



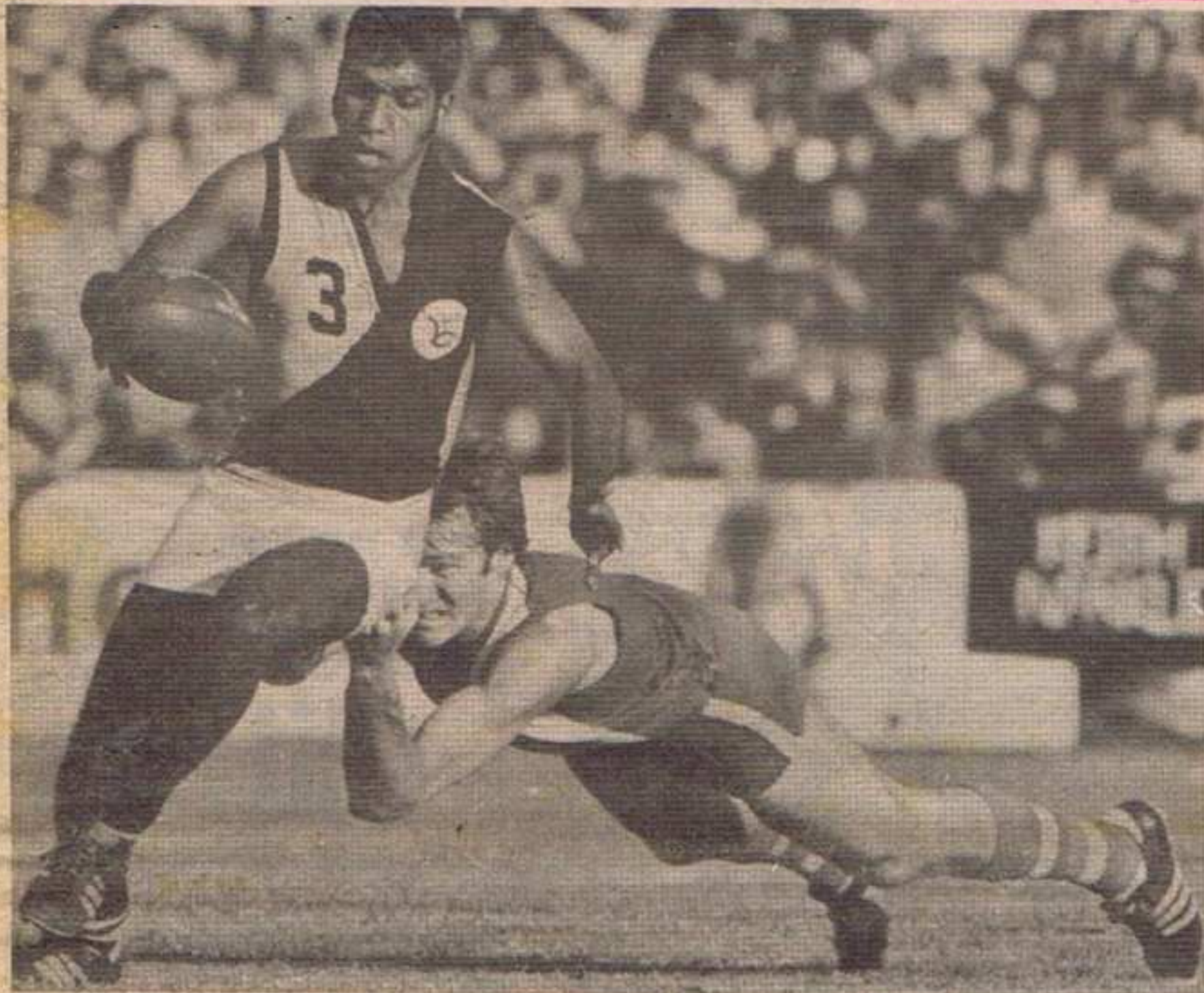

IT'LL BE TOUGHER

- BROWN

State coach Mal Brown has been pushing one point very hard all this week.

The message he has been trying to get across to his players is that the game against South Australia will be harder than the match earlier this season against Victoria.

"What has happened in the past is history and the players must realise that," says Brown.

"Because we beat Victoria there is a general level of expectancy that we will do well again.

"This means that we will start favourites for the match instead of underdogs and this makes it harder for the players psychologically."

However, Brown is happy with the way his side has prepared for the SA game.

"Their attitude is excellent and I am very pleased with the way they have trained," he said.

The biggest problems are settling on a centre-half-forward and centre-half-back.

Injuries to key players have complicated the issue and the final team will be announced on Friday night at a players' tea after training at Subiaco Oval.

ROVERS ARE THE WINNERS

SOUTH Australia are suspect on Subiaco Oval — especially without rovers!

When it comes to moving fast and freely on firm surfaces, SA rovers just don't seem to measure up.

Sure, there have probably been some exceptions to this statement. But in general SA rovers lack the magic and brilliant pace generally associated with the most dangerous player in any team's football arsenal.

That's why I would play both Jimmy and Phil Krakouer on Saturday. No-one in Australia could match this pair for football genius — let alone South Australians.

And then of course you could play Noel Carter, Wayne Otway and Mike Richardson. Any one of them would walk straight into this SA team.

Perhaps the classic example of a SA rover in WA conditions is Mark Norsworthy at East Fremantle.

Norsworthy arrived in Perth with a big reputation and East Fremantle paid a fancy price for his services.

But he hasn't fired a shot this year and looks a yard too slow for West Australian football.

This is not to say he couldn't succeed here. He will if he keeps at it, because he obviously has got a good array of skills to have got this far.

The trouble is that the SA small men develop very big thighs and carry more weight around the rump, a legacy of playing on heavier grounds.

They have trouble running when they hit firm, hard surfaces and they don't need this extra weight. Carter himself had this problem when he first arrived at South Fremantle from Melbourne.

If the sting goes out of the ground it will be a different story at Subiaco Oval.

But I would play Carter and Jim Krakouer as rovers and change Gary

Buckenara, Mike Richardson and Phil Krakouer (if needed) as ruck-rovers off the half-forward flanks.

To add to SA's problems this year they will be without Kym Hodgeman, (transferred to North Melbourne) who has been their No. 1 small man for a number of years.

INEXPERIENCE

This leaves them with Mark Naley (20) as their No. 1 rover. He will make his interstate debut on Saturday after 37 games with South Adelaide.

Naley's partner will be Phil Heinrich (24), who has played 112 games with Sturt and has made one State appearance.

What is needed to complement the vast array of mobile talent in the WA team is someone that can force the ball to the ground at centre-half-forward.

You don't need a player who is going to destroy the South Australians in the marking department or win the game off his own boot (though this would be a handsome bonus).

What is needed is someone who will contest on every occasion, split open packs and exert physical pressure on the opponents around him.

Too much skill in the forward line and not enough aggression often sees the ball rebounded easily out of defence.

That's why I like a player like South Fremantle's Wayne Delmenico at centre-half-forward. Delmenico showed his class in this position in last year's final round.

He is big, strong, in form — and versatile. I think he is a far better prospect than East Perth's Grant Campbell, a young player on the way up, who plays his football in bursts at this stage.

