# WE WILL WIN

## ...says Mal Brown

### STATE coach Mal Brown says WA can beat Victoria.

And he has every reason to be confident. The local squad for Tuesday's big match has a fine sprinkling of talent and boasts many versatile players.

On top of that, WA's record against the Victorians since the first State of Origin match in 1977 is impressive.

In the last five years, there have been four Victoria - WA games played at Subiaco Oval and the local boys have won three of them.

No doubt the Victorians will be keen to erase memories of last year's humiliating defeat in Perth.

But the WA side also has some bad times they would like to wipe out of their minds.

They are coming into the game against the Big V just a month after receiving a drubbing from the South Australians in Adelaide.

Brown loves working on people's minds and you can be sure he will remind his charges of the Adelaide debacle.

He believes that it will be a great match and will not run the risk of going into the clash over-confident.

"We can win. And we will win," Brown says. "But to do that we must play the same style of football which was successful last year."

"We won that match because we ran harder and we had winners all over the ground."



# IT'S A GRAND FINAL

## ...says Bryan Cousins

### IT is grand final day at Lathlain Park on Saturday.

Or at least, that is the way seventh team, Perth are approaching their clash with bottom side Subiaco.

Perth skipper Bryan Cousins says that some of the Demons players are unhappy with criticism levelled at them by the media and they are desperate to prove everyone wrong.

"If there is going to be a grand final for us this season, then this is it," Cousins said this week. "We just have to perform, otherwise all our hard work goes out the window."

"If we lose on Saturday, it means Subiaco have improved more than us. We beat them seven weeks ago and if we can't do it again, they are progressing faster than Perth."

"And they go into this game with better form."

"We have played disastrously in the last fortnight, whereas they have done well without winning."

"We'll be all fired up for a win - just the same as they will," Cousins said.

And the Perth captain can bet Subiaco will be just as keen to win.

After two promising performances in the last fortnight, Subiaco can smell their first points for 1982.

A win from their point of view is probably more important. It could be their last chance to break the duck.

Lose on Saturday and the Lions have only five more games in which to get off the mark - and they have a tough run home.

Of these games, four are against teams chasing a finals berth. The Lions have also received their fair share of flak from the media for non-competitiveness.

This game could be important as far as the future is concerned.

It would do Subiaco no good at all to finish the year without registering points.

### SETBACK

A loss would set back Perth's programme considerably.

They have put up some strong efforts against top sides and to capitulate against Subiaco on Saturday is something coach Ian Miller will not want.

As Cousins says: "We don't want Perth to be labelled as a side that did not achieve its objectives for the season. I just hope the players realise the magnitude of the importance of this game."

Even though the two bottom teams will be playing this game, it should be a great contest - particularly with the futures of some players at both clubs on the line.

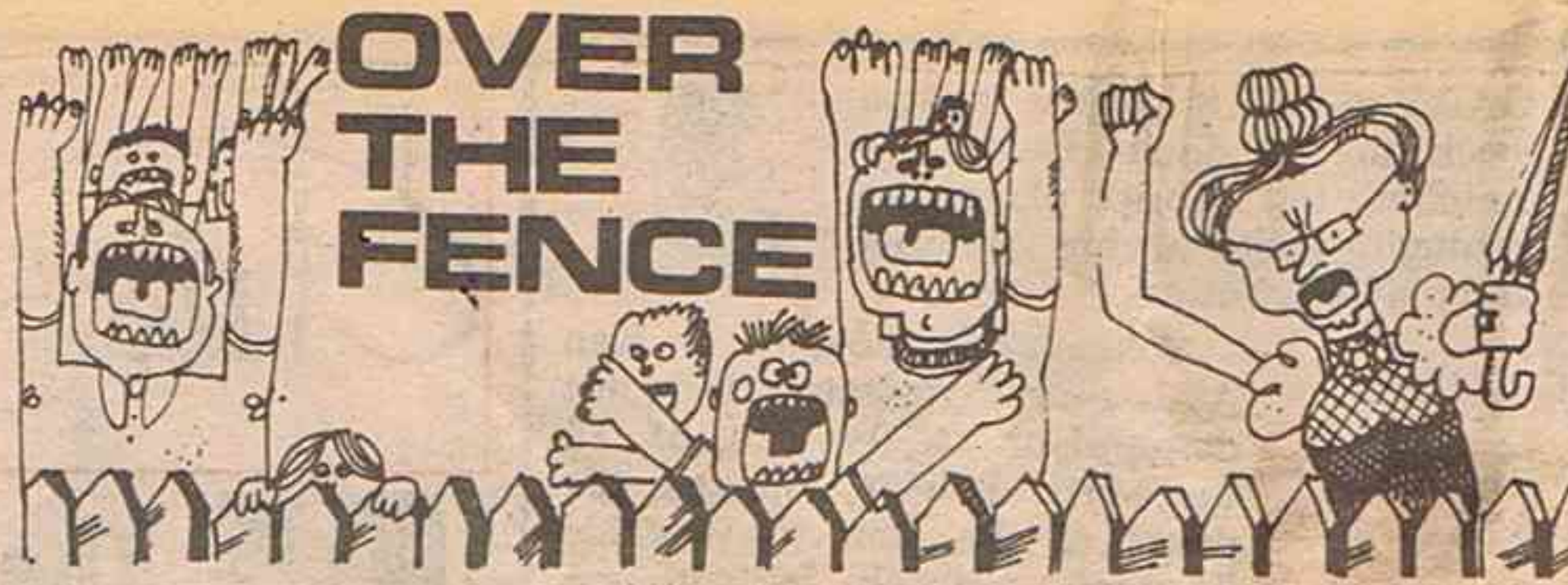
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## Demon double

# Let's have more life at the tribunals

Hardly a week goes by without at least one alleged transgressor of football rules making an appearance at the Tribunal.

In fact there's been only one week this season when the Tribunal room hasn't been graced with a league footballer charged with a violation of the rules.

The charges have been many and varied encompassing practically every rule in the book, but mercifully so far we've been spared a Wimbledon situation where people can be charged with abusing a ball. Mind you, it would have been quite valid to have arraigned the Claremont side last week on a charge of ball abuse, in that they seemingly deliberately avoided guiding the said ball through the goalposts more than 11 times after having had some 32 opportunities to do so.

But with the frequency of tribunal hearings this season (at one stage there were two going on at once) an air of repetition has crept into proceedings, and the time has come to make them more palatable to all concerned.

## TOO POLITE

The advocates for both the players and the umpires lack panache, and forfeit the opportunity to become personalities in the true dramatic sense. Not only do they sit down throughout the whole proceedings, but are frequently polite to the person they are trying to prove wrong.

Some even use first names when cross examining. Not once has a table been thumped, and not once has an advocate risen from his chair, utilised the pregnant pause, or engaged in the art of pacing the floor in his final summary. Mind you, this is nothing that can't be fixed by these concerned merely watching some re-runs of Perry Mason or Owen Marshall.

The chairman could also help by discarding his conservative suit in favour of the accoutrements of at least a Supreme Court judge, complete with gavel and black hat in case he wished to impose the death penalty, which in extreme cases would be handy to have written into the constitution.

But in the main, the advocates have had their colours lowered by some of the more loquacious players they've been defending.

