Royals big test

THE question as to whether East Perth are final four imposters or a real threat for the premiership will be answered at Fremantle Oval on Sunday.

The Royals, fresh from a morale boosting win over top team Claremont last week, face their stiffest challenge of the season.

Who would have thought after a quick pre-season glance at the talent at East Perth that the Royals would be vying for a place in this year's finals.

Most critics would have laughed at the suggestion.

But the Royals have come a long way since those early trial matches when it appeared as though they would be in for a long, tough season.

If they can emerge from the match at Fremantle Oval with four premiership points, they will have gone a long way towards putting a mortgage on the fourth place.

When Greg Brehaut took on the job no one envied him.

Four of the club's most senior players had dropped out and Brehaut, in his first senior coaching appointment in WA (he did coach Woodville in SA before coaching WAFU club Wanneroo), was left with the difficult assignment of moulding a competitive unit out of an inexperienced player group.

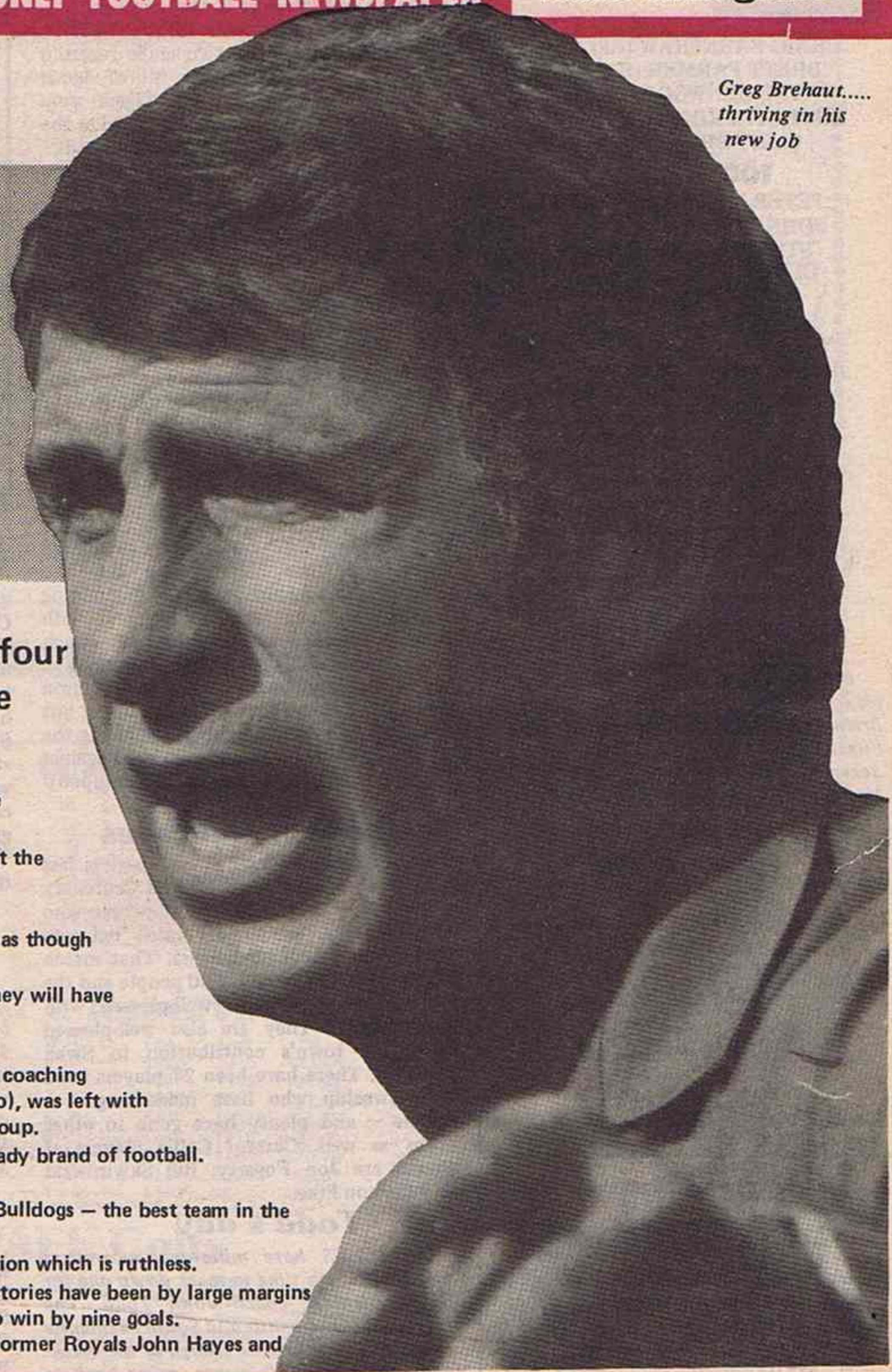
He has responded to the challenge magnificently and the Royals are now playing a steady brand of football. They lack brilliance, but they thrive on Hard Yakka.

On Sunday we will see just how much the Royals have improved when they meet the Bulldogs — the best team in the competition.

East Perth have a terrible record at Fremantle Oval and they meet a Bulldogs combination which is ruthless.

They have beaten every side in the competition except Claremont and most of their victories have been by large margins. In fact, in the first round match against East Perth they kicked away in the last quarter to win by nine goals.

And two of the men who helped to wreck the Royals in a blistering last quarter were former Royals John Hayes and Paul Arnold.

WAKE UP LIONS!

WAKE up Subiaco. You cannot continue to blame coaches for the club's poor showing.

The way the Lions allowed Peter Daniel to resign from the position on Tuesday night was a disgrace.

On Tuesday morning club president Michael Carlile came out and said that Daniel's position was not in jeopardy and that he would serve out his two year contract.

Daniel revealed in the same story that he had met with the Board of Directors and he was confident he had total support in what he was aiming to achieve at the club.

Then, less than 24 hours later, he resigned.

It is about time someone, other than

the coach of the day, copped it in the neck for Subiaco's undoings. It is time the players and the directors took the brunt of the blame.

Daniel lasted just 11 games.

When the Lions won their first two games of the season he had freedom of the club. But because the players failed to respond to his pleas for some onfield effort, he is made the scapegoat.

Have a look at Subiaco's record in the last 10 years.

Since winning the 1973 premiership they have had six coaches.

David Parkin took over in 1975 after the Ross Smith reign. Parkin stayed just one year. They finished last.

In 1976 Jack Ensor, a coach with a good record in WA, had his turn at the

helm. They finished sixth and then he quit.

The following year Brian Douge, a proven performer and an extremely dedicated player from Hawthorn, was recruited. He stayed in the position for two years and the best they could do was finish sixth.

Then former Subiaco ruckman Peter Burton took the job on. His was to be at least a two year appointment — but he was replaced mid-way through 1980 by Ken Armstrong after the club had finished last in his first season.

They also finished last in Armstrong's first half-a season.

In 1981 they improved under Armstrong to finish fifth. But last year,

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At the half-way mark...

The bookies are baffled

THE football race is at the half-way mark — and while we have seen a few jockeys tumble off their horses and a few favourites go down the tube, it's developing into an interesting battle.

It certainly looks like being a sprint home, but the question of picking a winner at this stage is something that even the bookies are reluctant to talk about.

There have been a few big wagers, including some heavy backing mid-season for East Perth, but the premiership market is still an open affair.

Here's the latest market (with the pre-season quotations in brackets): 6/4 South Fremantle (9/2); 2 Claremont (7/2); 4

Swan Districts (3s); 10 East Perth (10s); 20 East Fremantle (20s); 25 West Perth (9/2); 100 Perth (33) and Subiaco (50).

So we've seen South Fremantle firm sharply; West Perth drift alarmingly and Swan Districts go out a few points. Claremont have come in slightly; East Perth haven't budged (despite their win over Claremont last week) and the others are predictable.

How the runners are performing...

So how about a form guide on the teams...



SOUTH FREMANTLE: Strong and gutsy; plenty of speed and aggression in their side and a taste of the unpredictable among some of their superstars. Have enough experience to weather the variables that occur in football races and seem capable of producing a staying performance.



CLAREMONT: If you are looking for horses for courses, the Tigers have what it takes. They have the capacity to burst out of the barrier stalls and blitz an opposition team in the opening furlong. Were up before the stewards this week after a shocker against East Perth, but they'll improve with a spell.



SWAN DISTRICTS: After proving to be the horse to beat from last year, they haven't sustained that early promise from the inside barrier. They were slow out of the stalls, but have gradually started to put their best feet forward and are getting into stride. Certainly have the talent to come home strongly.



EAST PERTH: Looming as the dark horses of the field. Due to a lack of experience, they raced greenly in the early stages and while they showed bursts of speed, they couldn't sustain the effort. However, their youth and exuberance is now being harnessed a little and they are pacing out their races much better.



EAST FREMANTLE: Set the world on fire with their pre-race warm-ups, trouncing all the opposition on the way to the starting gates. But then they got stuck in the gates and trailed the field out of the barriers. Have been troubled by protests and interference in recent outings and their form is erratic. But they cannot be ruled out of the finish.



WEST PERTH: They were literally jumping out of their skin in the pre-race warm-ups and they looked good. Not quite odds-on favourites, but were the medium of several heavy plunges. However, their supporters have had their fingers burnt as they drifted right out of contention with some disappointing efforts when in a winning position.



SUBIACO: Shattered some of the bookies' bags in the early stages with a blistering burst out of the blocks. Set the early pace and caused some anxious moments for the more fancied runners behind them. But, like many bolters, they came back to the field smartly and are now languishing as the pressure goes on.



PERTH: Have had no support in the betting ring and have performed accordingly. Are really a maiden in a top-class field and need time to mature on outer country tracks before tackling the big city boys. Stay with the leaders for the early part of a race, but then wilt when the whips come out.

...and their trainers...

And what about the coaches, the men who ride their charges out onto the arena of battle each week?

This is how they are performing...

MAL BROWN (South Fremantle): The heavyweight of the field. Weighed in overweight as usual, but has thrown his bulk around and split open a few packs. Is cagey as the sharpest jockey and you can never tell when he's really trying! Is in control of his team and knows just how much rein to allow without them pulling too hard and tiring early.

JOHN TODD (Swan Districts): Has been plagued by injuries and even though he has tried a lot of new gear, it hasn't had the same effect. However, most of the experiments are over and he'll revert to the tried and trusted methods of getting the team into shape.

