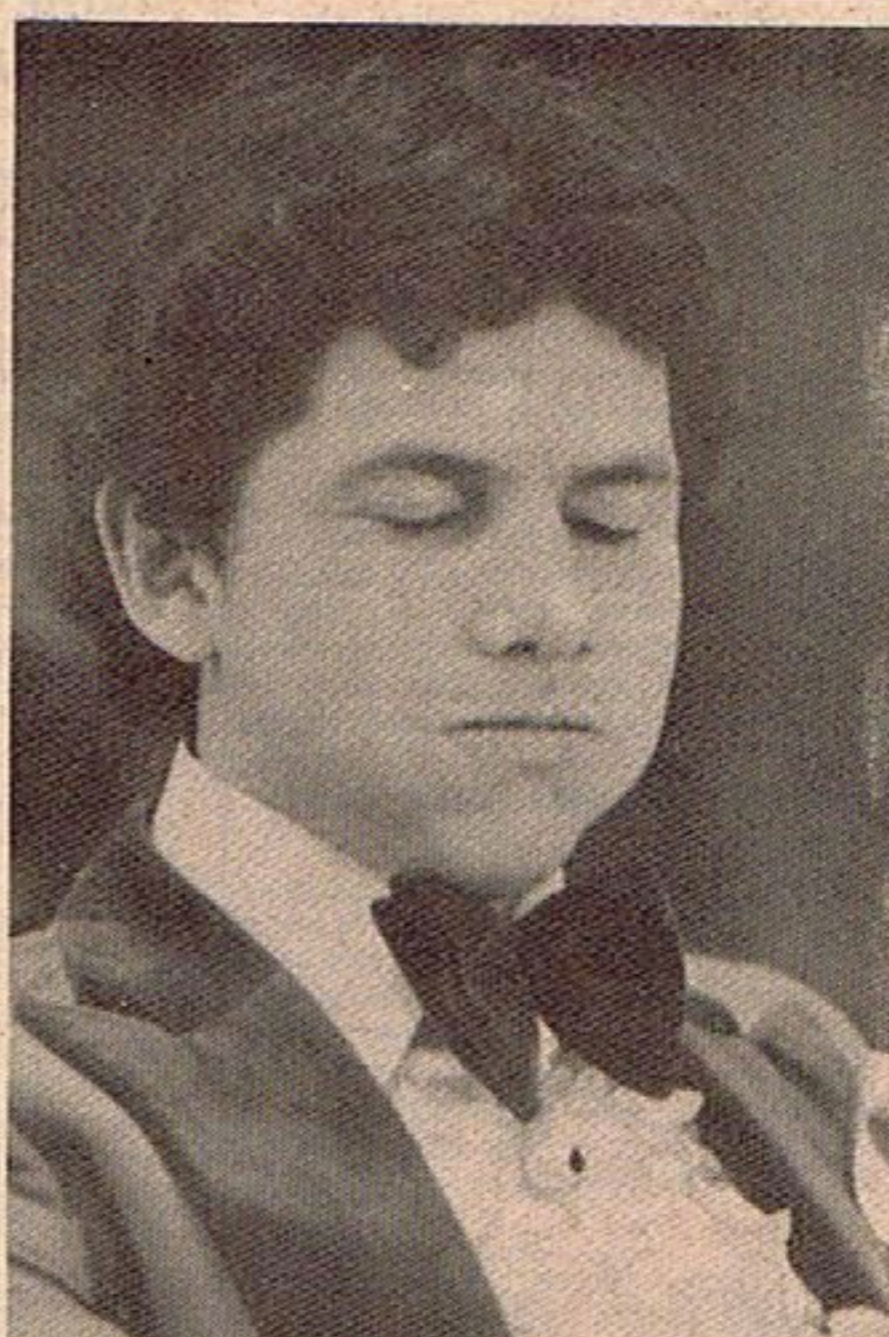

# KELLY A WORTHY WINNER, BUT . . .

The controversial question of whether umpires are the right men to handle the Sandover Medal voting has reared its head once again.

The failure of top-rated footballers such as Graham Moss, Ken Hunter, Ross Prunster and Brian Peake to attract votes from the umpires is cause for concern.

Moss and Hunter, particularly, deserved many more votes than the 13 and 10 respectively that they received.

Our special weekly Sandover Medal guide, which has recorded all the major media votes for best-on-ground, must certainly be regarded as an accurate guide to the performance of players.

Yet, there were five games during the season when Moss was voted best-on-ground by a minimum of two of the eight media — but failed to poll a vote from the

umpires. Those games were August 25 v Perth; August 11 v South Fremantle; June 23 v Subiaco; May 19 v East Perth; April 16 v West Perth.

In some of those games Moss received up to seven best-on-ground votes from the eight media, but still did not earn a single vote from the umpires.

Another interesting factor is that in 16 games, the player who received top votes from the umpire did not warrant a mention in the top three of ANY media man for that match.

Those games were: March 31 — Mark Carlon (C v EP); April 7 — Mark Washfold (WP v SF); Clint Roberts (P v S); April 14 — Wayne Cormack (EF v SF); April 21 — Ian Kent (WP v P); May 19 — Mick Johns (S v WP); Clint Roberts (P v SF); May 28 — Wayne Currie (P v S); June 9 — Robbie Lawrence (P v WP); June 23 — John Dimmer (S v C); June 30 — Alan Rose (S v EF); July 14 — Peter Menaglio (WP v S); July 28 — Peter Menaglio (WP v C); August 4 — Barry Kimberley (P v WP); Brad Hardie (SF v S); August 25 — Phil Krakouer (C v P).

## Moss takes our award

Graham Moss, Claremont's outstanding captain-coach, has won the inaugural Toyota Westside Ratings footballer-of-the-year award.

Moss has had a magnificent year and despite his poor showing in the Sandover Medal, he has certainly been one of the top footballers of the 1979 season.

Moss received seven out of 10 for his top-class game against Perth last Saturday to enable him to finish with 153 points for the year — an average of 7.28 for each of his 21 club games.

He finished three votes ahead of team-mate Ken Hunter, who also received seven for his effort against Perth, and East Fremantle star Brian Peake, who picked up an eight for his final match. Both players averaged 7.14 for their 21 club games.

The Westside Ratings is the only true indication as to how a footballer has performed over the season and next week we will analyse the complete year's voting by all players.

The top vote-getters in the other six clubs were:

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## EDITORIAL

# The medal and sponsorship

There has been a lot of discussion about Monday night's presentation of the Sandover Medal and its format and the prizemoney involved.

Some people may ask whether the league acted wisely when it opted to commercialise the medal last year.

We are the first to agree that the sponsorship is the lifeblood of Australian sport; the question is however, where should the line be drawn.

Most sports, and in fact most ways of life, have their sacred traditions. To many West Australian football fans, the Sandover Medal represented that holy symbol. Without prizemoney, the medal retained a constant value for more than 50 years. Despite the fact that no prizemoney was attached, footballers also regarded the Sandover as the ultimate reward.

TVW made a commitment to the league to provide prizemoney for a limited period. One wonders what may happen if there is a change in policy in future years . . . it would certainly leave the league in an embarrassing position. True, a new sponsor could probably be found, but what would happen then, would it change its name from the Channel 7 - Sandover Medal to, say, the Bill Bloggs Motors - Sandover Medal.

This would further detract from the traditional image of the Medal.

No one can dispute the contribution that TVW makes to West Australian football, and we would be the first to commend their efforts.

With its vast promotional expertise we wonder whether it may not have been a better idea, had the station promoted its own award. The \$25,000 prizemoney for a separate award, judged by its own critics would have done nothing to detract from the tradition of the Sandover Medal, it would have been a further incentive - in addition to the many existing awards - for which footballers could strive.

Sir Eric Sandover this week expressed concern at Monday's presentation and was reported as saying he was dissatisfied with the 'Channel 7' tag that had been added to his family's award.

When the WANFL first announced Channel 7's commitment to the award it was made clear that Sir Eric agreed to the change.

Obviously the commercialisation has gone further than he expected.

Many football followers will no doubt join with Sir Eric in wondering where it will all end.

# AND NOW THE REAL FIGHT STARTS

The battle is over . . . now the war will be fought!

Twenty-one weeks of club football has left four survivors - Claremont, South Fremantle, East Perth and East Fremantle. From this week they will take all the attention.

The season came to an interesting end; not quite as climatic as the headlong rush for final-four placings that we experienced last season, but interesting none-the-less.

We saw Claremont snatch \$10,000 from South Fremantle for finishing on top of the table for the first time since 1972. They won the inaugural Town and Country championship - and the big cheque that went with it; a cheque that will find its way into the coffers of the players as they prepare for an end-of-season trip.

South, trendsetters at the top for most of the season, slumped to Swans - for the second year in a row - in the final match and slipped out of top spot. However, Saturday was an anti-climax for the Bulldogs - their big day had been a week earlier when they downed arch-rivals East Perth, at Fremantle Oval, to make sure they stayed in the second semi-final and the Royals had to battle it out in the cut-throat first semi.

