South Fremantle's surprise weapon in the 1979 premiership battle . . . that's the tag being placed on the volatile talents of Mark Jackson.

The 19-year-old former Richmond colts player has emerged as the successor to Malcolm Brown in the 'character stakes' at Fremantle Oval.

He has astounded club officials — and bewildered opposing players — with his raw-boned talent.

In fact, Brown believes Jackson is just the sort of player South need to win a premiership.

"He is a real character," says Brown.

"He is a personality and you need personalities in football. He creates atmosphere; he makes people jump up and down.

"He is volatile, ungainly, angry . . . almost anything you want to call him. But he's a real goer and never stops trying.

"If you went on his general attitude to things, then you'd think he didn't have a brain in his head. But he has a tremendous football brain, certainly one of the best I've ever come across.

"He does everything wrong off the field, such as sleeping in and so forth. But it's taken all the knockers 10 weeks to realise how good he is on the field."

The South surprise package . . . Mark Jackson and here he shows East Fremantle ruckman Graeme Carter that he will stand no nonsense.

HANDS OFF OUR KIDS!

Victorian and South Australian football clubs have been warned to keep their cheque books away from WA's outstanding young footballers in the Teal Cup side.

The under-17 team, representing some of the State's best teenage talent, leaves next week for Hobart to contest the Teal Cup competition — and to atone for their narrow loss in last year's inaugural series.

Last year the talent scouts from almost every club in Victoria and South Australia pestered the West Australian boys and at least five youngsters were enticed to sign form fours.

At one stage last year there were more talent scouts trying to get to the young stars than there were players in the rooms.

"I think he's gone and there isn't much we can do about it," Mr Cowan said this week.

The decision this week by East Fremantle to reluctantly clear brilliant young forward Brian Taylor is the end result of a greedy campaign by Richmond at last year's carnival in Adelaide. In fact, several WANFL officials accused Richmond of simply using the WA Teal Cup team as their breeding ground.

East Fremantle agreed to clear Taylor simply because court action was imminent and would have been prolonged. So they accepted a fee believed to be around \$30,000 and an open clearance back if he wants it.

But East Fremantle president Merv Cowan doesn't think Taylor will ever play in WA — unless he is in a Victorian

"But we have let Richmond know that we are pretty disgusted with their tactics. I think they showed a lack of integrity tackling teenage boys when they are away on trips like that."

Other WA clubs follow Mr Cowan's thinking and officials will do everything they can to keep the youngsters out of the prying hands of the talent scouts.

Richmond have already thumbed their nose at East Fremantle by indicating that they will be out in full force during this year's carnival.

Several of the Teal Cup boys are expected to be played in the colts competition this Saturday to tie them to their WA league club. Five of the 25 boys selected to go to Hobart were not playing with a WANFL club at the time and are therefore not bound to the club.

But even after the boys become tied to their league club, the option of taking legal action to gain clearances seems to be Victoria's answer anyway and there is little that can be done . . . except to sever as many ties as we can with the player-hungry Victorians.

The VFL certainly adopts a two-faced attitude when it sends a delegation to WA to seek talks on finding a solution to the spiralling clearance fee situation and then openly canvasses among our best juniors with healthy cheque books in a bid to win their signatures.

Last year's Teal Cup squad produced plenty of good league football material — but also saw players like David Court and Peter Thomas (Subiaco), Grant Campbell (East Perth), Gary Armstrong (Perth) and Taylor signing up with VFL clubs.

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EDITORIAL

THE CROWD PULLERS

The drawing power of our Fremantle sides — and the value of promoting a football match — was never more evident than on Monday.

For the second time this year the traditional Derby clash between the two port sides — South Fremantle and East Fremantle — broke the respective ground records, firstly at East Fremantle Oval on April 14 and then at Fremantle Oval last Monday.

Admittedly, both occasions were split rounds, with the football public only having to decide between two games, instead of four. But you still need the lure of watching top sides in action to entice the average football follower out of his cosy shell at home.

The South Fremantle and East Fremantle directors must be more than pleased with themselves as they look at their attendances this year. So far this year 127,607 people have attended football at the 10 games in Fremantle — a nice, healthy average of 12,760. The respective figures are 71,145 at East Fremantle Oval and 56,462 at Fremantle Oval — but it must be remembered that the draw has favoured East Fremantle Oval with six home games there, compared to only four at Fremantle Oval.

It is always pleasing to break ground records because they are not easy to set and therefore it takes a big attraction to beat one of those long-standing records.

East Fremantle and South Fremantle have done a good job promoting their players and clubs this season and they both deserve the satisfaction of seeing ground records established in this, our 150th year.

Just as a comparison, both ground record figures have not just been broken — they have been shattered.

The East Fremantle Oval record of 19,200 — set way back in September, 1961 — was upped to a healthy 21,317.



The Fremantle Oval record of 19,004 — which has stood since the June Derby in 1964 — was shattered with Monday's figure of 22,399.

Our crowd attendances are in a healthy state this season. We are up some 26,000 and even though the fine weather has been in football's favour, the tough nature of the competition and some of our exciting new stars are drawing more people through the turnstiles.

On the topic of promotion, South Fremantle — and the Fremantle City Council — certainly proved that it pays off last Monday.

As part of the 150th year celebrations, the council joined forces with South Fremantle and backed by a number of Fremantle sponsors, embarked on a grand final type promotion with bands, balloons and ballyhoo . . . all part and parcel of giving the public something extra for their dollar.

The ground record, and obviously a very healthy bar turnover, was their reward. So why don't clubs adopt similar — if not such extensive — approaches more often?

Every time there is an important match, be it at Perth Oval, Fremantle Oval or Bassendean Oval, there is room for promotion of the game. Clubs shouldn't leave it all to the media; South proved that they can do something off their own bat and benefit, didn't they?

But then, we've been through all this before, haven't we?

Rocky road for East Fremantle

East Fremantle, the trendsetters for the early part of the season, are suffering from a double-dose of defeat . . . and they don't like it.

Old Easts have found the world turning sour on them with last-quarter fade-outs costing them victory against Claremont and South Fremantle — two of their top-four rivals. Now, in addition they have an injury plague. The loss of almost all their set defence for the derby last Monday was a tragic blow; in fact it was a tremendous tribute to the club that they made such a magnificent fight of the inaugural Foundation Day Derby, as it is to be known from now on.

Just look at the line-up — a week earlier, at full strength, their defence was Dobson, Crouch, Needle and Miller, Doug Green and Brenton. Last Monday it was Dobson, Hoult, Needle plus Diver, Overhue and Brenton. Good attacks are built around solid defences and East Fremantle's effort on Monday confirmed their depth in this department.

Now they face a third tough test — against East Perth; and at Perth Oval as well.

East Fremantle anxiously need to reassert their authority in this top-four battle. East Perth, likewise, need a win . . . and how.

Stocks in the Royals camp are not at a real high level. Their journey back into the top four was a hazardous one; helped by a lack-lustre win over a disappointing Subiaco, combined with a flop by Perth up at Bassendean Oval.

Right now it is the young, fledging Swans who are poised to enter the top four. They are fit, keen and eager — and certainly capable of holding down a top four berth. All they need is the chance to get in there and it could come any time. John Todd knows that he only has to keep the side winning and the breaks will come their way.

This week Swans travel to Claremont knowing that seven weeks ago the Tigers snatched a last-minute win in a game that Swans could have rightfully felt should have gone their way.

They have the chance to atone this week and victory is important.

Claremont are running hot at present. But they still have that little question mark of consistency hanging over them and this match has all the ingredients of being a top-class clash.

Perth's problems will not be eased by the fact that they are at home to bottom side West Perth. New Cardinals coach Graham Campbell extracted that little bit extra out of this side against Claremont last week and with only six points the difference heading towards the final bell, it could have gone either way.

Campbell and his players have proved that they can be competitive . . . can they go one step better this weekend.

South Fremantle are at home to Subiaco and that seems a certain four premiership points. Subiaco's game lacked any sort of teamwork; team spirit or system last Monday — in stark contrast to their previous home game when they played with lots of aggressive and satisfying team work to beat West Perth.

Listening to Radio 6PM's "roving reporter", Tim Flynn after Monday's Derby was quite amusing. He had some interesting comments from coaches and players, in particular Mal Brown and Trevor Sprigg, who claimed that East Fremantle had lost no friends in their defeat by South Fremantle and it was a magnificent effort by all players concerned, especially the new players. He also, was not pleased with the umpiring, which just goes to show that umpires can never win! Judging by the comments from both sides, the game should have been a draw! Another interesting comment was made by Noel Carter, South's captain, who said that when he ran onto the ground it was like the 1973 Melbourne Grand Final in which he played for Richmond. He really felt his body tingle when the crowd roared, which seemed to be happening all day.

