



# THOMSON [AND SMITH] PROVE A POINT

One of football's boldest gambles this season has been the decision of East Fremantle coach Bradley Smith to recall Ian Thomson from the wilderness.

The shock announcement on Thursday, June 14 that Thomson would line-up at full-back for East Fremantle in the game against West Perth stunned many football followers . . . especially those in Old Easts' camp.

After all, the 29-year-old veteran of 163 games with East Perth and South Melbourne had made no secret of the fact that he was keen to retire at the end of the 1978 season.

But when football '79 got under way, Thomson found the lure too great and he was back having a kick with Wanneroo, in the WA Football Association. Then suddenly he was back in the league arena.

The hastily-arranged clearance from East Perth, the headlines that followed the announcements and the speculation about his ability to join a league team mid-stream put tremendous pressure on Thomson. It was no surprise, therefore, that he did not do well at full-back in that first game.

"I wasn't fit and I'd certainly rather forget that opening game," says Thomson, with a wry grin. "Circumstances that day made it rather difficult, but I'm pleased that it hasn't stayed that way."

Seven days later Thomson was swung to full-forward in an equally bold bid by Smith to inject some much-needed height into the side.

Fortunately, that gamble has succeeded. The lanky Thomson has kicked 18 goals in four subsequent matches — and that's two more than Smith had been looking for.

"We were sadly lacking in height in attack and defence," says Smith.

"I wanted someone who could take a big mark and if Ian could do that and kick four goals a game, then I was going to be happy.

"I agree that it certainly was a gamble to pick him. But

I had tried to get him early in the season. He trained with East Fremantle a few times and I personally didn't believe that his league career was over.

"But we weren't successful in getting him and he went off to Sunday football.

"Then we ran into a few injury problems, so I tackled him again and he agreed to give it another try. He is not a champion footballer; but he has a lot of knowledge and has filled key roles in the tough VFL arena. He can take a good mark and he gives the younger players around him plenty of encouragement.

"At this stage I'm happy with the gamble and I'm pleased for his sake — and mine — that he has done well."

It was a difficult transition for Thomson, coming into the side at the last minute.

In fact, he had to introduce himself to several young players just before the game and he confesses that he did have trouble remembering some christian names during that first game.

Since then, Thomson has settled in well and he is the type of player who can bring other forwards into the game. His goalkicking contribution is handy, but Smith also places great importance on Thomson's experience in attack.

As for Thomson, he is counting his blessings.

An unassuming footballer with a love for the game, he believes that football can often be a lucky operation.

"I didn't really think my career was over, but at the

end of last season I just wanted to forget about football for a while," he says. "But then I had a few training runs early this season and reckoned I could get a kick in Sunday football. I was a bit surprised when Brad asked me to play in the East Fremantle league side.

"That first game didn't really put me off. It was a wet, bleak day and not really the ideal circumstances. But I'm pleased I've been able to kick a few goals since then, not only for my sake, but also for Brad's as he has given me the chance to play league again."

Smith took the Thomson gamble against the wishes of his co-selectors and one of the added bonuses has been the brilliant form of Jim Sewell.

One of Smith's ambitions when he went to East Fremantle was to get more work out of Sewell, one of the most talented players at the club.

Sewell's role in previous years as a high-flying full-forward or centre-half-forward saw him out of the game for long periods. So Smith wanted to convert him into a ruck-rover and the presence of Thomson in attack allowed him to put Sewell on to the ball.

The fact that Sewell has been one of East Fremantle's top three players in their last three games has also vindicated Smith's gamble with Thomson.

Whether Bradley Smith can win a premiership with his new team, only time will tell. But he certainly gets full marks for trying a few new ideas.

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# EDITORIAL

Mervyn George Cowan has spent many long hours sitting in the WANFL directors' room pondering important issues relating to football in Western Australia.

But he has probably never spent such an important two hours as he did last Monday night when, sitting in his normal chair, he had to face charges of misconduct laid by two league umpires.

For 2½ agonizing minutes, the room was deathly silent, as tribunal chairman Bernie O'Sullivan contemplated pages of notes after hearing lengthy submissions from both sides of the case. Then he started to give his verdict — and 11 minutes later it was a shocked and visibly shaken Mr Cowan who was found guilty of the charge and fined \$20.

It was certainly the most sensational tribunal case WA football has had for many a year.

On a day when league umpires were expected to lodge numerous charges against players because of rulings handed down in the previous week about controlling volatile incidents; the only person to be cited on a league umpires' sheet was one of the WANFL directors.

The fact that Mr Cowan saw fit to confront umpires Ron Buckey and Mike Ball at the half-time interval and make comments to them was sufficient grounds to find him guilty. But the whole issue must be kept in perspective.

## IN THE HOT SEAT

Mr Cowan felt that he had a right to challenge the two umpires to stop laughing, as football is a serious business — and it certainly was at half-time for East Fremantle, who were trailing Claremont by three goals at the time.

But Mr Cowan's role as a director of a club and a delegate to the WANFL table should have warned him that it would be an inflammatory situation to cross paths with umpires at the half-time break and that is the tragedy of the issue.

However, suggestions that Mr Cowan should vacate his seat at the directors' table are carrying the issue too far.

After all, the man has been a much-respected leader of a top club for 10 years, he had been a player and official for many years before that; he has been town clerk at East Fremantle for 15 years.

One digression, whether it be heated or whether it be a genuine, but mis-timed attempt to reprimand, is not sufficient grounds for such a drastic resignation.

Umpires Buckey and Ball must also be admired for their stand.

They virtually took their fate in their own hands by challenging a league director. But they handled themselves with complete aplomb at the tribunal and did what

they felt was correct under their charter as an umpire.

Mr O'Sullivan, also, deserves praise for the way he handled a potentially explosive situation.

There were calls from within the WANFL that the matter should be held in camera or even simply referred to the directors themselves, where it almost certainly would have got lost in the 'too-hard' basket.

But Mr O'Sullivan made it clear from the outset that this would be handled like any normal tribunal hearing and it is to everyone's credit that the matter was dealt with in the open.

It was a record attendance for a tribunal night — not only were there eight other charges; from reserves and colts ranks, but a roll-up of 10 media representatives made the normally sedate tribunal room look like part of a grand final crowd as people jostled for positions around the arena.

This has not been a good exercise in football promotion or public relations.

Let us acknowledge the right of umpires Ball and Buckey for reporting what they rightly believed was some type of misconduct by threat from a WANFL official; let us commend Mr O'Sullivan for the dignified manner in which he handled the issue; let us hope that Mr Cowan will accept the reprimand in the right manner . . . and let us now forget the whole issue and get back to the football.

# TIGERS CHANGE THEIR SPOTS

Claremont appear to have shrugged off the 'soft' image that they've been tagged with in recent seasons . . . .

Their tough approach to football 1979-style is causing problems for their finals rivals and the way they literally crushed East Fremantle into the Claremont Oval dust last week indicates that more is yet to come.

In fact, Tigers coach Graham Moss said as much last week when he promised that Claremont would get better as the finals got closer.

East Fremantle are not an easy side to crush; in fact they have had the capacity to bounce back and fight a game right out. But last Saturday Claremont restricted Old Easts to a meagre 10.17 — one of their lowest scores for some time.

It would have been a disappointed Bradley Smith who trudged home with foreboding thoughts about his pleasant start to a coaching career possibly ending in disaster . . . and he faces probably the ultimate test in a crucial Derby encounter with arch-enemies South Fremantle this week.

But back to Claremont. There have been many times in the past when they have promised so much, but given so little when the pressure goes on. Now the pressure has been applied and they have survived. Consecutive victories over two top-four rivals — East Perth and East Fremantle — has bolstered their confidence and they now face bottom-half sides West Perth and Swan Districts before they too clash with the top dogs, South Fremantle.

That August 11 encounter at Claremont Oval will be Claremont's chance to atone

for their two losses to South this year — and South are unquestionably Claremont's bogey side for '79.

That clash could also produce a new leader on the table, providing the Tigers can survive their two danger matches in the next two weeks.

Moss has injected a toughened spirit into his Tigers. He has even got hot-and-cold forward Norm Uncle revving in peak condition. He has plenty of all-round strength; good rovers, a tight defence and enough big men to get by. But Claremont also have Moss . . . and their star ruckman makes things tough for opposing sides.

Malcolm Brown is also riding high at present.

Six wins from their last seven games and now at home to East Fremantle and a great chance to destroy that club's morale

even more. Brown must be content with his scoring potential; each week he seems to find a new goal-scoring avenue and the versatility of his attack is a problem many sides find hard to counter.

He also had good news last week in the shape of an in-form Joe McKay, whose strength, height and ability to destroy the oncoming ball makes him a great cornerstone for defence.

East Perth are still hovering around, even though that three-point loss to Claremont is a worry.

The return to form of kick-getters and creative motivators Peter Spencer and Barry Cable is good news for the Royals. They are the players East Perth need in form as the finals approach.

There is little to be said about the four sides out of this year's action.

Subiaco's plight is lamentable — and even coach Peter Burton seems to be resigned to that fact — judging by some of his recent comments after losing efforts.

Swan Districts keep giving a spark of life every now and then, but simply are not capable of igniting a permanent flame. Perth found that even the apparently simple task of beating Subiaco was a supreme effort.

West Perth, in fact, are the only people who can afford an occasional smile in the lower order. At least they are putting up competitive displays and their effort against South Fremantle was commendable.

## OUR IMAGE IS IMPORTANT

In my various travels around Australia I try and emphasise during my talks to officials and players of our great game the tremendous importance of our overall image.

