ESCORT FLOP

THE Escort Cup series is doomed as an interstate competition — and it's about time the WAFL realised it.

The South Australians saw the light and pulled out of the competition and it is time the WAFL took a similar stand.

The South Australians are now playing in their own competition in Adelaide and that is something WA should aim for by 1983.

The current Escort Cup competition is made for the Victorians and no consideration has been given to West Australian clubs.

The AFC president, Dr Allen Aylett, has made that clear through his actions last week.

Because the original date of a quarter-final does not suit the VFL and two of its clubs, the date has been changed.

Swan Districts were due to play Richmond on June 8, but that would mean South Melbourne and St Kilda would clash just two days after playing each other in the VFL.

Important matches

It does not matter if Swans are inconvenienced by two changes. If the game is played on June 22 it will fall between two important matches for the WA club.

The time has come to tell the VFL that WA wants out.

After all, the WA teams have to travel to Melbourne for the series, which is supposedly important because of the television coverage.

However, the result of the game is known before the telecast begins in Perth and normally finishes too late for most people to consider staying up to watch.

Todd's threat

If John Todd sends his reserves side, as threatened, every football follower in the State will be behind the move.

It is high time we stood up to the VFL and made a few demands of our own. For instance, our own series in 1983 or no series at all. Even the VFL is not taking the Escort Cup seriously.

A measure of just how much the series means to Victorian clubs is that Carlton chose to "rest" 12 players for Tuesday's match against Fitzroy and the Lions did not want to risk injury to five of their league players.

WEST Perth ruck-rover Ross Gibbs must be a certainty to play in the State match against South Australia next month.

But he will be in a different role to when he made his State debut against Victoria last year.

Gibbs played as a back pocket specialist in his first inter-state match, but his form has been so impressive on the ball in 1982 that he must get a berth as the side's number one ruck-rover.

He is well up in most media awards and is the leader in the Westside Football player ratings.

Gibbs will be a key player in this Saturday's clash against Swan Districts.

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Miller's dilemma

PERTH coach Ian Miller may have confused a few people with his after-match comment on Saturday. He said: "A well deserved and character win after a shocking second quarter." But a look at the scoreboard will see that Perth kicked six goals for the term. Miller explains it this way: "We really dominated that quarter, but made some stupid mistakes and that's what disappointed me. I had asked the players to aim for 100 handballs in the game - and they looked as though they were trying to get them all in the one quarter. But I agree, the comment did look a bit strange in view of the scoreboard."

Late burst

SWAN Districts' ability to kick goals in the closing minutes of a quarter has destroyed more than one side this season... and East Perth have joined the ranks of those teams to suffer the Swans pressure. Take last Saturday for example. At the 25 minute mark of the second term, the Royals had a comfortable 34 point break - but goals in the time on period by Murray Rance and Gavin Outridge helped reduce the margin back to 20 points - a much easier figure to overhaul in the third term, which they did by kicking the next five goals in just eight minutes. At the 20 minute mark of the third term, the Royals were just six points down - but goals to Ed Blackaby, Outridge and Peter Sartori saw Swans have a handy 24-point margin at the break.

Changed roles

A NUMBER of league players who began their careers as forwards are now making their marks in defence. Phil Bradmore and Clinton Browning are prime examples. Both were used mainly at full-forward until this season when they have played most of their football at centre-half-back. But it was surprising to see a youngster with plenty of goalkicking talent playing at full-back with the Swan Districts reserves last Saturday. Brent Hutton kicked 10 goals in the reserves preliminary final last year but was given the task of minding East Perth full-forward Paul Arnold last week. Swans do not have a full-forward in their ranks and perhaps Hutton should be being groomed for the position.

New roles

The two men who acted as runners at Fremantle Oval last Saturday are quickly getting closer to resuming more normal roles with their teams. West Perth's George Michalczuk should soon be swapping his black and gold track suit for a red and blue guernsey, while Joe McKay appeared to be moving well in his runners outfit and he too, will be a welcome sight back in the red and white costume.

Champ toss

South Fremantle have added a little colour to the pre-match ritual of the tossing of the coin. At home matches, South invite one of their past stars to toss the coin in front of the members enclosure. John Colgan and Ray Richards have officiated at their past two matches.

Miller moves up

PERTH coach Ian Miller, a regular columnist with Westside Football, has had to accept the indignity of trailing the field quite considerably in our page five tipsters panel. THE season is almost half-way through and many pundits are talking about what teams will comprise the final four.

South Fremantle will just miss in my opinion because apart from their stars — Stephen Michael, Noel Carter and Bruce Monteath — they haven't the brilliance of previous seasons and that was their trademark.

It's an excellent idea. It gives players a new lease of life and an opportunity to prove themselves.

The clash at Fremantle Oval last Saturday revealed a big problem in the forward area of both teams.

Arthur Marshall mentioned full-forwards last week in this paper and surely Mal Brown and Dennis Cometti must have said to themselves 'wouldn't a Warren Ralph make a big difference'.

The current league competition shows that Claremont's Warren Ralph and now Perth's Michael Rea are the only full-forwards about.

Swan Districts say that without having

to rely on Simon Beasley they are perhaps a better goal-kicking side. However, a class full-forward is a great boost to any side.

It is a pity, but always a problem with a strong club that Claremont reserves full-forward Peter Avery is denied an opportunity in league football.

His displeasure with the club — which can possibly be branded selfish — can be understood.

Grant Campbell's form

WATCHING Grant Campbell struggle to gain form this season reminds me of several champions over the years who have gone through the 'horrors' at some stage during their careers, but have bounced back.

Grant is still very young in years, but he has now had enough football experience to really make his presence felt. But we do not see it often enough from him. However, time is on his side.

To be classified as a real top player, he must get consistency into his game and then he will be of great value to East Perth.

During my own career I was given some very good advice by the great Graham Farmer and I hope Grant Dorrington does not mind me passing it on to Grant Campbell.

- Be far more positive about your game.
 - Do not 'hang back' when near the play — be creative and make the play. Instead of waiting for other players to bring you into the game be a little selfish yourself.
 - Think of your top games you have played in the past — do not think of the poor game you may have played the previous week. This gives you that positive approach.
 - Believe in your own ability. You would have equal to or more ability than any other player in W.A.
- Good luck Grant — you are a pleasure to watch from the press box when you are firing.

Country zones

Last week I was visiting the country on business and I was in areas allocated to the Perth and West Perth clubs.

When speaking to football-minded people they were mainly full of complaints about how little the parent club was doing in their area.

If the country complaints were valid, it is a pity because there are some excellent players there, by all reports ready or nearly ready for the picking.

They let the play flow and their authority, consistency and positioning were first class. What more could you ask of an umpire?



