FIERY FELLAS . . .

. . . but the Duckworth boys will play it cool

West Perth coach Graham Campbell believes he has solved one of his biggest battles before the season starts — keeping big John Duckworth under control.

"I would have to concede that John has been too easily antagonised in the past," he said.

"He realises that he has to curb his natural impetuosity and he will.

"You will see a very balanced and disciplined footballer in 1981."

Duckworth is the key to West Perth's chances of regaining a place in the final four. At his top, his fiery play can be an inspiration to the side.

But he can have just the opposite effect if he loses his cool and loses his concentration. The team seems to lose control with him.

This Saturday the pressure will be on him. Duckworth is looked on as the strong man and protector at Leederville Oval.

It's a similar role to that enjoyed by Ron Boucher at Swans. If their paths cross, sparks could fly.

While Campbell admits that Duckworth has had a problem in the past, he also points out that he can keep his head in a crisis.

There isn't better proof than a Magarey Medal, which Duckworth won in his first season with Central District two years ago.

At Bassendean Oval he will team with kid brother Bill for the first time in his 154-game career — and this is something Campbell and West Perth have waited all summer for.

"They will have an emotional effect on the side. It's just what West Perth need," he says.

Campbell says he doesn't have any worries with Bill's temperament. "Billy is his own man, and he will just keep playing the way he did last year," he said.

"In fact my biggest concern about him at the moment is with injury.

"He has had a lingering groin problem and got a twinge against Subiaco in our final practice match last Saturday.

"I took him off the ground straight away. You can't take any chances with that sort of thing.

"We have had too many problems with Les Fong to risk aggravating anything with Bill."

The game should always come first

The person who coined the phrase "there's no such thing as bad publicity" has got a lot to answer for!

The 1981 football season hasn't exactly snuck up on us. I believe we've had a series of events over past weeks that, in the end result, certainly won't help the game.

I'm naive enough to think that the best promotion of football is a good match. I'm sick of people telling me how this statement or that action will bring people to football.

The truth is that the situation is almost static and many thinking uncommitted sports followers are more likely to be alienated by the tantrums and the lack of professionalism they may see to be Australian Rules in Western Australia.

It's about time we looked closely at sports like US baseball, US gridiron, UK soccer and racing and realised that discipline and good order are the essential base all are built on.

Sure, they have their problems and their characters, but they do not, nor do they try, to transcend the game or industry.

It seems to me we use the word professional to cover a multitude of sins, but a real pro is one who has a reverence for the vehicle that helps promote and feed him.

Even if the erratic antics and headlines are in some small way helpful in promoting the game in the short term, the controversies and the characters will be long gone when the game is still there.

It's debatable that public support will grow in a climate of contrived or ill-conceived disputes. I'm sure that many people are, and will continue to be, driven to cynicism by a sport that could be seen to be pushing its own product into the background.

THE PRODUCT

What of the product?

Well, it needs to be pointed out that the average losing margin in WAFL league matches last season was 47 points.

Hardly a picture of tough, unrelenting competition each week!

How can interest be maintained in the vast number of matches which, let's face it, are one-sided at least towards the end?

I suppose the percentage system is there to provide a value to each score in every game on the overall scene, but that's hardly tangible to a club fan watching a one-sided match on a wet and cold winter afternoon.

I think we should be looking at restructuring the premiership points allocation. Bonus points have been a great boost for cricket, why not footy?

I think a points system related to losing margins would be valuable in maintaining interest in a match till the end and at the same time reward competitive losing sides.

If we use 47 points as a basis why not four points for a win, three points for both clubs involved in a draw, two points for a club losing by less than 10 points and one point for a club that loses by more than nine points, but less than 30.

It follows then that percentages should be disregarded and instead a points difference system be introduced where margins between points for and against determine positions in the advent of clubs having the same number of premiership points.

This system should have immediate appeal with West Perth supporters, because had it been in use last season the Cardies would have made the finals.

Of course, there are flaws with any competition-regulating ideas, but I think stimulating interest at the ground on a Saturday afternoon should be a prime concern. The only way to do that is by putting premiership points on the line.

THE STATE COACHING JOB

While on the subject of changing the system, let me get back to one of my favourite hobby horses — the state coaching position.

I've long been critical of the way a league coach becomes State coach.

The situation has been made worse this year by our early State game against Victoria.

We've had the State selectors and coach virtually calling for volunteers.

If I coached a league side, I would have done what at least three coaches did when asked to submit a list of prospective State players at their club — including one or two youngsters nominated more with a view to confidence for

immediate club matches than future State matches.

If State football is important, it's about time we adopted a policy of selecting a coach not tied to a club and put him in sole control of selecting and preparing the WA team.

I say sole control, because committees and panels do little else but breed compromise.

Give the man his head and if he fails at least everybody has a fair idea where the buck ends.

A man not tied to a particular club is essential so he can move from match to match on a Saturday, watch various clubs train during the week and be removed from any one consistent pressure group.

WAFL MEN FULL OF PRAISE

Newly-elected WAFL chief Vince Yovich is looking for big things on the local football scene this year . . . and he sees Westside Football playing a major role.

Mr. Yovich, a self-made business man as head of Consolidated Constructions, has moved into the league's top job after serving a two-year apprenticeship as vice-president. He had previously been a highly-successful president of the Perth Football Club, taking them through one of their most glorious eras.

Success comes at second attempt



Swan Districts were the glamour team for most of the 1980 season, winning 12-in-a-row to take off Marlboro's \$20,000 bonus and making the grand final after finishing out of the top four a year earlier.

In the course of 1980, Swans unearthed plenty of promising football talent for the future; introducing some young players who seem destined to become prominent players in the next few years.

One of those players is Mike Richardson, a talented half-forward or ruck-rover whose football skills are considerable and whose quiet entry into the interstate arena has been more than impressive.

Richardson is a player who needed to be pushed into the league scene; he had one try at senior football and failed; thinking that it was too hard. He returned to his Sunday football atmosphere.

But fortunately for Swans fans, he was enticed back and even though he is something of a late developer, his influence on the local scene will certainly be watched with interest this season . . . particularly by the Eastern States contingent who dearly want him in the VFL.

This week, to open our Adidas Player Profile segment, ALAN EAST talks to the young Richardson . . .

Q: How do you feel about this season? You must be pretty keen after your strong finish to the 1980 season?

A: Yes, I am. A lot of us were disappointed after the grand final display. We had a top season last year, but the end result wasn't there. All the boys are pretty keen to atone this year.

Q: Was there a deep feeling of disappointment at Swans throughout the summer?

A: I think the disappointment finishes when the pre-season gets under way; you put it all behind you and work towards this year.

Q: Where do you think Swans went wrong in the grand final?

A: Probably the lack of experience in finals. We only had three or four players who had played in the 1975 finals. But I don't really know, because in the preliminary final we played so well against East Perth.

Q: Have you had a hard summer?

A: It's been pretty hard, but no harder than previous years.

Q: What about yourself; are you disappointed about not being able to accept an offer to go to Melbourne this year?

A: I thought about it a fair bit, but it got down to the realistic fact that I wasn't ready to go. The decision was really up to me and I decided to stay here and get more experience; maybe more interstate experience. I'll go for sure, but when I don't know.

Q: What is the lure of the VFL for you personally?

A: A lot of players probably say financial security and I'd agree. But there's more to it than that. You would be playing in the best football arena in Australia; you can't get any higher than that. If you play well there then it's a real achievement.

Q: Have the VFL clubs put much pressure on you to sign?

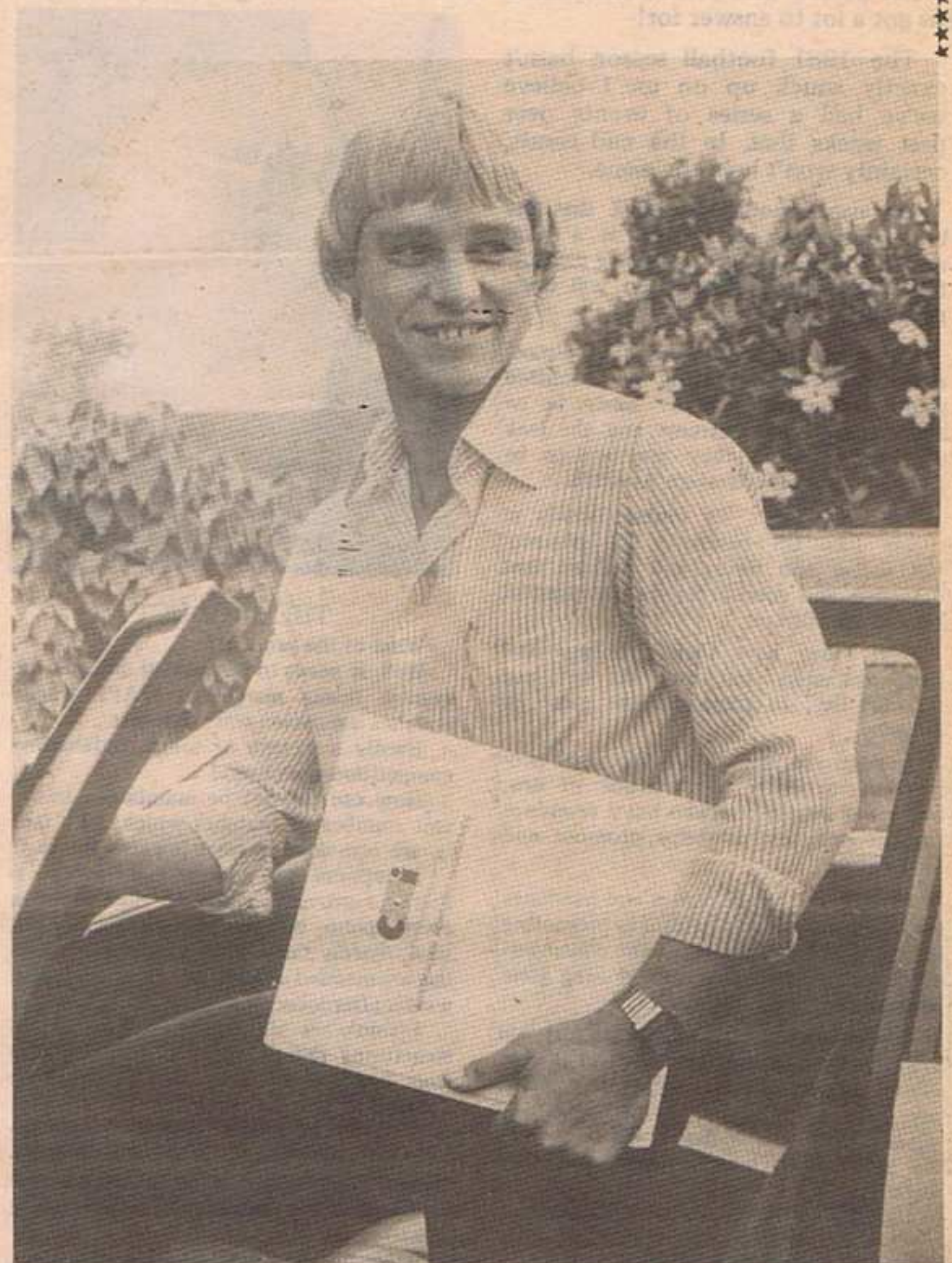
A: Not really. They came on a bit heavy when they first fronted up. They just happened to have a spare form four in their pocket when they spoke to me! I was first approached about a month before the finals; I hadn't even played State football then. Hawthorn showed a bit of interest first, but then Collingwood put up a good deal.

