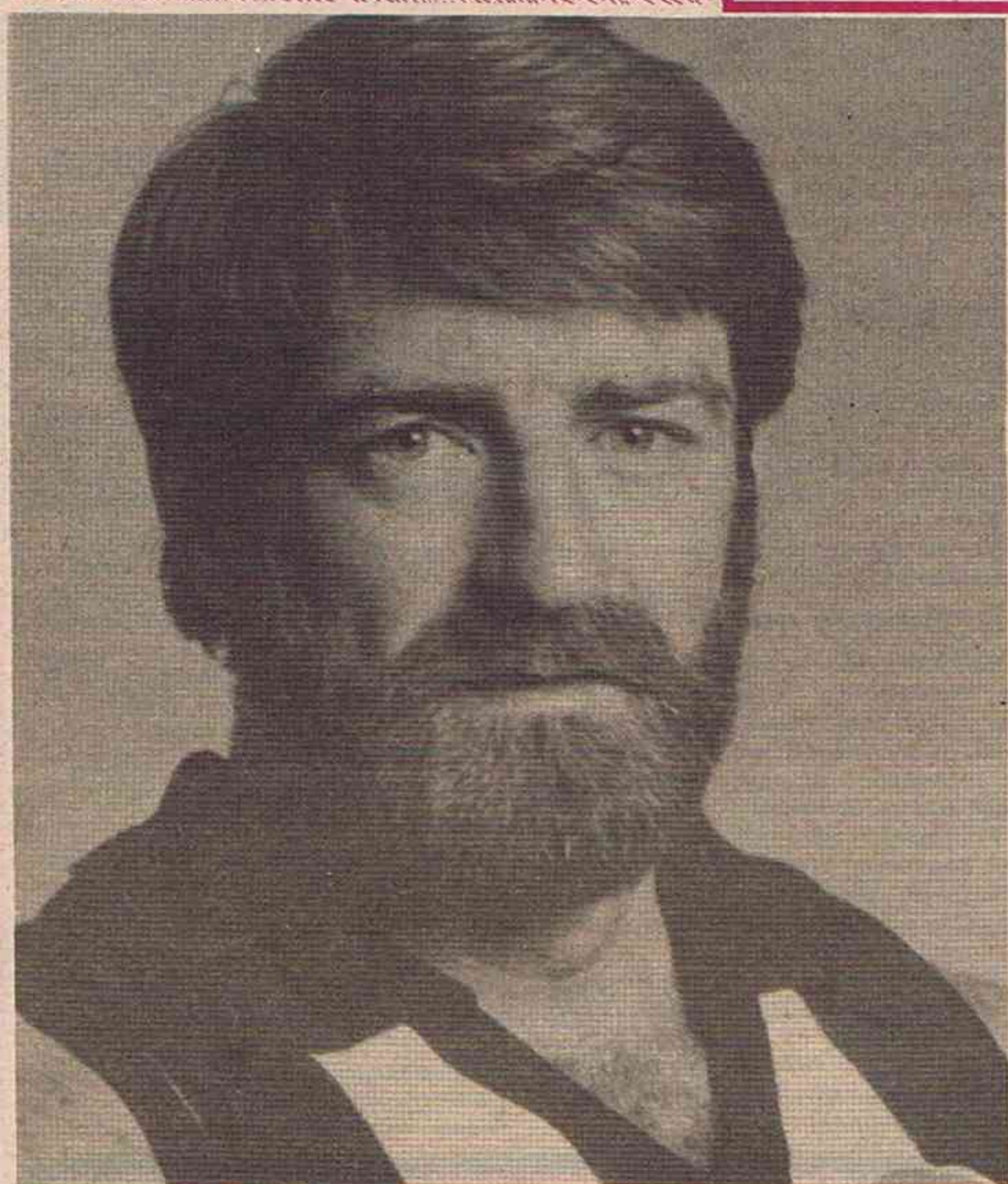

ARMSTRONG IN HOT SEAT

Stan is today's man



ONE of football's real achievers will reach a magical milestone on Saturday. Swan Districts forward Stan Nowotny will lead the team onto the ground for the clash against Claremont to play his 250th game for the club.

Nowotny, one of the most respected men in football, began his career as a half-back flanker. He was later converted to a ruck-rover and then he tried his hand at centre-half-forward and this year he has even been used at full-forward.

There is no doubting Nowotny's value to the team.

While he was sidelined a few weeks ago, Swans sadly missed the strength he uses to break up the packs.

During his career Nowotny has achieved everything except win a Sandover Medal — although he was twice runner-up — 1974 and 1975.

In 1974 he was Swan Districts' fairest and best player.

Throughout his 13 year career he has given his all to football and has been rewarded with many State appearances.

Subiaco have failed to win a game in the twelve matches played this season and speculation is riding high that they could dispense with Armstrong

Armstrong is known to have offered to step aside several times this year, but the committee have pledged its support for their coach.

With this solid backing, Armstrong told the players last Sunday that he wouldn't quit — and said that the only way to answer the constant criticism was out on the field.

A special meeting held this week between the players, Armstrong and the board of directors pledged total support all around.

As Subiaco struggle along grimly at the bottom of the table the pressure — from the supporters and the media — is building up for them to shape up or ship out. The players are starting to become angry and annoyed with the constant criticism — and South Fremantle could pay the penalty this week.

There are plenty of suggestions that Armstrong will not see the year out — but that would be drastic action and a giant step backwards if they used him as the unfortunate scapegoat.

Someone has to be the scapegoat — and history shows that it has never been the directors of a club.

They cannot be happy just to run along behind the other seven league clubs and they have to do something about it.

Unfortunately it seems Armstrong will bear the Lions share of the blame.

Armstrong is the most professional man in the young Lions den and if they are to progress in the next five years, he is the person to be at the helm.

Subiaco are a very inexperienced side (11 of last week's team were 21 or under), and Armstrong could eventually blend them into a competitive unit.

Subiaco need some talent.

There just is not enough for them to be a competitive force and there is nothing Armstrong can do without players.

They are aware that their club has recruited badly and they are understood to have made that point at Tuesday's meeting.

Their top recruit for 1982, Peter Bennett, played just one league game. Russell Forbes is struggling for a reserves game, Gordon Polson has played in the last few matches with limited success.

You can't cook a meal without ingredients.

But besides lacking recruits, even the players who helped lift them last year are struggling for form.

NEIL Taylor was made captain after winning the club's fairest and best in 1981 and the extra responsibility has done his game no good at all.



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NOTHING WRONG WITH THE SYSTEM

Tribunals will always be a source of controversy.

I firmly believe that they are best left as they are — and I base this on reporting tribunals for a number of years and acting as advocate for players for the last few seasons.

Very rarely does the tribunal Chairman reach the wrong conclusion about a charge, however, it is the penalty handed down that often causes controversy.

Fixed penalties for various charges are not the answer as every case has its own particular circumstances all of which are relevant.

It is essential that players and umpires alike take particular notice of the reportable incidents. Too often the players or umpires are under-prepared and when the chairman comes to his conclusion, they are upset because they have come out badly.

Take the case against Bill Valli this week.

In an effort to keep the game going, umpire Phil O'Reilly has failed to get the correct number of the player who ran into Valli.

