ANNUAL REPORT

1941.

Unth]even,

I wish to present to you for consideration and adoption, a report on the activities of the W.A. Amateur Football Association, during the season.

As the main value of the report is for it to set a future record of our having been in existence in 1941, I have condensed this report to a minimum, as I consider that in times such as these nothing should be wasted, not even words.

At the start of the season, there were 10 affiliated clubs, these being, Wembley, Nth. Prenttle, R.A.A.F., Cliphont Baylands, Pile.O.P.O., Mivverally, West Prenttle, Nt. St. Thom and Swans. However the last mentioned were unable to field ~~more than~~ 14 or 15 men in the first half of the season, and had to withdraw from the competition. At the conclusion of the first round the first 4 teams played off the Baywood Shield and those finishing 5th, 6th, 7th & 8th competed for the Bedford Cup. The winners of these were Nth. Prenttle and Baylands respectively. The R Richardson Cup for the team which was leading at the end of the 1st round goes to Wembley, whose name appears for the 2nd time thereon.

Mr. R.P. Tenkel's trophy for the Palace and Post adjudged on the Wembley votes, was won by A.D. Snelley for the R.A.A.F.

FINANCIAL. The statement of receipts and expenditure shows a credit balance of £35.17.2. No money was paid to the Nth. Prenttle Council for the use of their Oval last year. Only because they did not furnish an account, although requested to do so on more than one occasion.

As in previous years, officers of the St. Johns Amalgamated were in attendance at our matches, and this service was appreciated by all members.

PLAYING CONDITIONS
Owing to the non-availability of a League's Secretary competition, we were able to play approximately half of our matches on street places only. There were some exceptions, notably Nth. Prenttle, when the second grade grounds were in previous years and I think the extra cost was appreciated.

On behalf of the Association, I desire to express our gratitude to the U.S. National Football League, and to their Secretary Mr. Orr Eccobilli, for the assistance given us during 1945.

Regarding 1946, I think that together with other forms football is in this condition need kicking and the opening in the game we all have to play will not be of 95 minutes duration with the off, and will be about 140, the volume of organized sport for our children's pleasure, I do not very serious cooperation with the Football League in competitive matters until after the World War do II is over.

In conclusion, I wish to express our record many thanks to club delegates and officials for their assistance and cooperation throughout the year, also to the members of the Protests and Disputes Board who were called upon several occasions to deal with offenders.
