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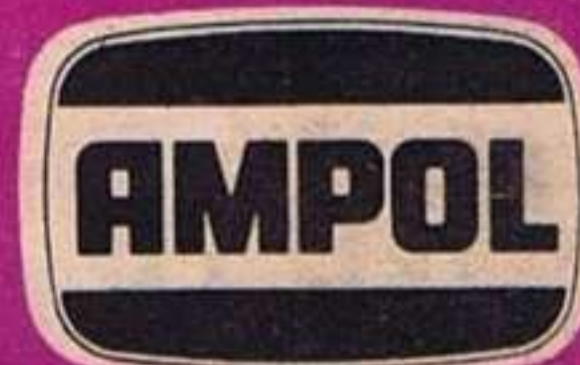

MURRAY COUPER VOWS

I'M NOT FINISHED

The mercurial Murray Couper, the man opposition fans love to hate, is fighting for his football life.

Couper wants to prove one more thing to a growing band of disbelievers before he hangs up his footy boots. He wants to succeed at another club.

And he hopes to realise that ambition within a few weeks.

The former Perth forward, who has been hampered by a groin injury at East Perth, has yet to play a league game with the Royals.

Last week, after pulling out of the reserves match against Subiaco, rumours were rife that Couper had quit.

But that's far from the truth.

"It's killing me to watch footy," Couper says.

"I'm honestly trying to do the right thing but my injury is not one you can fix in a flash.

Stronger

"The thought of giving the game away has crossed my mind, but the desire to do well at East Perth is stronger.

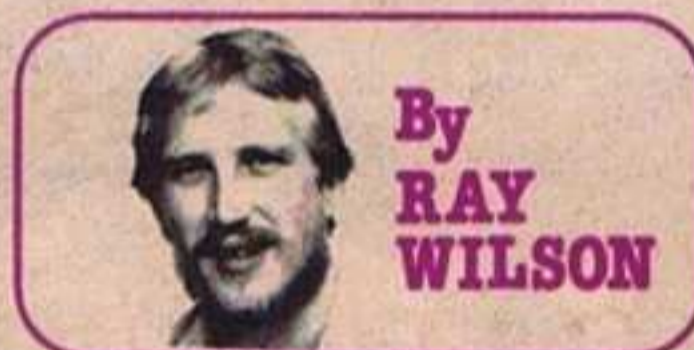
"I was asked to join East Perth and right now I have a few things to prove to others as well as myself."

Couper is angry at some supporters who say he is finished because he can't get a game.

He did play in the pre-season match against North Melbourne, but the groin injury has sidelined him for the first four home-and-away games of the season.

He said his injury was more serious than first thought.

One medical expert has told him that his right hip has dropped and the groin injury stems from this.

Couper has been swimming four nights a week over the last month in an effort to be able to run out with the league side.

In fact, he's putting in as much, if not more, dedication to getting a game than he has ever done in his nine year league career.

Couper has been a headache for some coaches during his 134-league game career with the Demons.

But Barry Cable has never had any problems with the sometimes wayward and volatile player.

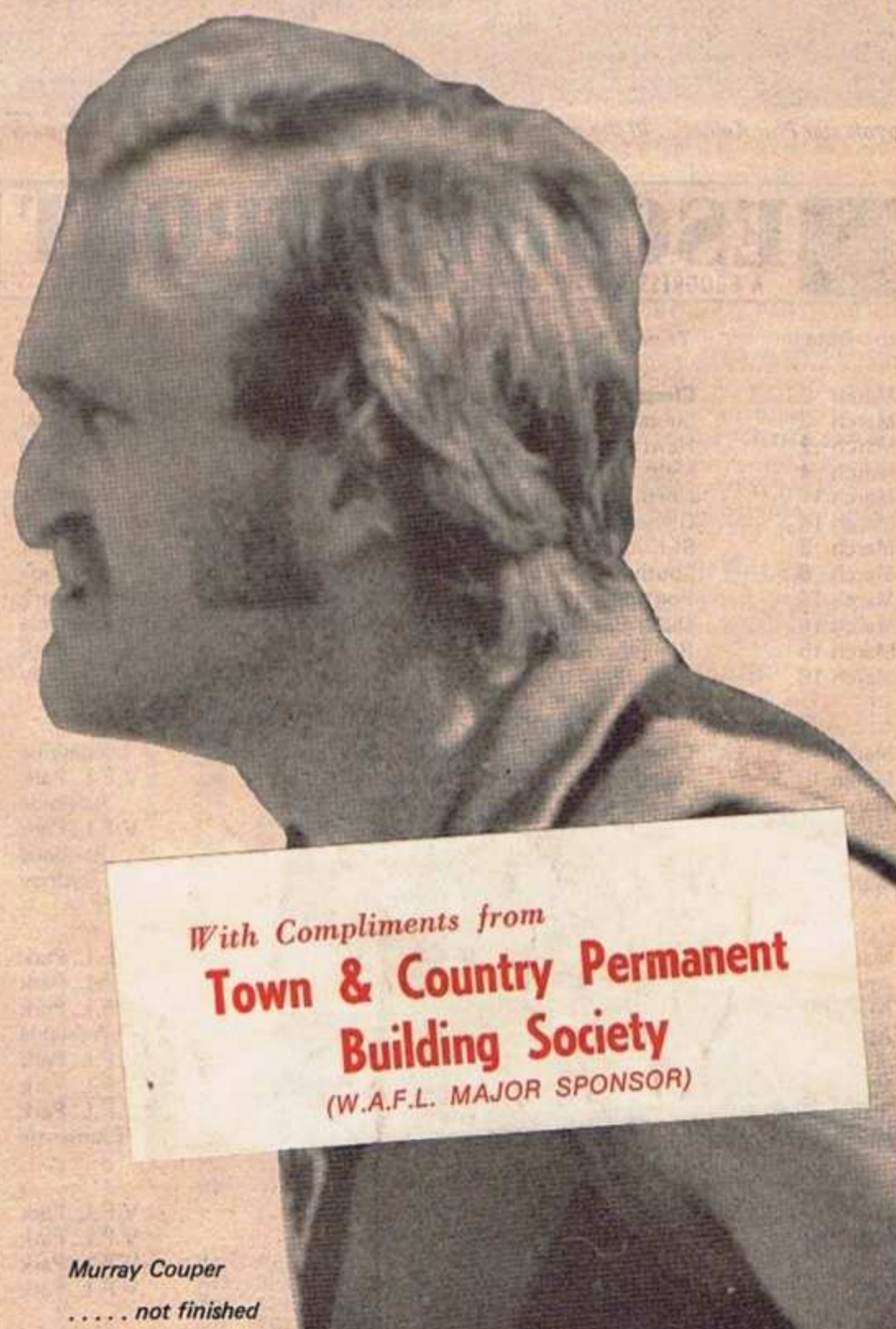
"Cable turns me on as a coach," Couper says.

That week the Royals play the Demons.