GRAHAM MOSS (Claremont): Is always a consistent performer and though his aging legs are starting to slow him down, he is still plodding on. Has some good, astute off-field trainers who know how to prepare their horses for the final sprint home and he will pace himself accordingly.

GREG BREHAUT (East Perth): A newcomer to Perth racing; has performed well on provincial circuits and after a slow start, he seems to have settled down well in the middle. Lacks experience in the crushes, but if he gets a clear opening in the sprint home, he could be dangerous.

DENNIS COMETTI (West Perth): Is having to resort to a mixed bag of training methods to get his rather lack-lustre team into gear. Still looks the part, shapes up well at every start but cannot quite get into stride. Lacks big-man strength and this will be a handicap at the finish.

RON ALEXANDER (East Fremantle): Has been frustrated by running into dead ends all the time. Takes time to get moving because of his size, but can bowl over a few fancied runners when he gets into stride. Likes to grab the bit and if he is given his head, he could figure in the finish.

IAN MILLER (Perth): Faces some critical examination in the coming weeks as the punters (and the stewards) question his future. Lacks the skill and stamina in the stable to mount a strong challenge, but is prepared to work with a lot of wayward horses in the hope that he can get the best out of them.

PETER DANIEL (Subiaco): Has had to face hecklers in the mounting yards and was up before the stewards this week after some disappointing efforts. He's a newcomer to Perth tracks and just couldn't work out the lie of the land. Had the credentials and should have stuck to it, but found the going too heavy.



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...battler finds his niche

EVERY coach dreams of having players like John Scott in their side.

Not because he is brilliant, but because he never gives less than 100 percent effort and he is a real team man.

Scott has been tried in a variety of positions at East Perth in the last few seasons, but he seems to have found his niche at full forward.

He is different from the average forward in that he is a real fighter and will not allow the ball to be cleared without a battle.

He began his career as a defender before being promoted to the centre line and eventually working his way further up the ground.

Scott is a real battler, but he is gradually stamping himself as one of the most valuable players in the game because he always gives the task of helping East Perth win matches total commitment.

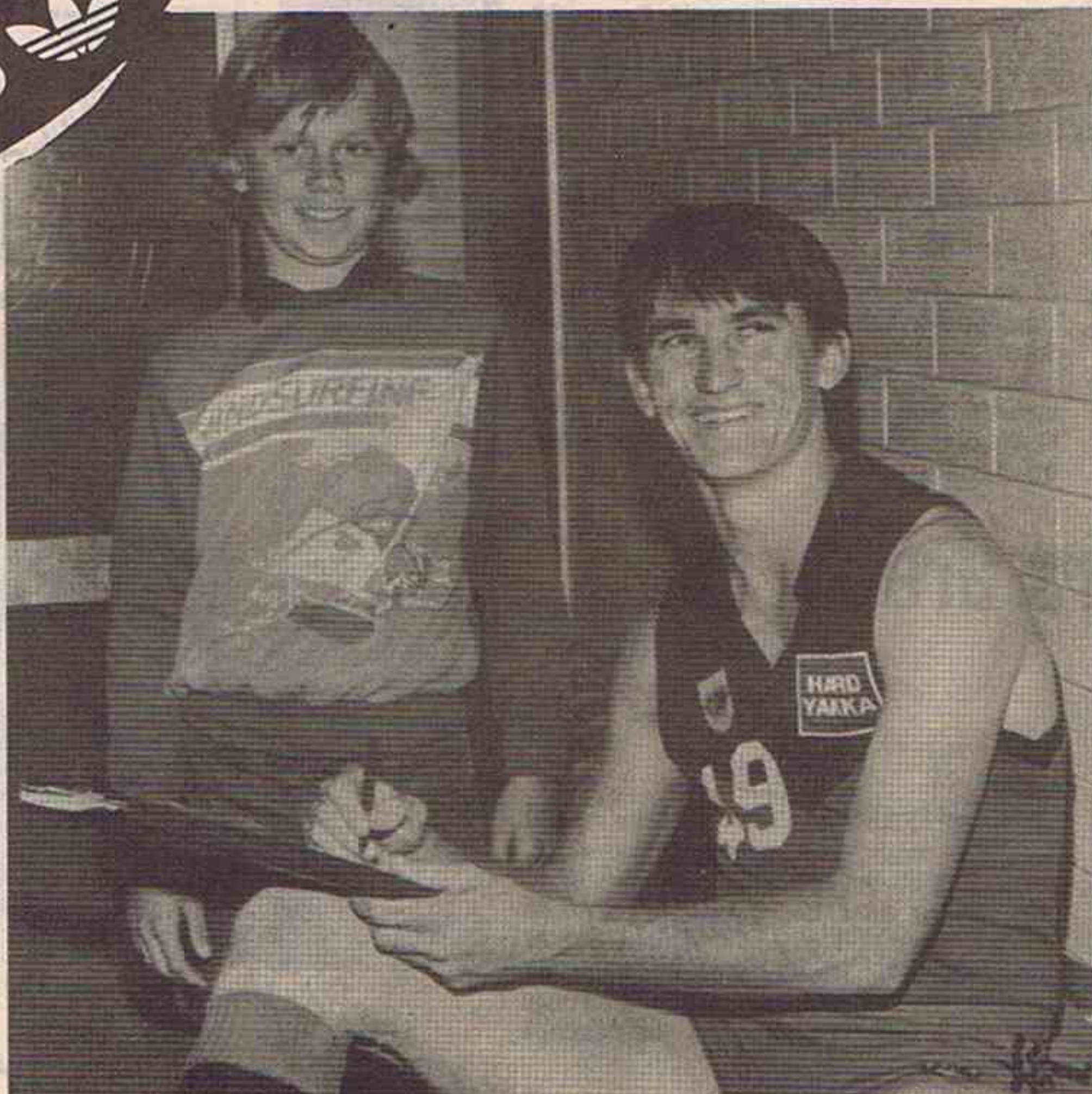
Since taking over the role in the key attacking position he has proven tremendous value for his side. It has been a tough struggle to get to the top of the football tree and now that he is there he intends to remain where he is.

He has had to overcome a number of setbacks on the way to league football and Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to Scott and found out more about one of the game's real characters.

Q. It is pretty hard to be noticed in colts, because there are so many young guys trying to get a berth. How did you find it?

A. I had always barracked for Swan Districts up until I was about 17, so I thought I would go and play for them and get a clearance from East Perth. I trained for about 10 weeks with them and when the practice matches came along I could not get a game. Eventually the coach Dave Sidebottom said I could have a game and I started on the bench and did not get a run until the last quarter. By that time the colts coach had gone home. It's hard because there are about 60 blokes trying to get in a colts squad at one time. After that day I decided I should come down and have a go at East Perth. My brother was here at the time and I was lucky because Eddie Pitter gave me a game straight away.

Q. You have played under three league coaches at East Perth - Barry Cable, Grant Dorrington and Greg Brehaut - how do you compare the three of them?

A. The coach who is in charge at the time you always believe is the best you have had. At the moment I am under Greg and I would say he would be the best coach, mainly because I am playing under him now and he has given me the opportunity early in the season to play league football. This year it is the first time I have played the first three games. But then you look back and you say 'Well Cable gave me the break'. He was different to the coaches I had been used to, because I had only played under colts coaches until then. He was a man I admired. He is one of the all time greats and I can't remember seeing anyone better. Then Dorro took over from where he left off and he would rank highly because everyone had an enormous amount of respect for him.

Q. What about this number 49. Most players who have been around a while move into a lower number, but you have kept that guernsey since you made your league debut. Any reason for that?

A. Well I came into the game with it and I decided to make it my number until I retire. The club has asked me to change it a couple of times, but I refused because a jumper does not make a player.

Q. Who has had the biggest influence on your career?

A. I would have to say Grant Dorrington because I played reserves and league under him. He was also the guy who told me how to play on a half back flank in my first colts game. I had never played there

before and he told me all I had to do was punch the ball and run and in the first seven games that was all I did. I got in the best players three times. I was worst on the ground once, but I was lucky. If I had played like that in the first game I probably would not be here now.

Q. I suppose versatility is the key to a player's make up these days?

A. Yes. A couple of weeks ago I started on the interchange bench and when I went on I went to full forward and kicked a goal. And after half time they switched me into the backline before finishing the game on a wing. Versatility is now becoming a trait of every league footballer. The days are gone now when someone asks you where you play and you answer full forward. If you can only play in one position and you don't go well for the first two weeks you will be dropped because they can't move you anywhere.

Q. How did you come to be a full forward?

A. A couple of years ago I was playing in the back line and I wasn't getting a game so I asked the coach to play me in the forward line. He gave me a go and I kicked five goals in the reserves. I followed that with five more in the next two weeks and they said 'Oh well, we have to do something about it' and finally, after playing the entire pre-season on a wing, they put me at centre half forward in the reserves. I kicked five and then kicked another five goals and they said 'he is obviously doing something right' and put me at full forward. I was lucky enough to kick eight goals there in my first game. I played 16 games last year and most of them were out of full forward.

Q. Was it difficult playing your first colts game against Swans, after having supported them for your whole life?

A. Not very. You lose interest in the other club as soon as you become involved with another club. As soon as I started playing colts that was it.

Q. What do you consider to be your greatest asset?

A. It's hard to say. Everyone wants to succeed, but it just depends on what type of person you are. Personally, I hate to be beaten and I think that if you are out on the field there is nothing worse than being beaten because there are normally somewhere between 5,000 and 30,000 people watching. Everyone has a lot of pride in themselves, especially when they are on the field. A big part would be pride. You don't want to see your mates being beaten either.

I think my greatest asset would be my aggression, controlled aggression. If the ball is there I go in hard and I also believe I am a team player.

Q. How long did it take you to break into league football?

A. I came down here in 1978 and I played by first senior game in 1980. My first match was in an Escort Cup game at the start of 1980 and then I played in about the third game of the season. I played seven games that year. I was pleased because it took a lot of hard work to get there. I didn't have as much ability as some of the blokes that came down here at the same time.

Q. What do you believe is required for a player to make the grade these days?

A. The main thing is hard work. And you have to want to succeed, you don't just want to come down and say, 'look I have got the ability', you have to put in the hard work. I had a couple of mates who came from East Perth - Highgate, the same club I came from, and they had untold more natural ability than I had. They could run quicker and looked classier, but while I had lesser ability I only made it to league football because I wanted to. If you really want to get somewhere you have to work at it. You have got 50 or 60 blokes all aiming at a berth in the league side every year and it is very hard to get there. It is not always the best 20 who make it, it is the blokes who want to make it the most who get their opportunity.