Three former WA players who are in Victoria but do not feature a lot because they are not playing for the glamour sides are John Burns (East Perth), Gary Malarkey (East Perth) and Brian Cousins (Perth). Burns was transferred to Geelong this year from North Melbourne and has performed consistently for this side and figures in the best players list most weeks. Malarkey plays at full-back for the same side, but not in the spectacular sense that the Victorian public and press would like. But he has asserted his authority as one of the leading full backs in Victoria. Gary was unlucky not to be picked in the State-of-Origin side that played against Victoria at V.F.L. Park last year. Cousins, who had a torrid time to get into the Geelong side,

has now found his feet and is figuring in the goal kickers and best players each week. Interesting to note that Brian could be back in WA with his old club, Perth, next year. With the abundance of rovers at Perth, barring injury, one wonders if Cousins could play at centre, which is a trouble spot for Perth at present, though Wayne Currie is playing consistent football without being spectacular in this position.

After hearing Percy Johnson's offer on television to help coach children, East Fremantle's under-14 combined side jumped at the opportunity and quickly had Percy down to take them through their paces. It is interesting to note that they went through the long weekend undefeated — beating South Fremantle, West Perth and Perth — and now play in the grand final on July 1.

Talking about Percy, there is no doubt that he has not lost the gift of the gab in summing up games on television. TVW 7 were quick to grab Percy and put him on their football round-up on Saturday night and he gave a very comprehensive summary of the game between Perth and Swans. Well done, Percy.

Allan Reid former East Fremantle winger seemed to find it hard settling down to the Victorian pressure of football. But full points to Essendon for persevering with him and over the past couple of weeks he has performed very well. In fact, on Saturday he was named Essendon's best player against Hawthorn by most media.

Reading Graham Campbell's column last week in which he was talking about Colin Beard being loyal to his old club, Souths, by coaching the colts side interested me. So I looked through football budget this last weekend and noticed that in the colts and reserves, 14 out of the 16 coaches are in fact former league players. Of these, 10 are coaching the clubs they played with.

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NEW LEASE FOR IRON-MAN STAN

Times have been tough at Bassendean in the last decade.

But rugged Swan Districts captain Stan Nowotny is one man who has survived the crisis periods and is now helping lead the rejuvenated camp.

Nowotny is a veteran of WA football a player who is still only 28 and one who is enjoying a new lease of life.

Nowotny talks about the tough times — and the future — to ALAN EAST:

You are almost the old man of the team at Swans now with nearly 200 games behind you. How do you feel about that?

No, I don't feel like the old man. I might be in age, but I feel as though I'm just entering the prime of my football. The change from playing on the half-back flank and the way the side has been playing gives you a better mental outlook, I think. You approach your football differently by being on the ball and the fact that the side is showing a lot more endeavour and you realise that you are getting more results, instead of just battling your guts out for nothing.

You have been through some highs and lows with Swans. Has it been tough in those years?

Yes, it's been difficult. That's why I'm enjoying my football so much now. After having had to plug away for all that time not getting anywhere all of a sudden you can see something there. I feel we definitely have something to offer; we are a definite prospect for the four.

You had a serious groin injury that set you back a lot, didn't you?

Yes, it affected me at the end of the 1976 season and I played only a few games in 1977. It was the third game of 1978 before I played again and it virtually took me all of last season to get back to form.

What have been the highlights of your 10 years at Swans?

Playing in the second semi-final in 1974; playing in my first State side that year. When Bill Walker played his 300th game, I remember that, we beat Claremont by a point at Claremont Oval. That was good. I can vaguely remember my first game,

against East Perth it was. I got ironed out before I got my first kick. I played on a half-back flank but it was a pretty fair bump. I was trying to kick the ball.

You are often called an iron-man or a strong man. Do you regard yourself as such a player?

No. I just think I'm aggressive when I go for the ball.

Have you been reported?

Once. For allegedly striking with my knee and I got off on a technicality — you can't strike with your knee. Anyway, it was Ian Miller and I reckon he staged it!

Do you think you are a half-back or a ruck-rover?

At the moment I'm playing my best football as a ruck-rover. I like it there because I'm in the game more and I can make my own moves. I'm not being dictated to by the player I'm on. I agree with John Todd that if I had played as a ruck-rover earlier in my career I might have been a better player. The influence Todd has had on me has made a big difference to my career. He has given me a new lease of life as a ruck-rover.

What have been some of the problems with Swans over those 10 years do you think?

I don't think it's any one thing. I think it's been a whole pile of different things at times. We've had problems; we haven't got a successful record behind us; we don't have tradition like some other clubs. We

have only won three premierships in our history and I think tradition plays a big part; the players have something to play for. I honestly believe that attitude is the big thing; attitude starts at the top and I think the club maybe has gone too far with our premises, which are great, but you look at our record and it just doesn't add up. I would rather have won 10 premierships and be living in the doghouse. Perhaps the priorities weren't in the right direction at times. When they decided to build this place, perhaps they should have gone out and bought players.

However, I believe the committee we have at Swans now are top-class. The way they have got behind John Todd and the players and their approach to our progress is excellent.

But many clubs believe that you have to have nice, big premises to influence sponsors and so forth.

That's an arguable point. I don't believe that. I reckon that if a player is looking for a club to come to, he looks at its record. He doesn't want to come to an unsuccessful club.

Were you surprised at being runner-up twice in the Sandover Medal?

Oh, yes. But now I look back and think that with a bit of luck I could have won one. The year that Graham Melrose won I didn't play in the last game and I missed out by two votes. But that's the way it

goes. But I do start out every year with the thought that I'm going to win a Sandover Medal. That means you have to play well every week and that's the thought that makes you knuckle down and do the hard pre-season work. I'm probably past the stage now of winning the medal, but the thought is always there.

Do you think we play a 'soft' game here?

I don't think it is as physical as it could be. I think umpires tend to umpire in such a way that if there is a good, solid physical clash they award a free kick. But when there is an airy-fairy situation they don't award a free kick and that's when the bubble starts. I'm not criticising umpires, they have a tough job, but the game could be more physical as far as using the body goes. I don't agree with throwing arms and elbows and fists around, but they should use hips and shoulders more.

EASTS' CLASH

Traditional rivals the Two Easts meet in a vital clash this week, but isn't it nearly always vital when these teams meet.

Old Easts (born 1898) have 129 wins over Young Easts (born 1906) who have 100 wins against the Blue and Whites. Their meeting places over the years have been spread over seven grounds.

East Perth last August recorded their 100th win against Old Easts which was also their 50th win against them at Perth Oval.

The two Easts have met in twenty seven final round games, more than any other teams (West Perth and East Fremantle have met twenty five times in finals), nine of these decided the premiership.

Swan Districts, the big improvers of 1979 will be looking for win number 50 over the Tigers this Saturday. Claremont have 84 wins over the black and whites.

On August 12, 1899 Perth and West Perth met for the very first time, this Saturday eighty years later they meet for the 244th time. With three games down the Demons are slightly in front 121 wins to Cardinals 119.

Their second meeting on September 2 1899 resulted in a win to West 15.11 to 1 point, Perth's lowest score ever, it was also the first 100 point win in West Australian Football.

Fifty years later in 1949 Perth and West Perth met in the Grand Final for the first and only time. West Perth coached by Stan (Pops) Heal beat Perth, coached by Austin Robertson Snr 16.13 to 12.7.

