Media agree

The football media world and the umpires were in almost total agreement on the Sandover Medal result.

The umpires weekly voting left South Fremantle champion Stephen Michael on 24 with his Bulldog skipper Noel Carter second on 19.

And that's how the media rated the best players for the season also.

A survey of all media best-on-ground taken each week, working on a consensus of opinion over eight media outlets, left Michael with 23 votes and Carter 19.

The closeness of votes confirms that the Sandover Medal voting system is the fairest we can devise. But the interesting side-effect is that Carter has won most of the awards in the media.

Each week Westside Football's Sandover Medal guide recorded the 3-2-1 votes of the newspaper, radio and TV media. The allocation of votes to Michael and Carter differs slightly, particularly in the one votes.

The media put Michael third best on ground six times, whereas the umpires did not give him a one vote. They awarded him six top votes — compared to five in the media — and three second votes.

Carter received only three one votes on the media survey; compared to six by the umpires. But the media had Carter best-on-ground four times, one more than the umpires.

However, the closeness of the final result is probably a good indication that media observers and the two umpires are both looking at footballers in the same light.

CARTER WINS TOYOTA PRIZE

Bulldogs skipper Noel Carter has won the Toyota \$1000 Westside Ratings award.

Carter polled six votes last week to take his tally to 141, three ahead of teammate Stephen Michael.

The South Fremantle rover collects \$500 for his efforts this season. He was a consistently high poller and emerged as clear favourite after overtaking Gerard Neesham towards the start of the third round.

Stephen Michael picks up \$50 for the biggest vote getter in the final round with 53.

The top vote-getter from each club collects \$50 from Toyota.

Swan Districts: Gerard Neesham 137, Graham Melrose 134; Claremont: Graham Moss 132, Ken Hunter 120; East Perth: a draw, \$25 each, Stephen Curtis and George Michalczyk 122; West Perth: Ross Gibbs 129, Les Fong 127; East Fremantle: Brian Peake 135, Tony Buhagiar 113; Perth: Brian Cook 127, Barry Kimberley 123; Subiaco: Tim Gepp 119, Alex Hamilton 110.

THE GREAT GOAL PUZZLE

The Great Goalkicking Puzzle continues

Everyone knows that Claremont first-year player Warren Ralph topped the goalkicking ladder with 87 goals . . . even the bankers out at Channel 7 who paid him \$1000 for the feat.

But the record books will show that in year 1980 Ralph shared the goalkicking honours with Swan Districts full-forward, Simon Beasley.

A decision by the WAFL directors earlier this season meant that goals kicked by players on Saturday, June 14 — when the State side was away in Adelaide — would not be counted when the final goalkicking table was ratified.

Ralph kicked five goals for Claremont that Saturday — with Beasley playing for WA in Adelaide.

With Ralph finishing five ahead of Beasley on the table — 87 to 82 — the two men finish together when Ralph's goals are deducted.

The WAFL decision — rather an untimely one — was taken to protect players away with the State side.

The introduction this year of a special Town and Country goalkicking cup was also seen as an additional reason to give all players an equal opportunity.

The directors felt that if Sandover Medal votes were suspended when State teams were absent, then the same should apply to goalkicking. But, the difference, of course, is that Sandover Medal votes are something that are cast by umpires; and can simply be 'left out' for that day. Goals are something that are physically kicked and cannot really be cancelled.

If you delete those goals then you must delete the total score . . . and then the match. Which is what should have happened in the first place — no football when the State side is away.

However, despite the confusion over the goalkicking table, nothing can be taken away from Ralph's feat in topping the list.

He becomes only the second post-war footballer to head the league's goalkickers in his debut year in senior ranks . . . the other was Austin Robertson, who went on to be WA's most prolific goalkicker.

Ralph is the first Claremont player to top the ladder since Norm Uncle in 1976 — with 91 goals. But before that there was a long Tiger drought . . . going back to 1943 when Robin Farmer shared the honour with Ray Schofield in the under-age competition.

Beasley's effort was also a top-class one.

His tally was just seven short of the 89 kicked by Max George, in 1974 — the last Swans player to top the ladder.



This week he wins our Hard Yakka award for his persistence and perseverance which is so well captured in this photograph.

I can see the result hinging on their performance, and what's more, I can see Claremont winning.

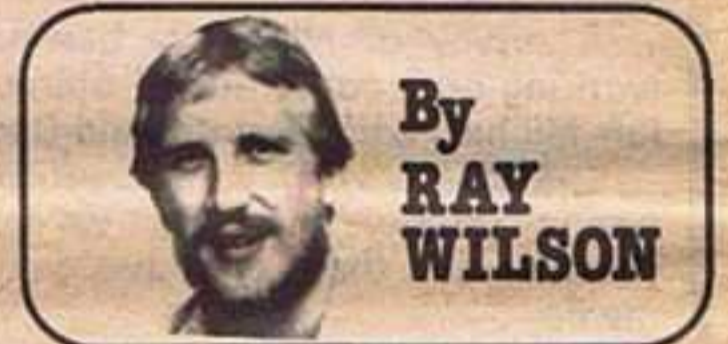
But you can't write off East Perth in a hurry. The Royals play their best football when their backs are against the wall.

Remember 1978? The year when the Royals scraped into the four on a wing and a prayer and then went on to grab the flag on a rain-soaked Saturday.

Neither side can be particularly happy with their form last week, but finals are definitely different ball games.

East Perth have been the "iffy" side of the competition this season and again in the first semi, a big question mark hangs over their approach to football.

There's no questioning the talent in the side but getting 20 players to team

together on a Saturday is another matter.

The Tigers look to have the steadiness in defence where Ken Hunter leads a talented bunch of players including Noel Morton, Brad Reynolds and Gerald Betts.

Moss mustn't make the mistake of rucking for exhaustive periods. He needs to allow Herman Van Der Beek to share some of the burden.

Warren Ralph relies heavily on Phil Krakouer to get the ball to him, but this has worked well all season and there's nothing to say it won't work on Saturday.

The Royals need a big performance from Wayne Duke and Wayne Otway to off-set the following division of Claremont.

East Perth had several injuries during the week and it would be a dangerous ploy to play anybody less than 100 per cent fit.

A lot will depend on who — and how — the Royals try to cut Ralph out of the game.

In previous clashes with East Perth he has kicked goal tallies of 5, 6 and 6 and if John Hayes gets the custodian job, he will have to be tighter than he was against Rod Alderton last week.

But while East Perth have to worry about curbing Ralph, they have their own trump card up in front of the other goals . . . Paul Arnold.

MARLBORO AWARDS

The Marlboro finals money starts this weekend with the losing side taking \$1000. The other payouts are \$5000 for the premiers, \$3000 for the runners-up and \$2000 for the preliminary final losers. South Fremantle won the second and third Marlboro Cup rounds of \$4000 each. South's Stephen Michael was the Marlboro \$1000 player of the final round, joining Les Fong (WP) and Wayne Duke (EP). Swans have also collected the \$20,000 bonus for being the first team to win 12 games straight in 1980.

