WA veteran plans to destroy his home State

AT least one South Australian star will feel at home when the team runs out onto Subiaco Oval on Saturday.

Former East Perth and WA champion Steven Curtis, who transferred to Port Adelaide at the start of this season, returns to Perth in the SA squad. Curtis, who played 215 games with the Royals, needed a new challenge in 1983 so he moved interstate.

"I had won East Perth's fairest and best award last year and felt I needed a new challenge," the strongly built Curtis says. "And the opportunity came up at Port Adelaide.

"I have been ruck roving with them and I have been extremely happy with my form.

"There is not much difference between East Perth and Port Adelaide as far as clubs go.

"They are both steeped in tradition and they hate losing.

"I played two games on a half back flank, but apart from that I have been playing on the ball and I am excited about the prospect of returning to Subiaco Oval to play against the West Australians," Curtis said from his Adelaide home yesterday.

When Curtis moved east it looked as though his interstate career was finished.

Although only 27, he had been overlooked for WA sides since 1980 after representing his home State 12 times — all of which he played from a back pocket on the resting rovers.

During his 10 year career at East Perth, he established himself as one of the toughest little men in the game. He is a player who never stops trying and even though South Australia will come here with the odds heavily stacked against them, he believes they can win.

"For some reason visiting sides always struggle," Curtis says. "But the South Australians are full of confidence after their recent win against Victoria.

"Although it was not the best Victorian team I had ever seen, it was a morale boosting win and I think we have every chance of beating WA."

The South Australians are on top of the world after beating the Vics, but they do have some injury problems going into the contest against the local team.

The WA players have trained impressively this week and must rate as favourites for the match.

Selector to come to Perth

VFL CONCERNED

THE VFL is to send its State chairman of selectors, Ian Ridley, to Perth this weekend to watch the match between WA and SA.

It is one of a number of moves being made by the VFL to rescue its interstate match reputation.

The VFL Board of Directors agreed last week to a number of recommendations made by the State selection panel, headed by Ridley.

Included among those was the naming of Robert Flower as Victorian captain for the match against Western Australia in Perth on Tuesday, July 12.

Flower, who captained Victoria against South Australia earlier this month, will now join the selection panel of Ridley, Ray Walker, Ted Whitten and coach, David Parkin.

Other changes include the naming of a squad of between 30 and 40 players. From this group, 24 players will be taken to Perth.

Mr Ridley said that it was important that positive steps be taken if Victoria was to retain its crown as the leading football State in Australia.

"The State of Origin concept has thrown interstate football wide open.

"The days of Victorian sides going to either Adelaide or Perth and winning as a matter of course are now well and truly gone," he said.

Croweaters will be hard to toss

After coaching in Western Australia and South Australia, I feel as though I'm in a good position to sum up this Saturday's important interstate clash between the two States.

Firstly, let me say I believe that the home side always has an enormous advantage in games of this nature.

One of the reasons for this is the crowd response.

You can hear the proverbial pin drop every time the visiting State kicks a goal and, conversely, all hell breaks loose and the ground erupts with unbridled joy when the home team boots a major.

This type of crowd involvement must lift the home-town performers and, in a way, depress the visitors.

EERIE FEELING

I know what it's like because I was in a Victorian team that played at Subiaco Oval in 1963 — it's an eerie feeling to kick a goal that is greeted with a deathly silence all over the ground.

In fact, take the matter a little further — there is almost wild cheering when the home team even kicks a point!

It's a little off-putting, to say the least.

The other side issue to the home team's chance of winning is that the visitors are virtually "living out of a suitcase" for two or three days while the local player is going through his normal routine, eating and sleeping at home and preparing for the game in his usual manner.

This facet of football life must be an aid to the WA boys on Saturday.

SA's coach Bob Hammond and selectors Geof Motley and Haydn Bunton have gone primarily for youth and quickness in their squad and this team would run through a brick wall for their State.

TOUCH OF CLASS

Players who have a touch of class about them are Stephen Kernahan, a 19-year-old ruckman-forward who marks the ball as well as any big man I've seen; Peter Motley, an exciting 18-year-old utility player who can play anywhere; Tony McGuinness, the 1982 Magarey Medallist and a top rover — and the superstar in the Croweaters camp is ruck-rover Michael Aish, a footballer of rare excellence who averages 37 possessions a game in local football.

NO BED OF ROSES

Life hasn't been exactly a bed of roses for me over here in Adelaide. My club, Glenelg, lost their first seven games and recently I was called from the track during a Tuesday night training session and bluntly asked to resign as coach.

It didn't come as a shock... because, quite frankly, that sort of thing is always on in league football and it's happened to better coaches than yours truly.

Nevertheless, I told the powers-that-be that I would not resign because I did not want to be seen as a person giving up when the going got tough.

So they relieved me of the job (that sounds better than 'sacked', doesn't it?) That decision caused an uproar from the players and, to a man, they descended upon the Glenelg board of directors (again, the men who hire and fire) and virtually said they would not play unless I was reinstated as coach.

That unified show of support was something the board had not counted on. I honestly believe they thought we were losing because the players were not behind me.

They found out the hard way that they were wrong... so to cut a long story short, I was asked to return.

This I did, and last Saturday Glenelg won, beating finals contender Central District by 50 points.

It was one of the most satisfying results that I have been part of during my time in football.

WOULD YOU BELIEVE

TALKING of resignations, did you hear the story about the coach who, when appointed to a club that hadn't won a premiership for 19 years, said: "If I haven't won you a premiership in 19 years, I'll resign."

