NO PANIC AT PERTH

**Too much being
left to too few**

THE time for making excuses at Perth is over.

The team that promised so much pre-season, but has given so little, is ready to climb back from the brink of disaster.

Demons coach Ian Miller has no intention of quitting; the committee has no plans to get rid of him — and the players have now realised that they have to lift their game.

A disgusted Miller left Lathlain Park immediately after their demoralising loss to Claremont last Saturday — but his mood of depression was lifted a few hours later when 25 players turned up at his home to show their support.

When the team made their way up the stairs to the Perth social hall on Saturday night they were greeted with boos from a large contingent of members.

"We have not reached a panic situation," Miller says. "We have not worked as a team. Some players who were expected to take on greater responsibility this year have not accepted the challenge.

"We can't change our plans mid-stream. We just have to keep trying.

"The next three weeks are absolutely vital to us. We have to win a minimum of two out of the three games," Miller says.

The former Perth, East Perth and Fitzroy star is not the only one in Demon land who realises the urgency of the situation.

When they successfully lured Peter Bosustow and Robert Wiley back from Melbourne those two players were expected to provide the impetus required to pull Perth out of the football doldrums.

PETER BOSUSTOW

"It is time for the players to stand up and be counted," Bosustow says. "We lost two close games, against South and East Fremantle, and we just threw those games away.

"We showed signs of a side not knowing how to win when the pressure went on.

"And the atmosphere in the room before Saturday's game against Claremont indicated that some players thought all we had to do to get the four points was to run out there. We didn't work for the points."

ROBERT WILEY

Wiley was also critical of some of his team mates.

"It takes 20 players to win a match," he says. "But at the moment we do not have enough players performing and many of them are inconsistent.

"We are not only inconsistent from week to week, but also from quarter to quarter and that does not help our cause."

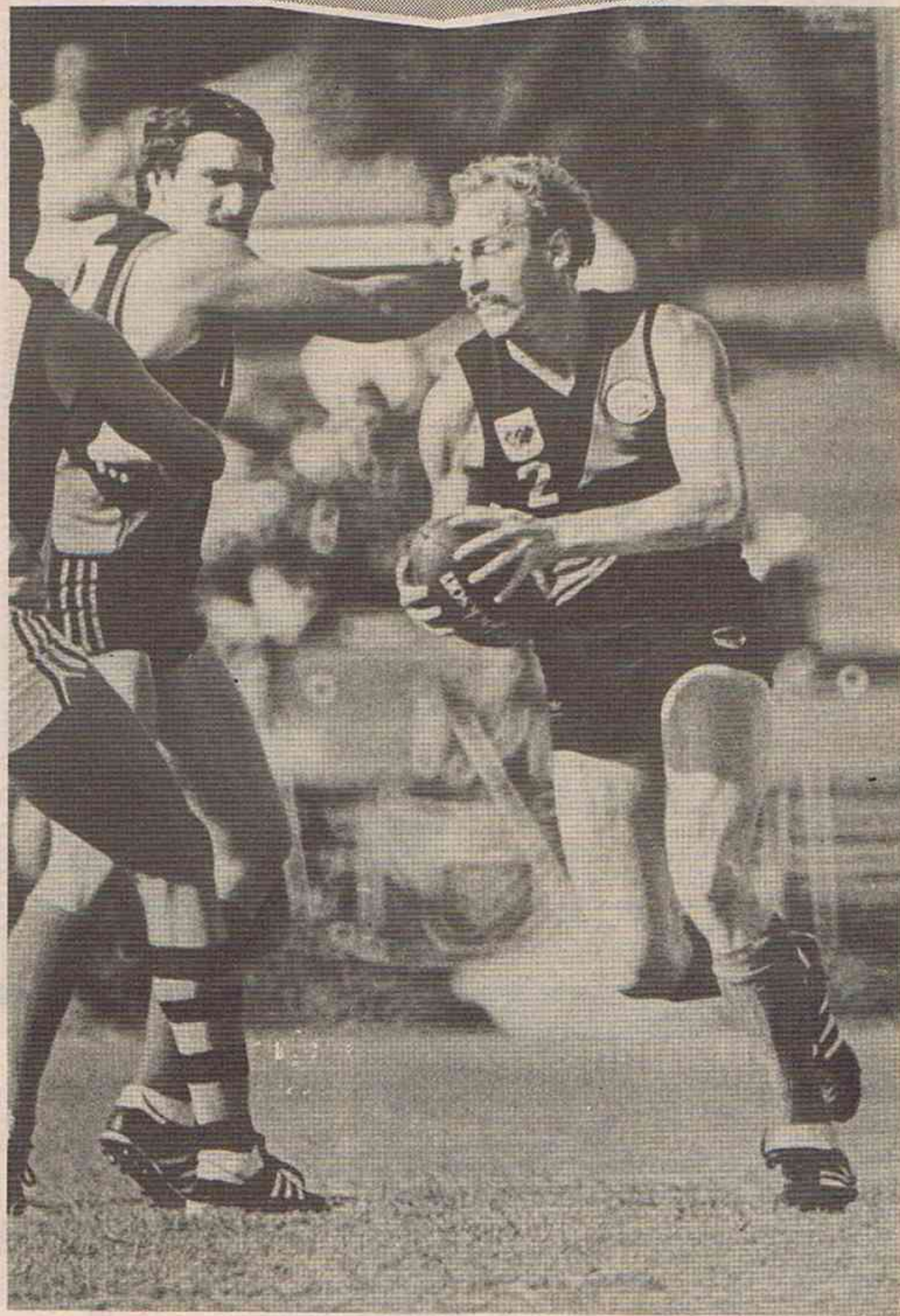
BRYAN COUSINS

Perth skipper Bryan Cousins believes there are enough good players in the camp, but there is not enough desperation.

"We have sufficient good players," Cousins says. "What we need is 25 to 30 players who are absolutely desperate to play league football.

"A total commitment is required and there is no place for the blame to lie for our bad performance except with the players.

"Ian is working hard for Perth and it is about time the players did."

Time for a change

BEING involved in football at the highest level provides plenty of confrontations and hard times for people on both sides of the fence.

Approaching a league football coach after his side has just lost a tough encounter is probably the hardest challenge.

Finding an alternative to that 'necessary' media-coach interview is not easy.