Q. How do you become noticed when it is virtually you against 59 other players?

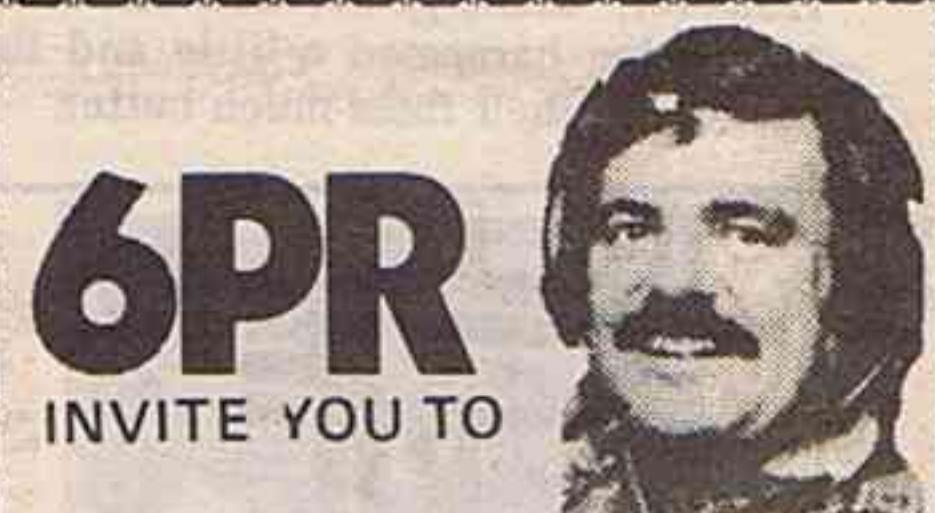
A. I think the main thing is to be out in front in the running. You have to show them that you really want to play league football by doing everything they ask of you and doing it with maximum effort. When you get into the pre-season games you have to do everything they tell you. If they tell you to punch the ball away at all times and not to worry about how many kicks you get yourself, you have to do it.

Q. What about East Perth? Every year they look like they may be struggling, but they still end up in the four?

A. I think that comes down to the pride in the players. There is a lot of tradition at East Perth and we are never far from the hunt for a position in the finals. I think there is tremendous comradeship at East Perth and everyone is happy and if you have a happy bunch of players, who all want to win, the chances of success are high.

Q. I suppose you have to learn discipline early in the piece?

A. If you are a disciplined player you are half way there and then your skills come into it after that.

Their poor form began in the Emu Export Carnival and continued for the next four games. They beat Swan Districts on May 22, but have since lost to East Fremantle and East Perth.

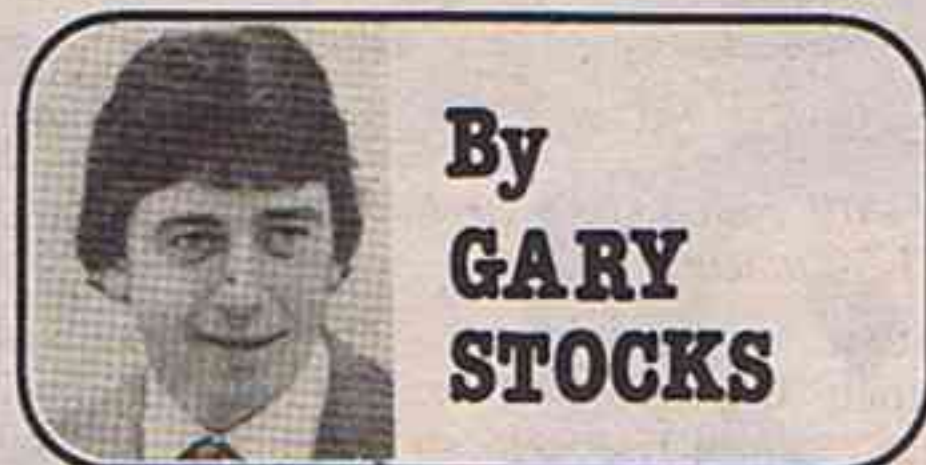
Their other victory in this period was against the lowly Subiaco.

SOUTH Australian football officials are rubbing their hands with joy after one of the most progressive moves ever seen.

The long weekend in SA saw them play five games over three days including a double-header on Monday at Football Park.

On Monday league matches between South Adelaide and West Torrens and Port Adelaide and Norwood were played on the same oval.

The first match, between South and Torrens would normally have attracted only 6000 people at the maximum.

Then Port Adelaide and Norwood took the field and 33,432 people turned out for the big day of football. Over the whole weekend the SANFL had more than 53,000 people pass through the turnstiles to see the matches.

SA officials are so impressed with the way the experiment succeeded that they are considering holding as many as five double-headers next year.

South won the first match by 68 points while Port scraped home by two points in a thriller.

The top game also saw the unannounced return of brilliant Port forward Tim Evans.

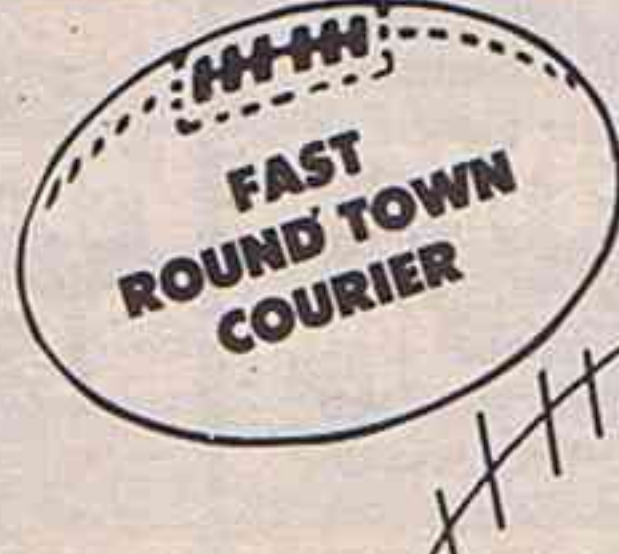


He was not listed in team line-ups leading up to the game but showed he was a vital part of the Port line-up by kicking four goals. He had been out of action since the third game of the season.

Time for league to crack down

IT'S about time the WAFL cracked down on club officials and coaches who criticise umpires and the tribunal.

Such criticism is usually pretty one-eyed anyway.

The situation came to a head following the derby last week between South Fremantle and East Fremantle.

One of the best matches you could hope to see — and a great advertisement for the game — was submerged beneath a lot of outspoken nonense.

For a start, you could not find a fairer player than Stephen Michael. The incident with Paul Harding was unfortunate, but considering the number of games Michael has played without blemish, he is entitled to the odd misdemeanour.

NOT DELIBERATE

Anyone who has watched Michael at length would not think for one minute that he deliberately put his boot into Harding's stomach.

The other incident is hardly worth talking about. Michael coming in from the opposite direction attempted to tackle. While it was head-high there was no malice in it.

But let's forget about Michael. Two Sandover Medals and another one he perhaps should have won, is proof enough of the kind of behaviour he displays on the football field.

The most disturbing aspect of much of the criticism levelled at umpires is that it is from people who are supposed to be trying to promote the game at a time when it is pushing against the tide.

Too many club presidents have too much to say that is detrimental to the game.

They are in the privileged position of being able to use their influence around the

league table. They don't have to air their feelings in public... particularly when they are speaking in the heat of the moment.

The published apology by South Fremantle president Roy Annear over comments he made about West Perth coach Dennis Cometti doesn't do a great deal for the image of football.

But then neither did a suggestion earlier in the year by West Perth president Rod Brown that the competition would be better off without Subiaco.

If the people who are entrusted to look after the image of football cannot be bothered giving a little bit more thought to what they say, then there isn't a great deal of hope for the game.

The league has the power to clamp down on club officials who vent their feelings publicly on umpires. It's about time it used that power.

I don't say that umpires are above criticism, but they get enough from the rabid one-eyed supporter without club officials putting in their bit.

DETRIMENTAL

Think about it club presidents. What you do when you sound off about football in a detrimental way in public is similar to a cabinet minister criticising the Government he represents.

It's just not on. If club presidents are unhappy with the umpiring standard in WA then let them take steps at a league level. They should not spark a situation like last week where umpires threatened to strike.

Football is having a tough enough job as it is in difficult economic times without it being smeared by unnecessary and derogatory remarks from administrators.

And in that respect I'm also talking about the trend by club officials, which includes coaches, to criticise tribunal decisions.

I think the tribunal in this State is far more lenient than its counterpart in the VFL. Over there French law seems to exist... you're guilty until proven innocent.

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THE MARSHALL SAGA

IT seems as though some bad blood has been spilt at Bassendean over Ken Marshall. The former Subiaco player (who shocked the football world with 13 goals in his first two games in new colours this year) has quit the club — and Swans coach John Todd is not happy. Marshall's form has gradually slipped since that great start and he was dropped to the reserves — as all out-of-form players should be, regardless of whether they think they are super stars or not. Marshall's next communication with the club was a letter saying that he had lost interest in football. However, as Todd says, he cost the club a lot of money and has a three-year contract. "If he doesn't serve that contract out with Swans, he won't play anywhere" Todd told radio 6PR Football World listeners last week.

Subi view

Swan Districts coach John Todd said he was disappointed that Subiaco recruit Ken Marshall had decided to retire from football. He said that Marshall had been dropped to the reserves after contributing in only three of his nine senior matches — he had been carried in the other six games Todd said. But one irate Subiaco supporter believes Todd lacks patience. The football fan was heard to say that Subiaco had carried Marshall for six years, but they never stopped trying to get the best out of him.

