## SUBIACO CRISIS:

# MAN IN THE MIDDLE

From juniors to seniors in just two weeks . . . surely that's a coaching record!

Former Subiaco half-forward Peter Metropolis had the most dramatic rise up the coaching ladder in WA football history when he took charge of the Lions in the league game against Perth last week.

Three weeks ago Metropolis was coaching his son's under-8 side in a Scarborough competition.

A week later he was appointed coach of the Subiaco reserves side after Reg Hampson resigned . . . and then just seven days later he was caretaker coach of the league side when Peter Burton was axed.

"It was a full day," Metropolis said. "But that's football."

He has gone from coaching under 8s, who play under modified rules, to coaching both a league and reserve side on the one day. All in two weeks, in a year when he was to take a "rest" from football.

He had coached amateur wides for several years but had decided this season to limit his involvement to juniors.

Metropolis, who played 159 games in the centre but mostly at half-forward for the Lions between 1965-73 found the transition, "a bit difficult".

That's more than understandable when he had to concentrate on the reserves game and then try to motivate players he didn't know in the league side.

Metropolis, who holds a responsible

position — a traffic programme engineer — with the Main Roads Department, said his job was made hard on Saturday because he didn't fully know the capabilities of each player.

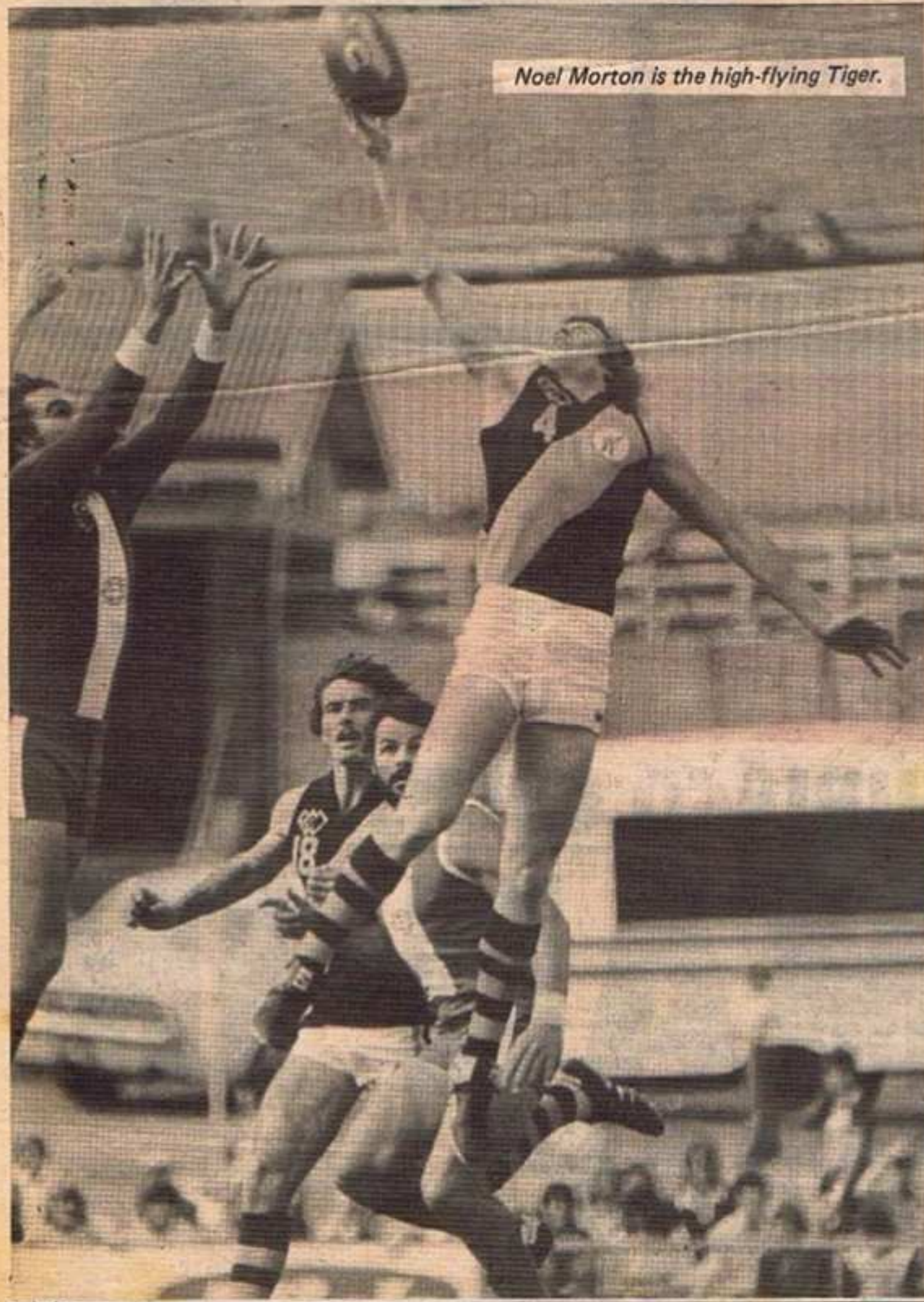

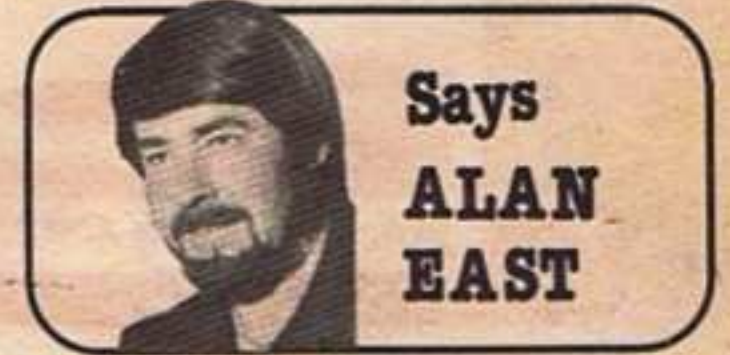

East Fremantle have certainly lost something — and it's more than just Doug Green (Who will be back later this year, just watch).

South Fremantle are the team who defy logic.

There is no way they can survive at the top without stars like Maurice Rioli and Ray Bauskis — but they are and they're doing it in style. West Perth were all primed up to win last Saturday and they will not be as easy as you think to down this season, particularly at Leederville.

West Perth are developing a new-look team that has strengths in the right places — Les Fong is a top-flight rover; Rod Alderton can kick goals; Ben Jager is strong enough to hold his own in the ruck; Geoff Hendriks and Chris Stasinowsky are young players with match-winning talents; Bill Duckworth is a star of the future . . .

