# Falcons

West Perth ARE good . . . and it is about time the WA football public began to realise it.

The Falcons have been accused of lacking the skill and general ability of other sides in the competition. But surely after last week's performance a few critics must change their minds.

West Perth beat the reigning premiers, Swan Districts and beat them well.

And this week they will be looking for a similar result against boom team Claremont.

Falcons coach Dennis Cometti believes that his side does not receive the accolades it deserves.

"A few people are inclined not to be flexible in their opinions about players," Cometti says.

"But I think it would be a good idea for those concerned to re-assess the ability of players like Graeme Comerford, Phil Bradmore and Shane Fitzsimmons.

"Comerford has been a valuable player at West Perth since being cleared from Swan Districts; Fitzsimmons had 28 possessions from a forward pocket or half forward flank against South Fremantle and Bradmore has been invaluable at centre half forward."

Many football fans have considered that it was a sheer fluke that the Falcons made the preliminary final last year.

But performances like the one against Swans last week indicate that they can win the premiership.

It seems that no one — except West Perth supporters — believe that they have the ability to earn the 1983 pennant.

Therefore the Falcons will approach the match against Claremont with the greatest of urgency.

Last season they beat the Tigers in the final of the pre-season Red Rooster carnival and followed that up by winning the first round match against Claremont at Leederville Oval.

But after that, the Tigers proved their master, winning one match at Claremont, another at Leederville Oval and the preliminary final at Subiaco Oval.

The Falcons are keen to avenge themselves for that September loss.

### PROUDEST


Cometti says that the proudest aspect of his coaching reign in the last two seasons has been that only once have the Falcons been guilty of not being competitive — against Swan Districts at Bassendean.

And now, with a strong band of young players, he is looking to re-assert West Perth at the top of the table.

David Hart, Dean Falconer and Peter Avery are all young players with outstanding potential and now they will get the chance to prove that they can play under final round pressure.

Because that is exactly the situation which will confront them on Saturday.

It will be a tremendous match and if last year's clashes between the two sides can be used as a guide it will be played as if a pennant is the reward for the winner.



# Promotion is paying off

## ...Attendances up

THE 1983 season unfolded with the West Australian Football League launching an imaginative promotional campaign to get more people to league matches — and now that programme is beginning to pay dividends.

Already there has been an increase of five per cent in the attendances and I believe it is a direct result of the campaign.

In recent seasons the trend had been towards flagging attendances because football is now competing for the "hard to get" leisure dollar.

But the promotion of the game seems to be working and the WAFL should be commended for its approach to the problem.

The investment has been very worthwhile. When it is considered that the South Australian attendances are marginally down and the VFL has seen 13 per cent less people at the football this year, the game in WA is in a much healthier state.

The promotional move by the WAFL to have the Emu Export carnival held in the middle of the season is also a step in the right direction. The Swan Brewery will pump in \$60,000 for sponsorship of the event and they should be congratulated for supporting the game.

It promises to be an action-packed two-day event and the clubs will be desperate for the rewards in terms of prize money.

The coaches probably are not over-keen on the carnival because it could upset the development and form of their team leading up to the finals, but the game should benefit.



# ...one of football's real characters



SINCE joining West Perth from Footscray in 1981 Phil Bradmore has developed into one of the characters of the game in this State.

Little did football fans know that when the tall forward was brought to Perth that he would develop into the most colourful player in this State.

The West Perth fans love him . . . and so do many supporters from other clubs.


His on-field antics, particularly when he does a tuck-jump after kicking a goal, have become his trademark. His short hair and big ears (which earned him the nickname Spock) have become an important part of the game.

The WAFL has not missed the opportunity to use one of their biggest drawcards by featuring the volatile Falcon on posters around town.

But what does the man himself think about his image and his rise to stardom?

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to Bradmore and found out a little more about one of the most popular figures in the game.

And Bradmore even kept a couple of stories reserved for the interview. Particularly one involving a Perth Football Club official who tried to coax him to Lathlain Park less than 12 hours after he had arrived in town.



Phil Bradmore . . . jumping for joy

**Q:** Before you came across to WA had you played anywhere else apart from the forward line?

**A:** No. I had always played in the forward line, mainly at full-forward. But I enjoy playing at half-forward because you have a lot more room to move around in. At full-forward you lead and if you miss it that is the end of that and then if you stand in the square and wait to take the mark in the pack another guy only has to get his hands to the ball you have missed your chance again. At half-forward you can run up to the wing and then back to full-forward. It's good. I don't really have a roving commission in the forward line, but I do have to do the ruck work in attack. As yet I haven't got into trouble for roaming too far!

