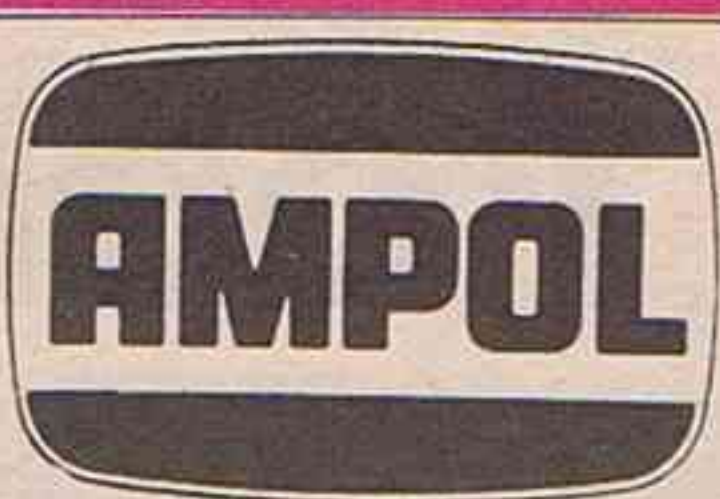

Monteath ready

CLAREMONT'S high-priority recruit for 1984, Bruce Monteath, is hungry for football.

The prize recruit who has managed a little over two games for the Tigers is confident of making a comeback.

In fact, he says he is ready to return to the competitive arena now... but he will take advantage of the one-week break for the interstate trip and delay his return. "It is not worth taking the risk of playing this week," says Monteath.

Since joining the Tigers from South Fremantle the star centre-half-forward has been plagued by a thigh injury.

He took the field in the pre-season Sterling Cup match against Collingwood and played against his old club in the first game of the year — but broke down with a torn hamstring.

He tried to come back five weeks later, but lasted just 10 minutes before straining the muscle again.

The former Richmond captain says that he could probably come through the reserves this Saturday.

But with the State team in Adelaide on Saturday week he can have a further seven days to recover fully.

"That would mean another two weeks of hard work," Monteath says. "And it would not do it any harm."

"Before I played against East Perth I trained on the Wednesday and Friday nights and it felt good."

"It feels fine again, but this time I've had a strength test and the muscle passed that test."

Monteath has had extensive daily treatment for the injury at the St John of God Sports Medical Centre in Subiaco.

Monteath was recruited at the start of this season to solve a deficiency in attack at Claremont.

With Graham Moss retiring the Tigers needed an experienced key forward to organise their attack and Claremont went straight to the top.

Monteath did more damage to their defence in his three seasons back from Richmond than any other individual in the WAFL.

He was a match-winner on more than one occasion for South Fremantle and he was exactly the type of player Claremont considered they needed to stop their run of seconds.

State policy is out of balance

THE State football selectors have come under fire for an incredible imbalance of players in the squad named to prepare for the South Australian clash on Saturday week.

In the initial squad of 30 players named on Saturday, four clubs provided 24 players — and the other four produced the remaining six.

Those four clubs — Swan Districts (eight players), South Fremantle (five), East Fremantle (five) and Claremont (six) — also produced the entire selection panel.

East Perth and Perth had two players selected and Subiaco and West Perth one — but that changed when Laurie Keene and Steve Richardson were added and Dean Warwick replaced the unavailable Noel Carter.

The new selection panel system adopted this year was obviously a reason for the imbalance.

The new Board of Directors appointed one selector from each of last year's top four clubs to join State coach John Todd and his Swan Districts club president, Bill Walker, the chairman of the panel.

Swans nominated their chairman of selectors Bob Manning, South Fremantle put up reserves coach Don Haddow, while East Fremantle and Claremont went for their coaches, Ron Alexander and Graham Moss.

The League's system allows for last year's bottom-four clubs — East Perth, Subiaco, West Perth and Perth — to nominate their State selectors next year.

West Perth coach Dennis Cometti, speaking in his role as a media critic — and he is recognised as one of the most authoritative sports commentators in Australia — was outspoken about the system on ABC radio this week.

"The selectors have abused the privilege they were given by the WAFL," Cometti told his 6WF listeners.

"They have picked players from their own ranks when form players in other teams missed out."

Cometti made the point that players and clubs generally benefit when their footballers are included in State sides. It helps lift out-of-form players; it gives young players confidence and it generally helps the image and performance of a club when they have a big number of State players.

"In view of the way the system has been abused this season, it seems pretty certain to be changed," he added.

Cometti emphasised that his "editorialising" was as a critic, not a football club coach.

He made his comments as a coach privately in telephone conversations with Walker, Todd and WAFL general manager, Peter Bowler.

