SWAN Districts were "ambushed" the last time they met West Perth — at least, that is the opinion of their coach John Todd.

Todd says that the Falcons had much more to gain from their second round clash than the black and whites . . . but he believes that the two teams would meet on a more even keel in Sunday's big match at Leederville Oval.

West Perth won the last encounter by 62 points and Todd is sure to use that drubbing as his front line pre-match ammunition.

"They had a lot going for them last time," Todd says. "They had more at stake than we did and they played some good footy. But I am looking forward to the re-match.

"Obviously they will be keen to win to keep their chances of playing in the second semi-final alive. And on the other hand, we are smarting from the defeat they dished out to us last time.

"We have been beaten three times this year. Once by seven points, once by 10 points and then by 62 points against West Perth.

"That was humiliating," Todd says. "I think the weather will have a big bearing on the result, but it should be a tremendous drawcard and a great contest."

However, it is the Falcons again who appear to have the most to benefit from winning the match.

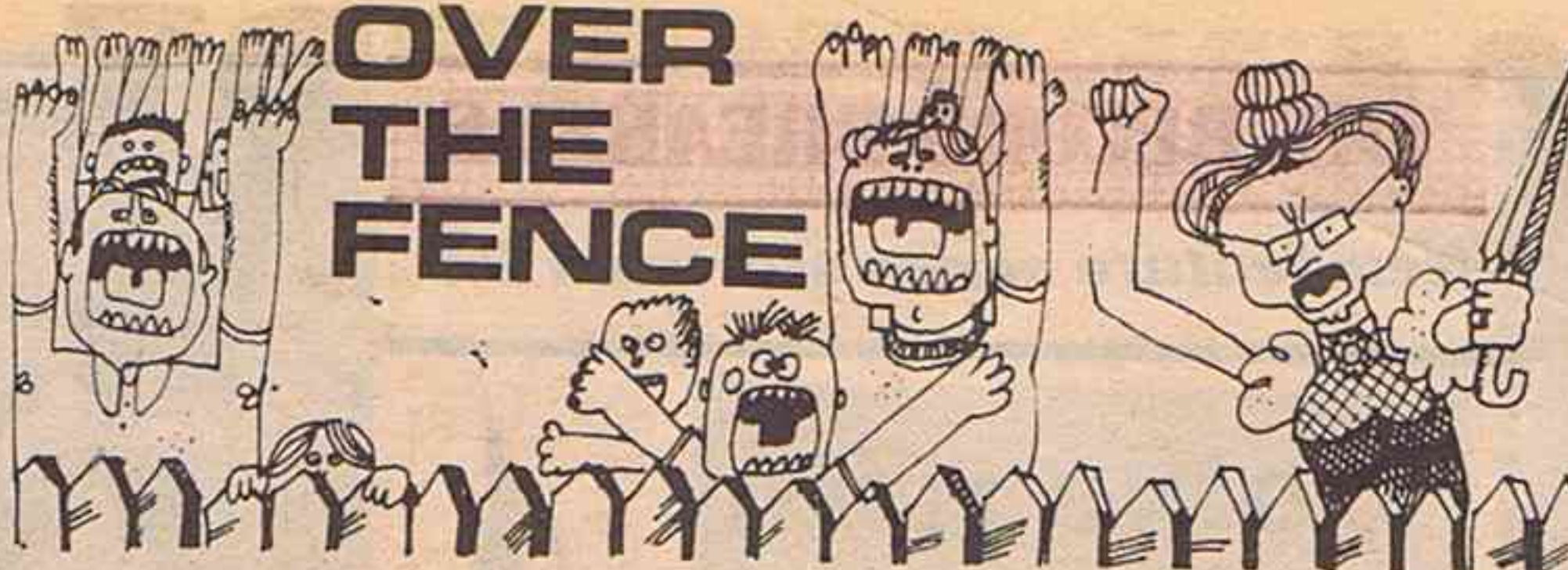

Versatile Hardie

IN a day when versatility is a key
ingredient in a player's make-up, South
Fremantle star Brad Hardie must be a
coach's dream. He can destroy an
opposition team with a brilliant goal-
kicking display from a half-forward
flank or forward pocket; can be a match
winner in the centre or even play a
major role as a ruck-rover. But last
Saturday we saw Hardie give a grand
display in defence - the place he says
he prefers to play. Hardie repelled many
South Australian attacking moves and
they must have wondered why he was
not playing in Adelaide last month.

Bad scoring

A brickbat for the scoreboard attendants
at Subiaco Oval on Saturday - even
though their standard is normally high. The
final siren saw them post WA's score at
21.18 with a total of 142 points, not 144.
This was left there for some considerable
time after the game and certainly made
things confusing for commentators
summing up the match from the press box
- and also affected any photographs that
may have been taken for the records.

Unfriendly helpers

SOUTH Australian team manager Kelvin
O'Reilly certainly didn't win any friends in
the public relations business during his trip
to Perth. The SA people have never really
had good media relations with WA (or in
SA for that matter) in recent years, though
their new chairman of football develop-
ment, Geoff Motley, has done a lot to help
improve that relationship in the last two
years. But O'Reilly was not co-operating
last week, particularly at three quarter time
when he continually stood in front of the
Channel 7 cameras as they tried to pick up
some footage of SA coach John Cahill
addressing the players. O'Reilly was also
quite uncommunicative in the rooms
before the game when the TVW 7 people
were getting to know the look of the
visiting players.

Flying Lion

Carnarvon Warriors under-17 player
Alan Perry played for Subiaco in their
combined team against East Fremantle
last Saturday. It was the second time the
Lions had flown Perry down to Perth to
play in one of the matches.

COOL ROOKIE

NORMALLY when a player is due to
make his interstate debut he is a nervous
wreck. However East Perth giant Craig
Edwards took it in his stride. He realised
it was an important moment in his career
but obviously decided to treat it as a
normal fixture. He was not overawed by
the occasion and while on the ground
played a big part in numerous WA goals.
While kicking two himself he also fed the
ball out at ground level to give the smaller
players a chance to convert. The ex-
perience of playing at interstate level
would help him if East Perth play in this
year's final round.

with his award at an end of year function.

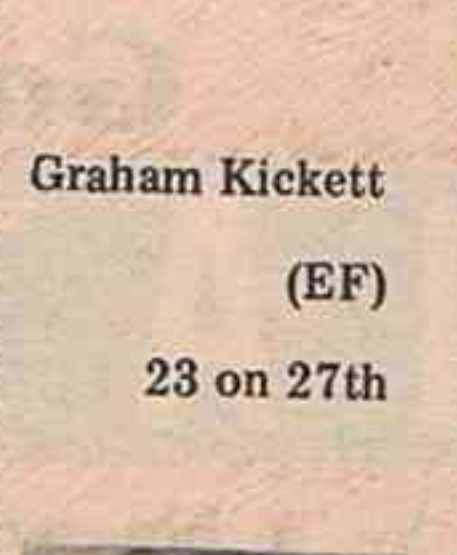

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AMERICAN EXPERT LOOKS AT THE AUSSIE GAME

Well-known media man and Perth reserves coach



ONE often believes that football coaches exert a considerable influence on our Australian game.

But a visiting American professor of physical education has far different thoughts after watching his first game of Australian Rules football.

Professor Darryl Sidentop, who hails from the Ohio State University, in Columbus, Ohio, where he is the sports educator, saw the WA-Victoria game at Subiaco Oval last week.

Some of his observations are quite interesting.

He was amazed at the lack of control the coach seemed to have in terms of the flow of the game. In American professional football, all systems of the play are worked out before the game, both in defence and offence.

NO PEP TALKS

Another factor that he noticed was that 99 percent of coaches in America don't use the motivational-type of address that Australian coaches rely on.

They feel that such motivational speeches before games are not crucial. It is more important for the player to motivate himself through intense practice.

Professor Sidentop noted that as far as the physical aspects of the competitors was concerned, the Australians were built more like pro. basketballers in the USA.

CONTINUITY

Comparing the game as a whole, he says that the continuity of the American game does not stop — and therefore, there was no chance to argue. Players had to keep playing at all costs, unlike Australian Rules where the game stops for penalties and so forth.

He also noted that the Australian players had to possess all the skills of the game — there is no specialisation in different facets as there is in America.

Professor Sidentop believes that the Australian footballers would have a higher level of fitness than any sport played in the USA.

An amusing observation made by Mrs Sidentop was that she was fascinated by the "errand runner" and also the "one and two flagger umpire."