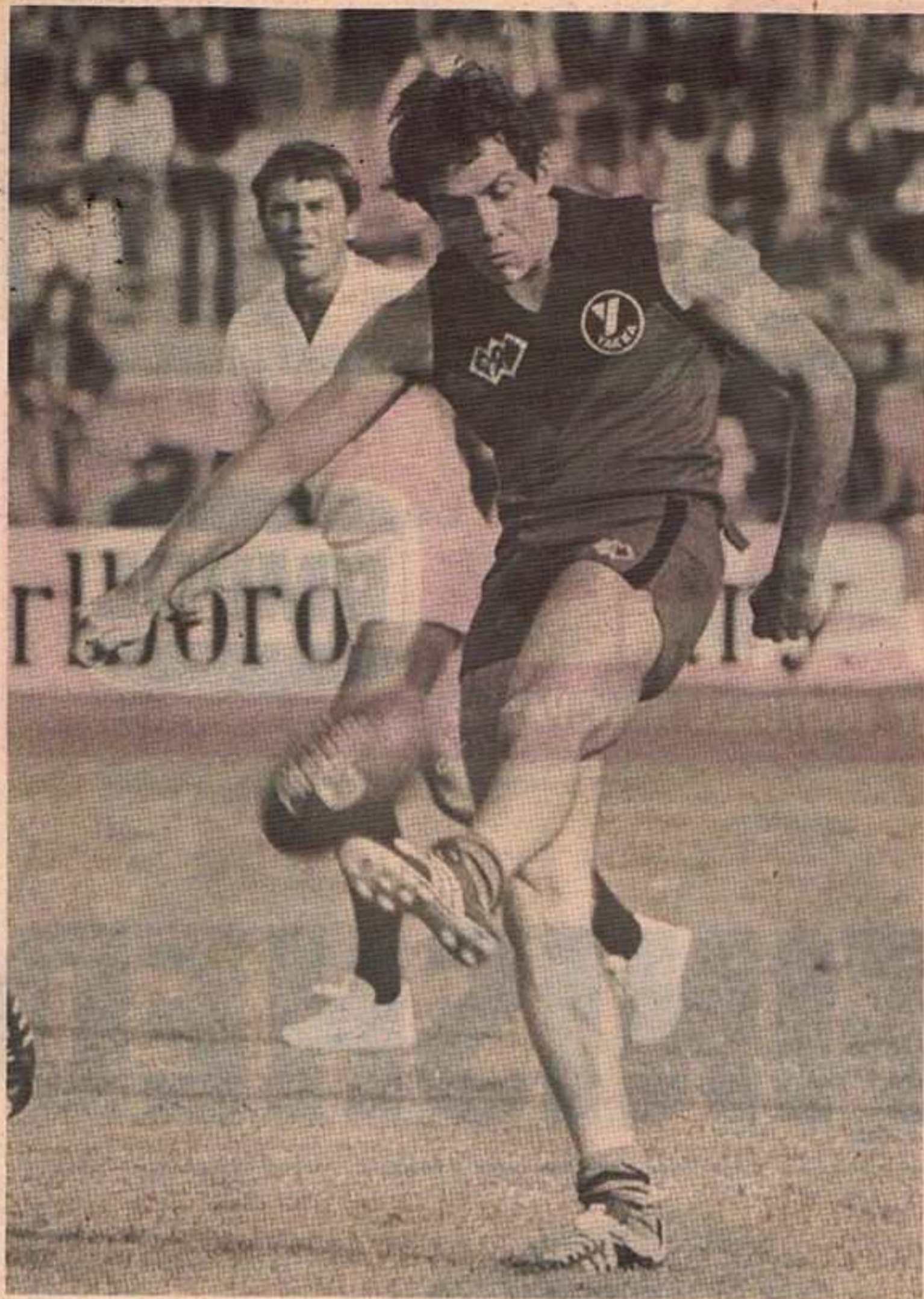

BROWN SURPRISES EVERYONE

South Fremantle coach Malcolm Brown must be laughing all the way to his insurance office

If any coach could have taken out insurance about their prospects of winning the opening three games, Brown would have resisted the invitation.

After all, four weeks ago he was not in a very happy frame of mind with half-a-dozen of his superstars on the injured list and he was looking at a side that seemed out of balance and lacking big men.

But in the opening weeks of the season, the courageous Bulldogs have risen to the challenge and the demoralising slaughter of fierce rivals — and 1979 grand final conquerors — East Fremantle has left the South camp cock-a-hoop.

If revenge is sweet, then crushing revenge must be sweeter and South can only go from strength to strength. They still have Ray Bauskis and/or Norm Uncle to bring in up forward and if Collingwood's Derek Shaw is really costing them something like \$1000 a game, then he won't be left in the reserves for too long.

So this week it will be poor old Subiaco who face the wrath of a smooth-running South side and even the influence of Ken Armstrong in the Lions Den won't help much.

Swans are also flying high. But then they felt entitled to be confident of winning their opening three games, providing they could catch East Perth off guard, which they did. Now if they can get over Claremont — at Claremont — this week, they will be looking the goods.

It is the even brand of consistency of

the Swans side that is impressing this season. Last year they would do everything right for 3 quarters, but then throw the game away with 30 minutes of poor football.

West Perth are the dark horses. But, as we said last week, they do have the ingredients needed to mould a match-winning side and with the imminent inclusion of Brian Adamson, their forward line will function even better.

This week they tackle Perth, who have not been disgraced in their start to a revival season and — like the Swans of old — it was only one bad lapse in the third term that really put them out of business last week.

What has happened to East Fremantle?

That question will no doubt be asked a thousand times this week as critics — professional and amateur alike — ponder the fate of last year's premiers.

Never before has a side fallen from top

to bottom in the space of 12 months — but East Fremantle will have to unearth some new spirit pretty quickly if they are going to keep ahead of Subiaco in the wooden-spoon battle.

This week they travel to Perth Oval and these two teams have staged some tremendous tussles in the past.

If ever East Fremantle were going to stage a revival it would have been last week as Derbies, traditionally, produce upsets and bring about unexpected happenings.

But that did not eventuate, so now coach Bradley Smith has to fire up his team to topple his old team-mates — and that won't be easy.

Most tipsters would have picked up four winners last week — except for those who still had faith enough to tip an Old East revival. That was a costly error of judgment.

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MORE WORK NEEDED IN THE JUNIORS

Do league football clubs do enough promotion in primary schools?

Some clubs work hard at fostering young talent in schools as well as running highly successful district competitions -- Peter Bosustow gave coaching clinics to more than 50 primary schools in the Perth district last season and Brian Peake has a busy schedule among schools in East Fremantle territory.

Ten years ago the market research students at the W.A. Institute of Technology carried a season-long survey of public attitudes to football.

More than 5,000 people were questioned and the result was that 37.61 per cent of league followers began to develop their interest in sport at primary school.

Only 8.74 per cent developed an awareness of the code in secondary school.

Most league football clubs still take a surprisingly low interest in primary schools and in players under the age of 13.

My 12-year-old son ended his primary school days last year at Kapinara (City Beach) without seeing one Claremont league footballer visit his school in the seven years he spent there.

When a Subiaco footballer who was due to present the end-of-season trophies to the Wembley Downs Junior Football Club did not turn up one year, I was called on to do his job.

Perhaps there's a moral somewhere in both these stories . . .

WESTSIDE FOOTBALL COMMENT

WAFI directors must be wondering about the sincerity of the Subiaco City Council after two recent moves.

In January this year, following months of negotiation, the league signed a 21-year lease of Subiaco Oval, accepting the responsibility for its development and maintenance.

Now the Council has served two demands concerning the use of the oval and its surrounds.

In the first move last week, the council's Health Department gave the WAFI 30 days to put their food handling facilities in order, or face the risk of having them closed down.

The council's move could cost the league up to \$8000. It involves alterations and modifications, the installation of exhaust fans, sinks and hot water supplies.

The question the league must be asking, is why these facilities were not made to comply with the Health Act while under the jurisdiction of the council itself.

The second move by the council came last Saturday when the public using the adjacent parking reserves were served with notices advising parking would, in future, be banned from those areas (see story page).

It appears that the Subiaco City council has drawn up a new set of rules for their new tenants . . . rules which were too tough for themselves to observe.

Josephs wined and dined the Spencer family and, amidst suggestions that Victorian medical circles could cure his groin and knee problems, Spencer was almost persuaded to pack his bags.

However, East Perth fortunately nipped the recruiting campaign in the bud and -- hopefully -- Spencer will be allowed to stay in WA and continue his battle for fitness.

