# SUNDAY FOOTY

## ... worth the try

... SAYS COLIN HOPKINS

Sunday football is a step in the right direction, providing it is done in small doses.

There is room for one Sunday match in each round and a final at the end of the year — making a maximum of four for the season.

The crowd of 11,180 at last week's match between South Fremantle and West Perth could best be described as encouraging.

It was nothing to go overboard about, nor was there any reason to be dejected.

The best aspect about Sunday football is that it was a move by the WA Football League to test a new market.

It provided an opportunity for a different section of the WA football public to see a match — if they wanted to.

The big trouble is that the league is not flexible enough to programme any one of four games at Subiaco Oval because of the various clubs' commitments to councils, members and sponsors.

For too long in WA football has been frightened to experiment. The trouble now is that the league is starting to wake up — and it may be too late.

Football can no longer depend on its traditional Saturday market to survive. New markets and new ideas must be tried.

I think the present format of three qualifying rounds, four finals and a couple of interstate matches is old and stale.

The whole competition needs freshening up. We need two rounds, four finals, perhaps a national competition placed in between — or at the end — and room for an interstate series as well.

There is room for at least three or four games on a Sunday among these.

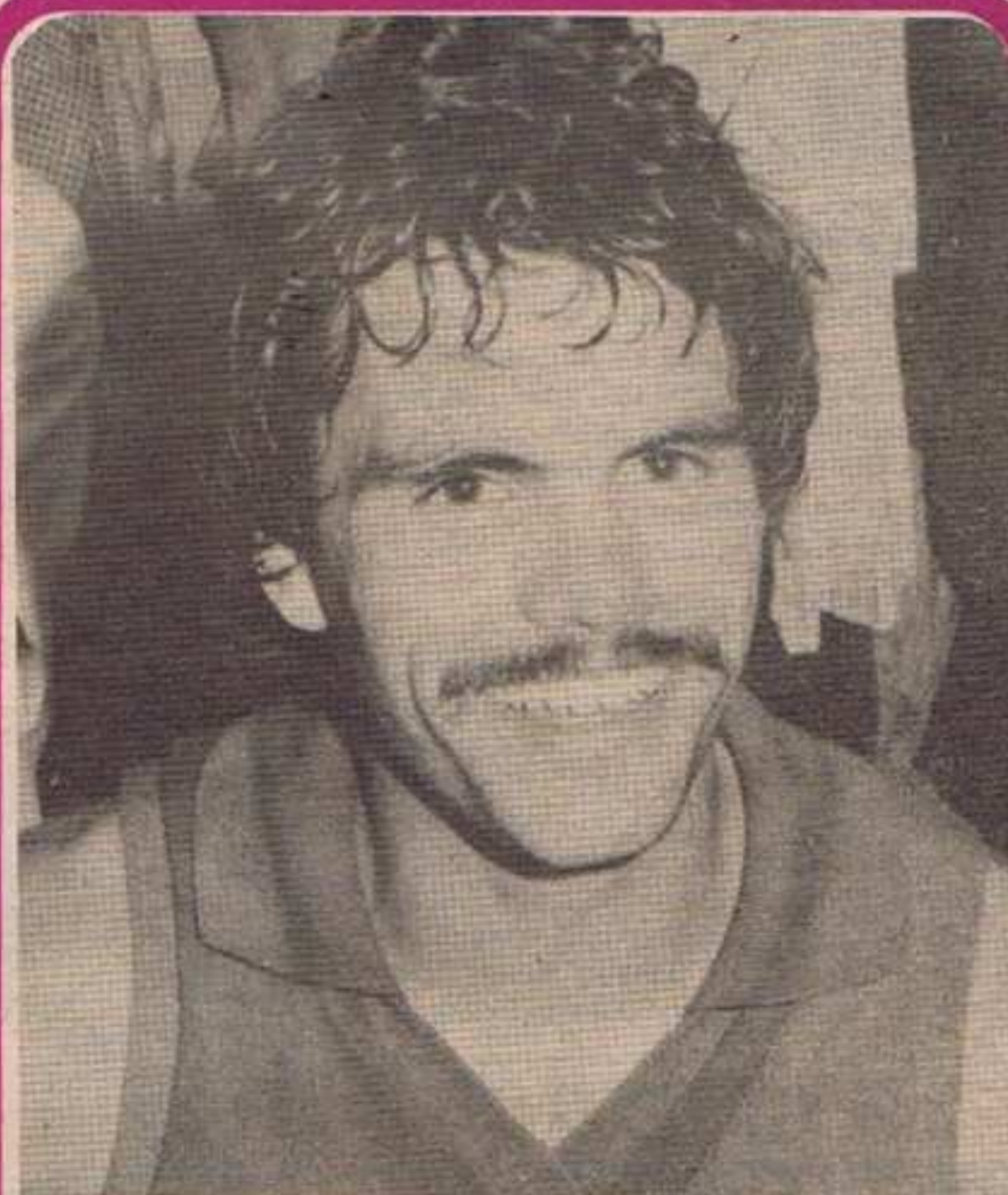
I'm not advocating more football. The season is too long now — and let's face it, our competition is almost split in half already, and there are still two rounds to go.

Our season needs to be compressed. This will cut expenses, cut the complaints from players and lead to different and more interesting competitions.

This year the WA football public were asked to start attending matches in March. I wonder how many will still be interested by October?

What will take time to develop is atmosphere in these games. There was a distinct "lazy" atmosphere about Sunday's match at Subiaco Oval — despite the closeness of the game.

In the years ahead leisure time will grow for most people. If a sport such as football is not prepared to capitalise on that extra leisure time, somebody else will.



## CARDIES MAY LOSE PALM

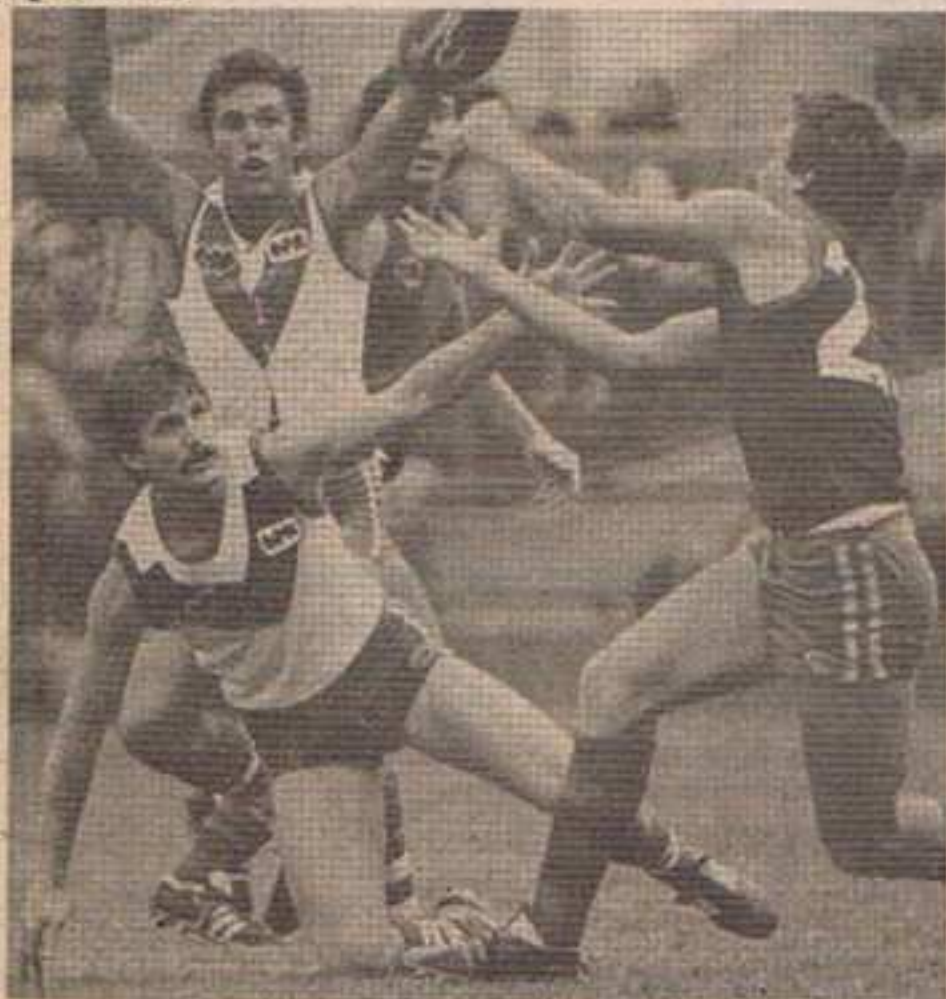
West Perth's David Palm may quit the Cardinals and return to South Australia.