Poor form poorly timed

THE State selectors had an unenviable task arriving at the squad of players announced last Saturday night — and added to it within 24 hours!

One aspect of their policy was that they went for form players and not reputations.

To come up with a squad of players from our unpredictable WAFL fixtures must have created plenty of headaches for coach John Todd and his selection panel.

But they have plenty of material to work with and that is good for WA football.

WA must be on the offensive if we are to retain the crown as Australian champions.

While not questioning the selection of any player, you have to spare a thought for players who were in scintillating form in the opening part of the season, only to lose touch at selection time.

West Perth could not have chosen a more inopportune time to run out of legs against Subiaco.

Not only did they stumble at a hurdle they needed to cross on their way to an appearance in the 1984 finals series, but it affected some leading Falcon State squad contenders.

Players like Peter Menaglio, Dean Warwick, Les Fong and Derek Kickett have set the Falcons in motion since their early season poor form — but all missed out.

And East Fremantle defenders Shane Ellis and Clinton Browning chose the

wrong week to turn in performances below their usual high standards.

Todd is a man of his word.

The most decorated coach in WA during the 1980's, Todd has made it clear that there is room for alterations before final decisions are made and the 21-man team leaves for Adelaide on Friday week.

Todd wants players with big-game experience and consequently two thirds of the 32-man group have come from the three clubs who have dominated finals football over the past four years.

Form is a major contender in relation to any selection consideration.

To do justice to their 'form' in the early part of State team considerations, it is hoped that Falcon and Sharks contenders can bounce back in time to gain recognition for their efforts.

Alexander to bounce back

RON Alexander was a dejected man for more than one reason when he fronted up for training last Sunday morning.

The Big Shark was naturally disappointed at his side's last-quarter fade out to go down to the improved Claremont by 14 points.

But Alexander was also extremely critical of his own game. He was man enough to single out his poor performance to the players before training as an example of form that will not be tolerated in the Sharks camp.

Alexander described his game as: "The worst I have ever played."

The Sharks coach reminded his players of the importance of winning a Derby and it wasn't long before the atmosphere became more positive.

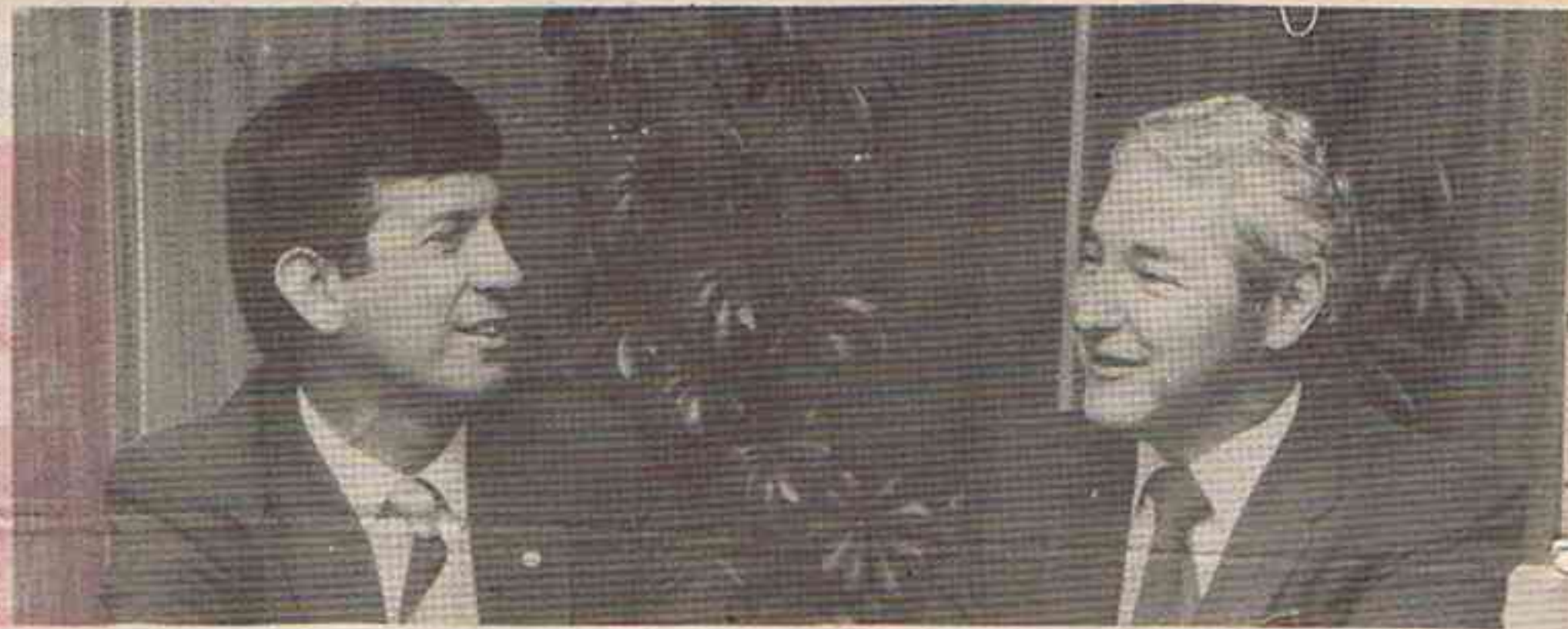
With a brief address from assistant coach Murray Ward — asking that the

