He has already used the strategy of talking about a "media ambush" before the State game.

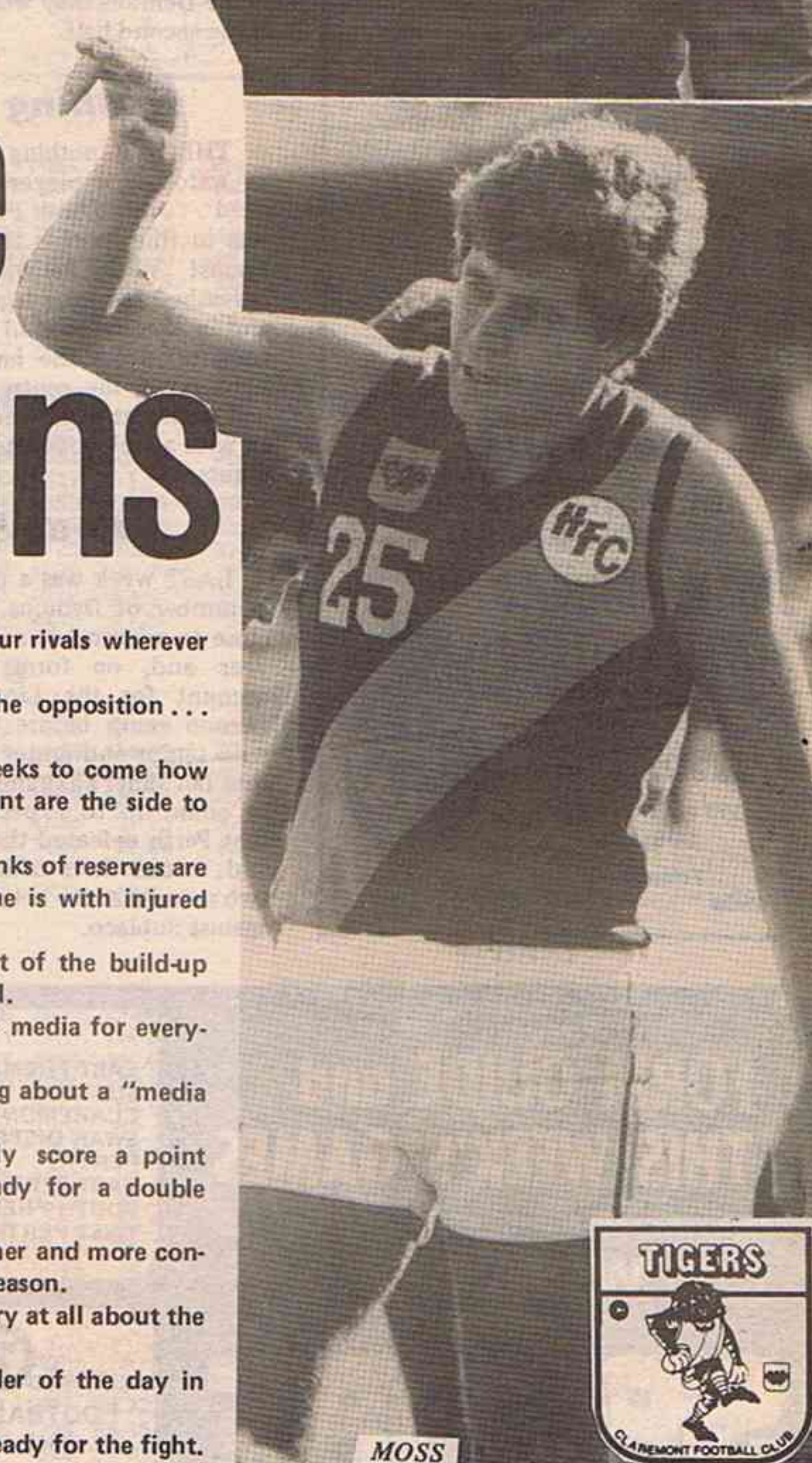
He will use it again if he can possibly score a point in the psychological stakes as he gets ready for a double premiership at Bassendean.

# OUR MEN OF STEEL

## ...Tough men over the years

Men of steel have been part of our Australian Rules game since its inception.

In today's football, we have Ron Boucher, a King Kong replica who tries occasionally to massage one's larynx; John Duckworth, who spreadeagles packs; the Mallee-bull charge of Stephen Michael; Stan Magro — a running time-bomb built like a cannonball on two legs; and, of course, the "Great White" himself, Ron Alexander, who is an expert in delivering tough bumps.

It is interesting to compare these players with those of the past 20 years or so.

When it comes to tough men, Norm Rogers was made of corrugated iron.

Before Derby clashes, Norm would sit in a corner of the dressing room muttering to himself "I hate this mob". Trainers would offer him chewies, a rub down — anything, but Norm would never hear them. He just kept on grunting and growling.

One day, in 1964 at Fremantle Oval, he ran through poor old Ray Sorrell, who was then playing with South.

Norm and Ray were good friends, but I reckon that Norm just saw red and white and collected Ray. Norm got reported and it could have cost him a Sandover Medal as he finished a close fourth that year behind Barry Cable, Mal Whinnen and Derek Chadwick.

### TRAINING

One night at training, when Norm Rogers was coach, I thought I was kicking and handling the ball pretty well.

Norm, however, ran past me and gave me a clout under the ear. I retaliated verbally asking what I had done wrong.

He replied, ultra coolly: "It happens in a game". What could I do, I just went on training with my left ear looking like a baseball glove!

In 1965, an East Fremantle premiership year, the league-side had just won the first semi-final. I was watching them eight days later (Sunday) playing a practice match among themselves.

Lo and behold, Norm got into a fight with Fred Lewis. The coach, big Bob Johnson, stepped in to cool frayed tempers — he wanted a fit Fred Lewis for the preliminary final and I think Fred found the final a lot easier!!

Another tough player was Fred Castledine, of Swan Districts — he was so tough I reckon he ate nails for breakfast!

In my second league game, I was perched under a "hospital kick", the

proverbial "widow-maker". Fred was zeroing in and I thought all the lights were going out in Georgia.

Fortunately, he mis-timed his run, tripped over my heel, fell to the ground was carried off on a stretcher with a back injury. They escorted him off past the East Fremantle members' stand where he was jeered and heckled. In those days Fred was as popular with East Fremantle supporters as the Archbishop of Canterbury is in County Cork.

I wasn't so lucky a couple of years later against Tony Nesbit. He hit me fairly and squarely with a shirt-front so hard that I thought I'd been hit with a Howitzer.

### BRUISERS

East Perth had a couple of bruisers. Mal Atwell, later to go to Perth, was an extirpator extraordinaire.

He was not backward in dishing it out to the Vics either. In the early sixties, on the M.C.G. he flattened Doug Wade sending the former Geelong and Victorian star full-forward into a state of semi-comatosis.

For the rest of the game he had a running battle with Ted Whitten, as the latter tried to even the score. Mal taught Perth to win premierships too.

Then there was John K. Watts and Ray Giblett. Wattsie was a great full back, but could "play the ball with ears on it" if necessary.

Giblett was downright mean. He had a simple licence. . . April to September was hunting season on forward pocket rovers. He did everything except wrap them around the point posts.

Bradley Smith could handle himself well also.

In the 1969 second semi final between West Perth and East Perth, West Perth won the fights, bumps and the match.

However, the best "cruncher" I've ever seen was when Smith hit West Perth's Bryan Pleitner. It was a "bone-cruncher" that makes you contemplate taking up croquet at a later date! The timing was perfect; Pleitner was unprotected as he had just delivered the ball.

This column wouldn't be complete without a mention of the brothers Regan.

### TOUGH

One day, up at Bassendean, Mike had a Swans player by the "credentials" in front of the McDonald Stand. It caused the ladies to shriek in horror — and Mike's words to the Swans player were "your move"!

Con Regan was clean, but tough. It didn't matter if you had won a Sandover Medal or had a great reputation . . . he would beat you anyway. East Fremantle were never weak when the Regans, Harry, Con and Michael, played for them.

But then there is the other side of "tough" and that is courage.

Haydn Bunton, of Swan Districts and Subiaco, must head the list here. A lot of veterans, the rugged ones, felt that if you went out to injure Bunton, you were liable to end up hurt yourself.

Many times he was hit, but never retaliated or even looked to see who was the aggressor. In one game he played with a practically broken ankle and was once seen training four days after an appendix operation.

Everyone remembers August 31, 1968 the day Subiaco defeated East Fremantle and Austin Robertson kicked 14.11 out of a Subi total of 19.14.

"Okker" broke Bernie Naylor's record that day and I had the dubious honour of playing in that game.

What is not well known is that in the first half Bunton received a kick high up in the groin region

A normal player would have gone off, but Bunton had the club doctor come out, put stitches in his testicles, and played out the match. I was agog!

Bunton never asked any quarter. He left Swan Districts in 1964 and returned to WA to play for Subiaco in 1968. In the first East Fremantle/Subiaco clash of that year Norm Rogers ran past him and

gave him "one to go on with". Bunton just laughed and said "Normie. . . I see you haven't changed".

Two of my favourite footballers when I was a kid were Jack Clarke and "Trizzie" Lawrence. Both had courage.

"Stork" played in the famous carnival in Brisbane in 1961. In the match against Victoria he had four stitches inserted in his head at half-time and continued to play.

The result . . . W.A. won the game, the Championship and Clarke won his fourth All-Australian Blazer, was runner-up in the Tassie Medal and was appointed vice-captain of the All-Australian side.

Trizzie won many games for the blue and whites. Close team-mates used to call him "the bait" because he would deliberately go out and antagonize the opposition and goad them into playing the man and not the ball.

It is fitting to end on a legend in Wilson Onions.

He was rough, tough and willing and had a posterior on him about the size of the Oriana. This famous incident happened at Leederville Oval one day, the necropolis of the East Fremantle team in those days.

East's were being thrashed this day and Wilson came on as 20th man. He was released from the reserves bench and went chasing across the field like a rhino through the bush, — he cannoned into Trevor Schofield, the West Perth rover, and laid him flat. Wilson was "interviewed" by one or two West Perth players and the wooden grandstand at Leederville was raucous with booing and stamping of feet.

There you have an assortment of boys, a rogues gallery if you like.

I guess the ones who you like, played for your side and the hated ones were the opposition.

## THE PRESS BOX AT FREMANTLE OVAL

When a member of the media goes to a football match he finds the hospitality good at all venues.

The conditions, too, are good except for one — the infamous Press Box at Fremantle Oval. At best, it can be described as a pre-historic relic.

It has two major disadvantages. Firstly, it is situated a good drop-kick from the arena, and secondly its interior is absolutely grotesque.