The former Norwood player is considering an offer from West Torrens to join them before the June 30 clearance deadline.

West Torrens, who finished third on the SANFL ladder last year, are now second-last after having won only one of their eight matches this season. But they are making a desperate bid to bolster their ranks and lift their standing.

They have also gained the services of former Swan Districts ace goalkicker Max George who was dumped from the Central District side a fortnight ago. He was cleared on Wednesday for a reported transfer fee of \$7,500.

Palm — one of West Perth's best players in Sunday's match against South Fremantle — has declared that he would not play for Norwood again.

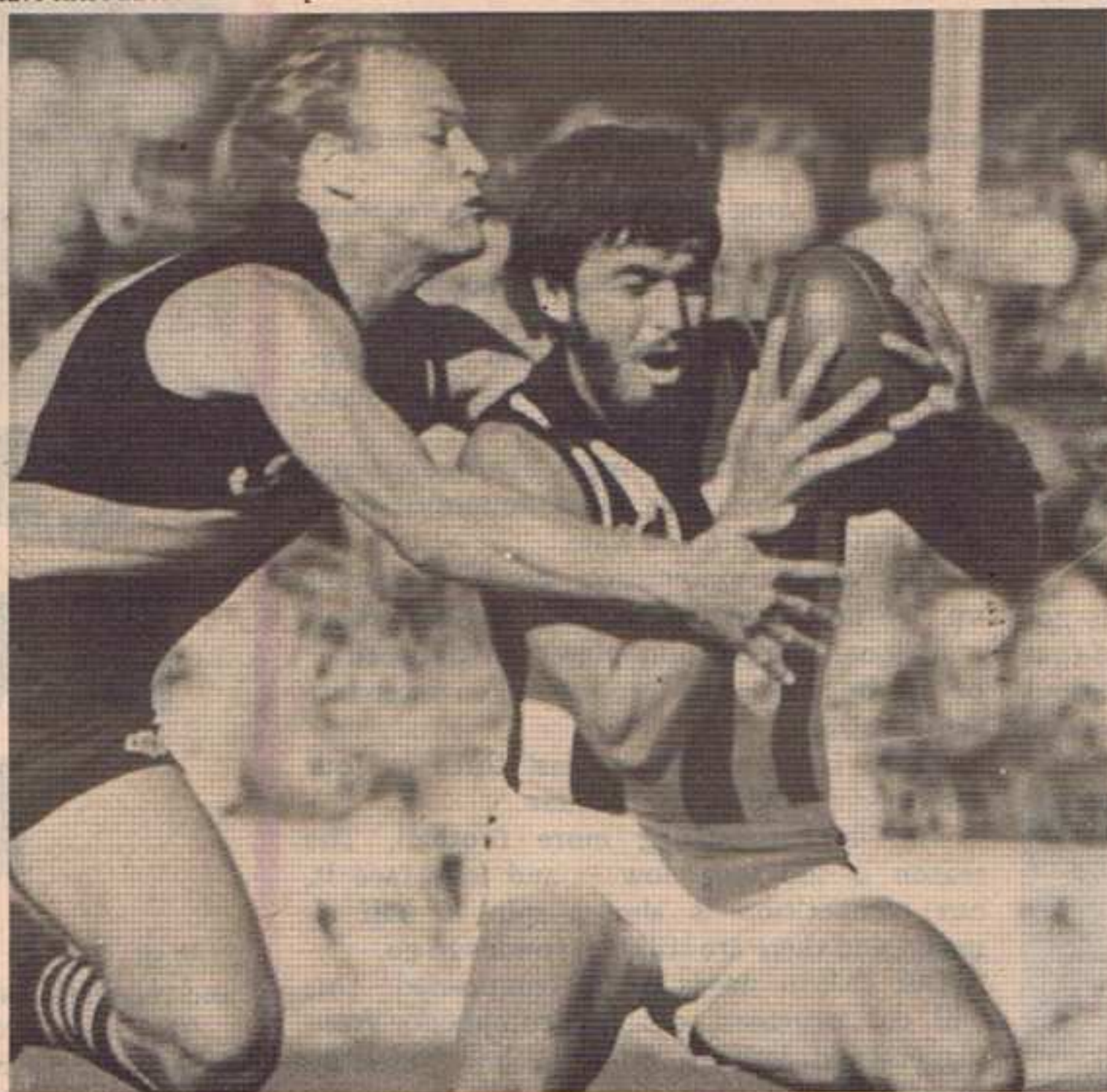

## GREAT COACHING LINE-UP



W.A. football has its best set of eight coaches in a decade. Because of them the game will continue to prosper. It also has better grounds, better facilities, better administration, better junior development and better country zoning than 10 years ago. But back to the coaches. Will John Todd's 13th year as a league coach prove fruitful for Swans? After four years with South and four with East Fremantle (which netted a flag), Todd has lifted the black and whites from last to second. He has kept pace with modern trends; matured as a tactician and built a team around his theory on football. Alan 'no comment' Joyce has matured too. He expects his players to show loyalty and community spirit, he sets rigid rules; believes in self-discipline; is magnificent at pre-match addresses and holds the respect of any team he coaches. Graham Moss has never been in a premiership team, but is the only W.A. coach who can say 'Do as I do' in his pep talks. The gentle giant is well supported by men like Murray Ward, and with a Brownlow Medal and 280 games behind Moss, something is certain to rub off on the players. Results may speak louder than words, but Graham Campbell has both. His knowledge of the game as a player,

coach and media man makes him something special. His optimism, loyalty, interest in his players, and ability to talk make him super-special. Ken Armstrong, Grant Dorrington and Ken Smith are the new breed of coaches, former players with physical education degrees, who have implemented new ideas. They've been educated to understand programmes and drills that relate to football. They've learnt how to develop an athlete's individuality; how to get their players motivated; and how to evaluate their performance. They've generated a new interest in their clubs. Smith believes in giving his players more responsibility. He lets them take training; chair meetings and contribute opinions. He feels that they must, like track and field, golf and tennis athletes, become self-motivated individuals. Mal Brown was certain to succeed. His football knowledge, education, inventiveness, imagination and communication with his players, have enabled him to enjoy the accolades of victory. In 1969 he beat 150 footballers to win a Sandover Medal; in 1972 and 1980 he beat seven coaches to take premierships, and, only a couple of weeks back, Victorian coach Tony Jewell joined his list of victims. With eight coaches of this calibre, it's little wonder that W.A. consistently provides Victoria with topline entertainers in Australian Football.