**Q:** How do you find Dennis Cometti's coaching methods?

**A:** Some people like the screamers — the guys who scream at you — but I like the guys who rev you up by motivating you. He is a brilliant speaker.

**Q:** You must have been disappointed when West Perth were bundled out in the preliminary final last year?

**A:** Yes I was. We had such a good year last season until the finals and when we made the preliminary final I think everyone had considered that we had done well enough. Maybe we didn't set our goals high enough. I think we just lacked a little bit on that particular day. We have won three of the first four games this year and I think we can go two steps further this year, firstly to make a grand final and then win it. We will definitely make the four and hopefully we can go on from there.

**Q:** Some of the half-backs in the competition seem to be playing well — will that make it harder for you?

**A:** Well at the moment Benny Vigona, Michael Aitken and Greg Wilkinson seem to be going pretty well and that has made it harder. Two weeks ago I played at centre-half-forward against Perth and that was a bit easier. I scored a seven in the Westside Football player ratings so I must have done alright.

**Q:** Who had the biggest influence on your career in the early days?

**A:** My father, although he didn't play league football himself. He kept me interested when I was living in Sydney for a while. I was born in Melbourne and then moved to Sydney, where they don't play much football and when I was asked to go down and try out with Footscray we moved back to Melbourne.

**Q:** I believe you used to live with Gordon Polson?

**A:** Yes. I was living with him when he was playing with Subiaco and we were always arguing and poisoning each other's food. Michael Sheldon was also living there so I was out-numbered. But with Gordon coming to West Perth I believe that helped my game and he has gone quite well there.

**Q:** Do you prepare yourself in any special way for a game?

**A:** I always have spaghetti on a Friday night and I never go outside the house on a Saturday morning. I never listen to TV or radio, I stay in my bedroom. I get up at about 9am. If Darrall and Ossie (Hey, Hey It's Saturday) are on TV it just distracts me. I like watching Hey, Hey It's Saturday during the summer, but I can't do that during winter.

**Q:** What made you come to WA?

**A:** I wanted to play league football and I had lost my job in Melbourne. At Footscray at the time they had Kelvin Templeton, Jim Edmunds, who is now captain, and Shane Lovelace and they were all holding down spots in the forward line and I wasn't getting a regular game. Then Graeme Pleydell rang me and I made the move to West Perth.

**Q:** You had a sensational start to football in WA as well, didn't you?

**A:** Yes I kicked eight goals in the first game and hit the post twice so I missed on the \$100 from Marlboro. West Perth kicked a record score against East Fremantle that day and after the first game I thought it was easy over here. But we played Subiaco the next week and I played

on Mitch Fussell and never kicked a goal. I was in for a rude shock after the first game.

**Q:** Who would be the hardest guy you have played on in WA football?

**A:** Probably Michael Aitken. He takes a strong mark and never stops trying. Plus he is a nice guy.

**Q:** I believe Perth contacted you when you arrived in Perth?

**A:** Yes. I was staying at Graeme Pleydell's house until I found some accommodation and he had gone to work and I was just watching tele when there was a knock on the door and Colin Minson from Perth was standing there. He just walked into the West Perth general manager's house and I didn't know what to do. I was trying to get him out without being rude. He said come on let's pack up your bags and you can come and stay at my place. I said no because I had already signed with West Perth, but it was pretty hard.

**Q:** How have you enjoyed it at West Perth?

**A:** They are a good bunch of blokes down there, plus the fact that we are winning games (unlike Melbourne) and there is nothing like winning. The best thing I ever did was to move over here. Sometimes I miss Melbourne and my parents as well as my close friends, but I get over there every Christmas. It isn't too bad now, but when I first came to Perth it was pretty hard. It took me a while to get used to the West Australian style of football and to get used to the way the other players approached the game. On top of that they had to get used to me.

**Q:** What would you say would be the major difference between the styles of football in the two States?

**A:** Probably the major difference in Melbourne is that they have 20 good footballers who just hate you to get a kick. Over here you have got about eight or nine really good players in every side and then after that it drops off slightly and they let you get a handball out or a kick. I think that is the main difference.