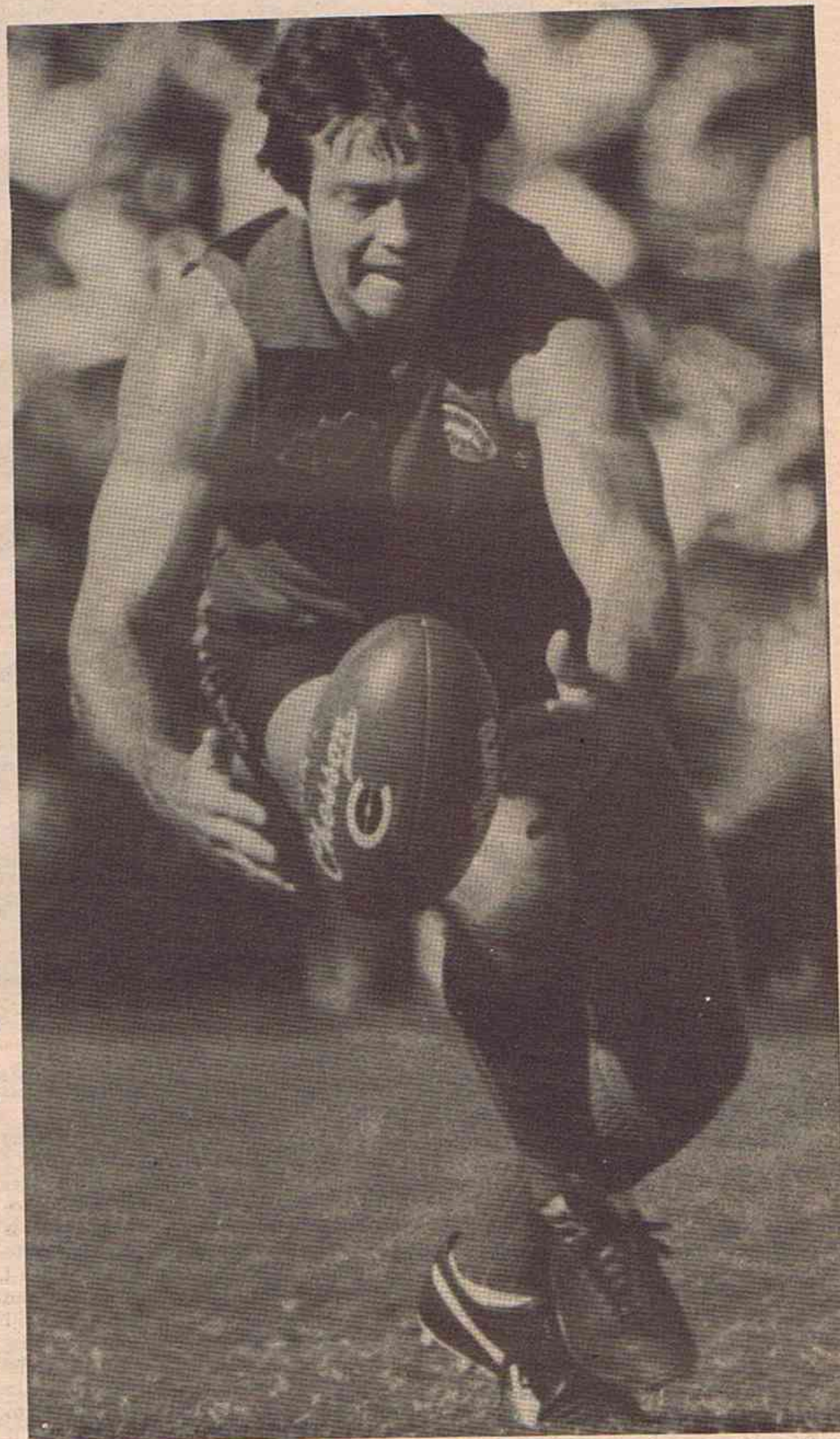
Self-motivation in the Vic rooms

AN interesting observation while in the Victorian rooms before last Tuesday's week's State of Origin game was the pre-match motivation of the VFL players.

It takes many different forms. For example, Brian Wilson, the Melbourne and Victorian centreman, added another dimension in terms of players preparing themselves for a big game.

About 20 minutes before the group warm-up, he sat with a pair of headphones on listening to a tape — was it one of Ron Barassi's famed motivational speeches, or perhaps it was the theme music from Chariots of Fire.

Who knows. But it was pleasing to see players taking the personal responsibility for their pre-game build-up.

ONE wonders what a player has to do to obtain a State guernsey.

A player that I particularly refer to is Perth skipper Bryan Cousins who has been a model of consistency this year, averaging 26 possessions per game.

His ability to run away from players and create open space and to read the ball off the hands of the packs is equal to any other rover in the competition.

His flexibility is another factor; he can play across the centre, half-forward or on the ball — and some of his best football for Geelong and Perth has been played on a wing. He is a sound, all-round player.

Bryan is currently showing the potential that has always been expected from him and it is hoped that now his talents have become more noticeable, his efforts are not ignored.

COUNTRY ZONE GAME A WINNER

PERTH had the opportunity to play a Match-of-Origin in their country zone on Sunday — which was a great success.

Perth played a combined Avon-Mortlock Association team in which six of Perth's regular senior players were included.

An interesting feature of the game was that only one umpire — WA's senior man-in-white, Ross Capes — was used.

It showed out in several instances that when the ball is moved swiftly from end to end, no matter how efficient the umpire is, infringements can often be missed because he is too far away.

I think the game proved that because of the pace of football today, we do need two field umpires.

I notice that Subiaco were involved in a country zone match at the weekend — but it seems amazing that the Goldfields National Football League had to guarantee Subiaco a \$3000 payment before the game could go ahead.

Subiaco were also under fire a little when the Eastern Districts combined side played an Esperance association team.

While both West Perth and Swan Districts sent representatives to the game to watch for potential footballers, Subiaco had all their eggs in the Kalgoorlie basket.



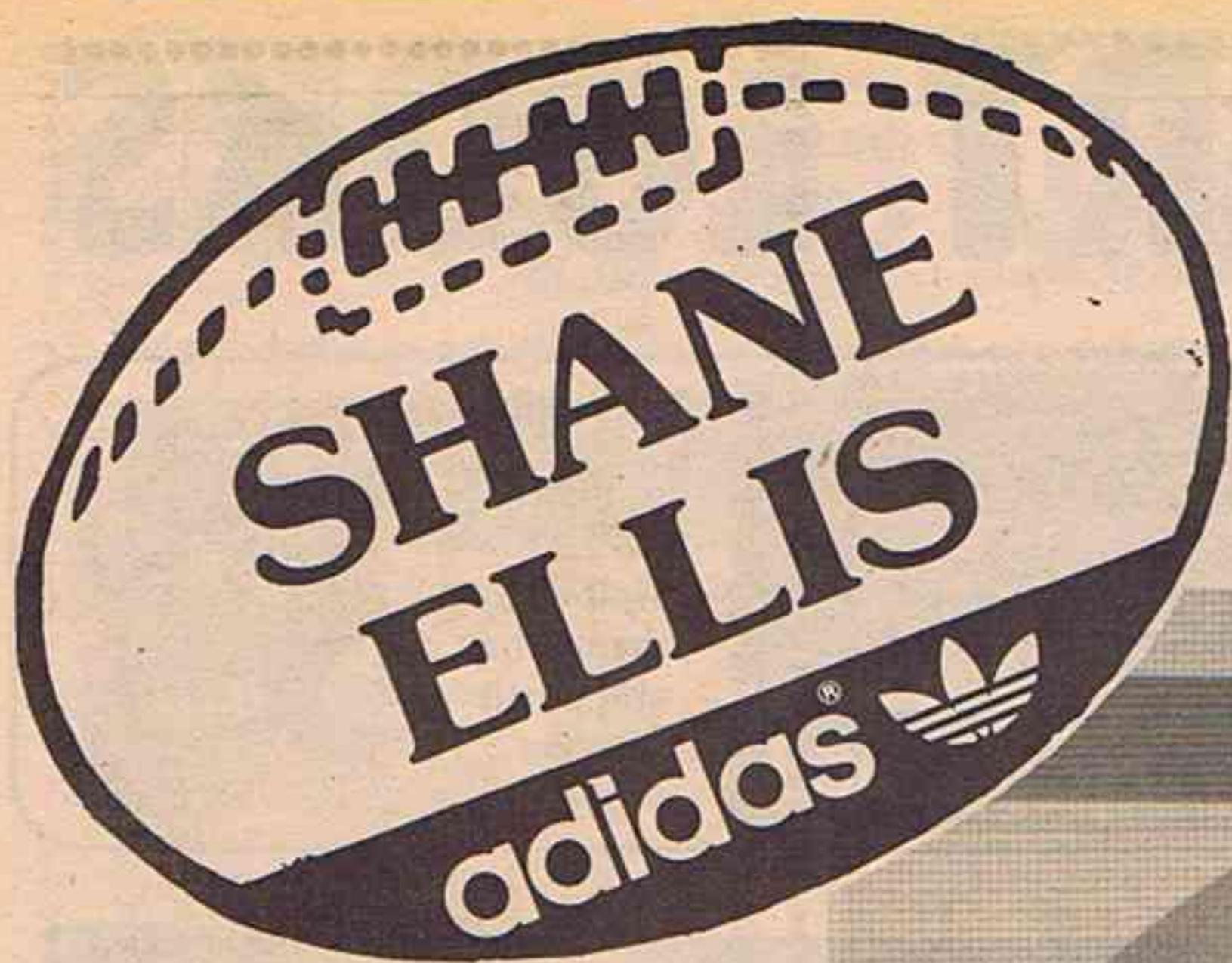
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... making his mark in senior ranks



East Fremantle defender Shane Ellis has come a long way in the football world since making his debut as a 20-year-old in 1980.

