

TRIBUNAL MARINAL

PUZZZEE

Football officials seem certain to be puzzled by WAFL tribunal decisions again this season.

This the immediate reaction after the tribunal's findings and penalties on Monday night.


It is difficult to fathom how Alan Cransberg, the Swan Districts centre-half-back and Subiaco wingman David Miers could receive the same punishment for varying degrees of aggressiveness.

Cransberg's offence was tame in comparison to Miers' and he should not have even been reported.

If the umpires found it necessary to report him, then perhaps the charge should have read unduly rough play.

Most people at Subiaco Oval believed that the Miers incident involving West Perth's Peter Menaglio was far worse. Yet the two reported players were each suspended for two playing dates.

Cransberg crashed into East Fremantle rover Roger Kerr after he had disposed of the ball but pressmen at the ground were amazed to hear of the report after the match.

Miers was reported by boundary umpire Ian Sandover for elbowing Menaglio in the opening minutes of the match between West Perth and Subiaco. People who saw the blow said it happened 60 to 70 metres behind the play. And tribunal chairman Mr. Bernie O'Sullivan conceded that it was a "serious offence".

This sort of unnecessary violence must be stamped out.

Miers was reported on two other separate striking charges by different umpires, but each of these was dismissed.


West Perth coach Dennis Cometti was angry and perplexed over the penalties handed out by the tribunal.

TRUTH

He instructed his players to tell the truth at the tribunal. He said he believed it was strange that two clubs could fight over player contracts during the week and then expect opposition players to tell less than the truth at the hearing.

Subiaco coach Ken Armstrong said that it was his club's policy to discipline players found guilty by the tribunal and Miers would be penalised by the Lions.

He added that he hoped his players would continue to play aggressively as long as it was within the laws of the game.



'HE HIT ME

. . . that was the direct evidence given to the WAFL tribunal by West Perth player Peter Menaglio on Monday night.

In a frank statement of honesty, Menaglio . . one of the game's most skilful players . . told the tribunal in no uncertain terms what happened in the incident with Subiaco's David Miers.

"We were jogging along in opposite directions with the ball about 50 metres downfield and he just turned and hit me in the eye", said Menaglio.

Menaglio's eye was swollen considerably on Sunday . . . and was factual evidence of the incident at a West Perth players meeting called to discuss the Subiaco match.

West Perth coach Dennis Cometti laid the law down to his players . . . and repeated the instructions on Channel 7's World of Sport later that day . . . that he expected all players involved in reports to "tell it as they saw it".

THE WAFL carried out an interesting exercise in public relations last week when all media received official letters at the four grounds informing them of the changes in players' outfits this year.

Apart from the introduction of new logos and the appearance of players' numbers on the front of guernseys, there are also changes in the shorts to be worn by alleight clubs.

All players will wear a standard short with three stripes (Adidas) on the side. The clubs will wear only one set of coloured shorts, thereby dispensing with

the old practice of different coloured shorts at home or away games.

The line-up of shorts this year will be:

Claremont — navy blue with gold stripes;

South Fremantle — red with white stripes;

Swan Districts — black with white stripes;

East Perth — blue with black stripes;

Subiaco — maroon with gold stripes; West

Perth — blue with red stripes; East Fremantle — white with blue stripes and Perth — black with red stripes.


FAMILY AFFAIR





HEDIER ENGESNOT

Plenty of people keep asking me about the transition from my involvement in Sunday football to that at league ranks at West Perth.

I think quite a few are mildly surprised when I reply that the differences aren't all that great.

The basic difference is the skill factor amongst the individual team members. Obviously the players at a league club are going to be lucky enough to have higher skill levels than their Sunday counterparts.

Perhaps lucky is the wrong word because I'm sure that many of the regular league players in the WAFL are men who have worked hard at refining their skills. But overall, I think skills and co-ordination are accidents of birth.

Sunday players have generally settled upon a different set of priorities to WAFL players. But once people involved with the various clubs accept those values, the objectives and the methods, although less concentrated, are much the same.

I was very fortunate to be associated with three quality Sunday sides, -Maddington, Osborne Park and Kelmscott, - and perhaps the lesser Sunday league clubs fall short of the standards I found. But I can think of several other clubs in both competitions who, at least to an outsider, went about their business in a professional manner.

Skill and attitude aren't always related and I must say I've seen some wonderful attitudes displayed on Sunday afternoons by teams watched by just a handful of spectators and with little chance of much publicity.