**Q:** Where do you enjoy playing best — in Perth or in Melbourne?

**A:** Over here because I have had more success in WA than I did in Victoria and everyone enjoys being successful.

**Q:** What about your image?

**A:** My image is a funny one. One night at training Alan Watling called me Spock and the nickname has stuck. I think it has something to do with my big ears. I'll never forgive him for that, but I do enjoy my image. I think it is good to be easily identified and I enjoy it when I am walking down the street and people say 'hello Phil'. Getting my poster on the wall has been good. When I had my photo taken in front of the poster for the Daily News it was embarrassing, because all the school kids were walking past when it was being done.

# A top round of matches

THIS week's round of fixtures in the WAFL are a promoter's dream.

All teams appear evenly matched and good crowds should result.

Game of the day billing should go to the battle between Claremont and West Perth, especially after West Perth showed the brand of football they are capable of producing when they trounced Swan Districts last Saturday.

Claremont had to struggle against Subiaco, but like the professionals they are, the Tigers are certain to improve for the all-important match with the Falcons.



SWAN DISTRICTS could find themselves in big trouble in the absence of Ron Bouncer.


Lanky Laurie Keene, the Lions ruckman, was superb against Claremont and it was his influence which almost saw Subiaco topple the Tigers last week.

Marshall was one of the many Swans players who were out of touch last week and he will need to regain the form which saw him head the goalkicking list after three games.


Swans will not have the game all their own way, but they have the experience in a crisis which will see them through.

The Sharks showed some signs of improvement in last week's derby, but they still have a lot of young players in their side who will need experience before they can play well for a couple of weeks in succession.




While Perth also have a lot of young players they have enough experienced talent around the ground to see them through in what promises to be an exciting match.

# Battle hots up in clearance war

As VFL clubs draw up their battle lines this week in one of the most sensational periods in the history of Victorian football, gloomy forecasts are emerging that the country's biggest football organisation is on the verge of ruin.

There is no doubt that last week's ruling by Victorian Supreme Court Judge, Mr Justice Crockett, will change the course of Australian football. Only time will reveal the full implications.

Former leading Victorian umpire and now radio commentator, Harry Beitzel, has predicted a period of absolute turmoil. He feels the eventual outcome will be a reduction of teams in the VFL competition.

Writing in Melbourne's Sunday Observer he also predicted:

- As many as 20 non-contracted VFL footballers would swap clubs almost immediately.
- Zoning, both metropolitan and country could finish.
- Interstate drafting would be non-enforceable.
- Sydney Swans would return to Melbourne before the end of the 1983 season. (They turned down more than \$200,000 in transfer fees for Silvio Foschini and Paul Morwood).

St Kilda administrator, Ian Stewart, a former triple Brownlow Medallist, blamed Collingwood for the present chaos.

He said the Magpies had been ringing Morwood half-hourly last week offering him "money he couldn't even count". This had led to the Saints making the decision to play him last Saturday.

Stewart described the Supreme Court decision as the best thing that has happened to football.

"Why shouldn't footballers have some freedom", he said.

Former Victorian Minister for Sport, Brian Dixon, who is now a full-time director for the Sydney Swans, believes that football should be controlled by the State or Federal Governments.

"It's important that the VFL be brought under a parliamentary Act in Australia's best interests" he said.

Meanwhile, the players involved in last weekend's historic happenings are both glad to be back on the playing arena.

Morwood was sworn to secrecy about his debut, and even walked into VFL Park before last Saturday's match without his football bag so he wouldn't raise any suspicion.

He said after the game that he was sick of not playing and was delighted when told at 5.30 last Friday that I would be allowed to play. He rewarded his new club by being one of their best players.

He said his parents wanted him to accept a lucrative offer from Collingwood, but had backed him in his decision to play with the Saints.

This Sunday, St Kilda meet the Sydney Swans and Morwood said this week: "If they (the Swans) want to come out and belt our heads in, good on them".

"I can't understand their animosity", he said.

"We (Foschini and himself) played our guts out for the Swans, but we didn't want to move to Sydney, so why should we be persecuted".



## PLENTY TO SMILE ABOUT

The shadow of gloom which has been cast over VFL football this week has done little to remove the broad grin of satisfaction which has occupied the face of Ian "Bluey" Hampshire in recent weeks.

Footscray have provided at least one bright talking point in an otherwise depressing few days.

The Bulldogs fighting win over Hawthorn last Saturday has rocketed the club into premiership calculations. Their pre-season long odds have tightened sharply since wins over ruling favourites Carlton and Hawthorn.

