

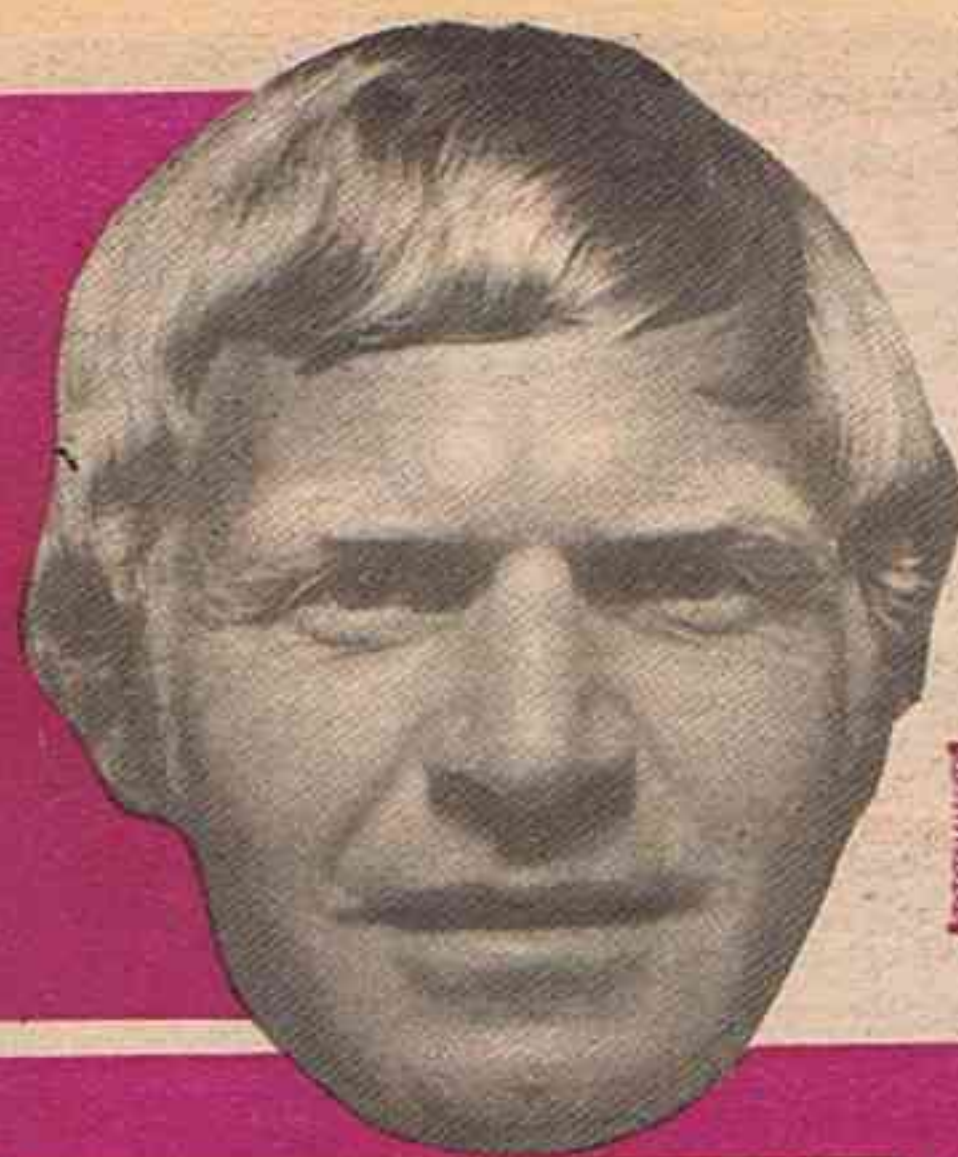

NO EXCUSES...

Says high priced recruit

High-priced South Fremantle recruit Chris Stasinowsky offers no excuses for his poor first-up showing with his new club — but he promises to improve.

Stasinowsky says he tried too hard in his debut for the Bulldogs last week.

"I was really looking forward to the game because I thought I would thrive in that sort of match," Stasinowsky says. "But I ran out of legs after half time.

"I hadn't trained for two or three weeks because I thought my playing days were over for 1982.

"And in that first quarter I ran everywhere trying to get into the game.

"It was a disappointing effort both team wise and from a personal point of view, but I am an extreme optimist. South Fremantle can still make it.

"I have the greatest respect for Mal Brown and the boys at Fremantle and we have not yet given up hope."

Although Stasinowsky is optimistic about South Fremantle's chances, there is little doubt he would prefer to be at West Perth, who are certain final-round contenders.

In his 3½ seasons with the Falcons he had not played in the finals and when he left he went to a club that had played in every final round since 1978.

Stasinowsky blames West Perth officials for his move from the club.

Stasinowsky says he would be still playing for the Falcons if four directors had not been so keen to off-set other recruiting outlays.

COMPENSATION FOR JOB

"I was forced into the situation where I had to decide between my career and football," Stasinowsky says. "I asked West Perth to compensate me \$120 a week for a delivery job I was doing so that I could continue my studies and also concentrate on football.

"Because I was on contract they refused. All I needed was the money for the last 12 weeks of my final semester at college where I am doing a phys ed. degree.

"And when I wrote them a letter two months before the clearance deadline saying that unless they helped me out I would seek a clearance to another club, they didn't believe me.

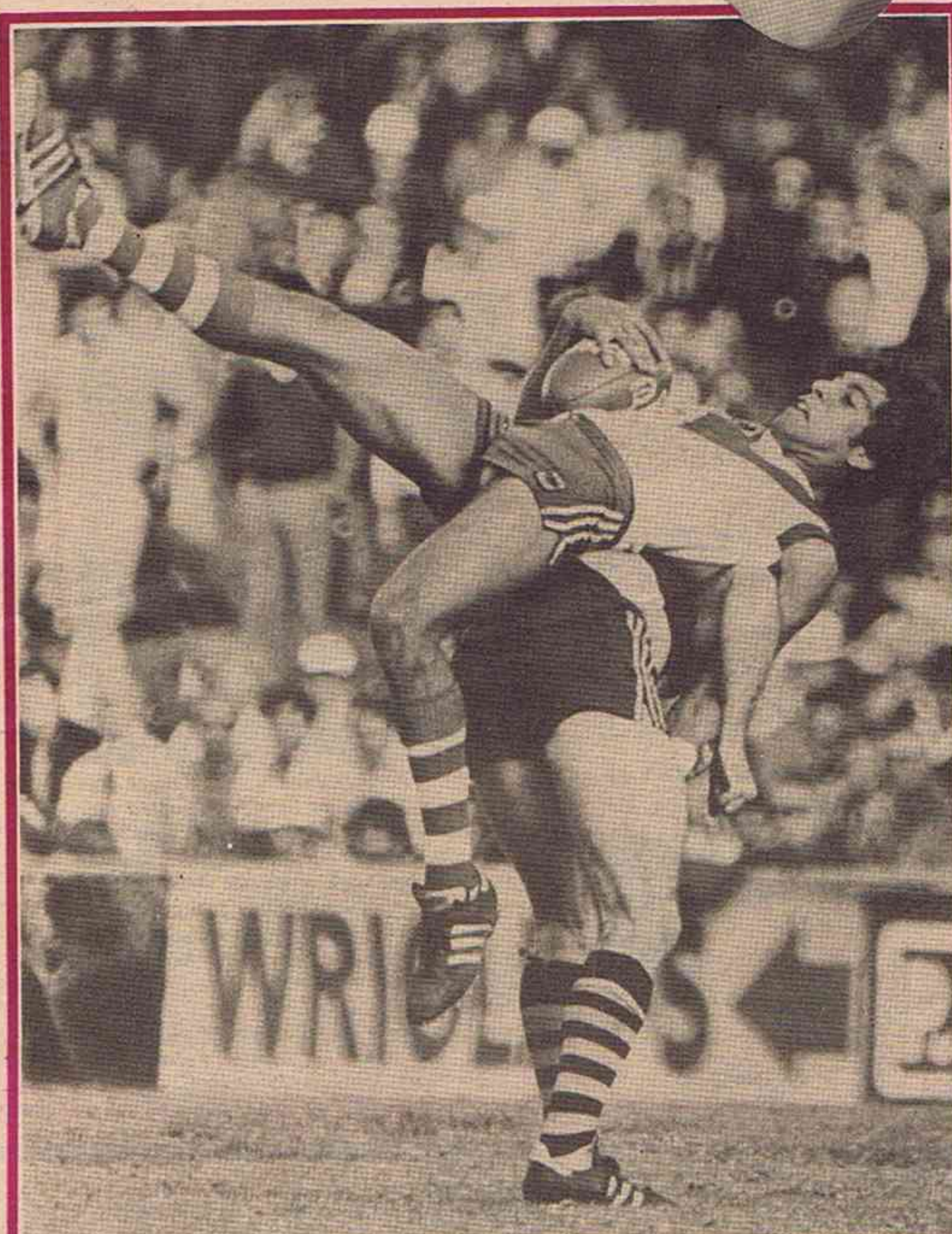
"The directors left me no choice," the ace goalkicker said.

