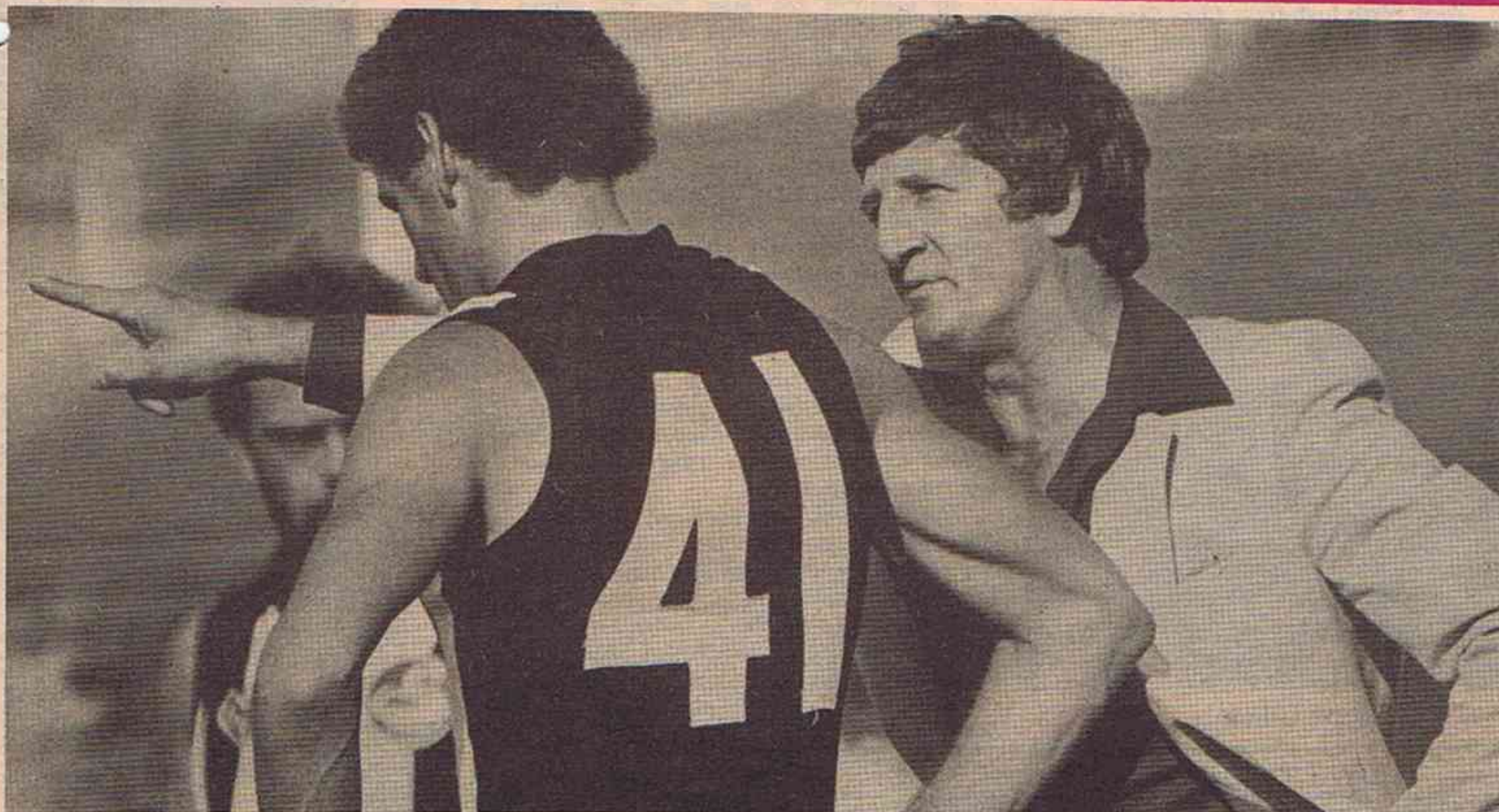

# ...but Max is back

Max George has grown up — and he is determined that his latest comeback to league football will be a successful one.

The 29-year-old former leading WAFL goal kicker is back training at Swan Districts after an unsuccessful attempt by East Fremantle to sign him up again this year.

George, looking fit and keen, is determined that this comeback — his sixth in various league circles — will prove once and for all that he is a top footballer.

"I've learned a lot in the last few years and I realise it's time I had a serious go at playing league again in WA," says George.

"I was keen to join East Fremantle when Ron Alexander, who I played with at Fitzroy, invited me down there. But when I realised that I would run into clearance problems with Swans I figured it was just as well to throw my lot in there if John Todd wanted me to."

George's football career reads like a geography map.

He was recruited from Northam to play with Swans and had several stints there with breaks in between to learn how to train trotters. He then went to Fitzroy, over to Central District (in South Australia) and then to Geraldton. Last year he went back to Central District again, but quickly switched to West Torrens only to finish the season back at Geraldton.

George is a player with enormous talent, a strong mark and a huge kick. If Todd can get him firing at Bassendean it will be a big bonus for Swans.

# I'VE HAD ENOUGH ...WILLIAMS

IAN Williams, one of WA's most brilliant footballers, wants to drop out of the league pressure-cooker scene. The clever 24-year-old ruck rover is up in Port Hedland — and intends staying there for this year. He will almost certainly be cleared by Swan Districts to avoid being banned from competition football elsewhere in the State for two years if he goes ahead and plays without a clearance as he has threatened to do. Williams got the "run around" from VFL club Footscray this year when they obviously decided that his dicey right knee was not worth a \$75,000 gamble. After paying out \$120,000 to Swan Districts for ace full forward Simon Beasley, Footscray obviously balked at another big clearance fee for a player who only managed six league games last year because of continued injury.

"They really gave me the run around and I came home because I was fed up," Williams said in Port Hedland yesterday.

"I started training with Swan Valley to keep fit, but then decided that I wanted to get right out of the place so that's why I'm up here."

Williams is considering offers from the two Port Hedland teams — Panthers and Rovers — and combined with job offers, he should end up almost as well off financially as he would be in Perth, where he has found it difficult to obtain regular employment.

Swans seem prepared to clear Williams on the basis that he will return to the club for next season. But even that must be considered doubtful as Williams was far from happy with the way he was treated at Bassendean Oval.

**WELL DONE ROYALS**

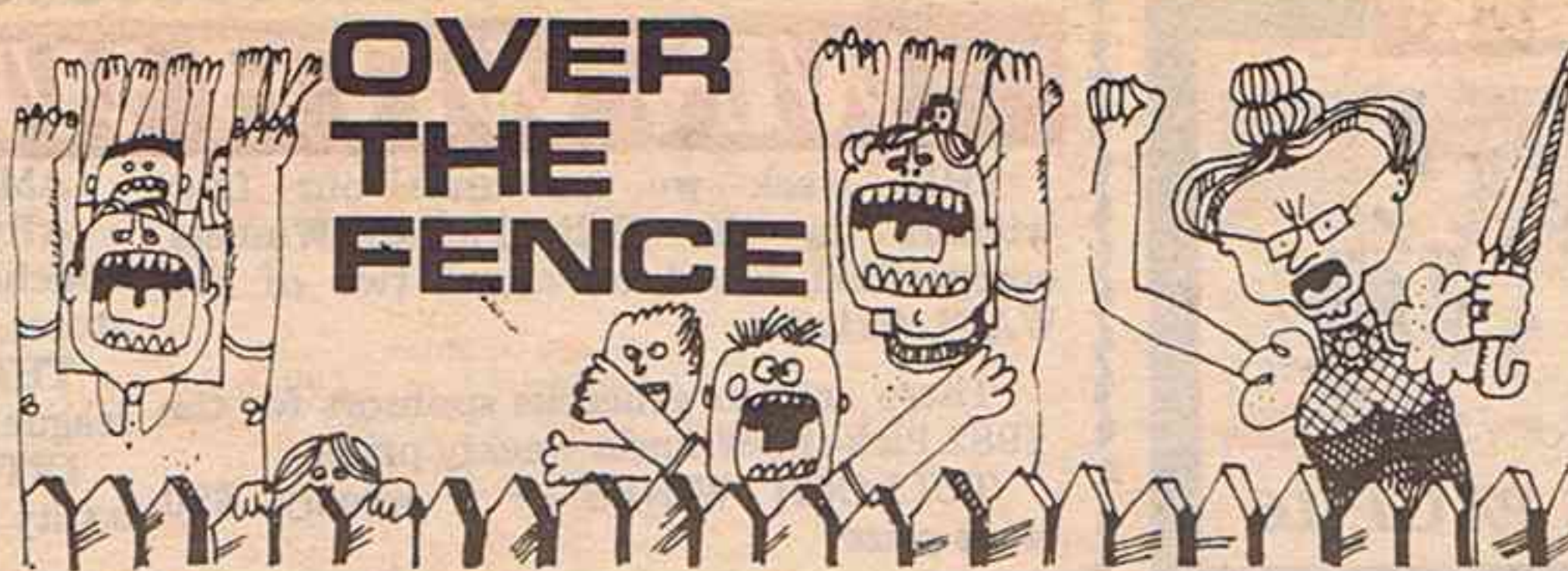

# A national competition will come

It's only a matter of time before a truly national football competition becomes reality, but the part W.A. will play is a matter for conjecture.