That is acceptable. But the fact that three other umpires all failed to name the correct player is not acceptable.

TECHNICALITY

In any Eastern States tribunal, the player in Valli's position would have had the case dismissed on a technicality.

Not so in WA. The very fact that he is alleged to have struck a player is sufficient to lay a charge. Who he hit has no bearing on the report. And the tribunal chairman has the right to hear the charge as he wishes.

He also has the right to call his own witnesses — which we found out when Murray Scheer was called in the Valli case when in fact the report named Jon Fogarty.

The irony of it all is that O'Reilly will probably be dropped this week to the reserves, when, in fact, he didn't do a bad job of umpiring. He just made a simple mistake and was prepared to admit it.

Coaches who propose to do away with advocates at tribunals could one day wish they never made that suggestion.

I have seen some very nervous players appear before the tribunal and some who are not too experienced at putting words together. In my opinion, some of the more vindictive umpires would have a field day and crucify some of those players.

Remember, some of the colts players are only 15 or 16 years old and are likely to appear there very few times in their playing career.

The more experienced umpires appear there several times a season. They know the procedure and can often be overbearing in their endeavours to obtain a conviction.

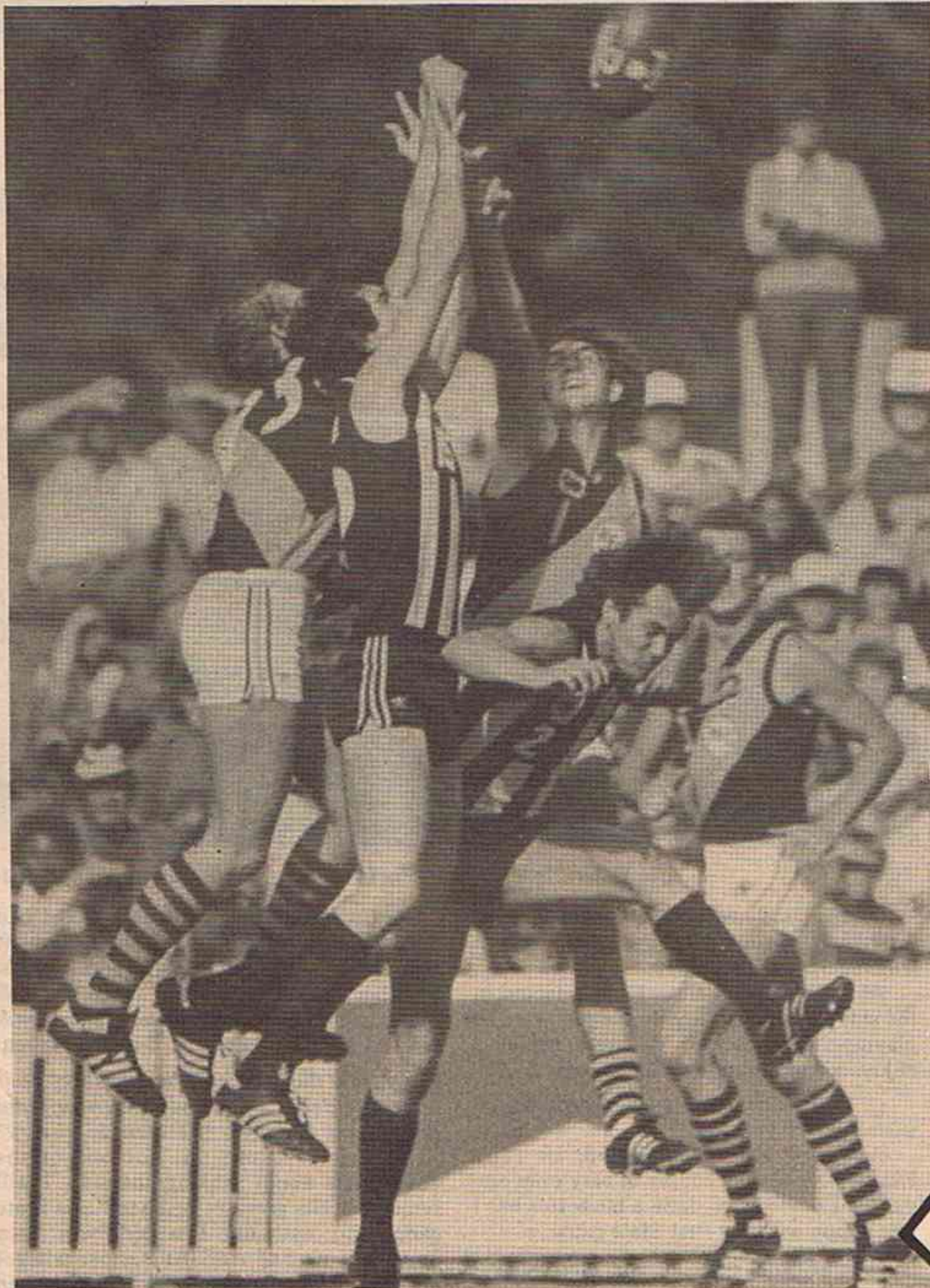

With two sons under 21 (who both drive) there is no way I could continue to help the league in their insurance outlet and three vehicles have been insured elsewhere.



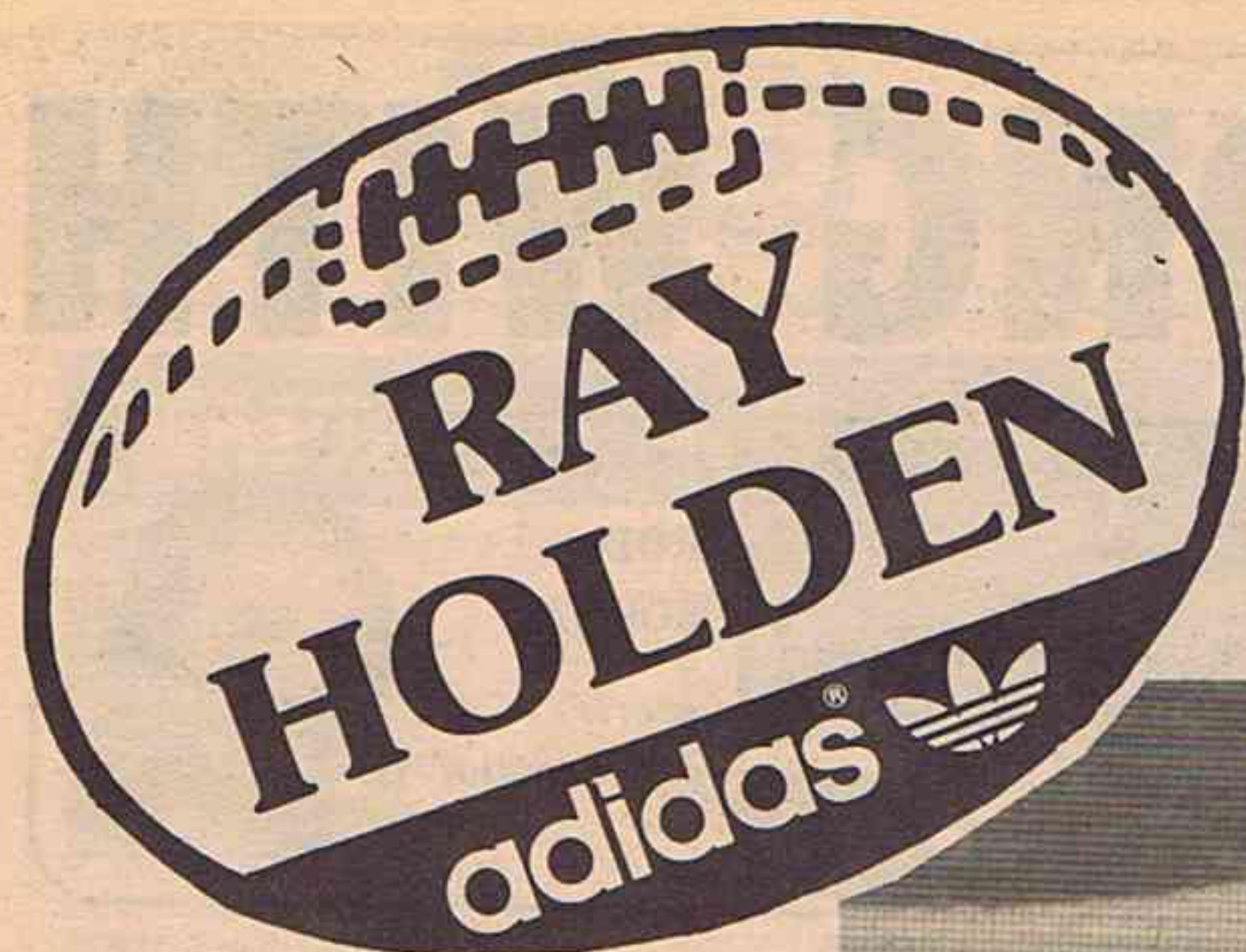
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Quick rise to interstate ranks