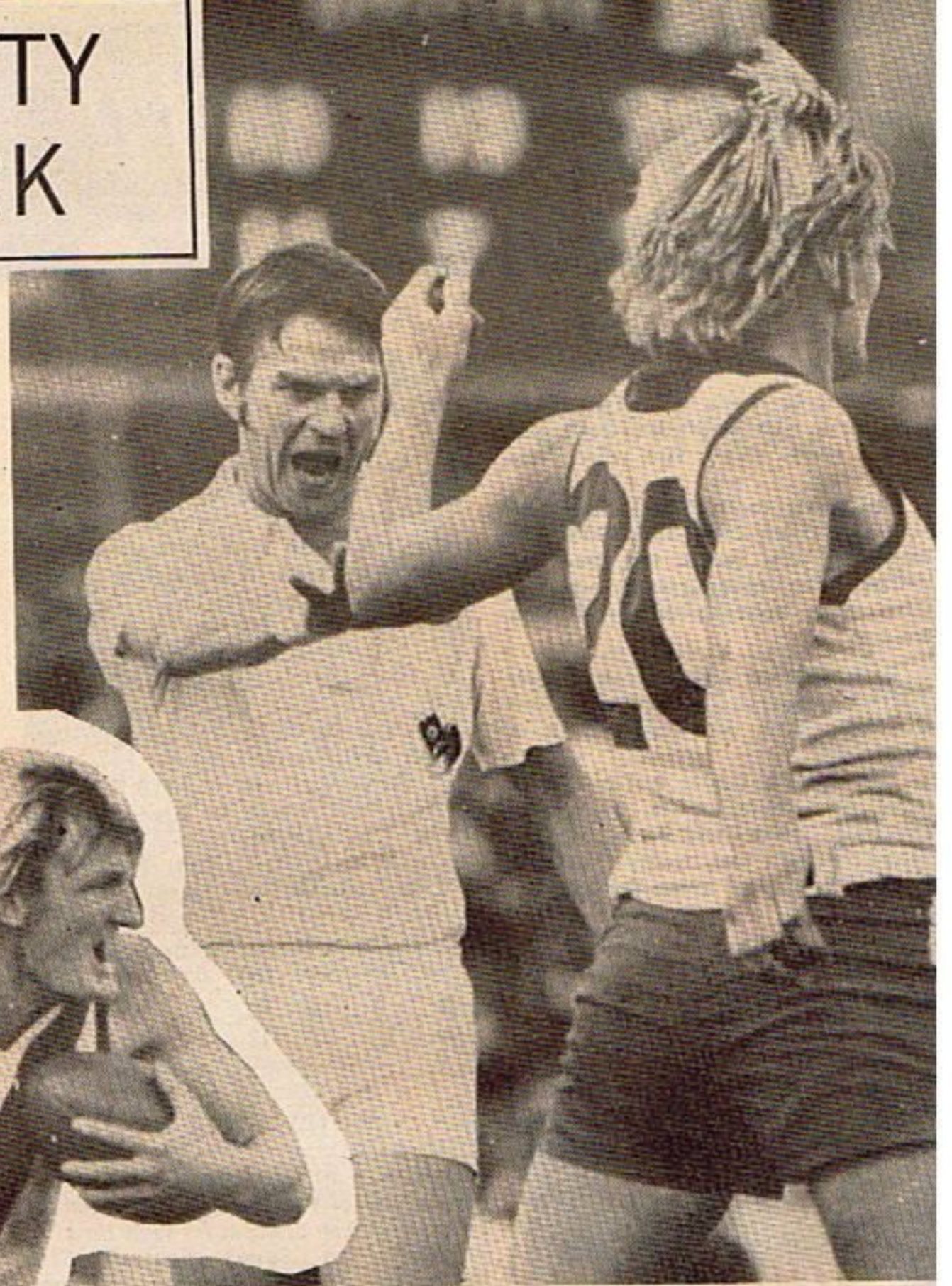

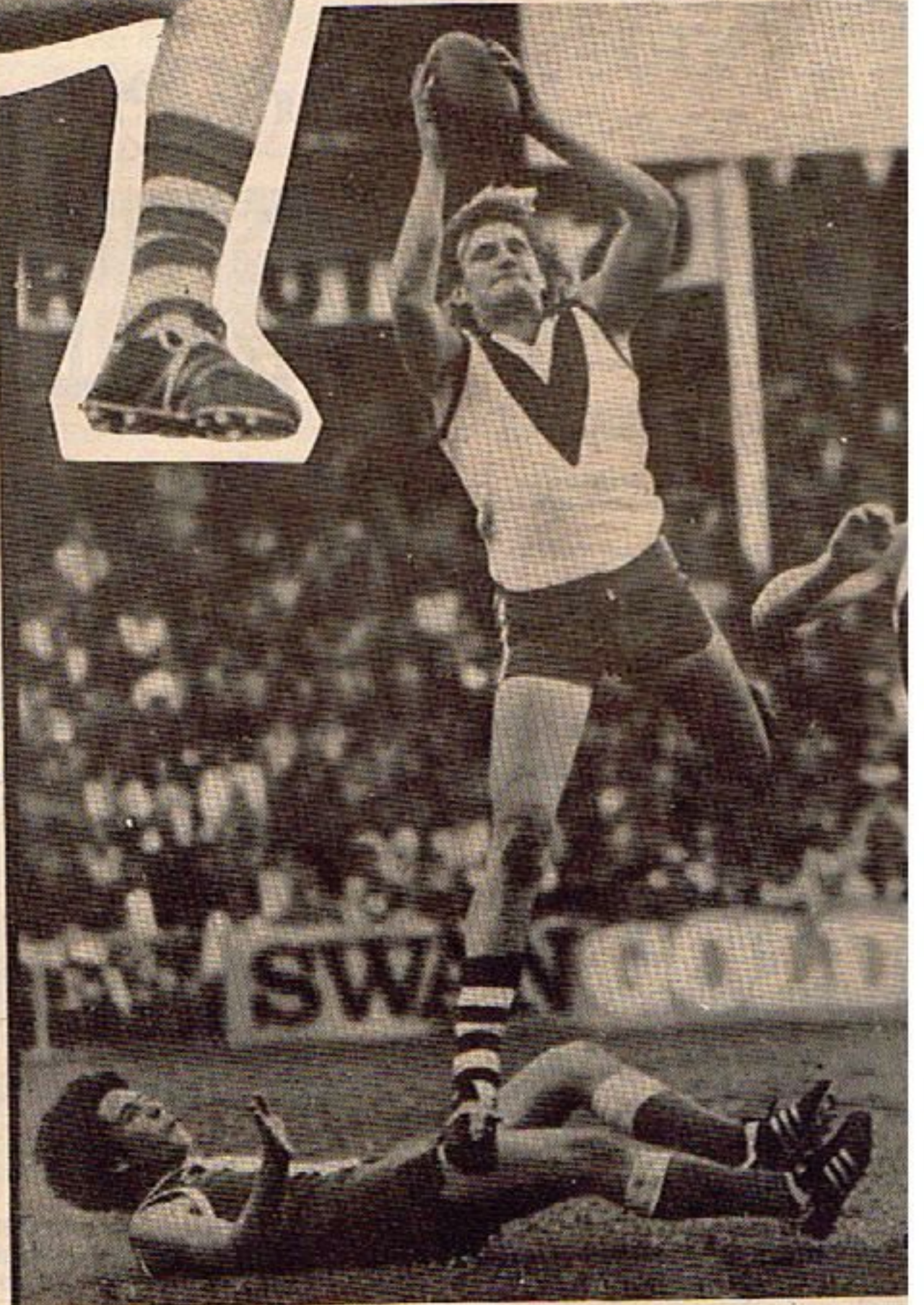

The shock walk-out of South Melbourne's Brownlow Medal winning ruckman Graham Teasdale has rocked football circles in Victoria.

Teasdale decided after a 6 am training run at South last Tuesday that he was wasting his time by playing with the disappointing Swans.

He packed his gear and headed to his parents house at Charlton, 325km north west of Melbourne.

Teasdale told me the next day that his team mates, though a fine bunch of blokes, were simply not putting in the effort needed to get South into the finals.

He said he was not interested in making more money out of the move, was definitely not going to play with South again and is prepared to stand out for the rest of the year in his bid to get a clearance to Carlton.

Teasdale has not had a good year. In fact he is playing just well enough to save being dropped. He claims he is injured and has been playing all season with a knee injury.

"I live like a hermit on Monday and Tuesday after we get beaten by 15 goals each week. I don't want to face people after our pathetic performances," Teasdale said. "After the game I feel too disgusted and annoyed to go out and talk to people. Hopefully they will have forgotten the game by Wednesday."

"It is miserable to be part of the side from week to week."

"The blame has got to fall back on the players," Teasdale said. Teasdale was unable to be contacted by South officials. His parents told South president Graeme John that he was with friends in the bush.

I drove to Charlton and within 20 minutes was sitting talking to the bearded giant in a farm house at the tiny hamlet of Youngroon.

It was as easy as that and makes you wonder about some football club administrations.

While the Teasdale saga was unfolding, South re-appointed Ian Stewart for another three year term as coach. By doing this they publicly absolved Stewart from any blame in the matter and put their faith directly in the triple Brownlow Medallist's hands.

Stewart resumed at South this year after a one year lay off. He started with the club in 1976 lifting it from bottom to fifth in two years.

