**TIME TO ACT**

Football authorities in Western Australia and Victoria are faced with urgent and important decisions which could have a far-reaching effect on the future of our game.

The events of black Saturday at Leederville have been well covered in other media and it is not our desire to go through it all again.

As Brian Adamson lay in a Subiaco hospital last Saturday evening, Robert Dickson died in the Royal Melbourne Hospital.

He had been a football spectator and the circumstances which led to his death are a pathetic indictment on today's society.

Dickson was a 27-year-old father from the Victorian country town of Bacchus Marsh. He was savagely attacked and assaulted while trying to protect his six-year-old son from a drunken brawl which had erupted at Princes Park after a VFL match on March 27.

After the incident he lapsed into a coma. Had he survived, he would have lived as a virtual vegetable.

For Robert Dickson and his six-year-old son, Robert jnr., the trip to Melbourne was a father and son get-together that both had looked forward to.

However, drunken louts took over in an alcoholic frenzy and now for the rest of his life Robert Dickson jnr., will probably be horrified by the very word "football". He will remember his last visit to the football as the outing which claimed his father's life.

Pressure is now on the VFL to ban liquor from VFL matches. VFL president Dr Allen Aylett has already called for a total ban.

Beer at VFL matches has always been a major problem. Its affects have to be seen to be believed.

West Australian football supporters can be grateful that the menace does not exist here.

Just imagine if the mob of hooligans involved in the Leederville attack on umpires had been charged-up with liquor. The result there could also have ended with death.

So both the VFL and the WAFL have urgent and decisive decisions to make.

The WAFL must take strong action to make sure that its tribunal hands out stiffer and MORE CONSISTENT penalties. It must not shirk this responsibility. Their Victorian counterparts must remove the menace of beer from its grounds. It will be interesting to observe whether commercial considerations cloud their obligations.

For both bodies action must come quickly and without reservation if our great game is to survive as a family attraction.

**I'LL BE BACK**

**Former Swan Districts and State champion Mike Smith will be back.**

Smith, who stamped himself as a champion in his brief career with Swans, has played just one game since 1980.

Fans will remember his superb State debut against Tasmania when he dominated in the centre.

He has been crippled by a serious knee injury, but is determined to return to the fold.

"I under-went a series of operations and am quietly confident that I will return to league football", Smith says.

"During the summer I went to Melbourne to have my knee completely reconstructed.

"That knee was in a plaster cast for two months and since then I have gradually increased my programme to the stage where I am now cycling, swimming and doing special weight exercises."

"Although I expect to be ready towards the end of this season I will not be making a comeback attempt before the knee is 100 per cent."

He knows too well the disappointment such action can bring.

Smith was nowhere near ready when he tried to play last year. He lasted just two reserves matches and part of a league game.

The attempt put him right back to square one — on the sidelines.

Now he says he will wait until 1983 before taking to the football arena once more.

Smith showed his brilliance in 1980 and W.A. fans have been deprived of seeing the star in action since then.

In fact, he is now almost a forgotten man in football.

But watch him in 1983. Hopefully we will see the magic which had all the VFL talent scouts searching for his signature.

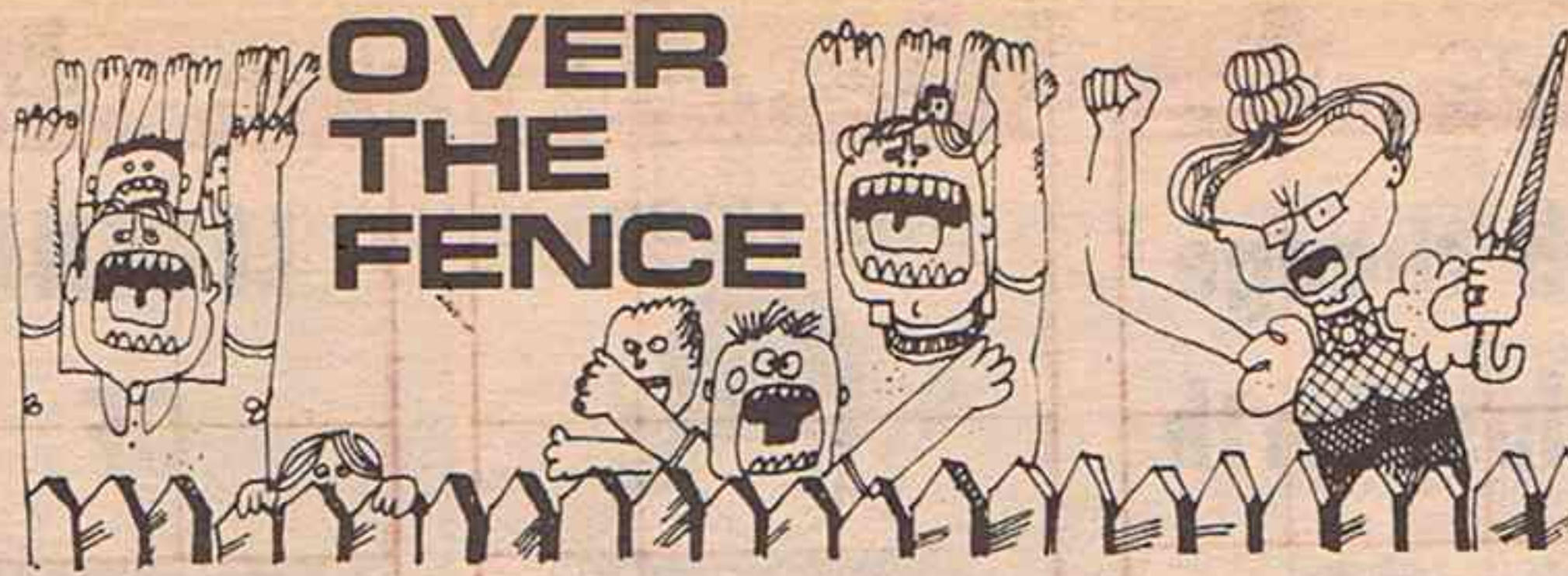
## WHERE'S COCKIE?

# Richardson the target

SWAN Districts half-forward Mike Richardson is being ear-marked as Collingwood's No. 1 recruiting target for 1983.

The brilliant Richardson turned it on for the Collingwood officials in last week's Escort Cup match at VFL Park and the Magpies now realise that he is the type of running player they badly need.

Richardson's football this season has been brilliant and his role at Swans is purely an attacking one. Coach John Todd has given Richardson a free rein to roam the forward area at will, thus relieving him of ruck-roving duties in defence.

The move has been successful as Richardson's creativity around the goals is proving a bonus and he has kicked 22 goals himself, 21 of them coming in the last four games.

His game against Subiaco last week saw him pick up eight votes in the Marlboro player-of-the-series award and he now has a clear four point lead in the race for the \$1000 prize for the first seven qualifying games.

Richardson is on 22 points, clear of Claremont's Wayne Blackwell, who received three votes last week.

Back on 16 are West Perth's Ross Gibbs (five votes last week) and South Fremantle's Brad Hardie, who failed to pick up a vote.

## Cometti's role

The part played by West Perth coach Dennis Cometti after last Saturday's match at Leederville did much to settle the angry scene.