We are living in an era which places much emphasis on public relations and consequently those responsible for the presentation of our game must at all times be conscious of how much damage can be caused by lack of thought or a few moments of undisciplined stupidity.

Our image becomes even more relevant when one is involved in approaching business executives with the view to gaining their financial support for various promotional ventures.

The actual presentation of Australian Football generally is fairly good and I believe clubs have advanced well over recent years regarding ensuring their players have neat, well fitting and well laundered jerseys, socks and shorts, accompanied by polished boots.

It is essential also that boundary and goal umpires be correctly attired and have proper equipment. This presentation assumes even more status in areas where our game comes up for critical assessment against rival sports.

In some areas at every game there are many people in attendance who are there not because they are adherents to Australian football, but because they are curious, or because their children are suddenly playing at school or because they have some disillusionment with another game.

Just one player swearing or disputing an umpire's decision or throwing an ill-advised punch could well dissuade a possible convert for life. And those possible converts could maybe have gone on to make significant contributions to the development of our game in their area — if not as a participant then maybe as a president, secretary, goal umpire, bootstudder, time-keeper or in fact in any one of the dozens of helping situations that any football club finds "recruits" hard to get.

It is in this same area of image that we must take a good hard look at some of our spectators and their influence on other people becoming regular Australian football supporters.

Thankfully the V.F.L. — which has naturally the greatest crowds — under Dr Allen Aylett's and Jack Hamilton's guidance — is looking at the "dry area" situation with consideration being given to extensions of the present well accepted areas.

It is an unfortunate fact of life that the loutish behaviour of a relatively few so called supporters is used to gauge the image and acceptance of our game. I recently for the first (and last) time had occasion with my wife to attend a match in the Melbourne metropolitan area — it wasn't a

V.F.L. fixture though I have no doubt the same conditions prevail in some cases. We arrived late and watched the game from "the hill". For the first time in my life I was completely ashamed to be an Australian. The language, demeanour, boorishness and general behaviour of the mostly inebriated "ockers" was nothing short of disgraceful.

Coupled with all this were some of the worst racist comments one could imagine which were directed at a few of the players who had southern European origins — and who were amongst the better players. (Isn't it funny how many Australians think it acceptable to have red hair, buck teeth, bandy legs and freckles, but by God you can't have olive, black, brown or yellow skin).

After being roundly abused for having the temerity to suggest that the language should be moderated, staggered against, sprayed with beer and offered a fight by about eight young "braves" we left at three-quarter time for the sanction of an early drive home.

Had we not been fanatic in our support of Australian football there is no doubt at all in my mind we would have been lost as spectators for all time if we were dependant on seeing matches from the outers each week-end.

I firmly believe if a system can be devised which effectively bans such an affront to the sensibilities of others by the exclusion or control of these no hopers there will be a surprising increase in attendance (and general commitment) of sensible family people. And let's face it — if we, as a sport, are dependant all around Australia on the attendance of a few hundred or even a few thousand yahoos we have a shaky set-up and a wrong sense of priorities.

I repeat — image at all levels is vitally important. That is where the National Coaching Scheme has a vital and on-going role to play by ensuring that coaches (and officials) become aware of the importance of instilling in their charges the necessity to present our game in the best possible light.

We can all get as professional as we like. It still doesn't exclude us from a handshake, a "well done", a pat on the head for a kid in his first game or a general acceptance that the supporters and players of opposing teams have feelings too.

Image is not soft or corny. Anyone in Public Relations will tell us how vital it has become. We in Australian football should pay due respect to it.

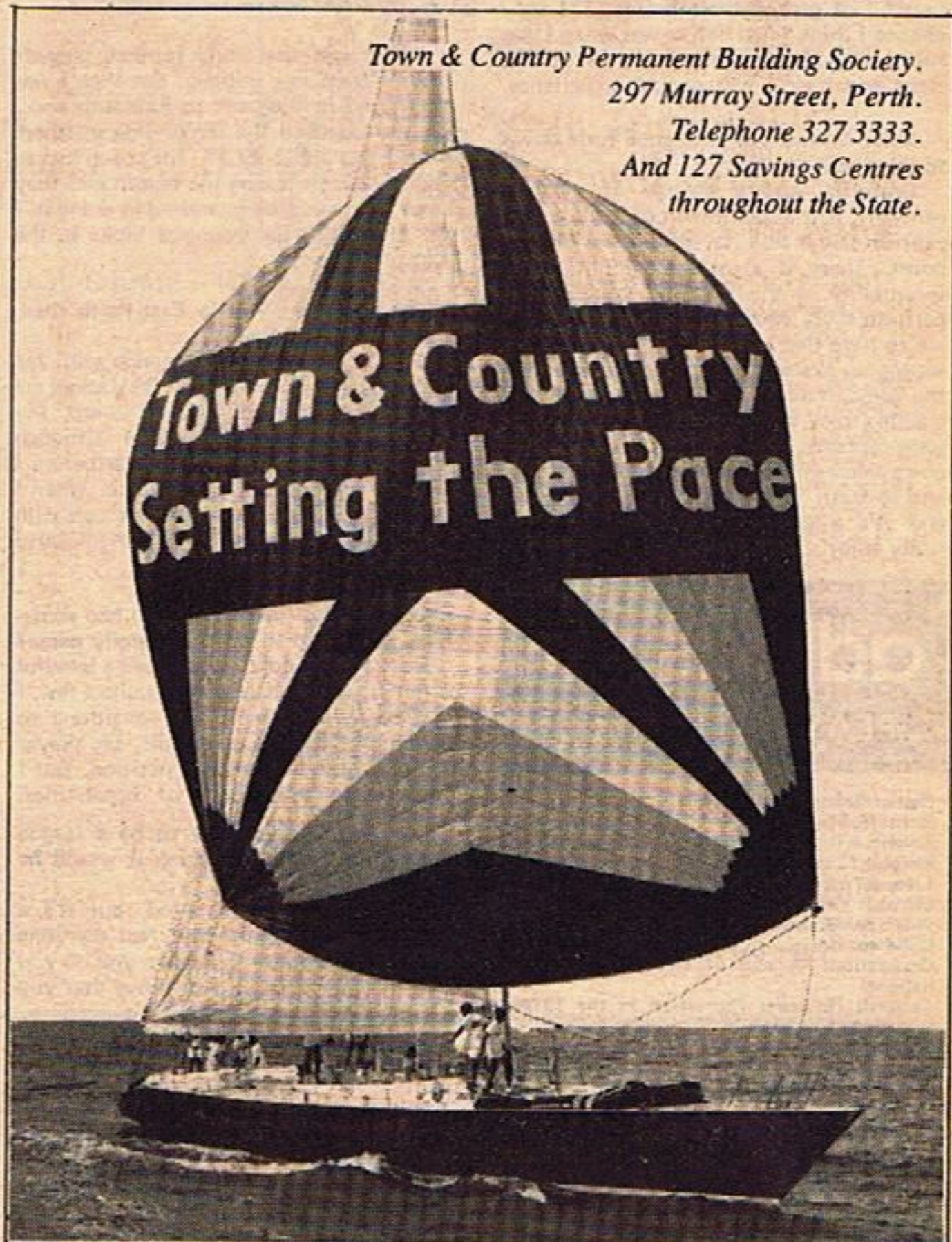

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# George happy about being one-eyed



George Michalczyk...  
a one-eyed view

East Perth defender George Michalczyk might have had a one-eyed view of his interstate debut against South Australia recently... but it was still a day to remember.

Michalczyk won his first State guernsey as a half-back flanker for the WA-SA game at Subiaco Oval — and after 100 league games with East Perth it was a reward well deserved.

However, he ran into trouble early in the match when he collided head-on with a rival as he took a courageous mark to repel a South Australian attack. The resultant swollen eye impaired his vision for the remainder of the day and left him with some discomfort for a week or so.

Michalczyk's career has been a consistent one with East Perth, but he felt that State football had by-passed him. He had gone close two years ago when playing as a ruck-rover, so this year's return to a half-back flank has now turned into an added bonus.

Here Michalczyk talks to ALAN EAST about his football life:

**You must have been happy about getting into the State side this year after being around for a few years?**

Yes, very happy. I was never really hopeful of getting there before. The only chance I think I had before was when I was ruck-roving, but I was a bit raw at that stage and hadn't had enough experience.

**What do you put your good form down to this year?**

Probably just a change of attitude generally. The appointment of deputy vice-captain of the club has given me a bit of a boost. There is a certain amount of responsibility in the role and you have to perform every week and it's a big thing for me to have that role. You are meant to be setting an example, at training as well as in the game. You have to be a leader on the training track. It's often left to Steve Curtis (vice-captain) and myself to keep everyone's mind on the job and organise groups and so forth. It's made me more dedicated and it's a good challenge, something I really enjoy.

**Do you still hold any regrets that you weren't cleared to Footscray when you tried to move to Victoria in 1977?**

Definitely, everyone says it's the name of the game to succeed over in Victoria and I'm a bit disappointed that I didn't get the chance to have a try. But I've had my chance and I don't think I'll get another one. After all, Victorian clubs don't really want 5 ft. 9 in. half-back flankers. When I was playing as a ruck-rover I was a bit more versatile.

**Where do you prefer to play?**

Obviously at the moment while I'm getting kicks it's good on the half-back flank, but I'd probably prefer to be ruck-roving.

**Where did you play your early football?**

At centre or as a rover.