Stasinowsky was running a delivery van in the mornings to help put himself through college. His match payments were not sufficient.

He says that West Perth told him that if they agreed to his demands every other player at the club would seek similar support.

"It was a tough decision to leave the club. I had come up through the ranks and made a lot of friends.

"But South Fremantle have looked after me and now I am concentrating on a career with them. I no longer have to work in the early hours of the morning."

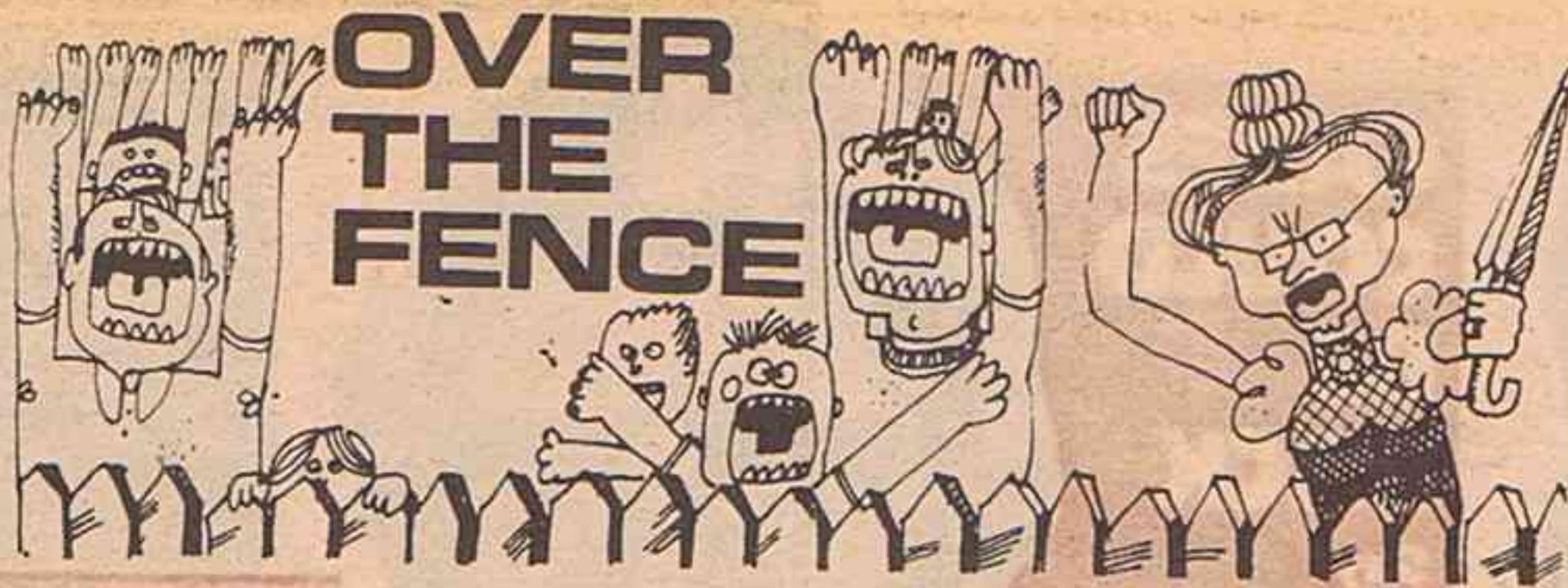


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OVER THE FENCE

A LOT has been said about the controversial Swan Districts move to field a virtual reserves team in the Escort Cup match against Richmond last month. Swans took a bunch of youngsters across to Victoria to play the Tigers in a semi final after the A.F.C. had twice changed the date for the match. Some people agree with the Swan Districts stand and other disagree. In keeping with out impartial policy, Westside Football invited Swans president John Cooper to put his club's side of the issue.

THE ESCORT ENCOUNTER

My club's participation in the 1982 Escort Cup series unwittingly led to one of the most controversial issues in football in recent years.

Despite public saturation of the affair by both the written and electronic media I feel it pertinent to put Swans point of view.

Before the start of the competition a set of fixtures were drawn up and, it was agreed that should we defeat Glenelg and Collingwood we would be scheduled to meet another V.F.L. club in Melbourne on June 10.

Without any consultation with us or the A.F.C. directors from Western Australia or South Australia (and as far as I know any other state) that date was summarily changed to June 8 by the Victorian directors of the A.F.C.

We agreed to that change.

Later a further change to June 22 was made, again without consultation with us or other A.F.C. directors, by the Victorians.

We objected strongly without avail.

OBLIGATION

John Todd and our match committee decided to complete our obligation with a very junior team and this was supported by our Board of Management.

Our treatment of the competition as a second rate one was entirely in line with the approach to it over the years by the top V.F.L. clubs.

They have consistently rested top players and on some occasions have fielded almost their second side. For example Carlton rested 12 of their regular players for their second last appearance in the Cup this year.

When we defeated Collingwood such players as Peter Moore, Graham Teasdale, Peter Daicos and Ricky Barham were not selected.

Never once has a V.F.L. premiership team won an Escort Cup in the same year.



John Todd.....determined

The Escort Premiership appears to have been reserved for the lower clubs who have everything to gain and nothing to lose.

It deserves questioning that none of the 1982 top four V.F.L. clubs - Richmond, Carlton, Hawthorn or Essendon - could even reach this year's grand final.

All this aside, the W.A.F.L.'s part in what has become a sorry affair should not be unrecorded.

When the fixtures were changed for the second time the Board of Management passed a resolution indicating their total and unanimous support for any action Swans might take over the matter. A letter indicating that support was directed to be forwarded to the A.F.C.

Some weeks later, in a complete about-turn a further resolution was passed (opposed by myself as Swans' representative) advising us to send our best (whatever that might be and in whose opinion?) to play Richmond. Soon after the match another resolution was passed that the A.F.C. be advised of the W.A.F.L.'s rejection of Swans' action in not selecting their best team and advising that the W.A.F.L. would fully support any disciplinary action or penalty against us that the A.F.C. might wish to impose.