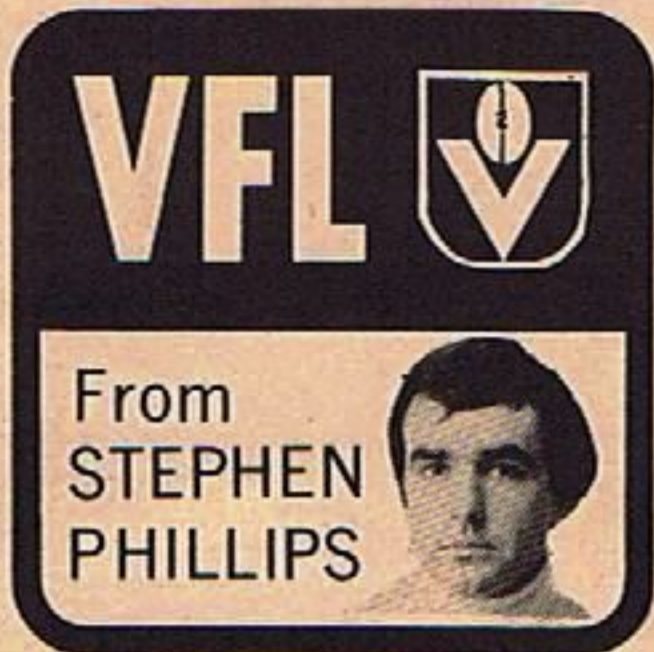
"It is a complete show of confidence in the coach," Mr John said.

And talking about that draw . . . wild scenes followed the match at Richmond Oval as angry West Adelaide supporters jostled and jeered the Glenelg players after they had grabbed a last-minute draw.

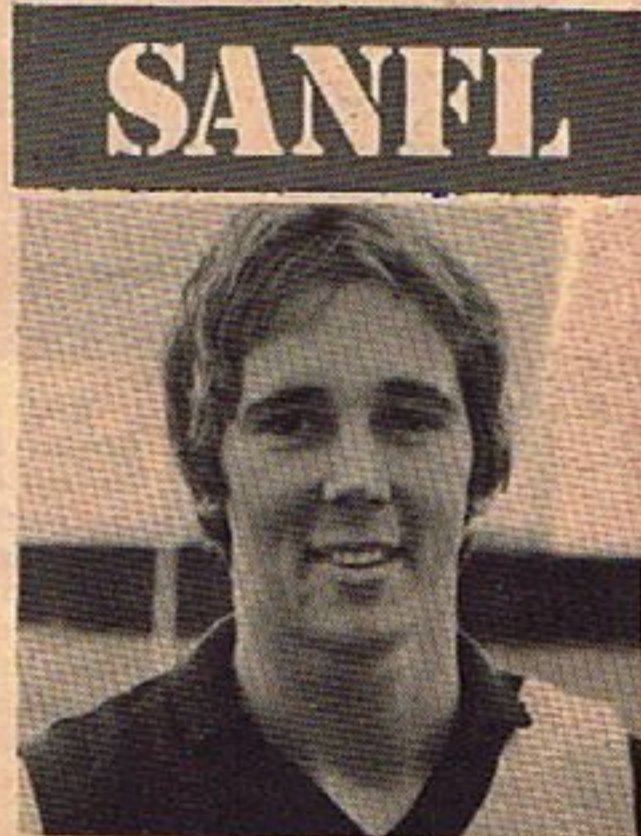

The loss sent Queensland's hopes plummeting for the all-Australian carnival in Perth later this year.

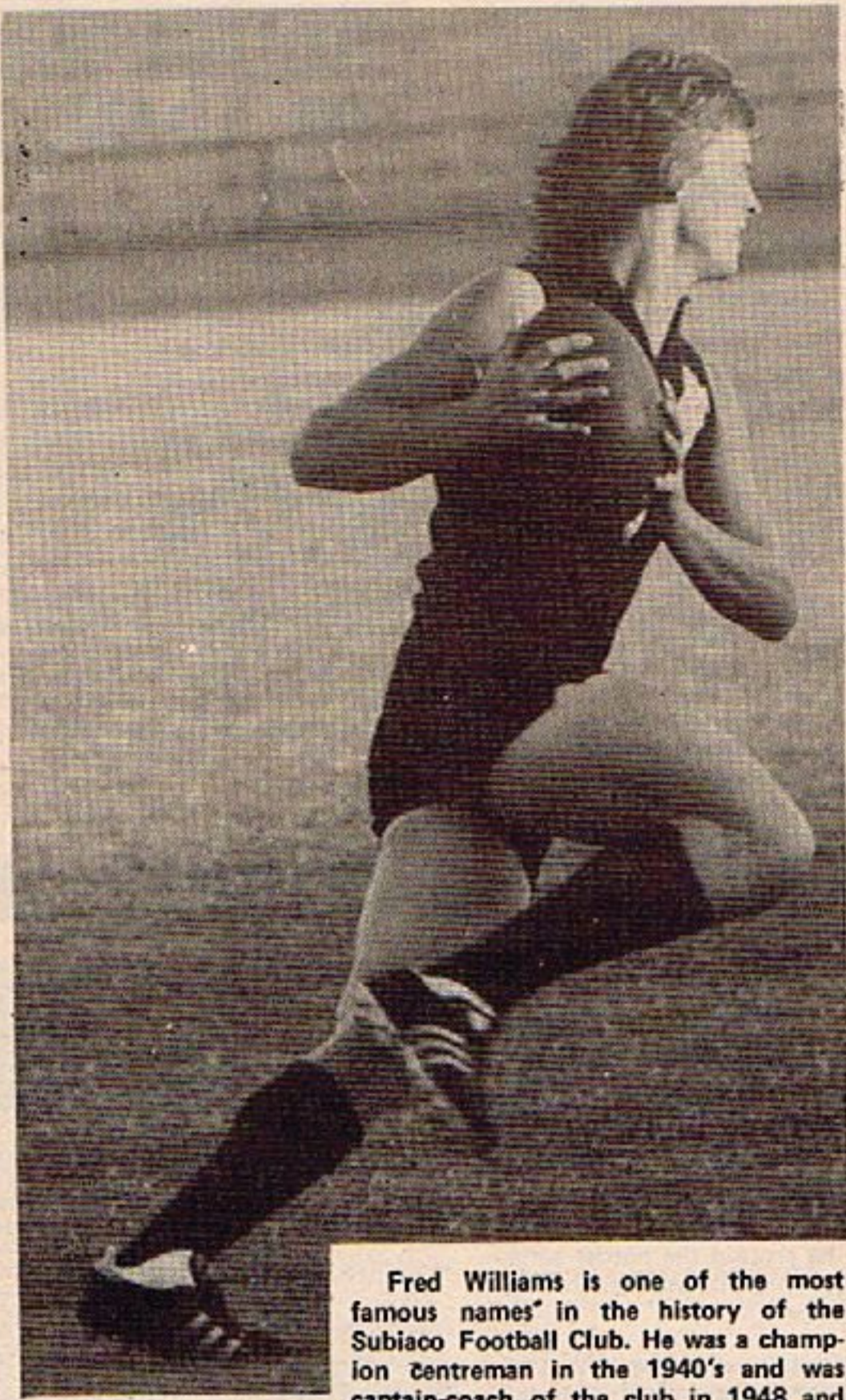

South Australia, with Rick Davies and Kym Hodgeman leading the way, never looked in danger and had the match won after only 25 minutes when it led by eight goals.