In two short seasons he has progressed to the stage where he is now one of the most reliable backmen in the business. And his career reached its highest point to date when he was chosen in the recent State matches against South Australia and Victoria.

In the first game against Victoria, Ellis was one of WA's best players when he did not put a foot wrong from a half-back flank. He was up against one of Australia's best performed players, Wayne Schimmelbusch and he did the job in fine style.

Schimmelbusch has been a thorn in the side of West Australian teams for many seasons, but the youngster chopped him right out of the game.

Ellis played alongside Ross Glendinning and Brian Peake and says that it helped lining up next to the two champions. He gained in confidence as the game progressed and could not have asked for a better introduction to interstate football — although WA lost.

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS talked to the quietly spoken 21-year-old and found out a little more about one of this State's most promising players.

He has notched just over 40 games and each of those has been stamped with class. Obviously, he will play a vital role in the East Fremantle rebuilding programme.

Q: What would you put your improvement down to since the last half of last year?

A: I think it is just that I am getting more experience all the time. Even now I have played just over 40 games and it takes a while for you to have enough confidence to do a few things and take risks. Towards the end of last year I was just starting to get confident in what I was doing. When I first started playing I would just go out and do the job asked of me — nothing more. I would devote the whole game to stopping my opponent getting a kick. Now I can be an attacking player as well as defensive. In your first few games you can't afford to take too many chances — particularly if you are playing in the backline.

Q: How are you enjoying your football?

A: This year it was good to make the State side, but East Fremantle have not gone too well. We have missed out on a place in the four and that is something I thought we could have achieved.

Q: For the last three years East Fremantle have had the players to get into the four but they have not gone on with the job. What would you put it down to?

A: It is hard to pin point. But we have had three coaches in that time and I suppose that it has to come back to the players. We have not performed as well as we could have done. Ron Alexander is a good coach. He is a hard task master, while at the same time being very fair. We have missed him on the field where he is very good. He is always directing the players and he leads by example. He does all the hard things and just being there helps to give the players around him a bit more confidence.

Q: I believe pre-season was pretty hard this year?

A: We started at about mid-November last year and it culminated with us running a hundred 100 metres just before Christmas. It probably was not as difficult as we thought it was going to be, just

thinking of how far you had to run you could probably psyche yourself out of it before you do it. Once you get going and everyone else is doing it, and pushing each other along it does get a little easier.

Q: How long did it take for you to play league football?

A: I started playing colts in 1978. The following year I played half colts and half reserves. And then in 1980 I played four league games and last year I played in all but one league game. So last year was really my first full season in senior football. This year I have played more consistently. I missed the second game of the season against Claremont because I had the 'flu but apart from that I have been in the side every week. Except for a couple of weeks which it took to get fit again I think I have played every game fairly well. The game against Swans a few weeks ago was probably my worst game for the year.

Q: Where did you play your junior football?

A: I played with the Mt Pleasant junior football club which is in the East Fremantle zone and most of the time I played centre-half-forward and the half-forward flank. The first time I had played in the back line was when I started playing colts. I have only ever kicked one goal at East Fremantle and that was in a night game against Hawthorn last year.

Q: Had you always followed East Fremantle?

A: No. Dad was always East Perth and I used to go along and watch. Probably up until I was playing colts I was an East Perth supporter. Even when I was playing colts I did go and watch the odd Royals game. When you play colts you don't really know the league guys because we train different nights, but as you start playing reserves and training with the guys you become more closely associated with them and the club. I soon became dyed in the wool and my father is even converted.

Q: Did anyone have an influence on your career in your younger days?

A: I always had a football when I was a young kid and I used to kick it around the back yard with my father. In my first years at Mt Pleasant my coaches always put me on the right track. As with Ken Judge, I had Peter Waterman in the under-12 combined side and he was good. He always encouraged me and helped me along.

Q: Did you always dream of one day playing league football?

A: Yes. It was always something to hope for to play league football. When you are young and you go and watch the football it is like a different world. It is something I always aimed for.

Q: And what do you think is wrong with Old Easts at the moment?

A: The players are there, like you say, but I don't think we are playing consistently well. Some weeks everyone has a good day and things go well. But the next week there might be four or five guys down on form and that is something you can't afford if you are going to be a top side. If you are lucky you can carry one or two, but with four or five players out of touch it makes it very difficult. I think one thing you always have to aim for is consistency. If that happens and you have an off day, you lose by four or five goals or even less but we had days like the game against Swans when the majority of the side had a shocking day. Then in the game against Claremont we gave them seven goals start and I think we probably outscored them for the rest of the day. It is not just consistency from game to game that we lack — it is consistency from quarter to quarter in one match.

Q: It must have been a great thrill to play State football, particularly in the game against Victoria?

A: When I was selected in the squad I thought I may have had a chance of playing against South Australia. But with 35 in the squad including the WA-Victorians and with Ross Glendinning in that list I did not give myself any chance of making the team for the State-of-Origin match. Then there was also the half-backs who played against South Australia and Ray Holden had done well at full-back. To get picked it was obviously a great thrill for me and to play on a half-back line with Brian Peake and Glendinning you would not dream of something like that happening even if you were writing the script. I could not have played with two better players. I had played with Peake before and we get along pretty well together, and Ross Glendinning is a professional and he talks and does everything that helps you get to play as a team.

Q: How did you find playing on Wayne Schimmelbusch, a man who has played over 200 games in the VFL?

A: Well, like I said when I started playing league football my main objective was to stop my opponent getting a kick and because I was inexperienced in State football that was the way I played it against Victoria. I didn't get too many either but in that standard of football one player can turn the game if he gets a couple of easy kicks.

Q: Western Australia were right in the game up to half time, even though they had slumped towards the end of the second quarter. What happened after that?

A: It is hard to say. The runner came out onto the ground and told every player as the second quarter got into time on that this was when we had to keep them out. I think they just found a little bit extra and their rovers pushed down the ground a bit. The guys who kicked the goals were Buckley, Marcou and Flower who went to centre-half-forward and kicked one over his shoulder. I think their rovers got down the ground a bit quicker than ours did.

Q: What about other sports. Have you ever taken any other sport seriously?

A: I do a bit of tennis coaching with Maureen Smith. I play a bit but I don't play pennants or anything like that. Particularly with pre-season training I don't get enough time to be able to play.

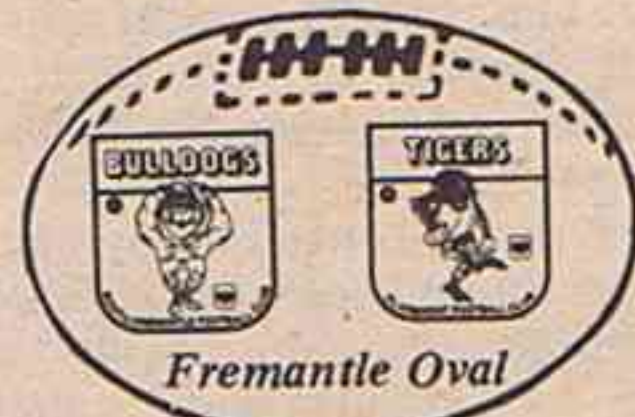

Fight for four to hot up



THE fight for the top four will intensify after this week's set of fixtures.

South Fremantle, on their knees and vulnerable to a knockout blow, have the capacity to stay in the fight for the four by beating form team Claremont at Fremantle Oval.

Swan Districts, smarting from the hiding dished out to them by West Perth in the second round, should avenge that loss at Leederville Oval on Sunday.

There are a number of reasons why South can beat the Tigers on Saturday.

They have already beaten them twice this season; the match is at Fremantle Oval, where South have lost only two games in the past two years; and they know that a loss will probably end their chances of making the finals for the first time since Mal Brown took over as coach in 1978.

Even so, it will not be easy as Claremont could have been undefeated in their past nine games, having lost two of them by only three points.

In a man-to-man situation, Claremont appear better equipped, however incentive is likely to have a very big bearing on this match. Claremont need to win to retain second spot and a double chance in the finals. But their plight isn't as desperate as Souths and that should be the deciding factor.



Swan Districts appear to be revved right up again after a patchy period midway through the season, when they were hammered by West Perth.

They will really test the Falcons on Sunday even though the match is at Leederville Oval.

There is a feeling at Swans that the club took West Perth too lightly the last time they met because of the easy way they had been able to handle them since 1979.

But there will be no complacency there on Sunday. Swans don't like losing and coach John Todd is sure to use their loss to the Falcons to whip them into an aggressive frame of mind.

West Perth have the capabilities of carving up opposing sides if their mobile players are given a free rein.

However, the same players have tended to struggle when put under pressure.

This match will show just how good the Falcons are. If they can handle the pressure that is sure to be applied to them then it will hold them in good stead for the four remaining qualifying games.

If they can't it could herald their slide out of the fight for a second-semi final place and put them in a position where they face a difficult job staying in the four.



