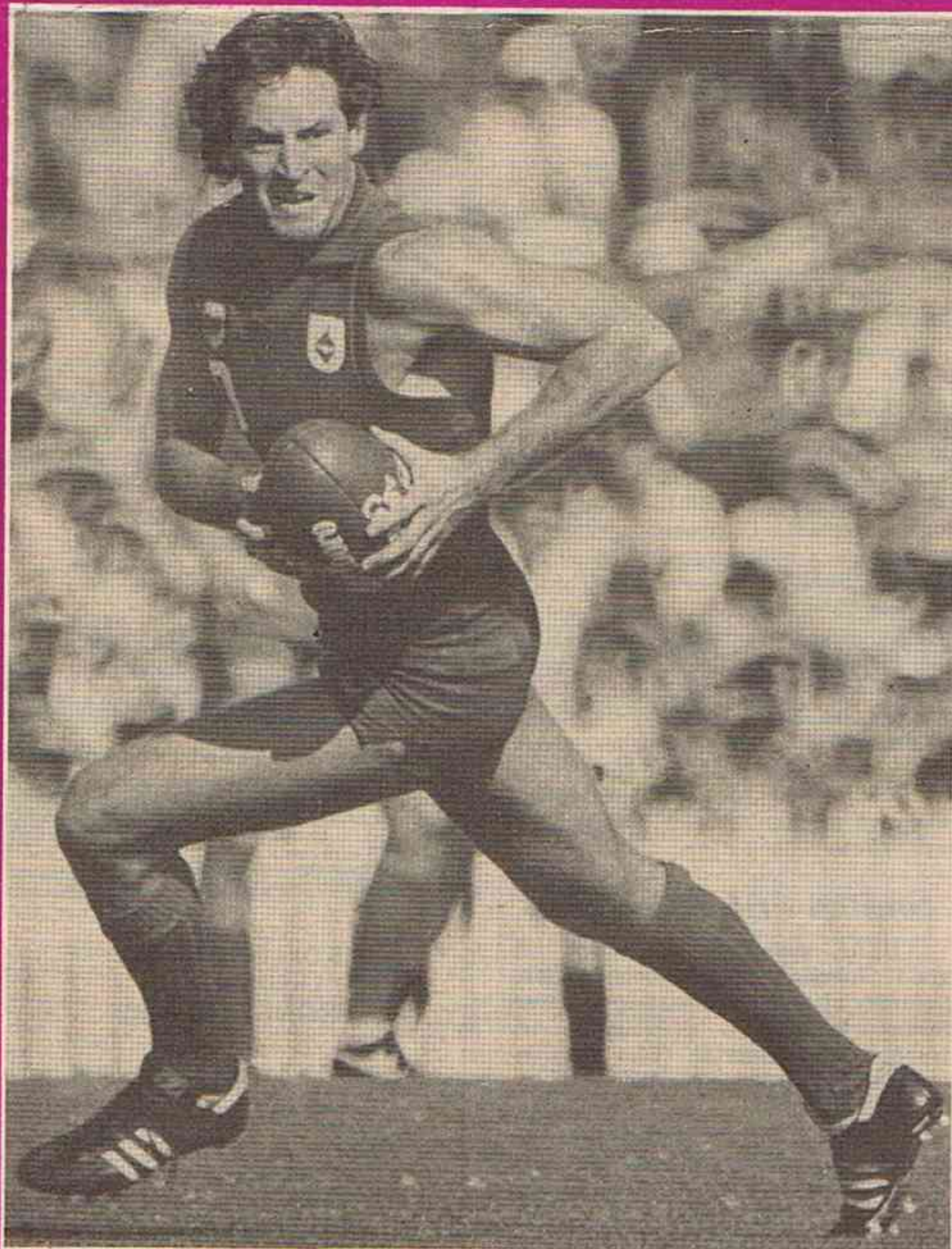

SPENCER REJECTS CABLE CLAIM

EAST Perth's Peter Spencer has rejected comments made by North Melbourne coach Barry Cable about the reasons for his return to WA.

In a Victorian football newspaper, Cable outlined reasons why Spencer had not succeeded in VFL football.

Cable said Spencer came back to WA because he could no longer cope with the tempo of VFL football and he added that Spencer could not be persuaded to continue his career at North.

However, Spencer has a different opinion as to the circumstances of his surprise return to East Perth three weeks ago.

He said he had been disenchanted at North Melbourne because in pre-season matches and the first few home-and-away games, he had been used mainly off the interchange bench — no matter how well he had played the previous week.

"I spent most of the time on and off the bench," Spencer says. "Even though my possessions were high, I was still taken from the ground.

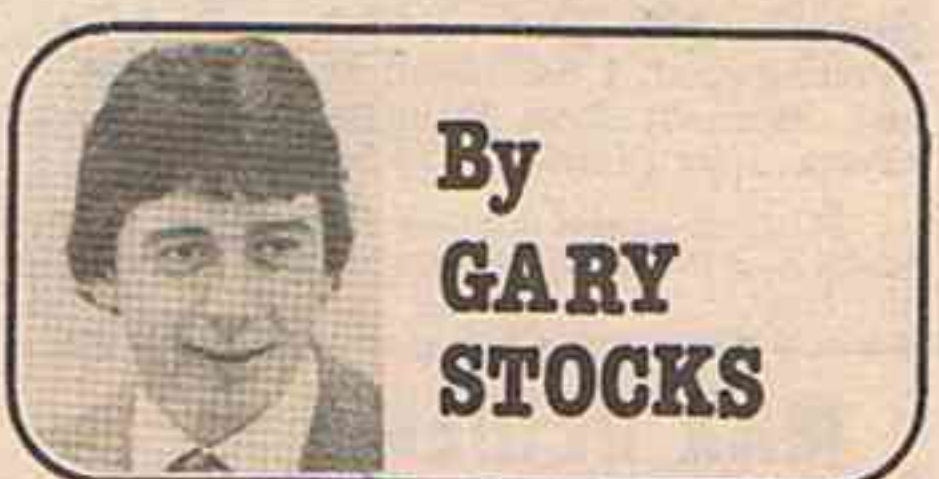
"In one game against Collingwood I thought I was doing pretty well, but spent the entire last quarter out of the game.

"Then, a couple of weeks later, I was dropped to the reserves for the match against Melbourne.

"I set my mind to the task of putting in a top game in the reserves so that I could win my place back in the senior side.

"However, the following morning I decided to talk with Barry to find out how my future stood at the North Melbourne Football Club.

"After talking for an hour with Barry, I realised that I had no future with North.

"At no stage did he indicate to me that I was still required at the club.

"If he had asked me to wait for a few weeks to see how things developed, I would still be playing for North Melbourne.

"I felt that it was a waste of time hanging around and went to see Ron Joseph," Spencer said.

Spencer said that he had also heard that Cable had said that he had lost too much pace and was a big risk in games at Waverley or the MCG.

Which, in effect, would mean that even if Spencer had continued with the Roos he would not have played in any of their finals sides.

Since coming back to East Perth, Spencer has been one of his side's best contributors and has been selected in the State squad.

He hopes to earn a place in the side that meets Victoria in July because "I have a few things to prove".

Spencer will be expected to play a big role in the vital match against West Perth this Saturday.