But the fact remains that their opinion is an important part of the promotion of that game.

Mr 'footy fan' pays his \$5 to see the game, buys every paper that prints football, dotes on every word on radio and television — he is the person keeping this great game going.

He deserves to receive rational coverage from the entertainment staged each Saturday and whether players, coaches and administrators like it or not, the media is the go-between of the payers and performers from which they draw their dues.

To assist the media presenting the best possible after-game coverage, the WAFL directors should follow their Victorian counterparts and arrange

press conferences after every league match.

It is difficult enough getting coaches to think clearly after the hurly-burly of a game without having to deal with the press and the many other pressures evident in league rooms at the end of the day.

A press conference 20 minutes after the game with both coaches and media men only, would be a way of gaining a completely rational and approachable method of communication.

It would give the media outlets an opportunity to quiz key figures in a professional, mutual surrounding.

The WAFL directors have made a number of minor (and unnecessary) changes — like tossing the coin for choice of ends during the reserve games — so why not improve the way in which the eight coaches have their say.

The footballing public respect league coaches and they should be well promoted.

COME ON BUZZ

PETER (the Buzz) Bosustow is a magnificent footballer. But it is time for his sensational form to return on a full-time basis. Bosustow has shown flashes of the form that took him to scintillating heights in Melbourne where he consistently thrilled crowds with majestic displays of class. But for WA fans — and the Perth Football club — these stints of brilliance are too few and far between.

Bosustow is playing one or two quarters a week, which is enough to keep the Demons within reach of opposition sides. He has come in for some close checking from opposing defenders, limiting his freedom.

Buzz has to get fully fit, realise that WA football will never attract crowds of 70,000 and concentrate for a whole game.

For your own reputation Buzz (and Perth's hopes for 1984) it is time to string together a few four-quarter efforts.