OVER THE FENCE

ARNOLD'S PLOY

Royals coach Grant Dorrington seems to be learning a few tricks of the coaching trade if our spies at Fremantle Oval are on the ball. Last Saturday big full-forward Paul Arnold was named in the reserves side — but a buzz went around the South Fremantle camp when Arnold was spotted in close conversation with Dorrington — and doing a few warm-ups. So the South camp were convinced that Arnold would take his place in the team — and even thought about a few moves to counter him, particularly as he had kicked seven goals against the Bulldogs in the first round. However, Arnold was genuinely injured — and when East Perth ran out on to the field, he walked out with the bench boys still dressed in his civvies and upsetting some South speculation.

KERR-RIPES!

Poor old Ross Kerr... what a day he had at Fremantle Oval last Saturday. The former Bulldog was returning to his old club for the first time since a hurried clearance had been arranged a couple of weeks ago. He was really nervous before the match, especially as he was to line-up on a wing right from the outset. He played pretty well early on, but finished up in the losing side — and feeling very sore and sorry for himself as he got carted off in the last quarter with a nasty rib injury.

HAPPY HOMECOMMING

West Perth president Len Roper was a delighted man last Saturday. The Cardinals' record win over East Fremantle was the first match he has seen since returning from an extended overseas trip. He said he had been receiving the odd score while away and things back home certainly seemed grim. He could remember receiving

one paper after the club's first-round thrashing at the hands of East Fremantle and, to rub salt into the wound, learnt that three West Perth players had been reported.

COACH HAPPY TOO!

Coach Graham Campbell was another Cardinal in a happy frame of mind after his side's record win last Saturday. It was the highest score kicked by a team in his league coaching career and, in fact, the only time he has coached a league side to score more than 30 goals.

MAGNIFICENT MENAGLIO

Peter Menaglio, who won West Perth's top trophy for his performance last Saturday, told members during the presentation: "beleave me it wasn't hard getting a kick out there today" he backed up his statement with incredible statistics — 46 possessions for the match.

MEDIA MUDDLE

There's something of a mini-war going on in local football at present, between the media and some of the clubs over the question of team placements. That bastion of newspapers, The West Australian, have dropped their customary Friday morning team 'map' placings in preference for Saturdays because of the occurrence of too many team lists instead of placed teams being released by the clubs. Well, two early-morning meetings between the media, club executives and the WAFL have tried to sort out some of the communication problems...

After last week's meeting, seven of the eight clubs responded by issuing a placed team on Thursday night. Victory, said the media men. But then when they saw how the teams lined up in the Claremont-Perth match for a start there were so many changes that maybe those team placings didn't matter much. Incidentally, Claremont were the only team not to release a list on Thursday — leaving theirs till Friday — and still changing it!

OLSEN MOVES

Mark Olsen, who finished a close second to Ray Bauskis on the goalkicking list in 1978, has moved on again.

Olsen, who was a part of the deal last year when East Fremantle cleared Graham Melrose to Swans, played only one game with Old Easts.

His employment has now taken him to Karratha.

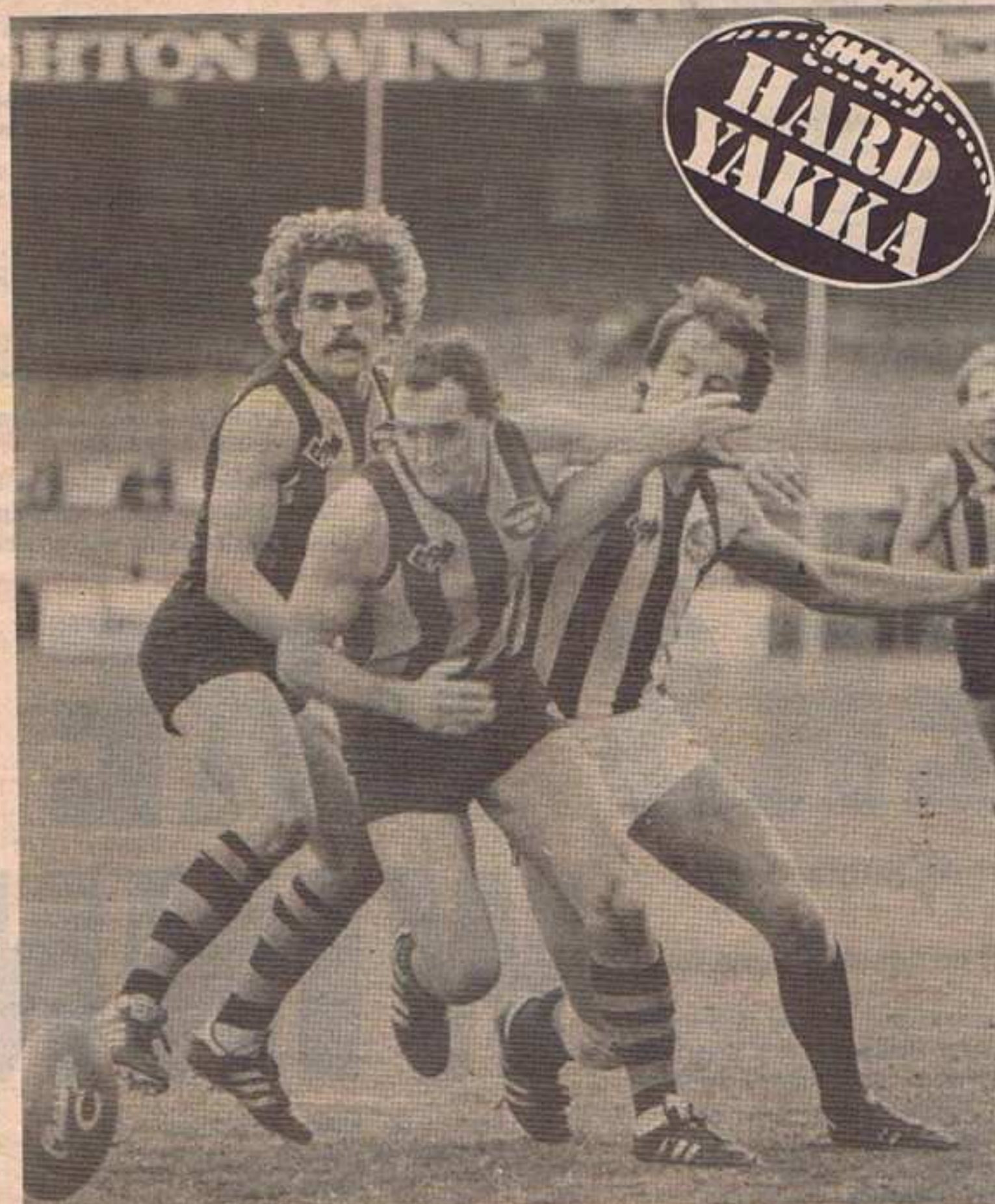

Football needs direction . . .

. . . especially at junior level

The operative word of W.A. Football league directors these days is "Promotion". I think it should be "Development".

Everyone seems to be going about talking of promoting this or promoting that. But what on earth is the good of trying to promote something if the product is inferior in quality or there is no quantity?

Without quantity we are not going to get quality and the only way to get quantity is to develop the game of Australian football at grass-roots level.

I have been writing about football now for more than 25 years and I am concerned in what direction it is heading. And when I say "football" I don't just mean the eight league teams, but the sport, "Football", which is played by some 60,000 people in W.A.

The W.A.F.L. recently let slip through their hands a Development Officer of calibre in Richard Walker, who gave every indication of being an outstanding administrator in this field.