To get to the broadcasting box one has to negotiate an almost perpendicular ladder. It's like trying to climb up a conning tower of a submarine!

Then one plugs in. The box itself is about ten metres wide but everyone has to plug in in the same area. There are wires all over the place.

If it rains you are in real strife. One day I had rain sprinkling all over my post-match notes. I thought that I would have to write my summary in water colour painting — not bad if I was Rembrandt or Rubens!!

Chris Mitsopoulos told me one day that he accidentally pulled the cord on 6PR's Oscar Howard, when he was packing up his gear. One minute Oscar was on air "live", next minute his voice was "filtering into oblivion"! Such is the chaos there.

One shouldn't criticise without offering a suggestion. The Council can either put the Press Box on the back of a truck and escort it to the Fremantle Museums, or zap a stick of gelnite under it, blow it up, and use the remains as firewood and for toothpicks!

Let's face it. One day someone is going to kick the ball out of bounds on the full, hit the Press Box, and the whole "super-structure" is going to cascade to ground level!

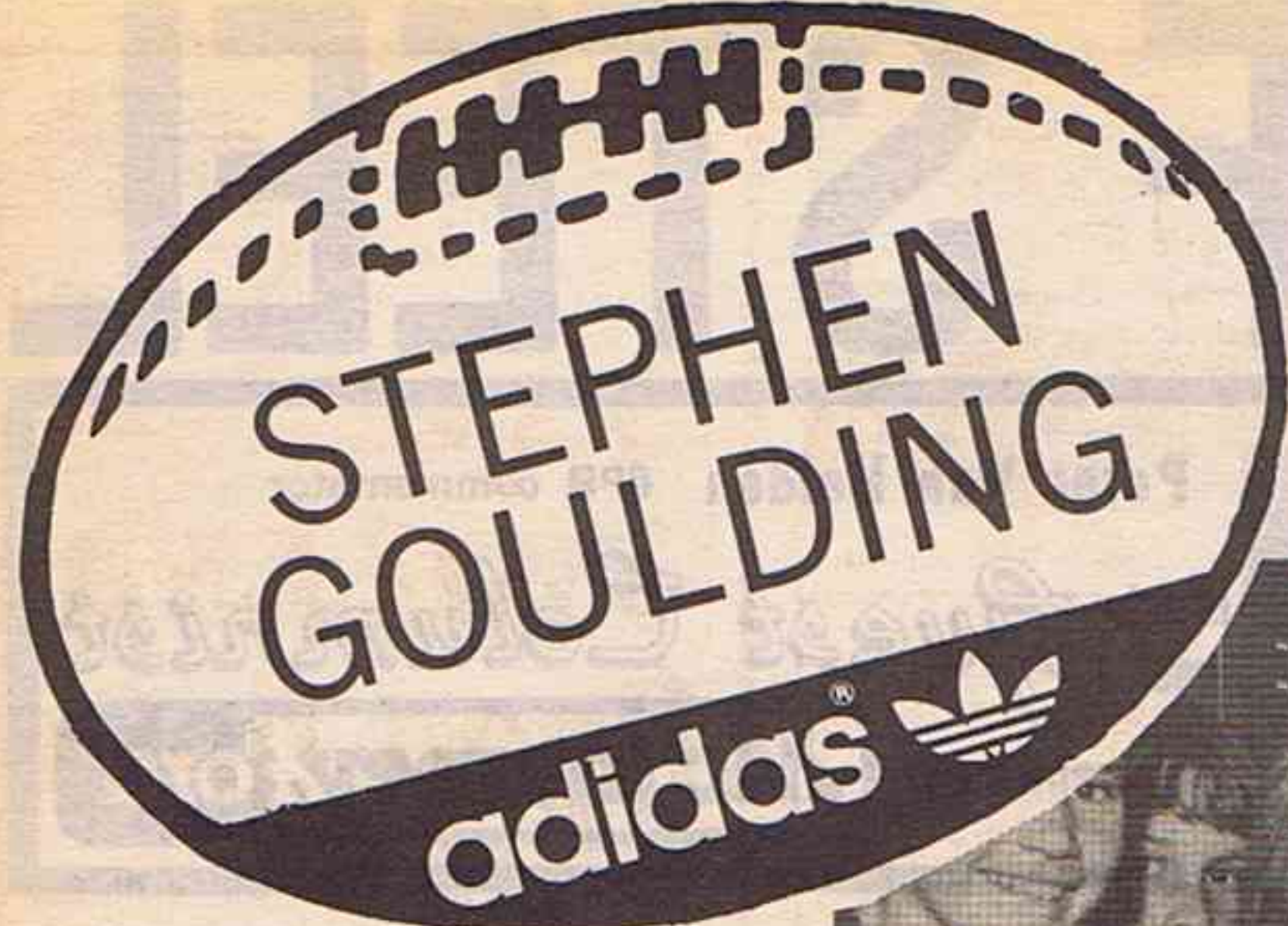
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# ...Tasmanian Tiger fits into new lair

WHEN Claremont recruited Stephen Goulding from North Melbourne at the start of last season few people would have realised the influence he was about to have on football in this State.

He had played only five games with the Kangaroos before heading west and no one thought the Tigers had won the race for a star.

But he has quickly made a name for himself in WA as one of the tightest, but hard working ruck rovers in the game.

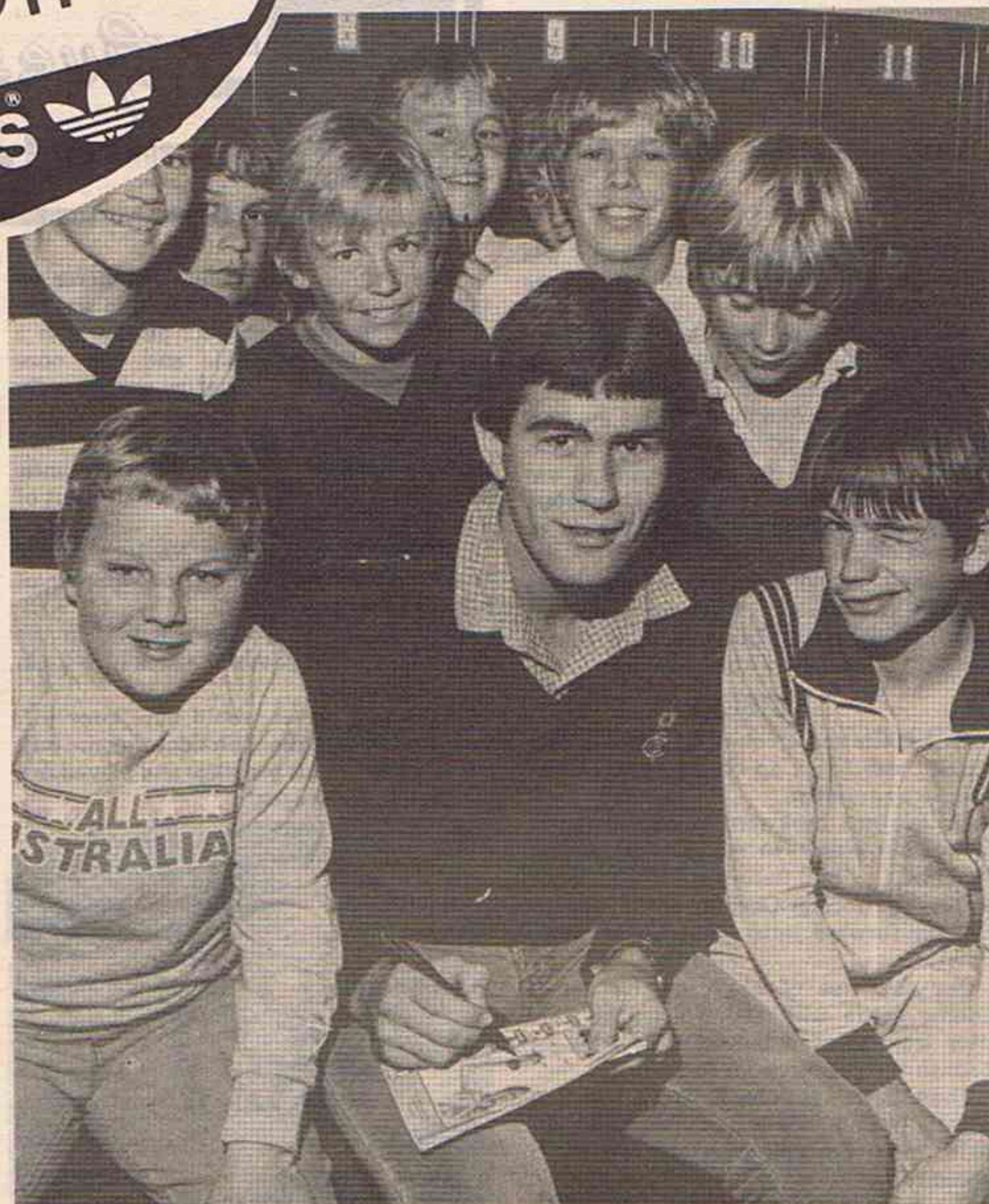
Goulding hit peak form for the Tigers mid-way through last season and from then on he has not looked back and he was rewarded for his efforts when he made his interstate debut for WA against South Australia earlier this year.

However, that was not Goulding's first taste of interstate football.

Originally from Tasmania he represented his home State three times -- the first when he was just 18.

Goulding is a key player in Claremont's quest for the premiership and if he can maintain his consistent form the Tigers will be given every opportunity.

He picks up kicks in an unobtrusive manner and Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to the star Tiger and found out more about his Tasmanian and Victorian achievements on the football arena.

**Q. What made you come to WA after you had played league football in Victoria?**

A. Basically I came to WA because there was a shortage of opportunities at North Melbourne in the positions I wanted to play. I couldn't see myself getting a game so I thought I would come here. I got a couple of games in a row and then I injured myself at training. I ran into a trainer's bench. It happened during circle work and I was out for about three weeks and couldn't get back in towards the end of the year and that was that.

**Q. Who was your coach at North Melbourne?**

A. I played under three senior coaches at North -- Ron Barassi, Malcolm Blight and Barry Cable. I had three coaches in two years and also had Ray Jordan and Colin Kinnear in the reserves.

**Q. How would you compare the styles of football in the three States?**

A. It just varies in stages of professionalism really. Tassie would be on the bottom of the scale, while WA would be close to the Victorians. But the Victorians are so professional. In comparison Tassie was more social football.

**Q. How have you found playing and not working. A lot of people believe in the theory: active mind -- active body?**

A. I believe it has worked in the reverse for me, because I am having my best season ever. To me, I have found it easier because I have more time to think about football and prepare myself for a game.