Unique night to honour our stars

The football spotlight swings to one of the glamour nights of the year on Tuesday when the Swan-6PM Champions Award winners are revealed.

This night, a forerunner of the big cash awards in local football, heaps praise on the footballers who have starred throughout the 1980 season. Radio 6PM and the Swan Brewery joined forces in 1977 to present these unique prizes to our champion footballer and the players we consider were the best in their respective positions for the season.

The background of this award is worth recapping. Radio 6PM felt that there was room for a major prize for the best footballer in the WA competition, plus there was a need to acknowledge the outstanding players in the various positions — many of which tend to be overlooked in weekly voting.

So our 6PM commentary team and our around-the-grounds men are called upon to cast their votes throughout the year to select winners of more than \$15,000 in cash.

Our sports panel of judges comprises match-of-the-day commentators — Jack Sweet, John O'Connell, Geoff Christian, Peter Phillips (our statistician) and yours truly; our around-the-grounds staff of Joe Fanchi, Allan Stiles and Colin Hopkins and our special on-the-spot-man, Les Mumme.

We meet at regular intervals during the season to talk about best-position players and footballers who are maybe being overlooked in the multi-media awards.

A consensus of opinion among our experts provides us with a list of names for the various positions — and we gradually whittle them down till we reach the final order of nomination.

Just to give readers an idea of how rich our awards are, here is the breakdown of the Swan-6PM Champions night:

- Champion footballer — \$5000.
- 18 position awards at \$450 each.
- Top player in each of the eight clubs — \$250 each (based on the voting by football fans).

Other awards include:

- Media personality of the year
- Most courageous player
- Best first-year player

We have also introduced a special award every year to commemorate an outstanding footballer in WA's history.

In 1977 we struck the Mel Whinnen medal for the best centreman; in 1978 the Graham Farmer medal for the best ruckman; in 1979 the Barry Cable medal for the best rover and in 1980... who will it be?

Let's look back at some of the stars who have figured in the Swan-6PM awards in recent years...

Robert Wiley was our champion in 1977; Brian Peake in 1978 and Graham Moss in 1979.

This year the award voting has been in camera for six weeks, but players like the South Fremantle pair Noel Carter and Stephen Michael are right up there, as are Les Fong (West Perth), Swans pair Gerard Neesham and Graham Melrose and Brian Peake, of East Fremantle.

Our best-position players also provide plenty of interest.

Players like Peter Bosustow (half-

forward-flanker), Stephen Curtis (back pocket) and Graham Moss (ruck) have dominated their position in the previous three years.

This is the only major football function of the year that involves wives — something that 6PM has decided was a good idea to help the men-folk cover up a lot of their sins for the season!

We have Ricky May heading the entertainment bill; STW Channel 9 providing a live telecast of the event and plenty of good fun and good football entertainment right throughout the night.

East Perth Rover is courage personified



Being tagged as the smallest player in league football is certainly something unusual . . . but that's the title Wayne Otway carries.

The diminutive East Perth rover stands only 5ft. 6in. tall — but he weaves his small frame into many a difficult situation.

Otway has risen up to be the Royals No. 1 rover; a club that has been strong in the roving departments over the years has seen fit to hand Otway the responsibility of leading their small man brigade.

He is courage personified. There are numerous times when fans cringe as Otway tears headlong into packs in search of the ball — and they breathe a sigh of relief as he comes out unscathed . . . and with the ball under his arm.

Otway's football has developed considerably in recent years . . . and that's something both Swan Districts and Subiaco probably don't like to acknowledge. Otway grew up as a Subi fan, but actually started his career with the Swans colts. It was then found that he really lived in East Perth's territory . . . so down to Perth Oval he went.

His story is the classic case of the little man tackling a big job . . . and succeeding.

This week ALAN EAST spoke to Otway about his football . . .

Q: You have had a fairly good season this year. Are you happy with it?

A: Yes, the main thing is that I have tried to get more consistency, stringing good games together instead of playing one good game and then a couple of poor ones. I've been concentrating a lot more and also working on playing more steadily over four quarters and not just one term.

Q: You are one of the few "pure" rovers around at present in so much as you are small and scout the packs a lot. Do you like that type of play?

A: I generally like to get into the packs as well as scouting the edges. I'd like to think I'm a getter of the ball more than a receiver.

Q: How hard has it been being so small?

A: It hasn't been a barrier or anything. Sometimes when it comes to a man-to-man contest in the air it's a little bit harder.

Q: You've had a series of injuries, haven't you?

A: I had a cartilage out over summer, after injuring the knee during a leap-frog training exercise the Sunday before last year's first semi-final. I had previously dislocated a shoulder in a water-skiing tumble.

Q: Did the cartilage operation put you behind for this year's pre-season training?

A: When I finished the season I had to go to Port Hedland where I was committed to do some work and I didn't have the operation till January. I only started training three weeks before the start of the season. I guess I was quite lucky as I was still ready for the first league game.

Q: Do you do a lot of running to build up your stamina?

A: Usually I do. But with the cartilage operation this year and a hamstring during the season I haven't done as much as I should. I plan to start really early for next season and get that bit of extra fitness that I need.

Q: When did you first decide that you wanted to be a league footballer?

A: I was playing amateurs, C-grade with Ashfield, but all my team-mates and

opponents were pretty big and strong. I was only 17 but I realised that if I could survive against them there should be no reason why I couldn't tackle league ranks. I was taking the knocks and it didn't seem to worry me. I was also playing under-19s with Bassendean, so I decided to go up to Swans to try out with their colts.

Q: How did your swap to East Perth come about?

A: I had played about four games with the Swans colts, that was in 1975, when they suddenly realised that I actually lived in the East Perth district. I was just one street inside the boundary. They told me to come down to Perth Oval and try and get a clearance back to Swans. When I got here I discovered that Mick Fuller, who was my best mate at school, was captain of the colts, so I decided to stay with East Perth.

Q: You had a couple of early premierships with East Perth didn't you?

A: Yes, I played in the colts premiership side that year and the reserves premiership team the next year. I also played two league games in 1976 and then went into the league side pretty permanently in 1977.

Q: You must be reasonably happy with your decision to tackle league football?

A: I guess I was up against it a bit with my height. But I'm lucky in that I seem to get the ball a lot. I'm starting to read the play a bit better now, but I still fumble the ball a lot and I'll be working on that over the summer.

Q: What about your future — at East Perth?

A: I'd like to get life membership here, that's 150 games so I've got a few more seasons to go yet.