It is to be hoped that his 3½ years of work directed at junior development will not be left undone. But the league does not seem to have done anything towards replacing him. An amazing situation considering, I understand, that portion of his salary is subsidised by the Government — the same Government that the league



directors are pressuring for handouts from the T.A.B.

The answer normally given is that the clubs themselves look after development of football and many do have their own development officers these days.

That's fine. But I am concerned in what direction they are heading and why the W.A.F.L. isn't doing the directing.

I believe former Subiaco coach, Ross Smith, was in Perth in January to give a series of seminars and that no fewer than 105 junior coaches turned up on Friday night it shows that junior coaches are thirsting for information and help. I believe real development of football lies in the hand (and brains) of these junior coaches. It is imperative that the League ensures that education of junior coaches is encouraged as the foundation of long-term football development . . .

I'm concerned especially when you hear of an under-10 team in a certain competition contributing money each week so that the three best players can be remunerated. Or another case where an under 16 team fell short of numbers this year because the club could not afford to pay the players!

Pity the poor boundary umpires

Having got that off my chest I want to say something about umpires. No, not that they are of poor standard or something — that's all been said before. I mean all this talk about two goal umpires at each end. What a load of old codswallop!

That's typical Victorian talk. What the present day game of speedy play-on football needs is two boundary umpires on each side of the ground. The poor fellows can't keep up with it. They aren't all even-time runners. In fact, until John Fuhrmann arrived on the scene some of them could hardly run at all.

The goal umpires don't need any help, but those boundary runners sure do.

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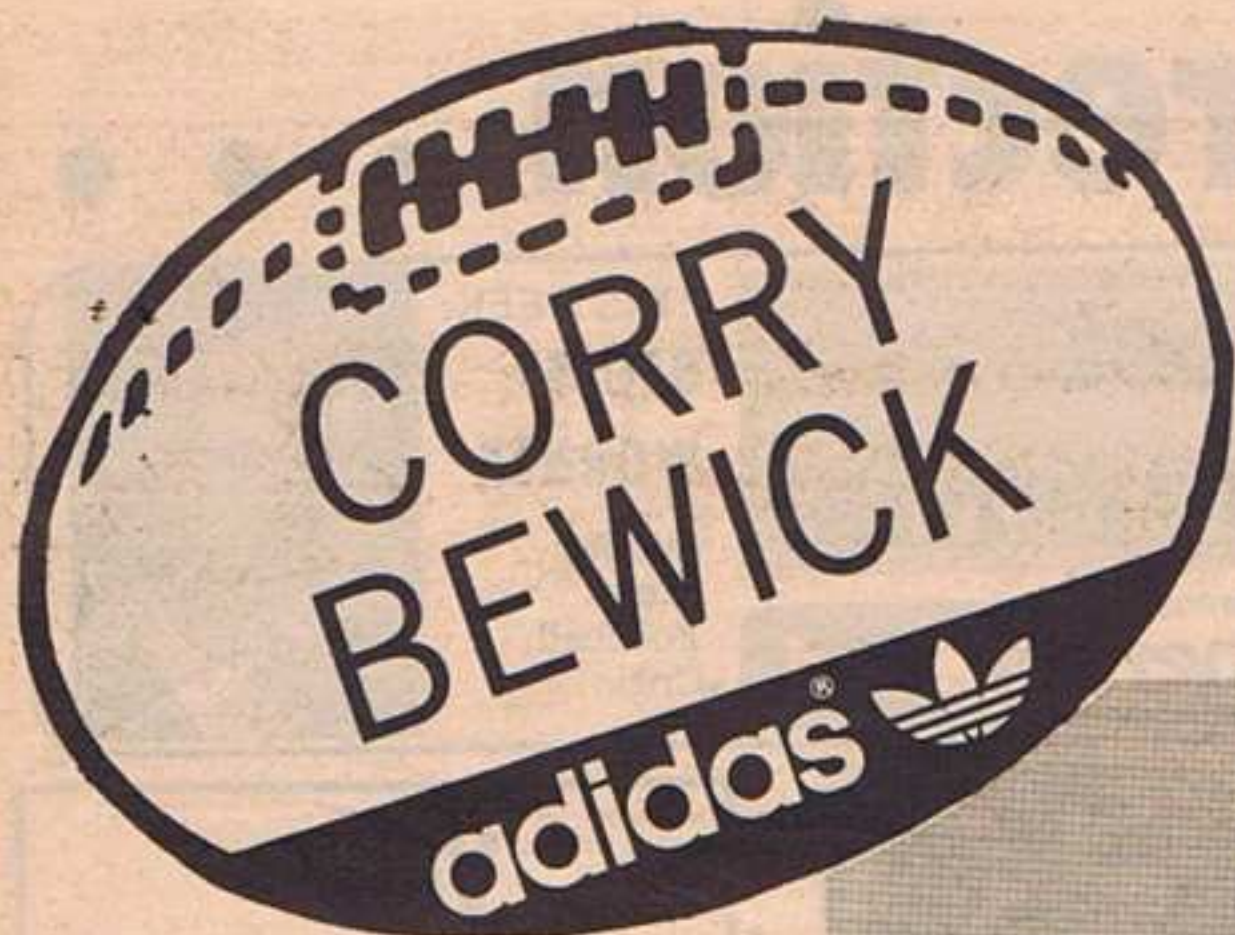

Working hard on consistency



Following in the footsteps of a footballing father is always a difficult task... and West Perth's Corry Bewick knows the truth of that statement.

The little rover broke into league ranks in 1977 as an 18-year-old — but it was only last year that he really confirmed his right to league status.

His father Ron was a top-class half-forward for the Cardies and has served the club long, both as a director and chairman of selectors. However, Ron relinquished that latter position when Corry reached league ranks to avoid any suggestion that he was helping his son along.

That suited Corry Bewick — he was determined to make it on his own and his football last year and in most of the games this season has confirmed that he has made

He is starting to emerge as a very effective back-up rover to Cardies captain Les Fong — and that is good news for West Perth fans as roving duos are hard to come by.