THE OTHER match that has relevance to the final four is between Perth and East Perth at Lathlain Park and it should also see a keen tussle.

INTERSTATE UPDATE

Swans . . . the new glamour side

The Swans have emerged as the VFL's glamour side as they continue their run toward the 1982 finals.

Coach Ricky Quade is sure he has the manpower to reach the final five. At the moment his side is lying in sixth spot, one match behind North Melbourne.

Swans can't afford to drop their match this Sunday on their new home ground, the Sydney Cricket Ground, against Footscray. They must win to stay in touch with North, who should beat Melbourne.

The Swans rocked Essendon last Saturday by 33 points to record their fourth win on end.

Quade said after the match that it was probably the club's greatest win since 1977 when they beat Hawthorn to make the five.

It was the first time this season — after several near misses — that the Swans had beaten a side in the top five.

However, despite their recent success, it appears the Swans have lost most of their Victorian supporters after their move to Sydney. There was hardly a murmur from the 23,000 crowd at last Saturday's match when the Swans scored a goal and fewer than 200 people swarmed around the players as they left the ground.



. . . and a night title for starters

The Sydney Swans, making their only appearance in a night grand final since 1967 recorded their first major success of the year with a strong win over North Melbourne in the Escort Cup on Tuesday.

They won 13.12 (90) to 8.10 (58).

But the win could mean a great deal more to them in the future.

In the last week they have now beaten two of the sides in the top five and their morale is high.

THE Championships proved a financial bonanza for Victorian clubs.

Of the total of \$450,000 prize money, nearly \$400,000 remained in Victoria. WA clubs took \$45,000 and \$10,000 went to South Australia.

How the prize money was split up: Swans \$130,000; North Melbourne \$80,000; Carlton, Richmond \$50,000; Swan Districts \$28,000; Fitzroy, Melbourne, St. Kilda \$25,000; South Fremantle \$10,000; Collingwood, Essendon, Footscray, Geelong, Hawthorn, Port Adelaide, Claremont \$7,000; Glenelg, Norwood \$1,500.

NEW JOB FOR WEBB

KEITH Webb, promotions and marketing manager for the Victorian Racing Board and a former VFL board member, is the new VFA general manager.

Webb, 49, was appointed last week to replace Russell Hopper who resigned two weeks ago.

VFA president Alan Wickes said Webb had beaten 19 other applicants for the job.

Wickes said: "I believe Keith Webb has an impeccable football background and is the type of person we would have selected had we not called for applicants. His obvious management and marketing skills will dovetail with our present and future VFA policies."

A former Fitzroy player, Webb later served a decade as delegate/director to the VFL and in this time was appointed to a number of league committees. He was also chairman of VFL selectors.

A life member of the VFL, Webb was general manager of the NFL from 1975-79.

FLU HITS RICHMOND

An influenza epidemic in Melbourne has hit the Richmond club. More than a dozen senior players, plus coach Francis Bourke and some of the club's administrators have been affected by the illness.

Kevin Bartlett was one of the players affected and recently had to miss his first match in more than 170 games.

The illness, combined with injury, resulted in the club having 22 players unavailable for a recent Escort Cup match.

Jewell rumours denied

Geelong have denied rumours that former Richmond coach Tony Jewell has been approached to take over the Cats in 1983.

Jewell's name had been linked with the club for many weeks as speculation on the future of current Geelong coach Billy Goggin gathered momentum.

It also seems certain that Goggin will step down at the end of this season.

Barassi sticks up for Jacko

Melbourne coach Ron Barassi has come to the defence of volatile forward Mark Jackson.

"I think it is about time someone woke up about Jackson," he said. "There is no way known he is getting the deal other players get from the umpires".

Barassi plans to raise the matter with umpires advisor Bill Dellar.

He said: "Jackson does give away free kicks, but week after week he is not getting a fair deal".

Barassi was so upset at the "treatment" Jackson received in last week's match that he sent captain Robert Flower across to speak to field umpires Nash and Howe who responded that Jackson "gets the same deal as everyone else".

Meanwhile, Jackson finished the match against Richmond with two goals and a broken nose.

SIDEY A SUCCESS

Garry Sidebottom has come through his first league game with Fitzroy with flying colours.

Coach Robert Walls said this week: "I can't fault the way he has applied himself at Fitzroy. It is surprising how fit he is despite a lack of match practice."

"The match committee decided to put him virtually straight into the senior side despite his lack of football this season and the gamble appears to have come off".

Walls said that Fitzroy had recruited Sidebottom because of his size and attitude. The club badly lacked big players and Sidey was desperate to once again prove he was a top player.

Sidebottom said before Saturday's match against Collingwood that he was "as nervous as hell".

After a solid performance in which he was named one of his side's best players he simply said: "I was glad to play footy again".

Homeless Kink

Rene Kink is a footballer without a home. Collingwood virtually sacked him after recent statements to the Press and his services were reportedly offered to the lowly placed Melbourne club.

It is understood Melbourne totally rejected any idea of signing him.



RIOLI BURNS

Former WA and South Fremantle champion Maurice Rioli is being hailed as the best centremen in Australia following some of his recent performances in Melbourne.

Last Saturday, Rioli thrashed Melbourne and Victorian interstate star Brian Wilson and certainly dimmed the chances of Richmond star Geoff Raines regaining the centre spot for the 1982 final round.

Since Rioli's arrival at Richmond, Raines, an All-Australian player, has been switched to the wing where it is well known he is unhappy.

The Tigers' big win over Melbourne last Saturday put them back on top of the VFL ladder.

NORTH UPSET THE '82 PREMIERS

North Adelaide caused the upset of the season in Adelaide last Saturday when they easily defeated reigning premiers, Port, by 12 goals.

Port were without eight of their regular players — in Perth for the interstate match.

The highlight of the round was a dramatic two-point loss by league leaders Sturt.

Sturt at one stage led Central District by a mammoth 72 points, but succumbed in a thrilling revival by the Bulldogs.

Edwards rumour

CENTRAL District crack forward Greg Edwards has denied speculation that he is about to quit the Bulldogs.

"That's bloody news to me, it's the first time I've heard it", he said this week.

Edwards has been languishing in the reserves for the past two weeks and there has been plenty of talk coming from Elizabeth that the young star is not happy.

He denied there was any friction between himself and coach Daryl Hicks. "I get on with Daryl. There are no worries there", he said.

Port Adelaide has been mentioned as the club that could be interested in his services.

A few weeks ago Edwards' brother Russell joined the Magpies after failing to get a senior game at Elizabeth.

He has been playing in the reserves at Alberton and the Magpies are quite happy with his form.

Greg Edwards began the season in a blaze of glory kicking five goals (against West), eight (Woodville), 10 (Glenelg) and six (Torrens) in the first four games.

He played poorly against Port Adelaide at Alberton in the next game but came back the following week to boot five goals against Norwood.

He managed 24 goals in the next seven games but was dropped from the side for the return match against Port at Elizabeth.



Many believed he was dropped from that match because of his poor performance against Port in the Alberton game.

Edwards has kicked eight goals in the last two Reserves games and must be close to league selection again.

If he can't regain his spot in the senior side the speculation over his future will continue.

Woodville's feat

SUBIACO HAVE BEEN GENEROUS

In recent times Subiaco have cleared some top players to VFL clubs including Peter Featherby, Mike Fitzpatrick and Gary Buckenara, but their generosity is not new.

In the early 1930's Subiaco must have been the most generous club in Western Australia.

Within the space of two years no less than seven top-line players were induced to play in Victorian football and every one was a success story with his new club. John Bowe, Brighton Diggins, Bill Faul, and Johnny Leonard joined South Melbourne's 'Foreign Legion', while Lou Daily went to Collingwood (1933) and Geelong (1934), Len Metherell went to Geelong and Stan Penberthy went to Footscray and later Melbourne.

No club can stand the loss of so many champions, but Subiaco would not stand in the way of players wishing to earn a living during the depression raging at that time.

One can only wonder how many premierships the Maroons may have won in the decade before World War Two had they retained all their 'big guns'.

Lou Daily, who played with the Maroons in 1935 and won a Sandover Medal that year at full-back, played with Collingwood in 1933 and Geelong in 1934.

On the opening day of 1934 he kicked 10 goals for the 'Pivotonians', as Geelong was known, from the forward pocket alongside Claremont's George Moloney, and against unlucky St. Kilda.

In 1929 Len Metherell kicked nine goals for a second Western Australian eighteen against mighty Collingwood in a great display of marking, positioning and kicking.

He was immediately signed up by Geelong and they repeated the performance some four years later with brother Jack Metherell.

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LONG SERVING BLUE AND WHITES

Ten players by the name of Doig have played for 'Old Easts'. They are Charles (Senior), Charles (Junior), Cleve, Edgar, George, James 'Scotty', John 'Hockey', Norman, who played from 1905-07, Norman, who played from 1932 - 40, and William.



George Doig

James 'Scotty' Doig played in nine premierships a feat that will never be broken most probably and George, top full-forward for 1933 onwards to 1946 notched up 202 games.

