The Adamson saga

NORWOOD BACK DOWN

South Australian club Norwood are getting cold feet over their dispute with West Perth involving the services of Brian Adamson.

With a legal bill of more than \$25,000 riding on the result, Norwood have taken several steps to try to avoid continuing with the legal action — even after forcing the issue in the first place.

Norwood officials shocked the WANFL and West Perth when they belatedly applied for an adjournment of the new hearing in the Federal Court on May 7 and the case is due to re-open in Adelaide on Wednesday.

Norwood recently appealed to the WANFL — and subsequently West Perth — to drop the case and seek a settlement out of court.

But a behind-closed-doors meeting of the WANFL directors decided to press on with the case. Obviously, they believe that the case can still be won and therefore Norwood will be left footing the huge bill.

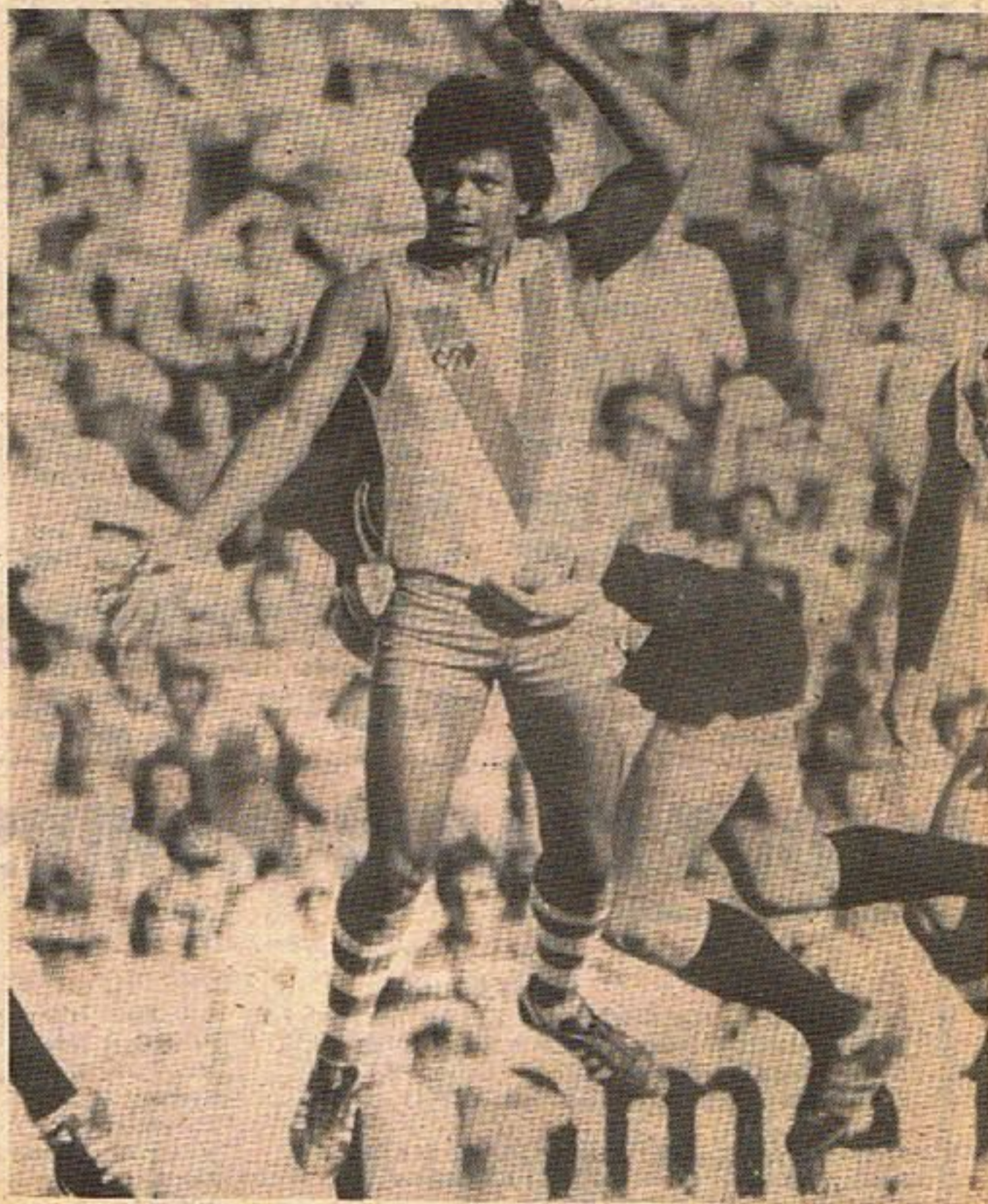
West Perth president Len Roper and the WANFL's legal adviser, Bob Meadows, made an abortive journey to Adelaide for the May 7 hearing only to be told that Norwood were not ready to proceed — even though it was more than two months since the High Court ruled that

Norwood felt that little could be gained by finally testing the case in court as this Federal Court hearing will certainly have major repercussions in the clearance battles between the major football States.

Norwood, who have gone into this legal battle without the sanction of the South Australian National Football League, have obviously been convinced that the value of winning Adamson via a court decision outweighs the future hazards for the entire clearance system.

Norwood had to accept a court ruling that they bear the costs of the deferment — about \$1000 — and they are now sweating it out before the hearing opens on Wednesday — if it opens.

the Federal Court had the jurisdiction to hear the case.

Obviously Norwood had hoped that their plea to drop the case would have been accepted and they made little effort to prepare their submissions for what is expected to be a vital court hearing.

CHECK NEEDED ON THOSE GOALS

The WANFL has to look closely at the situation regarding official goalkicking records.

With a lot of money at stake this season — \$1500 for players reaching 100 goals and \$15,000 for anyone kicking 150 goals — the records need a strong form of officialdom.

Last Saturday's case with East Perth wingman John McGuire was a classic example. McGuire won the Marlboro \$150 on TVW7's World of Football for the goal of the day — and it now turns out that he did not kick the goal. His team-mate, Paul Arnold, has confirmed that he soccered the ball through when McGuire's kick fell less than a metre short after travelling from well inside the centre square.

Nobody begrudges McGuire the prize because it was a magnificent kick; but how does it affect Arnold's goal-kicking tally? The big East Perth forward is certainly capable of kicking 100 goals in a season — his nine-goal effort in last year's preliminary final confirms that ability — so

every goal counts.

At present the WANFL relies on the goal-kicking records of *The West Australian* — certainly a reliable record, but not necessarily an official record.

There was another example two years ago when South Fremantle claimed that Ray Bauskis had one goal more than the media records showed. Because there was no official check, media records had to be amended as a result of South Fremantle's claim. That year it could have made a big difference as Bauskis and East Perth's Archie Duda were neck-and-neck in their race to 100 goals, which Bauskis finally won.

There have been many other disputed goals in recent seasons and it is extremely difficult for media scribes to pick out who kicks the ball when it comes out of a goal-front melee.

The goal umpire is the only person in a position to really tell and even though it

might be adding a burden to his task, he appears the logical person to become the official recorder. Maybe it could be done in conjunction with the emergency umpire. Or better still, a special steward could sit behind either goal to record the goal-kicking and also act as a steward in cases of behind-the-play incidents.

Another anomaly is the situation with goals kicked in Escort Championship matches.

Two seasons ago the WANFL agreed that players should be credited with games played in the then NFL competition and now these extra matches are added to a players' games tally; plus his provident fund.

But goals kicked in these matches do not go on to a players' career. Naturally, they should not be included in his WANFL goalkicking record, but a separate record should be kept and shown as additional goals.

EDITORIAL

Think about this . . .

They say that the game is bigger than the individual.

But that doesn't always seem to be the case in local football circles as we continue to see league coaches misuse the media in vain attempts to befuddle their opposition.

Last Saturday we had two blatant cases of football clubs getting their priorities a little mixed up.