What makes the WAFL so exciting is that there is the opportunity to harness both attitude and skill.

From a personal point of view, I'm happy with the combining of these two factors at West Perth at the moment. I think it's fair to say that Subiaco is another club that must be pretty happy with the endeavour of their players. Last Saturday the West Perth/Subiaco game provided a really committed contest.

Saturday's match against South should be a beauty. Despite Malcolm Brown's determination to down-play the Bulldogs' prospects, I believe they're the logical premiership favourites at this stage of the season.


I have a number of good friends who play for South and I'm sure they won't be doing me any favours on Saturday.


But, in particular, I'd like to wish Stuart Hillier a top season against all but West Perth.

Sydney . . an important step for football

IT was interesting to see the South Melbourne players . . . or the Sydney Swans as they will be known in New South Wales . . . survive their first test in the Harbour Bridge city.

The VFL's expansion into Sydney is an important step for the national development of Australian football and though I've got some reservations about the move . . . a subject I'll expand on later this season . . . it was a significant victory by the Swans.

The Sydney press are still a little cool about football coming into their rugby domain, but they are at least giving it media coverage.

One thing that does puzzle me, however, is the size of the Sdyney Cricket. Ground. Having seen quite a few cricket matches there, it is obvious that the ground is a little short from goal to goal. The flanks are wide enough, but it's about 25 metres short in length and that means a good kick out of the centre lands in the goalsquare.

That will have a big effect on the matches up there . . . especially if the Swans can adapt to the local conditions.

INTERSTATE RECRUITS

Just a point on the VFL.

It's interesting to note that in last weekend's round of fixtures, 54 of the 240 footballers who played in FVL matches were recruited from interstate clubs.

That's about 23 per cent. Another 29 played in the reserves and a further 14 couldn't play because of injury or clearance problems.

I guess it just goes to show that WA clubs should be justly proud of the opening round we provided.

Despite the absentees, there was some great football played and, more important, was the competitive nature of three of the four matches.

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JOHN DUCKWORTH adidos I

. . A FIERCE APPROACH TO PLAY AND TO WIN



Whichever way you look at it, John Duckworth will leave his name stamped indelibly on WA football when he retires from the scene.

For a start, he first came under football notice when he bobbed up at full-back for Fitzroy, in the tough VFL arena, and everyone suddenly discovered that he originally came from WA. National service had taken him to Victoria and the astute football judges turned him into a league star . . . a far cry from the country football he was playing at Dudinin, in WA's wheatbelt area.

Then it became something of a recruiting coup when West Perth whose country zone included Dudinin - enticed the big, strong defender back to WA in 1977, where he appeared as one of the best 'rookies' of all time.

Aggressive football was his hallmark and though he earned the nickname Ducky, he was never soft or susceptible to pressure. He was, without doubt, one of WA football's most fearsome players . . . and with enough speed to chase any aggressors, if necessary.

But he fell out at West Perth, failing to reach agreement with the committee over payments. So he headed to South Australia, became one of the few players to reach senior level in all three major football States and won the Magarey Medal, for the best and fairest player in the SANFL, to boot.

But back home there was a younger brother by the name of Bill, who was emerging at Kondinin and seemed set to make his mark at West Perth. In 1980 Bill Duckworth made his league debut and was voted one of the best first-year players. In 1981 John Duckworth headed home . . . to fulfill a long ambition.

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS asked big John why he came back to Perth . . . and found out a few other things about the burly utility player as well.





Estate and has begun a new challenge at West Perth. This could be his last chance to play in a premiership side and he will give his all.

Q. You have played in three States. Where did you enjoy your football the most?

A. I have to say the VFL. It's nice to play at the top level when you are up against the best players in Australia.

Q. Did they recruit you from the country?

A. No I went over to Victoria to do my national service and went to Fitzroy after Kevin Murray, who used to play with East Perth, asked me to go down for a run. I knew Kevin and after training I signed up with Fitzroy.

Q. What was it that you liked about the VFL? Was it the atmosphere, the prestige of playing in the VFL or just that you were playing against the best footballers?

A. I was playing in the top competition. You had to play well every week because there was always a long line of fellows who would be more than willing to take your spot if you didn't perform.

Q. What made you come back to WA and join West Perth?

A. West Perth came over and saw me when I was considering coming home and I thought they were a pretty good club. They gave me a good offer and I also had a couple of mates who were playing with hem at the time, so I came back.