Western Australia has provided more than its share of Victorian footballers, so it should follow that those players and the stars that are on the horizon are playing in a nationwide competition in W.A. colours.

We need at least two, possibly three or preferably four teams in a national league. This would ensure that the Krakouers, Spencer, Kelly, Bosustow, Hunter, Rioli, Buckenara, Buhagiar and so on would be seen on a regular basis at Subiaco Oval.

Football fans would flock to these matches because part of the reason they're staying away now is that the cream of W.A. talent has been skimmed and, as in any entertainment industry, the public pays to see the best performers.

If W.A. had a solid representation in any coast to coast competition, football at club level, as we know it now, would become little more than a nursery for the big time, but as things stand that trend is already evident.

## A force

For W.A. to become a force in a national competition, the VFL would have to agree to reduce the number of its teams, ideally from twelve to six. Of course they won't entertain this thought for a moment.

The VFL sees a national league as an extension of the VFL, to provide that body with a broader base. It wants to keep its 12 clubs, and it wants them all financial. South Melbourne, in dire straits not very long ago, now prospers after moving to Sydney. Another club in deep financial trouble is Footscray and I'm told they're thinking of moving to the Gold Coast.

## South Australia

Not helping W.A.'s cause is South Australia's attitude. The SANFL wants just one club in the VFL and believes it can still maintain a ten team club competition. That's rubbish. The ten team competition in South Australia is less than successful now. Imagine how much worse it would be if the State's twenty five or so top footballers were removed from the club competition.

WAFU president Vince Yovich and his league directors will be doing their best to push W.A.'s case at a national level.

If they achieve the success they're seeking, it's possible we may see four composite national teams, and four lesser sides participating in a local league that would foster the stars of the future.

In a radio interview last week, Mr Yovich did not rule out the possibility of the following amalgamations at club level. Perth and Swan Districts, East Perth and West Perth, Claremont and Subiaco, and South and East Fremantle.

But this may all be a pipe dream. It seems the VFL attitude is that we can have any national competition we like... providing it is to the ultimate benefit of the VFL.

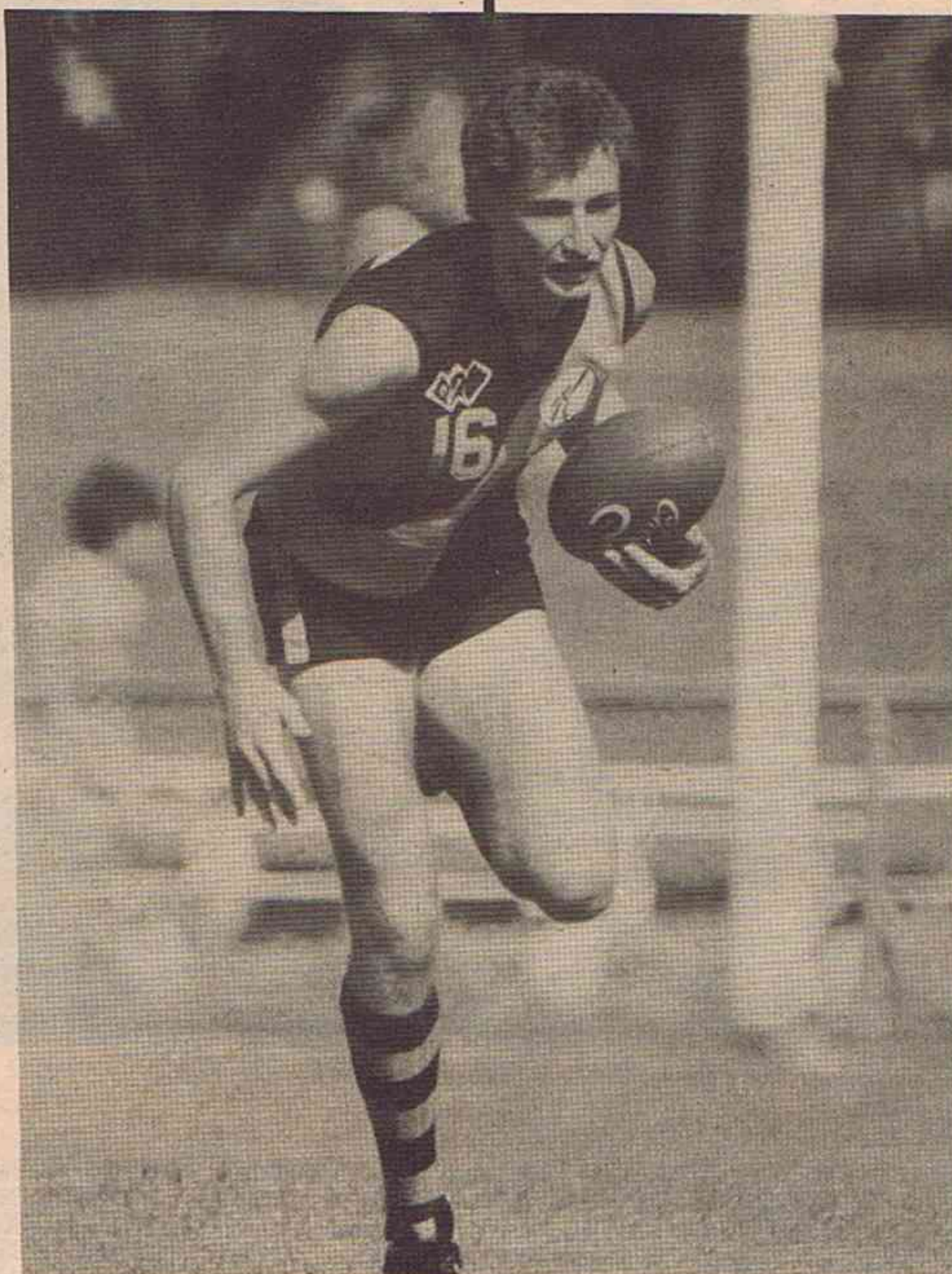

## State match disruption

Saturday attendances, as I've said, have been disappointing. I wonder how many people will be at the footy on June 12.

That's the day twenty more of our top footballers will be unavailable, as they'll be taking on South Australia in Adelaide.

What's worse is that we may not be able to send our best team to South Australia. In order not to disadvantage any club, restrictions will probably be placed on the number of players that can be picked from any one club.

Other disadvantages are that voting can't take place, and goals kicked will probably not count. On June 14, 1980, Warren Ralph booted five goals for Claremont but because

the State team was away they were deleted from all official records. Officially Ralph kicked 82 goals for the year, equal with Simon Beasley who was in Adelaide the day the State team played there.

Rather than club fixtures, June 12 would have been a good day to have held the Red Rooster Carnival, or something similar. For some reason the public stayed away when the carnival was conducted in March. Let's hope the fans' response doesn't deter future promotions of the same nature.

## Points emerge

Two important facts have emerged from the first two rounds of the season.

Firstly, 1982 looks like being one of the most even seasons for years and secondly, Sunday football is here to stay. Attendances at all seven Saturday matches have been poor, but the East Perth/Swans match last Sunday drew a crowd of nearly 12,000.

The WAFL needs to look seriously at a Sunday match every week, or at least on every Sunday when there's not a telecast of a VFL match from Sydney.

## 'Countdown' guests

I would like to take the opportunity to thank those clubs for the co-operation they've shown to 6IX in making players available for 'Countdown to Bouncedown' which goes to air between noon and 2pm each Saturday.

The object of the show, so ably chaired by Gary Carvolth, is to provide last minute information on such things as team changes, and to present a variety of opinions on the matches about to take place. There are only one or two coaches who are a trifle reluctant to allow their players to make the trip to the broadcast box. Sadly this means the fans of those sides are deprived of the opportunity to hear their players' viewpoints. Fortunately, this is clearly outweighed by the players who do have their say and are able to bring some of that "dressing room" feeling to listeners.

## Stone's day will come

The most inexperienced league footballer for 1982 has to be young Swan Districts ruckman Geoff Stone.