The winner will be in a strong position to earn a finals berth.

Top Falcon out of action

WEST Perth's high priced Essendon recruit, Wayne Foreman, could be out of action for the rest of the season.

He goes into hospital next week for an Achilles tendon operation — and his future is under a cloud.

Foreman has played just four games with West Perth since coming to WA.

Although he hopes to be training soon after the operation, time is running out for him to play a major role in the Falcons' bid to reach the finals for the first time since 1978.

He was recruited by West Perth in an effort to boost their mobile division, but has been out of action since the match against Perth on May 1.

The injury came at a bad time for the former Bomber. He was just starting to settle into his new surroundings and to have an influence on West Perth's performances.

Foreman also took over the role as the club's development officer when recruited for the 1982 season.

He will be in hospital for four days.

The news comes at a time when coach Dennis Cometti has had to recover from the loss of 10 of his senior players who have been out of action.

Bumper crowd

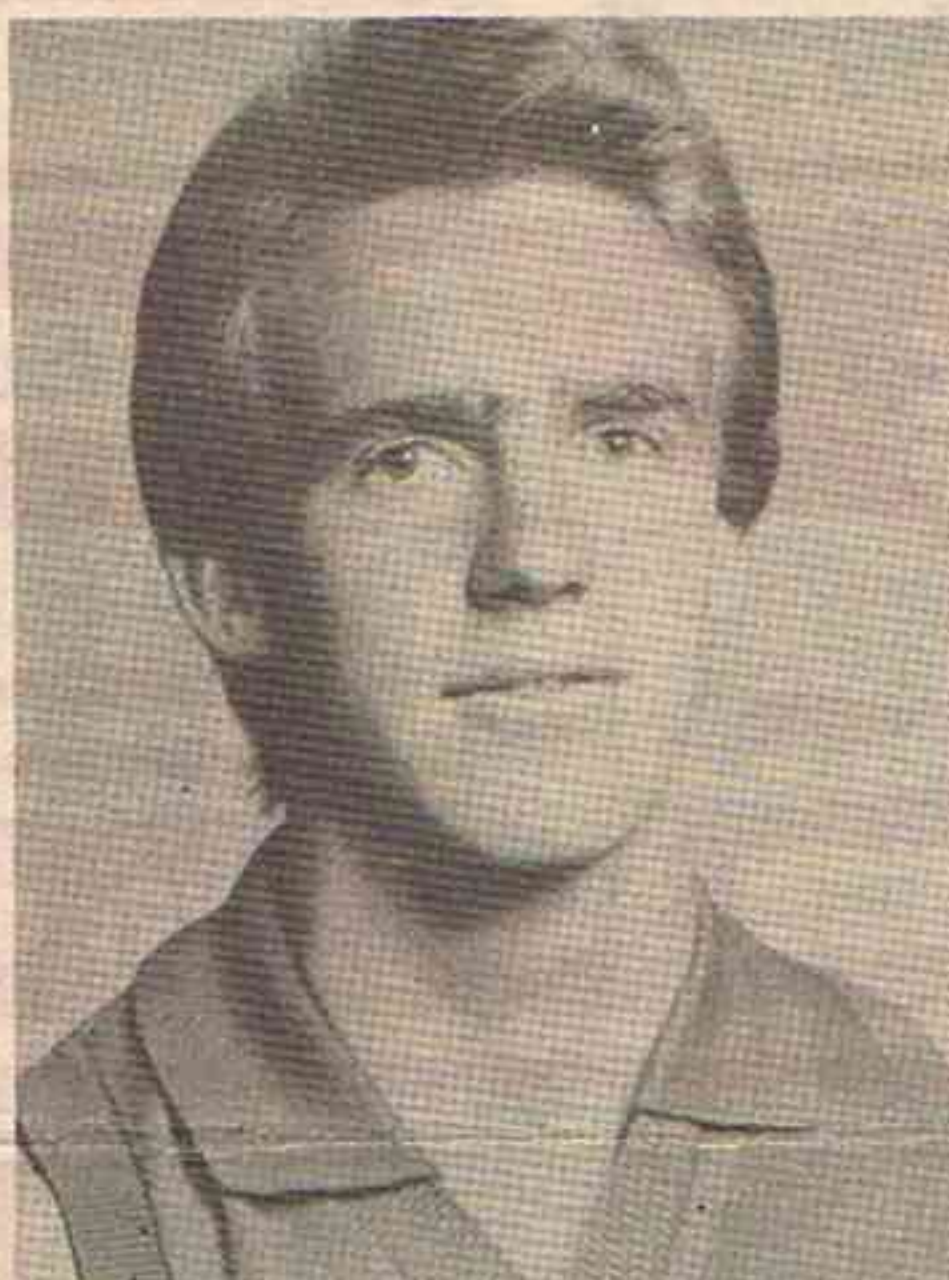

How about a final five in WA?

EVERYTIME the question of having a final five in WA football is raised the reply is: "Not with only eight sides in the competition".

BUT I fail to see why eight teams would be any different to nine or 10.

I think football would gain in a lot of ways.

Firstly — and most importantly — the hopes of the lower sides in the competition of making the five would last longer into the season.

As it is now, the hopes of making the four have been over for sides like Perth and Subiaco since the end of the first round, only seven weeks into the season.

Perth would need a miracle to make the four and Subiaco have no hope whatsoever.

With a final five, all teams would still have a chance, until at least the start of the final round of fixtures. This would encourage clubs to try just that little extra in all games, making the season much more competitive and profitable for both themselves and the West Australian Football League.

Still on the gain side of the suggestion is the extra two final-round games provided by the formation of the final five — and it would not need to extend the season.

The first two finals could be played on the same day — second and third positions play at Subiaco Oval and the fourth and fifth at a neutral ground named by the league.

Grounds could be named well in advance as only three alternative venues would need to be allocated.

The two additional finals will of course, provide more revenue for both the clubs involved and the league itself.

Maybe it would be the shot in the arm football is looking for in Western Australia.

Panel shows

IT amazes me how clubs don't follow Swan Districts' lead with Sunday morning panel shows for their members.

The Swans show is well organised (with star players from the previous day's game on the panel) and is attended by large audiences throughout the season.

With a little thought and effort, other clubs could be filling their social premises on a Sunday morning and providing their members with the sort of football atmosphere they deserve.

Sensible outcome

IT'S good to hear that the league coaches and league directors have now agreed to supply sides to the media on Thursday nights.

For the past two seasons, some of the sides supplied to the press have been so ridiculous that club supporters have lost a lot of interest in placing of players — and the continual "ribbing" between supporters of rival sides has been missing from workplaces around town on Fridays.

Small man is back!

IN the mid-seventies it looked as if the small man was finished in Australian Rules football.

To be a rover West Australia or Victoria would not even consider a smaller build than Hawthorn's lethal Leigh Matthews.

Even six footers (180cm) were becoming a must for the wing positions — Keith Greig won two Brownlows from a wing.

But now, in the early eighties, the skillfulness of the small man is back, both in Victoria and West Australia.

Rovers of the calibre of Tony Buhagiar, Wayne Otway, Jim and Phil Krakouer have not only succeeded in WA football but are now proving a drawcard in Victoria.