Many East Fremantle players have played for many years but none longer than Archie Strang who played from 1906-23, a total of 18 years. William 'Nipper' Truscott played from 1913-1927 and prior to that played with Kalgoorlie's Mines Rovers for seven seasons (1906-12). He played in five Carnival sides - two with Mines Rovers (1908 and 1911) and three with Old Easts (1914, 1921 and 1924).

Two of East Fremantle foundation players were Tom Wilson (first captain), a former North Melbourne champion, and he was club leader on nine different occasions. The other was David 'Dolly' Christy whose career spanned 27 seasons - five with Ballarat, six with Melbourne, one with the old Fremantle Club (1896), one with W.A. 'Imperial' Club (1897), and fifteen with East Fremantle (1898-1912). What a career.

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Media scapegoat

Marty's barb

CHANNEL 7 critic Marty McDonnell never misses an opportunity to show his Victorian allegiance and when the chance bobbed up last week he had no hesitation in venting his feelings. He said that local umpire Bob Phillips had been dubbed "Benevolent Bob" by the Victorian press. The Big V media pulls no punches and they thought a few free kicks awarded by Phillips in the interstate clash were home town decisions.

Todd's fallacy

WHEN John Todd said on radio last week that the home ground advantage in interstate football was a fallacy I wonder whether he was speaking with tongue in cheek. And then on Saturday he suggested that if Des Foster was the best South Australian umpire then the standard of umpiring across the border would be pretty low. Maybe it was a coincidence that he picked on the two visiting umpires or could it be that he was showing his bias?

I listened with interest to the broadcast of the Essendon-Swans match in the VFL on the weekend, especially when one of the commentators was talking about the form of Paul Van der Haar. He suggested that the selectors should take action against the Essendon centre-half-back because he had declared himself unfit for the State game against WA. Van der Haar was showing no signs of the injury which prevented him from playing on Tuesday.

THE media often gets the blame for things that go wrong with football - and coaches and presidents are quick to look to the different media men when they need a scapegoat for something. Such was the case with Swans coach John Todd recently when he expressed concern that a football achievement for Swans skipper Graham Melrose had gone un-noticed. Melly had topped the 200-game mark in WA football and Todd was critical of the fact that he didn't receive any recognition. But when he was asked why didn't the Club do something about informing the media, he had no answer. It's called communication, John, and few football clubs know what that means.

Out of date

SUBIACO Oval looked in good shape last week for the two interstate matches - with two little exceptions. That infamous electronic scoreboard is looking far from complete (maybe TVW 7 know something about the delay) and what are we doing with the WAFL's old logo painted on the grass? We've had the new shape for quite a while now, fellas.

Comic kids

LEADING South Australian breakfast announcers Bazza and Pilko (of 5AD) were in town for the big game - and they did an excellent commentary job considering their limitations in that area. They at least provided some light-hearted relief for folks back home as the Croweaters were gobbled up by the Sandgropers. They had a few name problems though, such as Ironmongrel (wouldn't call him that to his face), Panazza and Malassas.

Hayes tribute

THAT SA duo also paid tribute to some of WA's stars . . . talking about John Hayes, Bazzo (Barry Ion) said that the old veteran was doing as well as ever. "He left his crutches on the fence and is getting more kicks than most of our blokes", he said.

Peter Bosustow, the mercurial goalkicker from Perth who hit the VFL scene last year in a blaze of glory, is odds-on to return to the Demons next year.