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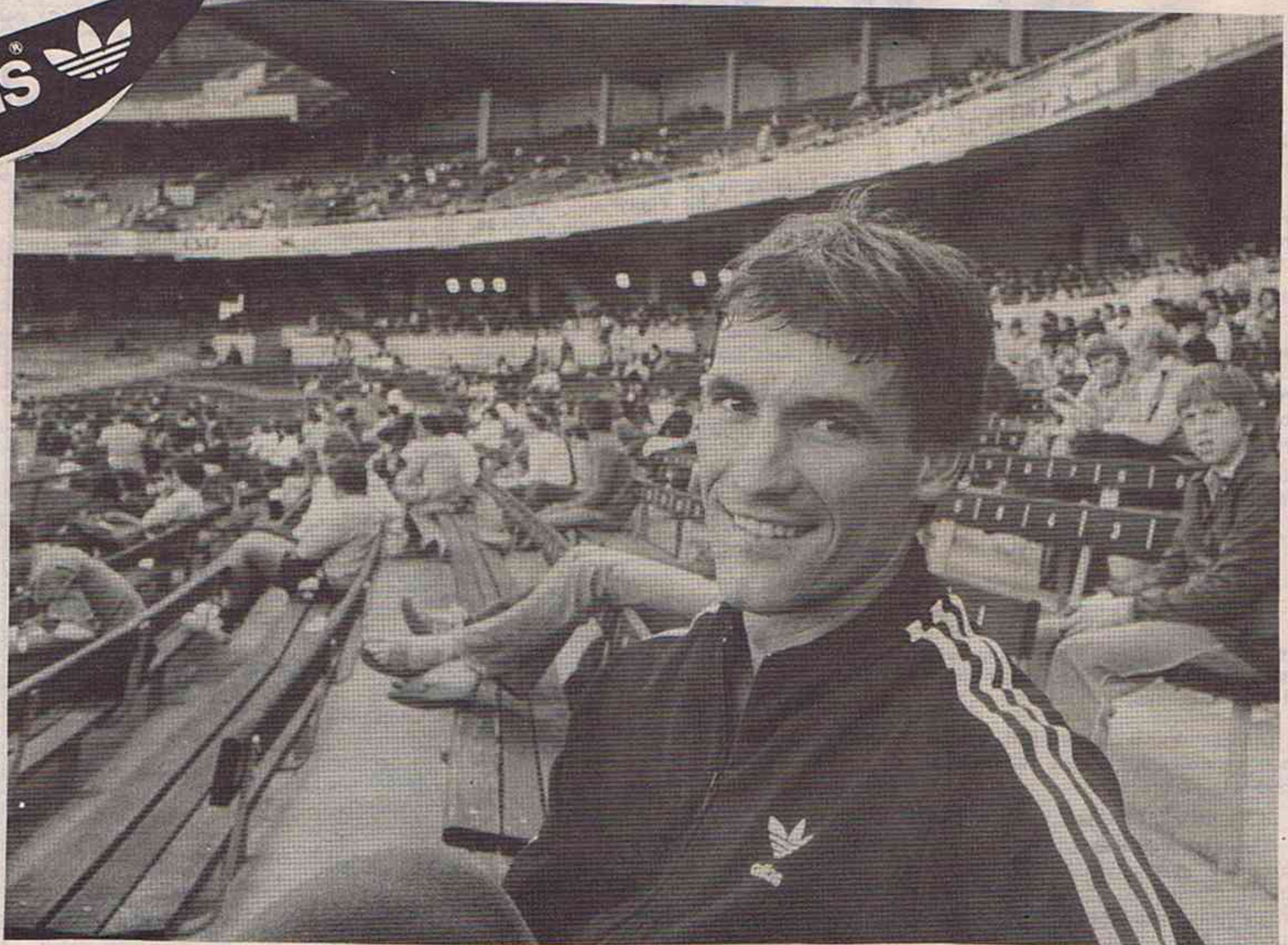

Swans star could have been a Croweater

HAD fate not played its part 15 years ago, one of WA's stars could well be lining up in different colours on Saturday.

Don Langsford was born in Cummins, in South Australia, and his parents moved to the WA South coastal town of Esperance when he was nine years old. Had the family stayed in SA, Langsford could be flying in with the Croweaters to play against WA — instead of making his debut for WA.

Langsford has emerged as a star of the WAFL this season after being one of the unobtrusive lesser-lights for almost 100 games.

He began his league career in 1977 as a half-back and up until this year had played most of his football in that position, although he was occasionally used on the ball.

He has relished the added responsibility and will now be a key player in WA's bid to keep an impressive home town record against the South Australians.

Langsford is one of the quiet achievers of league football and he recently reached the 100 game milestone.

Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to the 24-year-old pharmacist and found out a little more about the reasons for his rise to stardom this year. This is what he discovered . . .

Q: How has the pharmacy career affected your football?

A: Well last year I had a job where I had to work until 5.30 because as long as the shop is open the chemist has to be there so by the time I got to Bassendean it was after six. It would be dark and the other guys were half way through a session by the time I got onto the track. But this year I have just been working six hour shifts and it has been much better. If I owned my own pharmacy I would have to give football away. I think the change of job is one of the reasons for my improvement this year because I have got more time and I can train.

Q: How long have you been qualified?

A: Since 1980, so this is my third year out. I did three years of WAIT and then one year as a trainee type of thing where I worked under another pharmacist. I finished that at the end of 1981, so actually it has been two years as a fully qualified pharmacist.

Q: Is it a good life?

A: Yes. It is very rewarding, financially as well as in other ways. It is pretty satisfying.

Q: You had a quiet start to your career, where you just plodded along for a couple of seasons. Was it the release from the pressures of studies which has seen your improved form?

A: It probably has something to do with it, but it is hard to say. A lot of people asked me if that was the reason, but I really don't know. Toddy has also always tried to make me into a ruck rover and I have started there for the first few games of a season and when I haven't gone as well as he has hoped I have gone back to a half back flank. And that is where I have stayed for the rest of the year. This year it has gone a little differently and it was a success. I just hope it continues. As a ruck rover you are in the action a lot more and you pick up a lot more kicks.

Q: You are a very unobtrusive player and when I pick up the stats sheet I am often surprised to find that you have had more kicks than any other player. Do you know why?

A: I have been surprised myself when I have picked up a Sunday paper, read the statistics page and found I have had the most kicks of any player. And now that I



am doing it consistently I start to wonder whether those kicks are effective. I would like to know how effective I have really been.

Q: You must have been fairly pleased with your State squad selection?

A: Yes, it is the highlight of my personal career. I would like to think I have got a chance of finishing up in the side. Friday night will tell the tale.

Q: Can you put your improved form down to any one reason?

A: I have thought about it a lot and the only reason I came up with is that I have extra time during the week and I can have Wednesday off to do things around the home. I can now get in some extra practice in the light and that has helped considerably. Plus I have gained a bit in experience. Ruck roving is not something that you can pick up just like that, you have to work it out and work on your game. I think the main function of a ruck rover is to link up the play and in some ways I suppose you are a bit of a parasite, feeding off the other players.

Q: If you had remained in South Australia do you think you may have been flying over here this weekend to play with them?

A: I don't know. That is a purely hypothetical question. Actually my mum is a nurse and one of her friends had a son playing in the SA side last year. He was the young full back, Danny Hughes. But he hasn't been picked for the squad this time around.

Q: What about the grand final last year, how did it feel to play in a premiership side?

A: I guess in a lot of ways I was pretty lucky to be in that side. Apart from the fact that I was not getting to training on time and I wasn't the most popular player around I started on the bench and I must have been lucky to be there. When we lost in 1980 I think that was the most


disappointing thing that has ever happened to me. Last year it was do or die from a club point of view and that was why we were so desperate. Claremont were a good side but the attitude was the difference between the two sides on the day. You just couldn't compare the feeling between winning and losing a grand final. You just felt so bad after losing in 1980 that you don't want to go through that again. You just want to go for a drive in the country and get away from the place. You don't know what it is like to win a grand final until you actually get out here.

Q: Who had the biggest influence on your career?

A: Probably my coach at Scotch College, Ian Shortland-Jones. It was so much different to country football and I think I learned a lot while I was there. He helped me along the way.

Q: Do you get back to Esperance for weekends very often?

A: Not now. With my job I have to work every second Sunday so it is a little bit tough getting away. My parents would probably come up to see me play three or four times in a season. My father runs a trucking company in Esperance and he finds it a little difficult getting away as well. It is an eight hour drive down there.

At last!

IT IS certainly good to be able to write after a win at last! And it was a magnificent win. I feel that the result was somewhat overdue and we had really been building up to it in the previous three games — against Claremont, Swan Districts and South Fremantle. It was a concerted team effort and a well deserved result. But now the players must build on that win, which I am sure they can, if they want to play a menacing role in the balance of season 1983.

FRUSTRATION

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BIG BOOST FOR TROUBLED SWANS

THE VFL has committed itself to prop up the financially ailing Sydney Swans.

In announcing the decision, VFL president Dr Allen Aylett, predicted that Sydney would have a second league team within 10 years.