RAY Holden's football career has really taken off in the last 12 months.

In that time he has gone from being a borderline league player with West Perth to the State full-back.

And in his debut against South Australia last week he put in a top effort even though Western Australia was convincingly thrashed at Adelaide's Football Park.

He had eight goals kicked against him, but must be considered unlucky because more than half of that tally came from sheer bad luck on his part.

A couple of times the ball lobbed in Tim Evans' arms after being punched clear and on one occasion when the Croweaters had created the loose man Holden had to come out of the goal square to leave his opponent unguarded.

Holden, who has one of the biggest kicks in league football, put together one of his finest performances especially when one considers the monotonous regularity with which the ball was pumped into the South Australian attacking zone.

He has now virtually assured himself of playing against South Australia and Victoria at Subiaco Oval next month, providing he can maintain his form.

Holden was one of a handful of players who committed themselves to the game on hand and Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to the interstate rookie and found out more about his attitude to the game.

Q: How did you enjoy making your interstate debut against the South Australians last Saturday?

A: It was a great thrill to be selected in the side and I was really looking forward to playing. Even though we were beaten I enjoyed every minute of the match.

Q: You must have been pretty happy with the way you went?

A: Yes. I was quite pleased. He (Tim Evans) picked up a couple of easy ones and maybe I could have done a bit better but I was happy with my first State game.

Q: Is Evans one of the better full-forwards you have come across?

A: Probably not one of the better ones. He was a strong player and liked the physical encounters more than other full-forwards I have come up against. He virtually stood in the square and did not run me around a lot. Warren Ralph leads all the time and always keeps me on the move and I have to use my pace against him more than strength. We have had some good tussles. He is the best full-forward in the State and I always look forward to playing against him even though he normally manages to pick up his few goals.

Q: You must be happy with the way things have gone for you in the last 12 months where you have developed from a player who was struggling for a regular league berth to being chosen to represent your State?

A: It has happened quite quickly. I have not really had time to sit down and think about it yet.

Q: You have really come on in the last season, is there any special reason behind your improved form?

A: No not really. I think my attitude had been down a little until last season when I am now more determined to succeed and play well.

Q: What about your future. Have you thought about going to the VFL or do you think you will play the rest of your football with West Perth?

A: At the moment my football future lies with West Perth. But I would like to have a crack at the VFL to see how I go. I think everyone dreams of one day playing in Melbourne. I will stay with West Perth for a while and then hopefully go to Victoria for a couple of years.

Q: Did you think you would be playing State football at this stage of your career?

A: Up until the start of this year I had been playing reasonably well and thought that if I could put a few good games together I would be a chance for the State games later in the year and I was pleased to get a berth in the first match.

Q: How did you feel about making your interstate debut in the side which suffered the biggest loss by a WA team in history?

A: That certainly was not one of the good parts about making the side. I will remember the game as being my first State game and naturally I would have been happier if we had won. At least we will get another shot at them next month and hopefully we can reverse the decision.

Q: Where did WA fall down on Saturday?

A: We did not do the hard things. We didn't run or chase and I think we lost the game in the second quarter. We all thought everything would fall into place without doing the work. South Australia did all these things and it paid off.

Q: It must have been hard playing in the backline when they were putting you under that sort of pressure?

A: We were all under plenty of pressure down there and it brought back memories of West Perth a couple of years ago when we were not going too well. But I enjoyed the pressure.

Q: Being one of the new players in the side, did Mal Brown give you any special instructions?

A: No. He just had a couple of words with me during training one night. He told me to go out and play my normal game. He told me that the guys we were coming up against were only club players and I should treat them that way.

Q: Did you think you would go that well?

A: I thought that maybe my nerves would get the better of me and maybe I would crumble. But I was quite pleased with the way I went.

Q: One of the most impressive facets of your game was your spoiling - have you done any special work on that?

A: It is just something I have had all my career. I guess it is one of the strongest parts of my game. It is my main attribute and it is important to be able to spoil when you are playing in the backline. I have always been able to kick pretty well and that is another of my strongest points. Although I only go for the long kick as a

last resort. If there is a lead on I will try and pick the guy out. It is better that way because you still keep control of the ball, whereas, when you kick it long you put distance between yourself and the ball but it is a 50-50 chance as to who gets it.

Q: Have you always wanted to play league football with West Perth?

A: Yes I followed West Perth as a kid and it was always an ambition to play league football and once I did that I set my sights on playing for the State. Now I just want to keep on playing State football.

Q: How hard was it to get into the West Perth side to start with?

A: To start off with it was pretty difficult. You have to prove yourself when you get your opportunity. There are a lot of good footballers down there and once you get to league football you have to keep doing the hard things to make sure you keep your place.

Q: What is the difference between West Perth this year and last year? You have gone from an ordinary side to one which has beaten some of the top sides in the competition?

A: We got a couple of good recruits like Peter Murnane and Wayne Foreman, although Wayne has not played that many games. The attitude has also improved and consequently our football has improved.

Q: Do you think there is enough talent at West Perth to win a flag?

A: I think we can give the premiership a big shake. Like you say, we have beaten all the top sides so far and it proves we can do it. It is just a matter of staying in the four. We are aiming at the double chance and after that we will just have to wait and see what happens in the finals.

Q: Dennis Cometti seems to be going pretty well. How do you find his coaching?

A: He talks to the players well and gets involved with training. He has settled down well and everybody is getting on real good at the moment. There had been a few internal problems at the club but they have been sorted out now and we can concentrate on playing football.