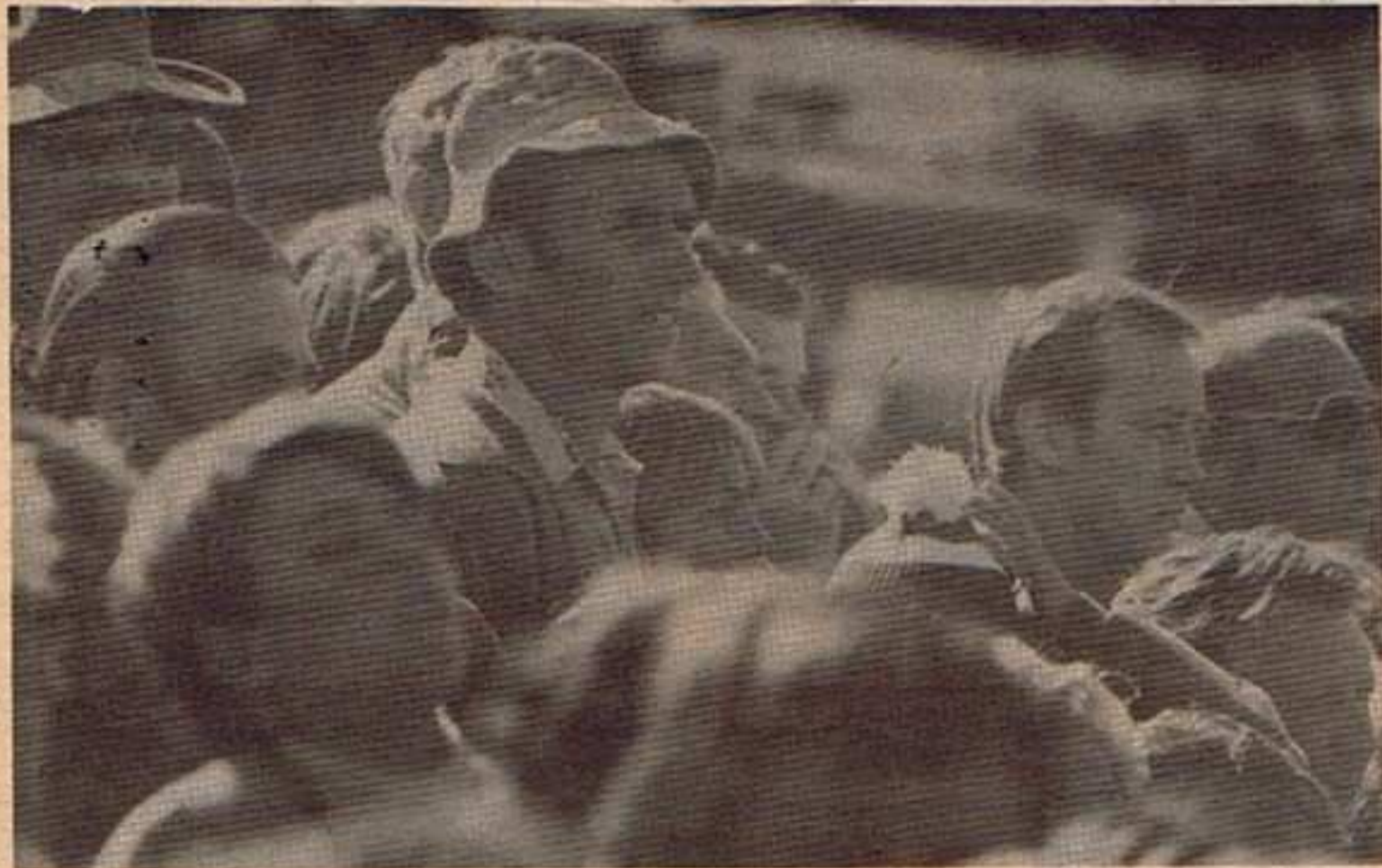

BENNETT'S BURST



Football, like any other sport, can be cruel.

West Perth supporters are aware of this as were Claremont followers two seasons ago when their club was also edged out of the four by a narrow percentage margin.

But while I agree that West Perth may have been a bit unlucky not to have forced their way into the four, I don't agree with coach Graham Campbell's assertion that there is no justice in football and that West Perth deserved to be in the four.

The weight of sympathy for West Perth has been detrimental and not fair to East Perth.

The battle for the top four is played out over 21 games . . . not one. Swan Districts' coach John Todd put things in perspective when his team lost to South Fremantle on Saturday.

His aim was to play in the second semi-

final and that loss did not threaten that goal. In other words, Swan Districts put the score on the board during the season.

West Perth did not deserve to be in the four ahead of East Perth.

Graham Campbell is a great one for statistics, so let me remind him and others of the respective performances of West Perth and East Perth this season. After 15 games East Perth were behind West Perth and trailed by 10 per cent. Five games later East Perth were in front and had converted that percentage deficit to a 5 per cent advantage.

Many are pointing to West Perth's one point loss to Subiaco as the factor that kept them out of the four. It can't be dismissed lightly. After all, West Perth were the only club other than East Fremantle to lose to Subiaco.

More importantly though, two weeks after that loss East Perth not only defeated Subiaco but substantially increased their percentage.

If percentage was the crucial factor in West Perth not making the four then they can't ignore the terrible 21 goal hiding by Swan Districts in the first round.

However, a contributing factor to East Perth making the four ahead of the Cardinals was their ability to defeat each of the top three sides.

East Perth were able to beat Claremont twice and South Fremantle and Swan Districts once each. West Perth were only able to score one win in their nine encounters with these sides — against Claremont.

West Perth have only themselves to blame being in the position to do something exceptional in the last match to make the four.

It also needs to be remembered that in the last two games East Perth finished on while West Perth faded, which turned out to be a decisive factor in respect to percentage.

It all adds up to East Perth doing a little bit more than West Perth during the season and not relying on just one game.

That aside, I think Campbell did a great job to rehabilitate West Perth this season.

Campbell had a particularly onerous task as he not only had to pick West Perth up from the floor but had to heal a wound in the club.

West Perth should be a force again in the competition next season. They have uncovered some outstanding players, particularly Dan Foley and Bill Duckworth who will be much better players next season after their initiation this year.

Goggin, the little genius, knows he has the team to win the 1980 flag.

Blackwell can't stand losing

A change of football club district boundaries back in 1972 proved to be a stroke of luck for Claremont.

They gained the services of the talented Wayne Blackwell, who had been bound to Subiaco.

Blackwell has now developed into one of the most damaging young players on the scene and his handball alone has been the cause of many an opposing coach's headache.

With Blackwell clearing the ball from the centre scrummages, the Krakouer brothers footpassing and the fast-leading Warren Ralph marking Claremont have one of the most potent combinations in league football.

Blackwell began his football with the Karrinyup junior club in the Subiaco district but after the 1972 changes he joined the North Beach Club in Tiger territory. He stayed there until he had completed his junior football commitments, when he moved on to the powerful Claremont colts training squad in 1977 and was in the victorious grand final side.

With that win to boost his exuberance, he started training in 1978 with a strong desire to make league football.