The VFL has decided to plough up to \$900,000 into the Swans during the remainder of the 1983 season.

Along with their financial commitment, the VFL is planning a closer role in future development and planning of the Sydney based club.

The first move has been the appointment of Barry Lyon as the club's new general manager to replace the sacked executive director Brian Dixon. Lyon was



formerly the club's secretary and accountant.

A new management committee has been formed and includes VFL administrators.

In another move the Swans' two Sydney offices have been combined and their Melbourne headquarters has been moved from Albert Park to VFL House.

Dr Aylett is confidently predicting that a second club will be formed in Sydney by 1992 from home-grown players. He says this will be the long term benefit of a shortly to be announced plan to cultivate juniors in New South Wales.

The massive programme to develop young talent both in the Sydney metropolitan area and country centres will involve up to six full time development officers.

Full details are expected to be announced by the VFL in the next couple of weeks. Meanwhile, the financial control, revenue raising and media relations of the Sydney Swans are currently all undergoing examination.

VFL HAPPY WITH ATTENDANCES

ATTENDANCE figures at VFL matches this year are keeping pace with the record 1981 season.

After eight rounds, 1,290,137 people have been to VFL matches compared with 1,310,033 in 1981.

The 1983 figure is only 19,896 or 1.5 per cent less than 1981.

Compared with last year, the figures are down 10,490 or only 0.8 per cent.

"This is a very pleasing result," VFL General Manager, Mr Jack Hamilton said this week.

"It has not been a good year weather-wise with rain on nearly every Saturday.

"The bad weather over the Easter split round had a substantial effect on figures.

"Last year more than 136,000 people saw three games on the Easter Monday.

"This year, Easter Monday was very wet and only 66,000 people attended the three games.

"But despite this, we have been able to maintain an attendance figure that almost matches record levels," he said.

Mr Hamilton said it was difficult to continue breaking attendance records.

In the four years to 1981, a new record was set each year.

Last year was marginally down on the 1981 figure, mainly because of the polarisation of the competition by Round 17 and Collingwood's lack of success.

OLD EASTS HAVE ARRIVED

WILL the real East Fremantle please stand up.

It is difficult to comprehend how a team that won only two games in the first round and took some real maulings into the bargain has suddenly become giant killers.

Though East Fremantle scrambled home by four points against West Perth two weeks before the Emu Export carnival there was nothing to suggest such a big transformation was just around the corner.

The question that now has to be asked is — can the Sharks maintain their momentum and make the final four?

The next two weeks should tell the story when East Fremantle meet league leaders South Fremantle and last year's premiers Swan Districts.

Coach Ron Alexander must be getting great delight in pulling all those daggers out of his back; but it is interesting to note that he is not getting carried away with the Sharks sudden elevation from pauper to prince.

While he has every reason to be confident of making the finals the Sharks still have a big job ahead of them to get there.

Though they are now out of the four by only percentage, I can really only see one berth in the four left for them to contest.

Claremont, South Fremantle and Swan Districts look as though they have mortgages on three positions. Even if you discount Swans it still means four teams are vying for two spots.

Unfortunately for East Fremantle their poor early performances have left them with a big disadvantage in their challenge for a place in the four . . . a woeful percentage.

At this stage it is a one-game handicap, particularly as third and fourth positions could easily be decided on percentage.

Fortunately for East Fremantle, West Perth appear to be on the skids while East Perth have tended to be rather erratic.

However Swans, hard hit by injuries this season, look as though they have turned the corner.

The Sharks can afford to lose to South Fremantle in the derby. But they can't afford to lose that match and also to Swans the following week.

Wins in both games would confirm their revival and not only make them a finals contender, but also a big premiership hope.

It would be easy to find excuses for Claremont's loss to East Fremantle last Saturday. After all, it could be argued that the Tigers had to lose a match eventually.

They had managed to resist challenges from all the main contenders and may not have been mentally prepared for their clash against the Sharks.

But I don't think that was the case. East Fremantle, flushed with their success in the lightning carnival, are brim full of enthusiasm and confidence at the moment.

They have shown in the two matches since the carnival that they are in a very competitive frame of mind.

They wrapped up their two matches since then, against Subiaco and Claremont, with an opening nine goal first quarter blitz.

Like a few others, I still need to be convinced that East Fremantle have really done such an incredible turnabout in the space of only a few weeks.

How they pick themselves up afterwards will show whether or not they have improved as much as their recent form indicates.

It needs to be remembered that East Fremantle were very impressive in pre-season scratch matches. It means that the talent was there all the time and it was merely a case of it emerging again as the season progressed.

It could also mean that the Sharks have their flashes of good form and that their current run may be short lived.

I think it more a case of the first. Whatever, the situation, East Fremantle have given the competition new life at a time when it appeared as though the premiership race had become a two team contest and the four was starting to look cut and dried.

It's good to see Alexander making some of his knockers choke on their criticism.

A true measure of how much East Fremantle have improved can be gauged from the amount of ground they have made up since the first round when they were annihilated by Claremont.

Saturday's win was a 127 point reversal on the first result.

Another person who must have received tremendous satisfaction on Saturday was Perth coach Ian Miller.

Though the Demons have had a pretty barren season, they have been steadily improving.

While they are not likely to create any great waves between now and the end of the season they look likely to be of nuisance value to some of the sides striving for a place in the four.

They seem capable of winning the odd game or two, which could jeopardise the finals chances of those teams vying for a place in the four.

It all adds up to a rather absorbing finish to the season.

In the past WA has always had the ascendancy over South Australia in games at Subiaco Oval.

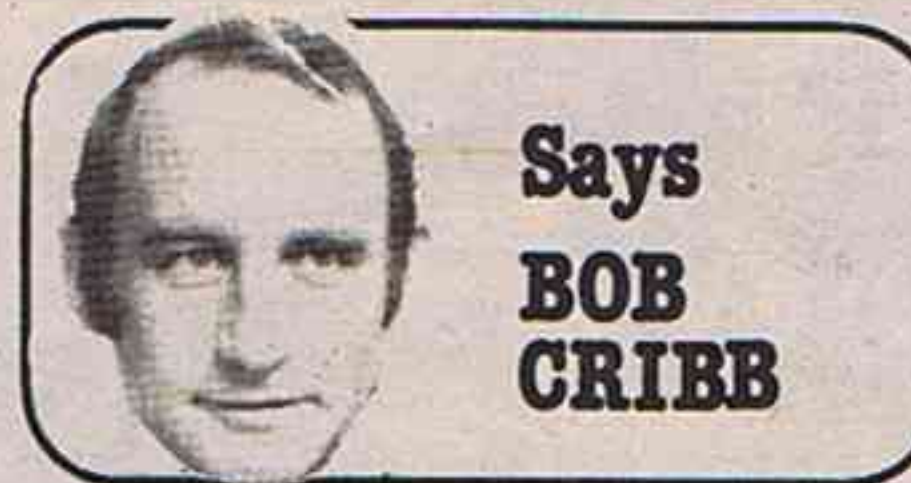
Todd and Brown seem to me to have taken this game too lightly.

Big media cover

The intense interest in interstate football in Adelaide since the Croweaters' big win over Victoria recently is reflected in the massive entourage of media personnel which will accompany the South Australian team to Perth tomorrow.

