DRAFT OUR COUNTRY BOYS

SCRAP THE ZONES

PLAN TO BOOST LOW CLUBS

SAYS GRANT DORRINGTON

LET'S scrap country zoning — and set up a draft system for next season.

Every football season raises conjectures about country towns being zoned to a league club.

Some country people argue that their freedom of choice is being taken away from them — and they are disadvantaged if they are linked with an unsuccessful league club.

My plan for a draft system would mean:

- ALL 18-year-old country players would become eligible to be drafted by a league club.
- THE eight league clubs would meet and the bottom club would have first choice to draft a set number of players. The top club would have the last choice before the bottom club selected another player.
- FINANCIAL benefits for the drafted player would be set by the WAFL. This would include a signing-on fee, away-from-home allowance and a first-year contract fee.
- COMPENSATION to the country club to assist that club produce and develop football. A sum of about \$1000 should be offered.
- ALL country football junior development to come

under the control of the WAFL director of coaching and the junior development administrator. They would have full-time development officers travelling through the country to hold coaching courses, player camps, umpire courses and development schemes.

• LEAGUE clubs should concentrate their resources and manpower on the city and their senior players — but visit country areas more often to watch games and keep an eye on the players they might want to draft.

The country visits would give all associations the chance to meet and see each league club, thus promoting the game of Australian football.

Imagine, for example, Albany being visited during the football season by the league club president, general manager or football administrator and a star player like Keith Narkle (Swans), Les Fong (West Perth), Greg Walsh (Royals), Stephen Michael (Bulldogs) and so on — the town would come alive.

Prominent Australian football personalities visiting the West should go to the country for the promotion of Australian football. The recent visit of VFL president Dr Allen Aylett would have been a great opportunity to have him as guest speaker in a major country town.

With the introduction of the new WAFL Board, the time is ripe for some positive changes to the promotion and development of Australian football within Western Australia.

SUBIACO are on target to repeat their traditional mid-season slide to the bottom rungs of the premiership table if current form is any indication.

The Lions promised so much early in the season, but have failed dismally to live up to that encouraging start. They face some problem times before they can be seriously considered a final four threat.

Two things have emerged from which the Lions can take heart and build upon.

The gradually improved stature of young ruckmen Phil Scott and Laurie Keene must be seen as the most encouraging thing to come out of the opening third of 1984.

Although Keene was a last-minute withdrawal from the Subiaco line-up last week, Scott carried the ruck responsibilities with maturity and confidence.

Scott faced the daunting task of beating the State's most promising ruckman, Paul Harding and the Sharks big man brigade which has some experienced back-up ruckmen.

But Scott's dominant ruck work around the ground, where he was clearly the best ruckman afield, exposed one serious question.

Where can the Lions find a talented rover to back up his hard work? And they need a key forward to utilise the mid-field opportunities that Scott, Keene and a busy rover would create.

Lions captain Neil Taylor, veteran Peter Featherby, vice-captain Phil Lamb and State team prospect Dwayne Lamb are expected to do too much.



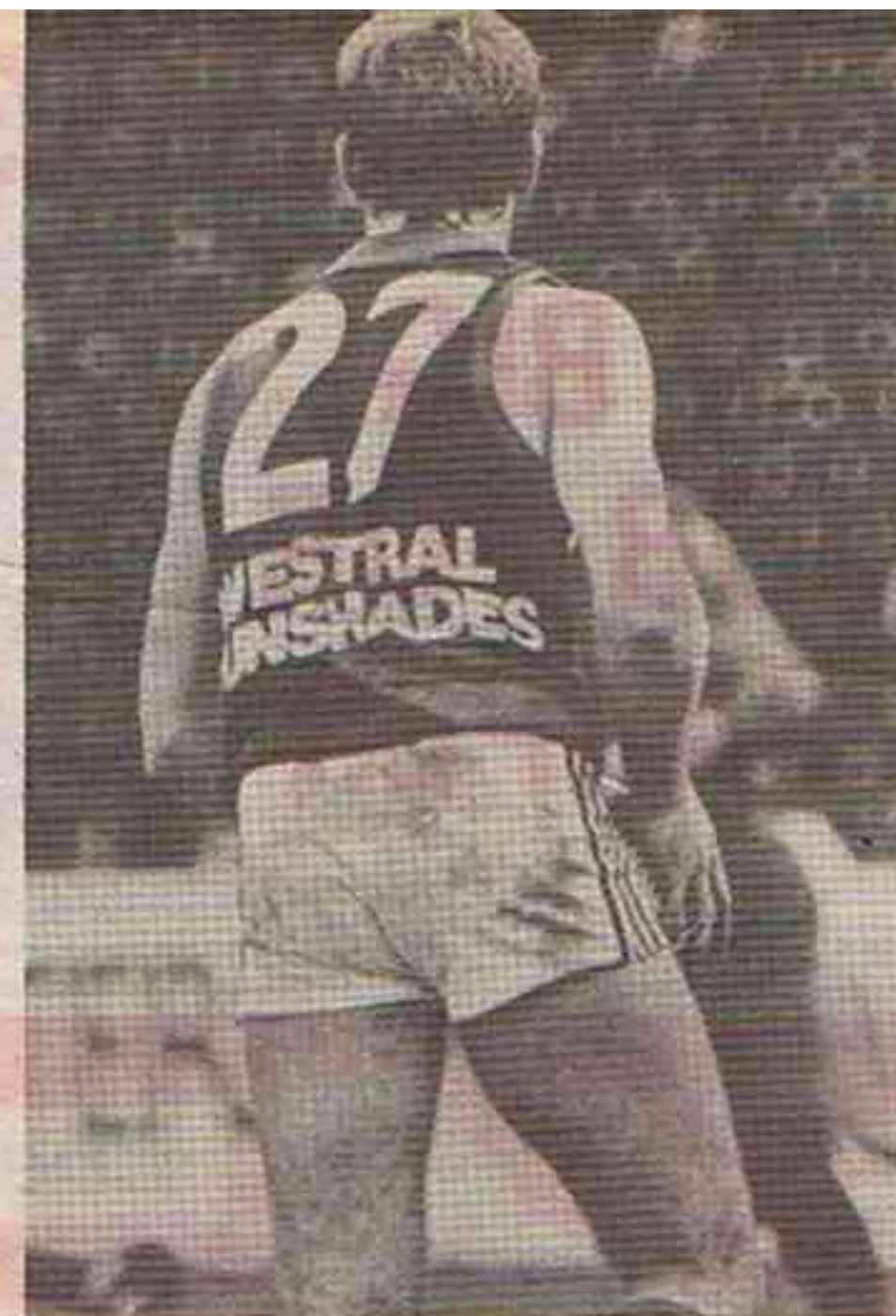

Far too often against the Sharks the ball rebounded from the Lions forward line with relative ease.