But success was not to come easily and his first eight games of that season were in the proving ground — the reserves. Typical of Blackwell — who cannot stand being down and out — his outstanding run of form warranted inclusion in the league side. The selectors thought his performances were worthy of promotion and at the time he was not even on the league list.

"I could not believe it when my father came in and told me I was playing in the league side," says Blackwell. "I had to go and look in the paper for myself — but there it was."

Blackwell's debut was against East Fremantle, at a time when they were a force to reckon with in the competition, and the game drew a big crowd to Claremont Oval.

"It was probably the best feeling in my football career," Blackwell says.

He came on from the interchange bench for about 1½ quarters and made a reasonable impression, gaining marks for courage more than anything else.

The next game was against Swan Districts and he cemented his place in the side with a solid half of football, bagging two goals.

Since then Blackwell has developed into a top footballer and now aims to become a regular league player.

But perhaps his biggest and most important aim at the moment is to be part of Claremont's winning first semi-final side.

"We all realise we have only one chance and once we win that one, we will be setting our sights on the grand final."

A self-confessed poor loser, Blackwell likes the competition of league football more than anything else.

"I used to play games with my mates and I could not stand losing," he says.

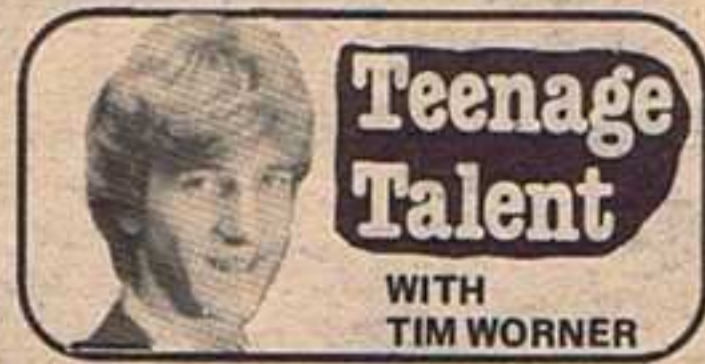
He has carried this attitude onto the football field and it has brought him a good deal of success.

Blackwell's will to win is unbeatable and it is not uncommon for him to dive on the ball only to be set upon by three or four opponents. He thrives on it. He has also found league football an excellent medium for meeting people and stresses that the Claremont football team is also a 'great bunch of blokes.' He bases his game around teamwork and bringing his teammates into the game.

"A group playing as a team will win a flag, but a group playing as individuals will go nowhere near it," he said.

Blackwell's attitude towards teamwork and his belief in it as a medium to win close games probably accounts for his exceptionally high tallies of handballs in matches this year.

He has found Maurice Rioli his most difficult opponent so far.



"He is a one-grab player and if you are not with him after the first grab he is off." He has looked to Ken Hunter for guidance both on and off the field.

"To me he is the perfect footballer — he is gutsy, his heart is for the team and the club and his heart is like an oval."

Hunter has also been extremely helpful in guiding Blackwell with his career off the field.

This year especially, Blackwell has also been aided by the thoughts of John 'Buzz' Parkinson, a Sandover Medallist for Claremont, who has been closely analysing his game week by week.

"He is looking at ways of improving my game so that Maurice Rioli is going to chase me and I don't have to chase him all the time," he said. During a game Parkinson's attention will focus carefully on Blackwell and his every move is being noted.

Blackwell's father has also developed into an admirable critic.

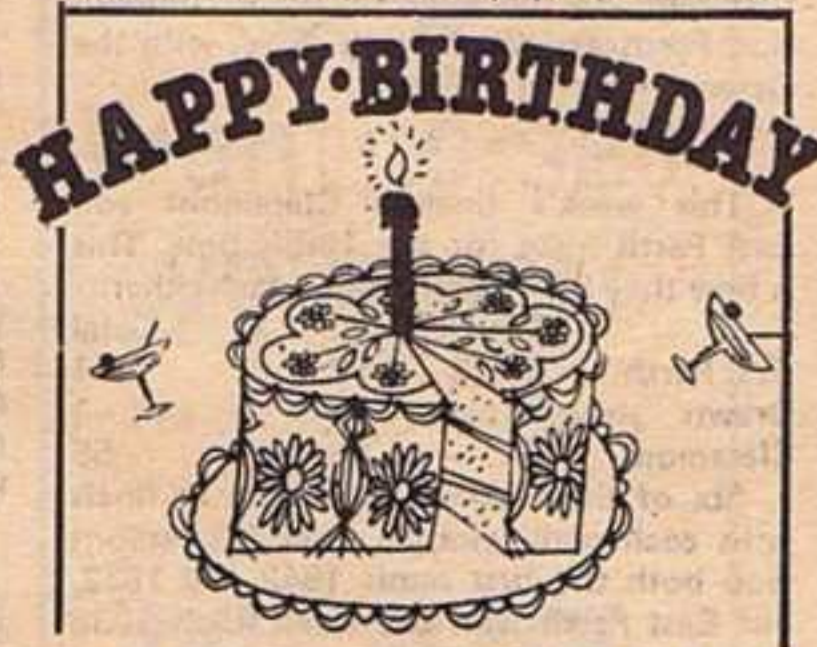
"He has never played football, but I regard him as one of the best judges — he talks sense and has helped me all the way.

Blackwell is at present content to remain in Western Australia.

"If I really thought I was good enough, if I knew I was going to make it over there and if I had an extremely attractive offer I would seriously consider going east," he says.

"But Claremont have looked after me very well since I have been down here and I have no thoughts of going anywhere."

With Blackwell continuing in his devastating form, Claremont will, no doubt, look after him for many years to come.

THE MARK OF THE YEAR

50th FIRST SEMI

This Saturday's first semi-final is the 50th since the present (or Page system) was introduced in 1931.

Ironically East Perth were one of the contestants that initial year.

The very first 1st semi final ended in a sensation, East Perth 10-19 drew with South Fremantle 12-7, the replay went to Easts 9-18 to Souths 10-10.

Compare East Perth's accuracy in these two games with the last two weeks.

In both these games East Perth scored less goals than their opponents but still managed to qualify for the preliminary final.

Of the 49 first semis already decided only 18 times has the winner made the grand final. In other words 31 first semi winners lost the preliminary final.

Of the 18 that went to the grand final nine were successful - East Perth 1936, South Fremantle 1954, Perth 1955, East Fremantle 1967, Swan Districts 1963, Claremont 1964, East Fremantle 1965, Perth 1976 and East Fremantle 1979.

The 1931 game is not the only drawn first semi. In the 1944 underage competition Perth and West Perth drew, with the Demons winning the replay.

This week's finalists Claremont and East Perth meet for the 168th time. This is how they have fared against each other:

Six of these games have been in finals with each club winning three. Claremont won both the first semis 1942 and 1952, but East Perth won the grand finals 1936 and 1972.

As everyone predicted, Swan Districts broke the goalscoring record this year.