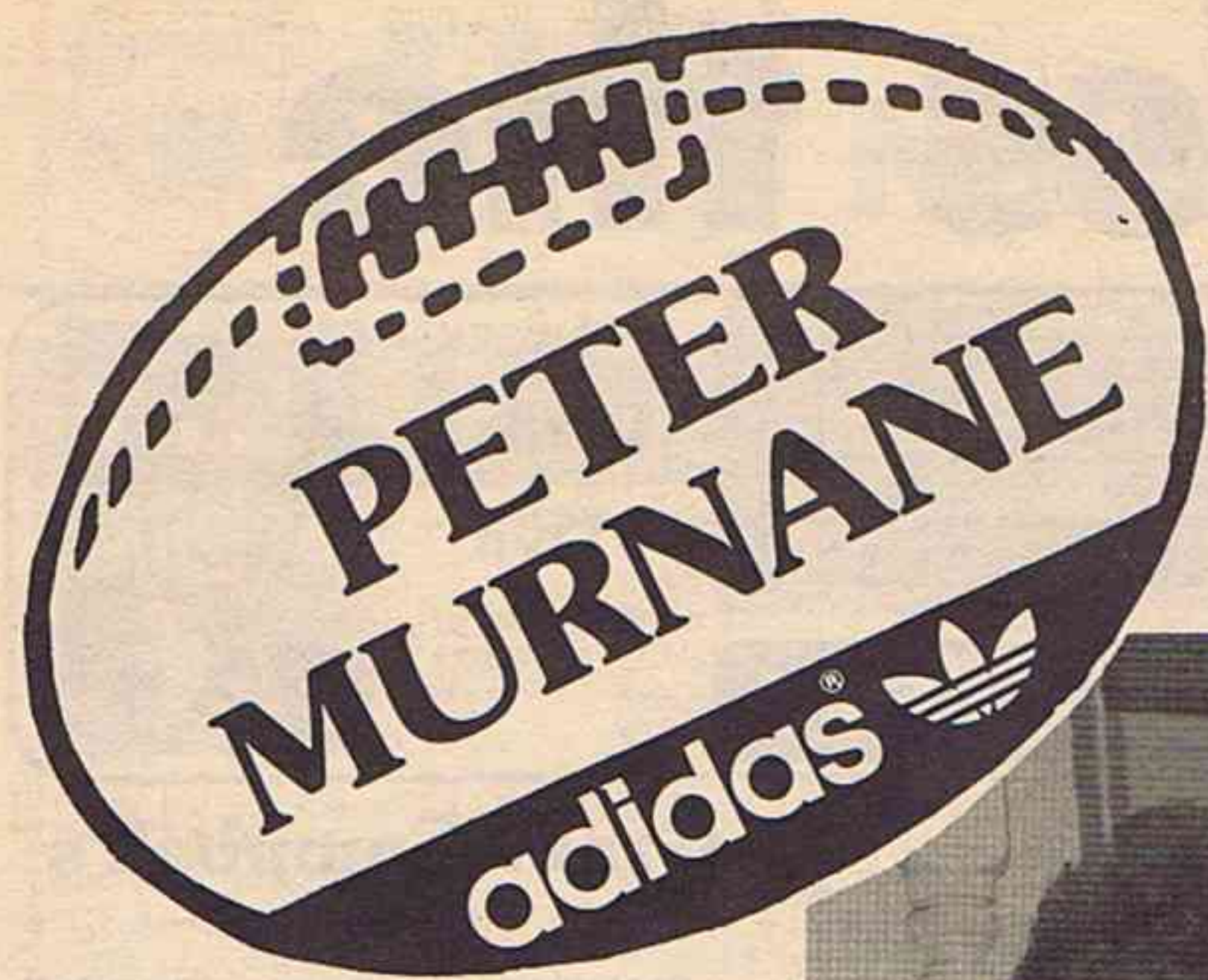
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W.A. conditions suit Victorian recruit

There is little doubt West Perth pulled off one of the recruiting coups of the year when they gained the signature of former Hawthorn player Peter Murnane.

Murnane had not really been a star with his Melbourne club, but has found the West Australian conditions to his liking.

His debut in Perth was delayed through injury, but once fit and able to take the field he was an instant success.

So big was the influence he had on local football that he was able to gain selection in the State squad and must be considered a serious contender for a berth in the side to play South Australia in Adelaide on June 12.

Last year West Perth had struggled and could only finish in sixth position — ahead of East Fremantle and Perth.

They had lacked runners and goal kicking potential up forward. Murnane is one of the men who has been responsible for getting the side on the comeback trail and now the Falcons are a big chance to play in the finals.

He teams with captain Les Fong, Ross Gibbs and Corry Bewick to form one of the best small-man brigades in the business and this quartet are important in West Perth's 1982 plans.

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to Murnane and found out the reasons for his great West Australian form, why he moved to Perth and a few more interesting facts about the man who has taken West Australian football by storm in his short career in this State.

wingmen and I just had to learn to be able to play other positions as well. It was a question of doing that or fluctuating between the two grades. With so many other players capable of doing the same job there was plenty of pressure on individuals to perform.

Q: Have you settled in well at West Perth?

A: Yes. It's great now. The biggest problem was getting to know all the guys. Not socially, but to find out how each one played. Their different movements dictate where I have to go.

Q: You would have been pleased with the win against Claremont in the first round?

A: Yes, that is one of the best wins I have ever been associated with. We had about 10 players out and although there was not a defeatist attitude in the rooms we were not all that confident. But we were going to give it a go. No one expected us to do well and that gave us more incentive to beat them. It was a great win. I thought we would give them a run for their money and to win the four points was a real confidence booster.

Q: You have found consistency over here. What has been the major difference between playing with West Perth and Hawthorn?

A: I played well for two weeks, but, as David Parkin used to say, 'two weeks do not make a winter'. I just have to go on with it now.

Q: What is the feeling at West Perth now? Is there an air of confidence?

A: It is more an air of expectancy. We have been able to win with a number of our guys out and we just wonder how good we will be when some of those key players are fit again. Each week it has been a different make-up. Although it has been mainly the same guys they have been forced to play in different positions and we just have not been able to settle down to a regular side. Dennis (Cometti) says that we should ride out the difficult times until everyone is fit and win as many games as we can.

Q: Was it a difficult decision to leave Victoria and come to WA to play football?

A: No. Not really. Eva liked the place and I had always wanted to come to Perth to live for a while. I had a job in Melbourne teaching and I thought that if I could get a position here I would come. I was fortunate enough to get a job and we had no hesitation in making the move.

Q: What does your wife do for a living?

A: She took aerobic classes for the first couple of months. She still does that, but only part time and now she is working for a department store.

A: I had roughening under the kneecap and saw a specialist about the problem — and I just had to rest it. I played only one practice match after February. It restricted my movements a great deal. I could not run and had a little trouble walking.

Q: You have done pretty well in your matches with West Perth — how did you feel about selection in the State squad?

A: That was certainly the greatest thrill of my personal career. I guess my next aim is to get a game.

Q: Did you ever earn a berth in a Victorian State squad?

A: No. It is the first experience I have had with a State squad and it is great to be training with the best players in WA.

Q: Where did you play most of your football with Hawthorn?

A: I started out as a wingman and never moved much from there, although I did play a bit as a half-forward and ruck-rover. I had a few problems maintaining consistency and had my ups and downs. There are just so many guys waiting to take your place, especially in VFL clubs, that you have to perform or you are back to the reserves. At one stage we had about eight

Q: Are West Perth good enough to win the flag?

A: I have not seen enough of the other sides to be able to answer that — but we are a good side and at the moment we are just aiming for a spot in the four. I would say Swans were the side to beat. They are very consistent and strong.

Q: Was the Red Rooster Carnival victory an important pre-season boost which was responsible for West Perth's brilliant start to the season?

A: It was a boost for the club. I don't know what happened last year but we didn't go too well and the win was something the club needed.

Q: What made you go to West Perth?

A: I did not know really where to come. But I asked a solicitor over here to check out the situation, ring around the clubs and see who was interested. Then I spoke to Dennis when he was commentating the cricket in Melbourne and decided to come to West Perth. I'm sure I made the right decision.

Q: Are the West Australian conditions suiting your game better than those in Victoria?

A: It is a completely different game over here. That's what everyone told me when I left Melbourne and it has turned out to be true. West Australians use their skills and the ball a lot more. They kick the ball to each other and in that sense they use the ball well. In Victoria they tend to kick a lot longer more often and they handball once before the big kick. I wouldn't say West Australians mess about with the ball too much. It is far more skilful over here.

Q: Where are you playing most of your football at West Perth?

A: Mainly as a ruck-rover changing with Gibbs (Ross Gibbs). I start on the flank. He is a good player to ruck-rove with. He is a big occasion player with plenty of talent. I am amazed that no Victorian club has chased him. He would do quite well in Melbourne.