In an era where inflammatory statements are often made by coaches and club officials after tight losses, particularly when the umpiring standard was as poor as it was at Leederville, Cometti deserves high praise.

There is no doubt that the angry scenes which developed after the match were beyond the control of the two policemen on duty.

Cometti and his assistant, Clinton Farmer, at a moment of great stress, gave their wholehearted support to the authorities to break up the crowd.

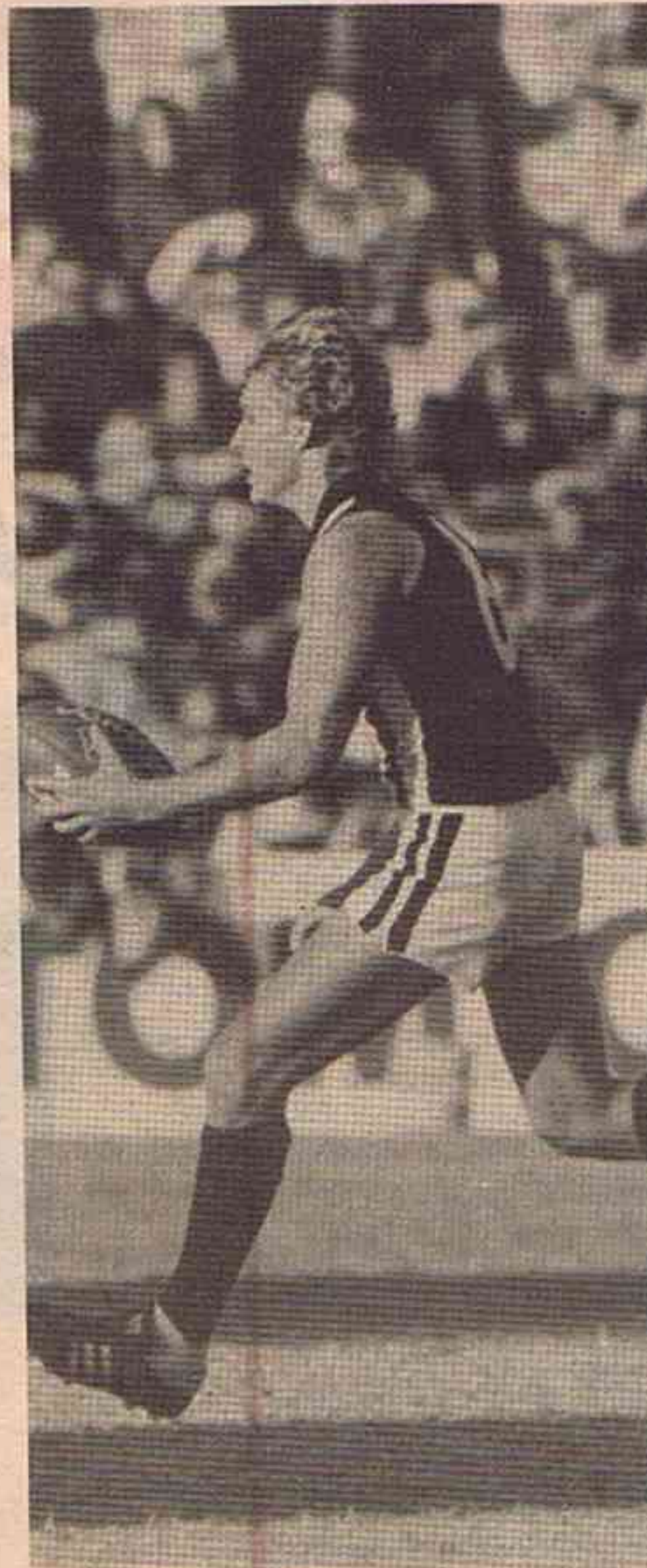
The method of their actions was one of conciliation rather than aggressiveness.

Later in an emotional address to a packed members hall, Cometti could have easily provoked more hostility, but instead chose to pacify the hundreds of very edgy fans.

He told members not to look for soft options like injuries and umpiring performances when talking about the club's defeats.

"The fact remains that we held decisive leads during the last two matches and let both games slip through our fingers", he said.

He chose not to highlight the Adamson affair simply saying: "My sympathy tonight lies not with Brian Adamson but for the game itself". - Peter Poat.

# Time to introduce tougher penalties

THE argument about penalties for football violence have been continuing for many years . . . but they could shortly come to a head.

The anomalies of the WAFL tribunal will be highlighted after that dreadful confrontation last Saturday at Leederville Oval between players, umpires and supporters.

One of the principal reasons that fewer children are playing the game at junior level is the prospect of them meeting with some unduly rough play at a more senior level.

Parents also find fewer reasons to take their youngster to a league game on a Saturday now . . . and the prospect of being involved in a confrontation increases their reluctance.

The hard task of recruiting new umpires to league ranks will also become impossible unless assurances can be given that protection is more substantial and that they will have more powerful support from the tribunal in regard to penalties.

It is up to the league clubs now to push home the message to their players far more strongly.

Why is it that clubs sitting firmly at the top of the ladder (Swan Districts, Claremont and South Fremantle) have not been involved in one single incident this year? Week after week they continue to pass over the rough stuff and simply get on with the game.

## Good Show!

CONGRATULATIONS to radio 6PR and their Friday Football World program.

It is the only vehicle open to the public each week where total involvement is provided away from the game itself.

The program is also taped and sent all over the State to help engender some enthusiasm outside of the metropolitan area.

The ABC is the other body that sends similar promotion to thousands of people each week with their comprehensive coverage on the game, both on television and radio.

If the league could use its promotional budget to help support particularly the commercial stations with advertising, you would find that the electronic media would become more involved in the general promotion of the game and would be even more approachable to discuss future possibilities. The game, like any business, needs to let the public know what it has got for sale.

We need more radio, television and newspaper advertising and maybe more clinics to schools, both in the metropolitan area and the country.

If our officials did more of these things, the public would at least be able to see that football is really trying to achieve something.

Any big business that deals directly with the public for support must think in terms of making available around 5 per cent of their turnover for advertising and promotions and marketing.

I now ask the league the obvious question . . . wouldn't that provide nearly \$250,000 a year for promotion?