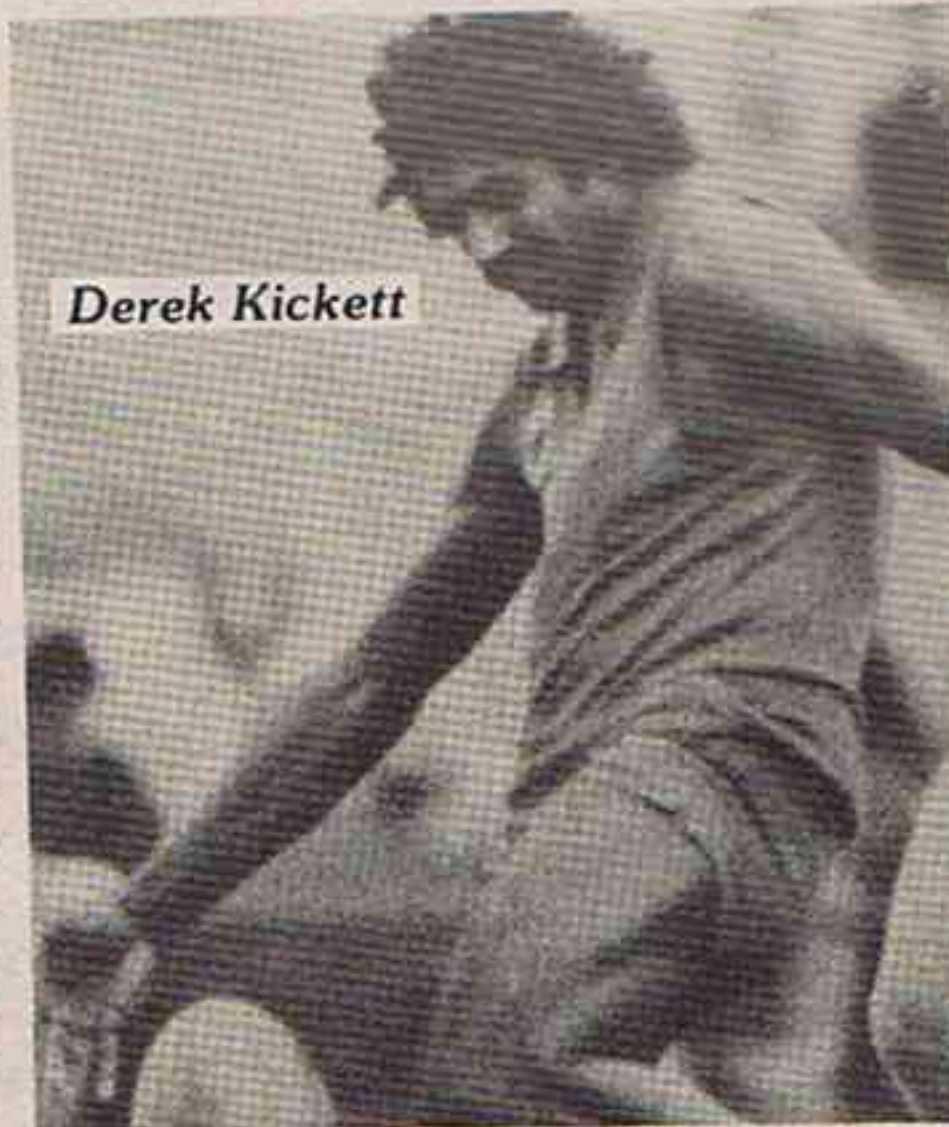
FALCON STARS

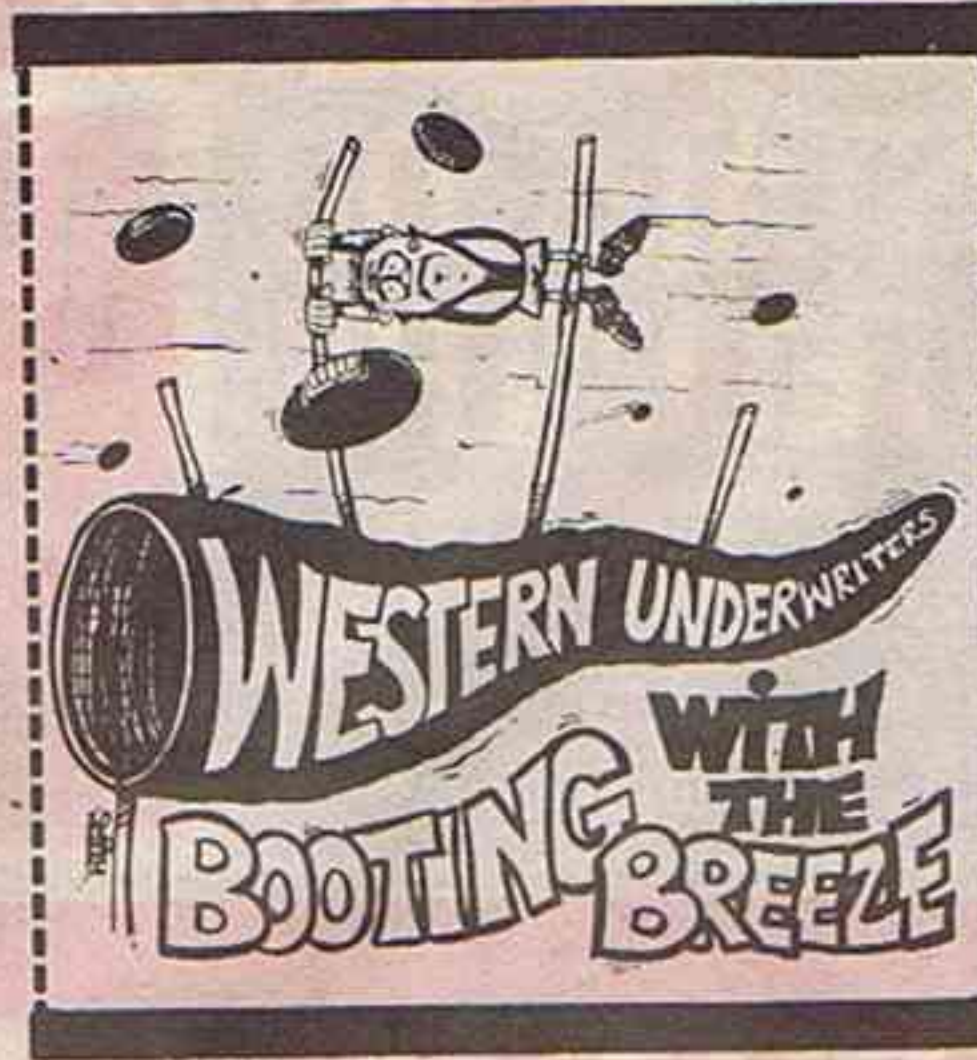

Royals fail on Malarkey



THE East Perth Football Club should be admonished for letting champion defender Gary Malarkey return to Victoria.

Quite clearly, they have put selfish, petty interests above those of the WA football public.

Malarkey was the best full-back in Australia in 1983. He made it clear to everyone in June last year that he would be returning to WA this season.

But between then and April — 10 months to be exact — East Perth failed to satisfy Malarkey's contractual needs.

East Perth claim they did everything to keep him and that he gave no definite reason for not wanting to play with them.

But despite making it clear that he would not play with his old club, East Perth still refused to grant him the open clearance for which he applied.

OFFICIAL

Their excuse — his clearance application wasn't on an official WAFL form.

But more likely is that their attitude was one of: "Well, if he's not playing for us, he's not playing for anybody, so let him go back to Geelong."

That kind of attitude is perhaps acceptable when you consider that football is a cut-throat business; that success is everything and that having Malarkey playing for another WA club would have done nothing but hinder East Perth's premiership aspirations.

But unfortunately, that attitude also sells the football public of WA down the river.

Imagine if Perth had adopted such thinking in their dealings with Robert Wiley and Peter Bosustow, or Subiaco with Peter Featherby.

They paid out to get these blokes back and look at the rewards. For example, Perth, for the first time in five years, this week passed the 2000 mark for memberships. Their crowd attendances are also well above those of last season.

It is quite possible that Malarkey is not totally blameless in this whole affair, but trying to find out exactly what took place in this botch-up is like extracting healthy teeth.

WRITING

Malarkey told me this week that he couldn't get along with Mal Atwell and that the verbal offers made by East Perth didn't match those made in writing.

When he asked for an open clearance, he was knocked back, so instead of fighting out a protracted clearance battle, he returned to Geelong.

East Perth's story is that they bent over backwards to please Malarkey, but that he even refused to attend meetings organised by the club and chaired by the chairman of the WAFL tribunal.

Malarkey's answer to that was: "Yes, but by then things had gone too far."

And watching Phil Narkle playing for St Kilda, it is quite obvious that he is finding the habit hard to shake.

As you may know, the rule in Victoria is different. When a player ducks his head there, the umpires call play on or holding the ball. In WA, he gets a free kick for a high tackle.

There are too many head injuries in our game already and this local interpretation only encourages more of the same.

MOSS TOOK MY ADVICE

I spoke to Graham Moss two weeks ago and he took my advice to act as his team's runner. The only problem was that he was not supposed to do it against Perth. By taking on the runner's role he made his presence felt on the field and I believe it went a long way towards helping his team to victory. I must admit that Graham was lucky not to receive a reprimand from the umpires for staying on the ground for too long. Mid-way through the last quarter Perth runner Allan Stiles was sent out to "tag" Graham to even up the teams. It will certainly be the last time you see a league coach acting as his team's runner as the WAFL will step in and make a positive ruling on the matter.

TWO RUNNERS

While on league runners it was suggested at a coaches' meeting this week that the WAFL look at the possibility of allowing two runners at league level. Naturally only ONE being permitted on the ground at a time. I am certainly an advocate for such a change, which will stop clubs using trainers and waterboys to take messages.

MITCHELL IMPROVED

Claremont rover Michael Mitchell is having a great season and he displayed all his skills last Saturday at Lathlain Park. He has greater consistency in his game and his performances show that he is covering more territory. Mitchell is now prepared to move well into defence, both to carry the ball out and to make himself available for the rebound ball. He must be in line for another State guernsey. It was also good to see Larry Kickett play well from a back pocket. He reads the ball well, has excellent disposal and great pace. From a former team mate Larry, I think that's your spot.

WELL DONE, ROSS

Congratulations to Ross Prunster on playing his 200th senior game last week. It is a tribute to Ross for the time he put into coming back from injury and surgery which caused him to miss two seasons. According to WAFL records Ross has played 196 games, but it is time a rule was introduced to include State matches in game tallies. If a player represents his State — a tremendous honour and time achievement — it virtually goes unrecorded. In the past many State games were played outside WA when local fixtures were held at home.

