BULLDOGS TELL VICS:

HANDS OFF OUR STARS

South Fremantle have given talent-hungry VFL clubs the heave-ho on Maurice Rioli and Stephen Michael.

Letters from the Bulldogs' solicitors have lobbed on the desks at Richmond and Geelong saying that Rioli and Michael will be at Souths till their contracts expire.

The slippery centreman is contracted till 1982 while the lean ruckman has signed till the end of 1981.

And until those times are up, Souths want their two star players to concentrate on winning games for the Bulldogs.

South Fremantle secretary-manager Ross May said the letters simply reminded the VFL clubs that the two players were under contract.

"We told the clubs that we would appreciate them not pressuring the two while they still have contracts with us," Mr May said.

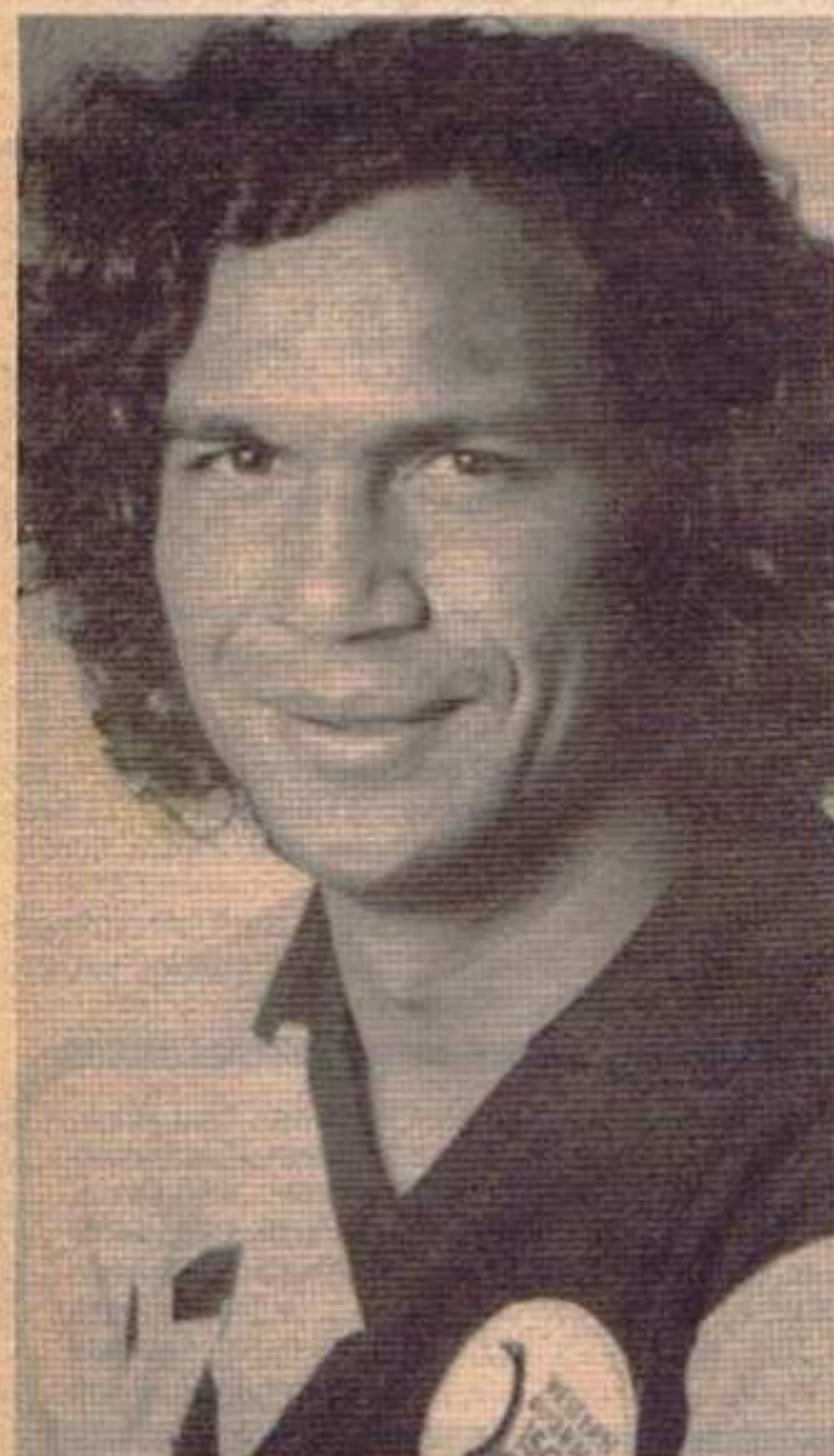
"When they get hold of a player, it's pump, pump, pump. It drives a person mad."

Mr May said Souths had adopted a low-key approach to the problem, but wanted to make their feelings perfectly clear to the two VFL clubs.

He said the VFL clubs were welcome to make approaches after the contracts had elapsed.

Mr May hinted at possible legal action if a VFL club induced a player to break a contract.

Richmond have also signed Brad Hardie, the tearaway youngster, who should not be looking to move East till 1985.

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MOTIVATION - IT COMES IN MANY FORMS

One of the most difficult tasks for any coach is the continual struggle to effectively motivate players to produce their best week after week through an extremely long and demanding season.

Some of the champions such as Graham Moss, Brian Peake, Peter Spencer, Noel Carter, Steven Michael and Graham Melrose are able to perform consistently well because they motivate themselves.

But the average league footballer needs continual stimulation to produce his best each week.

When players are highly motivated, they perform the desperate tasks of football, e.g. throw themselves on an opponent's boot as he kicks.

They fight more fiercely for the ball, they run faster and longer and they have a fanatical desire to win.

Wayne Otway, Kim Trew, Steve Curtis and Basil Campbell are good examples of players that can produce this desperation football.

The power of motivation is enormous. It wins games and premierships. Imagine being able to motivate players so that they perform to their maximum in every match.

If the brilliance of players such as Jim Krakouer, Kevin Taylor, Murray Couper and Peter Bosustow could be stretched over 100 minutes every week, they would win a Sandover Medal with ease.

Motivation is a powerful force which is sometimes difficult to control. Today's football often produces patchy form with large differences in scores between teams that look very even on paper.

The highly specialised pre-match "psyching-up" of players often has an opposite reaction if the team falls behind on the scoreboard. They can be beaten by a score that is not indicative of the skills difference between the two teams.

The clever coach will recognise a motivational opportunity when it arises and use it with telling effect. It may be the death of a popular figure around the club and the players must "Win it for Him".

Perhaps a team-mate's 200th game could provide the necessary incentive. Even the chasing of a club record can motivate players e.g. Swans 12 straight wins for \$20,000.

Sometimes to see a team-mate physically roughed-up can inspire players, e.g. last Saturday when Frank Bucknall was heavily felled, the Subiaco players reacted strongly and this provided the incentive for them to go on and beat West Perth.

Motivation can be part of a coach's pre-meditated strategy. As Graham Campbell did with West Perth before the Swans game in the second round.

He worked hard all week to prepare his players psychologically for the all-important clash. He did a remarkable job as his charges produced a top performance and went within two points of toppling the then unbeaten league leaders.