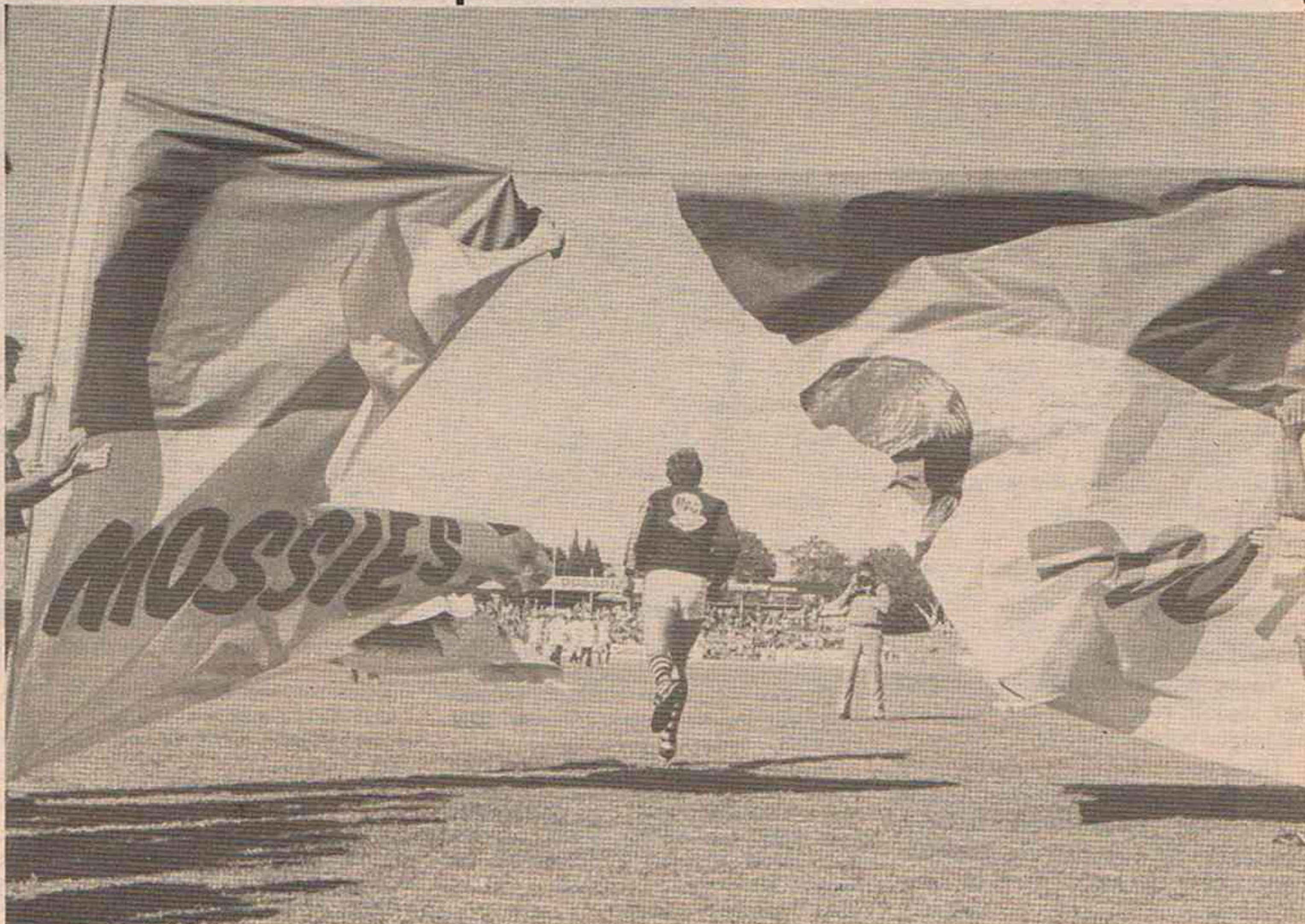

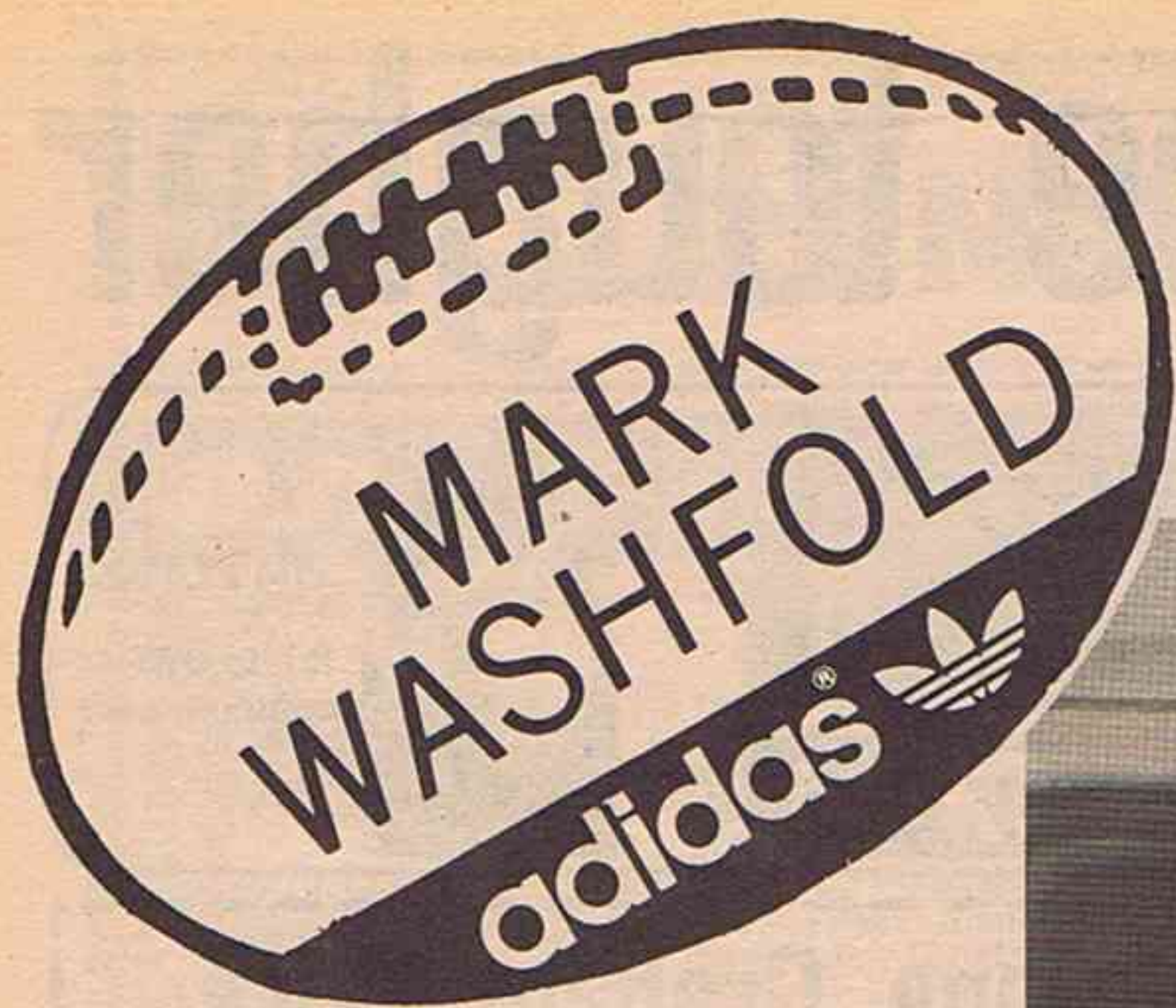

# ...job change helps Perth recruit



A lot of players have problems combining work with football and for Perth's Mark Washfold it almost spelt the end of his career.

His job with the Swan Brewery meant that he had to work afternoon shift every second week and he could not get to training regularly with West Perth.

He realised he was letting the side down by not being able to train regularly, despite efforts to get himself onto day shift work.

So he retired at the beginning of last season; resigned to the fact that his league career was over.

However, Perth desperately needed a defender like Washfold in their young and inexperienced side and they enticed him to Lathlain Park where he has slotted in magnificently.

The Perth Football Club approached his employers and instead of working in a factory he is now driving trucks during the day.