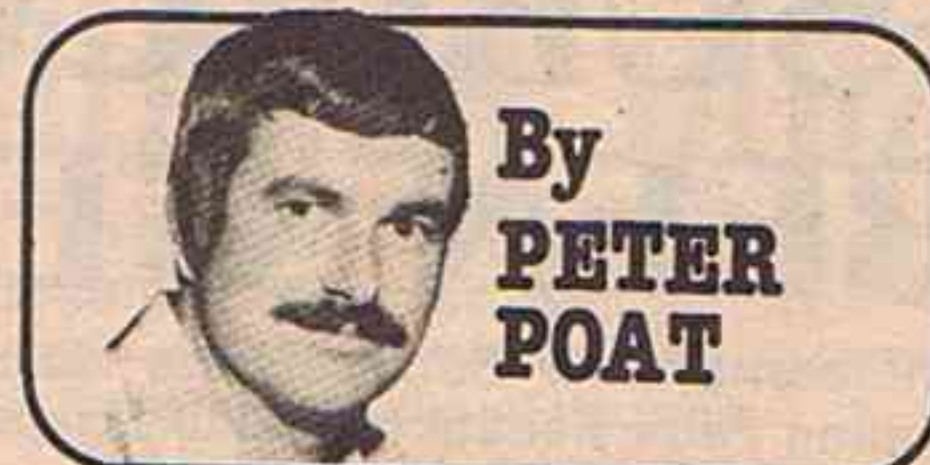

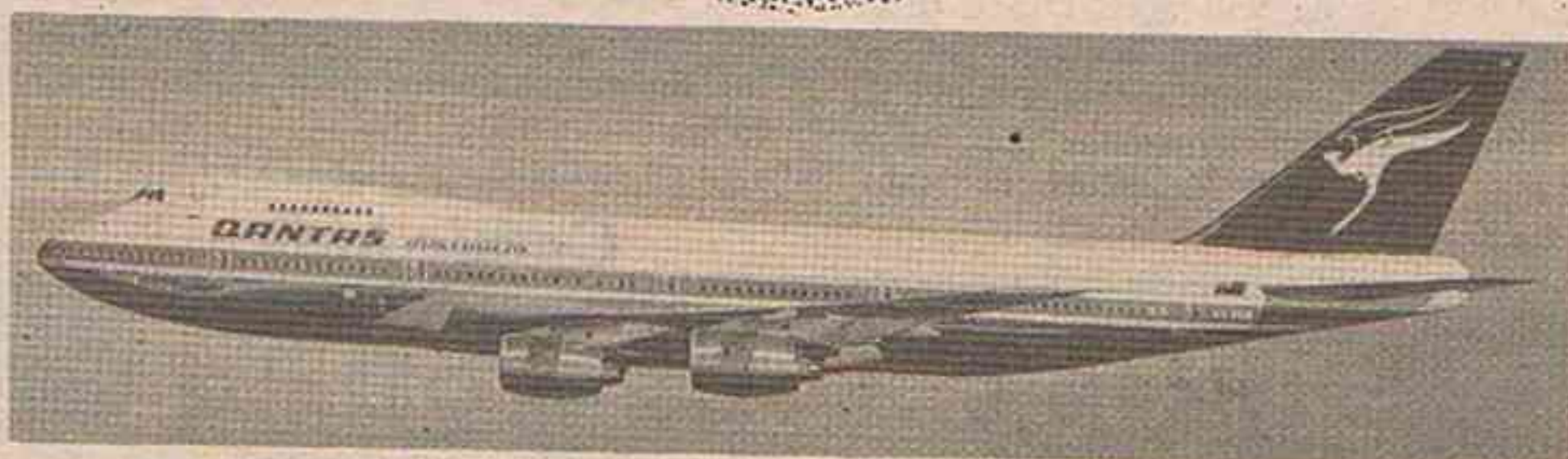

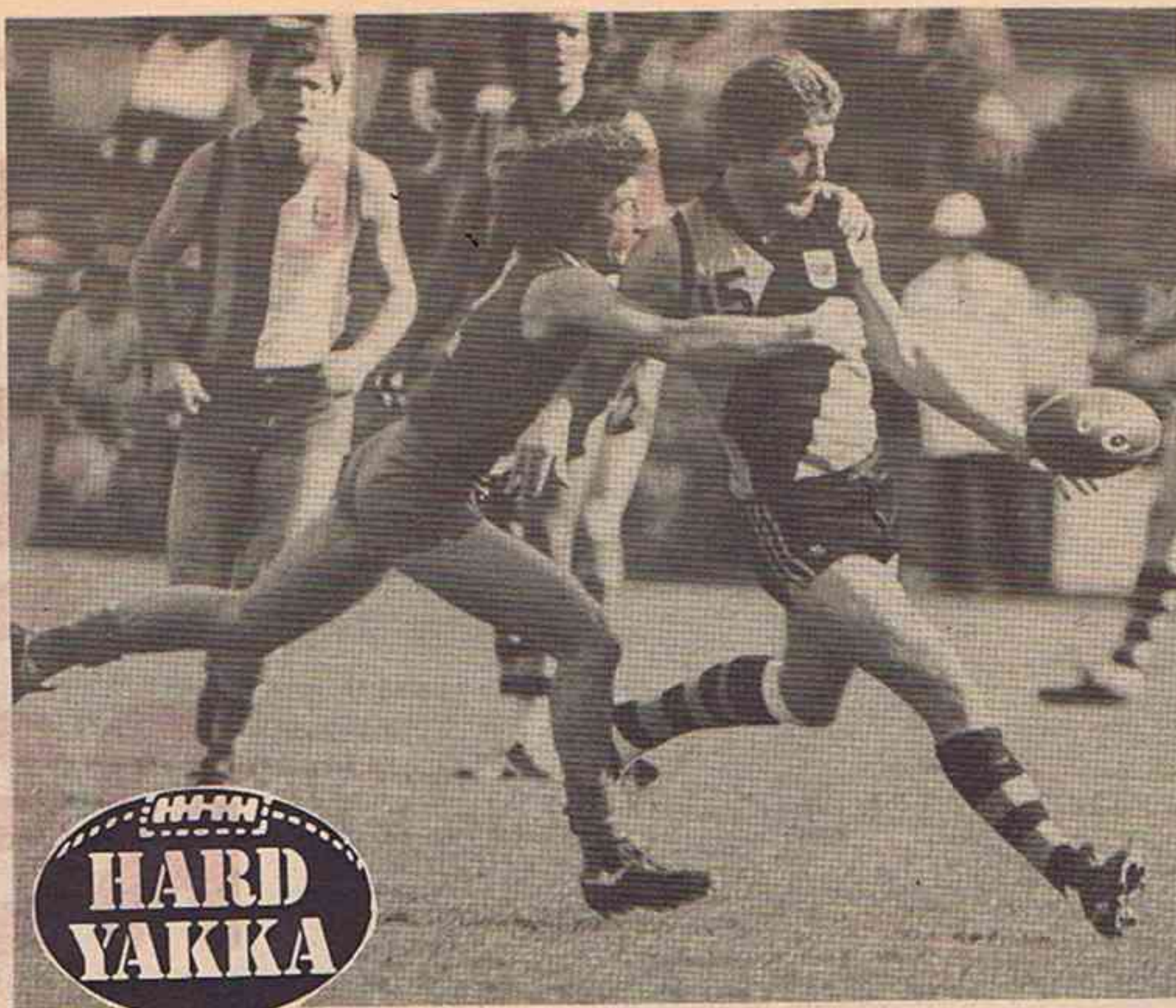
SO LONG, ROBBO

That was not surprising because his father Tom was a professional foot runner.

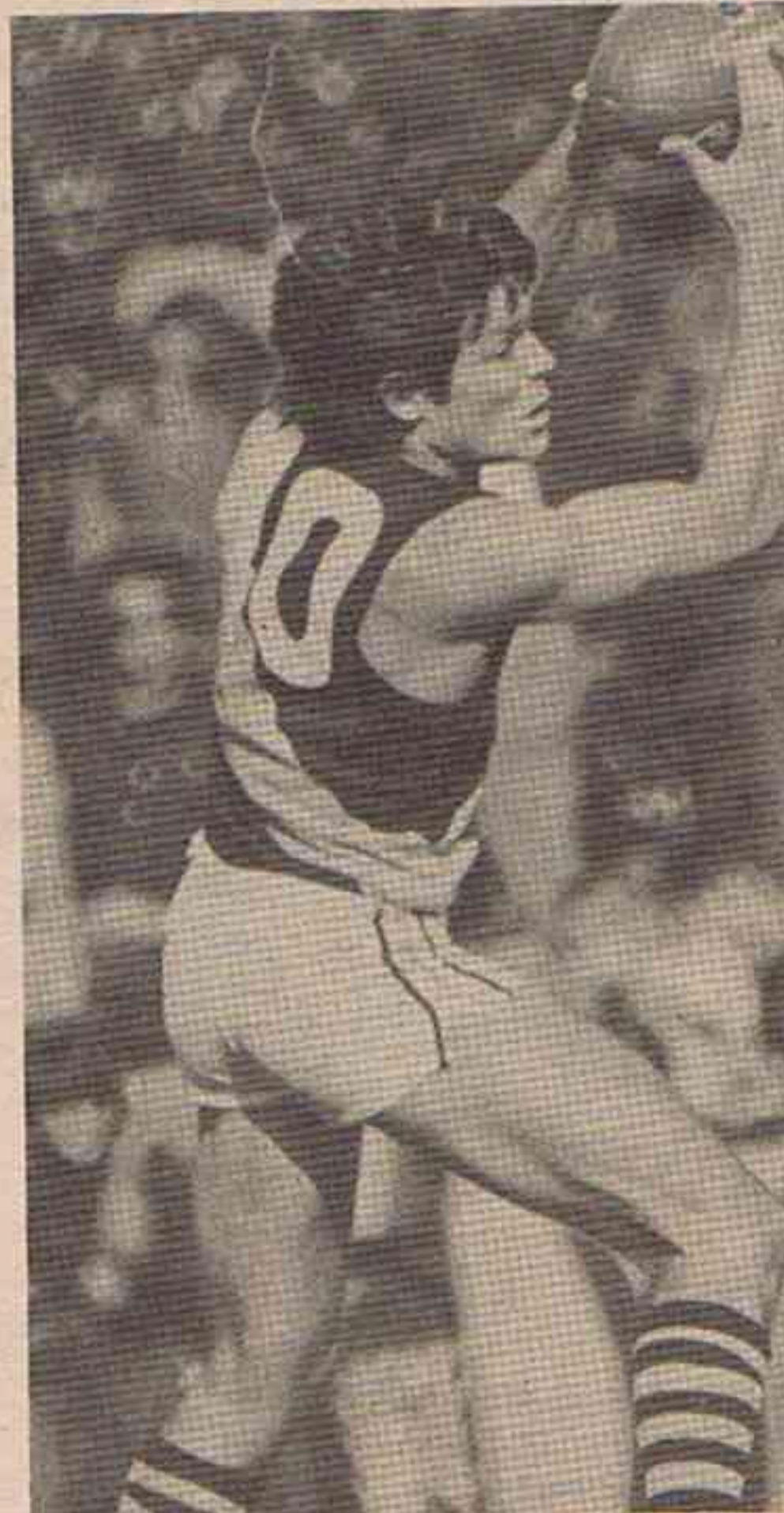
Panizza junior loved football, and his ability as an athlete, which he had inherited from his father, was obviously going to hold him in good stead for the future.

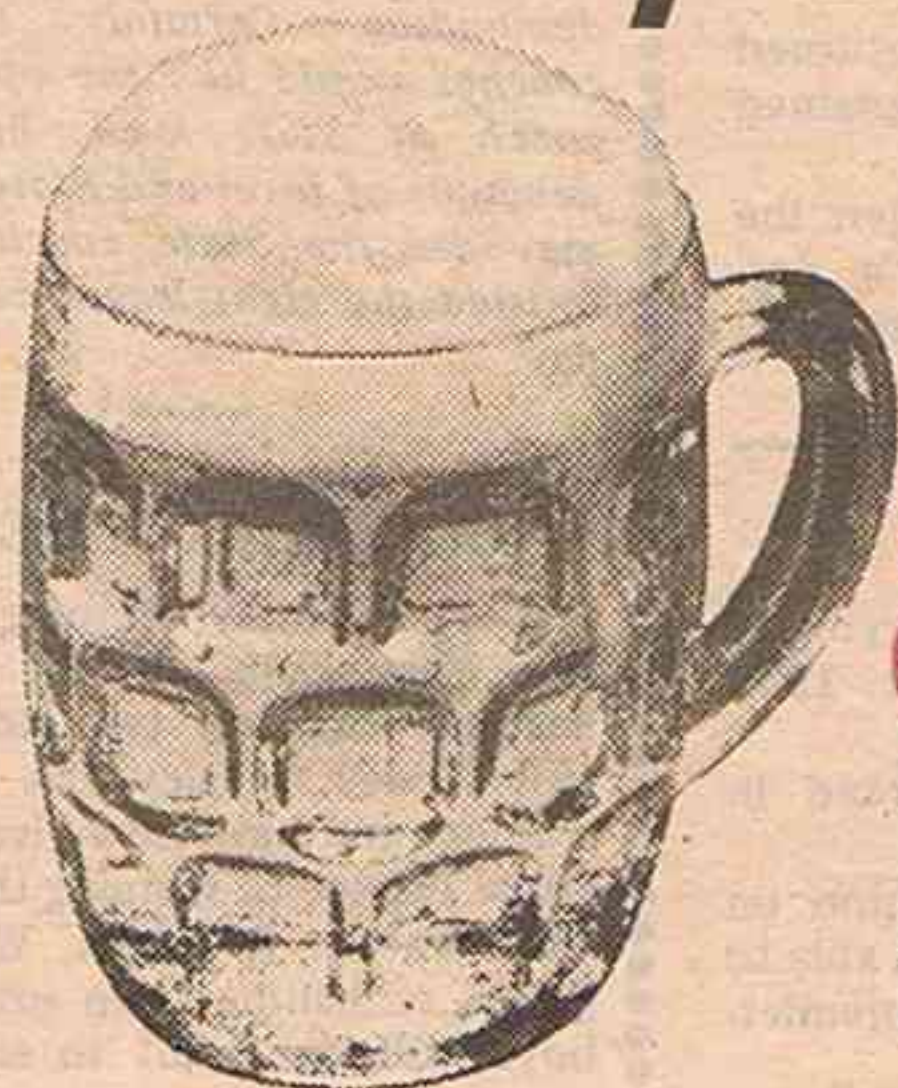

MEDAL EMBARRASSMENT

The winners of the Simpson Medal in the two interstate games were embarrassing.