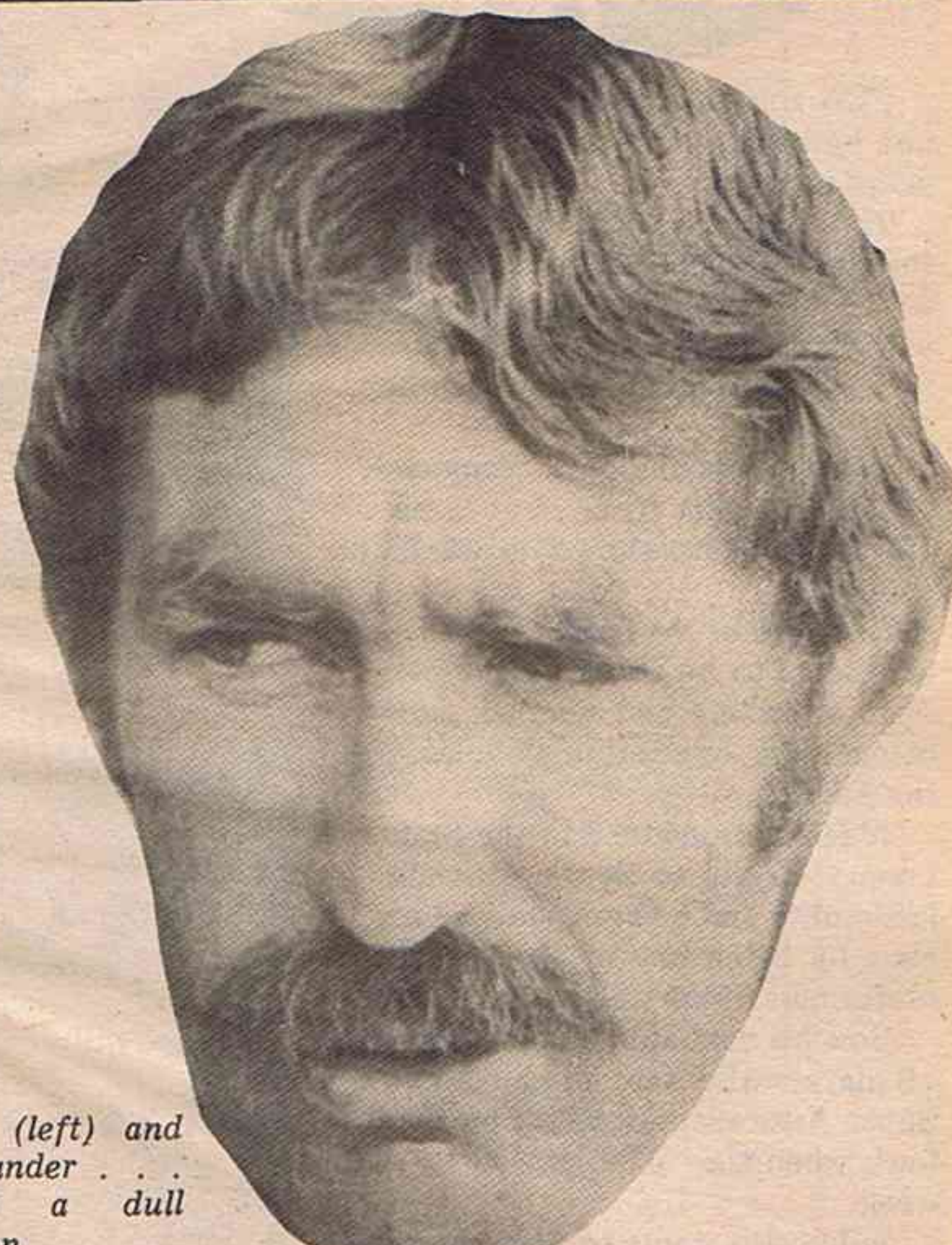
## EXCEPTION

Big Ron threatened to jump through the window if he was found guilty of a kicking charge. Fortunately, for Ron... the plate glass window at the League... and my car which was parked directly below, the charge was dismissed.

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# a versatile sportsman

FEW football fans would realise just how versatile a sportsman Ken Judge is.

The star East Fremantle half-forward played first grade cricket with Fremantle and A-grade baseball with East Fremantle — and he likes to tackle any other sport when he finds time.

Injury problems have hampered his league career so far, but in his 100 games he has shown outstanding ability.

He is one of the freak footballers who seem to be able to kick goals from anywhere and his ball skills often leave opposition defenders floundering.

Judge was included in the State team to travel to South Australia last month and he again showed his class by being one of the better performers in the side.

Now his next aim, like the other 19 players who were humbled by the South Australians, is to get his own back when they play here next week.

Judge also wants to play against Victoria, and more importantly with his good friend Tony Buhagiar. Buhagiar will be eligible because it will be a State-of-Origin game — and Judge is keen to win a place in the same side as his former teammate.

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to Judge and discovered some of his sporting loves.

opted out of going. The money was pretty good, but I looked at it from the point of view that this was the sort of work I had always wanted to get into and I had only been here 12 months.

(Judge is a sales rep with a sporting company).

**Q: What were you doing before this?**

A: I used to work in an office at the Mosman Park Council as a clerk. I was there for about four years.

**Q: Have you been reasonably happy with your form this year?**

A: No, not really. I would like to be playing a lot better. I was a bit slow starting off the year because of cricket finals and it took me about three games to find my touch. I was just about at my peak when I was injured and that set me back a little bit. I would like to be playing a lot better.

**Q: What about East Fremantle, are they going as well as you would like them to?**

A: No. I think we can improve. Obviously we were missing a lot of players who were either injured or suspended and I think we have to realise that unless you put it together for a full game you don't succeed and we haven't been doing that enough. When we have done that we have beaten three of the top five sides — West Perth, Swans and South and we played for 120 minutes in those games. But in other matches we are only playing in quarters. You can't beat top sides and you can't be a top side if you don't put it together for a full game. Things don't improve by just talking about it and it is something we have to work on and get it out of our system. I think we have the talent to make the finals although it won't be easy now.

**Q: You have been at the club during some pretty lean times since the 1979 premiership — do you know what the problem has been?**

A: Once again it has to get down to application or dedication from the players' point of view. It is hard to get to the top and it is even harder to stay there and some of the guys perhaps didn't want to do it the hard way any more. Even if you have ability the hard things have to be done and I don't think the players wanted to win badly enough after that grand final. They were content to sit back and say we have won one instead of going on and wanting to stay there like South have done.

**Q: Did you always dream of playing league football with East Fremantle?**

A: I always supported them and I wanted to play for them. It was an ambition of mine to play league footy but it does not become a reality until you are playing in a side with people you really respect. People that two or three years before you had been sitting in the crowd idolising. And then one day you are getting changed with your locker next to theirs. David Hollins was probably a prime example. I idolised him when I was young and then I managed to play footy with him.

**Q: How long did it take you to progress through colts and reserves to the league side?**

A: I went to East Fremantle in 1974 and I played six games in what was then known as under-19's and then I played the rest of the year in under-21's. The next year I played about half a year of seconds and then started playing league.

**Q: Have you been troubled by injury during your career?**

A: Yes, all the way through. In 1976 I had my ankle reconstructed after dislocating it in a reserves match against East Perth and had to have the operation. In 1978 I hurt my knee in a league game against Claremont and had to have that reconstructed as well. It happened on the Saturday and I had the operation on the Monday night. While I have just played my 100th game now I should have played about 150. When I did my ankle I did it in about the third game when I was just starting to show a bit of form. I was out for the rest of the year and in 1978 I did it at the end of the second round so I didn't play for the rest of the year then.

**Q: Did you play most of your junior football in Palmyra?**

A: Yes, and that is how I eventually came to play at East Fremantle.

**Q: Did anyone have a big influence on your career in those early days?**

A: Yes, a guy by the name of Peter Waterman, who coached me in combined sides. He was a rival coach in club fixtures, but he helped me along the way all the time and he assisted me greatly when I was trying out for the State schoolboys, which I ended up making in 1973. He was just about a second father to me when I was young. He also helped guys like Leigh Brenton. Leigh was a very good friend and he took us under his wing and he was probably the biggest single factor to influence my career in the junior days.

**Q: Did Peter help you get to East Fremantle?**

A: He was one of the most respected junior coaches in the East Fremantle area and still is to this day, although he is not coaching there anymore. He had a big influence on junior footy in East Fremantle. He was a very well respected guy and he coached a lot of the little league sides when they first started. He was really a big help.

**Q: You say you are coaching a cricket team — in which association is that and at what level would you rate it?**

A: I am coaching CBC in the Fremantle Mercantile Association and it is a pretty high standard.

**Q: Do you bat or bowl?**

A: I'm an all-rounder and I have been pretty successful down there as a coach. Since I have been coaching we have won four out of five first grade premierships and we were runners-up the other time. It was a fairly social sort of club when I started there and I have gradually instilled a bit of discipline in the side. I played one game of A-grade cricket for Fremantle in 1979. They had always asked me to go and play with them and I didn't really want to

because of my football commitments. I didn't think I could devote the time necessary to succeed. It is probably one of my regrets that I didn't play more than one pennant game.

**Q: How did you go in that match?**

A: I was run out for two and got none for about 40 off 15 or 16 overs. I had a few catches put down off my bowling so I bowled all right. Rod Marsh was playing — it was the first game of the year just after the footy grand final in 1979 and I hadn't trained at all for cricket. I came on when he was in full flight. From memory I think he opened and slogged the ball all around the ground on his way to 80 odd. I was bowling all over the place early because I hadn't had any practice and in the second spell I bowled a lot better.

**Q: What do you bowl?**

A: I bowl medium pace. I try to bowl quick but they come through at medium pace.

**Q: Have you played any other sports at the top level?**

A: Yes, I played A-grade baseball for East Fremantle. I used to play baseball on Sundays and football on Saturdays. I suppose I was a reasonable baseballer but once again I just didn't have the time needed to put into the game. I played State under-17 baseball.

**Q: You must have been happy to work your way back into the State football side after being injured for a couple of weeks just before the team went to Adelaide?**

A: Yes, but the result was disappointing. I thought we would do a lot better than we did.

**Q: Any thoughts of going to Victoria yourself?**

A: I don't know at the moment. I wanted to go earlier on this year. I thought of going at the end of January and then come back as soon as the footy season was over because I wanted to keep my job. Unfortunately the boss said he could not guarantee he could keep the job for me so I

For a side that could easily have been undefeated in their past eight matches — their only two losses were by three points — Claremont find that they are now playing for a place in the four.

Their three-point loss to East Perth last week has virtually been the difference between securing a second semi-final berth and the position they now find themselves in.