Unfortunately, a psychological reaction may have set in since then, but Campbell is a powerful motivator and West Perth won't be down for long.

Mal Brown is the king of motivators. He very successfully takes advantage of any media reports that depict South Fremantle as down on form, injury ridden and likely to lose.

He throws these reports back at the players and allows their pride to do the rest. In the past he is reputed to have engaged a hypnotist in order to motivate his players.

Currently he has his players going a few rounds in the ring with Laurie Flanders (a champion boxer) before a game, to sharpen up their reflexes, toughen their attitude and motivate them.

Then there was the Victorian coach who loosened the screws on the hinges of the

door leading from the changerooms to the oval.

After firing up his players with a highly exciting oratory he showed his players what desperation was all about by leading them out. He charged the door, flattened it and kept running. What better inspiration for his team!

Coaches often use films as pre-match motivators on such topics as world title fights, grid-iron games or past V.F.L. grand finals.

Inspirational music is often played in clubrooms before a game. Table tennis has been used to sharpen up reflexes and improve concentration before the match.

Motivation talks are given by special guests before a game such as Subiaco, who invited Ross Smith from Victoria for a pre-match address.

Players' bus trips to the game and training runs an hour before the game have all been tried. Money itself, surprisingly is not a great motivator, but PRIDE certainly is. Although many motivators have already

SELF DISCIPLINE

How important is self-discipline?

Any league player can do the easy things, but it's doing the tough difficult tasks under pressure that really count.

All good footballers have strong self-discipline or control over their thoughts, actions and emotions, not only in games but also in their approach to training and their habits in private life.

Important games, including finals, are often won in the last quarter when players are extremely tired and often carry minor injuries.

When the pressure is really on it's easy to give in to pain and tiredness but the good player with strong self-discipline will grit his teeth, fight off pain and tiredness and keep playing well. This takes great courage.

Two players from past years who stood out as strong and self-disciplined and did not know the meaning of pain or giving in were Haydn Bunton (jnr.) and Kevin Clune.

These players exist in every era and are around today, such as Ken Hunter, Brian Peake, Steve Curtis and Stan Nowotny; and of course the little master of self discipline Barry Cable.

Self discipline also applies to doing what the coach wants and what is best for the team, rather than what the player wants.

Glory seekers and grandstanders are not self-disciplined and could cost clubs dearly.

So self discipline is a very important factor in winning tight pressure games, especially final round matches.

been tried, the best is yet to come.

Clubs and coaches are still only really scratching the surface of the awesome power of motivation. The future could see full-time psychologists as common place at football clubs and maybe even a hypnotist to really cement the coach's ideas.

Perhaps we will see mental brain-washing with players hooked up to a specially programmed computer. Do you like the thought of a bionic footballer with a microchip implanted in the skull that can be activated by the coach to motivate as and when required?

Maybe even acupuncture as a means of relaxation and motivation.

How about sex as a motivator; one of Australia's top swimmers admitted that she had sex before an Olympic swim and it motivated her to a gold medal.

Meditation is perhaps another means of motivation for some. To get players thinking, perhaps quiz sessions or games of chess.

There is no limit to the motivational ideas that could be tried.

The search for new and exciting avenues of motivation will - and must - go on for coaches to keep their teams at top pitch game after game.

Large amounts of money will be spent on motivation by clubs in their continual quest for that elusive premiership.

THE UMPES

Umpires have come in for their fair share of criticism lately, but I would like to come out in their defence.

Umpires take the field the same as players with an Umpires Adviser watching their every move and awarding them points.

If they don't perform well enough then they are relegated, the same as a player.

They don't have supporters to "butter" them up after a game, there are no cash incentives offered or special awards. So clubs should welcome them on all occasions, be it good, bad or indifferent.

Coaches should invite umpires to training sessions, to get to know players and to instruct players on the rules.

Umpires are only human, let's treat them with a little respect. Try and see the good things they do as well as the bad.

Next time you see a decision you disagree with, instead of booing, put yourself in his place and maybe you'll see it a little differently.

Two last thoughts on umpires; firstly, one goal umpire is enough; secondly, let's try four boundary umpires for league games.

With the speed of the game today the two can't keep up the pace all day.

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WESFARMERS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIP PREVIEW P.15-16

RON ALEXANDER



There has been a lot of speculation in football circles of late about the future of Ron Alexander, the former East Perth captain.

Alexander, a 6ft. 5in. big man who has thrived in the VFL arena in recent years, capping his career by captaining Fitzroy, is on the lookout for greater things in the game.

He has always expressed a keen desire to coach and Alexander, a deep-thinking player and a man who commands considerable leadership respect, is interested in returning to his home state.

His years in the VFL have taught him many tricks; taught him how to survive in probably the toughest sector of the Victorian scene — in the ruck, where big men often win Brownlow medals and dominate the awards; the glory and the publicity.

His fervent loyalty for Western Australia generally comes out in the State-of-Origin carnivals. Alexander has been in each of the four State-of-Origin games against Victoria and he has never let his State down. He is not blessed with the acrobatic skills of a Peter Moore or a Mike Fitzpatrick; nor is he blessed with the pace of a Stephen Michael. But he has a big heart, tons of courage and a fierce loyalty to the players around him, especially the little men.

His years at Fitzroy have earned him the utmost respect, not only within the club but within the whole VFL structure. He served a term as president of the powerful VFL Players' Association and was instrumental in the WA body of players getting their association together.

Alexander is a keen weekly reader of Westside Football and in this interview with ALAN EAST he gives some clues to his future plans.

Fitzroy ruckman has sights on a coaching job

Q: How have you enjoyed your years in Victoria?

A: I enjoy it. I've had a great time, this is my fifth year and I've learnt a lot and it has been part of my objective to learn as well as playing. Football is No. 1 in Victoria and it's exciting to play.

Q: What are some of the things you've learnt?

A: Well, my first two or three years in football weren't too good. I suppose you could say I was a bit violent even. That detracts from your game. So I've learnt to control myself. You have to play the game hard, but I think I was immature in those early years. I'd get an elbow in the ear or see a team-mate go down and I'd lose control, now I still play a physical game, but it's a controlled game.

Q: How many years of football do you think you've got left in you?

A: Another four or five years I think. I've just played my 200th league game — 98 with East Perth and just over 100 with Fitzroy.

Q: You would like to get those two extra games with East Perth to make the century?

A: Of course, that would be nice. But I'll have to look at it and see what's going.

Q: Just going back to your early days at East Perth. When and where did you start?

A: I first played fourths at East Perth; a full year there with them, then half a year in thirds and reserves and then the next year back to thirds before making reserves at the end of 1970. I found it hard in the beginning, I probably just wasn't ready. I was only 19 or 20 when I first played league and even in 1971 I was dropped for one or two games. But since the start of the 1973 season I've only missed two games. I've played about 60 games in a row now without a break. The last game I missed was at the end of 1977, with a broken finger.

Q: You must have been very proud to be elected captain of Fitzroy, being a West Australian?

A: Yes, but I was a lot prouder when we were winning games, not losing. Last year, when I was elected captain, was a good year and we took off. But this year we have fallen in a hole and it's up to the whole side to get us out.

Q: Has it been hard leading a side that is struggling, as Fitzroy have this year?