Not one of the quartet is anywhere near 180cm and the Krakouer's and Otway are only lightly framed. But what they lack in physical build they make up for with sheer brilliant ball handling skills and kicking in

all areas — accurate short passing, amazing goal-front accuracy and, at times, their long kicks are almost unbelievable.

Wing positions are again being filled by the smaller, pacier players as well.

Take Swans for instance, they have received excellent service in recent years from the Narkle brothers, Keith (170cm) and Phil (175cm).

All clubs, in fact, have had success lately with wingmen under 180cm — Claremont: Allen Daniels (179cm), Darrell Panizza (179cm). West Perth: Peter Mengaglio (170cm). East Perth: Ross Kerr (172cm), Larry Kickett (172cm). East Fremantle: John Sims (167cm), Graham Kickett (177cm). South Fremantle: Stuart Hillier (177cm), Benny Vigona (179cm). Subiaco: Neil Taylor (174cm). Perth: Kim Coleman (175cm).

So this in itself is proof that there is still room for the skillfulness of the small player in Australian football.

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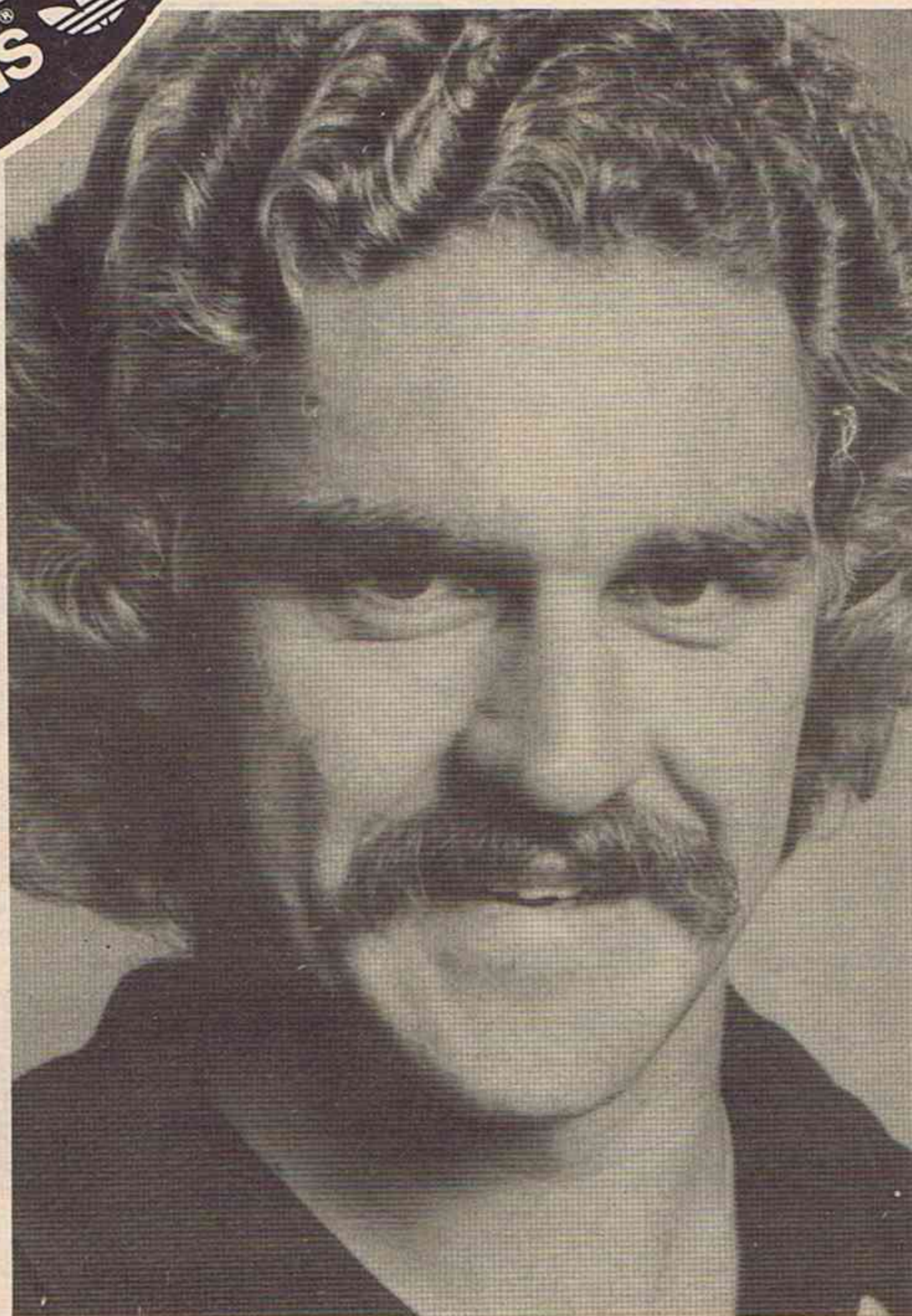
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Battler takes on Lions captaincy

Subiaco wingman Neil Taylor always had potential.

But until last year he had just been a player and that was all. He was nothing special.

However, he emerged as a top player in 1981 and was rewarded with selection in the State training squad and went on to win Subiaco's fairest and best award.

Now he is the club captain — something no one would have expected of the tigerish little wingman just two years ago. He was only a week to week proposition in the league side.

And it is to his credit that he was able to shake off the shackles which seemed destined to bind him throughout his career. From being barely a league footballer Taylor has become one of the most consistent performers in senior ranks.

He works hard and has developed into one of the Lions' most valuable players.

Taylor leads by example and it is not his fault that Subiaco are languishing at the bottom of the premiership table.

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to Taylor and found out the reasons for his improved form over the last two seasons.

He seems to play with more confidence these days and although he was not chosen in the West Australian 20 for last year's match against South Australia he says he learned a lot from just training with the best players in the State.

Q: You were struggling with your own form a little up until last year, what was the big difference which saw you improve so much?

A: As the team began to play better we gained momentum and I think all the players at Subiaco became more consistent and played with a greater deal of enthusiasm. And I think through that we gained in confidence in one another and that helped me play better.

Q: How did you feel about getting in the State squad for the South Australian game last year?

A: I thought it was a great thrill just to be able to train with the best players in the State. It was a good experience.

Q: Did you learn a bit from training with the top players?

A: I think you can always learn something from other players, particularly players from other clubs. It is certainly an experience and you gain something extra from the other players all the time.

Q: Were you disappointed that you did not get a game?

A: I was fairly surprised to be included in the squad for a start and thought that maybe it was a step forward, but I was not confident of getting a game so I was not too disappointed when I missed selection.

Q: And what about this year? Will you be looking to maintain your form and work your way back into the squad?

A: My first concern is, of course, for the club. We are not going too well so I would like to see us winning games more than personal achievement.

Q: How do you feel about being club captain?

A: It was a great honour to be chosen as the club captain. I think it is the pinnacle of one's career. Over the last few years a number of Subiaco's senior players have left the club and we generally lack experience. With those guys out of the picture I guess they only had three or four to choose from and I am honoured to have been given the job.

Q: Ken Armstrong said pre-season that it would be a step backwards if Subiaco missed out on the four. What has been going wrong?