There is no aggression up forward for the Lions and the mid-field work of Scott and his following division is being let down.

Two, or perhaps even three, players will not make the Lions an instant success. But it would give them more around the ground alternatives to what they have now.

Subiaco had one of the healthiest bank balances at the end of 1983. They must, for the sake of their future, spend a little to gain a little.



EXPOSED

PERTH became the second club to take advantage of the WAFL's new rule allowing advertising on the backs of their guernseys. Westral Sunshades took up the offer and it had an immediate impact at Subiaco Oval on Saturday. At first it appeared as though the players had their names on the back of their guernseys, but a look through the binoculars revealed Westral Sunshades had bought the spot. No doubt many fans pulled out their glasses to get a closer look at what the wording was.

CHEER-LESS

WHEN cheer squads began to take off in WA football, one of the leading groups was the Perth squad. But they were notable absentees on Saturday. The West Perth squad built a huge banner for their players to run through while the Perth players made a less glamorous entry to the arena — running onto the ground minus a run-through. Hopefully the Perth squad has not disbanded.

ON THE HOP

EAST Perth's Frank Wilson portrayed the dismal day the club had against Swan Districts. He took a great mark in the goalsquare in the last quarter, but as he came to ground someone trod on his toe. He hopped around painfully, producing some unusual antics, but was finally forced to take his shot at goal — and he missed from point blank range.

DOUBLE AWARD

EAST Perth presented special merit award certificates to two of their stalwarts last Saturday night. Phylis and Sam Smith had been acknowledged at the club's annual general meeting last year, but were away overseas at the time. The couple have been involved in a variety of behind-the-scenes jobs at Perth Oval for many years. Sam Smith summed up their feelings after the presentation: "We'll be around for as long as the club wants us."

BALL TOPS

FIELD umpire Mike Ball took out the \$500 cash prize as the top umpire in the Ampol awards for the first series of football. Ball, with 118 games to his credit, has continued on from last season when he was voted Ampol Umpire-of-the-Year. A repeat of that form this season will see him win a trip for two to London as part of the Ampol sponsorship. Ball topped the poll for the first series with an average of 74.42 for his seven games. He just shaded Brian Hearne, who has made a successful return to senior umpiring, with 74.28. Sharing third place were Richard Austin and Dave Johnson on 73.71.



HANDY HELPERS

THERE was a lot of experience among the runners of the reserves teams at Subiaco Oval last Saturday. The Perth runner was Ross Millson, who played 103 games for the Demons during the 1960s and early 1970s while West Perth's representative was Paul Mountain, who played 23 games with Swan Districts, 116 for South Fremantle and has now played 13 games for the Falcons. Millson began his career at Perth in 1967 and was a member of their premiership team of that year. Throughout his time at Perth he established himself as a class wingman. Mountain began at Swan Districts in 1970, but played only 23 games before joining South Fremantle in 1977. When opportunities were hard to come by at the port club last year he decided to head to Leederville Oval.

WA STARS

THERE has never been much doubt that West Australian footballers exercise considerable influence on the VFL.

Take last week for example. West Australians were prominent in all matches and four of the 12 VFL sides had their best player from across the borders.

WA players in dynamic form were Ken Hunter (15 kicks and 13 marks for Carlton), Stephen McCann (13 kicks and 13 marks for North Melbourne), Alan Johnson (18 kicks for Melbourne) and Leon Baker (20 kicks and, 10 marks and 12 handballs for Essendon).

DANGER POINT

CHANNEL Seven critic John Rogers was spot on when he raised the question of ducking-the-head last week. The World of Sport program showed several examples from the East Perth-Swan Districts game and they all confirmed that the Umpires Board (or the League) must act to stamp it out. Umpires Richard Austin and Dave Johnson seemed pre-occupied with the around-the-neck rule and awarded far too many kicks for this infringement. Some were for blatant head-ducking and others were for light touches applied in passing by opponents. It was embarrassing to watch the stop-start play over a rule that hardly ever justifies itself.

INTERCHANGE UPDATE

MAL Brown has brought to a head the need to clarify laws governing the interchange of players.

A bad example of the interchange problem is at league headquarters where players and officials must cover more than 60 metres to reach the interchange zone on the centre wing.

In sports where the interchange or substitution of players is legal during the course of play, accurate recording of the changes are made.

To make things simple in football, there should be an interchange zone in front of each coach's bench and an official, either neutral or from the opposition club recording every player swap.

The only clear thing about the interchange presently is that if a player doesn't leave the ground through the designated zone, he may not return to the game.

Why not?

If a club makes the recording with the appropriate official it can still be policed effectively.

Naturally, it will be easier to record the interchanges from a central point.

But the interchange is an important aspect of modern football and must be used by respective sides to the fullest.

A zone directly in front of each bench would allow for quicker and more effective access in the transfer of players — and less delays in the care of injured players.

The key to a system such as this is accuracy in recording player movements.

It can be done. Once a player is out of the game momentarily, it is recorded and he may not return until the official controlling the interchange is notified.

Every game is governed by laws. It just seems that other sports have a more rigid interpretation of theirs than football.

At a recent training night the Sharks were doing their warm-down lap and Kerr was showing off with his Michael Jackson dancing technique, going through all the motions running backwards. He turned around just in time to run straight into one of the goal posts.

Too much aggro off the field

FOOTBALL has suddenly become much too aggressive — off the field.