We had Kevin Taylor setting records all over the place, Graham Moss causing a stir in the Sandover Medal department; Ken Armstrong bowing out of league football as a coach on a disappointing note and East Perth licking their wounds after a tough clash with West Perth.

At this stage of the season, East Perth - who had opened up as premiership favourites back in March - are probably the longest quote of all as they have to overcome a confident, fit and in-form East Fremantle in Subiaco Oval's first finals match this Saturday.

Old Easts have done a tremendous job to fight their way out of a slump and they go into the finals sparking on all cylinders. And what an emotional situation it will be.

Bradley Smith, one of the Royals' favourite sons, defected this year to coach at East Fremantle - and he will be keen to notch something over his mentor of last season, Barry Cable.

In addition, we have Ian Thomson playing at full-forward for East Fremantle. Thomson was recalled from the football wilderness by Smith midway through the season - after being given his walking ticket by East Perth last year. The veteran has proved to be a winner for Old Easts at full-forward - ironically, a position that has often given East Perth trouble and one where the versatile Thomson was never used.

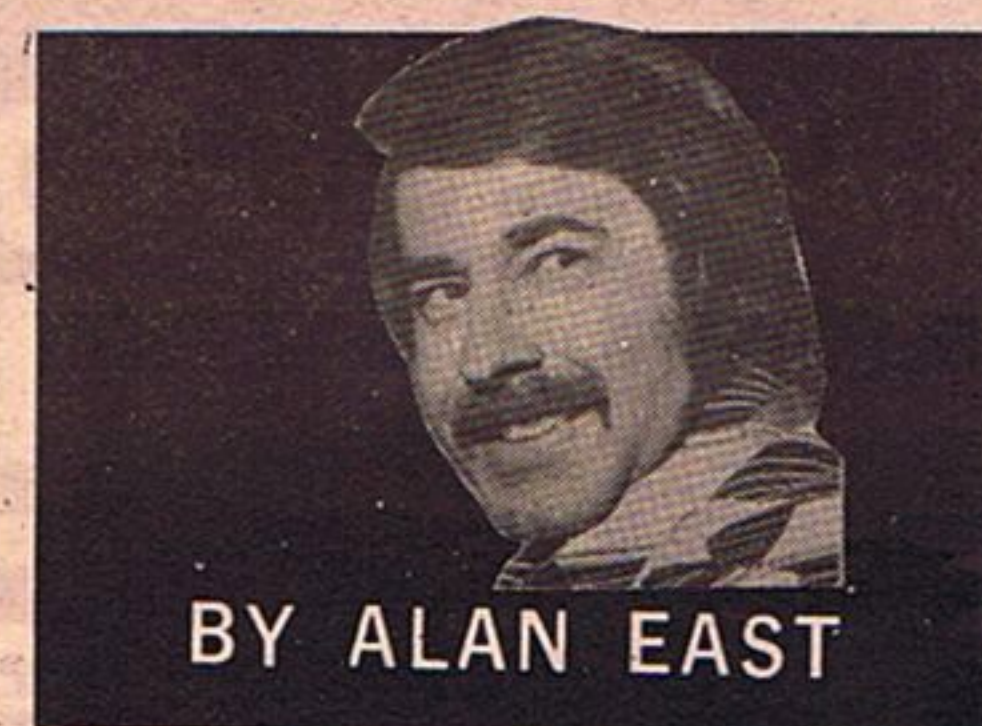
East Perth certainly seem likely to go into this crucial match without some of their stars, or at best, some of them not quite fully fit. Players like Ian Miller, John Hayes, George Michalczyk and Barry Cable were key members of last year's grand final side - and they are the men who are in doubt.

The spirit of competitiveness between these two sides is the background for what

should be a tremendous first semi-final. East Fremantle's worst effort this season was their 16-goal loss to East Perth just a few weeks back, August 4 to be precise. They have not forgotten that debacle and this Saturday is their chance to atone.

However, one fact must not be overlooked - East Perth have always been a side to thrive on adversity; when the chips are stacked against them, they seem to rebound in magnificent style and Cable will call on all the character and team spirit available to survive this situation.

For South Fremantle and Claremont, the two-week break will be used more for psychological motivation than anything else. They are not particularly worried about either of the Easts - whichever team

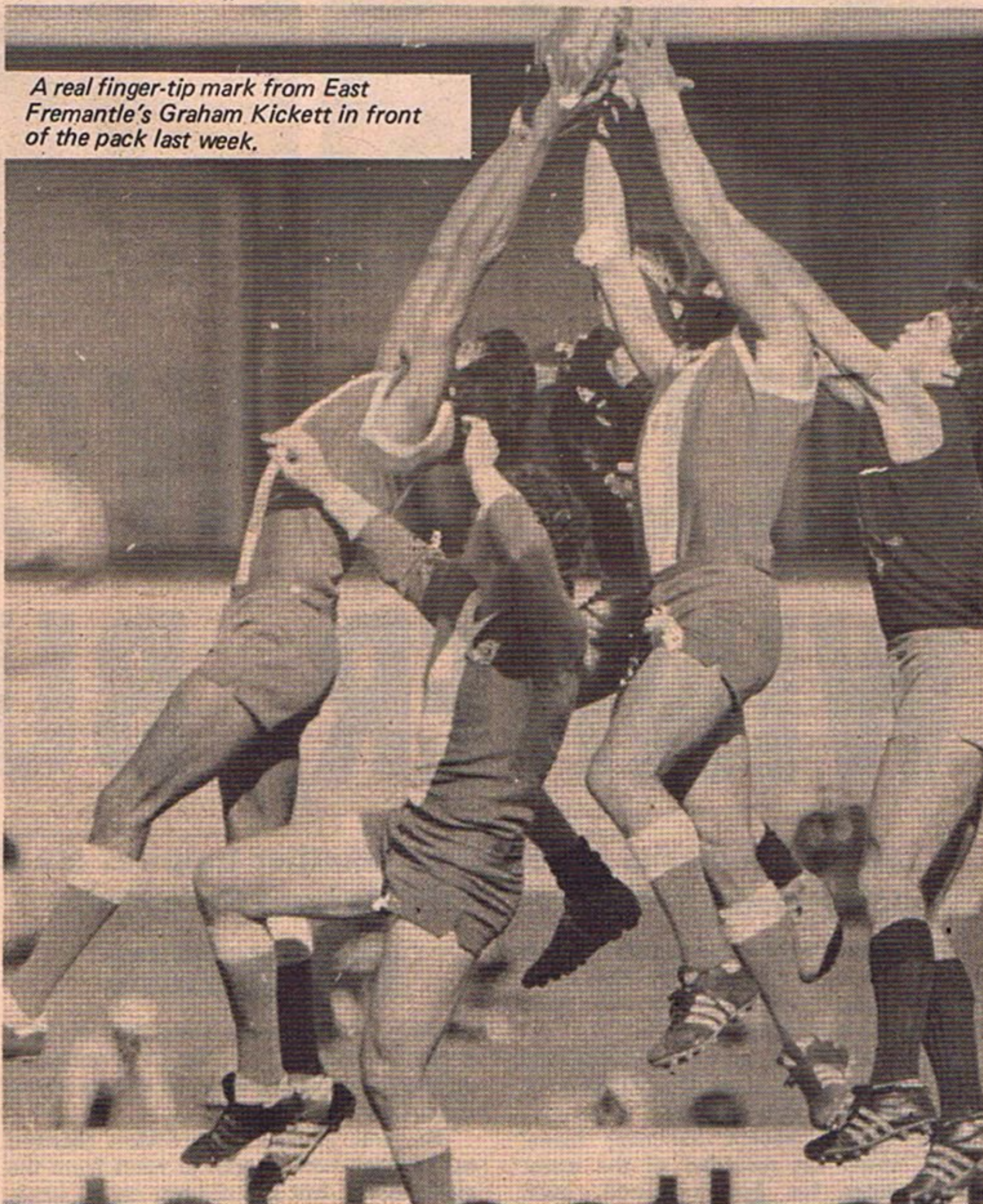
advances to the preliminary final will be in a battle-scarred condition.

However, both South and Claremont will treat victory as imperative. That double chance is good to have - but so is a straight passage to the grand final.

Claremont deservedly go into the finals as top dogs - their crushing win and their remarkable kicking, 35 goals from 43 scoring shots, makes them flag favourites. Moss has done a tremendous job with his young team, a side that has four or five first-year players in the line-up each week and one with plenty of grit and go in the virtually inexperienced combination.

That inexperience is probably the only thing that is going to trouble them - finals football is a different ball game and finals football is something new to most of the Claremont line-up. However, all that is to come in a fortnight's time.

Till then, it is a battle of the two Easts - so be there!

**Congratulations to East Perth's Grant Campbell, winner of one of the most unique sporting awards — the Coca Cola footballer of the future award.**

Grant, a talented youngster, had an outstanding season at both senior and junior level.

He was the captain of W.A.'s Teal Cup side, made the All-Australian side and was picked in the senior State side to play South Australia.