# Redlegs short of legs

NORWOOD staged a courageous effort last weekend when they beat Central District by 16 points.

The Redlegs completed the second half of the match with only 17 fit men. Among the casualties is star forward Neville Roberts, who suffered a hairline fracture of the cheekbone.

Malcolm Blight's problems continued when his Woodville side suffered another thrashing, this time at the hands of South Adelaide. The former North Melbourne champion's worries didn't end there — after the game he had to be treated for a broken toe.

### New star

PORT Adelaide unveiled a new young star in their win over Sturt last Sunday. He is 16-year-old Greg Anderson, who won 19 kicks and 10 handpasses in his first league match.

Despite his youth, Anderson was named on Essendon's draft list last year.

### Memorial day





## The great clearance wrangle

The Supreme Court decision to allow Sydney Swans player Silvio Foschini really blew the lid off the clearances issue.

Is this the end of players having their careers interrupted while clubs and solicitors haggle over transfer fees and exchange of players?

There have been many footballers foiled in their attempts to transfer interstate or interclub and many disputes were bitter and prolonged and some were not resolved.

Here are some that were talking points:

\* 1971: Darryl Griffiths applied for a clearance from St Kilda to South Fremantle, but a hold-up saw him stand out of football for 12 months. He was eventually cleared to Claremont.

\* 1979: West Perth's Brian Adamson won a clearance to Norwood, like Foschini, through the law courts.

\* 1950's: Two young Goldfields players — Dave Cuzens and Alex Epis — won the sympathy of all WA supporters when the WA league forced them to stay out of football for two years.

\* Another to stand down for two years was East Perth's Dick Lawn in the years 1936-37. Lawn was appointed coach of Claremont, but failed to gain a release from his club. He returned to East Perth in 1938 without playing a game for the Tigers.

\* Perth's Sandover Medallist George Bailey and Ernie Henfry (who later coached Perth for 11 seasons) were denied clearances to Carlton in 1947 but still coached them to a premiership.

\* In 1961 West Perth centreman Don Marinko joined East Perth but he was not cleared. The clearance wrangle ended with

Marinko becoming a Royal through the Supreme Court.

\* Haydn Bunton Jnr spent his first year as a coach without taking the field. North Adelaide refused to clear him to Norwood in 1957. Understandably so, because Bunton was only 19 at the time.

\* South Fremantle's Colin Beard, East Perth's Sydney Jackson and Melville junior Wayne Richardson found out how frustrating it could be to stand out of football for one year to play in the VFL.

\* When South Fremantle appointed East Fremantle's ace centreman Ray Sorrell as their coach in 1964 it almost brought civil war to the port. For the first time ever a clearance fee was made public. East Fremantle demanded \$1,000 so when Sorrell returned home two years later South received their original fee back. Sorrell also made an unsuccessful bid to play with South Melbourne.

Clearances apparently were not always hard to get. The great Phil Matson moved from West Perth to Sturt (SA); to North Fremantle (who were a part of the league from 1901-15); to Subiaco and to East Perth.

## BAD DAY

Perth's colts team had a bad day last Saturday when they failed to score a goal (they went down to East Perth 22.26 to 0.6). In WA league football this century a team has failed to kick a goal 21 times. The last occasion was in 1916 when Midland Junction beat West Perth 12.16 to 0.10.

## Many don't see importance

MANY players in the WAFL unfortunately do not realise the position or the potential of the Players Association.

Take the Shane Ellis boots issue and Sunday match payments as two recent examples. I think that most players would agree with the stand taken in both instances, yet without the Players Association, there would have been no official way of expressing these views.

It is extremely difficult for an individual player to make a genuine stand against either a club or the league.

With decreasing player freedom — due to such things as training demands, the draft system and player swaps and complex contracts (plus costly legal fees) — there is an ever-increasing need for a strong and truly representative body to speak on behalf of player interests.

Hopefully, more so in the future, we can also be involved in league decision making.

Without active participation and a high proportional membership our association will not hold this status. So the message is JOIN UP.

The association also offers a number of awards, increased interchange of ideas between clubs and the chance to mix socially.

Just a reminder — after the Emu Export carnival on May 14-15 — in conjunction with the WAFL — there will be a sponsored players' function where we will be awarding certificates of merit to all 100, 150 and 200 game players since the inception of the Players Association.