Q: You had a taste of State football at the end of the season, which capped off a good year for you, didn't it?

A: Yes, it was a great thrill. It's something completely different, a lot more pressure. It was certainly a bit of a surprise to be picked to play in the carnival. I only played against Tasmania; but it was good. I would have loved to play against Victoria, but that didn't come.

Q: You have had several attempts at making the grade here. What happened the first time?

A: I came here straight out of juniors in 1977 through a letter from the club to join colts training. But there were about 60 or 70 colts training and I was just one of the mob. I did all the training, but didn't get picked for a game — there were just too many players and I thought I was wasting my time. So I went out to Swan Valley and played the season there; against older men and pretty tough sort of players.

It really taught me a lot; taught me how to survive. Then I got introduced back down at Swans through Lindsay Johnston, who had spotted me out at Swan Valley. It made a difference when someone actually brought me down here and introduced me to the coaches.

Q: So your first real year was in 1978?

A: Yes, I played five reserves games and got my first opportunity against West Perth. I played eight straight, but then got dropped. I played 12 for the year and I was reasonably happy about breaking into league ranks. But I was disappointed at the way I finished off the year.

Q: So you came back in 1979 with a more determined attitude?

A: No, not really. It was a pretty poor attitude as the year showed. I only managed eight games or so. It was a real experience year; getting put through the ropes properly. I got suspended towards the end of the season and that cost me five games or so as I couldn't get back in the side, so I finished with a pretty determined attitude for 1980.

Q: Do you think your attitude is right now?

A: I'm learning all the time. I've learned a lot since first coming down here and my attitude has changed a lot. It hasn't been an easy road.

Q: What people have had an influence on your football?

A: I've spent a lot of time talking to John Todd, but he hasn't made it easy for

me. Lindsay Johnston helped a lot at the start. But another good bloke was Gerard Neesham, particularly when I was going through a low period. He stuck by me and instilled confidence when I was down. Billy Walker also inspired me as a youngster. I lived in Narembeen (Walker's home town) for a while and I thought I'd like to follow in his footsteps.

While the league clubs have been negotiating clearances, so have the radio stations and newspapers.

Heaviest hit was last year's No. 1 rated football panel show '6PM Sportsworld'. The Sportsworld Saturday morning panel show has been changed to Sportsworld Stop Press Team which goes to air 1.45p.m. every Saturday afternoon.

On the plus side for 6PM are Ian Miller and Ken Inman who have joined the Sportsworld Team.

Bob Cribb, Graham Campbell and Geoff Christian were quickly snapped up by 6PR for an undisclosed amount. Radio 6IX, using the selective recruitive method, made yours truly an offer I couldn't refuse (part of the deal was that Yorkie had to come with me) and Jack Sweet retired after an outstanding 28 years of commentating football.

A big advantage for 6IX was the controversial clearance application of Gary Carvolth. But all has been resolved (rumour tells me) as well as the recruitment of Howard Sattler and of course the fiery Percy Johnson.

Already people are placing bets on how long Percy will last on the 6IX Saturday morning panel! He is brilliant when he looks at a TV camera and talks without interruption or when he puts pen to paper, but footy panels, watch out!

AWARDS

Once again major awards are part of football this year. 6PM and Swan Brewery have combined again for the Champion Football Awards which has been increased to \$15,000.

The winner will receive \$5,000 (last year \$4,000) and this year the runner-up receives \$1,000 (this has not happened in the past) and all position players will receive \$500 (increase of \$50).

Also 6PM will have the Marlboro/Singapore Airlines 'Player of the Year'. Voting is based on similar lines to that of the umpires 3-2-1. Marlboro are giving \$1,000 and Singapore Airlines are providing a trip for two to Singapore with accommodation.

RECRUITS

Two recruits Graham Campbell is particularly pleased with are David Vogel and Chris Raykos. Vogel hails from Morwell in Victoria, which comes under the La Trobe Valley League (a'la Kelvin Templeton), and last year he won the 'Rodder Medal' which is the fairest and best medal for the La Trobe league.

Vogel happened to be in Perth on a working holiday and arrived at the ground unannounced and asked permission to try out.

The 22 year old can play half-back flank, centre or half-forward.

Raykos played for Nollamara Amateurs last year. So far this year he has played as an interchange player in all the Escort games and has acquitted himself well. He is only 20 years of age and can play centre or across the half-forward line.

Swans ready for tough encounter

John Todd calls them a good honest side.

"They are as honest as the day is long and while they play like that, they will always be hard to beat," he says.

He's talking about West Perth, the side Swans face in their opening clash of the 1981 season at Leederville Oval.

He realises that their playing structure is well balanced with a neat blend of physical strength and running type players.

But, he still reckons he is at the helm of a better side. "I think we have more ability at Bassendean Oval this year than in 1980," he says.

"Sure we have suffered some losses, we have also made a couple of important gains.

"In our pre-season matches we have worked on gaining balance and I am happy with the situation for our opening game," said Todd.

Like Todd, West Perth coach Graham Campbell reckons he also has a better side at his disposal this season.

Campbell even goes so far as to say the West Perth team of 1981 will have more ability within its ranks than the side that won the premiership in 1975.

"I have never seen such depth at the club," he points out.

"We finished last year in a blaze of glory and players such as Ross Gibbs, Dan Foley and Bill Duckworth just have to better this year even if you only allow for a 10 per cent improvement.

"At Leederville Oval we have about 25 or 26 league footballers. In past years there has been the right nucleus of league players — but they have been backed up by good honest seconds players.

"There is a big difference now in the class of our reserves."

The optimism of both coaches augurs well for a cracking opening game between the two sides, which are freely tipped to make the final four this year.

There has been little love lost between these sides in recent years — but there is mutual respect by both parties.

Neither will be at full strength but both have shown plenty of flexibility in their pre-season practice games.

I think that West Perth may just have a slight edge today, despite the fact that the match is being played away from their beloved Leederville Oval.

South Fremantle coach Mal Brown was concerned about Claremont a fortnight ago and predicted that they would be very hard to beat in the opening game at Claremont Oval.

But, that was before they clashed in the final pre-season match at Claremont Oval last Saturday — a game in which Brown could have shown his hand too early.

The South Fremantle coach always likes to keep something up his sleeve and that 'something' for Claremont could have been the ploy of using Benny Vigona at centre-half-forward on Saturday, then taking him from the ground.

But don't be surprised to see him settle at full-forward. Bruce Monteath's form at centre-half-forward in practice games has been faultless.

I have always thought that Vigona's speed, agility and overhead power could see him succeed at full-forward. His biggest handicap in football is that he loses concentration too often.

Neither East Fremantle and Subiaco can afford to lose in the match at East Fremantle Oval. Team morale for this pair is just as important as the four premiership points.

East Fremantle's form in pre-season games has been anything but convincing and they always seem to have more trouble with Subiaco than other sides.

Nevertheless, the addition of a top class rover to the team could make the difference here for East Fremantle.

Perth are capable of pulling off a surprise at Perth Oval in the match against traditional rivals East Perth.

Coach Alan Joyce has adopted a very low profile approach for his side but there have been plenty of grins around at Lathlain Park in the last week or so at the way things are going.

No matter which way it works out today, there are a few critics that would complain at any match they were sent to because there just isn't a bad one. In fact it's the healthiest round of fixtures that I can remember for some time.

HISTORIANS PLAN WA INDEX

Two interstate football historians are compiling a comprehensive index on every footballer to have played league football in West Australia since the game's inception in 1885.

Norm Sowdon, who lives in Melbourne, has teamed with Ian Everett in Adelaide to produce the index, which they hope to have completed for WA's football centenary in 1985.

The same could be said about Subiaco and Ken Armstrong.

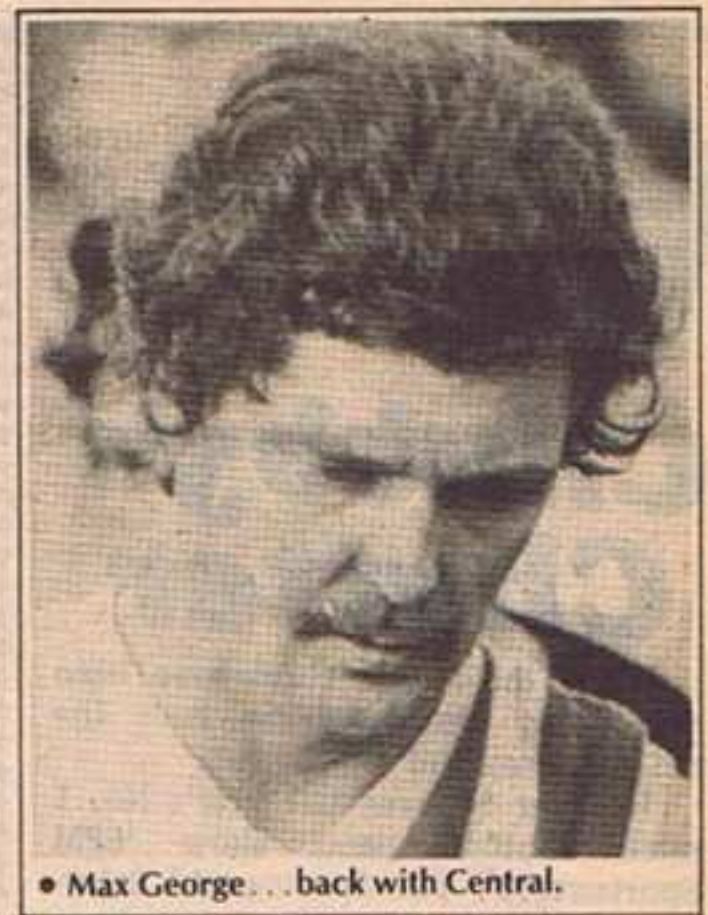

MAX GEORGE BACK IN SA

Former WAFL and Swan Districts leading goalkicker, Max George, has returned to South Australia to play with Central District.

He started the season in great form last Saturday, bagging eight goals.