The inter-club aggression out in the arena is all good stuff; the sort of physical conflict that the fans pay good money to see.

But the amount of spiteful aggression that is now evident off the field is not good for the game.

I'm talking about continual bouts of conflict between rival coaches; between coaches and media — and between club presidents and the new WAFL Board of Directors.

The verbal battle this year between the media and the coaches has, at times, reached spiteful — and almost physical — proportions. There is very little good said about either side in many camps.

The media may well fall short of the standards that some coaches and their club officials would require. But then, the playing standard of some players and clubs fall well short of what some media people would like also.

FREE PUBLICITY

The WAFL receives a tremendous amount of free publicity about the game in this State — something some rival sports would give an arm and a leg for — but it is often abused; seldom received gratefully and generally taken for granted.

Too many clubs and coaches are too defensive in today's world of communication.

We need personalities, superstars, characters, call them what you will, to brighten up our game and get the fans back turning turnstiles.

To have a situation where the clubs are growing further away from the media — and that includes the part-timers as well as the fully-committed radio, TV and newspaper people — is not good.

A meet-the-media function at East Perth this week only attracted a handful of media people, with quite a few Royals players and officials feeling put out by the non-attendance.

There were a number of reasons for the poor turn-out; but maybe one over-riding factor is that the communication breakdown and the genuine lack of football feeling between clubs and media has led to this situation of apathy.

Most clubs have generally regarded the media as "necessary evils"; something that has to be tolerated; but also a commodity that can be taken for granted.

Gone are the days when media men spent hours in football club bars; a sad fact of football life, but one that has contributed to the gradual breakdown in communication.

Now, when a media person tries to generate new activity, there is generally a willingness to co-operate on the surface, but a lack of total commitment underneath when it comes down to the nitty gritty.

We have seen clubs refuse to allow certain players to be photographed; coaches decline interviews on behalf of their players — and even one league coach who is seldom available for after-match comments.

Media men have given up trying to get into most club rooms before a match — and it's even harder after a game.

It's really time for the whole football world to get its act together again.

After all, we are all on the same side, really.

STATS MEN HAVE A JOB TO DO

SWAN Districts coach John Todd used his interesting column recently to have a shot at the official statistics that are published weekly in The Sunday Times and also in Westside Football.

He questioned the use of stats in football generally and felt that there was too much emphasis placed on how many kicks, marks and handpasses a player gets.

I couldn't agree more.

There are too many examples each week when media people generally reply on the stats to help pick their best-on-ground.

But where I disagree with the Swans coach is how the newspaper stats differ with those taken by club officials.

Where Todd missed the point is that each club has special requirements of their own stats men.

The eight men who compile stats for the media work on common ground, all with the same guidelines as to what is a kick and so forth.

They are not intended to be compiled for the benefit of a coach, who might be seeking something out of the ordinary. They are for the benefit of the football fan to provide a bland summary of who did what.

Todd questioned the qualifications of the stats men — suggesting they were not capable of doing the job — which was unfair.

They have been specially trained for the job; follow the same team each week so they know the players and only have to compile stats on their 20 players.

All those who know how the stats men work are confident of their accuracy. If they differ from the official club stats, that is because they are looking for different things.

There may be too much emphasis on stats in the overall assessment of footballers — particularly when it comes to the hard things that are done, but not recorded and the negative tactics taken by defenders.

But they are a growing part of football promotion and communication, John, and that's good for the game. Even coaches use stats to back up their theories, sometimes!

The Sharks enthusiasm and team work is a feature of their play and will need to be repeated if they are to take another step towards a second semi-final appearance in September.

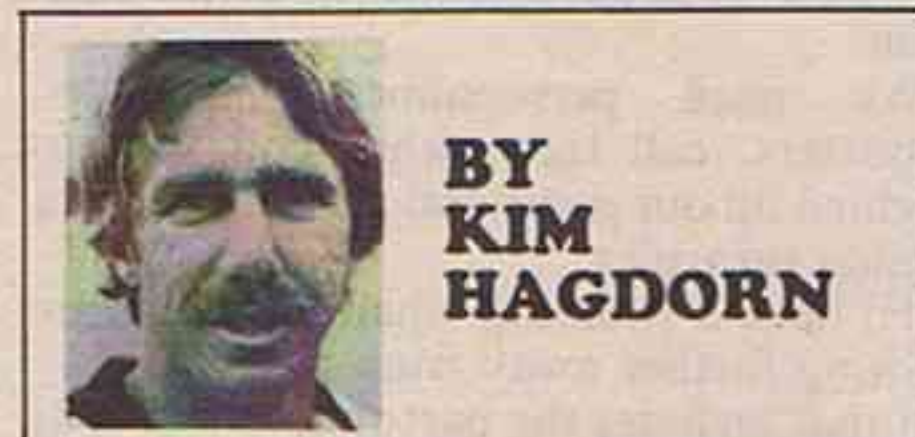
The Tigers have re-emerged as final-four contenders with character wins in their last two outings.

But the Tigers will have to find a method of stopping the slick cohesion of the Sharks defence before they can take the vital four points.

Half-back Shane Ellis is responsible for many of the Sharks forward surges with the dashing assistance of full-backs David Rankin and Clinton Browning.

The three defenders — backed up by mid-fielders Michael Brennan, Peter Wilson and Sandover Medal fancy Murray Wrensted — back their judgment to run the ball to the many alternatives the Sharks have up forward.

Jeff Cassidy firing in the forward line the Sharks have all the ingredients to continue their winning system.

But the Tigers have found a 1984 formula for success — and it bears great familiarity to that which made them a force earlier in the 1980s.

Steve Malaxos and Allen Daniels have been consistent all season, Darrell Panizza is back on a wing, Baden Harper and Larry Kickett are steady in defence and the pace of Michael Mitchell around the ground has the Tigers ready to match it with the Sharks.

BIG TEST FOR BAYNES

JUST how good is Perth's Rhett Baynes?

That question could be answered in the East Perth—Perth clash at Perth Oval this Saturday.

With the loss of champion rover Robert Wiley, Baynes' job of pitting his talents against the State's No. 1 ruckman, John Ironmonger takes on greater importance.