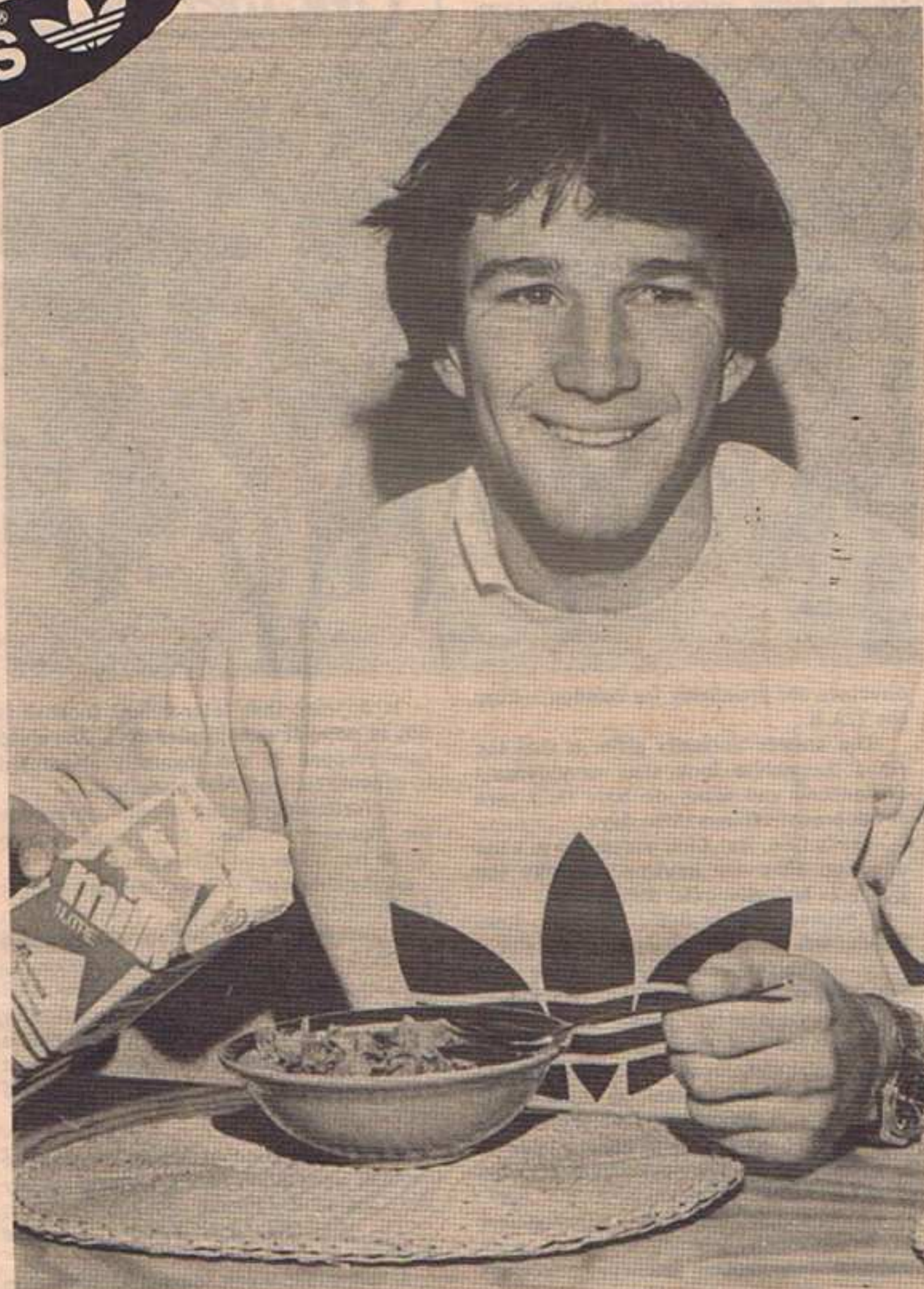
This week football writer PETER AUSTIN talks to Corry Bewick about his favourite sport...

Q. Who did you first play football for?

A. I played through all the junior ranks with Tuart Hill.

Q. Are you still playing with any of your old team mates?

A. Yes. I have played with Peter Menaglio for most of my life. I went to school with

quite a few guys who now play with West Perth. Dennis Cometti coached me when I was playing under-17's. Peter has probably been the closest but I have many good mates from juniors and school.

Q. When did you first arrive at West Perth?

A. 1976. I first played colts then the following year I played reserves and league. In 1978 I played reserves and the league side in the finals that year.

Q. What positions have you played?

A. Rover.

Q. Do you enjoy it?

A. Yes. I am too small to really fill any other position and I think I'm suited to that style of play.

Q. What is the hardest thing being a rover?

A. The continual push, push-up. You have to run for virtually the four quarters. It demands total concentration. I think a rover is demanded more than anywhere else on the ground. You are a link man and have to be a live wire for 100 minutes.

Q. How many touches are you happy for a game?

A. Graham Campbell likes us to get over 20 possessions each game. That means five touches a quarter which I suppose doesn't sound a lot and obviously the more you get the happier you are yourself.

Q. West Perth were tagged as the big improvers for 1981. Will they be?

A. We enjoyed a good pre-season training and started off well in the early part of the season. I hope it will pay dividends.

Q. Do you get a lot of support from ruckmen Ben Jager and Russell Ellen?

A. Yes. Ben is tremendous around the packs with his physical strength. Russell, although not as strong is a very agile player who does contribute a lot around the ground.

Q. Do you follow anyone's style of play?

A. Not really. I play my own style. I'm more of a creative player, a link man. I don't model myself to anyone.

Q. Do you regard yourself as an attacking style player?

A. Yes.

Q. Who do you find the best rover in WA?

A. Unfortunately for me the roving standard in WA is very good at present. Noel Carter and the Krakouer brothers are good, Otway from East Perth and Melrose and Neesham from Swans. It is very hard to select just a few good ones. The brilliance of the Krakouer brothers are hard to beat. They are so quick around the forwardline. Carter always picks up kicks around the ground and Otway is a tiger in the packs.

Q. Who has been your hardest opponent to beat?

A. I would say someone like Otway.

Q. Does Les Fong help you a lot?

A. Yes. He's always competing, and makes me feel part of the play all the time. He is a great bloke too.

Q. Do you enjoy playing under Graham Campbell?

A. Yes. Graham's style of football is just how I like it. He encourages the runner and the link that flows on. I enjoy playing under him immensely.

Q. Campbell has always been known as a good motivator. Does it help you?

A. He makes you really want to play before a game and you generally go onto the ground on a big high. His motivational techniques are extremely good.

Q. Your father Ron has had a lot to do with your football. What has he done?

A. He hasn't missed too many games I have played. He is always encouraging me or gives good useful criticism.

Q. Who has been the biggest help in your football career?

A. Probably my father.

Q. What do you think is in store for Corry Bewick in the future?

A. Well at the moment my biggest problem in playing is achieving consistency week after week. I see myself playing one or two real good games then putting in a bad one. I would just like to consolidate myself and play well every week. Until I do that I can't look at my future to play anywhere else.

Q. Would you like to go to Victoria and play?

A. Yes. I think it's every footballer's ambition to play in the VFL. Hopefully one day I might get the opportunity to play over there.

Q. What do you do while not playing or training for football?

A. I go fishing as often as I can. I like to get away from it all. I have a good collection of records and love listening to them too.

Q. You said you have known Peter Menaglio for many years. Does that give you any confidence while playing?

A. I think so. Peter and I have come up through the ranks all the way together. We played our first colts game and league matches together. It obviously does help in a game. When Peter grabs the ball, you automatically know what he's going to do with it.

Chubby's Chatter

Each year the same problem arises — people from junior football clubs becoming irritable with their parent league club over the co-operation, or lack of it, given to individual junior clubs.

Complaints concerning the methods of training by the junior coaches are also high on the list.

Looking at it realistically, one way to solve this problem could be if the WAFL would give the league club a grant which the club could match and use it to obtain qualified people to look after clubs in the junior district. It would provide a coaching co-ordinator, to lay down foundations of what skills and training methods are required for each individual age group.

He would also go to different games and listen to the coaches address the children and offer advice and constructive criticism.

Of course, the problem comes about in trying to find the right person with that amount of time. But surely if league clubs look hard enough they will find that person.

I know the Melville Junior Football Club has a coaching co-ordinator in Peter Amaranti, who played league football with South Fremantle and Subiaco.

UMPIRES

Umpires have always been a bone of contention and, of late, Lance White has come in for some strong criticism from both media and supporters.