Avery picked the ball up just centimetres inside the boundary near the coaches boxes, spun around onto his left foot and sent it sailing right through the middle with a screw punt. It was a tremendous goal, particularly as he was on his wrong foot, and it will take some beating for the goal of the year award.

### GOOD SWITCH

WEST Perth's top recruit Phil Cronan showed that he was relishing his switch from a half-back to a ruck-rover when he was able to kick goals instead of preventing them. Quick thinking around the goals saw him pick up his first goal of the day when he read the ball brilliantly off a pack, ducked and weaved and then sent a long left kick straight through the middle to register full points.

# Victorian replays not good

TELEVISION replays of Victorian football are not good for the game in this State and should be stopped by the WAFL if possible.

The VFL replays, particularly the Sunday evening show "The Winners" on ABC-TV are pushing the promotion of football in this State further into the background.

No matter what the WAFL tries to do in promoting the game locally it cannot match the spectacular impact of the VFL games and I am sure this is costing the sport in WA in terms of paid spectators and public following.

In particular, the VFL replays are having a very strong influence on junior footballers and junior coaches to the detriment of the local product.

Our game is suffering terribly by comparison and unless the spotlight, particularly on television, is shifted back onto the local product, other promotional aids for the port here are just going to be a waste of time.

Last Sunday I attended a junior football game at a suburban oval and overheard one of the coach's telling his players to model their game on the VFL replays.

He was right in giving that advice — but his words are hardly going to encourage those same players in future years to pursue the sport here in their home State.

The VFL product as presented on television is so far superior to our own replays that the game here is being made to look boring.


That is caused by a combination of several factors.

The VFL replays have atmosphere. Our own replays do not.

Packed grounds in Victoria bring out the best in the players and the best in the television coverage.

Our own coverage is lack lustre by comparison.

To make matters worse every VFL game seems to feature two, three and up to six West Australian players per-

forming incredible deeds for their new clubs.

That sought of thing must have a detrimental effect on the game here and if we cannot halt the best players in this State from going to Victoria, at least we should try and stop the continual highlighting of their performances.

The WAFL has an agreement with the Victorian Football League that no game from Victoria can be telecast live in this State if it clashes with a League fixture locally.

That ruling is only ever enforced in finals, but it must have been agreed to by the two bodies as a protection against the local product suffering from the direct exposure of Victorian football.

I believe the same principle now applies with the replays which, although not costing numbers directly at the turnstiles on Saturday, are having the same effect long range.

If people are watching and talking about Victorian football instead of WA football then this obviously will reflect in attendances and gate takings.

The WAFL has shown this season that it is prepared to examine every possible avenue to lift spectator attendance at league games.

It should therefore evaluate the effect that VFL replays are having on the game here and if necessary act to eliminate those replays.

# O'BRIEN ENDS A GOOD RUN

IT has taken West Perth defender Mick O'Brien eight years, three league clubs, two states and much frustration to compile his 96 game tally.

The shoulder injury he received in last Saturday's match against Swans was the last in a long line of injury problems that have dogged his career.

The rugged defender began his career with Swan Districts as a 17 year old in 1975. As a rover, in the reserves grand final of that year, O'Brien sustained a broken wrist. Little did he know but that was to change the course of his life.

The injury prevented him playing any sport of any kind that summer and as O'Brien was a more than useful first grade cricketer with Midland-Guildford the news came as a shock.

A very late start to the 1976 pre-season training meant a difficult task to impress Swans selectors and it wasn't until late in the season that he made his league debut as a roving partner to veteran Bill Walker. His first kick in league was, in fact, a goal.

O'Brien continued, failing to impress the selectors at Bassendean, and after only four league games for 1976 and 1977 he received an offer from a South Australian cricket club to try his luck at gaining a place in the S.A. state side.

It turned out to be a double opportunity for the young rover.

South Australian club, Central District showed interest in O'Brien and he made his first appearance for them in the third round of the 1978 season. He managed a full season roving for Centrals but it was then that his luck seemed to run out.

During the summer, while wicket-keeping for his cricket club Salisbury, he again broke his wrist. This put an end to any chance O'Brien may have had to make a name for himself as a state cricketer.

O'Brien had played nine league games in 1979 when he clashed heavily with state wingman Phil Gallagher at Norwood Oval. The result, a broken left leg. O'Brien re-

turned to the training track seven weeks later only to break a finger in five places the very first night he used a ball.

He did not play again that season.