Baynes has been in brilliant form, reminiscent of Ironmonger's 1983 start which clinched the Royals giant the Sandover Medal.

The loss of Wiley is a bitter blow to the Demons' chances of matching the pace of the Royals small-man brigade.

The elusive Peter Spencer, youngster Tony Papotto, Russell Sparks and Greg Carpenter have fed off Ironmonger's superb ruck work since his return to top football.

With mid-field control, the Royals' key forwards Grant Campbell and John Scott should cause plenty of concern for the Demons' defenders.

Unless Baynes and captain Bryan Cousins can provide the undermanned Demons with opportunities up forward, East Perth appear far too strong.

Falcons can continue

WEST Perth will continue to please coach Dennis Cometti when they take a step further towards the 1984 finals against Subiaco, at Subiaco Oval.

The Lions demonstrated a number of basic flaws in their loss to East Fremantle and Cometti is sure to exploit these weaknesses further.

The Falcons have been ruthless in their climb back to footballing credibility; a frightening thought for the out-of-form Lions.

Peter Menaglio, Les Fong, Brian Perrin, George Michalcyk, Paul Mifka and Dean Warwick are a formidable mid-field unit.

Add Graeme Comerford and Geoff Hendriks in defence, while Derek Kickett has emerged as the most exciting forward in the game.

The Lions lack the fundamentals to combat the Falcons supremacy and much will depend on Dwayne Lamb, captain Neil Taylor, Peter Featherby (who is not fit) and ever-reliable Phil Lamb.

Phil Scott is capable of tackling any ruckman in the game, but he lacks support in the big man duels and the Lions look set for another hard time.

Plenty at stake

THERE is plenty at stake in the Swan Districts-South Fremantle clash at Bassendean Oval.

Not only are the four points vital to both sides, but players will be out to impress State coach John Todd for the SA clash in two weeks' time.

Todd and Brown are both after top spot on the premiership table and what better pressure to decide a player's worth for a State guernsey than in a game of such importance.

The Bulldogs lethargy of finishing the first series with top billing cost them dearly against Claremont last week, while Swans handed out a drubbing to East Perth.

Souths will bounce back. Skipper Brad Hardie, with his 'lead by example' approach, will call on Stephen Michael, Rod Barrett, the brilliant Benny Vigona and link man Paul Vasoli for special efforts.

Tough man Brad Shine, the skilful Gerard Neesham and Leigh Brenton form a strong Swans contingent mid-field, while Noel Carter and Hardie pose threats to Swans authority around the packs.

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BENNETT'S BURST

WA faces a tough challenge

WA's football reputation is in for a big dent when we meet South Australia in Adelaide on June 9.

As reigning Australian champs, WA should be looking forward with confidence to the clash with the Crows. After all, we stitched up SA and Victoria last year. But it won't happen in Adelaide.

In fact, we could be struggling just to give a creditable performance.

We have taken a terrible hiding in Adelaide in our last two clashes there.

Our loss in 1982 — 29.23 to 12.4 — is one we would like to forget. We didn't do much better in 1980 when we went down 21.19 to 9.10.

For a while it looked as though we had overcome the SA jinx in Adelaide — the type that haunts them whenever they venture to Subiaco Oval.

That was when interstate matches were shifted from the muddy Adelaide Oval to Football Park.

In fact, we managed to win two successive games against them there in 1977 and 1978.

It looks as though the pendulum has swung back to SA.

It may seem as though I'm deriding WA, but unfortunately it's a fact of football life.

We have lost so many star players to the VFL in comparison to SA that we are at a distinct disadvantage when we play interstate without our expatriates.

Comparisons cannot be made with WA-SA clashes in Perth.

For some inexplicable reason we can put up a young, inexperienced team and still beat SA here.

There have been times when we looked likely to be struggling on paper against them in Perth, but still handled them comfortably.

I suspect that the South Aussies just don't have the legs for Subiaco Oval. They seem to run out of pace as the game progresses.

SA's performance in running Victoria to four points in Adelaide last week indicates that the Crows will field a formidable team against us.

COMPETITIVE

On paper WA looks capable of selecting a very competitive side, but there are a couple of real problem areas for us.

For instance, who will play at full-back against Stephen Kernahan, who kicked 10 goals against the Vics.

Shane Ellis may be the best prospect.

Full-forward also poses a problem. Peter Bosustow could play there but he may be required at centre-half-forward.

Murray Rance would probably be needed at centre-half-back if Ellis is played at full-back.

Fortunately we are well endowed in two important areas... across the centre and on the ball.

But no matter what case you make for WA, there's no hiding the fact that we have been left short on talent because of the annual pirating of players by the VFL.

I know it's useless bemoaning the fact but it's about time some system was devised that allowed a State to call on its best players for ALL interstate games.

What a difference it would make if WA was able to call on the services of players such as Leon Baker, Ross Glendinning, Brian Peake, Maurice Rioli etc.

Still there is some consolation. That opportunity will come when we play the Vics here on July 17.

Phillips bows out

INJURY takes its toll on umpires as well as players and one of the State's leading men-in-white has been forced into retirement. Bob Phillips broke down in a league match early in the first series this year and the emergency umpire was called on to take over. Phillips tried desperately to regain his fitness, but the extent of the leg injury was such that he was forced to give the game away. Phillips made his league debut in 1967 and umpired more than 210 games, including the 1980 and 1982 grand finals. He was one of the most respected umpires in this State and his experience will be missed by the panel.

FAMILIAR ROLE

ONE of the leading boundary umpires from last year, Damian Green, turned to field umpiring this season and has received good reports from games he has controlled in the country. But he found himself running the boundary again last Saturday. Because of injury and the school holidays many boundary umpires were unavailable last Saturday and Green took on the job of officiating in the colts match between East Perth and Swan Districts.

YOUNG STARTERS

TWO 17-year-olds have run the boundary in reserves this year. About four weeks ago Dominic White was given his first opportunity and he has done well enough to hold his place. And on Saturday another youngster was promoted. David Metcalf was one of the boundary umpires in the reserves game between Claremont and South Fremantle. The two youngsters certainly seem on line for bright futures in the game and it is good to see them involved at such an early age.