## WA's TEAL CUP TEAM

A strong and talented team will represent Western Australia in the forthcoming Teal Cup national championships for junior footballers in Melbourne.

A squad of 25 footballers will go to Victoria next week for the national series — sponsored by Caltex — and endeavour to dethrone South Australia as the leading State in junior football.

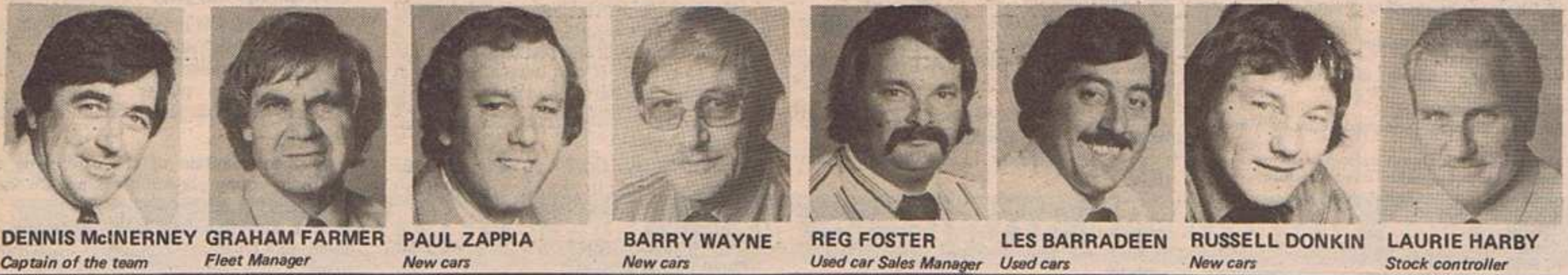
The WA team — sponsored by Town and Country Building Society — will be led by Perth league player Rhett Baynes and has promising South Fremantle reserves player Robert Zupanovich as vice-captain.



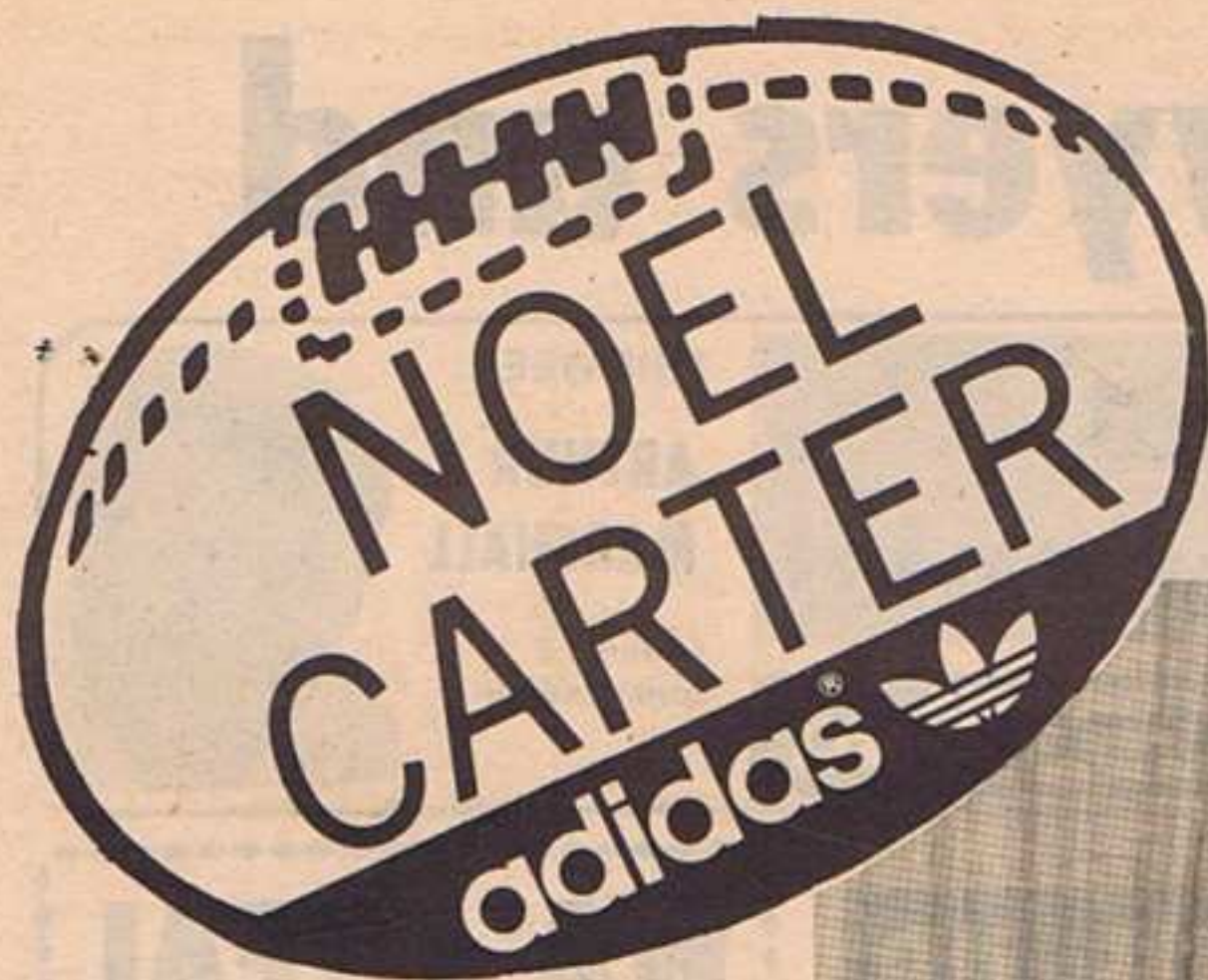
The team has another league player in East Perth's Steven Da Rui in the line-up, plus a bundle of reserves and colts players — and a number of league players from country teams. Seven of the players represented WA in last year's Teal Cup competition — Baynes, Zupanovich, Da Rui, Michael Smith, Mark Valli, Glen Bartlett and Peter Sartori. The Teal Cup, a competition for players aged 17 and under, has already produced a number of top-class youngsters for league football including Baynes, Da Rui, Lindsay Carter (Perth), Michael Cockie (South Fremantle), Glen Rogers (East Fremantle) and Jeff Beard (South Fremantle). The team, which has an average height of 182cm and an average weight of 79kg, is coached by Tom James. The side will be managed by Graham Forsythe and will be accompanied by WAFL director John Cooper and East Fremantle trainer Mal Newington. They will train at East Fremantle Oval next Tuesday night before their Wednesday departure. The carnival runs from June 5 to 9. Turn to page 13 for a comprehensive line-up of the WA Teal Cup team.

Noel Carter was probably the most surprised man in football when he was named to lead WA in the recent interstate clash with Victoria...but he was certainly among the proudest in the State when victory came the way of his side.

Carter is a Tasmanian who moved to WA with only a tentative reputation; he had played league for Richmond, but no-one knew much about him...except Malcolm Brown.

Since his arrival at South Fremantle, Carter has gone on to prove himself one of the best recruits to ever cross the border. This week football writer PETER AUSTIN talked with the Bulldogs and State skipper...

**Q.** When did you first start playing football?

**A.** When I was three years old with an under-6 side in Tasmania! I can remember wearing the league team's jumpers because we didn't have any of our own. The jumpers used to come down around our knees. From there I played in high school football and was lucky to play in the Tasmanian Schoolboys side two years in a row. The second year I played for Tasmania, the competition was held in Perth. I was 15 years old at the time and Richmond had their scouts here. They signed me up and I eventually played for them in

1973. It was fantastic, I played in the winning premiership side the same year.

**Q.** How did you get approached from South Fremantle?

**A.** I wanted to go to another league club. Mal Brown was in Melbourne and he asked me to play with South Fremantle. I knew Mal from when we played together for Richmond in 1974.