Adelaide's major daily and Sunday newspapers will send writers to Perth as well as Football Times (Westside Football's Adelaide sister publication) and four South Australian radio stations will send commentators.

The activity of the radio stations is of special interest because in Adelaide, one station (5AD) has exclusive broadcast rights to SANFL matches.

The one station provides a ball by ball description each Saturday of one club match and is supported by a network of around the ground commentators.

Other commercial stations have been unsuccessfully trying to break their stranglehold of exclusive rights for several years.

One of these stations, 5DN, will send a commentary team to Perth for this weekend's match.

Another station, also anxious to break into football is 5KA which will send Bazza and Pilko - Australia's top rating radio duo - who host a Adelaide breakfast programme similar to the Martin and Watts show on 6PR.

ABC station 5AN will also send commentators to Perth.

Combined with the four Perth radio stations and the dozens of country relay stations in both WA and South Australia, Saturday's match will have a massive radio audience. This, together with the two Perth television stations, and those in Adelaide will provide the game with one of the biggest ever radio and television audiences for an interstate match at Subiaco.

Coaches have the credentials

SATURDAY'S State match should provide an interesting battle of tactics between the two coaches - John Todd (WA) and Bob Hammond (SA).

Hammond must be feeling confident going into this match after guiding the South Australians to victory against Victoria - while Todd can be equally certain of success.

He coached Swan Districts to the pennant in the WAFL last year and knows what is required to win interstate matches.

History has shown that home side is particularly hard to beat on their home soil. But he has continued to develop a fast-running style of game and if they can continue they will throw out a strong challenge to WA.

SOUTH Australia have the 1983 Australian Championship all parcelled up if they beat WA this week.

And with that incentive, I expect SA to reverse the drubbing they received at Subiaco last season.

After humiliating the Victorians in Adelaide two weeks ago, a win over WA looks a mere formality as SA races towards their first national title since 1911.

This will make WA's game against Victoria next month a ho-hum affair to decide second place.

If it's any consolation, we'll be backing you all the way in that one — but for this week anti/VFL feelings will have to take a back seat.

This year's SA side is almost unrecognisable from the one that looked and played like tired old men last season with only eight players retaining their positions.

In recent seasons SA has been producing talent at a faster rate than Victoria can pinch it and this is the best prepared side to travel to Perth in years.

The SA selectors — Bob Hammond, Geof Motley and Haydn Bunton — have watched a video replay of last year's debacle so many times they have worn the film out and this year's side will not make the same mistakes.

A boost to SA has been the appointment of Hammond as coach.

He is not coaching a club side, but was a selector last season and accepted the post following John Cahill's transfer to Collingwood and the unavailability of Norwood's premiership coach Neil Balme.

Hammond is a former premiership

coach of Norwood, a disciplinarian and a student of the game who has harnessed the considerable talent of SA players into a precise machine.

SA has also received plenty of assistance from newcomer Stephen Curtis, the former East Perth and WA star, who has briefed the SA selectors on each WA player — and even taught his new team-mates how to kick a Chesson football. So watch out.

Follower Michael Aish, winner of the Fos Williams Medal for SA's best against Victoria, will give the Sandgropers the run around.

He has been unstoppable in recent weeks and will prove to WA fans why he is rated as the hottest football property in Australian football.

Another danger man for WA will be effervescent, flamboyant Bruce Lindner who booted five goals in his interstate debut against Victoria.

He is dynamic and one of those rare breed whose flair for the impossible inspire those around them to even greater heights.

And who is there in WA football to stop teenagers Peter Motley, Craig Bradley, Stephen Kernahan, Garry McIntosh and Greg Whittlesea?

Together with captain Russell Ebert, Neil Craig, Greg McAdam, John Riley and co, they form the nucleus of a side that will have WA looking a bedraggled lot at Subiaco Oval by 5pm on Saturday.

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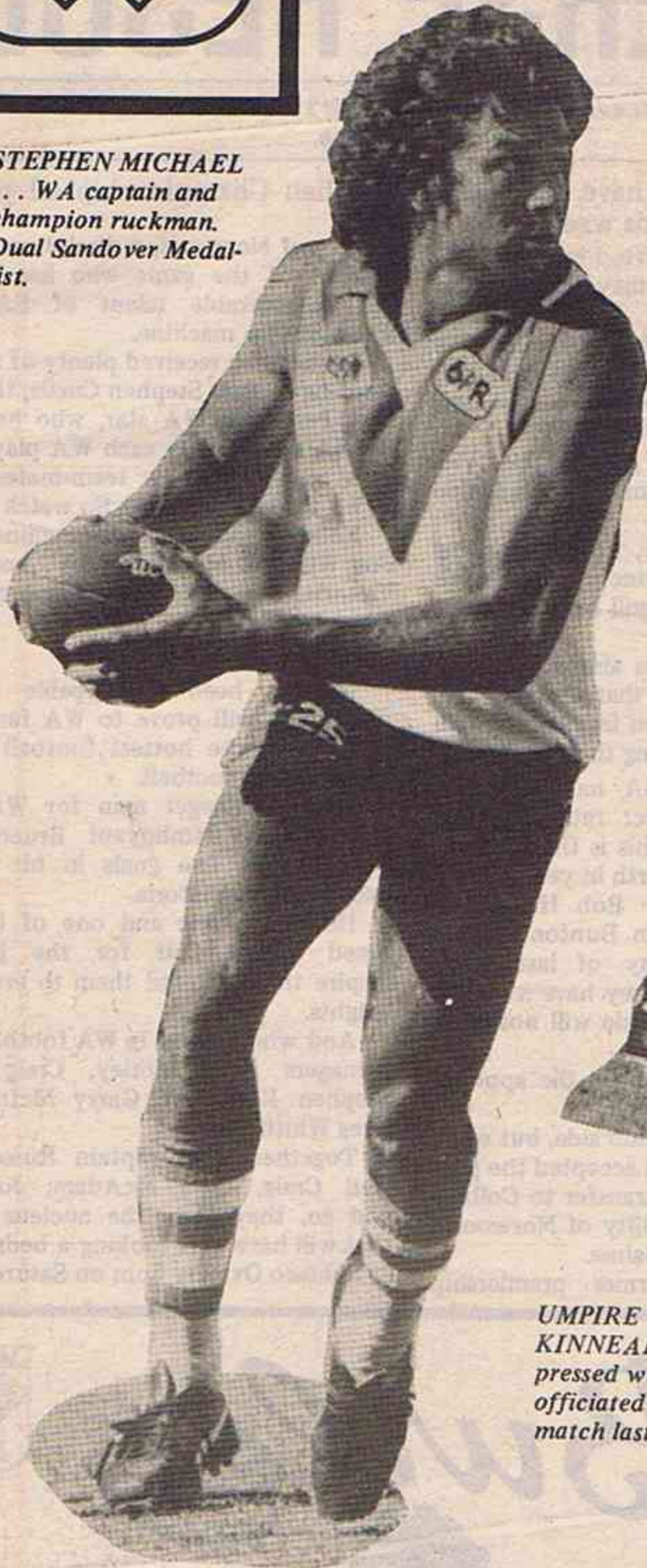