QUICK RISE

TERRY Tomlinson, who joined the WAFL panel as a goal umpire at the start of this season, has been promoted. He spent the first six games of the year in the colts and performed well enough to earn a move up the grades. On Saturday he was given his first taste at reserves level and did a competent job.

Few problems on interchange

THE interchange rule was introduced at the start of the 1978 season and functioned fairly smoothly, with a couple of exceptions, until last Saturday at Claremont.

Injured South Fremantle player Benny Vigona made an illegal exit and it caused all sorts of trouble.

The first real breach of this law came in 1978 in the ninth round when South Fremantle played West Perth at Fremantle Oval.

Falcons player Ray Boyanich left the playing area outside the marked area and later returned to the field. South protested to the WAFL, claiming that West Perth's score should have been annulled (West Perth won by four points).

The Bulldogs later withdrew their protest but West Perth were fined \$750 over the incident.

This was not the only incident that day. After the game there was a noisy demonstration against the umpires (Buckey and Chinnery) that prompted the Commissioner of Police to investigate the situation of mounted police at games.

LOW SCORES

SOUTH Fremantle coach Mal Brown had several reasons to get "hot under the collar" last Saturday.

In his 145-game career as South coach, the Bulldogs have only twice scored less than the 66 points they kicked against Claremont on Saturday. BUT on both occasions they managed to win.

In 1980 South Fremantle kicked 8.13 (61 points) to Claremont's 3.4 (22) on a very wet day and in 1979 South posted 8.10 (58) to beat East Perth 7.10 (52).

TOP EFFORT

IN last week's interstate game in Adelaide, Glenelg player Stephen Kernahan kicked 10 goals against Victoria.

I could be wrong, but I think that is the only time anyone has ever registered a double figure tally against the Vics.

Ten-goal tallies in interstate football are rare. I could find only four instances of this happening against WA.

In 1977 Peter Hudson (Victoria) achieved the feat at Subiaco Oval; in 1962 Doug Wade (Victoria) did it in Melbourne; in 1953 Clayton Thompson (South Australia) kicked double figures against WA in Adelaide; and in 1925 C. Rankin (Victoria) became the first man to do it when the two teams met in Melbourne.

FILLING IN

THIS one is for John K. Watts. It appears full-back was not considered a position of great importance in the early days of football in WA.

A 1916 report says: "East Fremantle included Truscott, who was still suffering from an injured leg. That forced him to occupy the position of full-back." It was the final of that year which was won by South Fremantle.

EARLY MATCHES

COULD this happen to today's football? A 1912 report says arrangements were made to play two matches on a Monday morning (the June holiday) to allow members and supporters of other clubs to witness the East Fremantle-Subiaco clash at Subiaco Oval in the afternoon. West Perth and East Perth were scheduled to meet at 10.30am at the WACA ground and North Fremantle and Perth were due to start at the same time. The big match was scheduled to start at 3.15pm.

TWO STARS OF THE FUTURE

IN the last fortnight league football has seen two colts players elevated to league level straight from the under-age competition. And both have impressed in their league debuts. Two weeks ago young Claremont star Peter Owens, the captain of the colts side, made an impressive entry into league football against Perth. He worked hard for his kicks and while he has a long way to go, he has the basic requirements to be around in league football for a long while. And then on Saturday Perth followed Claremont's example by giving Peter McKell his first game at senior level. He came up against star West Perth first year player Paul Mifka and the young Falcon won the duel because he has that slight edge in experience — having played a season of reserves. But McKell showed enough to suggest he will be a good player for the Demons in the future.

GLOOMY REPORT

I KNOW it was dark at Perth Oval last week, but I could not believe my ears when told of the report which had been made against Swan Districts defender Tony Solin. The umpires charged him for allegedly striking an unknown East Perth player and then to see him get a week's suspension was even more amazing. Surely the umpires could have worked out who Solin was supposed to have hit before making the report. I consider him extremely unlucky.

CHRONIC TONIC



Congratulations to Geoff Hendriks — better known as Chronic because he is always injured — on playing his 150th game for West Perth last Saturday. He did a magnificent job for the side in their important clash with Perth. Geoff has been around the league football scene for some time now and it was pleasing that he played so well on the occasion of his memorable milestone. He was a member of West Perth's premiership team as a 16-year-old in 1975 and he is still only 25 so he has many more games ahead of him.

DOUBLE-BANG

IT was interesting to see Doug and Wayne Simms playing in opposition sides last week. Doug was playing on a half forward flank for West Perth against his old side Perth and Wayne played in the ruck with Perth. They both figured prominently in the goal scoring department, being their team's highest score, with Doug kicking six for the Falcons and Wayne booting four for the Demons. An interesting sidelight was that they both wore number 29 for their respective sides. I wonder whether that is a first in WA football.

SKILLED STAR

NEW Swan Districts player Steve Richardson impressed me greatly at Perth Oval last week when he played solidly against East Perth. He played most of the game in the backline and put in a creditable performance. He puts everything into a game and he did not give any of his opponents any latitude, using his destructive skills to good advantage.

Sunday battle set to hot up

THE campaign for Sunday football is mounting in Victoria — with strong newspaper support aiming to pressure the Government into a change of mind.

The Sunday Observer, one of Victoria's two Sunday newspapers with a strong football flavour, has launched a campaign seeking public support for Sunday games.

A recent decision of the Victorian Government to allow several soccer matches to be staged at the MCG — the hallowed home of cricket and football — on Sundays has angered the football world.

Ken Piesse, the sports editor of the Observer and one of Australia's most prolific sporting authors, says that Victorian premier John Cain is way out of line with his ruling against Sunday football.



In a strongly-worded editorial launching the campaign, Piesse has urged all football clubs to withdraw the privileges they now extend to Government people — such as the VIP lunches, the finals tickets and the parking and seating perks throughout the year.

The Observer has published a special coupon seeking public feeling about Sunday games and the result of the mail-in poll will be used as a platform to convince Mr Cain to change his attitude.