George first joined Centrals in 1978 after playing 74 games with Swan Districts. He was W.A.F.L. leading goalkicker in 1974. After 25 games with Centrals he returned to W.A. at the end of the 1979 season. Last year he played with Geraldton club, Railways in the Great Northern league kicking 67 goals in 12 matches.

HOPES FOR JONAS

Central District has not given up hope of retaining Peter Jonas for this season.

The talented utility quit the club late last year after being wooed to Victoria by North Melbourne.

He has purchased a house in Melbourne and is adamant he won't be returning to SA.

Jonas is still contracted to Central and his case has been referred to the club's solicitors.

Central general manager Kris Grant and president Norm Russell visited Jonas last month to try and woo him back to SA but were unsuccessful.

The two clubs had confidential discussion last week but the matter remained unresolved.

Mr. Grant said, "We are standing firm at this stage. Peter has a contract with us and we want him to play with us."

"North are attempting to throw offers at us, but at this stage we are not clearing Peter Jonas, and that's a board decision."

North have offered a cash-player settlement and would probably be prepared to pay around \$60,000 for Jonas.

However, in today's inflated market, a player of Jonas' talent would be worth twice that amount.

North has already paid out at least \$300,000 this season to secure clearances for former Glenelg star Kym Hodgeman and East Perth pair Phil Kelly and Peter Spencer.

Jonas, 21, has played only 74 games for Central and six for SA and on that score certainly hasn't given the Bulldogs a lot of service.

CUP LASHED

The Escort Cup night football Competition is a "dead loss" for SA clubs, according to Glenelg coach John Halbert.

Halbert believes the series is heavily weighted to favor Victorian sides and now has little value for SA clubs.

"Last year nearly all SA clubs got to play a game against a Victorian side so you could use the games as a measuring stick," he said.

"This year only three SA sides will play Victorian teams.

"It would be good to win the extra money for the club, but the bias in the Escort Cup can be seen in the umpiring where you have Victorian umpires until you get to the quarter finals," Halbert said.

Sidebottom proves expensive

Former Swan Districts star Garry Sidebottom is rapidly turning into one of the biggest financial disasters in Victorian football.

Sidebottom was taken from the field on Saturday for the second week in a row and placed on the interchange bench.

What made it worse was that he was playing against his old side, St Kilda, at Moorabbin.

St Kilda officials reckoned he cost \$800 a kick in his short and undistinguished career with that club.

Now several Geelong officials claim that each Sidebottom kick is worth \$1600.

Though he was greeted with jeers by his former supporters on Saturday, he said after the match that this did not upset him.

"It was nice to be back home in a winning side but I would have liked to have played better."

BUDGIE STARS

Talented Tony Buhagiar is the toast of Essendon at present and could make the difference in them reaching the final five or not.

Buhagiar sealed North Melbourne's fate on Saturday when he kicked the final two goals in 95 seconds.

Lurking on a forward flank after a tiring game on the ball, he booted a goal at the 29-minute mark and then, moments later, snapped high towards the goal line.

From 50 metres out he saw the ball elude the clutching fingers of Phil Carman and David Dench to bounce four times on a haphazard course towards the goals.

The former WA rover was rightly elated after the game.

"I feel that I have fitted into the team fairly well, but that last shot was a blind kick which seemed to sail on and bounce forever," he said.

Buhagiar's form has certainly surprised some people — even coach Kevin Sheedy.

When Sheedy took over at Essendon there were rumours that he didn't want Buhagiar.

Sheedy had seen video replays of



Buhagiar in action and didn't think he would make it in VFL football.

Buhagiar was under contract to the Bombers and there was a suggestion that they were trying to sell his form four to South Melbourne. However, South picked up his former East Fremantle teammate Kevin Taylor.

RELIEF FOR PARKIN

The most relieved man in VFL football on Saturday night was new Carlton coach David Parkin.

You would have thought he had won the premiership after the Blues downed old side Hawthorn and it was obvious that the win meant more to him than the four premiership points.

It was the Blues first appearance against Hawthorn since Parkin took over and he admitted it was a "big relief".

"It was good to get it out of my system," Parkin said.

"It obviously didn't mean as much to the Carlton players as it did to me."

PERCY'S POINT

After the game Percy Jones — the man Parkin deposed at Prince Park — had some words of praise for him — but a blast for club president Ian Rice.

Writing in the Sunday Press, Jones said: "Carlton proved that 1981 could be their year.

"And that's despite Ian Rice's after-match comments last week, which did nothing to help the club or David.

"His admission that he cast the deciding vote to axe me, and that his decision had been vindicated, must have put more pressure on Parkin, who already had the problem of trying to lift his players after last week's important opening clash against Richmond.

CROWDS SLUMP

The opening round of SANFL Fixtures attracted only 41,000 people. This was 6000 down on the corresponding fixtures last year and the worst opening for the season for five years.

Perfect weather conditions prevailed and highlights included: A drawn match between Norwood and Sturt, reigning Premiers, Port Adelaide's 10 goal loss to Glenelg. And two eight goal performances from Glenelg's Robbie Walter and Max George.

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DUCKWORTH'S FEAT

Big John Duckworth is about to make football history when he becomes the first Magarey Medal winner (South Australia's top award) to play club football in W.A.

Duckworth was not the first West Aussie to win that medal — that honour belongs to Billy Snell who joined West Adelaide after a lengthy clearance wrangle with East Perth.

MY TIP

Swan Districts are my premiership tip following their good 'second' last year. But how often does the runner-up go one better the following year?

In the 36 post-war seasons, only six times has this happened — South Fremantle won in 1980 and 1952; East Perth 1972 and 1958; East Fremantle 1965 and West Perth in 1949.

LATEST START

April 11 is the latest start to a league season for 20 years. In 1961, the first games were played on April 15. The 1956 season opened on April 28, the 1945 season started May 5 and the latest start was May 19 in 1900! (The earliest start to a WA season was March 25 in 1978.)

COACHING CHANGES NORMAL

Two new coaches this year — Grant Dorrington and Ken Smith — is about the normal change in the coaching department.

Only once in the history of the league has all the eight coaches been retained for the following year, that was in 1963. The coaches were Bob Johnson (East Fremantle), Ern Henfry (Perth); Dave Cuzens (Subiaco); Haydn Bunton (Swans); Jack Sheedy (East Perth); Marty McDonnell (South

Fremantle); Peter Pianto (Claremont) and Arthur Oliver (West Perth).

The record didn't stay too long — before the season was over Subiaco had replaced Cuzens with Bob Browning.



FIRST FOR TODD

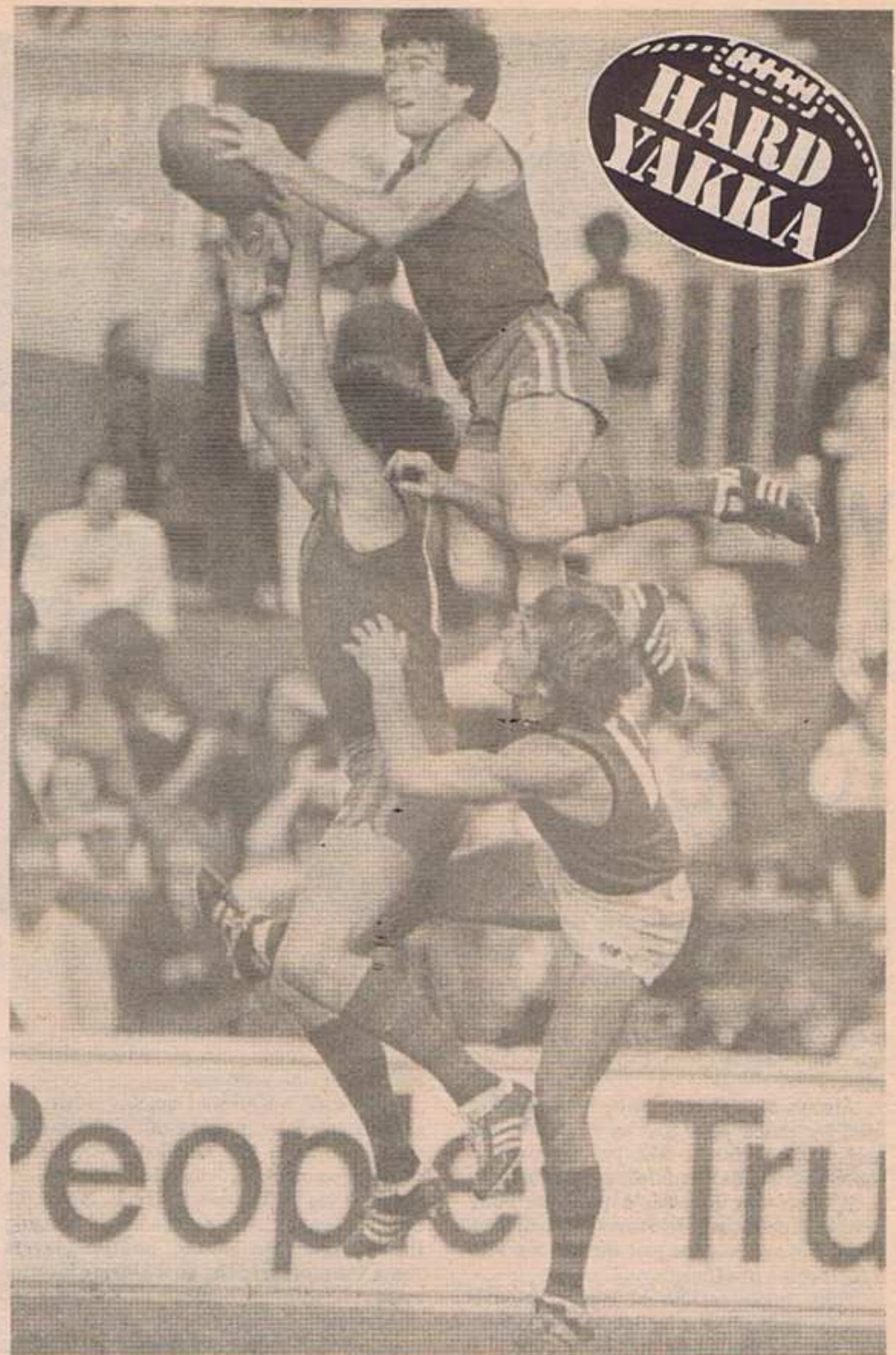
Still on coaches John Todd becomes the first to get a fifth consecutive year at Bassendean.

The longest coaching sequence at the other clubs are South Fremantle's Clive Lewington nine years 1950-58, Jack Sheedy had nine straight at East Perth 1956-64, Ern Henfry had Perth for seven seasons 1953-59, Stan (Popsy) Heal was six years at West Perth 1947-52, Claremont's longest running coach was H. Gepp for six seasons 1928-33, Bob Johnson and Terry Dolan both coached East Fremantle for five years straight, Subiaco retained Charlie Tyson 1956-60 and A. Green 1930-34 for five years.