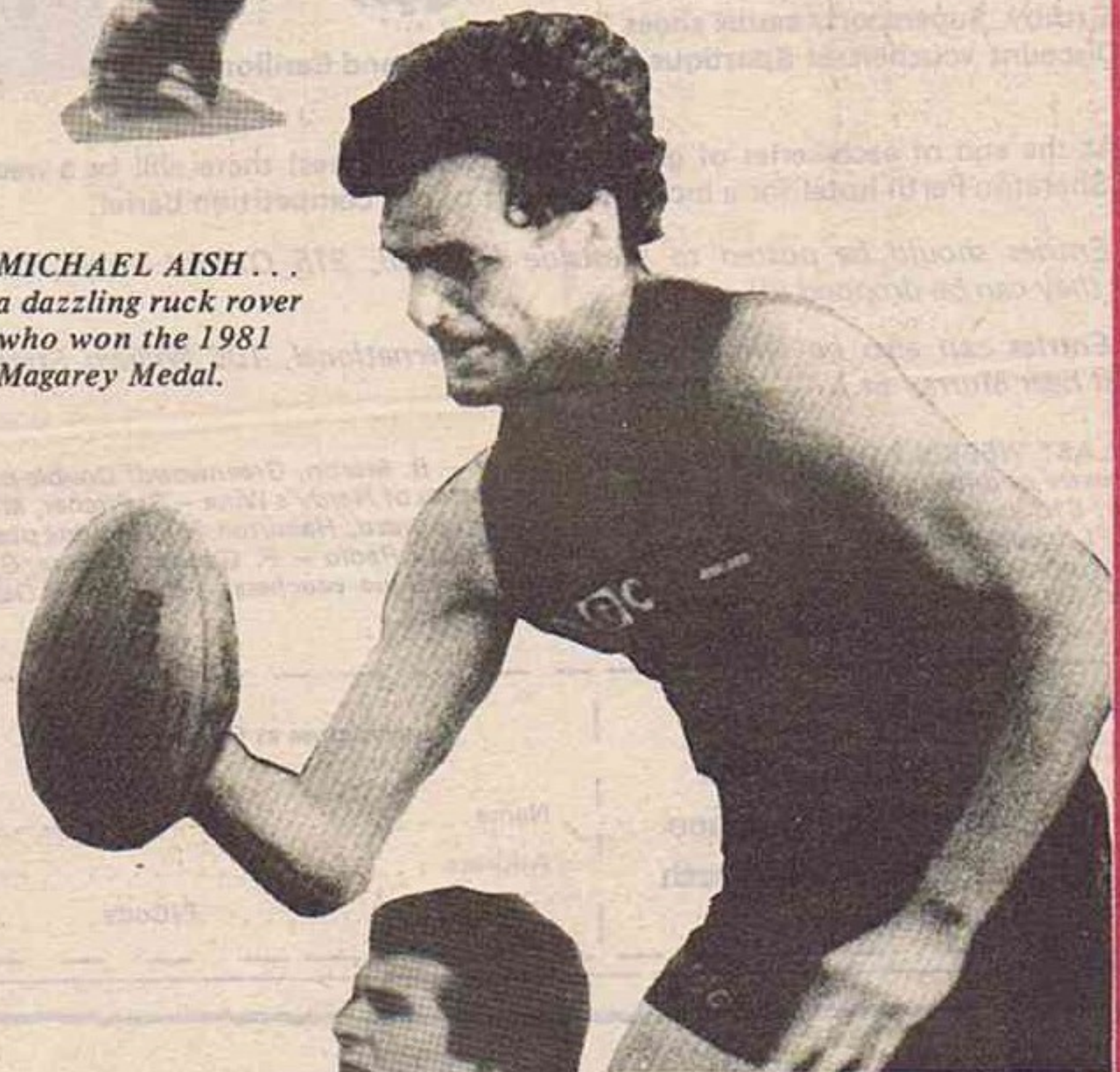

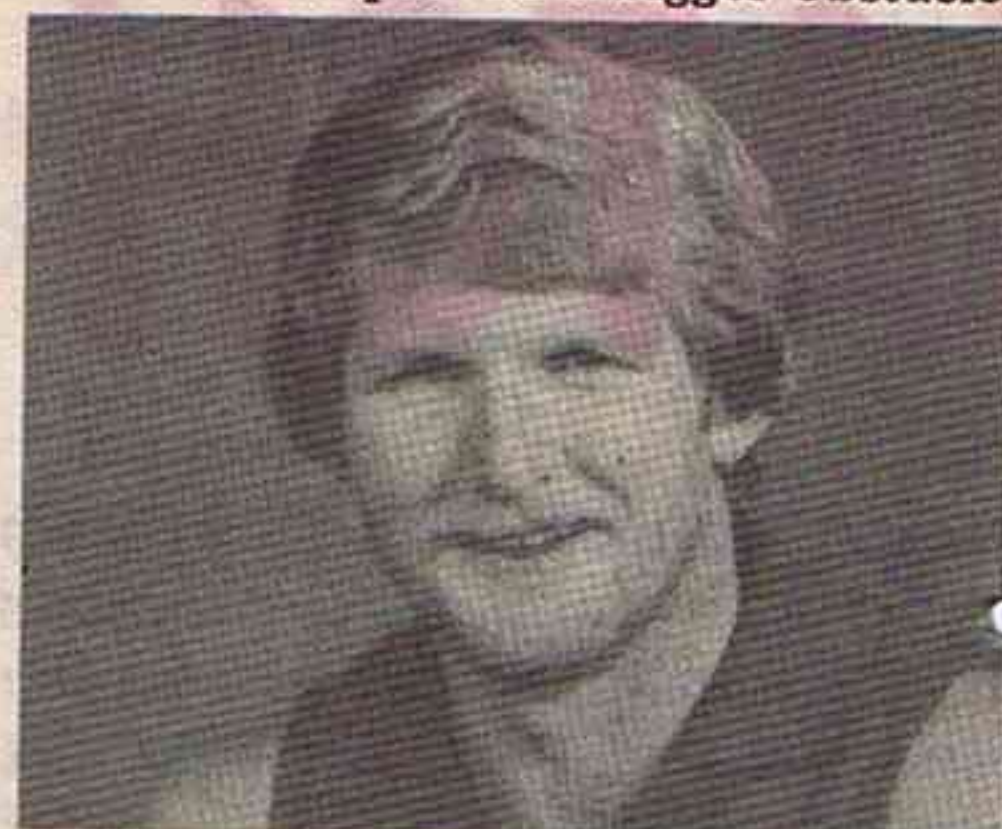
Player of the week

Applecross again received tremendous drive from former State player and captain-coach Mick Jez.

