

NEW STATE PLAYERS HOW DO THEY FEEL

Saturday is State football day. . . . a day when 20 footballers don the black-and-gold guernsey representing Western Australia.

At least six players are expected to be wearing that jumper for the first time this week; an honour that is jealously guarded among local league players and one that is usually regarded as an opportunity of a life time. How do our State rookies feel about that prospect?

JIM KRAKOUER: It's certainly a thrill. After being out suspended for three weeks I didn't give myself a chance of even being considered. But if I'm out there representing WA I'll give my best.

NOEL CARTER: When I came over from Richmond I was mainly concerned at establishing myself as a regular league footballer. To represent WA will be an honour — and something for the people back in Victoria to think about.

GEORGE MICHALCZYK: After 100 games of league football I had almost forgotten about getting a chance in the State side. I thought my best hopes were a year or two back when I was playing as a ruck-rover. But I'm really pleased about how things have changed.

BARRY BEECROFT: Coming to WA from the VFA was virtually a means of proving myself in another area of league football. Getting a berth in a West Australian side is an unbelievable bonus.

ROSS PRUNSTER: Playing for WA is something that I had almost forgotten about. After passing the 150-game mark with West Perth, I had thought my chances of representing the State were over.

GARY BUCKENARA: How do I feel? It's unbelievable. When I joined Subiaco after amateurs I was happy to just play league. To represent WA is like a dream come true.

PEAKE WILL GO

SAYS ROSS NICHOLAS

Champion East Fremantle utility player Brian Peake WILL play with Geelong next season.

That's my prediction, with foundation, after having spoken with Geelong officials in Melbourne at the weekend.

Forget the huge amounts of money pushed Peake's way by East Fremantle; the captaincy of the league side and the worries of uprooting a settled family home.

The urge to play in Australia's No. 1 football competition is too big a drawcard, for the highly motivated and determined Peake. And 1980 will be his last chance!

Peake, who played 12 senior games in his first league season in 1972, will be 26 in December — an age of decision.

Geelong are desperate for a player of Peake's mould. I watched them toss aside Melbourne — a team most WA sides could crush — and there are huge gaps in the line-up.

Geelong are prepared to pay enormous money for Peake's services and they have a bundle of players earmarked for East Fremantle's consideration.


"We have never made it a secret that Peake has been our No. 1 target over the past few years. We will be making an all-out effort to win him to Victoria for the 1980 season," said a Geelong official.

"We believe Brian is keen to make the move and he realises that it must be next season or not at all.

"Also, East Fremantle president Merv Cowan has told us that they would give consideration to a clearance in 1980. Of course, they don't want to lose him. However, he has given them lengthy, sustained service and certainly justifies a release.

"There's no doubt Brian would be a sensation in VFL football. He has unquestionable skills; strength and most importantly, the character to succeed.

"We are confident he will be wearing our guernsey next season."




Brian Peake. . . destined to play in a Geelong guernsey?

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EDITORIAL

WELCOME SOUTH AUSTRALIA



The concept of interstate football has been with us for a long time... and the clash with South Australia at Subiaco Oval this week is yet another chapter in that long story.

This Saturday 20 of WA's top footballers will have the pride of our State on their shoulders — or rather, on their football boots. It would be totally unacceptable to lose to South Australia, especially in our 150th year.

WA coach Barry Cable is certainly taking the State's 150th celebrations seriously and he will make no bones about the fact that he expects his team of players to produce that little bit extra in the name of State loyalty when they contest the ball with the visitors on Saturday.

The defeat that WA inflicted on SA at Football Park two years ago, when that State was celebrating its Centenary of football, hurt right down to the quik... and it's still hurting.

In fact, SA's whole football reputation has taken a battering — mainly because they took on the might of the VFL and refused to play interstate matches with Victorian sides. For two years, SA found themselves out in football's wilderness — and their performances suffered as a result.

Without entering into the politics of why South Australia decided to break ties with Victoria, they have found it hard to maintain any sort of interstate prestige without competition against the nation's top footballers.

Their return to competition with Victoria in Adelaide earlier this season saw them get away to a disastrous start... suffering a massive defeat.

But the South Australians still be-

lieve that they can be the No. 2 football State in the nation.