**Q. Would that competition be on the same level as the South West competition here?**

A. I wouldn't really know because the only football I have seen has been here in Perth since I have been in WA.

**Q. How are you enjoying your football at Claremont?**

A. It has been really good. It took a while for me to settle in because it was a new club, new coaches and new players. Also it was only late last season, probably towards the end of the second round, that they played me as a ruck rover. That and the centre are my favourite spots and Blacky (Wayne Blackwell) and Stav (Steve Malaxos) have had the centre tied down so ruck roving has been the goal.

**Q. Was that the position you were aiming at with North Melbourne?**

A. I preferred to play there, but at North they had the Krakouer boys coming across, they had Wayne Schimmelbusch as a ruck rover and Peter Spencer was there at the time. There were a lot of those sort of players and Bruce Abernethy was coming across so I just couldn't see myself getting a game ahead of them.

**Q. You must have been fairly happy to score a State berth this year?**

A. Yes, well my form has been pretty good. I have been happy with the way things have gone. It has probably been the most consistent year that I have had. It would be the highlight of my career so far. I would put it on a par with playing my first game with North Melbourne. I was nervous that day. At North a lot of players in the side were fairly experienced. Blokes like David Dench, Schimmelbusch and Keith Greig. You could run through about 95 percent of the side and they were all experienced. They were good before the game. Of course at North you knew pretty early in the week whether you were going to play or not and they were good on the day. Naturally I was nervous and it was the same when I played my first game here.

**Q. You have virtually been ruck roving backward of the centre with Claremont, haven't you?**

A. It is not so much that, but I like to get down to the backline and help get the ball out of there. I reckon that is part of the ruck rovers' job. You have to cover as much ground as possible. You can't really attack because you have got your forwards down there and you should hang around the half forward line and backwards of that position.

**Q. What sort of role did you play in Tasmania?**

A. I spent most of my time as a ruck rover.

**Q. When you came across from Melbourne did you leave a job to come here?**

A. No, I got a transfer across in the bank. But I just wasn't happy in my work here and with my wife working and football helping to support me, I decided to resign and look for something I would enjoy more. I gave it away in January and

I still haven't found anything, although I would like to do some sales rep work.

**Q. Did you win any awards over there?**

A. I won a media award. It was like the West Australian over here, it was their major paper and I won that on a count-back. I played under Peter Daniel over there for two years and in that time he won two premierships. I thought he was quite a good coach and he was unlucky with the way things worked out over here. Considering all the players came out in public and said it was their fault, I think he was unlucky to have been asked to resign.

**Q. What about the demise of Tasmania as a force in interstate football. They always used to be competitive, yet they are now being beaten by Victorian clubs in Stirling Cup matches?**

A. A few years ago they had three leagues and they were playing against each other in competitions. The Tassie leagues are separated by only a couple of hundred kilometres, but they still didn't play each other a lot. When they did, and that was mainly pre-season, they had a competition for the best league in the State and they also used to pick the State side from the best players in those competitions. When I left they picked it just from the players in the Hobart competition. Then a lot of players from the North and North West Leagues went down to Hobart and that made them bigger and stronger and ones up north weaker. Then, of course a lot of players left, knowing they wouldn't get a game they went to South Australia and Queensland.

**Q. Did you play State football for Tasmania?**

A. Yes, I played three games. I played my first game when I was 18 and we played against Victoria. It was great except that I lined up against Bernie Quinlan in the centre. That was at a time when he could run like the wind, kick the ball with both feet and take a big mark.

**Q. By having three major leagues in a State the size of Tasmania, do you think that has hampered their development as a major football State?**

A. The situation over there was that the Hobart league was supposedly the strongest in the State for a few years and although the other leagues suggested playing in one competition the Hobart teams refused. Then it was suggested that a few top clubs from each league play in a division and the weaker ones play in another division, but Hobart also knocked that on the head. I think they could see themselves being knocked off their pedestal.

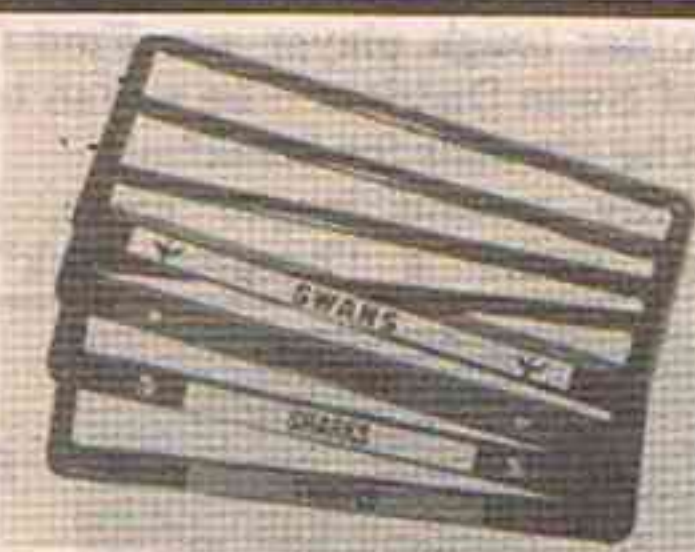
**Q. Wouldn't that mean that the blokes up the north of the State were denied the opportunity to represent their State?**

A. Yes they were. But they have reverted back to the old system now, although I had a look at a side a few weeks ago and about 90 per cent of the players were from Hobart.

THE battle for the vital second spot on the premiership table will remain a two-way struggle after this week's set of fixtures.

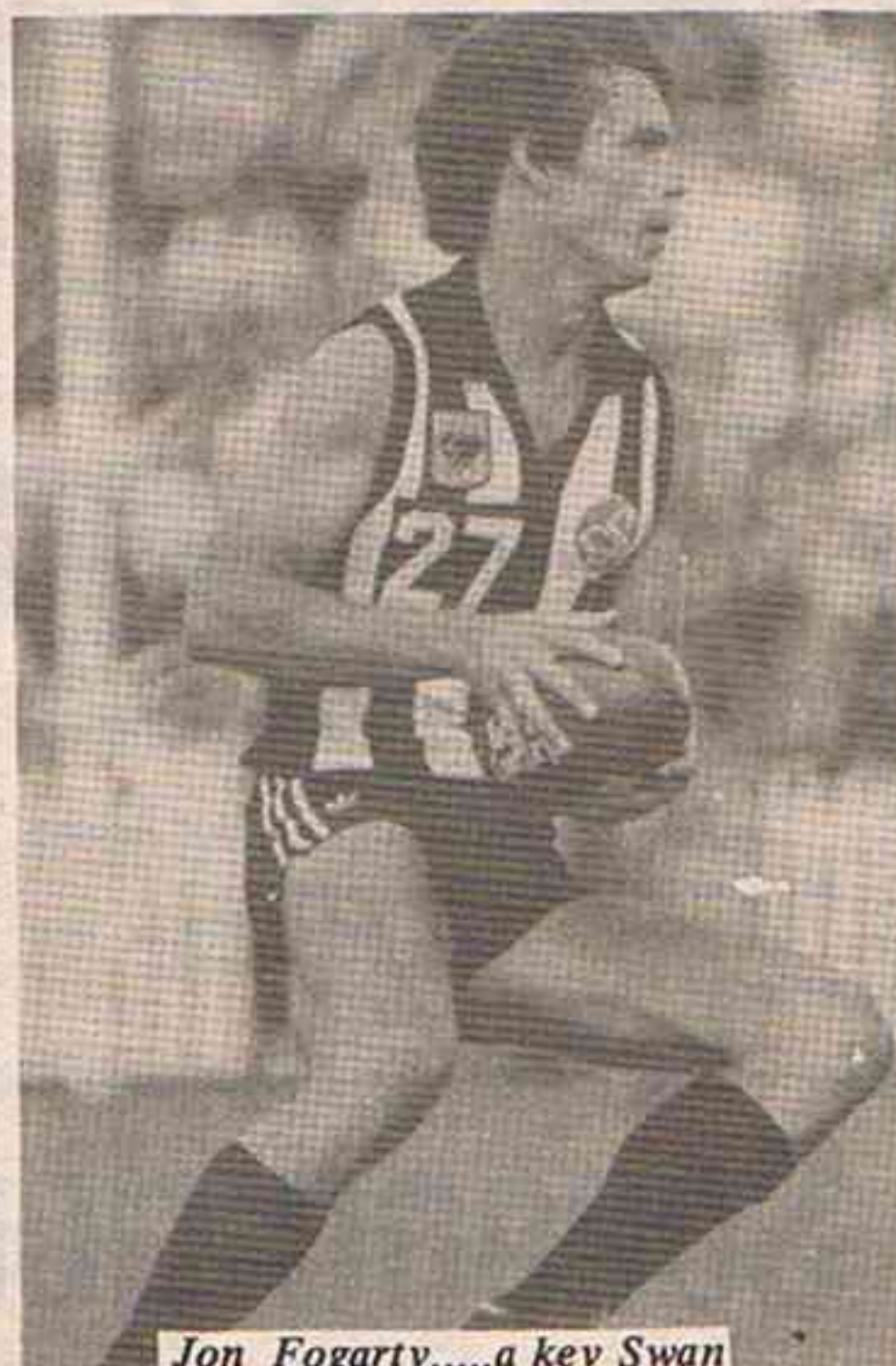
Claremont and Swan Districts should both win their matches. The Tigers come up against East Perth and they will be keen to avenge their second series defeat at the hands of the Royals.

Like his brother Ian, the present Geelong captain, Bruce showed an immediate liking for the pressures of league football and won the Cats' best first year player award.

He followed this up with best and fairest awards in 1973-74 and runner-up in 1978.

His strength has been the ability to break-up the game by getting on his own to create the loose man.

He has played eight finals matches and has a career tally of 77 goals.

His consistent form has also been rewarded with 12 appearances for Victoria.

Bruce and brother Ian hold the record for the total number of VFL games played by brothers.

Their total now stands at 568 with Ian's games tally at 319.

Kevin Smith first joined the VFL in 1968 and has been one of the most successful umpires of recent times. (However, after his efforts in Perth last week, some Sandgropers don't agree.)

He has umpired three VFL Grand Finals including the 1975 premiership match between North Melbourne and Hawthorn.

That was the last grand final in which only one field umpire was in control.

He umpired the following year's grand final with Bill Dellar and teamed with Dellar again 1979.

Smith has also umpired 16 minor VFL finals matches.

Last Tuesday's match between Victoria and Western Australia was his fifth interstate match.

# Second double header for Adelaide

The South Australian National Football League has decided to hold its second double header fixture for the season.

The decision comes after the successful experiment of playing two league matches at the same ground on the same day earlier this season.