On form they should stay on target for a second semi-final berth by beating East Fremantle, at East Fremantle Oval.

But they will need to brush up their play in attack. They paid dearly for their inaccurate kicking for goals last Saturday. They were also way off target against West Perth the previous week.

Old Easts were well and truly bundled out of the fight for a place in the four last Saturday but there is still some kick left in them.

They won't be taken for granted, particularly at East Fremantle Oval. If Old Easts play the kind of football they have demonstrated on occasions this season, then they could give Claremont a difficult time.



Sorry Subiaco. You blew your chance to win a game this season last Saturday.

Even though you are playing second bottom side Perth you won't open your account this week.

Despite your narrow loss and the drubbing handed out to the Demons by South Fremantle last Saturday, Perth will be difficult to beat at Lathlain Park.

This could easily be Subiaco's last chance to win a game this season so they are sure to approach it in a very determined fashion.

But Perth have already handled them twice this season and as the game is at Lathlain, the Lions look to have the job ahead of them to crack it.

It will take more than the determination displayed by Subiaco in the past two weeks to anchor Perth's small men.



East Perth jagged a win against Claremont last week. They won't find Swan Districts so obliging this week.

The Royals were only able to snatch victory because of the Tigers atrocious kicking for goal. East Perth's mid-field play was pathetic at times.

Unless they tidy up that aspect of their play the Royals will remain in the hot seat in the fight for a place in the finals.

Centreman Peter Thorne will have the opportunity to make Swans coach John Todd eat his words in this game. When they last met Todd made it clear that he wasn't impressed with Thorne.

And there would have been justification for that remark if he had seen Thorne in action against Claremont.

Wayne Blackwell completely carved him up. Thorne has shown that he is a very damaging player given a free rein, but he doesn't have a great appetite for winning the hard ball.

No doubt he will be subjected to close attention this week. How he performs could have a big bearing on the outcome.

East Perth certainly don't lack character but they will need more than that against Swans who are back to their best form and already appear to have wrapped up a second semi-final berth.



South Fremantle coach Mal Brown said after last week's fixtures he was disappointed East Perth and West Perth had got up to win.

Brown will find that South won't be able to rely on other teams getting them into the four.

This week the matter is in their hands. A win could put them equal on premiership points with West Perth and East Perth.

A loss would probably see one of the sides they hope to displace get enough space to guarantee them a place in the four.

South have been something of an enigma this season. Though they have been hard hit by injuries they are a vastly contrasting side in home and away games.

They are a very difficult side to beat at Fremantle Oval but have been almost insipid at times away from that ground.

For that reason they will not go into this game with a great deal of confidence.

It will be interesting to see whether West Perth are starting to falter. They were lucky to beat Subiaco last week, not the kind of credentials to suggest they will be the side to beat in this match.

# INTERSTATE UPDATE

## COWBOY RIDES INTO SAINTS JOB



**KEVIN 'Cowboy' Neale has put himself on the coaching market in Melbourne . . . as he's heading straight back to his old club, St Kilda.**

The word is out in the VFL traps that Neale will take over from Alex Jesaulenko at the end of the season.

Suggestions that other coaching 'heavies' such as Tom Hafey might end up with the St Kilda job have been scuttled. It seems as though St Kilda will opt for home-grown material — something that Collingwood will now also do as a result of the Hafey sacking.

Melbourne's two Sunday newspapers — both in the controversial mould — have been speculating on the future of the St Kilda coach for some weeks now, following the mid-season execution of Hafey and Royce Hart (Footscray).

The Sunday Observer's Shadow reports 'exclusively' that Jesaulenko has just seven games to go before he severs his ties with the club that he took over at the end of the second round of the 1980 season — when Mike Patterson got the axe.

Neale, who has coached with success in Canberra after retiring as a 256-game player with St Kilda, has been putting in a lot of appearances on the VFL scene recently — and makes no secret of the fact that he's available for a senior coaching spot.

Neale's record with the Ainslie club in Canberra is impressive. They have reached the grand final every year in the five that he has coached them, winning two flags. In 1980 they went through undefeated and are again unbeaten so far this year.

He has revealed that he had talks earlier this year with St Kilda officials, but was told that nothing could be done till the end of the 1982 season.

Even though Neale is obviously in the market for a senior coaching role, he hasn't put the skids under Jesaulenko. In fact, he defended the Saints coach at one stage this week.

He said that the finger shouldn't be pointed at the present coach for St Kilda's downfall.

"He lacks a few experienced players, but I believe St Kilda does have the makings of a reasonable side", said Neale.

### Kink is gagged

**VOLATILE** Collingwood forward Rene Kink came under official restrictions by the Pies committee after he was reported last week.

Kink, dropped to the reserves because of indifferent form, was reported by four umpires in the matinee match against North Melbourne.

Kink was talking freely to the press in the reserves rooms after the game when Magpie president John Hickey gently removed him from the impromptu press conference.

The fiery 'Incredible Hulk' is on the transfer market at present and he looked a little annoyed when he was 'gagged'. But he still managed to tell the Press that he felt the umpires were out after him.

Club officials have disciplined Kink over comments made on radio about his own form and the club in general.

### WELLS COMEBACK?

**CARLTON** veteran Greg Wells could be talked out of retirement.

The 32-year-old Wells, with 269 games behind him at Melbourne and Carlton, told officials recently that he had reached the end of the road.

But the Blues hierarchy believe that Wells still has something to offer the Carlton camp.

Wells obviously suffered a lapse in his enthusiasm after Carlton won last year's premiership — an elusive goal that enticed him to leave Melbourne after 236 games to have the chance of sharing in a flag success.

### WALLACE EMERGES

**HAWTHORN's** Terry Wallace has emerged as one of the football trendsetters for the 1982 season.

The Hawks centreman has joined his team-mate Leigh Matthews as joint leader in the Sunday Observer's footballer-of-the-year award, with more than 40 possessions in the game against Richmond.

Though Wallace is up in the forefront of most media awards, the general feeling is that he won't win many Brownlow Medal votes. He is an unobtrusive type of player, doing a lot of hard work that often goes un-noticed.



## Sidey's last stand

**VICTORIAN** football officials are prepared to give Garry Sidebottom another chance . . . and Fitzroy is the club that has put him back into business.

Sidebottom, the high-priced refugee from St Kilda and Geelong, lined up with the Fitzroy reserves against Essendon last week and picked up 13 kicks and six handballs. He showed a desire to work hard and be a team-man and Lions officials are hoping that he can adopt a new football attitude.

Sidebottom's fitness failed as the Fitzroy side was slaughtered by 82 points. He started well at centre-half-back and though he moved into attack later in the game, his strongest football was in defence.

In the previous clash against Fitzroy — the fifth round of the season — Madden was on the interchange bench for the reserves after being late for the early match.

He completed his return to the upper echelon of football with his brilliant display and if the two Maddens can continue their form, the Bombers will have the ability to dominate the big man department this year.



## Double champs day

**IT** was a day of Double celebrations as the illustrious 300-club welcomed two new VFL members — Barry Breen at St Kilda and North Melbourne's adopted son, Gary Dempsey.

Breen — the man who kicked the point that gave St Kilda their only premiership, in 1966 — was given another hero's ovation as he was chaired off the ground after helping the Saints down Footscray in the bottom-of-the-table clash.

Dempsey didn't enjoy such a good day, even though North won a hard-fought clash with Melbourne.

But they both reflected in the glory of the day . . . with these after-match comments: **DEMPSEY:** "The ultimate would be to be a member of the team that wins the premiership. I've won fairest and bests at Footscray and North and the Brownlow Medal. Now I want a premiership."

**BREEN:** "I'm tired, emotional and very, very happy. Quite simply, you just can't buy memories like that. The future? Let me see out the season and that'll be it."

**THE** departure from the Sydney Swans camp of Max James has left a few disappointed people with a sour taste in their mouths.

James, a faithful if somewhat unpredictable servant of South Melbourne for 4½ seasons, has rejoined Port Adelaide, his original South Australian club.

He skipped out of town last week with little fuss or fanfare after talks with Swans officials decided that his career would be better served in Adelaide.

"I am very disappointed, but that's the way things go," he said.

"I had a lot of good times with South, and a few bad times. But the good times outweigh the bad."

James, now 30, will continue living in Melbourne and commute to Adelaide till he can sell up. He believes that he has another three years of football left in his legs.

**THE** SANFL has announced increases in the cost of watching this year's league grand final.

A grand final seat ticket under cover on the concourse level will cost \$10 for adults, and \$5 for pensioners and children, an increase of \$2.50 on the adult price.

A seat ticket on the terrace level will be \$8 for adults and \$4 for pensioners, compared with an adult price of \$5 for standing terrace room last year.

The price of a ticket for all six finals will be \$33 for adults and \$16 for pensioners and children, a rise from \$30 and \$15 last year.

Capacity crowd for the grand final will be 48,000 — all seated.