A: I don't think that the other clubs have picked up so much, nor do I think that we have slipped back a great deal. I don't think some of the scores are indicative of the way we have played. I think we have missed a number of opportunities and as the coach says, I think at times we are our own worst enemies. We make it hard for ourselves. But I am sure with the perseverance and the hard work the guys are putting in we will put it together. You only have to have a look at the guys who get here early. They all get stuck into weights or some other exercise while waiting for training to begin. There is no question about it, we are putting the work in.

Q: What sort of an influence has Ken Armstrong had on yourself and Subiaco in general?

A: Well, Ken is a great motivator and a positive thinker and I feel that a little bit of that has rubbed off on everyone at the club and that has helped to build our enthusiasm and our confidence at the club and certainly me, personally.

Q: Has playing with your brother, Brian helped you by putting a bit of pressure on you to perform each week?

A: It is good to play with Brian. I don't

know whether it has helped or not but I am glad to be playing in the same team as Brian and I am sure that everyone else who has a brother playing dreams of being in the same side. You seem to be able to read each other's game better than someone outside your own family. You work together when you have the ball. We don't particularly look for each other more than our team mates its just that we seem to be able to read each others game better.

Q: Can Subiaco get to the stage they were at last year when they were putting pressure on top sides and even winning a few against teams in the four?

A: I think we can. For example, in our first game against West Perth this year we probably had more possessions and more scoring shots and we should have won that. The same thing happened against East Fremantle. We are getting possession of the ball — its just a matter of using it better. We get the ball into our forward line and squander opportunities. But it has to come together for us eventually and all I hope is that it is in the not too distant future.

Q: As you say, a lot of the senior players have left Subiaco in recent seasons — what effect has this had on the younger players?

A: Some of the guys here have been expected to mature a lot faster than perhaps players at other clubs. Where another club will introduce one or two new players in a season we would blood anything up to about eight. Our young guys are forced to come up a lot quicker.

Q: Last year was undoubtedly your best season in league football. How did you feel about winning the club's fairest and best award?

A: As far as personal achievement goes it is for individual sports. But it was a thrill to win Subiaco's fairest and best award. With a team sport everyone is at the same club for a specific purpose and that is to win a premiership and everyone shares in that success. I guess these awards roll along and if you pick them up that's fine but I would rather play in a premiership side. Actually I would like to play in a finals side. I have been here eight years now and I have never played in a final round game. In 1974 we won the colts grand final and that was the only finals game I have ever played. It is fine for the colts and reserves to have success — and our colts and reserves are going well now. But when someone says who won the premiership last year you don't ask league, reserves or colts? All that matters is who wins the league premiership.

Q: Have you always supported Subiaco?

A: No. I barracked for Claremont until I came down here to play colts. I come from Woodlands and that is Subiaco territory. We moved there when I was very young, but I still supported Claremont.

Q: Have you had any injury problems during your career?

A: Only minor injuries. There has never been anything which has kept me out of action for up to six weeks. I have only been sidelined for one or two weeks.

Q: And what about your own future?

A: I would like to think that my future lies here. I am sure that if I hang around long enough success will come our way. All we have to do is persevere and I would like to be here when we win a flag.

SOUTH STOP KIDDING

SO South Fremantle have finally stopped kidding everyone. They gave the appearance, until the past two weeks, that they would be struggling to make the four this season.

However, two fighting wins against West Perth and Claremont show that they are back to the form, and frame of mind, that enabled them to play off in the last three grand finals.

But, isn't it noticeable just how much Souths form depends on that of their star ruckman Stephen Michael.

They were struggling early, when he was showing indifferent form. But now that he's back to his top so also are South.

Having taken a grip on second place South are unlikely to allow East Fremantle to loosen it when they meet in the derby at Fremantle Oval on Monday.

Even so, it should be a desperate affair. Old Easts have to win this match to stay in touch with the top four. So far they have tended to plod along behind the other sides vying for a place in the four, but a loss in this match will probably catapult them out of finals contention this year.

On current form they should take a further step in that direction against East Perth on Saturday.

They had the Royals on toast when they met in the first round but got the stagers in the second half to go down.

These two sides usually have close encounters with the home ground advantage being the deciding factor.

However, the Falcons will need to forget about last week's big win against Swans if they want to steal a break on one of the sides they are vying with for a place in the four.

East Perth are usually at their best when they have their backs to the wall and despite two losses in their past three matches have the ability to win this match. It all adds up to a great game.

Parkin called for a total commitment from every player — and they responded.

Parkin said that he spoke to each of the 20 players individually at the break. He asked them was there a reason why he couldn't give a total commitment for the team in the final term. There wasn't a "no" among them — and the Blues stormed home.



Dons stay put

ESSENDON are not the only VFL club playing selfish when it comes to winning the big crowds through the turnstiles.

The Dons have rejected a Carlton plea to transfer their June 14 clash from Windy Hill to the MCG — following the pattern set by Collingwood who are reluctant to surrender their home games when it is obvious that the match can draw a bumper crowd.

Carlton's general manager, Ian Collins, said that the club was disappointed at Essendon's decision because it would have given a lot more fans the chance to see a top class game.

He had another secret reason for being disappointed — it would have given Carlton a valuable run on the MCG, the venue for the grand final.

Carlton's only other game at the MCG before the finals is its return match against Richmond on August 14.

Blight's burst

THE effect that former coach Malcolm Blight has on North Melbourne's fortunes was well illustrated when the Roos thrashed Footscray last week.

Blight, replaced mid-season last year by WA's Barry Cable, booted 7.7 from full-forward and helped North to a 58-point win over Footscray.

Blight's effect on North's forward line is dynamic and he could easily have booted 12 goals as he picked up 18 kicks, missing several easy shots.

In the same game, there was a decided WA influence apart from the effect of Cable's tongue-lashing on North after their loss to Geelong a week earlier.

Former Swan Districts forward Simon Beasley booted three goals, but had his share of problems. Beasley was well held by David Dench and when he was moved out to centre-half-forward he copped a knock that set him back — and forced him to recuperate back at full-forward.

McGlashan, 24, has managed only five senior games in his two years at Melbourne and though St Kilda have shown an interest in obtaining his services, he has stayed in Ron Barassi's camp.

"I had something to prove today," he said after the big win. "I had to prove I was worthy of a senior game."

RUMOURS HURT

A **MILLION** dollars of football talent hit the deck in a flurry of arms and legs on Saturday ... and the Footscray fans had their hearts in their mouths.

Templeton is currently the subject of fairly strong rumours that he will be on the open market at the end of this season — and bids will go high for the Brownlow Medallist.

However, he says that he is prepared to negotiate a new contract with Footscray after the final game of 1982.

In the meantime, his form with Footscray is just a little better than ordinary ... his best effort this season was a seven goal burst — and that was for Victoria in the State game against South Australia.

Krakouer dislocated a shoulder a week ago and seemed destined to spend time on the sidelines as the injury was similar to one that kept him out of pre-season action.

However, the shoulder joint has slipped back into place and the North doctor believes that he will only miss two or three games.

BIG GUNS FIRE

ESSENDON, the glamour team of last year's qualifying matches, have two of their big guns returning to top form as the season enters the half-way zone.

Paul Van Der Haar and Simon Madden were both in brilliant form last week as the Bombers shot down St Kilda by 30 points.