It is time Victorian clubs -- and North Melbourne in particular -- stopped pestering our young stars, particularly after the season has started and when they have previously failed to win them across the border.

The liaison between East Perth and North Melbourne is far from being a healthy one in regards to our young talent. They not only had Ross Glendinning and Kevin Bryant in their camp before the two players had given just service; but they also have Grant Campbell, Spencer and Phil Kelly signed up for the future.

It's time WA clubs closed the doors to some of these hungry VFL talent scouts.

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ILL-FATED EDWARDS IN HOSPITAL

Brilliant Collingwood forward Allan Edwards is not only one of the most expensive recruits in the game — but he must be one of the most ill-fated.

The mercurial 22-year-old is currently in a private Melbourne hospital suffering from a broken bone at the bottom of his back — and that means a spell of about six weeks.

Just look at his previous injuries — broken ribs, damaged knee cartilages, punctured lung, dislocated shoulder . . .

His latest injury came within minutes of the final siren in last week's game against Richmond, his old side. Edwards lay motionless on the ground after a heavy pack collision and doctors immediately feared spinal injury.

He was carried off on a stretcher and rushed to hospital. It seemed as though Edwards had been kicked in the back.

Hawthorn coach David Parkin is not short of a few heated words when the time is right . . . and his outburst against VFL umpires this week pulled no punches.

"It was a fiasco," said an angry Parkin after Hawthorn had scraped home by three points against Fitzroy.

"One umpire lost complete control and nearly cost us the game."

Parkin was critical of a decision that went against Hawk rover Norm Goss and described it as the worst decision he had seen for 20 years.

The incident occurred when field umpire Peter Cameron penalised Goss after he had out-ran a Fitzroy defender and appeared to soccer the ball through for a goal, with the ball coming off his leg below his knee. The free kick was a mystifying result . . . and Parkin had every right to get upset. But it will probably cost him money.

The rumours are flying thick and fast in Melbourne circles about classy North Melbourne star Stephen Icke.

Icke, the talented and versatile youngster, has expressed a desire to move to WA — but there are too many VFL clubs after his services for that to happen.

However, North have made it clear that Icke will be staying right where he is.

North secretary John Dugdale says that four or five clubs are believed to be interested in winning Icke's services. At this stage Collingwood were the only side to seek permission to talk to Icke and that was flatly denied.

"Icke's services are definitely required by North and he's staying put," said Dugdale.

Billy Goggin, one of the great rovers of Victorian football, has taken up the coaching role at Geelong with a sizeable pay cut compared to his predecessor.

Goggin is accepting a 20 percent cut in the \$25,000-a-year contract that Rod Olsson had. And Goggin is proving to be more than just a bargain coach — he has become the idol of the Geelong camp and the fact that he has got the Cats in fifth place at the moment is making everybody happy.

Blond bombshell Mark Jackson — the boy who rocked South Fremantle last season — is booting goals madly for the Richmond reserves. But how do you fit him into the Tigers' senior side when they have State full-forward Michael Roach in the camp?

Big Percy Jones — the boom coach of the VFL — is holding himself well in reserve.

The man who was thrust into the coaching role at Carlton when the George Harris-Alex Jesaulenko affair blew up, has no immediate plans of putting himself into the side that has opened the VFL season with four straight wins.

Jones played the first half in the reserves against South Melbourne last week — just to keep himself in shape.

Currently Carlton have Mike Fitzpatrick and Warren Jones doing well in the ruck and big Perc is happy to watch from the sidelines as his team of stars prove that you don't really need a superstar coach.

Former East Perth and now North Melbourne defender Kevin Bryant will be out of action for at least another month.

Bryant is in hospital undergoing minor surgery to a knee injury.

GLENELG ANGRY OVER UMPIRING

South Australian football circles — and Glenelg in particular — are still hopping mad over the recent AFC Escort Championship match against North Melbourne.

North Melbourne, once the glamour side of the VFL, but now struggling along in the bottom half of the table, snatched a five-point win over Glenelg at VFL Park.

SA football fans saw the match on television — and even officials at the highest level are bewildered at the seemingly 'one-sided' and 'home-town' decisions made by Glen James, one of the two umpires.

Glenelg looked the better team and even non-Glenelg supporters have joined a wave of sympathy about the result.

The official verdict from Glenelg is summed up in the comment from the club's Football Director, Harry Kernahan: "I don't think I need to make any comment because everyone who watched the telecast would know how we feel."

The telecast indicated that James was either not seeing things too well or was looking after the home side. All night he handed out technical frees to North and appeared to ignore obvious kicks to Glenelg.

SA officials are calling for a stronger stand as far as the AFC matches are concerned. The time has come to insist on neutral umpires for all AFC games.

Lindsay Head, one of the all-time greats in South Australian football, has stuck his neck right out this week . . .

Mr Head, the jubilant president of West Torrens, has declared the new-look Eagles side now sitting in second position on the table, as the best side the club has fielded in 20 years.

Mr Head, a triple Magarey Medallist, says: "You can use all the adjectives you like. I've never seen a Torrens side play as desperately as this one. We have arrived."

Torrens coach Neil Kerley was pretty impressed with their strong last quarter, but in his usual way, he did not heap too much praise on the Eagles even though they downed Sturt by 16 points.

"We made a lot of errors and we need to improve in areas," he says.

Outspoken South Australian coach Daryl Hicks is not too happy with VFL umpires adviser Harry Beitzel.

Hicks is critical of the way Beitzel has introduced changes to the laws of the game in Victorian football. He agrees with some

of the changes, but feels that Beitzel has over-stepped the mark in making the changes, which should have been confirmed by the National Football League, the governing body in Australia.

Changes include lines across the centre circle to make umpires come in from the opposite direction; players allowed to run 15 metres without a bounce and limiting free kicks to 50 a match.

Hicks sees a need for uniformity and control and feels that the VFL should not be able to set dangerous precedents by allowing Beitzel so much freedom.

The SA club Woodville has provided more than their share of VFL players . . . and they have produced two more this season.

South Melbourne have John Roberts in their camp and Carlton have Phil Maylin across the border. Others to make the change have been Craig McKellar, Malcolm Blight and Ray Huppertz.

FLASHBACK...

George Doig showed early in his football career the form that would make him one of the State's greatest ever goal-sneaks. In a junior match in which his East Fremantle side defeated Palmyra 26.20 to 7.7 Doig scored his teams entire tally, 127 points.

"Doc" Returns to coaching post

Tasmanian football welcomed the return this season of one of its greatest sons — Darrel John Baldock. The man who became a legend in his own time has returned from a four-year-lay-off to coach his old club, Latrobe.

Not that he ever really deserted the game, although his job as a Tasmanian Parliamentary Minister made it difficult to spare time to follow the sport.

But he bobbed up every now and then as an adviser or even bench coach at Latrobe when coach Vin Waite was called elsewhere for intrastate or interstate duties.

Baldock is non-playing coach at Latrobe but it would not surprise me to see him shed the track suit one day and run on from the interchange bench. At 41-years-of-age he would still get more than his share of kicks.

It is hardly necessary to list Darrel Baldock's successes — they are well known and it would take pages to relate.

His career spanned 395 senior games from 1955 till 1975, ending with four games at New Norfolk in '75 when, as coach, he retired from the field.

Tasmanian football is delighted to have Baldock back in harness and looks forward to his continuing exploits.

The football boots controversy has flared up again . . .

The continuing battle between Adidas and Puma — the major suppliers of football boots in Australia — has come out in the open as the result of the WAFL Properties Division endorsing Adidas as an official product.

Puma, who did not take up the endorsement offer, have a number of leading players (including myself) on individual contracts.

The feeling of the Players' Association is that freedom of choice must be retained in the matter of boots.

While the Players' Association supports the concept of the Properties Division, we cannot accept the fact that the WAFL can tell players what boots to wear.