The award was narrowed to five players:— Campbell, Steve Malaxos (Claremont), Chris Stasinowsky (West Perth), Glynn Williams (East Perth) and Brad Hardie (South Fremantle). All the boys were judged from their performances in the games and also for the way they handled themselves off the field.

Grant received 11 nominations for on field performances. His nearest contender received eight.

As the inaugural winner, Grant receives a trip to Atlanta, in the United States, flying Pan Am's special performance 727 service. He stays at the Peach Tree Plaza Hotel and will be chaperoned by executives from Coca Cola International and will join the N.F.L. grid iron football team — "The Atlanta Falcons" to see some of their matches and see them in training.

The panel of judges for this year's award were Geoff Christian, from The West Australian, Brian Purslowe — vice president of the W.A.N.F.L., Richard Walker, Junior Development Officer for the league, Michael Pritchett from Coca Cola, Graham Campbell from the West Perth Football Club and myself.

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# TAYLOR BOOTS HIMSELF INTO HISTORY

There have been many outstanding rovers in West Australian football in recent years . . . .

So it has certainly taken the local football world by surprise to see that a relatively unknown newcomer has broken a roving goalkicking record that has stood since 1951.

Kevin Taylor, who is virtually regarded as East Fremantle's No. 2 rover, proved his goal-kicking prowess beyond doubt in the last two weeks when he stormed home to firstly break the record of goals kicked by a rover and then to become the first rover to top the WANFL goalkicking table.

The first feat saw him kick three goals to take his total to 77 — one ahead of the tally kicked by Jim Conway back in 1951, which has stood the test of time from top rovers for those 28 years.

Then last Saturday, Taylor — with considerable help from his loyal team-mates — booted his second nine-goal haul in three weeks to overtake Swan Districts' forward Mark Olsen on the goalkicking ladder and finish on top with a final tally of 86 goals.

The 20-year-old curly headed Carnamah product has taken all before him this year, turning in consistent games every week and certainly disproving the theory that youngsters go bad in their second year in league ranks.

Taylor played only 14 senior games with East Fremantle last year, being a real in-and-out player. In his half-season of reserves football he turned in some brilliant games, enough to win the Prendergast medal for the fairest and best player in the competition.

The goal-kicking record of Conway's was the furthestmost thing from his mind at the start of this season. It was only as East Fremantle gathered momentum during the early matches that Taylor emerged as a consistent goal-kicker. And he could have broken the record much earlier if he had his kicking boots on — as his tally of 57 points confirms.

This week, as East Fremantle prepare for their first semi-final clash with East Perth, ALAN EAST talks to Taylor about his goalkicking, his record and his football:

**This season saw you break the WANFL goal-kicking record for a rover. How important was that to you in the last few weeks?**

It has been important. I've thought a lot about it because it does go into the record books, but most of all it's been a worry; the pressure has been on me a bit, especially in the last two or three weeks before I broke it.

**You must have wondered at times if you would get there or not?**

Yes, I worried about it up to the time we played West Perth when there was only

three games to go and I had to average about four goals a game and I didn't give myself much chance. The back pocket players were watching me a lot, they were right on to me. But fortunately, my day came all at once against West Perth when I managed to kick nine goals and that made all the difference. But it was a strange day. In the first half I only had one goal and I wasn't going too good. But Peakey had a talk to me, told me I looked as though I was trying too hard, which was probably right. He told me to just play my normal game and I did and things started to click. The players helped me out a lot, especially Peakey and Thomo in the forward line.

**You feel as though you owe part of the record to your team-mates?**

They have really helped me in the last few weeks and given me confidence, especially the way they were looking for me.

**You have picked up a lot of goals from Brian Peake, haven't you?**

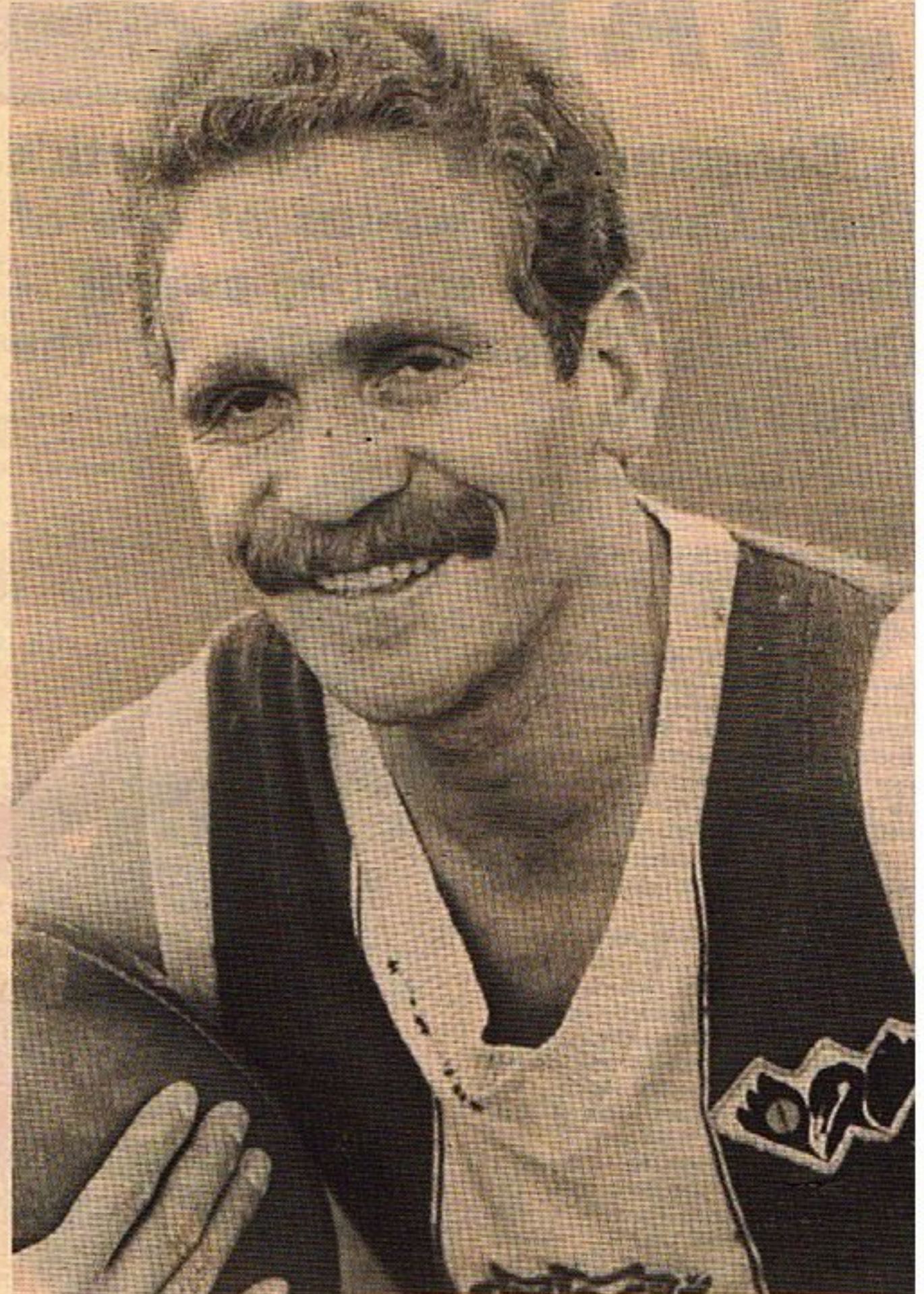
Yes, he has fed me well. I think at the beginning of the year we were missing an in-form full-forward and someone had to kick goals. So Peakey worked out that he could feed me as I ran past and it was up to me to kick the goals. It was a pre-arranged plan where he would be on the look-out to shoot out a handpass and I'd be expected to run past him all the time.

**But you didn't really have your kicking boots on. What did you do to overcome that problem?**

I decided to start practising on the off nights when we didn't train. I'd just go down to the local park and shoot for goals by myself. I think it has paid off a lot since then. My standing shots have improved particularly.

**Have you always been a rover?**

No. I usually played on the half-forward flank or in the centre, but I think I'm too

small to play on the half-forward line, so I was given the roving job.

**How long ago did you come down from Carnamah and what happened in those early years?**

I came down four years ago, but I couldn't play football because of my work. I was an apprentice butcher and I had to work Saturday mornings, so I couldn't play colts or anything. So I played with the Attadale under-18s for a season, but the next year my firm arranged for me to get off a bit earlier on Saturdays just in time to get to the football, so I could play colts. I broke into the reserves side towards the end of 1977 and then last year I was in and out of the league side.

**Did you feel then that you were still capable of becoming a regular league footballer?**

I still felt confident that I could make league football, but the opportunities were just not there at the time. I got into the side last year as a rover when they tried out a three-way change with Tony Buhagiar and John Sims.

**What brought you to East Fremantle?**

Well, I really wanted to go to Swans, but that was before zoning came in. I was playing colts up at Carnamah and an East Fremantle chap came up and heard that I was kicking a few goals, so he arranged for me to come down to East Fremantle.