Q. How long did you play with West Perth before going to South Australia? A. I played two years with West Perth

before going to Central District in South Australia.

Q. What was your reason for coming back to WA?

A. Another change. I had another opportunity to change clubs so I took that opportunity and it paid off. My first year there I won the Magarey Medal which was the highlight of my career.

Q. What brought you back to WA. Was it mainly to play with your brother Bill? A. Yes, I really did want to play with

Bill. To play league football with your brother is a great experience and that was my main reason for coming back.

What about when he decided to go to Essendon, did you try to persuade him to play for Fitzroy?

A. No. The decision he made as to which club he went to was entirely up to him. But I handled all his dealings because I had to do it for myself with other clubs. I handled everything for him and got him a good deal so he's happy about going to Essendon.

Q. What do you consider to be your greatest strength in the game?

A. For my size I'm pretty fast, probably one of the fastest in the league and to be my size and fast is probably my greatest asset.

Q. Have you always had that aggressive approach to your game?

A. Everyone has got to have a certain amount of aggression in the way they play football.



Q. What about your future?

A. Well I'll just take it year by year. I think I need just over 20 games to play my 200th and if I can play them I'll probably quit at the end of the season.

Q. Would you be looking at the possibility of coaching in the future?

A. I put in for the West Perth job this year, but didn't get it. I'll probably give it another try whether it be at league level, in the country or in Sunday league I don't know. But I'll give it a go.

Q. How are you shaping up this year? A. I feel good. We have had a very hard pre-season this year. Probably the hardest that I've had here in Western Australia. It's done the boys the world of good and they're pretty fit. And if we can have everyone fit and well I think we'll have a good year.

Q. It must have been disappointing last year?

A. Yes it was. The way the boys finished off 1980 there was so much talk of us doing well in 1981 and for us not to perform it was very disappointing.

Q. You started well in practice matches too.

A. We burnt in the practice matches last year and then fell away. This year we haven't won a pre-season practice game so it might be a different story.

Q. Could this be your last chance at

playing in a premiership side?

A. I'd say so. It's getting harder all the time. I'm 33 now and by the time the next footy season comes around I'm going to be 34. The aches and pains are more difficult to overcome and it's harder to get enthused about pre-season training. I would play footy for the rest of my life if I didn't have to do pre-season training. At the moment I'm looking at this being my last year.

So the talent is there. But is the attitude? At the moment it seems to be, but the Falcons will need to beat a team of South Fremantle's calibre to show they are not premiership pretenders.






East Fremantle, riding high after last week's opening victory against Swan Districts, obviously believe they can stop Claremont's winning run.

But it's unlikely. While Old Easts have a lot of talent it remains to be seen whether they have the discipline and appetite to put the kind of pressure on Claremont to jam their precision-like football.

Claremont can expect a dividend from their foward line. They have so many top players in this area that if one is hamstrung others carry on.

If they can win, or give Claremont a run for their money, then it may provide the spark to fire them again this season.






The other Saturday game, between Perth and Subiaco, looks like complementing a top round of football.

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INTERSTATE UPDATE

Umps in the hot seat

IT hasn't taken long for the VFL to be embroiled in umpiring controversy - just one week into the season, in fact.

The first full round of fixtures last week saw talk of protest after Fitzroy and Carlton had tied in a thriller at Princes Park.

Carlton, the reigning premiers, were lucky to scrape out of their match with a draw when a point after the siren saved them from defeat in a match that had earlier seen them lead by 32 points at halftime.

Fitzroy claimed that the final point should not have been allowed. It was kicked by Carlton's Greg Wells and the siren sounded as it sailed goalwards. It didn't make the distance, but was forced through by the milling pack in the goalsquare.

The rules state that the ball must not be assisted through the goals by any player. It must cross the scoring line by its own momentum.

Fitzroy were also annoyed at the free kick that gave Wells his shot at goal.

"It was no free kick and no point," said Fitzroy's president, Keith Weigard, who also called for the re-instatement of sacked umpires adviser, Harry Beitzel.

"At least with Beitzel, everything was clear cut and we knew what was happening even if we didn't like it," he added.

However, Fitzroy coach Robert Walls took the situation calmly and defused any suggestions about a protest.

He said that from his understanding of the rules, he felt that the point was legitimate.