Q: Are you only going to stay here for two years?

A: At the moment it will be just for two years, but I will see how it goes. I don't think one year is long enough. In two seasons I will have had the chance to see a bit of Perth and to settle down properly at West Perth. As I said before I wanted to come across to live and two years would give me a good taste of it.

Q: Did you play in a premiership side with Hawthorn during your career with them?

A: I played in the 1976 and 1978 premierships with Hawthorn. In 1976 I started on the bench and did not get onto the ground until the last quarter so I was not a great contributor in the win. But I still ran around the oval with the rest of them at the end of the game.

Q: Are you enjoying your job in Perth?

A: My job is tremendous. That was my main concern when I came over. I had a position in Melbourne and I was lucky to be able to score such a good job over here.

Q: I suppose you spend half the day signing autographs?

A: No. I am at school to teach and during working hours I restrict my thoughts to school, although sometimes I sit down during recess or lunch time and have a chat with them.

Q: How have you found Dennis Cometti and his coaching methods?

A: Dennis had a problem similar to mine because we both had to get to know how every player in the side moved and thought. But he is a very up-to-date coach and he always has something different to offer us at training. It is necessary to have variety so that you don't become stale. David Parkin did much the same thing and was an excellent coach as well.

Q: Who were your coaches in Melbourne?

A: My first year was under John Kennedy and that was an experience. He was a hard-task master and in my first season I didn't know what I had walked into. He was very professional and very hard, but he never asked us to do anything he couldn't do. Then David Parkin took over.

Swans too good for Falcons



IT'S that time of the round when West Perth supporters wish they could have a weekend off.

On Saturday they face up to their bogey side, Swan Districts. The Falcons have taken some nice old hidings from Swans since 1980 and there is little to suggest they won't again be on the receiving end in this match.

Swans are in full flight and it will take more than the Falcons to bring them down to earth.

While West Perth can take some consolation from last week's defeat by South Fremantle . . . they showed football character to pick up a nine goal deficit and get within five points of South in a hectic last quarter . . .

But they will need to show a lot more grit than that to match Swans.

If they don't win then they will probably find themselves dumped out of the top four. So they certainly don't lack incentive for this match.

It's not often that a side has a distinct psychological advantage over another, but it certainly appears to exist in the case of West Perth each time they meet Swans.

Swans showed last week that they will take a lot of stopping this season. They conceded a big start to East Perth and not only fought their way back into the game but turned the match into a one-sided affair.

Falcons coach Dennis Cometti is finding that it's not all tea and biscuits coaching a league side. Even though he is doing a commendable job with West Perth, he will be sent back to the drawing board after this clash.



EAST Perth, smarting from two successive losses that have tumbled them from second to fifth spot on the premiership table, should bounce back into the winning circle against Perth.

The Demons have been improving each week and have shown in their past two matches they are no longer the easy beats of WA football.

But despite their form and the fact that the match is at Perth Oval they don't appear equipped to beat the Royals, who desperately need to win to remain in contention for a place in the top four.

Last week, against Swans, the Royals showed for a half that they can be a difficult side to handle. They also did that for a quarter against Claremont the previous week.

Their biggest problem is the way they are easily brushed aside when the pressure is applied.

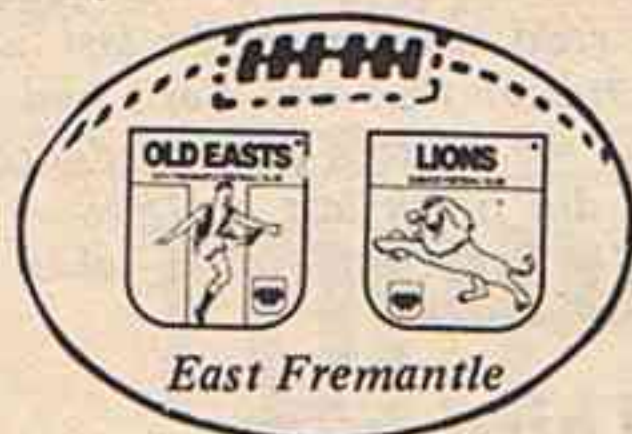
They will need to show a lot more endeavour in this match. There are two many players in the side who have become front runners.

So why should it be any different this week?

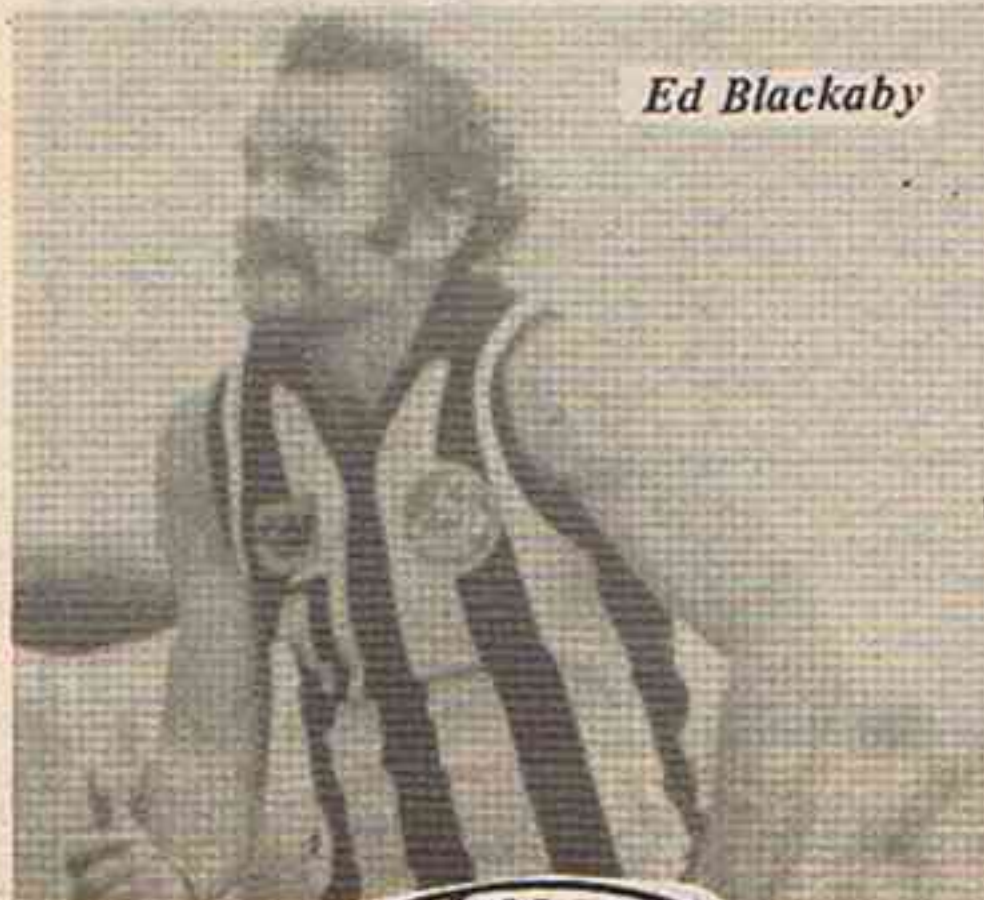
East Fremantle, smarting from two successive losses, desperately need to win this match just to stay in the fight for the four.

BAD MEMORIES FOR SUBI

POOR old Subiaco. All the bad records they have created during their history keep bobbing up now that they are down.

If they lose this week it will be their 10th straight defeat. They lost their first nine games in 1976 before beating eventual premiers Perth who were coached by Ken Armstrong. In 1947 they lost 12 games straight and then won three on end. However, their worst season was in 1902 when they lost all 15 qualifying games.