The association accepts the decision that a club can stipulate what boots a player must wear, providing the player agrees to that clause in his contract. If he does not agree to wearing a certain brand of boot, then it is up to the player to sort that out with his club.

We certainly hope the day doesn't arrive when the governing body tells ALL players what boots they must wear.

We do not have any objection to the WAFL entering into a sponsorship agreement with firms like Adidas — that is good for the game. But not to the extent where they can give exclusive rights to such companies.

MARLBORO'S MAGIC 12

It's a bit early to talk about winning 12 matches in a row . . . but the people out at Marlboro headquarters have that figure constantly on their mind.

Marlboro, a joint major sponsor of the WAFL, have offered a \$20,000 cash payout to any WA side that can win 12 consecutive qualifying games.

The target is difficult, but not impossible. In the last few seasons we have seen West Perth win 10 on end and East Perth record nine straight victories.

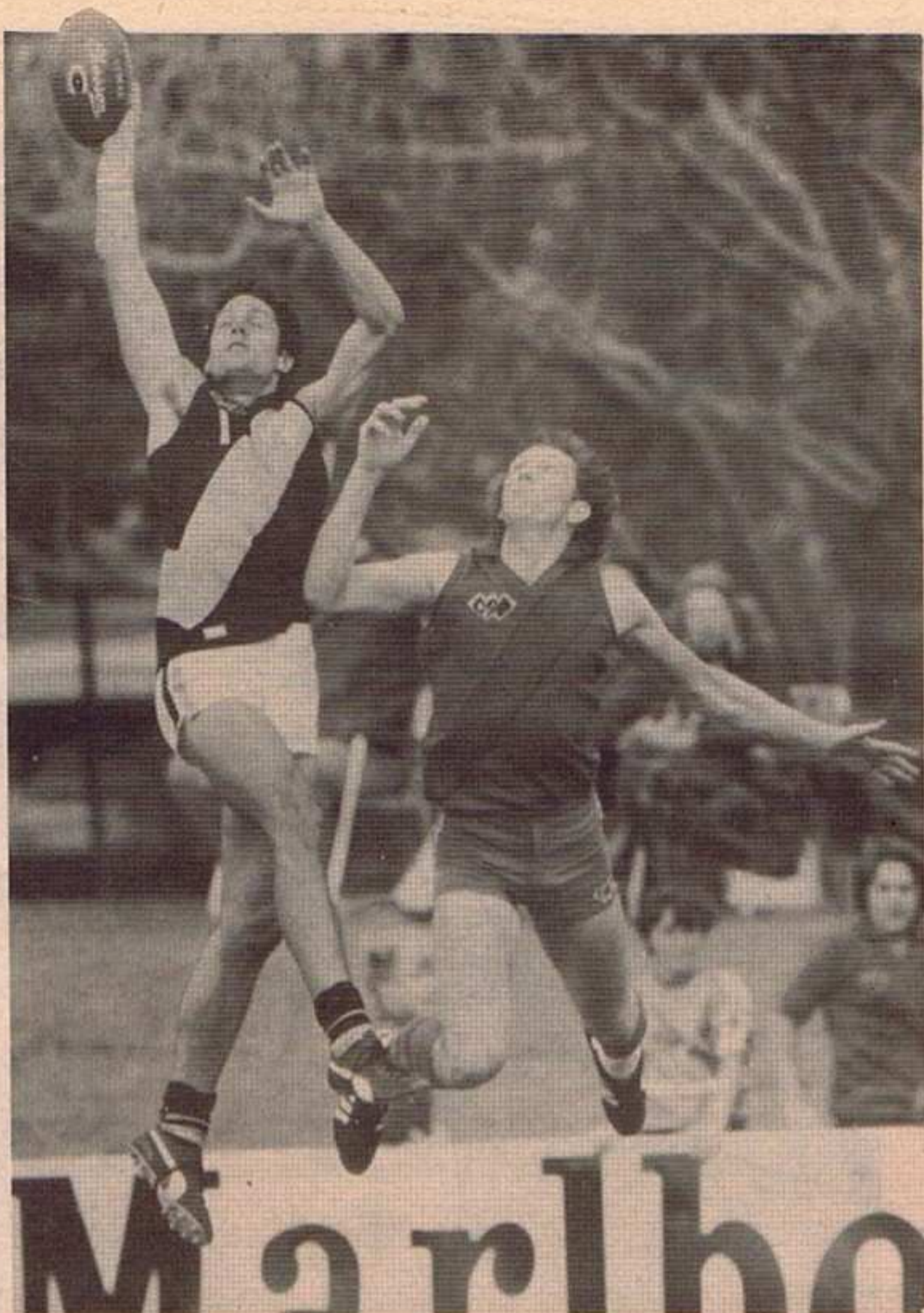
The stage is set so far with Swans and South Fremantle notching up a hat-trick of victories to open the season.

If both sides could win their next three encounters, the scheduled May 17 meeting between them at Fremantle Oval would draw a full house. That target is far from impossible. Swans are playing well enough to down Claremont, Subiaco and West Perth and South Fremantle's form is good enough to suggest that they can beat Subiaco, Claremont and East Perth.

Marlboro's state manager, Barry Milsome, would be a very happy man if he has to give the cash away.

Marlboro are probably well insured against the eventuality, but if a club starts to get near the magical 12-in-a-row target, then the pressure — and the publicity — would be enormous.

It would be a nice incentive for the club concerned — \$1000 a player almost.

DERBY DEBACLE

Last Saturday's one sided Derby was the first time in history that this traditional game between the two Fremantle sides has been won by a margin of over 100 points in senior football.

South's 107 point margin was the easiest win since they thrashed Old Easts by 98 points in 1952.

The Bulldogs score last week (28.13), was also their highest Derby score but the record for a Derby is 28.33, kicked by East Fremantle some 43 years ago (1937). (East Fremantle (33.24) beat South Fremantle (2.8) by 201 points in the under age competition in 1944.)

When Perth appointed Allan Joyce as coach this year it completed a remarkable sequence for former East Fremantle players.

It now means that an East Fremantle player has coached every club in the league in the post war era.

The other Old East players to coach other clubs were Ray Sorrell and Percy Johnson (South Fremantle), Jim Conway (Claremont), Charlie Strang (Subiaco), Jack Sheedy (East Perth), Ross Hutchison (West Perth) and Charlie Doig and Percy Johnson (Swan Districts).

Australia's first female football critic . . .

I HEARD quite a few grumbles last week about the charge of \$3 to go to the football nowadays.

I was quick to defend the cost of admission because I doubt if there's any other entertainment in the world that is so cheap for what you can get; after all it goes from 9.30 am to 5 pm and it's non-stop action.

But, I guess we have to listen to these people and see if there is something we can do for them. One major area of concern was at East Fremantle, where it costs an extra dollar to sit in the covered concrete grandstand. Now, I think that's reasonable, but someone pointed out that when it was constructed, there was an announcement that the 50c charge to sit there would help pay off the council loan. Now it's gone up to \$1, but we still don't know whether we are still paying off the loan or not.

Maybe we could press for a reduction back to 50c.

A QUESTION for Ray Scott, the WAFL umpires adviser.

What has happened to the 'in possession' rule that came in last year?

This rule, when players were penalised if they hovered over the ball and were deemed to be in possession, was a great move last year.

But umpires are not penalising it this year. Why?

CONGRATULATIONS to Barry Cable, particularly, and all those footballers who took part in the Walk Against Want.

I know that almost every colts, reserves and league player at South Fremantle was involved in this community charity event. I think it's tremendous that our footballers are part of such things.

I know they are called on for a lot of things such as interviews and special appearances and so forth, but it is heart-warming when they respond to community charity appeals such as this.

LET'S spare a thought this week for all the mothers and wives in football.