**Where was that early football played?**

At Narembeen initially. But then I was transferred in the bank to Exmouth and I actually coached the senior side up there when I was still only 17. The coach had to leave the town during the season and they asked if I would be interested in doing it. I was just about the youngest bloke in the team.

**What brought you to East Perth then, family tradition or what?**

East Perth had kept in touch with me while I was at Exmouth and they asked me down when I had finished there. My brothers were at Perth Oval although Richard left for Victoria the year before I arrived, but Eddie was still there. When I came down West Perth got in touch with me and I had a few talks with them, but I decided to join East Perth.

**Did you feel as though you had something to live up to with the family name?**

Not really. Eddie only played a handful of games, but Richard played quite a few. I suppose in his case I had something to follow, but he was a versatile, big player and could hold down any position. But I didn't have those sort of capabilities.

**Did you always want to be a league footballer, or did you think it would be too hard?**

Everyone knows it's hard, but it's a matter of opportunity first. Not everyone gets the opportunity, but when you do you have to work hard at it to prove that you can make the grade.

**What does your future hold for you then?**

Well I'm only 24 and I've just passed the 100-game mark so I'd like to play 150 and get life membership. I'd then like to aim at 200 — I don't see why I couldn't do it if I stay fit.

**What have been the highlights of your career?**

Last year's premiership for sure. But also being approached by a Victorian club and given the chance to go over there and see how things operate. I spent a few months over there and really enjoyed it. The pressure is on all the time and I played

in all the practice matches and I definitely came back with a more professional attitude. Everyone lives football over there and to achieve something extra you have to put in that little bit extra. I was disappointed when I came back that I had a thigh strain and it kept me out for the first 13 weeks of the 1977 season. But lately, especially with Barry Cable here, I think I've learnt to do a lot of little things that help add to your game; things I didn't do last year which I'm doing now and I feel I'm improving all the time.

**Has football opened up a lot of doors for you?**

Certainly. Because of my football, going back five years ago the bank placed me in the travel department so I wouldn't get transferred to the country again. Because of that training and my football now it's one of the biggest reasons why I've got this new job with Travel Time International. It's a managerial position and one that I never thought I could get. It gives me plenty of opportunities for the future.

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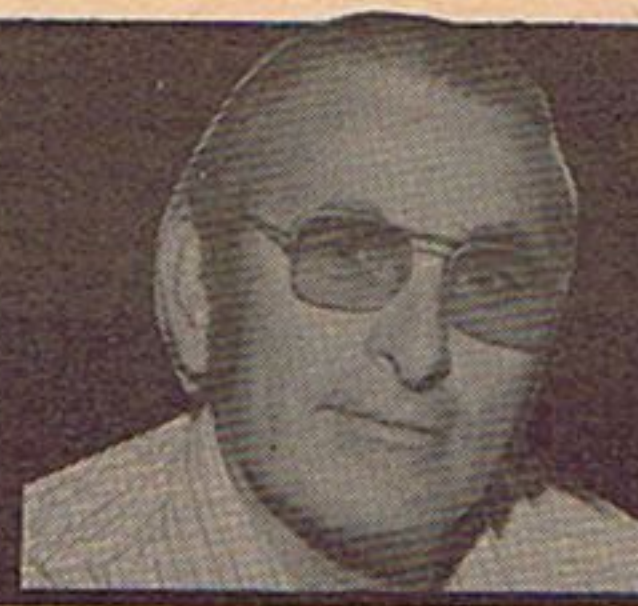

## Perths' great era . . .

When Perth moved to Lathlain Park 20 years ago, it heralded the most successful era of the Perth Football Club.

Since the move, five premierships have gone their way, compared with the two in the 60 years they had spent at the WACA Ground.

At Lathlain Park, the Demons have played 218 games, won 138, drawn 2 and lost 78. However, the first two years there were not good. Although they finished in third place on the ladder, winning seven of their home games in 1959, the season finished abruptly for them in the now famous first semi-final when Subiaco kicked a finals record against them — 26.23 to 7.8.

The margin of 129 points was the biggest drubbing in Perth's history (in 1952 South Fremantle beat Perth by 128 points).

Coach Ern Henfry was replaced by Bob Miller for the 1960 season, but Perth had their worst ever year at Lathlain, winning only two of their 11 home games.

The most games Perth have won at home in a season was 10 out of 11 in 1968, losing only to West Perth.

It was during the Mal Atwell reign that Perth performed best, losing only 16 of the 63 home games under him.

The Demons' home ground advantage was asserted during the 1976/77/78 seasons when they lost only six of the 32 games played there.

Despite their recent win over Perth in that rather rough game, South Fremantle still have the worst record at Lathlain Park, having won there only eight times. East Perth with 16 wins and 16 losses have the best record, probably because they won the first five times they played there. Perth didn't beat the Royals until the East meeting in 1962, ironically their second win came from the first meeting in 1963 with identical scores 13.14 to 12.14.

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Perth are not the only club to move from their original venue. Actually only Swan Districts and South Fremantle are the "stay puts".

● Subiaco, who were admitted to the league in 1901, first used an oval at Shenton Park as their home ground till they moved to Subiaco Oval (or Mueller Park as it was known as then).

● West Perth trained and played on The Esplanade and the WACA Ground before making their home at Leederville Oval in 1915.

● East Fremantle used Fremantle Oval as their home ground from 1898, with the exception of the 1906 season when they played at East Fremantle, till April 25, 1953 when they played Claremont on their present ground.

● East Perth were admitted in 1906 and used the WACA ground for home games until the move to Perth Oval (or Lotons Park as it was known as) in 1910. Incidentally, East Perth's first game was against North Fremantle in which they won 4.8 to 1.10.

● Claremont came into the league in 1926 but had to wait a year before Claremont Oval was ready so the Showgrounds was used as their home ground.

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*When East Perth climbed from fifth to second place on the last set of qualifying fixtures last year, it was only the second time in history that the eventual premiers were out of the four with one game to play. (The other year was in 1964 when Claremont scraped into fourth place and went on to win the premiership). There are other similarities: both games were against West Perth; both were played at Leederville Oval and both set record attendance figures for Leederville. In 1964 21,446 saw Claremont win and last year that record was stretched to 24,567.*

## More about THAT law

Even though we are into the third and final round of this season's football the addition to law 13 is still receiving its fair share of comment.

The addition to the law was never intended to finish all the controversy that has always gone along with the holding-the-man/holding-the-ball rule.

No matter what way you look at the law you will always have that difference of opinion. Some say holding the man and some go for holding the ball — it's always a matter of opinion.

Putting it all back on the umpires' plate — it would be an ideal situation for them all to have the same uniform interpretation. I'm positive that it is much easier to talk about than put into practice.

Some critics have said that it has not made any difference to the game. Others say it's a bad law and does not encourage the player to go for the ball. This is debatable.

Statistics show that of all the free kicks awarded during a game, nearly 60% of them go to the player who is in possession for being tackled incorrectly.

This must surely tell us that its important to win the race for the ball.

The main difference between free kicks given now and in previous seasons is that not as many holding-the-man frees are given and there are now more frees given for holding-the-ball.

This is self-explanatory as in previous seasons if you bounced the ball and was then tackled correctly you were given a free kick for holding-the-man.

It is now reversed and the decision would be for holding the ball. Players in the main have accepted the change and do not now query the decision.

Once again, what has been added to the laws is: "A player who is bouncing the ball is deemed to be in possession of the ball". On Page 4 of the law book Possession is also defined "Possession means a player with the ball shall be in possession until disposing of it, or attempting to do so, by kicking or handball".

There is always a lot of argument with football followers with holding-the-man/holding-the-ball. If the law is read carefully it is a straightforward law, but the problem lies with the interpretation on the day by the umpire.

Different circumstances at times also adds to the so-called different interpretations. No matter what the individual thinks, the umpire must give his decision as per the book using common sense and discretion.

If a player has gained possession he must be tackled correctly, he must be held firmly enough to retard his progress and he should be given a "Reasonable" chance to dispose by either kicking or handballing. If he does not do this he would be free kicked for holding the ball.

When tackled, if the player with the ball is carried forward the free kick would be given for in the back.

As we all know tackling is a skill of the game and not too many of our players are proficient in this fundamental.

At all times, umpires are instructed to keep the game flowing and encourage the players to go for the ball and when in possession to give the player a reasonable chance to dispose.

"The Spirit of the Law is to keep the ball in motion".

## FOOTBALLERS ON DRUGS

Doctors in Melbourne claim that some footballers are taking drugs and others have become reliant on pain-killing injections before games.

In fact former Collingwood great Des Tuddenham was quoted as saying that all but a few VFL players have used pain-killing injections at some stage or other in their football careers.

A report in "The Age" claims that pain-killers have become as common in VFL dressing rooms as liniment.

The president of the Australian Sports Medicine Foundation Dr Jack Refshauge claims that some players are using benzedrine drugs... known stimulants.

Fitzroy surgeon Mr Howard Toyne claimed last week on television that some footballers were using Amphetamines, another stimulant.

Former South Australian star David Young said that he had been having up to seven cortisone injections in each ankle before each game at South Melbourne.

After four hours the injections wore off and he could hardly walk.

Peter Keenan and Peter Moore, two of the VFL's most colourful and damaging ruckmen, are in danger of missing the remainder of the season.