The flying Dutchman Van Der Haar started on the interchange bench because of poor recent form, but came on early in the match and picked up 23 kicks at centre-half-back ... and was voted best-on-ground.

Madden, who hit rock bottom earlier this season with a two-week spell in the reserves, booted six goals from full-forward ... and watched younger brother Justin win 38 knockouts in the ruck.

PORT ADVANCE

Reigning South Australian premiers, Port Adelaide, advanced to second place on the league ladder last Sunday with a crushing win over West Torrens.

Last weekend's matches ended the first half of qualifying fixtures for the 1982 season with Sturt clear leaders ... winning eight of their first nine matches. Glenelg, West Adelaide and Norwood make-up the remainder of the five.

Norwood had to wait till the final quarter before they were assured of victory last Saturday over bottom side, Woodville.

Woodville grabbed the lead several times in the last half, giving coach Rod Olsson hope that they would break the ice. But they couldn't quite go on with it and Norwood won by 10 points.

WYNNE BACK

John Wynne was an instant hit when he made his first league appearance for Norwood since the 1980 grand final.

The former West Perth star was making his 200th senior appearance in South Australia. He has notched up 192 club and eight State games for South Australia.

South Adelaide rover Mark Naley — a hero of South Australia's great performance against Victoria recently — has rejected offers to join South Melbourne.

Naley, only 21 years old, has a big future in football, but says he likes the way of life in South Australia and wishes to stay there ... at least for the time being.

NORM SOWDON and IAN EVERETT

CHAMPIONS OF TWO SPORTS

Like South Australia, Victoria and to a lesser degree, Tasmania, Western Australia has had a host of footballer-cricketers, some of whom have reached Test standard, a greater number have attained to State cricket and many have reached Pennant status.

In Test cricket or overseas touring parties we have had players such as Derek Chadwick (East Perth), Des Hoare (East Fremantle), Mick Malone (Subiaco), Neil Hawke (East Perth), Keith Slater (Swan Districts and Subiaco), and Ernest Bromley (East Perth) — the last known played only a few games of football for East Perth. He was the first of the Test cricketers West Australian League footballers.

In State and Sheffield Shield there have been quite a number, however space does not permit me to mention them all.

Of the early players, first and foremost was West Perth's James (Jim) Everett who appeared at State level at both sports. Earlier still, Bill Back (Fremantle), Joe Chamberlain (Perth) who was also a soccer star by compulsion of his employer. Harry Edmondson (Perth), Albert Heinrichs (East Fremantle), Albert Banks (South Fremantle), the two West Perth players in Edward and William Lockwood, George Moysey (Perth), Frank Musgrove (Fremantle), Harry Rowe (West Perth), Harry Shepherd (Perth), and others.

The father of Wally and Fred Buttsworth was a great cricketer at both State and club level and between Wars the better known were Alan Evans of Perth, Bob Hewson (Perth), Carlyle Jarvis (East Fremantle), Harry Grigg (Perth), Billy Truscott (East Fremantle), Bob Blundell (West Perth), Jim Ditchburn (Subiaco), Vic Carlson (East Fremantle) and Tom Outridge (Subiaco). There were at least half a dozen others.

CHAMPIONS

With the coming of Sheffield Shield cricket in 1946-47 a host of champions in both sports come to mind. Names as Fred Buttsworth junior, (West Perth), Basil Rigg (Perth), Ken Cumming (Subiaco), Harry Price (West Perth), Ian Brayshaw (Claremont) who took ten wickets in an innings once against Victoria, Ken McAullay (East Perth), and Alan 'Punga' Preen (East Fremantle).

In recent times the supply has dried up through the greater demands on the players to specialise in one sport. The only cricketer-footballer of note I can think of in the last decade is Mick Malone.

RECORD BREAKERS

How many players took part in all of East Perth's record-breaking five premierships between 1919 and 1923? That was a question asked of us by one of our readers.

Of the 31 players used in the grand-final over those five years, only seven played in all premierships sides — Larry Duffy, Archie Herd, Bill Hilton, Bill Moloney, Gerry Owens, Val Sparrow and Bill 'Digger' Thomas. Another six (Ike Allen, Reg Brentnall, Harry Gepp, Hector Groom, Bert Harold and Charlie King) played in four and missed one.

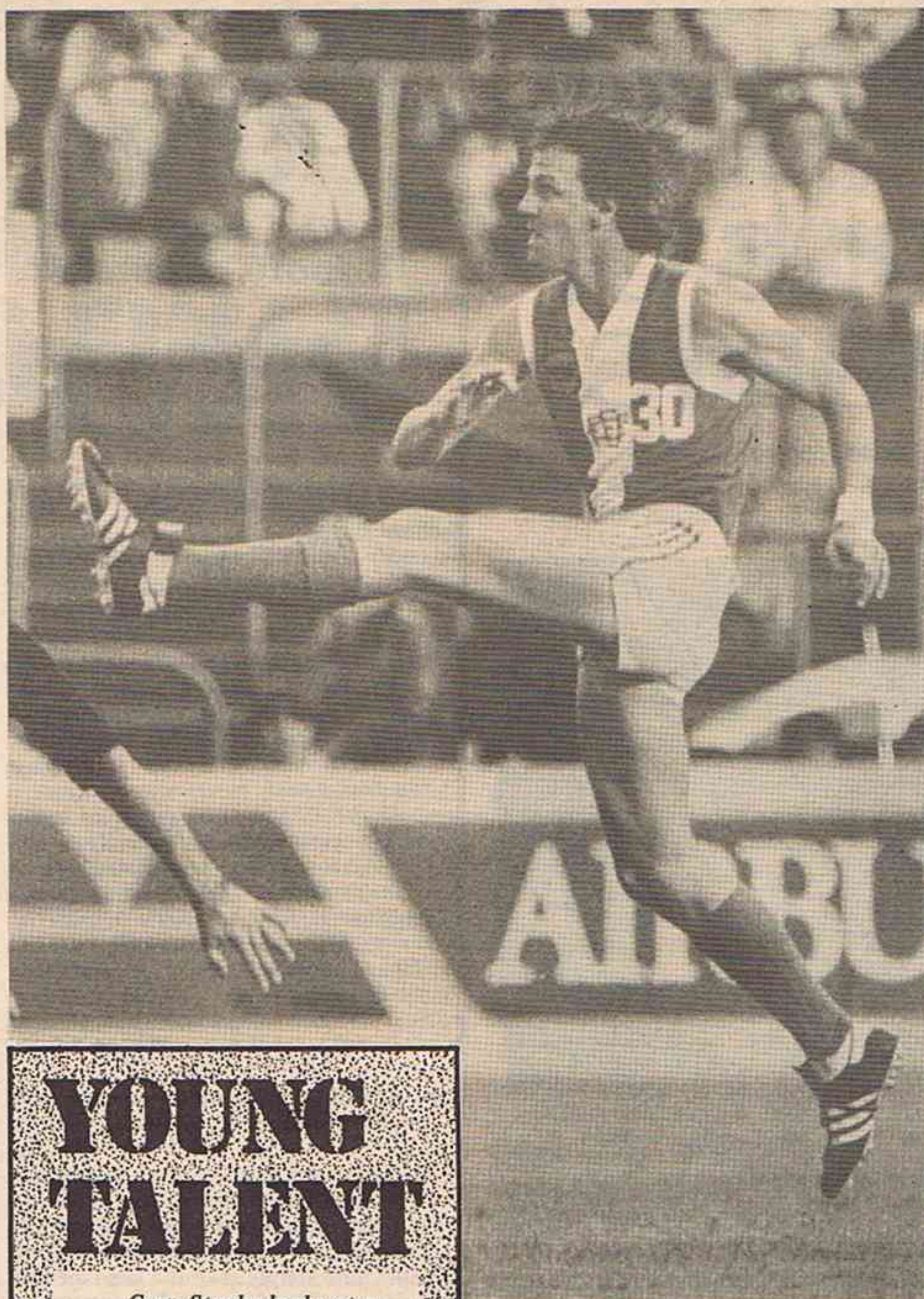
POOR OLD TOM

There is no way that WA can look forward to the interstate match in Adelaide on Saturday week with a great deal of confidence.