What a turn-around!!

In the space of a few short weeks from complete support to total and utter opposition.

Perhaps the abbreviation should really be... "W.A.F.F.L.E."

Now that the leading club in Western Australia football (league ladder leaders in 1980 and 1982 and runner-up to Claremont in 1981) has been banned from competing in the Escort Series it has successfully reduced itself to, what it has indeed been all along, a second-rate competition.

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...an underated young Demon



One of the most consistent players at Perth this season has been centre-man Cam Shepherd. He has rarely played a bad game and was recently chosen in the WA squad.

However, injury played its part, and Shepherd could not even be considered for State selection.

He has been one of the most under-rated players on the league football scene in the last three years, but is now receiving just recognition for his efforts.

He is a class player and one the Demons will be hoping will stay at the club for many years to come so that he can play a part in their re-building programme.

He made his league debut in 1979, but coach of the day Ken Armstrong only played him on a handful of occasions in order not to ruin the promising youngster.

He was gradually blooded into the competitive league football scene and Armstrong should be commended for his judgement in holding Shepherd back.

The results began to show in 1980 when he was third in the club's fairest and best award.

Since then he has gradually progressed to the stage where he is now enjoying his finest moments in league football.

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to the Perth centre-man and found out how he feels at Perth and where he sees them going in the next few years.

Q: Everyone has suggested that this has been your best year in league football, but you must have gone fairly well in 1980 to be third in the fairest and best award at Perth?

A: 1980 was my first full year of league football and as such I was ranked as a first year player and I think people tend to look at you a bit more if you are in your first season. Obviously I think this has been my most successful season. In the first round and at the beginning of the second round I think I was playing as well as I have ever done in senior football.

Q: What has been the reason for your form dropping away in the last few weeks, after that good start to the season?

A: After the Subiaco game in the second round, when I considered I had played pretty well, I suffered an ankle injury and I still have not recovered fully from that. It makes it hard to turn. Whether that has been why I have dropped down in form, or not, or possibly a loss of confidence following the injury, and that couple of weeks off interrupted the system I don't know. I reckon I was going well until the injury. But that stopped the system where I was playing reasonably well week to week and I had to start the system all over again. But to play for 21 weeks well in succession it is virtually an impossibility. You have to play at least one bad one.

Q: How did you end up playing for Perth?

A: I played for Scotch College and from there I came to Perth because my father

and grand father played for Perth I went there under the father and son clause, because I lived in the Claremont district. It was either Claremont or Perth and I chose Perth after they had finished second in a grand final in 1978 and Claremont were not going too well. On looking back it was not the right decision but I am very happy where I am.

Q: Were there any family pressures to go to Perth?

A: No. I think I was given a free hand to decide myself where I wanted to play. Possibly it was always considered I would go to Perth.

Q: Who had an influence on you when you were playing at Scotch?

A: We had Ian Shortland - Jones who was a Subiaco player, and he was the first 18 coach there for about 15 or 16 years. He had an exceptional football brain and players who have come through him include Robert Wiley, Ross Glendinning, Neil Randall and Oral McGuire. He knows what he is talking about, Scotch have not finished out of the first three since he was coach, which is an amazing record.

Q: When did you come up from the country to Perth?

A: I was born in Kellerberrin when my father was running the hotel up there. But I only spent my first two years at Kellerberrin and the rest of my time has been spent in Perth, so I am not really a country boy.

Q: What do you think has been the key to your own success this year?

A: I did a solid pre-season - possibly the best I have done. Ian Miller certainly knew the whys and wherefores of the pre-season and we had our physical education man in Andrew Taggart on hand. Andrew was with Ron Barassi at North Melbourne in 1977 and 1978 and I got the fittest I had been and then I was played in the position I prefer - the centre - they

played me on the wing previously and while I don't mind playing there I think the middle suits my game. Early on everything clicked, I was getting the ball through the centre rather than waiting for it out on the wing, but I put the consistency down to the fact that once you get into a frame of mind it is very hard to get out of it. That is why players down find it hard to get up and players up generally stay up.

Q: And what about Ian Miller's influence down at Perth, how he has he been going?

A: Exceptional. I don't have any gripes with Alan Joyce, he was a hard worker and knew his football. But Ian has thrown new light on the scene with himself, Chubby Stiles, Pat Astone and Mike Redenbach making it a very tight knit group. Ian knows what he is talking about. He has a great football mind and next year it will probably show more. He does give the players a little bit of freedom to make decisions on the field. It is not decisions as such, but he has given us a bit of creativity. We can call different players onto the ball if someone else is tired. Ian has created a lot of enthusiasm at the club and our performances this year, although we are not winning, have been a great improvement on last year. We are far more competitive. We have had three barren days, twice against South Fremantle and once against Claremont. Apart from that we have been pretty consistent without winning.

Q: Those three wins against Subiaco must have been fairly important for Perth?

A: The last game against Subiaco, Ian treated like a grand final, because had we lost, then Subi would have been right in the hunt to get off the bottom of the table.

No team wants the wooden spoon. Personally I think we have held the wood over Subiaco this year.

Q: What about the future at Perth - do you think it looks pretty bright?

A: I think the last four games will tell the story. We would be looking to win two of those games. With young players like Len Gandini, Chris Lee and Oral McGuire I think we have some top players. On the media side, if we don't beat a couple of sides in the last few games, they will say all we can beat is Subi, and what chance have we of improving. If we can grab a few good players from Victoria like Bosustow and Wiley - they would be very handy. Next year the young players should be better for the experience and that should help our team's performance as a whole.

Q: You must have been pleased to have been selected in the State squad this year?

A: I hoped I would get in. I thought early in the year I was one of our most consistent players and I was aiming to get in the State squad. Once I got there I thought I must have had a chance of working my way into the team. However, I didn't make that. But so far State squad selection has been the highlight of my career. Unfortunately the week I was chosen was the week I did my ankle in.

Q: Do you play any other sports at a competitive level?

A: In summer I go to the horse racing extensively, but I also play cricket for the Windsor club with Neil Randall and Gary Diver who used to play for East Fremantle and apart from that the occasional game of golf. Football is pretty much full time and you don't get many opportunities to take on other sports.

Q: Has anyone from the VFL approached you about playing over there?

A: Well, I had an approach from Carlton about two years ago but that was the last I heard about it. I think that although I am only 21 I have played a lot of games and I would be very interested in going to Victoria when I am 23 or 24. All I want to do is play in the best league in Australia. I have played in the best over here.

South still have a chance

HAVE South Fremantle been written off too soon as a finals contender this season?

This Saturday will answer that question. South are still a chance. If they beat East Fremantle and West Perth roll East Perth then South and East Perth will meet in a showdown at Fremantle Oval next week.

And the Royals have shown a distinct dislike for the port ground over the years. While a lot depends on West Perth beating the Royals this week some critics may have been a little premature in burying South after their loss to Claremont last Saturday.

East Perth are sure to be conscious that they are not yet safe and that a loss to West Perth could tumble them into a situation that could make it very hot for them in the last three games of the season.

They will have an easier run home than South after their next two clashes, playing East Fremantle and Subiaco.

South will meet Subiaco and Swan Districts, but their match against the league leaders will be at Fremantle Oval.

South coach Mal Brown has been reported as saying that he will use the rest of the season to blood young players. But is unlikely to do that until after this week.

If he brings new players in for this important clash then it will be because he feels he will get more value out of them than some of his more experienced players.



So West Perth have finally managed to show they can perform under pressure. Their reward has been a place in the finals this season.