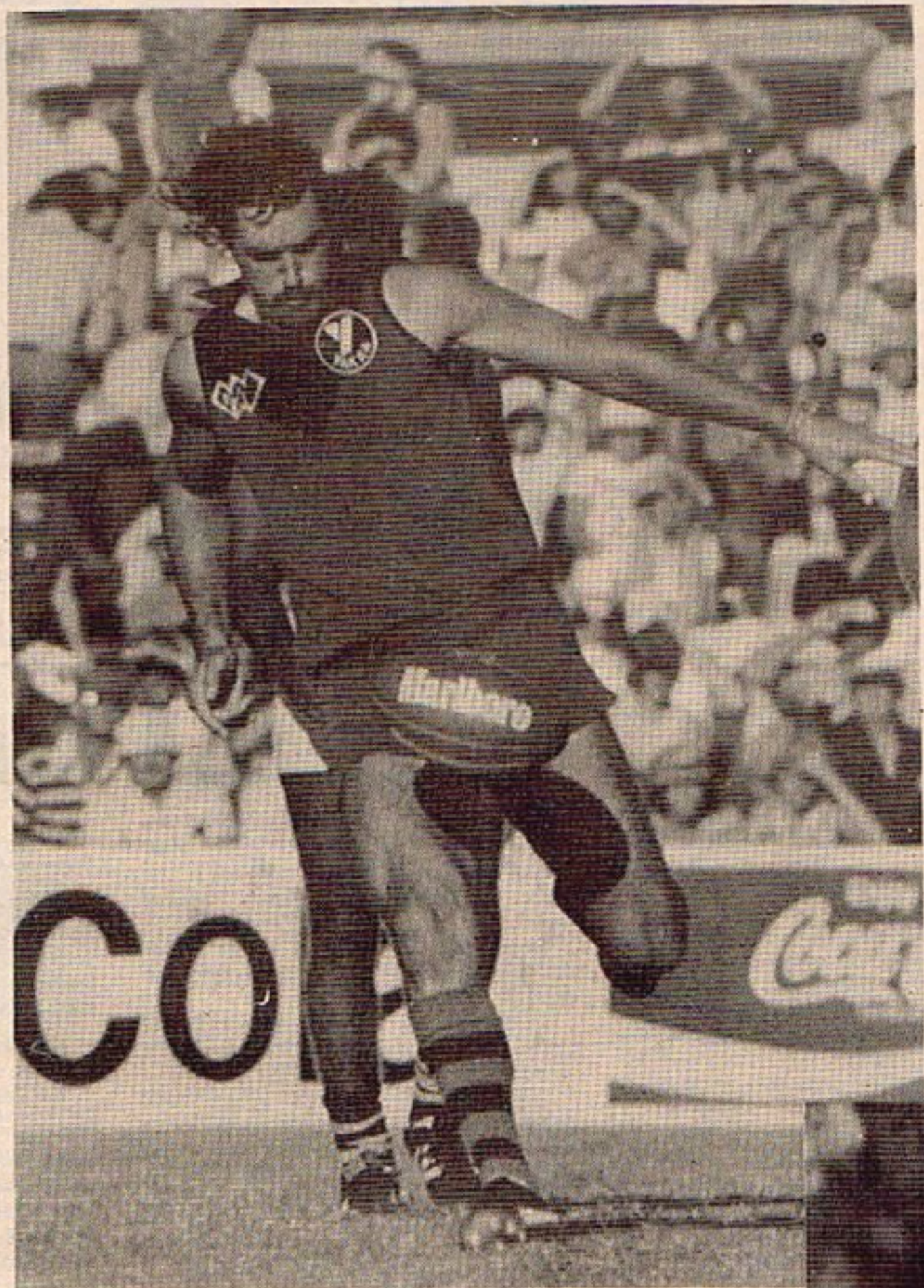
South Australia kicked eight goals in the first quarter, followed by an 11-goal haul in the second.

Queensland, after trailing 30.8 to 5.12 crept back into the game in the final term and put some respectability into the score.