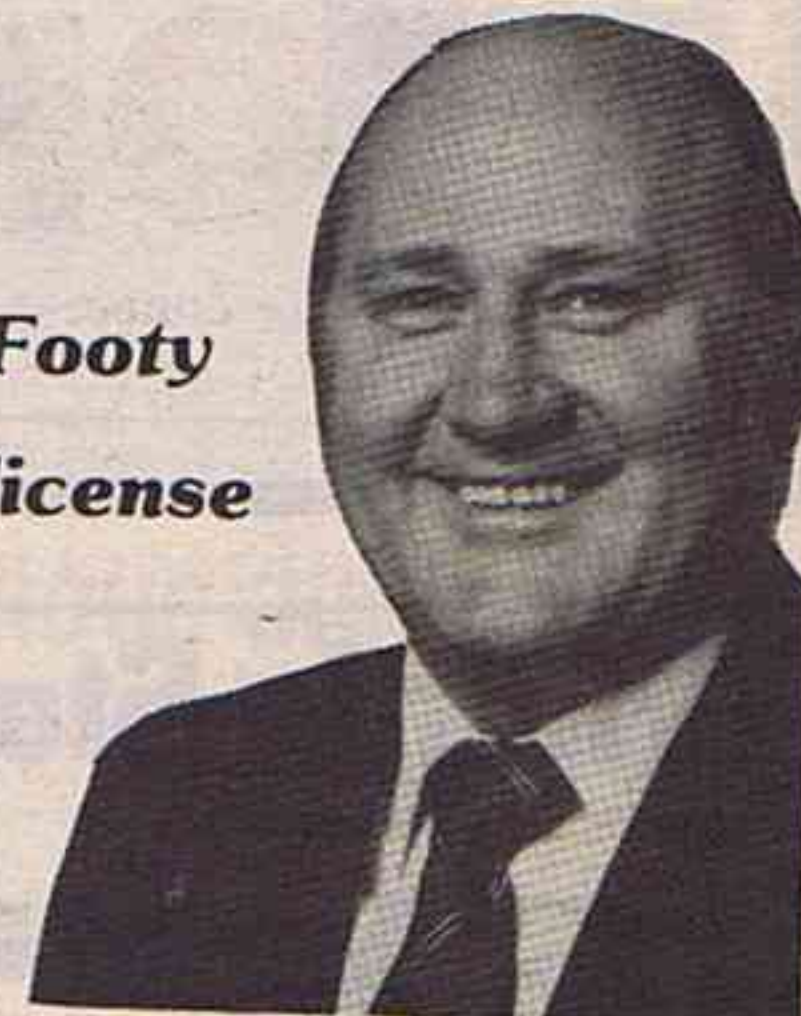
Frustrated

That controversial Bulldog goal

THAT Derby incident where Willie Roe kicked another goal before the ball was taken back to the centre certainly stirred things up at East Fremantle.

I recall this happening three times before in the last 20 years.

In 1975 Swans rover Brian Close scored one of his ten goals for the day in a game against East Fremantle at Bassendean with a 'second' kick.

In a game against Claremont in 1974 East Fremantle ruckman Kerry Williams was awarded a 'second' kick and goaled. The Tigers actually lodged a protest over this decision (they lost by three points), but it was dismissed.

The first 'second' kick decision happened in a game between East Perth and West Perth in 1963.

Saintly Sharks

ONE of my daughters is an avid Shark fan and a member of the blue and whites. She points out that they are not the bad boys some people make them out. For instance their latest newsletter points out that in 1969 they went through the entire season without a player being reported! Then there's a bit about Wilson Onions actually receiving a vote from the umpires for the Sandover Medal.

HIGH MARKS

MARKING of the ball by jumping and "catching" it overhead was not heard of until late 1890. Essendon's famous player of that era Charlie Pearsons is acknowledged in the history books with being the first player to 'take risks with his rocket like leaps into the air for marks'.

Old timers shook their heads and said "this new fangled idea of marking will ruin the game, people come to see football not men leaping into the air!" I wonder if they would have appreciated the aerial artistry of Bosustow, Gerovich, Knights, Baker and many other of our famous leapers.

Long kicks

I have often been asked what is the longest kick on record. I'm not asking anyone to believe this information, but I copied it from a publication at the Perth Library, they are all place kicks:

- 107 yards 2ft 2 inch — A.J. Thurgood 22.6.1899 assisted by 'slight breeze'.
- 105 yards 2ft — Dave McNamara (St Kilda) 27.7.1914 'wind assisted'.
- 102 yards — J. Lieth, Melbourne 23.5.1905 'slight wind assistance'.
- 102 yards 2ft — D. McNamara 6.8.1912 'AGAINST BREEZE'.
- 101 yards — A.J. Thurgood, Essendon 22.8.1901 'no wind'.

Austin Robertson senior got a mention for a 1941 place kick of 98 yards, it didn't say which way the wind was blowing.

One of the longest kicks in more recent years was an 84 yard drop kick by Geelong's Paul Vinar in 1965.

After siren goals

ANOTHER reader asked when was the last time a game was won with a kick after the final siren, as in the Derby two weeks ago? I'll say August 1974 when Swans full-forward Max George goaled to give his side victory over West Perth at Leederville.

LIFE OF COACHES

League coaches don't normally survive for long periods these days, but it has not always been that way. The immortal Jock McHale coached Collingwood for 38 seasons. Norm Smith had a 23-season reign with Melbourne, Fitzroy and South Melbourne. Dick Reynold coached Essendon for 22 years.

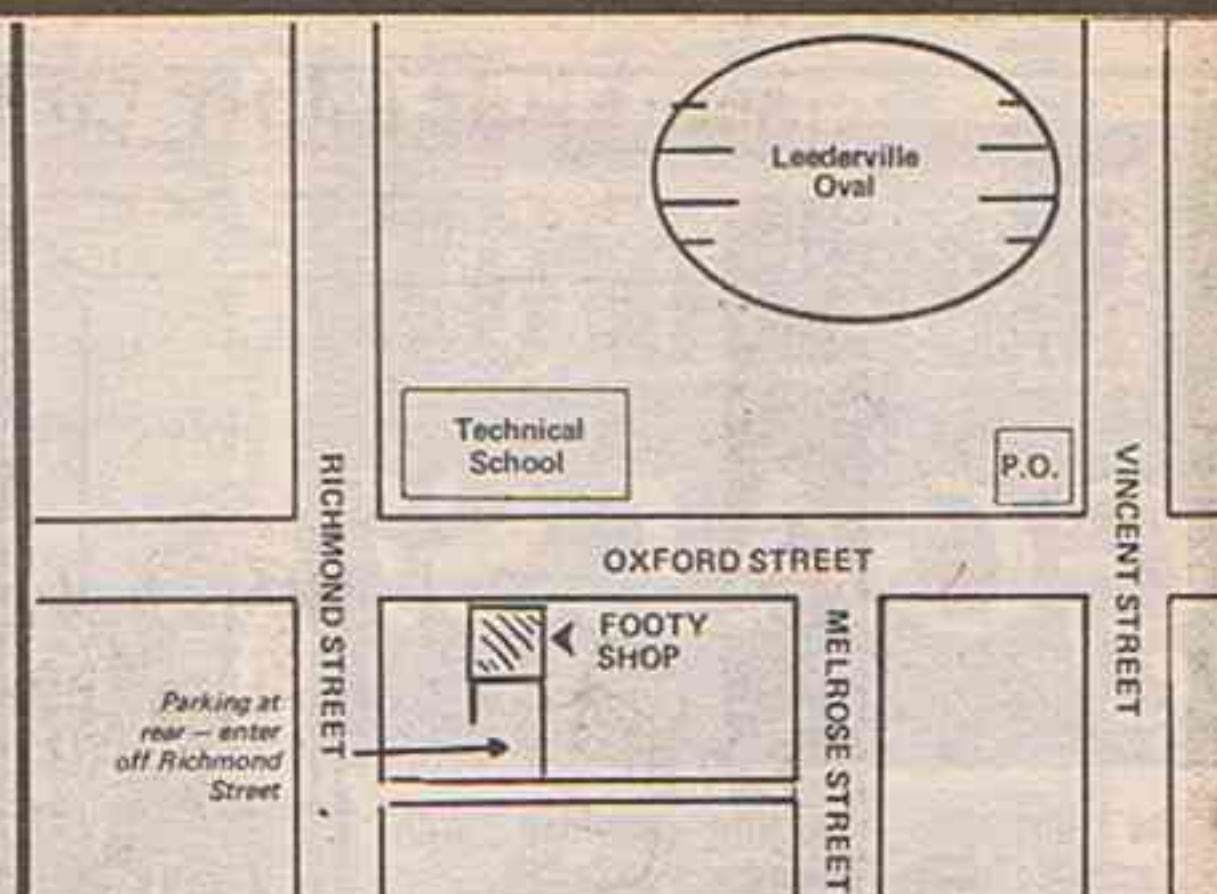
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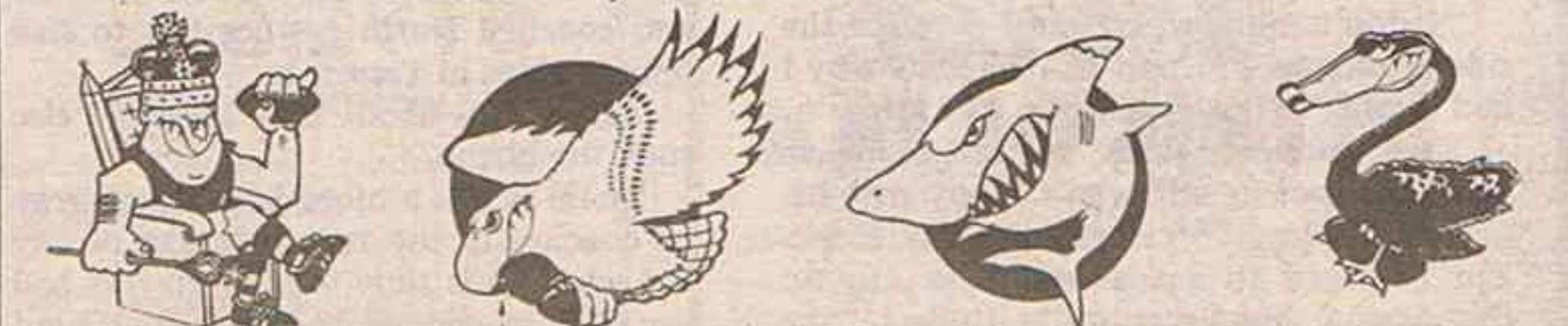