Their tally for the year - 2763 points is 70 more than the previous best of 2693 by East Perth in 1976.

Claremont's reserves side, undefeated in the 21 qualifying games, also set a record. Their 3333 points may take some beating.

The Tigers finished with a percentage of 206%.

In 1952 South Fremantle seconds were undefeated and finished with a percentage of 216%.

There have been nine occasions in WA when a team has missed the four with 11 wins, as Swans found last year and the Cardinals this year.

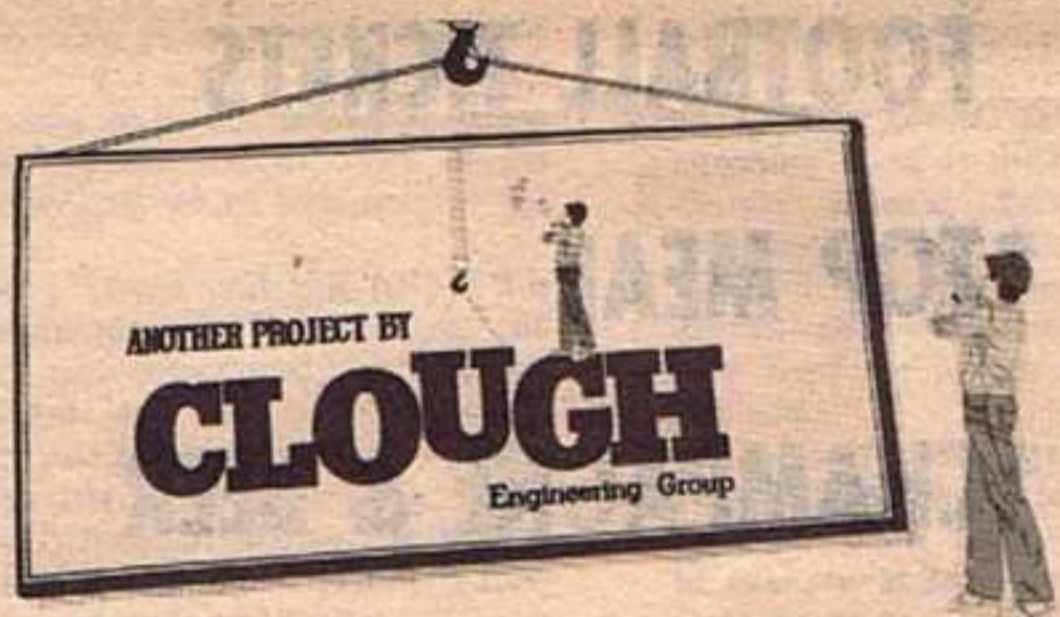
However, twice, in a 21 qualifying game round NINE games was enough. In 1953 East Fremantle, under Charlie Strang and in 1972 West Perth under Peter Steward, reached the finals with nine victories. But the least number wins a team qualified for the finals was 5½ in 1924 when there was only a six team competition.

(In 1968 Richmond missed the finals with 14 wins).

Old Easts have just finished their fourth worst season on record. Their five wins this year betters only the 1970 and 1968 season when they won four games and their inaugural year of 1898 when they won only once.

Swan Districts' 18 wins in the qualifying round was certainly their best, beating their 1965 effort when, with Fred Castle-dine as coach, they won 15 games.

Only in five other years has a team won more qualifying matches. In 1946 East Fremantle won 19 home and away games, so too did South Fremantle in 1950 and 1953, East Perth in 1961 and Perth in 1968.



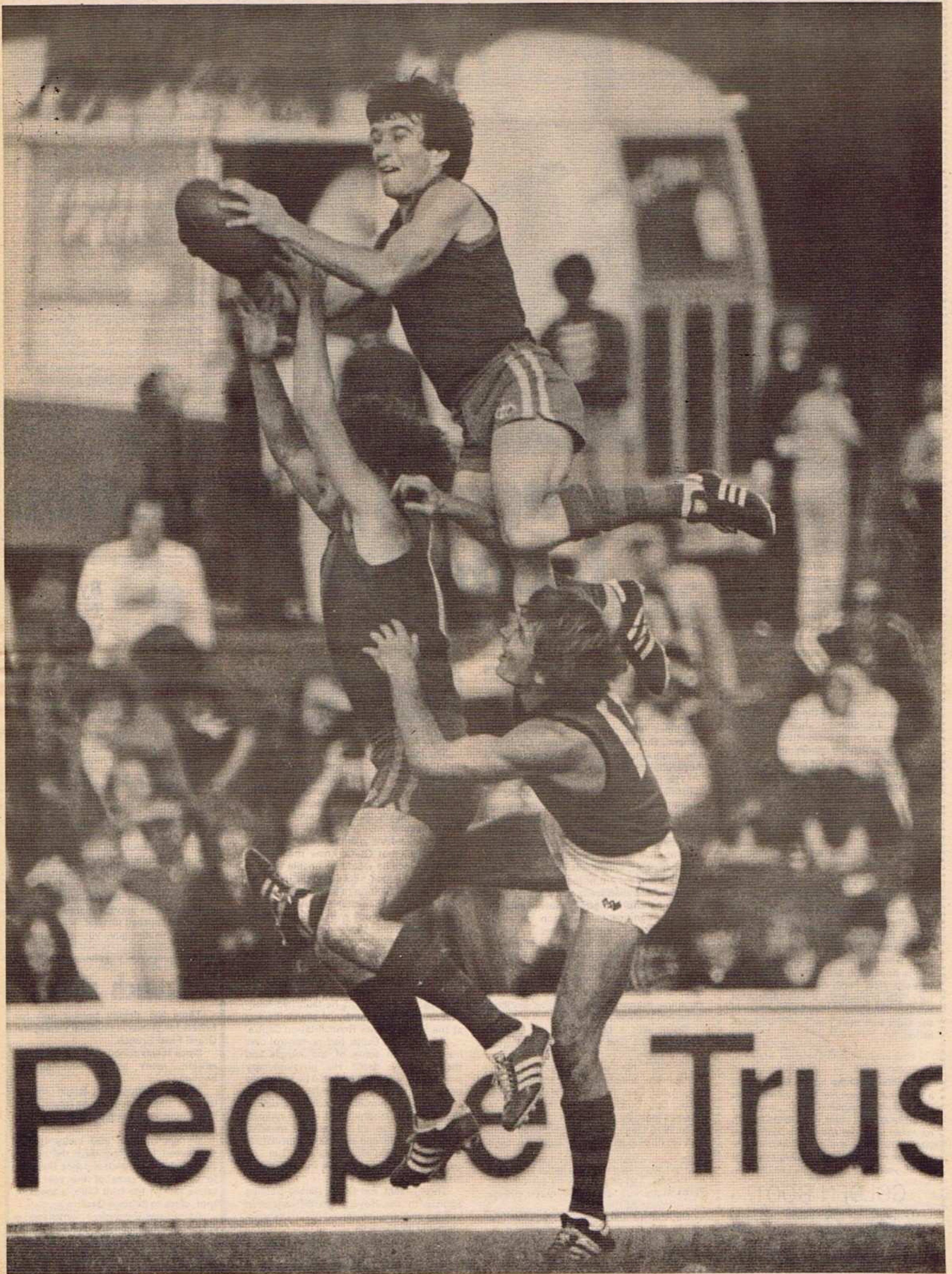

GOALS!