Graham Campbell certainly has a magical way of weaving a seemingly invisible wand over the land and coming up with competitive sides. It will be interesting to see if they can sustain the pressure.

Claremont's return to the winner's list was a welcome boost for the Tigers — after all, their five-year plan wouldn't look too good with two straight losses and their clash with West Perth this week will be a no-holds-barred affair.

It was significant that the Krakouer brothers starred last week and it is definitely a case of stop them and you can stop Claremont. But isn't that Robbie Melville something? He can't get a berth in the Claremont defence, so he stars as a ruck-rover one week and then does well at centre the next. He's a nice sort of versatile player to have around.

Subiaco versus East Perth. Boy, what a nightmare! If Ken Armstrong is at the helm — which he should be by Saturday — then it will be shades of old times with the Armstrong v Barry Cable issue coming up again.

East Perth have a habit of dropping games to Subiaco — they've done it several times in recent years when they were expected to win easily — but usually at Perth Oval strangely enough. However, even though this game is at League Headquarters, it won't be easy for the Royals.

They put in a puzzling sort of effort against Swans. East Perth kicked 19 goals; only lost by 22 points — and that should have been 16 if Paul Arnold took more time with his after-the-siren kick — and yet it was hard to find good players for them.

Usually with a team effort like that, in what was a top-class pressure game, you can pick six good players without much trouble. But the Royals best player list faded out a bit after the first two or three names.

Swan Districts, at home to Perth, should win. The Demons are improving and though they were impressive against Subiaco last week, that quality of football won't do them much good this week. Swans just have too much class.

The Derby — traditionally the power-packed games of our football calendar. Tough, tense and lots of love-hate relationships between the two Port sides.

On form South Fremantle must win; on paper you would think East Fremantle have the better side. It is just the sort of game that will see Old Easts rebound to produce typical Derby spirit and knock the Bulldogs off.



## ESCORT REPORT

### VICTORIAN CLUBS DOMINATE

Three clubs — Claremont, South Fremantle and South Adelaide — are valiantly flying the football flag in a bid to prevent Victorian teams from raking off the cream in the \$400,000 AFC Escort Championship.

Claremont — with three hard-earned wins — and South Fremantle, with one surprise victory, are already in the quarter-finals, in opposing halves of the draw.

South Adelaide, struggling along in fifth place on the South Australian NFL table, play their first game on April 29 when they meet St. Kilda. The match will be in Adelaide and SANFL fans are confident that South Adelaide can pick themselves up and win a berth in the quarter-finals.

As the quarter-finals line up now, Claremont play Hawthorn on May 20 and South Fremantle meet Essendon on June 10. North Melbourne, five-point winners over Glenelg this week, are opposed to the winner of the St. Kilda-South Adelaide clash on April 29.

The other quarter-finalists will be decided when the final two third-round games are held next month — Footscray and Collingwood on May 6 and Richmond and Fitzroy on May 13.

Glenelg's effort in pushing North Melbourne to a five-point margin indicates that the club gap between the three major states is narrowing — and that visiting club sides from interstate are starting to cope with the novelty of playing on the treacherous VFL Park surface at night under lights.

**Jack Dyer** — Captain Blood from Victoria and Richmond. Always tougher than the rest. A mean, but always fair competitor who has sustained his role as a media man for many years.

**Ron Barassi** — remembered as a good footballer but best known for his incredible record as a coach.

Add to the list —

**Ron Casey**, Mr Football; **Ted Whitten**, the incomparable; **Alex Epis**, the West Australian who went to Essendon and became a Victorian player.

Tasmania have had a couple of personalities who became huge names through playing — **Darryl Baldock**, footballer now a politician and this year again a coach returning to his old team. His name is one that any Aussie Rules follower would know. **Peter Hudson** — the freakish footballer and goalkicking record holder with every club he has played with. He has had more injuries and has had more comebacks than Dame Nellie Melba. And to cap it all off, he could still get front page space around Australia over his report during his final game for Tasmania in the State of Origin Carnival at the end of last year.

South Australia have some names that are above the rest — **Jack Oatey**, famous coach of Sturt and former champion player. A man who has two sons who were also known as great players particularly, his son Robert who successfully coached Nonwood and played to an incredible age of around 37.

**Neil Kerley** — another name every Aussie rules footballer would know. As a player, coach and media personality he is renowned principally for his never-ending public hatred of all other Australian Rules football states. He has used unorthodox state squad training tactics,

Number one on our list must be:

**John K. Watts** — Brilliant as a creator of fun in football. A man known to his friends as an affable, lovable family man whose love for his family is greater than anything else. He has survived as a media personality for a long time. Loyal to his friends and helpers always. But above all his comic antics to promote football has done more than most anybody else has or could achieve. A great competitor in all fields whether it been in football or business generally.

**Les Mumme** — The quiet funny man of football. A great player both at State level and club level. The last premiership captain of the Claremont Football Club, Les has been in radio now for 10 years on 6PM's Sportsworld and is known as having a very quick and cutting sense of humour, a man who mixes the funny side of the game as capably as he does as one of our most respected commentators. He is now seen back on the playing fields as 6PM's on the

## Man in the middle

"This made the job of positional changes during the match a bit of guesswork," he said.

And while Subiaco were slaughtered by Perth in the league game and also lost the reserves game, Metropolis said there was hope left in the club.

"Subiaco fell down in the basic skills of football on Saturday.

"The players must learn to apply themselves to a common cause, and that is to lift Subiaco into a position of football power.

"The league side still needs a few key positional players," he said.

He welcomed the appointment of Ken Armstrong as the new Subiaco coach saying the decision was "the best step the club could have made".

"Armstrong is a highly respected coach and that respect is deserved. I'm looking forward to working alongside him," Metropolis said.

"The club has to set about moulding a side which means that the talent in the lesser grades has to be developed.

"And there is talent in the colts and reserves which will form the backbone of the league side in years to come."

Metropolis has no immediate ambitions to coach a league side but is looking forward to the challenge of helping to bring respectability back to Subiaco.

He is a highly intelligent and articulate man who should succeed in his given task.

# VIOLENT TRENDS WORRY UMPIRES

Victorian umpires are becoming concerned at the violent tendencies towards them that are emanating from VFL fans.

The last two Saturdays have seen public violence — firstly there was the can-throwing incident that resulted in Garry Sidebottom getting hit with a can aimed at an umpire. Then last week a Richmond fan tried to attack field umpire Kevin Smith in the dying minutes of the action-packed match drawn against St. Kilda.

The can-throwing incident shows just how volatile VFL fans can be.

Field umpire Rohan Sawers seemed to be the target in a hotly-disputed game between St. Kilda and Hawthorn and it was Sidebottom who got hit above the eye with the three-quarter full can of beer.