Even so, they will find themselves in a real desperate struggle against East Perth on Saturday.

While the Falcons will have plenty of

incentive to win this match because victory will keep them in a fight for a place in the second semi-final they will meet a side that knows defeat could erode their hold on fourth spot and force them into a fight for their football lives in the last four games of the season.

There is no love lost between these two clubs, so it is likely to be a very rugged encounter with so much riding on it.

Over the years the home ground advantage has usually been the deciding factor between these two sides. The Falcons certainly haven't found Perth Oval a happy hunting ground.

Though they appear to have more sparkle than the Royals, because of their pace on the ball, they could be forced to struggle against a side that usually gives its best performance in this kind of situation.



Swan Districts are in trouble.

They can no longer excuse their dismal second round performance against West Perth as an off-day. For the second time the Falcons have exposed deficiencies in Swans.

They simply don't have the run to counter sides that do.

Last Saturday's loss has suddenly changed the complexion of the competition. Swans coach John Todd, desperate for a premiership has been shielding his players from games that could take an injury toll.

It may have backfired. Swans now look as though they could be in for another barren final round.

While they will be favoured to beat Perth at Subiaco Oval on Saturday, Swans

Teasdale, a former Brownlow Medal winner, has just had a knee reconstructed and is confident that he will be fit enough for next season.

"I decided to have the operation now as it takes about nine months for the knee to recover properly and this gives me plenty of time to play next season", he said.

Lee's new role

RICHMOND never seem to be short of a class full-forward. Earlier this season, Mandurah boy Brian Taylor stepped into the key role when former VFL leading goalkicker Michael Roach was unavailable through injury.

Taylor is now on the injured list himself and his place has been taken by ruckman Mark Lee. Though Lee doesn't relish the role, he booted nine goals in less than two quarters in the match against St Kilda last week.



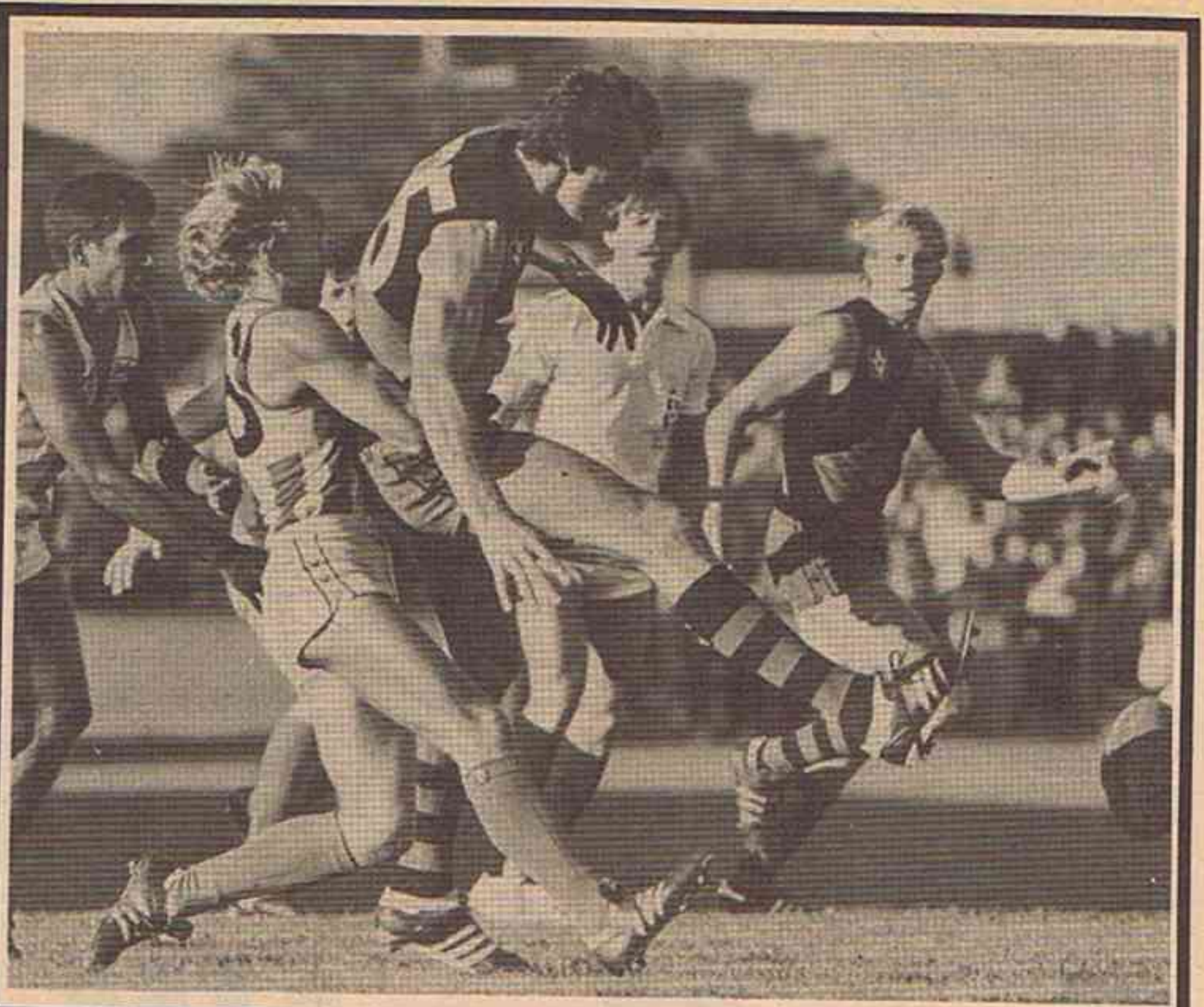
Ansett upset

THE NUMBERING OF PLAYERS

Although the representative game between Port Adelaide and Western Australian teams in 1910 was actually the first to place numbers on players' backs, the first real attempt came in the final of the same year when East Fremantle met East Perth.

Incidentally, it was Young Easts first chance of a title since joining in 1906. But to the East Fremantle club it was already 'old hat'.

The game was played on the first day of October at the Fremantle Oval with Ivor Crapp as umpire and \$606 was taken at the gate.

East Perth, who had finished second, eliminated West Perth and East Fremantle, who had finished top, eliminated South Fremantle.

Full scores of this game, the final for the premierships, were:—

ROYAL TOUR

East Perth toured Victoria in 1936 and beat a combined Melbourne-St Kilda team on the M.C.G. in a mid-week match by 18 points — 11.25 (91) to 10.13 (73). The combined team was captained by veteran ex-South Fremantle champion, William "Bull" Adams, who was then coach of Melbourne seconds (reserves), and he captained them to five straight premierships. Some of the players to make that trip for the 'Royals' were Deverick (Mick) Cronin (captain), Brian Ryan (vice-captain), Sefton Parry, Herbert Screaigh, Paul Lockyer, Len Golding, Dave Miller, George Fogarty, Alf Mussman, Ray Starr, Ritchie Thomas and Jack Guhl.

FIRST FOR EAST PERTH

Talking of 1936, in that year East Perth became the first club to win the premiership from fourth place on the premiership table, under the Page system of finals introduced in 1931.

On the way to the premiership they beat Subiaco 6.11 (47) to 5.16 (46), East Fremantle 14.14 (98) to 14.13 (97), both matches by one solitary point. Finally Claremont 11.5 (71) to 9.6 (60). In the East Fremantle match, Old Easts were 13 points ahead with five minutes to go. Former East Fremantle champion, Jerry Dolan, was East Perth coach that year.