**Q.** Have Richmond ever asked you to come back to their club?

**A.** No.

**Q.** Is there any great difference in tempo between WA football and the VFL?

**A.** It's been a while since I played there, but obviously it has changed. It doesn't matter where you play football, you still need the basics of the game. The big difference here is the open spaces and the dry grounds.

**Q.** What position have you mainly played during your football career?

**A.** Mostly as a rover, but I've had a few stints in the centre.

**Q.** Do you think WA and VFL football leagues will ever amalgamate?

**A.** Yes. Probably in about five years time.

**Q.** WA football appears to be lacking big crowds which probably generates more atmosphere and interest. What's wrong with it?

**A.** You must have the big-name players to draw crowds. The super stars and the high-fliers make football the exciting sport it is. Once you get these types of players, they shoot off to Melbourne.

**Q.** Do you think it is a good thing?

**A.** It's good for the footballer — and they are well rewarded. Besides, once one leaves, another will bob up somewhere.

**Q.** Did you ever dream of being captain of the WA side?

**A.** Naturally not. When I came here in 1969, I thought WA was a good place to come back to but I didn't expect this.

**Q.** What do you think of Mal Brown?

**A.** He's controversial. We get along all-right, but it is probably a little hard working with him during the week and seeing him at the football ground as well. I see him seven days a week.

**Q.** Does it worry you a great deal?

**A.** I sometimes get built up before a game or something and feel like telling him where to get off. If you have a bad day at work, you then have a bad day at training.

**Q.** How do you mentally prepare yourself for a game?

**A.** These days I don't go through all the motions I used to go through. I don't know whether it is a fault or not.

**Q.** Do you regard yourself as cool-headed on the ground?

# ... well accepted as WA's skipper

**A.** I think I have rounded off a few of the sharp edges now.

**Q.** Is there any skill you have to concentrate on to master at this stage of your career?

**A.** About five or six. You still have to get a kick and be a part of the team.

**Q.** Are there any thoughts of you going back to VFL football?

**A.** At the start of this year there was when Essendon approached me, but not at this stage. Collingwood also want me to go, but they have to get past Richmond for a clearance.

**Q.** Is your heart still with the VFL club Richmond or with South Fremantle?

**A.** South Fremantle. My heart is with whoever I am playing with. It's like having a wife and job. You stick to one and do your best.

**Q.** What did you think of the interstate clash recently?

**A.** That was a big shot-in-the-arm for me and WA football. I was proud to be the leader of the State team.

**Q.** How do you regard Mal Brown's coaching ability and tactics compared to your past coaches in the VFL?

**A.** Anything Mal does, he has thought it up himself. He's not scared to make his own decisions. I can't compare him with the others because they all have good points and lost games in the past. No-one has a 100 per cent record.

**Q.** What has been the greatest highlight in your football career?

**A.** I was too young to appreciate the Richmond premiership in 1973 so probably the 1980 season with South Fremantle.

**Q.** Has injuries interfered with your football career?

**A.** I have had a few injuries with the worst probably leaving me out of the team for about six weeks. Early this season I had achilles heel problems and that put me back a bit.

**Q.** Has that injury caused any problems with your performances this season?

**A.** It did at first because I missed about two months of pre-season training, but after a few games, I ran into match fitness.

**Q.** Do you train much during the off season?

**A.** There's not much left of that now. I think we had about a month break from the grand final win.

**Q.** Do you think football is taking too much of people's lives?

**A.** No. Not for the money players are getting these days.

**Q.** Is South Fremantle approaching the game correctly this season?

**A.** In any team there are players that think because they won a grand final last season, they don't have to try as hard this season. Those guys just won't be getting a game unless they change their attitude. We can't afford to carry one player in our side. We were the champions last season and everyone wants to beat us. You cannot afford to have one or two players breaking the chain of success. We are in a better position this year than we were last season. At the same period, we won four games in 1980 and five this year.

**Q.** How easy is it for you having players like Stephen Michael in the side.

**A.** He's tremendous. Every team has their champion player and we've got Stephen. He brings players around him into the game.

**Q.** Being captain of the side, how do you help young players breaking into their first league match?

**A.** I always make a point of talking to them and try to give help and encouragement.

Boy, didn't that controversial man-of-many-parts, Robert J. Cribb, give young Chris Stasinowsky a hot welcome to the 6PR Football World show last week? He posed three straight-from-the-shoulder questions to the Cardie star: Why do you wave the ball around your head after taking a mark; why do you duck your head and look at the ground when going for a mark; and why do you act so aggressively towards your marksman after winning a mark? All hot questions, with Stassa's coach, panelist Graham Campbell, coming to his rescue quickly. Stassa seemed a little ruffled, but to his credit he didn't explode and he parried them fairly well. While the questions may have been denied in the main by Stassa, they certainly created a hot topic on the show. Maybe that's what we need in WA football — a more aggressive approach to the whole thing.

## NUMBERS GAME

It's not often you get to a game and the media men are upset BEFORE the first ball is bounced; that is, they haven't seen their team cop a whacking; a player get flattened or umpires do bad things. But the pre-match situation at Perth Oval last week wasn't a pleasant one. Apart from the fact that many of our well-dressed media men had to tackle a filthy dirty Press Box on arrival at Perth Oval, most found that the Football Budget they had purchased in town on Friday — to give them enough time to study the numbers — was way out as far as East Perth was concerned. There were four East Perth players missing in the numbers line-up . . . and that's a very sore point with commentators, particularly radio men who rely on pre-match familiarisation of numbers to enable them to provide an efficient commentary.

## CROWD PLEASER

Come on George Grljusich, you're better than that. To actually suggest that the crowd of just over 11,000 was a good one for Sunday's game at Subiaco Oval was simply being nice to the WAFL. If the Swans-Claremont game, for example, had been the Sunday fixture — and properly promoted — it could have drawn 20,000 plus.

The Perth reserves side looked a motly crew last week as they took the field against Subiaco with four different styles of football shorts — including one that wasn't an endorsed product. A league player also looked out of uniform — what's happening about those endorsed products, eh?

## BOURKE'S BATTLE FOR 300

Reaching the magical 300-game barrier is a monumental achievement in the life of veteran footballers — but it's not an easy task.

Currently there are four Victorians within striking distance of the triple century club — but there is some doubt about their ability to make it. In addition, another four players are within a season or so of the milestone and a lot will depend on their fitness in the remainder of this season whether they can make it or not.

Sunday Observer sports editor, Ken Piesse, has taken an interesting look at the 300-game prospectives in his weekly column War and Piesse — and he features that veteran of many a football battle, Francis Bourke, as the man closest to the target.

Bourke, the battle-scarred Richmond hero, is due to reach the 300-game mark on Saturday week — becoming only the 11th player in VFL history to achieve that feat.

But even the legendary Bourke, a man who has risen to such heights as the captaincy of a Victorian side, has doubts about his ability to go on much longer. Legs are the trouble, particularly on the heavy VFL ground. However, that doesn't apply to Bourke's ageless teammate, Kevin Bartlett, of course.

The 34-year-old Bartlett is about to reach his 350-game mark and seems destined to continue for ever.

Three others in line for the 300 game barrier this year are Don Scott, Barry Breen and Alex Jesaulenko — without including their night games.