Reliability was Laurie's forte

Reliability was the trademark of ruck-rover and defender Laurie Kennedy, who played in some of the greatest East Perth sides in the club's history.

Kennedy played the support role for most of his 213-game league career that saw him appear in three premierships sides.

Always a great club man, Kennedy was used by coach Jack Sheedy in the second half of the 1950s to help protect Graham Farmer, the side's trump card in that era. His job was to clear a path for Polly at the bouncedowns, and together with Jack Hunt, it was a role the pair carried out with a fair degree of efficiency.

Polly made certain of that — even if Sheedy didn't. "If you let anyone get in the way of Polly, he wouldn't forget to tell you," chuckled Kennedy.

"That was the way everyone tried to stop him but two customers that I remember well were Charlie Skehan and Garry Scott.

"We used to chase them all around the centre circle, trying to get in their way and in turn prevent them from blocking Polly," said Kennedy.

He is adamant on one point — Farmer would have been even a greater player in today's style of football because of the lack of interference at the centre.

"He would have been incredible. As it was he was magnificent, and the impact he could have on a game was tremendous," said Kennedy.

Later in his career, Kennedy performed much the same sort of role for Bradley Smith at the bouncedowns.

Kennedy was part of the football revolution that Sheedy brought in at East Perth when he took over in 1956.

Sheedy was the first one to really use handball as a weapon and the East Perth game was built around Farmer's ability to take the ball at the centre and fire it out to players running by.

But, Kennedy points out, the abundance of good key forwards at the club during those years played a significant part in the side's success.

"The ball was moved quickly down the ground to make it a one-out situation for the forward and this enabled them plenty of room to move in," he said.

"The big difference today is that a lot more players are involved in bringing the ball down the ground, position players run a lot more and the goal-kicking is more evenly distributed because of the number of players in the game.

"We had some top forwards though. One year Billy Mose kicked more than 100 goals and he couldn't get a game the next year because of the presence of Neil Hawke, who did the same thing.

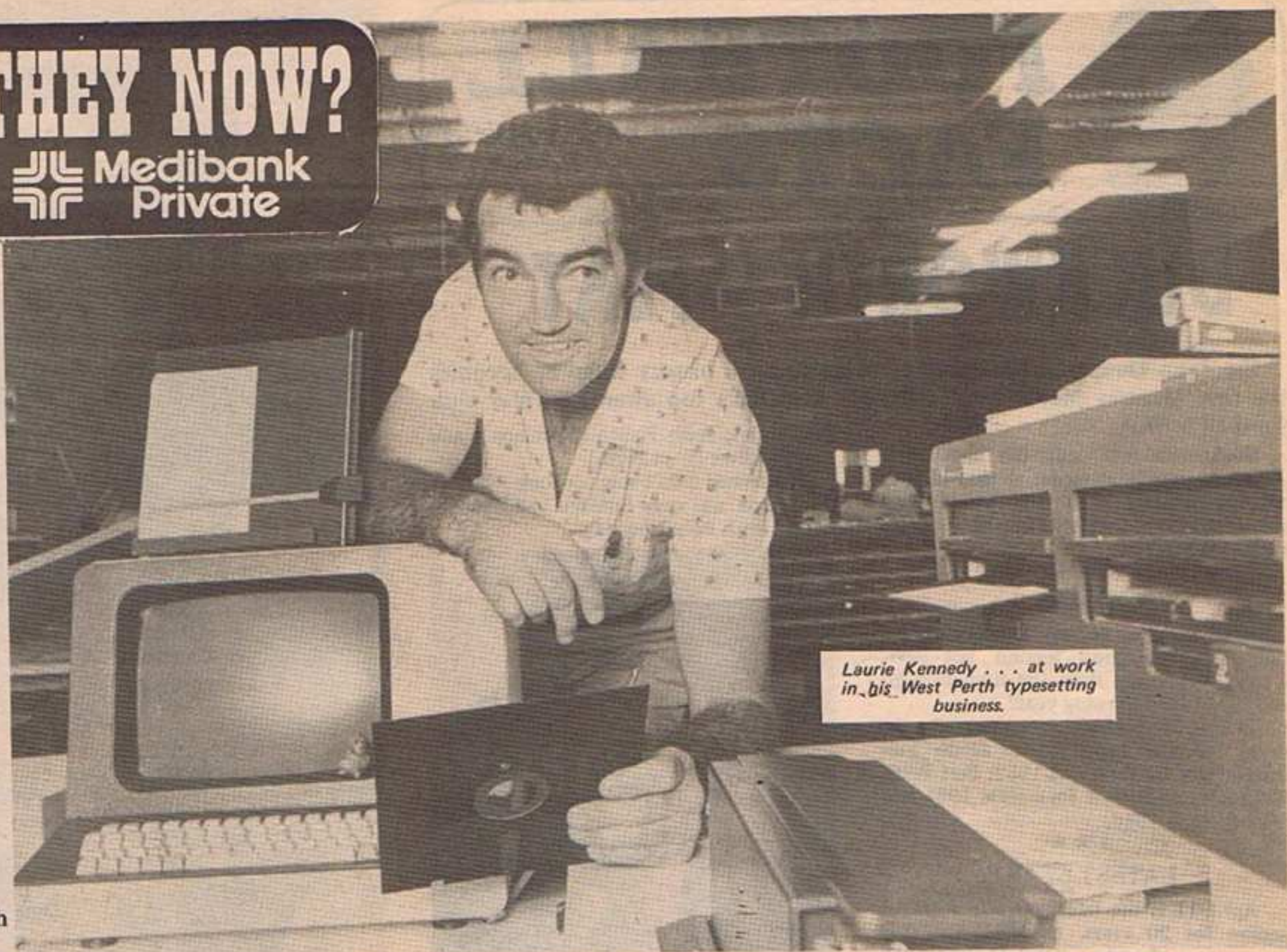
East Perth dropped from power in the early sixties, but came back again to be a force in the competition at the end of that decade, but could not break through for a premiership.

"The big difference then was Barry Cable," says Kennedy. "We were beaten by Perth — and Cable — in the grand finals of 1966-67-68 — but put Cable in the Royals team and we would have won those three pennants."

Kennedy combines his sporting interests these days between playing golf at Wanneroo and going occasionally to the football.

He likes to pick out top games, but makes certain never to miss an interstate or final match at Subiaco Oval.

"I like the way football is going and I think young players today are very lucky. The financial rewards are great and provide the opportunity of a lifetime for a player — if he applies himself properly," said Kennedy.

FROM A COACH'S POINT OF VIEW

Colin Hopkins speaks to Ken Armstrong

Subiaco coach Ken Armstrong is a football realist who knows just how important it is for the club to improve this year.

"We have got to get our act together — it's a very big year for the club.

"If we don't, then you can close the door."

Fighting words from a very determined man. At this stage he doesn't have many supporters outside the club when it comes to assessing Subiaco's prospects for 1981.

Inside it hurts him the way everyone has written Subiaco off before the season starts. It's almost an automatic reaction from the critics — but Armstrong is not about to engage in a war of words with them.

He's an old stager in the coaching business and knows that the best way to make a point is by performance on the field.

He will say this though: "We are going to surprise a lot of people this season.

"We still have got a few problems in the team and naturally I am looking for improvement in some areas.

"We are not making the task of kicking goals easy on ourselves but we are working on this and the results can only come from effort," said Armstrong.

One of the biggest problems Armstrong has at Subiaco is restoring confidence in a side that has been down for so long.

The worst aspect about Subiaco is that young players who arrive at the club quickly get into the losing habit — despite their potential.

But Armstrong has had a full summer with his new charges for the first time and you can see the effect already.

I haven't seen as much enthusiasm, spirit and ability on the track at the club since 1973.

This has been carried on to a couple of practice game performances and their effort against West Perth last Saturday was most encouraging, despite the fact that they were beaten.



Football today is won at the centre bounces. Just ask South Fremantle. This is where Subiaco looked as though they were in trouble last Saturday.

Yet, they still managed to gain enough possessions to have 41 shots at goal and they can only blame themselves on a lot of occasions for their poor conversion rate.

If the score had been 28.13 instead of 13.28, the Lions would have been in the winning business. Armstrong now is quietly confident they will open their account against East Fremantle — a side that has never been at its best against the Lions.

Swan Sponsors

Swan Districts have maintained their previous stability with regard to sponsorship.

Swann Insurance enter their third year as a major backer of the black and whites and Midland Toyota join them this year.

The annual Swan Districts media awards for the best story and best picture were announced this week at the club.

Real estate giants — Roy Weston & Co. — have provided \$1000 for newspaper and electronic media incentives.

New Medals

The SANFL has introduced three medals which will be awarded for the first time this season.

The medals have been named after three former greats — champion goalkicker Ken Farmer and record breaking coaches Fos Williams and Jack Oatey.

The Ken Farmer medal will be awarded to the player kicking the most goals in premiership matches.

The Fos Williams Medal will go to the best South Australian player in an interstate match played either in SA or another State.

The Jack Oatey Medal will be presented to the best and fairest player in the grand final.

GOLDFIELDS TRIP

Two Esperance based teams will travel to the Goldfields this weekend for practice matches. Esperance will meet Mines Rovers in Kalgoorlie tomorrow and Gibson will play Boulder on Sunday.

If we are to avoid being swallowed up by the VFL then we should resist any move that enables them to engulf the WAFL.

The WAFL put themselves into a ticklish situation by organising the fixtures so our season ends a week later than the VFL.

By playing the match on a Saturday, the preliminary final would have to play second fiddle to the VFL grand final.

The preliminary final is traditionally the worst attended of the final rounds in WA as it is.

By playing it on a Sunday, the WAFL allows the VFL to dictate our fixtures.

Okay, there's no avoiding the VFL grand final. It's a bit like the Melbourne Cup. Interest in it throughout Australia is enormous and I'm no different to anyone else.

I would like to be able to see a direct coverage of it on television.

But while there were a lot of complaints last season that the WA and VFL grand finals clashed, our grand final was not affected.

If it had not been for work on the new grandstand we would have had a 50,000 plus crowd. As it was the gates had to be closed before the start of the game.

If the WAFL were so concerned about the two grand finals clashing then they should have worked out the fixtures so that our grand final was a week earlier ... not a week later.

In fact, that was the logical move. All we had to do was start our season the same week as the VFL.

VFL aside, we have had a ridiculous situation in the past two weeks. Certainly last Saturday. After wetting our appetites with Escort Championship games, the WA season was virtually put in limbo.

It was a flat Saturday with football being played everywhere except in WA.

There is no getting away from the fact that the WAFL, as are the other states, is struggling to survive the influence of the VFL.