## One-way ticket

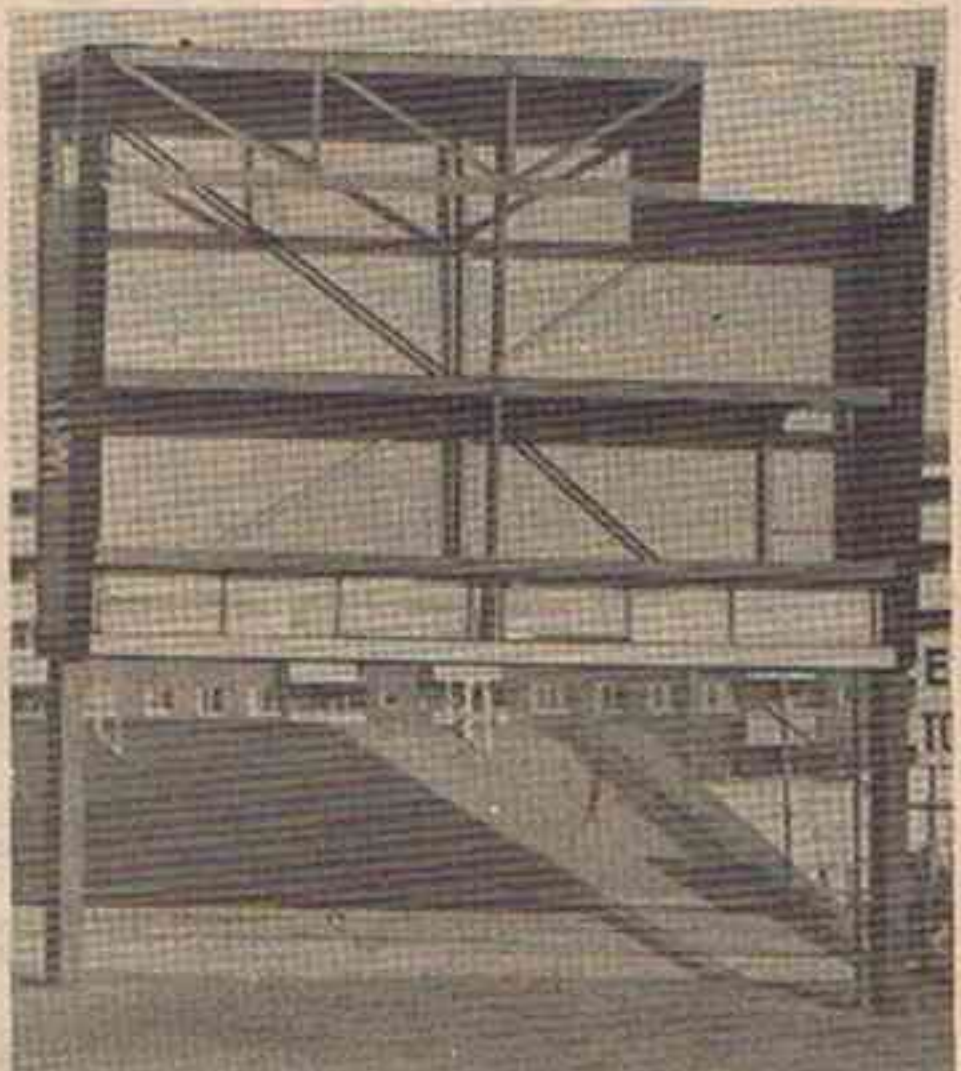

### AMATEURS

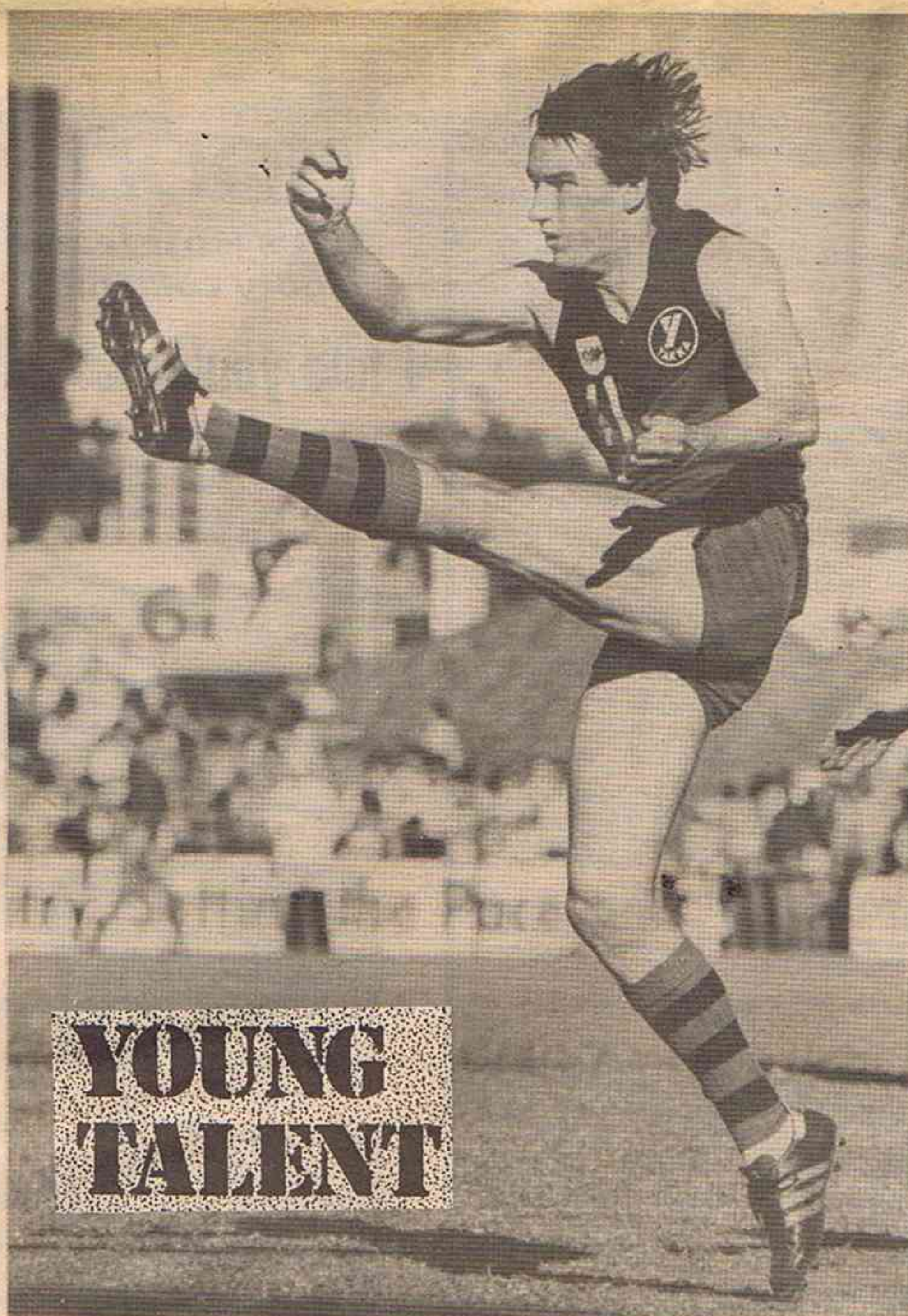

# Carpenter finds his niche

Over the years East Perth have developed a habit of producing top class youngsters . . . and that trend seems to be continuing.

Since Greg Carpenter made his debut against Perth in the first round he has been a consistent contributor for the Royals on a wing.

He has taken all before him and seems destined for better things.

The 20-year-old clerk is a gifted player. His left foot passes into the forward line regularly find their target and he will be expected to play an important role in his side's bid to win the premiership.

Carpenter has set a perfect example for other aspiring league footballers.

He got his chance in the third game of the season and has not looked back. He made the most of his opportunity and is now a regular league player.

Although he still has a long way to go, he has done everything right in his debut season.

In the early matches he naturally lacked confidence, but his efforts are growing in stature every week as he gets more senior games under his belt.

He is a deceptive and "heady" player. In the recent match against East Fremantle — possibly his best performance in league

ranks — Carpenter found himself up against a much taller opponent in Clinton Browning.

The Old Easts utility player had been in good form before that match and Carpenter knew he would have to keep his mind on the job for the full 100 minutes if he was to win the duel.

He was conceding 13cm in height but had enough intelligence to bring the ball to ground level so he had a better than even chance of winning possession.

The theory worked in practice and that marked the turning point in Carpenter's game.

In his early matches he did some fine things in the first half but faded badly in the last two quarters.

But against Browning he knew that he could not afford a lapse because the East Fremantle wingman was capable of destroying the side.

Since that day Carpenter has put in four quarter efforts on each occasion.

The former Albany player was bound to Claremont when he first came to Perth and secured a clearance to go to the Royals. East Perth's gain has certainly been the Tigers' loss.