Their ambitious programme this season includes five interstate clashes and the game against WA is the one that is now burning a hole in their heart as they try to psyche their players into a frenzy in a bold and desperate bid to snatch that No. 2 reputation away from WA.

There is very little in football that is more honourable than wearing your State guernsey.

Speak to any of the football veterans around the place and they talk with pride about their first State appearance — and their most recent. All are important and the 20 fine and upstanding fellows who run out on to Subiaco this Saturday must remember that they are fighting for their State.

There is very little, also, that can match the electric atmosphere of a State match as far as the fans are concerned — apart from grand finals, of course. The crowds tend to flock to interstate battles and though SA lack the charisma of the Victorians, there is still sufficient appeal in this match to produce a near-capacity crowd.

So the stage is set for a top-class production with all the drama, action and intrigue associated with our great game. Let us hope that the players do their part — and you, the football fan, are out there to do yours at the top of your voice.

The top half — South Fremantle, Claremont, East Perth and East Fremantle — lined up against the bottom four — Swan Districts, Perth, West Perth and Subiaco — respectively on Saturday in a make-or-break situation.

It is now history that all four bottom-half sides were gallant in defeat.


In fact, they all led their top-half rivals at various stages of hard-fought matches and Swans and West Perth particularly were right in with a winning chance in the closing minutes.

A victory to any one of those four struggling sides would have breathed life into the competition as it would have left only a two-game break situation.

But, alas, we now have seven weeks of home-and-away football remaining and it is up to someone to pull off a miraculous feat in order to restore interest in the weekly club battles.

It should be remembered, however, that at the start of the final round last season, East Perth, the eventual premiers, were still sixth, in exactly the same position as Swans and Perth are today.

One fact that did emerge from Saturday's games however, was the quality of football produced by the bottom four sides.

If they can build on those fighting performances and string a few wins together, then the final four cannot be taken for granted altogether. A combination of several upset wins from two or three of the bottom sides and the final four could be thrown wide open once more.

Several other factors emerged from the victories by the top four sides.

* South Fremantle are certainly not the vibrant machine we have seen when they miss the driving force of Maurice Rioli at centre.

* Claremont, at times, do look like a one-man band when captain-coach Graham Moss has to do two jobs to get them going.

* East Perth's outstanding defensive network is going to prove a huge stumbling block in the finals. But they have to hope Victorian John Nolan can solve their half-forward problem.

* East Fremantle need two Brian Peake's — they also look vulnerable when Peake is cut out of the game.

Whether all these sides can iron out their flaws before finals time, only the next few weeks will tell.

LONDON, PARIS REWARD FOR THE 'WOODS

FULL SERIES DETAILS

Collingwood footballers will tour the historic sights of London, and witness the bright nightlife of Paris as their reward for winning Tuesday night's Escort Championships at V.F.L. Park.

The Magpie players will be given half the \$68,000 prizemoney they won towards the trip — planned for the end of this season.

Their 28 point win in the grand final was a repeat of their success over Hawthorn just four days earlier.

Though lacking the same prestige as an official V.F.L. premiership — it was their first grand final success since 1958.

A record 37,753 people saw the match which climaxed the \$375,000 series.

West Australian clubs won a total of \$94,000 during the championships. Semi-finalists, East Perth were biggest local winners — collecting \$28,000.

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NEW RULE A BAD RULE

At roughly the mid-way mark of the season it's probably opportune to take a look at what effect the amendment to the holding-the-man/holding-the-ball rule has had on league football.

Let me say at the outset that I didn't, and still don't, like the amendment.

My basic dislike of the rule as it now stands is that it defies logic.

To deem the man in possession when clearly he is not in possession is a bad point from which to develop any argument.

With the advent of wet weather, I believe a new grey area has come to light with the onus still on the umpire to determine just what constitutes bouncing the ball.

Following the VFL replays has convinced me that the VFL umpires are having greater problems than WANFL umpires with the new situation because of the different tempo and greater congestion.

Despite its secretive introduction, the amendment was said to be designed to remove a problem area for the fans and umpires, but more importantly to speed the flow of the game. I don't think it does either, in fact I'm sure it has hindered the flow of the game.