He trains all the time and as a result his form with Perth has been solid.

Washfold made a late entry into league football and Westside Football's GARY STOCKS found out the reason as well as some other interesting facts about the Demon full back.

**Q. You have been sidelined through injury for the last couple of weeks, have you always had injury problems?**

A. When I was at West Perth I had knee trouble and I missed about 17 games over three seasons. And now I have another knee injury, but this time at the back, and the doctor told me I will be out for another six weeks — although I do not think it will be that long.

**Q. How did you manage to arrive at West Perth?**

A. I came over here for a holiday in 1978 and thought I would only be here for three months. I knew some friends in W.A. and one of them wanted to go for a run with West Perth and asked me to go down with him. He played a season of reserves before leaving the club and I stuck it out and played league football.

**Q. How difficult was the decision to leave West Perth?**

A. It was pretty hard. I still see all the boys from over there and I have a lot of friends at West Perth. But these things happen.

**Q. Why did you leave the Cardinals?**

A. I had trouble getting off shift work and could not get to training regularly so I decided to retire. I asked the brewery if they could get me on day work but they said they couldn't so I had to give it away. And then Perth rang me so I decided to have a go with them. Within three weeks the club had me on day work as a truck driver rather than working in the factory.

**Q. Are you enjoying your football at Perth?**

A. Yes. I have made a lot of friends. They have looked after me and the committee and coach have been good to me. We just have to be a bit more successful this year.

**Q. How were you shaping until you were injured?**

A. I put in a lot of pre-season work before I was injured and I thought I was in for a top season. I suppose you say that at the beginning of every year, but I was very fit for the start of the season and the worse thing is that I copped this injury at training on a Tuesday night. Now I have to try and keep fit by doing weights and a series of exercises, otherwise all the hard pre-season preparation goes down the drain.

**Q. Do you have any preference for one particular position?**

A. I played most of my football at centre-half-back with West Perth and I

enjoyed it there. Since coming to Perth I have played mainly at full back. I enjoy centre-half-back more because you have more room to move.

**Q. Can Perth improve?**

A. I think we have been a little unlucky with injuries. I know West Perth had about nine out at one stage but we have not got as much depth as them and it hits us harder. With Wayne Simmns, Darryl Freame, Brian Cook and Ross Prunster out of the side it leaves a big hole. But I think we are improving all the time and that is what we are after at the moment.

**Q. Where did you play all your junior football?**

A. With Leongatha in the Latrobe Valley, about 120km out of Melbourne. It was a pretty strong league.

**Q. Did you ever think of having a go in the VFL?**

A. I was asked down to Footscray in 1974. Ian Salmon played about 140 games with Footscray and he comes from Leongatha as well. It was Footscray's area but there were not very well liked by the country zone so I did not even worry about it. I did not think all the work was worth it — but blow me down I come over here and get stuck into this!

**Q. Who has had the biggest influence on your career?**

A. Probably Percy Johnson when he was coaching at West Perth in my first season. Then Graham Campbell did a bit for me. Last year Alan Joyce helped me along and now it is Ian Miller. I have had a different coach every year I have been in W.A.

**Q. Have you always played in defence?**

A. No. I played at full forward in my last year at Leongatha and I kicked 86 goals to win the goalkicking. I keep telling Ian about it but he won't play me in the forward line!

**Q. When you play against West Perth do you try that little bit harder?**

A. The first game I ever played for Perth was against West Perth but I didn't last too long because I got a bit of a cork. I like to play well against them so that they can't call me a West Perth reject. I left because I had no option. They did not ask me to leave and I like to prove a point when we play West Perth. As I said I still have a lot of friends at West Perth, but once you get onto the ground all that changes.

**Q. It must have been disappointing to finish on the bottom of the ladder last year.**

A. Yes it was. But I was fortunate in as much that I had a reasonably good year personally. But I don't know what happened last year. We just could not seem to put it together. We played well in patches but it just was not enough to win games and that's what it is all about. Hopefully we will go a bit better this season.

We had a lot of first year players last year, like Len Gandini, Lindsay Carter and Peter Ashworth and they have to start to take over a bit more responsibility now. Unfortunately no one cares whether you are a first year player or not. Once you are out there you are one member of the team and you have to produce the goods.

**Q. What sort of an influence has Ian Miller had on the side so far this year?**

A. He has had a huge impact on the players. He is very professional and is right behind the players all the way. He has some pretty good ideas and will listen to any ideas anyone else has to offer. But at the same time he rules with a pretty strict hand. He does not rant and rave. He knows we have a long way to go and he is doing a top job.

**Q. What about Bryan Cousins. His own performances have improved since being made captain. Does he have much to do with the younger players?**

A. When he came back from Geelong we expected a lot from him. Probably too much, and that seemed to worry him. He played reasonably well, but he is a man who sets himself a pretty high standard and he was not happy with his own form last year. He is playing a lot better this year, although like the rest of us he lacks a little bit in consistency. That is something we all have to get out of our games. But Bryan had had a lot to do with the younger players. He is a good talker and puts them on the right track. He is a good captain.

**Q. Do you miss Alan Johnson's drive from the middle of the ground?**

A. Johnno is a top player and with Allan Montgomery also in Melbourne we certainly miss both of them. Johnno had a top year last year and he would have been real handy here, but I suppose it is everyone's ambition to play in the VFL and we all hope he does just as well over there. Monty didn't play with us very often last year, but he seems to be doing pretty well with Carlton.

**Q. What are your plans for the future?**

A. My immediate plans are to get fit and then help Perth re-establish themselves as a force in the competition.

# Everything set for big drawcard



THERE is little hope for football in this State this season if the Swan Districts-Claremont match at Bassendean Oval doesn't draw a big crowd.

# INTERSTATE UPDATE

## VFL UNDER PRESSURE

The VFL is facing a barrage of criticism over its failure to use more pressure to persuade clubs to transfer big matches to its two major stadiums, the MCG and VFL Park.

The criticism reached an all-time high last weekend when two potentially big-crowd drawing matches were played at grounds with small crowd capacities.

After attempts last week to shift the match between North Melbourne and Collingwood to the MCG had failed, the game drew a crowd of only 23,405 to the Arden Street Oval.

There had been pressure to re-locate the game-of-the-day between Hawthorn and Richmond to VFL Park. This match went ahead at Princes Park, drawing a crowd of 20,110.

Critics claimed that both matches had the potential of pulling crowds of between 60,000 and 80,000.

The fact that the MCG was not used for any match last Saturday added fuel to the critics attack.

A total aggregate of less than 130,000 people turned out for last Saturday's matches... the worst result so far this season.

### Saints double

When St Kilda beat Footscray last weekend, the club completed its first double (two successive wins) since 1978. Wins over Geelong and Footscray have provided Saints supporters with new found enthusiasm.

However, this weekend the club faces a big challenge when they meet Carlton at Moorabbin. One of the stars of St Kilda's recent revival has been veteran ruckman Jeff Sarau, who, after 189 games is playing some of the finest football of his career.

### Madden rumours

Essendon officials this week denied rumours that last year's captain Simon Madden is at loggerheads with the club and wanted a clearance to North Melbourne.