It has reached the stage that with so many expatriates in the VFL the Victorian competition is becoming almost as big a talking point in this state as our own.

We can't ignore that. But if we are to accommodate it, then let's do it on our own terms.

We simply can't allow the VFL to take precedence over our own competition. If we do then we will contribute to our own demise.

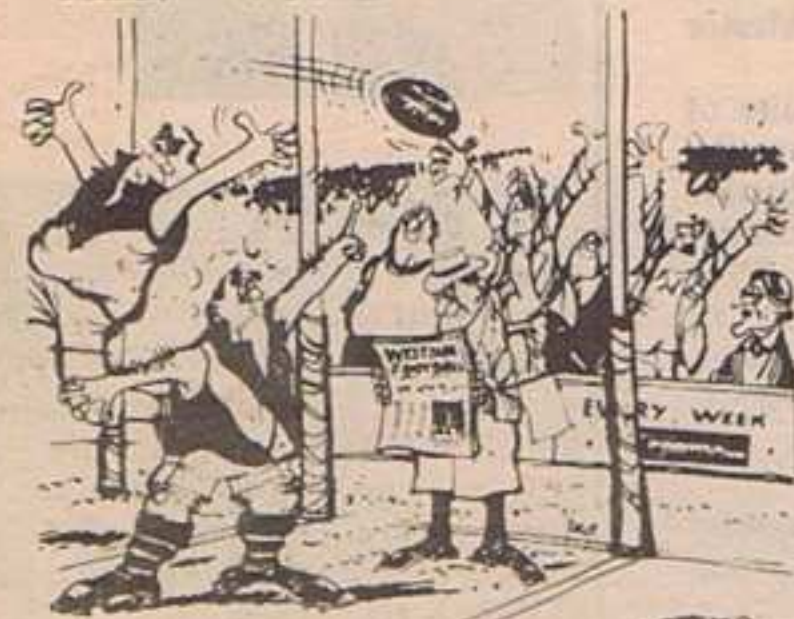

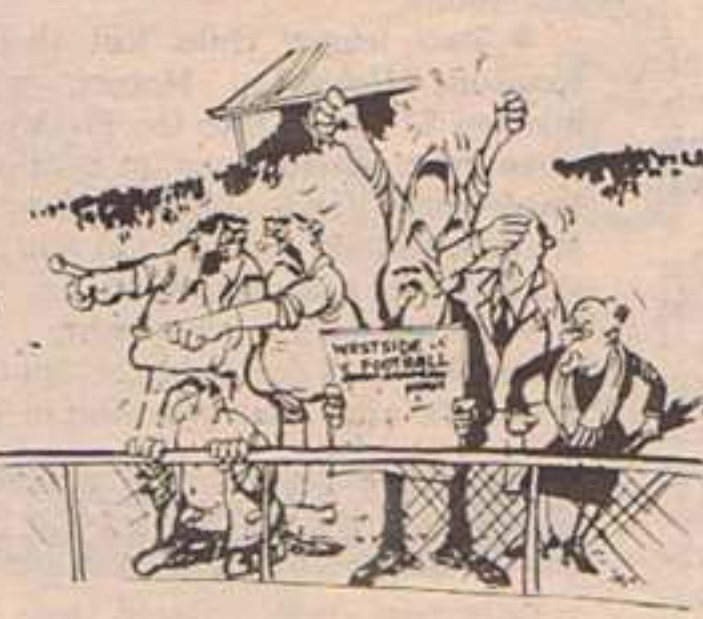

Brown saga heads the headlines

No event during the off-season captured as much publicity as Malcolm Brown's clash with the WA football league authority which eventually led to the Supreme Court.

It is almost incomprehensible to imagine how a striking incident in a reserves pre-season match could lead to the repercussions that have eventuated since Saturday, March 21.

On that day, Brown ordered his club's reserves side to leave the ground 20 minutes into the last quarter. His order followed an incident in which a South Fremantle player, Darryl Stokes, received a fractured jaw.

After calling a halt to the game, Brown went to the Fremantle police station to enquire about laying a civil complaint against Swan Districts player Stewart Egan.

Subsequently, Stokes notified police that he would not press any charges.

Egan later faced the WAFL tribunal and was suspended for three playing dates.

The WAFL directors imposed a \$1000 fine on Brown for calling a premature halt to the practice match.

On the night the penalty decision was made, Brown burst into a private gathering at league headquarters and verbally attacked the directors.

Subsequently, it was discovered that the directors had erred in imposing a penalty. Constitutionally, they were permitted to issue a caution.

The league then decided to transfer the charge, together with a new charge relating to his behaviour toward the directors, to the WAFL's disputes tribunal.

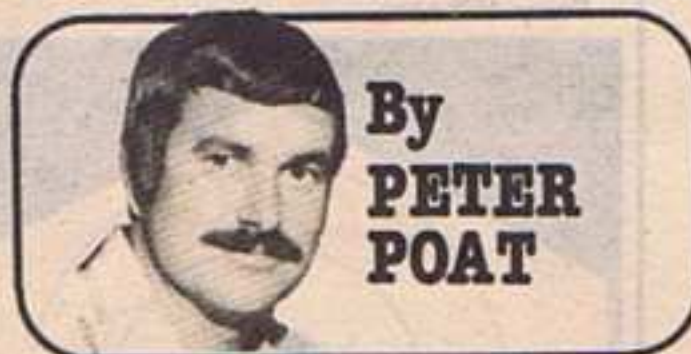
Brown then forced the WAFL to cancel the tribunal hearing after the WA Supreme Court granted an injunction preventing the tribunal from dealing with the charges.

Then on Tuesday of this week, the WAFL was successful in having the Supreme Court set aside the injunction and have the case referred back to the WAFL Tribunal.

In January, WAFL president Jim Davies resigned after six years in the State's highest football post. Mr Davies said he resigned because he felt he didn't have the full confidence of his directors. Elected president in 1974, Mr Davies had never previously been challenged for the position. He said: "It is no good being league president unless you have the full support of everyone around you. It had been made clear to me that I wouldn't get that support if I had stood for president."

A fortnight later, former Perth president, Vince Yovich, was elected to the job. There had been talk of a coup and intense behind-the-scenes lobbying to bring about the election of a new president.

However, Mr Yovich commenting after his election said: "I think it is a great honour and something I have aspired for — which I am not ashamed of saying. I admit the transition from president to president has not gone smoothly, but I won't dwell on that. Football is big business and has become more professional. We have got the best product to sell in the sporting market place, but just because we have the best, we can't be complacent."

In these pages we look at the other events which have kept our game alive since last October.

OCTOBER

West Australia's reign as State-of-Origin Carnival champions came to an abrupt end when the State side journeyed to Adelaide to defend their title.

In two lack-lustre performances, the WA side bore little resemblance to the one which had won the title of Australian champions in Perth just 12 months earlier.

Little more than 10,000 people saw Victoria (14.20) beat WA (9.15) in their first match on October 11. Then, on the following Monday, WA looked all but impressive against a poor-looking Tasmanian side. The championships were poorly supported by the public and lacked the atmosphere and rivalry which were part of the Perth Carnival.

East Perth made a formal application to join the VFL. The move was regarded as a basis for future discussions and in tendering the application the club said it hoped another WA club would follow its lead. The Royals felt that two WA based VFL clubs would help stem the exodus of WA stars to Victoria. The application was dealt with by the VFL directors shortly after it was submitted and rejected with little discussion.

Former East Perth ruckman and Fitzroy captain, Ron Alexander, announced that he was seeking a coaching position in WA.

Following their dramatic slide down the 1980 premiership ladder, East Fremantle decided to appoint a full time coach for the 1981 season.

The 1978 Magarey Medallist, Kym Hodgeman turned down an offer to join Claremont.

Two league clubs lost their major sponsors. Houghton Motors, who had injected \$140,000 into the Perth club over three years, decided not to continue their involvement and East Fremantle lost Melville Motors, who had put \$60,000 into the club over a similar period.

Richmond's premiership captain, Bruce Monteath decided to return to South Fremantle after a six-year stint in Victoria.

NOVEMBER

Only two clubs replaced their coaches over the summer months and both appointments were announced in November.

East Perth chose long-serving assistant-coach, Grant Dorrington, to guide their destiny for two years and East Fremantle selected Mal Brown's former deputy, Ken Smith, from a long and impressive list of applicants.

For both the new appointees it was their first league coaching role.

A major breakthrough was achieved in the area of umpire sponsorship when Joyce (WA) announced prizes worth \$10,500 for umpires for the 1981 season. Under the terms of the unique awards, WA's top umpire could win up to \$7,000. The prizemoney is to be broken up into nine separate awards with votes being cast by league club presidents and an official of the Umpires Appointment Board. The awards: Umpire of the Year \$4,000, runner-up \$1,500, best umpire (Three awards of \$1,000 each for the best umpire in each qualifying round), Boundary umpire of the year \$700, runner-up \$300 Goal Umpire of the Year \$700, runner-up \$300.

Cliff Houghton announced that he would stand down as president of the Perth Football Club. He had just completed two years back in the post that he had held during Perth's boom years of the sixties when the club won three successive premierships.

The WAFL was in dispute with the Claremont Town Council and was considering moving Claremont's home games away from Claremont Oval for the 1981 season. The council wanted to lift its share of gate takings by 10 per cent to 40 per cent of all net receipts in 1981.

VFL directors gave the final stamp of approval to an interstate player drafting system to operate between WA and Victoria from the start of the 1982 season. Under the scheme, the bottom VFL club will have the first choice of eligible WA players, with the remaining clubs choosing in order from the bottom of the 1981 table. A set transfer fee of \$40,000 will be paid. Players concerned must be 24-years-old have played 110 league games or have played for five seasons and 50 senior games. The transfer list will be limited to 12 players per year.

The WAFL Players Association announced that it would set up a service for players who wished to transfer from one club to another. Players would register with the association and be introduced to other clubs. The association also set up a players advisory panel, comprising president Ian Miller, Mal Brown, David Rawlinson and association administrator Peter Rule.

The NFL decided that the rules of football needed re-writing and it gave the job to 1967 Brownlow Medallist and former successful Subiaco coach Ross Smith. The rules adopted by the NFL in 1906 and all the amendments since will be re-written to provide a simpler set of laws.

WAFL vice president Brian Purslowe resigned from the post after a six year term.

WAFL directors voted 5-3 against the re-introduction of a fourths competition.

The Perth City council approved in principle the leasing of the Perth,

Leederville and Lathlain Ovals to the West Australian Football League. The planned leases were to be for a three-year period at a rental of \$1000 per year and the proposed handover date was set for January 1, 1981.

Interstate clearance regulations were amended by the NFL in a bid to reduce the number of applications which were ending up before the Courts. Under the changes, a player need only make one unsuccessful clearance application before taking his case to the NFL appeals board. This reduces the previous two refusals, which took 83 days to a situation where a player could appeal after 49 days.