South Fremantle coach Malcolm Brown made a big thing about dropping Joe McKay from the league side. The subterfuge went as far as McKay even going on record in a radio interview that he was playing reserves.

Just when McKay knew that the whole thing was a ruse is not certain. What is certain is that the deception certainly did not fool Swan Districts. It was obvious from 11.50 am — when the South Fremantle reserves side ran out on to the ground — that McKay was not playing reserves. When Peter Lauritsen, the man named to take McKay's place in the league side, lined up at centre-half-back it did not take much to deduce that McKay would be in the league line-up.

So the element of surprise was absent.

West Perth were equally at fault, but theirs was a case with a difference.

Victorian player John Frazer arrived in Perth at 2 am on Saturday and lined up in the league side at 2.30 pm.

Apparently the deal was not clinched till late Friday afternoon, but that still did not prevent the club from taking advantage of all the publicity media still available.

Obviously, they did not realise that advance publicity about such a recruit would bolster attendance at the game. After all, the West Perth fans have not had much to enthuse about this season

and the arrival of a Victorian recruit would certainly engender interest.

If the lack of information about Frazer was meant to be a surprise weapon for the game against East Perth, then it also back-fired. The East Perth camp certainly knew about Frazer well before the league game. It was on radio by at least 1 pm and after all, Barry Cable does have some good contacts back at his old club North Melbourne, where Frazer played 10 league games.

These two clubs are certainly not the only clubs that fail to promote their players and teams through the media.

In recent weeks almost every side has been guilty of releasing teams to the media on Thursday night that look vastly different to the line-up on Saturday. In the recent East Perth-Perth clash there were 12 positional changes.

All in all, it makes life difficult for the media. And, after all, it is the media that promotes the game. Maybe it's about time the clubs did a little more promoting also.

Maybe also we could take a look at what happened in South Australia, where attendances have fallen alarmingly. Football clubs are blaming a lack of media coverage on the drop in crowds. News media men acknowledge that the game is receiving less coverage . . . but they say that continual lack of co-operation from clubs has led to their tapering off of football promotion.

Closer to home, it was noted with concern that last Friday's Daily News devoted almost the same space to its preview of Saturday's football as it did to the preview of the VFL matches.

It is time for everyone to have a good look at themselves — and the promotion of the game.

Now we have two divisions

The WA football season received a savage setback when it was brought to a sudden halt last weekend with disappointing displays from the four bottom sides.

Just when things looked like developing into a cut-throat battle for survival, the competition fell apart at the seams.

With crowds going up every week, it was no wonder that 40,000 people attended the four matches for the seventh week in a row this season. They expected to see some tough, competitive football, particularly after Subiaco had come out of the wilderness to win a match; Perth had shown that they were not to be ignored; West Perth gave renewed signs of hope and Swan Districts emerged as a top-four contender.

But in less than 60 minutes last Saturday — and it only took that long because most games were over by half-time — everything was back to square one and it was the old story of the top half versus the bottom half.

Swans folded completely against the silk-smooth South side after matching wits for the first term. West Perth were completely outclassed by East Perth; Subiaco suffered an even more humiliating fate against East Fremantle and Perth took two paces backwards after their one step forward a week earlier when they were belted by Claremont.

It certainly looks as though the premiership table is split in two.

The top three sides — South Fremantle, East Fremantle and East Perth — are certainly looking good. They are moving along in polished style and with respective coaches Mal Brown, Brad Smith and Barry Cable all having apparently limitless depths of talent, they can justifiably be satisfied with their progress.

Claremont, the fourth-placed team, have not quite lived up to their pre-season promise or even their potential. But they have finished the first round with four wins from seven games and that's all you need at this stage of the season.

The troubles that abound in the lower half of the table are numerous.

Perth's Ken Armstrong has fielded a new-look side, full of promising youngsters, but also full of inconsistencies. He faces a struggle to get his young bloods to put it all together on a regular basis.

John Todd was utterly baffled by the apparent lack of desire from his Swans players after quarter-time last week. If they were discouraged by their failure to record more than three goals from their 11 scoring shots in the first term, then Todd's efforts in getting the players to strive to overcome all challenges has been in vain.

Frustrations like inaccurate kicking when you have had more than your share of the play are obstacles that good sides overcome; good players just keep on going when that happens. They don't compound.

Subiaco's lamentable performance was a far cry from the heady moments a week earlier. For Peter Burton it certainly was disappointing. But his perseverance is such that the players would have been given a



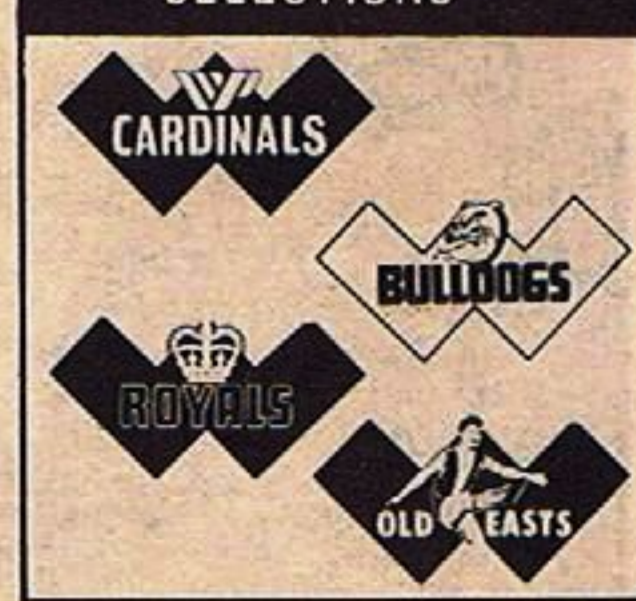

tough training pill to swallow this week and the outcome will almost certainly be a more competitive combination.

It is to be hoped that those bottom four sides can generate some new interest in the competition. In our 150th year, it would be tremendous to see the one millionth spectator pass through the gates at grand final time.

But to do that we need a viable competition and the 100-odd league players in those four bottom clubs have a responsibility to the paying public to perform at high levels.

This is a good idea — it adds variety to the training sessions, as players do tend to get used to the one man barking out the orders, and they can "switch off" from time to time.

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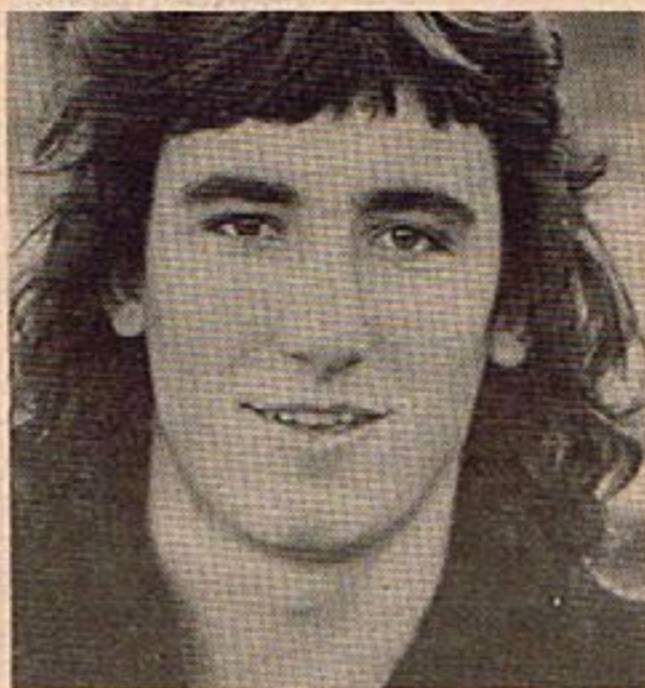
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I've got to admit I was more than impressed with the attitude of the Bulldogs on the track.