Q: What was the biggest hurdle you had to jump in order to become a regular league footballer?

A: The biggest problem was being consistent. I could put in one good game, and then it would be a few weeks before I did it again.

Claremont are finding that life at the top is not easy.

After an incredible run last season (when they won 21 of 23 matches) they have really come back to the field this year.

They might as well stop kidding themselves. The difference between 1981 and this year is the Krakouers.

While they have been competitive in each of their losses this season, Claremont would probably be sitting high on top of the premiership ladder if the Krakouers were still with them.

It's a whole new ball game this year and though they are in second position on the premiership ladder the Tigers have yet to beat three of the sides in the competition, Swans, South Fremantle and West Perth.

Until they do they won't be able to say with any confidence that they are capable of winning their second successive premiership.

Though Swans have been down on form in recent weeks they won't be easy pickings for the Tigers, even though the game is at Claremont.

This game will be a true test of character for Claremont. There won't be any excuses if they can't beat Swans as they are virtually back to full strength.

Swans have found it hard to stay revved up. Apart from the hiding they took from West Perth, they have been in control for most of the season, winning when they have to and gearing themselves up for important clashes.

South have been presented with one of their biggest challenges in the past four seasons.

With three teams, Swan Districts, Claremont and West Perth threatening to break away from the other sides in the competition, South face the grim prospect of vying with East Perth for fourth spot.

The Royals have shown in past seasons they are capable of overcoming the odds to make the finals.

It all adds up to South having to fight their way out of a corner. Though they will beat Subiaco, they desperately need to boost their percentage.

For that reason they are likely to be in a very mean frame of mind. It wouldn't surprise to see South bounce back from two successive losses and record a big win against Subiaco, who have just about had the plug pulled out of them.



PERTH didn't know what hit them last Saturday as they were steamrolled by Claremont at Lathlain Park.

They could be in for a repeat does this Saturday against West Perth.

Though they appeared to be on the improve, the Demons again were shown to be brittle last week.

West Perth are moving along in overdrive at the moment and should not have any trouble disposing of Perth and setting themselves up for a double chance in the finals this season.

There seems little doubt that West Perth will make the final four. It's just a case of what semi final they will be in.



EAST Fremantle have been bluffing the WA football public. They are not a final four side, as will be shown in Saturday's match against East Perth at Subiaco Oval.

Old Easts have struggled for most of the season, just managing to bob up every now and then to indicate that they are capable of staying in the race.

While no-one can deny they have given some gutsy performances this season, particularly in the derby and against West Perth, they simply don't have the playing resources to make the four.

They will be put out of their misery by East Perth on Saturday. The Royals in winning, will put paid to Old Easts chances of making the finals. It will put them two wins and percentage out of the four.

That will be too much ground to make up with only eight games remaining.

While the Royals will shake off one of those teams challenging them for a place in the four, they aren't likely to be any more comfortable, even with a win as they will still have South Fremantle breathing down their necks.

The Royals appear to have the ability to make the top four but they have a habit of making it tough for themselves each season and this year doesn't appear as though it will be any different.

INTERSTATE UPDATE

INCREASE IN ATTENDANCES

Attendances were up by nearly one percent in the first ten rounds of VFL football this season.

A total of 1,606,276 people — an increase of 14,871 on the same period last year — saw the matches.

With the increase in attendances, the VFL has achieved a weekly average attendance of 150,000 for the first time. The rise in crowds also means that records have now been set over the past successive four seasons.

VFL Park continues to show its popularity with attendances up by 9.1 per cent this year.

This result will no doubt encourage VFL directors who are pushing for a swap to VFL Park in 1984 for the VFL grand final.

VFL General Manager, Mr Jack Hamilton said the figures were pleasing and further emphasised the strength and popularity of Australian football.

"The fact that VFL Park attendances continue to climb is a strong indication of the football public's desire for first class facilities," he said.

"There is a long way to go yet, but there is every chance that we may establish our fifth successive attendance record this year.

"There would be very few sports in the world that could boast such a rate of spectator growth," Mr Hamilton said.



OVERSEAS MARKET

The VFL may consider employing overseas sales representatives to help expand its international TV coverage.

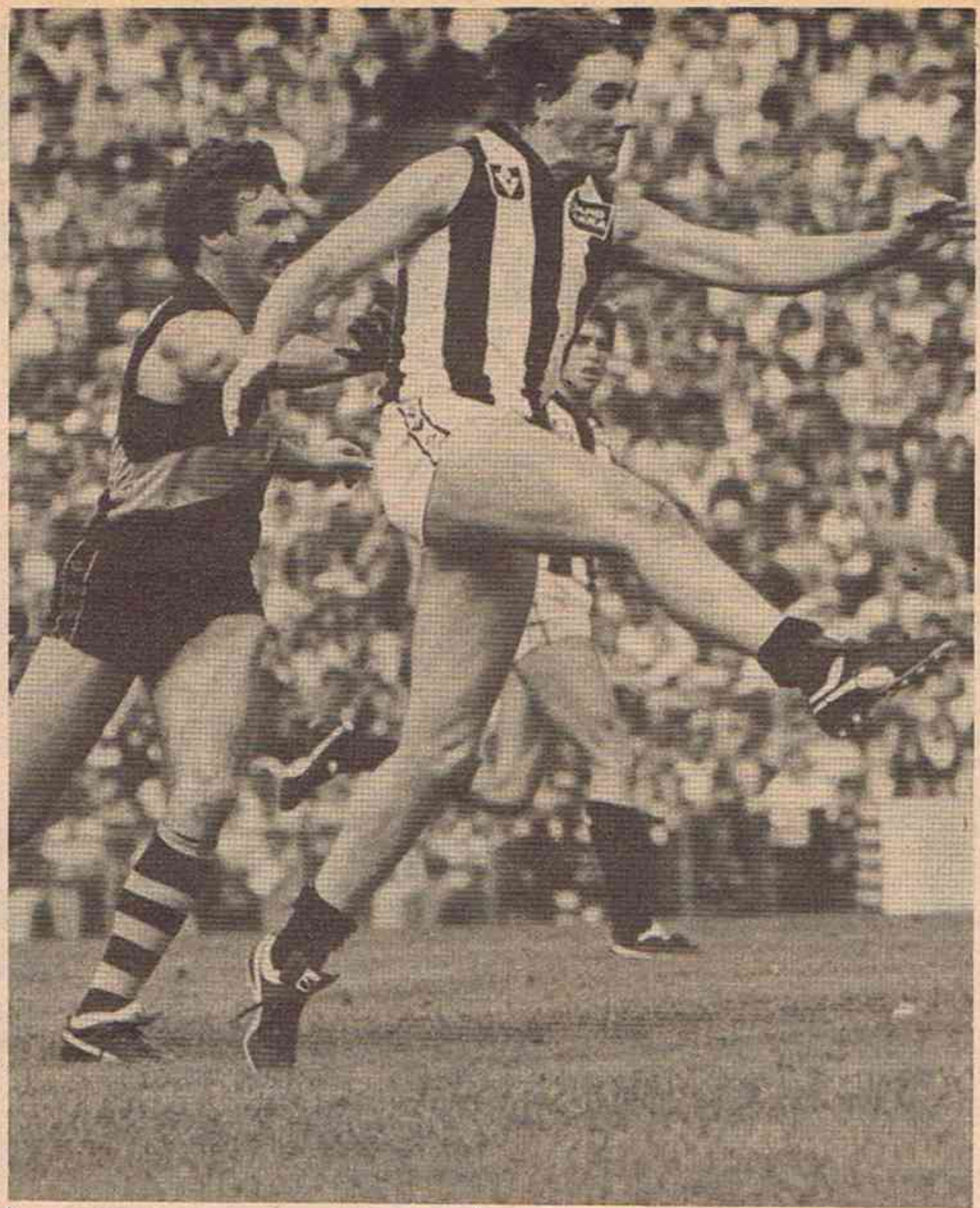
VFL replays already have strong audiences in Mexico, the United States and Hong Kong.