## SWANS UNLUCKY

Swan Districts was surely the unlucky side of the 1979 season.

Three weeks ago they became the first team to score over 200 points in a game twice in one season, then following their great victory over South Fremantle last weekend they made history by becoming the first team outside the top four to score the most points in a season.

In fact Swans were only FIVE points short of Perth's all-time record of 2,678 set in 1977.

Eleven wins was not enough for Swans but fourteen times in the post-war era, a team HAS qualified for the first semi-final with eleven wins or less.

Claremont's score last Saturday of 35 goals, 8 behinds, would have to be an Australian record for accuracy. The nearest score I could find to this remarkable feat, was Norwood's 31-9 in 1937.

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The 1979 season was a high scoring one but it did not pass the 1977 record. Three teams - Claremont, East Fremantle and Swan Districts - scored more this year than they had in any other season but three clubs - West Perth, Perth and Subiaco - had more kicked AGAINST them than in any previous year, Subiaco in fact became the first club to have over 3,000 points scored against it.

For the fourth time this year a side has kicked over 200 points in a game, Claremont, East Fremantle and Swans, twice. Claremont's effort was their third double century (1940, 1978, 1979) but not their highest score, in 1940 they became the first team in league football in WA to score over 200 points with a 33.22 (220) tally against Swan Districts.

The two Easts meet this Saturday for the 28th time in a final round game (East Perth have won 15 of them and East Fremantle 12). Since the inception of the Page System in 1931 seventeen winners of the first semi have made it through to the grand final but only eight have won the premiership. Those successful were East Perth 1936, South Fremantle 1954, Perth 1955, East Fremantle 1957, Swan Districts 1963, Claremont 1964, East Fremantle 1965, Perth 1976.

East Fremantle's Kevin Taylor, the only rover to head the WANFL goal-kicking list needs only five more goals to equal the Australian record of 91 goals for a rover in a season. In 1971 Hawthorn rover Leigh Mathews kicked this tally when he was runner-up to team-mate Peter Hudson. Mathews did head the goal-kicking list in 1975 with 68 goals and another rover Dick Harris of Richmond headed the list in 1943 with 63 goals.

Writing this column each week is starting to make me feel like a tight rope walker - one mistake and I am in trouble.

Last week I mentioned that Laurie Bowen won the Sandover Medal in a competition restricted to 17-year-olds. One reader was quick to point out that he played as an 18 year in 1943. Yes, he's right in 1943 and 1944 the age limit was adjusted to under 19 years. However, in 1942 it definitely was for 17-year-olds.

The previous week I was really shot down in flames! I mentioned four instances where one goal was scored by a team in post-war football and listed Swan Districts with 1.9 in 1960 (my information came from the publication "Swan Districts 1934-74" which listed this score as their lowest ever).

Hawkeyed statician Ross Calloway of Shenton Park was quickly on to it, this score was obviously a misprint - it should have read 7.9.

Swans lowest score is 2.8, against East Perth in 1968.

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# Round mentioned in Brownlow leak

If South Melbourne's giant ruckman Barry Round is standing on the winner's dais with the Brownlow Medal around his neck on September 24, the VFL will die of shame.

Despite the most intricate security precautions the "leak" is out.

Round of South is the man whose name is on everyone's lips.

Bookies have obviously heard the word too.

In just one week they have slashed his quote from 66-1 to 2-1 favourite . . . that is if you can get money on.

It is the third successive year the leak has been sprung.

In 1977 Leigh Matthews was red hot favourite yet in the 24 hours before the votes were taken from their envelopes and counted Graham Teasdale was installed as the man to beat.

And who could forget last year's fiasco. Fitzroy's Garry Wilson won tens of thousands of dollars worth of media awards and was unbackable in the Medal until a week before the televised count.

Then his price soared and North's Malcolm Blight walked off with the VFL's most prestigious award.

The VFL investigated the leaks the last two years and couldn't come up with the answer.

Let's just hope that the investigations aren't needed in 1979.

*"Cazaly" is already something of a legend in Melbourne. It is the fastest selling single ever recorded in this country and sales are over the 150,000 mark.*

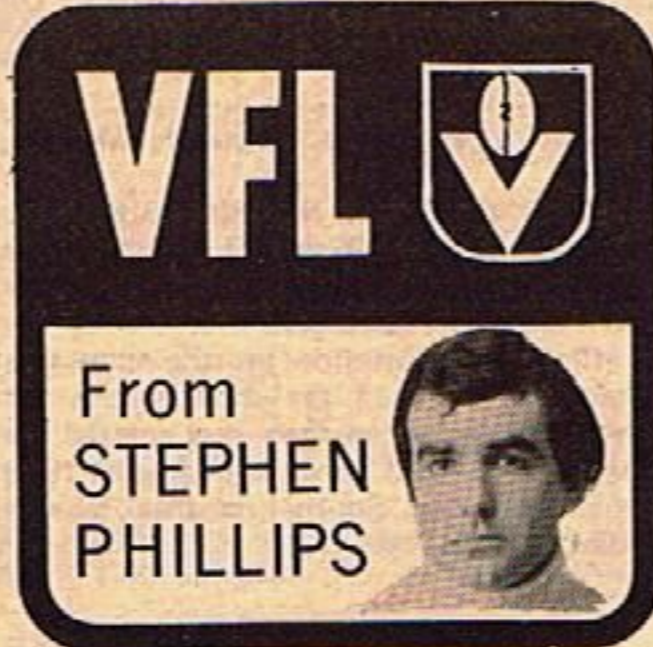

He says it would be a very harsh penalty.

South are determined to hold onto the bearded Teasdale and the situation is just slightly reminiscent of the Roberts saga. Like Teasdale, Brian Roberts was cleared by the Tigers to South. He came close to winning the medal . . . had a disagreement . . . stood out . . . appealed and then retired. End of story.

Despite Carlton's shock loss to Collingwood last Saturday, the Blues are heading for a VFL record season. They have won 17 matches and need only one more win to record the greatest number of victories in a VFL season ever.

And on Saturday they should do just that by accounting for South at Princes Park.

It has been a bonanza season for the Blues. They have topped the century in 20 of their 21 matches and have lost to North, Geelong and Collingwood.

The bookies are a little more ruthless than the supporters. They have taken Carlton off the top line of betting for flag and replaced them with North.

North are 6-4, Carlton 2-1, Fitzroy and Collingwood 12-1 and you can write your own ticket for Essendon.

# Interstate Round-up

## SA PLAYERS PLAN UNION SANFL

South Australia's league footballers are likely to have their own players association next season.

Moves have been going on for some time to try and form an association to give players an effective voice on players and administrative problems which directly concern them.

In 1974, former Hawthorn, West Adelaide and South Adelaide player, Bob Keddie attempted to form an association but it never got off the ground because of a lack of interest and finance.

West Torrens star, Neville Roberts, said this week that the time was right for a new association to be formed.

"Players need an outlet for their com-

plaints and suggestions", he said.

"There are a million things that players would like to see done to benefit themselves, administrators and spectators".

Many players have expressed concern about the lack of direction football appears to be taking.

Talk of amalgamation, composite sides, super leagues and national competitions has many players confused.

"Players are the meat in the sandwich", Roberts said.

The previous players association wanted the league clubs to act on several matters. These included:-

- ★ The setting up of a taxation consultant service for all league footballers so that proper guidelines be outlined for this purpose.
- ★ The formation of a sub-committee be formed to study the feasibility of compensation and insurance schemes.
- ★ The need for the players to be recognised as a professional body.
- ★ A study to be made of the legal aspects of league football.
- ★ A re-assessment of the league provision fund.

Several of these issues have since received attention.

## FINALS FEAR

South Australian football officials are worried that the simultaneous arrival of Woodville and South Adelaide in this year's finals will sabotage hopes of a financial bonanza.

Following last weekend's matches the final five is decided.

Regardless of what happens this Saturday, Central District, Port Adelaide, South Adelaide, Norwood and Woodville will contest the premiership.

While the presence of Woodville and South in the finals is unlikely to precipitate a financial flop, it does not augur well for a healthy cash flow.

Both are bad crowd pullers.

As the SA National Football League's general manager, Mr Don Roach, said this week: "You don't have to be a Rhodes Scholar, to realise that Woodville's appearance in the finals will not help as far as attendances go.

"That is just a fact of life we have to live with.

"It has won enough games to be there so we have just got to hope there might be some curiosity-seekers who will help make up the numbers.

"Australians generally will give a battler a go and I hope this is the case with Woodville in the finals.

"Certainly we're not going to break any attendance records this year.

"Last year we had an aggregate attendance over the finals of 190,000. I don't think we'll reach that figure this year but I'm not too pessimistic and hope we won't be so far away from it."