The most recent incident saw a man dressed in a Richmond football guernsey, with corduroy trousers and sandals, run on the ground and head for Smith, about 70 metres away.

Smith grappled with the man, throwing him to the ground. Volatile St. Kilda 'bad boy' Robert Muir rushed in and held the man on the ground till police arrived.

Muir, who has crossed swords with many an umpire, got a pat on the back this time. Smith said: "I'm very grateful to Muir. For all I know that guy could have been a world champion boxer or something."



Top Victorian football commentator Scot Palmer — sports editor of the Sunday Press — thinks that sacked St. Kilda coach Mike Patterson could be invited back to his former club, Richmond.

Patterson helped make the Tigers great back in the mid-60's and a group of sentimental Richmond fans have launched a campaign to get the former ruckman back in the fold.

Not many people in the VFL world liked the quick way the rug was pulled out from under Patterson's feet and he could soon be seen in some sort of advisory or recruiting role at Richmond.

Hawthorn tough-man Don Scott is really quite a softie — when it comes to shoes only but.

Scott plays in soft-sole shoes without stops — something rather incredible in the muddy world of VFL football.

The 32-year-old Hawks veteran, one of the most colourful men in Australian football, set an early pattern with coloured boots a few years back.

Scott was wearing the slipper-type shoes partly because of his long battle to recover from a crippling ankle injury. His football career was virtually written off six months ago when he had a serious operation involving ligaments, bone chips and growth-removals — and he was told he wouldn't play again.

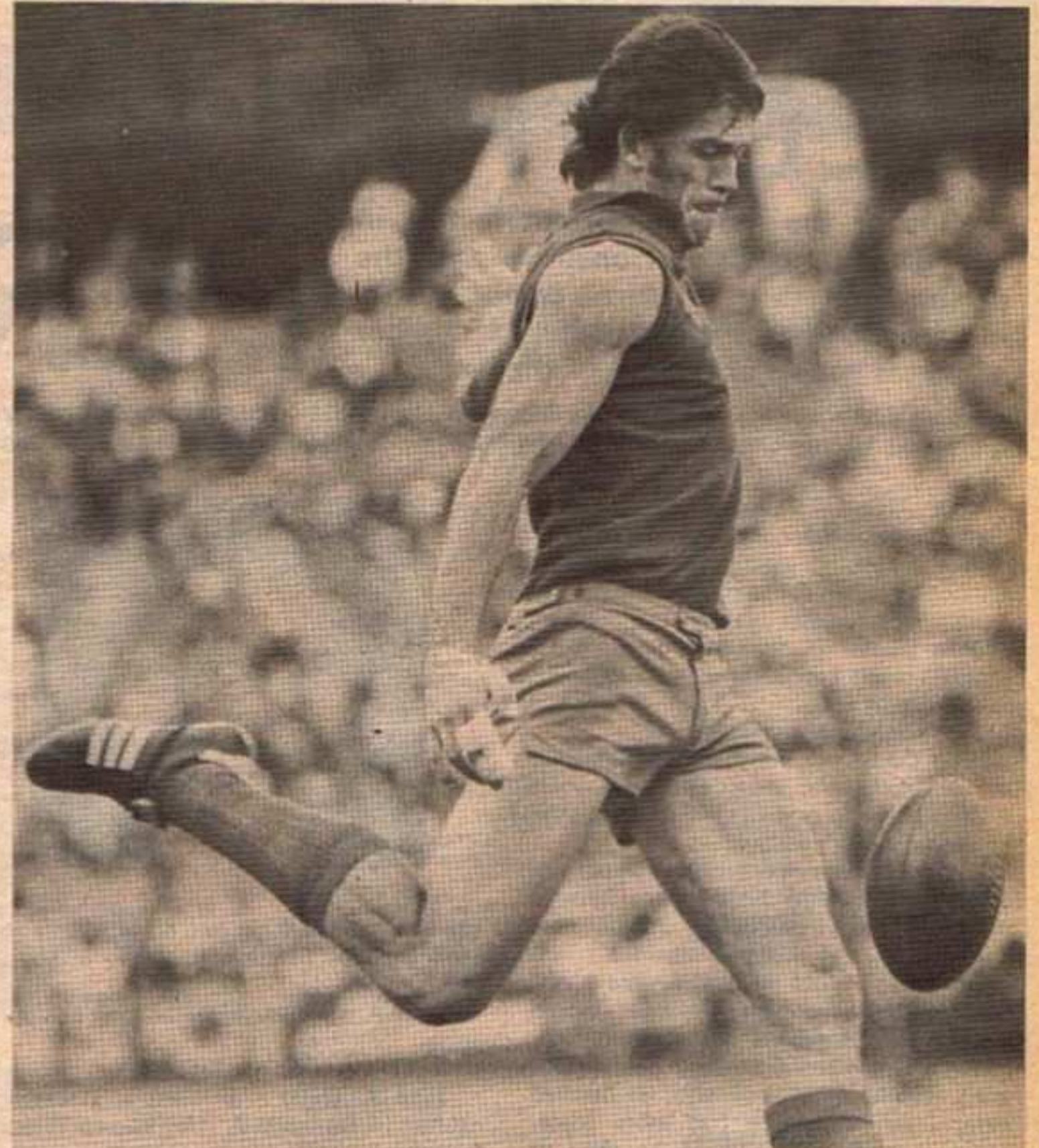
But tough men don't give in easily and his personal triumph over injury was a bonus as far as Hawthorn were concerned — his display helped them down hot-shot side Collingwood and he had the satisfaction of getting a points decision over Brownlow Medallist Peter Moore.

Many of the top Victorian footballers have managers — and that is something the VFL administration isn't happy about.

VFL general manager Jack Hamilton says that the managers — most of whom rake off about 10 per cent of the earnings of their charges — are having an unsettling effect on the game.

"They tend to encourage players to fall into disputes with their clubs", says Mr. Hamilton.

Speaking at a Monash University law seminar, Mr. Hamilton will probably find his comments falling on deaf ears. Many of the managers in the VFL are, in fact, top solicitors.



## He's no 'rubber ducky'

There's no doubting the toughness and courage of former West Perth strong-man John Duckworth.

Wrongly nick-named "Rubber Ducky", Big John is one of the hardest men in the business to stop — and his effort for Central District in the recent game against Port Adelaide sums up his attitude.

Duckworth was carted off the ground on a stretcher, with what seemed like serious rib injuries. Further examination in the rooms showed that there was no serious damage — he immediately wanted to return to the fray!



Doctors over-ruled him, saying that another severe knock in the rib-cage region could cause irreparable damage.

Duckworth, last year's Magarey Medal winner and vice-captain of Centrals, was almost tied down to the trainer's bench to prevent him from returning to the field.