Stone sat on the interchange bench at Perth Oval last Sunday, his 20th birthday, until the 27 minute mark of the last quarter. Coach John Todd sent him to the forward line, but unfortunately the ball didn't travel to that area in the dying

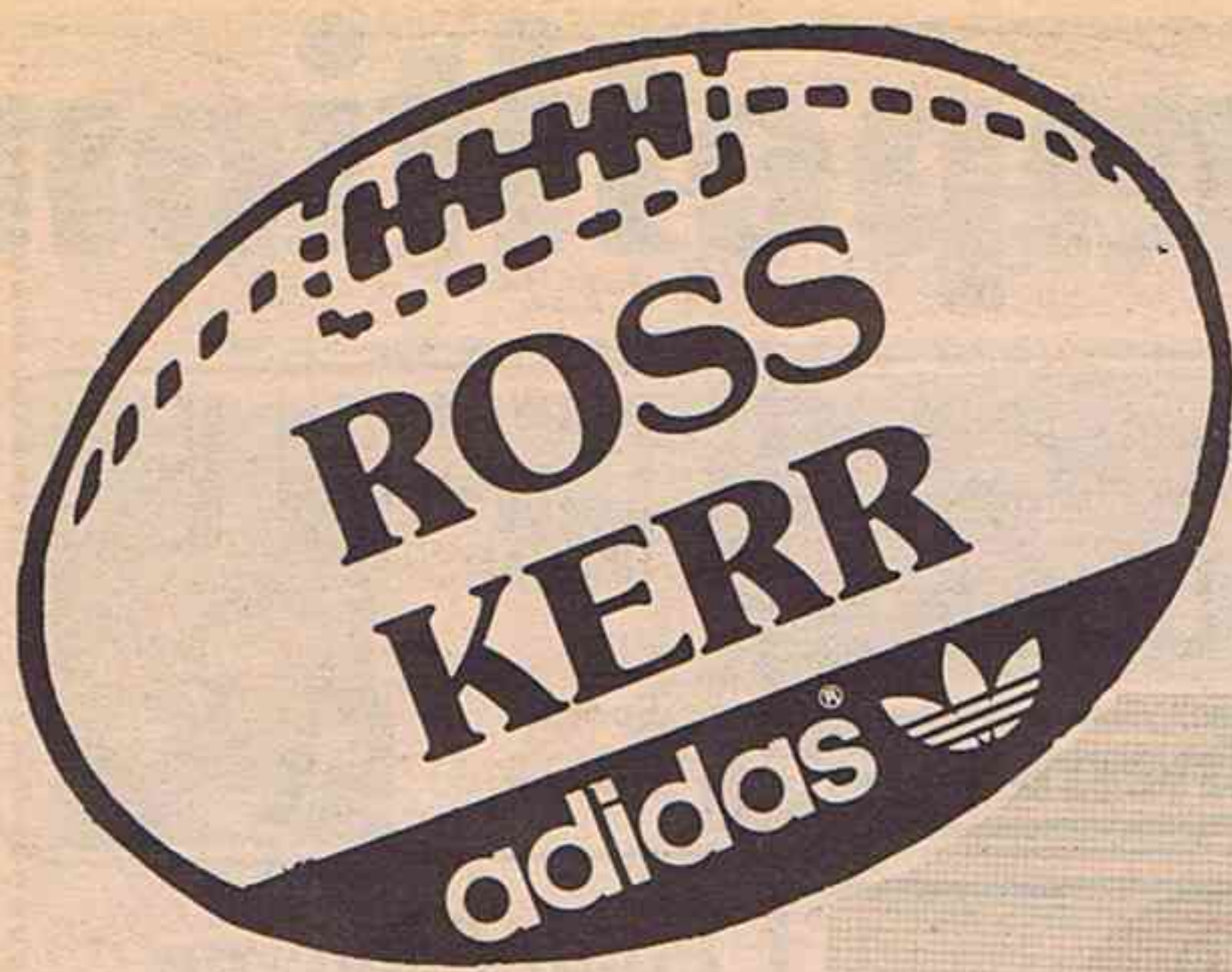

# ... Change was a bonus for Royals

It is always difficult for a player to leave a club that he had been associated with for a long time.

And that was an even tougher decision for Ross Kerr to make last year.

The tigerish wingman wanted to play league football on a regular basis and to do that it meant breaking ties with a club he loved since childhood and move to East Perth.

He played 63 games with South Fremantle but because of the abundance of little men within the club's ranks he was forced to make the switch.

The biggest problem facing a player who has changed clubs is establishing himself in his new environment.

However, since going to the Royals Kerr has played every match and so far this season he has been in outstanding form.

In the opening match he was opposed to one of the best wingman in the league in Claremont speedstar Darrell Panizza but he beat Panizza with his never-say-die approach.

It is that approach which has made him a success at East Perth and he is now one of the first included in the Royals line up each week.

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS talked to Kerr about the transfer to his new club and found out a bit more about the man who has had to battle to remain in top competition.

out to win. A lot of people say you can't take any notice of practice match form, but I think you can. Both sides were trying to win and we came out on top. That will boost our confidence no end.

**Q:** When you are playing against South Fremantle, do you try harder?

**A:** Yes, I do. I can remember playing against them in the first semi and it was a little bit hard playing them in a big one. The guys try to talk to you and it's difficult to ignore them when you have played with them and respected them for so long. But I just tried to shut everything out of mind and looked for a black and blue jumper.

**Q:** What have been some of the high spots in your career?

**A:** Just playing league football. As a kid all I wanted to do was play league football. Being involved with two successful clubs in WA football is good. I could have gone to lesser clubs, but East Perth and South Fremantle are both top clubs. I would have liked to have played in a premiership and hopefully that will happen this year. Even though we lost to East Fremantle in the 1979 grand final it was a good experience. A lot of guys never get the chance to play in a grand final and that is a real eye-opener. We could have won that game, there's no two ways about it. We faded out in the last 10 minutes and threw it away.

**Q:** How hard was it to get into South Fremantle's league side?

**A:** Competition within a club is a good thing. But then you have a close look at the situation and say to yourself: "I will hang around here for a couple of years and keep plugging away". If you keep playing well in reserves then you have to play league. But then, like anyone else, you are going to play a bad one and you are always among the first to be dropped. The thing is that when you get an opportunity, you have to grasp it and try to be the best man on the ground every week.

**Q:** How did you find the switch from South Fremantle to East Perth last season?

**A:** I found it hard at first. It was a matter of adjusting to a different club and meeting new guys. A lot of them I knew as I had played against them and they accepted me pretty well. But when I went there East Perth were going through a bad run as well. We would win one game and then lose the next, but as the year progressed we seemed to become a real tight unit.

**Q:** Do you still have a soft spot for South?

**A:** You never forget the team you cracked the big time with. I left South on good terms, but I wanted to become a regular league player. I played the whole season in 1979 when South lost the grand final to East Fremantle. That was my first full season and when I switched to East Perth I played every league match. That's what I was after.

**Q:** Did you play in the 1980 grand final with South?

**A:** No. I was on the list, but I missed out and that would be one of the biggest disappointments of my career. I had injuries that year and my form was down as well.

**Q:** Did you have any problems settling in at East Perth?

**A:** The guys are top blokes. They are all good characters. At first I was down on form a little bit. I think I was trying too hard to get a kick and that's a problem a lot of guys find when they go to a new club. They don't want to be a failure. Those players you left at your old club follow your progress and you tend to try too hard to succeed. No one likes to earn bad reports.

**Q:** If you had failed would that have been the end for you?

**A:** I'd say that if I had failed I would be looking at the Sunday league. I doubt if I would go to another league club if I did

fail. I'd call it the end and go to an amateur club. But then again it depends on the character. I think that if you have got a bit of fight you won't just walk out when things are going bad. I'd keep trying for a little while.

**Q:** Were you happy with form at East Perth last season?

**A:** I was happy because East Perth were happy with me and I have signed on for another year. Everything was sweet. They are a great club in tradition, just like South and that is one of the main reasons why I joined them. East Perth and South are two teams who typify tradition in Australian football.

**Q:** You must have been happy in winning the fairest and best awards with South early in your career.

**A:** Yes. I know football is a team game but my biggest ambition was to one day make a clean sweep and win the league fairest and best award. Like I say, it is a team game, but those awards are the cream on the cake.

**Q:** How are you going at East Perth now?

**A:** I was pretty happy with the game against Essendon. It was good to play against a name player and have him shifted off you. I started on Ken Eustice and he was taken off me and then I played on Gary Foulds. I was happy with the way the team approached the game. It showed we had the never-say-die attitude and that's what is needed to survive in football these days.