A: There is plenty of pressure, but I think that's part of being captain, you have to cope with it and I like to think that I can cope with it and help the side win a few more games in the remainder of the season.

Q: You had a leading role in the VFL Players' Association too, didn't you?

A: Yes, I was president for two years, but I stepped down at the start of this season. I'm still involved as the Fitzroy representative. It was a fairly influential group in so much as we did get players' views across. But we still haven't got

official recognition. We need to go to the arbitration system, to be officially recognised. But the VFL lobby against us is very strong.

Q: Do you see these leadership roles as being good grooming for the day when you tackle coaching?

A: Well, I have got coaching stacked away in the back of my mind somewhere, but you have to have an opportunity first. I think the leadership experience is very handy. I don't enjoy just being one of the troops, I like to have my two bobs worth.

Q: What have been the highlights of your years in the VFL?

A: Definitely last year, captaining the side for the first time and making the finals for the first time in 20 years. It was an exciting year, we won about 16 or 17 games and the attitude was right. Also the State-of-Origin concept has been enjoyable. I like playing for WA and though it was a thrill when I played for Victoria, it's an even bigger thrill playing for WA.

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GOALS!

There wasn't much doubt about the winner of Town and Country's \$100 cheque for the goal-of-the-day on Channel 7's World of Football last week... it was just a question of deciding which of Philip Krakouer's three brilliant goals should be given the honour. Krakouer was in blistering form, not only around the goals either, and apart from the three he kicked himself, he set up many others. His first earned the award — and it was Krakouer at his speediest as he received the ball at centre-half-forward, slipped as he turned for goal, but could still recover his feet, elude an East Perth defender with that brilliant acceleration and drop it neatly on to his left foot for Claremont's fourth.

Still with the Krakouer goal-kicking feats... don't let anybody tell you that Jim and Phil DON'T look for each other on the field! They seem to have extra-sensory perception when they get the ball and direct it downfield. Take Claremont's fourth and fifth goals for example. Jimmy won the ball in the centre and picked out Phil on the half-forward line for him to kick the \$100 goal and seconds later Phil repaid the favour with a brilliant handpass to Jim, who goaled from close range.

South Fremantle skipper Noel Carter is taking all before him this season... and the Sandover Medal could be his ultimate achievement. However, it is his goalkicking that is currently under notice and he produced a couple of snap shots last Saturday against Perth that were absolute gems. The way Carter always gives himself time to line up the goals when he wins the ball around the forward zone is quite incredible.

Back to Phil Krakouer again... many fans at Claremont were a little mystified when Krakouer hit the post in the second quarter, but booted a major seconds later. In fact, after his first shot deep from the left forward pocket hit the post he was given a free kick — and made sure of the goal second time around.

It's good to see last year's top goalkicker Kevin Taylor back in form. Taylor produced one of his long, raking goals against Swan Districts — and it really had the fans gasping. It was East Fremantle's eighth goal — and it just kept on floating after he booted it out of the centre.

Claremont's Clayton Lewis certainly deserved the goal he kicked to bring up his side's 14th major against East Perth. Lewis chased the ball towards the boundary line deep in the forward pocket and literally threw himself through the air to mark it just inside the line. Then, from right on the arena fence, he steered the shot through the big sticks.

Both players are picking up more free kicks this season than anybody else, mainly for staging.

And the umps can't do a thing about it.

Peake and Neesham have developed the talent of getting in the right place at the right time and then the slightest nudge sends them reeling... sometimes they don't even need the nudge!

The result is the same... a free kick. Neesham used these tactics to perfection last week against South Fremantle and picked up half a dozen frees.

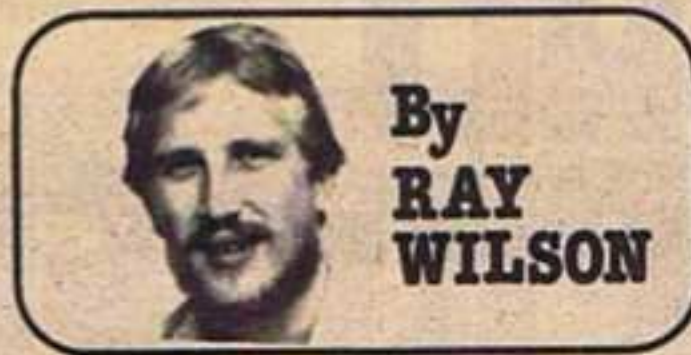
Peake has been doing the same thing all year. It was most evident in the State-Of-Origin game.

It's not wrong. Any measure used to win a game (or at least anything a player can get away with without bending the rules too much) is worth doing.

Peake and Neesham are intelligent enough to get the frees. Good luck to them.

Both deserve the reputation of being tough customers. They give as much as they get.

What enables them to get the nod so often from the umpires is the simple fact of getting to the ball first.

If they get near the ball and realize that a break-away is not on, an opposition player is manoeuvred into a position where he obliges with a touchy tackle.

It's then a matter of arms flung high, body thrust forward... the necessary actions to get that vital kick.

It's an artful ability that few players have. Winning a free kick this way has become part of the game. It's creeping in like the drop kick crept out.

Peake and Neesham — trendsetters in the field — know the exact time to pull the trick.

It's usually when they have their backs to the umps, when the degree of interference, or in fact whether there has been any at all, can't be estimated.

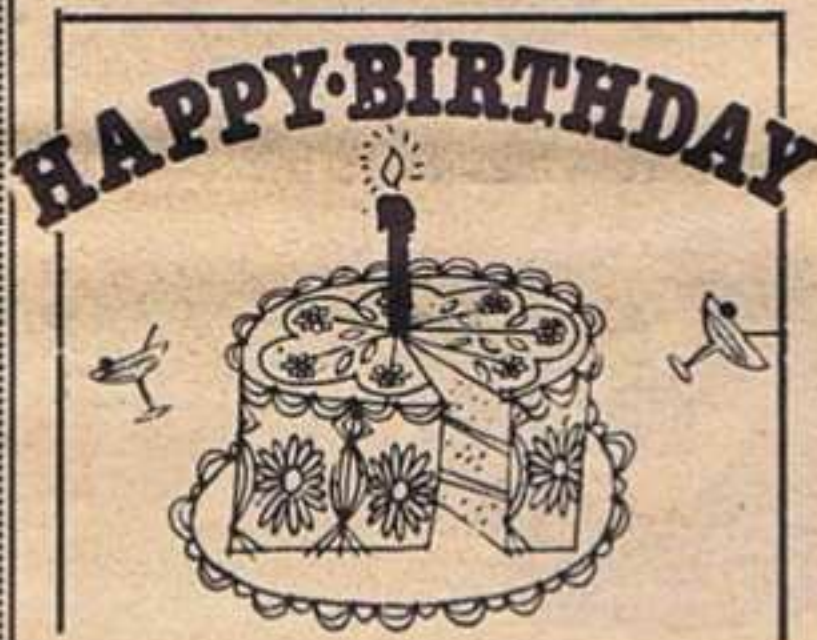
Some players, good players included, just haven't got what it takes to make the grade as a first class actor on the field.

An example is George Michalczyk — a top class footballer — who can't act his way out of a paper bag.