Let me quote you some random figures.

I've compared WANFL round six of 1978 with round six of 1979. It seemed to me round six would be a reasonable one in terms of a period of adjustment. Random tests are always dangerous but I'll qualify the figures as best I can a little later.

Both days were fine with light winds. In 1978 the four matches produced a total of 286 free kicks. In 1979 the total number of free kicks was 282. To me, a more important figure was the number of out-of-bounds on the full decisions registered. In 1978 during round six the ball was kicked out-of-bounds on the full on 25 occasions. In 1979 the number was 32. To carry this further I went to round seven of both years, again played in fine weather, to find that 20 in 1978 as opposed to 30 in 1979. I would presume the object of increasing the flow of the game would be to increase scoring. Well in 1978, round six produced a grand total of 937 points, but in 1979 the total was 913.

Briefly, getting back to the figures, it is often said that they can be made to say anything. True enough, but I did pick round six at random.

From my own observations, I believe there have been slightly fewer free-kicks

this season and the game has become more scrumbly.

It may be that it is in no way connected to the amendment, but the sight of top players reluctantly fiddling with the ball on the ground leads me to think differently.

It's not so much a question of what is being done, as what is not being done within the framework of the amendment. It seems to me that to set up fast running football, the balance of power must always be with the ball carrier.

In past seasons when a player is breaking away from a congested situation, an opponent arriving on the scene was confronted with the problem of tackling the ball carrier without him first bouncing it. The man with the ball had the options and the psychological advantage. Now no such problem exists. He can be tackled with impunity and this brings about the kind of free kick that really stifles the game.

Umpires have now resorted to giving a large number of high-tackle frees or push in the back frees at ground level (which again are real restrictive free kicks) in an effort to protect the man with the ball. But all to no avail.

Of course, the other alternative open to the player with the ball is to dispose of it quickly. This is what he is doing and I think it is to the detriment of the game as a spectacle. Those figures of out-of-bounds on the full perhaps illustrate poorer disposal and translated into disposals by foot and hand all over the ground suddenly assume large and ragged proportions.

I firmly believe the amendment to Law 13C is a poor one. The AFC has made so many good refinements to the rules in the past decade, I hope it decides that this time it made a miscalculation. It may seem a small matter but why alter, even slightly, the texture of what was (and still is) the greatest spectator game in the world.

Its disappointing that the final four seems out and dried with a full round of fixtures still to be played.

I suppose last season's high finish was as

good as anybody could hope for and anything else would be considered an anticlimax.

Having said that, I'm sure that the supporters, officials and players of South Fremantle, Claremont, East Perth and East Fremantle would be well satisfied with the situation. They have done what every club sets out to do — make the four — and collected some hollow wins along the way.

Again that's what clubs are in business to do — to win matches and to win them by as much as possible.

Unfortunately, because of their success, the overall product is in danger of generating less interest over the last seven weeks. It's highly unlikely that clubs, especially the successful ones, will try to implement changes to balance the competition even after a string of lop-sided seasons.

People talk about promoting clearances between WANFL clubs but while this is left to the discretion of the clubs, it is unlikely that any major impact will be made.

I think a step in the right direction would be the abolition of country zoning. All players wishing to come from the country to play in Perth could be listed in a pool and drafted by the league clubs.

The draft could be conducted along the lines of last season's bottom side having first pick from the pool and so on up the ladder, with the premiers having last. Perhaps another draft could take place mid-season with the ladder at that stage dictating the order of selection.

I think the advantages would be that the clubs in greatest need would get the best players (in their opinion at least), and that players would go to a club that needed their services.

For instance a top country rover zoned to a club with three State rovers stands little chance of getting many opportunities. It then follows that the WANFL would be responsible for country football, eliminating a lot of duplication in this area by the eight clubs.

The financial arrangements that exist between league clubs and country clubs when a player is recruited to Perth would still apply.

This is not a new idea, it operates with many refinements in American professional football and I doubt that the number of country players of league standard in any given year would seriously alter the composition of the table.

So perhaps we could carry the idea a step further and have a set of criteria that would enable players already playing league or reserves football to become 'free agents' at some stage before June 30th.