**Q:** Grant Dorrington seemed pretty keen to win the game against Essendon. What sort of approach did he take?

**A:** Yes, Dorro was keen to win. He told us we were not only representing East Perth, but we were playing for Western Australia so we approached it as a State game. He said a lot of players may not get a chance to play against a glamour Victorian side like Essendon again and we went all

## Swans ready to apply pressure

WEST Perth are on the vengeance trail. After squaring off their drubbing by South Fremantle in the last qualifying round last year, the Falcons will venture to Bassendean Oval intent on repaying another debt.

Last season Swans gave the Falcons three hidings, beating them by 12, 14 and 17 goals. The previous season Swans slaughtered them at Bassendean by 21 goals.

But will it be any different this time? Swans would be happy to clip the high flying Falcons wings, but on form it will not be easy to do.

West Perth are full of confidence and virtually treated South Fremantle with contempt at Leederville Oval last week. Swans bounced back in convincing fashion against East Perth after a shock first-up loss to East Fremantle.

They are always a tough proposition at Bassendean and their aggressive approach will really provide an indication of just how good West Perth are this season.

In fact it will be interesting to see how some of the West Perth players stand up to vigorous, close-checking tactics which seem certain to be employed by Swans.

On paper, West Perth probably possess more skilled players than Swans and if allowed the kind of rein given to them by South Fremantle last week, the Falcons could turn the tide of one-sided encounters against Swans.

It is difficult to fault Claremont's form, but it will be interesting to see if the Escort Cup match against North Melbourne this

week robs them of anything next Monday. Claremont will have to be harnessed eventually and South are normally at their most lethal after a shock loss.

Because of their great form it is difficult selecting against Claremont, storm warnings are up for Claremont when they venture to Fremantle Oval.



EAST PERTH and Subiaco, easily the two most disappointing sides this season, will try to extricate themselves from a difficult situation this round.

Both sides looked likely to play a big part in the competition this year, but now face the possibility of starting the season with three successive losses.

East Perth, after a strong first-up effort against last year's premiers Claremont, were miserable in defeat last Sunday. After looking a big chance to half-time they fell in a hole and it raises doubts about their ability to be a final-four contender this year.

With Perth having their stocks boosted by a hard-fought win over Subiaco last week, the Royals can expect a tough encounter at Lathlain Park.

Even so there appears to be sufficient talent in the East Perth line-up (as was demonstrated against Essendon) to enable them to chalk up their first win for the season.



SUBIACO are facing another barren season and simply can't afford another loss. The deficiencies that were in the side last year appear to be there again this year.

The club lost rather than gained in players and though Laurie Keene is developing into one of the State's best ruckmen, the club appear to lack quality players.

East Fremantle, on the other hand, have been something of an enigma since winning the premiership in 1979. There seems to be plenty of talent in the side, which emerged in the opening game against Swan Districts.

But their fade-out against Claremont last week, after making a strong run at them in the last term, is not a good sign.

On last season's form Subiaco would have been favoured to win this clash. The way the respective sides have played this year East Fremantle are favoured to notch up another victory.

## PARKIN IN HOT SEAT

However, it was a top class snap that took his tally to four goals from two games.

Former Claremont rovers Jim and Phil Krakouer have taken the VFL football world by storm.

In both games played they have each figured in the best players list for North Melbourne and were at their brilliant best on Saturday.

Put in true Victorian fashion they won't allow WA to play as many Victorians as are available. They have restricted the number to six, but only one player from one club can be chosen.

The VFL has laid down the same format for the proposed match against South Australia.

Coach Neil Balme makes no bones about the fact that a few of the younger players at the club will be given their opportunity this year.

Motlop won Norwood's fairest and best award in the reserves last year and he has plenty of ability. He has played two senior matches but will notch up further senior appearances this season.

# Historic talks in Canberra

The NFL took an historic initiative recently. After 32 years they "came back" to the National Capital to host a National Football Conference.

The one and only other time that such a concept was undertaken was over 30 years ago when a similar conference was held — also in Canberra. It is also interesting to note that the President of the host league was the father of the incumbent A.C.T.A.F.L. President, Mr Bill Mahoney.

The conference structured over two days was held in tandem with Australian Football Championships and NFL Executive Committee Meetings.

Subjects vital to the concerted development of Australian Football were presented by host speakers. There was then liberal time available for forums to be conducted after conclusion by the speaker — and an open forum was scheduled for the final session.

Such vital subjects as the possibility of instituting a regular National Competition, the need to maintain correct procedures within the clearance and permit system, the advantages of orderly marketing and the advantages of supporting the National Coaching Scheme and of instigating plans to produce a far greater proportion of players from within clubs own zones were presented by Don Roach (S.A.N.F.L. General Manager), Dr Allen Aylett (VFL and NFL President) and myself respectively.

## NATIONAL SCHEME

I now feel for the first time since assuming my position as Rothmans National Director of Coaching with the NFL that the various State and club administrators are fully aware of the aims of the National Coaching Scheme. They must also be surely aware of the absolute necessity for senior State affiliated clubs to plan for structures throughout their feeder zones which allow for a co-operative relationship to be built up. These can be achieved by the supply of coaching expertise, resources, umpires and controlled financing. The St Kilda Football Club is the outstanding example of such plans at present and there are several other clubs with similar plans. These naturally have been forced on financially embarrassed clubs through an inability to compete with the "big boys". Subiaco, under the astute leadership of Kevin Merifield, Ken Armstrong and John Rose have a similar concept in mind.

## DISCUSSION

During my presentation I deliberately made a statement (which I nevertheless sincerely believe) — and which I thought would provoke animated discussion, perhaps criticism. Somewhat to my surprise nobody said one word — except privately afterwards when one person who is very prominent in football administrative circles remarked that "there was nothing to discuss as the statement was totally correct."

The statement was "if all senior State league clubs in Australia didn't recruit one player from interstate or from other clubs in their own leagues the difference in playing standard, spectator interest and financial return would be exactly nil in comparison with the present situation.

Interesting isn't it? Clubs would resultingly have a mint of money to develop players and their zones. They would also have enough finance to suitably reward and consequently retain their own stars. Interstate football would be evened up. Pie in the sky? Not necessarily, I believe in the long term there is a real possibility of positive steps being taken to ensure a more equitable sharing of the abundant talents which abound in the lower ranks.

## A unique coaching situation

It isn't very often we find that half of our league coaches have played football with the same club.

Ron Alexander, Grant Dorrington, Ian Miller and Mal Brown were all, at some time, Royals players. (There is only one other similar situation and that was back in 1964 when four league coaches had played with East Fremantle. They were Ray Sorrell coach of South Fremantle, Jack Sheedy (East Perth), Jim Conway (Claremont), and big Bob Johnson was in his third term at East Fremantle. Conway was the premiership coach.)

## WA BONANZA

Would be interested in any one who can give me more W.A. players in a Victorian match than the seven we saw in the Carlton-Essendon game last weekend.

I think that group of Fitzpatrick, Hunter, Bosustow, Montgomery, Otway, Buhagiar and Duckworth is the most locals we have seen in one game.

## TEN YEARS ON

West Perth's runaway win over South Fremantle last week (30.15 to 11.16) was reminiscent of their last big win over South 10 years ago when they won 31.19 to 11.10 at Leederville Oval.

The coaches in that game were Peter Steward and Mal Atwell. When those two sides met in the last qualifying game last year South walloped West Perth with a league record 40.18 to 12.6 at Fremantle Oval.

## YOUNG SKIPPERS

Was asked last week who was the youngest league captain?

I guess it would have to be John Todd who in 1959 was appointed captain coach of South Fremantle at the age of 20. Todd



also is the youngest Sandover Medal winner (in open company) with his 1955 win, so that would give him a rare treble.

Incidentally, the youngest captain in the VFL is North Melbourne's David Dench who like Todd was only 20 when he first lead the Kangaroos.



The above cutting, from a 1953 paper, was sent to me by regular Westside Football reader John Philpot of Maylands. It read "Jack Sheedy seeks clearance to play with Claremont", Sheedy said "the offer was too good to refuse and I have three or four years of football left." John has asked for some information about the story, so this is what we know.

As it turned out, Sheedy did not take the coaching job with the Tigers. The "too good" offer was between 250 and 300 pounds a year. Several influential East Fremantle supporters kicked in a "few quid" and as Jack told me last week one supporter offered to paint his car free of charge if he stayed. (Another good reason for Sheedy staying at Old East was that at that stage the only things East Fremantle let go were homing pigeons and boomerangs.)

East Fremantle released Sheedy two seasons later in 1956 to coach East Perth. As for the three or four years Sheedy claimed to have left he played his last game in 1963, ten years after the Claremont offer!