Last week he ran onto the field at the 25-minute mark of the second term — and ran straight into a goal. As he ran across from the wing, heading for half-forward, the ball came downfield, skidded off the top of the pack into his waiting arms and he simply kept running on to goal.



There wasn't much doubt about the winner of the goal-of-the-day at Leederville Oval last week . . . it seemed pretty certain to go *Les Fong's* way. But there could have been some discussion on which goal *Fong* should receive the Town and Country \$100 for. In the opening quarter he screwed a left-foot shot at the goals and watched it bounce along the ground for about 20 metres before going through the big opening. Then his second goal in the next quarter came after he had run deep into the forward pocket and screwed a right-footer back to split the middle . . . and that earned him the cash.

The weekly goal-of-the-day award on Channel 7's Sunday show produces some pretty tough competition . . . and after 21 qualifying games the winner will be hard to pick. One player who has a bit of headstart on his rivals is Perth's *Peter Bosustow* — he won the weekly award three times during the season. West Perth's *Corry Bewick* and South's *Paul Mountain* won the award twice each.

Billy (The Kid) Duckworth was in fine form for West Perth last week — and certainly deserved top honours for his display at centre-half-back. He joined the elite group of players who have shown the forwards how to kick goals when he dashed across the centre in the third term and botted a long goal to keep West Perth on the road to victory. His big-kicking is reminiscent of brother *John* and if they both end up in the same side next year it will be interesting.

Big Wayne Duke has developed into a top-line player for East Perth since settling in at Perth Oval . . . and he's versatile as well. Last week the 6ft. 5in. ruckman gathered the ball in behind the goalmouth pack and moved around like a nippy rover to snap the 7th goals for the Royals.

Carter now joins *Graham Moss*, the Claremont captain-coach, on the Toyota-Westside honour board.

Courage of a forgotten footballer

October 25, 1979, and the news of *Barry Cable's* tragic accident was splashed across the newspapers of Australia's football states.

And just three weeks later one of *Cable's* proteges experienced a similar mishap and he was to go through the same painstaking recovery programme and bear the same scars.

His plight was to remain unpublicised as *Cable's* courage justifiably grabbed the headlines and the media spotlight in general. But for this young man, *Cable* was the inspiration, a shining light that would hopefully guide him back to the top.

The player is *Barry Quick*, a 20-year-old with a wealth of the *Cable* brand of courage and a real will to conquer the handicapping effects of his accident; an accident that occurred at work with his leg being chewed up by a conveyor belt. With five league games for East Perth under his belt, *Quick* was considered to be one of the most promising ruckmen on the Western Australian scene last year.

The handful of games was enough to make a significant impression on many knowledgeable football judges . . . and it was also enough to whet the youngster's appetite for top level football.

That appetite remains unsatisfied. Every time *Quick* watches his teammates run onto the ground, the appetite becomes a ravishing hunger. He would give anything to be out there with them.

Quick was a product of the Royals' country zone and originally hailed from *Donnybrook*.

In 1977 his parents brought him to Perth every weekend during the winter to play with East Perth. He started in the colts, but quickly made the jump to reserves football.

In 1978 *Quick* decided to move to Perth to live, hoping to 'make it' in league football.

That year did not bring him a great deal of success, but the following season East Perth supporters saw the youngster emerge as a ruckman of the future.

He finished 1979 with a sense of pride, for he had made it, and now had an unmatched enthusiasm to get his teeth into the 1980 season.

But *Quick's* football fortunes changed dramatically.

After about 10 weeks of pre-season training his newly-found exuberance turned to sheer horror on December 14 as

the telling effects of his accident hit home.

On that day while at work he slipped and his leg became caught in a conveyor belt. It was broken below the knee and extensive muscle and tissue damage resulted. The turning belt literally chewed his leg to pieces — and at that stage tore his football aspirations apart.

The leg swelled to twice its normal size and the artery damage was so bad that the leg was denied its vital blood supply.

With the possibility of gangrene setting in, *Quick* underwent extensive surgery twice during his three-week stay in Royal Perth Hospital.

The incredible pain was overshadowed by the fact that *Quick* knew there was a strong chance he would be unable to keep his leg — and that his coach was in a nearby room also fighting to save a leg.

The leg was saved and *Quick* returned home to *Donnybrook* with his injured limb heavily plastered. It was to stay that way for four agonising months. The burning ambition to become a top flight league footballer was now revived and he set about planning his steps along the long comeback trail.

With the plaster off he launched head-first into three months of physiotherapy at the Shenton Park Rehabilitation Centre.

All this time *Quick* had no control over his foot, with some of the muscle and tissue simply dead. His physiotherapy programme was supplemented by an intense beach training routine which he rigidly enforced upon himself. It included gruelling runs up steep sandhills and lots of swimming in a bid to strengthen the muscles.

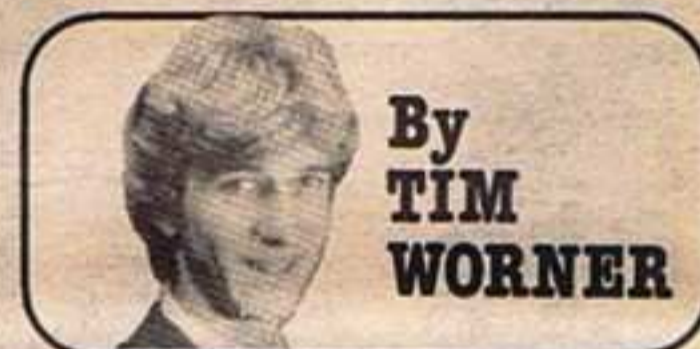
Nine months and countless hours of rebuilding work later he still has no guarantee that he will have the full use of his leg.

Three weeks ago *Quick* started training again with the Royals, but difficulties in kicking and running forced him to hang up his boots for this year.

Coach *Barry Cable* and assistant *Grant Dorrington* suggested to *Quick* that it would be best to wait until next year.

Quick took this in his stride — he has taken the whole thing in his stride.

But those nine months have not been without their pain — both through the

accident and his longing to be out there with East Perth.

"It has been a frustrating time and I just cannot wait to get back on the track," *Quick* said this week.

Quick has looked to *Cable* to provide him with the drive to keep at it.

"His accident was more involved than mine. But I look at him and I look at the way he has beaten it and I just keep going.

"There is no two ways about it. I will be playing football in 1981."