Opportunist

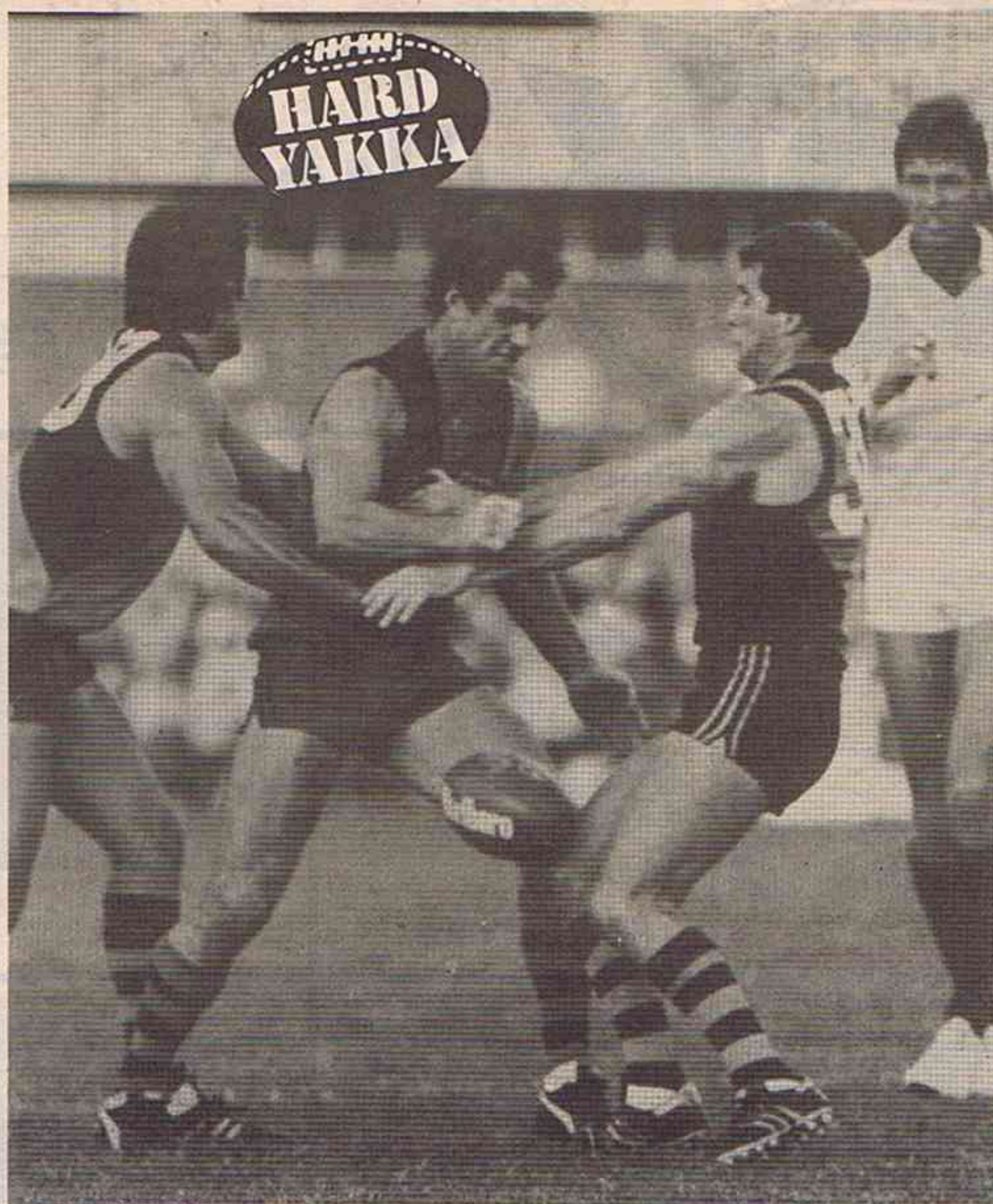

He picked the ball up in the centre square, ran his full measure of 10 metres and then sent the ball 70 metres to register his side's seventh and 10th goals just when they really needed a lift.

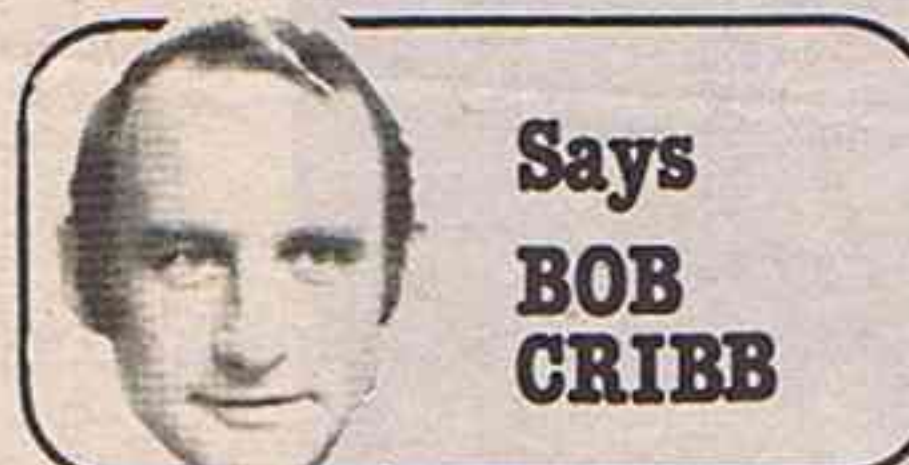
Murray Rance (the most versatile player in the side), Brent Hutton, Bill Skwirowski, Jon Fogarty, all match winners in their own right.

His late start to the season was caused by a pre-season injury.

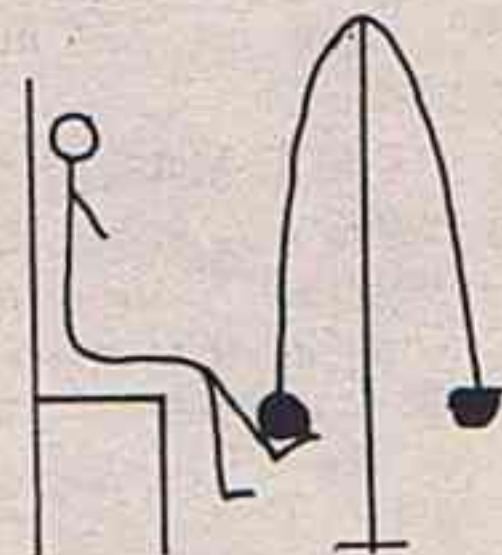

(A series of articles on muscle injury).

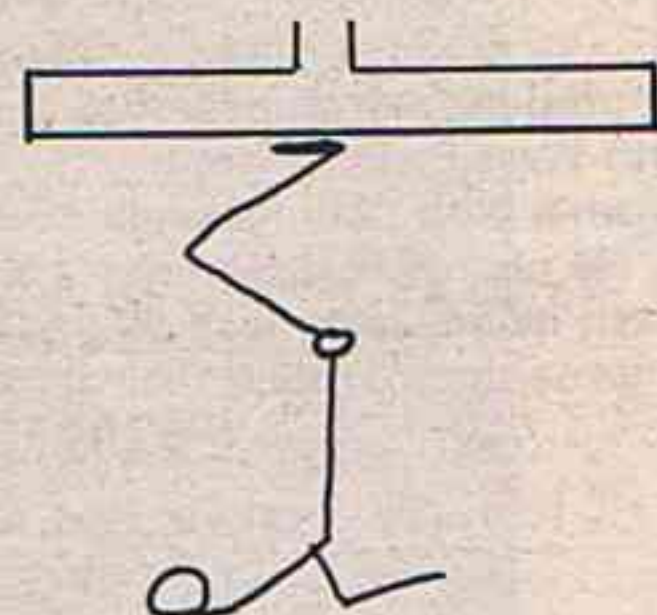
Rehabilitation of Muscle injury

In regaining muscle strength during the rehabilitation period, it is important to realise that the amount of strength regained is often only sufficient for the specific rehabilitation exercise being performed and it does not necessarily mean the muscle has the functional power required for a return to competition.

For example, an injured front thigh muscle may seem to have regained the power of the uninjured similar muscle of the other leg, when doing a single knee extension exercise against a heavy free weight, but yet it may be found to be lagging when it is subjected to a more complex task like a leg press.

The reason the leg press is more difficult is because the muscle needs to generate maximal tension throughout a greater range of action. In scientific terms, we call "Iso-Kinetic exercise", the type of exercise that is desirable in giving quicker and greater strength rehabilitation in muscle.

It is achieved by:

1. The use of orthtron or cybex II machine.
2. Doing a variety, rather than one type of exercise.
 - e.g. a. Weight resistance exercises.
 - b. Jogging.
 - c. Cycling.
 - d. Exercises specific to the sort of action that's required in the game.

Note: Muscles become specifically adapted to performing the exercises used in training and competition and there is little carry over ability to other tasks. e.g. There is often little to gain by footballers having a game of indoor cricket, as different muscles are used and also the sudden unaccustomed activity in these muscles may cause soreness and strains.

As well as regaining its strength, a muscle has to regain its endurance. i.e. The ability to keep contracting powerfully for the necessary period of time. Endurance and strength properties are independent. Cycling and jogging for increased periods, and stepping up their velocity of work increases endurance and prevents cramps, tightness and tiredness in the muscle, which could lead to re-injury. Endurance exercises enable the muscle to become more efficient its metabolism of oxygen and function therefore for longer periods before becoming fatigued.

Example of a graduated rehabilitation programme for a grade II hamstring tear.

Week 1. — Concentrate on Physiotherapy, stretching; and Anti-inflammatory drugs.

Week 2. — Continue stretching. I. Passive (done by another person to the pain zone).

II. Active (done by athlete to pain zone).

— Jogging and cycling "within the pain zone" for 10-15 minutes. It is to be preceded and followed by a stretch routine for all the lower limb muscles.

— Build up to two jobs a day by the end of the week.

— Do lots of swimming to maintain heart and lung fitness. No kicking or sprinting yet.

Week 3. — Do jogging and stretching routine.

— Do Iso-Kinetic exercises on orthtron machine.

— Now and submaximal loading run throughs at a gradually increasing pace. e.g. half to three quarter pace, and then finally to sprinting. Progression to faster pace only permitted if no pain felt at the lower speed, and if the next morning there is no pain or marked stiffness.