Palm for Norwood

South Australia's 'Football Times' reported last week that West Perth's David Palm may return to Norwood next year.

The paper quoted Palm as saying he would have no ties in Perth after the '82 season and could return to Adelaide. He said he had achieved one of his ambitions in playing for WA against South Australia.

"I wasn't good enough to play for SA, so it was a great thrill to play for WA", he said.

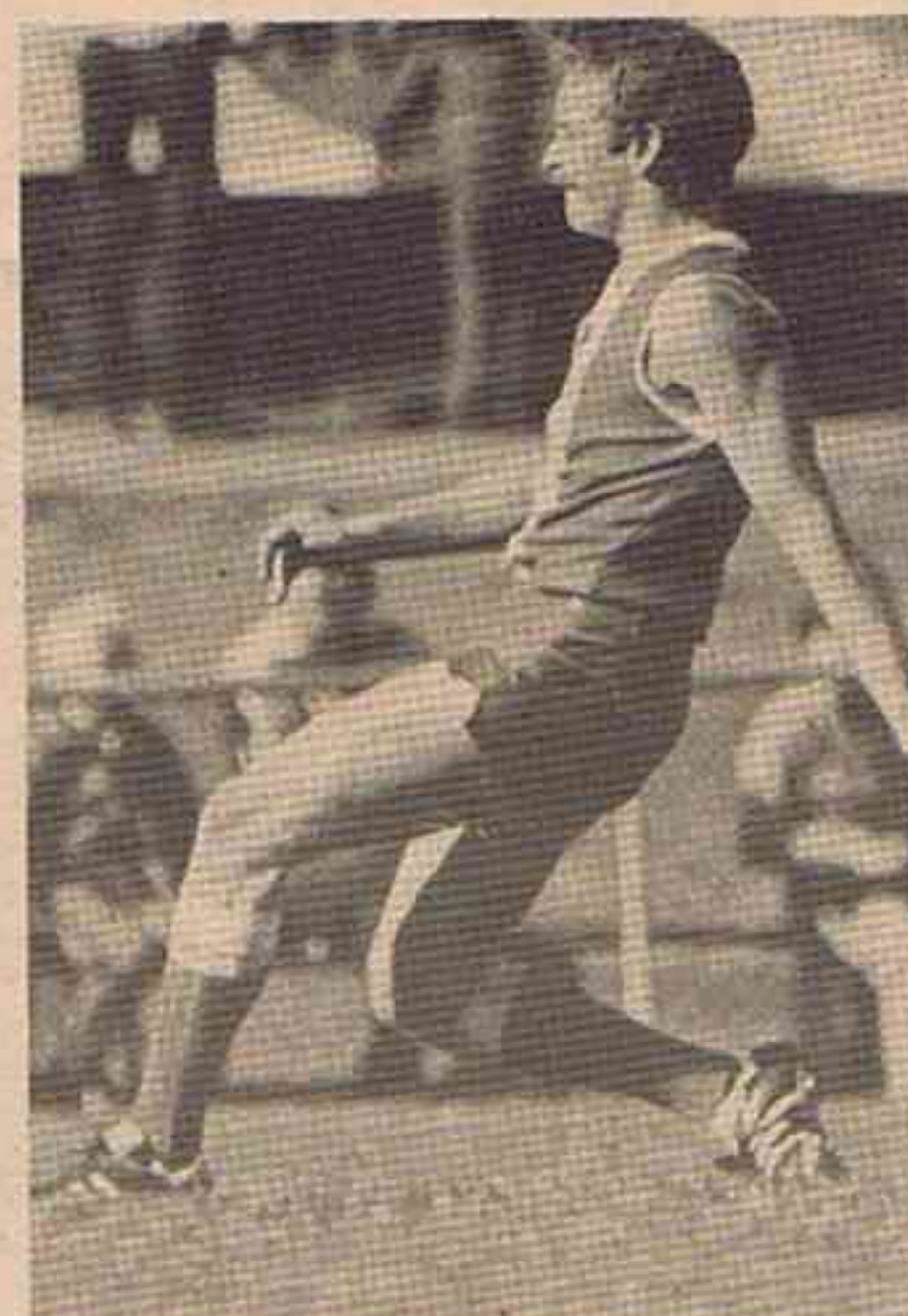
Get it right!

Are Falcons trying to buy a flag?

Are West Perth trying to buy a premiership? They appear to have taken a North Melbourne approach in their desperation to again become a football power.

On Sunday, eleven of the 20 players in the side were acquired from other clubs — John Duckworth, Peter Mumane, George Michalczyk, Mick O'Brien, Russell Ellen, Phil Bradmore, Graeme Comerford, David Palm, Frank Bucknall, Neil Fotheringham and Gordon Polson.

Throw in Wayne Foreman and Shane Fitzsimmons and it can be seen the lengths West Perth have gone to to bolster the team with imports.

Ironically, while they were still buying players, until the clearance deadline, obviously as insurance in case they are hard hit with injuries, they have let two local players go to other league clubs in recent weeks, Chris Stasinowsky and Chris Raykos.

It would be interesting to know just how much it has cost the club to acquire their imports and what it is costing them to field a team each week.

While it shows initiative by the club to try and build West Perth into a strong team again, it will be interesting to see whether the acquisition of so many outsiders has a detrimental effect on the club in the long term.

It backfired on Claremont when they tried to buy a premiership in 1972.

They also had a lot of success on the field, winning 18 out of 21 qualifying games, but were unable to handle East Perth in the finals.

The club paid a heavy price for concentrating on imports. The bottom dropped out of Claremont the following year as many of their stars and imports moved on.

Claremont have obviously learnt a lesson from that experience as they have concentrated heavily on developing talent in their own areas.

That is a recipe that guarantees to keep a club on an even keel once they reach the top. The side may gradually lose impact as their players are recruited by VFL clubs,

or retire, but it is unlikely to torpedo them to the extent that occurred to the Tigers after 1972.

They dropped to last position in 1973 after one of the most productive qualifying rounds in post-war years and found themselves anchored at the bottom for another two years, finishing second last in 1974 and again taking the wooden spoon in 1975.

I'm not suggesting that will happen with West Perth, but I am suggesting that short term success can bring long term failure if clubs concentrate too much on propping up their side with imports.

It has the effect of drying up the nursery as young players deprived of league opportunities because of imports, look elsewhere.

I find it strange that West Perth have been prepared to bring imports almost straight into the league side without them having to win their way through the ranks (Bucknall and Polson).

It must have a dampening effect on players, who have been striving all season for the opportunity to play league.

He finishes at the end of this year and is almost certain to play at Bassendean Oval in 1983.