With a larger overseas viewing audience, the league would be able to attract arena advertising from international firms.

Jezza safe

Following the recent sackings of VFL coaches Royce Hart and Tom Hafey, there has been renewed speculation that St Kilda would axe Alex Jesaulenko.

However, Saints president Lindsay Fox quelled the gossip last weekend when he said there is no truth in the stories.

NOT FOR SALE

Swans secretary Barry Rogers has declared that rover Bernie Conlen is not for sale.

Rogers said this week that the club had received requests from clubs all round Australia wishing to interview the former Oakleigh rover.

His form in the Escort night series, together with the fact that he has not been able to win a regular berth in the senior Swan side, has created interest in Conlen... reputed to be the smallest player in VFL football.

HART MOVE

Richmond will offer sacked Footscray coach Royce Hart a position on their match committee as well as a job as a skills coach to attract him back to Tiger territory.

Hart has severed his connections with Footscray following an agreement last week to release him from his contract and is now clear to return to Richmond.

It is thought that Hart would replace Pat Guinane on the match committee. Guinane would then be able to devote more time to his recruiting duties.

SWANS WANT PAYMENT ON SIDEBOTTOM

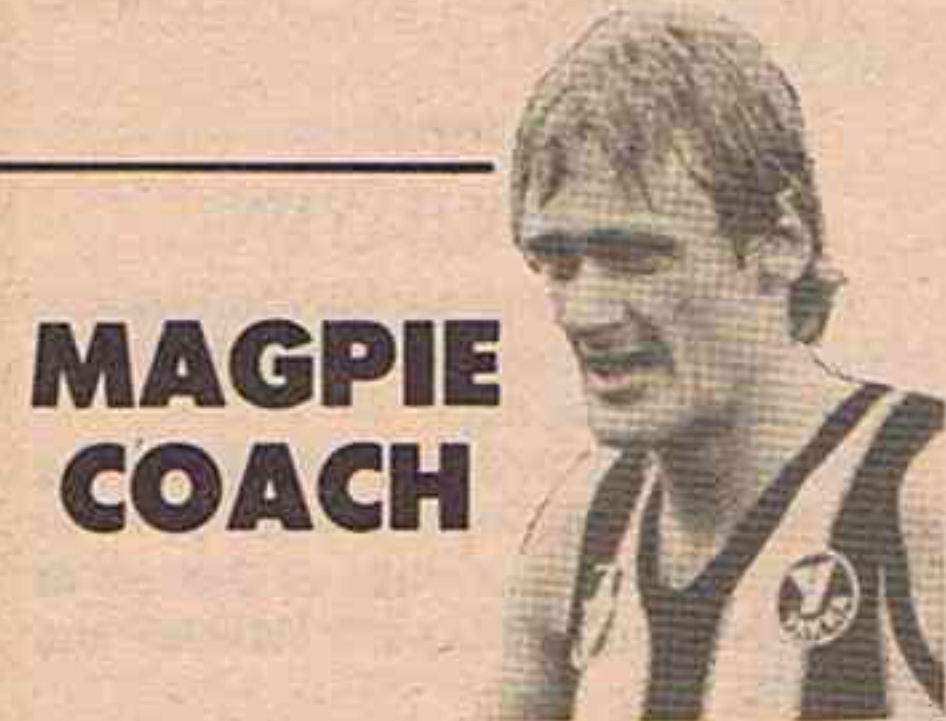
The endless Garry Sidebottom saga took a new twist last week when Swan Districts threatened to sue Geelong over the non-payment of a lease instalment.

Swans are claiming \$15,000 which was due in April and solicitors acting for the club have told the Cats to pay up.

Apparently it is the first time Geelong have been slow in making one of their payments, but they are claiming that negotiations with Sidebottom have caused the delay.

Swans general manager Peter Evans said "We are owed the money and we want it. It's as simple as that".

The move by Swans comes at a time when Sidebottom himself is considering getting his lawyers to study his position. This follows a stalemate in negotiations between him and Geelong in talks last week.



MAGPIE COACH

There is mounting speculation in Melbourne that Collingwood will appoint a coach from within their own ranks next season.

The Magpies have a long tradition of entrusting the league coaching position to one of their "own". Support for a return to this policy is growing.

Names being mentioned as possible candidates are caretaker coach Mick Erwin, former ruckman Len Thompson and a surprise candidate, Peter Moore.

STEPHEN ACTIVE

Four-time VFL coach Bill Stephen is still actively involved in the coaching field... mainly because he loves the game.

Stephen runs a coaching advisory service — and regularly attends league training sessions and notes the good and bad points of players going through their paces.

Job for Goss

Former South Melbourne and Hawthorn veteran Norm Goss, who retired after 202 league games last month, has been appointed skills coach at Hawthorn to assist Allan Jeans.

The tigerish rover does not intend to play again, but there is always the chance the club could call on him again if needed.

New call for 8 team competition

There have been renewed calls in Adelaide to reduce the number of clubs in the S.A.N.F.L. competition.

Recent poor attendances have been blamed on the weakness of some of the bottom clubs... particularly Woodville.

One suggestion is that Woodville, West Adelaide and West Torrens pool their resources and unite to form one club known as "Westside".

To inject new life into the North and South Adelaide clubs it has been recommended that these clubs transfer their bases to newer suburban areas.

New book

South Australian State coach John Cahill may only have won his first game as coach of South Australia last Saturday, but his football achievements cover 25 years.

He is one of the most successful players and club coaches in South Australian football and his career is the subject of a book to be released next month.



Marriott quits

West Torrens utility player Craig Marriott has quit the club because of lack of opportunities to play league football. He played 95 games for West Torrens after transferring from Glenelg where he had played 81 games.

Following two league appearances — after a season's break — Norwood's John Wynne has been sidelined with a hamstring injury.

Tilted crown

Neil Kerley might still be the King but maybe he doesn't wear his crown with as much authority as he used to.

Before the SA v Victoria State game he tried to enter the players' dressing room but was halted at the door by the doorman.

"But I'm Neil Kerley", he explained. However, the doorman was unimpressed and it was only after some persuading that the former State coach got into the room.

Stringer retires

North Adelaide's fourth longest serving player, Barry Stringer, has retired.

The 31-year-old Stringer played 217 league games and represented SA in every interstate match from 1977 to 1979. He was captain in 1978 and '79 and a member of the club's premiership teams of 1971 and '72.