More people turned out to see those matches than would normally have gone and now the league is going to hold another double header.

On Sunday, August 21 the West Adelaide-Woodville game will be rescheduled as the first game at Football Park ahead of the Port Adelaide-Norwood clash.

However, some critics in Adelaide believe it will be a flop the second time around, saying that the only reason people went to the first double header was that it was a new concept.

### Attendances down

Attendances at South Australian football have dropped this season.

About 7,500 people less than last year



have been to the football in the 1983 season. At this stage last year 562,272 had poured through the turnstiles compared to 554,861 to the same period this season.

### Working Warriors

Woodville have had a long hard struggle to become competitive on the field and now that they are improving they are looking at matching it with the other clubs off the field.

However, it causes some concern when discussions as to the best SA coach in history are brought up and the answer is given as Barry Goodingham because he coached the Warriors into the five in 1979.

# AUST. SERIES A JOKE

DESPITE WA's great win, the Australian championship series was a bit of a joke.

For a start the Tassie Medal should never have been awarded.

Some players had a big advantage over others for this prestigious medal.

It was judged over the two games each State played. Yet, some players were only entitled to play in one of those games.

Take WA for instance. Because none of the State's VFL contingent played against SA, they were able to poll votes in only one match.

The award should never have been given or there should have been a weighted system to give players able to play in only one game an even chance of winning the medal.

### WROUGHT

The selection of the All-Australian team was also a bit of a wrought.

West Australians are entitled to ask just who won the title.

Our representation in the All-Australian side was not commensurate with our winning performance.

Victoria and SA finished with seven representatives to WA's six.

It could be argued that WA didn't fare too badly as they finished up with the captain (Stephen Michael) and coach (John Todd). But that was perfunctory.

If WA hadn't snuck home against the Vics then the captain and coach would probably have been South Australians.

### SELECTION

It seems the selectors ignored WA's performance against SA by the Victoria-SA game in selecting the All-Australian team.

And while on awards, Gary Buckenara must wonder what he has to do to attract votes for the Simpson medal.

He has clearly been the best man on the ground in two interstate matches, yet overlooked in the voting.

He should have collected three Simpson medals by now.

All that aside, WA can wear the title of top dogs of Australian football proudly.

I doubt anyone would be foolish enough to think that WA is Australia's premier football state because we won the title.

But it did show that this State produces Australia's best footballers.

For too long Victoria was able to have an unfair advantage against the other States. They not only pinched the best players from other States, but also used some of those stars against their former State.

No wonder Victoria were virtually unbeatable in interstate games before the State-of-Origin concept.

That concept has breathed new life into interstate football.

### TOP PERCH

But WA needs to be on its guard against the VFL taking steps to arrest a situation that has knocked them from the top perch in interstate football.

The Vics are likely to try and enforce tighter restraints on the number of players allowed to be used by their home State or change the rule in an effort to restore their prestige.

Victorians may not be very interested in interstate football, but it's quite obvious supporters in SA and WA are.

Victorians aren't likely to dwell much on their loss at this year's championship. They have always put club football first.

Because they entice the best footballers in Australia to Victoria, their game is in a healthy state.

WA's win (and the way the match against Victoria was supported) has given the game a much-needed shot in the arm in this State.

The win has drawn the kind of attention usually reserved for a grand final.

In other words it has been a great advertisement for the game at a time it could do with a lift, particularly with the finals quickly closing in.

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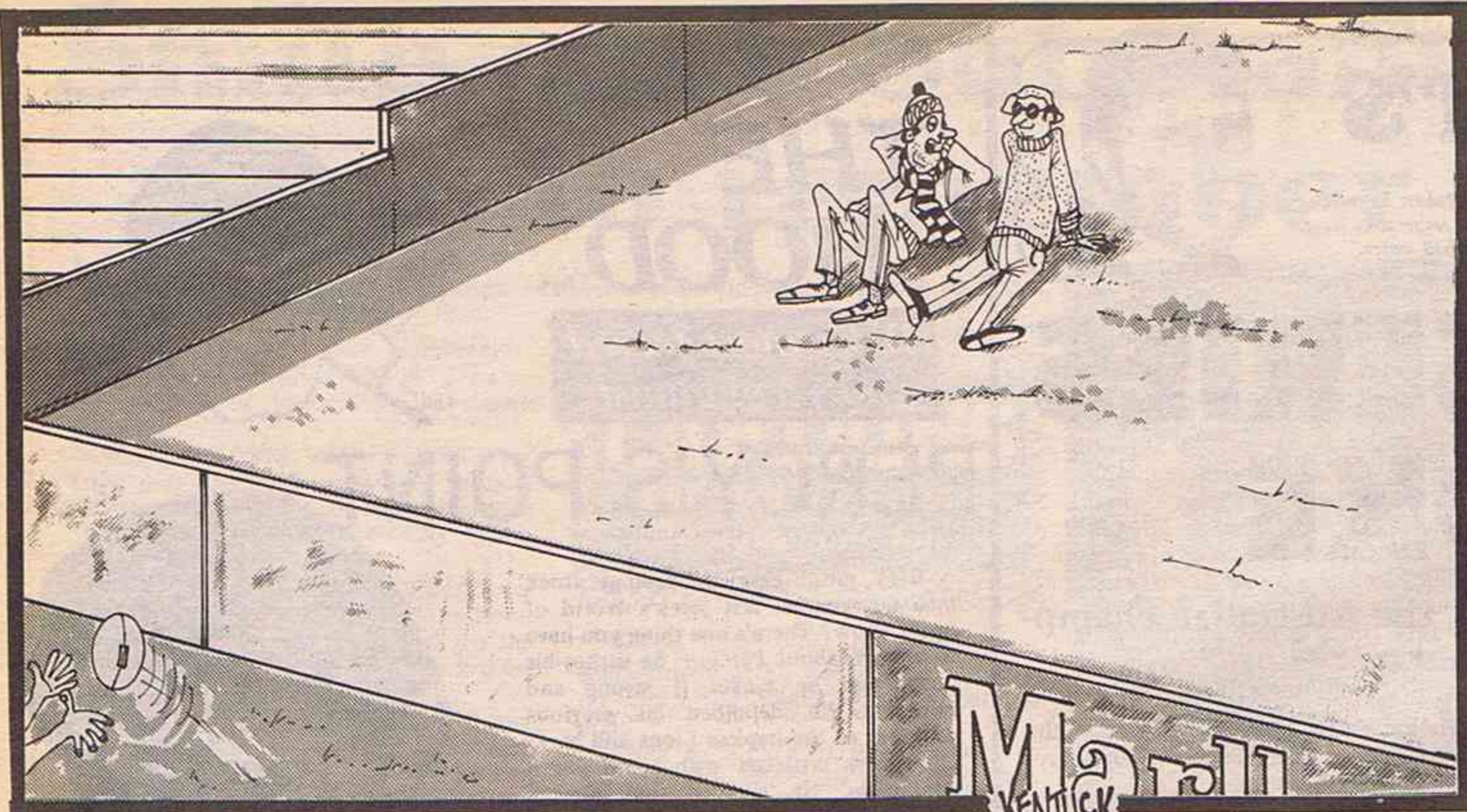

# ANOTHER 'FIRST' FOR TAYLOR

EAST Fremantle's Kevin Taylor, the first rover in Australian league football to kick 100 goals in a season, has come up with another first.

In 1979 Taylor kicked 86 goals in qualifying rounds and a further 16 in the finals. And now he is the first Prendergast Medallist (fairest and best in the reserves) to be chosen in an All-Australian team. He won the medal in 1978.



### Free kicks

The official number of free kicks awarded in a game has always been a debatable point and when looking for the record highest I found this. In 1929, when Melbourne played South Melbourne, they received 70 free kicks and their opponents picked up 88. The umpire's name was Devine.

### Ton tallies

With Warren Ralph racing towards the 100 goal mark it's hard to imagine that in this era of modern day high scoring football only one player can register the ton.

Forty six years ago, in 1937, five players posted triple figure tallies. They were George Doig (East Fremantle) 144, Ted Tyson (West Perth) 124, Frank Hopkins (Claremont) 120, Bert Cook (Perth) 115 and Ted Holdsworth (Swan Districts) 109. The first of the this five to reach the mark was Holdsworth who was injured soon afterwards.

### Top two

Still on goalkicking, I wonder how many readers are aware that two West Australians went to Victoria and headed their club's goal kicking list for four successive years. At Fitzroy former Swan Districts player Bob Beecroft topped their list from 1977-1980 and former Subiaco star George Young was St Kilda's main scorer from 1975 to 1978. St Kilda's leading goal scorer in 1974 was Bruce Duperouzel and in 1979 Garry Sidebottom.

### Umpires crisis

Umpires, it seems, have been "copping" it ever since football began, but it is doubtful that the 1921 season's criticism was rivalled.

After allegations from clubs saying they were murdered every Saturday by crook decisions and that the umpires were too old the league delegates called for new umpires mid-way through the season. This included the goal umpires. Ironically the new umpires tried out were not successful and the season finished with the original panel, with one exception. Top umpire Ivo Crapp was talked out of retirement.

### Great finishes

Western Australia has only beaten Victoria in five of the 22 games contested between the two States in carnivals. Their winning margins indicate heart stopping finishes. In 1921 we won by five points, in 1947 by four points (WA still lost the carnival on percentage), in 1961 the margin was nine points, in 1979 it was 15 points and last week WA snuck in by three points. In eight of the 17 games won by Victoria the margin was less than three goals.

# DOCTOR FOOTBALL

LAST week I discussed the on field management of the severely injured footballer that may either be unconscious or suffering from suspected neck or spinal injury.

This week I will deal with the on field management of the less severely injured player.

A systematic approach to assessment is to remember the key words:

Ask: Look: Feel and Move.

On reaching the player, the head trainer should first ASK certain questions, because in 90% of cases, the history gives the clue as to what the injury sustained is.

*How did it happen?* — for example he may say "I landed on my hand heavily" and this may make one suspect injury to the collar bone or the wrist, etc. He may say that his foot got caught and his knee twisted, which may then make you suspect internal injury to the knee.

Another question that may be asked is:

*What did you feel?* — for example, the player may have felt as "if a golf ball hit him behind the calf" or "I felt as if I got kicked there, but I couldn't

have because there was no one around", which may give you a hint that you are dealing with a torn muscle or tendon.

Ask if any snapping noises were heard — again this may favour tearing of muscle or tendon.

Ask where does it hurt so that the injury can be localized.

Having asked such questions, then LOOK and compare the injured side with the noninjured side.

For example, what is the posture and shape of the injured limb in comparison to the normal one? Is there any discoloration? Is there any swelling or any obvious deformity?