week leading up to the Derby to be nothing but positive and to neglect all negative thoughts about the loss of Claremont — the Sharks seemed to gain confidence.

The Sharks have a score to settle with the Bulldogs.

Last year's traditional Foundation Day Derby resulted in a one point win to Souths when Noel Carter registered a point from a free kick given on the final siren.

Alexander, in promising an improved performance this week, was quick to remind his charges of that frustrating result and called on Sharks to "....turn the tables."

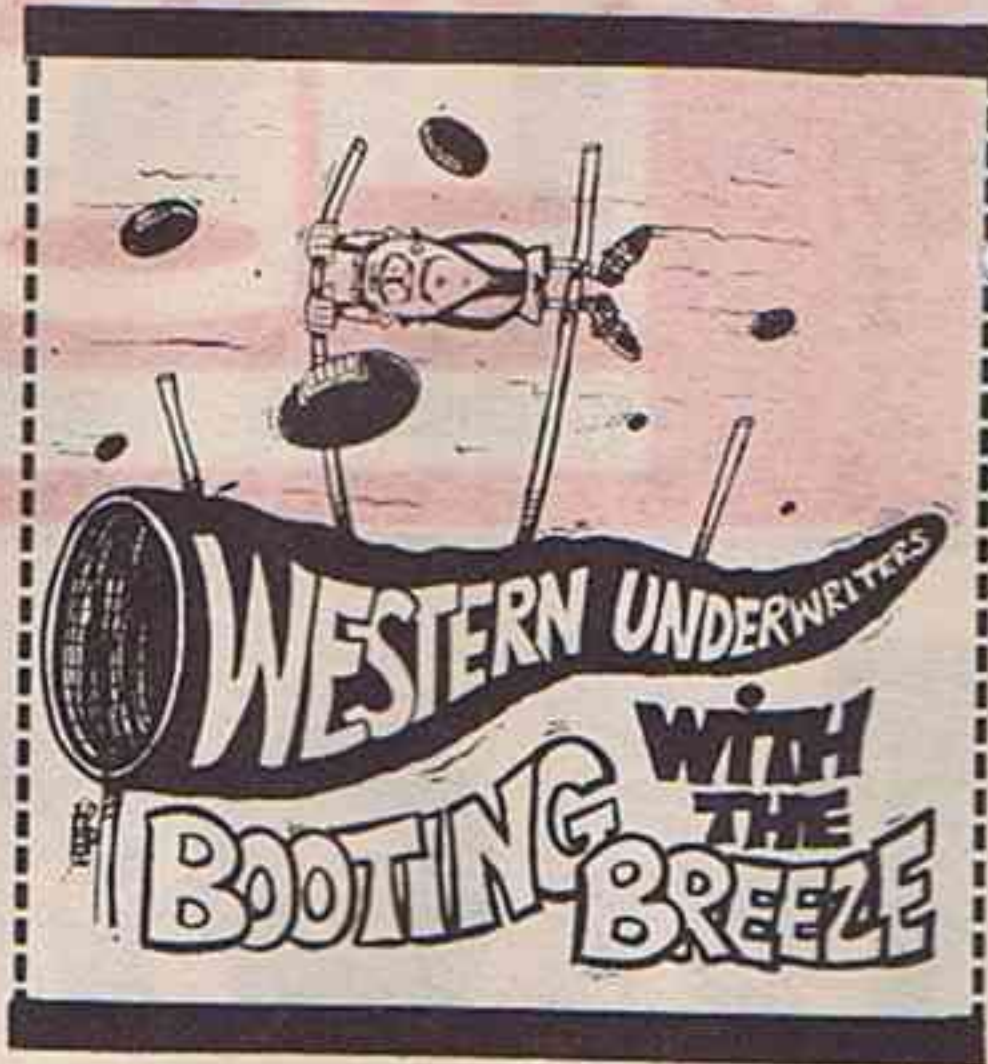


WA WEEK

FOOTBALL — boy, it does

look different!

THE 1984 football season is of special interest to me because it is the first time for 15 years that I'm not taking part out on the field.

The transition from playing to the media has forced me to look at football from another angle.

The selection of best players is one of the things I find slightly daunting.