Return blow

ANYONE at Subiaco Oval on July 17, 1971 when Victoria played WA, will remember that bone-crushing shirt-front Leigh Matthews handed out to Barry Cable. Well, it took 11 years but Lethal copped his a fortnight ago against South Australia. Matthews is one of five from that Victorian team who are still playing league football. The others are Gary Dempsey, Keith Greig, Geoff Southby and Peter Knights. Only one West Australian representative in that year is still playing, Graham Moss.

Old East's record

DID I read somewhere in last week's Football Budget that Old Easts had never finished on the bottom of the ladder? East Fremantle did finish last in 1898 — their first year in the competition when they won just one match.

Third home

IF Subiaco move to Wanneroo, as was reported last weekend, it will be their third home. When they came into the league in 1901 they first used an oval in Shenton Park before moving to Subiaco Oval which was then known as Mueller Park.

Send-off rule

THE proposed send-off rule has received plenty of publicity in recent times before being knocked on the head. I was in favour of it for years, but I have seen enough injustices in football lately to change my view. This rule would only invite more.

Early this century there was a send-off law in effect here. I recall a report of a 1902 game when the umpire ordered two players from the field. But I have no record of when this rule was recinded.

Lions chances

SUBIACO's chances against East Fremantle this week do not look bright — especially on past records. They have won only eight times in 44 since East Fremantle moved to their ground in 1953. But, in the same time Subiaco have won 21 of the 46 games played against Old Easts at Subiaco Oval.

I'm off

THE strain of picking four winners, two weeks in a row, was too much for me. So I am off to the UK, Europe and Asia on two months holiday. It is my first break from league football in 27 years of continuous patronage. Two of Australia's top football historians, Norm Sowdon from Melbourne and Ian Everett from Adelaide will have some interesting facts for this page when I am away.



MILESTONE celebrations for league footballers have been commonplace lately with players like Graham Moss, Graham Melrose, Steve Curtis and Tom Mullooly reaching important personal achievements.

One man, however, who will not be running through any giant banners or receiving front-page recognition this week will be veteran boundary umpire John Devine.

Devine, who started running the line in 1966 at the age of 23, will break Charlie Pratt's long-standing record of 236 games when he takes to the field this Saturday.

Devine, still fit even though he turns 39 next Monday, runs up to 10 kms a day to stay in shape; but regards his boundary umpiring as a year-by-year proposition.

The highlight of his long career was the first of eight grand finals. He has also held his position at the top by being chosen for the last three grand finals.

Richmond duo Robert Wiley and Maurice Rioli had 35 and 34 possessions respectively. Rioli, playing devastating football in the centre, shot out 21 handpasses while only having 13 kicks. Wiley had 25 kicks and 10 handpasses.

INTERSTATE UPDATE

Turco battles on at North

MARIO Turco, a forgotten man of football, is far from disconsolate about his continued selection in the reserves side at North Melbourne.

The plucky little rover, who helped East Fremantle take out the 1979 premiership before switching over the border, hasn't played a senior game with Norths since the start of the 1980 season.

Turco, now 26, was told that his services were no longer required at North Melbourne at the end of the 1980 season — but instead of moving elsewhere or returning to WA, he opted to stick it out at Arden Street.

Turco's three-year contract expires with North at the end of this season and he intends playing it right out to the end. The fact that he is probably under an agreed contractual amount has influenced his decision to stay at North and live with reserves football. But he still doesn't rule himself out of contention of winning back his league berth.

KRACKED UP

JIMMY Krakouer continues to cop the heavy treatment — and the bad luck — in the hurly-burly world of Victorian football.

The former Claremont rover had six stitches inserted in a cut above his right eyebrow after a first-quarter incident. He continued to play with a large piece of plaster over his forehead . . . but then he injured his suspect shoulder in the final term and had to leave the ground.

The Krakouers are certainly giving North Melbourne their money's worth . . . but Jim is starting to come under heavy fire in the big games and it seems as though the opposition sides are out to give him the hard treatment early to soften him up.



The club has since cleared Daryl Schimmelbusch to South Australia and released Peter Spencer back to East Perth — and with the Krakouers and Kym Hodgeman in such good form, it seems unlikely that Turco's services will be needed.

"Barry Cable has told me that I could still make it and I'll keep trying", says Turco. "Who knows, we may need a spare rover around finals time."

The recruiting of Turco back in 1980 was part of a panic move by North Melbourne when coach Ron Barassi felt that the club lacked rovers. It seems as though North went from the sublime to the ridiculous — ending up with more rovers than any other club in Australia almost.

BATTLING BARTLETT

KEVIN Bartlett might be a mean-looking footballer . . . and there isn't all that much of him.

But he doesn't lack heart and though he has probably just gone through the worst two weeks of his career; what with being reported (although he was cleared of the charge) and now being benched in last week's game.

But the fans haven't deserted little 'Hungry'. They still flocked around him after Richmond's game win over Footscray last week, confirming that he is still the Tigers' No. 1 footballer. Signing autographs has become a way of life for Bartlett . . . and a spell of poor form isn't going to affect him all that much.

Richmond coach — and close friend of Bartlett — Francis Bourke was quick to defend the little rover after he had been dragged from the ground.

"He took my decision like the gentleman he is", said Bourke. "He's just down a little at the moment, but I can't see why he cannot keep going. He just has to work a bit harder."

Phillips for VFL

ONE of South Australia's top defenders could be heading for the VFL.

Port Adelaide centre-half-back Greg Phillips has continued his brilliant form and may consider a move to Collingwood shortly.

He will almost certainly play the rest of the season with Port, but if he continues in the same fashion the VFL Magpies will step up their efforts to gain his signature.

He is a class player and would slot in nicely at Collingwood. However, there is a stumbling block — he is contracted to Port Adelaide until the end of the 1983 season.

By then Phillips' best days in football may have passed.

CENTRALS HOPES

CENTRAL District are determined to keep brilliant half-forward Michael Wright.

South Melbourne are keen to have him back playing for them, but the Bulldogs believe he is an important man for them in the immediate future.

After Wright was named in the South Australian squad, the Swans showed interest in having him back in their ranks. He has a contract with Central District until the end of this season.

BIG-HEADS TO ROLL

An angry South Melbourne coach Ricky Quade is set to axe a few players who he labelled as "lazy, big-headed and insipid."

His outburst came after Souths went down to Carlton by a massive 102 points.

"Players who have let us down in the past were there again today," Quade said after South Melbourne's worst defeat of the season.

"They will not be playing next week", was the only way Quade would identify the players, who he said had been around the club for several years.

Quade said that the match was full of challenges for a side who had hopes of emerging as a major contender now that the Sydney move had been initiated. But he said that the players failed the test.

Ross in front

North Melbourne's Ross Glendinning has taken over the lead in one of Victoria's main best-player awards.

Glendinning, who has been in scintillating form at centre-half-back for the Cable Roos, has opened up a two point lead in the Winfield-Sunday Press \$3,000 best player award.

Glendinning earned three votes for his game against Geelong last week and headed Hawthorn's Leigh Matthews and Essendon's Glen Hawker.