Field umpires, I am afraid, are thrown to the fray as there are only two on the field. Unlike footballers, who are given the opportunity to play their first few games in the league side and can be hidden to a certain extent, which means that their mistakes are not as obvious as the umpires!

These players are blooded for two or three games (unless they are exceptional) to give them experience — and then normally dropped to the reserves for two or three weeks before being brought back again, depending on their form.

I only hope that the Umpires Board acts similarly to umpires such as Lance White, who is now back in the reserves.

Otherwise you will find that there could be an exodus of senior league umpires retiring all at once — and we will be left with inexperienced umpires. An example of this, you could say, is the Perth Football Club at present.

SA CLAIM

Last Saturday on the 6IX World of Football, Gary Carvolth had the audacity to tell the South Australian National Football League's manager, Alan Roach that I claimed that the SANFL was backward.

I was upset with this allegation, as I do not require other people to speak for me and if I held that opinion, I would have stated so myself.

McDONALD'S MOVE

Interesting to note that Gary McDonald's contract with St Kilda (Gary has been running for the Swan Districts reserves) finishes on June 29.

He was signed for a \$50,000 transfer fee and his own personal contract.

At present St Kilda are trying to negotiate a clearance fee, but he has offered to come back to Swans for nothing on the above-mentioned date.

I am pleased to see John Cooper and his committee holding out to pressures from the Victorian clubs.

FOOTBALL FACTS

WA are favoured

It's horses for courses when West Australia and South Australia meet.

In Adelaide, the West Aussies' track record is bad with only a 20% chance of success — five wins from 24 games played there.

The South Australians are on all par when they play in Perth; of the 32 games played here, the visitors have won only six.

Overall, West Australia lead with 37 wins to 31, but this can be attributed to having played eight more games at home.

South Australia has had three wins here in the Post-War era — the successful coaches were Fos Williams (1955 and 1962) and Neil Kerley (1979).

In these years of high scoring it's interesting to note that West Australia's highest score against the "Croweaters" was recorded 43 years ago when they kicked 29.23 to win by 123 points; the biggest margin in games between these two States.

The closest finish was in 1936 in Perth when the visitors won by one point and there has been seven other games when the margin was under a goal.

CHANGES

How times have changed! Remember the good old days when WA footballs were yellow in colour and the Victorians would bring over their own red ball to use in alternative quarters? Now I see where the Vics are using a yellow ball for all their games while the West are all red.

CARDIE RECORD

West Perth's mammoth score at Leederville last week (37.17, 239 points) was certainly a club record. But it is just two goals short of Swan Districts' 1979 league record of 40.11 (251).

Swans also have the second highest score with a 38.21 (249) against Perth earlier this year.

The winning margin at Leederville last week (178 points) is the second highest in league history. In 1953, South Fremantle walloped Subiaco by 192 points, 35.18 to 5.6.

How often does a team kick 20 goals in the first half of a league game? Well, Swans did it once, in 1979 they kicked 20.5 in the first two quarters and 20.6 in the second half.

INTERSTATE UPDATE

JEWELL'S GAMBLE PAYS OFF

It was certainly a day of mixed emotions, fluctuating fortunes and lucky escapes for Richmond as they clung to their top-five position with a narrow 15-point win over South Melbourne last week.

Tigers coach Tony Jewell pulled off one of the biggest gambles in his football career as Richmond revived themselves from being down and out half-way through the last term.

Richmond were trailing by 22 points when Jewell pulled the league's leading goalkicker, Michael Roach, off the ground after kicking only two goals. Jim Jess, an out-of-form defender, was thrown in at the deep end — and kicked two goals to help the Tigers mount a recovery and get up to win running away.

Ace WA rover Robert Wiley and his co-rover, Dale Weightman, helped sink South Melbourne.

Wiley was in blistering form, earning best-on-ground honours with a four-quarter display that saw him pick up 26 kicks and 10 handpasses. Weightman was equally effective with the incredible tally of 24 handpasses to add to his 13 kicks.

It was also a day of triumph for Francis Bourke, celebrating his 300th league game and at one stage looking like finishing it on a miserable note.

Bourke was in the horrors, particularly as his high-flying Swans opponent, John Roberts, kicked four goals in seven minutes to put the Tigers on the run.

But Jewell didn't panic. He sent out a message to Bourke to obviously encourage him on his big day — and he was rewarded when the veteran turned in a great last quarter to help the revival.

MONEY MACHINE

Collingwood aren't just a football machine; they must also be a money machine.

The Magpies still have something like \$100,000 to spend on players in their desperate bid to win a premiership.

They want a ruckman; in fact, they want a ruckman so badly they are offering money all round Melbourne — and probably Australia — to get one.

INJURY CRISIS

The North Melbourne heartbreak continues... this time in the form of broken bones.

The Kangaroos, who have been in the finals for seven years in a row after their elevation from the depths of the VFL



despair department, seem destined to be onlookers at this year's finals series, despite a multi-million dollar outlay on players.

Their latest tragedies came last Saturday when, apart from going down to Essendon, they saw \$100,000 recruit Peter Jonas go to hospital with a broken leg (just above the ankle) and WA superstar Ross Glendenning — another six-figure player — on crutches with a leg in plaster, fearing the worst after X-rays for a possible leg fracture.

North's team for Tuesday's Escort Championship match was not picked on form — simply on those players standing up and available to play football.

Missing from last Saturday's line-up through injury were Kevin Bryant, Phil Kelly, Wayne Schimmelbusch, Keith Greig, Kerry Good, Stephen Icke, Arnold Briedis and Doug Smith — almost a good-quality State side!

STEWART STAYS

Ian Stewart has ended speculation about his football future — he will (at this stage) continue coaching South Melbourne.

Stewart, coach at South Melbourne for five of the last six years, has refuted suggestions that his coaching days at the Lakeside Oval are nearing an end.

A week earlier he indicated that he may have run his race with the Swans — but he thought the matter over and has decided to continue, at least for the next two years of his contract.

"We are going to be a football power, there's no doubt about that," says Stewart.

Glenelg's run ends

Glenelg's magical run is over... last year's premiers, Port Adelaide, showed a great return to form to end their unbeaten run last week.

It was St Kilda recruit David Granger, playing strongly at centre-half-forward, who helped Port charge out of their football slump.

There was an air of elation in the Port dressing room after the game, with one Port Adelaide official claiming it was the best the side had played since 1979's grand final win. However, coach John Cahill wasn't getting too carried away.

"We played better than we have done this year, but we are not there yet," he said.

SLATER STILL ON THE BALL

Keith Slater's best season of football was 1961 — but it was only because of a strange twist of fate that he even played that year.

Slater, now a football critic with the ABC, won the Simpson Medal, played in Swan Districts' first premiership side and was a member of the State side which won the Australian Championship in Brisbane in that memorable year.

However, on performances he should not have been able to achieve any of those feats.

He should have been with the Australian Test cricket team touring England.

During the Australian summer he took 33 wickets for WA and most critics throughout the land considered him a certain inclusion in the touring party.

But the selectors did not see it that way.

They preferred Victorian Ian Quick who had taken only 11 wickets for his State in the same season.

Disappointed at being overlooked, Slater bounced back with top performances on the football field.

WAF A highlight

It's being termed the Sunday football clash of the year — and it's almost certainly going to be a preview of the WAF A grand final.