Mr Cain said last week: "We are not prepared to allow regular Sunday football because we are concerned to protect the interests of junior football, the VFA and country competitions."

Piesse's answer was: "That is a disgracefully tepid argument. A huge majority of out-of-town senior competitions, in fact, play on Saturdays and more than 90 percent of junior and suburban games are also on Saturday."

MAGICAL MAURICE

MANY football critics have examined the merits of magical Maurice Rioli, the Thursday Islander who made his name with South Fremantle.

Rioli has been in blistering form since joining Richmond, being runner-up (to fellow-WA player Ross Glendinning) in last year's Brownlow Medal and setting similar standards this year.

Richmond clinched victory over Collingwood in the second quarter last Saturday — and it was the blazing Rioli, with the ball on the end of his magical fingers, who set up that quarter with some faultless skills.

So, is Rioli as brilliant a footballer as the original Mr Magic, St Kilda's Darrell Baldock?

New Richmond coach Mike Patterson, a former St Kilda player, ducked the issue a little after the scintillating Rioli performance.

"Baldock was Baldock, Rioli is Rioli," said Patterson.

Nonetheless, the Richmond fans are happy to claim Rioli as their Mr Magic.

MCG PICKETS

THE Builders' Labourers Federation picketed the MCG last Saturday in the continuing war over floodlights being installed at the ground.

They handed out posters headed "The MCG Superbox Scandal" — a reference to the boxes that are leased out, allegedly for \$200,000 a year.

The union claims that the boxes should be open to the workers and the public.

Peeved Parkin

CARLTON coach David Parkin certainly didn't enjoy seeing his original club, Hawthorn, set a record at Princes Park last week.

The Hawks crushed Carlton by a record 68-point margin — and Parkin, one-time Hawthorn premiership player and coach, had to withstand the defeat on behalf of the Blues.

Since Parkin had taken over at Carlton, he had achieved victory in seven of their eight encounters — but he paid tribute to the Hawks after their win.

"When you look at the Hawthorn centreline of Dippy (Dipierdomenico), Wallace and Schwab you find three players who don't run fast, but never stop and usually succeed in the finish," said Parkin.

"I have great admiration for these players."

MOORE'S MEDAL

VFL football fans are wanting to back Melbourne's Peter Moore to win his second Brownlow Medal.

The blond bombshell has been backed at odds of 12/1 and 10/1 since his return to form in the early games and some big bets — including one outlay of \$5000 — have been plunged on the star.

Good value is being offered by Melbourne bookmakers on the game's most prestigious award. Behind favourite Moore are Mark Browning, Greg Burns and WA's Maurice Rioli all on 15/1. Essendon's Leon Baker is a big tip also.

SA NEWS

Kerley is unhappy

THE SANFL administrators are under a great deal of pressure after the Croweaters' loss to Victoria in the interstate clash at Football Park last Tuesday night.

State coach Neil Kerley said that one of the major reasons for his side's four point loss was that all his players had to front up to two games within four days.

He called on the administrators to abandon matches a week before interstate clashes.

Kerley said that in the crucial last quarter the South Australian players felt the pinch while the Victorians were able to maintain pressure.

"The Victorians are conditioned to playing two tough pressure matches in the space of four days," Kerley said. "We are not and that showed in the last quarter."

"Tiredness brings a lack of discipline and they stopped doing the hard things."

WARRIORS AT WAR

THE Woodville Football Club have answered criticism levelled at them by some media men in Adelaide.

Club Chairman Mr Bill Sanders said they were prepared to accept constructive criticism, but active measures were being taken to ensure that the Warriors became a more competitive unit.

He said the recruiting committee had been strengthened in an effort to give coach Malcolm Blight the support he requires.

CLAREMONT'S Baden Harper must be on line for the full-back position in the State team to meet South Australia in Adelaide on June 9.

The squad will be announced on Saturday night and Harper only needs a good effort against East Fremantle to secure a berth in the squad.

The talented Tiger defender has played one game of State football before — but his form this season has been more consistent than at any stage of his career.

He has played solidly from full-back and from the pack pocket on the resting ruckmen and has done a magnificent job for his club.

It will take a big man with pace, a good mark and fine ball skills to counter Kernahan.

DEBUT

He has now played more than 90 league games and is ready to emerge as one of the real stars of West Australian football.

Since making his debut in 1975 he has been one of the most under-rated players in this State. He is now beginning to get his true recognition.

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FUNDAMENTAL BANDAGING AND STRAPPING TECHNIQUES

PART 2

LOCKING TAPES: — refers to a particular form of supportive or rehabilitative strapping designed to provide extra support in more than one direction i.e. with regard to normal movement combinations rather than isolated movements.

— applied to provide additional stability to the joint complex when it is being stressed, as in competition.

— usually applied with non-elastic adhesive tape to provide maximum support and adequate limitation of stressful movements. Additional support may be supplied by the application of a "locking bandage", using elastic adhesive bandage, over the taping.

— usually applied over "standard" ankle taping i.e. stirrups, figure 8, etc.

IMPORTANCE:

- (1) When there is a history of previous injury predisposing to joint instability.
- (2) When the athlete has a natural tendency to joint laxity, which may predispose to injury.
- (3) When there is a high risk of injury because of the nature of the sport.

EXAMPLE: THE HEEL LOCK

— apply the tape directly from the roll so adequate and even tension is maintained.

— start with the tape on the outside of the foot, just in front of the ankle. Pass the tape across the front of the ankle, under the foot, and then diagonally up the lateral aspect of the heel. Take the tape around and across the front of the ankle, under the foot and diagonally up the medial aspect of the heel. Again, pass the tape around and across the front of the ankle, and finish by taking one full turn around the forefoot.