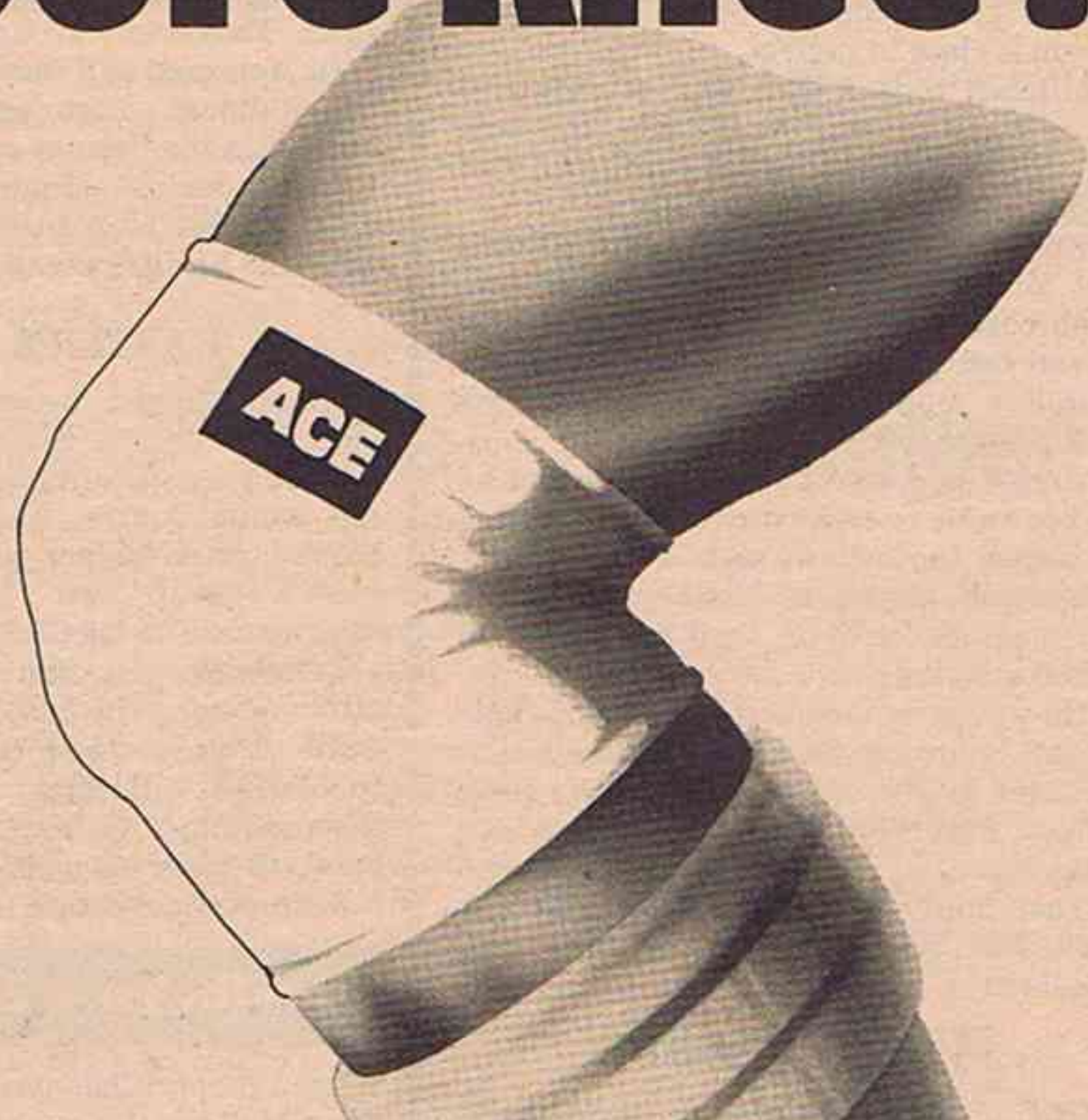
Glendinning's effort in a losing team was magnificent — he took 14 marks, had 21 kicks and shot out 11 handpasses.

POOR CROWDS

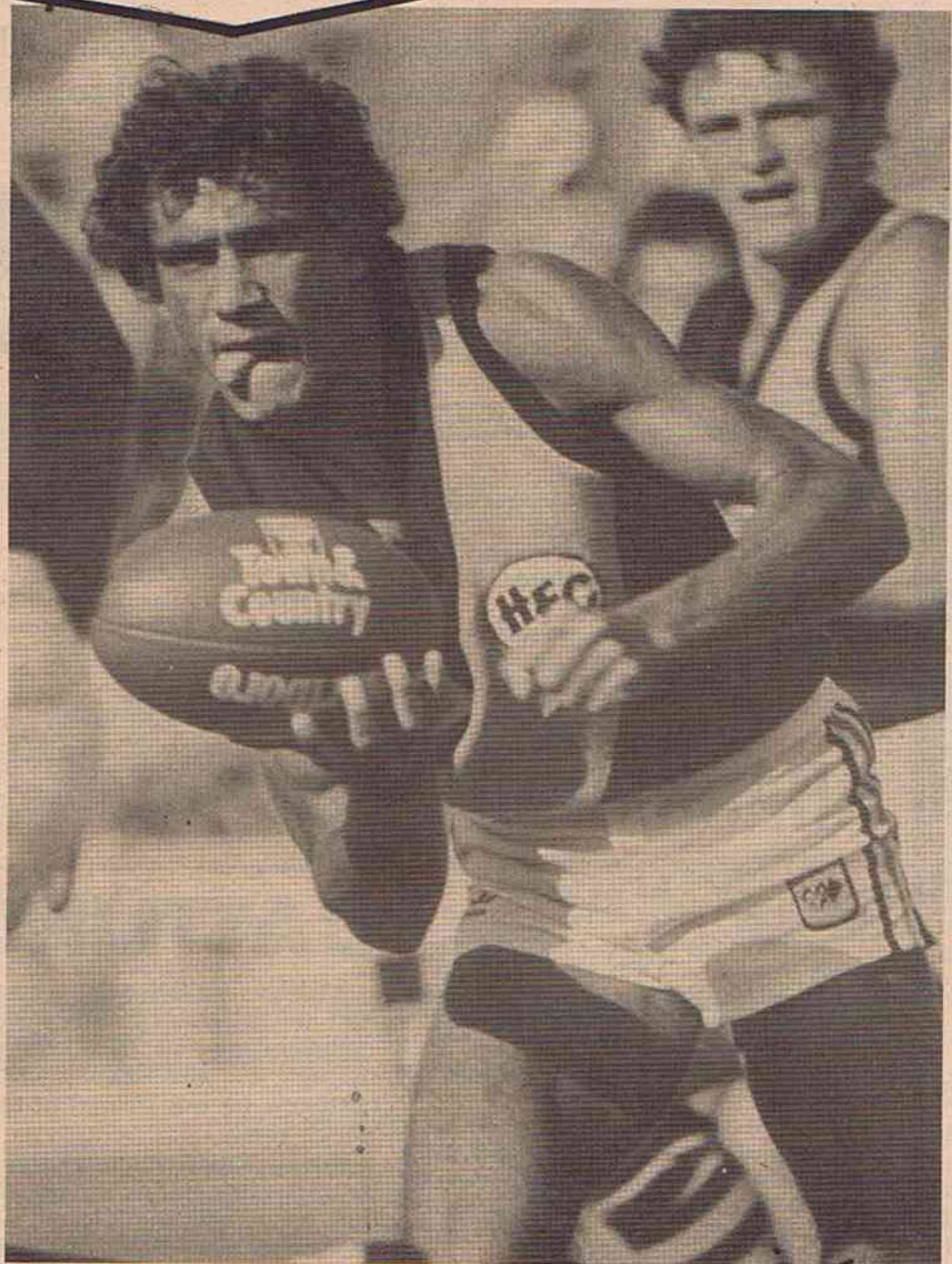

And it is a credit to his ability that he has been able to make such a big impression in league football in such a short time.

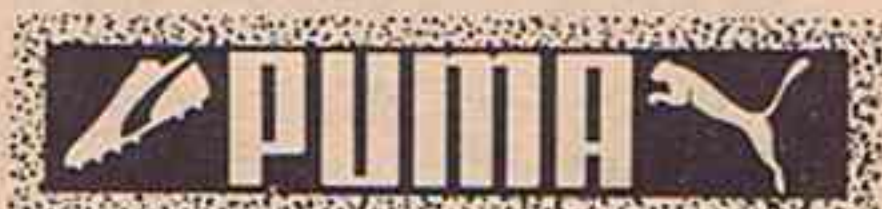
Mitchell played his first game in the match against Perth on April 24 and put up a good showing.