'PIES CHEWED UP



Collingwood's coach Tom Hafey delivered a scathing attack on his players after their dismal performance against Geelong.

He lamblasted the players as slow, slack, undisciplined and lacking any fight.

"We'd be battling to find a good player," he said after the Pies had been chewed up by the Cats to the tune of 88 points.

Hafey wants the club to move back to Victoria Park for full-scale training. The club has been forced to train on a local junior ground as Victoria Park's muddy condition dries up.

Bluey will be back

Footscray's veteran ruckman Ian (Bluey) Hampshire hasn't retired despite speculation that he wasn't wanted at the club this year.

The 33-year-old veteran of 215 games has been troubled by a groin injury, but should be available for this week's fixture.

The big ruckman missed out on the vicecaptaincy at Footscray this season and when he didn't appear in the league or reserves teams last week, the rumours were rife.

However, Footscray's chairman of selectors, Peter Welsh, dispelled any doubts about Hampshire's role when he said:


"We certainly expect him to be our No. 1 ruckman this year."

You often hear talk about kicks being expensive, especially when they miss easy goals. But this is hard to swallow. The critics have worked out that Graham Teasdale, football's highest-priced recruit, cost the Magpies about \$750 a kick for each of his four kicks against Geelong. Teasdale is reportedly being paid \$185,000 for this three-year contract - or about \$3,000 a match.

Ironically, Teasdale's high salary is believed to have forced the walk-out of star Collingwood defender, Bill Picken, on the eve of the match. Picken was in conflict with the committee over his pay for 1982.

Collingwood missed Picken's influence in defence as they were thrashed by the Cats and Teasdale's contribution of four kicks (all from marks) did not impress the fans.





Football doing well in New Guinea

With all the activity associated with Australian Football here in Australia there is a tendancy to forget some of the better things which are happening away from our shores.

In response to an enquiry which I made to the Secretary of the Papua - New Guinea Rules Football Council I have been supplied with the very latest player statistics from that beautiful country.

The enquiry was made initially because Rules (that is our game's official title in Papua - New Guinea) was one of the few sports which did not conduct coaches courses at the new National Sports Training Institute at Goroka during 1981. This naturally concerned me — and particularly in view of visits made by me to Papua - New Guinea in 1978 and 1980. During these visits the great importance of coach education was continually emphasised.

In spite of the fact that our code has not utilised the Institute to the same extent as other sports is disappointing but nevertheless should be considered in context with the many other initiatives which are being taken by the Papua - New Guinea Rules Council under President Herea Amini and Secretary William Maha, There are now plans to have a coaching and umpiring course at the Institute in 1982.

The Council staged a highly successful National Championships series in 1981 at Lae. These were contested by six leagues — National Capital (Port Moresby), Lae, Rabaul, Goroka, Mt Hagen and Madang who completed the championships in the above order.

VIC, UMPIRE

The grand final was umpired by V.F.L. umpire Neville Nash and one of the local panel. After the match, Nash showed the N.F.L. produced film "Play The Game" and conducted a clinic for Papua - New Guinea umpires attending the series.

A national team was then selected which played the annual match against the Gold Coast (Queensland) representative team. Over the past four encounters the Queensland team has been victorious on three occasions. The "PNG" team was only selected from Port Moresby for these matches. Last year with a truly representative team Papua - New Guinea won by ten goals. This year's match will undoubtedly be a thrilling affair. It is perhaps debatable that so much hard earned local league finance at both the Gold Coast and Papua - New Guinea ends should be expended on sending elite teams on biannual jaunts. It is however, something for players in those areas to really strive for and in the final analysis I have to admit they are a good thing.

In addition to the six leagues which contested the National Championships there are a further four competitions at Kieta, Kimbe, Kavieng and Wewak which field a total of 23 teams.

One of the problems of developing football in Papua - New Guinea is that there is no attention paid to junior football on a national basis. It has been a very ad hoc scene. Now for the first time the President of the Central Junior Football League, Mike Coburn, a former Tasmanian, is going to confer with the senior league executives in Port Moresby with the object of formulating a concerted programme of expansion.

There are also interesting plans for an Oceania Championship involving Papua - New Guinea, New Zealand, Nauru and Australian aboriginal teams.

Father and son league coaches

The appointment of Ian Miller as coach of Perth completes a unique double.

Miller with his father, Bob, are the only father and son combination to coach the same club in Postwar WAFL football.