Breen, the St Kilda veteran, is crossing off his games to 300 but with 286 to his

Cox was given the honour of leading the Saints out on to the ground; but unfortunately, all the emotion didn't help as Richmond gave them a 20.16 to 15.15 crushing.

Former Port Adelaide utility Max James could be back playing in South Australia in the next few weeks.

James, 29, left Port at the end of the 1978 season to join South Melbourne.

Former Richmond (and Subiaco) player Neil Balme is far from finished as a league player.

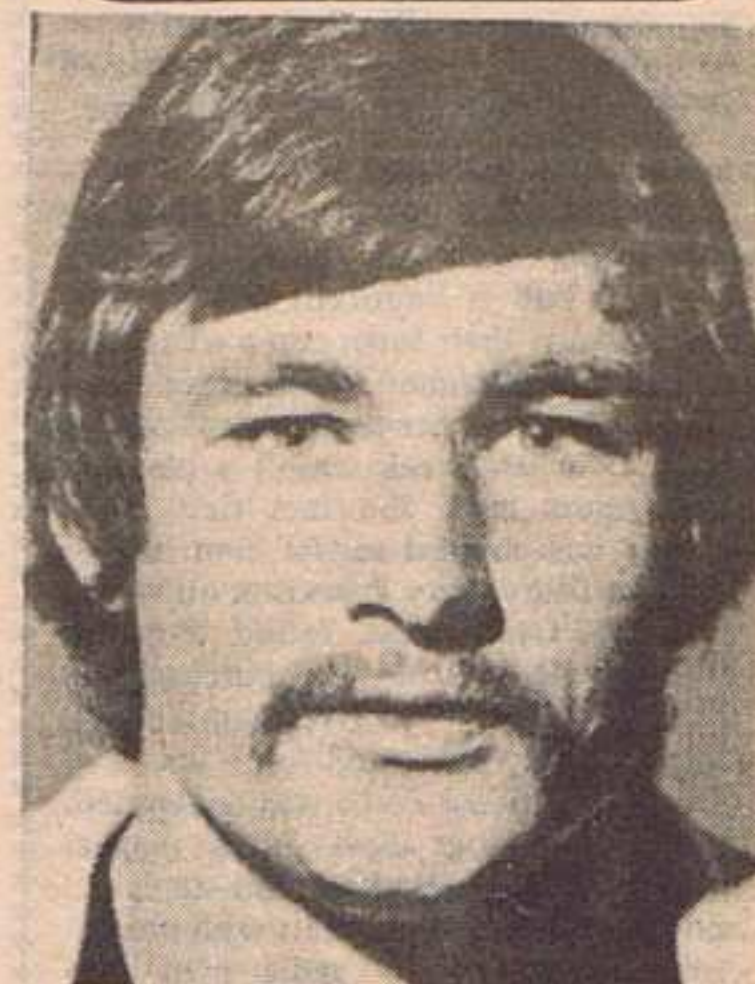
That's the message in South Australia after Balme produced a seven-goal effort at full-forward to help Norwood come from behind to down South Adelaide last week.

### Problem is in the head

Subiaco's problem at present, according to coach Ken Armstrong, is more in the head than in the body.

"Sure, I'm not denying that we could do with a couple of class players to make our job of kicking goals easier," he said.

"But there seems to be an inbuilt attitude towards "away" games that is letting us down," he said.

Armstrong likens the situation at present to climbing up a slippery ladder. For every half step up you go, you come down one step.

There are a lot of things that Armstrong is happy and encouraged about this year at Subiaco. He points out that they are the only side to have beaten Claremont, and believes they would have beaten South Fremantle — but for a magnificent individual performance from Stephen Michael.

But at this stage his charges are letting themselves down because they are not getting full value for the work they are putting in on the training track.

"We must recognise that Saturday is performance day as far as league football goes," he said.

After the game against East Perth Armstrong gave his players one of their heaviest weeks of the season on the training track.

On the Monday night (which is usually a self-help programme night for his players) there was a 10km run.

The following night was man-to-man work for 1½ hours. "It was tremendous — as good as I have seen anywhere," said Armstrong.

"But we failed to put this into action on Saturday. The players didn't get value for the work load that they had put in," he said.

Armstrong believes that there cannot



afford to be any flat spots during a game if a side hopes to win in today's style of football.

And at Subiaco his players must be prepared to work 15 or 20 per cent harder to be a chance against top sides.

One aspect of the Lions that continues to worry him is the difficult job the side makes of kicking goals.

"I don't think I have seen us kick an easy goal this year. We make it look really hard," he said.

"What we need more than anything else is a key forward who can weigh in with two or three of those goals that seem to come easy to a top player."

Armstrong is adamant about one thing when it comes to discussing prospects for next Saturday. "Football is a week to week proposition. Last week is now history and it all starts against next Saturday," he says.

Players wishing to take advantage of this facility can make inquiries on 271 8950 or 271 3700.

Mr Bill Choules, president of the Bayswater club, says that this is a much-needed service as far as amateur football is concerned.

"Prompt attention to muscular injuries not only keeps a man on the playing field for longer, but can save many man hours at work and subsequent loss of income," he says. "It can also, avoid risk of permanent damage.

"We hope that many amateur footballers who receives muscular injuries on weekends will now take advantage of being able to have the problem seen to immediately."

Colin Hopkins talks to Ken Armstrong

### Problem is in the head

Subiaco's problem at present, according to coach Ken Armstrong, is more in the head than in the body.

"Sure, I'm not denying that we could do with a couple of class players to make our job of kicking goals easier," he said.

"But there seems to be an inbuilt attitude towards 'away' games that is letting us down," he said.

Armstrong likens the situation at present to climbing up a slippery ladder. For every half step up you go, you come down one step.

There are a lot of things that Armstrong is happy and encouraged about this year at Subiaco. He points out that they are the only side to have beaten Claremont, and believes they would have beaten South Fremantle — but for a magnificent individual performance from Stephen Michael.

But at this stage his charges are letting themselves down because they are not getting full value for the work they are putting in on the training track.

"We must recognise that Saturday is performance day as far as league football goes," he said.

After the game against East Perth Armstrong gave his players one of their heaviest weeks of the season on the training track.

On the Monday night (which is usually a self-help programme night for his players) there was a 10km run.

The following night was man-to-man work for 1½ hours. "It was tremendous — as good as I have seen anywhere," said Armstrong.

"But we failed to put this into action on Saturday. The players didn't get value for the work load that they had put in," he said.

Armstrong believes that there cannot



afford to be any flat spots during a game if a side hopes to win in today's style of football.

And at Subiaco his players must be prepared to work 15 or 20 per cent harder to be a chance against top sides.

One aspect of the Lions that continues to worry him is the difficult job the side makes of kicking goals.

"I don't think I have seen us kick an easy goal this year. We make it look really hard," he said.

"What we need more than anything else is a key forward who can weigh in with two or three of those goals that seem to come easy to a top player."

Armstrong is adamant about one thing when it comes to discussing prospects for next Saturday. "Football is a week to week proposition. Last week is now history and it all starts against next Saturday," he says.