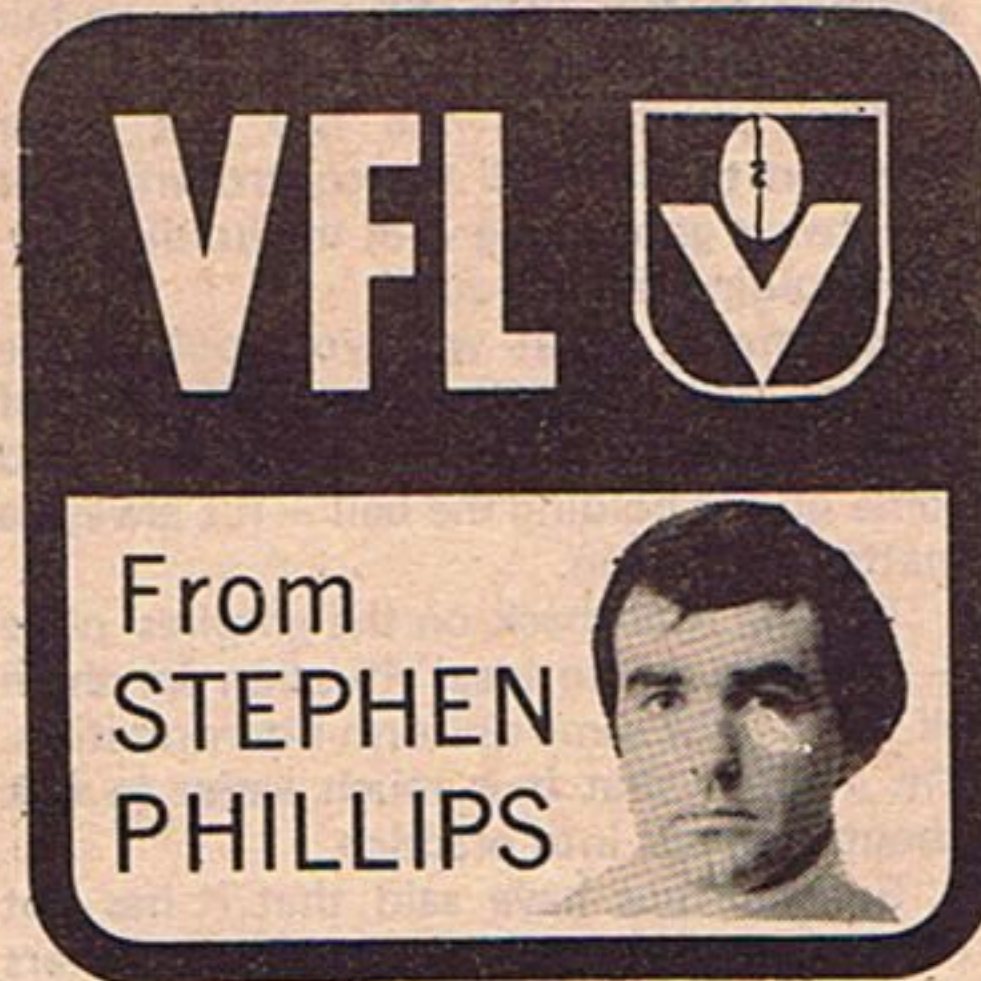
And for Essendon and Collingwood it is a severe jolt to their premiership hopes.

Keenan has carried an achilles tendon injury since the practice match against the Magpies at Portland in March but on Saturday broke down yet again.

The gawky Essendon ruckman limped from the Junction Oval on Saturday after having only one kick and watched Fitzroy romp home with an easy victory.

Moore is battling to keep his place in the Collingwood line-up. He has cartilage damage in his knee and may have to undergo surgery.

Both clubs expect to know the fufures of their stars later in the week.



The situation at Melbourne grows darker by the week. A half million dollar recruiting campaign has back-fired in the club's face.

On Saturday fabulous Phil Carman broke his thumb and he had an operation on Tuesday. He is out for the rest of 1979.

The worst news however, was the injury to brilliant State wingman Robert Flower. He has strained ligaments in his shoulder and will miss at least two matches.

Those two matches however may prove costly. He is outright favourite for the Brownlow Medal and leads in media awards worth more than \$20,000.

Talk of reliability. South Melbourne's veteran John Rantall limped from the field at VFL Park on Saturday with a strained knee.

It was the first time Rantall had been forced to leave the field injured for 17 years.

He has played 325 games and missed only one game in five years.



In the studios of HSV 7 on Sunday two Carlton players, Vin Catoggio and Wayne Harnes established a new record for the Guinness Book of Records.

Standing five metres apart they hand-balled to each other for thirty minutes. 1700 handpasses later they claimed the record. Both players were aching all over and had blistered hands from the ordeal.

The televised marathon raised \$500 for the Children's Hospital Appeal.

Richmond's late burst may have done more than propel the Tigers up the ladder. It may have saved coach Tony Jewell's job.

Jewell came under intense fire earlier in the year after the club's disappointing performances and it looked as though he may have been sacked.

The man who was expected to take over was former Richmond ruckman Mike Paterson, now coaching bottom side St Kilda.

The Tigers are now out of finals contention but are playing so well that they are going to trouble every team and may play an important role in shaping the final five.

## DOES S.A. HAVE TOO MANY CLUBS?

Is South Australia trying to support too many league sides? That is a question that has been asked many times since the SANFL decided to add two new clubs to the competition a few years ago.

There is strong feeling in Adelaide at the moment that the league should act to cut the competition back to eight teams.

Attendances at league matches in South Australia are poor at the moment... last weekend only 23,354 people turned out to watch the five matches. Nearly 8,500 of them watched the Sunday match between Norwood and Central District.

In fact four clubs probably PAID to provide football for their spectators. West Adelaide and South Adelaide attracted only 2,064 people to Richmond Oval.

The attendance at Football Park to watch Glenelg and Woodville was a mere 3,887 - and most were members.

The Glenelg football director, Mr. Harry Kernahan, said that his club received less than \$200 from the game against Woodville at Football Park on May 19.

A crowd of 4,903 had watched that match.

Glenelg would be "in the red" from Saturday's fixture - a disturbing aspect in view of the \$400,000 needed to balance the budget at Glenelg in 1979.

Woodville was severely hit last year when the league decided to split home-match gates on a 60-40 basis for a three-year trial period.

Previously gate receipts were pooled and divided equally among the 10 league clubs. At neutral games at Football Park the division is 50-50.

John Halbert, who made an overseas study tour last year, said yesterday that SA had too many teams for its population.

League football in SA was played on too many grounds and better facilities for spectators were essential.

Eds. Note: - The people that keep suggesting WA should have ten clubs would do well to absorb these facts.

Former Subiaco and WA ruck star Mike Fitzpatrick is heading quite a few awards in Victoria this year... and must be a strong contender to win the Brownlow Medal.

Fitzpatrick has joined the lead in the Melbourne Sun's Sunscore competition - a players poll similar to our own WESTSIDE RATINGS - and seems set to finish the season off in good style. He shares the lead with Brownlow favourite Robert Flower and veteran Kevin Bartlett.

Carl Ditterich, one of football's hottest-tempered characters, has held himself in check for most of the season... until Saturday, that is.

After Melbourne's pathetic second half against Carlton, Ditterich humiliated his players in front of supporters as he criticised them for an undisciplined and second-rate effort.



Norwood defender John Clarke must be one of South Australia's unluckiest footballers.

On July 8 last year, he injured his left knee in a game and underwent a cartilage operation.

A long rebuilding programme saw him fight his way back to form - till July 14 this year, that is, when he hurt the left knee once again and has had another cartilage taken out.

## NATIONS' TOP JUNIORS IN W.A.

West Australia is this week playing hosts to some of Australia's top junior footballers.

Under-16-footballers from all States of Australia are in Perth competing for the Commonwealth Bank Cup.

The championships commenced on Tuesday and will conclude next Wednesday at East Fremantle Oval.

The Commonwealth Bank is sponsoring the championships as part of a three year \$120,000 commitment to Australian rules football at junior level.

The football carnival is being held in conjunction with the girls' hockey and netball carnivals as part of the State's Sesqui Centennial celebrations. It is the first time all carnivals have been conducted in the one state simultaneously.

Victoria are the title holders. West Australia have not won the carnival outright since 1971 when the championships were held in Launceston.

The WA side is coached by former Swans and Subiaco league coach, Jack Ensor.

Two of West Australia's most important

matches will be played on the last three days of the championships. On Monday WA meet South Australia at East Fremantle Oval at 12.45 and on Wednesday, at the same time and venue meet, Victoria. In WA's only other remaining match they play Queensland at Claremont Oval at 10.45am Tuesday.

The Perth carnival is only a small part of the Commonwealth Bank's contribution to football. One of the most significant undertakings to date, was the release last year of a film dealing with skills of the game. The bank brought together league stars from various States to make the film which has attracted tremendous demand from dozens of junior bodies from around Australia.

It was announced in Sydney last week that the bank is planning a further film, this time dealing with the rules of the game.

Next year's under sixteen Carnival will be held in Darwin and the Commonwealth Bank will again be there to sponsor the series.