It's the head-on confrontation between unbeaten teams Wanneroo and Osborne Park at Robinson Reserve — the match every one in the WAF A has been waiting for all season.

Wanneroo, confident of winning their fourth consecutive flag, are the champions with the fast improving Osborne Park the challengers, keen to knock them off their perch.

With Angie Papadopolous, Shane Sheridan, Peter O'Connell, Glen Schofield, Greg Murphy and Kim Dellacqua all playing strongly, Osborne have the pace and skill to trouble the 'Roos.

Wanneroo are particularly strong in attack where Colin Northcott, Mick Fuller and Archie Duda are all prolific goalkickers. But it's in defence that Osborne Park are strongest and key defenders Terry Bruce, McNeill and Dave Adamson are capable of blanketing those players.

In other games Southern Port play Applecross at Fremantle Oval, Cockburn play South Perth at Tempest Park and Belmont play Melville at Forster Park.

The champion ruckman, who is now a partner in a Midland sports store, described the 1961 premiership as the highlight of his football career.

"We went to every hotel in Perth in a day and the celebrations lasted a week.

"It took us a year to get over it," says Slater.

The 1961 premiership would go down as one of the biggest upsets in the history of the WAF A.

Swans were quoted at 50-1 to win the flag, although Slater recalls one of his long time friends and former Swans player, Lal (Harry) Mosey got 100-1 about his side winning the grand final and 33-1 on making the four.

Swans were up against a star-studded East Perth side in the grand final, which boasted such talented players as Graham Farmer, John Watts, Mal Atwell and Derek Chadwick.

The underdogs were equal to the task and won by five goals.

In 1962 Swans made it a double when they proved to be the strongest side in the competition throughout the year.

The hat trick was completed the following year, but it was Slater's last season at Bassendean Oval.

He crossed over to Subiaco to take on the coaching position.

He had immediate success by leading

the Lions into the finals, only to be beaten in the first semi-final by Claremont, who eventually won the flag.

But that was the best he could achieve at Subiaco.

"In the next two years I lacked support from the committee and I think I did a poor job," admits Slater.

"When you have got support you tend to put a lot more effort into coaching. When I was not backed by the committee I did a job and that was all," adds Slater.

Slater made 167 league appearances with Swan Districts and a further 55 with Subiaco.

It was unusual that Slater even played league football let alone represent the State.

After playing junior football until he was 18 he decided to give the game away.

"I was like a bean pole and was pushed out of the way too easily so I decided to give it away," he says.

"I had no intention of ever playing again. I was about 20 when some Midland amateurs came around home and asked me to play because they had only 14 players, including the propertyman and trainers.

"In that season I played five games with Midland before being selected in the State amateur side. I played my first league game with Swans in the same year."

Fortunately for the game in this State, Keith Slater was re-discovered by Midland. He gave great service as a player and is continuing to serve the game as a critic.

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New-look line-up for visitors

The South Australian side boasts a formidable array of strength and experience — but is also something of a new-look line-up.

Here is a run down on the 22 players coming to Perth for Saturday's clash with Western Australia.

PAUL WESTON (captain) is a veteran Glenelg player who won his club's fairest and best award in 1976 and has been a regular and versatile player in the SA line-up for three years. His deputy, **NEIL CRAIG**, has won a place in the State side with just one game back in league ranks after a serious injury.

The ruck department will be led by veteran **PETER CAREY**, an All-Australian player who has been a thorn for WA sides since his State debut for SA in 1975. He will be supported by **DEXTER KENNEDY**, who first played league football at the age of 15 years and 10 months and has reached the peak of his career in the last two years, and **ROBB HAWKINS**, the third-string ruckman who joined South Adelaide from Geelong three seasons ago and is set to make his inter-State debut.

GRAHAM CORNES is a name well-known to WA football followers. He is a ruck-rover of enormous class, winning the Simpson Medal for his great display when SA downed WA at Subiaco Oval two years ago and the Tassie Medal in last year's end-of-season carnival. He will be supported in the mobile division by **RUSSELL EBERT**, a legend in his own lifetime in South Australia with four Magarey Medals, and **KEVIN McSPORRAN**, a veteran campaigner who only broke into State ranks last year, but quickly proved a success.

PHIL HEINRICH and **MARK NALEY** are the South Australian rovers, with Naley, set to make his interstate debut. His form with South Adelaide this year has been faultless. Heinrich, a second-game State player, adds to SA's roving inexperience, but his form also made him a certainty for the side.

The SA defence has the experienced **KEITH KUHLMANN** at full-back with Weston out at centre-half-back. **JIM LIHOU**, an experienced back pocket specialist, will guard the resting rovers and newcomer **PHIL BROOKSBY** will operate out of the other back pocket and take a turn on the ball, if necessary.

EDDIE FRY, a skilful ball-handler who joined Sturt from South Adelaide last year after coming down from Darwin, will be on one half-back flank and the high-flying **DANNY JENKINS** will be on the other side.

RON HATELEY, who has the SA record for the most number of goals (eight) kicked in one game by a wingman

and former Teal Cup star **BRUCE ABERNETHY**, playing his second State game, will be the wingers, flanking Craig in the pivot.

TIM EVANS went on a goal-kicking spree in SA last year, kicking a record 146 goals while playing with Port Adelaide — and justifying his decision to move over from Geelong, where he had been recruited from Penguin, in Tasmania. With more than 530 goals from his six years in SA, he is the logical full-forward, which means that newcomer **ROGER LUDERS** will be an emergency.

MICHAEL WRIGHT, who joined Central District from South Melbourne this year, is a natural for the centre-half-forward role after his impressive form.

On one flank the SA team will look to Woodville's record games played holder, **RALPH SEWER**, to create goals and the other flank will see one of the game's most talented players in **MICHAEL AISH** play his first interstate match against WA.

Here is how the SA team will probably line-up:

Backs: Lihou, Kuhlmann, Brooksbys; Half-backs: Jenkins, Weston, Fry; Centres: Hateley, Craig, Abernethy; Half-forwards: Sewer, Wright, Aish; Forwards: Heinrich, Evans, McSparran; Ruck: Carey, Cornes, Naley; Reserves from: Ebert, Hawkins, Luders, Kennedy.

THE INTERSTATE SCOREBOARD

Interstate clashes between WA and SA are always full of interest because of the relative closeness of the two States.

Over the years, since matches between the two neighbouring States commenced in 1904, West Australia has the advantage . . . having won 37 to South Australia's 31.

It is significant that the matches have been invariably won by the host team. West Australia have won 27 matches at home and South Australia 19 in Adelaide. Each State has won six matches on neutral ground.