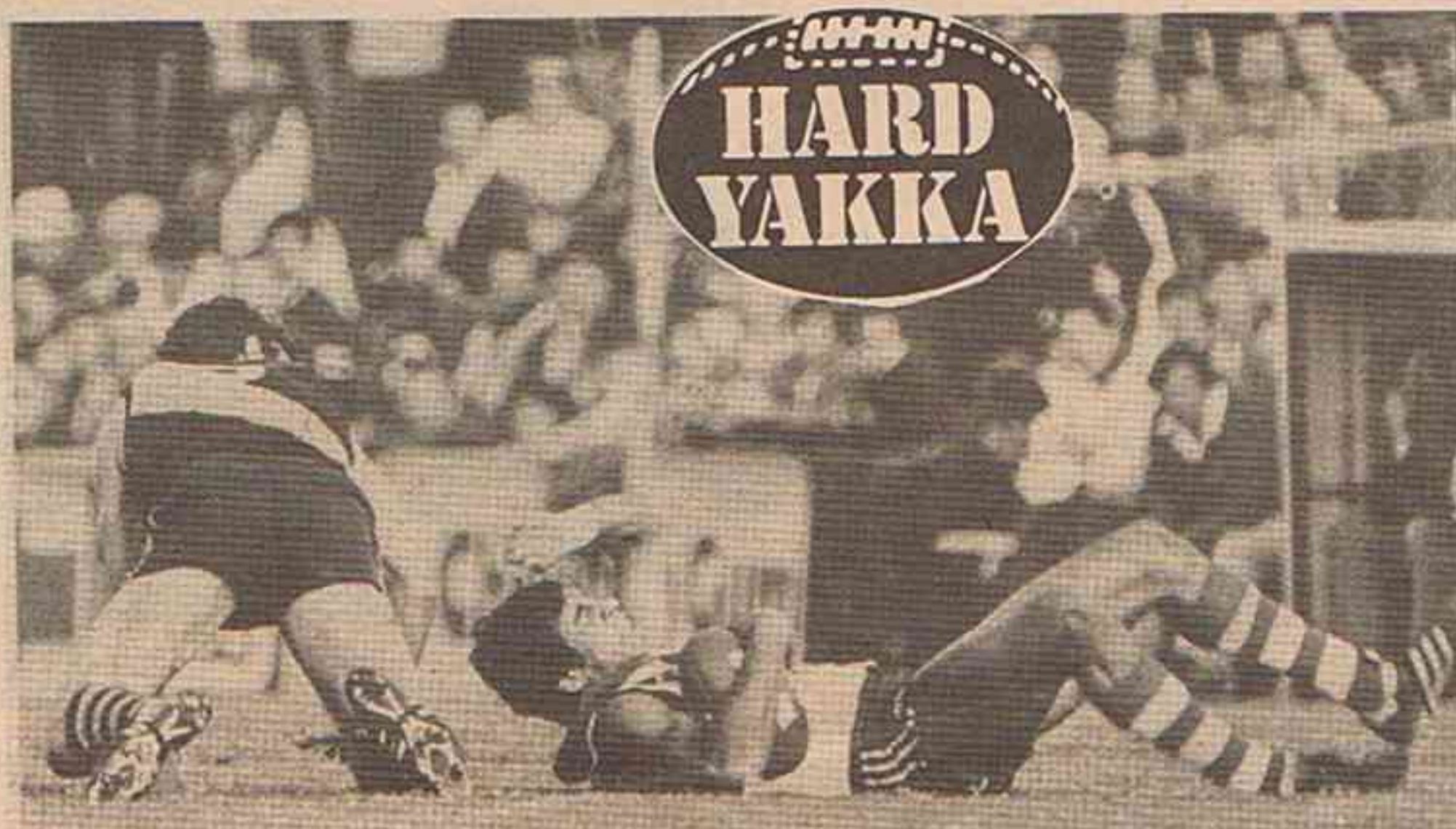

Interchange changes

There have been many rule changes to our game in recent years and one of the most significant was the introduction of the interchangeable reserves. It allows a coach much more flexibility in his team and naturally he aims to keep the game flowing and the ball in motion - as has been seen with other rule changes like kicking the ball out on the full and the two umpire system.

Now the question arising is how many interchange players should be permitted in one team. The recent State games have seen five (Victoria) and three (SA) players used, both successfully. For our game to progress it will be inevitable that more interchange players will be used - just as in many other sports.

I would like to see three players used, but perhaps one day the interchange players may be selected for specific positions and placed in definite categories, such as forward, back, centreline, ruck and ruck-rover/rover, giving us five players who are only allowed to play in their specific areas.

CURTY THE DIFFERENCE

In a game in which 46 goals were scored many players contributed from both East Perth and Perth last week. But East Perth's Steve Curtis was the outstanding player in the match. His second half effort on the ball was the major difference between the two sides. His energetic and characteristically aggressive approach to the ball and his willingness to use and share it at all times was a top effort.

Curty had rather a slow start to the season, but in his last eight or 10 games his form has given the opposition a glimpse of vintage Curty and Saturday was really one of those days.

HIP AND SHOULDER

One of the keys to success is team work and it comes in many forms. On Saturday East Perth ruckman Craig Edwards showed how to shepherd off for your team-mate which resulted in an East Perth goal. He gave out one of the best hip and shoulders I have seen and I am sure Len Gandini, the recipient, would say the same after picking himself up off the ground.

It finally happened -- the Lions, after 16 consecutive losses, broke through for their first premiership points of 1982 when they easily accounted for East Fremantle.

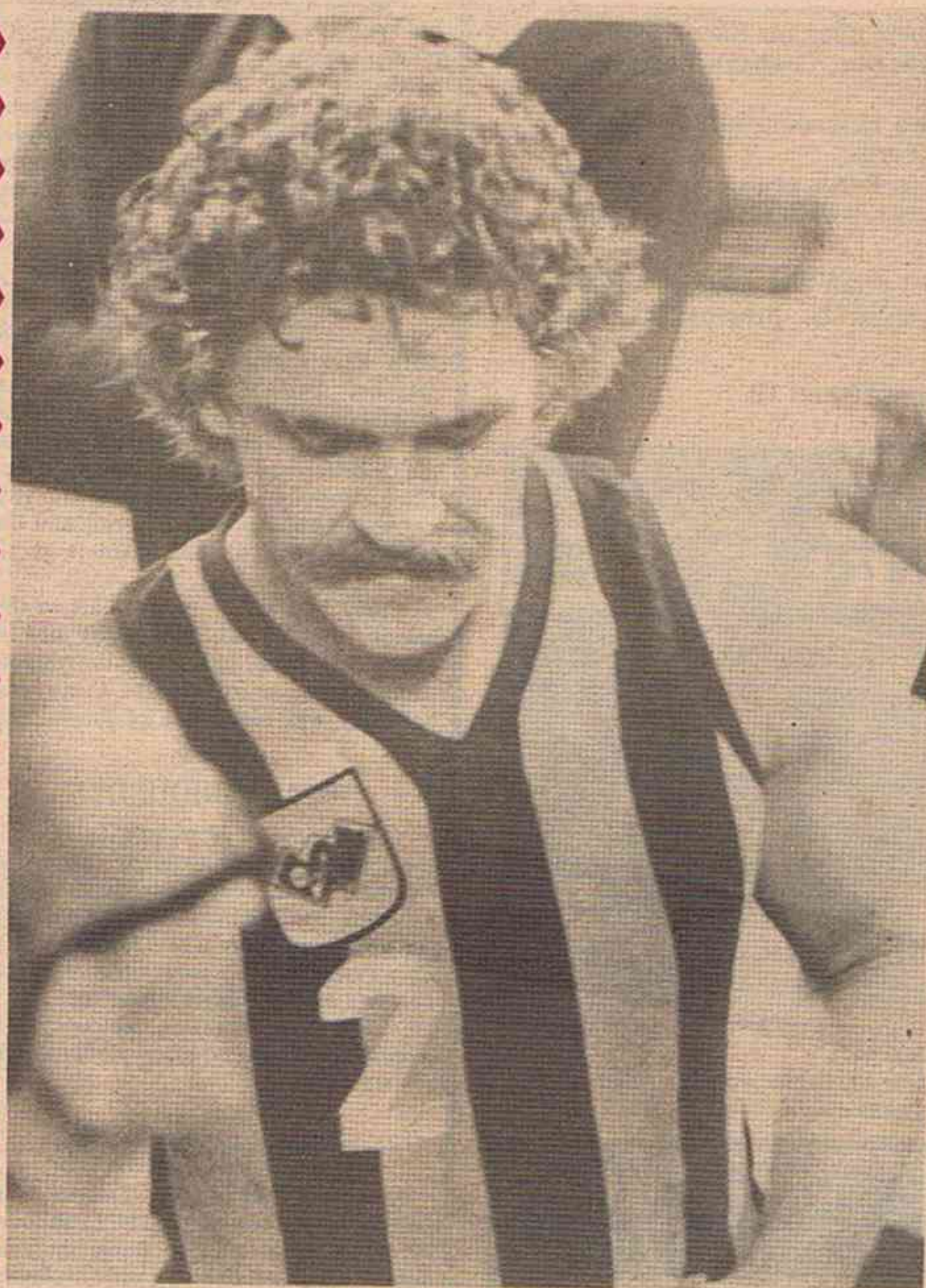
And they treated it as if it was a grand final.