### Turner's share

Dean Turner kicked four goals for the Royals in the match against Claremont and all came in the third quarter. In fact, at the 17-minute mark of the opening term of the Fremantle Oval game between Souths and Perth, Stephen Michael put a virtual mortgage on the \$100 cheque. He took the ball in front of a goalsquare pack and snapped it straight back over his head for a major. It would have taken a pretty good effort to top that goal.

### HAPPY HARDIE

SOUTH Fremantle's young star Brad Hardie was in a goal-happy mood against Perth. He continually split the Demons' defence open with his creative play and he could do no wrong when it came to shooting for goals. His third — on his way to a bag of seven — was a particularly brilliant snap shot from deep in the forward pocket. He had followed play down from the centre and his backing up enabled him to be right on the spot when team-mate Rod Barrett was looking for someone to take an urgent handpass. Even though Hardie was on the boundary line, the angle back over his left shoulder didn't seem to trouble him.

### FORTUNES FLUCTUATE

THE changing fortunes of football was well illustrated in the South Fremantle-Perth game last week. Perth's Mick Morris had been struggling to get himself into the play, but suddenly mid-way through the second term he was right in the limelight. Perth, finding it difficult to get to the goals, saw Harris emerge from his half-forward flank spot to produce two great snapshots within the same minute to revive the Demons.

**Robert Wiley:** A top rover now, after a slow start. Has few superiors in the roving position in VFL football and is one of the players to make Richmond 'tick'.

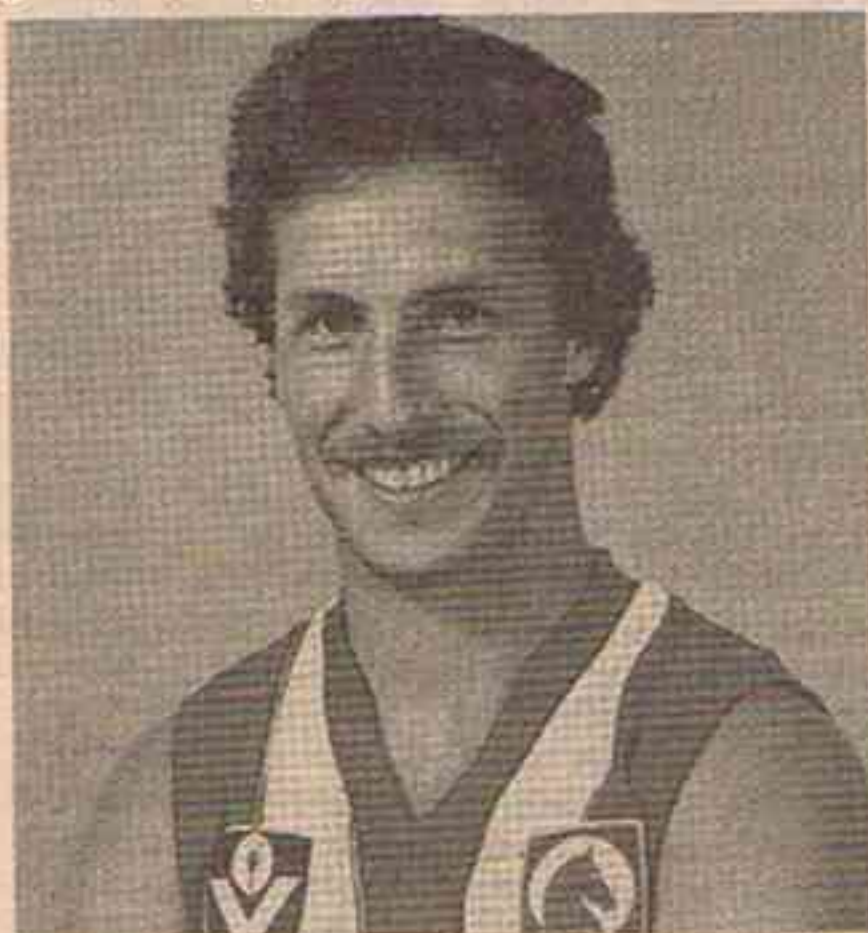
**Craig Holden:** Has not set the world on fire as yet, but still commands a place in a top side every week, so he must be doing something right without being spectacular.

**Brian Peake:** The Geelong captain has lowered his 'colours' only once this year in the centre. When Peake plays well so do Geelong.

**Peter Featherby:** Playing better now with Geelong than he ever did with Footscray. He has lifted Geelong's forward line and is always dangerous near goals. Unfortunately he does have off days and is another player who can fire the Cats when in full flight.

**Gary Buckenara:** Has fitted into the Hawthorn forward line like a glove. He has added depth to Hawthorn's attack and is always getting goals for himself and his

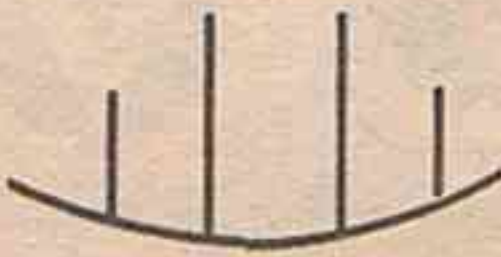

### GROUND SHARING

There have been many reasons put forward this year as to why attendances have been down, such as increased admission prices, non-competitive games and the player drain to Victoria. One reason is that after sitting in the comforts of their lounge room and watching top international competitions live from all over the world, it does not compare to standing in the rain with an umbrella. That is an average of just over 35 players from each club. Here is the break up — 37 East Fremantle; 34 South Fremantle; 37 Claremont; 33 West Perth; 31 Swan Districts; 37 East Perth; 38 Perth; 41 Subiaco

It is interesting to note that Swan Districts have used the least number of players as they are also on top of the premiership table.

Last week three Perth players journeyed to the club's country area and assisted training at the Cunderdin Football Club. The coach asked that his charges be given a solid workout and time was of no object. The boys really got into their training but unfortunately had a small interruption . . . One I have forgotten to mention looks to have a big (tall) future in football. I am, of course, referring to Essendon ruckman Justin Madden who stands a mere 6.9% on the old scale. It should be a great contest next Tuesday afternoon with WA once again having the opportunity to send the Vics back with their tails between their legs.

## The men who have represented the West

Since regular interstate matches between Victoria and West Australia commenced in 1904 a total of 538 West Australians have represented their State.

This previously unpublished list records the names of every player who has played for WA against Victoria.

Of the 538 listed, a total of 141 players also played league football for Victoria either before or after representing WA.

Club representation is fairly even with both South Fremantle and West Perth supplying 81 different players each with East Perth only one behind those on 80. Then follows East Fremantle (73), Perth (63), Subiaco (55), Claremont (or Claremont-Cottesloe) (46), Swan Districts (36), Kalgoorlie Railways (12), Mines Rovers (10), Boulder City (8), North Fremantle (7), Horseshoe Warriors (2) and Midland Junction (1) — the last three clubs now defunct as a senior body.

Phil Matson for his three games played with three different clubs — Boulder City, North Fremantle and Subiaco — while the greatest number of games against Victoria belongs to Norm Rogers of East Fremantle with 13. Others to have been in ten games or more are Derek Chadwick (10), Jack Clarke (10), Graham Farmer (12), Brian Foley (11), Mervyn McIntosh (10), Graham Moss (10), Keith Slater (11) and Bill Walker (10).