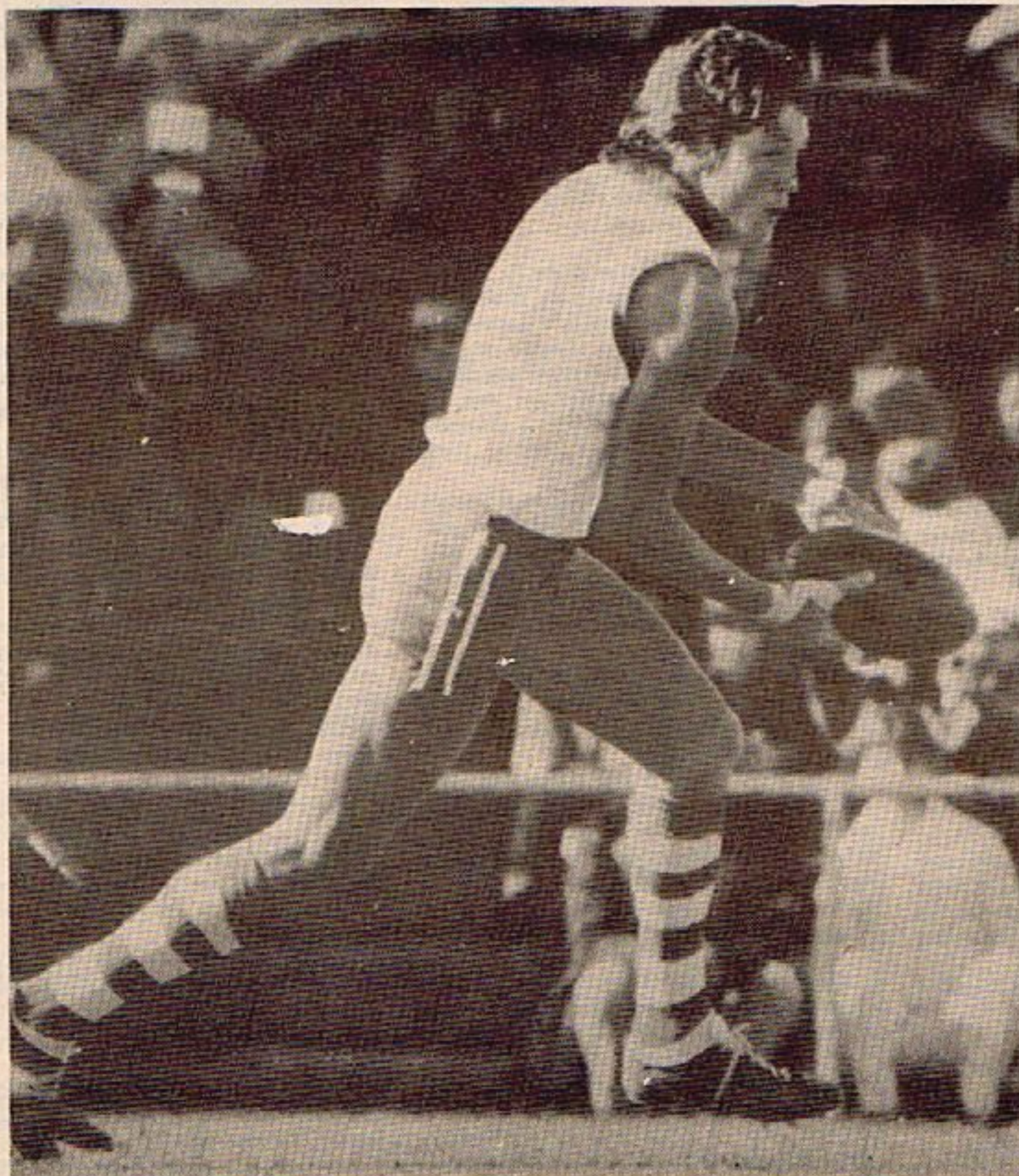

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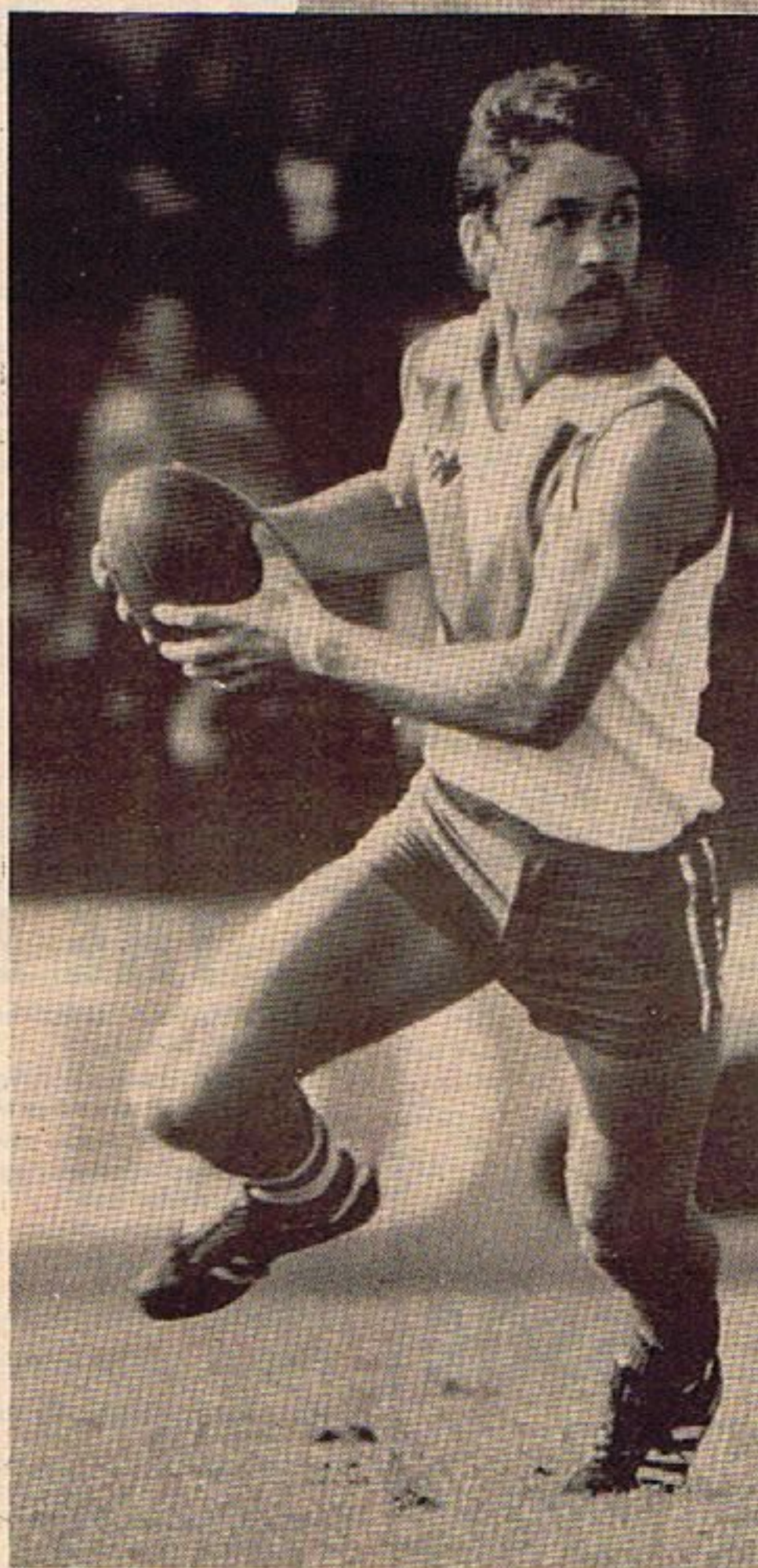
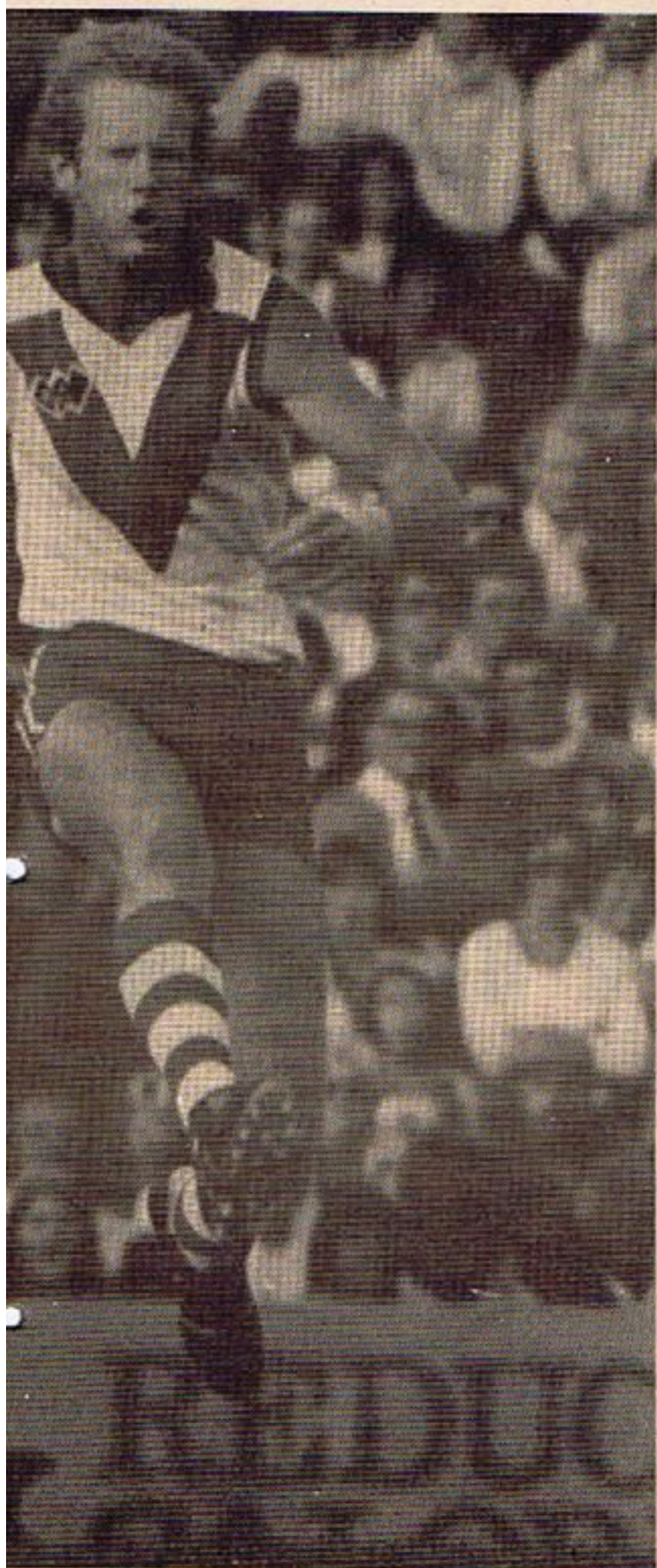

Cockburn's hopes of winning should be boosted by a top centreline where wingmen Rod Cronan and Ian Match compliment centreman and captain-coach Paul Bennett.

South Perth centreman Barry Stockden has been out of form in recent weeks and this will not help his team's chances of retaining third spot ahead of the tenacious Cockburn side.

Cockburn look to have a slight edge in the ruck where Trevor O'Brien and Phil Clucas form a high-leaping and effective combination backed up by top ruck rover Frank Geers and Greg Sheehan.

In recent games Cockburn have alternated Russell Grant and Lee Kelly between full forward and centre-half-forward with good result.

But on Sunday this pair will come up against stiff opposition from Souths defenders Ric Marshall and Peter Fysh.

The South Perth-Cockburn game has been promoted as the match of the day to take the place of the aborted W.A.F.A. VFA game that was scheduled to be played at Subiaco Oval on Sunday.

It was then intended that unbeaten teams Wanneroo and Mosman Park should clash but this game was not possible because Mosman Park had arranged a fundraising night on Saturday.

SCOTT SAYS

Congratulations go out to Graham Fogarty and Max White.

Graham made his league debut as a field umpire on Saturday at Leederville Oval in the West Perth v Claremont game. He has been with the WANFL panel for the best part of three seasons and has progressed from country umpiring to Colts, Reserves and finally league football.

Still young for league football — 24 — there is no reason why, with dedication and hard work, that he cannot stay in league for many years. When he started with the league panel he showed an aptitude for umpiring and it was no surprise to many that he made the top in quick time.

Who is Max White? Not many football followers would have noticed him, but on Monday at Subiaco Oval Max ran his first game as a league boundary umpire. Many potential boundary umpires come to the WANFL panel with very little experience. They start off in the colts and providing they can build up their stamina and master the fundamentals there is no reason why they can't reach the top and this is exactly what Max has achieved.

Now that both these umpires have had a taste of league football you can be sure that they will do all in their power to stay there for many years.

Doug Leicester were the officiating goal umpires in the league game. Both have been goal umpires for four or five years and it must be some kind of record for brothers to be goal umpires in the same game.

Often umpires are criticised unfairly for decisions that they make and are correct. This does happen because a lot of followers of the game are not familiar with all the laws.

Many believe the game does not restart until the ball has been kicked into play by the fullback after a behind has been scored and, in the case of a goal, until the umpire bounces the ball in the centre. This is not so as Law 17 s states. "All breaches of the laws must be penalised whether the ball is dead or in play."

A good example of this is when a player scores either a goal or behind and the field umpire has given the goal umpire the "All Clear" and then an infringement occurs. The field umpire is then entitled to penalize the infringer. Any score from this free kick would also be recorded. What must be perfectly clear to all is that the "All Clear" must be given before the infringement occurs.

This type of incident has happened in league football on a number of occasions. The last was, I believe, between Claremont and East Fremantle and the Umpire concerned was Ron Powell.

West Perth's Rod Alderton grabbed the Marlboro \$150 for the goal-of-the-day last Saturday . . . and could almost have brought off the double with several great marks that featured strongly in the mark-of-the-day. The Channel 7 World of Football show judged Alderton's snapshot goal over his shoulder early in the game against Claremont as the best of the day . . . and deservedly so.