The Subiaco players showed a lot of character and determination to finally crack the ice. As Ken Armstrong says "If you keep working the breaks must eventually come your way."

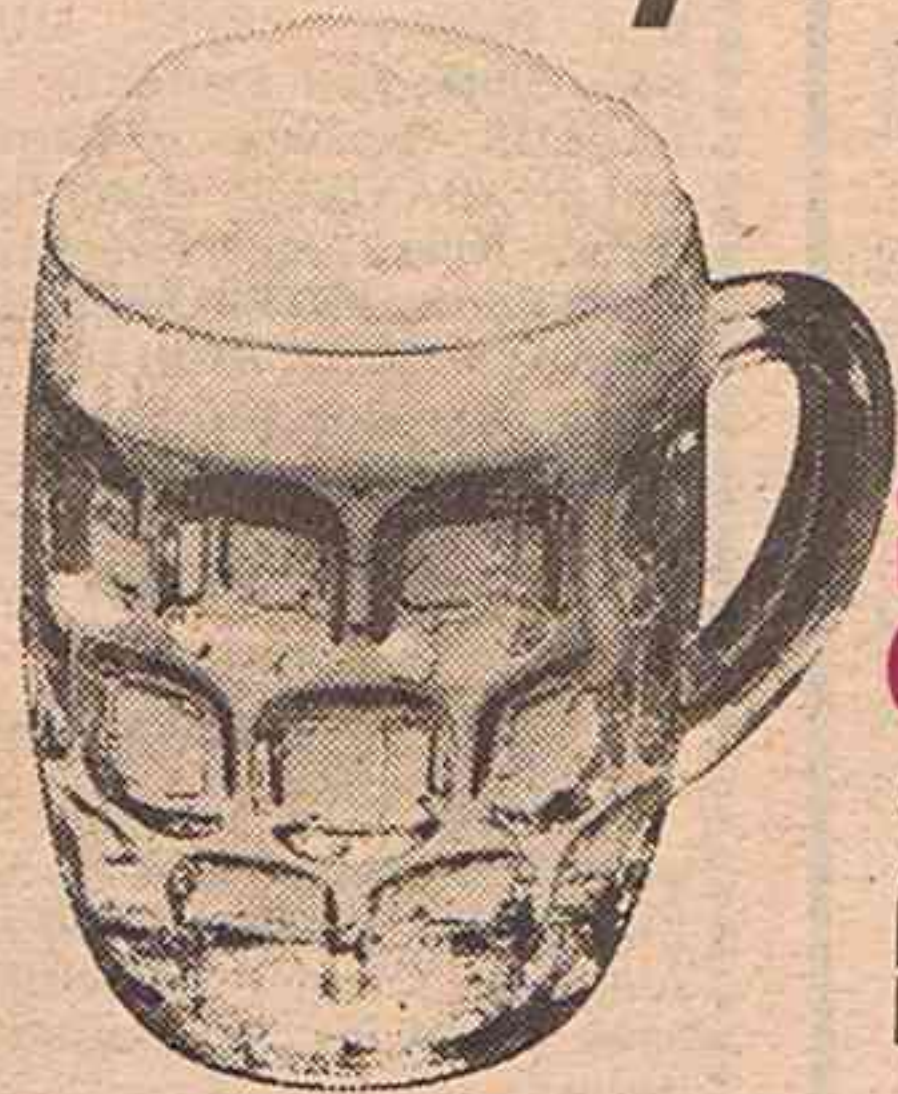



Below: Mike Sheldon and Dwayne Lamb could not contain their emotion. They were absolutely ecstatic about the victory.