## 300 CLUB

Graham Melrose played his 300th senior game last Sunday and it is interesting to recall the other triple centurions.

Including all State, Perth, East Perth and North Melbourne games Barry Cable tallied up 404 games. Graham Farmer played 392 games — 31 for W.A., 5 for Victoria and 356 club games with East Perth, Geelong and West Perth. Mel Whimen has 371, a record with one club. Bill Dempsey played 343 also with West Perth, Jack Sheedy has 338 with three different clubs, East Fremantle, South Melbourne and East Perth. Bill Walker with Swan Districts, Tom Grljusich South Fremantle and Central District are other members of the 300 Club.

His leadership qualities both on and off the field, and loyalty to the team and club will be greatly missed at Subiaco.

## ICE BROKEN

It was good for all at Perth to "break the ice" last Saturday and take the four points from Subi.

Alexander is one of the most experienced ruckmen in the game today and Keene did exceptionally well to match it with the aggressive big man.

Subiaco have recognised his ability and it seems he will play an important role in their quest to return as a force in the WAFL.

Even if Subiaco do not finish in the four



this year, it seems likely they will do everything within their power to retain Keene's services. He could play a vital part in Subiaco's immediate future.

If Keene can be kept at Subiaco, opposition ruckmen will meet with their fair share of problems coping his size and skill.

## Well done Brian

With the announcement of Brian Douge's retirement, WA football has lost one of its hardest working players.

Douge set the perfect example for youngsters and devoted many hours every week working on his football — either his skills or his fitness.

He came to WA after a 94 game career with Hawthorn in the VFL to take over as the captain coach of Subiaco.

Douge worked overtime in an effort to lift the floundering Lions in his two seasons at the helm, but the club just did not have enough strength for him to be successful in this capacity.

Ken Armstrong is a great admirer of Douge and his ability.

"He is a top guy," the Subiaco coach says. "I look at him as the professionals professional."

"He has been a tremendous ambassador for the game of football and this club as a coach, a captain and a player."

"He is the perfect model for any aspiring young footballer."

"Brian is the type of guy who believes he needs 100 hours per week to devote to his football. He is a busy man professionally and can no longer put the hours in."

"He believes that he is letting the club and himself down if he can't put the hours in and he also thinks that perhaps there are some younger players in the club who deserve a spot in the league side," Armstrong says.

"He is a great club man and I hope will see Brian around the Subiaco Football Club in another capacity."