Former Swan Districts rover Brian Close is on the injured list in South Australia — and caused quite a stir in the Woodville camp.

Close was feared to have suffered spinal damage when a Sturt player had accidentally fallen on him, and play was held up for five minutes while he was placed on a stretcher.

Close was rushed to hospital for X-rays, but a surgeon said later that there was no spinal damage.

South Australian and former Test cricketer Ashley Mallett is a journalist and covers football for the Adelaide paper, Sunday Mail.

He is a very sharp man with words — as many a touring cricketer has known — and he takes the top award this week for manufacturing phrases.

His opening paragraph on his coverage of the Norwood-Port Adelaide game — when Port notched up a healthy 108-point victory — was: "Port Adelaide did everything but 'en-Balme' Norwood in a massacre at Alberton Oval yesterday."

Poor old Neil Balme, things just aren't going right for him this season.

Sturt are re-asserting themselves as a power in South Australian football — and handball is the reason.

The Blues produced some of their old magic when they trounced Woodville last week and with something like 170 effective handballs, their game was hard to counter.

The star was Neil Craig, with 12 kicks and 20 handballs, and he was the follower who got the side going.

Port Adelaide's triple Magarey Medallist, Russell Ebert played his 250th game when his side met Norwood last Saturday.

Ebert first played for Port in 1968, joining the club from the country. He has played 18 games for South Australia and 25 for North Melbourne. That gives him a tally of 293 senior games in a little over 12 years of senior football... an average of 24 games per season.



Former Swan Districts star Garry Sidebottom — now captain of St. Kilda — has joined the football media world.

Sidey is writing for the Melbourne Sunday newspaper Sunday Observer, and a recent issue has a typical Sidebottom statement — "it's time football clubs were taken over by the big businessmen of this world".

Sidebottom suggests that clubs should be privately owned and he sees the days of football entrepreneurs fast arriving.

Talking about Garry Sidebottom — the can-throwing incident brought back memories to the big Swans ruckman.

To quote him: "Swan Districts were playing at the 'prison farm' — South Fremantle — and as we were going off the ground someone tossed a can. This time I saw it coming, ducked and it smashed into... you guessed it, the umpire!"

Big John Nicholls, a legend in his own lifetime in Australian Rules football, is looking for a coaching job again.

Big Nick is moving back to Melbourne after a stint in Adelaide and he has put out the 'available' sign to VFL clubs looking for a new coach in 1981.

The former Carlton champion might even find his way into a coaching spot this year the way sackings are going on!

## TIGERS SNARE NEW RECRUIT

Claremont have pulled off an unusual recruiting coup . . . they have tied up one of Australia's top cricketers.

Australian Test captain Kim Hughes has joined the Tigers' Den as official runner for the Claremont colts side.

Hughes actually is simply rejoining Claremont.

The dashing batsman was, in fact, a promising full-forward with Claremont,

playing a few seasons with the colts and the reserves side before cricket forced his retirement four years ago.

"I'm really enjoying this involvement," says Hughes, who has only recently returned to Perth after touring Pakistan with the Australian Test side.

"When I returned home I was looking for something to do to keep fit and I jumped at the invitation to get involved

with Claremont again.

"I go down to training on Mondays and Wednesdays and practice my drop-kicks. They are a great bunch of guys and I really enjoy chasing the ball around."

Hughes, an experienced leader of men in the tough world cricket arena, is proving to be an ideal runner for colts coach Graham Mabbs — and their unbeaten run to date puts him in another winner's camp.

## ORDERING OFF RULE

The introduction of the "Ordering Off" rule into the V.F.A. in 1980 and the debate of its possible inclusion into the major leagues throughout Australia is of interest to amateur footballers in this state.

This rule has been part of the Australian Amateur Football Council's laws since the

1930's and as a consequence has been a very important and successful part of the W.A.A.F.L. laws.

Recently the ordering off rule was amended in W.A. for a year's trial period and if it proves successful will be recommended to the A.A.F.C. for adoption. The proposal now reads:

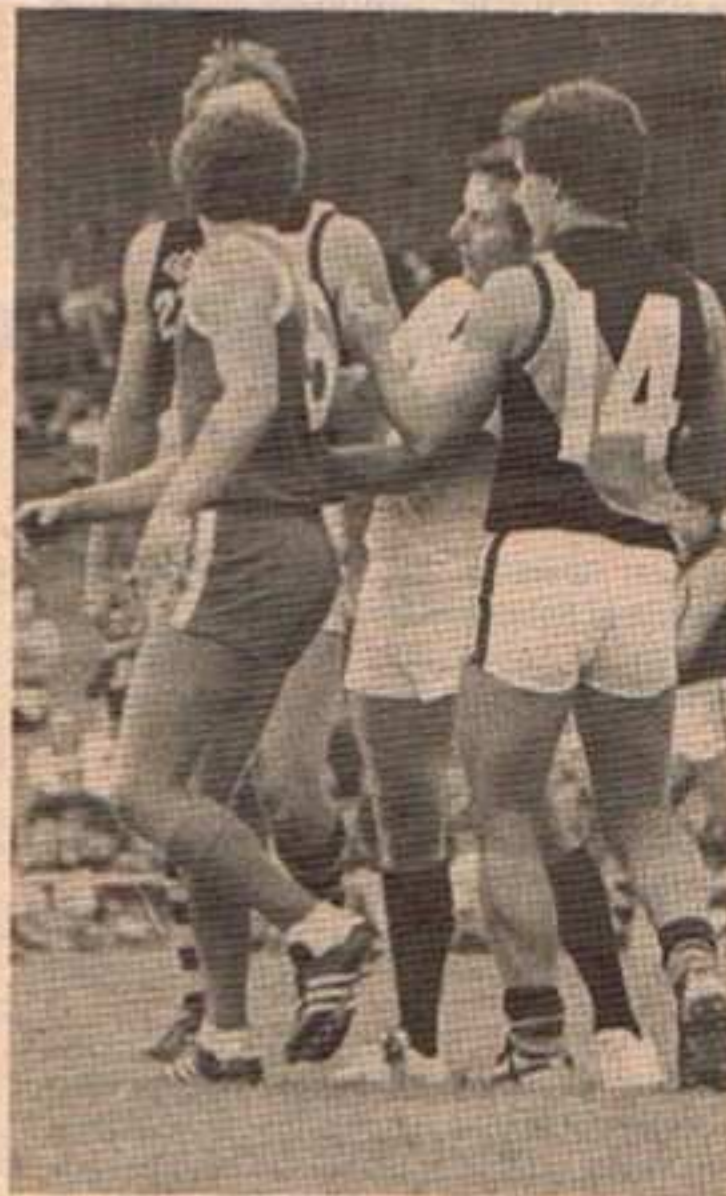
*"In any match the Field Umpire shall have power to order from the field for such time as he sees fit, any player who has committed a reportable offence. Such player can be replaced by one of the Interchange reserves, but will not be eligible to return to the field until sanctioned by the Field Umpire.*

*Should the same player offend again, after having been allowed back on the field, the Umpire shall order him from the field for the remainder of the game, and he shall not be replaced by an interchange reserve player."*

Previous to this amended rule players could be ordered off the playing field on the first offence and not replaced by an interchange player.