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FORMER SUBI COACH REFLECTS

Brian Douge appeared to be 'yet another Victorian' when he came to WA to take over as captain-coach of Subiaco. He did not enjoy much success; in fact he had to survive two of Subiaco's worst years.

He relinquished the coaching position last season, but stayed on as a player; impressing many people both inside and outside the club with his sincerity, his determination and courage on the field and his willingness to stick by the club that gave him his first taste of coaching.

ALAN EAST talks to Douge about the reasons behind his decision to stay in WA and his thoughts about Subiaco.

Why did you stay on at Subiaco as a player after stepping down as coach last year?

There were several reasons. The club had suffered severely, both on and off the field and I didn't want to leave if they felt that I could be of help. They suggested that I could help on the field, so I stayed for that reason. Another reason was that the position I held at the Marist Newman College was most beneficial and my wife also had an adequate professional job.

What were your thoughts about your two years as coach?

I was disappointed in some ways; mainly because I always believed that we had the players to perform well. The fact that you can win one game proves that you can win many. I was disappointed that the players were not rewarded for the effort they put in and the loyalty they gave me. I believe that the club and the players gave everything they had.

Did you see any failings in your approach as a coach?

Definitely. Having coached I can now see failings in all the coaches I've been involved with. First of all, I think the league coach is given too much of a role. He is expected to be the recruiting officer, the coach of the players and everything else. The role should be divided among people with expertise in different areas. I've learnt a lot from Peter Burton. His approach to recruiting and his rapport with players is tremendous; it has to be seen to be believed. He has the fantastic ability to get across to the individual just what he wants and he knows what he needs as a coach and he goes and gets it; he knows the people to go through to get what he wants. His tactics and coaching methods are similar to mine; we've obviously been through similar coaching schemes. But he has that little bit extra to get around problems I couldn't overcome.

Did coming from a professional and successful club like Hawthorn inhibit you a little?

I went into it with the same method as Kennedy used at Hawthorn. The only things I changed were due to my experiences as a physical education teacher. This probably led to problems — the game over here is entirely different, the climate is different, the method of running the club is different, the system of putting the players on the field is different. It took me quite a while to adapt to that. I struggled on thinking that my methods were right, but after half a season I had to change radically.

But when you look at the problems you faced — the climate, the comparison of clubs, your previous lack of coaching experience — you had a big hurdle to jump, didn't you?

I'd agree with that. But I wouldn't give that experience up for anything. I learnt more about coaching that way. I haven't given up thoughts of coaching again; in fact I'd gladly coach again having gained the knowledge from those two years.

As a coach of a bottom side, you obviously came in for a lot of criticism. Did any of this criticism affect you in any way?

No. I was glad for the criticism because some people can see things that you cannot see, particularly people off the field and people from this State who have seen a lot of football here. I used that criticism to change my approach and sometimes that criticism was used to change our training methods.

What about yourself as a player. Did you give yourself too much responsibility, trying to do too much on the field?

No I don't think so. I never adopted the dictatorial approach on selection. My selection in certain positions was quite often a unanimous decision. The moves on the field were usually made by our chairman of selectors, so that responsibility was taken away from me. I found that it was impossible to interpret how blokes were going while you were playing.

Where do you think you play your best football?

Probably in a back pocket. I played a lot of games as a junior at centre or ruck-rover. I don't think I've ever played as well as I can. I just believe that I have never really performed up to my capabilities.

Where did your career start?

I only started playing when I was 15. I played soccer before that. We moved to Waverley then and I just wandered down to the ground and had a kick with some boys. I then went on to Balwyn and then to Hawthorn, I played my first game at 17. I started off as a wing player; I was switched to roving in my first game and stayed there till Leigh Matthews replaced me five games later. But for the next five years I played on a wing.

What were your impressions of WA football, coming straight from a VFL grand final success?

I didn't really have any pre-conceived impressions. Once I started playing I discovered that the tempo is as fast; the players are not quite as big. The game certainly has the skill that Victoria has, but the thing that is missing is that the crowd atmosphere doesn't urge you on that little bit extra.

How long do you think you will stay here?

I don't really know. I'd like to stay here as long as it takes Subiaco to get back on its feet.

Do you believe they can recover?

Definitely. Anyone who works as hard as these players do has to have a reward in the finish.

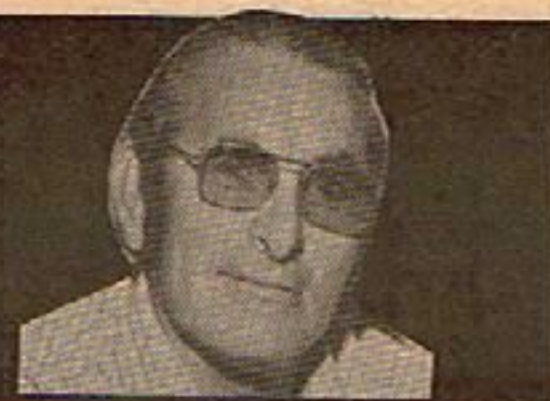

Wooden spooners

In September, 1973 Subiaco and West Perth played off for the premiership. This week they play off for the wooden spoon. It's 40 years since these clubs occupied the bottom two rungs of the ladder. West's have finished on the bottom eight times, the first in 1895 and the last in 1974. Subiaco have had some bad years — in 16 of them they finished last.

Below is a chart showing games played by each club since its inception to the end of 1978.

Games played in the war-time under-age competition are NOT included in the above figures.

Games played by West Perth are from 1891 onwards, the year they became known as West Perth.

Last week's games produced a one sided set of fixtures, the combined total of winning margins amounted to a massive 333 points.

Only once before in the history of the WANFL has there been a bigger margin between the winners and losers. On 30.8.1952 the four winners had 358 points to spare.

If Swan Districts don't beat East Fremantle at Bassendean this week they will never beat them anywhere. Well, that's what it looks like when you read through their record against Old Easts. From 39 games at East Fremantle Oval they won only seven and drew one. At Fremantle Oval (when East used it as their home ground) they won only three games and lost 24. At Subiaco Oval it's all square — three games all. But at Bassendean they have had 24 victories in their total of 37 against East Fremantle's all-ground total of 94 wins.

East Fremantle's score of 27.21 (183) last week was their highest score ever against Subiaco and their best score on East Fremantle Oval. Previous best was 26.18 v Claremont in 1958. The winning margin was a record too — 126 points was that club's biggest win in senior football. They did win an under-age derby by 202 points.

Perth maybe the underdogs when they play South Fremantle on Saturday, but their record against that side at Fremantle Oval is by far the best of all teams in the post-war era (1945 onwards). The Demons have won 29 of the 51 games played at the Port against South. Perth and South have met 228 times and Perth have 121 victories to 107.

Yes, Steve Riley of Embleton you are right.

A: South Fremantle did kick 202 points in 1978.

B: East Perth have drawn more than one game.

Umpiring not so easy!

Who said life was not meant to be easy?

This saying also applies to umpiring as it has not got any easier over the years.

Although we now have the two umpire system in operation, it does not make it easier for field umpires.

The game has just got faster and faster and no way would an umpire under the one umpire system be able to stay with the game. Therefore, thankfully the two umpire system is here to stay.

Present-day umpires would go through a much tougher preparation than umpires of years ago. At different stages of the game one umpire not actively engaged in the game must still concentrate on what is going on and help his co-umpire in control generally.

Umpires now are required to go deeper into the forward line than what they used to do.

The big advantage to umpires of the two-umpire system is that it gives more umpires a chance to control league football and also will keep umpires in the game much longer.

Why has the game become faster?

There is probably a dozen and one reasons for the game becoming faster.

For instance it is a must to dispose of the ball quickly. Coaches demand that players must keep the ball moving. It is not very often that players after taking a mark or receiving a free kick actually go back for their kick. They are looking for the player

running past to give the ball to.