COSTLY ERROR

Players should play to the umpires' whistle — always a golden rule in football — and this was never better illustrated than in the West Perth—Swan Districts match last week when Craig Nelson was awarded a 15 metre penalty. He was awarded the penalty right on the half time siren and Leigh Brenton, thinking the quarter was over, handled the ball, but did not deliver it back to Nelson. A 15-metre penalty was awarded and Nelson kicked a goal — the difference between the two sides at the end of the day. A costly mistake.

UNLUCKY THIRD

Perth utility player Darryl Frame dislocated his elbow in the reserves game against East Fremantle two weeks ago. It was unfortunate for him after having just returned from injury. He is the third player in seven weeks to have received a dislocation at Perth — following on from Cam Shepherd and Greg Campbell.

ROYALS NEED TO KEEP FIRING

EAST Perth will need to reproduce the character and enthusiasm that took them to a memorable victory over the reigning premiers at Bunbury in the opening round of the year if they are to beat Swans again this week.

Tagging of key players has become a feature among tactics in recent weeks and this clash will be no exception.

Don Holmes will need close attention as his ability to kick big tallies is a factor in

SUBIACO NEED THE POINTS

SUBIACO desperately need four premiership points, but will not get them at East Fremantle Oval this week.

After starting the season with their traditional successes, the Lions are struggling to put good form together for four quarters and will find Ron Alexander's band of youngsters too strong.

The Sharks stumbled in their endeavours to finish the first series in one of the top two spots on the ladder when they went down to East Perth last week, but will bounce back on Saturday in front of their own crowd.

Murray Wrensted will be hard to stop for a second successive time while Alexander should continue his good form to provide the Sharks' talented little brigade plenty of opportunities around the ground.

If the Lions are to offer any real resistance they will call on big efforts again from Peter Featherby, Neil Taylor, Phil Lamb and Steve Leishman, while special assignments will go to full-back Michael Crutchfield and Phil Scott.

Crutchfield will have the task of stopping crack goal shooter Jeff Cassidy and Scott will try to curb the dominance Alexander has enjoyed in the ruck knock outs.

PRESSURE ON PERTH

PERTH start the second series of fixtures with a lot of pressure on players and administrators and they have to snap out of the doldrums for the sake of the competition.

But they come up against the hard working, disciplined West Perth at Subiaco Oval and look set for further heartache.

The Demons have not lived up to their pre-season promise and coach Ian Miller faces some worrying times before things will improve.

The Falcons are back to the form that took them to a preliminary final appearance in 1982, Dennis Cometti's first year as coach.

They have the aggression, desire and team work that was evident in that dream introduction for Cometti and in recent weeks have found the avenue to attack that was so sadly lacking in early season failures.

Derek Kickett forms a superb combination with the Falcon midfielders and if they can reproduce anything like the form of the last three outings the Demons are in for another loss for their members to boo about.

TIGER TROUBLE

CLAREMONT'S success of last week looks short lived.

Not even the on-field presence of coach Graham Moss will be sufficient to lift the Tigers to beat Mal Brown's Bulldogs at Claremont Oval on Saturday.

Although the Tigers had all their old run against the hapless Demons last week, with Michael Mitchell, Stephen Goulding and Lindsay Kanther all turning in improved performances, the Bulldogs look too strong all over the ground.

Souths will be looking to improve their goal front disposal after the poor conversion rate of last week when Craig Edwards, David Hart and Geoff Gillies failed to wear their goal kicking boots.

Claremont will have trouble stopping the talents of Benny Vigona from a half back flank and will miss the on-field leadership of captain Noel Morton. But at the same time they should welcome a return to playing duties of State defender Mike Aitken.

The Bulldogs have the edge on the Tigers and with so many Southerners eager to perform for the State selectors the points are set to go South's way.

WELL DONE, GRAHAM

Good on you Graham Moss. What you did on Saturday gave WA football a much-needed shot in the arm.

And it's not because the Tigers won... but because you outwitted your opponents to such an extent that they felt the need to grizzle about it.

Mossie, you gave the football public something to talk about.

It was obvious Claremont needed two things... direction on the ground and a psychological lift. Moss gave the club both by adopting the role of official runner.

Though it had been done before it hadn't been exploited to the extent achieved by Moss on Saturday.

And why shouldn't he do it?

It would be a shame if something that is unusual is outlawed by the league for being different.

I doubt it will work to the same extent if tried again, but at least it was something different and football can do with some innovation.

I'm surprised that Ian Miller, who has used the same ploy, felt it necessary to have his own runner tag Moss.

Moss must have really been chuckling to himself when "Chubby" Stiles started following him like a little lap dog.

That ensured the initiative was wrested from Perth as it meant too much attention was paid to Moss rather than Perth's own situation.

In fact Miller should have devised tactics to exploit the role played by Moss.

While the Claremont coach was absorbed in giving players instructions he was not in a position to have an overview of the game.

I bet John Todd or Mal Brown would have tried to capitalise on the situation.

Last week I suggested Moss resume playing to try and get his side out of the pits. They needed his on-field leadership and players needed a psychological jar.

On Saturday Moss showed his on-field value to the club, albeit in a different role to the one I envisaged.

Despite their loss I wouldn't write Perth off as a finals prospect this season.

Tough at the top

It would be a brave man at this stage who plonked a heap of cash on a side to take the flag, or for that matter fill the bottom couple of spots in the four.

Most pundits have been forced to revise their assessment of this season's top four.

Perhaps the only side at this stage considered safe to make the finals are South Fremantle.

I still think Swan Districts and East Fremantle will be there in September... but I reckon you could raffle the rest for fourth spot.

West Perth, on their past two performances look the best side out of the four at the moment. It will be interesting to see if they can maintain their momentum.

Their clash with Perth at Subiaco Oval this Saturday should throw some light on each side's prospect of making the finals.

Subiaco have the capacity to trouble most teams but I wonder if we've seen the best of them this season.

Claremont are the enigma of the competition. They face a tough task to make the finals. Their future will be decided over the next three weeks.

"Roo", as Swans supporters affectionately know him, generates enthusiasm by his mere presence. He is cheered on to the ground by the crowd as he relays messages from Todd and surely the impact he has on the players when he is on the ground constitutes an unfair advantage.