### FLASHBACK...

# MICHAEL — A KEY PLAYER IN SOUTHS MACHINE



Pound for pound, Stephen Michael is one of the most talented footballers in the country.

He has consistently been a key in the South Fremantle machine and is a player who has sent the VFL talent scouts scurrying for their cheque books. But Michael is an Aboriginal, a proud man with close family ties and a deep feeling about the country around Kojonup where he comes from.

The thought of even quitting the countryside for the city was one that he didn't particularly enjoy, although football's lure was sufficient to at least get him up to Fremantle Oval. For that reason, it seems as though the VFL clubs will have a fight on their hands to get this high-leaper across the border.

Michael's role at South Fremantle has generally been one of a No. 1 ruckman, a position he was quickly slotted into when he arrived up from the country. But many good judges say that he would make a champion ruck-roller — if he could be spared from the ruck.

South Fremantle would dearly love to have another Stephen Michael in their camp. But, alas, that's not so. In this interview, ALAN EAST talks to the real Stephen Michael.

**What are you, as a footballer, looking for in 1980?**

No set goals. I'd like to play a bit better and maybe prove that I can win a Sandover Medal. I thought I could have won it last year, but once people started printing things about leaks in the voting and all that, I lost my chance.

**You were a bit upset about that suggested Sandover Medal leak?**

Yes, it upset my concentration and put a lot of worry on me.

**A lot of people speculate on what position you should play as — ruckman or ruck-roller. What do you think?**

You can say where you want to play, but a coach has a different point of view and you play where he wants you. I think you can be put anywhere on the ground; anywhere the coach wants and if you are capable of playing there, then you are a good footballer in my opinion. I've got no personal desire to play one or the other; I'll go where the coach puts me.

**What do you put your good season last year down to — maturity?**

We didn't really have a great team, but it was a good team spirit; we were a battling side and the team spirit of all the guys seemed to lift one another and encourage each other.

**You won the fairest and best last year for the third year in a row. Was that a big factor in your football life?**

Yes, to win it three times in a row is a feather in your hat. But Maurice had a bad year, he could have won it and even Noel Carter, he was a bit unlucky, he got injured too.

**What about State football, how important is that to you?**

State football is another thing all together. You are out there to prove your point, to beat the opposition you are playing on. Once you start beating them, people tend to look up at you and State football brings the best out of you.

**What about Victorian football then, do you think you'll go?**

I'll give it another couple of years here and try and help South win a premiership. Where I come from down in the bush I was in premiership sides, but since I've been up here I haven't played in one, so I'll fix that first. There's plenty of time, I'm only 23 and I can get over there in another couple of years. I'm not saying I wouldn't like to go now, Geelong made me a pretty good offer.

**You have pretty strong family ties here, don't you?**

Yes, that was part of the reason I didn't go this year.

**Where did your early football start then?**

In Kojonup. I started playing senior football when I was 15.

**How did you get involved with South Fremantle?**

That area was in the Central Great Southern zone, which is South Fremantle territory. One of the presidents down there brought a few of us up to Fremantle Oval. I just took football day by day then and I had proved myself in the country so I thought I'd give it a go up here. I played one reserves game and I've played league ever since; I haven't missed a game through injury or anything. That was the beginning of the 1975 season.

**Were you a bit surprised at how quickly you made it?**

No, not really. I believe that if you are out there and you try to do your best you are bound to get a game sooner or later.

**What aspects of your football have improved? Discipline for example?**

Well, discipline has improved I guess. But the older you get the more you learn to bring your teammates into the game and I'm learning to talk to the younger blokes and encourage them out on the field. I like to try and encourage the younger blokes just to get them into football instead of going into the pubs on Saturdays.

**As an Aboriginal, do you think you have benefitted from football?**

I reckon no matter what the race is, black, white or brindle, you still have to prove yourself and you get back what you put into it. Football is really my life now that I've come up here and I guess it has been good for me. I've got no regrets.

**How long do you think your football life will be? Could you play for another 10 years?**

No, no. It will be earlier than that. A lot of players try to keep playing and they get injured easily and instead of staying on a standard level of about 80 per cent effort, they tend to drop down to say 45 per cent and come under lots of criticism. I'll retire when I reckon I'm ready.

# BENNETT'S BURST



Is Ken Armstrong on an ego trip? It would be easy to jump to that conclusion after his decision to shed Perth in favour of Subiaco.

Armstrong is reported to have said that he found the transition from coach to an administrator more frustrating than he could have believed.

On the surface it would appear that he has not given his job as director of coaching at Perth much of a go.

I suspect there is far more to his decision than meets the eye. Let's face it, he appears to be taking on a very big task. While I am prepared to acknowledge that Armstrong is a competent coach, I don't see him as a miracle maker and on their showing so far this season, Subiaco will need a miracle to even become a strong competitor.

So why has he taken them on? — to show that he has the capabilities of transforming a down-and-out club into a force?

If Armstrong can just make them competitive this year then he will win accolades . . . and after last Saturday's showing, he won't have to do a great deal to improve Subiaco's stocks. But it will be a different story lifting the club to a top four proposition. Just ask John Todd.

He had to endure a lot at Swans to get the team to its present standing. Success did not come overnight.

It was a hard grind but fortunately for him and the club, he had administrators who were prepared to stick by him and were not impatient for success.

To my mind, Subiaco have tried to buy improvement, if not success this season. Some say they recruited judiciously but I don't believe this was the case. They reminded me of shoppers looking for bargains — and bargains are very hard to come by in league football.

Most of the footballers they recruited this season were only peripheral.

Personally, I don't believe Subiaco were fair to Burton. If he wasn't the man for the job — and quite obviously someone didn't think he was judging by the quick decision to sack him — then they should have terminated his services long before the start of the season instead of dislocating the club after only one set of fixtures.

I also find comments by the club's president Kevin Merifield incredible.