In future the WAFL should select a panel, which used to be the practice, to cast votes for the award.

Two winners — Mark Browning in the WA-Victoria game, and Kevin Taylor WA-SA match were hardly rated by the media and spectators.

While both players made useful contributions there were players more deserving of the medal.

It is interesting to note that both players are stylish left footers, who tend to hang on to the ball a long time before getting rid of it.

Browning's selection was a shock. Most media critics were reluctant to believe he was the winner when word spread it had been given to the Victorian half back.

The same kind of attitude prevailed when it was announced that Taylor had won the medal.

On each occasion the umpires awarded the votes for the medal. It simply makes a mockery of the award when players not even considered in the best six on the ground win an award purportedly for the best player in the match.

It was an interesting situation regarding the absence of Swan Districts players in the two interstate games.

It seems absurd that a side parked so comfortably at the top of the premiership ladder should have only one representative in the two interstate games — and then only as a last-minute replacement. Contrast the situation with Swans with

that of Claremont. The Tigers contributed eight players over the two matches.

Swans seemed surprisingly injury-ridden during the week.

It is fortunate for them they didn't have to play an interclub match last Saturday — particularly of the nature of the one they face this week against West Perth at Leederville Oval.

Perhaps the lack of Swan Districts players was why their coach John Todd selected SA to win.

WA will probably never have a better opportunity of beating Victoria than last week.

The Victorian side was ordinary by normal standards. It lacked marking power, a class full forward and did not have its usual damaging rovers.

But it made up for those deficiencies because players were prepared to work hard for the ball.

The best way to describe the Victorian performance would be honest and hard working.

They were also more efficient. Their coach David Parkin places a great deal of importance on making the most of opportunities.

It was disappointing to lose a match when we appeared to be better than the opposition... as the 38 point lead we obtained in the second quarter reflected.

It was also obvious from the attendance that West Australians like to see a Victorian side, even if it is devoid of big names.

STEVE Malaxos is a great goal-kicking opportunist and though he notched three majors in the game against South Australia, one of WA's best goals came up as the result of support he lent to co-forward Bruce Monteath. Malaxos won the ball on the half-forward flank and was immediately put under pressure from the SA defence. However, he rode a tough bump and handballed the football out to Monteath who goaled.

REBOUND MAN

BRAD Hardie is proving to be one of WA's most versatile footballers — and that's high praise for a player who is still only 19 years old. He had an incredible 22 kicks off a half-back flank — and still featured in helping boost WA's score. WA's third quarter saw Hardie at his



best as he ran out of defence, taking three bounces before delivering the ball to Chris Allen, whose pass found Mike Richardson and the 13th goal was posted as Hardie trotted back to his defensive position.

RUCK TACTICS

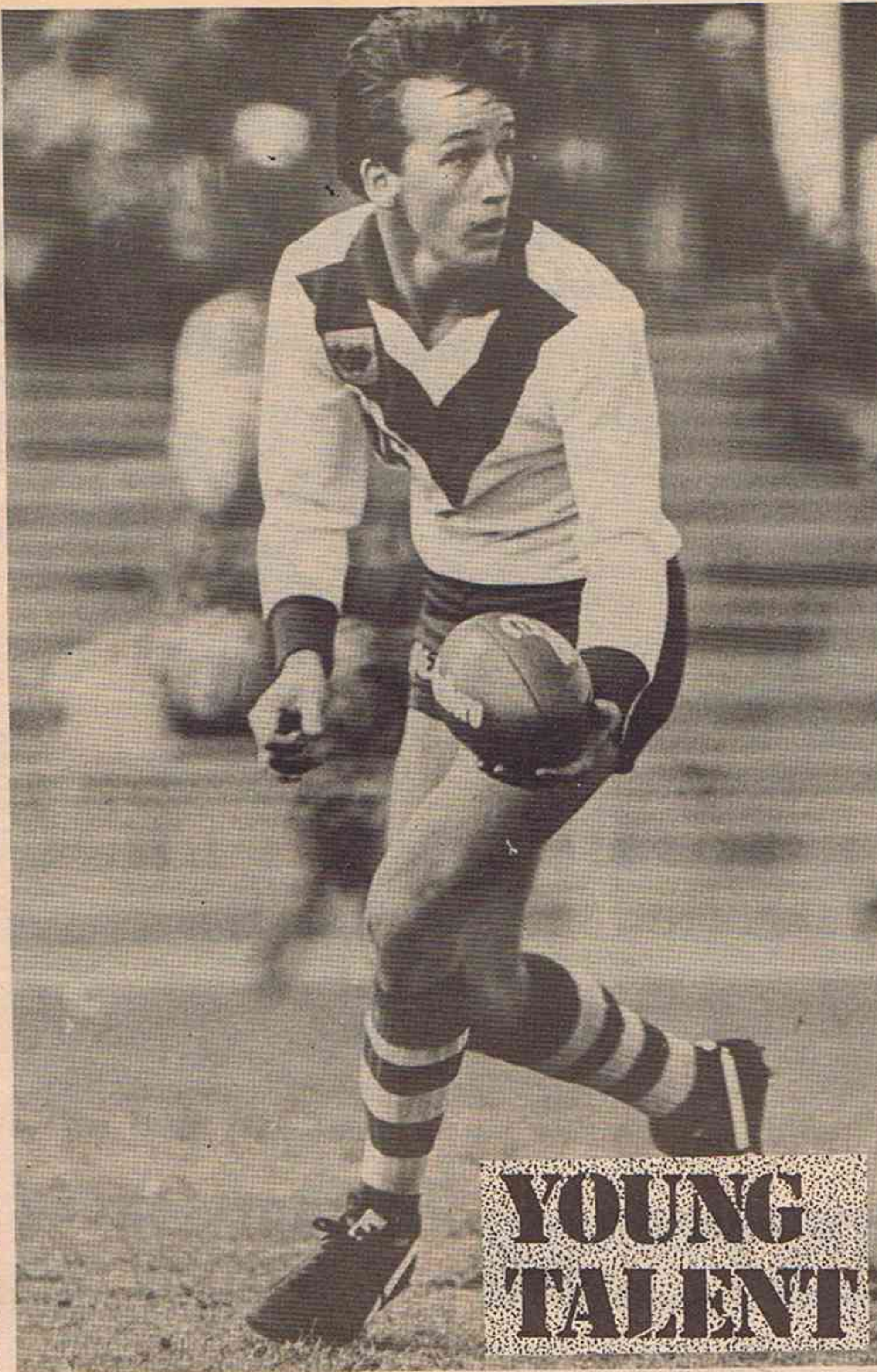
BIG ruckman John Ironmonger, playing only his second State match, was up against one of Australia's most experienced ruckmen in SA's Peter Carey — but the young WA rookie acquitted himself well. During his last-quarter battles he frequently circled right around Carey at the centre bounces, coming in on his 'blind' side to win the tap-out. At one stage he palmed the ball straight down to team-mate David Palm (no pun intended), who shot it out to Steve Malaxos to bring up WA's 15th goal... showing the advantage of a dominant ruckman at centre bounces.

NO BONUSSES

THE WAFL forwards have not taken up the generosity of Marlboro so far this year. 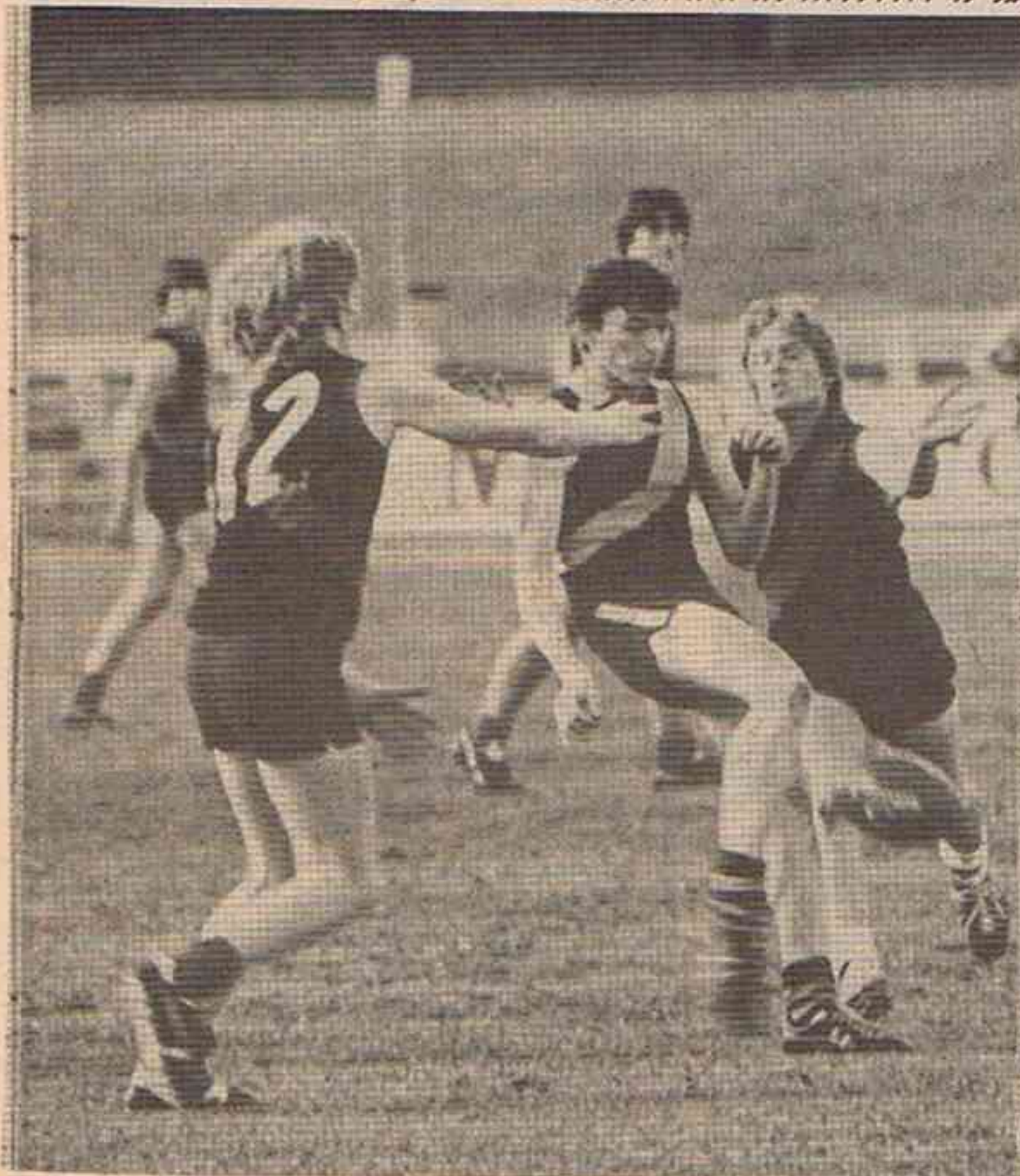