Also, the changes and additions to the laws over the years have had a big bearing on the speed of the game.

The interchangeable reserve system has now made it possible for coaches to maintain pressure for longer periods. Instead of sending a player say to the forward pocket for a rest, they can take him off the field for any length of time. When the player has recovered he can then take his place on the field again.

Many people originally were against the two-umpire system, but now they agree that it has helped the game. When Western Australia beat South Australia in Adelaide two seasons ago the SA coach said that WA football was much faster because of playing under the two umpire system. At that time SA were operating under one umpire.

They have now changed to two umpires.

Football critics said that the centre square was not needed in WA football because of our good playing conditions. They said that Victoria wanted the square because the heavy conditions created chaos at centre bounce downs.

You would at times have 20 or more players around the centre bounce. Nowadays the ball is quickly cleared from the centre. It also gives the skilful ruckman a greater chance to use his skills to contest the bounce downs.

Kicking out on the full took the onus off the umpire to decide whether the player kicked the ball out on purpose. There were many players who were skilful in this art. Now it is mandatory if the ball is kicked out on the full it is a free kick and there is no argument.

Other changes have helped the game speed up, this gives more scoring opportunities and a high scoring game is always a crowd pleaser.

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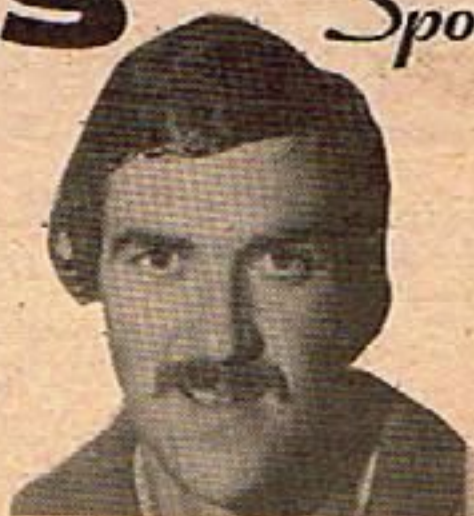

Handball helps South Adelaide

South Adelaide's rise to the top of the South Australian premiership table has coincided with a drastic change in football style — and handball is the keynote of their success.

And it has taken that wunderlust of football, former Swan Districts hero Haydn Bunton, to introduce the new change.

Veteran SA football commentator and former star Bob Hammond rates South Adelaide as the best handballing side he has ever seen. In addition, he is particularly impressed with the ability of the players to handball with both hands — an art that is seldom taught in juniors today.

Hammond pays tribute to two of WA's greatest champions — Barry Cable and Graham Farmer — as the men who developed the art of handball and the South Adelaide side is obviously benefitting by the lessons from Bunton.

Despite the pre-season loss of their top ruckman, former Claremont star Peter Hines, South Adelaide are cruising along with five wins from their six clashes and certainly look like the side to beat for the flag.

Ron Hateley, SA's best player in the game against WA last season, has been forced out of the State side for the all-important clash with Victoria this Monday.

Hateley, South Adelaide's dashing wingman, was injured in the third quarter of the game against Glenelg last week and will miss about four games.

Former WA ruck star John Duckworth is a certainty to be SA's trump card in the clash with Victoria. Duckworth lifted Central District off the canvas to take them to a stirring 23-point win over Woodville last week.

He proved the master of former Victorian ruckman Barry Goodingham and the display has almost certainly earned him a prominent spot in the SA team.



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Melbourne farewells two heroes

Two of Melbourne's favorite sporting "sons" went on parade on Saturday afternoon for the last time and received a rousing farewell.

And it seems likely that both will be crossing the Nullabor before the winter is out.

At VFL Park a huge crowd farewelled veteran Tiger backman Kevin Sheedy, who announced his retirement last week after 270 games for Richmond and Victoria.

And across the other side of town, Australia's highest stake earning race-horse Family of Man was farewelled at Flemington.

While both champions have given away their respective sports because of a drop in pace, there is every chance that Sheedy may consider offers to head West.

(Family of Man was sold to WA last Friday).

Within hours of the announcement South Fremantle coach Mal Brown was on the phone to him trying to persuade him to join his side.

Apart from the fact that Brown and Sheedy were team-mates at Punt Road in 1974, South's captain Noel Carter is another ex-Tiger.

Looking back on the career of the rugged Tiger it is one that is crammed with achievement. The boy who came from Prahran and was told he was too slow for VFL football played in three premierships, captained Richmond in 1977 and won the club's best and fairest the previous year.

He played eight times for Victoria. Alf Brown, the chief football writer of the Melbourne Herald wrote after he announced his retirement: "Kevin hung on for too long. Forget the Sheedy who cruised league grounds for the last couple of years.

"Remember the Sheedy of the late sixties and middle seventies.

"The tough, courageous, aggressive, tantalising, aggravating, matchwinning Sheedy.

". . . The man who goes to a losing position and turns it into a strength.

". . . The player who could line up against a star, give him inches and many pounds and cut him down to size with skill and pestering outside-the-rule tactics which umpires knew were being used by could rarely detect.

Sheedy is continuing to work as Richmond's promotions officer, giving clinics to schools and clubs in the Tigers territory.

He told me before Saturday's game that he was thinking carefully about his future next week before making a decision.

Running onto VFL Park on Saturday afternoon, flanked by North skipper Keith Greig and his old team-mate Kevin Bartlett may have been the thrill to get his adrenalin flowing again.

If so, look out WA.

Young too costly

South Melbourne discard David Young, who cost the club \$70,000 two years ago is pricing himself out of the game.

Young, who came from South Australia with a great reputation clashed heatedly with coach Ian Stewart and suddenly found himself sacked.

A talented player, the bearded centre-man is asking about \$20,000 a season with the proviso that he stand out of football for a month or so to let his injured ankle heal.

The other shock at South last week was the resignation of general manager Oberon Pirak, who arrived from South Australia a few months before Young.

Mr Pirak, reputed to be the third highest paid administrator in the VFL, decided he wasn't interested in being a virtually full time recruiting officer.

THE 6PR BIG TEAM

WA's first-ever computer football team is under way . . . Radio station 6PR, in conjunction with Western International Travel and Australian Insurance Brokers — are preparing a team based on weakly computer information.

A tough decision



Alan Quartermaine, one of football's controversial and intriguing characters, has no fears about stepping into one of the hottest seats around — general manager of the ailing Subiaco Football Club.

Quartermaine's football life has always had the drama of the unexpected — quitting the game under coach Mal Brown; winning the 1975 Sandover Medal as a rank outsider; dropping out last season to concentrate on studies — and now retiring to cross the border into administration.

"It's a huge challenge, but I'm really looking forward to it," says the 27-year-old former East Perth star whose blistering pace has often presented a huge challenge itself to opposing defenders.

"It was certainly a tough decision to quit football. I believed that I had another year or two left. But I've always wanted a job such as this, so I had to make the decision."

Quartermaine's decision to hang up his boots after a 10-year career that saw him play 108 league games and kick 177 goals took many people by surprise. However, it was made easier for him when he suffered

his sixth injury for the season in the game against South Fremantle — two days before he was interviewed by Subiaco officials.

Quartermaine was just getting back to top form when he dislocated his shoulder in the rugged clash with South Fremantle — and that was virtually the straw that broke the camel's back.

"So far this season I have pulled my hamstring muscle three times; damaged my left ankle; had six stitches in a gashed ear and finally did my shoulder," he says. "I reckon that's enough to help me decide to retire."

Quartermaine, a football fanatic from the age of nine — he was playing in the under-17 competition down at Katanning soon after that age — realised that the highly-paid Subiaco job was too good an opportunity to turn down.

He doesn't plan to seek a clearance from East Perth — and would probably prefer not to involve himself in any protracted wrangles anyway — and he believes that the task of helping Subiaco survive will be a demanding one that leaves no room for playing football competitively.