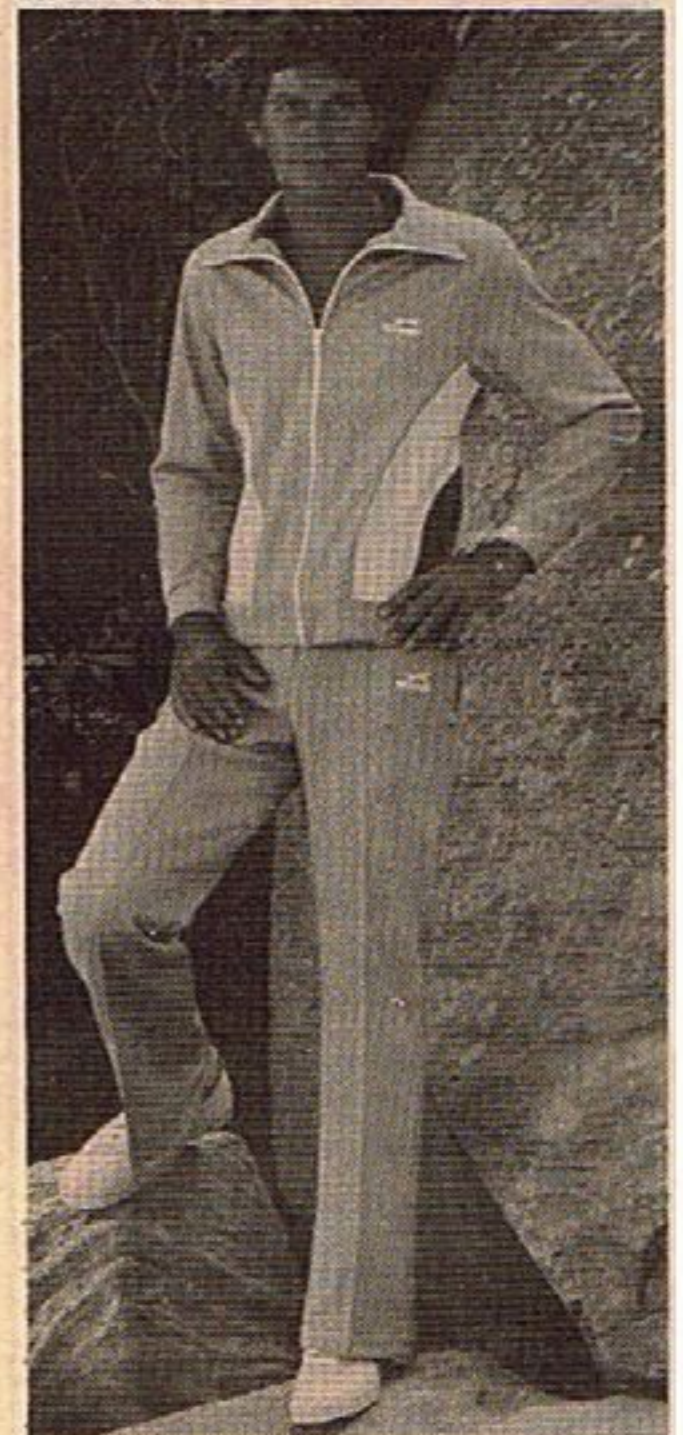
Mr Roach said the league would not lift the attendance limit of 50,000 for the grand final.

"A maximum crowd of 50,000 guarantees no hassles for everyone," he said.

"Everybody who pays to see the game will get an unobstructed view.

"We would rather have that situation than a repetition of 1976 when 67,000 crowded into and on to Football Park.

"I never want to live through that again and the people of SA should not be subjected to it."

Selecting best players is certainly a tough task — every media man has conceded that point at some stage or another. But the inconsistency of the umpires in relation to the media voting raises some interesting points.

Are the umpires the best men to cast votes? How many times are players left out because of their attitude on the field? How often do umpires confuse players such as the Krakouer brothers?

It would certainly be a fairly rash move to moot a change in the system. The system as it stands now has worked fairly well for years. But maybe the two umpires should get their heads together a bit more and not leave it up to the senior umpire on the day.

Another disturbing factor, of course, is that players are being influenced to leave WA as a result of their inability to win votes from the umpires.

Robert Wiley made that point clear when he went to Victoria last season after failing — for the third year in a row — to poll well even though he was a hot favourite.

Graham Moss must certainly be wondering what he has to do to get enough votes to win and this last example could well influence him to accept an offer to return to Victoria and coach Essendon.

Ken Hunter is certain to move to Carlton next year, partly because he is disappointed at his failure to receive votes for some outstanding football.

And Peter Spencer, the man who won the medal in 1976, received a miserable three votes — and that could well send him packing to Victoria also.

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# CARDINALS READY TO GO AGAIN

The 1979 season may have finished for the West Perth camp . . .

But the players have just received the news that they have a whole six weeks before starting their 1980 campaign.

season and pressed strongly for a wing berth in the league side before Campbell finally gave in to reserves coach Ken McAullay, who felt that his debut was overdue.

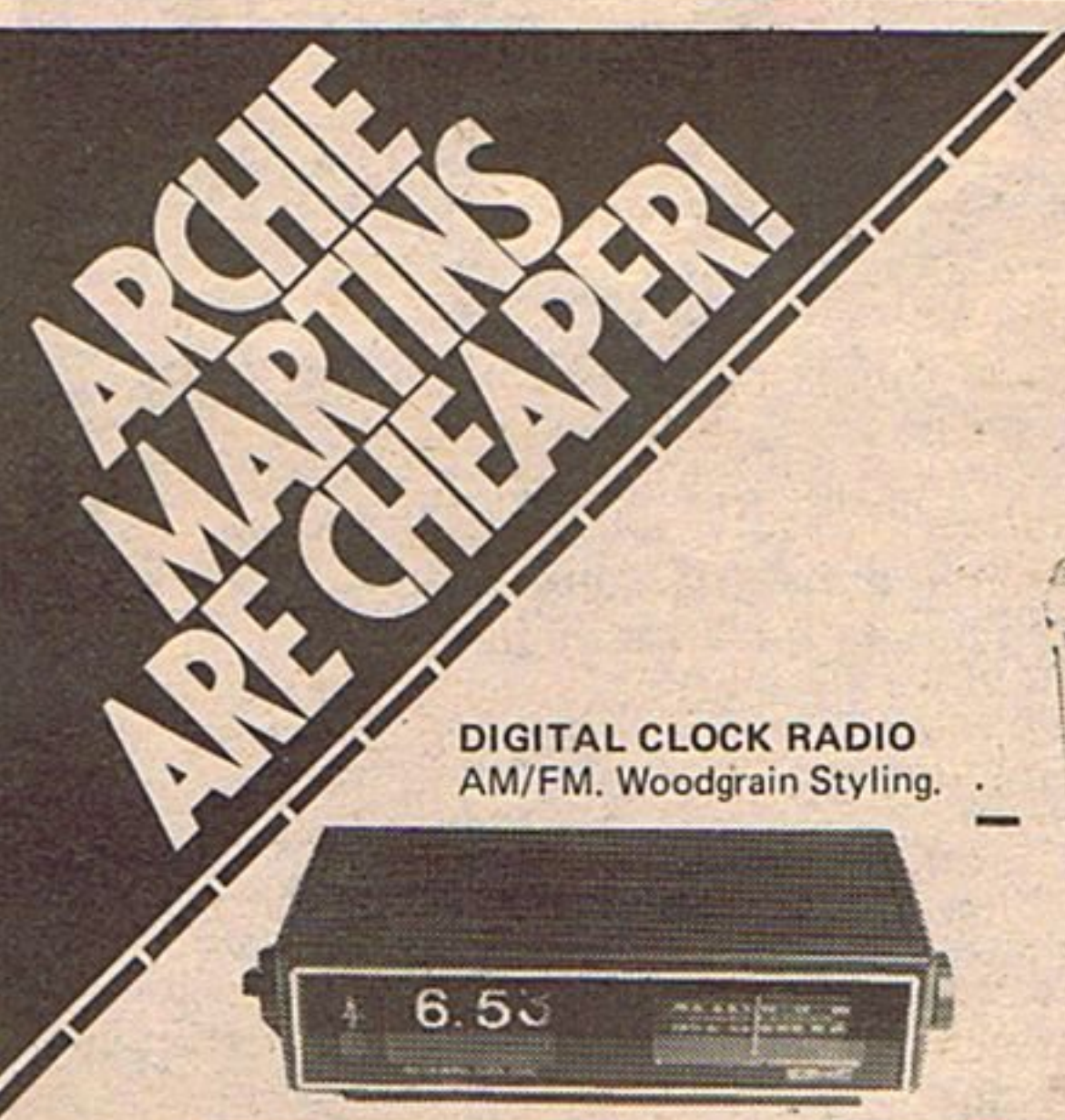
In two league games, Campbell has turned in solid performances and he joins half-back Tony Fraser who appears to have successfully negotiated the big jump from colts to league in one season.

"I think Ross Gibbs was the success story of the year in a back pocket and I'm sure West Perth has the player potential sufficient to improve next year."