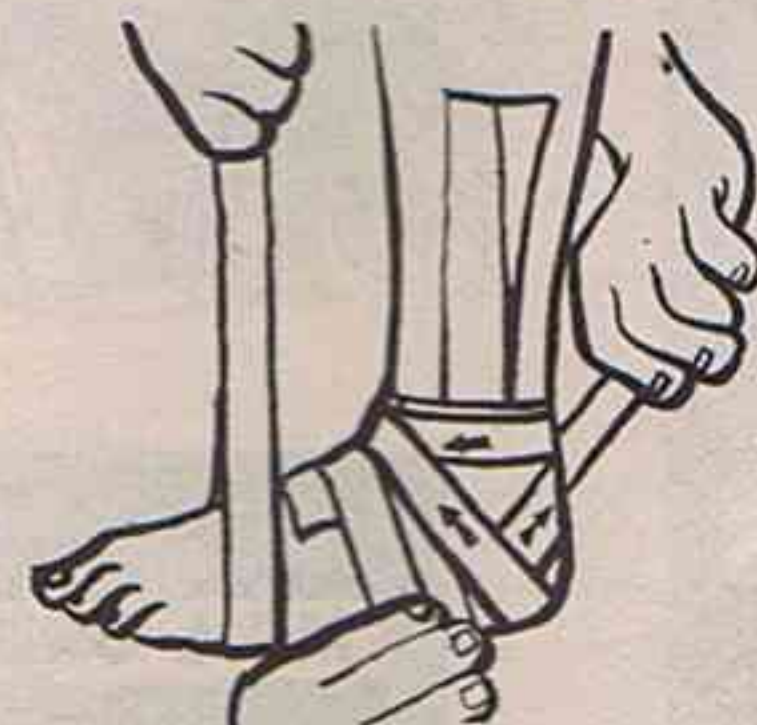


FIGURE OF EIGHT: This involves bandaging across the joint where the bandage is taken once around the limb on one side of the joint, across the joint and once around the other side and so on, making a series of figures of eight. The result bears a resemblance to an ear of wheat and it is referred to as a "spica pattern". The main purpose of this technique is to apply compression to a joint while allowing some flexion and impeding extension.

Holmes in a danger mood

SWAN Districts danger-man Don Holmes gave the East Perth defenders a torrid time last Saturday. It is disappointing that Osborne Park, in particular, have not maintained their colts teams in amateurs as they field one in the newly formed Sunday Football League.

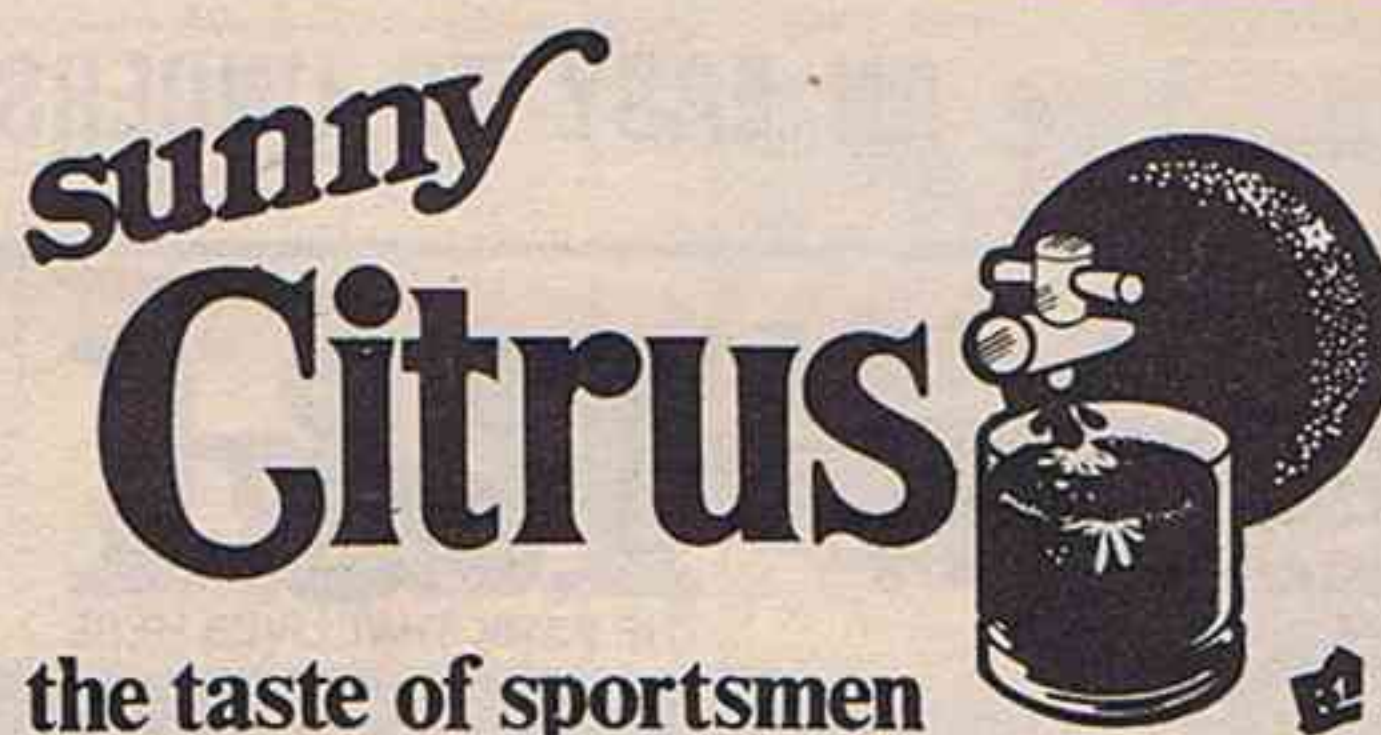
They must determine where their priorities, loyalties and future lie and if they are allowed to remain in amateurs they must guarantee full support.

FALCONS ALIGHT

IF EVER the emphasis that pace and skill has on modern day football needed to be witnessed, then the recent Swans-West Perth game exemplified it.

I had seen the Falcons earlier in the season and they were heading for the bottom of the ladder. They lacked pace, skill and had no flair forward.

In Ron Davis, Derek Kickett, Don Bonson and John Gastevich the Falcons have been transformed. These players have great individual skills and always look dangerous when near the ball.

The only problem could be the maintaining of this form as all these exciting recruits are only young and therefore can lose concentration.

Let's hope they continue to set the Falcons alight as they have restored even more interest in the WAFL fixtures.