This may give the clue as to whether you are dealing with an abrasion, laceration, severe bruise or a fracture.

Having asked questions and observed as thoroughly as you can, then you attempt to feel the site of the injury gently.

While feeling the injured site note if there are any lumps. Is there any unstable deformity? How much tenderness is there? Does the area feel hot?

All the time your mind is thinking, are we dealing here with bruising, muscle tear, or possible fracture?

## CONTINUING MANAGEMENT OF INJURIES ON THE FIELD.

A lump could mean muscle spasm or fracture, or acute bleeding into the soft tissues.

Severe deformity usually means fracture; if it feels hot, this usually indicates that there has been acute bleeding.

Throughout the assessment try and avoid panic.

This is probably the most important single thing to remember. Composed accurate assessment often saves a player with premature removal from the oval. Or, on the other hand, it may prevent him from continuing to take part with an injury that could be seriously worsened if he was not to leave the playing arena.

Don't feel rushed into making hasty decisions by an excited umpire or team mate.

Now to the final part of the assessment — TEST MOVEMENT.

Movement should be tested actively by the player himself. He has to demonstrate his ability to move all limbs on his own effort. If the player cannot move a particular part of his body, eg. a limb; gently try and move it yourself in order to discover what may be limiting the movement.

If passive movement by a trainer increases pain and disability, the player should be carried from the field to the sideline where more thorough examination by the club doctor can quickly resolve the problem.

In Australian Rules football, trainers should always endeavour to bring the player off the field through the interchange markings, because if the injury is not severe, the player can then return to the playing field once he has recovered sufficiently.

Once he steps over the boundary line, other than through the interchange markings, he is no longer eligible to go back onto the arena, and if he does so the club may face penalty such as an \$800 fine.

If it is obvious that the player has sustained a severe head and neck injury, and will not participate in the game any further, then of course the route that is most expedient to bring the player back to the medical room is used.

After testing movement you decide the player can actively move the limb and the trainer can passively move the limb and there does not appear to be too much disability; then the player is encouraged to stand.

Having stood up he then walks; he then tries to run; he then attempts a jump, and a kicking action. If he feels confident, he is then told to play on.

Thus, in summary: the trainer or other persons responsible for making the initial assessment should —

- (1) remain calm and not panic
- (2) assess carefully the situation and ask questions
- (3) should look first before touching
- (4) gently feel the injured part
- (5) finally movement is tested — firstly by the injured player, and then by the trainer.

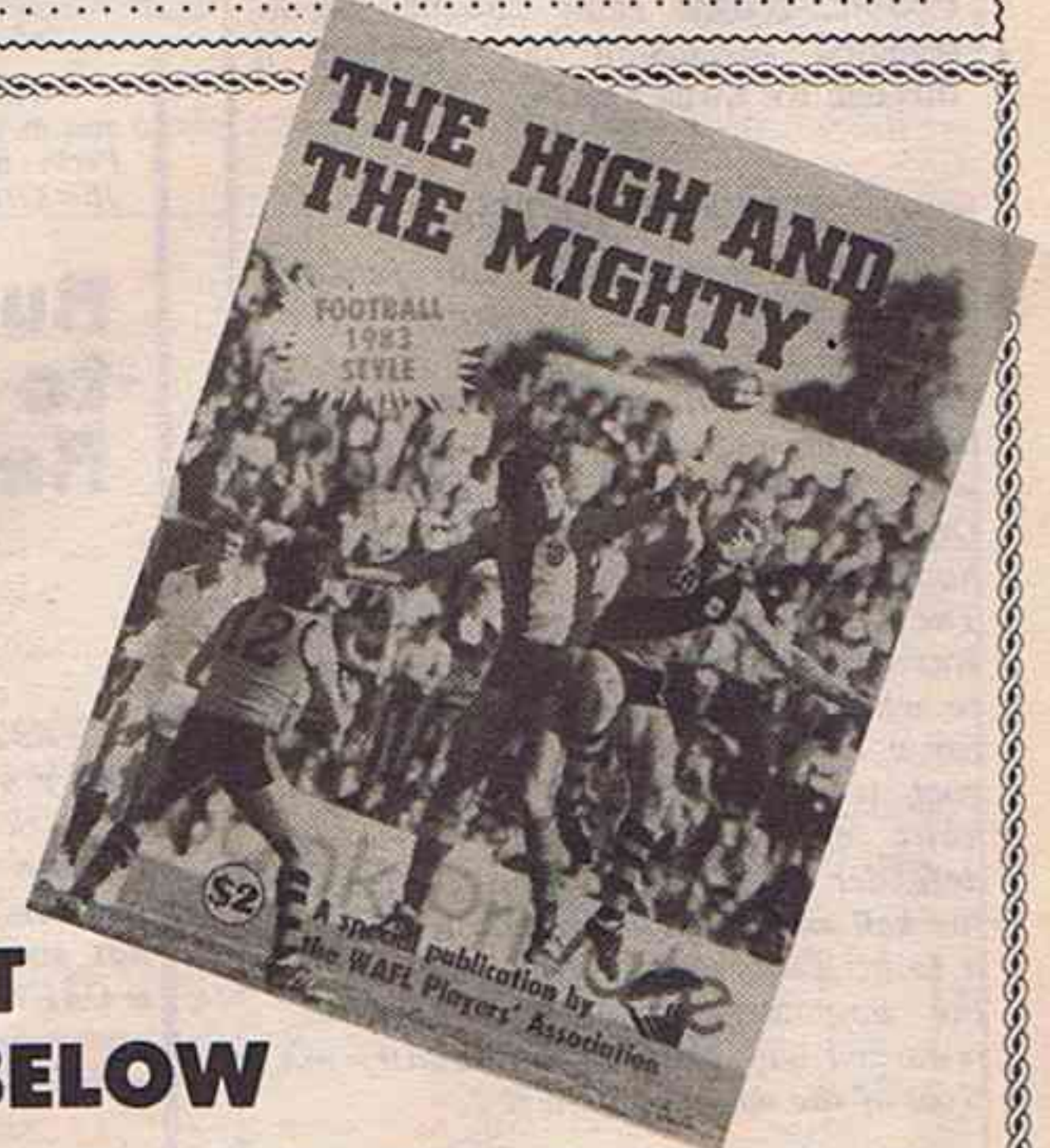

## Our 125th birthday

Australian Football this year celebrates its 125th anniversary. The game has evolved from the simplest beginnings of a match played by any number of people on a "paddock" half a mile long to a highly tuned athletic skill watched and played by millions.

How could the game's accepted founder, Thomas Wills have conceived that more than 100,000 people would watch that one game of the year on the last Saturday in September.

Or that 6 million people in a country thousands of kilometres away across the Pacific Ocean would fervently watch the game each week on television.

According to Federal Government statistics, Australian Football is now the country's most popular sport.

## How it all started...

The origins of Australian Rules Football date from a letter to the sporting publication, Bell's Life of Victoria on July 10, 1858, in which Thomas Wentworth Wills advocated a game of football in winter to keep cricketers fit during the off-season.

He suggested that a committee be formed to frame rules and organise games.

Wills had attended Rugby Public School in England where he had captained the school team at football and cricket, and returned to Melbourne in December 1856.

By early 1857 he was starring in inter-colonial cricket against NSW.

The football played in Melbourne before 1858 consisted of scratch (i.e. pick up) matches usually organised as part of a sports meeting or as a social gathering.

It is not known what rules or codes were adopted for these games or whether there was much consistency between the various contests.

But it is certain that the numbers per side were varied according to the numbers attending and that a lot of the rules were made up for the occasion.

In such free-for-all's, there must have been many interruptions to play while disputes were resolved.

It was something similar in England. Each school or village had its own distinctive game or set of rules and there were few inter-school contests or matches between different localities.

In this connection it is relevant to note that Soccer was not played nationally in England until 1863, and the British Rugby code was not adopted nationally until about the same date.

So in some respects developments in Victoria were five years or so in advance of England's.

There were a lot of Melbourne men who had played football at the English Public Schools (Eton, Harrow, Rugby etc) and some would have been familiar with the games of folk football in which seemingly the whole village turned out and took sides in getting the ball from one end of the village to the other in order to penetrate the opposition's defence and score the winning goal.

There were so many taking part that it did not matter whether the sides were even or whether the contestants came and went to suit their convenience (or thirst).

Features of both types of contests were recognisable in the earliest trial games after Thomas Wills' letter.

There is some doubt as to the first of such matches, but probably the first, and certainly the most significant, was the contest between Scotch College and Melbourne Grammar which started on the afternoon of August 7th, 1858 and was not finished until nearly a month later.

The match was played on the Richmond Paddock—ie the area between Wellington Parade and the MCG but stretching through to Punt Road and including today's Richmond Cricket Ground.

The goals were over half a mile apart, one situated near the Hilton Hotel and the other near the Corner of Punt Road and Rowena Parade.

The playing area was rough, interspersed with trees and little gullies, and generally sloping away to the south—quite pronounced in parts.

There were 40 boys and men per side as each included a sprinkling of masters and friends.

It was agreed that the first team to score two goals (games) would take the match, and a round ball was probably used.

Wills was an umpire-cum-observer on one flank and Dr. Macadam from Scotch officiated on the other.

The two sides struggled all that afternoon and only one goal was scored (by Scotch) before darkness made further play impossible.

The next Saturday, the Scotch arrived to continue the match, but Grammar failed to appear.

Scotch claimed the match and there were suggestions of cowardice which Grammar resented. So the match continued on the following Saturday afternoon when Grammar scored an equalising goal but neither side could clinch its second to win the contest.

After close of play on September 4th, it was time to turn to cricket so the match was declared a draw.

The two school groups ultimately formed the nucleus for two prominent teams in the early years of competitive football in Melbourne—Scotch (East Melbourne) and Grammar (South Yarra).

## The Thomas Wills' letter

10th July, 1858

Dear Sir,  
Now that cricket has been put aside for some few months to come, and cricketers have assumed somewhat of the chrysalis nature (for the time being only, it is true), but at length again will burst forth in all their varied hues, rather than allow this state of torpor to creep over them and stifle their now supple limbs, why cannot they, I say, form a football club, and form a committee of three or more to draw up a code of laws?

If a club of this sort was got up, it would be of vast benefit to any cricket ground to be trampled upon, and would make the turf firm and durable, besides which it would help those who are inclined to become stout and having their joints encased in useless superabundant flesh.

If it were not possible to form a football club, why should these young men who have adopted

this new country for their motherland — why, I say, do not they form themselves into a rifle club, so at any date they may be some day called upon to aid their adopted land against a tyrant who may some time pop upon us when we least expect a foe at our own very doors. Surely our young cricketers are not afraid of a crack of a rifle when they face so courageously the leather sphere, and it would disgrace no one to learn in time to defend his country and his hearth.