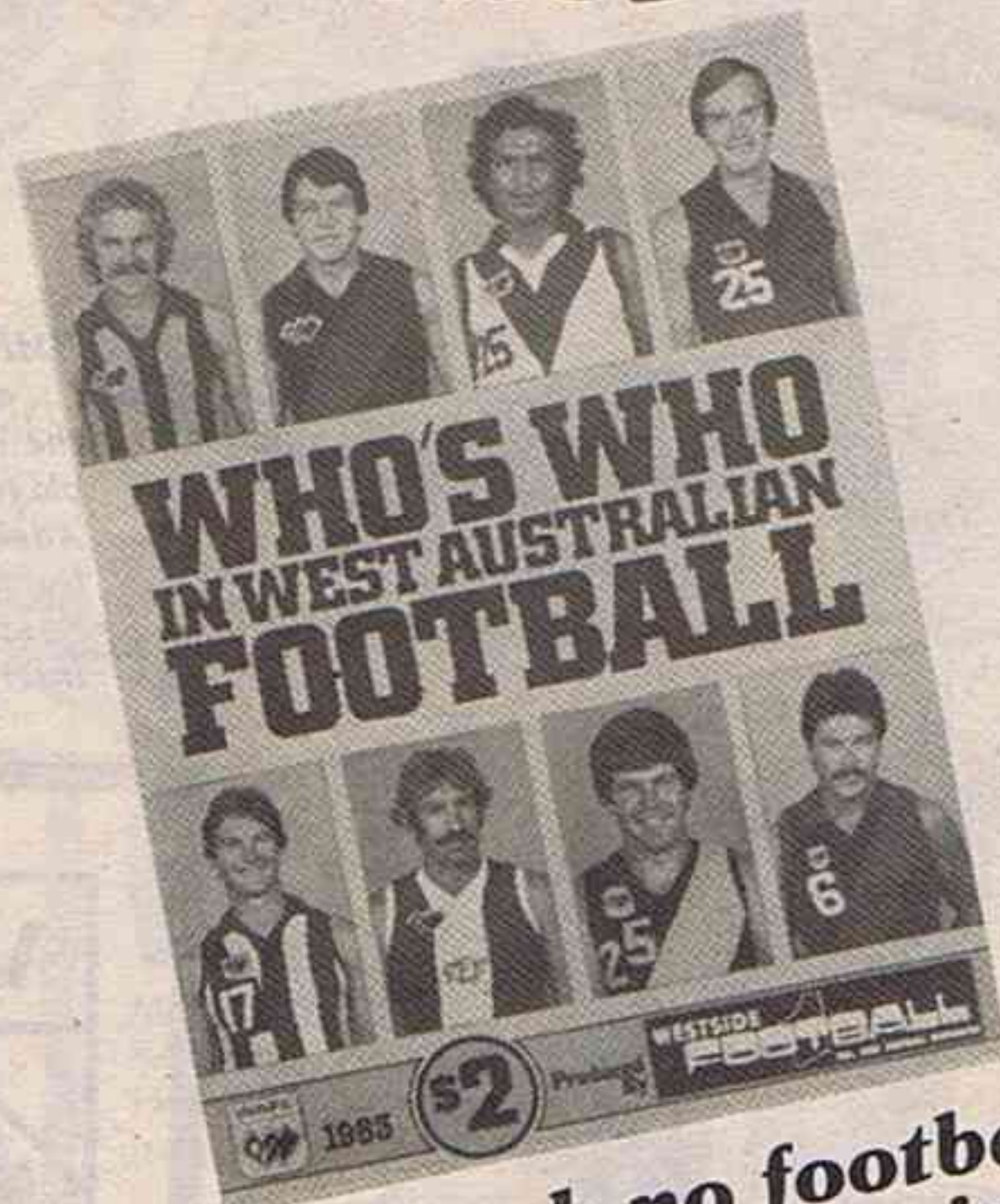
Jez played at centre half forward where he kicked four goals and was responsible for several others in his side's 15 goals.

The Saints were never under pressure and spent much of the day looking for leading goal kicker Norm Uncle, who took his season tally to 60 with his 12 goal performance.

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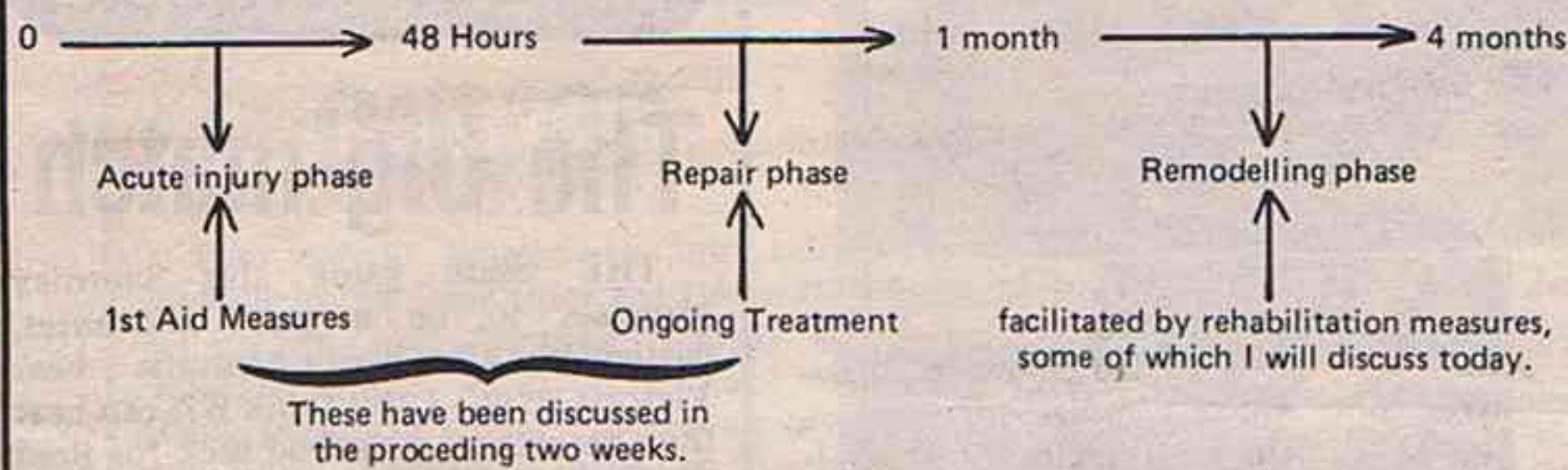
THE REHABILITATION OF MUSCLE INJURY

Continuing a series - muscle injury

In discussing the management of muscle injuries, we have seen the first aid treatment and further ongoing treatment which might apply during the "repair phase" of muscle injury.

It is important to realise that healing continues, at times, for up to four months. The period of time from one to four months is called "the remodelling phase" and rehabilitation is aimed at facilitating it.

Let's summarise the time sequences of events after muscle injury and the corresponding management.



During the "remodelling phase", the "scar tissue" which bridges the gap created by the disruption in the continuity of muscle tissue is modified.

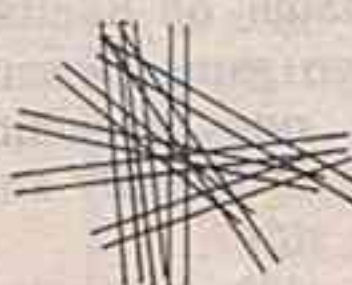


scar tissue made up of collagen fibres bridges the tear in muscle.

The scar is made stronger and becomes more stretched, so that it does not remain tight and tear apart easily. The "collagen fibres" which make up the "scar tissue" are laid down parallel to each other, rather than hap-hazardly, and thus the scar is stronger.



collagen fibres re-laid in a straight line, during the "remodelling phase". This is encouraged by stretching the muscle.



During the "repair phase", the Collagen fibres are hap-hazardly laid, and the scar tissue is not as strong.

Rehabilitation exercises are aimed at (i) restoring full function and elasticity of the injured muscle. (ii) improving the athlete's overall condition to the point where he can pass a fitness test and return to competition, (iii) encourage proper remodelling of the scar tissue.