George simply overdoes the reaction. He sometimes makes it appear as though he's been clouted by the Indian-Pacific in full flight.

Teammate Ian Miller could out-act George any day and he is another player who knows how to get the best out of umpires.

But it would take a first-class stager to beat the abilities of either Neesham or Peake to persuade an umpire to blow the whistle in their favour.

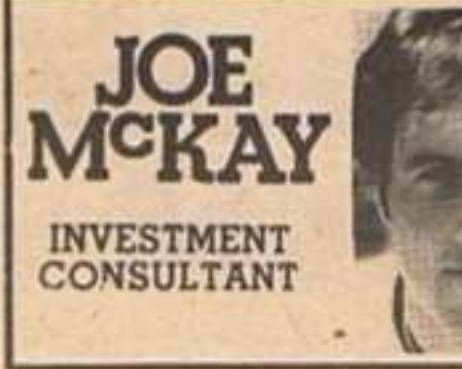


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Australia's first female football critic....

Joe McKay, Derek Shaw, Tony Kelly and the coach himself all had bad doses of the flu in the week leading up to the match against Perth.

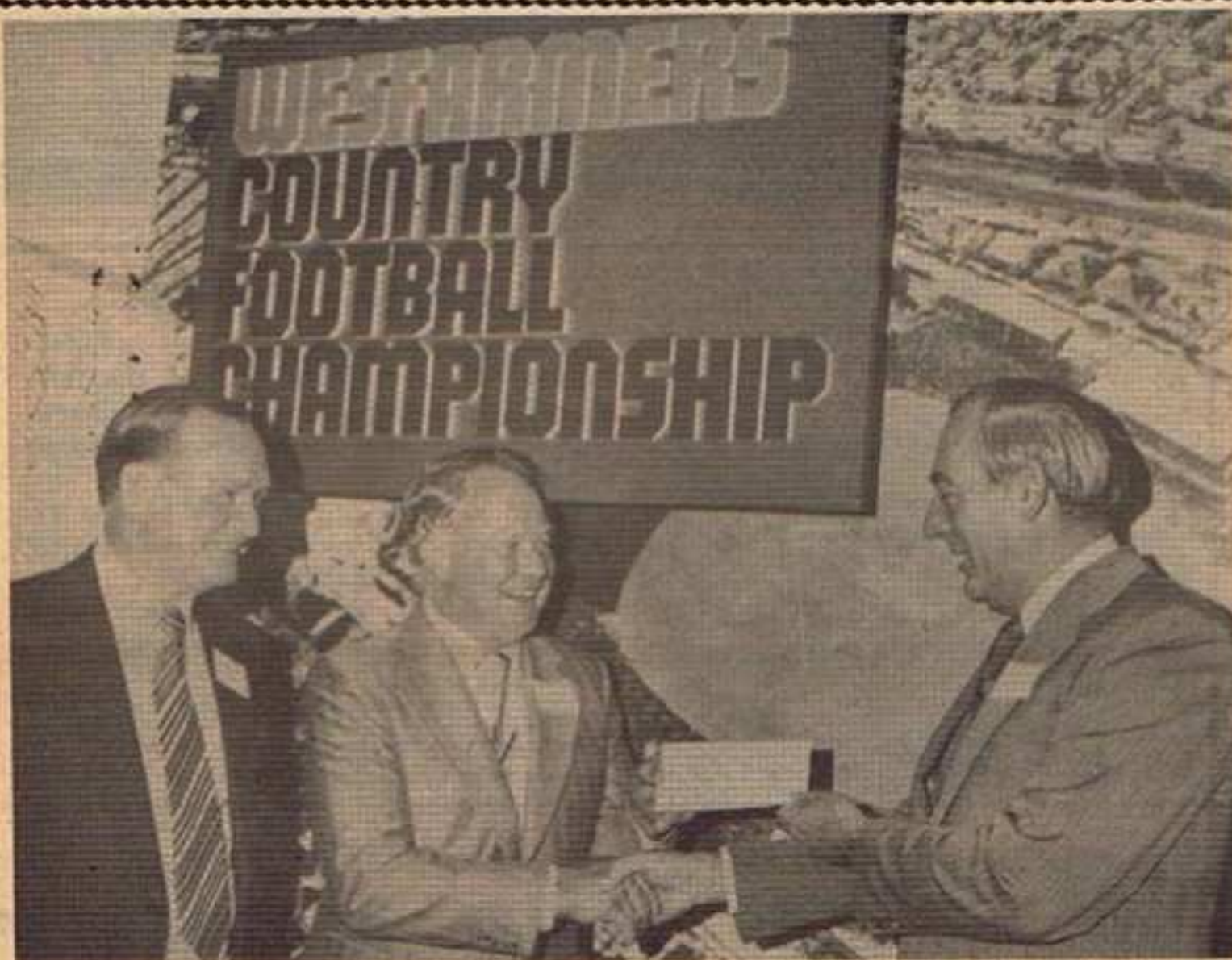

Wesfarmers boost prizemoney

Wesfarmers, the biggest WA-owned company supporting football in the country districts, are upset at the WAFL — and they have good reason to be.

The Wesfarmers function to launch the annual country carnival was virtually snubbed by five of the eight WAFL clubs.

Invitations were sent to all eight general managers — but only two attended — Bob Uittenbroek, of East Fremantle and Peter Brophy, of Swan Districts.

The only other club at the presentation was South Fremantle, represented by Norrie MacDonald, their president.

WAFL president Jim Davies was embarrassed at the unclaimed name tags at the entrance — and even more so when Wesfarmers executive Colin Delmenico commented on the lack of support from the clubs.

On handing over a cheque for \$13,000 — a rise of \$3000 on last year and virtually double what they contributed two years ago — to the carnival organisers, Mr Delmenico said:

"It's a pity our league clubs don't see fit to support this function, which is the official launching of the annual carnival.

"After all, most of the clubs reap a rich reward in the way of top-class footballers from the country districts.

"We put more money into country football than any other WA company and we would at least like to see the clubs come along and acknowledge our support."

Mr Delmenico's remarks were supported by Jock Coleman, president of the organising committee, and Bud Byfield, vice-president.

Mr Byfield said: "We would like to think that the clubs — and the public — will at least turn up on Sunday, August 3 at Subiaco Oval to see the final of our series."

Wesfarmers have turned the country carnival into a showpiece of football talent with their continuing sponsorship.

Teams from all over the State will share the \$13,000 prizemoney and fierce competition is expected over the three days of the championship.

Mr Coleman paid tribute to Wesfarmers for their financial support, not only in prizemoney but in spreading the word around the country football areas. He also thanked former WAFL secretary Barney Giles, who organises the carnival every year.

What chance do the Krakouer brothers have of surviving in the VFL?

Their track record in WA, in respect to reports, shows how easily intimidated they are. Unless they learn to discipline themselves then they will be in for a rough time in Melbourne.

Even though they have been frequently reported in WA, neither brother has learnt to keep a check on his emotions.

In fact that is their achilles heel at the moment. The fact that they are easily aroused into action gives opponents something to work on.

The treatment meted out to them in WA will be kid's stuff compared to what they can expect in Victoria.

It has been intimated that Jim and Phil Krakouer have become targets of other players and that umpires have been quick to respond.