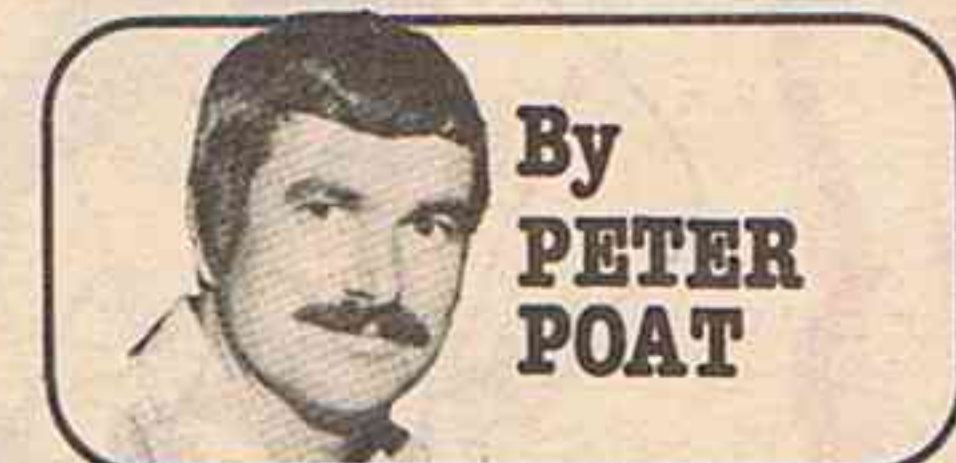
The odds are certainly stacked against us and it seems that only a last minute change of heart by the league directors on selection restrictions would rescue our chances.

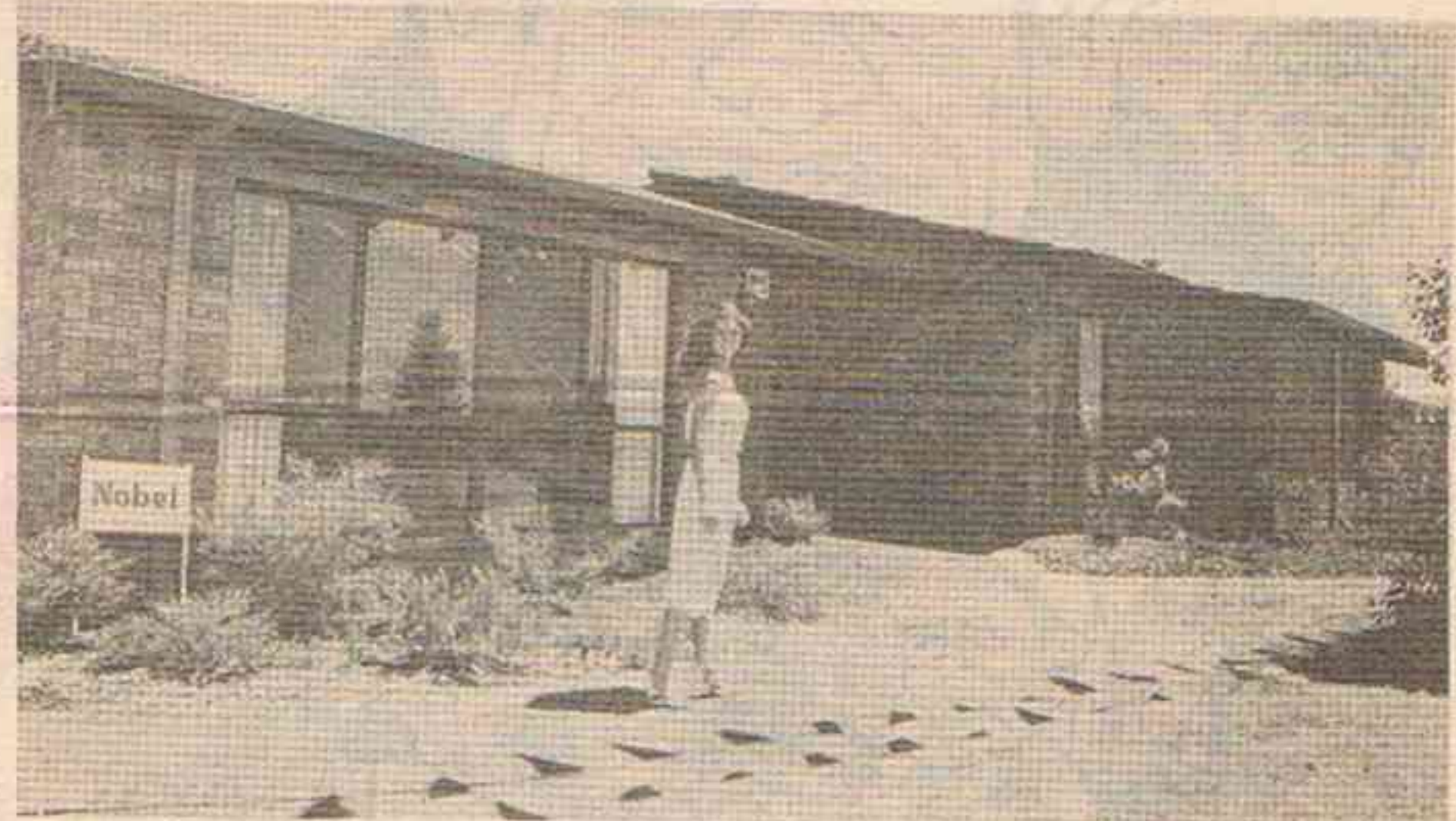
This would go part of the way to relieving the shackles around the selectors' necks.