Quick continues to work on his leg in the gym at East Perth, with the firm belief he will make it back. He enjoyed the crowd and the atmosphere of league football. But most of all he liked the competitive spirit of it.

Now he utilises his own fiercely competitive spirit in another battle — a battle for his own football survival.

Talking to the guy, you know he will win.

SEINOR WAS HELPED BY NEW RULE

It was no co-incidence that the last two years were the best in the career of former South Fremantle ruckman Fred Seinor.

Seinor played 219 games with the club before retiring at the end of the 1974 season.

The biggest change he saw during his career was the introduction in 1973 of the centre diamond, which later became the square.

Seinor was a leaper and this helped his game tremendously. The first year the diamond was introduced, he won his club's fairest and best award and made the State side for the first time.

"This move has made football a better spectacle," he said. "It has resulted in higher scores and more accent is now placed on the skills on the game."

"Before the diamond was introduced, the game was becoming too congested and had bogged down. I think attendances were starting to suffer because of this."

Seinor led the ruck in South Fremantle's last premiership in 1970 and is naturally disappointed that there hasn't been one since.

"It's hard to put your finger on why we haven't succeeded since, because we have had some very talented players," he said.

"But over the years I think we have lacked a bit of professionalism in our approach to the game."

"I can't really see us winning the flag this year. At this stage the backline is too brittle and too few players are carrying the side."

"They are not getting the support they need and this will tell on them in the end," he said.

After he left South, Seinor had a brief coaching stint in the South Suburban-Murray League, first with Thornlie and then Kenwick.

"I enjoyed it at the time but my job as an insurance consultant would make it very hard for me to do anything like this again."

"I go to the football every Saturday. It's very relaxing these days," said Seinor. Seinor rates John Todd as the best player he ever saw at South but points out that Gary Scott and Tom Grljusich gave the club tremendous service in many areas.

What was the secret of that 1970 premiership? "Naturally, you don't win premierships without having a lot of ability," said Seinor.

"But we were a very close-knit group and the club recruited extremely well that year. We already had Hassa Mann, but then they got Len Clarke, John Reilly and Alf Oldenhof and Ken Smith from Tasmania."

"Clarke was one of the best players ever to be recruited to South. He was a brilliant half-forward with the ability to win a match off his own boot."

HAYWARD MEDAL TO CORMACK

CAREY Park rover John Cormack has won the SWNFL fairest and best award with 23 votes.

Runner-up was Busselton ruckman Dave Roberts with 21 votes. Leon Baker (South Bunbury), Frank Tyson (Augusta-Margaret River), a son of former champion Charlie Tyson and Shane Brennan (Busselton) tied for third place with 19 votes each and finished in that order on a countback.

The main newspaper award of \$500 has been won by Mines Rovers ruckman-forward Wayne Coles and the main radio award of a return trip for two to Melbourne has been won by Harvey-Brunswick ruckman David Morris.

But the big award of the season is the Paul Motors-Volvo \$2000 premiership which will be decided on Sunday, September 21.

North Albany have won the Claremont Football Club Shield and \$100 for the champion club in the Southern Districts National Football League.

It was their third successive win in the four-year history of the championship.

North Albany players also won the goal kicking awards in all three grades.

Both players scored 13 points, with Paul Western of North Albany third with 10 votes.

The thirds award provided the biggest margin of the night with Royals Tim Hunter scoring 19 votes, four more than Paul Whittington of North Albany. Railways Ray Ditchburn scored 12.

Mincherton takes another medal

Five league fairest and best wins in six years is a rarity in senior football of any standard. But that is the feat achieved by Ballidu coach, Phil Mincherton, in the Mortlock National Football League.

Though Mincherton is a top-class player, his win did come as a surprise, because he has been plagued by back and leg injuries all season.

Mincherton polled votes in eight of the 12 games he played to finish with a total of 20.

Runner-up with 16 points was former Swan Districts player, Frank Scarfone. Last year's winner, Dexter Davies (Wyalkatchem) started the season slowly, but finished strongly to take third place with 13 votes.

Mincherton won the Mortlock fairest and best award in 1976 and 1977. He then transferred as captain-coach of Bindimiling in 1978, winning the Central Midlands major individual award in that season and repeated it in 1979.

He was not available for selection in the Mortlock team against Central Midlands and Avon, or the Wesfarmers country championship team, due to his back injuries.

In what is believed to be a Mortlock record, Murray Clarke became the first player to poll top votes in every game.

The thirds competition is restricted to eight games before the finals, with Clarke polling 24 votes.

His brother, Barry, won the top thirds award in 1979.

The Clarke brothers are largely responsible for Toodyay's success in recent seasons.

Trouble has brewed up again in the Great Northern Football League.

Brigades A reserve player Alan Hedland has been suspended by the GNFL protests and disputes board for the remainder of this season and all of 1981 for three offences against goal umpire Arthur Budd.

Hedland was charged with continually disputing umpire Budd's decisions, removing his scorecard from his pocket and throwing it to the ground and knocking the hat from Budd's head.

The hardest part about picking an ALL Star South Fremantle side is which stars to leave out.

The unluckiest man at South Fremantle is Gary Scott, a veteran of 253 games with the Bulldogs, but we just couldn't find a spot for him.

Scott was included in the 1976 South Fremantle All Star side selected by Bill Hughes, Frank Harrison, Frank Fuhrmann, Geoff Christian and Don Smith.

He was on the bench in that team but in our update, we've opted for current skipper, Noel Carter, who hasn't put a foot wrong since moving from Richmond.

Another brutal move we have made to the 1976 side is to omit Tony Morley and include Maurice Rioli on the wing.

Morley has given tremendous service to Souths, but we feel that Rioli has emerged a slightly more brilliant player.

Others that can be regarded as unlucky not to be included are Fred Senior, Don Wares, Harry Carbon, Laurie Green, Eric Ericksson, Tony Parentich, Bob Mason... the list is endless.

There's little doubt that another side could be picked which would stand up in ability to the one we've selected.

The criteria we used for picking the side was based on length of service to the club, saddled with the ability and contribution that a player gave.

The side is strong and versatile in defence. Ray Richards was a tough, strong half-back before shifting to full-back in the fifties. He was a State player and a member of the 1958 Carnival side in Melbourne.

Frank Jenkins was a fairly unanimous choice for centre-half-back. He's flanked by Frank Treasure and Tom Grljusich.

Grljusich didn't play much football on the flank, but he was a State footballer in both SA and WA and though his gangly, awkward style surprised some supporters, he rarely turned in a bad game.

The centre line and forward zones overflow with talent.

We've placed Rioli on the wing because nobody deserves to be in the centre more than Clive Lewington.

And names like John Todd, John Gerovich and Bernie Naylor in the forward line speak for themselves.

Whenever football's bygone days are reminisced in front bars or lounge rooms, these three names are sure to crop up in the conversation.

Len Crabbe, on the flank, played more than 140 games - and earned State selection - for Souths before moving to Victoria.