The fact that they have been reported so many times in short careers seems to vindicate this.

I don't subscribe to the theory that they are innocent victims. But I do believe that opposing players realising how easy it is to upset them are playing on that aspect.

Neither brother helps himself nor his club by allowing himself to be drawn into a situation that leads to a report.

During the trophy presentation at Claremont last Saturday Jim Krakouer sat with head bowed in a very disconsolate manner. Obviously the report was playing on his mind.

The worst aspect about of the Krakouers being suspended is that it affects the performance of the other.

Over the past two weeks Jim and Phil Krakouer have shown the form that makes it easy to understand why two Victorian clubs have been willing to fork out \$250,000 for them.

Their performances have converted Claremont from a side struggling to make the four into a premiership chance. There is not doubt in my mind that Claremont's premiership hopes hinge on these two star players.

To be suspended can only affect the equilibrium of the team at a time when it is running hot.

In other words they are playing for very high stakes. Someone should take them aside at Claremont and impress upon them how important it is for them to ignore the jibes from opposing players and not become involved in incidents that could lead to a report.

The way they can be so easily upset must be worrying Claremont at the

moment, particularly with the finals looming.

If they don't learn to discipline themselves then the future looks rather bleak if they go to Victoria. **ROBERT BENNETT**

New job for big Carl

Melbourne's controversial coach Carl Ditterich is about to join another club . . . but it has nothing to do with football.

Ditterich has been appointed director of recreation at a \$20m holiday complex at the glamorous Noosa Heads in Queensland.

His job will be to supervise leisure activities for package tour holiday makers who will occupy the 200 luxury riverside apartments which are due to open at Christmas.

The apartments have already been sold at an average price of \$100,000 each. When Ditterich takes over his new job, at the end of the football season, he will organise keep-fit and sporting functions for the club's residents.

Ditterich said he accepted the new role for the "quality of life" it offers.

He reached his decision after a number of interviews and secret visits to Noosa over the past few months.

But after the match this proved to be far from the truth as Stephen blasted Alexander.

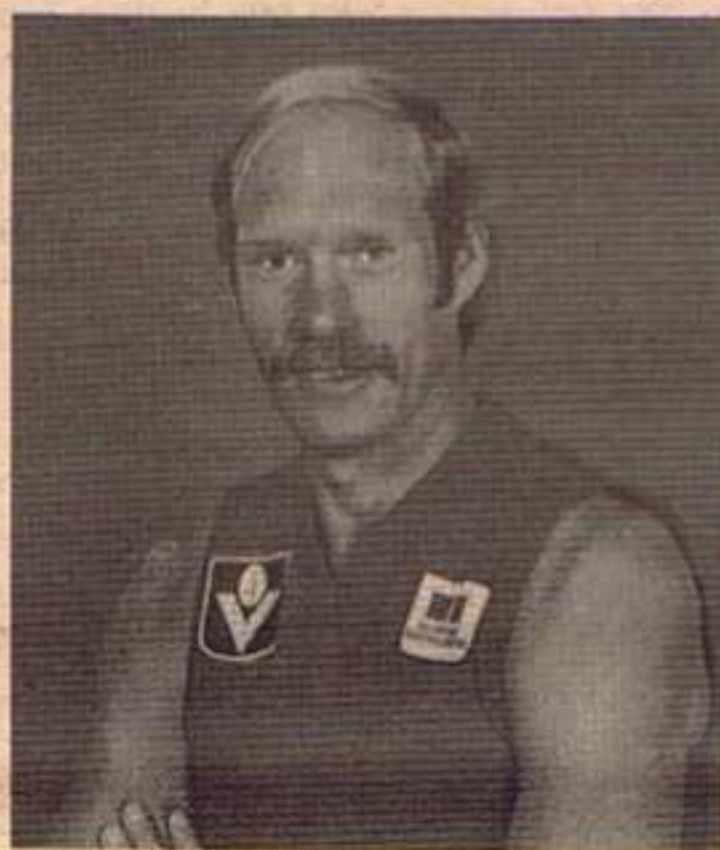
Alexander told Stephen that he came off because he was too tired to continue.

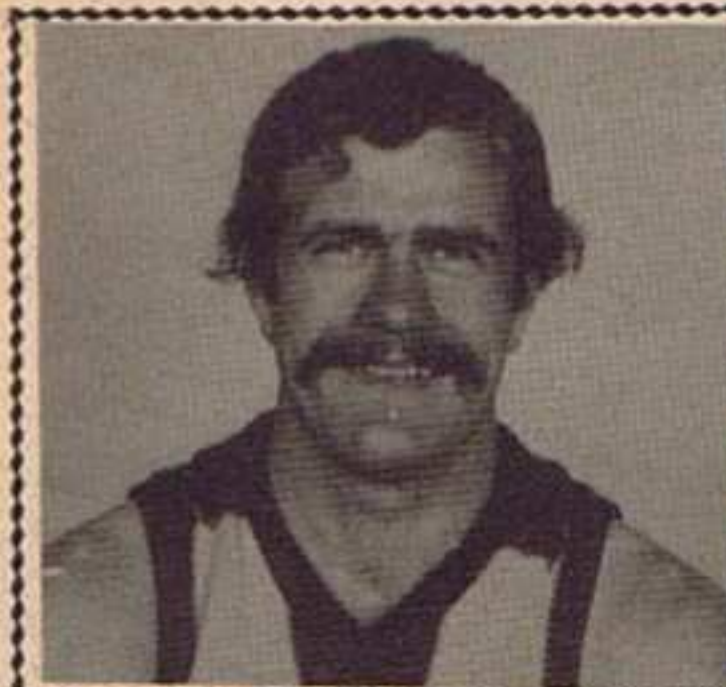
ALVES UNHAPPY

The side's success is indicative of many things but among the more obvious is Claremont's depth.

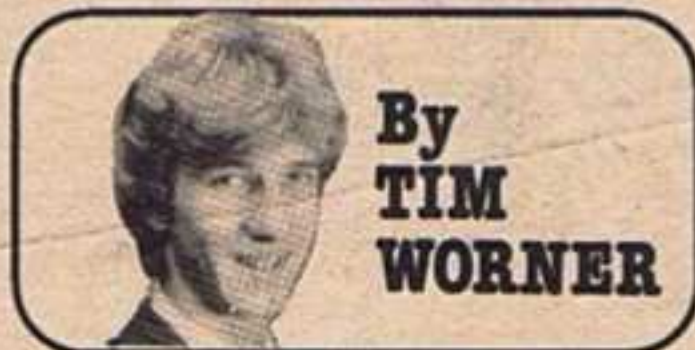
The club has had an unreal run of wins with their colts sides in the past few years and Dufall also played a big role in that situation.