Many of the forty goals scored in Monday's Derby at Fremantle Oval were absolute gems and had the goals in this match qualified for the Marlboro \$150 goal-of-the-week-award — judges would have been provided with a tough job.

One of the classic's was Old East's seventh — kicked by star of the match Brian Peake. Running away from goals in a forward pocket and under a great deal of pressure from Souths defenders he snapped the ball over his right shoulder.

Another great effort was a shot by Basil Campbell to register Souths 13th goal. Running toward the boundary midway between left half forward and the forward pocket he snapped over his left shoulder to notch full points.

Souths sixth goal — though not one of the great goalkicking feats of the match — was the reward for one of the most spectacular marks of the season. Playing at full-forward Mark Jackson juggled a one handed overhead mark while being held by Old East full back Brian Needle. This "once-in-a-lifetime" mark was followed by a goal at point blank range.

Plenty of league players have kicked a goal with their first kick in league football . . . some have even made it two goals from two kicks. But Claremont forward Mike Salmon will take some beating with his effort of three straight goals from his first three kicks when he made his league debut against West Perth last week. Salmon

got all his goals in the third term as the results of fast and intelligent leading, strong marking and long, penetrating kicking.

Young East Perth ruckman Craig Edwards had some awkward moments early in the game against Subiaco last Monday. Edwards, a raw-boned teenager with only two league games behind him, was doing well, but his kicking let him down. Firstly, he grubbered one along the ground when trying to short pass near goal; then he put an easy shot for goal out of bounds and then he kicked right across the face of goal. However, his potential finally won through when he brought up East Perth's first goal at the 17-minute mark of the first term with a strong mark and a long, accurate kick. He followed up quickly with East Perth's fourth goal, handballed to Ian Miller for the side's fifth and then got the ninth himself. He then handed over to another newcomer, Mick Fuller, who kicked the 10th, 13th and 15th in a promising second-half display. Fuller has generally been regarded as a defender at East Perth, but lack of opportunities kept him out of the team. However, reserves coach Grant Dorrington has tried him as a forward and that was the role he was used in last week.

MEMORIES STILL LIVE

South Fremantle may never recapture the heady days of their Golden Years when they won six premierships in the space of eight years . . . but the glory of those days still lives with one of the State's most exciting clubs.

Souths have been trendsetters in many ways over their long and illustrious history. Though they have only won nine premierships, consistency has been a strong part of their reputation.

The big crowds have always followed the South Fremantle feats, and nothing captures the imagination of the Fremantle football fanatic more than the situation we have in WA right now — the two Fremantle teams battling it out at the top of the premiership table. After all, they are simply re-living something that was going at the turn of the century when the Fremantle sides dominated the small competition in WA.

Those Golden Years saw South emerge as Australia's No. 1 football team. Not only did they stop the 31-game victory run by East Fremantle, but they travelled to the Eastern States and conquered the best football sides in the nation.

The victory trail started in 1947 when they won their third premiership, rising from the bottom of the table on the resumption of senior competition after the World War. It was only the intervention of West Perth in 1949 and 1951 that prevented a total sweep by the Southerners as they stormed the football world under the coaching, firstly of Ross Hutchinson and then Clive Lewington.

In those years Souths won two Sandover Medals — Lewington (1947) and Steve Marsh (1952) and had the outstand-

ing goalkicker of the time in Bernie Naylor. They also produced the best collection of superstar-status players ever assembled under one club's roof.

South have always been a solid club; one based on the tough, gritty approach of typical hardened Port people — almost typifying the waterside worker, which is the hard core of the South Fremantle football world.

South would prefer to forget the years between 1957 and 1970 — when they finished in the top four only three times and even then they made quick exits. But those years were not completely uneventful ones. Souths introduced two champions to the football stage in John Todd and John Gerovich and they continued the tradition of a club that has always had stars, if not premierships.

South are a determined side this year; coach Malcolm Brown certainly has no peers when it comes to claiming the title of football's most controversial character. But he has one burning desire deep down in his heart — to erase the memory of that humiliating 18-goal preliminary final defeat at the hands of East Perth.

Brown has weeded out some of his questionable players; he has moulded a hard-hitting, fast-running side that boasts plenty of skill. But underneath all the South Fremantle glamour and teamwork this season he will be building in some strong character . . . a trait that he will need if he is going to take this year's flag.

Staying at the top more important than Premierships

Norrie MacDonald is the newest of our football club presidents, but he has stepped into a job that has solid foundations — a fact that has been a considerable advantage in helping maintain Souths as a top club.

A long career in junior football administration led to a vice-presidency at South Fremantle in 1969 and those years — coupled with his rise to the top of the administration ladder in the Metropolitan Transport Trust — fitted Mr MacDonald well for his leadership role at South.

Mr MacDonald is not a president who strives desperately for a premiership; often ignoring many other facets of football life on the way. In fact, he would prefer to see South continually surviving near the top of the table, maintain a reputation as a consistently good side in preference to a brilliant side one year and a flop the next.

"It is important to win premierships," he says. "The prestige that goes with a premiership is tremendous for a club. But from a financial point of view it is equally important to simply make the four every year. That way, members are retained from year to year."

Mr MacDonald believes that South have an exceptionally good side this season . . . but he is not getting carried away with thoughts of a premiership at this stage.

"We have suffered the loss of top players like Joe McKay, but it is pleasing to see Basil Campbell back in action. This has enabled our coach to distribute our talent better and I'm sure the players will be there at the end of the season."

On a financial scale, Souths adopt a low-key approach to budgeting. They seldom get involved in big-money controversies and though they attract lots of Fremantle-orientated sponsors they have a healthy bar trade that helps them to balance the books.

Souths have really done their part for WA's 150th celebrations — as last Monday's Foundation Day game at Fremantle Oval showed.

The huge promotion that was carried out in conjunction with the Fremantle City Council — helped by a variety of sponsors — proved to be the type of pre-match build-up that football so badly needs.



A MULTITUDE OF STARS

To survey the list of stars to wear the red-and-white jumper is a mind-boggling task; to pick the best of those champions is an impossibility.

South Fremantle have only produced five Sandover medallists in their history — but many more of their champions would have been worthy winners of the State's top award.

Their Sandover medal trail started in 1928 when Jack Rocchi won the award and nine years later that champion of a by-gone era — Frank (Scrano) Jenkins grabbed the medal. Clive Lewington was an early winner after the war (1947) and then in 1952 it was Steve Marsh's turn. John Todd was their last winner in 1955 and it has been a long, dry spell since then.

But that doesn't mean Souths haven't had their stars . . . names like Gary Scott, Fred Seinor, John Colgan, Pat Daly, Frank Treasure, Don Byfield, Tony Parentich, Bernie Naylor and Barry White figure among the champions of past decades.

When you look at some of the players that have won the fairest and best award at South you realise their talent . . . Bruce Monteath, Stephen Michael, Tom Grijusich, Colin Beard, Cliff Hillier, Doug Ingraham . . . and so on.

Souths have produced many of the real iron-men of football probably because of the tough nature of Fremantle people. Because of his goalkicking feats, the great Bernie Naylor must rank high among the club's best players. He topped the league table six times; kicked more than 100 goals in a season five times and held the record of 156 goals till Subiaco's Austin Robertson passed that figure by one in 1968.

For outstanding brilliance, Steve Marsh probably heads the South list as he held the roving honours for more than a decade. For sheer brilliance in an injury-shortened career, John Todd stakes a strong claim. Many will argue that Todd would have been the greatest player of all time if an early knee injury had not struck him down in his prime.

A look at South's 200-game club will give an idea of the talent that has been bred at the Port. South Fremantle have seldom imported star players; they have generally been born and bred within kicking distance of the harbour.