A firm heart and a steady hand and a quick eye are all that are requisite, and with practice all these may be attained.

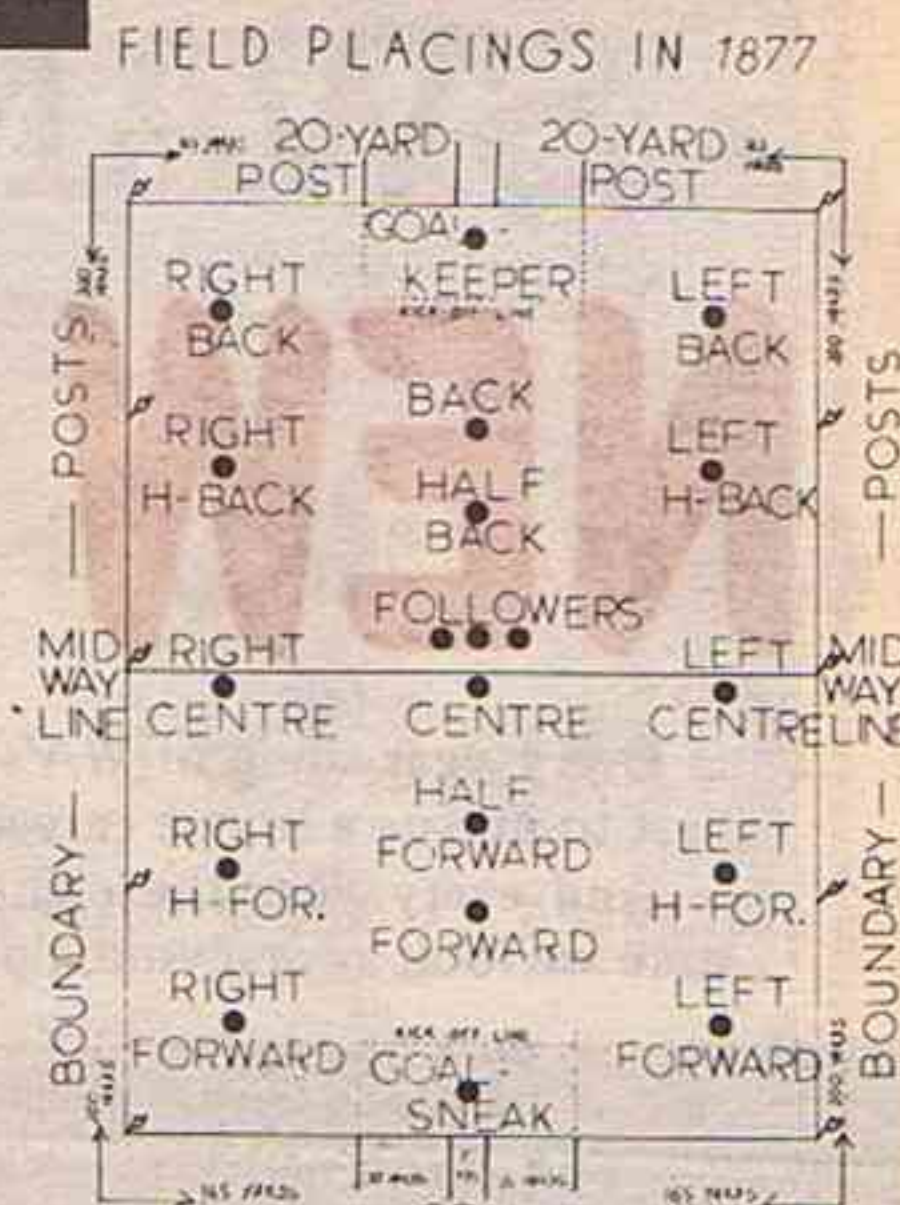

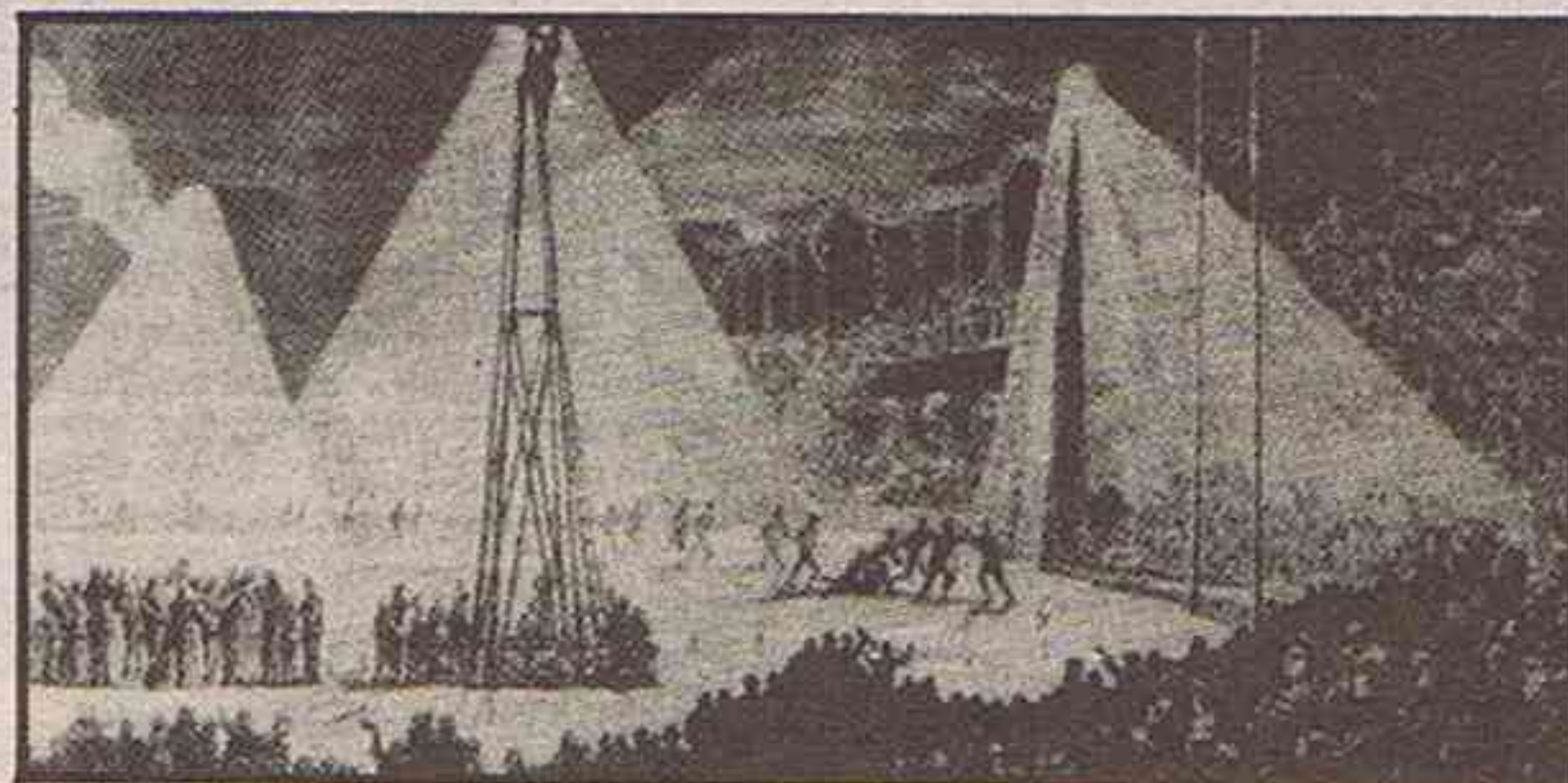
## FOOTBALL'S BIRTHDAY

This month Australian Football celebrates its 125th Birthday.

On this page we outline the historic events which led to the first game of 'Aussie Rules' ...played in Melbourne on July 10, 1858.



Field placings, 1877. At this time, there were no reserves but 20 per side on the ground at the one time. Only goals were scored. If the ball was kicked for a "behind", there was no score and the goal keeper then kicked out.



The first night football match ever played in Australia took place between Collingwood Artillery and East Melbourne teams on the Melbourne Cricket Ground on Wednesday, August 6, 1879, under a special electric light system installed and controlled by a Professor Pepper.

Electric lighting was only in its infancy and the lamps were the large clear glass type, suspended from poles erected around the arena.

Despite the cold and damp night a crowd of 12,000 was present.

The game was drawn, both teams scoring three goals.

On Wednesday evening, August 13, Carlton and Melbourne also met under the lights. Carlton winning by three goals to one, with Blues champion George Coulthard, scoring all three goals.

Seven thousand watched this game.

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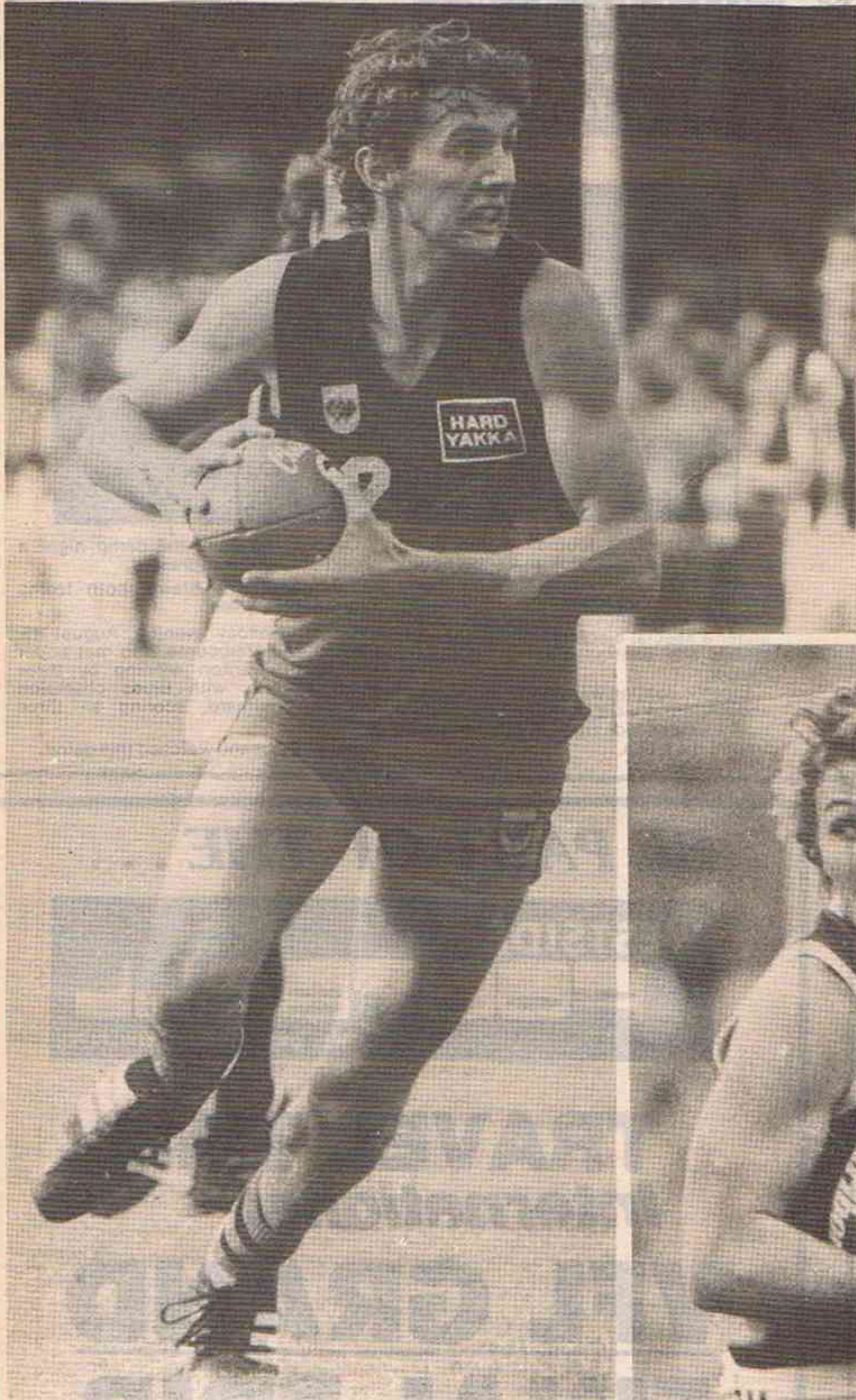