WAR TIME PERMITS

During World War II (1939-45) a special war-time permit was automatically granted to any serviceman who was camped in or passing through any State capital city.

Victorian clubs scrambled for both West and South Australian footballers who arrived in Melbourne, whether it be for a short time or a long period.

The WANFL competition provided many great names to the VFL lists. Some also came from the Goldfields and other country areas.

One unique achievement was by Stan 'Pops' Heal who played a great game on the wing and roving for Melbourne in its 1941 premiership and followed it up a week later by being a member of West Perth's premiership side.

George Bailey played with Carlton in 1941-42 and Ern Henfry with the same club in 1944. Both returned to the Perth club in 1945. Bailey in fact won the Sandover Medal that year, but Carlton induced them to stand out of football in 1946 and they were cleared by the A.N.F.C. in 1947 after a long clearance wrangle.

East Perth's Ritchie Thomas, a star back pocket player, appeared for Essendon in 1941 when a Carlton protest prevented him from playing in the second round series that season. He played again with the Dons in 1945 and later South Melbourne as well as returning to East Perth.

Haydn Bunton Snr. returned to Fitzroy in 1942 and he took veteran Douglas Oliphant of Perth with him and George Robinson, a class full-back.

Marcel 'Nugget' Hilsz, also of Perth, turned out for St Kilda, while Jack Sheedy, the record breaker, added six games to his tally for South Melbourne. Fred Buttsworth of West Perth played eight games for Essendon with brother Wally in 1945.

Brim Birmingham of Claremont played with St Kilda in 1944 and Tony Bizzaca, also of Claremont stripped twice for Melbourne.

Two Swan Districts players in Robert Annersley (Essendon), and Ralph Lathom (Melbourne) appeared in 1945 and the late great Neville Way (ex Boulder City) showed St Kilda supporters his marking abilities in 1942.

East Perth brothers in Eric and Jack Sweet played for South Melbourne in a handful of games while the same South Melbourne club welcomed Les Tetley of East Fremantle, The McPartland brothers, Andrew and Bert, played with Essendon and Collingwood respectively. Many others also appeared during those dark war years.

Merv McIntosh

. . . Super ruckman

Merv McIntosh, champion ruckman for Perth from 1939-41 and 1946-55, won the Sandover Medal on three occasions - 1948 and 1953-54.

He won practically every award in football - local and interstate - during a career that stretched over 17 seasons. Though he missed four entire seasons during World War Two, he played 217 club games for Perth before retiring at the end of the 1955 season.

Born in 1922, he was 17 when he made his league debut. He was better known for what he did after the War. A knock ruckman, beautifully proportioned at six feet, five inches and 15½ stone, he first attracted the State selectors' attention for the 1947 Hobart Carnival. After that he was an automatic State selection until his retirement. McIntosh was State captain for three seasons (1947-49), and won the Tassie Medal in 1950 (as fairest and best at the Brisbane Carnival).

Mervyn McIntosh won Perth's fairest and best award on seven occasions, 1946-50, 1952 and 1954, and the Simpson Medal three times - a State game against South Australia in 1952, the 1953 Adelaide Carnival and in his last game, the grand-final of 1955.

Perhaps his greatest thrill would have been helping Perth to win their first premiership in 48 years, and he played his heart out that day. He was the Demons captain 1947-50 and again in 1954, the same year that he won the 'Daily News' Footballer-of-the-Year award.

UMPS HELP ROYALS

Umpires are not the ogres everyone thinks they are. No matter what decision they make, someone disagrees — but they still do a great deal for the Australian game.

In fact, two umpires recently went out of their way for a 7 a.m. meeting with East Perth coach Grant Dorrington and Royals skipper John Hayes.

Ross Capes and Ron Buckey, together with Umpires' Advisor Ray Scott, met with the East Perth pair to view a video replay of the East Perth - West Perth match.

In that game Dorrington considered his side did not get the best end of the umpiring. So he sat down, edited a tape of the match, and then contacted the umpires who agreed to discuss the decisions.

"It was a very good meeting," Dorrington says. "It was not a hate session and it proved most beneficial to both parties."

"It made us realise that there are two sides to an argument. They realise they made some bad decisions against East Perth —

but they also made some very good ones.

"The three men put in a big effort to come and meet with us at 7 a.m. and there should be more of these kinds of things happening in football," Dorrington said.

The group discussed the tape for about 90 minutes.

"The reason why there are so many wars, conflicts and strikes in the world today is that no one wants to talk," Dorrington said.

"At least we have talked about it and that is a step in the right direction."

"There are a number of rules in football which can be interpreted more than one way and the umpires explained to us why they chose to see it the way they did."

Dorrington's thinking is on the right lines.

By talking with the men in white he can now tell his players where they are going wrong and they will then have a better understanding of how the umpires operate.

It promises to be a great outing for football fans this weekend at Richmond Raceway.

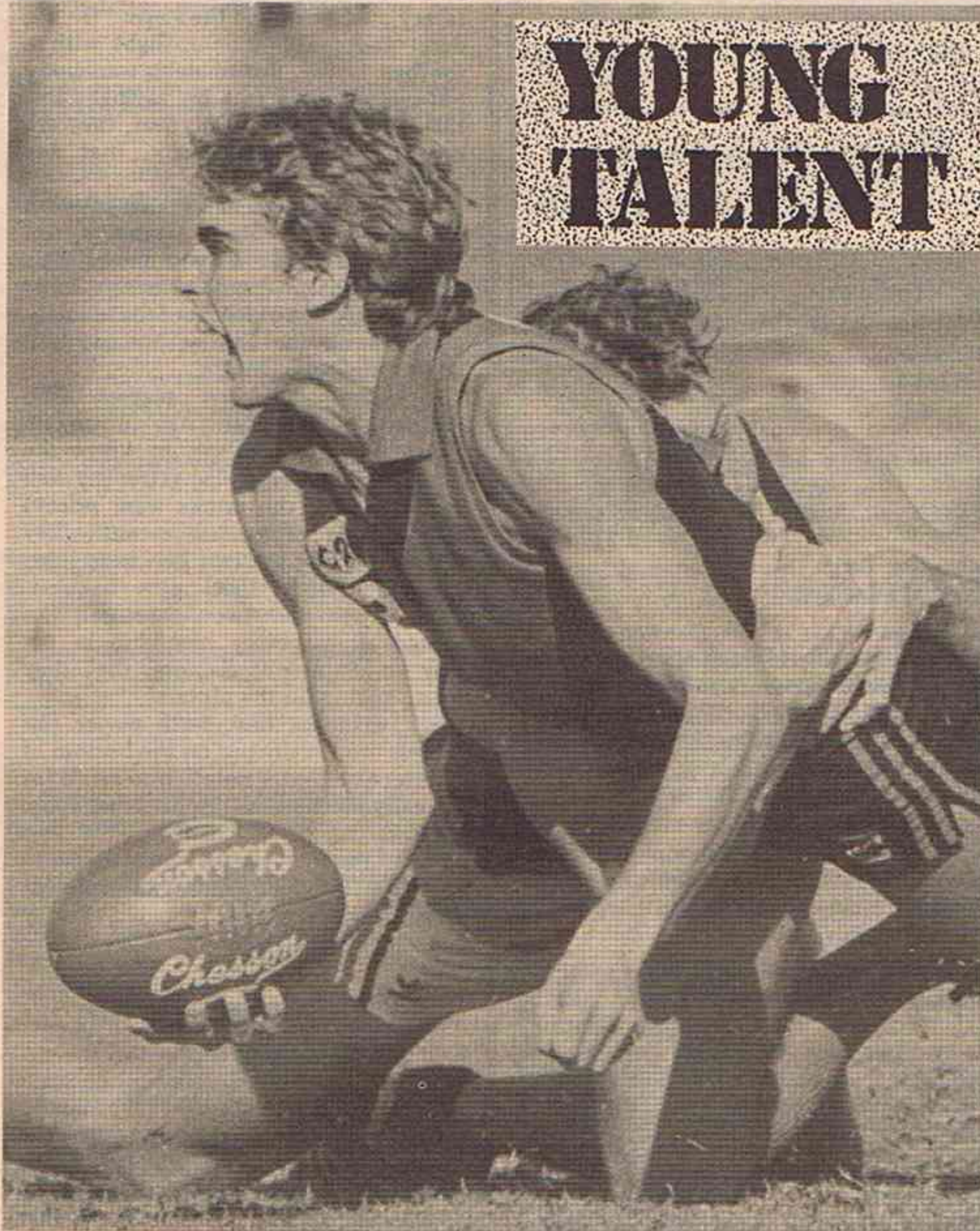
The whole programme will be football orientated and the highlight of the night will be the match race between Mal Brown and Ron Alexander — the coaches of the two Fremantle sides.