Rehabilitation measures include:

1. Continuing to stretch the injured muscle for several months.
2. Doing specific muscle exercises to regain and maintain the necessary power in the injured muscle.
3. Undertaking a graduated training programme where the training load is gradually increased to a point where he can pass a fitness test, but at the same time not aggravate the injury.
4. Institute preventative measures to prevent the injury re-occurring

Stretching of the injured muscle is done to the point of moderate discomfort and maintained for approximately 10 seconds. If one gets the muscle to contract against resistance first, and then stretch, the range of stretch is increased. Stretching is usually combined with muscle exercises, and the athlete gradually builds up to say, 30 muscle stretches twice a day.

Stretching of a muscle serves many functions:

1. It reduces spasm and therefore, pain, in early acute phase (first 48 hours).
2. It maintains the elasticity of the uninjured portions of the muscle.
3. It stretches the scar (a stretched scar is better than an unstretched one).
4. It prevents adhesion forming between adjacent muscle bundles (with non use, glue-like material forms between muscle bundles, making gliding movements between them difficult i.e. causes stiffness).
5. It aids the direction in which collagen fibres are laid down. i.e. fibres are encouraged to be laid down in a straight line, rather than hap-hazard, and a stronger scar forms. (i.e. remodelling of the scar occurs).
6. If muscle length is increased, its power of contraction is increased.

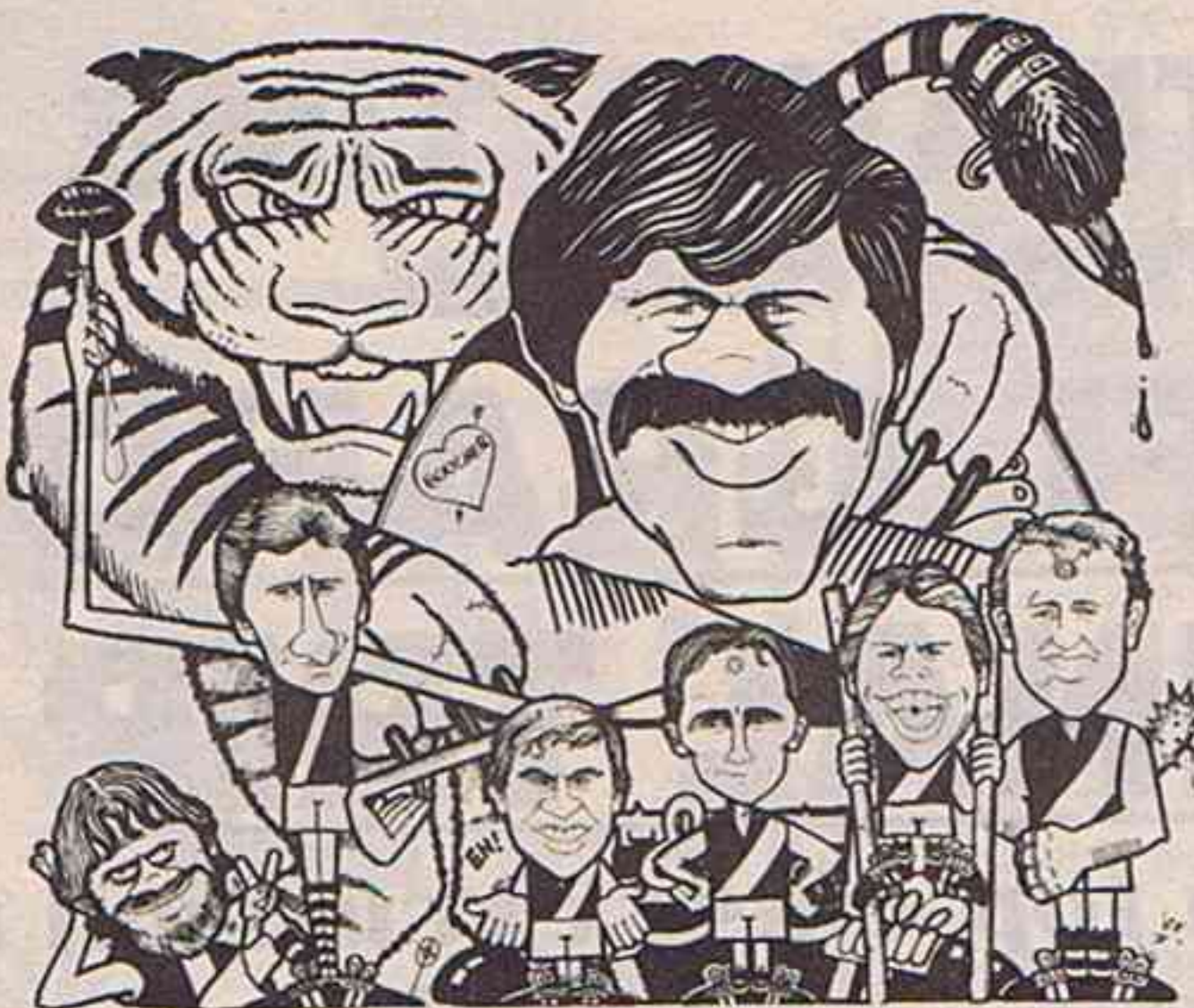

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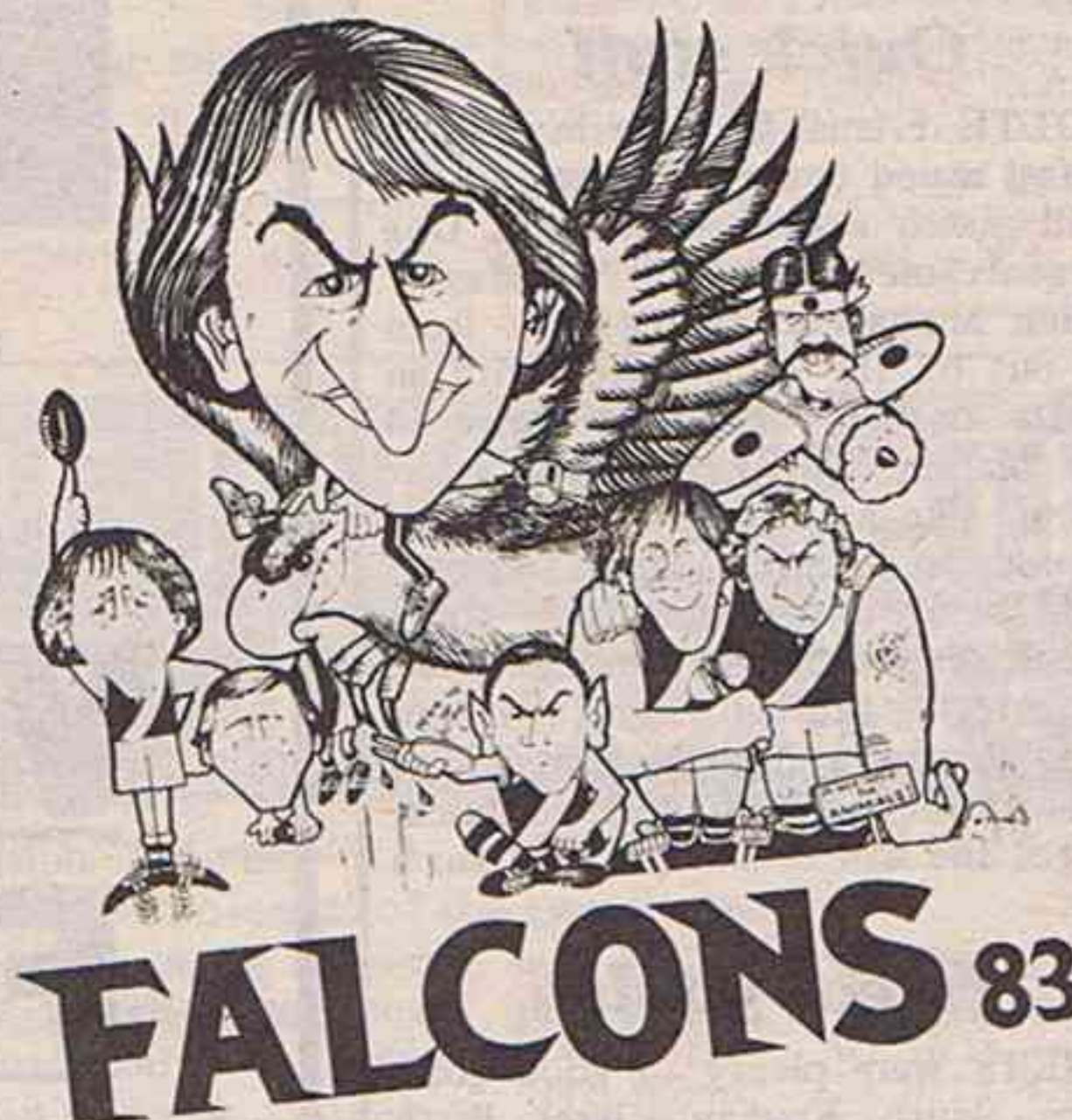
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GOALS!