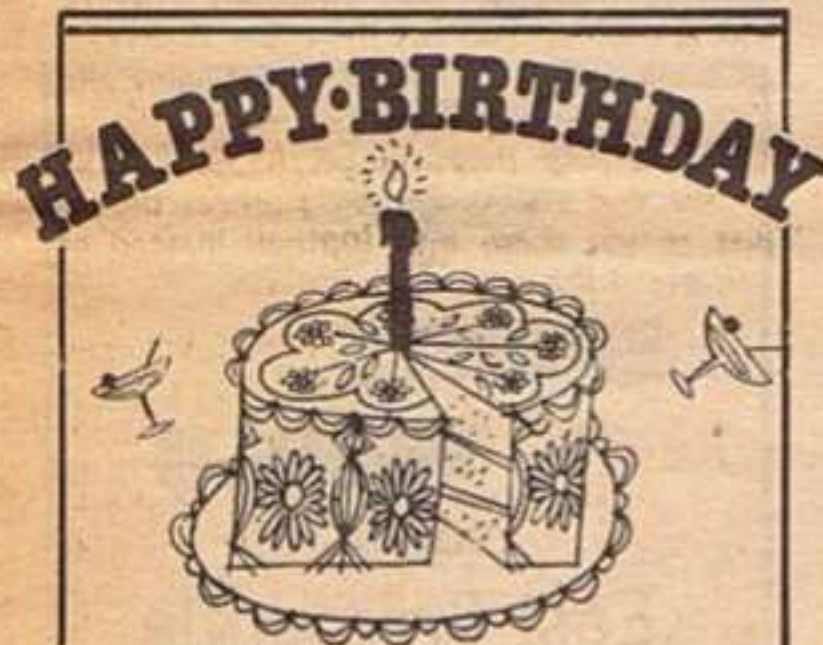
Sure, Subiaco needed a coach. But why should Perth be expected to hand Armstrong over gladly and thereby leave themselves in a hole.

Armstrong occupied a very important position at Perth in respect to player development and to put it quite bluntly he has been poached by Subiaco. If they were so keen to get him then they should have approached him long before the start of the season.

I personally believe that Armstrong has too sober a nature to embark on an ego trip . . . it would seem that there is a lot more to this decision than has so far been publicised.

Obviously he is entitled to improve himself or to move to another club if he is dissatisfied with the situation. But one wonders whether he has given Perth the kind of consideration that one would expect from a person of his standing and reputation in league football.

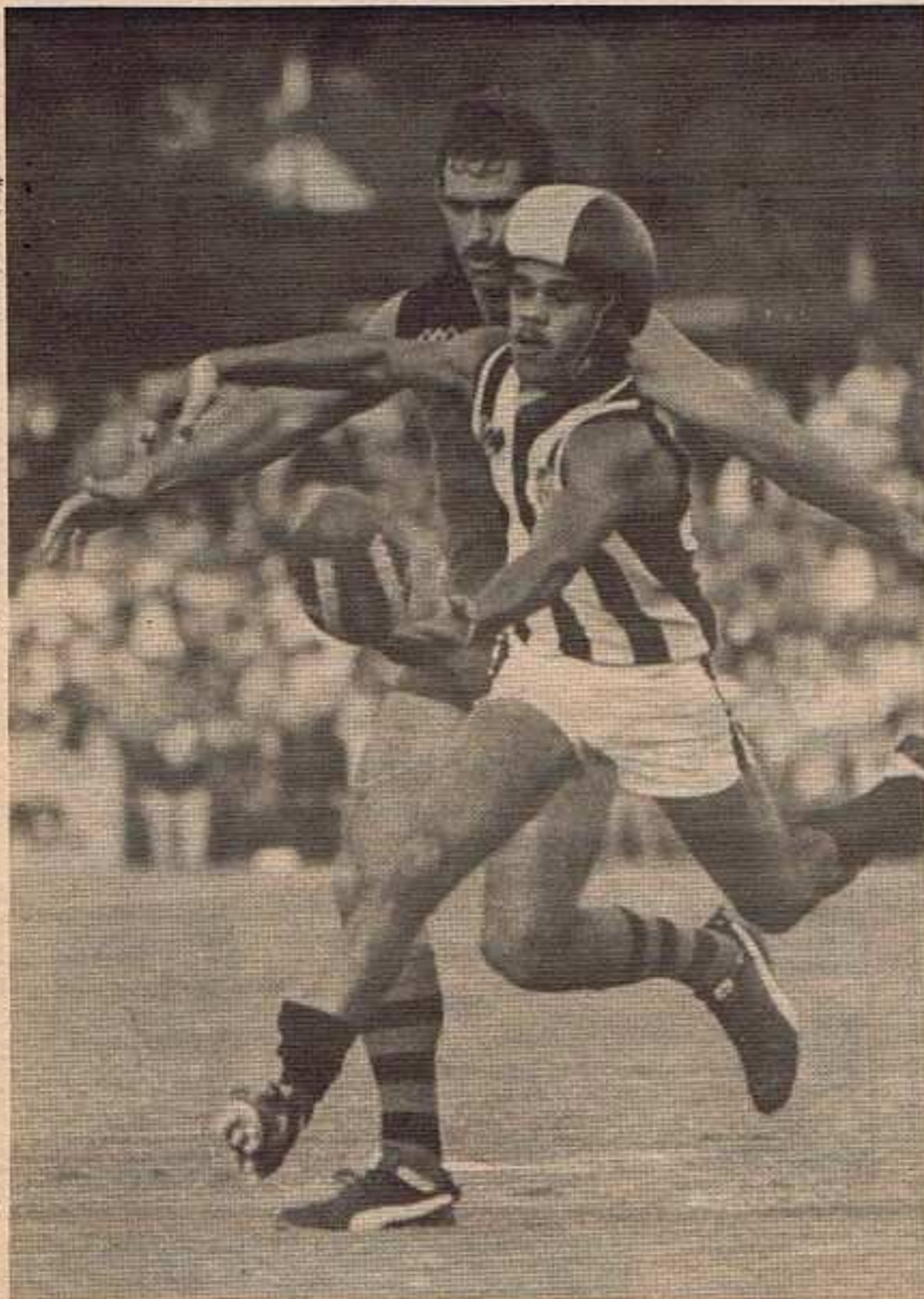

# DAVE CLEMENT

How refreshing to at last hear a top administrator with the courage of his convictions — but doesn't he 'show up' some of his predecessors, especially those on the ANFC.

How many footballers have played in the VFL without obtaining a clearance? There are many cases of Victorian Football Association players transferring to VFL clubs without a properly negotiated clearance.

Two big names I recall were Peter Bedford, who went to South Melbourne and won the 1970 Brownlow Medal, and played in the successful 1966 Carnival team.

Another was Richmond's Kevin Sheedy, he too represented Victoria in many games, whilst according to the ANFC constitution was ineligible. Yet nobody from anywhere said how come?!

Swan Districts are off to a flying start this year, two records in two matches.