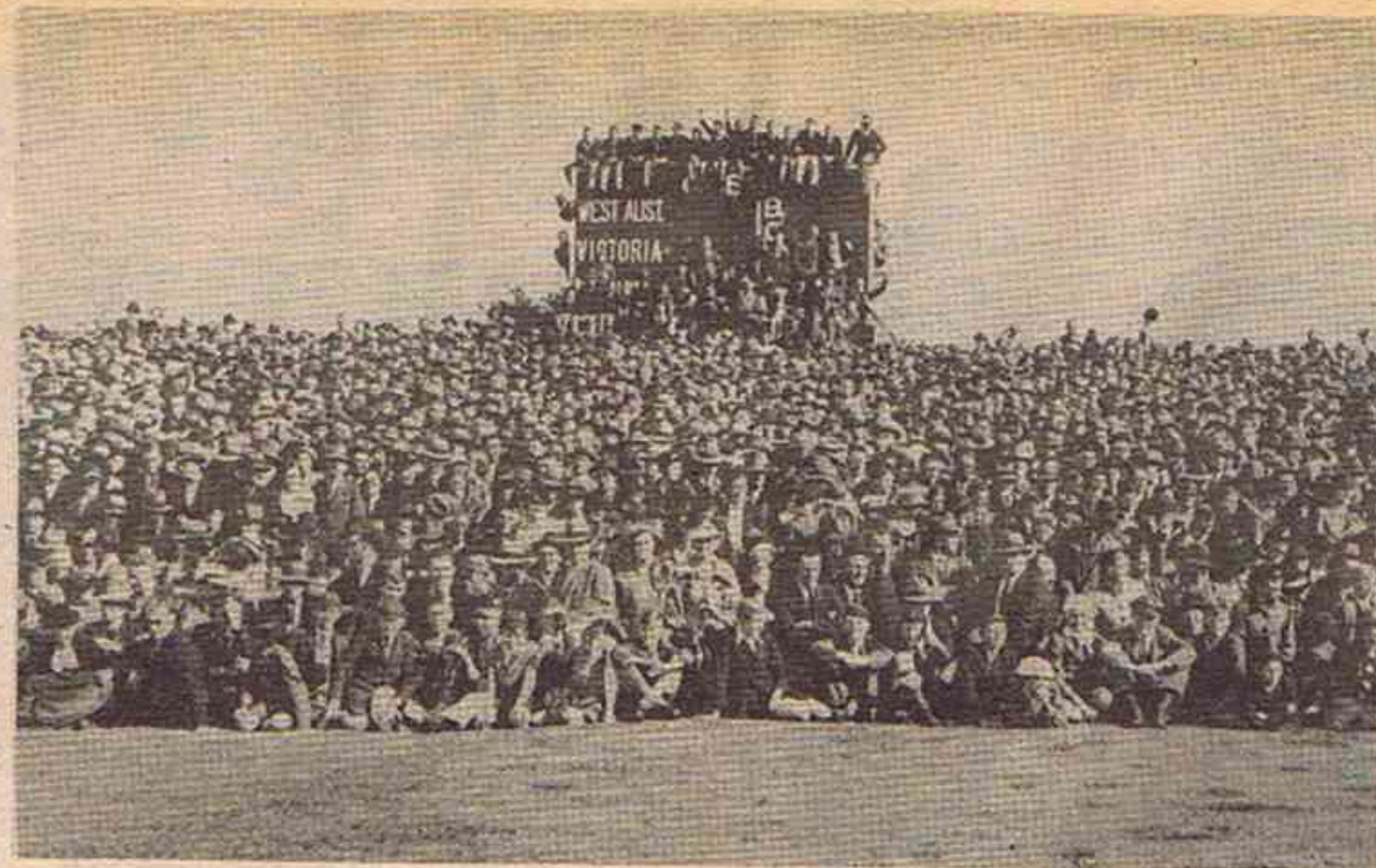

# THE TUESDAY EXPERIMENT

If 15,000 people turn out to next Tuesday's interstate clash it could set a precedent for the future.

That is the figure the WAFL is aiming at for the big State of Origin match between WA and Victoria.

And if the experiment comes up trumps all future State games could be held on a week day.

In the past many people have argued that State matches should not clash with normal fixtures.

When the WA team travelled to Adelaide last month some clubs faced important matches without their star players. And three teams - South Fremantle, Claremont and East Fremantle - had to go into the games without their coaches.

Had East Fremantle beaten West Perth in that vital clash on June 12 the shape of the final four could now be completely different. Captain coach Ron Alexander would have made a big difference to his side's performance.

The WAFL has gone all out to get the crowd they want at Tuesday's match. They have sent letters to all secondary schools in Perth inviting them to be guests of the WAFL at the game.

Seats have been reserved for the school children and WAFL general manager Mr Peter Bowler said he expected "quite a few thousand youngsters under the supervision of their teachers to be at Subiaco Oval."

The WAFL will also begin an extensive advertising programme on Sunday to get people to the game.

And there is no reason why the WAFL should not get the crowd they expect.

The game will start earlier - at 1.45 p.m. so that the match can be televised live back to Melbourne.

The preliminary game will see the State school boys side play a combined high schools team.

## TALENT ADVANCES

THE last time WA played Victoria in Perth was April 27, 1981, when the WAFL's \$4 million grandstand was opened.

On that day the curtain-raiser was a match between two teams of Teal Cup candidates - the cream of our under-17 footballers.

A number of interesting names were in those team lists; names that are now featuring in league ranks in WA.

Glancing down the list of one team we see Michael Mort (Subiaco), Warren Dean

(Subiaco), Steve Da Rui (East Perth), Rhett Baynes (Perth) and Peter Sartori (Swan Districts).

The team list for their opponents included Brent Hutton (Swan Districts), Alex Ishchenko (East Perth), Paul Harding (East Fremantle) and Mike Smith (Swan Districts).

It's interesting to note the number of Teal Cup players who have gone on to represent their club at senior level this season.

## POSSIBLE PLACINGS

Tuesday's big match between Victoria and WA should provide fans with everything they wish to see.

A few WA players will put their interstate reputations on the line and they will be keen to send the Victorians home with the bitter taste of defeat in their mouths.

But the Victorians also have a point to prove.

When they made the trip over last year they were well beaten and being a State which does not accept defeat easily they will be all out to avenge the loss.

They brought in some new faces for the clash and it will be interesting to see how these players face up to the test.