AS the team manager for the Western Australian team at the 1979 Australian Football Carnival at Subiaco Oval, it was my responsibility to work closely with all players representing our State.

The WA side, captained by Brian Peake, won that historic carnival.

Many fine WA players now based in the VFL travelled over and stayed at a city hotel where I lived in as off field coordinator.

This was my first interaction with the tough, bow-legged Collingwood back pocket player, known to all football supporters as "Stan the Man" Magro.

Watching all pre-match team meetings and coaches sessions, Stan greatly impressed me, in fact so much so, that I indicated to the then East Perth coach Barry Cable that he would be one of the first players

I would approach if ever I was appointed a league coach.

Being a short, but well built, back pocket player, many football followers would have selected other players in that side above Stan.

But Stan has that football character you find in very few players.

He has great courage and an 'aura' that puts fear into opponents. Stan is the type of man you would select if you knew your life was on the line — he would never surrender.

His quiet and deep approach to each game spreads that feeling of great team

pride among other players; no one wanted to let him down as they knew he wouldn't let them down.

Stan breeds 'teamwork' — 'team commitment' qualities that I have always believed win premierships, a genuine concern for your mate and a ruthless approach to the team winning.

When appointed coach of East Perth in 1981 I immediately contacted Stan who had some thoughts about returning. Unfortunately Collingwood also knew Stan's strengths and wanted to keep him.

Again in 1982 I approached Stan much to the doubts of some prominent East Perth members.

He all but signed; then decided to stay one more year much to my disappointment, as I believed the young and developing Royals needed a Stan Magro.

When reappointed at the end of 1982 I was elated to find out Stan would sign with the Royals as by now he and I had been in touch by phone regularly, and I visited him on my interstate trips.

Unfortunately, the planning never came to bear while I was coach. But it does give me great satisfaction to see Stan achieving the personal glories I believed he would claim. His presence at the Royals will continue to grow and "Stan the Man" will be an instrumental part of that team's search for a premiership.

Ramsay beware

AFTER all the controversy over the inclusion of Ramsay Bogunovich going straight into the West Perth league side, I had my first chance to watch him play in the reserves last Saturday.

I know it is hard to judge on one performance, but there are some obvious basic football guidelines to judge a player initially.

Ramsay, to say the least, has a long way to go.

His basic weakness is reading the play. He gets caught between the ball regularly, something ruckmen cannot afford to do.

His skills need improving, but if you are

his size being "where the ball is", is the major skill he requires.

He is only young and needs hours of work on where to go. He should watch video games to study other players. In fact he would be better off following another club for a few weeks and watching how other ruckmen function. Someone like Ron Boucher.

I couldn't help feel sorry for the young player as I believe he is the meat in the sandwich.

West Perth selected him first up, obviously realising that would create enormous hassles for both him and his peer team mates if it backfired.

Ramsay has had too much highlighting too early — ever since he was 16 he has been in the headlines. He was sold to Geelong — and couldn't get a regular game there. Now bought by West Perth — and in the reserves.

Young men cannot handle pressure so early, particularly when he has never set the football world on fire.

My advice to Ramsay is simple: Start from the basics — with your size it is not too late. If you don't, you will be on the football scrapheap.

I believe that Ramsay has been badly advised so far in his football life. I only hope he can survive.

This week's dinner for two at the Vegas Hotel goes to Perth coach Ian Miller — he had been starved of satisfaction up till last week; now he can over-indulge with a top meal.

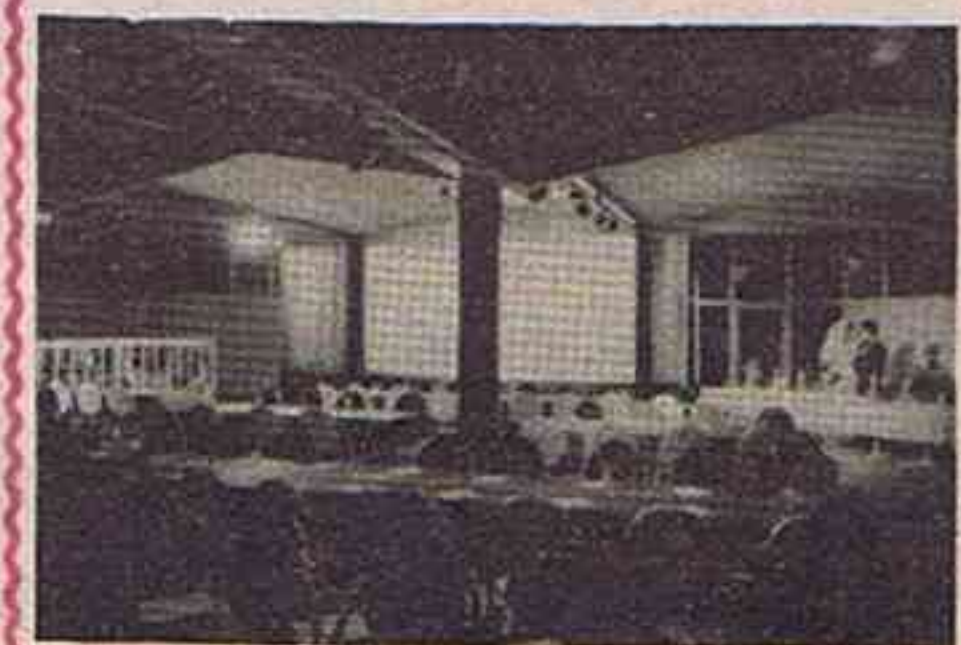
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