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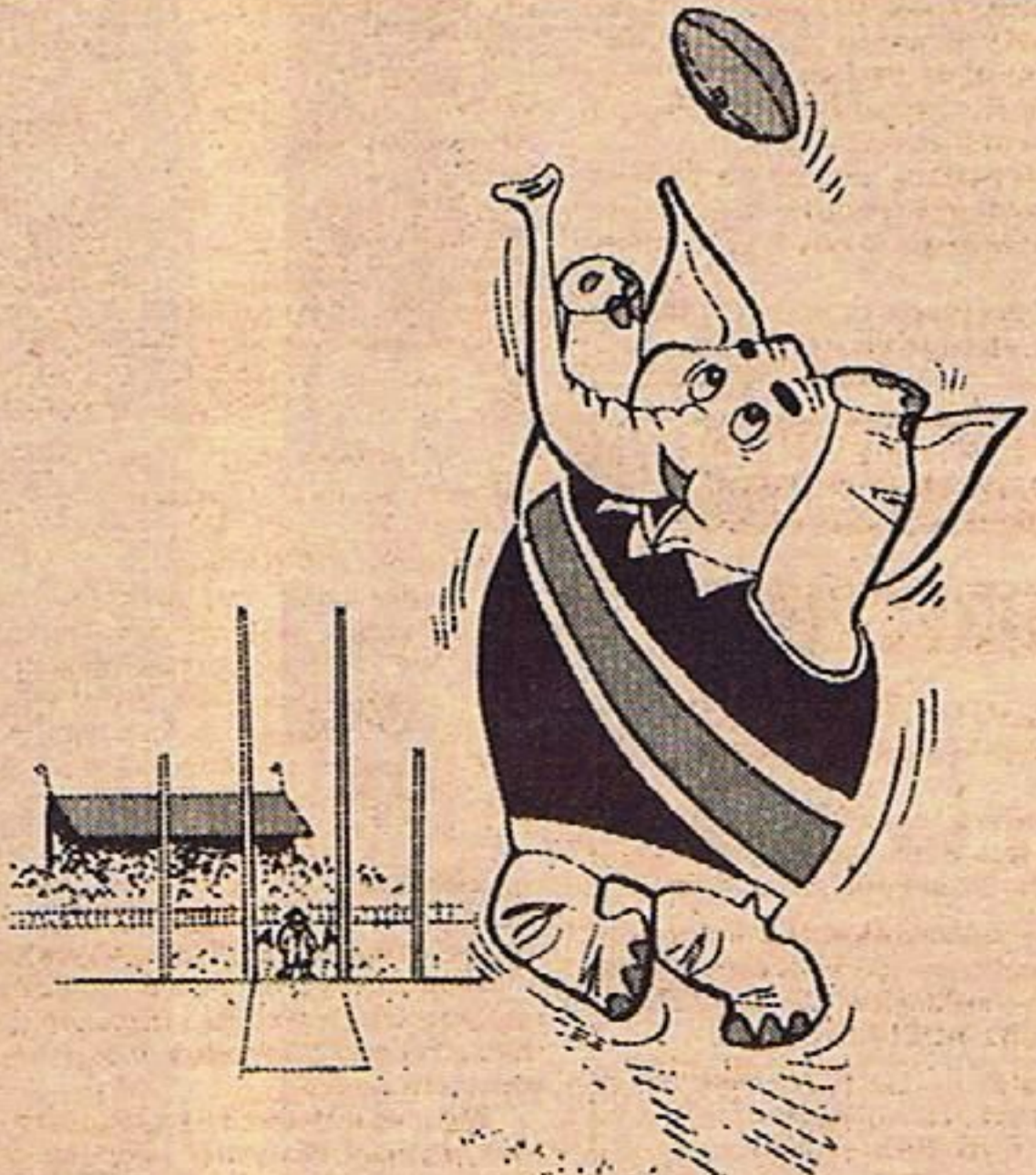
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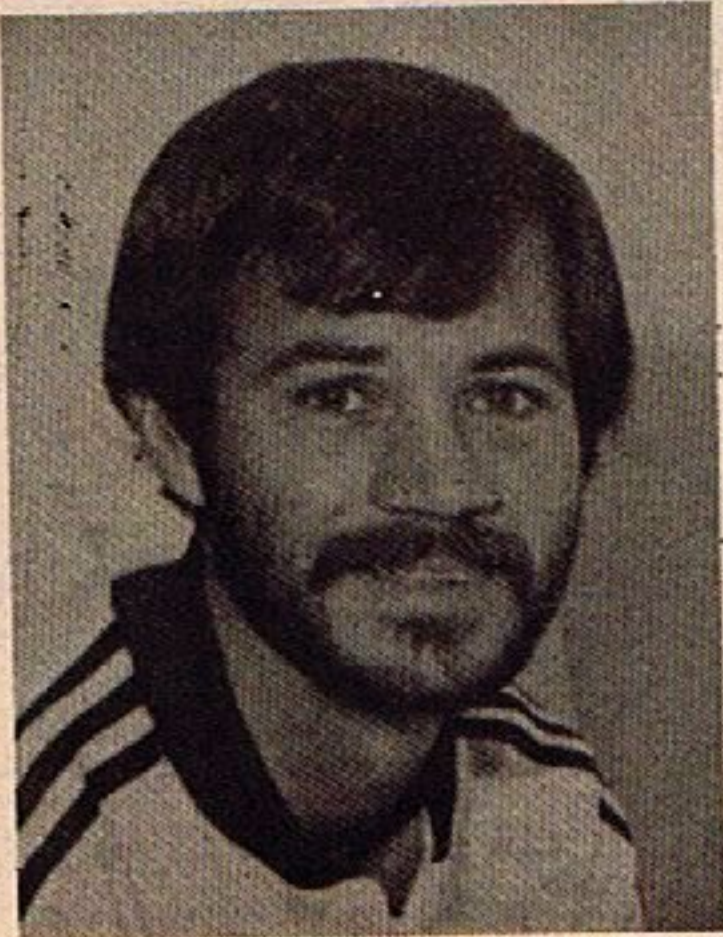


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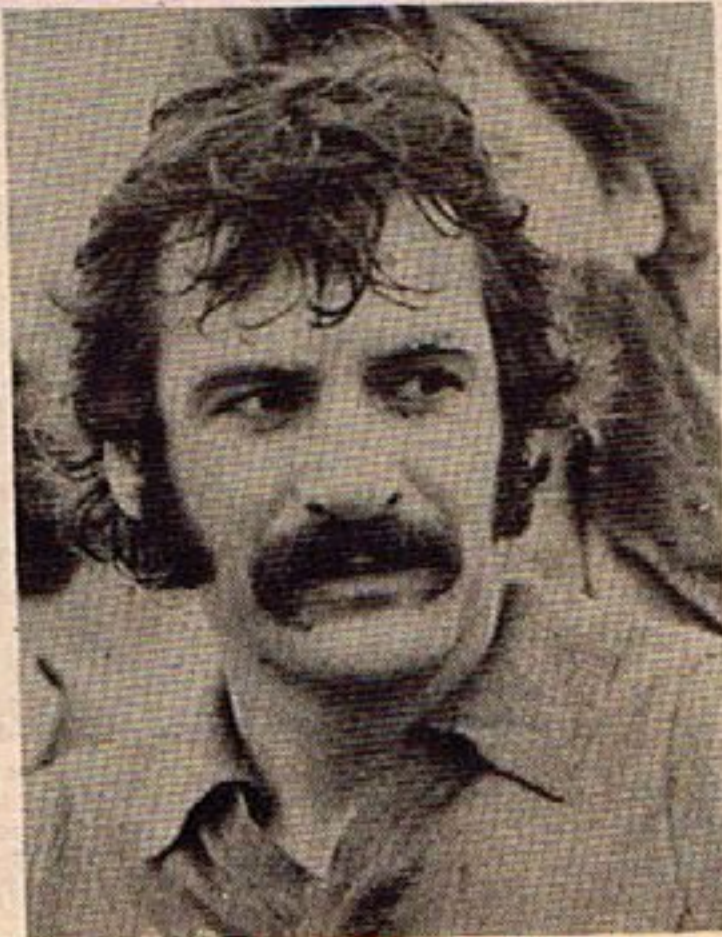


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**TONY MORLEY (South Fremantle)**