What criteria do you use to select best players?

When you are directly involved as a player, you develop an understanding of your team-mates; not only do you become familiar with his playing habits and abilities, but you begin to understand the levels he sets for himself.

If that player constantly achieves those levels of performance, you classify him as consistent.

EXCEEDS

When he exceeds those levels, you think "he played well today". When his performance falls below that level you say "he has had a bad day".

These levels are based on your own observations, and expectations and very often differ from other people's assessments of that particular player.

Therefore it is not uncommon, when talking to players after the game, to hear them rate one of their team-mates as having played well, but you didn't really consider him as a good player.

Traditionally, centreline players, ruckmen, rovers and ruck-rovers win best-player awards, principally because they are always in the play and are the most skilled players — consequently, they have more opportunities to get the ball.

Does it follow that because a player has 27 kicks, eight marks and 10 handballs that he is the best player? I don't think that it does.

To my way of thinking, statistics are incomplete. They should include the number of tackles, smotherers, spoils, shepherds and knock-ons.

The best player for a side is the one who is the most effective. That is a simple statement, but when you apply it to football the word effective becomes a little difficult to interpret.

A player given a specific job of tagging or nullifying an opposition star who normally has 40 possessions a game, but is limited to say 10 possessions, has been a very effective player for his team.

On the other hand a player who has had, say, 21 effective kicks, eight effective handpasses, had three free kicks for good tackles, but not given away any free's and booted five goals, has also been an effective player.

How do you differentiate between the two? With great difficulty!

The player who has had all the kicks and handballs stands out; you notice and remember those possessions.

TAGGING

He generally receives the award ahead of the tagging player. It also follows that the more skilful ball-getting player is not placed in a tagging role.

Three players who have made a name as successful football "taggers" are Mick O'Brien (West Perth), Bill Skwirowski (Swan Districts) and Claremont's Lindsay Kanther.

Last week I saw Kanther completely cut Murray Wrensted out of the game, particularly in the first half.

Backline players often fall into the category of taggers; they have specific roles to play, cutting full-forwards and half-forwards out of the game.

A defender might not get a kick or mark for a half, but he can have 10 spoils, seven tackles and four shepherds — the sort of things that can go unnoticed by the footballing public.

Taking all of the above into consideration, the name of the game is to win. To do that you must kick a bigger score than the opposition so it could be argued that you don't need a good defence or a backline full of stoppers.

Rather you need a side full of running players.

PICKING

When it comes to picking my best players where do I start?

As the game progresses I will write the name down of a player I consider has done something a little bit extra; someone who has used his body, was involved in a passage of play that results in a goal or prevents a goal and so on.

At the end of the game I study these names and come to a decision.

Whenever decisions are made about who was the best player, something is for certain, that decision is not going to change the result of the game.

Providing a player is honest and doesn't have to make excuses, the player knows how he played and can take pride in his performance.

St Kilda's policies

NOT so long ago, because of a work commitment, I was in Melbourne and had the opportunity to see the game between Collingwood and St Kilda.

It was an ideal game with Alan Sidebottom and Phil Narkle performing for St Kilda, but as it turned out Mike Richardson was a last minute withdrawal (back injury) and he didn't line up for Collingwood.

Apart from the first quarter, the game was a disappointing affair.

St Kilda were pathetic. They showed no spirit, desire or pride in their football. To me that is an indication that St Kilda's policies and apparent philosophy of "we don't care what the rules are, we do it our way" is affecting the attitude of a number of the St Kilda players.

Despite what is said about the amount of money being paid to footballers, that is not the motivating factor when it comes to performance on the field.

What it boils down to is pride.

If the player believes that the club and what the club represents, is not displaying pride, integrity and is not going about its business in a way that the player is expected to perform on the field — in a professional manner, with pride and courage, but within the rules of the game — then the club cannot expect a full and honest commitment from their players.

It is a hypocritical situation.

To some people that may sound like sour grapes over the Phil Narkle saga, but that is not so.

I have no official connection with Swan Districts Football Club, so the outcome of the case doesn't affect me in any way.

In fact, I believe Phil should have gone to the VFL. He is a top player and deserves the chance to prove himself in the mecca of Australian rules.

The point that I do make is that attitude starts at the top. In the fiercely competitive world of Aussie rules football, there is no room for the "do as I say not as I do" attitude.

By the way, Alan Sidebottom was one of St Kilda's best players. Phil Narkle had a good first quarter and Phil Cronan played with assuredness.

Brown's Antics At South

What is happening at South Fremantle?

Is it merely another case of Mal Brown at loggerheads with football administrators or is there a problem that could jeopardise Souths chance of winning this year's flag?