After our first wet weekend for the season, there must have been heaps of wet jumpers and clothes to wash and iron and it is one of those thankless tasks, especially getting rid of all that mud.

OPEN selection — I'm dead against the decision taken by the WAFL directors last week to give our State selectors an open hand when it comes to picking the team to play South Australia, in Adelaide, on June 14.

I can remember times when clubs like Swan Districts and East Perth had anything up to seven players in a State side — and it cost them dearly in terms of losing four premierships points.

It was interesting to see that State Coach Bradley Smith was against the idea, but our directors decided it would be in the best interests of the State to have open selection.

HAMILTON- 'ODD MAN OUT'

FINDS A NEW ROLE

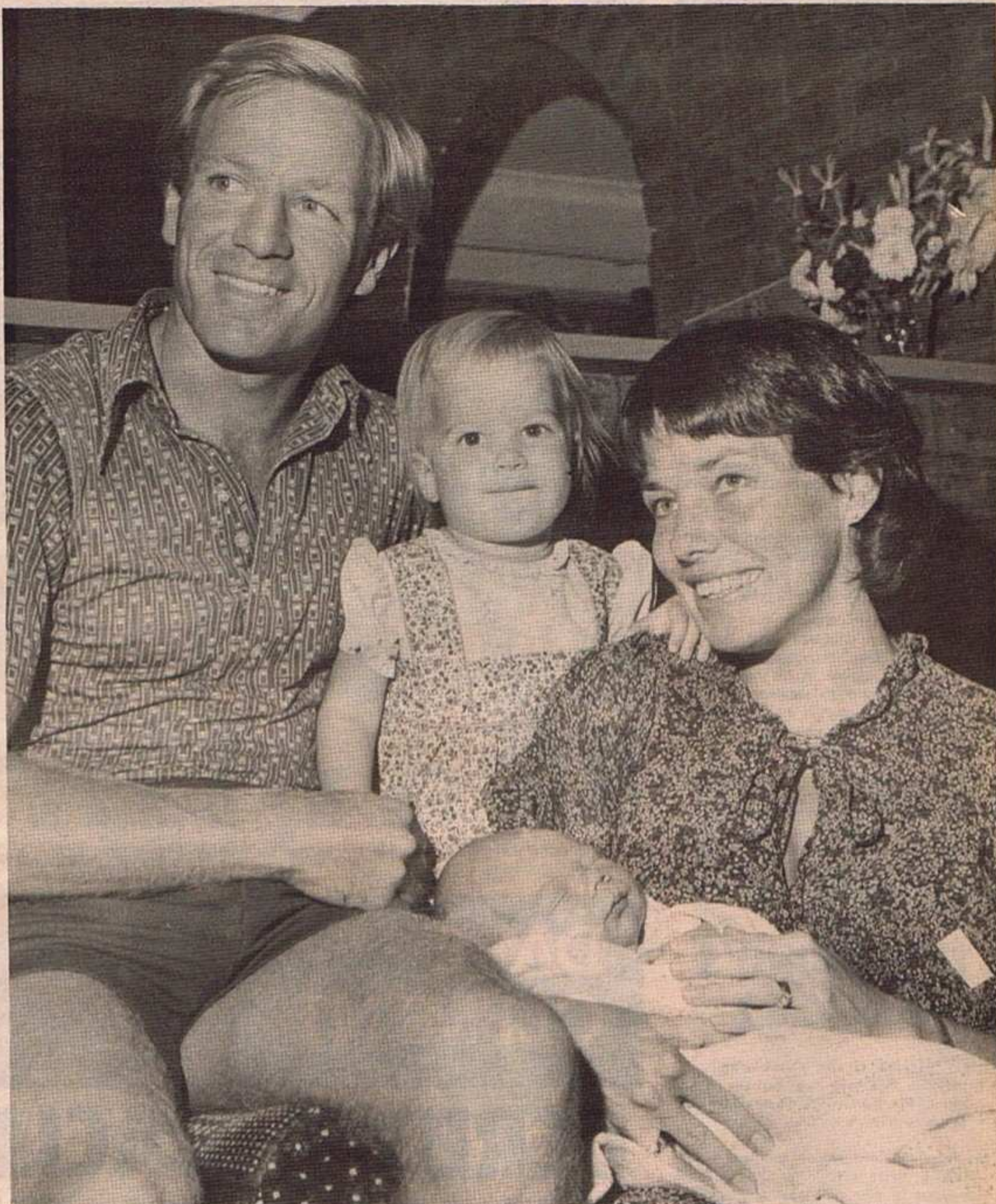
Living in the shadow of star players is a problem that has plagued many footballers over the years. Making the break to another club and quickly finding success is a remedy that requires a particular type of individual approach. Alex Hamilton has that approach.

Hamilton, the neat little blond-headed rover, was always destined to be the No. 3 rover at East Perth. No matter whether there was a Hans Verstegen, a Barry Cable or a Wayne Otway at the club, it was Hamilton who found himself the odd man out.

It is somewhat ironic that East Perth now lack frontline rovers, what with Cable retiring hurt, Peter Spencer still a doubtful quantity with injury and Larry Kickett proving better value at centre.

The offer came from Subiaco, a club in need of rovers, and the mutually-acceptable agreement saw Hamilton change colours. It was a successful merger with Subiaco, as Hamilton proved his worth by being a consistent No. 1 rover — and when he capped the year off by winning the club's fairest and best award, everyone at Subiaco was happy.

But Hamilton has stuck with Subiaco and in this interview with ALAN EAST he talks about his change of clubs.

You must have been fairly happy to cap your year of change by winning the fairest and best at Subiaco?

Yes, I was. At one stage half-way through the season I was feeling a bit homesick; even right from the start I felt that I had left something I didn't really want to leave. But I decided to make the best of it and I was really thrilled to win the fairest and best.

It must have been disappointing to always be regarded as a No. 3 rover?

It was. I had two good years under Polly Farmer and even when Barry Cable arrived, I was looking forward to playing under him. But at that stage I could see that he would continue playing and the struggle for the second berth would be between two or three rovers. I felt that at my age I would be better off to move elsewhere and be established.

Do you have any regrets now that Cable is unfortunately out of the game?

I did have talks with East Perth after the end of last season; but I've made the change and I had a good year at Subi, so I felt that I owed them something to stay with the club. I felt a bit committed to the club after having won their fairest and

best award and we have high hopes of improving this year.

It has almost become a refuge for East Perth players at Subiaco this year?

Yes. It becomes a bit embarrassing at training sometimes when a few of the Subiaco fellows jokingly suggest that we won't share the ball around.

Just looking at your own form, did you see any particular improvements come into your game at Subiaco?

Well, I think I have always been more of a defensive rover than an attacking player and at Subiaco, because we only won three games, I was probably playing better because I was in a side where my defensive skills were needed more.

What do you think was your best year at East Perth?

I think 1977, the second year when Polly Farmer was coaching. I finished third in the fairest and best that year.

Was it hard to change clubs?

No, it wasn't. I think that football is a part of every players' life and the guys are basically the same at each club. It didn't take long to get into the swing of things; they are the same sort of guys because you have the same interests.

Where did your early football start?

I started with Inglewood, playing all my junior football there. I then went to East Perth in 1972 and played a year in fourths I had a year in thirds and then about a season and a half in reserves before I forced my way into the league side.

What are your thoughts about your football future?

Well, at this stage we have two little children, so I feel as though I have to approach football year by year, just see how the family situation is. I've always wanted to go on in football for as long as I can, and I guess I'll keep going as long as I'm enjoying it.

What about Subiaco. Do you feel as though they have the capacity to lift themselves out of the bottom half?