Rovers Steve Marsh and Barry White picked themselves. Most of the youngsters would have some knowledge of Marsh's talent but White's name has been cemented in fame. He played 160 games with South and won State guernseys from 1954-58.

Norm Smith was picked as the leading knock ruckman, with ruck-rover support from Joe Reilly.

We've selected Ross Hutchinson (now Sir Ross) who had an involvement with East Fremantle, West Perth and South Fremantle before entering politics, as coach. He took the Bulldogs to premier-ships in 1947 and 1948.

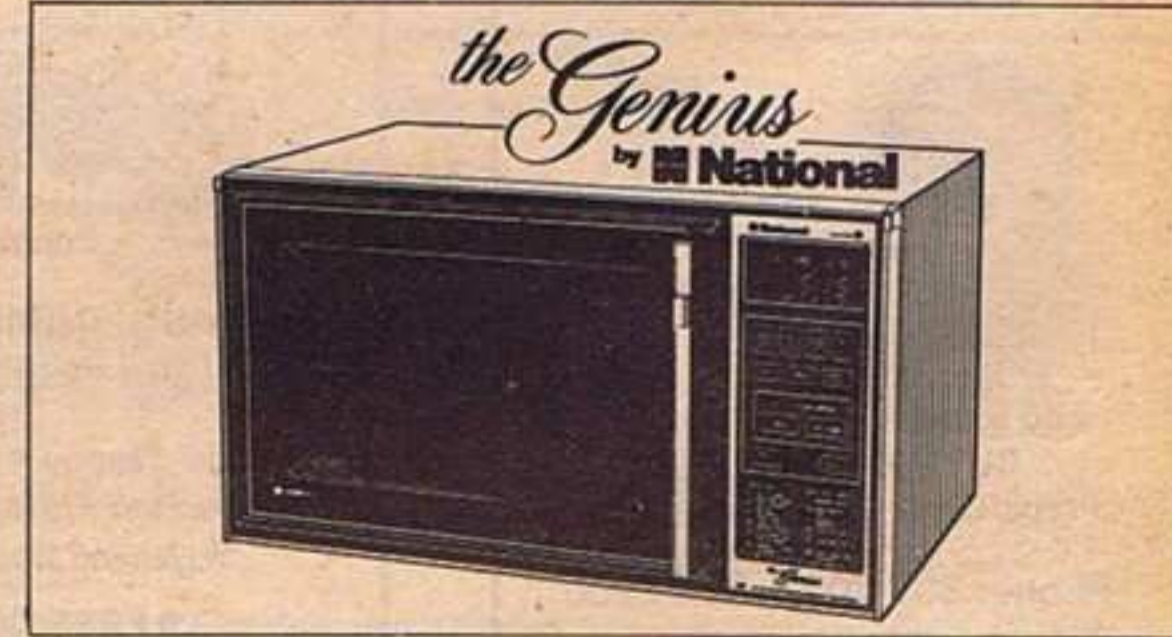

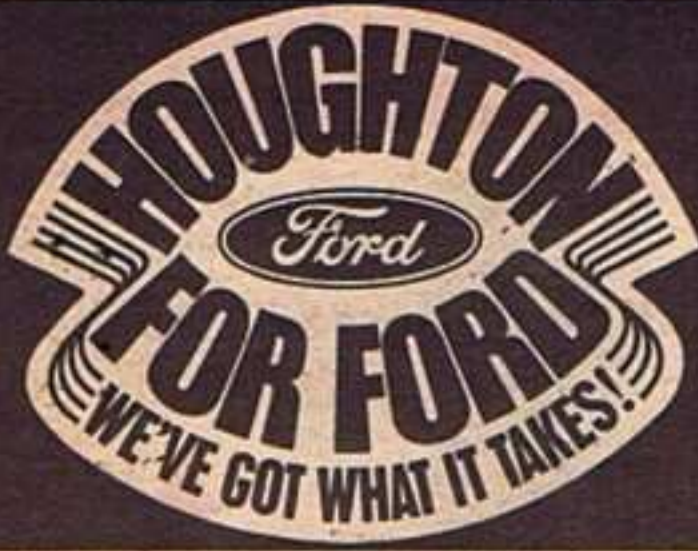

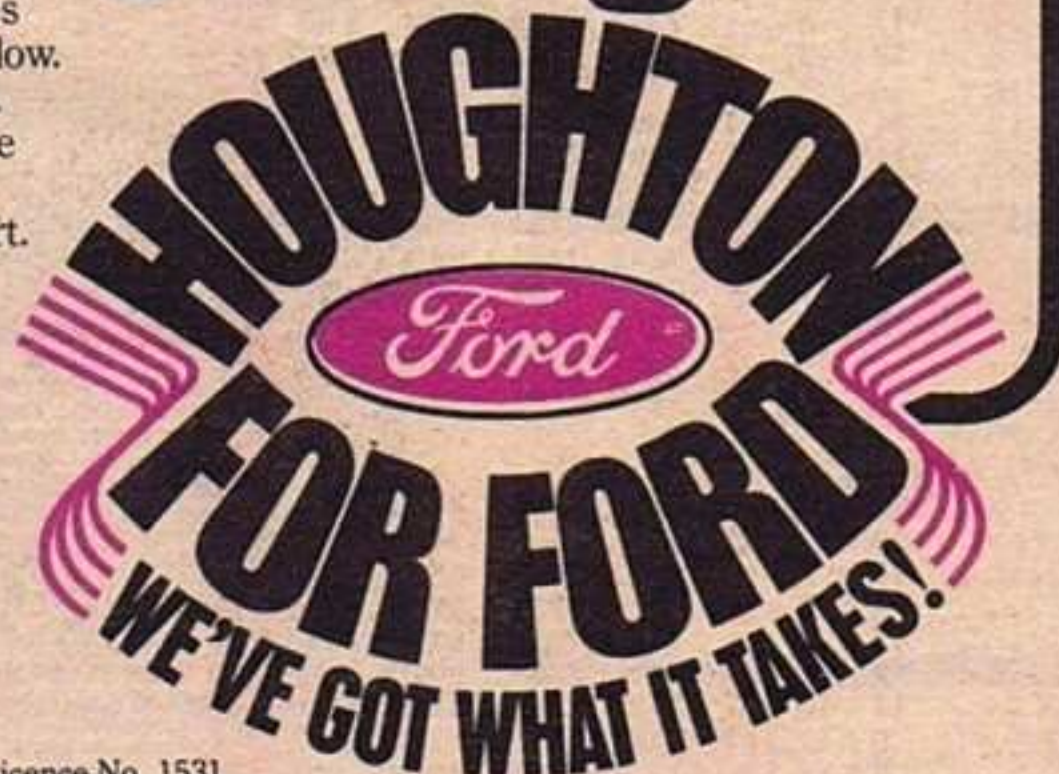


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PICKET SNIPPETS