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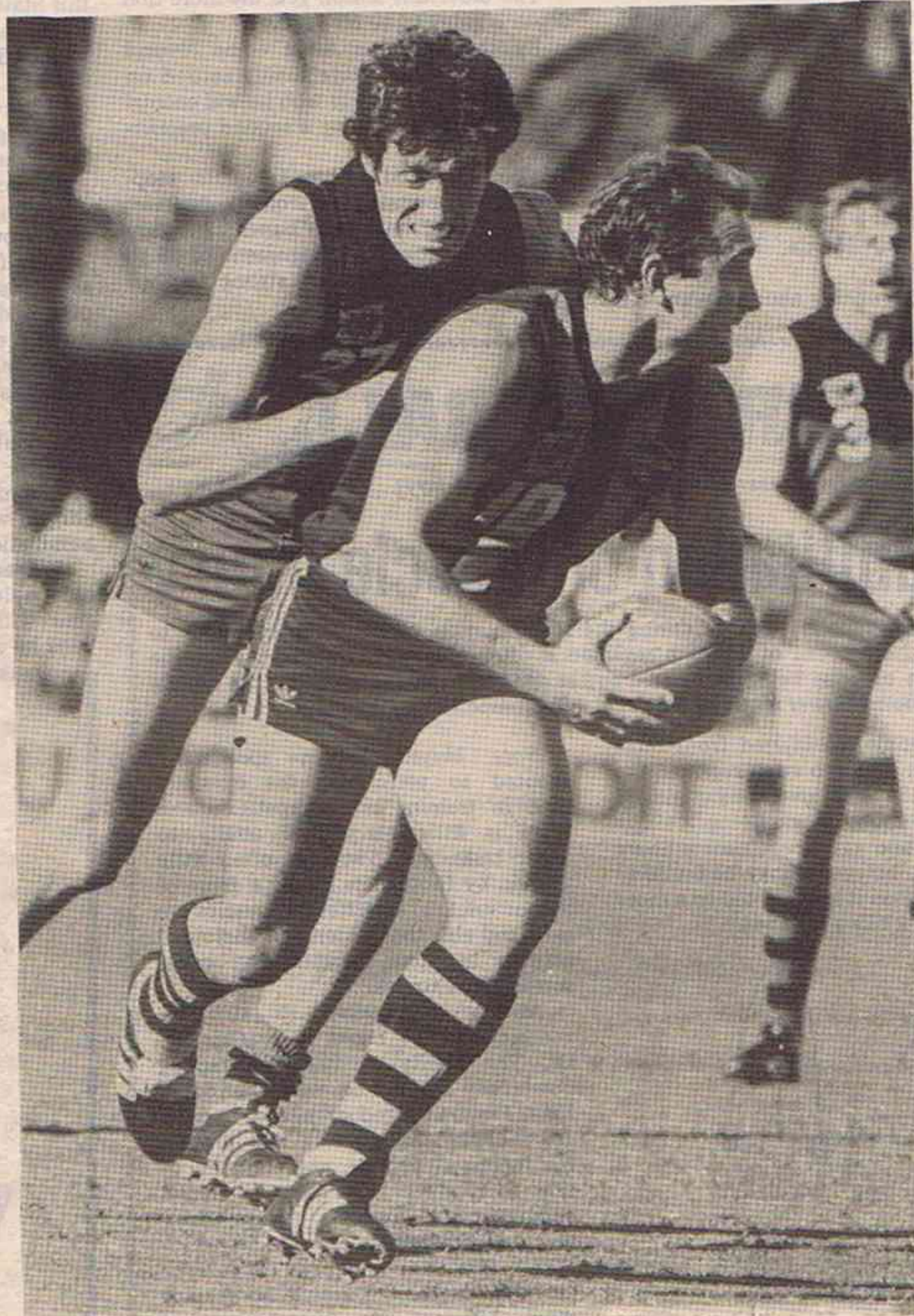

Valli began his career with West Perth where he played 147 games, then he moved to the VFL and played 17 games with Collingwood and one game with Essendon before joining Subiaco in 1981. He played two seasons with the Lions, notching a further 37 games with them. However, he had lost much of his blistering pace and has opted to stay in touch with the game as an around-the-grounds commentator with Radio 6IX after a 201-game career.



FORMER West Perth half forward **RON WILSON** stamped himself as one of the most dangerous players in the game. Throughout his 121 games it became a characteristic to see him swing onto his left foot and kick goals from impossible angles. He was a fine touch player who could change the course of a game in a five minute burst of brilliance.

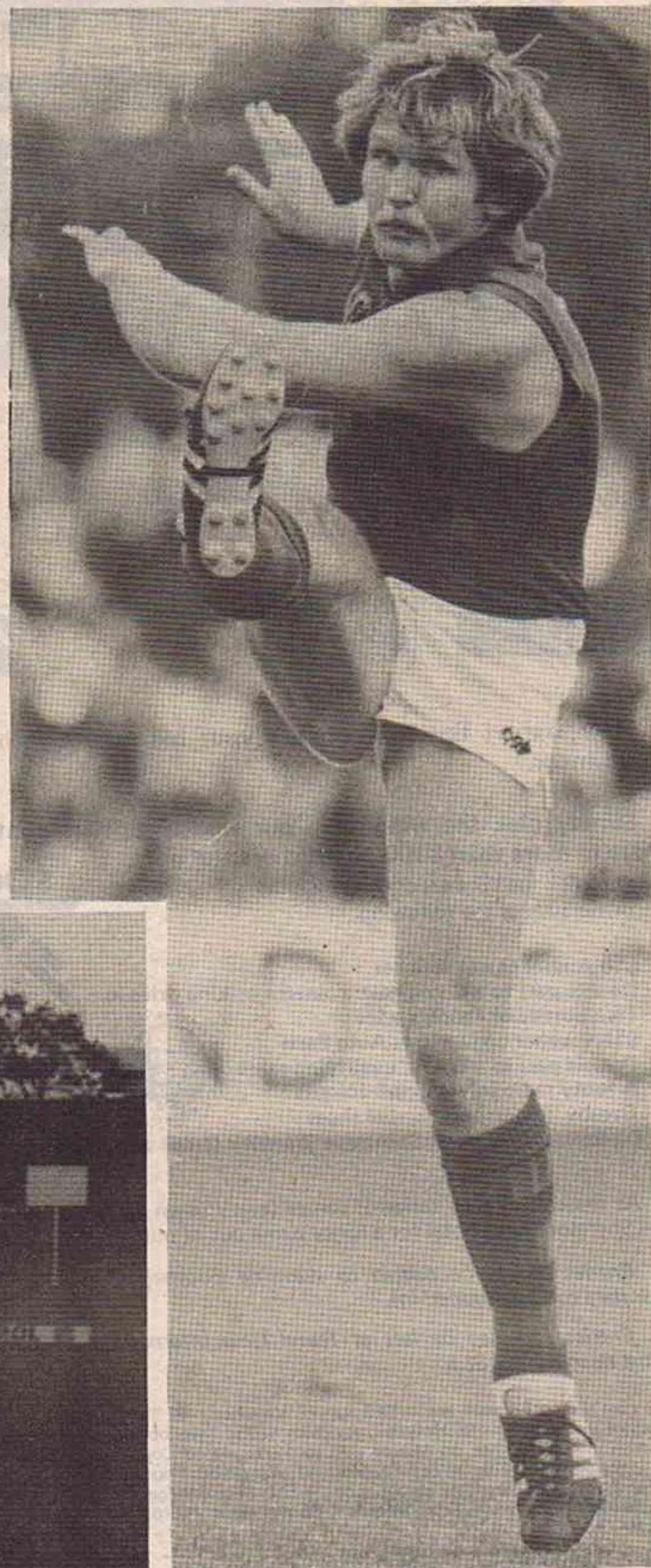
Our tribute is a little later than usual, but on these pages we record the efforts of seven players who have decided to end their league careers.

Injuries hampered JOE MCKAY (Above) throughout his 167-game career and eventually forced him into retirement. McKay, an outstanding key forward or defensive player, also decided he wanted to spend more time with his family and concentrate on his business commitments.

They pushed the glamour side for three quarters before the Saints hit top gear to run out 44-point winners.