In the opening game they notched up their biggest win ever over East Fremantle. Their 111 points win beat their previous best... a 97 point victory in 1975 (29.20 to 14.13).

Incidentally, Swans biggest win in a league game was over Claremont in 1961 when they won 123 points 25.14 to 6.5.

Swans second record came last Saturday when they recorded their highest score at Perth Oval, 21.20.

Perth's mammoth score last week 27.20 (182) was their highest ever against Subiaco, but their 100 point margin didn't better that club's 1916 effort when Perth

beat Subiaco by 117 points.

Perth's easiest win occurred in 1966, when under Malcolm Atwell, they beat South Fremantle by 143 points 27.25 to 6.8.

Subiaco, deserted by lady luck in all but one of the thirty five post war years has just made its nineteenth coaching appointment in this era.

For a club that has made the 'four' only seven times and finished last on nine occasions in these years, one might suggest that it displays a lack of stability. The club's post-war coaches are Diggins, Murphy (Dan), Cuzens, Browning, Slater, Killagrew, Bunton, R. Smith, Parkin, Endor, Bunton and now Armstrong.

However, it may surprise most football followers to know that it is East Fremantle, a club with six premierships in the same time that has changed in coaches the most, twenty one in all. In fact in the fourteen years between 1949 and 1962 they used ten different coaches (Sheedy, Dolan, Conway (Jim), Strang, Doig, Miers, Marsh, Clarke, Everrett and Johnson).

Coaches at Perth and South Fremantle have a greater feeling of security as these two clubs have made only thirteen changes since the war. East Perth and Claremont have made fifteen changes, West Perth and Swan Districts seventeen.

## WELL DONE UMPS!

Abuse is part and parcel of being one of the men in white on a Saturday afternoon.

But how often does that abuse turn to praise? Hardly ever.

If an umpire does a bad job, every decision is booed by the crowd and often football critics hop in for their chop.

Well, down at East Fremantle on Saturday, no fair-minded footy fan could have had any complaints about the exhibition put on by veteran Ross Capes and his partner Brendon Green.

Some critics will say that a performance can be gauged by whether the umpire is actually noticed during a match. If he's not noticed then he's done a good job.

That theory didn't apply last week in the clash between East Fremantle and Claremont because the umpires came under a lot of notice, but still did an excellent job.

Two players who "noticed" the umps were Phil Krakouer and Kevin Taylor who both faced the league tribunal this week.

Capes and Green were on the spot early in the game when it looked as though the match could have developed into a rough, bruising affair.

The umpires gave 23 free kicks in the first term — more than one third awarded during the game — and showed players they were not willing to tolerate any rough stuff.

The players got the message. The game was better as a result and the spectators got full value for their entrance fee.

The umpires certainly earned their money but still there were those who vocally questioned decisions.

I suppose the umpires have grown to expect that as part of the Saturday afternoon entertainment.

Cam now wears number 24 — the same number his father donned when he played for Perth.

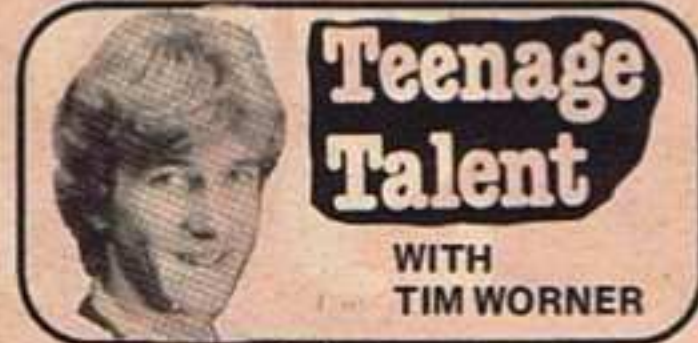
He rates his father as the biggest influence on his football career — "He is always on my back when I do something wrong, always helping with a word or two. That's the only way to learn," he says.

So that only leaves three clubs — North Melbourne, Fitzroy and Hawthorn — who haven't had to replace coaches for sudden reasons.

Jesaulenko knew what it was all about when he said: "If I don't get results, I expect to get the bullet."

Alan Killigrew knew all about it too: "Football's a cynical game these days. If you don't win you're gone. The club comes first."

I don't know whether those thoughts are any consolation to Peter Burton or last year's sacked coach, Percy Johnson, but it is food for thought.

In conclusion I would like to wish Ken Armstrong every success with Subiaco. Ken and I don't always see eye to eye, but I do respect his obvious ability as a coach and his dedication to the game. Being a Subiaco supporter myself, I'll have to be a bit nicer to Ken in the future.

# RETIRED STARS

Every season sees the retirement of footballers — some long standing, some with injury-shortened careers.

Many reasons force league footballers to hang up their boots. It's not an easy decision; but it is one that takes an honest footballer to face.

Since the completion of the 1979 season we have seen some familiar faces fade from the league arena.

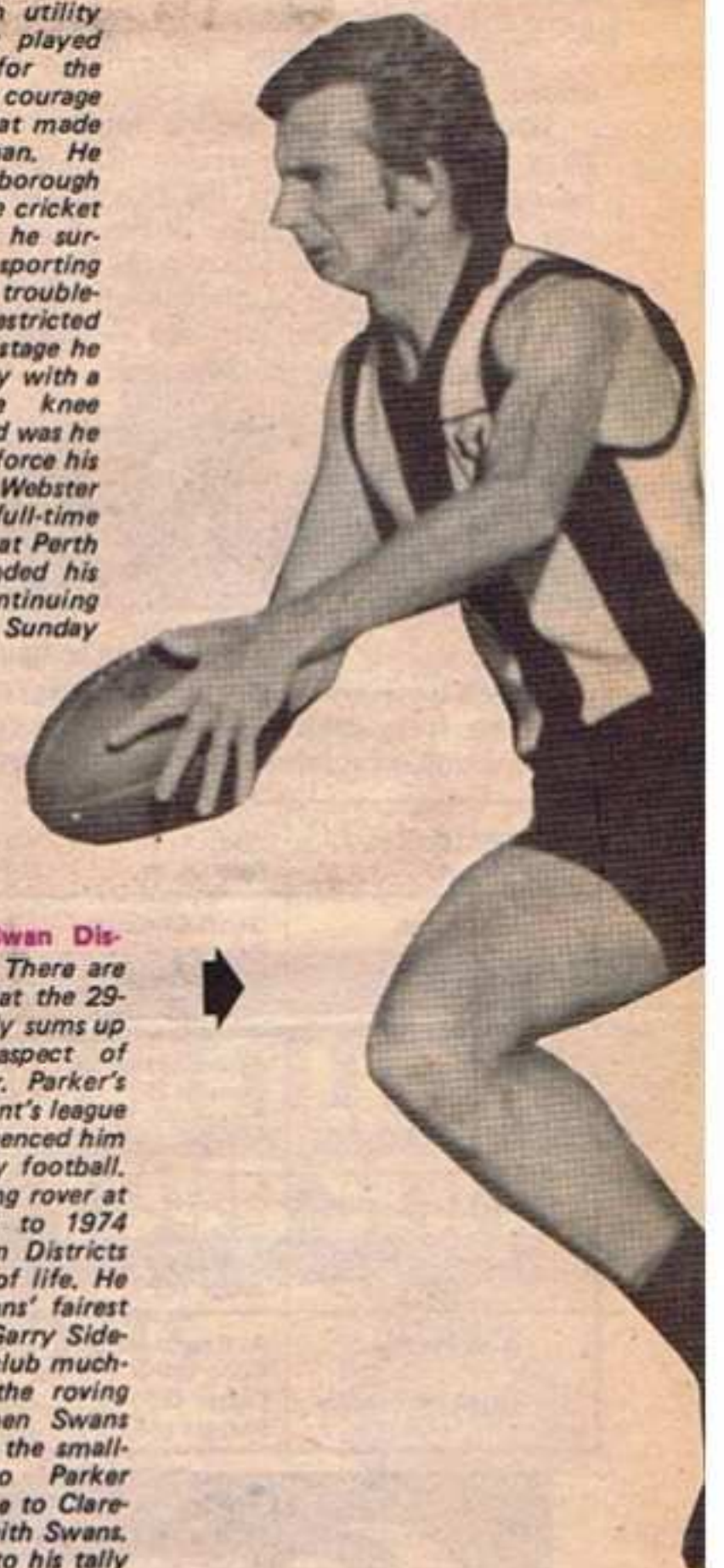
Last week we acknowledged the contributions some of those men had made to the game, today we pay tribute to six more.