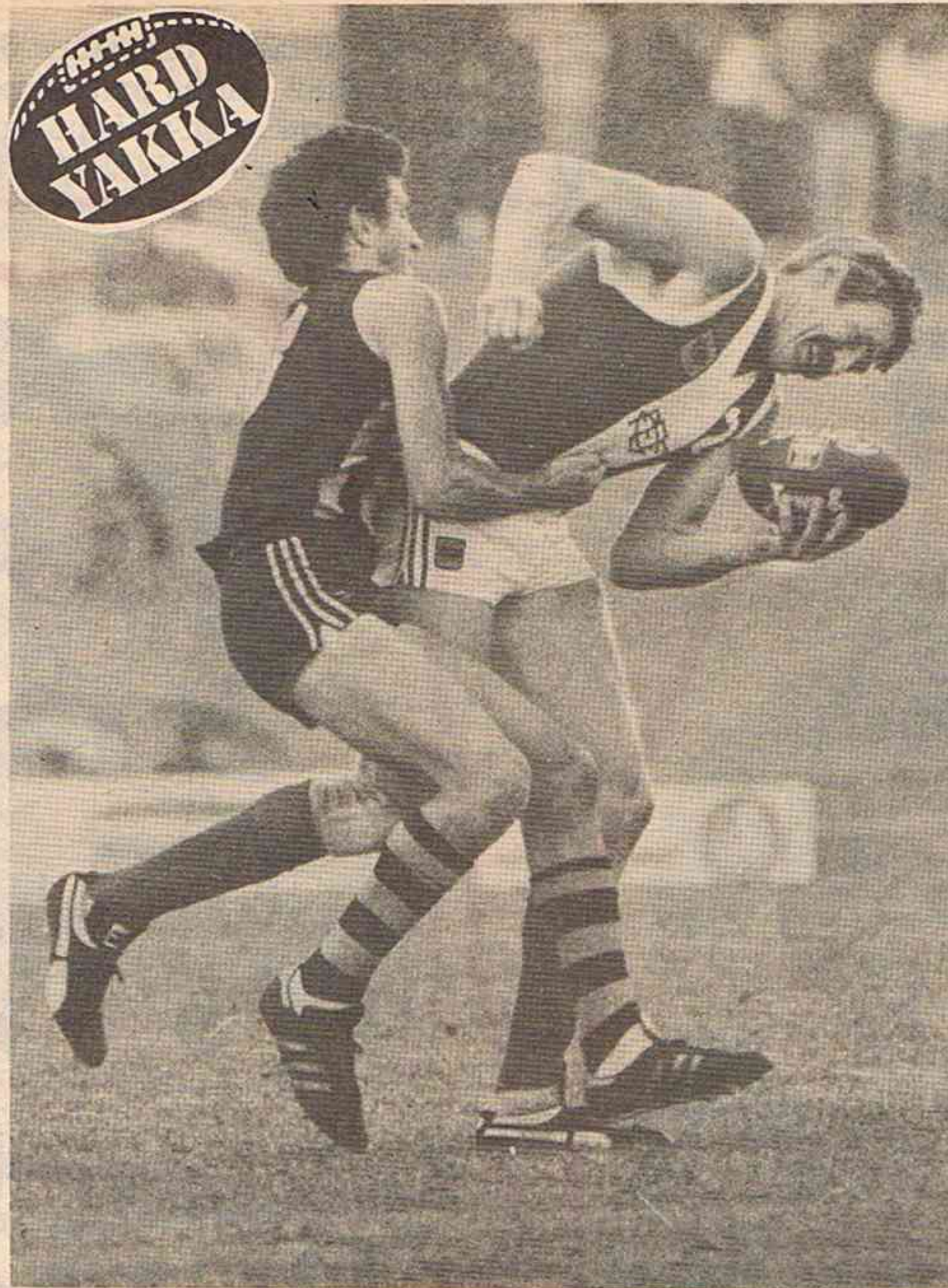

Firstly Wayne Delmenico, the unobtrusive player who since coming from Melbourne in 1976 has been a great asset to South in many key positions. His last quarter at centre-half-forward was a key factor in their win. At the other end of the scale was the first half magic of Benny Vigona. Some of his goals were unbelievable. Hopefully his injury is not serious because that type of play will bring people back to football.

CREDIT DUE

Before the season Perth boasted three good ruckmen, Wayne Simms, Steve Turner and Dean Herbert. Due to injury and suspension now it is left to Turner to shoulder the responsibility which he did manfully last Saturday against two of the most promising ruckmen in the league, John Ironmonger and Craig Edwards. This extra responsibility and the chance to spend more time on the ball has brought greater consistency into this game, something he will need to maintain all year, especially this week against the formidable Swan Districts trio (Boucher, Sidebottom and Sartori) at Bassendean.

Hockey players fitter than footballers

LEAGUE footballers, despite training for almost 12 months of the year, are not as fit as some of our top hockey players.

Not my words, but those of Australian hockey captain Ric Charlesworth.

He made this comment on a panel show organised last week by the Maylands Amateur Football Club.

Charlesworth was sceptical that players were expected to be super-fit because of the amount of time they spent training. He said some players were able to loaf on the training track.

He used Peter Bosustow as an example and he was monitored at training nights for Carlton. According to Charlesworth his heart beat only got up to around 120 a minute. To have any benefit the heart rate should be around 150.

I found Charlesworth's comment interesting as I believe footballers are asked to put in far too much time training and I think it tends to show during the course of a season.

Some players lose their appetite for the game, particularly if things start to go wrong for a club.

It's absurd that players should have only a few weeks off after a season and then be asked to start pre-season training for the next year.

While the game has reached the stage where fitness is a very important aspect I think footballers, like racehorses, can go stale and need a break from a grind that doesn't compensate them in a monetary way for the time they are asked to contribute.

On the same panel show Subiaco utility player Ken Marshall said that a lot of good, and I presume potential league players, give the game away to spend their time doing other things such as surfing . . . or they decide to play in a less demanding competition.

Retaining an appetite for football is becoming increasingly difficult. Because of the young age competitive football is now being played, many players have had enough by the time they reach their mid teens.

Those who do decide to go on, and have the ability to make a league training squad are then forced to put themselves in the hands of league clubs who, in my opinion, make ridiculous demands.

It would be interesting to see the kind of training program someone like Ric Charlesworth goes through for hockey and measure his rate of fitness, and time spent acquiring it, against some of our top league players.

HOW do you measure a player's contribution in matches? The selection of best players is often a contentious issue. I sometimes believe there is too much collusion between football critics because of a fear of missing certain players.

I came under fire a few weeks ago because I did not select Jon Fogarty in my best players. I learnt after the match against South Fremantle that he had 47 touches, certainly enough to warrant inclusion among the best players.

Had I had access to those statistics no doubt I would have been influenced by them. But should you allow statistics to govern our selection of best players? I do admit that I shouldn't have needed statistics to include him among the best.

For instance I read where Ron Boucher won 30 of 37 knockouts against West Perth on Saturday. The particular person gave him second best on the ground on that basis.

Yet in my opinion West Perth did a lot of their damage from centre bounce downs. They were able to consistently take the ball away from the centre. To me there was no art in what Boucher did. He simply thumped the ball towards his goal.

I noticed that West Perth coach Dennis Cometti devised a plan to counter Boucher's ruck ascendancy. To say it was successful is an understatement.

Victorian expatriate V.F.L. men in W.A. football this year.