WHITE WHAT!

"Perth, Subiaco, South Fremantle and Swan Districts contacted me," Brenton

"That meant I would play with Swans or South and on reflection, I made the right decision."

Indeed, Brenton could be well satisfied with his decision.

He has now played in a premierships side after eight seasons of league football and he is a part of one of the most exciting eras in the history of Swans.

Brenton made his league debut with East Fremantle in 1976 and missed selection in the club's 1977 grand final side.

Two years later East Fremantle again appeared in the grand final. This time he

shattered his jaw late in the season and at the same time shattered his chance of playing in the club's 25th premiership.

Some players get into a rut and Brenton was one man who fell into that category while at East Fremantle.

He needed a new challenge and when he joined Swans last year he accepted that challenge.

Brenton started from scratch and after settling into his new surroundings, he became a key player for Swans in their premierships success last year.

And judging by his form this season, if Swans are to make another grand final appearance he will have a lot to do with it.

He is happy with the way things are going, but he is far from satisfied. He is desperate to become a more consistent and damaging player — but most importantly he is determined to convince other people that he is far from washed-up.

Those feelings can be seen especially when he plays against his old club.

DEMONS STILL IN TOUCH

IT IS a unique situation to see the bottom team, Perth, just two wins away from second spot at the end of the first series.

The competition has never been this close since the league became an eight-team competition.

Nowhere in the past 50 years has the last team been as close to the second team after seven games.

Talking of a close competition, I had a phone call from Geraldton this week and the caller wanted to know if there had ever been a case of all teams being on equal points after round one.

This is the situation in Geraldton in a seven-team competition. All sides have won three games.

FAMILY HONOURS

WHEN East Perth vice-captain Peter Spencer played his 150th game against Swan Districts (at Bunbury in the first round of the season) he qualified for life membership of that club.

Life membership for Spencer creates a situation of three generations with the same honour at one club.

His father, Jim, received life membership in 1958 and his grandfather, Frank Edwards, was the Royals fourth life member in 1918.

I believe this is the first time in WA football that this situation has occurred.

FINAL FORMAT

THERE is still a lot of uncertainty about the format of the finals in the days before the page system — the one which operates now — was introduced.

The years in doubt were between 1904 and 1930 when there were two semi finals and a final.

However, if the team which finished on top of the table as minor premiers was beaten in a semi or final they had the right to challenge the final winner.

Contrary to popular belief about the top team playing the fourth team, or the third team, this is not true.

A draw was held to see who played who and most of these draws came out of the president's hat.

Nowhere in those years were the terms first semi, second semi, preliminary final or grand final used. That did not come until 1931.

ON THE RUN

THE club runner became official in the VFL in 1956 — ending many years of the farcical situation where trainers were relaying messages on behalf of the coach.

As usual the WAFL followed, but it was not until August 1961 that the runner was official.

And in 1963 the first controversy began. East Fremantle's coach at the time, big Bob Johnson, was suffering from a jaw injury and he made himself runner in a second semi-final against Perth.

The league took no action against Johnson and at the same time left the door open for others to do the same.

It was not until 20 years later that Perth coach Ian Miller appointed himself runner for a day.

Despite his on-field advice, the Demons went down by four points to South Fremantle.

And now Claremont coach Graham Moss joins the controversy about the running coaches.

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INTERSTATE UPDATE

SAINTS SAVE THEIR COACH

SAINT KILDA, the struggling anti-heroes of the VFL, saved their coach's skin; broke their losing drought and caused confusion in the North Melbourne camp last week.

The Saints beat North Melbourne by 47 points at VFL Park and eased the pressure on their coach Tony Jewell, who admitted that his job had to be on the line if victory had not occurred.

And the shock defeat — the first time since 1978 that St Kilda have beaten North Melbourne — caused severe repercussions in the Roos camp, including putting the future of champions like Gary Dempsey on the line.

For the second time in as many visits to VFL Park, Roos coach Barry Cable had a top-level behind-closed-doors session with club officials after the thrashing.

At the same time, Jewell was smiling.



"If we had been thrashed the club would certainly be entitled to look at the coach," he said.

"You have to have a come-what-may attitude in this business. But I was very pleased at the pride the players showed and the way we played. They have to overcome the inferiority complex and they are starting to believe in themselves."

Cable indicated that there could be major changes in the North Melbourne line-up — but critics were shocked at several positional moves by the Roos off-field experts as the Saints raced away with the game.

Big forward Mark Lisle, who kicked a match-winning six goals two weeks ago, was kept on the interchange bench until the last quarter and the hard-working Gary Dempsey was banished to the forward line when the pressure was on.

ANOTHER SHAW

COLLINGWOOD have 're-discovered' rover Tony Shaw.

The brother of former Pies skipper Ray Shaw, he has lamented in the seconds for many years, seldom being recognised for league selection.

Tony was generally known as a 'tagger' because of his ability to negate star opponents.

But now he is a prime mover in the new-look, fast-moving Collingwood side. He confirmed his new role with a best-on-ground effort against Geelong last week.

Long hours on the training track over the summer are the secret to his improvement.

"He's an exciting player now," says coach John Cahill.

His old coach Tom Hafey paid high tribute to Shaw last week when he sent out Geelong's 'tagger' David Bolton to keep tabs on Shaw.

BATTLING BLUEY

FORMER Footscray coach Ian (Bluey) Hampshire still has aspirations to coach a VFL club.

Bluey quit as Footscray coach in January, saying that he wanted 12 months away from the game.

The former Geelong veteran has been concentrating on building up his Geelong plumbing business as he watches the competitive VFL coaching scene from a distance.

"I believe I've got something to offer and certainly haven't ruled myself out of coaching again," he said.

"When I took over during the 1982 season, Footscray were at a low ebb," he said.

"Changing the attitude of 90 percent of the people at the club wasn't an easy task."



200 up for Rod Austin

One of Carlton's most loyal clubmen, Rod Austin, played his 200th VFL game last Saturday.

Austin, 31, has formed part of the great Carlton defence since he played his first senior game in 1972.

His League career has been plagued with injury and in 1981-82 missed Carlton's premiership wins because of a chronic groin problem.

But he was a member of the 1979 premiership team.