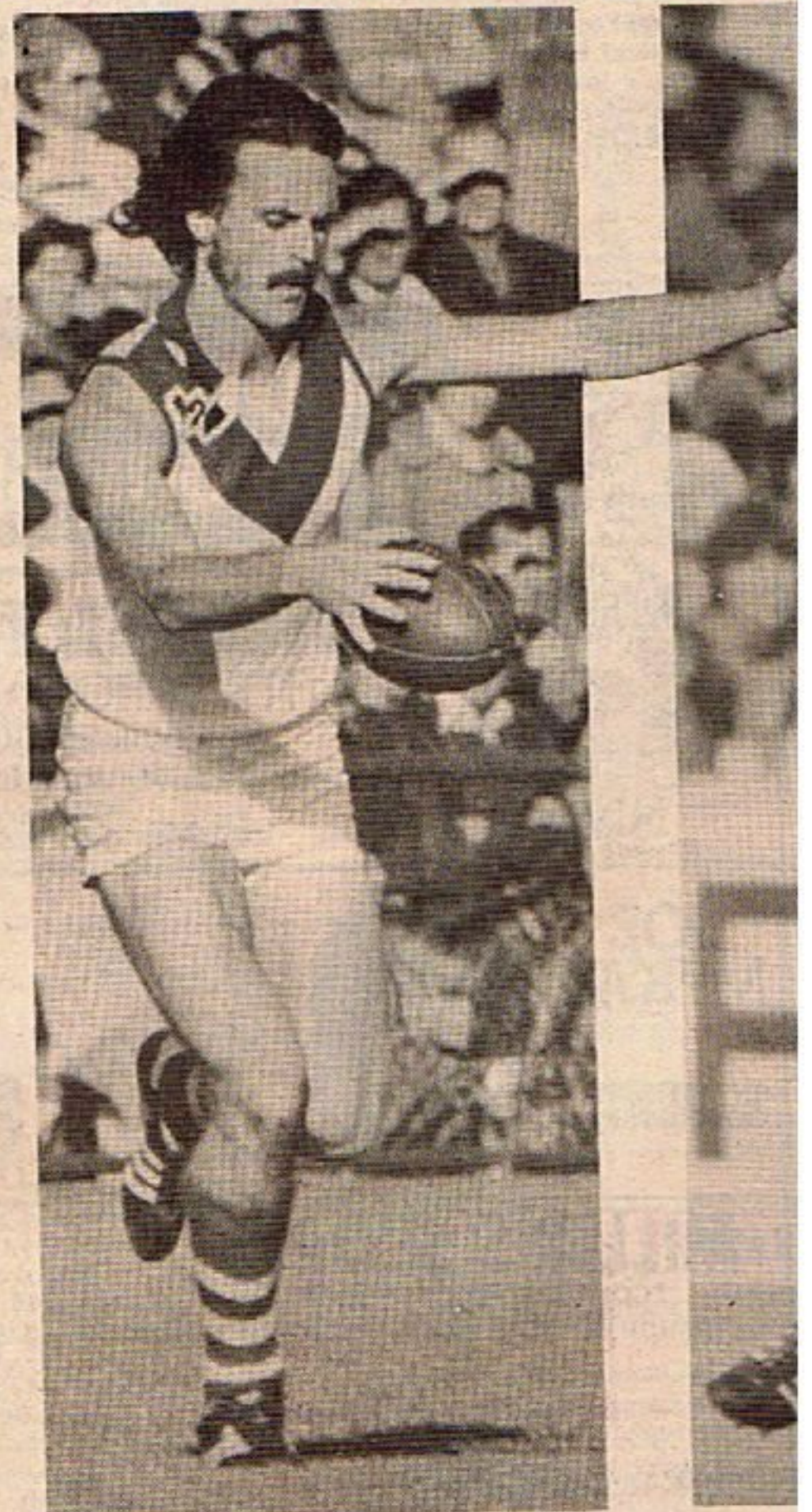

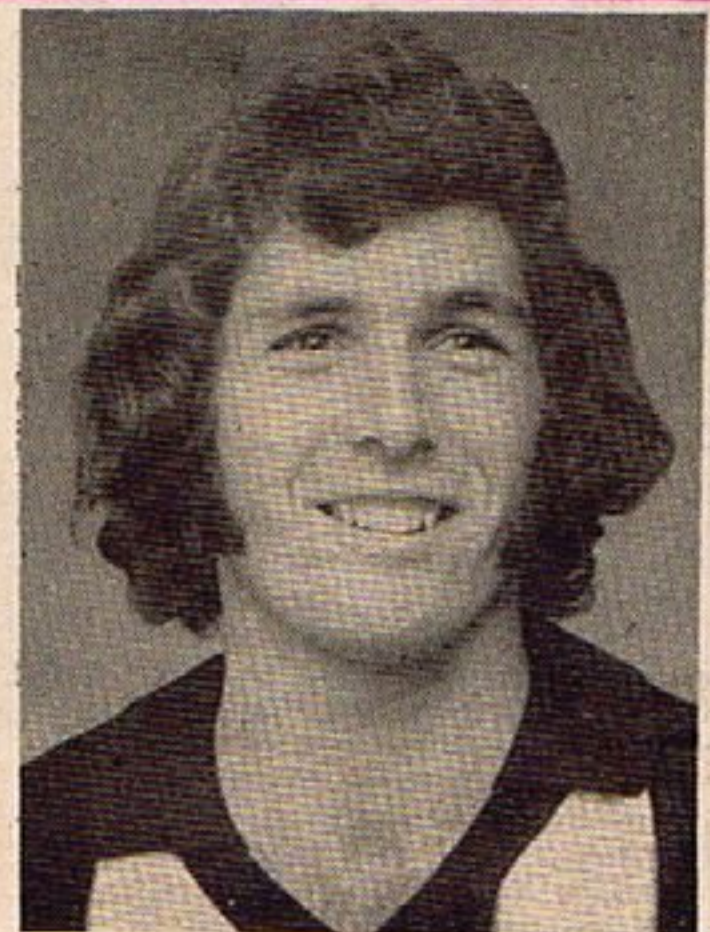
**GEOFF WATT (Perth)**

The W.A.F.A. wanted the two associations to join forces and form a two-division competition working on a yearly promotion and relegation system similar to that which operates in the VFA.

But the South Suburban let it be known last week that they weren't interested.

"We don't want to dwell on their reasons for not wanting to join — we are more interested in doing something about the situation," Mr Bitters said.

"Sunday football in WA is in a transitional period. If an imaginative and professional approach is made by all concerned, the Sunday game here can go on to great things.

"But if we are negative and don't try

"As it is now we have an uneven competition that must be improved.

"We have already had contact with some clubs in our quest to have 16 clubs in the W.A.F.A. next season . . . the response has been encouraging.

"We hope to eventually introduce colts teams to the competition and join forces with both Sunday associations in SA and Victoria.

"Once we have all this in order I believe we can generate enough interest to have direct television coverage — just as they do in the VFA and SA."

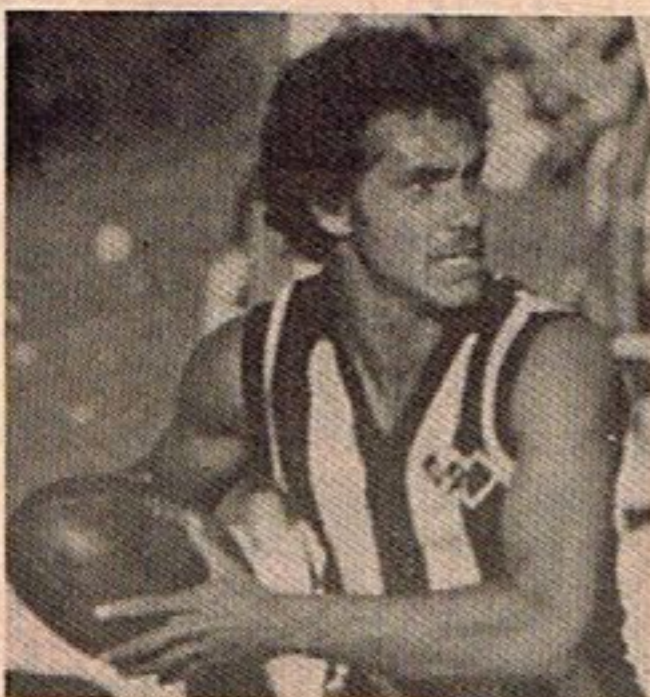

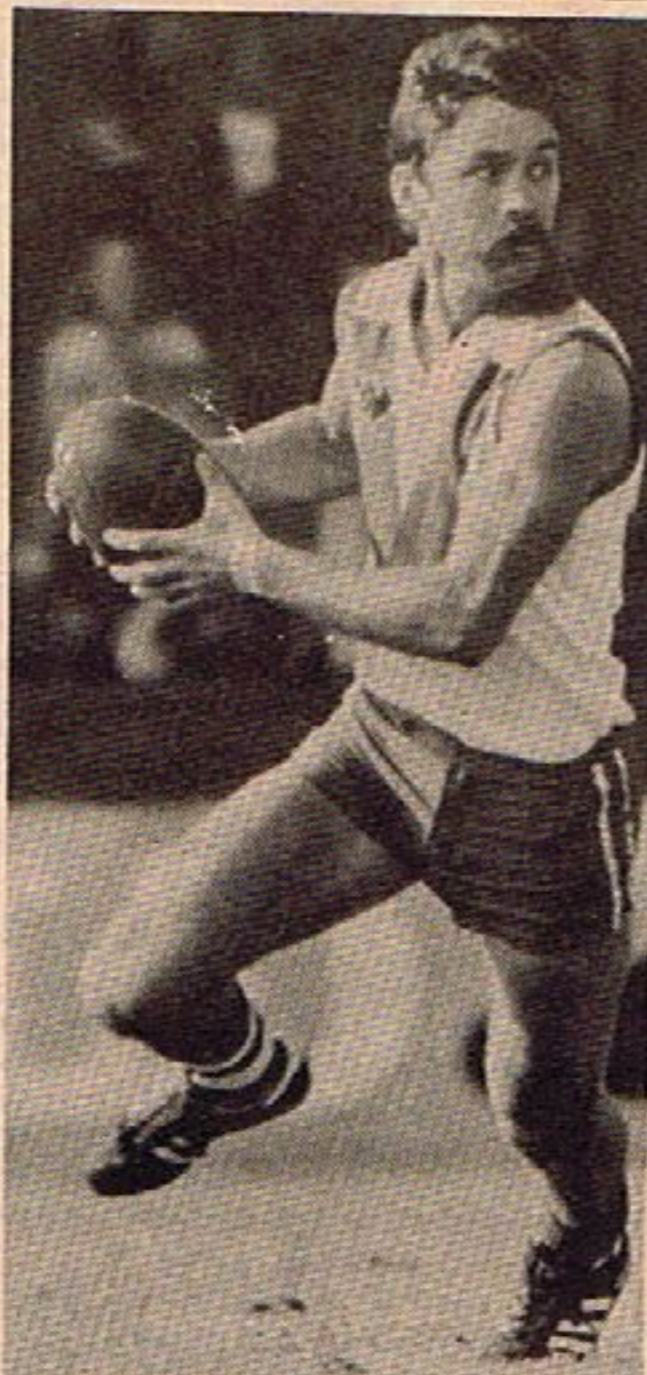

## ANATOMY AND PHYSIOLOGY

The anatomy and the physiology system of the body are the two basic starting points for a trainer to become familiar with.