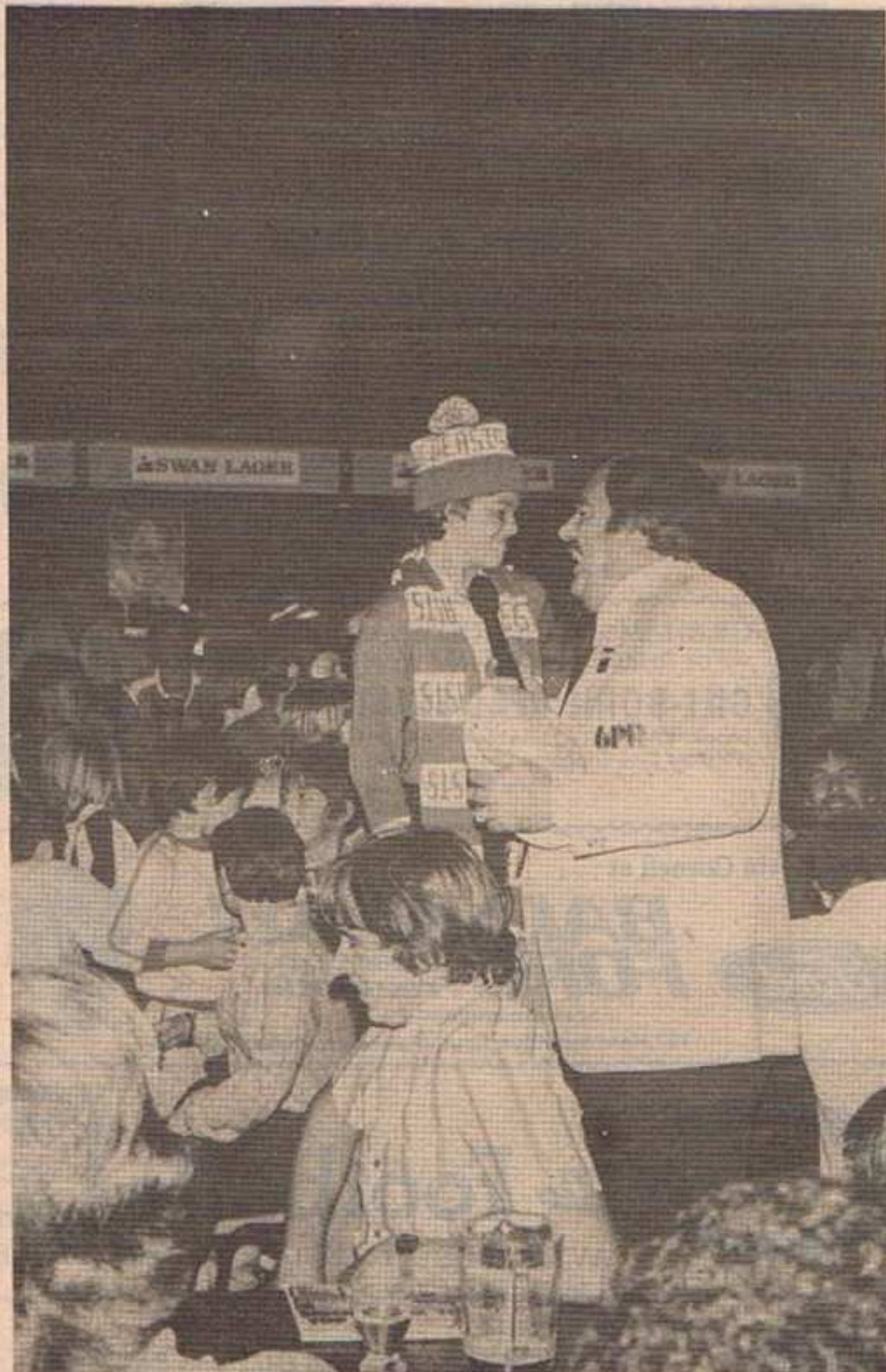

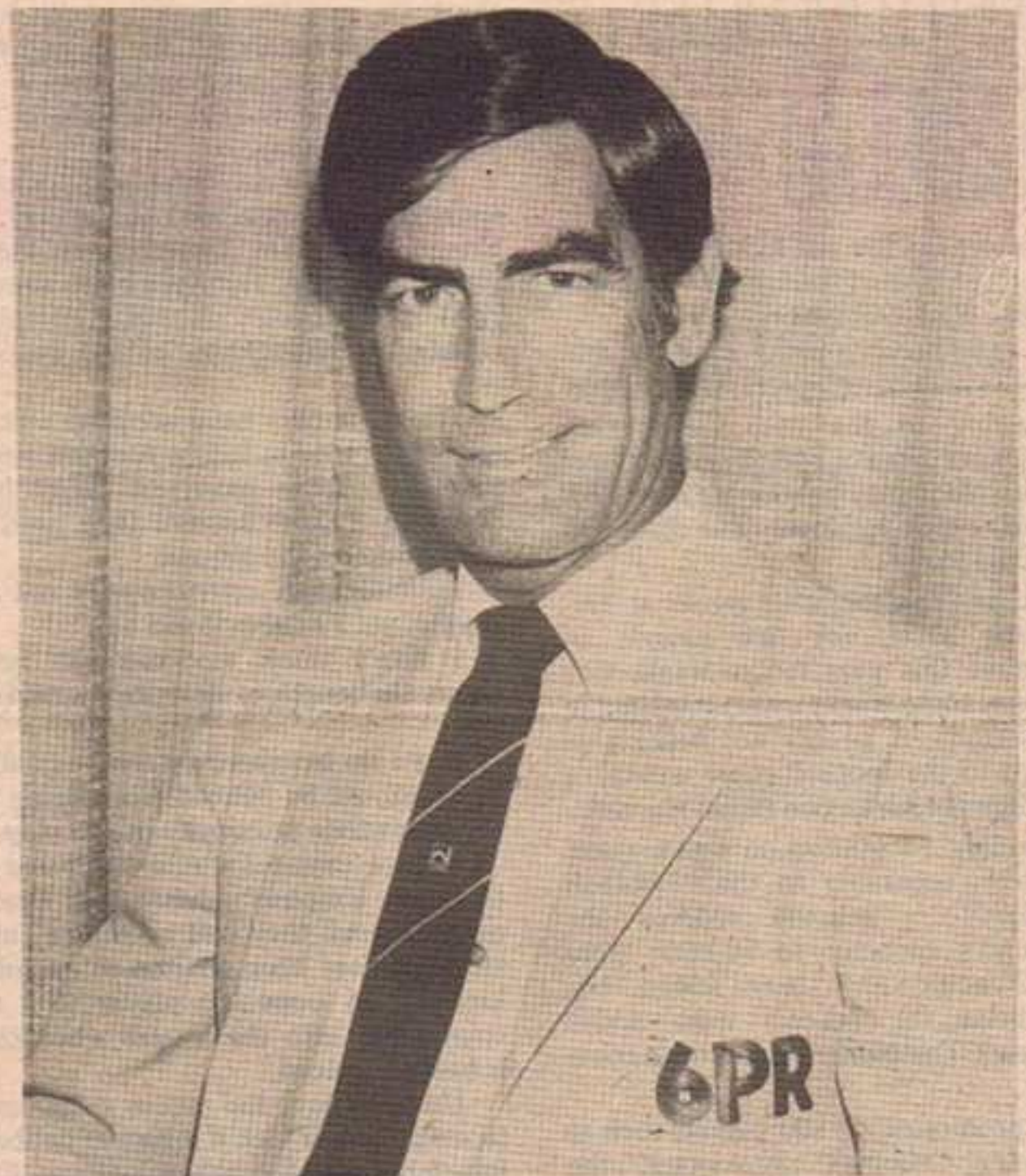

## Runners are a nuisance

It's about time the WAFL clamped down on club runners.

They are spending far too much time on the ground. The worst aspect is the way some are interfering with the play.

There were prime examples last weekend of just how much of a nuisance runners can be.

Some East Fremantle officials were fuming after their clash with East Perth over the activities of the opposing runner. There was also dissatisfaction with the South Fremantle runner in Sunday's match.