Some would have seen Brown's announcement of his resignation to players only an hour before the game against Swans as a bit of theatre...a ploy to jar his players following their inept performance against Claremont the previous week.

After all the matter was resolved less than 24 hours later.

It could be argued that Brown could have tried to thrash out the problem, as he was able to do on Sunday, before Saturday's game.

Those who suspected Brown was trying to whip his players back into gear following some lack-lustre performances

by the team in the previous month could point to him having resigned once before as coach of Souths.

GRIZZLE

That was back in 1980 when he had a grizzle about the umpires and his players.

But from my feedback it would seem a real problem exists at South and Brown did not pull a stunt on Saturday.

It was only ferreting from Sunday Times football writer Ray Wilson, who was tipped off something was in the air, that brought Brown's resignation into the open.

Even though Brown informed his players of his action behind closed doors at Bassendean before the match, no-one was prepared to leak what happened.

Wilson, who went to the oval persisted and finally extracted sufficient information on Saturday night to confirm Brown had tendered his resignation.

From subsequent events it would seem Brown and club president Wayne Ryder are anything but the best of mates.

Brown let his feelings be known in a television interview when said he didn't like Ryder.

PLAYING ARENA

If that's the case then South have a problem, particularly if it spills onto the playing arena.

I understand Brown hasn't received the support from some sections of the club administration he would like.

If Brown and Ryder engage in a power struggle then South can just about kiss their premiership hopes, this season, goodbye.

Such in-fighting inevitably will involve players.

Perhaps it has already been seen, with Souths desultory performances in recent weeks.

After having started the season in great style South have progressively fallen away in performance.

They have shown they have the ability to win this year's premiership.

But with the competition so tight they, like other clubs, need to be fully united in that endeavour.

The administration at South should move quickly to patch-up any differences between Brown and Ryder. It should not be allowed to simmer beneath the surface.

For a start both men should keep their feelings toward the other private. Secondly, Brown has been around long enough to know what is needed for success.

If he has been frustrated by the club administration then perhaps it is time to not only listen to him, but give him the support he feels necessary to win a premiership.

There was no sign of the big, bad coach, so maybe the talk about quitting was true. A check with a club football official brought a negative reply. "Nothing wrong down here, mate" was the typical reply. "Brownie's picking the team somewhere." A further query about the possibility of Stephen Michael not playing because of a distinct lack of movement on the track brought a similar reply "He'll play alright."

The same thing happened a few days earlier when another media man approached a club president about the continuing St Kilda clearance battle saga. What he was told was, as it soon turned out, to be completely opposite to what was actually happening. No wonder media people cannot be bothered with half of football's officialdom when you keep being dished up lies.

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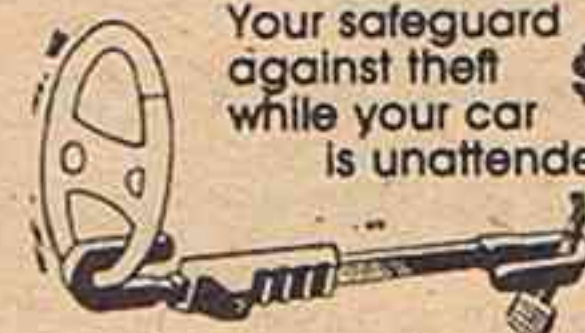
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SUBIACO'S Michael Crutchfield didn't think seriously about football until he was 17 — but he has covered a lot of territory since then.

After spending his boyhood trying out a number of different sports, the former Victorian decided to try the national game seriously. He started with Fitzroy and then went to VFA. When Crutchfield arrived in Perth in February 1983 he found it difficult to settle down.

He completed East Perth's pre-season last year, only to fail in his attempts to get a senior game.

After all the hard pre-season preparation, the physical education trainee contemplated packing his bags and heading back east.

Had it not been for the friendship he shared with established Lion, Shane Braddy, Crutchfield would have been lost to football and opted for his other sporting love, basketball.

Braddy suggested that Crutchfield try his luck at Subiaco before making his final decision about giving the game away.

That advice could not have turned out better — for Crutchfield and Subiaco.

Crutchfield has developed into one of the league's most reliable defenders with an ability to back his judgment and use tremendous pace to run the ball out of defence.

The strongly built 22-year-old culminated his beach sprinting career representing Victoria at the Australian

surf life saving championships in Rockhampton three years ago.

While Crutchfield's experience in Perth could easily have turned out to be a hard luck story, he has now made the most of his opportunity in 1984.

A shaky start to his league career with the Lions last season looked like the final chapter in his time in the West.

But 1984 has found Crutchfield a State team prospect, and a stable life style seems to have contributed greatly to his improved consistency.

A series of house shifts, club changes and problems settling into his University studies almost lost the Lions a player of the future.

But the skilful defender is completely at home now with the Lions and looking forward to a long and successful association.