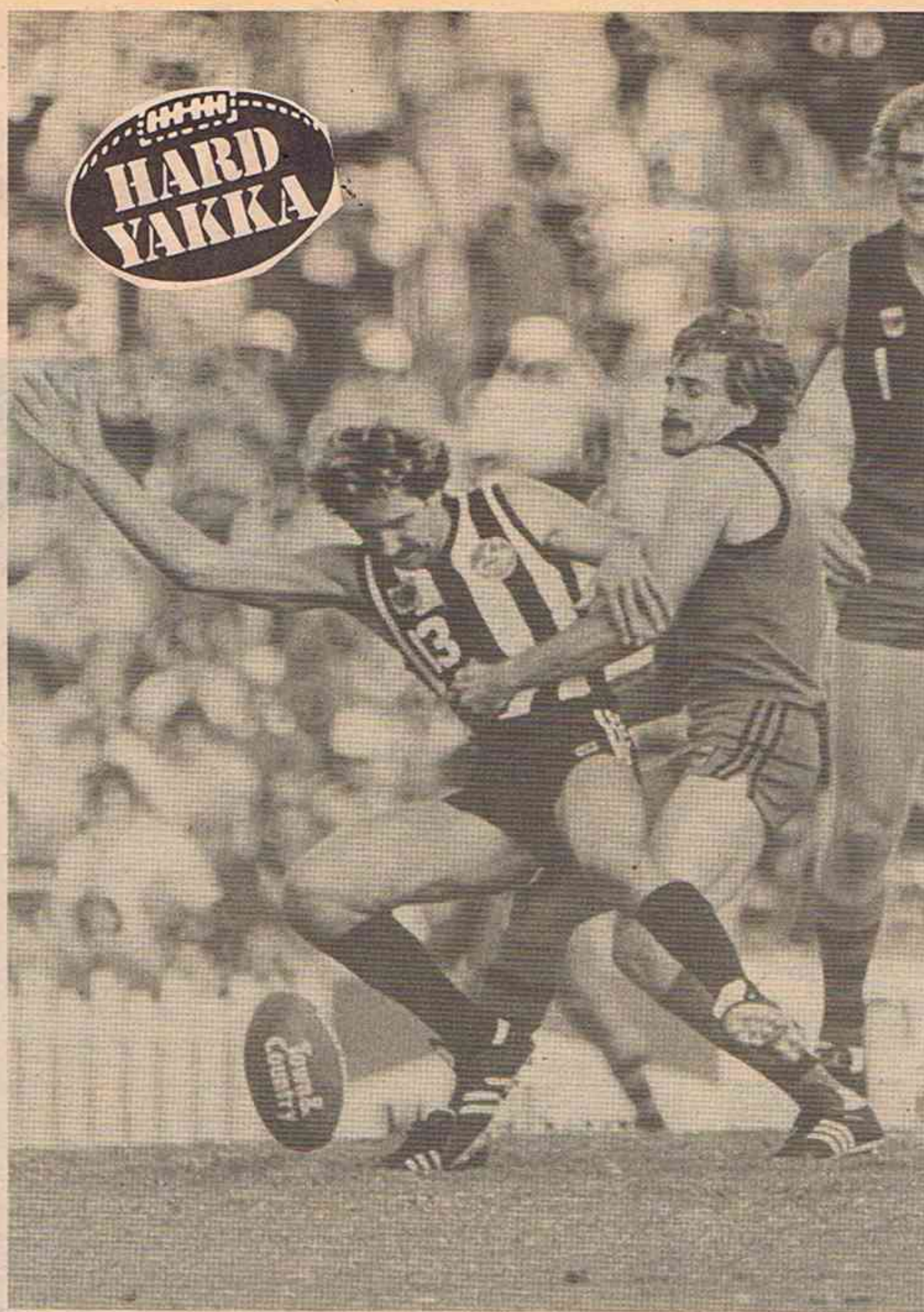

Wayne relinquishes his position as vice-captain and this will be filled by Mark Washfold for the rest of the season.