During a pre-season hill running session in 1980 O'Brien broke a bone in his right ankle. He recovered from this in time to start the season and put together 10 league games, this time in a back pocket.

It wasn't until the last match of the year that he managed to break another bone.

Again at Norwood Oval, the hapless defender broke a bone in his left hand and this time it was in plaster for 10 weeks.

O'Brien managed an injury free run in 1981 and, while his luck was in decided to return to his home state for the 1982 season.

After a degree of haggling with a number of WAFL clubs he finished up at Leederville Oval.

Before the season had got under way O'Brien sustained a stress fracture in his left foot and missed five weeks. That was the seventh occasion he had broken a bone in his body.

Since then O'Brien has cemented a reputation as one of the hardest working defenders in the game and just when things were looking good he received last weeks injury which could see him sidelined for several weeks.

And what is the rugged back pocket player's philosophy on all his broken bones?

"Just the luck of the game-and how hard you get hit!"

# VIC. CLUBS SIGN MANY 'EASYBEATS'

Interstate footballers west of the Victorian border are not always the potential champions many claim to be.

Victorian clubs have been embarrassed by non-performing interstaters from West Australia and South Australia and many now are reverting back to their local zones in the metropolitan and country areas for their newcomers.

No-one can deny the sheer class of star West Australian and SA men such as Barry Cable, Ross Glendinning, Ron Alexander, Graham Moss, John McIntosh, Malcolm Blight and company.

But for every champion there are at least two big reputation players who fail to cement their futures in Melbourne — some who can blame injuries for a curtailment of their VFL days.

I have selected two teams of imports — one from WA and one from SA — since 1970 and in South Australia's case in particular, I had trouble fitting all the failures in.

I'm probably being a little unkind to ruckmen Craig McKeller and Rick Davies, while coach Neil Kerley may also question why he has been given such an unsavoury coaching task.

I think Kerley would be the only man, outside of Ron Barassi or WA's own John Todd, capable of lifting his "charges" to any sort of form at all.

Half of the SA squad would be lucky to make it on to the ground at all. The medical room would resemble a scene out of General Hospital.

SA rover Barry Norsworthy would look forward to this "clash" of giants with trepidation.

He had his jaw broken, courtesy of Hawthorn's Jeff Murray in the opening minutes of the very first game in 1978.

And horror of horrors, Murray makes it for WA!

Murray and fellow Hawk ruckmen, Ray Boyanich, and Craig Hoyer head an impressive list of Hawthorn imports who failed to fire.

Hawthorn, more than any other VFL club, must wonder if their recruiting efforts in SA and WA are worthwhile.

Until the arrival of West Australians Gary Buckenara and Ken Judge — both making a fine reputation — I counted only one good player — Bohdan Jaworskyj from SA, in eight Hawk recruits from SA and WA since 1970.

Andrew Bennett, Rick Davies, Robert Day (all from SA), Boyanich, Murray and Hoyer are joined by another South Australian Peter Beythien, who failed in the practice matches in 1982 and was sent home without playing again.

Boyanich didn't play a senior game in 1969 with the Hawks before being transferred in virtual disgrace to Richmond.

The West Australian spent a whole season in reserves in Melbourne and for a man of such impressive physical proportions (6ft 3½ins and 14 stone) he was a great disappointment.

The centre-line duels in my teams between the WA trio of Bryan Cousins, Bill Valli and Mick Jez against SA's Day, Malloy and Parkinson wouldn't be worth seeing, while the half-forward duel between David Young and Richard Michalczuk probably wouldn't occur at all for medical reasons.

Mal Brown would coach these WA "all-stars" — he had one season in the VFL with Richmond in 1974 and is mainly remembered for starring in the famous half-time brawl at Essendon.

If any rough stuff started — and I don't think my teams are capable of it — Mal's mouth, not to mention that impressive mid-section, would surely account for a few.

# DOLAN WAS SHARK'S MOST SUCCESSFUL

EAST Fremantle, the most successful club in the history of football in Australia, enjoyed their best run of premierships when they did not have a coach.

The club was formed in 1898, but did not appoint their first coach, Jack Scobie, until 1914 — and by then they had won nine premierships.

In Scobie's first year East Fremantle were again successful.

When they did not have a coach it was up to the captains to lead the team and advise others where they were going wrong. Therefore, it is fitting that Tommy Wilson, one of the club's founders, should hold a special place in the playing history of the port side.

He was captain in 1900, 1904, 1906, 1908 and 1909 — years when East Fremantle won the flag.