A trainer should learn (a) the bone structure and (b) the skeleton. Then we have muscle problems and joints.

The physiology aspect starts with the nervous system, the circulatory system, the respiratory system, the digestive system and the urinary system.

The control centre of the nervous system is the brain. The heart is the focal point of the circulatory system. Both these then relate to the three following systems

## MANAGEMENT OF SPORTS INJURY

The management of sports injuries falls into five basic categories:

- 1 : Prevention.
- 2 : First-aid treatment.
- 3 : Definitive treatment.
- 4 : Rehabilitation.
- 5 : Prevention of recurrence.

There is a code of ethics operational in sports injury training and it basically revolves around the trainer.

To become a sports trainer is to take up a vocation; to provide part-time or full-time care to innumerable athletes playing in all levels of sport. Usually the only remuneration is the satisfaction that they are contributing their skills and knowledge in helping both the health and the performance of the athlete.

In his relationship with players, the sports trainer should be aware that he is

there to serve the needs of the player before, during and after the competition.

In his relationships with the administration, the trainer should remember that he is on public display as a representative of that administration. It is important that he conducts himself so as to maintain the principles, the integrity and the dignity of both his position and that organisation.

The trainer should have no executive authority with regards to the coach and acts merely as an advisor and medical orderly.

It is essential that a trainer develop a relationship with the coach which ensures that the player's health is never endangered. It is the responsibility of the trainer to see that the prompt and competent attention required by the coach is provided.

The trainer must know the laws of the game. Being a registered club official who is permitted on the playing arena, a trainer may incur penalties against his team if he unduly interferes with the ball or a player of the opposing team.

It is the responsibility of the trainer to act fully in accordance with the instructions and details given by the medical officer.

During a game, a trainer should be as inconspicuous as possible. He should only enter the playing area when there is a full requirement for his services.

### ROLE OF THE SPORTS TRAINER

• A trainer must endeavour to recognise the type of injury and its severity in the shortest time possible. A good trainer should remain calm and reach his decision only after carefully obtaining a clear history of the incident.

The trainer should find out:

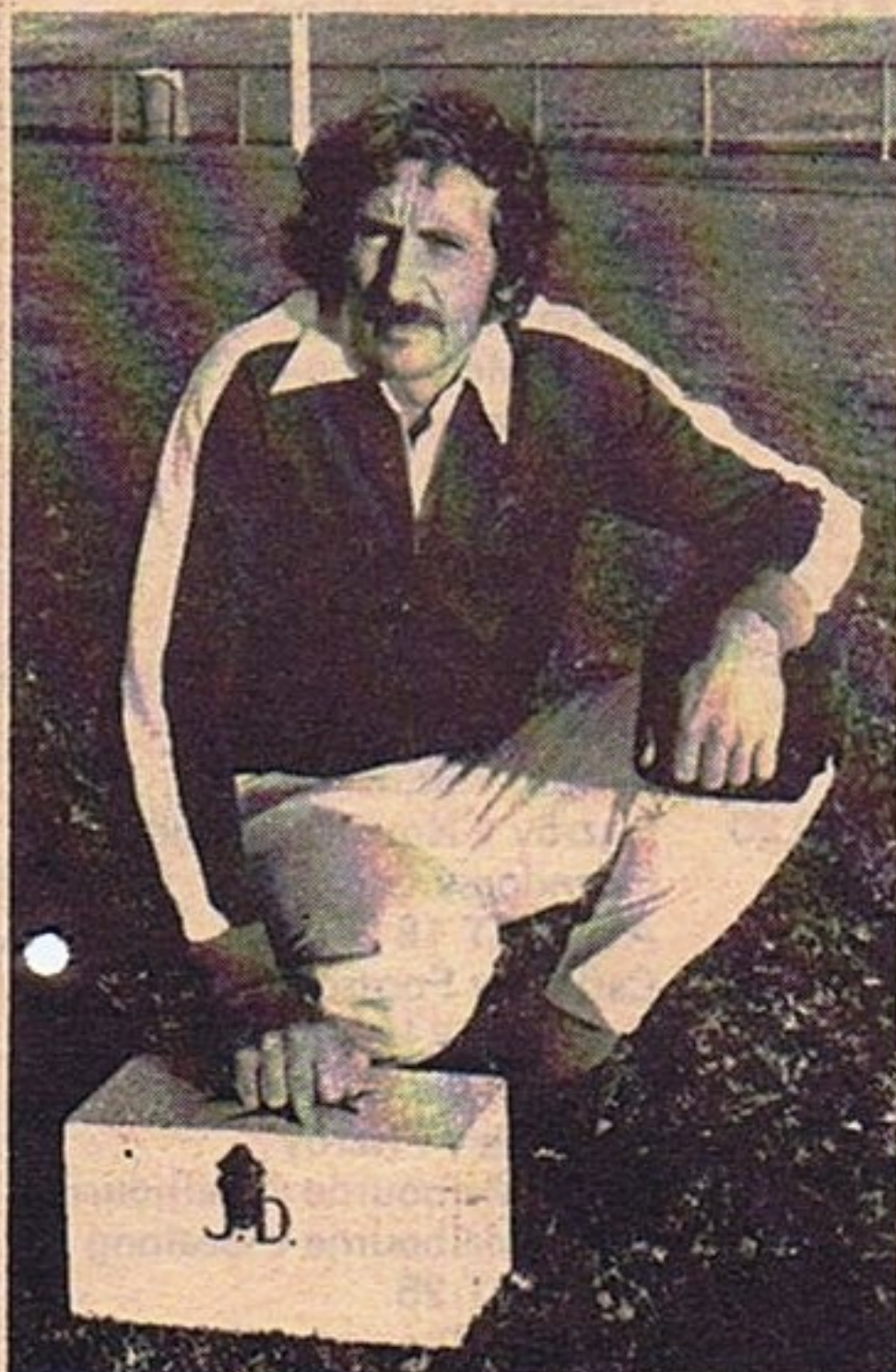
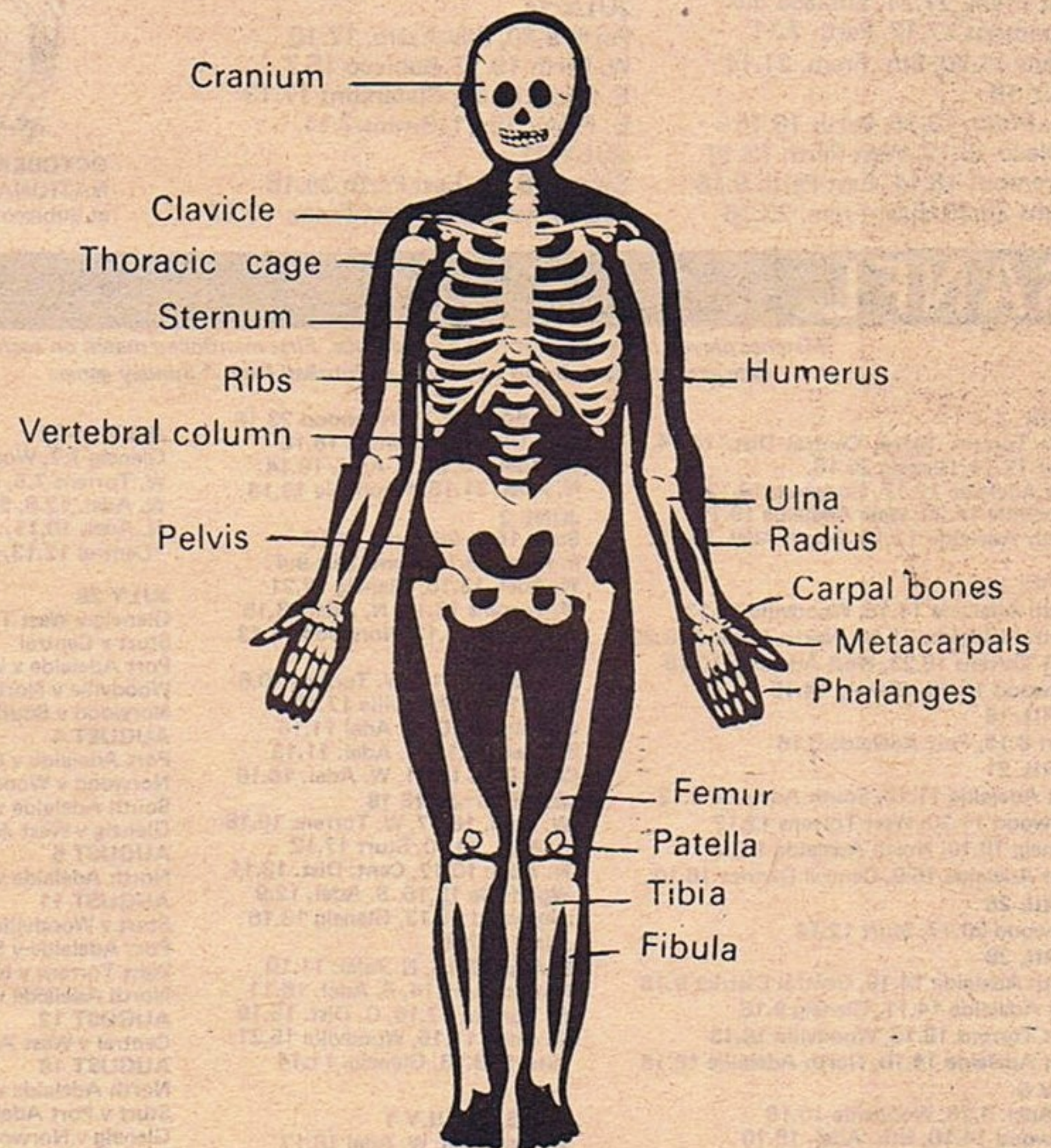
- How did it happen?
- What region is hurt?
- What did you feel?
- Was there a crack, snap, rip, tear, giving way?
- Is it painful, numb, weak?