I don't blame the East Fremantle officials for being annoyed with the situation at Perth oval. There were some glaring incidents where the East Perth runner interfered with the play.

The most blatant involved East Fremantle speedster Jeff Cassidy.

Cassidy, in a typical burst, got well clear of any opposing player as he streamed down the grandstand wing into an attacking position.

There was no East Perth player within 20 metres of him. Suddenly the East Perth

runner dashed across his path from the bench. Cassidy was forced to check himself. Fortunately for East Fremantle he was able to pass the ball accurately to Jim Sewell who goaled.

I don't believe the East Perth runner deliberately tried to baulk Cassidy. I think he was too occupied with his own job. He was hardly off the ground all day.

But it was inexcusable that a runner should be allowed to interfere in such a way with the play.

It has become common practice for runners to be right next to the play. South Fremantle's Tom Grijsich is the most glaring example. He more often than not is right in the centre of things. Umpires are constantly telling him to get out of the way.

While runners have adopted a far more important role in league football, now that playing coaches have just about become obsolete, I don't believe they need to be constantly on the ground.

Policing their activities may not appear simple, yet I believe it can be.

I don't think anything can be done about the length of time they spend on the field.

But I do believe they can be controlled. They should be banned from being within the immediate proximity of the play.

I know umpires would like them out of the way. Umpires' adviser Ray Scott told me this week they had become a nuisance. Umpires have been advised to award a free kick to an opposing player if a runner encroaches into the square when the ball is being bounced.

Umpires have the power at the moment to award a free kick if a runner deliberately interferes with the ball or a player. But it is a grey area. It seems they actually have to handle either to be penalised.

Obviously the umpires are in an invidious position.

They should be allowed to discipline any runner they consider too close to the play.

The most obvious way is to penalise the team of the offending runner.

This can be done by either awarding a free kick, or more drastically, sending an offending runner from the ground.

Awarding a free kick may put too much onus on the umpire.

However, he could warn the runner, and if he still persisted send him from the field for the rest of the quarter.

Obviously umpires would be loathe to take any action without the sanction of the league, even if entitled to.

The easiest way to alleviate the problem would be for coaches to be instructed of the ramifications if their runner gets involved in the play.

After all, the runner is merely the puppet. The coach pulls the strings. He is unlikely to allow his runner to get into a situation that could deprive the team of his assistance.

# Wafa to clash with Goldfields

Nuggety former East Perth wingman Paul Hyde is likely to get the key centre position for the combined Wafa side for the match against the Goldfields Football Association at Kingsway Reserve on Sunday.

Hyde has been in top form at the pivot for the powerful Wanneroo team this year and should be given the centre role in preference to Mosman Park's Barry Haydinger.

Hyde is one of six Wanneroo players who are certain to line up against the country league. His former East Perth teammate, Mick Fuller, who also started his Wafa career this season, looks likely to be given the centre-half-forward position in preference to Mosman Park's former Claremont player Kim Malcolm.

Colin Northcott, who has kicked 29 goals in the West Perth reserves team as well as playing one league game this season, has returned to the Roos and will be given the full-forward spot.

Northcott, who has kicked more than 200 goals in the last two Wafa seasons, kicked eight against Southern Port last week.

Trevor Heath, whose 12 goals last week took his tally to 30 in five games for the 'Roos, will line up on a half-forward flank and share the ruck-roving with Osborne Park's in-form Angie Papadopolous and veteran South Perth player Kerry Coates.

Former Claremont and Swans rover Ross Parker, one of the biggest kick-getters in Wafa, will probably share the roving with Applecross star Mick Pember.

Half-back flanker Barry Ross is the sixth player from Wanneroo certain to be in the side.

The selectors have gone for form players and have a flexible team with the potential to kick a big goal tally.

There will be no lack of height in the ruck with the selectors having the choice between Mosman's Jeff Allen, Applecross's

Ray Davies and Belmont's Ron Lilly.

As well they will have Osborne Park captain-coach Gerard McNeill to call on in the ruck if needed. McNeill is likely to play at centre-half-back.

Former Subiaco players Dennis Blair, Zane McDonald and Dick Robinson will boost the Goldfields team.

Blair, now captain-coach of Boulder, will lead the combined team. McDonald, who also plays for Boulder, is likely to play in the ruck.

Robinson, who came down to Subiaco in 1974 as a likely replacement for champion goalkicker Austin Robertson, has kicked 20 goals for Railways this season, and should start at full forward.

However, he will find goals hard to get opposed to the strong marking of Applecross fullback Greg Naylor — a son of former champion South Fremantle full-forward Bernie Naylor.

4. No promotion of star players such as Beasley, Michael, Buckenara, the Krakouers, Peake etc. The public must be sold on the entertainment value of football and promotion and advertising is the answer.
5. Special bus trips to and from ovals should be advertised. Most football fans don't know where to go to catch them.