# SWAN GOLD SPOTLIGHT

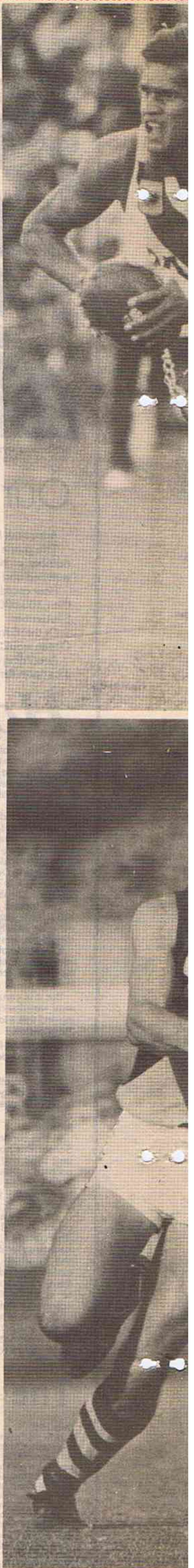

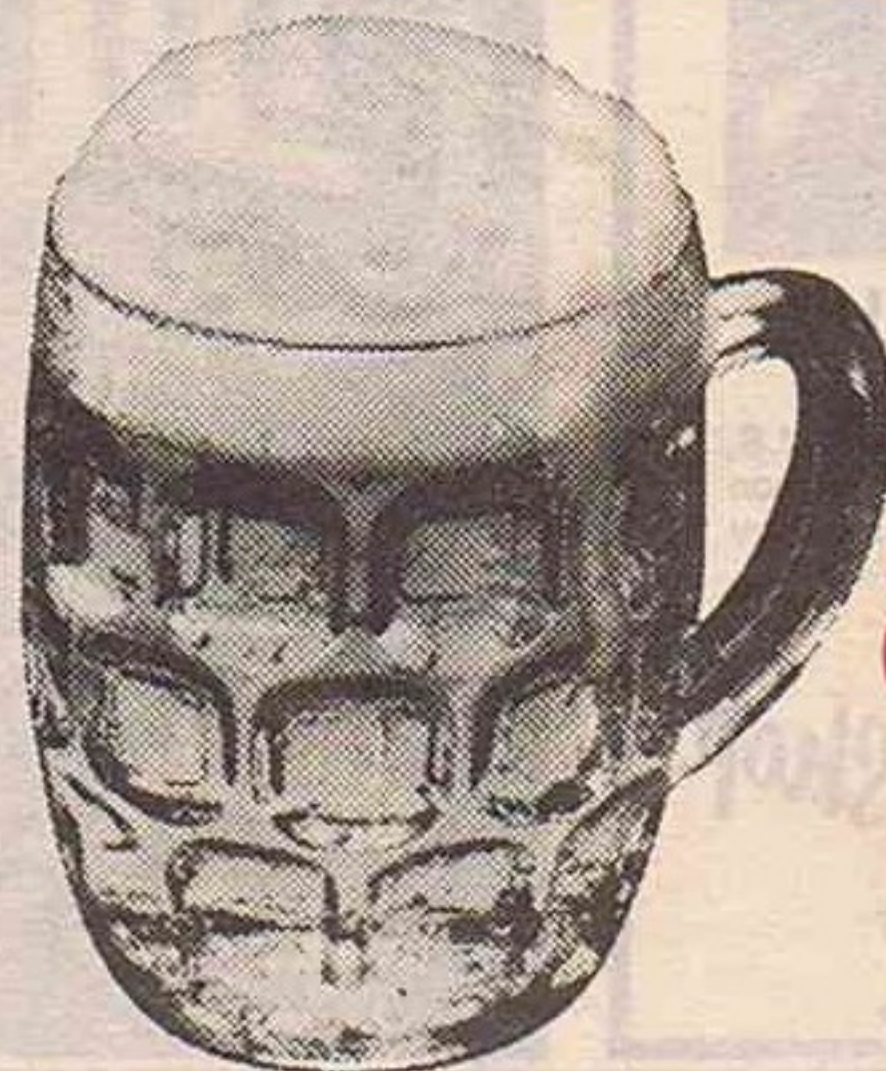

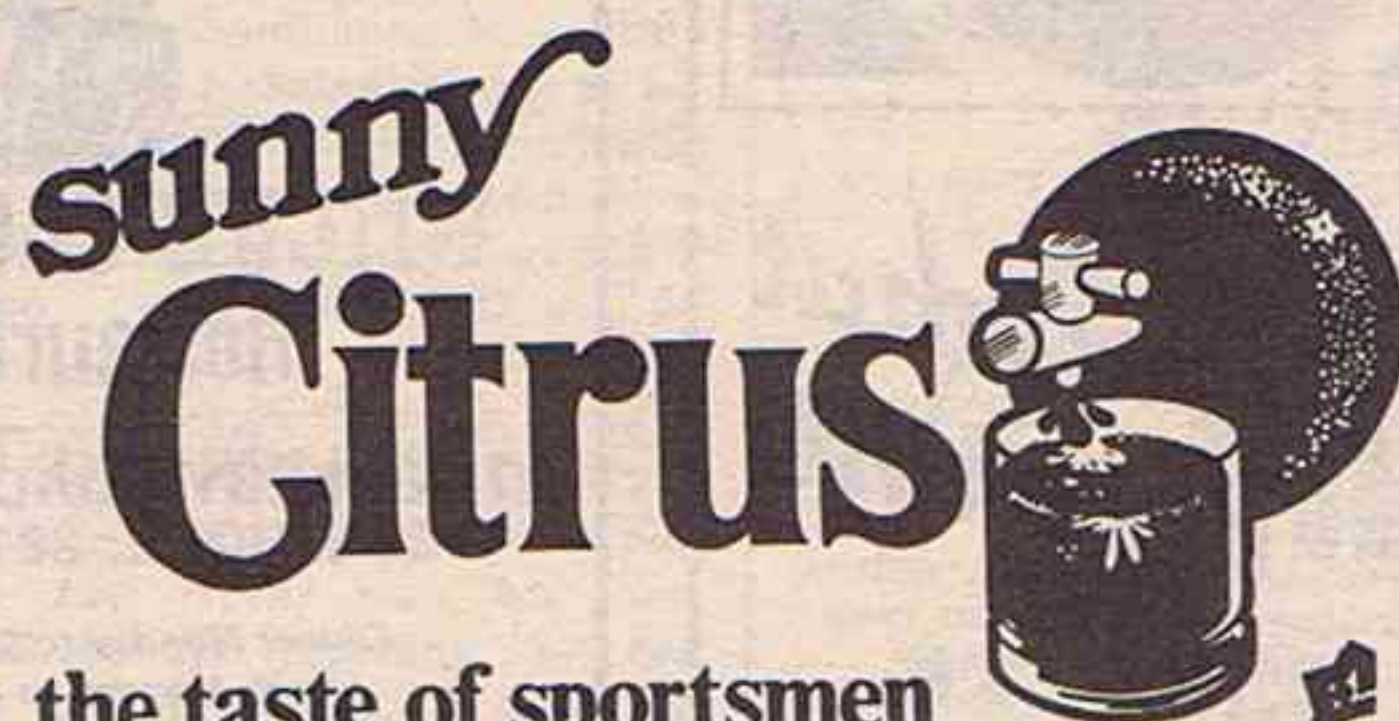


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# Smith gave Subi fans a day to remember

SUBIACO have always had their problems winning enough games to play in the finals.

And by the time their premiership drought had extended to 49 years — the longest in history — they were desperate.

When the 1973 season arrived they knew they had to do something dramatic to halt their bad run so they appointed 1967 Brownlow Medallist Ross Smith coach and captain.

He had stamped himself as a class rover with St Kilda and besides being a useful coach for the Lions he would also give the roving strength the depth it had lacked for so long.

Keith Watt, the mop haired, skinny little figure of a man could not be expected to carry the roving department on his own — particularly if Subiaco were to do anything about resurrecting their poor history.

Smith took over from Haydn Bunton junior and carried on his good work.

Bunton had made the Lions more competitive but he just could not cap it off with a flag. Smith hoped he could do that.

When he arrived at Subiaco Oval he brought with him some innovative ideas from Melbourne. He had definite views as to the brand of football required to win top level football matches and he set about passing on these views to the players.

The Lions had a top side with players like Mike Fitzpatrick, Peter Featherby, Austin Robertson, John Dimmer, Colin Williams, Ron Bayens, Brian Sierakowski and Mick Malone providing the nucleus of a potential premiership combination.

Smith took hold of that potential and developed it into a team — a team which could end 49 years of misery.

What Subiaco had lacked in previous seasons was some on-field direction and he provided that. He was a player everyone respected and he was a burrower. He would throw himself into packs and get the ball out to other players.