Austin was recruited from northern metropolitan club, Holy Child, before joining Carlton's Under 19 team.

He has kicked 18 goals and played in 14 finals matches.

Grant Fowler's last minute inclusion in the Hawthorn team last week was a double celebration — he played his 100th VFL game.

Fowler, 27, started with Fitzroy in 1976 and crossed to Essendon in 1980.

He joined the Hawks last year.

JACKO'S WAY

FORMER South Fremantle forward Mark Jackson, now playing with Geelong, was obviously very annoyed at getting a week's suspension from the VFL tribunal when found guilty of abusing an umpire. After the decision he was interviewed on television and said: "Seems to me that unless you're a girl ya don't get nuthin. I think I'll go out there in a dress from now on."

SA NEWS

KERNAHAN RUNS HOT

SOUTH Australian full forward Stephen Kernahan is set to become the hottest football property in the country after his 10-goal haul against Victoria on Tuesday night.

The talented Glenelg ruckman relished the opportunity of playing deep in attack and he proved too good for five opponents.

He out-classed household names like Bruce Doull, Jim Jess, John Kennedy, Gary Pert and Chris Mew.

However, his individual performance was not enough to get the South Australians across the line in front of 52,798 screaming home-town fans at West

Westlakes.

The Victorians survived a hectic last quarter when the lead changed six times to scramble home by four points.

They could thank the efforts of Doug Hawkins, David Ackerley and Michael Tuck for their nail-biting win.

EVANS ON TARGET

PORT Adelaide full-forward, Tim Evans has once again set a cracking pace in the SANFL goalkicking competition.

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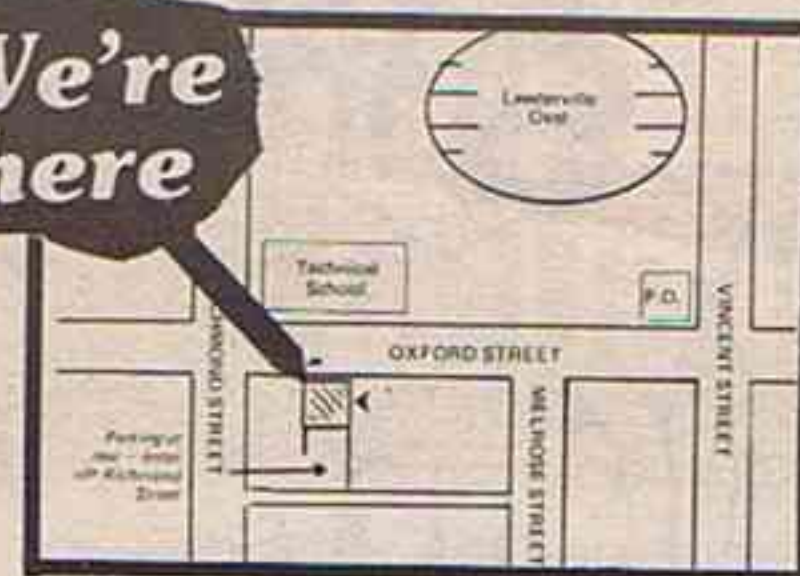
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A-LA-PELE!

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STATISTICS TELL THE STORY

Statistics play a major part in modern football, with most coaches nowadays having their own team of statisticians.

The full page of statistics, published in the Sunday Times every week has proven to be one of the most popular innovations in football coverage in the past couple of seasons.

A team of ten fully trained statisticians compile this information at every league match.

These statistics are processed by computer and leading kickgetters, marks, handballs and hit outs are published weekly in Westside Football.

The computer also compiles averages on most facets of a teams performance.

The chart below shows some of this information up to the end of the first series last Saturday. The figures shown are weekly averages.

East Fremantle, currently in third place on the WAFL ladder, obviously rely more on handball than any other side.

Their average of 199.9 kicks per game and 64.1 marks is less than any other team in the competition, whereas they have a higher tally of handpasses

Perth, with a weekly average of 40 hit-outs, hold a commanding lead in the ruck department, despite their low place on the league table.

East Perth, with an above average level of kicks, marks and handballs head the tally of overall disposals.

Umpires have come in for a fair share of criticism this season, but our chart shows no great variance in the free-kick department.

Subiaco seem to have done best, picking up an average of 40.1 free kicks each week, while conceding only 29.3. A handsome advantage of 11 kicks each week.

Swans and Perth are giving away six more frees than they are earning each week. South Fremantle are approximately even, while East Perth and Claremont concede two more than they receive.

West Perth trail Subiaco as the second-best off in the receipt of kicks, with an advantage of four each week.

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FOOTBALL CLINIC

A weekly feature dealing with the treatment of football injuries.

FUNDAMENTAL BANDAGING AND STRAPPING TECHNIQUES

ANCHOR STRIPS: Initial application of tape used as a basis of application for further strips.



STIRRUPS: The example given is the technique used for lateral ankle ligament injury. The tension on the bandage is reversed for medial ligament injury.

The bandage begins on the medial aspect of the calf and passes under the heel and finishes on the lateral aspect of the leg. Tension is emphasised on the bandage to help maintain the foot in dorsiflexion and eversion. Successive stirrups overlap one another by approximately one third. A normal application would be three stirrups.