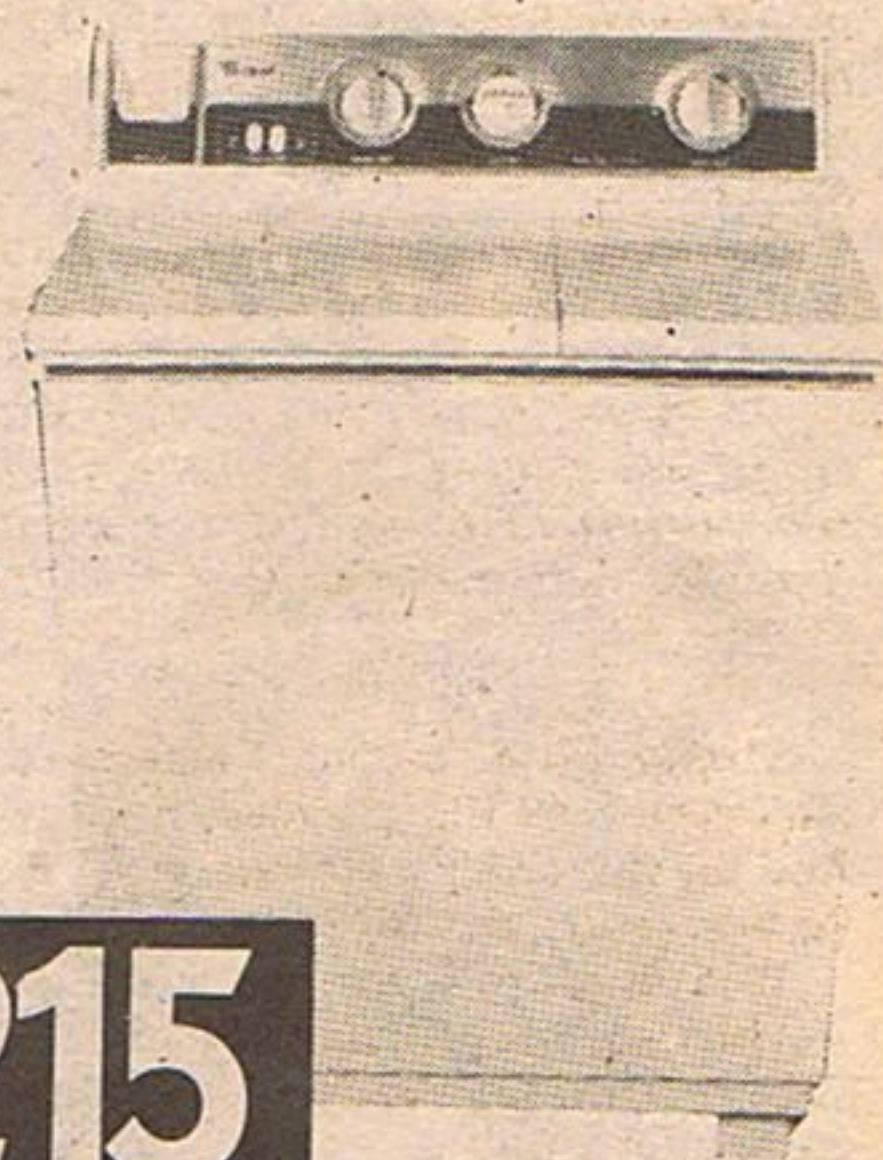


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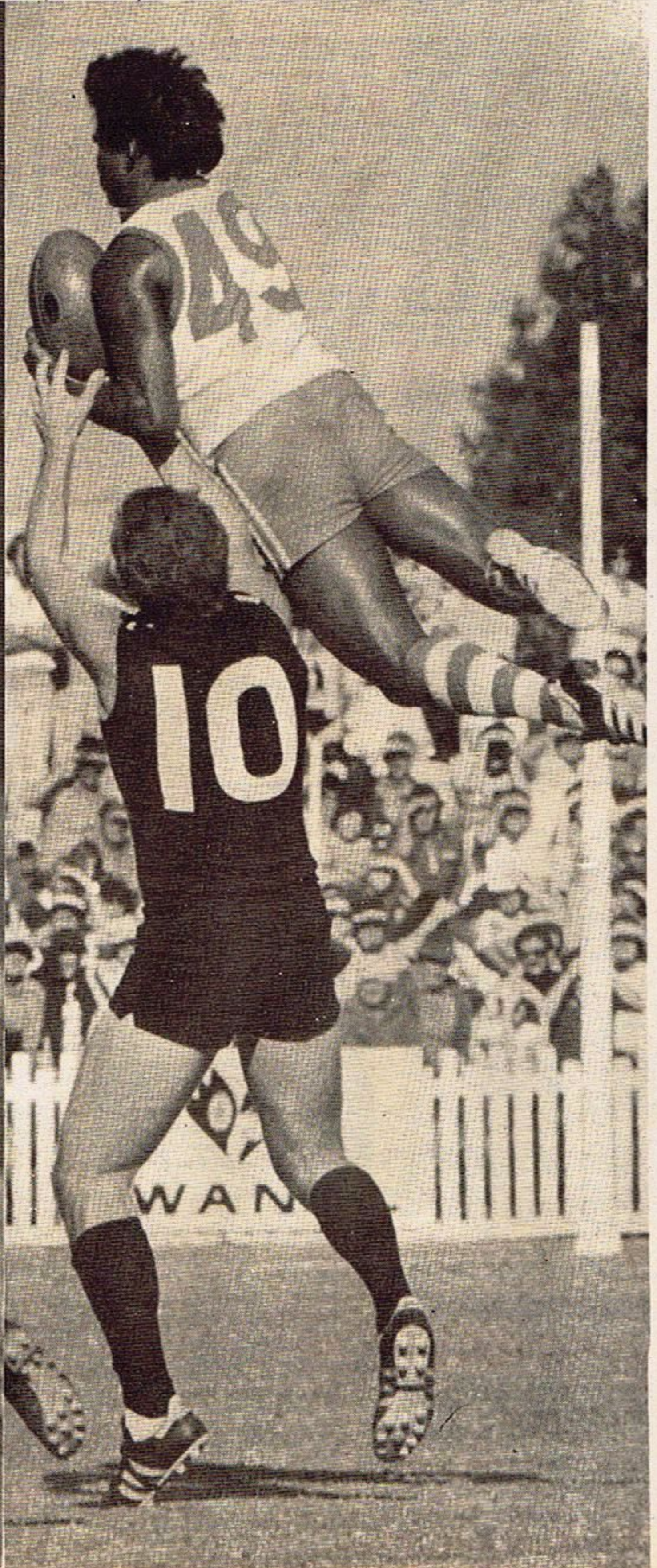

# WHY WE CAN WIN... By the top four coaches



**BRADLEY SMITH (East Fremantle)**

I thought we could win the premiership when I first came here; that's why I took the job. I haven't changed my mind since then. But we are not over-confident; there are weaknesses, like every other team in the finals. But I'm happier now than I was three weeks ago. We've got blokes coming back to form and fitness and we should go into the finals with a full compliment of players. We've had our share of injuries, which hasn't helped us settle down. But I'm reasonably happy with the situation now.

Obviously East Perth are our main rivals — we have to get over them in the first semi-final. If we do that, anything can happen.



**GRAHAM MOSS (Claremont)**

I think we can win the premiership; I think we have reached our peak at the right time. We have been the most consistent team over the last two rounds, losing only two games. We've proved that we can beat every team in the finals. All the players have come together at the right time as far as fitness and enthusiasm goes. Training has been excellent and we are doing everything almost at perfection level which is great at this time of the season.

I don't really see any team as our main rival; they are all rivals and it will just depend on the day. I'm not really concerned about how the opposition will play; I'm just concerned about how we play. We have the ability to play well, regardless of who we play against, so we just have to perform on the day.



**MALCOLM BROWN (South Fremantle)**

No, at this stage I don't feel confident about winning the premiership. It's a personal thing — our players have a very big habit of drawing a lot of emotion and enthusiasm out of the coach and the people around him — and then the next week they play very ordinary. But we are not going in thinking we can't win; we are going in with a fear of defeat more than anything. We know, I believe, that we have made fools of ourselves for some years in the finals. We have to redeem what we did last year in that preliminary final. That's our whole incentive.

I regard all the sides as our main danger. I can't see one standing out. I reckon all three sides are in with a big chance.



**BARRY CABLE (East Perth)**

Naturally we believe we can still win the premiership; but it won't be easy. I don't think there is much between the four teams and it will certainly depend a lot on what happens on the day. We do have some troubles with injuries, but the players have the character to overcome these difficult situations.

I regard all the other three teams as our main dangers. Our strength is our all-over blend of skill and our teamwork and we can win if our players work hard and do the little things that matter.

# WHERE WE WENT WRONG... By the bottom four coaches

**GRAHAM CAMPBELL (West Perth)**

Our depth wasn't good enough, particularly towards the end of the season. You can afford to lose front-line players like Les Fong, Laurie Heal and to a lesser extent Chris Stasinowsky for a week or two. But you can't have them all out for spells of up to six weeks. Overcoming the loss of players from last year was also a tough job and I just think we were down on manpower.