He earned the respect of the players firstly through his ability on the field and then as a coach.

The Lions played an improved brand of football and by the end of the qualifying games they had won enough matches to

earn the right to meet West Perth in the second semi final.

Subiaco had not beaten West Perth all year. On the three occasions the teams had met West Perth proved their master each time.

The Lions believed, however, that they could reverse the result in the big game. For the first time in years the players had faith in each other's ability and they were certain they could get through to the grand final the easy way.

However, West Perth were just as determined and they emerged as 18 point winners.

The Lions then had to front up to East Perth in the preliminary final who were most impressive first semi final winners. Although the Royals tried hard they could not hold the Lions and they went on to score a 10 point win.

The stage was then set for the West Perth — Subiaco grand final.

The Cardinals had to go into the match without their highest goal kicker, full forward Phil Smith who broke down with a knee injury in the dying stages of the second semi final.

Subiaco could hardly have been confident of victory — West Perth had won their previous four encounters, but the loss of Smith was a severe blow.

Ross Smith was a determined man, however, and he led the Subiaco charge.

He was one of the best men on the ground and he continued to lead by example. When the final siren sounded Subiaco had broken the long drought.

Watt gave Smith valuable support on

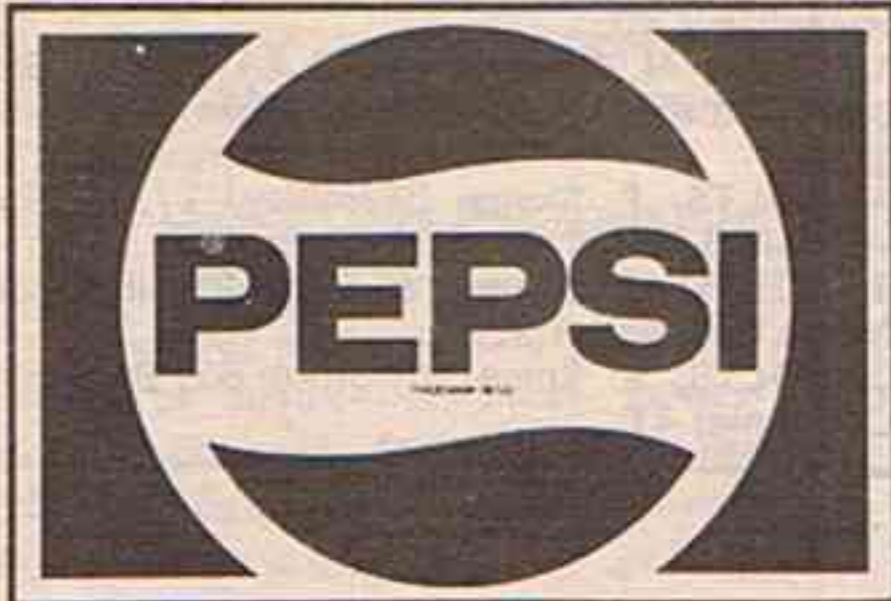

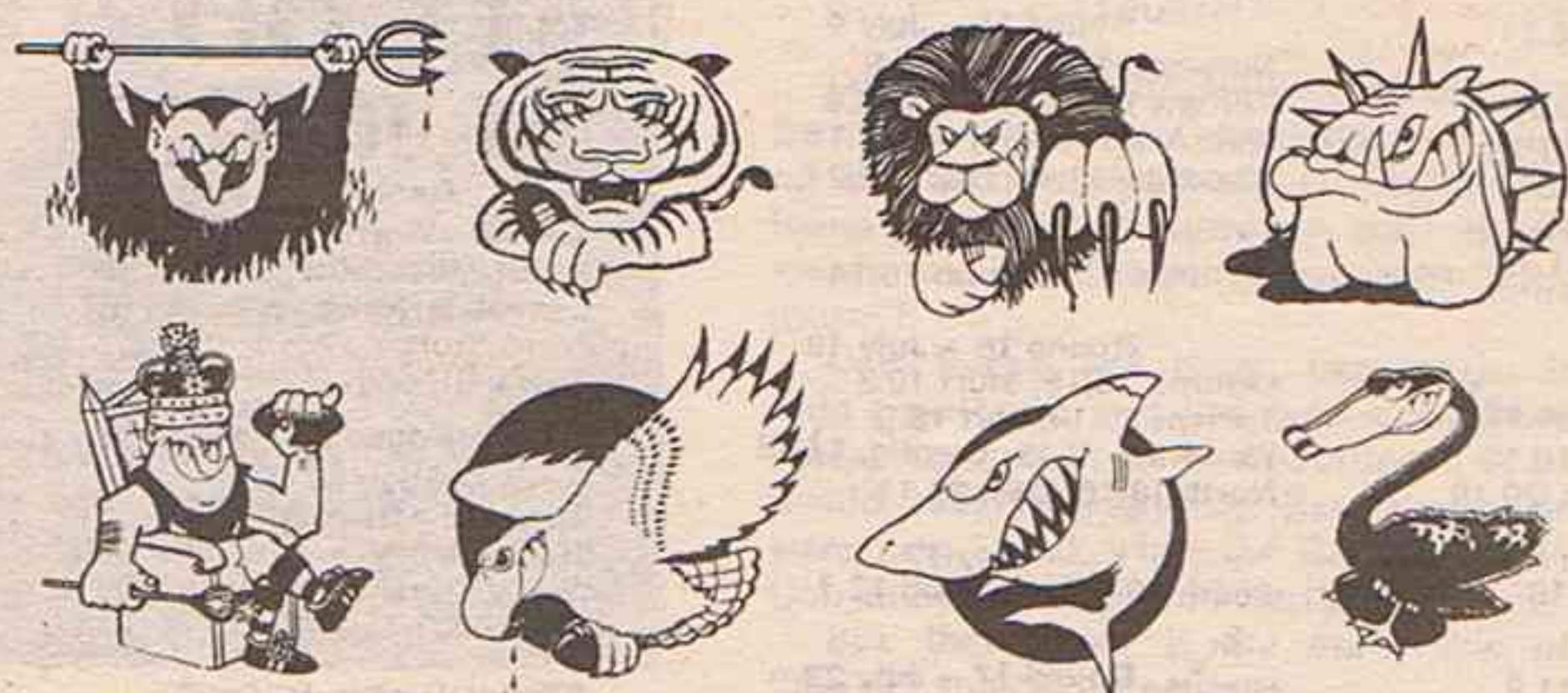

I'm not knocking the brass bands, but they are not entertainment at football games.

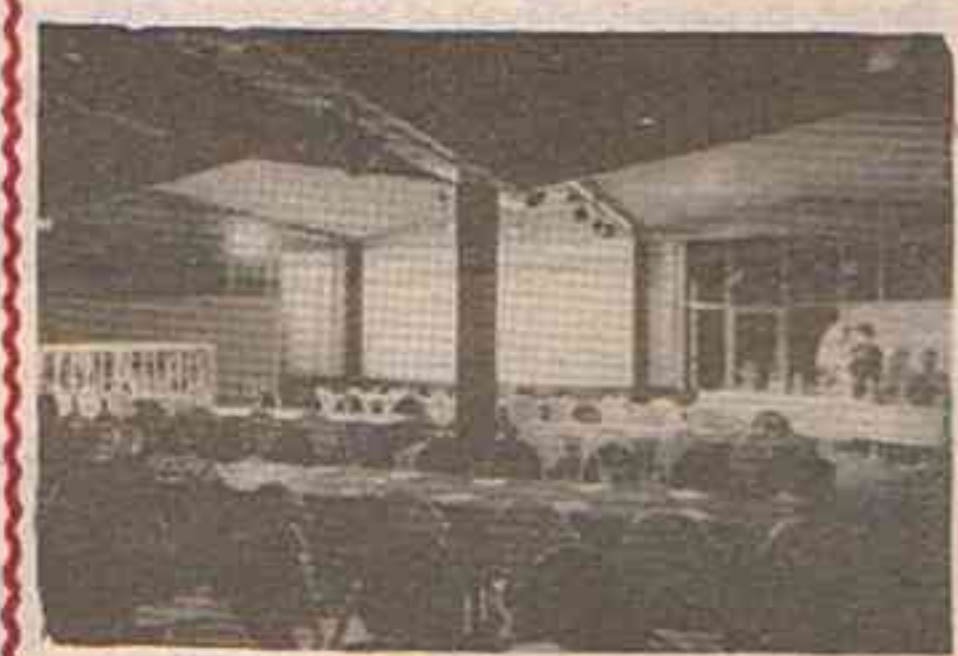
Why not run a kicking competition between current league players, or even between outstanding colts or junior players?

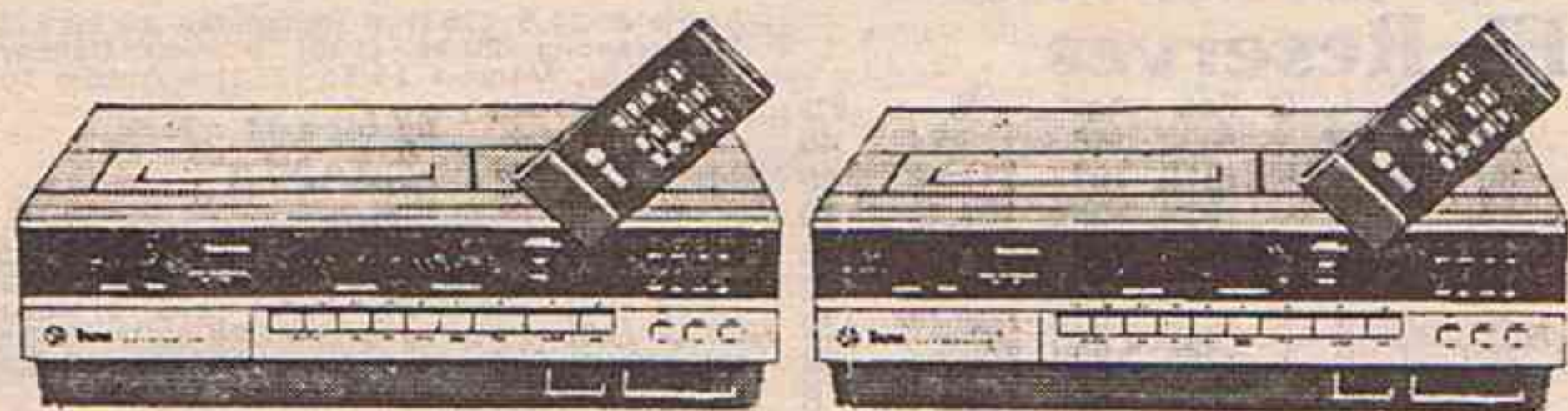
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