Bob coached the Demons in 1960 and '61. There has been other father and son coaching combinations in this era but not with the same clubs. Frank Sparrow coached Swan Districts and West Perth, his father, Val, East Perth, Kevin Murray coached East Perth his father Dan, Subiaco.



Miller . . senior and junior

Jack Sheedy and Haydn Bunton coached the same clubs, East Fremantle and Subiaco, as their fathers had before World War II.

There is only one instance of a father and son coaching league football at the same time. That was in the late sixties when Jack Oatey was with Sturt and son Robert was with Norwood.

OPENING RECORD

Swan Districts opened the season with a record, their 26-28 (148) is the highest losing score in WA league football. Previous highest was East Fremantle's 147 points against West Perth at Leederville in 1978.

PREMIER'S BOUNCE

Leederville Oval was officially opened in 1915 when the then Premier of the day bounced the ball to start the first game there between West Perth and Subiaco. Probably no Premier has been more qualified for such a duty than present premier Ray O'Connor, he won the 1950 Prendergast Medal (reserves fairest and best) when playing for East Perth.

TALL ORDERS

Some years ago I was lucky enough to win a television quiz show on football so I guess it was acceptable that I would be called on to try and settle some inevitable footy arguments.

Over the years I have received hundreds of calls (at all hours). The boys at the Koorda Hotel often ring in from the Sunday session. I recall being waken at 1.30 a.m. by two former footballers (both Sandover Medalists I might add) they wanted to know who were the two doctors that played for Claremont in the fifties. (It was Tony Capes and Peter Tunbridge, Capes is now president of Footscray.)

A recent request was the best of all, the questioneer wanted quarter by quarter scores plus goalkickers and umpires of all league games played between 1885 and 1960!!

THE LONG, SHORT AND TALL

Looking through the "Who's Who" in Westside last week it shows Laurie Keene of Subiaco and John Ironmonger of East Perth are the tallest players in the league at 2 metres. Subiaco's Vic Melville the heaviest at 108 Kilograms, and East Fremantle's Joe Pittorini the smallest at 165 centimeters.

TIMES CHANGE

How time have changed. I remember during the fifties football writers of the day were advocating a shorter season. Twenty one games was too long, impossible for footballers to retain fitness. They never dreamed of Escort Cup games or Red Rooster Carnivals preceeding a March start to league football.

Then about the same time there was plenty of suggestions why we need ten teams in the competition, SA made this move which they latter regretted. Now there is suggestions in some places that we should reduce our number of teams.

This was also about the time when 30 years was the retirement age of foot-ballers even though the game was

incredibly slower than it is today. In other words Bill Valli, Ron Alexander. Stan Nowotny and Alan Watling would have been 'phased out' by now.


FULL FLIGHT

"I know it's bad and I'll have to do something about that," Gandini says. "I have got something to prove this year.


"Without taking anything away from the other players, the only reason everyone thinks I had a good year last season was that we were playing so badly and it was easy to stand out.

CLAREMONT SHOULD WAKE UP

Some league officials are helping kill the game in this State.

Why is it that football attracts so many negative people into influential positions? The way some react gives the impression they see the media as a nuisance, if not the enemy.

It's about time league clubs realised the media is helping prop up the game in this State.

Not all clubs fall into this category. In fact Swan Districts, West Perth and East Perth in particular . . . have gone to great lengths to recognise the part played by the media.

Probably the worst offender is Claremont, as was shown at Claremont Oval on Saturday. It is one club that appears to have no time for the media.

WINNING STREAK

Perhaps because they are on a winning streak they feel they don't need it. But times change.

Also it needs only a couple of clubs to make it difficult for the media to further erode the position of football in this State.

An incident at Claremont Oval shows how clubs can be a hinderance to football. Claremont made little attempt to overcome a Licensing Council regulation that purportedly prevents the media from venturing on to licensed premises with their official media pass.

The Media Guild, which represents football critics in this State, has initiated moves to resolve the matter.

But why can't clubs take the initiative?

If the media has to be ushered on to licensed premises by being signed in by a member then surely steps could be taken to do this,

LUDICROUS

Instead there was the ludicrous situation at Claremont Oval where some football writers found it difficult to even get in to the Tigers club rooms because it was alleged to be part of the members' section.

I can assure club officials it is no great thrill going into members' section to be

sniped at by club officials or supporters wanting to give their version of the game.

Most newspapers insist their reporters cover presentations and listen to what a coach and club president has to say so as to give the public a better service.