When KEVIN TAYLOR returned from Melbourne at the beginning of the year he had a point to prove.

And those who still needed convincing of his ability before Saturday's interstate clash against South Australia, must surely respect the man now. It has been said that Taylor's selfishness around the goals detracted from his performances, but that facet of his game was not prominent in either of last week's State games.

He combined with Gary Shaw to form a brilliant roving division against Victoria in the first match when the local pair were far more impressive than their Victorian opponents.

In that year Taylor became the first rover to kick more than 100 goals in a season when he was the driving force behind an East Fremantle premiership. He then set off for Melbourne and found success a little harder to come by. But, he says he did not return to Old Easts because of limited success in the hurly burly of VFL football. He came back because of family reasons and still has aspirations of returning to Melbourne.

If Saturday's performance is anything to go on, he can be a star in the VFL. He won the Simpson Medal for an outstanding four quarter contribution and he was not only damaging around the goals but was responsible for starting many of his side's forward thrusts. And Taylor is one of the few West Australians who can boast about playing well against South Australia in both games in 1982.

He has progressed from being a player fighting for a regular league berth to one who can swing a game in his side's favour with his own individual brilliance. And he has also shown in two State matches that he has the class to match it with the best rovers the game can produce.

In his interstate debut in Adelaide in June he was clearly WA's best player when he put in a courageous effort in an otherwise drab performance. He did all the things which make a great player stand out from a good one. He did the hard things and was always at the base of the pack when things were not going as well as they might have been. Even when WA had no chance of winning Shaw was giving everything he had for his adopted State.

The former Queenslander was simply brilliant. And in Tuesday's match it was again Shaw's ability to dominate at ground level which enabled WA to get away to a flying start. He continued in that vein for the entire match. While teammates around him fell away because of the pace of the game, Shaw was still battling on. Many critics thought he deserved another Simpson Medal (to follow on from the one which he won in last year's grand final). He was one of the best players afield and deserved the recognition.

THE battle for the 1982 Channel 7-Sandover Medal is still a wide-open affair.

With just five matches remaining before voting closes off this year, any number of players can feel that they have a chance of picking up enough votes to take off football's most prestigious prize.

The weekly Sandover Medal guide published in this segment of WESTSIDE FOOTBALL has generally been an accurate guide as to how the media see the medal voting going.

Each week we publish the best-on-ground voting for nine local media — and a survey this week of the 15 matches in which votes have been cast indicate that early-season medal favourite Michael Richardson is still holding the advantage.

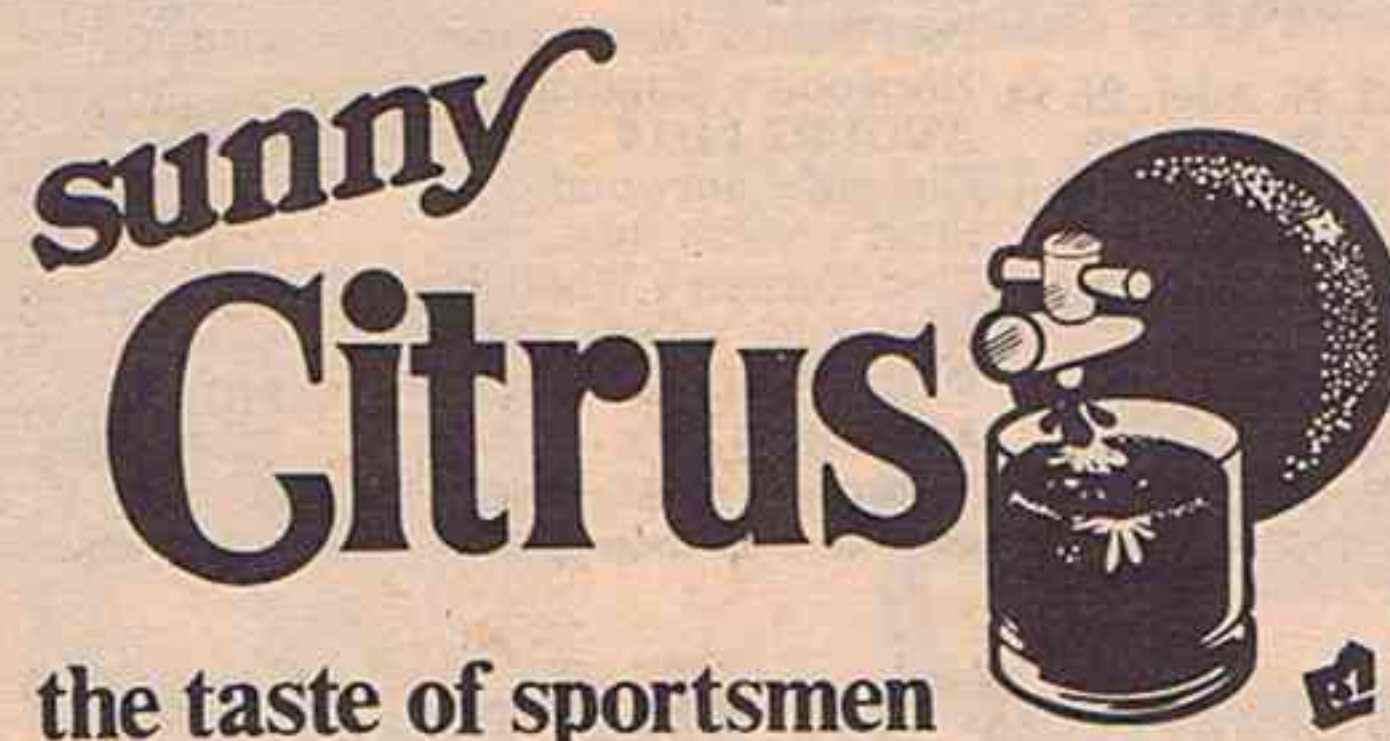

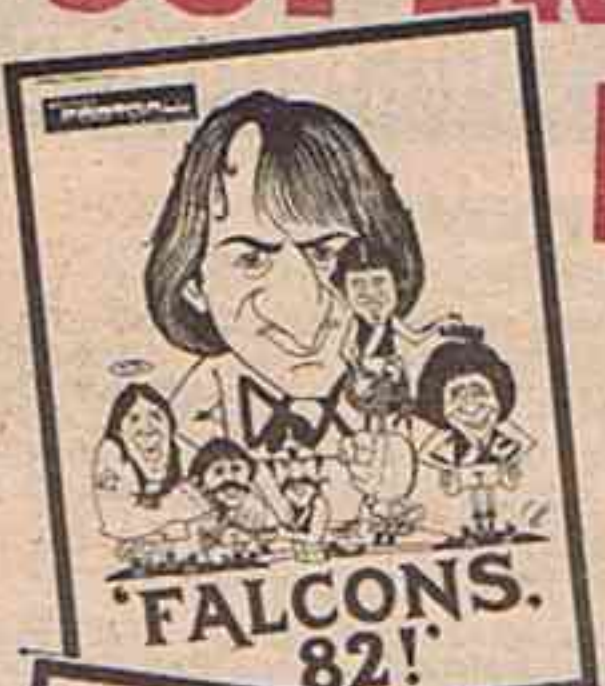