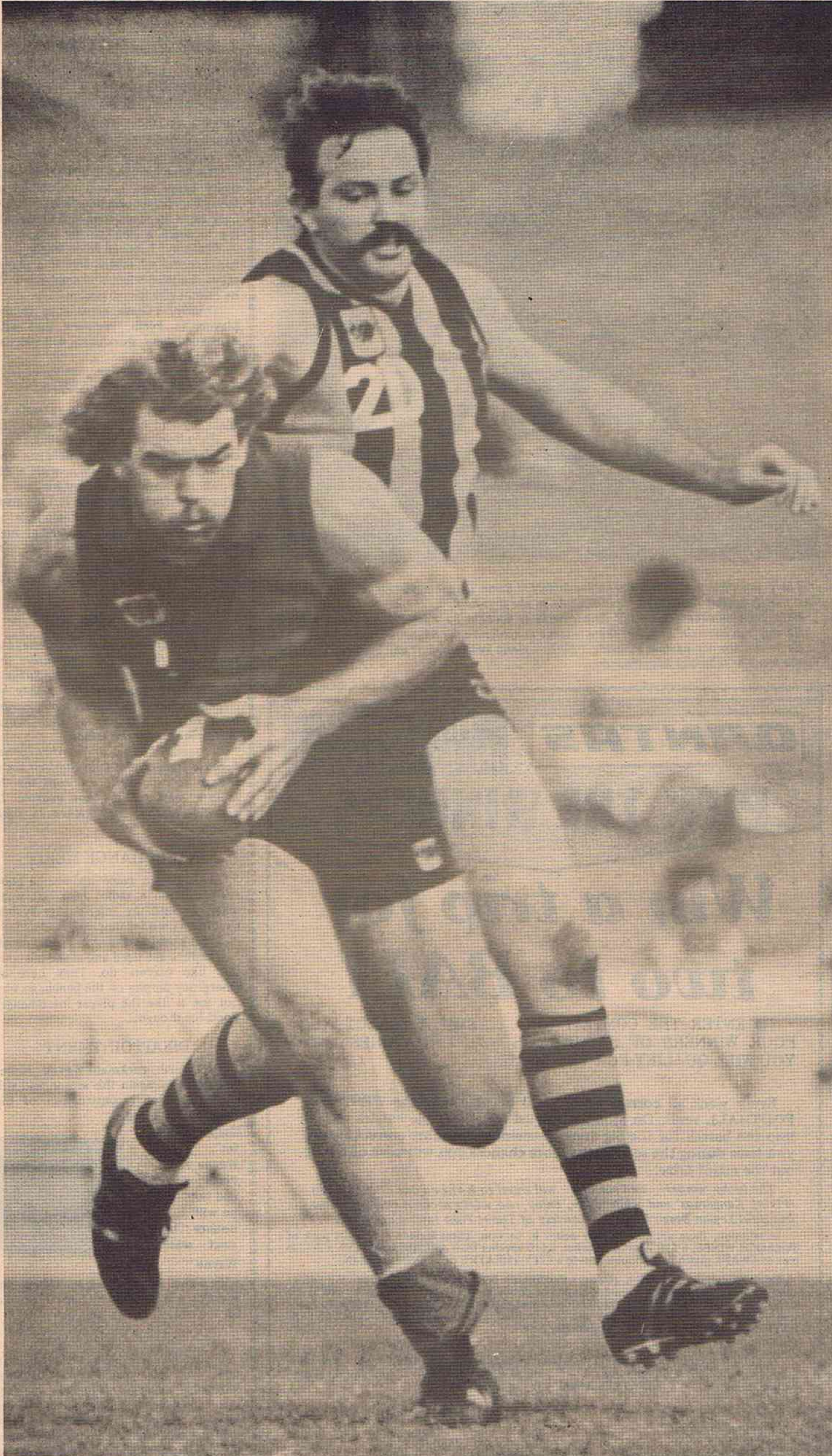
FUTURE FOOTWEAR

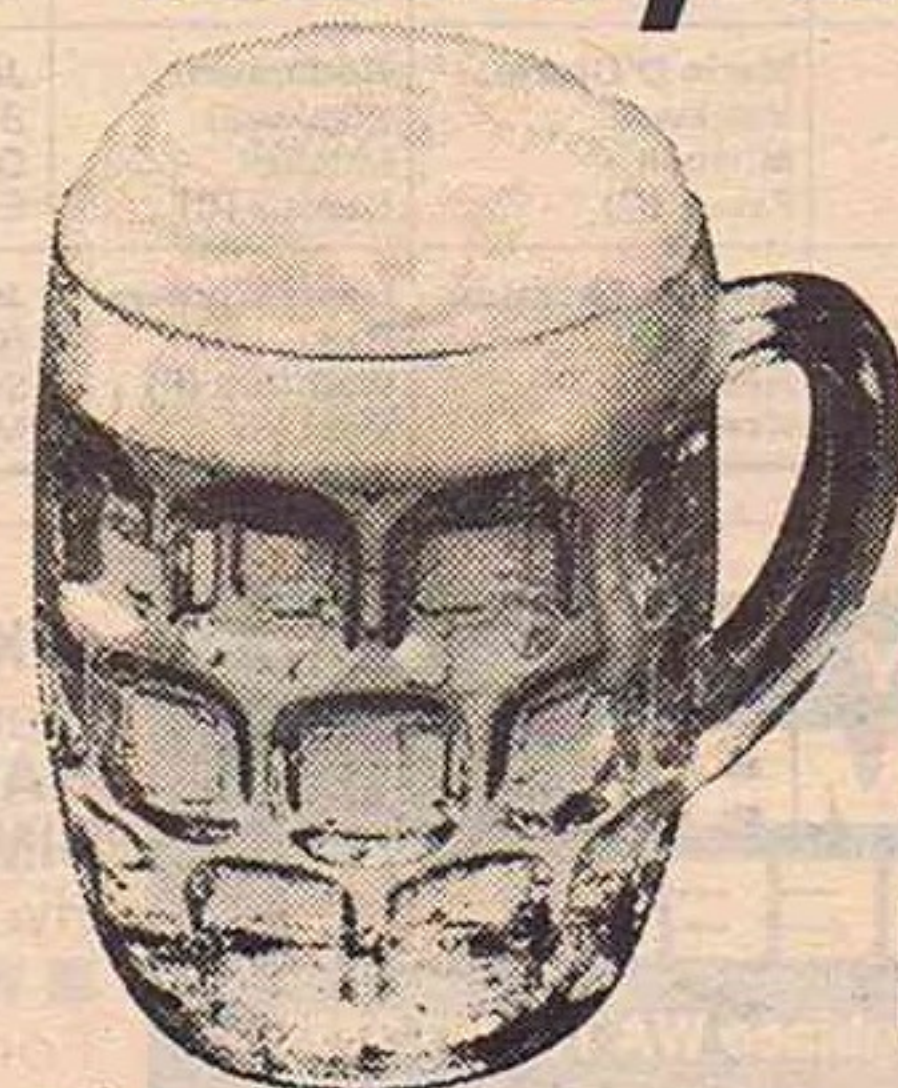

Drop in attendances a real problem

THE WAFL's \$30,000 advertising campaign to attract people to the football is probably viewed in some quarters as a rescue operation to arrest a decline in attendances this season.

Whatever the interpretation, it shows that football is not in very good shape outside the playing arena.

A 10 per cent drop in attendances over last year poses a real problem for the WAFL, particularly as it follows one of the worst attended seasons in the past 15 years.

While the campaign is a step in the right direction it must be perplexing for the WAFL to see attendances at such a low ebb even though it is proving to be a very absorbing season.

It shows that people have become more discerning as to how they spend their Saturday afternoons.

If football is to remain viable in WA then the WAFL has to get a greater share of the public dollar.

Increasing the entrance fee is not the answer. So what is the alternative?

It seems unlikely the WAFL will receive a significant share of the TAB cake, if any, even though it presented a very forceful and well documented submission to the Government on the matter.

I believe that football is not selling itself to the public in this State.

The WAFL relies too heavily on the media to do its promotion.

It's about time a more vigorous and professional approach was adopted. Football is big business. It should not remain in the hands of a group with vested interests.

The situation where the league comprises directors from each of the league clubs is archaic.

What football needs is a board of management, comprising successful business men.

Such a board should be intent on selling the game. As it is league clubs in this State too frequently fight each other, or allow their differences to spill into the public arena.

It does not help football when league presidents engage in verbal fisticuffs over clearances or on-field incidents.

It only retards the game.

East Perth and Claremont showed pre-season what a joint promotion can achieve. In staging matches against VFL clubs Carlton and Essendon they shared in the kind of promotion football badly needs in this State.

One possibility thrown up in conversation by former football writer Len Owens is for clubs to promote their own games.

But there would need to be an incentive. If they were guaranteed a percentage of the gate for attracting a certain number of people to matches then it could help stimulate attendances.

Old men show how . . .

THE old men of football. There are quite a few of them around at the moment, but three I saw at Bassendean Oval last Saturday could show some of their younger counterparts a thing or two.

John Hayes, Stan Nowotny and Graham Melrose showed that age is no barrier if you have an appetite for football.

Though well into the twilight of their careers, they all made a significant contribution.

Hayes is running around like a spring lamb, Melrose is astute as ever and Nowotny displays an exuberance that is a credit to the game.

Nowotny receives little recognition for the hard work he does at centre-half-forward for Swans each week, yet he makes it easier for his team-mates the way he goes in after the ball . . . and tough for opposing backmen.

Each of these players set an example that a few of the younger players would do well to follow.

Violence in the South West

FOOTBALL violence has not been restricted to the WAFL this season.

Augusta-Margaret River player Ian Mumme had his career cut short after receiving a punch in the head in a South West National Football League match three weeks ago.

Mumme had shepherded solidly and in doing so hurt a Bunbury opponent. Mumme was then hit from behind and was carried from the ground unconscious.

Medical opinion now indicates that he is a diabetic and at 24, his football career is over.

He is also resigned to the fact that he will probably have to sever his ties with his other sporting loves.

Mumme, together with the player who struck him, appeared before the tribunal and both were suspended on striking charges.

The effects of that sort of incident, which sparked an all-in-brawl, can be far-reaching. It does not encourage parents to promote their children into the great Australian game.

Who wants to see their off-spring carted off on a stretcher while playing a sport which is meant to be enjoyable?

A sportsman's whole life has been changed by a game on a Sunday afternoon.

In the country the players take the field to win — just like they do in the WAFL. But football is not their lives. They have to work on Monday and support their families. For this reason it is even more imperative that the violence be taken out of country football.

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THE GREAT GOALKICKERS



Western Australia has produced some prolific goalkickers over the years and in this eight-part series *Westside Football* has looked at some of the greatest from each of the league clubs.

Over the past seven weeks *Westside Football* writer GARY STOCKS has peered into the past to bring back memories of the men who have thrilled the crowds with their uncanny goal sense.

This week, in the last of these special features, we feature league leaders, Swan Districts...



Versatility cost Holdsworth goalkicking fame

When looking through the Swan Districts record books one name stands out above all others in the goalkicking list — Ted Holdsworth was undoubtedly a champion.

Although he never led the goalkicking list for the West Australian Football League, he was a prolific scorer.

And his feats would have been greater had it not been for the war and the fact that he was so versatile.

Holdsworth, on many occasions, would kick five or six goals at full-forward in the first half of a match only to be moved to centre-half-forward in an effort to create more opportunities for his side.