Perhaps that is the reason why some clubs are happy to hide behind an interpretation of the Liquor Act.

I wonder how football would react if the media suddenly said: "If we are going to be obstructed in the course of our coverage then we won't bother reporting games at grounds where it occurs."

There would be some nice screams from football administrators.

Unfortunately they have to come to expect the kind of coverage they get . . . which many believe is too much.

BATTLING

Football in this State is currently battling to survive . . . make no mistake about that.

Football should be going out of its way to forge a strong liaison with the media the vehicle that helps promote the game. Some clubs are.

But if commentators are going to be subjected to the kind of stupid action at Claremont Oval last Saturday then the only loser in the long run will be football,

And that goes for league coaches as well. They may very well find it a nuisance, or irksome, to talk to commentators after the game. But acts of petulance don't help.

It's interesting as a critic to find how loquacious some coaches are when they win, yet don't want to know you when they lose.

As I said earlier the Media Guild has moved to resolve the situation with the Licensing Court. It should not have had to. League clubs should have taken steps to overcome the problem when it first emerged.


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

WAFL sets up junior committees

THE WAFL has taken a giant step forward in their bid to guide junior football along the right path.

Football Development Administrator Ross Davis has recently formed two committees - Development Committee which is made up of the league clubs' eight fulltime development officers and a Football Development Board.

The Development Committee meets monthly and discusses coaching clinics at schools - the funds for which are provided by the WAFL.

The Football Development Board is due to have its first meeting next week.

The board is headed by Cliff Houghton (Chairman), Neil Judge (secretary), Ross Davis, Len Pavy (superintendent of physical education with the Education Department), John Fuhrmann (Department of Youth Sport and Recreation), Ray Scott, Gerry Stokes and Mick Moylan.

Mr Stokes was elected to represent the junior councils of all the clubs and Mr Moylan (South Fremantle) was elected as the development officers' representative. DEVELOP

Mr Davis said the board has been formed so that junior football could continue to develop.

"There was just too much work for one person," he says. "With the formation of the board, it means that we can pool our ideas and come up with a sound development programme for the juniors.

"Our first official meeting is next week, although we had an unofficial gathering a couple of weeks ago to make sure everyone on the board knew each other.

"At our first meeting we will discuss the budget and the development of football in the North West," Mr Davis says. The Australian Football Championships

made money available to the project last year.

But the previous development administrator at the league, Mr Richard Walker resigned from the position early in the season and there was no one to go on with the job.

"Mr Walker had planned a few trips but these had to be cancelled," says Mr Davis.

"That means that we still have about \$13,000 of the \$15,000 allocated and this will be spent on air fares, coaching materials and equipment."

Mr Davis says that when they travel to the Pilbara and the Kimberleys, they hoped to take a few league players and coaches with them.

At the moment he is planning the trips. around the programmes of coaches and players.

He said they would fly to the North West and spend one or two days in each town.

They would look at going to the schools to conduct coaching clinics during the day, follow up by going to training at the senior clubs in the afternoon and perhaps helping out with the training and then holding seminars for umpires and coaches at night.

Mr Davis has approached Hamersley Iron to help sponsor for the visits. The company owns many of the centres which will be visited and the indications are that they will become a supporter of the scheme.



League prepares for carnival

W.A.A.F.L. officials will have one of their busiest years for some time with the Australian amateur football carnival in Perth from July 5-10.

Competing States are South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria and Western Australia.

This will be the 15th carnival since 1936 when W.A. first competed in Adelaide. Previously Perth was host city in 1948, 1959 and 1970.

Western Australia has yet to win a carnival series, the closest being in Hobart (1979) when they defeated both Tasmania and South Australia and only went down to Victoria by several points.

Both Victoria and South Australia have dominated the series, Victoria winning on 10 occasions (including seven straight). South Australia have won four times.

Clubs are highly organised

Many amateur clubs have developed into highly organised, efficient and business-like organisations, especially those with several teams competing.

Some administrators are responsible for up to nearly 200 active participating members and have shown great expertise and skill that in all too many instances are not recognised and appreciated out of their own club circles.

Some of the professional sporting bodies could look to some amateur football club set-ups, remembering each individual team has to supply a goal umpire, boundary umpire, time-keeper, steward as well as team manager and trainers.