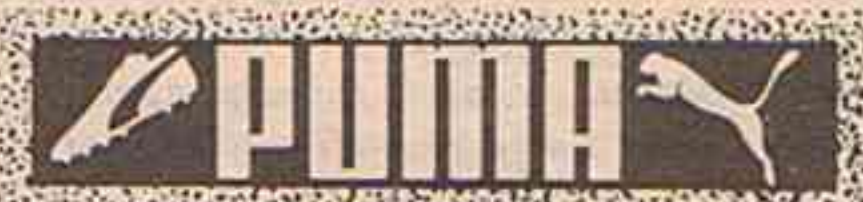
It was not the fact that he halted these forward thrusts which impressed most. It was more the coolness he displayed while under pressure.

Last week, along with many other football critics, I thought Claremont may have been bombarded by the Demons while their four State representatives were away in Adelaide.

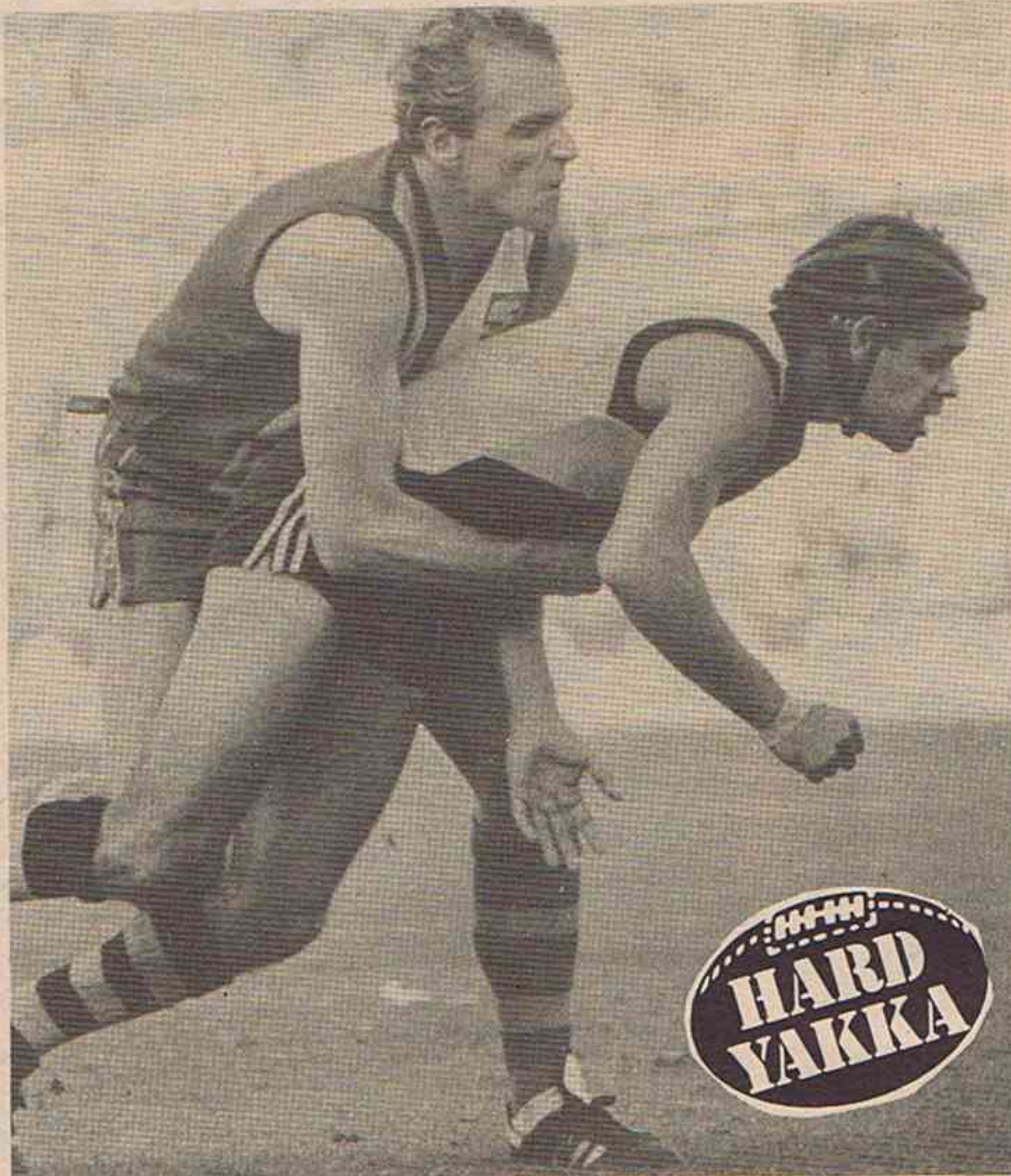
On the front page of Westside Football I said they would be fully tested because they did not have enough talent at Claremont Oval to cover the losses of their stars.

WA PAYS THE PRICE

WA football has paid the price for propping up State teams with expatriates now playing in Victoria.

We have deluded ourselves into thinking we are rivalling Victoria as the State with the best players because of our performances against them in recent years.

We have propped up WA sides so well with former WA players that we have been able to regularly beat Victoria since the inception of State-of-Origin games in 1977.

In the four games we have played against Victoria in Perth since then we have won three and lost one narrowly.

We have tended to ignore SA as a football power.

It was contemptuous of us to send a restricted side to SA... and we paid the penalty.

SA have long taken interstate football seriously. But have we?

I doubt that it would have made much difference if we had picked an unrestricted side. The constant drain of players to Victoria was reflected in the game against SA.

We simply lack quality players, particularly in key positions.

WA should immediately select a State squad and have it train together each week until our return game against SA.