Well, after only winning three games last year, I think we have to improve. We have had a lot of new recruits training with us and I think there will be a number of them who can make the grade. That will add strength to the league side and also add depth, which we lacked last year. With injuries and a lack of depth last season we just couldn't field a competitive side every week. But I feel we can overcome that this year.

To use your own words — last year you took on a side with talented players. From the results you obviously were able to motivate them.

Now you have to show that you are a top football coach.

Let's face it, you had a dream run last year. Football followers didn't really learn much about your coaching capabilities.

But now your coaching reputation is on the line.

Too often in WA football coaches have had instant success. They tend to get the credit for a side's performance. The people who have been overlooked are the coaches who have done all the ground work.

There is a very thin line between success and failure.

For example, Ross Smith is credited with having taken Subiaco to their first premiership in 49 years. But one wonders whether he would have achieved that goal if Haydn Bunton had not been at the helm of Subiaco in preceding years.

There were some players in that side who still believe that it was Bunton's premiership.

And what about Alan Joyce. I understand that I'm not one of his favourite people. He believes that I had a part in him getting the sack and being replaced by John Todd at East Fremantle — ah, such is the power of the press.

While I believe he has deficiencies in his coaching methods, I also believe that he went a long way to paving the ground for two of East Fremantle's premierships.



One of those belong to you, Brad. I was a little surprised after last week's Derby that you were not prepared to comment on the side's performance.

It annoys me that coaches are happy to bask in success, but aren't prepared to comment after their team has performed dismally.

You are now in a situation where you will have to prove just how good a coach you are. East Fremantle have slipped from crown prince to court jester and are now in danger of becoming the joke of the competition.

I believe there is too much tradition and pride at East Fremantle to allow that to happen.

This week you face your biggest test. So far old Easts have not even been a competitive side. It really doesn't matter a great deal whether you win against East Perth or not — what matters is that East Fremantle must again show that they are a competitive side.

From East's performance in the Derby I don't think they have anywhere near the talent of last year . . . but I also don't believe that there has been such an erosion of talent to force the club into its current predicament.

Brad . . . you had an intoxicating first year with East Fremantle. It is now time to learn the sober realities of football.

The reputation you won as a coach last year will fly out the window if East Fremantle continue to perform so dismally.

From what I saw in the Derby I think you've got a big job ahead of you this year just to rehabilitate East Fremantle.

Still, you won a premiership last year . . . so you must have something going for you.

Ross Smith left Subiaco in a blaze of glory after their 1973 premiership and returned last week as though nothing had changed. The supporters remembered and he was still a hero.

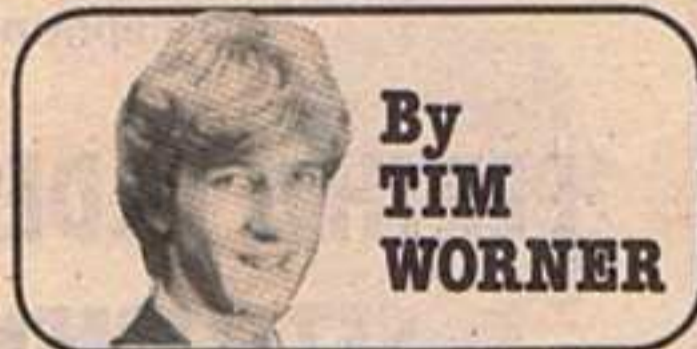
It must have been relieving for Smith, especially after the hassles he has had to face at St. Kilda, to be welcomed so well.

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Chubby's Chatter



SUPPORTERS! — They are the parents of sons playing in junior football teams in the metropolitan area.

Too many times do I see and hear some of these parents walking along the boundary lines screaming and abusing the umpires, opposition players and even boys in the team they are supposedly supporting.

They do not realise that this encourages the players to also argue and abuse the umpires and thus give away unnecessary free kicks. This behaviour gives them a bad name and, more importantly, their club gets a poor reputation.

It is hard enough to find umpires for junior sports and it is unfair that these people, whose remunerations are small, should be exposed to such abuse.

Encourage your players and leave the umpiring and coaching decisions to the people appointed to these positions.



Still on the junior football scene which is, after all, where our future league players come from.

It is noticeable in junior football that there are coaches who do not teach juniors the skills and fundamentals of football and put too much emphasis on fitness and winning.

Most boys in junior football are fit from just everyday exercising and playing.

One particular instance which brought this subject to my notice was an incident where a 10-year-old was given laps for mis-kicking the football. One wonders what this would be doing to the youngster's confidence. Every time he kicked a ball wrong he was punished and to my way of thinking, this is not what junior football is all about.

Football skills are an important part of the game and it is something which is lacking in the game today.

Coaches should be encouraged all the way as they give up a great deal of their time for these budding footballers of the future. But please, have your priorities in the right perspective. Of course, everyone likes to win, but losing isn't everything.

If coaches should ever need help with their job, I'm sure the particular league clubs in their areas would be only too happy to provide information or assistance needed.



Back to league ranks.

After seeing West Perth play Claremont last week I was most impressed by the Cardies backline. They were very tight and determined and not only kicked the ball over long distances, but always to a teammate. The Ross Gibbs/Neil Fotheringham combination worked together as if they were veteran partners in the game. I was most impressed with Gibbs, I think he has a great future. The half-back line of Laurie Heal, Bill Duckworth and Shane Fitzsimmons hardly let a ball past them; Lindsay McGuinness also filled the position well when he replaced Fitzsimmons for part of the match.

PARKING SCANDAL

Bureaucracy has once again put the boots into West Australian football followers.

In the latest move, the Subiaco City Council has banned parking in the reserves adjacent to Subiaco Oval.

Motorists using the reserves at the eastern end of the oval last Saturday were served with warning notices signed by the Subiaco City Town Clerk, J.F.R. McGeough, advising that in future parking would be prohibited in the area except for special occasions (presumably finals).

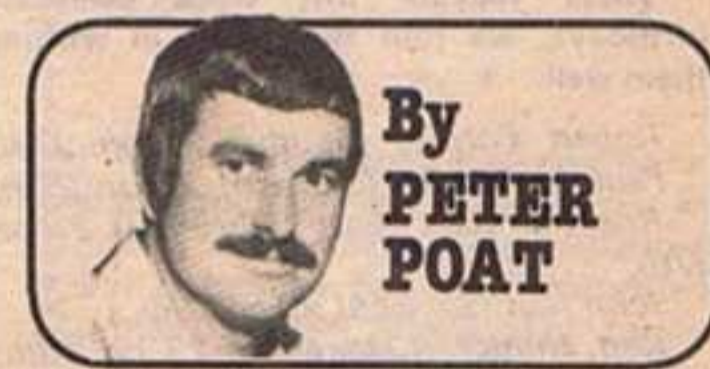
This move is similar to one made by the Perth City Council, which banned parking in the reserve adjacent to Leederville Oval several years ago.

The football public was dealt a severe blow last year when the State Government discontinued the rail service which served Subiaco, Claremont and Fremantle Ovals and provided a direct linkup for supporters from those areas to commute to Lathlain, Bassendean and Perth Oval.

This move particularly affected the young and elderly supporters who found the railway the easiest and most direct mode of transport.

The latest move by the Subiaco City Council has now affected the most popular mode of transport to football matches... the motor car.

Both Subiaco and Leederville ovals are

surrounded by busy road systems which make on-street parking difficult. The authorities concerned have done nothing to ease the parking problems created by their own actions.

Private business concerns who apply to councils to build premises, must include plans for sufficient off-street parking, particularly when such businesses will attract big numbers of patrons.

It seems as though the rules these authorities apply to the general public don't count when it comes to their own application.

Football clubs, and particularly the WAFL, should not take kindly to this latest move and should approach the Subiaco City Council to revoke their ruling.

It would also be opportune for similar pressure to be brought to bear on the Perth City Council in respect to Leederville Oval.