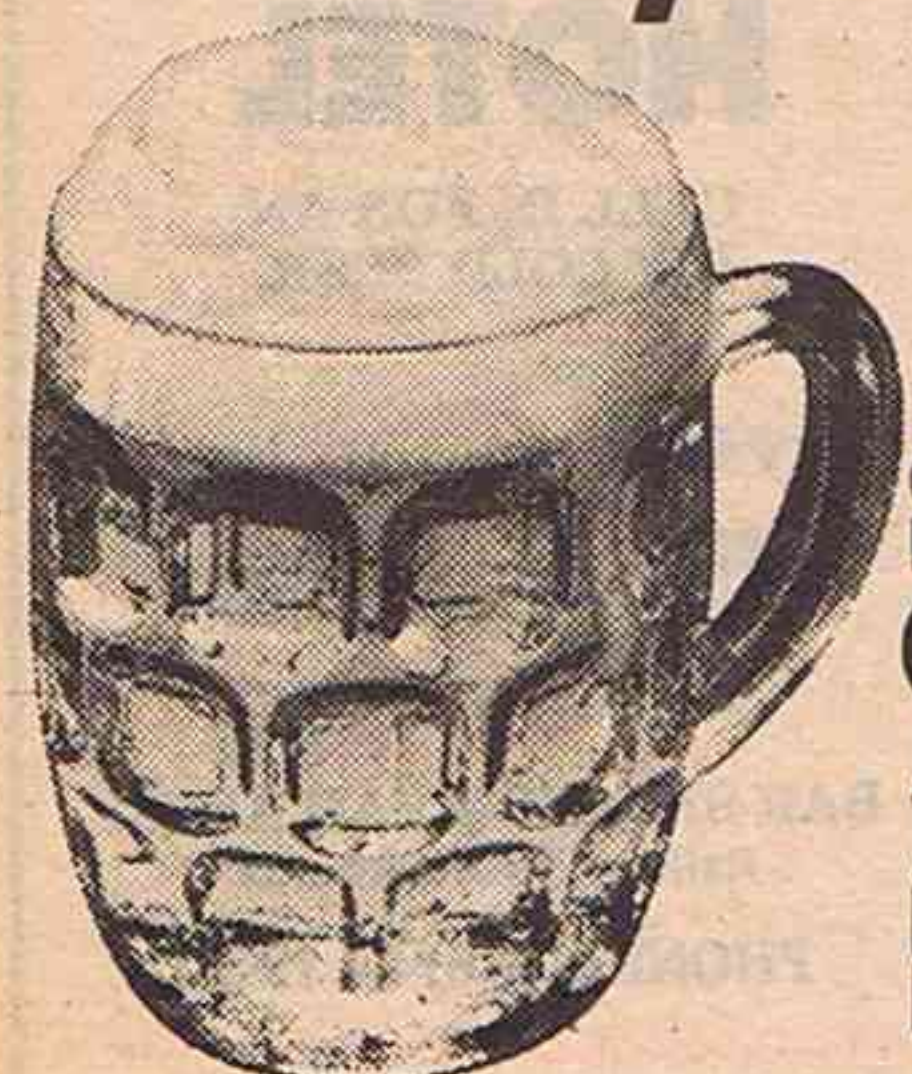

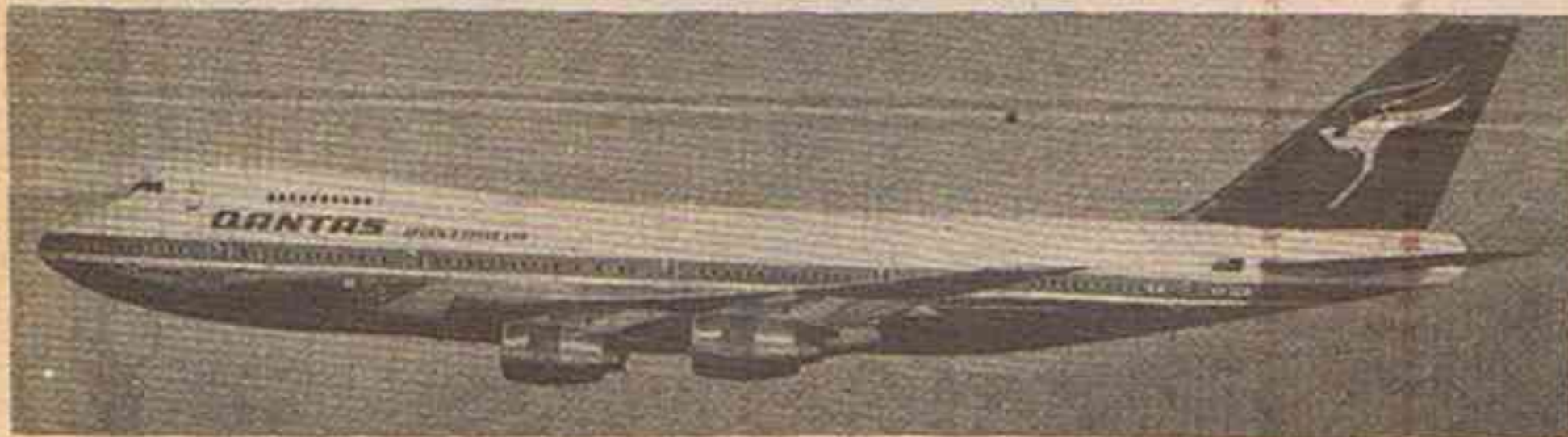
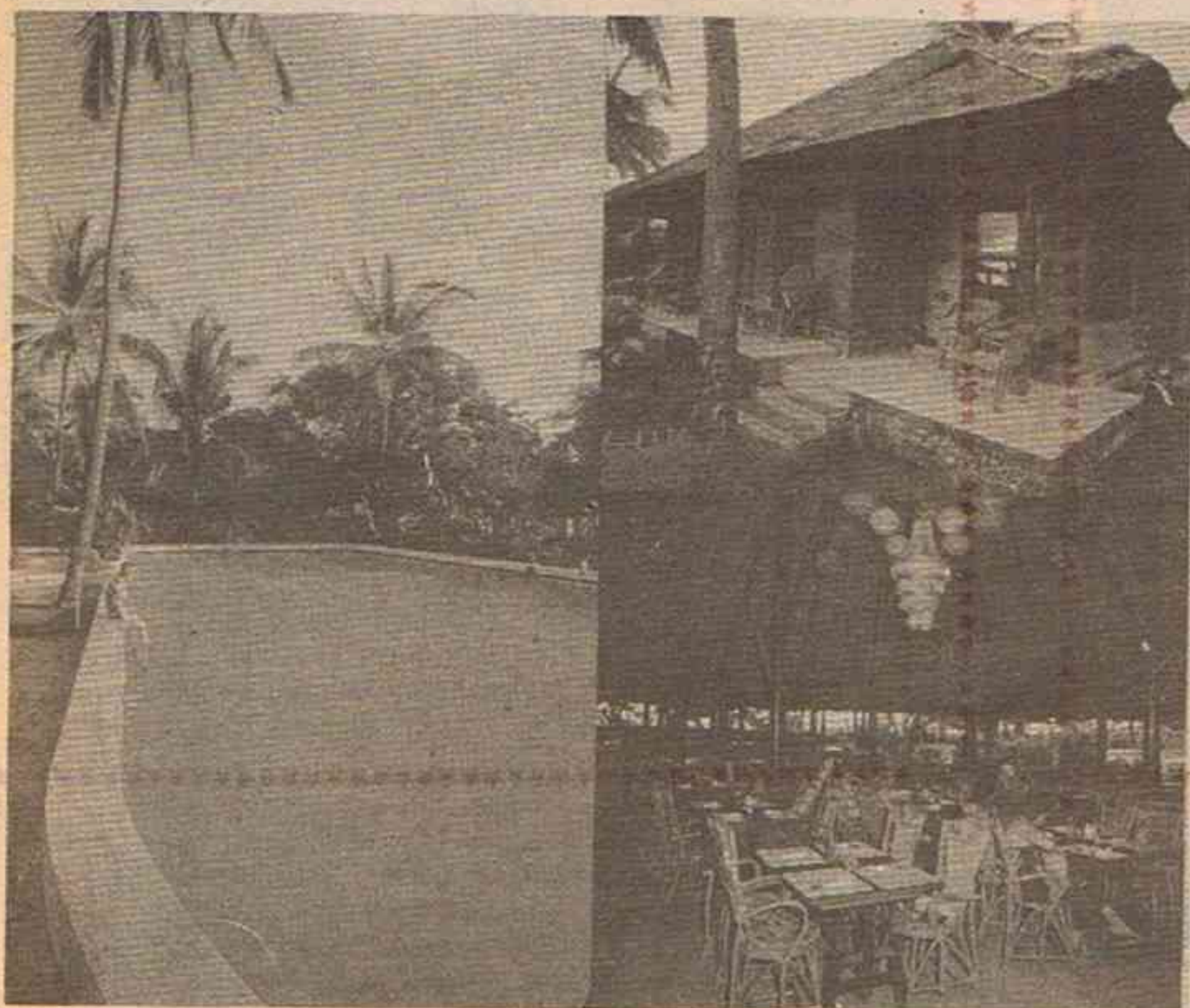

**Claremont still  
the one to beat**

Despite their loss to East Perth last Saturday  
Claremont are the team to beat for this year's  
premiership.

But as last week's game showed, Clare-  
mont still have a fair amount of work to do  
if they are to successfully defend the  
premiership they won so impressively last  
season.

A factor in their favour has been their  
competitiveness all season. Their four  
losses were by 28, 20 and twice by three  
points.

Apart from the 28 point loss, when they  
took a hammering by South Fremantle,  
but still managed to lose respectably, the  
Tigers could have won each of the other  
three games.

In two of them, the 20 point loss to  
Swans and last week against East Perth,  
poor kicking for goals let them down.

Ironically Claremont are considered to  
have the most potent attack in the com-  
petition but their strength this season has  
been their defence, which has had the least  
number of points kicked against it.

The only side I think can beat Clare-  
mont for the premiership is South Fre-  
mantle.

That may sound strange considering  
they aren't even in the four. But South, to  
my mind, are able to exploit Claremont for  
some reason. The Tigers have trouble  
handling them when they are near full  
strength.

But before Claremont can be assured of  
giving themselves every opportunity to win  
the flag, they need to straighten out a  
couple of their best players, Warren Ralph  
and Allen Daniels.

Ralph's approach to goal kicking is  
deplorable. He misses shots that are inex-  
cusable for a full-forward. In fact, it really  
cost Claremont the game last Saturday.

For a player who has kicked so many  
goals Ralph shows a surprising lack of con-

fidence at times when kicking for goals.

From now until the finals he should  
spend all his time perfecting his goal  
shooting. He appears to get too far under  
the ball, giving it a lot of elevation when he  
kicks.

But I also feel he is very casual at times  
in his approach . . . and this applies to his  
marking.

He squanders opportunities because of  
his frequently fragile approach, particularly  
when going for a mark.

Daniels is another proposition. He is far  
too hungry for a wingman. He is reluctant  
to pass the ball out to a team-mate and too  
often destroys his good work by kicking the  
ball indiscriminately into attack.

Daniels is far too pre-occupied with  
hanging on to the ball and wanting to kick  
goals. He is determined to have a kick at all  
costs. It often results in a poor percentage  
of effectiveness for the amount of time he  
gains possession.

At the risk of upsetting Swan Districts  
supporters I don't think they will win the  
premiership if they play Claremont in the  
grand final. To my mind they lack pace on  
the ball and I don't think Brad Shine's play  
in centre is suited to the wide expanses of  
Subiaco Oval.

East Perth also tend to be too slow on  
the ball. They lack a true rover. Peter  
Spencer and Chris Allen aren't nippy  
enough for that role.

South Fremantle will again be hard to  
beat if they make the finals and get all  
their players back.

West Perth are the dark horse. They  
don't lack in players. The big question  
mark is whether they can utilise their skills  
in the cooker-pressure atmosphere of final  
round football . . . if they make the four.

# THE FUTURE LIES WITH YOUNG TALENT

**WESTSIDE FOOTBALL'S GARY STOCKS** has just spent a week in the Lions Den ... watching the Subiaco players go through their weekly training and playing routines. Subiaco coach Ken Armstrong, frustrated but not despondent at the run of 15 successive defeats, opened the doors of the club to Westside Football for this frank, in depth examination of where the players are headed.

**"EXCUSE me coach . . . er, I know what your answer is going to be, but do you think I might be able to play for the school tomorrow?"**

That question was asked of Subiaco coach Ken Armstrong by one of his star players in the last weeks — Michael Mort.

Mort's comment typifies what Subiaco are all about.

They are a young club going through a strenuous re-building campaign — the rewards of which will not be seen for at least two years.

After having spent a week in the shadows of the Subiaco stands, it is obvious there is ability in Lions den.

Remember Swan Districts and how badly they were going just six short years ago?

They were struggling to win matches, but by developing talent within their own junior and country zones they are now the top team in the WAFL.

It took a lot of hard work to get to the situation Swans are in now. Just ask John Todd and the rest of the coaching staff at Bassendean Oval how much effort they had to put in to get to where they are now.

Subiaco are aiming at similar results and they are certainly heading in the right direction.