About his new job: Quartermaine sees the financial side as his major problem. Four years of study has left him with a Bachelor of Economics degree and he will obviously be expected to offer the club some expert day-to-day advice on their affairs.

"I plan to tackle the job honestly; that's the only way to do it," he says. "For the first few weeks I'll be having a long, hard look at the financial situation and trying to sort out in my own mind just exactly where Subiaco are going."

"Till we get the club on a successful financial footing we cannot expect to get anywhere. We have to build up our playing strength right down the ranks and we need a healthy financial background to do that."

"I'm confident that we can do it. It will take time, but I'm looking forward to the task."

SOUR TASTE!

The much-publicised player swap between Subiaco and East Perth with Alex Hamilton and Ken Screech has turned sour for the Royals with the decision by Screech to quit league football.

The 23-year-old defender has left East Perth to join the Nollamara amateurs.

He told club officials that he could not handle the pace and the pressure at Perth Oval.

Screech's decision to quit has greatly disappointed Royals captain-coach Barry Cable, who felt that he had the ability to be a capable defender if he could dedicate himself.

However, the message from East Perth is that Screech would not have been much value around finals time if he could not stand up to the pressure and discipline at this early stage.

GARY'S GOSSIP

Incidentally, Mal had Graham Campbell take one of South's sessions last week. This week he obtained the services of one of the red and whites all-time champions, Steve Marsh. Steve supervised training on Thursday night.

TWV Channel Seven always seem to be first with the latest, particularly in football. They have suggested to the WANFL that they consider including a proper studio or television interview room as part of their super \$5 million dollar extensions at Subiaco Oval. I think it's a great idea and so do a lot of my colleagues in the media world. Work should commence at League headquarters immediately after the end of the 1979 season.

Be warned Western Australia. My spies in Adelaide tell me that the SANFL are determined to regain some of their sagging interstate football prestige by defeating WA at Subiaco Oval in July — and in our 150th anniversary year too. The South Australians really mean business, they have been conducting regular meetings to discuss the project since the season commenced and a specially chosen league squad has been in training now for at least three weeks. One fellow who has been assisting the SA squad is Haydn Bunton. "Bunts", by the way, is enjoying one of his most successful seasons in Adelaide. His side South Adelaide continue to ride high on the premiership table following a convincing win over Glenelg last Saturday.

Radio 6PR suffered a shock recently when Ron Barassi, a regular Friday morning comments man on the station for the past two seasons, suddenly defected to 6PM. 6PR have retaliated however. From now, on the Friday morning VFL spot will be conducted on a rotational basis and feature former WA footballers now playing in Victoria such as Rob Wiley, Garry Sidebottom, Bill Valli, Barry Day, Bob Beecroft, Ross Glendinning, Allan Reid and Graham Melrose and so forth. Quite frankly, I think the idea is great and I'm sure WA football fans will agree.

Talking about East Perth, don't be surprised to see a young and talented North Melbourne kid called Kerry Good included in their line-up soon. Good will probably come to East Perth on loan for the remainder of this season, but the "Kangaroos" definitely want him back as they see this 22-year-old as a star in the future.

More rumours. My radio spies tell me that STW Channel 9 will involve themselves in football toward the end of the season. One of their projects is a special televised Champagne Breakfast on Grand Final morning, plus a couple of other shows. Channel 9, in my opinion, are now the "poor relation" as far as football is concerned.

Ironical, really, as the station had the "ball at their feet" so to speak two or three seasons ago. However, any coverage offered by Nine is all grist to the mill as far as football is concerned. If the Channel 9 footy rumours are true, it will be interesting to see whether they continue to associate themselves with 6PM or form a new alliance with 6PR.

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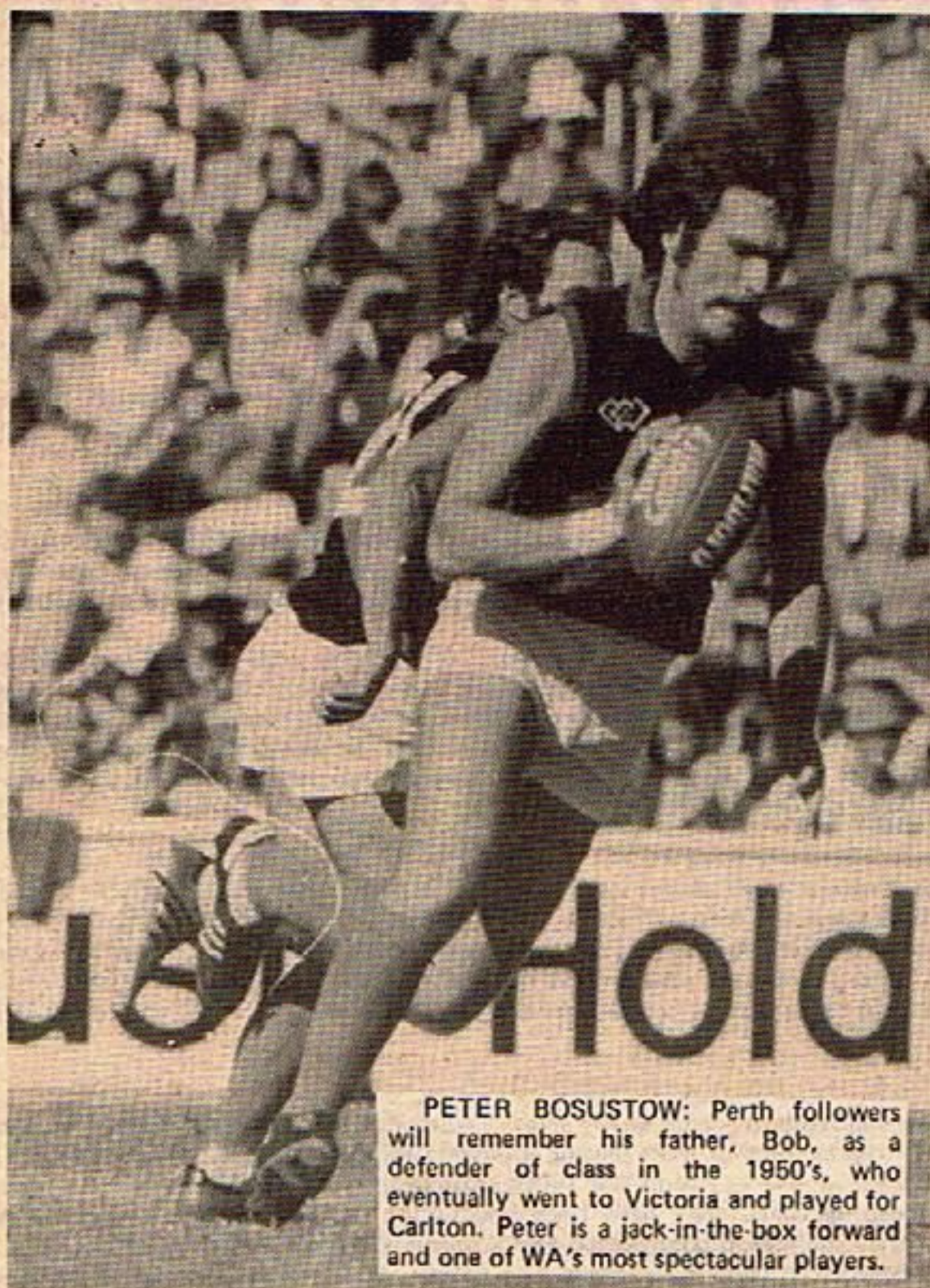