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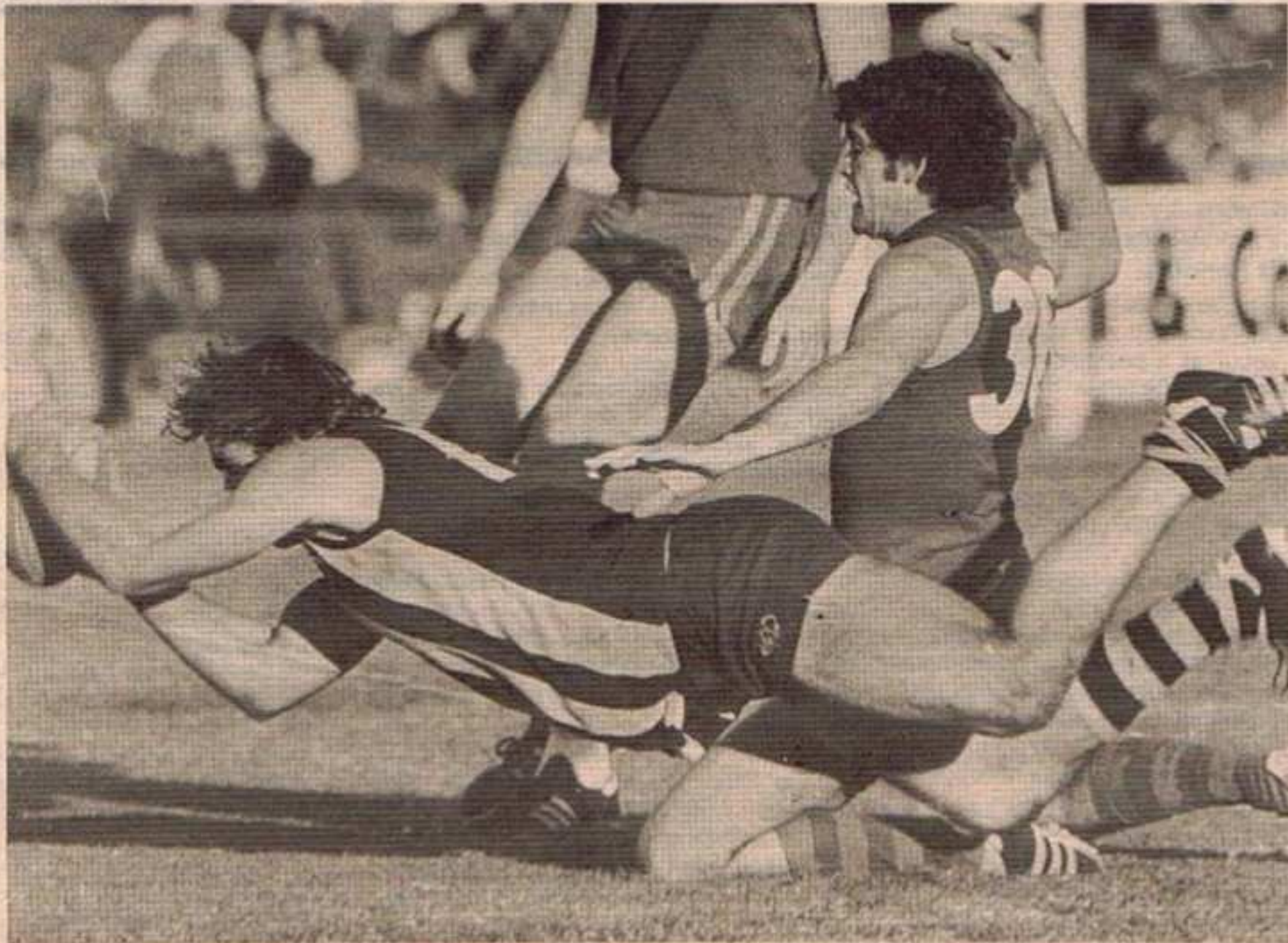

Subiaco recruit Peter Munro has been a consistent player for the Lions since moving West this season — and his strong marking is a feature of his game.

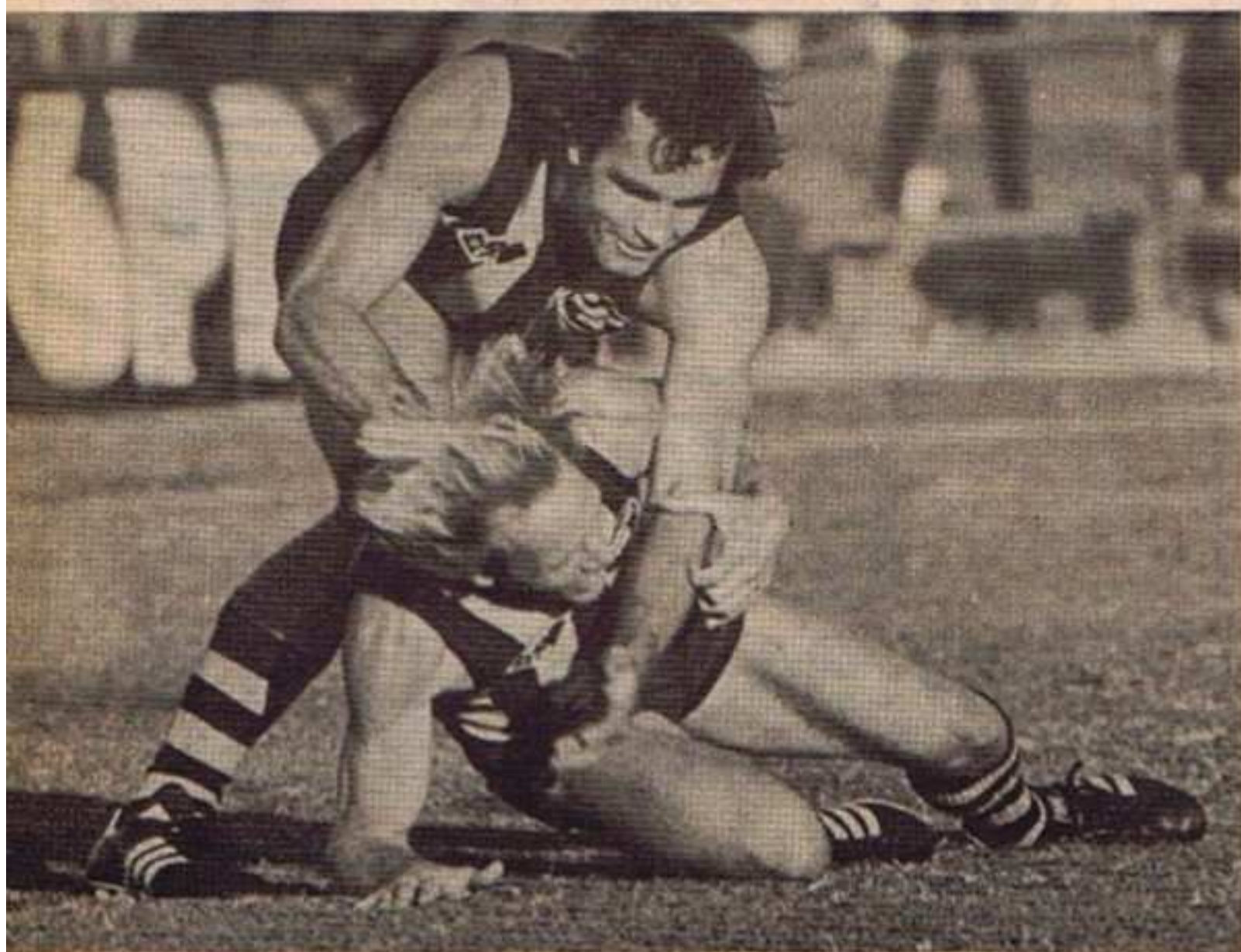
Photographer Richie Hann captured Munro taking the mark that virtually gave Subiaco victory over West Perth last week.