The NFL decided that there would not be a State-of-origin carnival at the end of the 1981 season.

The WAFL directors decided to experiment with the controversial "centre circle bounce rule" which was tried for the first time in VFL matches during the 1980 season.

East Perth captain Ian Miller announced his retirement after 196 games of football in West Australia and 80 with Fitzroy. He represented WA on 15 occasions, won the 1972 as a ruck-rover with East Perth. Arthritis in his left foot forced him into retirement.

Charlie Doig, captain of the 1946 undefeated East Fremantle side, died after a short illness. Mr Doig was a member of one of the most illustrious families in the history of Australian Football.

DECEMBER

December is developing into one of the gloomiest months on the football calendar as most clubs release their annual balance sheets — and the general picture gets worse year by year.

Only two clubs reported profits for the

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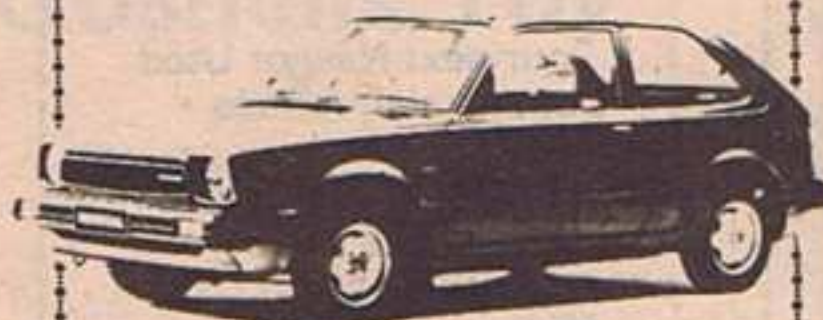

ar. Ironically, the clubs were at different ends of the ladder. Swan Districts, who finished on top made \$6,621 profit and East Fremantle, who put in a dismal year on the field and ended the season in second spot on the ladder, recorded a \$53,001 deficit.

Premiership side, South Fremantle proved that on field success does not necessarily mean financial reward. Souths recorded the second biggest loss of all, when they finished \$53,363 in the red for a season. East Perth lost a mammoth \$1,624 bringing their accumulated deficit to a record \$206,924. West Perth lost \$19,800, Subiaco \$44,227 and Claremont \$3,757.

Swan Districts announced the formation of the most exclusive and expensive group ever formed in WA football. Known as the Golden Swan Club, its membership is limited to 10 people, each for a period of 10 years for a fee of \$10,000. Each member receives 14gr of gold, a golden tazer, tie track suit and all facilities of the club. Each member will be also guest of the president for lunch and refreshments at each home ground and have a specially served seat in the club's new sponsors lounge.

Two clubs elected new presidents. Long serving administrator J. D. (Slim) Somerville was elected to the position at East Perth and former club vice-president Matt Brophy got the job with Perth.

Barry Cable accepted a role as coaching director recruiting officer and team administrator with North Melbourne. Although he will remain in WA, North hope he will be in Melbourne for at least 12 matches during the 81 season.

Brian Cook was appointed full-time coaching co-ordinator with Perth. He filled the position left vacant by Ken Armstrong. East Fremantle had earlier sought his services for a similar post with their club.

Dual Sandover Medallist Phil Kelly announced that he would join North Melbourne on a three year contract.

Former East Perth ruckman, Ron Alexander decided to remain in Victoria with Fitzroy for another year. The 30-year-old ruckman said it should definitely be his last season of VFL football.

The 20-year-old Swans ruckman, Craig Hoyer, was offered a \$100,000 deal to join Hawthorn for three years.

Victorian clubs made desperate last-minute bids to sign WA players before the new drafting system took effect on January 1. Under the scheme players signed before that date would not be affected by its rules. Two 16-year-olds, Shane Bogunovich and Rhett Baynes were made big offers to sign form fours.

East Fremantle rover Kevin Taylor shifted to Victoria to join South Melbourne.

JANUARY

The biggest news in January revolved around the demise of league president Jim Davies and the subsequent election of his successor.

Also in January there was a general warm-up in the race for players from interstate and interclub.

North Adelaide were showing a lot of interest in Claremont's Lindsay Kanther who had also looked to greener pastures locally. Teammate John Annear received a huge offer to join Collingwood with Kevin Worthington who decided to try his luck again in Victoria.

Mal Brown was appointed State coach.

The 1980 Subiaco fairest and best award winner, Alex Hamilton said he would like to continue his career back with his old club, East Perth.

Swan Districts signed Claremont

reject, Kim Trew ahead of eight other clubs in three States.

Doug Green advised South Melbourne officials that he would be continuing his career with East Fremantle, and would not be going back to Victoria.

Former West Perth Player, Laurie Richards announced that he would make a league comeback in South Australia. After having quit league football in 1979, when he played his last game with West Perth, he was seeking a clearance to his old SA club, Woodville.

Umpires advisor Ray Scott revealed that the league was struggling to secure sufficient umpires. He said he couldn't understand why more footballers weren't turning to umpiring.

Subiaco announced a scheme in which top players would be able to earn up to \$700 per match. On top of payments of \$150 for a win and \$100 for a losing match, the club would provide incentive payments of up to \$3000 a week to be shared by the best eight players on the votes of newspaper, televisions and radio commentators.

East Perth were contemplating legal action to prevent Ross Glendinning continuing his career with North Melbourne. Under the terms of a three year contract North had with the Royals, Glendinning was to receive an automatic clearance back to East Perth in 1981.

Former State and Claremont champion, Kevin Clune was appointed assistant coach to John Todd at Swan Districts.

FEBRUARY

North Melbourne agreed to pay East Perth \$240,000 for the clearances of Peter Spencer, Phil Kelly and Ross Glendinning. It is believed to be the biggest transfer fee ever paid between two Australian clubs.

Agreement was reached only after Spencer took his case to the NFL Appeals Board, which granted him a clearance and set the transfer fee. The fee paid for the other two players was agreed to by private negotiation.

Clearance discussions had earlier broken down when East Perth had demanded a total of \$320,000 for the three players.

The East Perth trio were not the only players to figure in transfer battles. Central Districts demanded \$20,000 for a clearance for John Duckworth. The NFL appeals Board placed a value on his head of \$12,000.

In a departure from tradition, the WAFL directors appointed umpires advisor Ray Scott as chairman of the Umpires Appointment Board. The position had previously always been given to a league vice-president.

East Fremantle coach Ken Smith... the man who assisted Mal Brown lead South Fremantle to a premiership last year, was again selected to team with Brown to prepare WA's 1981 State squads. Smith also occupied this role last year, when he teamed with State coach Bradley Smith.

The WAFL and Channel 7 reached agreement for the continuation of TVW's sponsorship of the Sandover Medal. The new agreement would run till the end of the 1985 season and cost a further \$100,000. Though the prizemoney was not increased, TVW would take over the full costs of the medal presentation dinner. The league also decided that women would be invited to attend this year's count for the first time. In another deal involving TVW, the league announced that it would enter into a joint venture with the station to provide a \$150,000 electronic scoreboard at Subiaco Oval.

Former Perth president, Cliff Houghton was elected vice-president of the WAFL.

Ken Smith, Bob Shields, Lorne Cook and Ken McAullay were appointed State selectors for the 1981 season.

The Perth City Council agreed to raise \$135,000 for the East Perth Football Club to finance improvements to the club's building at Perth Oval. The money is re-payable at six-monthly intervals for 15 years.

Meanwhile the Bassendean Town Council threatened to withdraw a \$150,000 loan guarantee raised on behalf of the Swan Districts club because the WAFL had decided to transfer one of Swans home matches to Subiaco Oval this season.

Terry O'Brien took over as WAFL marketing manager, replacing Richard Fisher who set up the division last year.

Former Swan Districts league player and later marketing manager, John Rose was appointed general manager of Subiaco.

A move to have an Escort Cup match between Swan Districts and East Fremantle played in Geraldton was rejected by the organisers, Australian Football Championships.

Radio 6PR and the Bond Corporation would each contribute \$25,000 in a joint sponsorship deal with South Fremantle.

The State selectors decided to ask the eight league coaches for assistance in selecting a squad to train for the State match against Victoria.

Murray Couper decided to shift camps again. After a short career with East Perth, the former Demon sought a clearance to East Fremantle. He was not the only player on the move, clearance applications were coming thick and fast...

Former Swans star Gary Sidebottom transferred from St Kilda, the team he captained last year, to Geelong in the VFL. SUBIACO secured the services of former Collingwood player David Miers, after he had earlier indicated that he would play for either West Perth or East Fremantle.

Subiaco signed former West Perth, Collingwood and Essendon rover Bill Valli. And decided to back an ambitious junior coaching academy with Valli joining Gary Buckenara in partnership. It was believed to be the first fully commercial coaching academy of its kind in Australia.

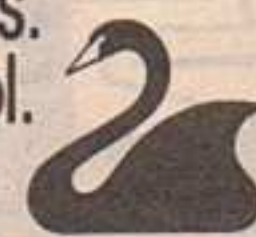

the first weekend West Perth recorded a thrilling one point win over Claremont and East Perth beat Perth. The following weekend West Perth beat East Fremantle and East Perth put Subiaco out of the Championships. Old East remained in with a chance by virtue of their percentage. West Perth have since been eliminated from the series after going down to last year's night premiers, North Melbourne at VFL Park.

An on-again off-again situation developed between Derek Shaw and his clearname application from South Fremantle to Collingwood. The upshot is the Shaw is now back in Victoria and a court case is pending.

The VFL decided to allow the WAFL to select one WA player from each of the 12 VFL clubs for its State of Origin match against Victoria on April 27.

WAFL president Vince Yovich announced that the league's two major sponsors, Marlboro and the Town and Country Building Society, would inject \$250,000 into football this season. Each company would increase their cash sponsorship to \$66,000 and would provide a further \$120,000 in back-up sponsorship.

West Perth appointed Rod Scott as its public relations and marketing manager.

League directors decided that players found guilty of pre-season offences should not be ruled ineligible to win the Sandover Medal.

Belcrest Homes announced a sponsorship arrangement with West Perth.

East Perth club manager Alan Hughes resigned the position he had held with the club for eight years.

Subiaco rejected a three way clearance proposal involving Alex Hamilton going back to East Perth, Valli joining Subiaco and Thornton moving from the Royals to West Perth.

A State squad was selected and commenced training for the clash against Victoria in just over a fortnights time.

VFL matches got under way two weeks ago and already several former West Australians have made their mark.

The East Perth and now North Melbourne star, Phil Kelly, was the first \$20,000 winner - and he notched the prestigious award twice.

Last year it was the lion-hearted South Fremantle and WA ruckman Stephen Michael who took off the State's top award - a comfortable five votes ahead of his clubmate and skipper, Noel Carter.