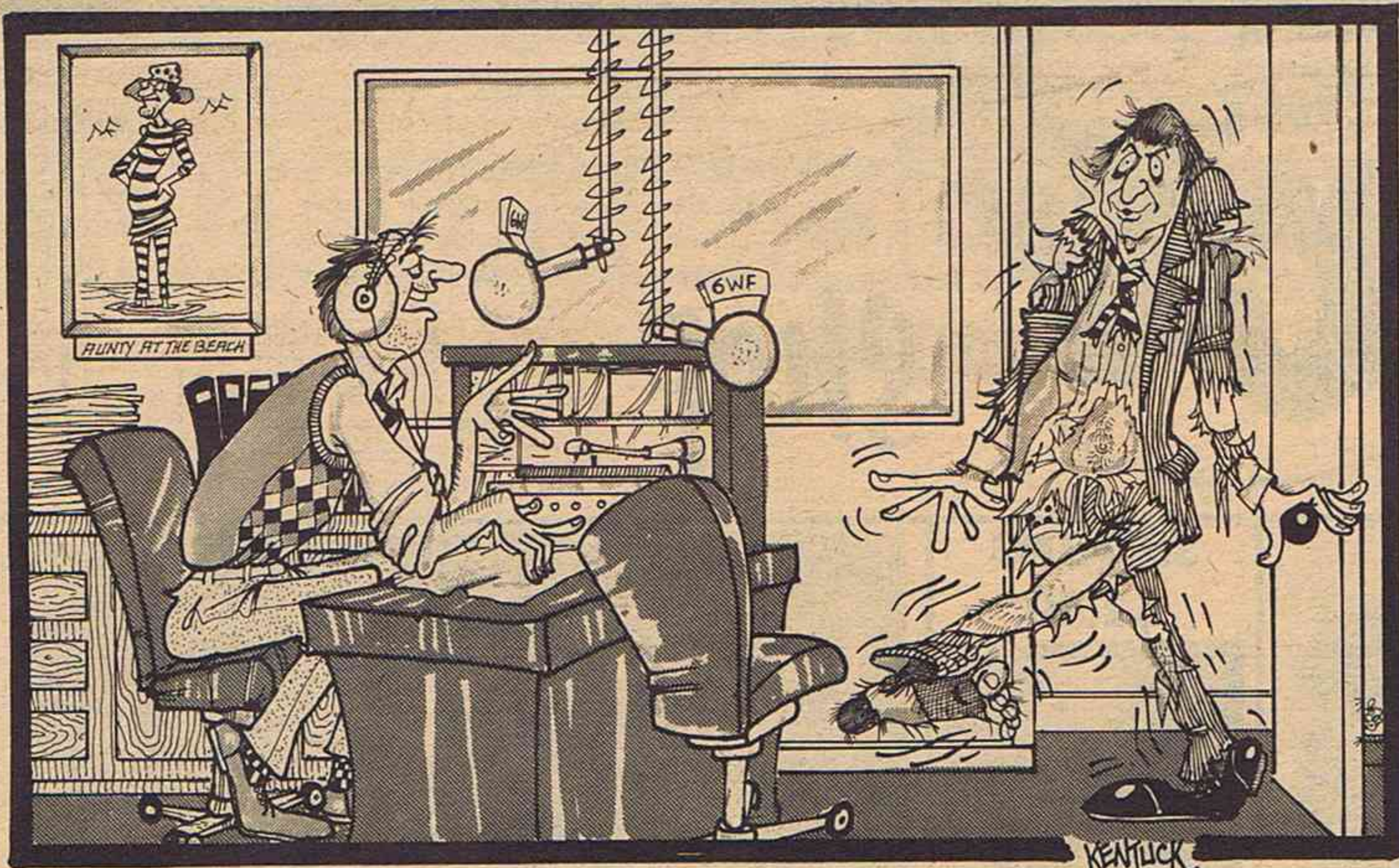

Therefore, they were mature enough to handle VFL football and the tremendous adjustments they need to make to be successful.

Lions have a hoo-doo over the Falcons

IT SEEMS as though West Perth are becoming Subiaco's easybeats.

The Lions have developed a habit of beating West Perth in recent years.

This prompted me to survey the last 10 seasons and these are the figures I came up with. Since the start of the 1975 season West Perth have won 19 games between the two sides and have lost 10 to Subiaco.

The other teams have fared better against the Lions in this period.

Perth, Claremont, South Fremantle and Swan Districts have all won 22 matches and lost six during the same time, while East Perth have lost seven and believe it or not, Shark supporters, East Fremantle have the same figures as West Perth — having won 19 games and lost 10 against the Lions.

Subiaco, often the victims of other clubs when it comes to high scoring, recorded their highest score ever against West Perth on Saturday.