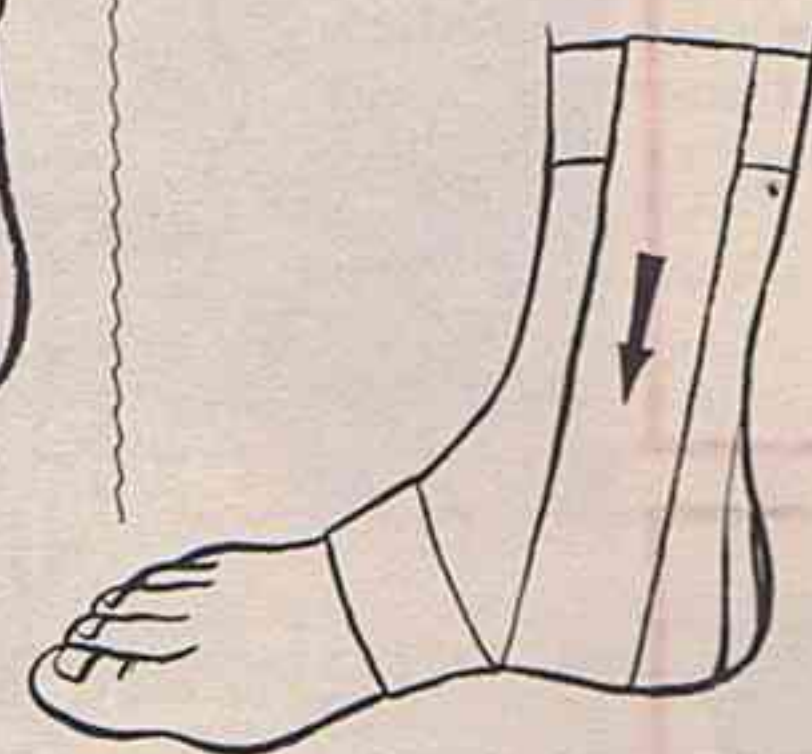


FIGURE SIX: The example shown is for lateral ankle ligament injury. The technique is reversed for medial ankle ligament injury.

The bandage begins on the dorsum (top) of the foot and passes under the arch of the foot to finish on the lateral aspect of the calf. Tension is applied on the bandage to maintain the foot in eversion. Successive applications overlap one another by approximately one third. A normal application would be two to four overlapping strips.

Cousins relishes the responsibility

WHEN the Perth captaincy was first offered to Bryan Cousins in 1982 he was reluctant to take on the position.

His form the previous season was not up to his high standards and he held grave fears of failing in the most responsible on-field position in the game.

The chairman of selectors at the time was Pat Astone — the man who was Demons skipper when Cousins made his league debut in 1970 — the league coach, Ian Miller and reserves coach, Allan "Chubby" Stiles were good friends and Cousins did not want to let him down.

But in hind-sight, Cousins had nothing to fear.

In his three seasons as Demons captain he has played some of the best football of a 15-season league career.

"Initially I did have a fear of letting those people down after they had shown faith in my ability," Cousins recalls. "I had not been happy with my own form after returning from Geelong.

"However, the appointment made me more responsible — both as a player and in life in general.

"I have a philosophy that you either do things or you don't. There is no point saying later that if this happened or that happened I could have been a champion.

"Under Alan Joyce I did not play to capacity and I was apprehensive about taking it on. But it meant a lot to me that Pat, Ian and Chubby approached me to do it.

"Football is a game of opportunity," Cousins says. "And that is something I always stress to the young players at the club.

"They sometimes feel that coaches do

not give them the opportunities that they deserve and they drop their bundle if they are relegated to the reserves.

"But the coaches have a tough job. They must have every individual in the team playing as well as they can and they strive to achieve that aim in their own way."

Evidence of Cousins' new-found form came when he was runner-up (on a countback to East Perth's John Ironmonger) in last year's Channel 7-Sandover Medal.

He has carried the burden of the captaincy of the lamenting Demons for a couple of years, but this year has relished the return of experienced players like Robert Wiley and Peter Bosustow.

In addition, young players like Rhett Baynes have also risen to the occasion.

"Some of the young players have now worked their way out of the losing syndrome," Cousins says.

"Take Rhett for example.

"He has played about 60 games for Perth, but he has probably only been in a winning team 10 times.

"In addition, because there has been a lack of experience and depth he has had to take on senior roles.

"In comparison, someone like Peter Sartori was able to move slowly into league football with Swans, playing mainly from a forward or back-pocket.

"His learning process was much easier than Rhett's and Swans benefitted when he was one of the stars in last year's finals."

Perth skipper Bryan Cousins, has relished the captaincy and the responsibilities it brings. And he has plenty on his plate at present. If Perth are to come out of their current slump, Cousins will play a leading hand.

Top duo add their support

BEFORE this season Perth skipper Bryan Cousins desperately lacked senior support at Lathlain Park.

But he has obviously appreciated the return of former stars Robert Wiley and Peter Bosustow.

Wiley's influence has been particularly noticeable in the early part of the 1984 season.

The five-times fairest and best winner for Perth returned to WA after a stint with VFL giants Richmond, where he continued his high standard of football. He has made a big difference to the

younger players at the club — obviously remembering what it was like for him when he broke into senior football in 1974.

There were players of the calibre of John Quartermaine, Brian Cook, Colin Lofts, Doug Farrant, Murray Couper, Gary Gibellini, Wim Rosbender, Mal Day and Ken Inman playing for Perth at that stage, so there was no shortage of experience and knowledge when he forced his way into league ranks.

An indication of Wiley's ability was that he won the fairest and best award for Perth in every season before he went to Melbourne in 1979.

Owens was the colts captain until elevated last week and he should be able to hold his place, while Howard impressed with his effort on the wing.



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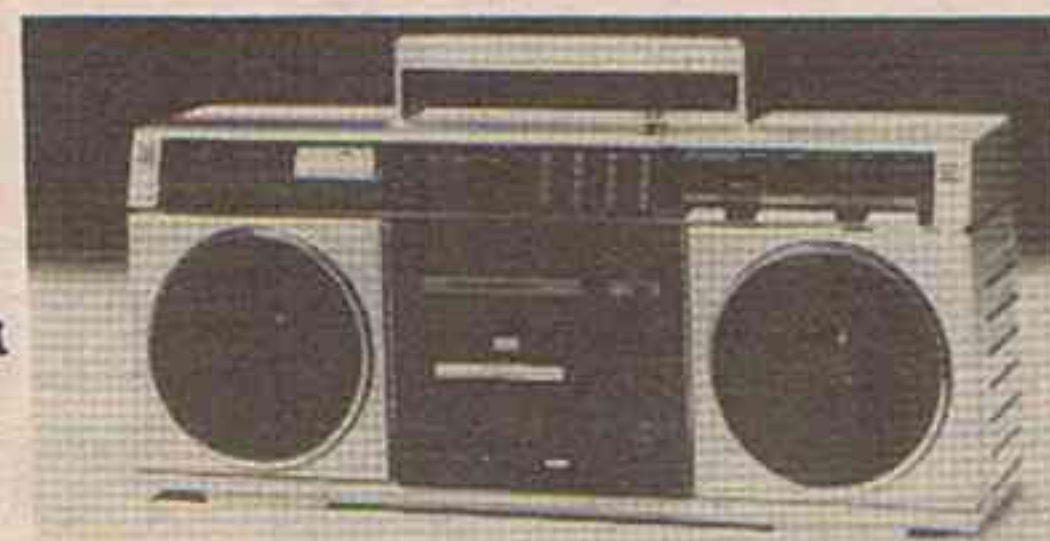