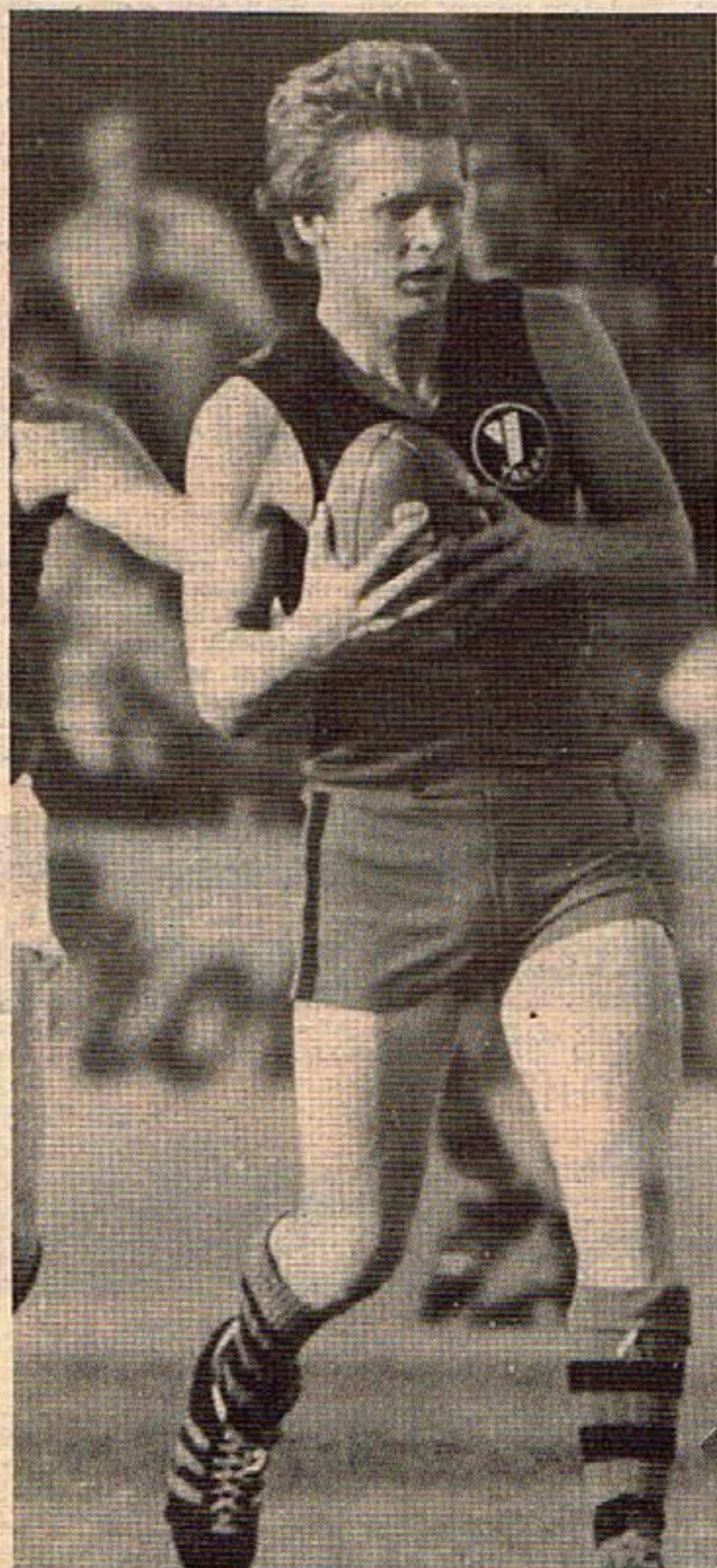
FOLLOWING IN FATHER'S FOOTSTEPS

One of the most fascinating features of league football is to follow the exploits of sons of famous players in the game and follow the exploits of sons of famous players.

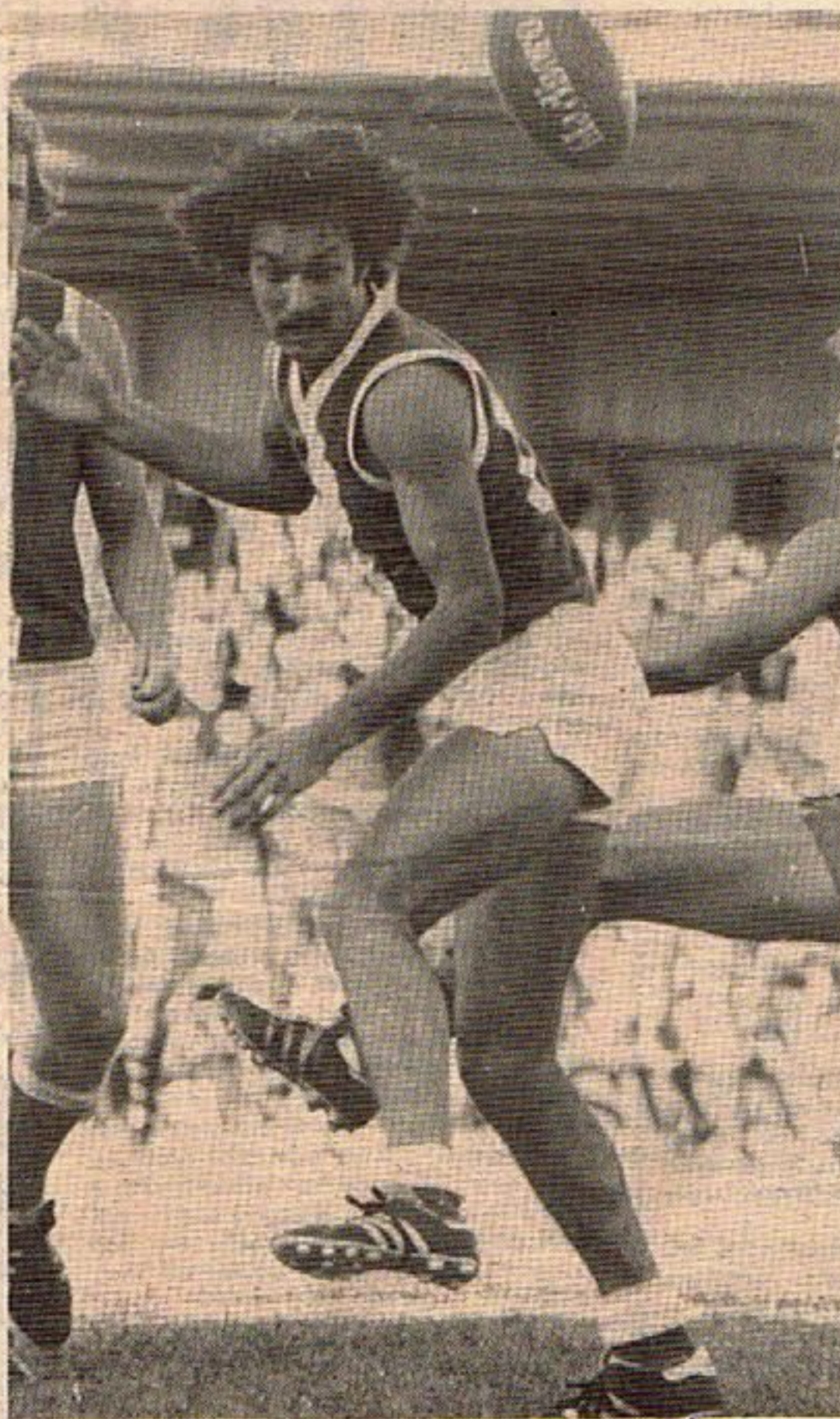
The record books show that football ability runs strongly in some families, with sons following in the footsteps of their fathers, who were big stars in post-war football.