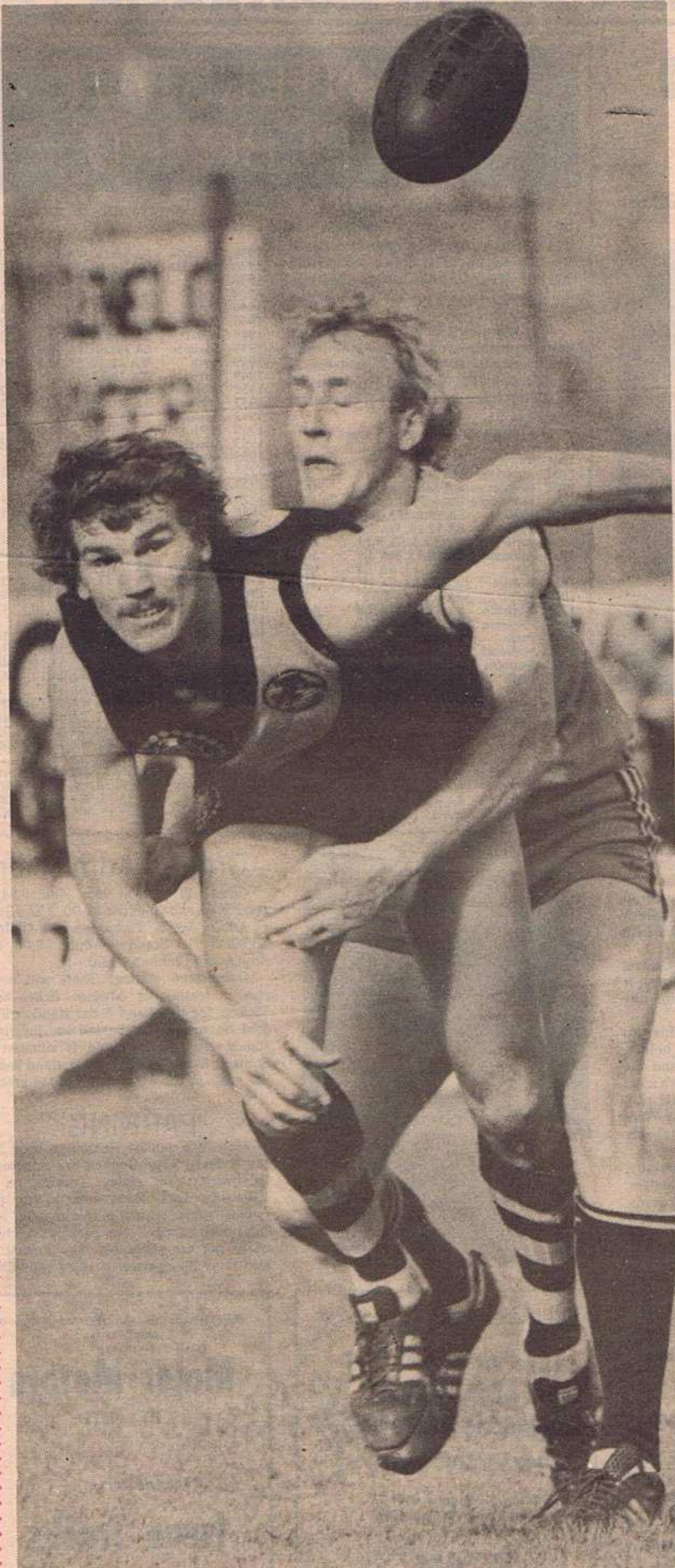

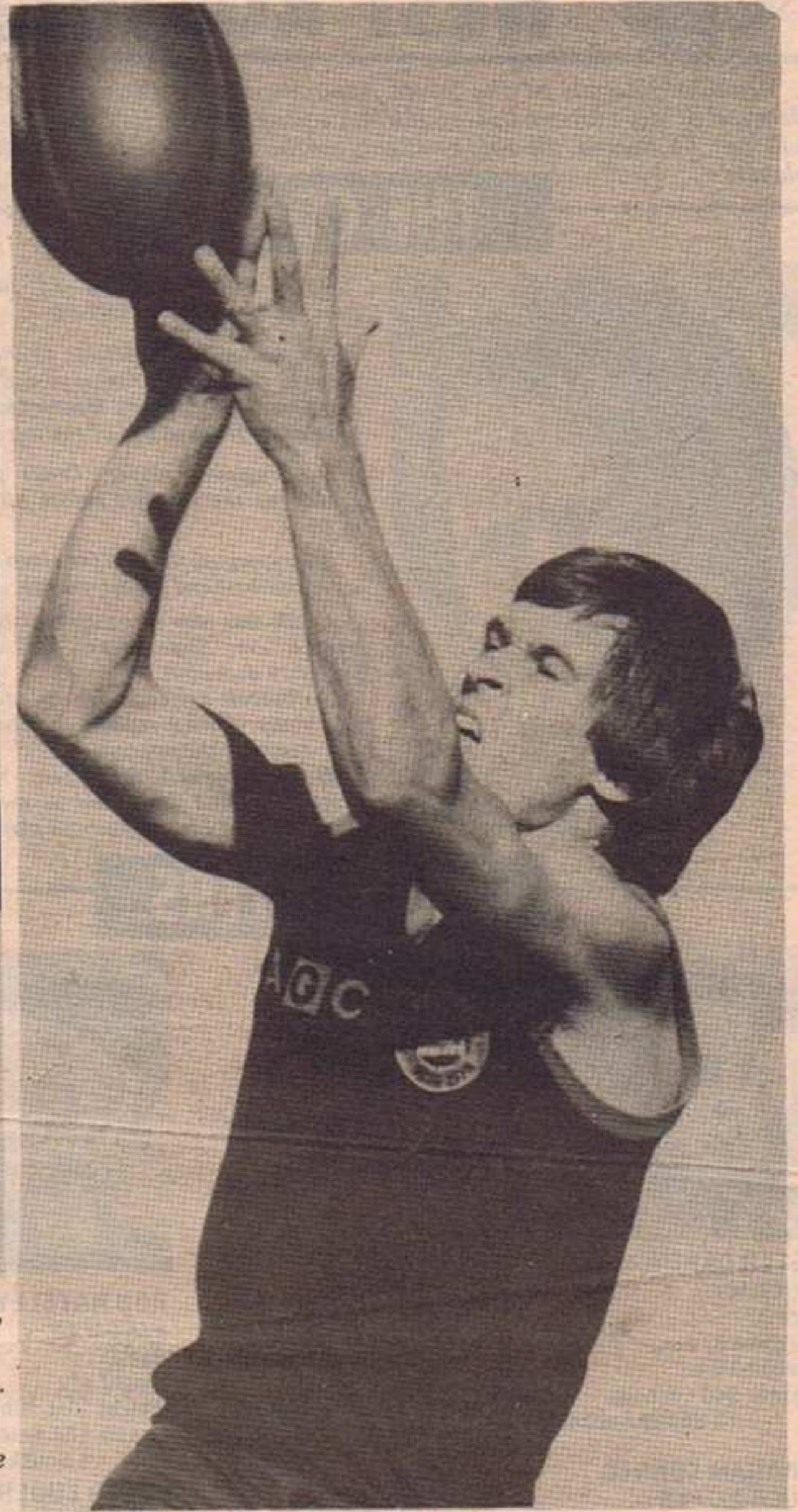

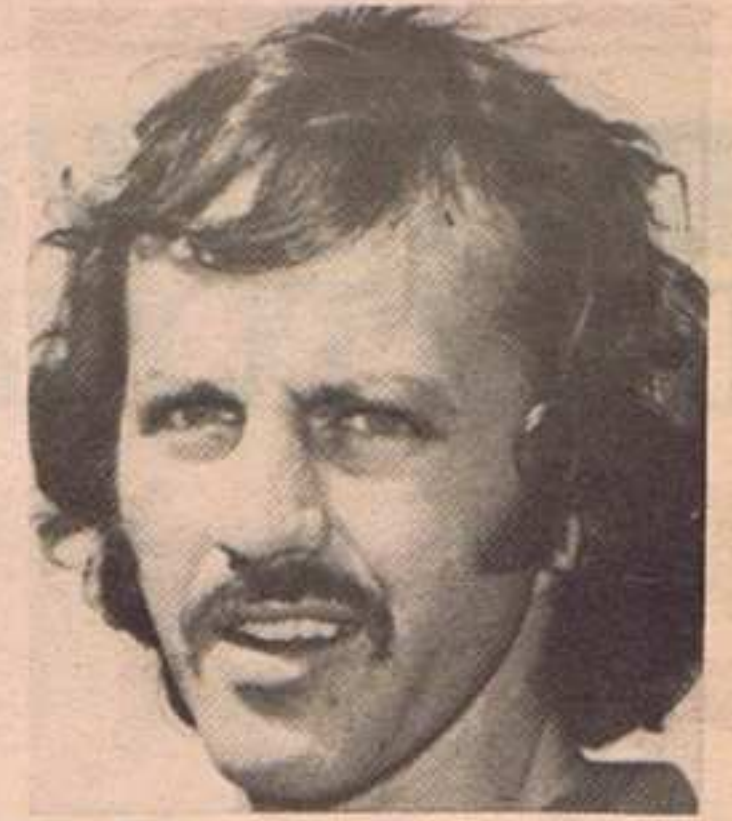

WP coach explains Merredin cancellation

West Perth coach Graham Campbell this week explained why he took steps to withdraw his side from a scheduled zone match at Merredin this weekend.

The game, which was scheduled to be played between West Perth and a combined Eastern Districts and Central Midlands side, had to be cancelled after West Perth advised that they were not in a position to send a league team to Merredin.

Campbell said "We are in a very touchy spot at the moment, having won only four matches and fighting for our football lives.

"I cannot take that sort of risk with injuries.

"We have had more than our share of injury problems this season, and I consider that this match would have exposed us to unnecessary risks".

Campbell doesn't have a happy memory of such games and vividly recalls a similar match in Mukinbudin in 1975.

"In that match, Brian Adamson was injured and is still — six years later — suffering from the effects of that injury. Graham Heal was badly injured in the same match and never played league football again.

"With those instances firmly in my mind, together with the knowledge that Wayne Blackwell was injured in a similar zone match in Albany a couple of weeks ago, it is hard to justify me taking the punt.

"I am fighting for my coaching future and have the task ahead of me to get the side into the finals. If we received injuries in a country game that eventually cost us a chance of reaching the four, the fact that we went to Merredin for a match in June would hardly be considered when the club took stock at the end of the season", he said.

Campbell said that he would not object to an end-of-season or pre-season match in the zone.

"The club does a lot of work in their country area, but we never seem to be able to satisfy the demand. I appear on panel shows, attend trophy presentations and the club conducts coaching clinics", he said.

BENNETT'S BURST

RESTRUCTURE NEEDED

East Fremantle's dismal performance last Saturday has highlighted the need for a restructuring of the WAFL.

In recent years it has become too lopsided. The disparity between the top and bottom teams is killing football in this State.

Perhaps we should consider reducing the competition to six teams.

If we are to maintain the status-quo, then consideration should be given to a drafting system that enables weak teams to have first selection of country recruits.

There is no hiding the fact that football is stagnating in WA. Twenty years ago we were shooting for the million fans in a season at the games. We have succeeded only once in achieving that figure — in 1979 and that was only because we had the inaugural State-of-Origin carnival.

Take last Saturday's attendance figures. Only 33,000 people went to the football on a perfect day. The reason is not hard to find — lack of interest in most of the games because they were considered to be of little consequence in the fight for the four.

It has been suggested in the past that consideration should be given to increasing the WAFL to 10 teams by including new clubs from the northern and eastern corridors. That would be a retrograde step. It would merely stretch the already-flimsy football resources even further.

South Australian football has not progressed since it increased the size of their competition from eight to 10 teams. The two new teams, Central District and Woodville, have had little impact on the competition. In fact, Woodville have been a liability, if not an embarrassment.