The club also denied that Madden had had a disagreement with coach Kevin Sheedy.

Madden is badly out of form at the moment and performed poorly in a reserves match last weekend.

### SWANS READY

Sydney fans should see what promises to be the best match yet scheduled for the harbour city when the "home team", South Melbourne does battle with Essendon this Sunday.

Yet to be defeated at the SCG, the Sydney Swans go into the match after going down by a slender two point margin to Geelong last Saturday.

South coach Ricky Quade called all his players to a special meeting last Sunday to reassure them that they had the ability to win matches. He had been extremely worried after the Geelong match that his young side had become too disillusioned about the defeat.



### BOSUSTOW IN STRIFE

Peter Bosustow is in the centre of another controversy. Melbourne officials are upset this week over an incident which occurred in their match against Carlton last Saturday. Demons defender, Shane Zantuck, was felled in an incident while play was temporarily stopped waiting for a boundary throw-in.

Zantuck, who lay motionless for a few seconds, appeared to have been struck by Bosustow with his right forearm. Melbourne officials are angry that there was no report. They say the umpire must have seen the incident as a free kick was awarded.



### Cassin's future

Veteran John Cassin will undergo an operation this week which may decide his football future.

Now playing with Fitzroy, after stints with Essendon and North Melbourne, the 30-year-old Cassin was injured in last Saturday's match against Essendon.

Cassin, a member of North's 1977 premiership side injured a medial ligament only five minutes after the start of the game.

Before entering hospital for the operation he said: "I might give it away if it's too bad, though I'd like to continue because I've never been fitter".

### HAFEY SILENT

Collingwood coach Tom Hafey has discontinued his weekly post-match press conferences.

When he stopped the conferences a fortnight ago, it ended a practise which he had followed through his entire league coaching career. The recent flood of media speculation regarding his future, much of which promoted the idea of him being replaced as Collingwood coach, probably led to his decision.

## Magpies horrors continue

Collingwood's run of horrors continued last Saturday when two more of their star players joined their ever-increasing list of casualties. Both Mark Weideman and David Twoomey — two of the club's bright young hopes — are expected to miss up to four matches. Weideman has damaged shoulder ligaments and Twoomey has damaged cruciate ligaments in his left knee.

Already sidelined with injury are captain Peter Moore (right), Stuart Atkin, Stan Magro and Rene Kink (who is also under suspension).



## SANFL SPLIT ROUND UNDER FIRE

Though South Australia was the only major football state to conduct matches on the Anzac holiday last Monday, it still faced criticism for what has been described as its "miserable attitude".

Because sporting authorities must pay the Anzac Day Fund 60 percent of profits from fixtures conducted on the Anzac holiday, critics claim the SANFL scheduled two "non-event" matches for the Monday matches of the split round.

Meanwhile, pressure is growing in Adelaide to re-introduce a split round of matches on the Easter weekend. Since the league discontinued splitting Easter fixtures in 1979 there has been a slide in attendances.

### Squad unchanged

The South Australian selectors did not add any players to the State squad following last week's round of fixtures.

It was expected a few more players may have worked their way into the squad but the selectors chose to leave it as is.

However, the selectors said they were concerned about injury problems within the squad and hoped some of the key players could get themselves fit in time for the match.

### McInnes takes over

John McInnes has been appointed acting league coach of Sturt till Jack Oatey is well enough to resume duties.

Oatey had major surgery on his hip three weeks ago and it is uncertain how long he will be incapacitated. Prior to the start of the 1982 season he said it would be the last year of his long reign at Sturt.

### Heaven injured

Woodville defender, Lindsay Heaven has missed his chance of gaining a berth in the State side for the match against Victoria on May 17.

He has been in outstanding form but a broken thumb and a shoulder injury suffered last Saturday have put him out of contention.

Heaven may have to have his left shoulder pinned as a result of the match against Sturt.



### VFL players unavailable

The VFL refused the SANFL to use players from the Collingwood and South Melbourne clubs for their State-of-Origin match against Victoria on May 17.

They argued that it was too much to ask players to play a league match in Sydney on Sunday then fly to Adelaide to play in the interstate match the following day.

The decision rules out players such as Mark Williams, Mike Taylor, Mark Weideman, John Roberts and Max James.

**Runners for the umps?**

THERE have been many changes to our game in the last 10 years and no doubt there will be more to come in the next decade.

So what about introducing a 'runner' for the umpires?

When players make mistakes, or are in the wrong position, coaches generally send the runner out to remedy the situation with a suitable message.

Why not have a runner going out to the men in white to do the same?

The rule as it is at present does not allow for the umpires adviser at the game to speak with the field umpires till after the match is over. Notes are made on the performance of the umpires, but not presented to them till the following week, well after the game.

Maybe on-the-spot messages to help them overcome mistakes made at the time would be of benefit.

**MEDIA MEN?**

Last week I was invited to Wesley College by the year 12 media group for a full-scale television interview.

The studio could have been from any of our three TV stations as the boys certainly did their homework on the design of the set and the preparation of some relevant questions.

The interview went off without a hitch and these media men of the future can be proud of their achievements.

These days they must be providing big business around the country for smart Perry Mason types.

Gone are the days when players were satisfied with extras such as new pair of socks and shorts each season, a return bus trip for away games and a couple of free beers after a win.

This year we have heard of some real odd demands and you can bet your footy boots that there's a dozen more which are being kept very, very secret.

Here are a few:

● It has been reported in Melbourne that Collingwood's Graham Teasdale had a clause inserted in his playing terms that he would not be played in a back-pocket.

● Another Melbourne paper reported that Brian Peake is captain of Geelong because he made that demand in his 1982 contract.

● Still in Victoria, one player this season attempted to have a clause included which prevented the coach dropping him to the reserves. (This one failed).

● Another VFL player will receive a massive cash bonus if he wins the Brownlow Medal.

And finally if you think some of our top players are making premature comebacks after serious injury these days, that is because of a clause in their contracts which states that they will not lose match payments unless they miss a certain amount (usually about three) games on end.

## Mistaken mistake

IT irks me a little when commentators, particularly on television, tell us that so-and-so is down injured and doesn't look too good. Then, after some time generally, we discover that they had the wrong player. Twice in recent weeks we've heard cases of commentators having the wrong player carted off on a stretcher. It's a bit heart-breaking for the folks at home. Surely it's a classic case of 'When in doubt, leave out.'

## In memory of . . .

A small and dedicated group of Subiaco supporters could be forgiven if they gave up their loyalty. They travelled to Bassendean equipped with a variety of supporters' gear and took up position near the western goals. They had a special banner prepared for the players to run through and as soon as the reserves match finished, they rushed out on to the oval to erect it for their heroes. But the Subiaco players beat them to it... they ran on to the ground even before the reserves players had left — and the banner remained unfurled.

## Fighting finale

The violence that erupted in the West Perth-East Fremantle game was a blight on football, that's agreed. But did you notice one thing about the Ben Jager-David Rankin incident? When the players decided to have a box-on after Rankin was felled, it was diminutive West Perth skipper Les Fong who was at the bottom of the pack; hopping in there in defence of his ruckman team-mate.

## Slowly does it

The only people slower than the umpires at Leederville last Saturday were the scoreboard attendants. Their pace was painful . . . they even forgot to start the time-clock for the second quarter.