Wilson was a fine player who led by example and when he skippered the team to victory in 1909 he was 39.

Even though Wilson found great success on the playing arena, the title as the best coach in the history of the Sharks must go to Jerry Dolan.

In fact, Dolan is considered by many to be the finest coach ever in this State.

He was a gentleman in the true sense of the word and relied on his ability as a communicator to get the best results out of his players.

He began his coaching career in 1930 and met with immediate success. He led by example on the ground where he found success as a ruckman and utility player, doing just as well at centre-half-back and centre-half-forward.

A school teacher by trade, he was an extremely well spoken man who knew how to get his message across.

After the initial success in 1930, Dolan took a year off from coaching and returned in 1932 only to see his side finish in third spot.

But Dolan was a perfectionist and he stayed for another year determined to succeed again. He continued in his capacity at the club in 1933 and he managed to take them to another flag.

But after winning his second premiership in just three seasons of coaching Dolan and East Fremantle were destined to break their ties.

East Perth had been struggling and they considered that for them to return as a force in the competition the first step would be to get the best coach in the State into their colours.

But in those days the laws were strict and players and coaches had to abide by the rules and play for whatever district they were bound to.

Dolan lived in East Fremantle territory and they were not about to see him released. After all, they were beginning to realise the potential this coach had as a leader of men.

East Perth were just as keen to have him with them in 1934 and they put him up at the Norrogin Hotel in Armadale for a few



weeks so that he would be granted the clearance.

Armadale was an area which was not designated to any one club and the fact that he was living out of the district, combined with some heavy work from East Perth, saw Dolan win a clearance.

Dolan had an immediate impact at his new club and during his reign (from 1934-38) the Royals did not finish outside the four.

And he took them to a premiership in 1936.

At the end of the 1938 season Dolan broke his ties with East Perth and in 1941 headed back to his original club — again as the senior coach.

He remained in the position until 1948 and confirmed his rating as one of the masterminds of the game with a further three premierships with East Fremantle — 1943, 1945 and 1946.

It was during this time that he really stamped himself as a coach of extraordinary talent. He proved he deserved the billing as the club's best coach by taking them to their fifth pennant.

Add to this the East Perth premiership and it goes even further to suggest that this man stands high in the coaching ranks of W.A.

The only other man to take the club to more than one premiership was Ray Mudie, who was Dolan's predecessor.

Mudie was at the helm from 1927 to 1929 and he won premierships in his final two seasons. Mudie was not unlike Dolan.

He was a gentleman in every sense of the word, was a half-back-flanker of enormous talent and had the special ingredient which enabled him to communicate with his players.

His skills were not restricted to football, however, and he was also a first grade cricketer with Fremantle.

East Fremantle is a football club with a tremendous amount of tradition and of the

26 coaches who have led the club since its inception, 17 have been home-grown.

The nine outsiders combined to win just four of the club's 25 pennants. Bob Johnson, John Todd, Brad Smith and Steve Marsh were outsiders who took the club to premierships.



# BENNETT'S BURST

## KNIVES OUT FOR COACHES

Who would want to be a football coach.

Already the knives are being sharpened. If we listen to the football grapevine then Ian Miller, at Perth, and East Fremantle's Ron Alexander should start packing their bags.

It's always the coach who is to blame if a side performs miserably.

What tends to be overlooked is the lack of talent in some clubs.

I'm not saying coaches don't make a difference. I AM saying that it doesn't matter how good you are as a coach you can't get results if you don't have the talent at your disposal.

### EXAMPLE

Ron Barassi is a classical example. He had talent when he coached Carlton. The club bought talent when he had success at North Melbourne.

Melbourne did not have talent when he shifted there. And the results showed it.

That club has embarked on a very big spending spree that could eventually bring Melbourne success.

But you don't hear anyone saying Barassi is not a good coach just because Melbourne aren't having success.

Take Dennis Cometti at West Perth. He is already being talked about as something of a football magician... but look at the recruiting West Perth did to ensure he had talent at the club.

### EXPECTED

As I've said before in this column - too much is expected too quickly of coaches in this State.

Some clubs expect instant success.

Look at John Todd. It took him years of painstaking work to eventually get Swan Districts a premiership. Claremont worked hard at it for a number of years also.

East Fremantle's biggest problem in recent years is they expect success. They don't like failure. You only have to look at the long line of coaches they have had in recent years.