A ratio of league games to reserves games over a given period, for instance, could determine a club's ability to hold a particular player. The time span could extend back to June 30th of the previous season.

Those players wishing to try their luck elsewhere, and able to do so under whatever criteria was established, could also become available for some form of draft.

At this point club officials will be chanting about their depth. If I were part of a club so would I, so what chance is there to change to the status quo!


While on the subject of players zipping from club to club, it has suddenly become more fashionable to bring players from competitions outside league and give them another chance at the big time.

At the moment, East Fremantle are having success with Ian Thomson and Merv Carrott, but probably the best example of another chance is South Fremantle's Paul Mountain.

In some cases Sunday football teaches hitherto border-line league players to assume responsibility for their team's situations within matches. They become reactors.

Mountain learnt his lessons well and now reacts to situations with South and is one of the club's hardest-working players when the going gets tough. Not all league coaches realise that although a player may be in the 18, he doesn't necessarily feel part of the team.

Newcomers and spare-parts players generally put their personal aims (i.e. getting a regular league game) ahead of team success. In rare cases, a dose of Sunday football can do the trick.



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MOSS THRIVES IN INTERSTATE ARENA

Graham Moss is the man who will lead Western Australia out on to the Subiaco Oval arena this Saturday to do battle with South Australia. It will be a crucial encounter and one that will go down in our record books as the match to mark our 150th year.

Moss is WA's most experienced interstate player in this side, which has a wide contrast of youth and experience.

A veteran of 16 interstate appearances — 11 with WA and five with Victoria — Moss thrives on the pressure-cooker atmosphere of big State matches. It is always a clash of the giants and this week will be no exception as Moss will once again put his talents on the line against champion South Australian ruckman Rick Davies.

Even if Moss plays at centre-half-forward, it will be inevitable that he will clash with Davies — and the reputation of Australia's No. 1 ruckman will be at stake.

What does Moss think about interstate football. Here he talks with ALAN EAST about State football:

Do you still get charged up about interstate clashes such as this week's game?
Certainly. It's always a big thing. You get a big crowd, which is good for the atmosphere. You play against top footballers and it's always a good, hard game and it gives you a real kick, especially when you play before a home crowd.

How do you think we will go against South Australia?

I think we'll beat them. Playing at Subiaco gives us a big advantage. I think our side can run faster than theirs and I'm fairly confident in the players we have available. They are all in good form and that's important. South Australia will certainly be keen to win, especially to avenge that last defeat over there. But I'm confident we can finish in front.

Can you remember what it was like when you first played State football?

It was perhaps more of an excitement for me in those early days, being chosen to represent my State. I'm not saying it's not big now, it still is. But there is nothing like the thrill of your first one or two State appearances. Now, even though it has lost that initial excitement, State matches give me the chance to play in a top game of football, which I enjoy.

When you play interstate games, especially against Victoria, do you go out to try and prove that you are still the best ruckman in Australia?

Not really. I go out there to play against guys I've played against before and it's a good opportunity to test myself. I go out there with the idea that I'm going to beat them, but not necessarily to prove that I'm the best ruckman in Australia.

One of your best interstate performances would have been that first State of Origin game when we beat Victoria here. Do you agree?

Yes, I think so. I think everybody played well that day.

What about your own form this year. Are you happy with it?

Yes. I probably wasn't as dominant early in the season as I have been in previous years, but I think that was mainly because I was getting a more consistent effort from everyone else out on the field. I probably didn't stand out as much as I may have in Claremont's side before. For example, Ken Hunter and Robbie Melville were dominating at different times, the Krakouers were really playing well. But there were times when I was probably down a bit, but according to the stats I'm still getting as many marks and kicks and so forth.

Have you been carrying an injury?
I've had a bit of an ankle problem. It's only a carryover from previous ankle injuries. It gets a bit stiff and sore during a game and it worries me a little bit, but there is nothing I can do about it.

How have you gradually learnt to cope with the two roles, coaching and playing?

It was difficult early. But I think the biggest thing is that the team has now got used to what I want from them. They are doing things more readily now without me having to tell them so much, and I'm able to concentrate more on my own game. Every now and then when things tend to go wrong it sticks out. I might play a

reasonable first half, but then we get into trouble in the third quarter and I start concentrating on the game rather than my own game. So I've got to try and learn not to worry too much about how the game is going and concentrate more on my own game.