The same thing would happen here with two more teams. What we should be considering is a way to even out and tighten up the competition.

This year, with more than half the season remaining, the only games likely to stir much interest are the clashes between the top three teams — Swan Districts, Claremont and South Fremantle. In fact,

the closeness of these three teams is the only factor keeping the competition alive.

It is to be hoped that the battle for fourth place between East Perth, West Perth and possibly Subiaco can extend until later in the season.

It doesn't really matter who makes fourth spot because I doubt if any of the other five teams can account for any of the top three — let alone dispose of two of them to push their way into the grand final.

A six-team competition would have some obvious advantages —

Firstly, it would lift the standard of the competition as teams would become more competitive as there would be less league spots available.

Equally as important, it would enable the clubs to cope better with the spiralling costs of operating.

Six teams dividing the financial cake instead of eight, would obviously result in a greater slice for each club.

It is a fact of football life that most league clubs are battling to make ends meet because their income is not commensurate with their expenditure. It is the main reason why star players are now able to obtain clearances so easily to the VFL.

Most league clubs simply cannot afford to hang on to their stars.

The season would not be greatly affected by having only six teams. It would mean that clubs would play each other four times for a 20-round season. Only one final would be lost. Teams could fight it out for three places in the finals with the top two playing for a place in the grand final. The loser would then play the third team to decide the other grand finalist.

If football is to survive the pressures currently being applied to it in this State, then a re-assessment of the competition is now necessary.

The game simply cannot afford to accommodate the lop-sided kind of results that have developed this season.

I think the time is ripe for Barry Cable to enter the coaching arena once again. Cable decided on a self-imposed rest from league football at the end of last season. However, now with the possibility of at least three of our clubs seeking new coaches in 1982 — Barry will be back as a coach, either in Perth or Melbourne, in the not too distant future.

Just in case you are wondering which local clubs I am referring to — I will tell you — Perth, East Fremantle and maybe West Perth.

Although it is only a rumour, I believe Graham Campbell could be returning to his home State of Victoria at the end of this season.

Percy is allegedly against the decision to have Noel Carter as captain of the W.A. side. Brown, on the other hand, is adamant that Carter should be the skipper.

Unfortunately, what started out as the main topic (Carter as skipper) became clouded in a series of other issues that really related to bad blood between Brown and Johnson over a period of years.

You know, the sad part is that both guys have so much to offer football — and incidentally, have both contributed in no small way to our game in this State.

Both Percy and Malcolm also have similar fiery temperaments. On a personal note, I am the meat in the sandwich — both are friends (I hope) yet the two remain enigmas of this funny game called "Football".

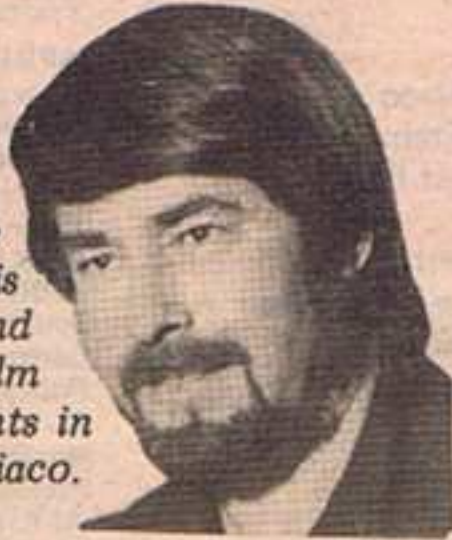