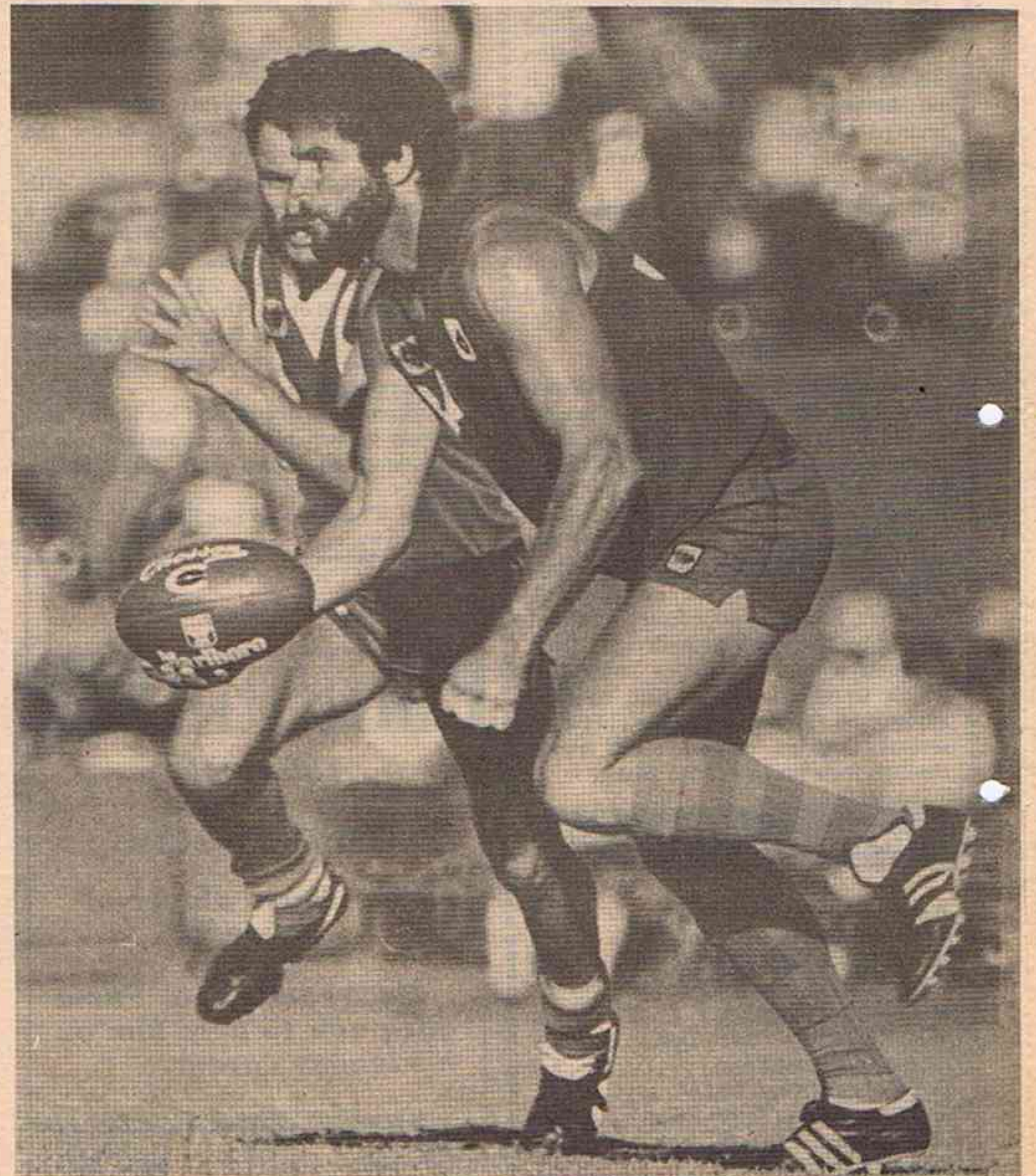

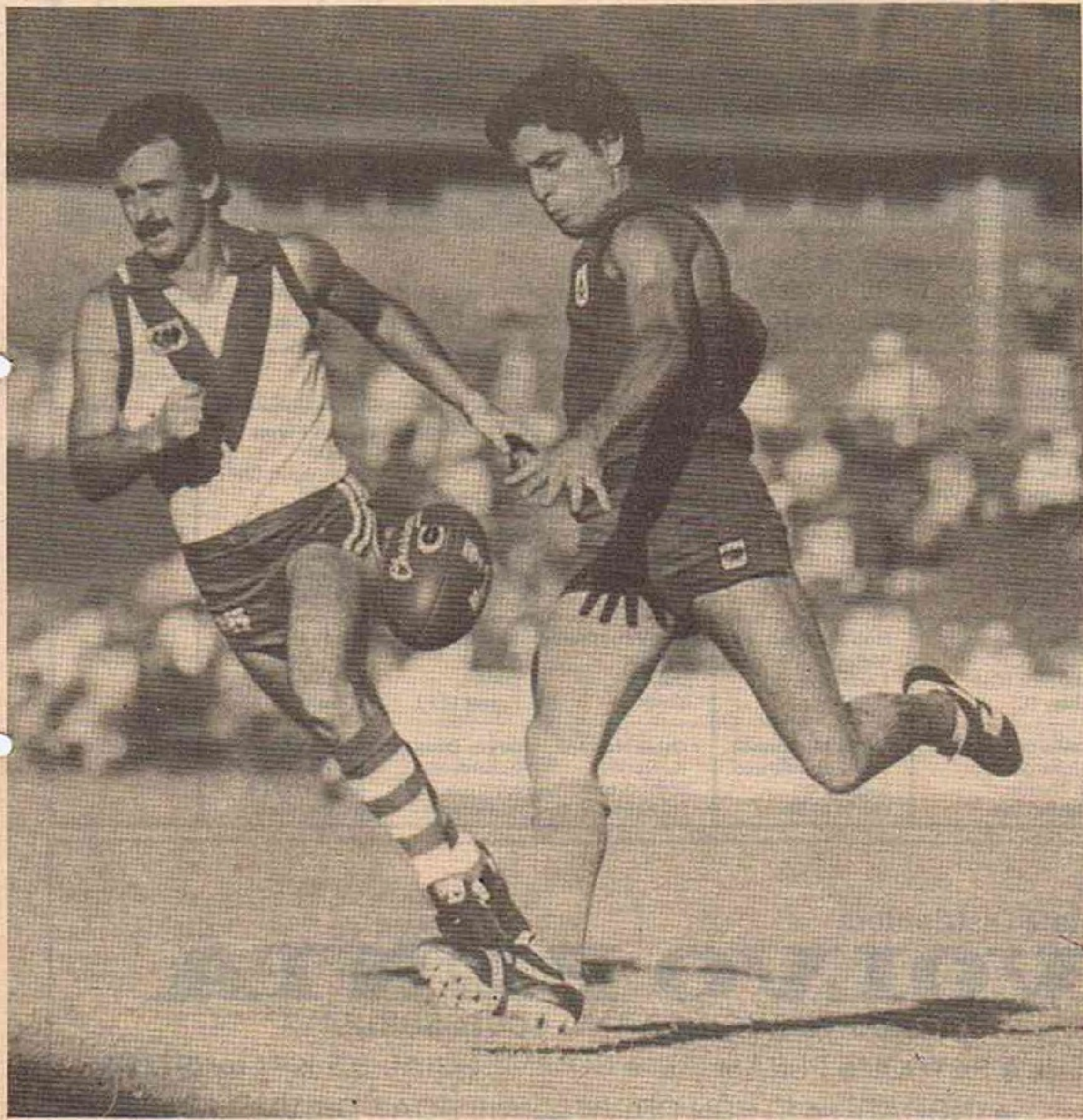

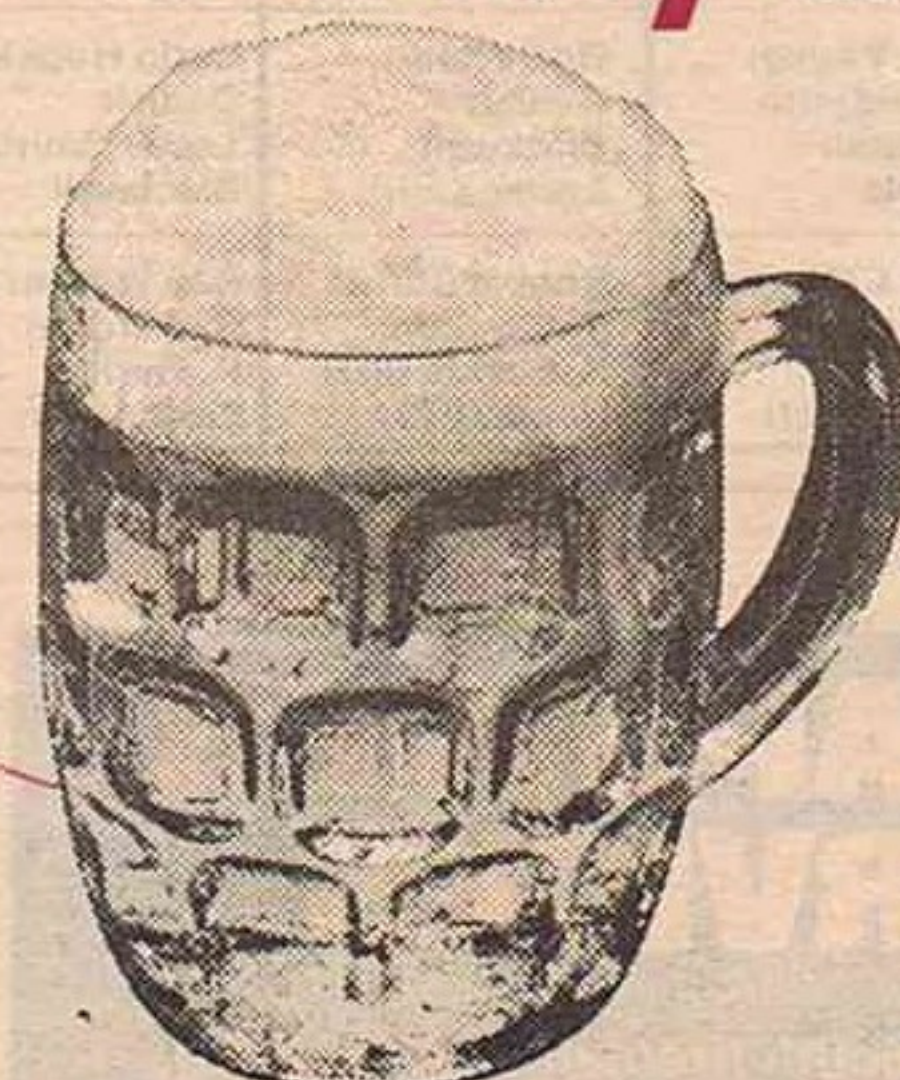

## Michael must be a worry

WHAT is wrong with Stephen Michael? According to South Fremantle coach Malcolm Brown, nothing. Brown bristled when I put the question to Ken Smith after last week's game against West Perth.

Brown made it quite clear that he did not want any excuses made for his star ruckman.

Well, I'm not about to make excuses for him, but I find it strange that a player of such talent can find it so difficult to get a touch, as was the case on Saturday.

Michael can't be criticised on effort. He certainly tried. In fact, at times too hard. But he lacked his customary skill in leaping for the ball and was reduced to almost a bumbling novice the way he pursued the ball on the ground.

It is unfair to criticise Michael on one performance. And when a side runs as hot as West Perth did on Saturday, then even top players can be relegated to an ordinary status, particularly if he seems to be chasing all day, as did Michael.

To me Michael didn't have any zest or spring. He was not the agile player who has won the past two Sandover Medals and was narrowly beaten for another.

It's not that he didn't look interested. He didn't look to be as fit as he has been in previous seasons. He also lacked his usual pace.

Brown knows him a lot better than I do, so if he says there isn't anything wrong, and by that I guess he means in a physical sense, then Michael's form is something of a mystery.

Perhaps he's finding it hard to become motivated. But then he would be no orphan at South Fremantle if that were the case.

To me South Fremantle did not have an appetite for football on Saturday. I don't know whether it is an attitude problem.

For the past three seasons, South have been able to accommodate some ordinary players in the side because of the way their following division monopolises possession and uses the ball to advantage.

But without control on the ball and relegated to a man-for-man situation, South — as was shown on Saturday — were pedestrian.

It's bad enough Michael isn't firing. But without Paul Vasoli and Noel Carter, normally two very potent players on the ball also firing, the South Fremantle mobile division is virtually thrown into neutral gear.

Vasoli was dragged off the ground on Saturday. I don't think he really had his heart in football at the start of the season. Perhaps that has continued. While he should have had his mind on the coming season he, and Paul Mountain, were flirting with the idea of joining another club.

Mountain, as he showed on Saturday, has been able to get back into his usual stride, but Vasoli found it difficult to get into the play.

While Carter was injured he still did not make much of a contribution for South in the time he was on the ground.

Brian Close also does not appear to be the answer as a centreman, South would be better persevering with Benny Vigona in that position.

No doubt South will bounce back, but it must be disconcerting for supporters, who have become accustomed to seeing their side very strong competitors, take the kind of hiding dished out to them by West Perth on Saturday.

**Communication must improve — Davis**

WAFL Football Development Administrator Ross Davis is embarking on a programme to improve communication in football circles.

Mr Davis says that although football has developed quite well it could be further advanced if there was a better communications system.

"In the past football has developed because it is a good game," he says. "Because it was popular it was allowed to go along on its own path. But that has to change."

"Looking at the top end of the scale the NFL was designed to provide stronger communications between the States."

"And from the State level we have to have a greater liaison between all the associations from the WAFL to the South Suburban Murray League, the country leagues, amateurs and WAFA."

"All these associations have juniors playing within their ranks and it is important they benefit from a communications system," Mr Davis says.

He says that even within the eight junior councils there has to be stronger communication.

**COACHES MEETING**

Earlier this week the eight league coaches had a meeting to discuss where football was heading and this is the situation that must operate in juniors.

All it takes is two or three meetings per year of all the junior coaches so they can pool their ideas on junior development — the most important aspect of our Australian game.

If the coaches met regularly it would mean they could find out how others were coaching the youngsters.

As Mr Davis says there are still coaches around who go by the old theory that a few laps around the oval and some sprints is the best way to prepare the youngsters.

However, this could lead to them becoming disinterested and eventually fall out of the game.

The youngsters are fit enough anyway and the best method is to have the ball included in every exercise. After all when they are young it is important to teach them the basic skills and that cannot be done without a football.

If the coaches got together they could discuss their individual ideas and training techniques.