Do you think you've improved a lot as a coach then?

I've got a lot more confidence now, especially talking to the players. The hardest thing to overcome is that I can't really assess individual player performances on the day, because when you are involved in your own game you can't really keep track of what everyone else is doing. Consequently, I have a bit of a problem during the week talking to individual players telling them what they did right or wrong. So in that area I have to rely a lot on Syd Dufall and Brian Johnson. They give their comments on how players went and we have also started having team meetings, when the players are asked to talk about how they thought they performed themselves, which has been successful.

What about your own future. How much longer do you see yourself playing?

I'm 29 now, I can't see why I shouldn't be able to play till I'm 32 or 33.

WA v SA RECORDS

West Australia and South Australia first met in 1904 in Adelaide and in those 75 years they have played each other 66 times and met in every capital city in Australia.

When these states meet it looks like a case of 'horses for courses' — in Perth, Melbourne and Hobart WA has the edge on the 'Croweaters'. But in Adelaide, Sydney and Brisbane the record is against us as the list below shows.

South Australia's last win over WA in Perth was in 1962, a 16-point margin, which was their biggest win here. Their other wins here (in 1925, 1934, 1936 and 1955) were won by less than a goal. Fos Williams was the successful coach in 1955 and 1962.

Two years ago, at Football Park in Adelaide, WA upset the home State's 100 Football Anniversary by winning their first game there in 39 years. This, together with the 17 year draught, would be all the incentive the visitors would need for this Saturday.

Only two South Australians have won a Simpson Medal and both were Port Adelaide footballers — Fos Williams in 1955 and Max James in 1977.

This Saturday we see a new design in the South Australian guernsey instead of the familiar red with gold and navy blue one they used for 48 years. In 1930, South Australia swung away from their original colour scheme of chocolate and light blue.

WA players are a common sight in Victorian State teams, but few can be found in South Australian line ups. However, there are signs that this trend is changing.

In Adelaide last year SA included Carl Fragomeni (formerly of East Perth) in their line up; in 1977 they brought John Wynne to Perth, and now John Duckworth can make it three in three years?

South Aussies in WA sides? Haydn Bunton of course, Reg Zuener and that's about it, for post-war football anyway.

There have been 18 different coaches of WA in post-war football, eight were Sandover Medalists and one a Brownlow winner.

SCOTT SAYS

John Fuhrmann has returned to the umpiring world, not as an umpire but in a dual role as umpires observer and the man in charge of the umpires training.

After the 1972 grand final between East Perth and Claremont, John decided to retire from umpiring. He had earlier been a boundary umpire for some years.

Before taking on umpiring John had shown a great deal of potential in athletics, being one of Western Australia's top middle distant runners.

This year he was approached to become an umpires observer, which he readily accepted.

He quickly fitted into the system and his written reports on umpires' performances are highly regarded.

With the experience he has had with umpiring and athletics he was the logical choice to take over the supervision of training. He now controls the training of all umpires at the WACA ground on Tuesdays and Thursdays and it is his responsibility to ensure that all umpires are at their top physically for weekend appointments.

It is a pity that more footballers and umpires are not prepared to offer their services after they retire so that their experience and know-how can be passed on to the young and up and coming footballers and umpires. There is no substitute for experience.

It was interesting to read that in next season's trial games the VFL intend to experiment with four goal umpires in each game.

They are evidently having problems and consider that with one goal umpire at each end they are not capable of giving correct decisions.

Not wanting to buy into other State's problems, it makes me wonder if it is a necessary addition to the game.

What we must realise is that whoever participates in sport and has to make decisions runs the risk of making mistakes. Goal umpires on the WANFL panel are encouraged to attain a high degree of physical fitness so they can move quickly in and around the goals.

To be capable of giving the correct score, it is paramount that they must get behind the flight of the ball. Fitness is an essential part of a goal umpire's make up. Everyone connected with umpiring realises that with the ever-increasing speed of the game, it is becoming more difficult to get into the correct position to give decisions.

Many years ago when talk of two field

umpires was first mooted it wasn't realised what a great asset it would be to the game.