We have plenty of young talent on the sidelines for next year and I'm looking forward to a new challenge in 1980. We finished the season strongly — our game against East Perth was the closest of the day and we had our chances to win. It was pleasing to lift ourselves off the bottom of the table and I believe that with some selective recruiting, West Perth can be a force next year.



**PETER BURTON (Subiaco)**

We really just didn't have enough good, experienced players in the key positions. We are skinny in our backline; we need a bit more strength in attack. Once we start shuffling players around we are just plugging gaps and not getting anywhere. We possibly tried to persist with some of our older players for a while. But injuries killed us. We got less than one game out of George Young and only a handful from Dennis Blair. Those two fit and in form all season would have made a big difference. We were deficient in height and strength, so we have to do some selective recruiting.



**JOHN TODD (Swan Districts)**

We failed to make good our ground early in the season. Inaccurate kicking cost us the chance to set up winning opportunities and we messed around with our roving combinations too many times. When we finally settled on Ian Williams and Gerard Neesham, we started to improve. The players also matured as the season progressed and this, in turn, helped such things as our kicking.



**KEN ARMSTRONG (Perth)**

We had a crippling run of injuries early, which took a lot of class out of our side and we were battling from then on. We started to lose games that we would normally have won; doing things the hard way when there were easy ways. But I think there were bright lights, rather than think of the failures. We've introduced a number of promising first-year players and we've got something to work on next year. I don't think the club should be pessimistic. We were certainly battling to overcome the disappointment of losing last year's grand final, but I wouldn't say we had an attitude problem. We've copped a lot of flack from the media, which is probably good as we don't want to become accustomed to being out of the four.



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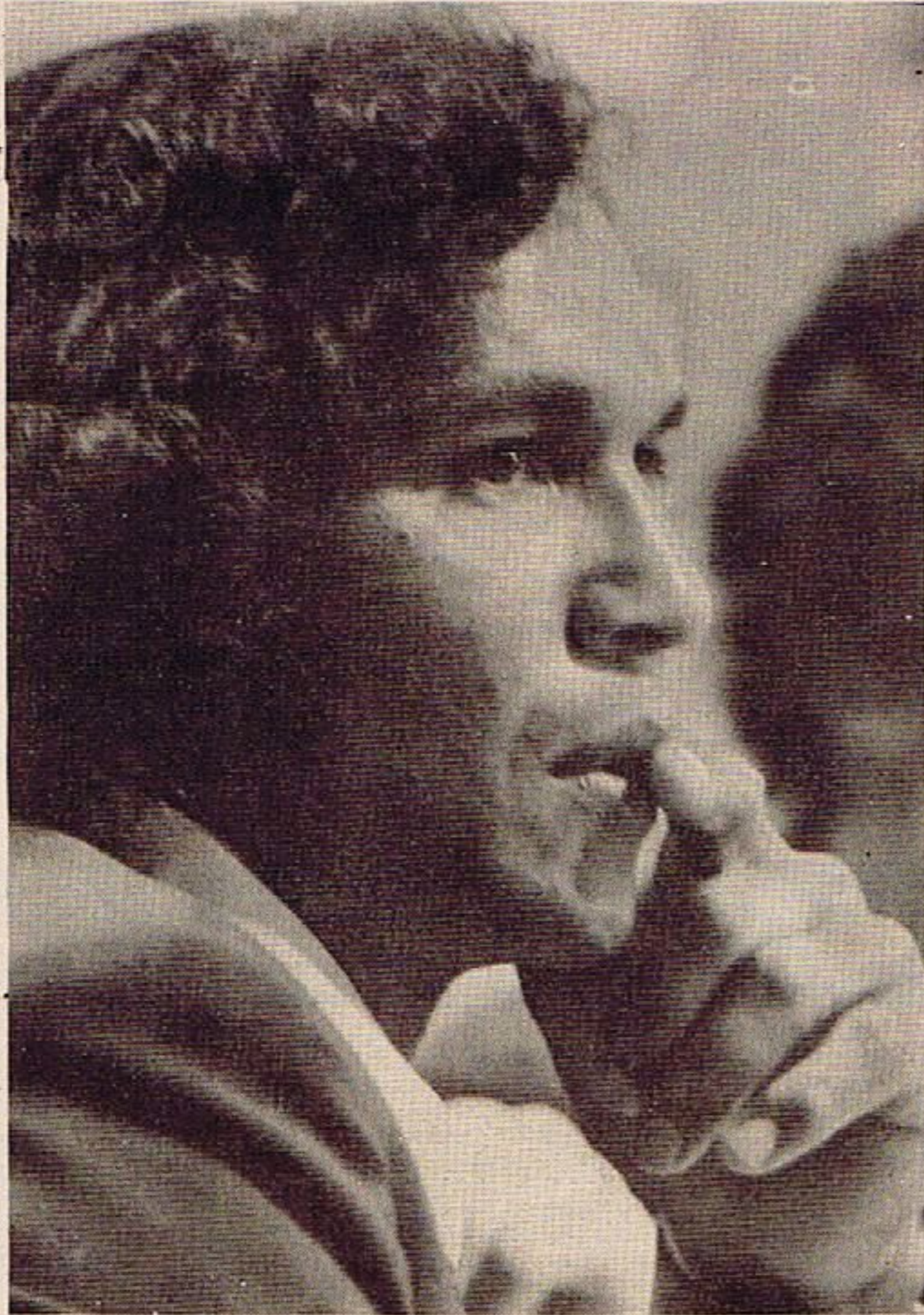

## KALAMUNDA CAN PLAY A PART

Kalamunda, the most disappointing team in the South Suburban competition this season with injuries and loss of players taking their toll, can suddenly play a dramatic part in the finish of the qualifying rounds.

After some outstanding games with East Fremantle's reserves side, he seems to have cemented his position in the league team as a rover.

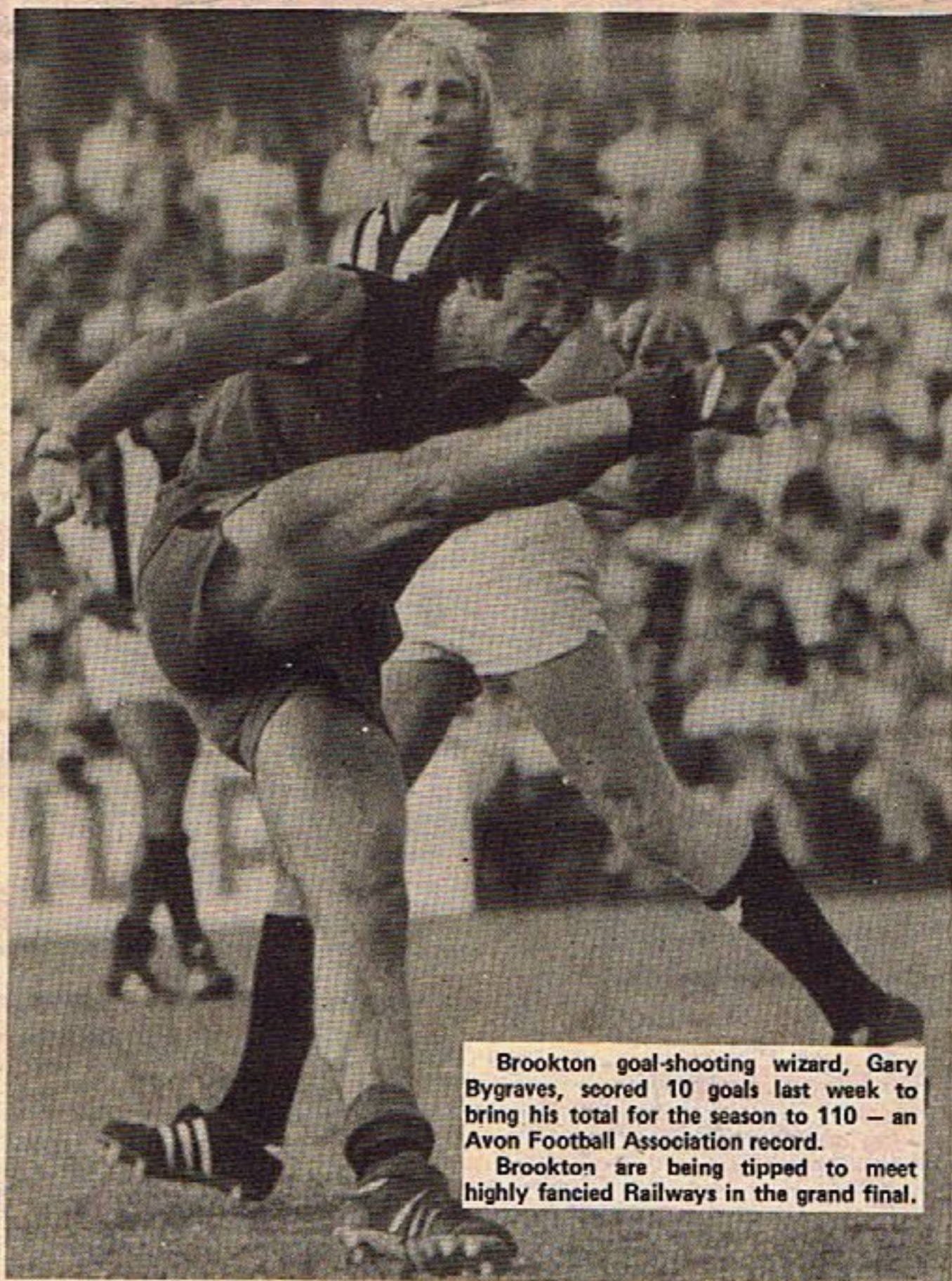
Nukarni's return to the four for the first time in many years has pleased supporters.