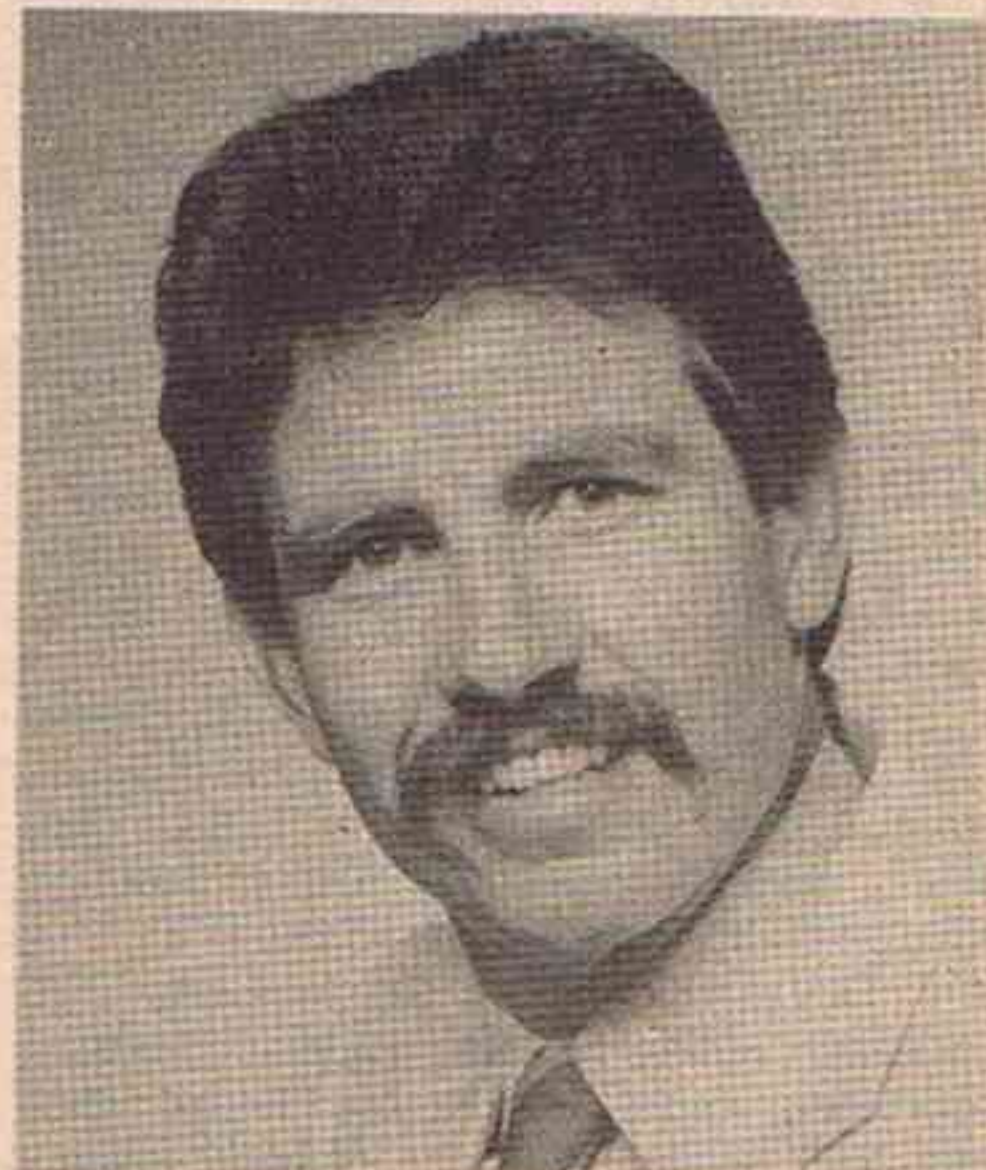
The WAFL has already held a level one coaching seminar in an effort to improve relations with the junior competitions.

Mr Davis said that while league coaches met for the first time on that occasion he hoped to form a similar type of liaison

with the colts coaches. After all they are coaching our future league stars.

Mr Davis has taken over a difficult task with the WAFL — but he is qualified to be talking on junior development.

Before being appointed Football Development Administrator he was a physical education teacher which gives him a great insight into how the juniors should be developed.

And he also has a solid background in football.

He played most his junior football in Perth before his father moved to Northam and he continued his playing career in the country town.

A measure of his ability was that he was selected in the combined side for the annual country carnival.

On his return to the city he played fourths for the Perth Football Club and the following season was captain of their colts side.

In 1976 he played half a season of reserves before injuring an ankle.

That was to be the end of his career with Perth, but in 1980 he played with Thornlie in the South Suburban Murray Football League and won the club's fairest and best award.

That was the last time he played — preferring to move ahead with his career rather than football.

Mr Davies faces a monumental task in building up a closer relationship with all junior associations throughout the State and it will take a strong effort from all junior coaches for his programme to succeed

## 1982 PROMOTIONS AND REGULATIONS

As a result of last year's final premier-ship tables many teams have either been promoted or relegated depending on their success or failure.

The 1982 changes are: B League minor premiers North Beach have been promoted to A League. This is their second try at the major league, being relegated in 1980 after a three year stay. They replace Carlisle, who now play in B League for the first time since the early 1960's.

**B LEAGUE** : City beach (premiers C League) have replaced W.A.I.T. who failed to win a game.

**C LEAGUE** : D Grand Finalists and the former great Innaloo, Osborne Park F premiers Forrestfield have replaced Churchlands and down to E Division. T.C. Claremont (relegated because they cannot field the required under 20 Colts team) and Perth, who have disbanded. Forrestfield first joined amateur ranks in 1978 and are one of the fastest rising clubs.

**D DIVISION** : E premiers, North Beach (2nd team) gained their second successive promotion at the expense of C.B.C. Old Wesley and Hellenics (the former Sunday division team) are also new to the D's.

**E DIVISION** : both St. Norberts and National Bank replace Floreat Marist, Coolbellup and North Fremantle, all who may find it easier in one division lower.

**G DIVISION** : has the greatest changes of any grade with Coolbinia, North Beach

(H Division premiers and Minor premiers respectively), Edgewater and Mt. Hawthorn West Perth filling in the positions of Swanbourne, Mt. Lawley, both who are graded in one division lower. Wembley (No. 6 team) has dropped two pegs to I division.

**H DIVISION** : Robb Jetty, in their third year of amateurs, have jumped two divisions that should put them to the test. Applecross, Bullcreek and Dianella are new to the grade. All are at the expense of Morley's disbanded fourth team. Nollamara and Collegians, who are part of I division.

**I DIVISION** : promoted are Mt. Lawley, (J premiers), Maylands (K premiers), Hellenic and Swanview J finalists and a newly formed fourth team from the Bayswater club. Missing are Maranatha (disbanded), Hammersley, who failed to win a game in 1981, to J.

Three new clubs R.A.A.F., Girrawheen and City of Perth, along with Coolbinia's newly formed second senior team — are among the teams to fill J division.

Promoted from K are Carlisle, Whitfords and Koondoola.

**K DIVISION** : M.H.W.P., Edgewater and Lynwood all relegated from J along with new teams A.I.C.A., (second team) and Scarborough (No. 4) help fill the 10 teams.

**SUNDAY DIVISION** : new teams are Stirling Districts and Langford. Hellenic have moved to the Saturday competition whilst Carlton who struggled last year and failed to win a game have withdrawn.

## Send-off rule works

Debate continues in the football world, and the media regarding the pro's and cons of the send off rule, and if it would work in the W.A.F.L.

The send off rule has worked effectively in amateur ranks throughout Australia since it has become part of the Australian Amateur Football Council's Laws in the 1930's.

As a consequence, the law has been a very important and successful part of the W.A.A.F.L., where currently it reads:

*"In any match the Field Umpire shall have power to order from the field or such time as he sees fit, any player who has committed a reportable offence. Such player can be replaced by one of the Interchange reserves, but will not be eligible to return to the field until sanctioned by the Field Umpire."*

*"Should the same player offend again, after having been allowed back on the field, the Umpire shall order him from the field for the remainder of the game, and he shall not be replaced by an interchange reserve player."*

Previous to this amended rule players could be ordered off the playing field on the first offence and not replaced by an interchange player.

It is very interesting to note that the W.A.F.L. supplies umpires for the weekly amateur "A" and "B" divisions. When umpiring amateurs they are in a position to enforce the send off rule and several in fact have applied it to great affect to cut out unduly rough play.

Many of the umpires who have used this rule have at some time gone on to umpire games under the direct control of the W.A.F.L.

The experience gained in having the rule at their disposal may one day be put into use in other senior football leagues.