HAVE THE RIGHT GEAR
It's most important that you look like a footballer. Make sure your boots are good and strong, no holes in the ends. Make sure all the stops are in good condition so you don't slip and slide everywhere. Put in new laces regularly. Make sure the shorts fit properly and don't wear loose-fitting jumpers — that only helps opponents grab you if you have floppy jumpers or shorts. And make sure your jumper is tucked in and your socks pulled up. Use wide elastic for garters, not elastic bands or shoe-laces. Your mother's old stockings are okay.

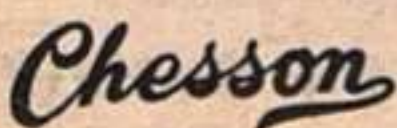

Wesfarmers Championships

South West face stiff opposition

The South West National Football League will next week face stiff opposition in their bid to retain their crown as WA's top country football league.

With 15 other country leagues and associations, they will compete in the 16th annual Wesfarmers country football championships in Perth.

The championships, which commence next Thursday (July 31) will culminate with the A and B section grand finals at Subiaco on Sunday, August 3.

In their first match, South West will meet last year's B Sections premiers Upper Great Southern at Bassendean Oval.

Victory in B section last year, has earned Upper Great Southern the right to re-enter the A section competition. UGS had previously won the A section title in 1968 and 1974.

Under the leadership of former West Perth and State player, Keith Miller, Upper Great Southern have undergone a solid preparation for the carnival. A fortnight ago they recorded an impressive victory in the Great Southern football Carnival at Albany. In the grand final of that competition they beat Lower South West by 61 points.

In the qualifying matches, the Lower South West had beaten Southern Districts. Earlier in the season, also at Albany, an inter-league match between Southern Districts and South West resulted in an easy win for Southern Districts.

On the basis of these results, South West has lost a lot of ground and their coach, Doug Peake, will need to dispel any thoughts of over-confidence his side may have.

One factor, however, that must be considered is that all of the lead-up matches have been played in shocking weather conditions on grounds that do not have the same drying-out capacity as the sandy surface that the South West sides are accustomed to.

The South West will definitely feel 'more at home' on the WAFL grounds.

Lake Grace-Kulin will meet Southern Districts at Subiaco Oval on Thursday and the winners of this match meet the winners of the South West - Upper Great Southern match at Claremont Oval on Friday.

In the Albany Carnival, Lake-Grace Kulin defeated the eventual winners, Upper Great Southern in a qualifying match and this performance should boost their confidence to do well against the formidable Southern Districts side.

Last year's runners-up, Avon, meet Great Northern at East Fremantle Oval.

Avon showed that they will once again be a power when they easily beat the Mortlock League in an inter-league clash at York recently.

Great Northern, winners of the 1969 and 1975 carnivals, are once again coached by Gary McCormack and have had a solid preparation. There are a number of new faces in the side, some with previous WAFL experience.

Changes had to be made to the squad following last Sunday's matches. Some of those named in the initial squad had lost form or were injured.

McCormack said this week "I feel we have a top squad with a good chance of winning the carnival.

"There is a better atmosphere in the squad, particularly from the more experience players."

The winners of this match will meet the winners of the clash between Lower South West and Eastern Districts (1) at Lathlain Park on Friday.

Lower South West play Eastern Districts at Leederville. The Albany Carnival has also provided Lower South West with invaluable interleague match practice and given them the opportunity to iron out their trouble spots.

Eastern Districts (1) has also put in a solid preparation and are making a desperate bid to regain the form which took them to a hat-trick of carnival wins from 1965 to 1967. Since that 'purple-patch' they have not won another title.

In the B Section eight teams will also compete for prizemoney and the WAFL trophy.

Under the usual system of promotion and relegation, the bottom two A section teams from last year, Mortlock and Central Great Southern, will drop into the B section, while the B section premiers Upper Great Southern and runners-up Eastern Districts will enter A section.

This system now sees the B section premier for the past three seasons now competing in the A section competition.

The Esperance District Football Association has dropped out of the carnival this year and their place will be taken by a second 18 from the Eastern Districts league.

The biggest event on the West Australian country football calendar, the Wesfarmers Country Championships, will begin in Perth next Thursday. This is the first in a two-part preview of these championships. Next week's edition will contain more news on this important fixture.

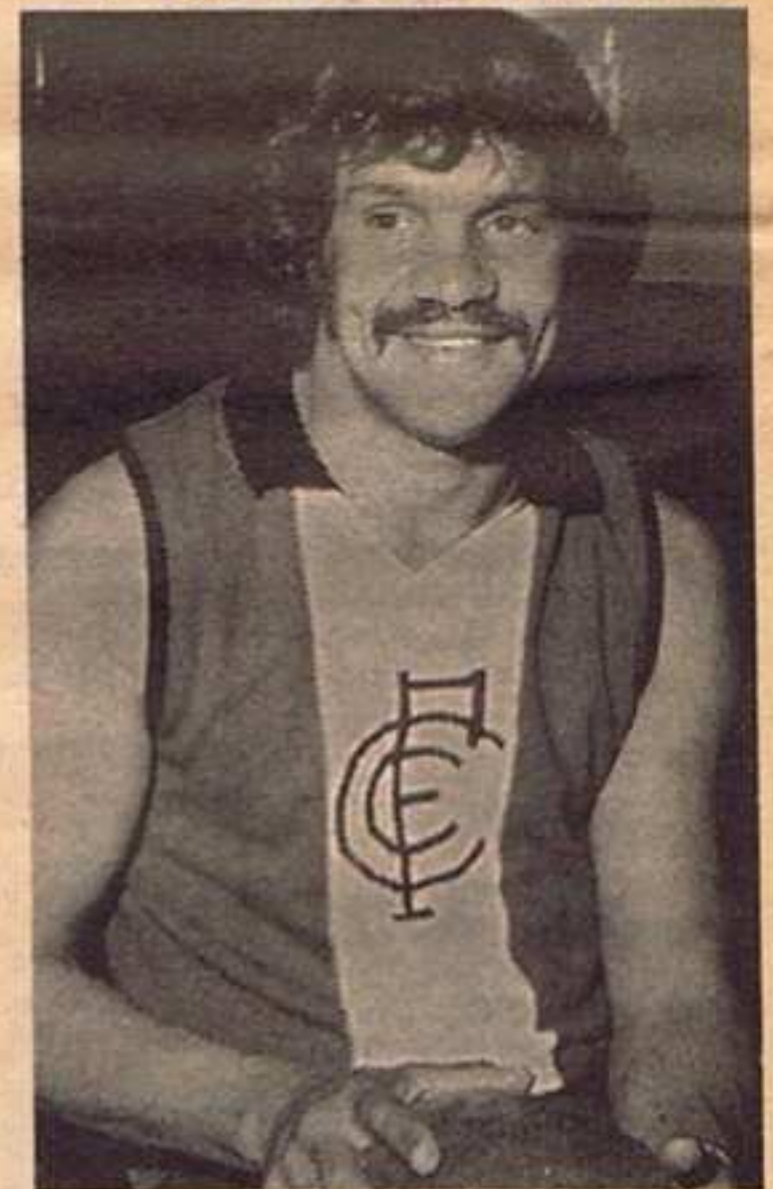
MILESTONE FOR S.W. STAR

ATWELL WINS COACHES SPOT

One of the most difficult tasks about the Perth side was selecting a coach... who do you pick from Mal Atwell, Ern Henfry and Ken Armstrong? We finally went for Atwell who coached the Demons from 1966-71, taking the club to premierships from 1966-68.