He mentioned four players — Peter Bennett, Geoff Ironmonger, Brendon McFaul and Russell Forbes — as recruits this year. What he didn't mention was that McFaul is the only member of the quartet able to get a league game at present, and that's only as an interchange. Bennett and Ironmonger were dropped to reserves after one match and Forbes hasn't earned promotion as yet.

## Un-selected

Hear tell that one of the newer of Subiaco's selectors doesn't usually get to the ground on match days till the reserves is well into the second half. What with Subiaco's colts and reserves both doing well, you'd think that there would be scope to pick new players from those ranks... and that's a selector's job, isn't it?

## Female folly

I notice one of my fellow columnists, the illustrious Mother Brown, had something to say recently about clubs using young boys as drinks runners. Swans, in particular, do this and I agree with her that it's not good. But Swans go a step further... they've got a female trainer! Boy, what a difference that would make if you were feeling a bit groggy after a heavy knock and you opened your eyes to see this beautiful young girl looking kindly into your face!

## Marshall's man

That well-versed commentator, Arthur Marshall, produced another of his verbal classics last week when he talked about West Perth's Alan Watling 'taxi-ing all over the ground'. The veteran rover or half-forward, is of course, a taxi driver.

## Never too late?

Subiaco coach Ken Armstrong had some hot words to say about media criticism of his team and their player standards on Seven's Sport show last week. He said that it seems fashionable to get into Subiaco lately. He also said that it was the club's determination to put all its surplus recruiting money into development of local and country zones in an all-out effort to develop younger players for the future. # FOOTBALL FACTS

## Not really the family scene

WAFU chief Vincent Yovich's pre-season remarks "we want to change the image in the sense of getting the whole family involved in football" and "we want to highlight the good things" took a gigantic tumble last week with that disgusting situation at Leederville Oval.

How do we eliminate these spiteful incidents and mob riots from our game?

Three ingredients for a demonstration were ready made: A — The home side lost; B — The home side's star player was K'OD early in the game; C — The visitors scored from 12 frees (seven goals/five). We can't stop visitors from winning, we can't tell umpires how to do their jobs so let's take action on factor B.

These incidents are becoming an annual occurrence.

In 1979 it was Wim Rosbender, in 1980 Roger Crouch, 1981 Phil Clucas, 1982 Peter Menaglio and now Brian Adamson (the penalties for these assaults — one player got two weeks and another got one!).

Just last year WAFU tribunal chairman, Mr Bernie O'Sullivan stated: "Footballers found guilty by the tribunal can expect a consistent level of penalties in future".

This does not seem to have eventuated. Mr O'Sullivan has given second and third offenders ONE week and first time up players THREE.

## Demonstration not rare

Demonstrations like last week's are not rare in the last couple of decades.

I recall a couple of 'beauties' at Fremantle Oval, one in 1975 when East Perth played there and another in 1978 after West Perth had won narrowly.

Thirty years ago (in 1952) a near riot occurred at Perth Oval after East Perth had just beaten Claremont.

Tiger supporters claimed that they were hard done by on the score of free kicks in front of goals.

They kept the umpire bailed up in his room for a couple of hours after the game.

However, the worst demonstration I have read of happened in the last century (1891) when the Perth based team Rovers beat Fremantle at Fremantle Oval.

A former Rovers player umpired the game and was mobbed by hundreds of irate

fans on the bell. When he decided to make a run for the railway station he was literally stoned and cornered against a brick fence.

Only a strong rearguard action by players from both sides enabled him to outspurt his attackers along Market Street to the sanctuary of the railway station.

In last week's column I mentioned how the 1968 East Perth team had a lot of coaches in it.

Well, it has been pointed out to me that the 1968 touring Victorian side that beat WA here that year by nine points, had 13 players who were later to coach in Victoria or the West.

They were Bill Goggin, John Nicholls, Denis Marshall, Francis Bourke, David Parkin, 'Hassa' Mann, Peter Steward, Bobby Skilton, Royce Hart, Eric Sarich, Barry Davis, Alex Jesaulenko and Carl Ditterich.

The top five includes four interstate recruits, Brian Taylor, Mal Blight, Peter Bosustow and Jim Krakouer. Only Peter Daicos is a local.