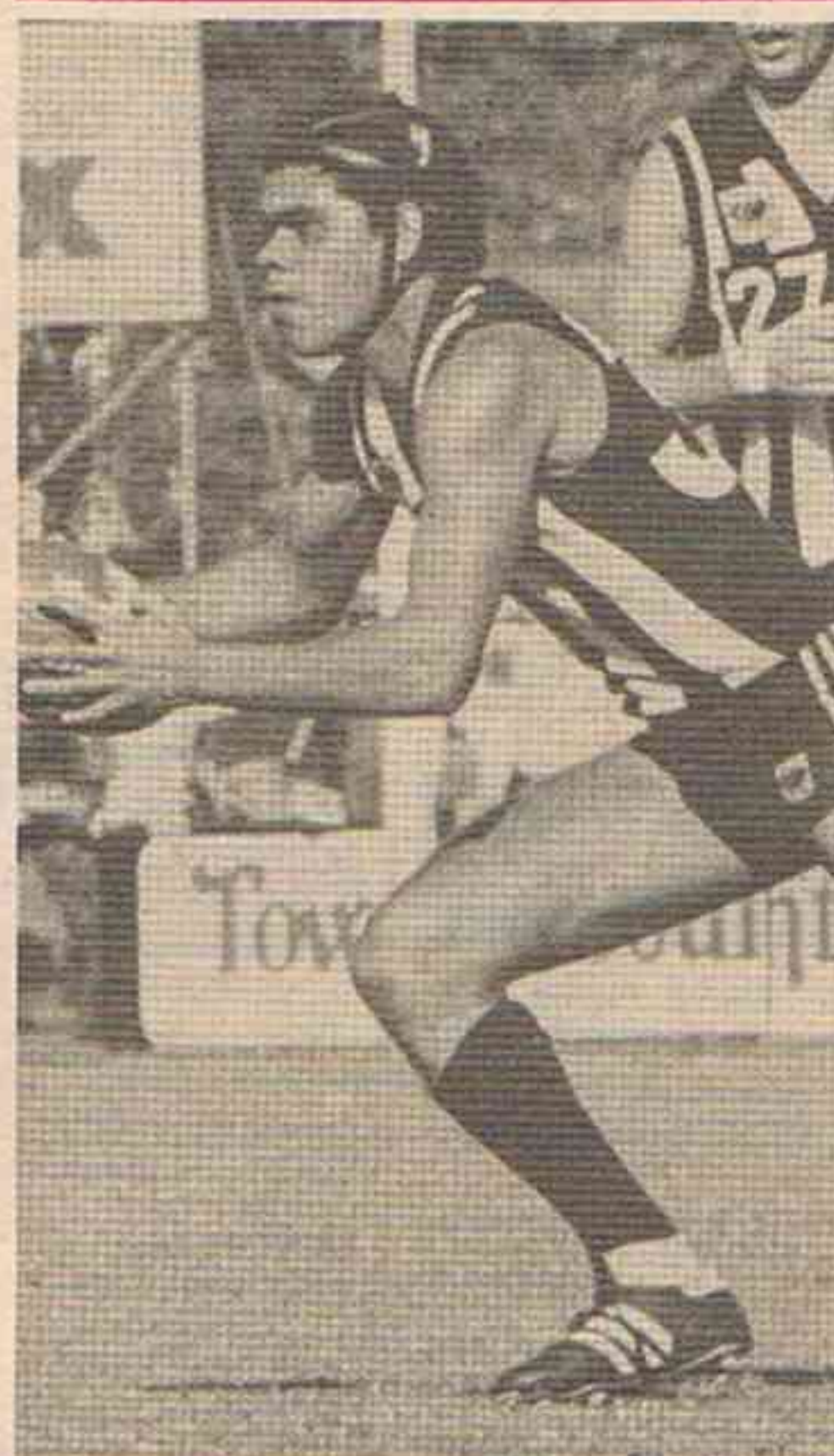
I imagine this is decidedly above the average of past seasons.

SUBIACO v CLAREMONT. Claremont by the proverbial country mile... especially as they are on the rebound from a loss.

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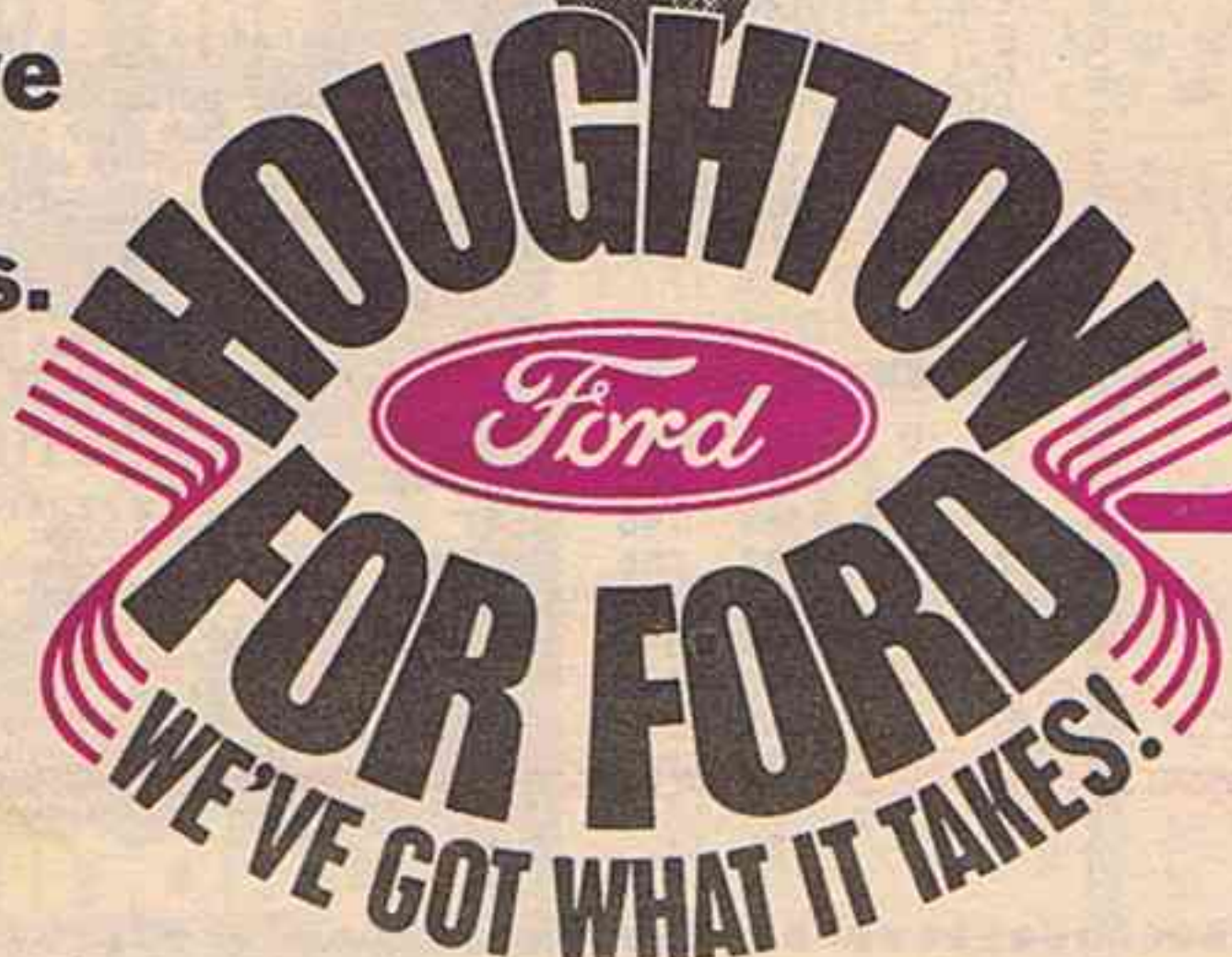
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