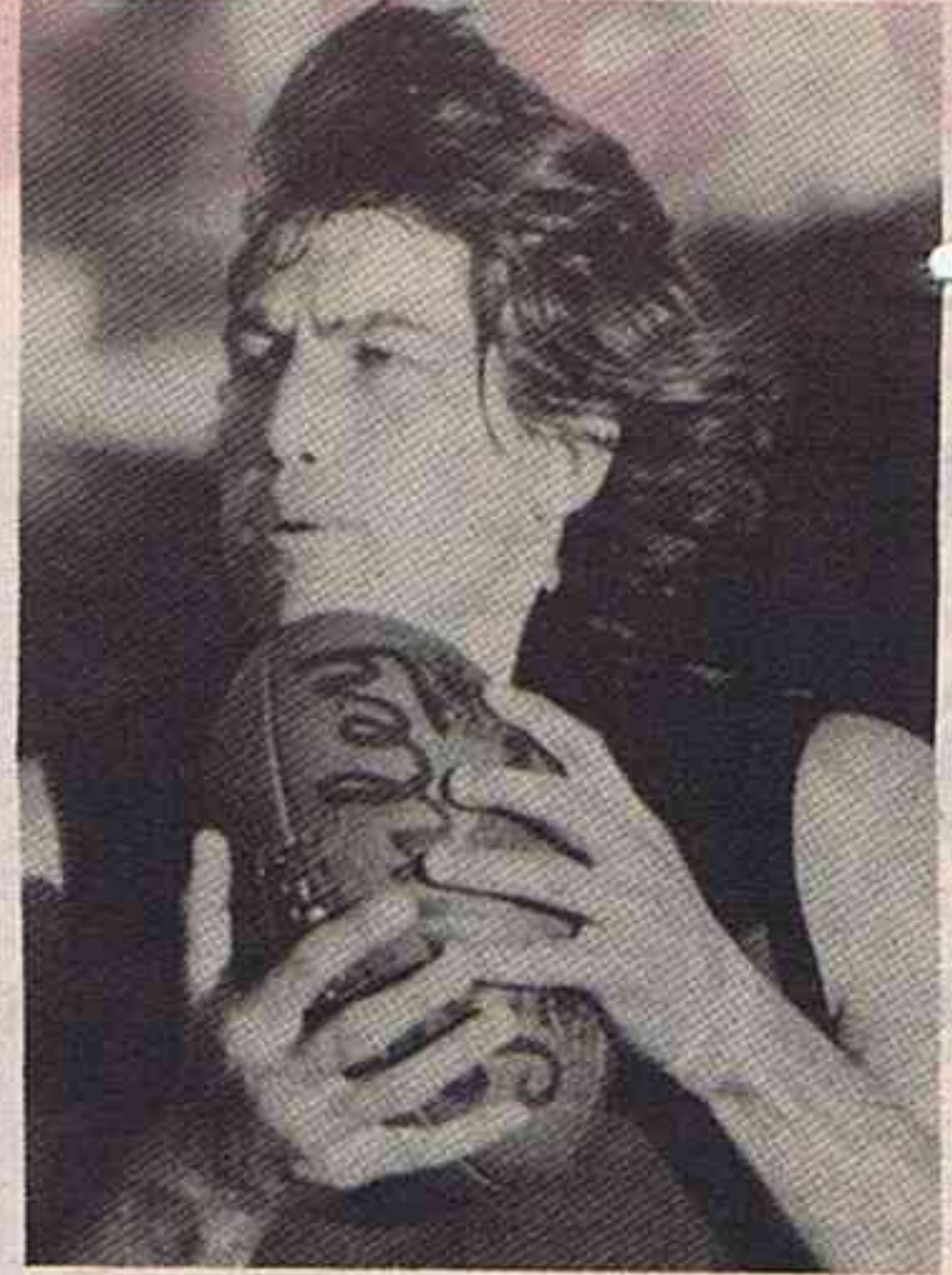

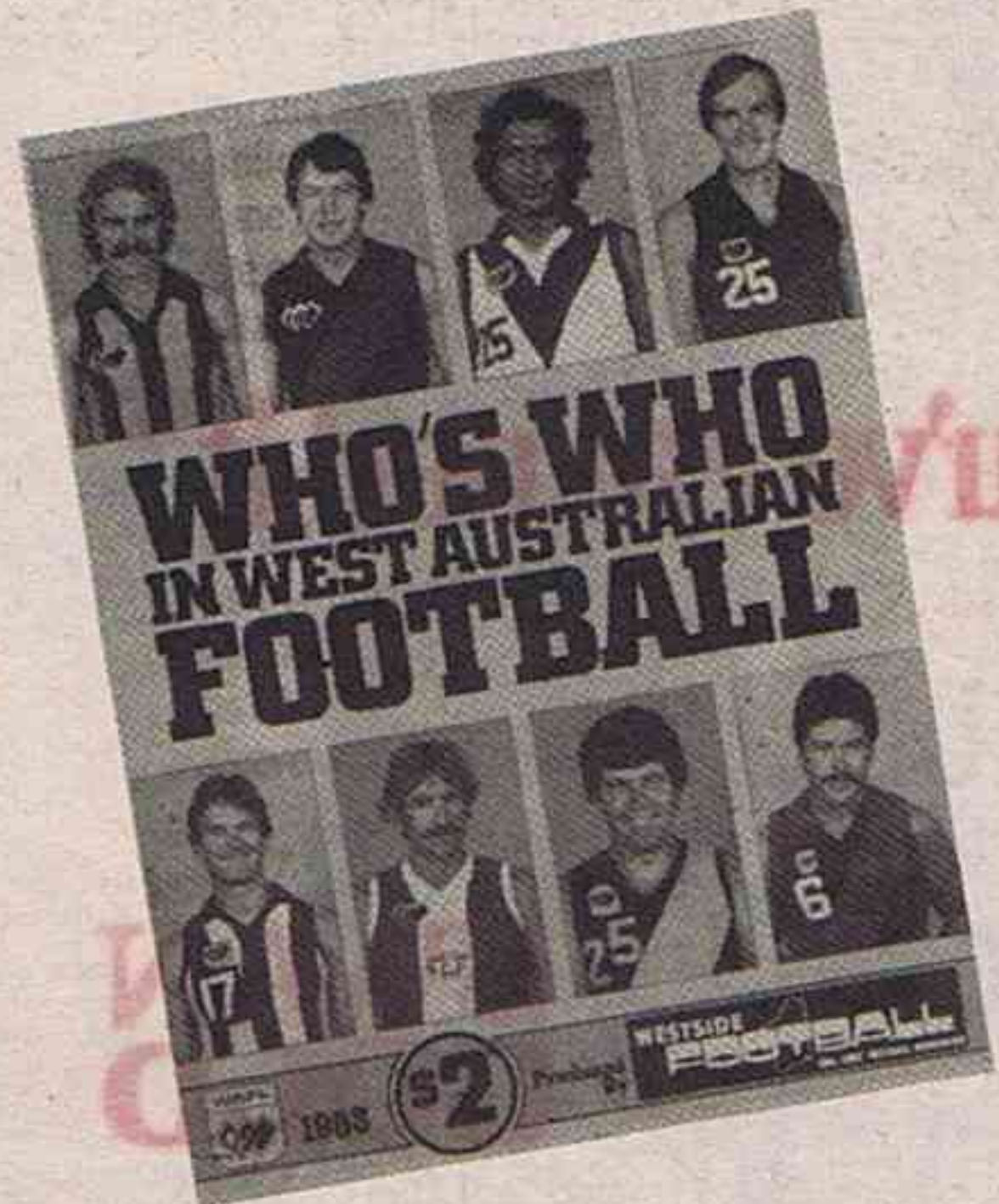
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HUTCHINSON LED SOUTH FROM A LONG DROUGHT

SOUTH Fremantle fans had no reason to be any more confident about the 1947 season than any other year.

They had lived in the shadow of their neighbours for 30 seasons and it did not appear that this season was going to do anything towards halting the run of East Fremantle.

After all, East Fremantle had won 31 league games in succession and they looked to be an almost awesome power. They were a champion team and with four wins in the opening four games of 1947 they were again looking the team to beat.

However, South Fremantle looked to have a side capable of bold showings and it was not beyond the realms of possibility that under the leadership of captain coach Ross Hutchinson they could even beat Old Easts.

The Bulldogs won the opening four matches of the season as well and then the stage was set for a great derby as the two undefeated sides prepared for what was to develop into a significant day in the history of football.

A huge crowd poured into the ground in anticipation of a great contest — and they were not let down by the 40 men who represented the two sides.

At the end of a titanic struggle South Fremantle had finally broken the dominance of their neighbours by a mere four points.

No one realised it at the time, but that match was to provide the turning point in the way derbies were to go for the next decade.

The Bulldogs had finally slipped out of the East Fremantle shadow and they were to become perhaps the best team in the nation.

That match marked the beginning of the most successful era in the history of South Fremantle. For the next 10 years they were to be the most powerful side in this State and given the opportunity that marvellous team could probably have downed any other team from any other competition in the land.

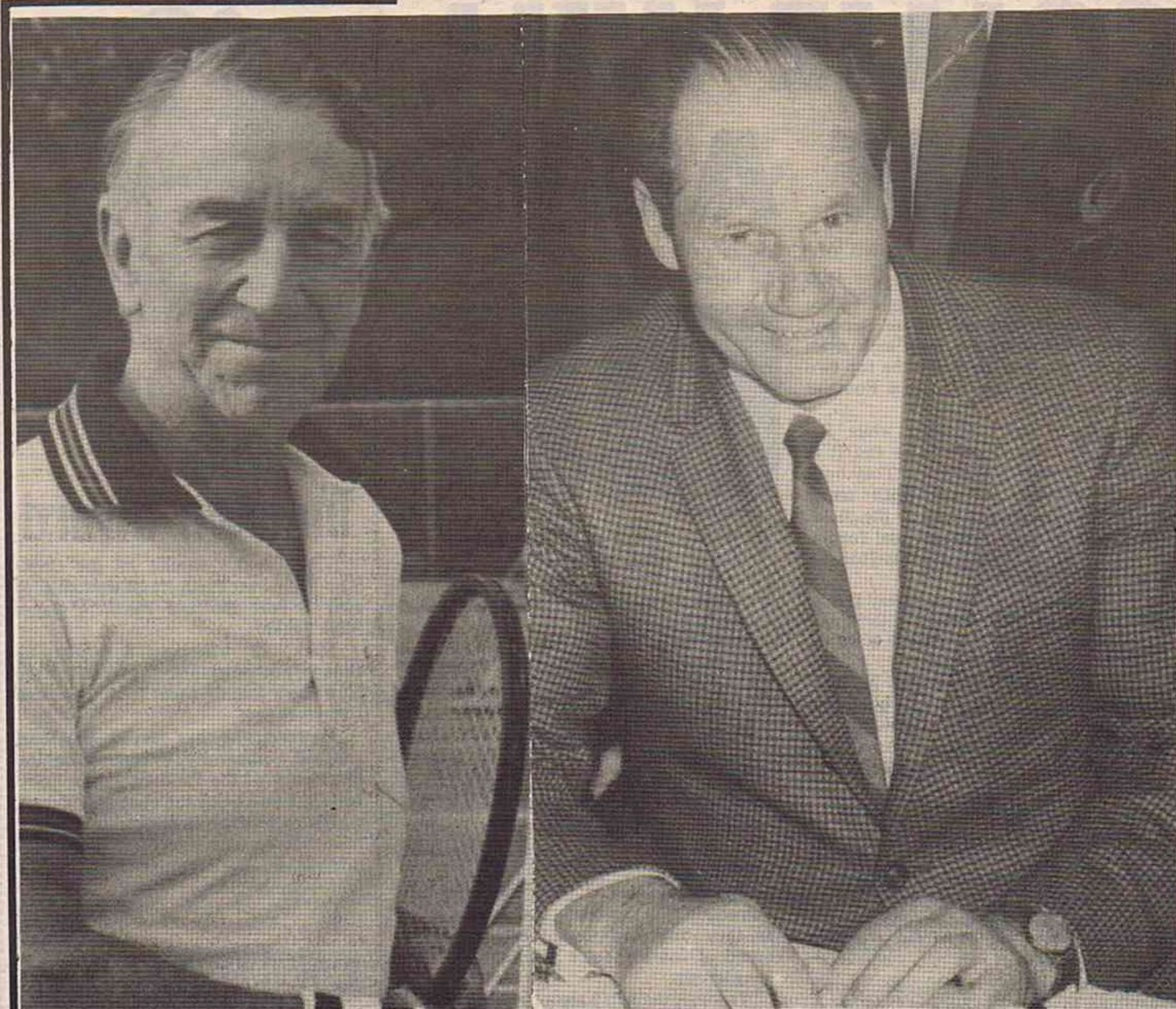
After that memorable Fremantle derby, South went on to win the second semi final against West Perth and when the Cardinals earned the right to again challenge the Bulldogs in the grand final, South proved the masters and won their first pennant in 30 years.

Ross Hutchinson had joined South Fremantle from West Perth and that victory was a personal triumph for him.

South also won a pennant under Hutchinson's guidance in 1948, but the following year they missed out — even though they still had one of the most powerful combinations in WA.

In 1950 Clive Lewington took over as the captain of the side and it saw the Bulldogs return to the top of the tree.

SOUTHS' GREAT LEADERS



Sir Ross Hutchinson has a special place in the history books at South Fremantle and these days he plays more tennis than football. However, he is still involved in the game and is the patron of the West Australian Football Media Guild.



Clive Lewington has been involved with football in many varied roles. He left South for a brief period to coach West Perth, he was later a State selector and is now a selector with South Fremantle.

CAPTAINS They led their teams to a premiership

Lewington had won the 1947 Sandover Medal and he was ready two seasons later to take over as the club's captain coach.