## Eight new coaches for U.G.S.N.F.L.

# THE GREAT GOALKICKERS



Western Australia has produced some prolific goalkickers over the years and in this new segment Westside Football looks at some of the greatest from each of the eight league clubs.

When flicking through the record books champion forwards like George Doig, Austin Robertson, Bernie Naylor and John Gerovich are prominent.

These four were legends in their own time and are just a few of the great goalkickers seen since the inception of Australian Rules football in this State.

Over the next eight weeks Westside Football writer GARY STOCKS will peer into the past to bring back memories of the men who thrilled the crowds with their uncanny goal sense.

In the first of these special features, we look at some of the great South Fremantle forwards who attracted thousands of people through the turnstiles . . .

# Naylor was a genius

When talking about great full-forwards, Bernie Naylor is one of the first to be mentioned in any conversation.

In his 10 seasons of league football with the Bulldogs he booted more than 1,000 goals — a remarkable average of more than 100 goals a season.

And had it not been for World War II his record could have been even greater.

He made his debut in 1941 but after just one season his career was interrupted.

When he resumed his football, in 1946, he showed that even though he had endured a four year absence, he had lost none of his brilliance.

It was the golden era for the Bulldogs as from 1947-1954 they won six premierships.

They had a tremendous side which boasted names like Steve Marsh, Clive Lewington and Len Crabbe.

Naylor says it was mainly these three players who fed him the ball with immaculate drop kicks and helped him stamp his name in the record books as one of the greatest footballers of all time.

Naylor was a fast leading full-forward who was brilliant in his judgement of distance. He never went that far from goal that it made it difficult for him to register full points, although many of his 1,000 plus majors resulted from a fast lead, mark and then long kick.

One of the men who helped Naylor to success, Clive Lewington, said that it was the full-forward's unerring accuracy which made him a great player.

"He rarely missed," Lewington said. "And perhaps his greatest asset was his ability to make room for himself.

"I have never seen anyone so adept at wrong-footing an opponent as Bernie.

"Just before he led he would send his opponent the other way and he would be on his own," Lewington says.

Bernie Naylor was at the head of the WAFL goalkicking table six times and on five of those six occasions he kicked more than 100 goals. A truly remarkable feat.

In 1946 he booted 131 goals in qualifying matches but failed to add to the tally when South Fremantle were bundled out in the first semi final by Subiaco.

However, in 1947 he played a leading hand in South Fremantle's first premiership

in 30 years when he kicked 12 goals in their two finals matches after kicking 96 in qualifying matches.

The following year Naylor again led the goalkicking, with 89 in the home and away games. It was noticeable that he kicked just two goals in the two finals South played and the Bulldogs were ousted in the preliminary final.

It seemed that when Naylor fired so did South Fremantle.

After a break of three seasons as the WAFL's leading goal scorer Naylor returned to head the list in 1952.

But 1953 was to be his greatest season.

It was the year that he created a record for the number of goals kicked in qualifying matches when he booted a mammoth 156 for the season. And he added another 11 to the tally during the finals.

The record remained intact until Subiaco full-forward Austin Robertson emerged on the scene 15 years later. The record was broken — by just one goal in 1968.

But with the 11 goals kicked in the final round Naylor still holds the record for an entire season.

After kicking 133 goals (15 in the finals) in 1956 Naylor retired, needing just five more games to reach yet another milestone, the magical 200 game figure.

Going into the 1956 season South Fremantle had lost one of their greatest players.

But a high flyer by the name of John Gerovich emerged on the scene and took over from where Naylor left off.

Naylor was the most accurate forward in the game and Gerovich was to become the greatest mark ever seen.

He didn't need a run up to soar through the air. From a standing start he could jump head and shoulders above the packs.

Gerovich was the WAFL's leading goalkicker for three seasons and his greatest performance was when he kicked the most goals of any WA player in his second season of league football.

But he had to wait until 1960 before he headed the goal kicking table again and it was in this year that he cracked the 'ton' — booting 101 goals.

However, Clive Lewington says that Gerovich wasn't as good as he could have been.

He was superb — almost unbeatable in the air. But he wasn't as accurate as he would have liked.

"People used to flock to the ground just to watch John," Lewington said. "He was the master aerialist. It wasn't as if it was a one off situation. He did it all the time."

So South Fremantle managed to produce

two of the greatest names in the game within a season of each other. Imagine their striking power if Gerovich had been born 10 years earlier, or Naylor 10 years later.

But Bulldogs had to wait for more than a decade before another goal kicking machine arrived at Fremantle Oval.

Ray Bauskis, like Gerovich, had tremendous marking ability — although he was nowhere near as strong in the air as his counterpart.

He was the leading goal kicker in the league in 1977 and 1978 and although he had ability, he did not go on to establish himself as a great player — injury took its toll, finally forcing him into a premature retirement.

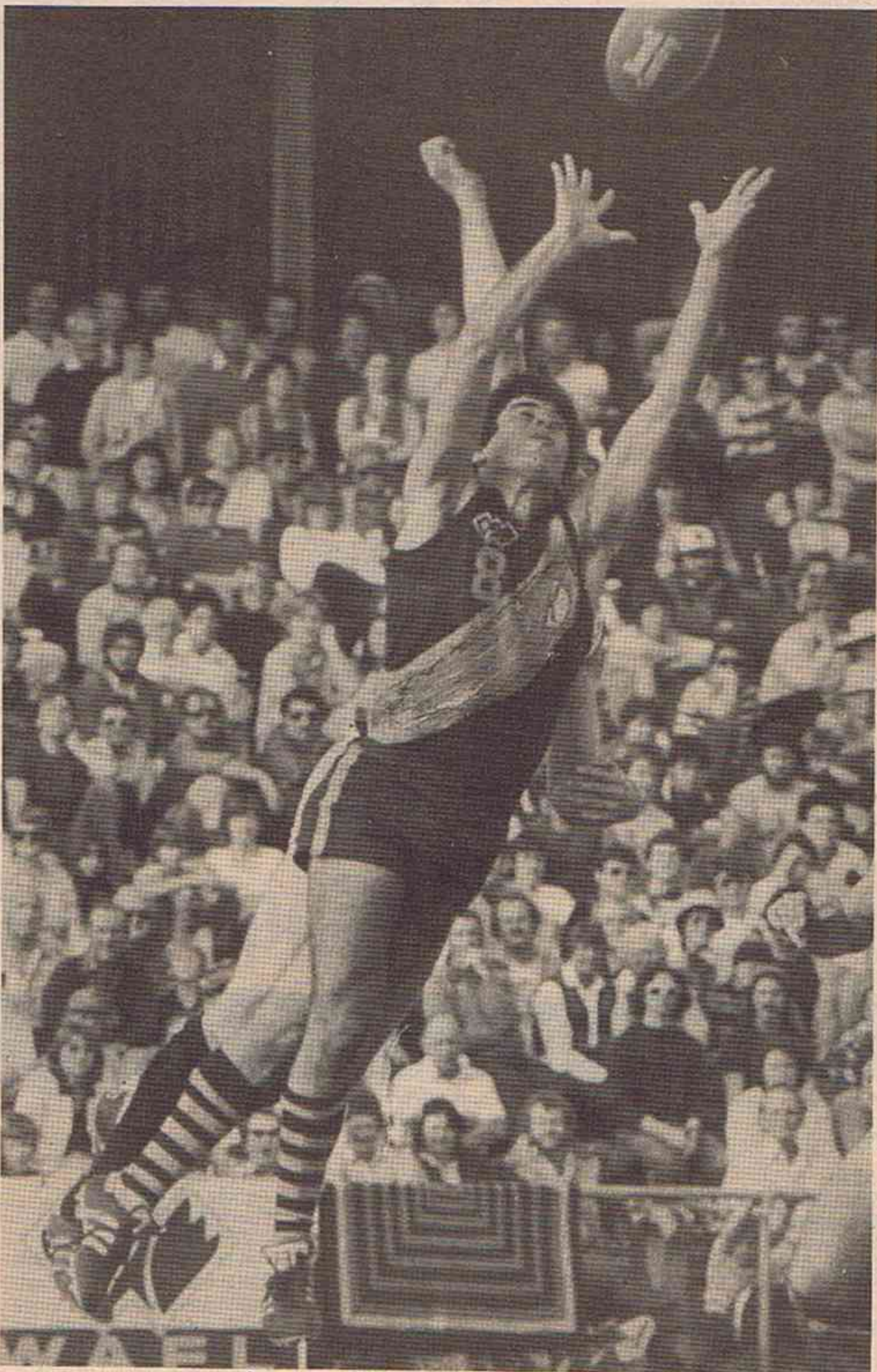