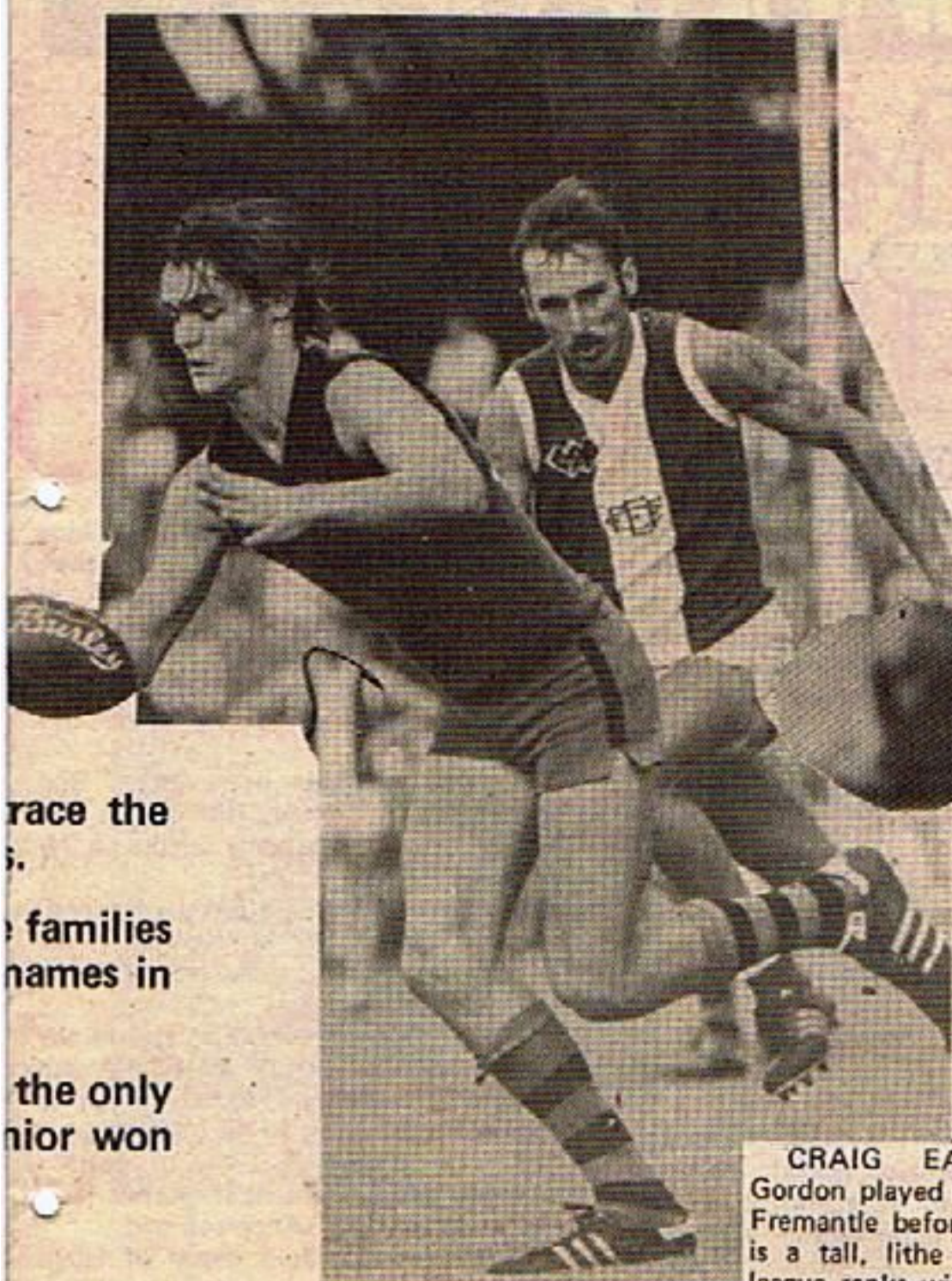
Here is a brief look at some of today's famous sons.

Jim played for WA and won East Perth's fairest and best award. Peter, a rover-centreman, went one better than dad when he won the 1976 Sandover Medal, after winning the club's fairest and best award twice.

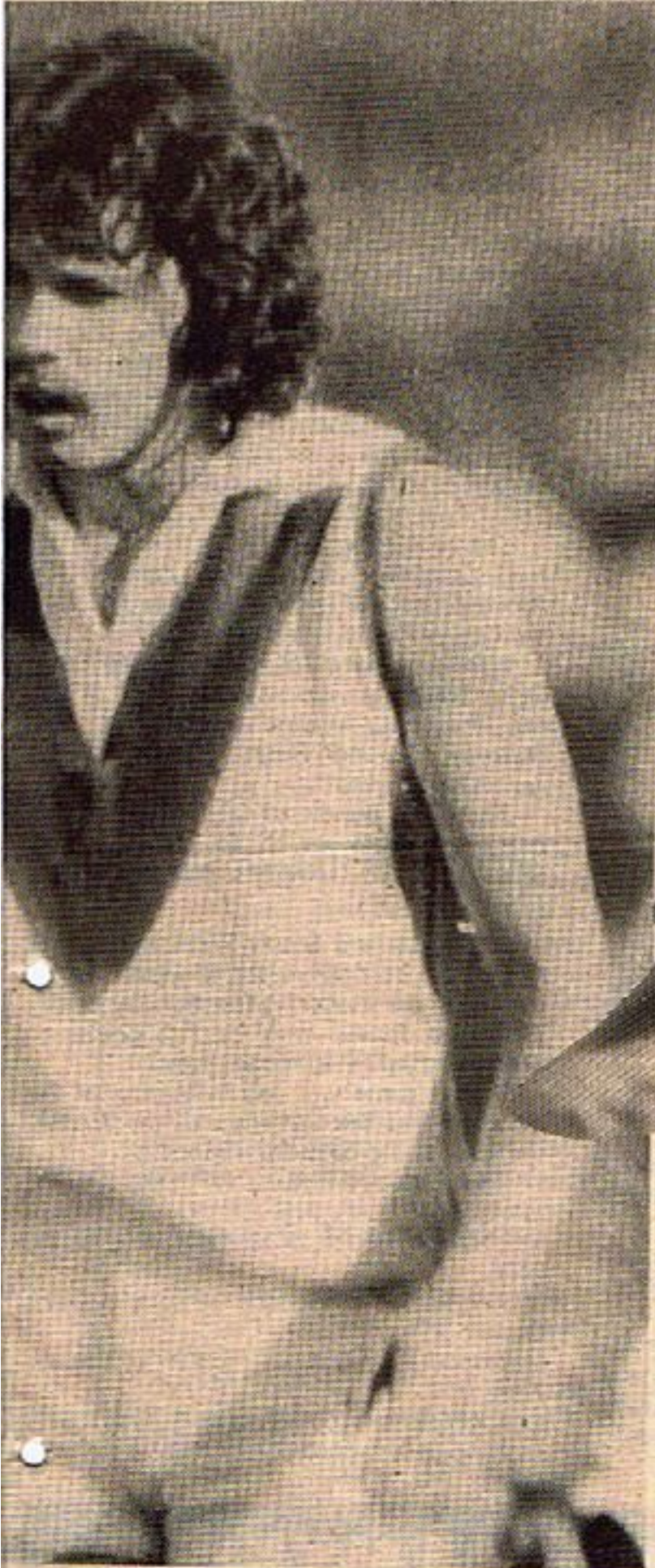


ROBBIE JOHNSON: A son of Percy who made his name as a ruckman-forward with East Fremantle in the 1950's. Robbie is now approaching his best form as a ruck-rover and followed his elder brother-ruckman Percy junior into league ranks.

Bottom teams Maddington and Willetton clash at Maddington, which gives one side the chance to notch their first four premiership points. It is anyone's guess who it could be, but maybe Willetton will enjoy victory.

In the other games, top sides Kelmscott and Thornlie will boost their percentage against Mandurah and Armadale.

W.A.F.A. coach Len Anderson, the man who has taken Mosman Park through five unbeaten games this season, made this clear this week.

Anderson and his co-selectors, Ron Ronchi, Barry Dedman, Con Regan and Wayne Harvey have already selected a 34-man squad for the match.