The controversy surrounding various aspects of umpiring rages with all sorts of people becoming involved.

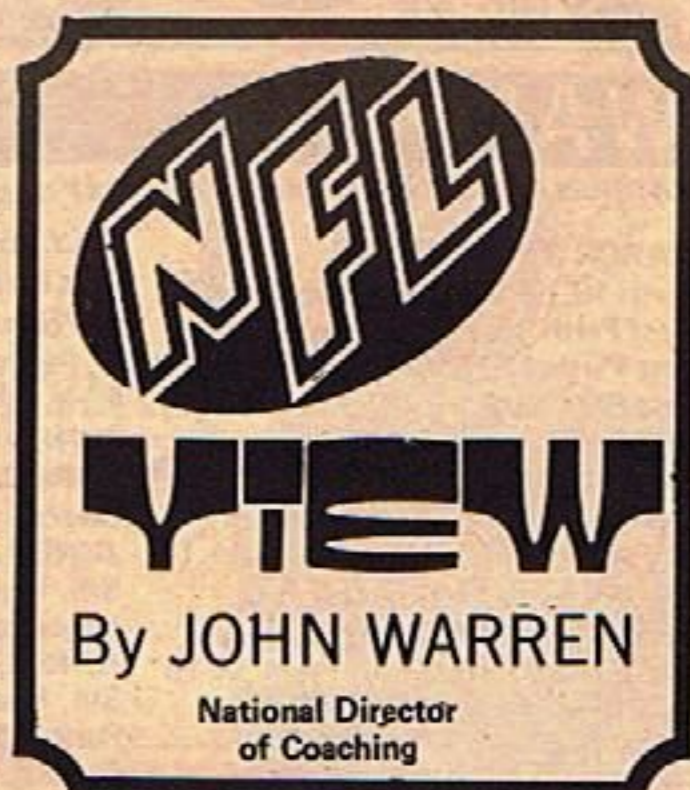
The most disturbing part of the whole thing as far as I am concerned is that many players who should know better are visibly questioning umpire's decisions and in some cases actually abusing them on the field.

Player's attitude towards umpires is of concern to myself as the person charged with administering the National Coaching Scheme and the attitude of the Rothmans National Sport Foundation towards acceptance of umpiring decisions at all times without churlish demonstrations is completely desirable and necessary.

It is most difficult to instil the correct priorities in junior footballers when they are subjected on television to a disgraceful exhibition of gestures and obvious abuse by so called top players. Of course the umpires have everyone's destiny completely in their own hands. Law 28 of the Laws of Australian Football is quite specific and states — (a) Umpires shall in every case, and without taking into consideration any question as to whether the offending player received provocation or not, report to the controlling body any player who during the progress of a match or within the oval on the day of the match — (iii) "Disputes the decision of an umpire". (iv) Unduly interferes with or assaults, or uses abusive, threatening, or insulting language, or behaviour towards an umpire during the progress of the match, or within or without the oval on the day of the match.

Umpires should immediately embark upon a campaign of reporting players who dispute decisions or who use offensive or abusive language. The language used by some of our top sportsmen (top in terms of pure ability) is often disgraceful and cannot be condoned under any circumstances. If these foul mouthed "ockers" were reported to the tribunal and subsequently outed for a few weeks, the problem would disappear "like magic".

If only these players — many of whom are making good money from the game — realised the poor example they are setting. It is sad and downright disturbing to visit some junior football matches and see



talented young footballers downgrading their performance (and their enjoyment of the game) by displays of undisciplined behaviour.

Real sportsmen accept all umpiring decisions unquestioningly. In so doing they also "open the door" for the next controversial decision involving them to go their way. The clowns who "get offside" with the umpire find themselves naturally in strife all the way with virtually any hairline decisions going against them and a general compounding of their original problem.

If we want to look at specific examples let us consider Leigh Matthews, Peter Knights, Malcolm Blight, Barry Round, Barry Cable, Russell Ebert and Mike Fitzpatrick. No questioning the umpire with these fellows — just playing the game at the very highest standard.

In conclusion — the umpire is not the enemy. Like a policeman he is only out there because of necessity. We cannot have football without umpires. Let us start consciously administering to help them. Let the umpires for their part start sensibly using the powers they have at their disposal. Specifically on language charges — the first week would see maybe twenty players lining up, the second about five. Assuming the charges were correctly dealt with by the Tribunal by the imposition of several weeks suspension to the players concerned, there would then, without doubt, be a spectacular improvement in this most unsavoury aspect of our game.

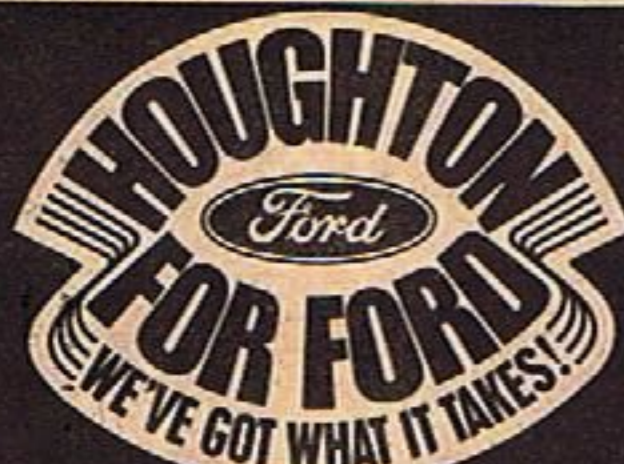

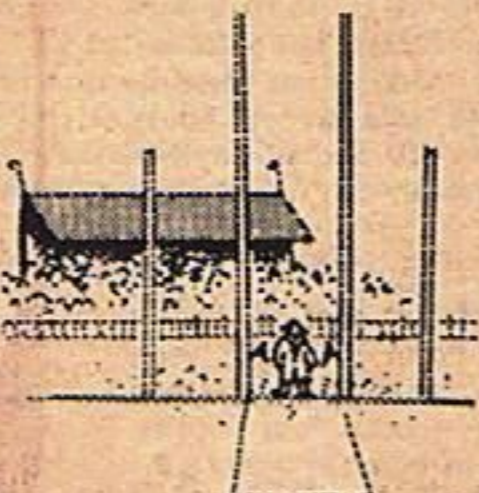

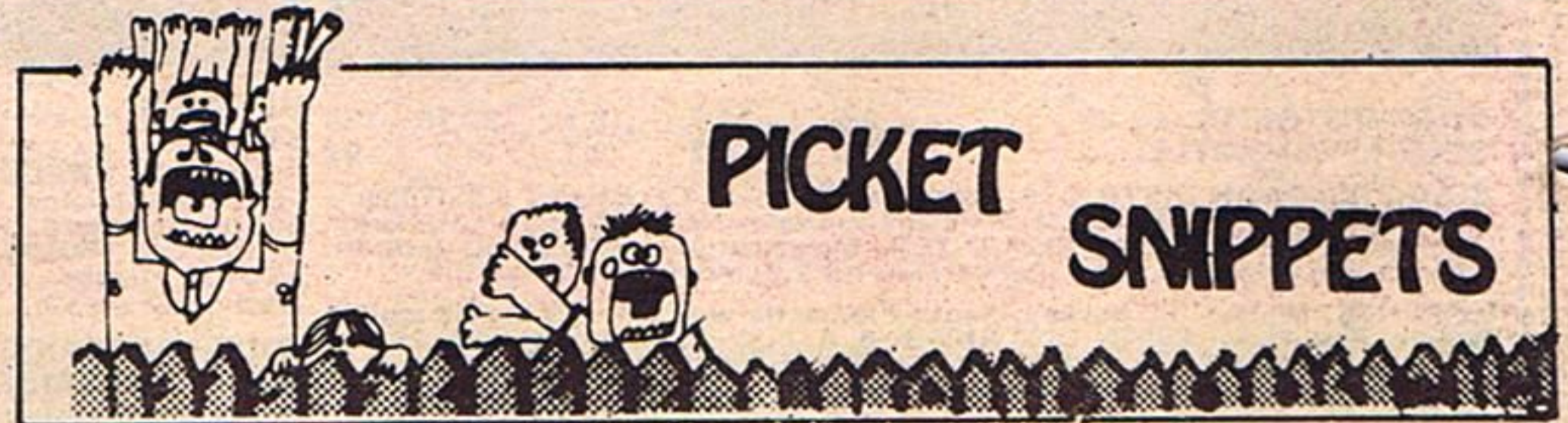