Campbell made his debut on a wing and then moved to the half-forward line — but not before he had played in a reserves premiership side.

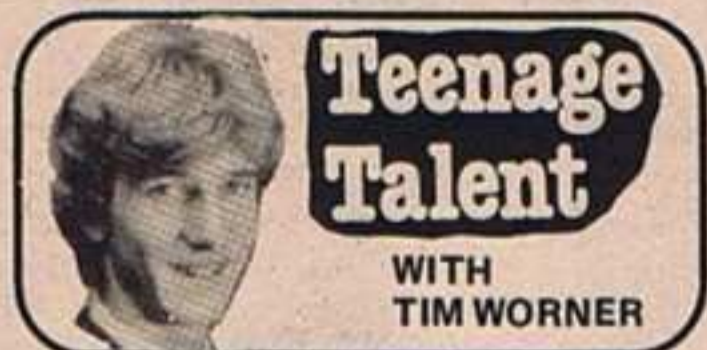

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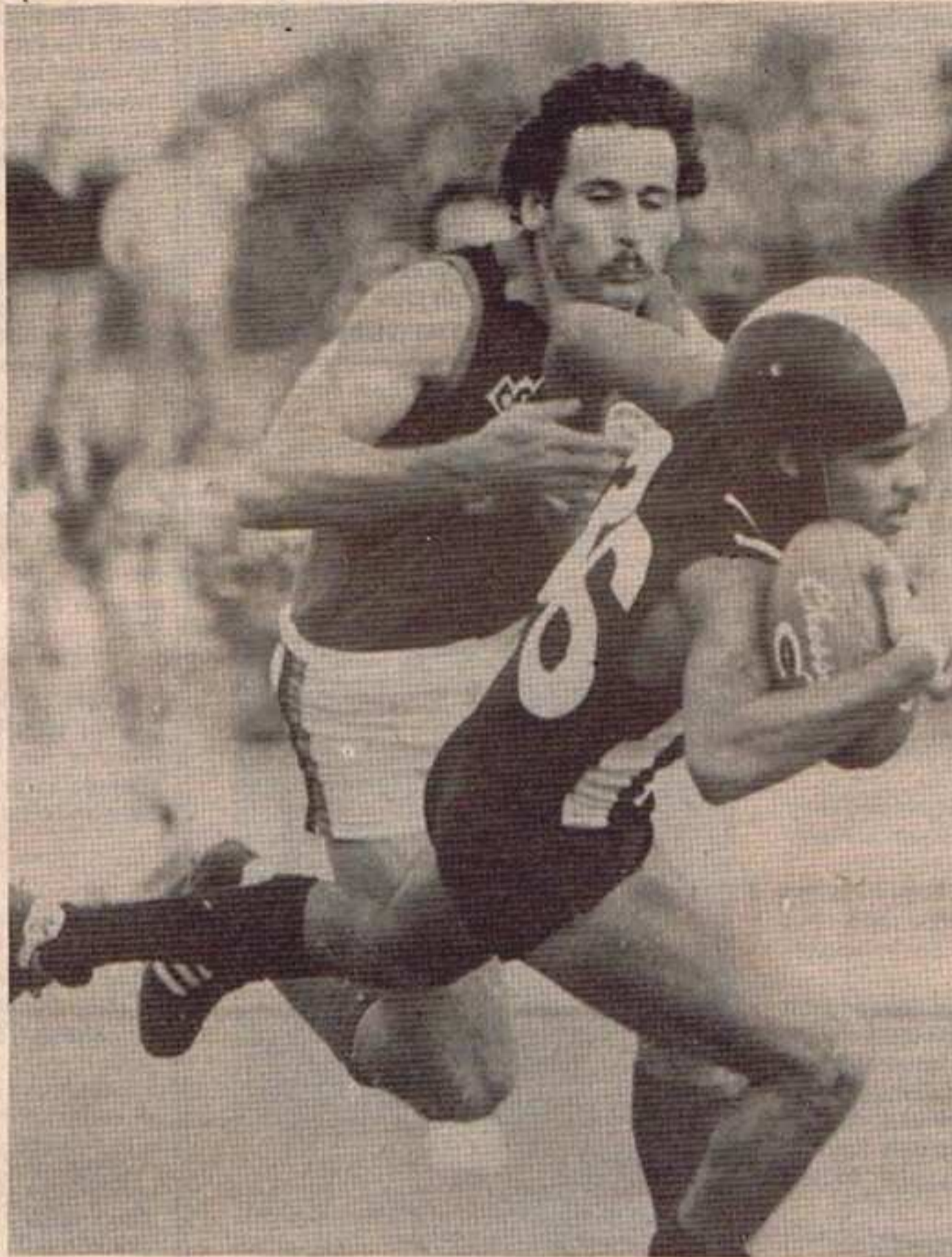

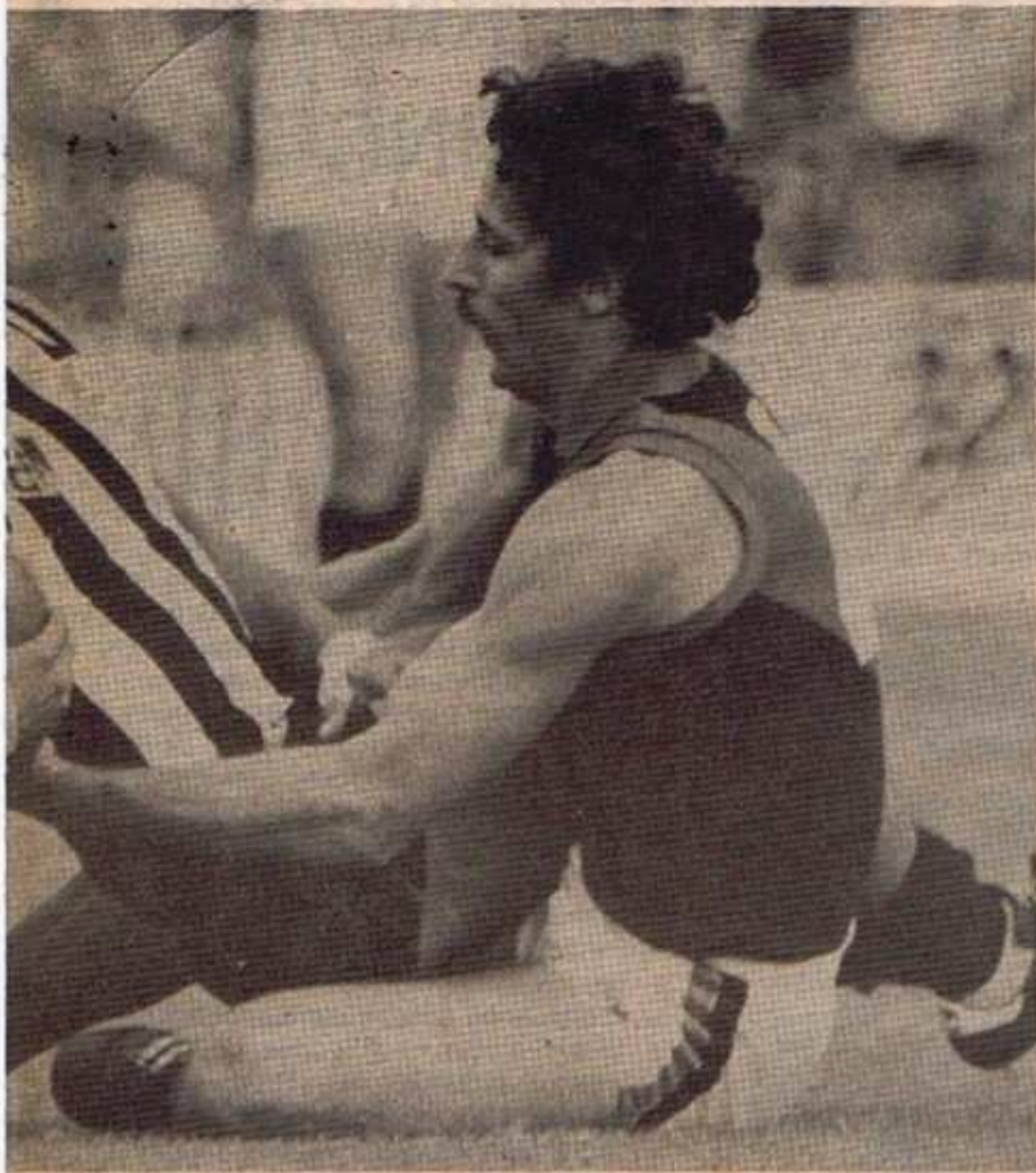

KARRINYUP'S PROUD RECORD

The Karrinyup Junior Football Club is one of the strongest and most progressive clubs in the Subiaco district.