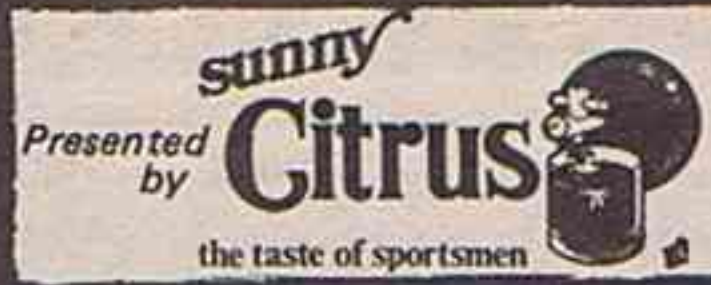
The tackle...

If your opponent has the ball — and that's a must — then you can grab him (a tackle) between the shoulders and the knees. In other words, you can throw your arms around him to prevent him from getting away or from disposing of the ball. But if you grab him above the shoulders, that's around the neck and below the knees is a trip.

AND you cannot push him forward . . . that's in the back. So make sure you drag him to the ground, using your feet as 'brakes' to stop sliding forward.

PLAN FOR TV PROMOTION

HAVING watched one of the recent WAFL games live on ABC country television, I realised what a great medium the WAFL has for extra promotion of Australian football.

The country literally stops for Saturday's live telecast — thus bringing together a huge audience that is eagerly waiting for football and therefore a market to promote the game.

Half-time of the telecast is used by the ABC to show any programme they can get their hands on to fill in about 15 minutes.

This is where the WAFL should step in with a professionally-produced football segment.

The films could range from coaching techniques, the ugly parents, ruck play and individual skill using WAFL stars.

The production of these videos would be done during a two-day period and then replayed throughout the season, maybe twice a round.

I am sure the ABC would be most receptive.

It is common knowledge that television is perhaps the best medium for promotion.

We have a magnificent captive audience — but what we need is for the WAFL to act.

Once these segments are made and used by the ABC they could take their place in the WAFL football video library for clubs to borrow and use for coaching courses and promotions.

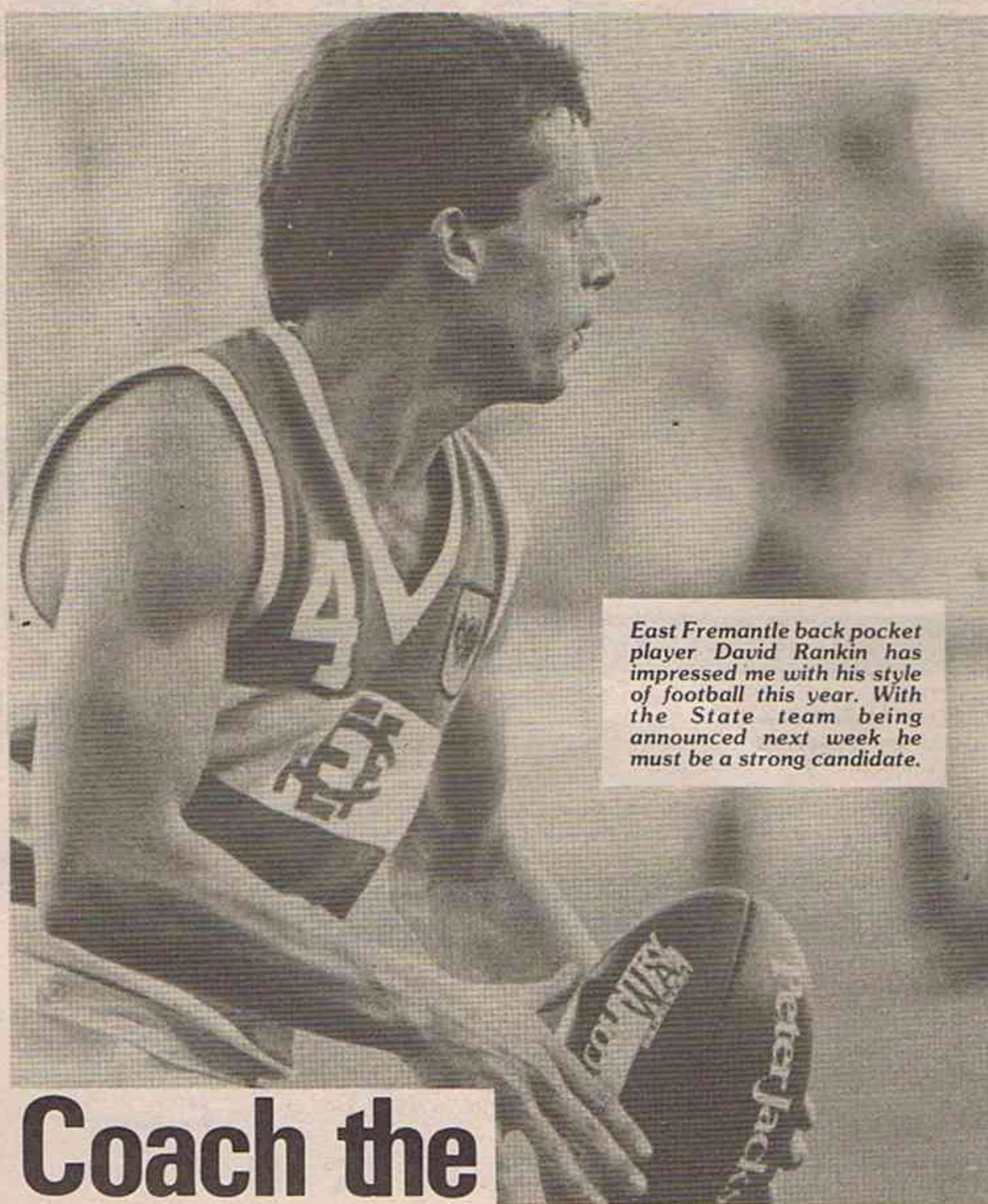
Their use would continue for years with enormous benefit to our game.