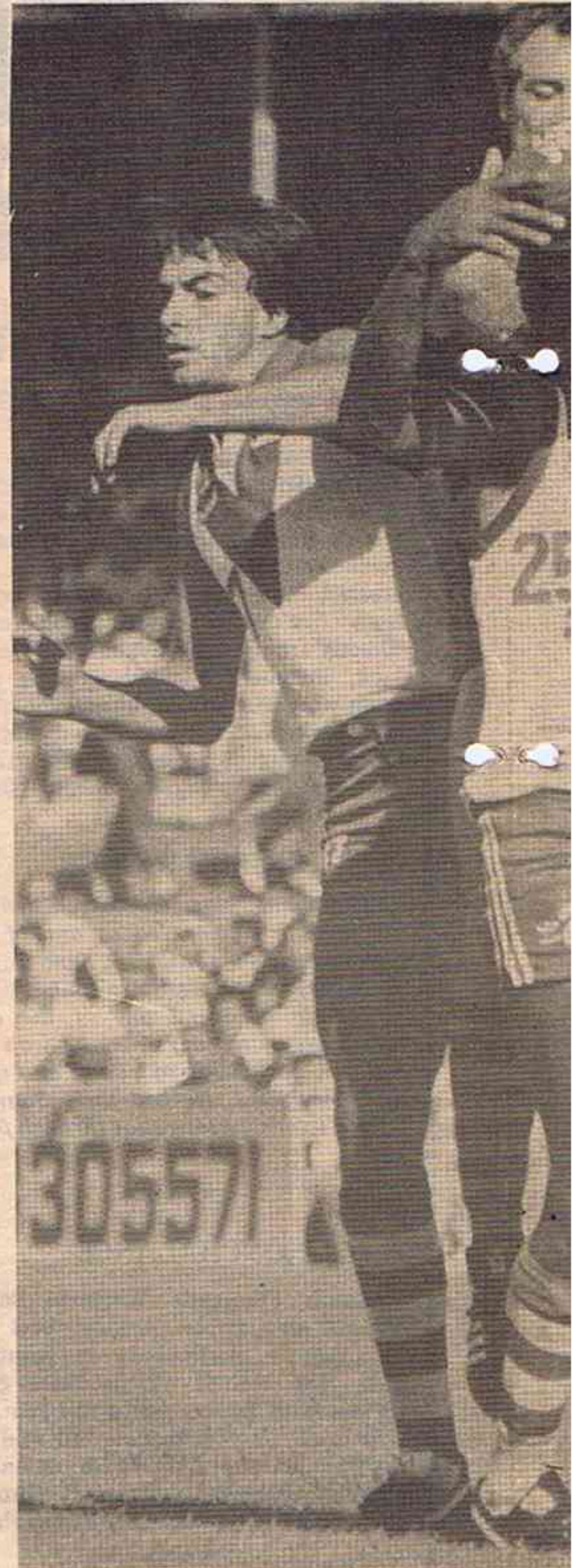

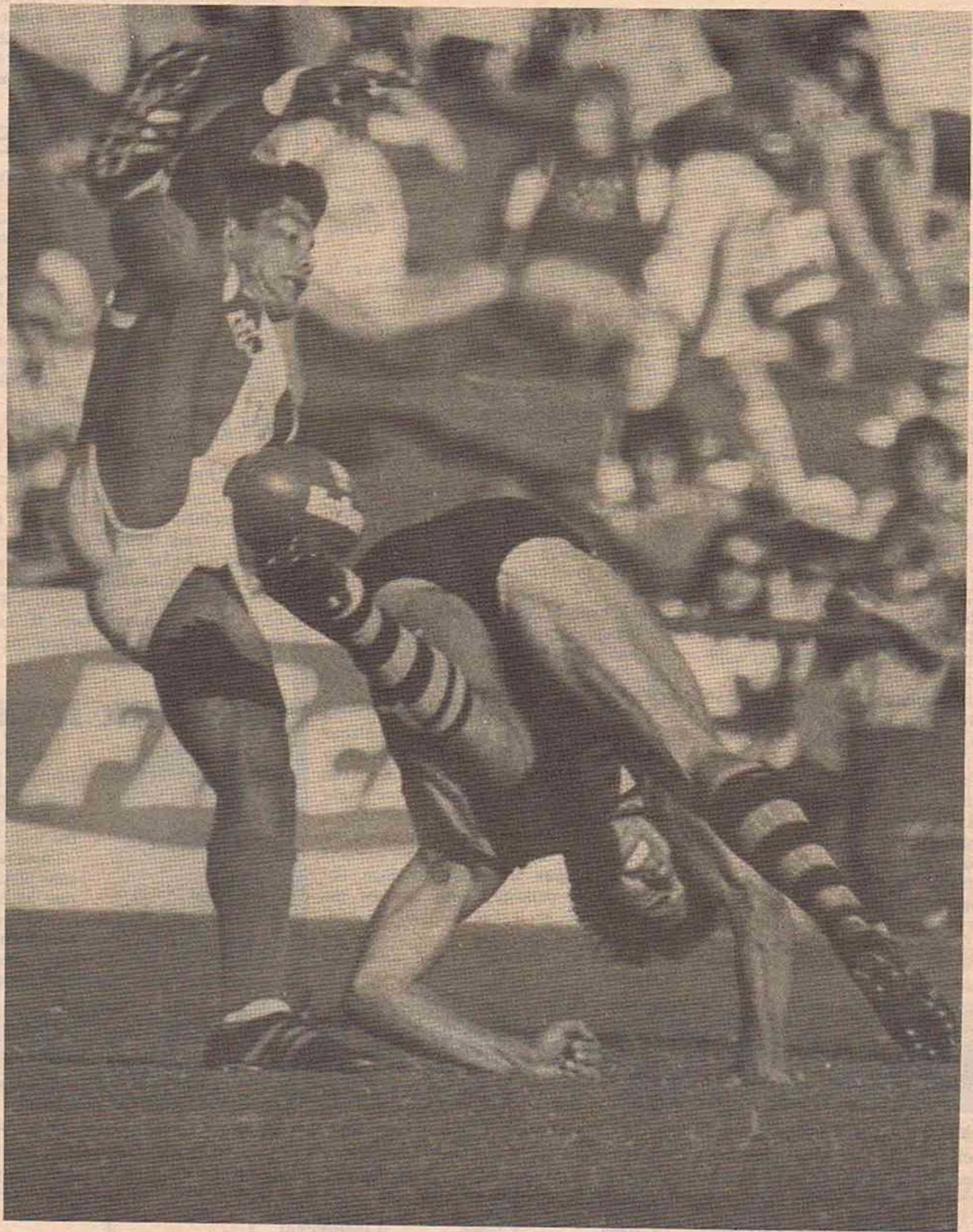

# BENNETT'S BURST

## Keep cool, please Mr Official

No-one likes football violence. There is no way it should be tolerated.

But the emotional outburst by West Perth president Rod Brown this week, following the hectic match between his side and East Fremantle, also does little for football.

While he had every reason to be upset over what happened to Brian Adamson, Mr Brown tended to ignore the incident where East Fremantle's David Rankin was flattened.

I wasn't at the game, but the television replay indicated that something went on just before Adamson had his jaw broken. It was difficult, however, to say exactly what happened without seeing the incident.

### CLEAR PICTURE

But the same couldn't be said about Rankin. There was a clear picture of what happened to him.

In my opinion it was the kind of incident that warranted as much investigation as the one that saw Adamson injured.

While I concede emotions run high after football matches, the image of football suffers enough damage with the kind of after-game incident that occurred at Leederville Oval without a club president adding fuel to the situation with highly volatile statements.

Football is meant to be a man's game and in comparison to rugby league is mild for its violence.

But while spectators like to see a bit of blood, there is no room for the king-hit behind the game or the lethal use of an elbow.

Perhaps it's about time the WAFL took a really tough stand against such incidents. Umpires have a difficult enough task as it is without being subjected to the kind of abuse that occurred on Saturday.

It was inevitable they would receive a tough time leaving the ground. It is difficult to placate supporters when their side loses narrowly. Unfortunately, the umpires are the ones who become the target of emotions.

Fuel is added to such close encounters when players are unfairly put down behind the play.

Perhaps it's time the league appointed stewards at league matches to take the onus off umpires.

I don't believe anything would be gained from giving umpires the power to send players from the ground. Too often they only see a player retaliating and it would give the sly player the opportunity to take advantage of such a ruling.

But if players know there are stewards outside the ground it is likely to act as a deterrent for behind-the-play incidents, particularly if they have the power to carry out an investigation if something occurs.

If it was backed up with really stiff penalties, then the kind of incident that occurred to Adamson on Saturday is likely to be stamped out.

### PERSPECTIVE

Even so, we still need to get things in perspective. The incident that happened on Saturday doesn't occur very often. Most of the real damage results when players are going for the ball and someone crooks an elbow.

It is unfortunate that West Perth have had two players put down behind the play this season. But I hardly see that as evidence that other clubs are head-hunting West Perth players.

For Mr Brown to be quoted as having said: "West Perth players have been placed under unwarranted physical pressure during the first five weeks of the season and some of the incidents may even have lead to death", is to border on histrionics.

While some West Perth players have the reputation of being put off their game if physical pressure is applied to them, the club also is endowed with two of the toughest men in league football in John Duckworth and Ben Jager.

It's not all one-sided, as was shown last Saturday.