One of the first players featured in

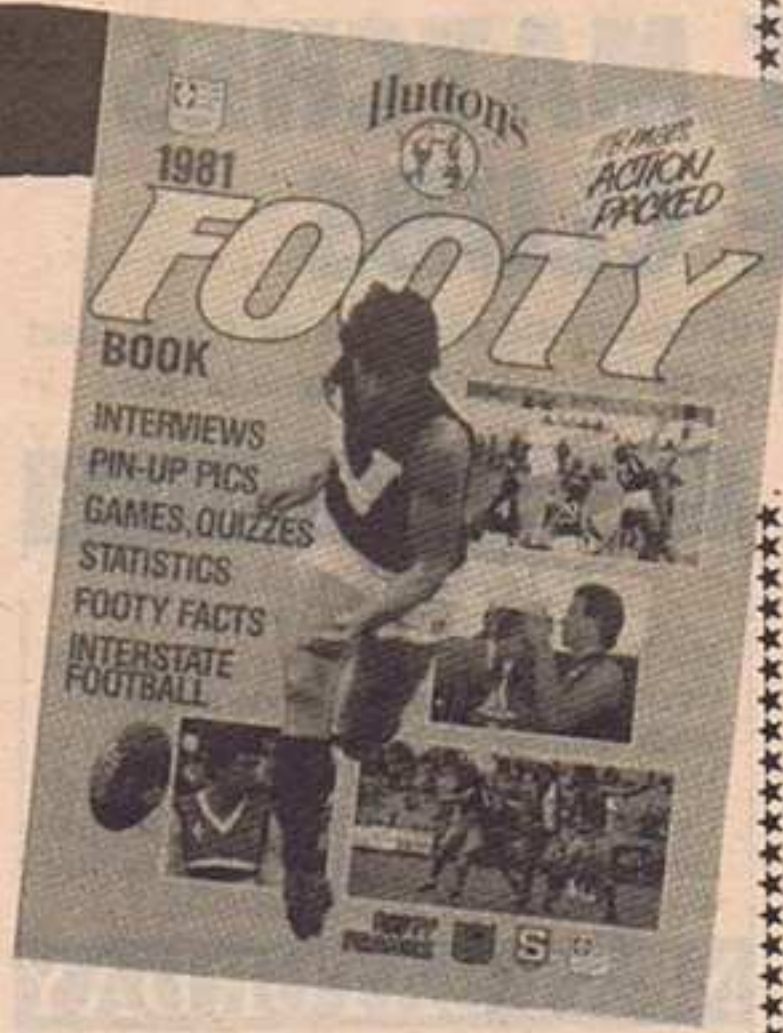

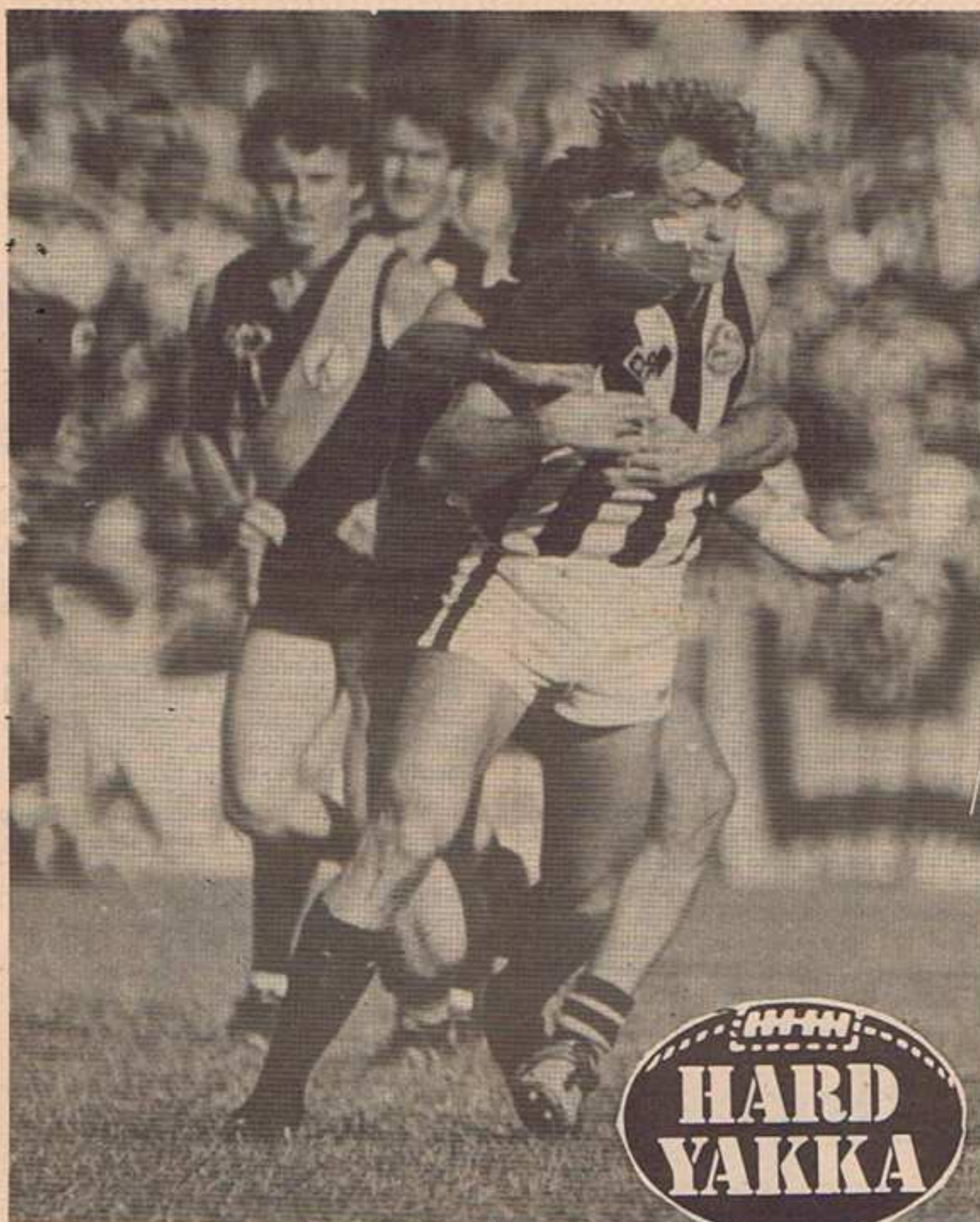

## MICHAEL STREAKS AWAY

Channel 7 Sandover Medallist Stephen Michael finished the first round of football a clear leader in most awards for 1981.

His brilliant best-on-ground effort against West Perth last Sunday saw him earn another nine out of 10 votes in the \$1000 Toyota Westside Football Ratings award — WA's most accurate guide to football performances.

It was Michael's third nine-out-of-ten effort in the opening seven games and took his first-round tally to 57 — a healthy average of 8.14.

Michael clearly won the Toyota \$50 for the first-round leader and has a commanding lead in the overall race for the end-of-season \$500 prize.

At present his closest rivals are Claremont ruckman Graham Moss and Swan Districts winger Phil Narkle, both on 51. Narkle only managed six votes last week in the losing Swans effort against Claremont, while Moss gathered another eight votes.

Leaders in the other clubs are Brian Peake (East Fremantle) 48; John Dimmer (East Perth) 46; Wayne Simms (Perth) 50; Brian Taylor and Bill Valli (Subiaco) both on 45; and Ross Gibbs (West Perth) 43.

The letters "i" and "r" will often appear on the lists and they represent "injured" or "reserve". If a player is injured during a match, then his rating will be based on his performance up to the time he left the ground. The same applies to a player who is a reserve — his rating will be gauged on how he performed during his spell on the ground.

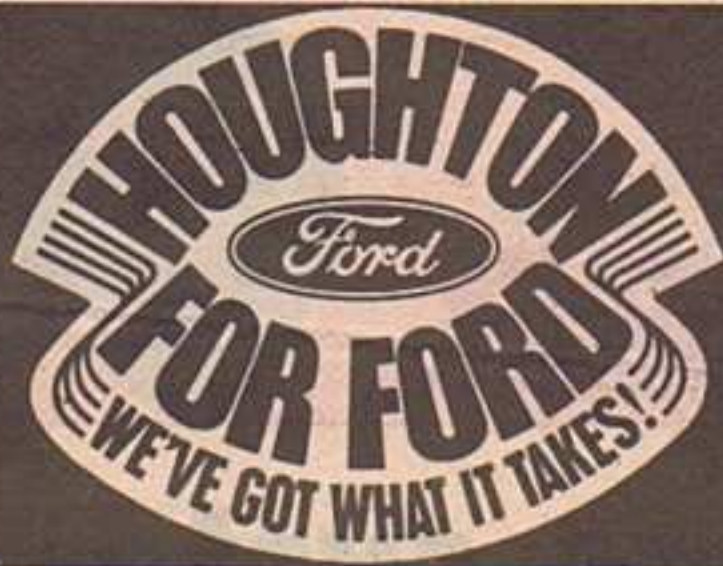

## Interchange system is not for ruckmen

The interchange system is one, of the best things to have been introduced to the game, but not for ruckmen.

Changing two big men off the bench just doesn't work and most of the players used in this way aren't very happy about it.

For a start, a player becomes less involved in the game on the bench. He is more inclined to lose concentration.

This makes it difficult to get consistency into his game, to pick up the threads from where he left off before he was taken from the field.

There is enormous value in having a big man in the forward pocket to give extra marking power and some top ruckmen in their day have perfected the forward pocket role to such an extent that they can be relied on to kick three goals a match.

Let's have a look at how spending more time on the ground can help a player. There isn't a better example than Allan Sidebottom at Swan Districts.

While he is still changing at times with Ron Boucher, he is being given a lot more responsibility and is gaining greater confidence from it.

As this confidence gathers, he can be expected to do a lot more for his side, in either a forward or back pocket.

I think the East Fremantle duo of Graeme Carter and Andrew Purser look much better players when they change with each other on the ground — not off the bench.

And the same applies at East Perth with John Ironmonger and Wayne Duke.

And, by the way, could you ever imagine either South Fremantle or Claremont changing Stephen Michael or Graham Moss off the bench?