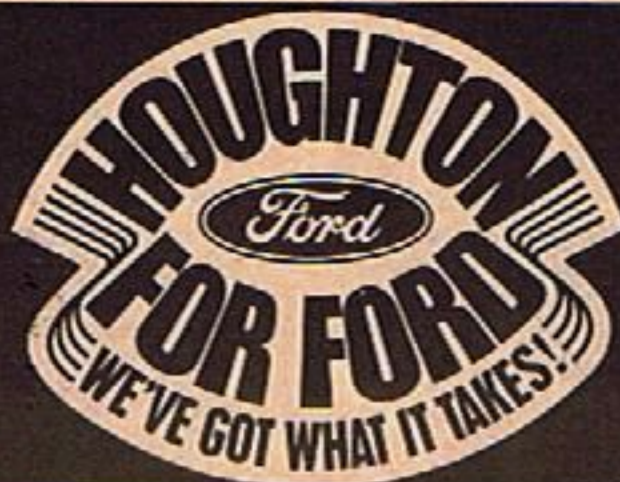

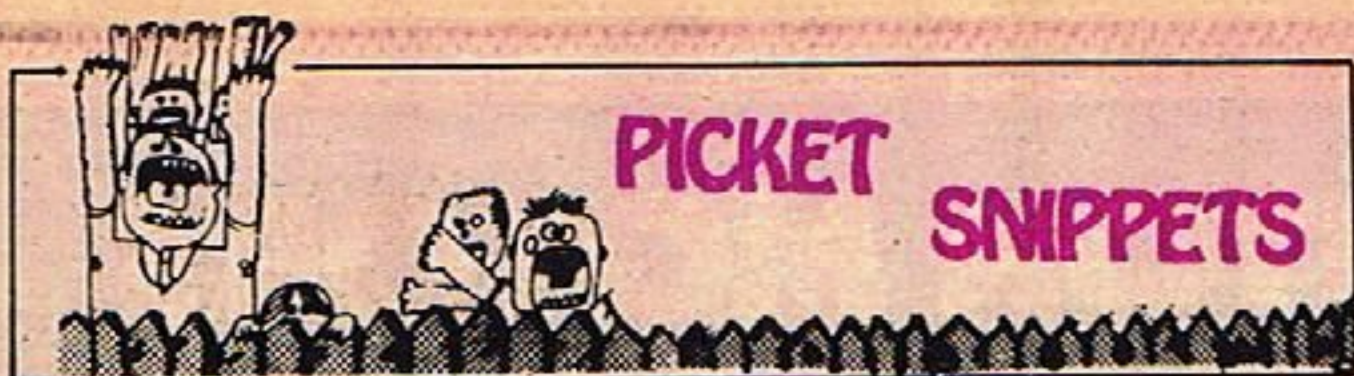

West Perth veteran Alan Watling showed plenty of courage to see last week's game against Claremont out. At half-time Watling was on the trainer's bench receiving 14 stitches to a cut in his thigh. The badly-gashed thigh looked certain to curtail his game, but he fought on strongly to be one of West Perth's best players.

The 'bionic men' at Swan Districts are starting to shed their facial protections. Big ruckman Ron Boucher is now playing without the helmet he used to protect his fractured jaw and talented forward Simon Beasley has discarded the face mask he used to protect a nose injury. However, wingman Phil Narkle still retains his special black-and-white helmet because of a tendency to suffer from concussion. Defender Bill Skwirowski, who is fighting his way back to form in the reserves after an ankle injury, is also wearing a helmet as a result of concussion problems.

Talking about Campbell . . . he has high hopes that the Victorian recruits at West Perth this year will still prove to be valuable players despite rather unimpressive starts to their WA careers. Campbell sees big forward John Frazer as being a key player provided he is given plenty of encouragement to utilise his strength and marking ability in the goal square. Campbell was also impressed with newcomer Shane Fitzsimmons, who will be back in Perth this week after a flying trip last weekend to have a try-out with the reserves. "Shane is a great half-forward goal-kicker and that's something we need," says Campbell.

The run of 26 successive victories notched up by the Busselton colts side has come to an end. The youngsters emulated the feat of their senior side last year by winning the premiership — with 20 straight wins — and with six wins in a row to open this season, things looked rosy once again. But they ground to a halt opposed to South Bunbury, losing 15.12 to 6.8.

The chain of events after the Percy Johnson sacking have been rather incredible. First of all team manager Mike Throssell got the axe as part of the new-look Graham Campbell team with former team manager John Clinch taking the reins again. That meant Throssell was looking for a part-time job . . . and he ended up joining the Sunday Independent as a football columnist; which left Rod Lohar out in the cold.

Incidentally; Percy wasn't the only one carpeted at Leederville Oval last week. The committee spent several thousand dollars putting new carpet down on the floor of the social rooms as part of their new look.

There wouldn't have been many people at Fremantle on Monday that were not aware that there was a Derby taking place at the local football arena. Talk in the streets was all football. The publicans even got into the swing — a blackboard outside one hotel announced the special on that day's lunchtime menu was "South Sandwiches", a similar board outside another hotel bore the simple message "Dinning room closed — gone to the Derby". A publican close to the ground erected a tent to cater for the overflow of patrons.

While on the Derby, it was amazing that one of the enterprising local service clubs did not take advantage of the occasion and borrow some of the empty business parking areas that were locked up and not in use. At least three such areas which would have held two hundred vehicles are located within a stones-throw of the ground. A good fund-raising opportunity went begging.

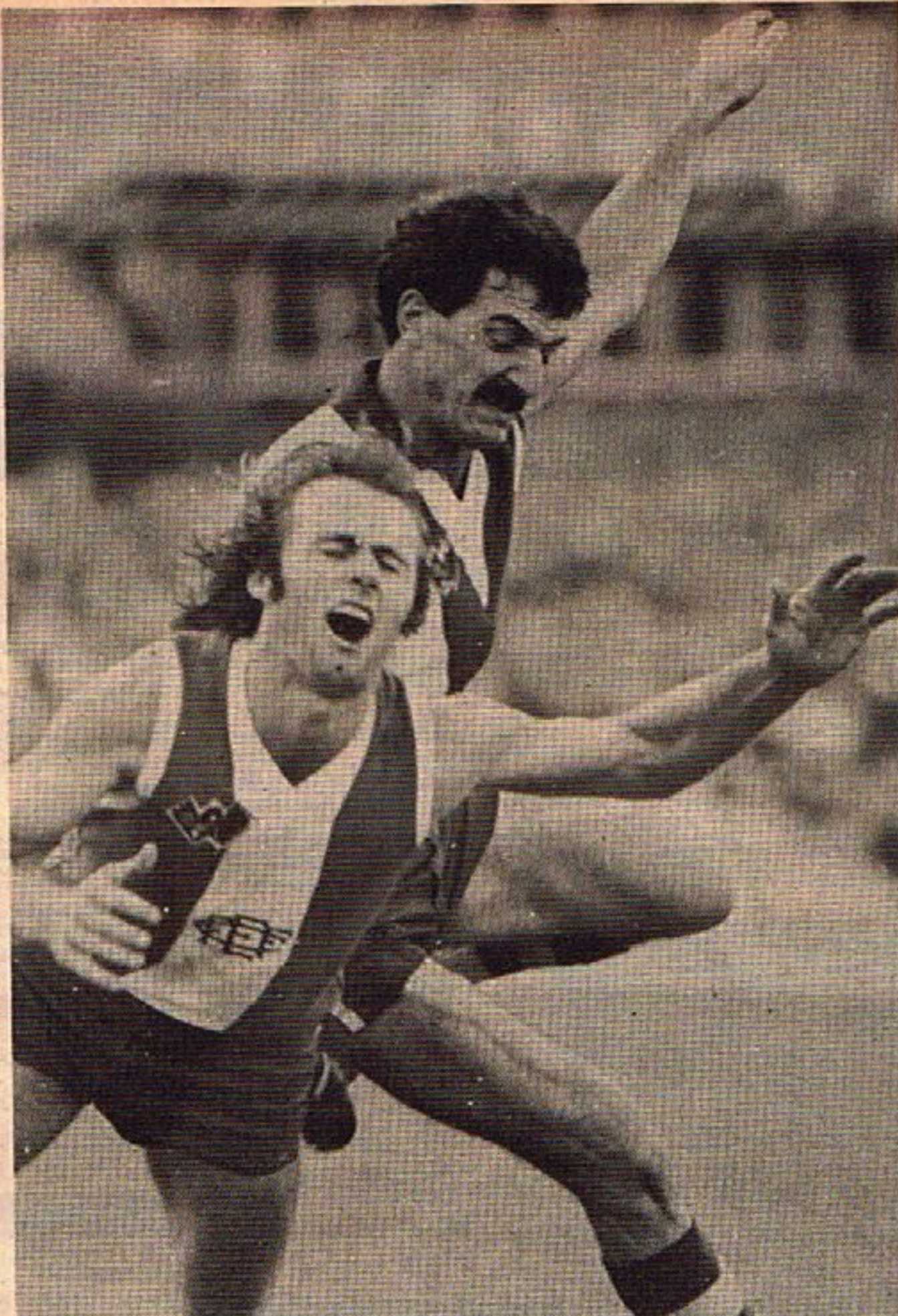
Carl Ditterich has finally done some good after 17 trips to the VFL tribunal in his 17 year career.