Each week during the season our unique Sandover Medal guide enables readers to keep their own record of who is heading the list of favourites.

The best three players recorded by all major media are published in an easy-to-read chart under the respective heading of their newspaper, radio station or television channel. The chart makes interesting reading... if only for the wide range of best-players produced by the media.

There is a space for the umpires' votes each week, so cut the guide out, file it away and then on Sandover Medal night fill in the weekly umpire voting.



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Juniors off and running

One of the biggest mass-participant sports in Australia — junior football — launches its 1981 season this weekend.

An estimated 15,000 young boys — and a handful of girls — will compete in junior competitions ranging from grades for seven-year-olds to youths of 17.

This magnificent breeding ground for our footballers of tomorrow involves hundreds of voluntary workers doing such onerous tasks as running committees, coaching the youngsters or catering for them off the field. In addition, many thousands of parents are involved every weekend as enthusiastic supporters.

The current junior competition run under the auspices of the WA Football League and controlled by the eight league clubs, is one of the best-organised junior sporting groups in Australia.

Every league club looks upon its junior council as the lifeline for the future supply of league players. Even this year several clubs have promising youngsters on the verge of league selection in just their first year out of the under-age competition.

Apart from the junior council organisation, most clubs have developed a special competition for their older boys, taking part in an inter-district type series such as the Kelloggs Cup run in the Claremont district.

The councils also conduct an inter-district knockout competition covering most age-groups — and selection in these combined sides is an honour all boys chase after.

New format for R & I Little League

The R & I Little League matches will be played under special laws. While the changes are minor they are more suited to players of primary school age and are designed to encourage greater participation by all players.

The change in laws is in keeping with other major sports throughout the world which have seen the need to provide games for children at their level NOT at adult levels or expectations.

The following poem which was submitted by an anonymous football follower, typifies the philosophy for R & I Little League.

*"Little Leaguers . . .
The Players of Tenmorra!"*

They are the players of termorra, and them we gotta keep,
An sum of 'em no bigger, than Basil Campbell's feet,
I'll tell ya fair dinkum, when they do it at 'arf time,
On their shortened battleground, the pleasure is all mine!

They cum out to entertain us, when the 'biggies' 'ave gone in,
They throw 'emselves into the fray, with scant regard fer skin,
They take it all quite seriously, fight like the 'big 'uns' for the ball,
Their dedication and tenacity, is a lesson to us all!

WELCOME

Welcome to our bigger weekly coverage of the W.A. Amateur Football League.

Since the start of Westside Football some two seasons ago, the amateur section has grown from a quarter of a page in 1979 to a third of a page last year and now, with the support from the players and supporters in amateur football, we occupy a full page.

We hope that the football public gain a better insight into the biggest football league in West Australia.

INTEREST PACKED FIRST ROUND

The opening round of 'A' League fixtures will be full of interest.

This season two teams — Bayswater and C.B.C. (after an indifferent 1980 season) — were relegated to 'B' League.

The 'B' League premiers Old Scotch (formerly N.S.T.C.), and 'B' runners-up Trinity-Aquinas have been promoted.

The clash between last year's 'A' league premiers Nollamara and runners-up Old Wesley should end in a reverse result of their last encounter.

Nollamara appear to have lost several of their star performers including captain coach Colin Ticknell (back to Claremont) and Chris Raykos (to West Perth).

However, those losses could be offset by the inclusion of several top former colts players.

Seasoned campaigner Barrie Pearson (Nollamara's non-playing coach) will be up against the experience of Steve Arnott's coaching ability.

Old Wesley has once again placed their faith in Arnott who has, over the years, moulded his charges into a fast, efficient team with all-round skills.

Trinity Aquinas, in their first encounter in 'A' league, should find it difficult against Maylands.

Trinity, now coached by former Subiaco player Dick Manning, have not been running particularly hot in pre-season games and unless they find new recruits during the early part of the season, they may find the job in front of them a difficult one.

Maylands, on the other hand, lost many games by less than a couple of goals last season and have regained their former coach Tim Wright, who originally led them back in the major league some three seasons ago.

The loss of their State representative and captain Ray Reeves (to Subiaco) will be hard to overcome and it will be interesting to see if their former mobile duo of Glen and Garry Clohessy will be staying after their stint with Wanneroo Sunday league.

Maylands must still be expected to cause upsets during the season without turning the world on fire. Maylands should grab four premiership points first up.

WHAT'S ON

University and Collegians should provide the clash of the round with both teams still uncommittal about the strength of their recruits.

University have finished fifth in 1979 and 1980 by mere percentage and with the return of former member Mike Salmon after a couple of seasons with Claremont and now captain-coach, have recruited wisely.

Amongst their new faces are Kim Craig and Norm Salomons (both from Claremont). Collegians, since the completion of their new clubrooms at Dalkeith Oval, now have a positive identity and should aid the enthusiastic club. Alan Rose (Subiaco and South Fremantle) has the difficult job of matching up to the standard set by their former captain coach Oscar Milne.

The loss of their State representative rover Mark Phillips (to Claremont) could tell in the end as the "Brutal Blues" have been a side full of skill and pace, and he was often a springboard for their scoring.

Uni should record a win and take their first step back to a place in the 1981 final four. Collegians will be improved performers and could finish better than last season's sixth place.

Carlisle has former State amateur player and dual W.A.A.F.L. Fairest and Best winner Geoff Hurran back as captain coach after a year in charge of the 1980 Melville Sunday League team.

Carlisle's clash with newly promoted Old Scotch will be watched with interest, as that young team were one of the best seen outside of 'A' league last year.

Carlisle must improve greatly on the last few years performances to have any impact on the competition.

But they are at a distinct disadvantage as their club is wedged in amongst some highly successful Sunday league and South Suburban clubs where top players are lured away by cash incentives.

Old Scotch, on the other hand are located near highly competitive amateur clubs in University and Collegians.

The liaison with former Scotch College and Nedlands Secondary Teachers College students will determine the long range success of this club who were formerly in 'A' league in 1977 as the Secondary Teachers team.

The final game of the day between Wembley and Mt Lawley will be a replay of the 1980 first semi-final when Wembley won quite easily. George Young, who started his football career with the Wembley club before going on to Subiaco and St. Kilda, has returned as their 'A' league coach and his experience should have a great impact on his team's fortunes.

The 'Black and Whites' are virtually guaranteed a place in the final round, with a record of finals appearances in all grades that may not be surpassed by any club in Australia.

DEATH OF MR AMATEUR FOOTBALL

The death in December 1980 of Mr H.B. Grosvenor, M.B.E., who served a record 43 years (1937-1980) as secretary of the biggest football league in the State, was a great loss to the sport.

His work will not be totally appreciated until the W.A.A.F.L. management and players get down to organising and participating in the full 1981 season.

Mr Grosvenor, affectionately known throughout the football and amateur sporting fraternity as Gra, first became involved in football with his important part as one of the instigators and subsequent founders of the C.B.C. Old Boys team in 1933.

As an inaugural playing member, he was also that club's first secretary. His involvement in sport also saw him as foundation honorary secretary of the Fremantle C.B.C. cricket club and inaugural member of the National Fitness Council in W.A.

During the early 1940's, he was asked to fill the position of organiser and controller of sporting activities in the Police Boys Clubs.

His dedicated support for junior sport never waned which included, apart from football, his involvement in an award for the junior cricketer with the most potential, presented annually at his local Richmond Primary School.

At the start of the 1937 season, he was elected to fill the position of secretary of the then W.A. Amateur Football Association. At that time the association comprised 17 teams with an 'A' and 'B' division.

He acted in the capacity of assistant manager and State manager in many of the early amateur football carnivals and interstate matches.

During 1942 to 1945 the competition was suspended, but resumed in 1946 with 16 teams. In 1947, due to Gra's drive and persistence, W.A. was finally admitted as full members of the Australian Amateur Football Council, and he was elected one of our inaugural delegates, a position he held until his death.

His contribution to amateur football earned him a National Football League merit award in 1958, becoming only the third West Australian to be so honoured at that time.

During the mid-1950's his occupation took him into various country areas, but he still continued his role as secretary with the assistance of his sister Miss Barbara Grosvenor, returning each week-end to administer the growing amateur association.

In 1971 the name of the association was changed to its present title of W.A. Amateur Football League and had 80 teams.

Perhaps his greatest moment in his life time contribution to amateur sport was his being awarded the M.B.E. in 1979.

Mr Grosvenor has left the W.A.A.F.L. with a massive 158 teams, a far cry from the humble beginnings.

With his organising ability and administrative skills over the years, he has laid down the firm foundations for the continued success of the W.A.A.F.L.

Over the years he had always battled for the ordinary sportsman who wanted just to participate in sport no matter what his skills were.

We were indeed fortunate to have such a rare gentleman who had dedicated his whole life to assisting others no matter what time of the day or day of the week.

Thanks Gra.

As a tribute to the late Mr Grosvenor one minute's silence will be observed prior to the bouncedown of all W.A.A.F.L. matches this weekend.

Vale Gra Grosvenor



Gra had for longer than anyone else can remember in Amateur Football in W.A., been the driving force.

He was Secretary from 1937 to 1980, and before that, Secretary of C.B.C. Amateur Club.

Manager of our second carnival team to Launceston in 1938.

An Australian Amateur Council delegate since we were admitted to that body.

During recent years, he had maintained his drive despite failing health, finally to leave us in December last.

This season without him will be a tough task for your Management Committee and new Secretary, it is up to all in consideration of Gra to help that little bit more to keep W.A.'s largest football body functioning properly.

A final thought for Gra must be 'may he rest in peace' knowing that he has left a firmly established Amateur Football League behind.

GERALDTON DISPUTE SETTLED

The possibility that no football would be played in Geraldton this season was averted last month when the Great Northern Football League paid the Geraldton Town Council more than \$1000 to settle a ground rentals dispute.

The league paid the money after the council said it was not prepared to make its Geraldton grounds — the Recreation Ground and the Sportsman's complex — available to the league for matches this season.

This was the culmination of a dispute which arose after the council increased ground rental charges in 1979. The league claimed it had not agreed to pay the council 12½ per cent of gate takings for the 1979 season and was withholding payment.

At a special meeting, the league agreed to reverse a previous unanimous decision not to pay the additional fee. The league did so because it felt it did not have the right to deprive the Geraldton football public of seeing matches in the town.

In a letter to the council the league, which is struggling financially, said it would seek council support in a submission to the local member of State Parliament to bring the league's plight to the attention of Parliament.

In 1960 a similar dispute between the South West National Football League and the Bunbury Town Council resulted in no football being played in Bunbury for 12 months. The three Bunbury based clubs played home matches on nearby country ovals.

GERALDTON START

The G.N.N.F.L. was the first major league to commence play this season when the opening set of fixtures were contested last weekend.