THE most important coach in a league club is the colts coach — that is a statement I have made over many years.

The impact of the colts' coach will set the standards and develop the future patterns of play and behaviour for that club.

Nowhere has this been displayed better than at East Perth.

The Royals continually produce players who have the necessary skill and, more importantly, character to play league football.

The current crop of league players who have produced some outstanding performances for the Royals this season were introduced to the basic requirements for league football by perhaps one of the best junior coaches this State has seen.

Former Royals ruckman and life member Eddie Pitter can take most of the credit for the stream of young talent.

Pitter is a strict disciplinarian, often criticised by parents and club officials for being too demanding. He sets standards for young players to achieve to get to the top and the key to his success is his character, club loyalty and sincere approach towards the colts players.

Pitter is idolised by his players, especially those who get to the top. But like all

coaches, some players don't survive his methods and they use the old excuse "it was the coach's fault" — neglecting the key factor that they couldn't accept the requirements to play at the top.

Recently, the Royals colts players who were coached by Pitter took him and his wife out for dinner — a gesture that rarely occurs in modern day football.

LINE-UP

When you look at the Royals team that played so well against the Sharks the following players came from Pitter's coaching — Ironmonger, Carpenter, Hawkins, Morgan, Rattray, Bartlett, Papotto, Scott, Higgins, K. Sparks, R. Sparks, Williams and Da Rui. Then also consider Dennis, Delborello, Cox, Cocker and other injured players and you can see the influence of a good colts coach.

Pitter had to re-apply for the East Perth colts position when the new Board came into power in 1983, but he was considered "unsuitable" and not selected.

He was then sought by all other clubs, finally deciding to take on the task of resurrecting the Lions colts team, which had won only four games last season.

PHILOSOPHY

Using his same coaching philosophy, the young Lions have won six of the first seven games, recently beating the previously undefeated Bulldogs colts team at Fremantle.

Watching all the colts teams play this year, I can see the same tremendous personal influence developing in the young Lions. And like the Royals team of 1984, Subiaco will be a power by 1988 as these young players develop and take their place as league footballers.

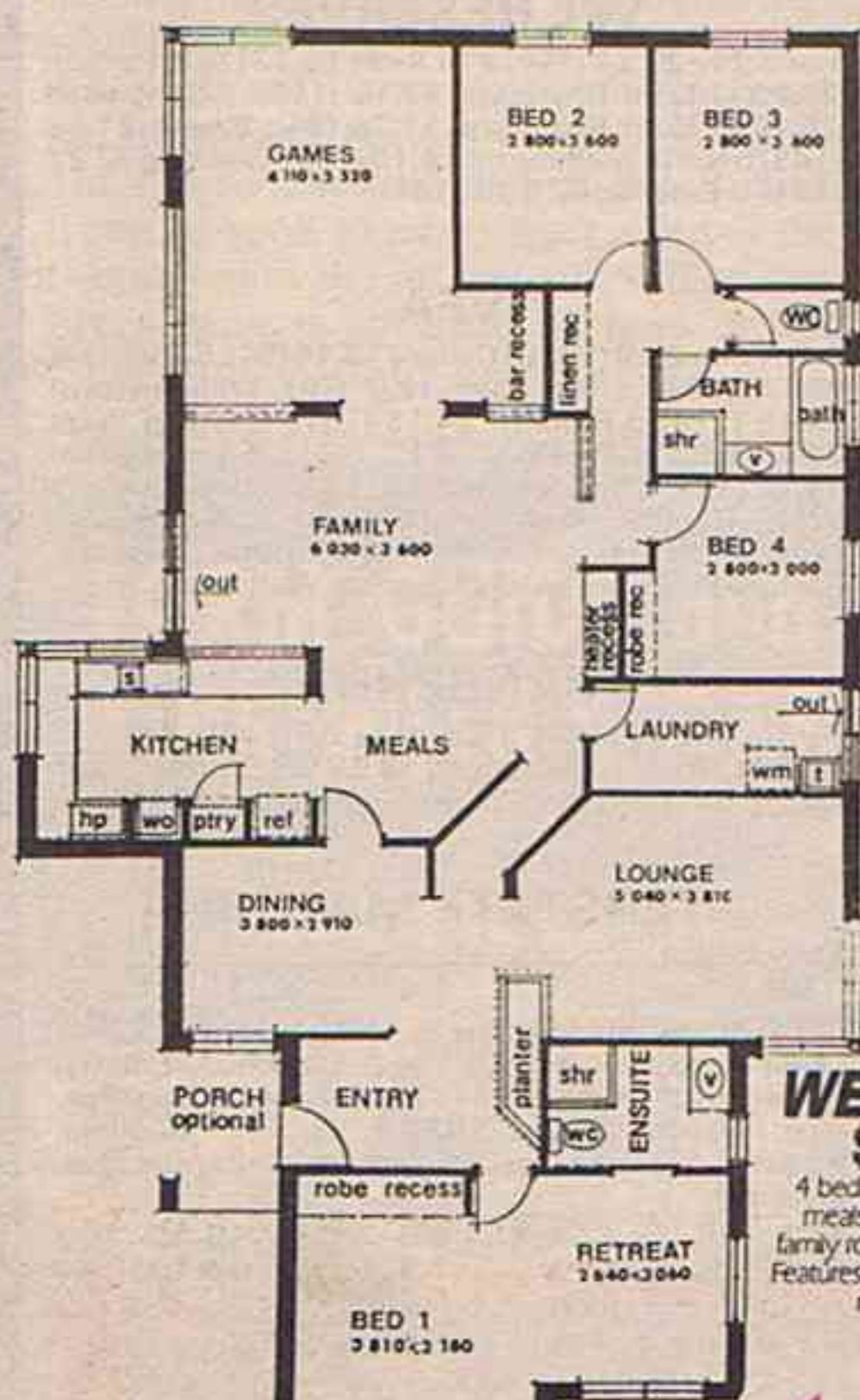
Coaches of Pitter's rare talent and character are worth their weight in gold; they develop the key to club success — men with strong character and commitment.