A good trainer indirectly helps the player by:

Preparing all equipment; recognising the routine of players and making sure training areas such as couches and other needs are clean and tidy.

The qualities of a trainer can be summed up in six parts:

- Skill.
- Loyalty.
- Selflessness
- Communication.
- Judgment.
- Enthusiasm.

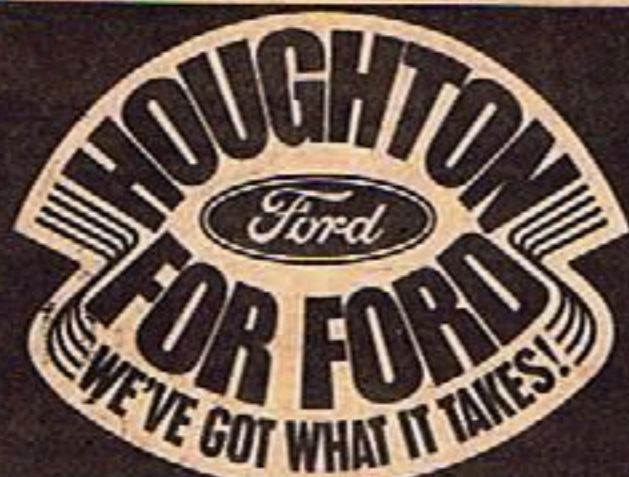

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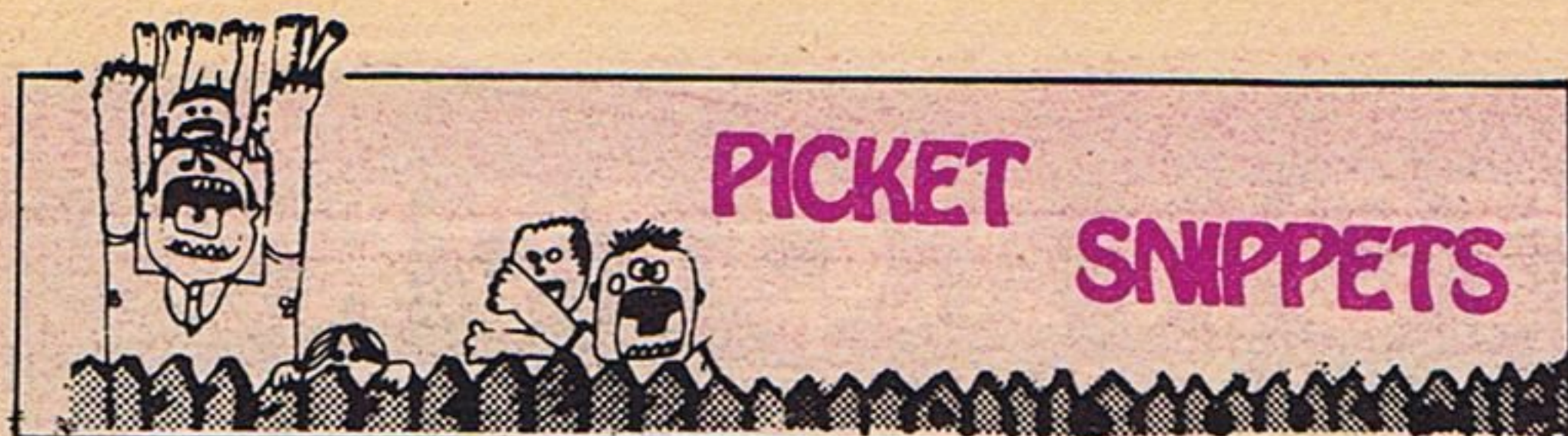

Campbell has apparently told him that the decision is irrevocable, for this year at least. But if Philippe is prepared to front up at Leederville in October — when the 1980 season gets under way — and do all the pre-season work, then he will get another chance.

East Perth star Peter Spencer made a welcome return to league football last week after a lengthy absence with yet another injury problem — a badly dislocated elbow this time. Spencer finished the game in fine style — after a slow start. It was a strange decision by Royals captain-coach Barry Cable to put himself on the ball first-up and leave Spencer cooling his heels in the forward pocket for almost half of the first term. Spencer is the type of player who needs to be thrown straight into the action — and Cable's value to his team is more of a leader out on the edges watching what is happening.

The Channel Seven World of Football panel had a few things to say last week about umpires — and the controversial proposal that they should be allowed to send players off for minor infringements. However, Mick Cronin's suggestion that mandatory penalties be introduced for reportable incidents was not well received — and Swan Districts defender Bill Skwirowski was one player who is glad such a scheme is not in force. Skwirowski was reported in the reserves game two weeks ago, but the charge was dismissed because it appeared to be a case of mistaken identity. of being in the "big money" at the end of the VFL season. Recent good form has put the ex-West Australian ruckman in strong positions in some Victorian football Awards. A best-on-ground performance against Geelong last weekend placed him in second position in the coveted "Age" award, the winner of which receives a trip for two to Asia, \$500 cash plus a wall plaque.

Poor old Malcolm Brown; the coaching business must be a tough one to be in. Brown feels that 40c is an 'exorbitant' price for our weekly publication WEST-SIDE FOOTBALL and therefore he cannot afford to buy it. Or so he said on radio 6PR last week. Brown obviously doesn't realise that 40c is a very reasonable price in today's inflationary world. 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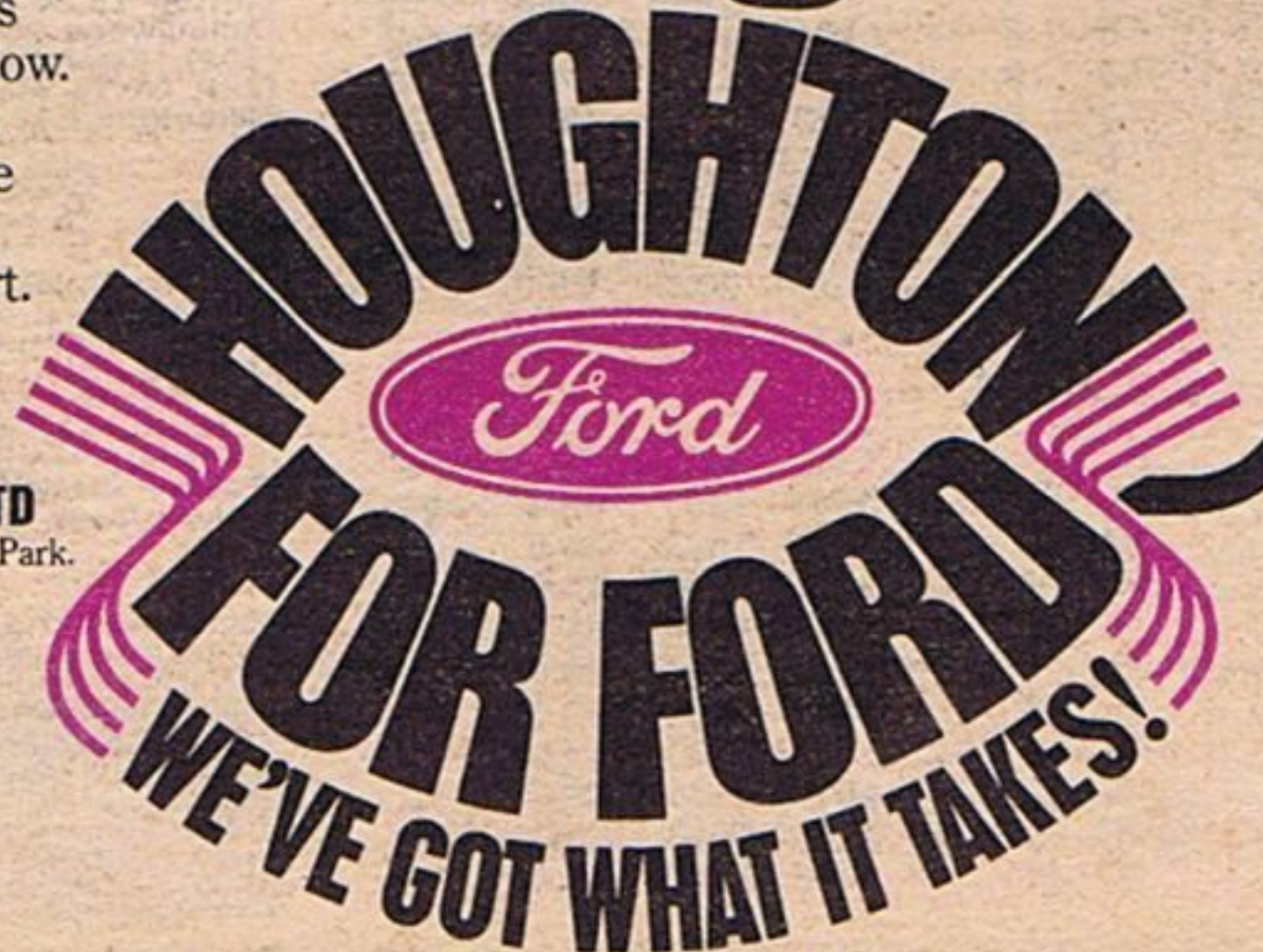