Last years premiers Railways are expected to have another good season and started as premiers favourites. The team is again led by former Swans player Bevan Rose. Rovers are tipped to do well under veteran coach Alex Kotowski.

Northampton with new coach Bob Johnstone are certain finals contenders. Mullewa have lost many of the players who represented them in last years grand final and coach Gary McCormack will

have his work cut out this season.

Brigades are confident of a good season under coach Ray Hicks. Their team is much the same as last years.

Chapman Valley under coach Erin Johnson are hoping for better things this season and are sure to make their presence felt.

KALGOORLIE LAND BIG SPONSOR

The 1980 Goldfields National Football League premiers, Kalgoorlie City, have negotiated a \$2,500 sponsorship deal with Penfolds Wines.

When Penfolds' State sales manager, Bill Gryst, announced the sponsorship recently he said it was the first time his company has been involved in such a deal.

In addition to the \$2,500 cash input, which would be used to pay uncontracted players, the company would provide additional player incentives such as a "mark of the day" award.

Penfolds' State manager, Bert Penniment, said the agreement with the club was a one year re-newable contract.

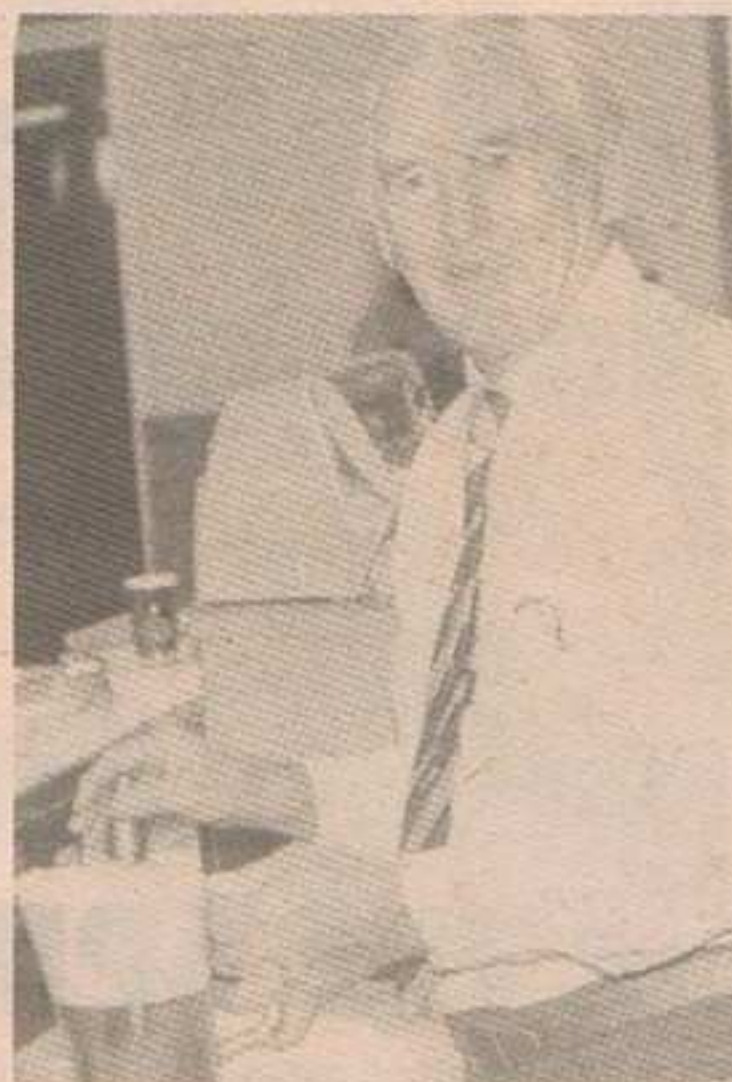
LIGHTNING CARNIVAL

UMPIRE CRISIS

The Upper Great Southern National Football League faces an umpire crisis and may have to call on clubs to umpire their own matches.

The league needs a minimum of seven field umpires each week to service their league and reserves matches. Up until early this week only one person had applied. Fixtures start this Sunday.

The situation has been worsened this year because the WAFL umpires panel will supply the league with only three umpires, leaving the league to find another two league, plus five for their reserves competition.

League secretary John Pillage said this week that competing clubs may be called to supply one umpire each for matches which cannot be supplied with an official umpire. If this happened, these games would probably operate under the two umpire system... each club having a representative.

The league has advertised extensively to attract umpires, but with little effect. In a last minute bid to draw applicants from outside the district, the league last week decided to pay travelling expenses. The match fees are league \$55, reserves \$40 and thirds \$30.

Chasing the double-figure goal tally in a league football match is a coveted feat achieved by few players.

You need to be able to take full advantage of every opportunity that comes your way and have to kick very straight.

This season, players achieving the feat will be awarded \$100 by The Marlboro Company, in association with Westside Football.

Ten men have kicked 10 goals or more in the past four seasons of league football — and a number of them have done it twice.

In fact, last year two 'discoveries' achieved the feat twice.

Claremont's rookie-of-the-year, Warren Ralph, bagged 11 goals in games against Subiaco and East Fremantle, while East Perth's prolific scorer Paul Arnold kicked 10 goals in two games in succession.

He notched 10.3 against East Fremantle and then nonchalantly bagged an accurate 11.1 next week against Perth.

Swan Districts full-forward Simon Beasley missed the mark narrowly when he kicked nine goals on two occasions.

Spring-heeled West Perth high-flier Rod Alderton went close to the double figures with a nine-goal tally and teammate, Chris Stasinowsky, bagged eight one week, as did mercurial Perth forward Peter Bosustow.

Premiers South Fremantle had a far more even spread of goal-scorers with Brad Hardie, Don Haddow and Neil Randall all kicking seven goals on separate occasions.

Subiaco's new goalsneak — Victorian recruit Peter Munro — snapped seven on one occasion, while East Fremantle's live-wire forward Ken Judge had six-goal hauls three times.

The previous year, 1979, three full-forwards — South Fremantle's Ray Bauskis, Perth's Murray Couper and Swan's Mark Olsen — reached the double figures.

In 1978, Olsen proved to be the State's leading goal-bagger with three 10 goal plus performances — two opposed to a club he always plays well against — South Fremantle.

State cricketer Mick Malone was playing football for Subiaco during that season and achieved a remarkable 11.8 against.

Ray Bauskis bagged another 10 and Rod Alderton and Archie Duda etched their names into this prestigious list with 11.4 and 10.1 respectively.

The year before that — 1977 — saw Robert Wiley to the forefront as a goal-kicker and he bagged 10 twice, as did East Fremantle's leaping goalsneak Jim Sewell who kicked two lots of 12 in the first three games.

Duda — still with East Perth at this stage — kicked an 11 and a 10 and Ray Bauskis pushed his name up the ladder with an 11-goal performance and Murray Couper kicked 10 goals for Perth in a game against Subiaco.

 - Shiek Abdullah, chairman of the London stock exchange, sponsoring the Sydney Sharks.
 - \$12 million a year being spent on junior development representing 6.6 per cent of turnover.
 - Goal umpires using laser beams to relay scores to the scoreboard.
 - Only three VFL matches being played each Saturday — Sydney, Brisbane, Sunday and night matches taking care of the remaining games each week.
 - In March, 1991, the Prime Minister announced Australian Football to be officially classified as a "protected pastime".

HISTORIAN DIES SUDDENLY

Well known and respected Australian football historian, Ken Pinchin died in his home town of Longford in Tasmania during February. He was 44.

He wrote several books on the history of Australian rules football. Though most were based on the Tasmanian scene, he had been working for two years on a book for the NFL which covered facets of the game's history from every State.

It was a massive project which he expected to take three years to complete. Not long before his death he was working on five books simultaneously.

He developed an interest in researching sport in his teenage days and did it as a hobby during most of his working life, until a heart attack forced him into premature retirement in 1978. From then on he devoted all his efforts to compiling and publishing records.

Westside Football joins with all those who knew him and appreciated his contribution to the game's heritage in mourning his death.

He was survived by a wife and two children.

Grant Campbell a key Royal

Grant Campbell is the key to East Perth's chances of holding down their place in the final four this year.

Campbell is only 19, but he is virtually one of the veterans of the East Perth side these days.

There are not too many teenagers who are going to carry his amount of responsibility this year.

But this will be the story at East Perth. The young players are going to have a lot more responsibility thrown on their shoulders than in the three years I was at the club.

How they react to that responsibility will determine whether they hold their place in the four again.

Personally I think they will just make it - but it's going to be a lot tougher than in the last two years.

There is no shortage of ability. But the young players will find it hard to win tight matches. They just won't know what to do at times. They will find it hard to stop another side when the opposition get a run on and won't know what to do in a hectic last quarter.

But back to Campbell. Because of his skills, agility and height, he has the potential to turn into one of the best centre-half-forwards seen in WA.

But so far he has struggled to get consistency into his game in this position and this is natural in someone of his age and experience.

He will need support from the players around him and I have been a bit disappointed in this aspect of East Perth's performances in the last two practice games.

Campbell has obviously been the focal point of the side's attack but in the last fortnight he has been blocked out.

When this happened no-one took the initiative around him. Campbell wasn't able to get the ball and feed it out to players.

His opponents just kept on thumping it away and East Perth didn't have any players feeding off these spoils.

With Campbell firing and the youth in the side, East Perth are capable of winning more matches than they lose.

If you are not 100 per cent fit in football these days, you cannot expect to survive.

Running is the key to winning. If you can't run, you are in big trouble.

After 14 years of senior football it is very hard to give the game away. It's something that has been an integral part of your life for 10 months of the year.

It's no secret that I had trouble last year and this is why I had to call it a day.

It's a funny thing. You can play all that time, but people always tend to remember your last season.

GRANT CAMPBELL APPEALS BOARD

Perhaps one of the best aspects of football this season has been the use of the Appeals Board by players and clubs.

When it was first set up a couple of years ago, it was hardly used.

This is because of the rules involved. Players had to have two clearances refused and this could have involved a 56-day wait before you were allowed to appeal.

But the football administration saw the light and changed all this.

The result has been that players like John Duckworth, Phil Kelly and Peter Spencer have all been cleared in time for the opening game.

Without that Appeals Board, the hassles may have gone on for weeks. From a player's point of view it is always hard moving to a new club.

There is a lot of pressure on you to perform well and it makes it hard if you are on the sidelines for the first few weeks.

You lack match practice and you worry about what is going to happen when you eventually get out on the ground.

From a personal point of view, I believe that clearance hassles cost me the honour of playing 200 games in WA.

I finished with a total of 198. When I came back from Fitzroy in 1978, I missed the first six games because of transfer problems.

It's ironical. When I went there I couldn't get out of the State. When I wanted to get back, I couldn't get in.