Henry coached from 1953-59 and 1962-65, taking the club to a flag in 1955 while Armstrong, at the helm from 1974-79, coached Perth to premierships in 1976-77. Perth were runners-up in 1978.

The following division was one of the easiest to select. Merv McIntosh was the automatic choice to lead the first ruck while Barry Cable is the rover to pick up the crumbs.

Bob Miller and Charlie Skehan were selected as ruck-rovers while Robert Wiley was chosen to partner Cable and Reg Zeuner, who played 209 games from 1949-59, was the man we felt should change with McIntosh.

The unlucky men not to get a guernsey on the ball were Tom Davis, Dick Walker and Garry Gibellini.

John Quartermaine, a master of the drop kick, is slotted in at full back while Phil Craven, who played 88 games from 1947-51, was selected to watch the resting rovers.

Neville Beard, the 1961 Sandover Medallist, was one of the safest backmen in the league and was a natural choice at centre-half-back.

He is flanked by a strong, rugged duo in Terry Moriarty and Nugget Hilsz, men who gave no quarter.

Wingers were reasonably easy to select. The tenacious play of Greg Brehaut is still fresh in the minds of most Demon supporters but Keith Harper is not as well known among Perth's young supporters. Harper played 233 games with Perth from 1948-60.

The centre position was a three-way tussle between Ern Henfry, Ken Armstrong and Pat Dalton.

Dalton was the 1970 Sandover Medallist, Armstrong played with flair but we couldn't go past Henfry, who played from 1937-45 and then again in 1954-55. Henfry also captained Carlton and Victoria.

The half-forward line contains strength, versatility and brilliance.

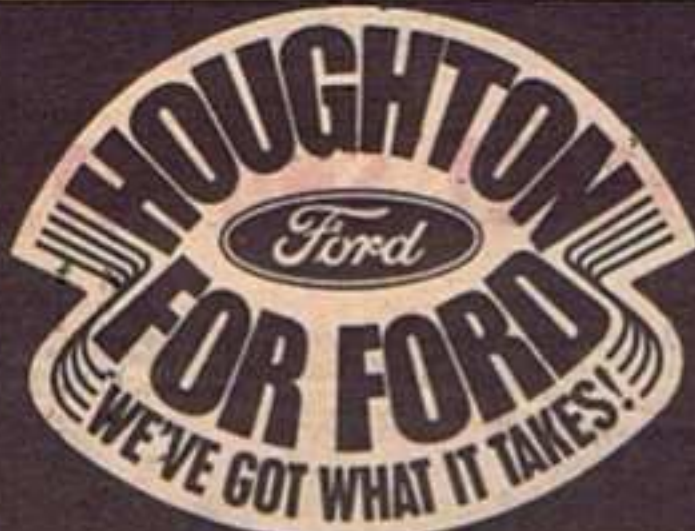

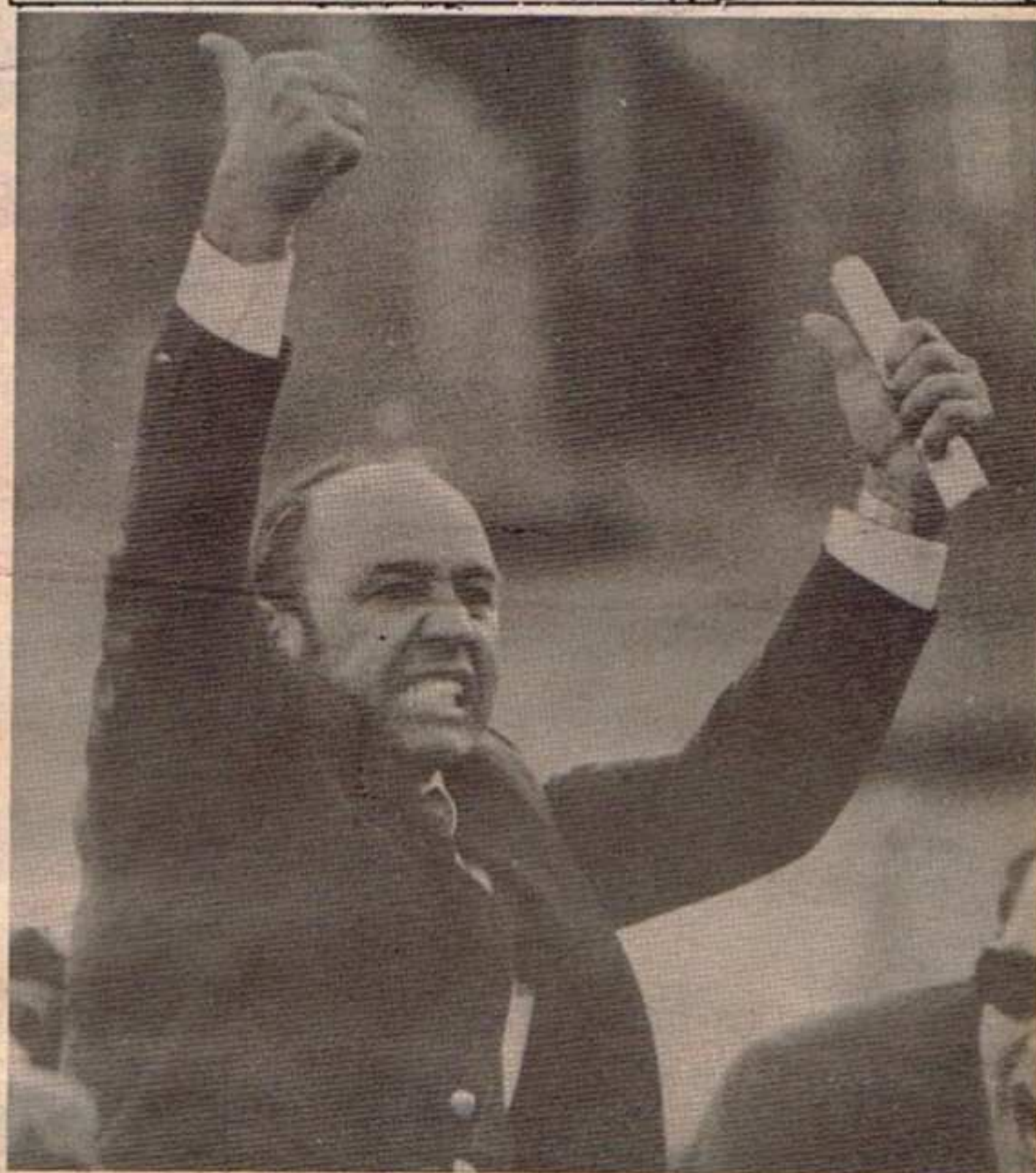