In fact their 25.15 (165) was the seventh highest score recorded by that club in their 83 years in the league.

SUBI COUP

Still on Subiaco, we have talked about that great, but unsuccessful recruiting coup in 1938 when they lured Bunton Snr, Hardiman and Shea to their club from Victoria. Well, in 1911 Subiaco pulled off something bigger than that when they enticed Herb Limb from Sturt, Harry Bushell from St Kilda and Jack Scaddon from Collingwood. Led by this trio Subiaco won the premierships of 1912, 1913 and 1915. Limb headed the goalkicking list in 1912 and 1915.

THE WAY IT WAS

I thought this 1911 report was worth a mention. "A section of the red and white crowd again made gigantic asses of

themselves yesterday. An individual, who acts as a trainer for South Fremantle, walked onto the field at a crucial stage and jostled with the field umpire. Several league delegates saved the umpire from ruffiant treatment, but not before blows were exchanged. An East Fremantle delegate was cowardly cracked under the lug by a bystander. It is only fair to say that the South Fremantle players were disgusted at the actions of their trainer."

NEWSPAPER COVER

League football in by-gone years did not command the newspaper coverage it does today.

This prompted the Sunday Times, midway through the 1916 season, to publish a premiership table, saying that as the dailies had a hazy idea of the relative positions of the competition's teams here is how they stand.

FAIR SYSTEM?

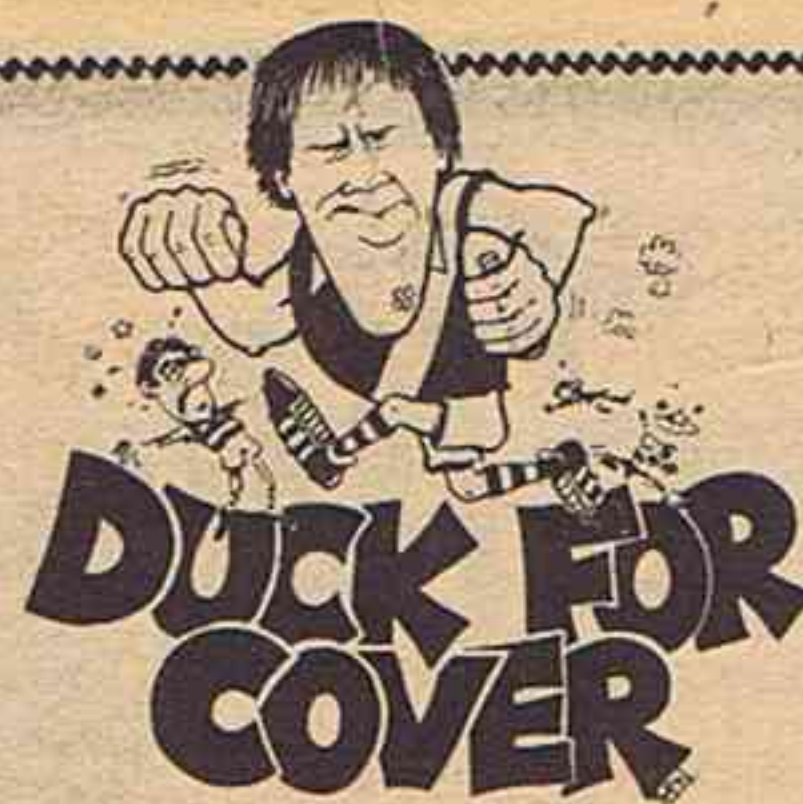
Over 60 years ago percentages to decide final placings were calculated a little differently to today's method.

The 1913 table below shows why Subiaco were minor premiers and had the right to challenge Perth for the premiership even though Subiaco were beaten in the first of the semi finals.

IT'S A JOKE!

THE State selectors have got to be joking! How can four clubs provide 24 players in the State squad and the other four clubs provide just eight when the competition is as tight as it is at the moment? South Fremantle, Swan Districts, Claremont and East Fremantle form the basis of the squad while West Perth, Subiaco, Perth and East Perth can only get two players in each. That is extremely disappointing. But on top of that the selectors have chosen players on reputation rather than form and omitted other players who have enjoyed tremendous seasons to date. It is time the selectors took a long, hard look at the players who have missed out and picked players on performance rather than on their names.

COURT HITS FORM

I WAS at the East Fremantle-Claremont game last week and was most impressed with the effort of big Claremont ruckman David Court. He was always a player of outstanding potential at Subiaco, but the change of clubs has obviously done him the world of good. He was a little slow to get into top gear with the Tigers at the start of the season because of injury problems, but he now looks set for a



great year. Court relished the opportunity to lead the ruck against Paul Harding and he came out of the contest with flying colours. Claremont must have been pleased with his effort against one of the best young big men in the game.