**IAN McCULLOCH (East Perth):** Football has had its tough moments for a tough player like McCulloch. But it has also opened up new horizons and subsequently, the opportunity of moving into his own hotel has forced the big ruckman to retire from the city scene. McCulloch, now 30, has moved to Collie where he will play with Mines Rovers, the 1979 South West NFL premiers. His burly frame has dominated football arenas in two states over 15 seasons; compiling 106 league games with East Perth and 79 with Fitzroy, in the tough VFL arena where big men have to be strong and courageous to survive. He represented WA once — before going to Victoria — but premierships eluded him.



**RON WEBSTER (East Perth):** Retiring from football to work full-time in football — that is what has happened to this burly East Perth utility player. Webster only played 74 league games for the Royals — but it was his courage and determination that made him a real team-man. He graduated from Scarborough and, mixing first-grade cricket with league football, he survived in two tough sporting arenas. A spate of troublesome knee injuries restricted his career and at one stage he even attempted to play with a hefty American-style knee bandage, so determined was he that injury would not force his retirement. Now 27, Webster has moved into a full-time football commitment at Perth Oval and this has ended his league career. He is continuing to play in the W.A.F.A. Sunday competition.



**ROSS PARKER (Swan Districts and Claremont):** There are many fans who feel that the 29-year-old Parker probably sums up an often-unheralded aspect of football — the battler. Parker's omission from Claremont's league list this season has influenced him to venture into Sunday football. Parker was a third-string rover at Claremont from 1971 to 1974 and his move to Swan Districts gave him a new lease of life. He was runner-up in Swans' fairest and best in 1976 (to Garry Sidebottom) and gave the club much-needed assistance in the roving department. Since then Swans have recruited well in the small-man department, so Parker decided to return home to Claremont after 64 games with Swans. That he failed to add to his tally of 34 games there will go down as one of those bitter twists of fate that often deprive footballers of their just rewards.

**GEOFF TAYLOR (West Perth):** There were plenty of people at Leederville Oval earlier this season who wished that Geoff Taylor had not hung up his boots. Amidst talk that Taylor was planning to switch to Subiaco, the former West Perth captain and full-back was enjoying retirement. Taylor now 31, came down from Wickpin to make his league debut in 1972. He went on to play 133 games with the club, captaining them last year to cap his league career on a fine note. Taylor's football was always first-class; he played character football and set an example of discipline and determination that was a credit. He also served the club well in attack, kicking 37 goals in various stints at full-forward.

**CHRIS MITSOPOULOS (Perth):** A serious back injury has cut this talented rover down in the prime of his career. The 27-year-old Mitsopoulos reached the peak of his football life when he represented Western Australia against Victoria and South Australia in 1977. Even though he made his debut with Perth in 1971, injuries restricted his league tally to 103 games — passing the century in a painful and injury-riddled season last year. A dashing rover with lightning fast goal talents, he has now moved into the football media world and his comments are well worth listening to.

**GEOFF WATT (Perth):** One of football's most under-rated players. If the name of the game is to work your hardest; do your best and be satisfied with the result, then Watt has every reason to be proud of his 170-game career spanning eight years. Now just on 31, the dour, dogged tactics of Watt at centre bounciedowns had a big impression on Perth's success in the 1976-77 seasons — after all, if you don't win the ball away from the centre, you don't win. Watt was not over-endowed with football skills; but he more than made up for this with sheer determination; never shirking the hard work and his application is a lesson that many a young player should learn.

The selection committee sifts through the names — usually about 50 — and then picks a squad of 22.

Most delegates consider this system suitable but a suggestion was made that all WAFL clubs supply two selectors who would judge players' form.

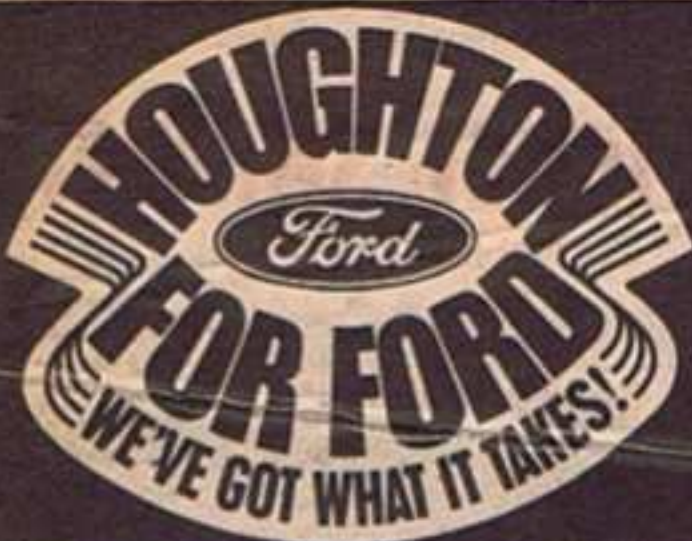