## Frame appointed State manager

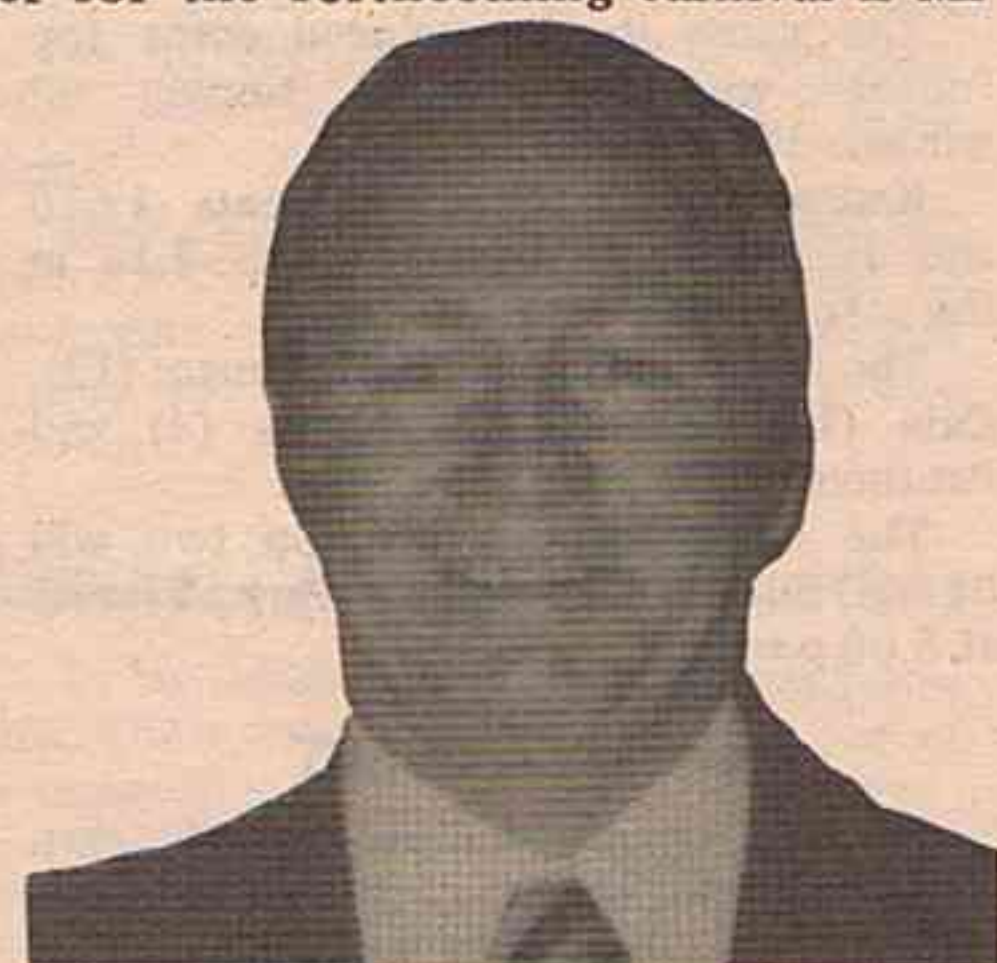
The W.A.A.F.L. State team manager for the forthcoming carnival is Mr Doug Frame.

# THE GREAT GOALKICKERS



Western Australia has produced some prolific goalkickers over the years and in this eight-part segment Westside Football looks at some of the greatest from each of the league clubs. Every week Westside Football writer GARY STOCKS peers into the past to bring back memories of the men who thrilled the crowds with their uncanny goal sense. So far we have looked at South Fremantle, Subiaco and Perth's great full-forwards, this week, in the fourth of these special features, we feature West Perth.



# One legend after another at Leederville

The legendary Ted Tyson and Ray Scott stand out head and shoulders above the goalkicking forwards produced at West Perth.

Their records speak for themselves. Tyson was West Perth's top goal scorer 11 years in succession and Scott kicked the most majors for the club eight times on end.

An indication of their ability was that between them they kicked 100 or more goals in a season 10 times.

West Perth were fortunate in that as soon as Tyson retired from league football, Scott was ready to take over. It was significant that during their years with the club the Cardinals won six premierships.

## ILLUSTRIOUS CAREER

Tyson, who booted more than 1100 goals during his illustrious career, was the complete full-forward.

He could snap goals over either shoulder with regularity and he was one of the most accurate kicks in the game.

Tyson was one of the straightest kicks the game ever produced. If he had 10 deliberate shots at goal you could bet that eight or nine of them would bring up the desired result.



Ted Tyson made up for his small stature with his tremendously accurate kicking.

But Tyson also earned a reputation as a quick thinker.

He scored many of his majors from soccered efforts. When he was under pressure and did not want to risk the chance of being caught with the ball he simply kicked it off the ground, a-la-Peter Bosustow, to register full points.

It would be true to say Tyson was an opportunist.

Besides his accuracy, he was also strong in the air, although he was only 5ft 10in (177 cm) tall.



Ray Scott emerged on the scene shortly after Tyson retired.

During his career West Perth had some great players up the field delivering the ball to him.

Tyson kicked 10 goals or more on 16 occasions during his distinguished career and led the WAFL goalkicking table twice.

That total would have been greater if it had not been for some other outstanding forwards during his era.

In 1934 he booted 143 goals during the season, but it still was not enough to win the title as the State's best sharp shooter for the season.

## FOOTBALL LEGEND

Legendary East Fremantle forward George Doig sent 144 kicks sailing between the big sticks.

However, Tyson headed the table in 1932 with just 84 goals and again in 1938 when he kicked 126.

A year earlier, in 1937, he also kicked 126 but again Doig spoiled his attempt to lead the goalkicking table when he produced 129 goals.

## FOILED AGAIN

In 1939, Tyson's attempt was again foiled.

He kicked exactly 100 goals but was this time second behind Perth's Bert Gook who posted 102 majors for the season.

Tyson also topped the ton in 1941. When he retired, West Perth discovered another top forward in Scott, who took over from where Tyson left off.

They were similar types of players. However, Scott did not have the same pinpoint accuracy as his predecessor.

But he made up for this with his uncanny goal sense.

He could snap goals from either pocket with monotonous regularity.

Scott had a lot in common with Tyson. He was pitted against some great full-forwards in his attempts to be the league's highest goal kicker in a season of football.

Scott also led the competition twice although he kicked more than 100 goals in one season four times.

While Tyson booted more than 1100 goals during his time as one of the best forwards in the business, Scott kicked more than 800.

Scott also kicked 10 or more goals in a match 11 times.

And on August 15, 1953, he put up one of his finest performances when he booted a personal tally of 15 goals against Perth.

It was in this year that he also kicked his highest tally in one season.

Although that was the only time in 1953 that he kicked more than 10 goals in one match, he kicked 143 goals for the season to equal Tyson's 1934 club record.

Scott led the WAFL table in 1951 when he kicked 141 goals and again in 1955 when he kicked 83.

He and Tyson are two of the best forwards ever produced in this State.

Their all round ability gave backmen plenty of problems and their style of football would certainly succeed in today's game.

Since these great goalkickers West Perth have not produced another outstanding forward who could regularly kick a bag of goals.

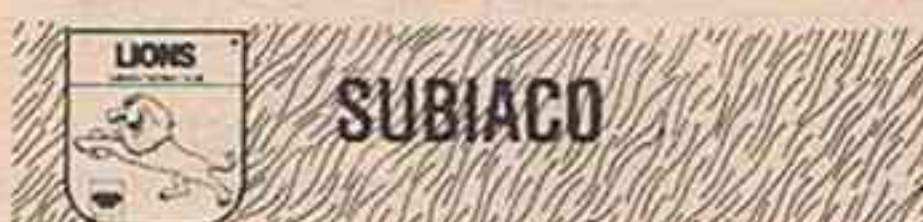