He was a graceful centreman who had superb ball skills and was an inspiration to his team mates. It was these traits which saw him succeed in his first season as captain coach.

A modest man, Lewington attributed much of his success to the brilliant players he had spread all around him, but he was a leader in the true sense of the word.

Although his playing career finished just one season after his initial success, he stayed on as coach until 1958.

The man to succeed Lewington as captain was one of the stars who rose to prominence under the reign of both Lewington and Hutchinson — Harry Carbon.

He also proved to be an outstanding leader on the field and helped South to another premiership.

This time the Bulldogs had to do it the hard way. They lost to West Perth in the second semi final by 15 points and they had to go back to the drawing board and

prepare for what was going to be a tough encounter with Claremont.

But South showed they were capable of taking out the grand final when they powered their way to a six goal win over the Tigers in the preliminary.

Magnificently led by Carbon they then overcame a six goal half time deficit to eventually win the game by 19 points.

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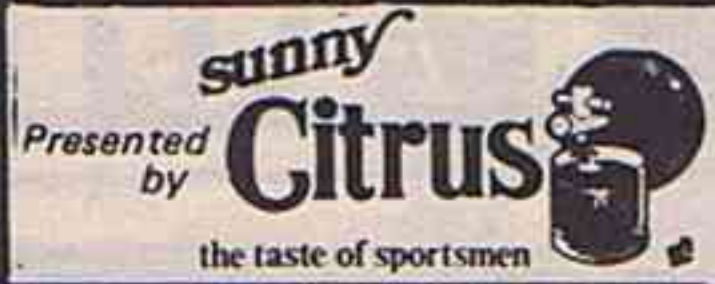
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AMATEUR NEWS

Who know where this fallacy began, but the truth be realised. Percentage is worked out by multiplying 100 with your FOR total and then dividing that by the AGAINST amount.

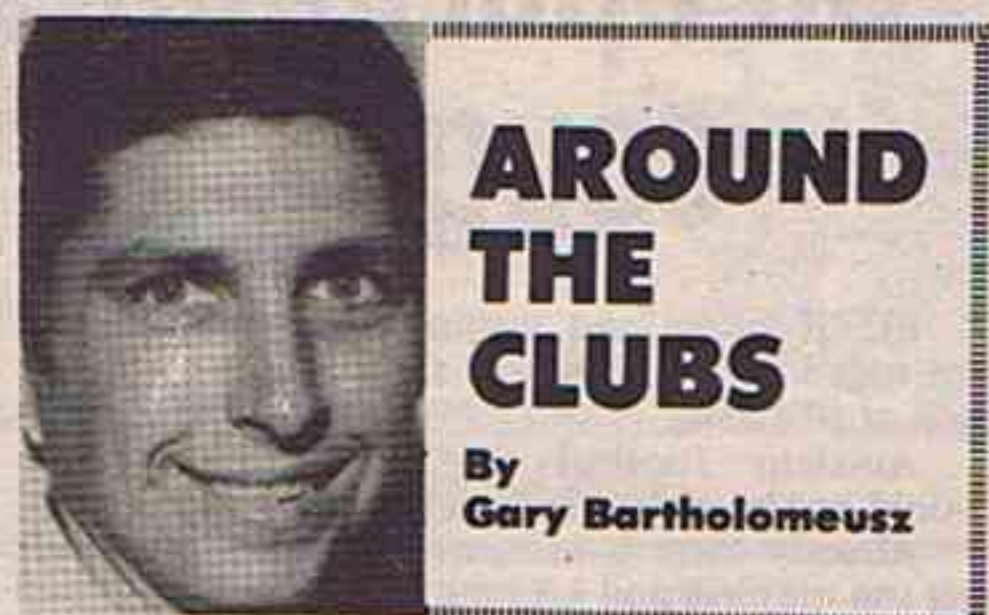
SORRY I ASKED

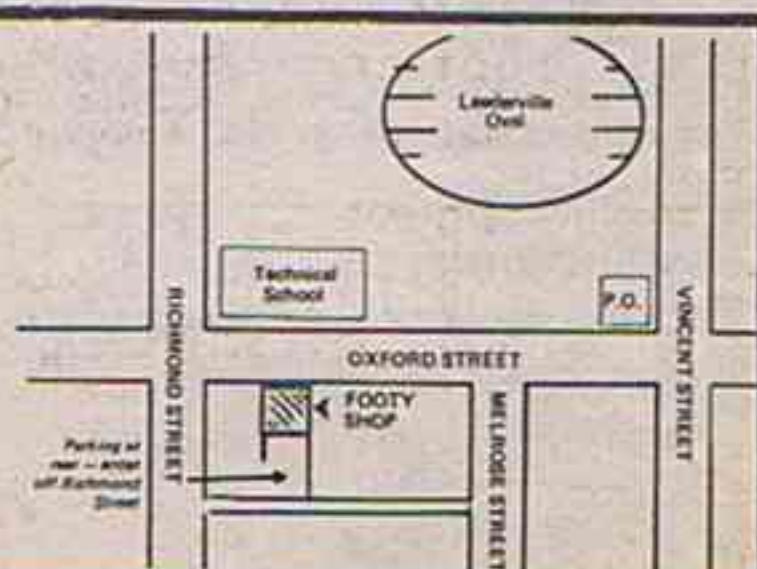

The danger 'season' for coaches

"WHEN a coach is hired he is also fired, only the date hasn't been fixed" — that is a quote that should be printed on all coaching contracts.

As we have seasons for other activities — such as ducks, crayfish, prawning, etc — round two in the WAFL fixtures opens up the "coaching season".

The criteria for opening "coaching season" is the performance of the league team during round one.

Pre-season, club officials heap praise on the coach using familiar quotes like — "the coach has done a great job," or "we are sure of a big season" or "everyone is behind him, we are a united club".

But the season starts; games are lost; pressure goes on administrators — and they unofficially open "coaching season" with behind closed doors meetings.

From discreet comments rumours develop.

Club administrators then have to quell the rumours and issue statements to the press like — "the whole board is totally behind our new coach" when probably the best statement would be "the club has re-appointed the coach for another season".

Strong statements that need personal strength of character by boards are few and far between.

The players sense the divided support within the club, take sides, bring up personal grievances and so the club "rots" in its own predicament.

But even when they do come, they don't always mean much — as per example with Subiaco this week. The club came out in support of Peter Daniel, but he decided to resign anyway.

Football followers often want to know how their club is going, so here are my brief comments on the "coaching season" just opened:

GRAHAM MOSS (Claremont): *Has survived many close shaves over previous seasons and has developed an immunity to the "sack" — a great team.*

MAL BROWN (South Fremantle): *Lost some feathers last season, but has bred well and now has the numbers for success in '83.*

JOHN TODD (Swan Districts): *A prolific season last year eradicated the hunters who nearly had him. Now has breathing space but can't lose too many games; people forget quickly!*

DENNIS COMETTI (West Perth): *The new coach in town last year with strong support from the media. Has made several controversial moves, feathers becoming ruffled within.*

GREG BREHAUT (East Perth): *After a slow start is making ground, has to survive for the board's sake.*

RON ALEXANDER (East Fremantle): *Was being shot at from all sides, but recently changed course for the better; is an endangered species.*

PETER DANIEL (Subiaco): *Another new species in the WAFL; escaped the hunters for a while, but finally opted out while he still had his skin.*

IAN MILLER (Perth): *A definite endangered species, needs to be added to the world heritage society.*

What a strong move, something that most Western Australian clubs never do.

THE 1983 Teal Cup carnival has ended in Darwin with Western Australia finishing a creditable second.

Having been involved with the coach Eddie Pitter I cannot speak highly enough of the effort he put into this carnival.

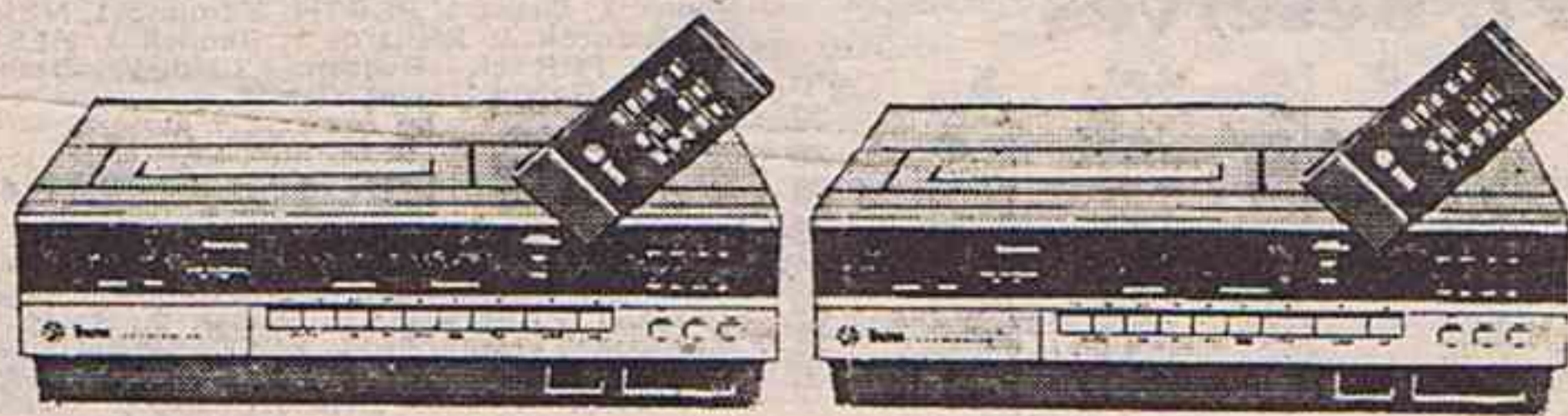
He has worked tirelessly since pre-season, communicating with every colts coach, attending clubs' training, searching the country zones and selecting the best under-17 players in the State.

These boys beat the Northern Territory and Queensland easily and were six goals in front of Victoria at half time. At three quarter time their lead had been pegged back to just one goal and they finally lost by six goals. When you consider the number of boys Victoria had to choose from it is a great shot in the arm for WA and coach Pitter's efforts.

I was involved in influencing Eddie to begin coaching and worked with him for 10 years in this capacity. He has those qualities of loyalty, dedication and total commitment that make him one of the best junior coaches in the land. East Perth's success has been a direct result of the hours of work put into the juniors by Eddie. He wasn't required by the East Perth club this year, but I am sure one WA club will have him developing their juniors in season 1984. His record speaks for itself!

I award him this week's dinner for two at The Vegas Hotel for his fine work with juniors.

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