I feel sorry for Alexander. He is expected to be something of a miracle maker. Few clubs who finished near the

bottom of the ladder the previous year could absorb the loss of players such as Andrew Purser, Ken Judge and Jim Sewell.

East Fremantle are going to have a lot more heartburn in the immediate future. It is going to be a slow process for them to become a premiership contender again.

That also applies to Perth. There is no substitute for talent. And that needs to be blended with experience. Claremont have it. South Fremantle have it. So also do Swan Districts and West Perth.

Subiaco look like getting it.

There is an enormous amount of talent in the Lions camp. But the club lacks a few experienced star players. When it comes they will be a finals contender.

One side I haven't mentioned is East Perth. I wonder if Greg Brehaut can survive a dismal season by the club this year.

### ARGUMENT

Without entering into the argument at the club - Brehaut obviously has coaching talent - I feel Grant Dorrington was hard done by.

East Perth are a bit like East Fremantle used to be... they have become accustomed to being in the finals. Anything short of that, even finishing fourth, is simply not on.

East Perth are going through a transitional period. They also have some young talent in their ranks but the club has a tendency to clear experienced players to other clubs.

The loss of Paul Arnold, Larry Kickett, Stephen Curtis and John Hayes robbed the club of players, who on their day can be match winners. It has also left the club a little threadbare in respect of experienced players.

In my opinion it should be club committees rather than coaches who take the brunt of criticism if a club continues to fail.

After all they are the ones who control the flow of talent in and out of a club.


Unfortunately it is the coach and not the committee who has his head on the chopping block... as Alexander and Miller are no doubt already aware.

# DOCTOR FOOTBALL

The second in a series of four topics on sports psychology in football.

## MOTIVATION IN PLAYERS

THE best motivating factor is to enjoy the actual participation, i.e. playing footy for the love of the game.

Understandably, however, as players age this feeling may wear off and financial reward may be needed as inducement.

The players who obtain reward from the enjoyment of playing football are referred to as "internally motivated" players. They are the best players from a coaches point of view.

The players who need high match payments to stimulate quality of performance are said to be "externally motivated".

"Internally motivated" players often have high aspiration levels and usually enjoy the game more if they perform well. They usually strive to make the State team; become the club champion, or win the Sandover medal.

They are usually motivated to perform consistently well, irrespective of whether they are playing against weak opposition or in difficult conditions.

They usually believe results are due entirely to their own behaviour rather than external factors such as the weather, umpiring decisions, injury, luck etc.

Other players, because of their personality or because they are becoming stale need to be "externally motivated".

The typical reward is money. The problem football clubs find is that with some players match payments lose their effectiveness because the players acclimatise to the financial reward.

Thus, each year match payments need to increase.

In order to provide external motivation coaches can order punishment for losing — extra training; training early in the morning or being dropped from the team.

It is important to realise that internal and external motivation are not necessarily additive. They may interact adversely, e.g. if large prize money is offered in the case of an internally motivated player it may become distracting.

He may have a particular sensitivity to or be in desperate need of money and may begin to think "I do not believe it — all that money! "Now that there is money at stake I will probably lose my form". Negative thinking may thus be introduced.

In maintaining motivation, coaches need to vary the approach to training and the environment where training is held. Other factors which may influence a footballers motivation on particular days are:

- Parents or girlfriend watching — may inspire or distract.
- State selectors watching — may inspire or distract.
- Superstition — "we always lose on this oval" or "this guy always beats me"

The importance of the occasion. The grand final may prove too awesome for the inexperienced, anxious player, but may be just the event to extract optional motivation in the "Out of Form" extraverted big-match player. Selectors often deviate in their team selections for finals.

It is important when dealing with children to realise that they are motivated by the incentives of excellence (doing something well); and affiliation (making friends) rather than the adult incentives of power (controlling others) and success (seeking status prestige or earning external reward).

Motivation in youngsters is often healthier and more sincere.

Perhaps the saying "when in doubt — select youth" has a rational basis to it.



With the financial outlay facing most clubs increasing each season, football is becoming big business... especially for the lesser associations such as amateurs and Sunday leagues.


Australian Football Coaching Services has been established to provide guidance that some clubs might require in that direction.



It is an inevitable part of our game, in fact any game, that tempers will flare up at different times.


Clubs demand total commitment from players and coaches demand a strong bond of comradeship from their team.

I know Ken will be out to prove to everyone, particularly himself, that he has the qualities needed for success!