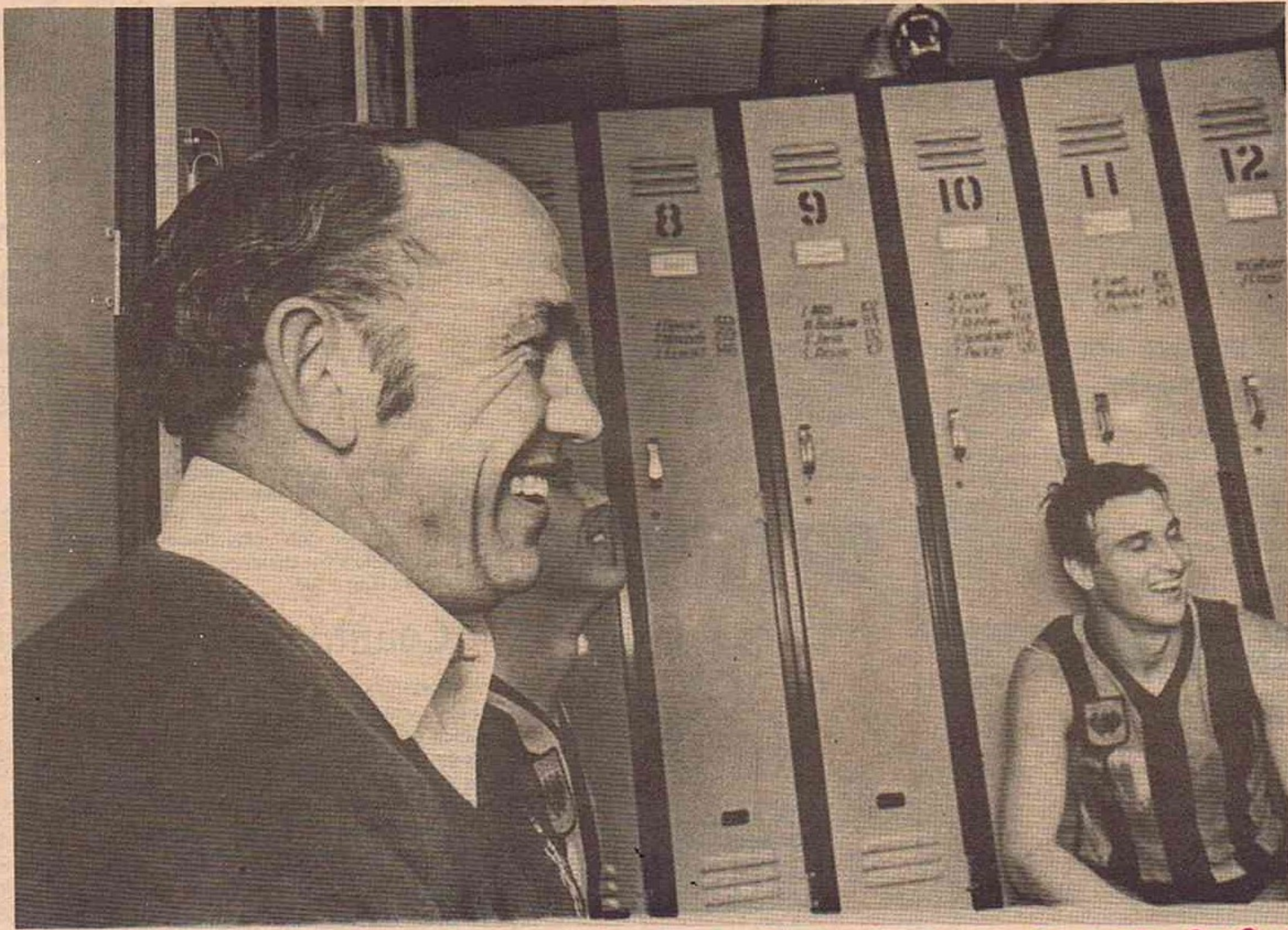

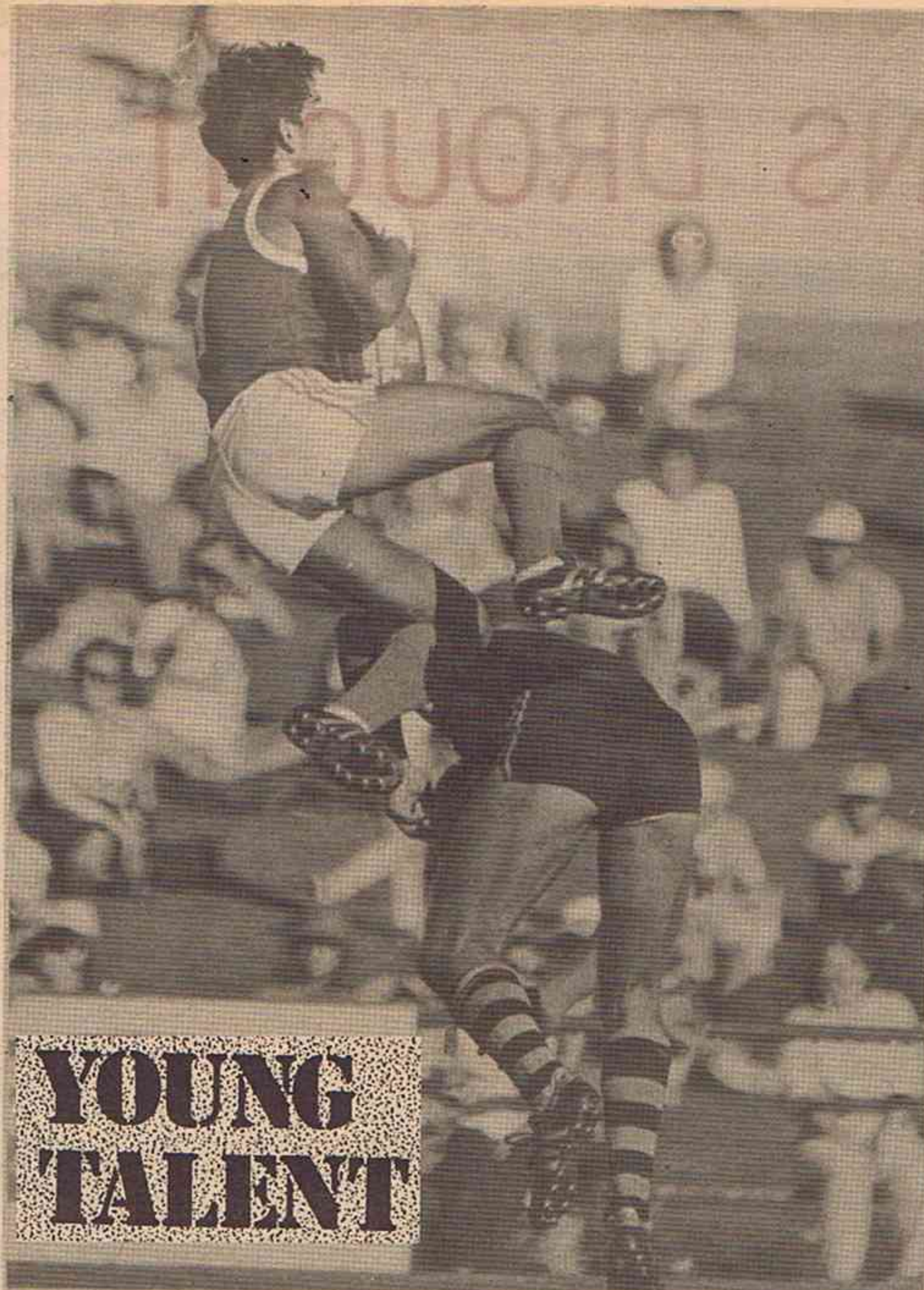
ELUSIVE TIGER

UMPIRES

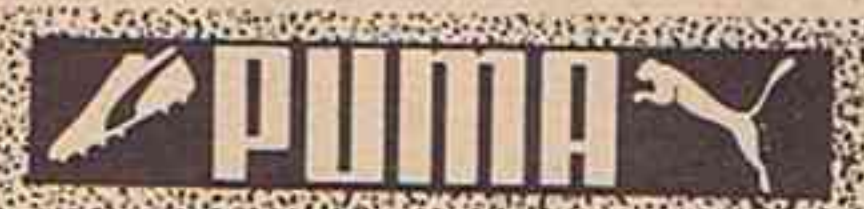

NEW JUNIOR POLICY

The recently formed W.A.F.L. Football Development Board is in the process of formulating a policy to be operational in junior football by all clubs next season.

Indications are that freeball, used successfully in South Fremantle's zoning for the past two years, modified rules and special rules will be introduced.

Freeball is a skills clinic, with fun games of non-contact and player rotation, and will be for 8s and under.

Modified rules is expected to be uniform with 10s and under while special rules, played without followers, is aimed for the 12s and under bracket.

The most significant breakthrough will be ties with the Education Department.

"We plan to have the system in all schools," said WAFL's Administrator of Football Development, Ross Davis.

"The problem today is that by the time a player reaches 15, he has already played 200 games of competitive football, and has had enough," Mr Davis says "Their early years should be skill learning with fun and games for them."

The Football Development Board, led by chairman Cliff Houghton, will present their recommendations to the WAFL directors shortly and a decision on the format for next season will be forwarded when available.

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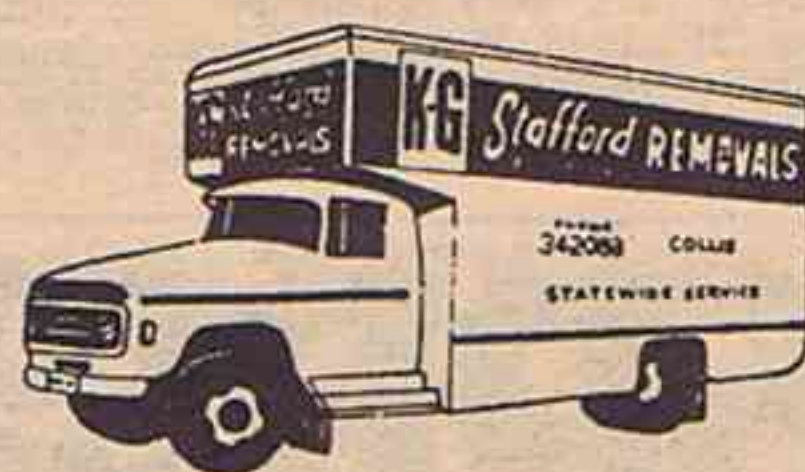
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Nollamara show top form