Now it is possible that we may have four goal umpires; next it will be four boundary umpires. Coupled with the emergency umpire, the interchangeable steward and two field umpires it might be difficult to move around and actually see the game!

If all these changes and additions help the game, how can we resist?

Most of the changes made over the past years have helped make the game a greater crowd pleaser.

Trevors chief Ray Green and his staff were on hand for the announcement and were able to give advice on the restoration of the expensive carpet. W.A.F.A. clubs South Perth, Wanneroo and Victoria Park must be the envy of some sponsorless WANFL clubs — between them they have netted \$45,000 in sponsorship this season. Apart from South's \$20,000; Colin Langer's Phoenix Holden has backed Wanneroo for \$15,000 and Derek Flatman Motors have put in \$10,000 to Victoria Park. ***

Osborne Park players will have a top priority job before their next match at their home ground — the Osborne Park Showgrounds. They will be making sure the goal posts are straight. Last week the leaning goal posts at one end virtually cost them the game against Wanneroo — and possibly a place in the four. With just seconds to go they were leading by three points when Wanneroo player Gary Smit gathered in the ball in the forward pocket and managed to get his boot to ball while being swung by an Osborne Park tackle. \$100,000 CLEARANCE DEAL

In a last minute clearance scramble in Melbourne last weekend Richmond received \$100,000 and three Collingwood footballers for disgruntled forward Alan Edwards.

Edwards walked out of Richmond nearly a month ago.

Tigers coach Tony Jewell said he was glad to see the last of Edwards.

"He's been nothing but trouble at the club", Jewell said. "We've done the right thing by him all the way, but he started moaning and groaning and I'm glad to see him go."

In contrast, Tom Hafey, Edwards' new coach at Collingwood said: "We are tickled pink to get Alan. Twenty-one year old key forwards are very hard to come by, and he will be a good player for us".

Hafey coached Edwards at Richmond for two years before going to Collingwood in 1977 and has a high opinion of him.

The three Collingwood players going to Richmond as part of the deal are Rod Osborne (also formerly of Claremont) and

the Considine brothers, Craig and Ross. Collingwood president John Hickey handed over a cheque for \$100,000 and clearance papers for Osborne and the Considines at 11 o'clock last Saturday night.

Richmond's general manager Richard Doggett took the cheque and the Magpies' secretary Bill Hogen lodged Edwards' clearance papers at VFL House.

The VFL's third attempt to get Sunday football in Melbourne has been knocked on the head by the State Government and the League is fuming.

President of the VFL Dr Allen Aylett believes the VFL has been victimised in the interests of minor football bodies like the VFA.

Fitzroy attempted to secure Brownlow Medallist Len Thompson who has had his ups and downs with South this year and "Fabulous" Phil Carman who is languishing in the seconds at Melbourne.

They wanted Thompson as a back up in case captain and only ruckman Ron Alexander is injured.

Those who didn't go but would have been instant successes include Barrie Robran, Ken Eustice, Neil Kerley, Don Lindner, Bruce Light, Paul Bagshaw, Rick Davies and Peter Marker amongst others.

Norwood will meet South Adelaide in the grand final of the Escort Cup in Adelaide on Tuesday night.

The Escort Cup series has been conducted by clubs not aligned to the Australian football championships. As well as all South Australian league sides, teams from Queensland and the V.F.A. participated. Tuesdays grand final carries prize money of \$30,000 for the winners.

Glenelg will miss this seasons S.A.N.F.L. finals for the first time in seven years. Injuries and State commitments haven't helped Glenelg's cause but all sides have had injury problems this season.

After winning its first two games of the season Glenelg was being hailed as a certain grand finalist.



Cracks are appearing in the multi-million dollar North Melbourne superstructure after the side's 12 point loss to Footscray last Saturday.

It follows a shocking 47 point loss to Essendon the previous week.

Internal squabbles have been reported at Arden Street as North suffered its fourth loss in five weeks and a further slide down the VFL ladder.

Abrasive pressman Tom Prior wrote in "The Sun" that North is heading for the most expensive flop in VFL history and hinted that coach Ron Barassi might not be there to pick up the pieces.