In the past 10 years, Karrinyup teams have collected 13 premierships, five runner-up and three minor premiership pennants. This year, they are fielding 13 teams in Subiaco junior competitions.

The club operates on an annual budget of about \$18,000, two-thirds of which comes from fund-raising schemes such as a continuous bottle drive, raffles, quiz nights, river trips and the efforts of a hard-working mothers' club.

In the past six years, Karrinyup's senior teams have made three trips to Geelong, Melbourne and Sydney. The Seventeens will be heading East again at the end of this season as guests of the Bayswater club, Melbourne.

The club sends at least one side a year to the Goldfields and individual teams organise many country trips themselves.

Karrinyup claims to be WA's first junior club to adopt coloured shorts for players and printed T-shirts and club jackets for players, members and supporters.

The club had a humble beginning in 1966 when the first meeting was held in Ron Martin's garage opposite Stoneman Reserve - now Karrinyup Oval. The area was mostly bush and Karrinyup's two 1966 teams had to train in sand on the road verges.

Karrinyup Oval is still the club HQ, only now it is grassed, floodlit and the club shares a changeroom-clubroom-storeroom building with other sporting groups.

Home ground for the four senior teams is Millington Oval, which has similar facilities and is shared with the Scarborough amateurs and Stirling Baseball Club.

Karrinyup life members are Percy Taylor, who got the club off the ground, Arthur Cochrane, John Byrnes and Morrie Sullivan. Murray Howard and Ron Tester are to be nominated this year.

Past-presidents are K. Reid 1966, P. Taylor 1967-70, J. Williams 1970-71, G. Hamersley 1971-72 and A. Cochrane 1972-79. Ron Tester is current president. Cochrane and Byrnes are also life members of the Subiaco Junior Council.

League players who have worn the Karrinyup blue and white colours in their junior days are Gary Fathers, Neil Savage, Gary Addison, Gary Tuckwell, John Dimmer and Wayne Blackwell.

Current Subiaco Colts who come from Karrinyup are Gary Tester (captain), Laurie Keene, Steve Crawford and Clayton Power.

Karrinyup boys who have notched up 150 club games are Dave Veaney, David Spinks, Clayton Power, Steve Dickson, Neil Herd, Gary Wilson, Gary Tester and Neil and Rod Savage.

One of the club's proudest achievements has been the effort of coach Murray Howard and manager John Byrnes. After forming a midgets team in 1970, they went undefeated through that year, 1971, 1972, 1973 and 1974.

The super team chalked up a sequence of 79 wins and in the process beat many visiting teams and combined sides from other league districts.

Murray Howard, the club's senior coach has collected seven premierships for Karrinyup and two for Subiaco combined sides.

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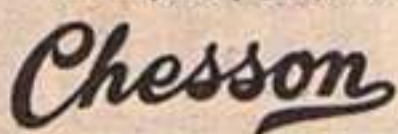

Former Swan Districts full forward, Mike Leroy, has been the key to Mandurah's solid performances so far this season.

Kennedy is optimistic Mandurah will be a strong force in the competition this season.

Great Northern National Football League Umpire Bruce McVee notched up his 200th league game in the first round of fixtures this season. He has been umpiring for 11 years and hopes to umpire another ten in the hope of reaching the 300 game milestone.

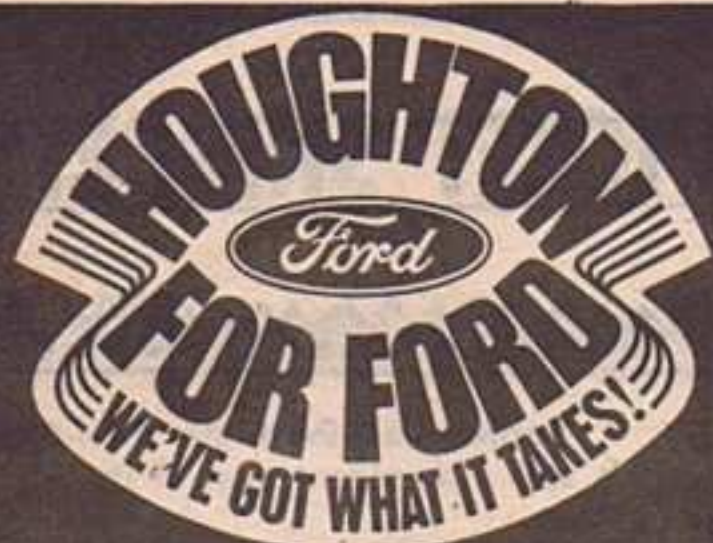

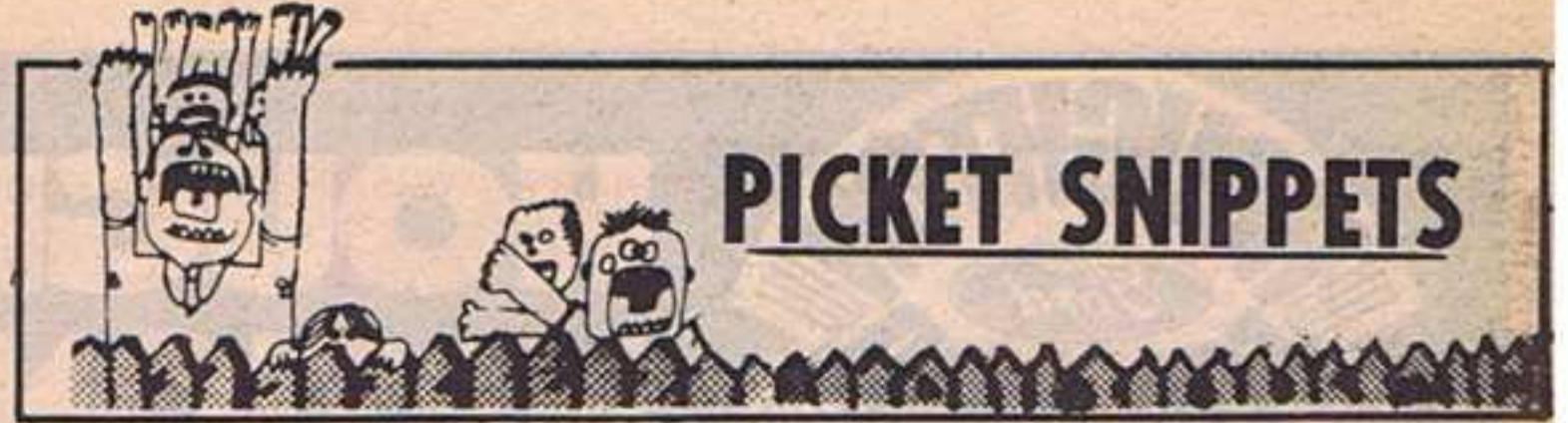