Clubs with six teams are Mt Lawley, University and Wembley, while North Beach have five teams. Those with four teams include Bayswater, Collegians, Carlisle, Dianella, Maylands, Mt Hawthorn-West Perth, Nollamara, Old Wesley, Scarborough, W.A.I.T. and Whitfords.

There are 14 other clubs with three teams, nine clubs with two teams and 23 clubs with one team.

Humble start

SINCE its initial meeting on March 19, 1922 — when, at the instigation of W.R. (Billy) Orr (then Secretary of the W.A.N.F.L.) the "Mercantile Association" was formed — the amateurs have gone from strength to strength.



From that humble beginning with five teams in 1924 it first changed its name to Perth District Association (still with five teams).

By 1929 seven teams were competing, the name again changed, this time to the "Western Australian Amateur Football Association".

In 1938, 14 teams played in one division and the following year's competition was divided into "A" and "B" divisions with 17 teams.


From 1942 to 1945 no competition was conducted during the War years.
University become the first club with

more than one team in 1946, while Postal's were a non-playing, fully affiliated member.

A third division "C" was added in

The first colts (under 20) competition was introduced in 1959 and the name of the Amateurs was changed to its existing title in 1971 when 75 teams

A Sunday division was commenced in 1973, and the amateur league admitted its 100th team one season later, and reached the 150 team mark for the first time in 1980; playing in 15 separate divisions.



Mr Colin Jamieson, M.L.A., has been president of the W.A.A.F.L. since 1971. He has been on the league's council since 1946, either as a delegate or officer.

He is also president of the Australian Amateur Football Council, being a delegate on that body since 1956.

This year, Mr Jamieson will be host President to the Tasmanian, South Australian and Victorian amateur State teams competing in the Australian amateur football carnival in Perth in July.

In all, there are 65 umpires (excluding A & B division) involved every weekend.

Claremont to improve Cardinals should country links improve

The Claremont Football Club has moved to improve its relationship with it's country zone.

The "flag waving" visits of the past will go in favour of full day or weekend seminars to discuss specific aspects of football promotion or education.

A delegation of officials from the Southern Districts National Football League attended a special meeting with the Club in Perth recently to discuss the new system. The delegation included league secretary, Mrs Eleanor Hockey, vice-president Allan Hamilton, delegate Pat Brown and past president Harry Reeves. All expressed the view that the meeting had been the most positive and constructive yet held with Claremont.

Claremont is keen to establish a better image and liaison with its country zone to the benefit of both parties. "It was now up to country leagues to do their best to make it work and individuals in the area had to adopt an approach equally as positive as Claremont's", said S.D.N.F.L. secretary Eleanor Hockey.

Once the new system has been given time to take effect it was intended that

there would be a greater integration of the country zone within the framework of the Claremont Football Club's affairs. Conversly there would be a closer understanding of country problems and a more effective use of the available expertise by country players and officials.

Seminars will be arranged in conjunction with country leagues. The plan called for concentrated seminars in which country and city counterparts would meet. Senior coaches would instruct country senior coaches; Claremont trainers would discuss methods with their country counterparts; Junior Council executives of both sides would meet together and executive officers would discuss management problems. "In this way it was hoped to establish a much broader contact on a "person to person" basis with direct communication instead of through complicated channels", said Mrs Hockey.

Claremont will continue to give special assistance to promising juniors by including country players in representative sides as it has done in the past.

Great Northern expect big season

There are several familiar West Australian football names coaching teams in Geraldton and it augers well for a top year.

John Lewis, Ron Bentley and Gary McDonald will be searching for a premiership with their respective clubs.

Lewis, the former Claremont defender, is optimistic about Northampton's chances of making the finals. He is keen to get off to a good early start in a bid to get enough points on the board before the pressure goes on.

Lewis has a shortage of talent in the ruck and will be relying on his runners to produce the football required to be a force.

Bentley, who played about 90 games for East Fremantle, is having his first stint at coaching and he has taken over the job at Railways - the club which has won the last two premierships.

It's not an easy task for Bentley especially as the club has lost a number of their leading players.

It will be a case of promoting youngsters at Railways and they hope there is enough experience to enable them to win matches.

Bentley has been giving his charges solid workouts during pre-season in the hope that superior fitness will help them finish on in their games and help win the tight matches.


"We were happy with the attendances last year," Mr Bowler said. "This season every club will play one Sunday match and we are hoping for a similar response."


Barry Day could have been anything . . . as it stands now he will probably hang up his boots.