Prior asked Barassi if there was trouble in the North camp and the Roos super-coach replied: "Tell me who told you there was and I will punch him in the mouth".

"I haven't seen such an apathetic, ineffectual, seemingly eager-to-surrender North team for many years," Prior wrote.

He hinted at conflicts between senior club officials and personalities. It seems senior players have reacted badly to criticism.

Barassi said later that perhaps North was on the brink of the same type of decline that ended Melbourne's run as a power side in the 60's, Carlton's at the start of the seventies and Richmond's a few years ago.

In each case Barassi pointed the finger at the administration of the club.

Kevin Worthington kept the West Australian goal-kicking standard right up high in Victoria last week. The former Claremont defender kicked two of Collingwood's 25 goals - and he was playing in the back pocket! Good backing-up and strong clearing work saw the rugged Worthington boot two long goals after streaming right across the centreline.

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


This week we see WA play South Australia for the 67th time...and we have a vastly contrasting picture of the coaches.

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GOALS!

WITH **Marlboro**

Wingmen do not kick a lot of goals in league football, but when they do the feat is usually well recognised. Such was the case last week when Marlboro's \$150 goal-of-the-day on Channel Seven's World of Football went to West Perth wingman Peter Menaglio for his third-quarter effort. Menaglio had smothered the ball beautifully off the boot of Royals defender George Michalczyk, recovered after falling to the ground, evaded another defender in Craig Earnshaw and snapped a long shot that went through with the help of teammate John Frazer, who cleverly shepherded East Perth fullback John Hayes out of the way.

Talking about snapshots... two games were virtually sealed with brilliant snapshots from clever rovers. East Perth's Wayne Otway, who had put his side ahead of West Perth for the first time in the game when he kicked a goal in the opening seconds of the third quarter, sealed the issue with his next goal. It was East Perth's 12th and gave them an eight-point lead at the 25 min. mark of the last quarter as he steered a right-foot shot in from deep in the forward pocket. South Fremantle captain Noel Carter put his team in front of Swans in a hectic last term as he ran across half-forward and snapped truly to help seal the game.

The pressure was right on talented Swan Districts forward Simon Beasley when he was given the full-forward role last week against South Fremantle. Beasley had only kicked two goals in his last four matches — mainly playing at centre-half-forward — and he was in danger of being dropped. However, an injury to Mark Olsen meant that Beasley was the man for full-forward — and he responded with a nine-goal effort, including six in the second term. His goals came from a variety of methods — two from free kicks, one from a brilliant piece of scocoring in the square and the rest from his 10 marks.

Mick Moylan



Rovers are expected to snap difficult goals out of packs... but not ruckmen. However, two big men — Claremont's Graham Moss and South Fremantle's Mick Moylan — were right on target with their snap-shooting last week. Moss collected his side's 10th goal when he screwed an accurate right-foot shot back as he ran deep into the forward pocket and could hardly see daylight between the posts. The goal spurred Claremont on in their bid to over-run a tigerish Perth side. Moylan grabbed one of the best goals of the match against Swans when he took the ball cleanly at a boundary throw in and dropped it on to his boot from the middle of the pack to kick truly.



Archie Duda

Archie Duda, East Perth's specialist full-forward, has had to battle hard to regain league football status, but he certainly did everything possible to help his side last week. Duda led quickly and marked strongly and his kicking was a delight. His best goal was probably his second when he stood his ground strongly in between two West Perth defenders to mark safely and then convert.

West Perth's Corry Bewick was in good early goal-kicking form against East Perth. Bewick is not renowned for his accurate kicking (17.23 for the season including three straight goals in the opening game of the season) but he was right on target on Saturday. He kicked three of West Perth's first six goals — all coming from quick snapshots — and he was obviously overjoyed with his success.

South Fremantle rover Noel Carter was a special guest out at Channel 7 for World of Football on Sunday when he received the Pye mark-of-the-day award. The \$500 stereo set went to the South captain for a brilliant left-handed mark over a Swan Districts player. "Sometimes you just go for them and they land in your arms," was how he described the capture.

Ross Gibbs has proved the old adage that no-one is indispensable. When regular back pocket player Ian Kent quit West Perth over the Percy Johnson sacking, there were some anxious selection meetings