They have gone for a blend of experience and youth. The only common denominator is that all players are fit, in form and enthusiastic.

On paper it is reasonable to assume the powerful VFA will crush the W.A.F.A. and Anderson is certainly realistic enough to recognise his team will be the underdog.

"But by picking a team of goers I believe we can beat them if we put it together on the day," Anderson said.

"There is tremendous depth of talent in the W.A.F.A. at the moment - this is something we realised when we sat down to select our initial squad."

The first big decision is who to play in the centre. Mosman Park's Barry Haydinger is the form centreman in the association at the moment but South Perth's Barry Stockden is also in top form.

There are at least five rovers vying for a berth - Wanneroo's Gary Clohessey, Mosman's John Hall, Cockburn's Ray Stewart, South Perth's Kim Castle and Inglewood's Greg Hyde are all top players capable of doing well in such a game.

Selecting ruckmen and ruck rovers is no less easy. In the ruck division there are players like Joe Angel and Jeff Allen (MP), Gary Fee (VP), Dennis Williams (W) and Tom Goldfinch (OP).

The ruck-rovers are likely to come from Rob Cantrell (Mets) Greg Parker (W), Richard Peel (SP), Glen Wheeler (I), Ron Bentley (VP) and Paul Bennett (C).

Wanneroo forwards Russell Colcutt and Colin Northcott are likely to fight it out for the full forward berth and Ron Watroba (I) and Russell Grant (C) for centre-half-forward.

There is a bundle of talented and tough defenders from which to pick - Allan Shepherd, Noel Knights (W) and Wayne Blockland (OP).

Wanneroo and South Perth fought out one of the best games played in the W.A.F.A. over the past five years last Sunday before Wanneroo finally won by five points to keep their unbeaten record intact.

If that game was any indication of the standard and the fierceness of the W.A.F.A., the VFA could be in for a shock.

Junior football hits a high spot during the two weeks of the school holidays with all clubs running coaching clinics and the WANFL staging its special skills programme.

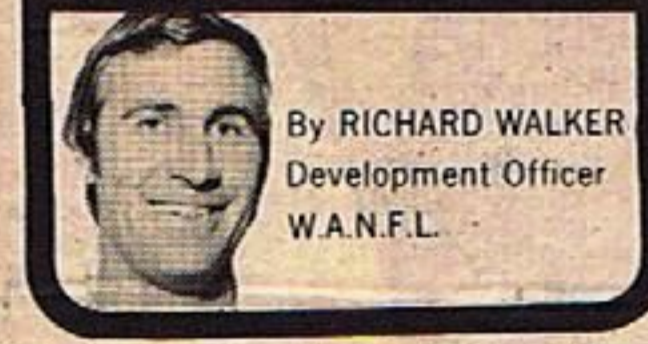

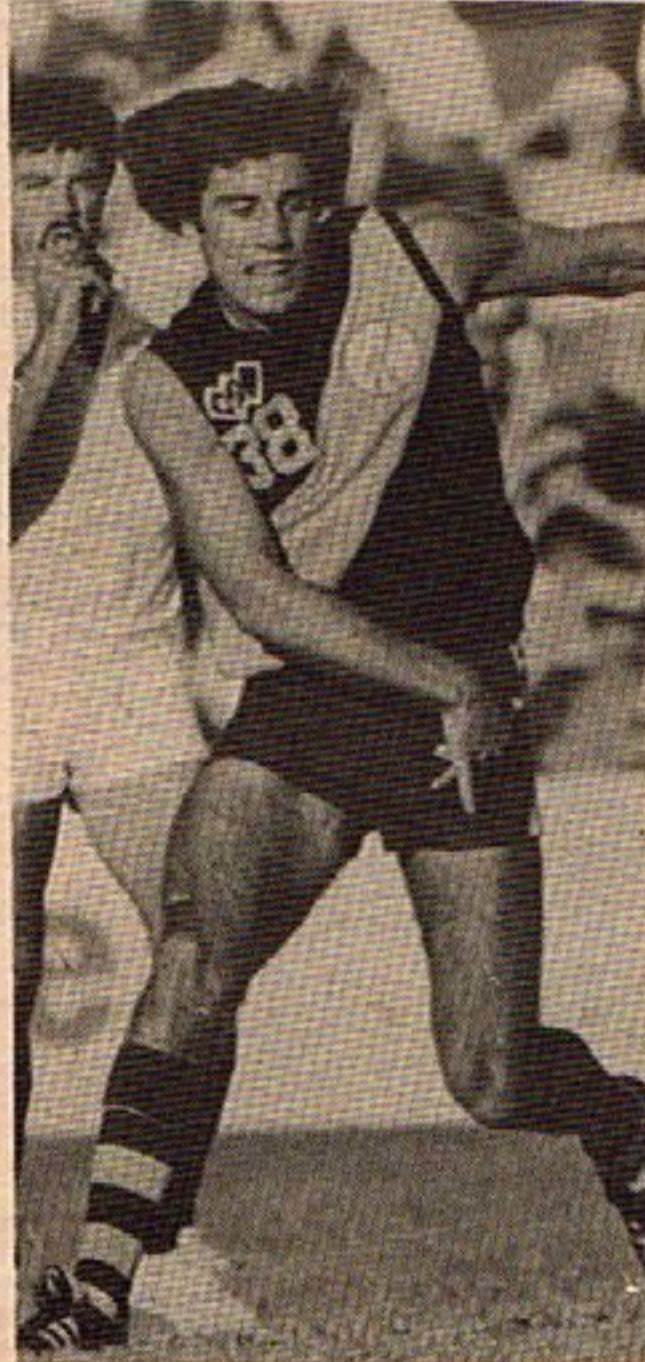

Royals goalsneak Archie Duda was very relieved when the final siren went against West Perth last Saturday . . . he had survived a crucial test of his ability. Duda, one of the WANFL's top goalkickers in recent years, has been languishing in the reserves because coach Barry Cable did not believe that he was competitive enough to be in the league side. Finally Duda was given his chance last week — for the first time this season — and he responded magnificently. He booted six goals and was a hard-worker throughout the match. His teaming with big Paul Arnold, the goalkicking star of last year's final round, was perfect and the two men kicked 12 of the team's 21 goals between them.

East Fremantle's Kevin Taylor did not pick up the goal-of-the-day — but he certainly takes the honours for the best effort of the round. Taylor roved the packs extremely well and picked up seven goals when resting in the forward line. However, he should have returned a much bigger haul as he kicked five points, several of which could have been majors which might have left him in the superstar bracket for rovers kicking more than 10 goals.

Victorian John Frazer impressed with his goal-kicking ability when he made his debut with West Perth on Saturday. Frazer, flown in secretly by West Perth and 'smuggled' out on to the ground, had his first kick in WA at centre-half-forward, but then his second kick — when he had moved to full-forward — registered a goal. He finished with three goals, one of which was a real gem. Running away from the goals, heading towards the boundary line, he snapped it back off his right foot and steered it through the middle — something West Perth could only manage on six other occasions on a luckless Saturday afternoon.

Claremont's Steve Malaxos had one of those dream-come-true days last Saturday. The 17-year-old former Colts star was playing only his fourth league game and he just happened to be in the right place at the right time on Saturday. He picked up five goals from a permanent forward pocket and at least three came from his ability to be in the right place as mis-directed kicks found their way into his waiting arms.

The introduction of a special award based on the votes of footballers themselves will certainly add interest to the football season.

The Players' Association Award will provide a trip for two people to Hong Kong at the end of the season — and it will be an award that the winning player will certainly value as he knows it comes from the votes of his team-mates and rivals alike.

Generous sponsorship arranged through Vacations Unlimited makes this award unique in WA football history.

At the end of the season all members of the Players' Association — and by then we hope to have the majority of league footballers on our books — will vote on a 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 basis for the footballer of their choice.