In the past we have usually been able to handle SA on Subiaco Oval. But the way they beat us last Saturday indicates we

may be starting to fall away from SA at interstate level.

Or perhaps we have just been too complacent about interstate football.

Inflexible thinking

HOW important is the individual in league football?

A growing number of players are walking out on clubs because they feel they have not been given a fair go. And on many of those occasions the club concerned has taken an inflexible attitude.

A lot has already been written about the dispute between Peter Avery and Claremont Football Club. Personally I feel Avery was hard done by. What else did he have to do to prove himself in the reserves?

It is interesting to note that Claremont were quick to settle differences that developed with Brett Farmer, yet have been prepared to leave Avery in limbo.

Even so, Claremont shouldn't be condemned too much over the attitude. They have had a tendency to clear players to other clubs who have found it difficult to get a game with them.

It is an attitude that should be taken more often and by all clubs. While it is understandable that a club fighting for a place in the four or for the premiership doesn't want to clear a player to a rival club, I can't see why a player can't be loaned for the remainder of the season to a club lower on the list.

It would help a club ascertain whether or not it is worth keeping that player. More importantly, it would help keep the player in league football in this State.

It would be interesting to see how Avery, who apparently has a lot of talent, performed as a full-forward with another club, particularly as there is no hope of him getting a game in that position with Claremont.

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Six teams undefeated

AT the half-way mark of the 1982 W.A.A.F.L. season, only six teams remain unbeaten.

They are — D Division Hellenics, Dianella (E), Lynwood-Ferndale (F), Wembley No. 4 (I), R.A.A.F. (J) and A.I.C.A. (Sunday Division).

These teams are in the quest to become undefeated champions — something only 19 teams have achieved since 1925.

LAST week two teams lost their first game of the season — Scarborough No. 3 'K' division and Wembley 'A' colts.

Swanbourne 'C' league, Morley No. 2 'G' division, Greenwood No. 2 'K' and 'C' colts Forresterfield all opened their winning account.

Seven teams have yet to win their first game and the next nine weeks hopefully will not be as unproductive.

Trinity-Aquinas meet the improving Mt Lawley and both clubs have much at stake.

Trinity are only out of fourth spot by percentage and Mt Lawley still have an outside chance to take a finals placing.

Both teams have gone from strength to strength and it would not surprise to see the result reversed. The return to form of Tony "Hard" Yakka, Brad Dunn and Peter Hughes could sway it Mt Lawley's way.

OLD Scotch could make sure of third spot by downing Old Wesley and a two-game gap could result.

Old Wesley cannot afford to lose as Trinity and North Beach can easily grab their fourth placing.

However, in their clash earlier in the season they downed Old Scotch in a hard slog encounter and the result should once again be close.

Ken Duffy's recent top form should give Old Wesley an edge at the crucial centre spot.

Collegians, fresh from their second win of the season, should push Wembley much closer than in the opening game when the "Magpies" were runaway winners 23.19 to 8.18.

In recent games Collegians have played passage of good football and with a little more luck and consistency they could have been further up the ladder.

Wembley have been strengthened with the return of Peter Hoar (full-forward) and Bevan Johnson (ruck).

Coach John Coleveary must be concerned with the slow start Wembley have in most games. However, their finishing runs more than offset this.

Nine weeks ago Maylands had everything going for them and they were more than convincing despite going down to Uni 15.20 to 11.14 the last time the two met.

However, over the past few weeks since their defeat of North Beach, they have not performed consistently and it will be hard to see them beating University in their second clash.

Uni have welcomed the on-field experience of Robbie Melville, along with the form of highly-rated John Morrison. Both should contribute to a successful day for their team.

Injury-stricken Nollamara failed by 26 points last time against North Beach and it is difficult to see them having any chance

to reverse that result on present form. North's certainly have enough ability to be a top team, but have failed in recent weeks to capitalize when in winning positions.

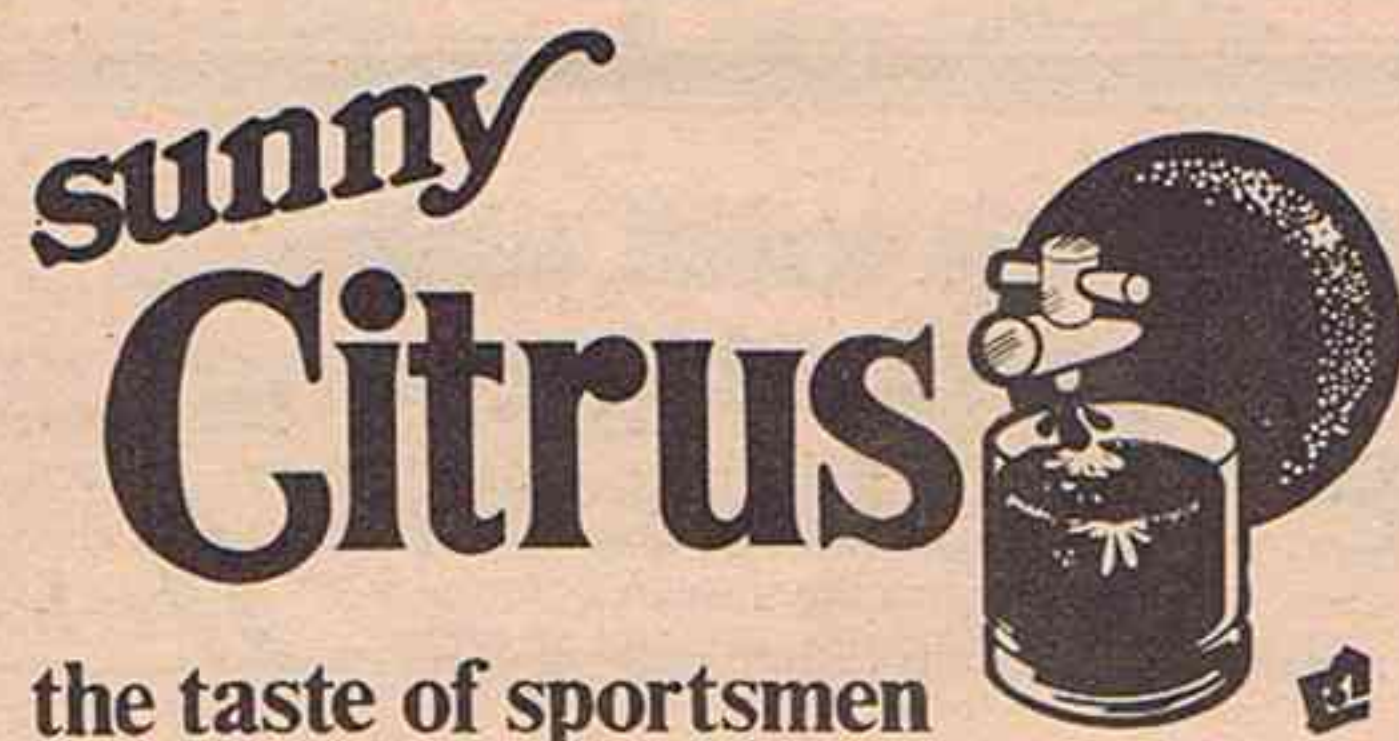