Armstrong's decision to "blood" young players into the senior side during the last few matches will pay dividends.

Already Mort, Warren Dean and Bevan Warner have shown they have the ability to succeed at league level. But they cannot afford to stop there. For the sake of Subiaco they must continue to develop as players.

Andrew Chater also made his debut last week and although he spent the entire day on the bench he showed in reserves matches he is a player of the future and will get another chance.

## "The young guys keep me going"

The reserves and colts sides are stacked with talent.

Ian Tucker, Mark Zanotti, Paul Wilson, Brad Lohar, Phil Scott, Peter Thomas, David Perry, Paul Ross, Shaun Kelly and Matt Bushe-Jones all have ability.

Add to this a bunch of talented young players already making their mark in league football like Clinton Brown, Brian Taylor, Dwayne Lamb, Mick Lee, Phil Brown, Gerry Cotter, Laurie Keene, David Court, Dean Wilson and John Bengough and the horizon is much brighter.

The point being made is that there IS talent at Subiaco.

It may take a while for them to develop into a unit, but it will happen and when it does no one will be saying "Poor old Subi"

The fact is, that young players like those at Subiaco are keeping one of the game's most professional coaches going.

It would be easy for Armstrong to throw in the towel. But being the professional he is, he has looked ahead and can visualise, in the not too distant future, that Subiaco will win football matches.

He says he is excited at some of the youngsters on their way up and he wants to be around when the Lions are a successful side.

Subiaco would be the first to admit they have made mistakes.

Rather than sift through potential recruits, Subiaco took anyone who was available and offered them lucrative contracts.

At last they have seen the light and realise there is more talent closely at hand than any Victorian club could offer with their rejects.

Evidence of this is that the colts and reserves teams are sitting high on the premiership tables and their coaches, Peter Mahoney and Gary Gibellini, are playing important roles at the club.

## "We have some exciting prospects"

Another man who has accepted huge responsibility at league headquarters is former Claremont player Alan Walker.

Walker was with the Tigers when they began their re-building programme and is adopting many of the things he learnt at his old club in his new position as assistant coach of the colts.

He is also in charge of a special weights circuit.

Under the circuit the players put in more effort in 20 minutes than they would at a normal training session, which would last anything up to about two hours.

While everyone has been having their say about Subiaco and their lack of professionalism, few have taken the time to analyse the situation.

They are putting in as much work as anyone else in the league, but at the moment they are just not getting results.

Last Saturday was a classic case.

They led West Perth, one of the sides fancied for this year's pennant, for 99 per cent of the day only to see their golden opportunity to break the ice go down the drain with just a few minutes remaining.

Had they received value for effort the game could have been all over by half time.

However, they lacked a spearhead in attack — someone to take advantage of their dominance on the ball.

## "I want to be here when we are winning"

Laurie Keene and David Court won almost every knock and the smaller players had a feat of opportunities. The only problem was that there was no one up forward to give them that little big extra around the goals.

Keene and Court were superb and they will develop even further in the next two seasons.

Through them, Subiaco have something a number of the other clubs in the competition lack — two class ruckmen.

In short, Subiaco will be a better side next year and they will continue to improve as each season passes by. Their future is secure.

## A week in the Lions den

This is how the Subiaco players spent their week in preparation for last Saturday's clash with West Perth.

**SUNDAY:** Following the 13 point loss to East Perth the Subiaco players had an early morning training run at the club at 9 a.m. They ran out the soreness in an hour-long session and followed that up with some of their own entertainment in a player's revue. The Taylor brothers did a good job with a puppet act and David Miers was impressive with his take-off of coach Ken Armstrong.

**MONDAY:** This a self help night where players are expected to do some sort of training on their own. Ken Marshall took the opportunity to help reserves player Mark Zanotti improve his kicking. New comers Warren Dean and Michael Mort also practiced their disposal.

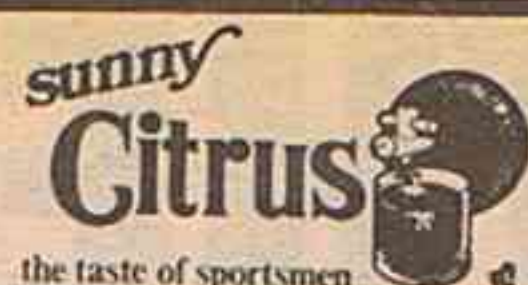

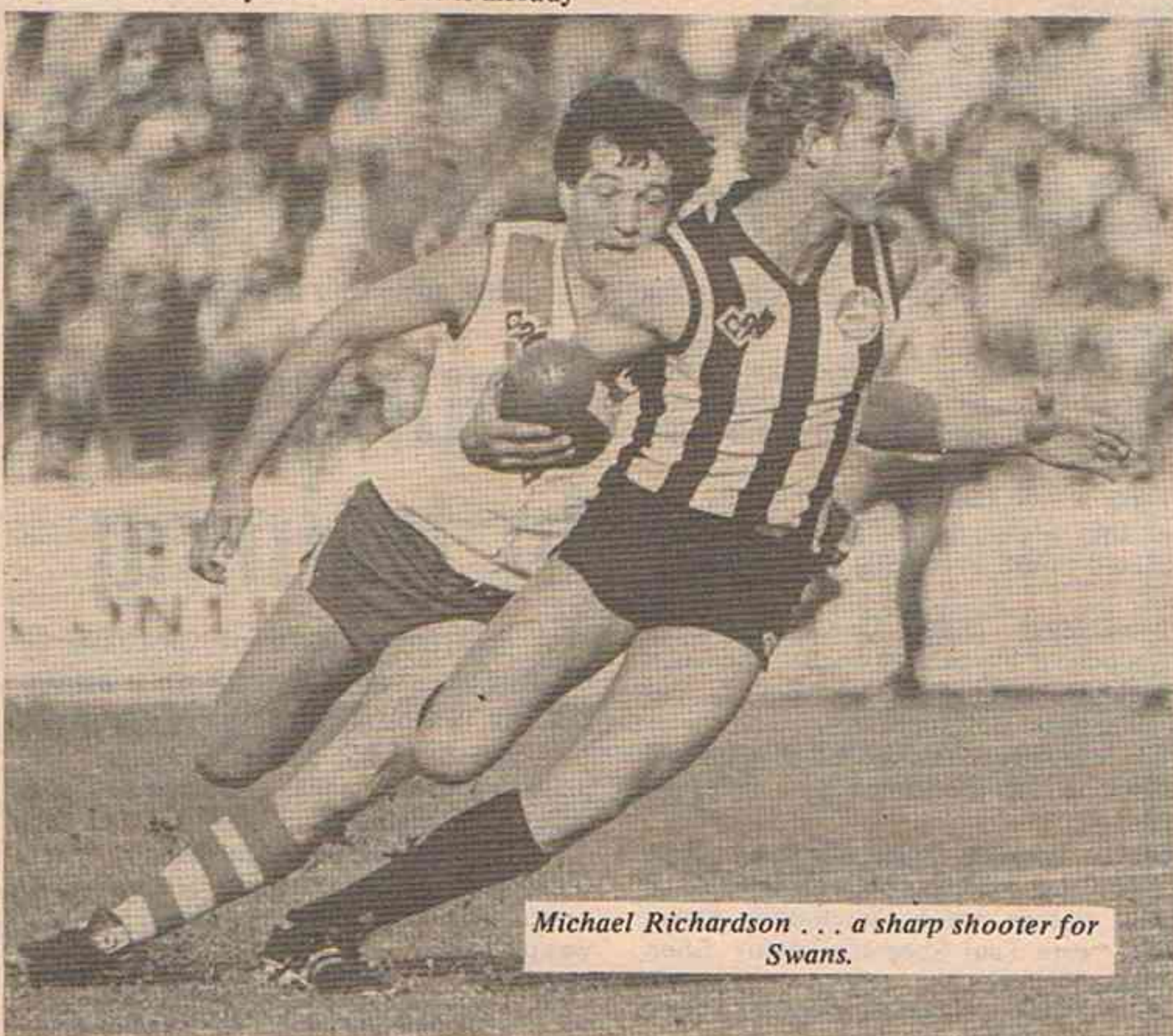
on line to score as many goals as he did for the entire season last year when he notched 51.

## STEPHEN MICHAEL . . .

Adamson was opposed to young Subiaco rookie Warren Dean and although he was under pressure early, he was good enough to break free of the shackles and give the Falcons an avenue to attack.

Adamson has shown great courage in coming back from the injury and it is a credit to his ability that he has been able to return to form so quickly after a long absence.



## DON LANGSFORD . . .

DON LANGSFORD is one of the unsung heroes of our great Australian game. He is not a brilliant player who always comes under notice, but rather a player who simply goes about doing the task asked of him by his coach. Last Saturday he produced one of his most eye-catching performances from a half-bank-flank. He refused to allow anything past him and turned many defences into attacking moves. Langsford is one of the most capable backmen in the game and also has the ability to play in attack when called upon. He would be a valuable member of any team.