He was a high marking player who was suited to either position, but he finished his career playing full-back — the position he says he enjoyed the most.

Holdsworth led the Swan Districts goalkicking list seven times and was the first player at the club to notch the magical 100 in one season.

In fact, in 1937 he was well on the road to a record when he broke his hand and missed the final five games.

In the first 14 games of that season he kicked 109 goals and seemed destined to be the first Swan Districts player to head the goalkicking table.

However, fate played its part and Holdsworth was the fifth highest goalkicker for the season.

It is unusual for a player to kick that many goals and not be in the top three, but there were some great forwards around during his time, including Ron Tucker, George Doig, Ted Tyson, George Moloney and Bert Gook.

Holdsworth kicked 10 or more goals three times and on May 1, 1937 he booted 10 majors out of Swans' total of 12 goals in a match against East Perth. A truly remarkable performance.

He also recalls kicking eight of Swan Districts nine goals in one game.

He began his career as a full-forward and says that he relied more on his marking ability and accurate torpedo punt than on leading.

Until last year, when Simon Beasley registered 119 goals, he was the only Swan player to ever reach triple figures.

His highest tally in league football was recorded in 1938 when he booted 116, but this time his attempt to head the table was foiled by West Perth champion Ted Tyson, who kicked 126 goals.

A tribute to this man's ability was that he booted 80 goals during the course of the 1945 season while playing solely at centre-half-forward.

His ability to read the play contributed greatly to his efforts in that memorable year.

Holdsworth would probably be successful in this day and age.

Versatility is the key to a footballer's make-up nowadays and that is something

Holdsworth certainly had. He started as a half-forward-flanker, moved to full-forward, then took over at centre-half-forward and later played most of his football at full-back, with the occasional run as a half-back.

He represented Western Australia in his two favourite positions — full-back and full-forward.

And Holdsworth is the type of man who does not take out of football without putting something back into the sport.

He has been involved with Swan Districts for 48 years. Firstly as a player and later in an administrative role. He is now the trustee of the club.

And besides that, he is also doing his bit for the development of junior footballers.

He is currently chairman of the junior council tribunal.

Holdsworth is a life member of the WAFL and recently received a Merit Certificate from the Australian National Football Council.

Swan Districts have not had many outstanding forwards, but Holdsworth's contribution to the game would offset the non-appearance of other top goalkickers.

In recent times they have produced players like Max George, Mark Olsen and Simon Beasley who were first-class forwards, but they were few between.

Holdsworth produced his last bag of 10 goals against Perth on September 3, 1938 and it was not until June 1974 that another Swan player reached double figures.

That was Max George and it was in the same season that he became the first player from Bassendean to head the goalkicking

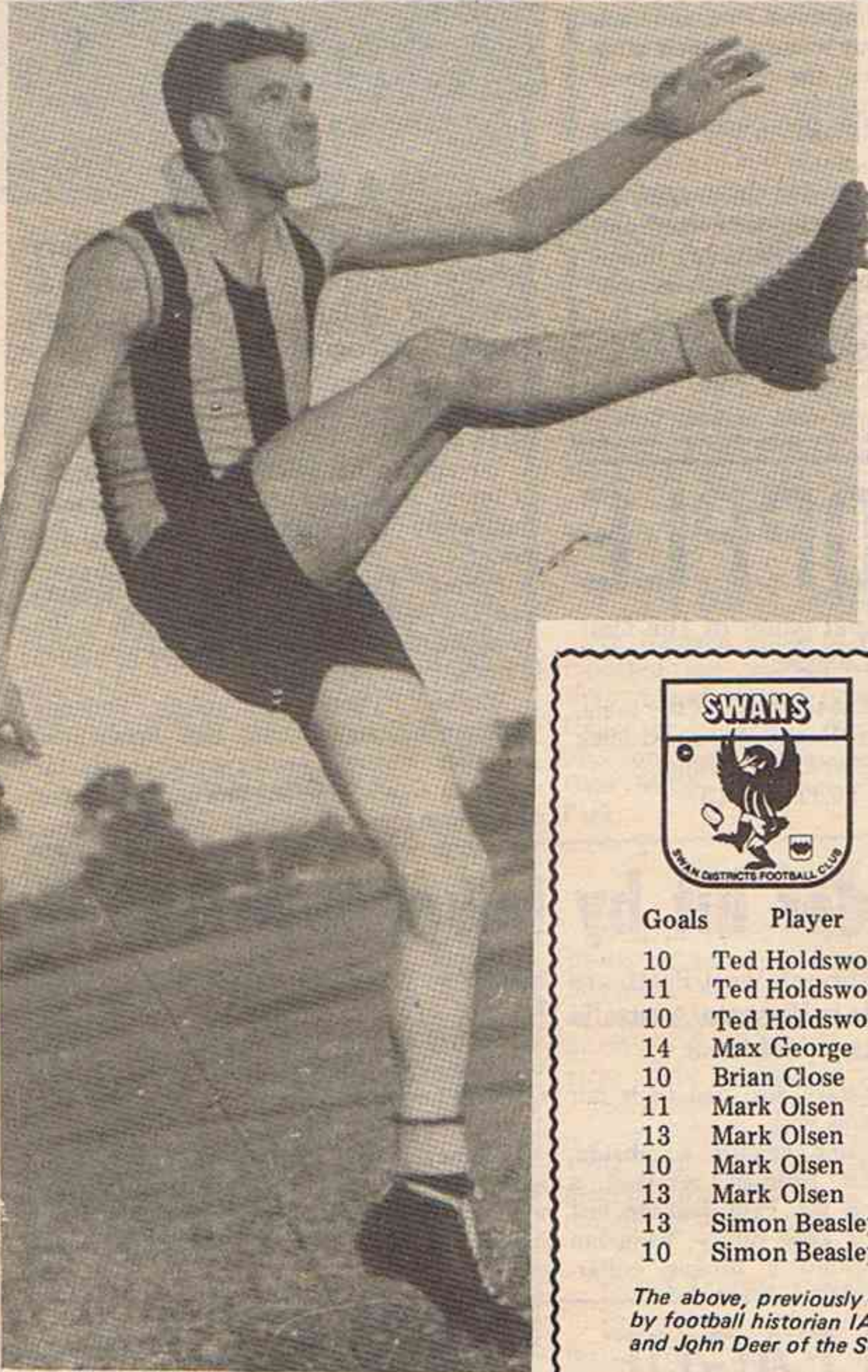

table when he kicked 90 goals. George remained alone as the Swan Districts player to head the table until Simon Beasley emerged on the scene.

It was in 1980 that Beasley shared the goalkicking award with Claremont's Warren Ralph.

However, Ralph kicked five goals when Beasley was away with the State side in South Australia. Ralph really kicked 87 for the season, but the directors chose to eliminate these from the record books and this brought his tally back to 82 — the same as Beasley.

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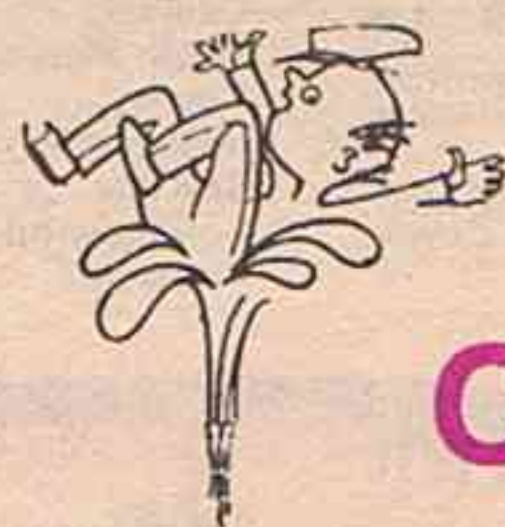
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