GOALS GALORE

TALKING about the game at East Fremantle Oval there was plenty to keep the crowd interested throughout the day with a high standard of football being played. And just to cap off the day there were a couple of great goals kicked. Jeff Cassidy won the goal of the day award on Channel 7 on Sunday when he did a Georgie Best from near the point post and soccered the ball through for a great goal. But Claremont's new full-forward Steve Goulding would also have been a worthy winner of the award. He picked the ball up on the boundary line and would not have seen any daylight between the two big uprights. But he steadied under pressure, put the ball into the air and used the wind to perfection to bring up maximum results.

POOR SHOW

I WAS disappointed to pick up the Monday morning newspaper and find no details about an interstate football clash which happened on the weekend. The West Australian and South Australian State amateurs played each other at Leederville Oval on Sunday and there was not one reference to the match on Monday. That just is not good enough. Those players worked hard to represent their State and deserve greater recognition than they received.

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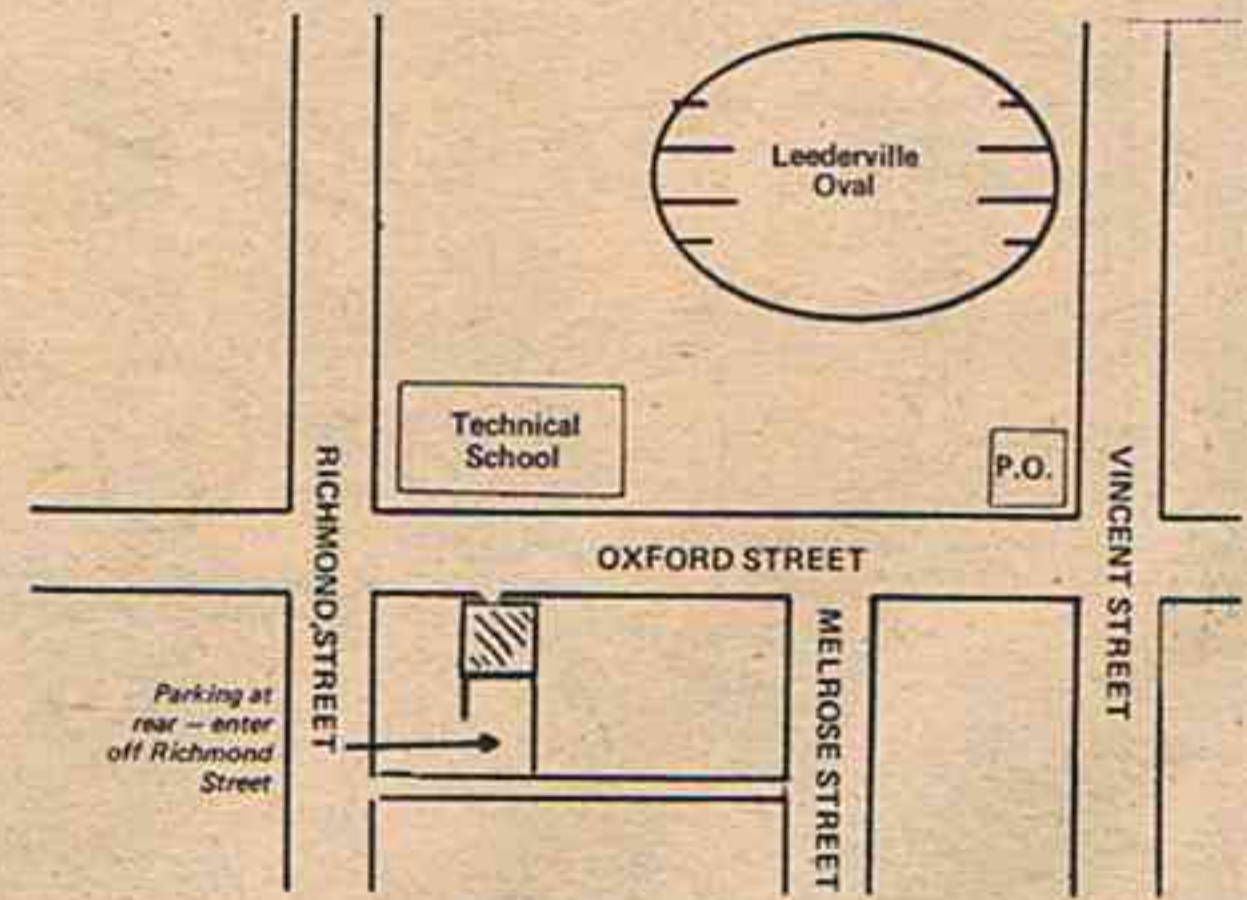


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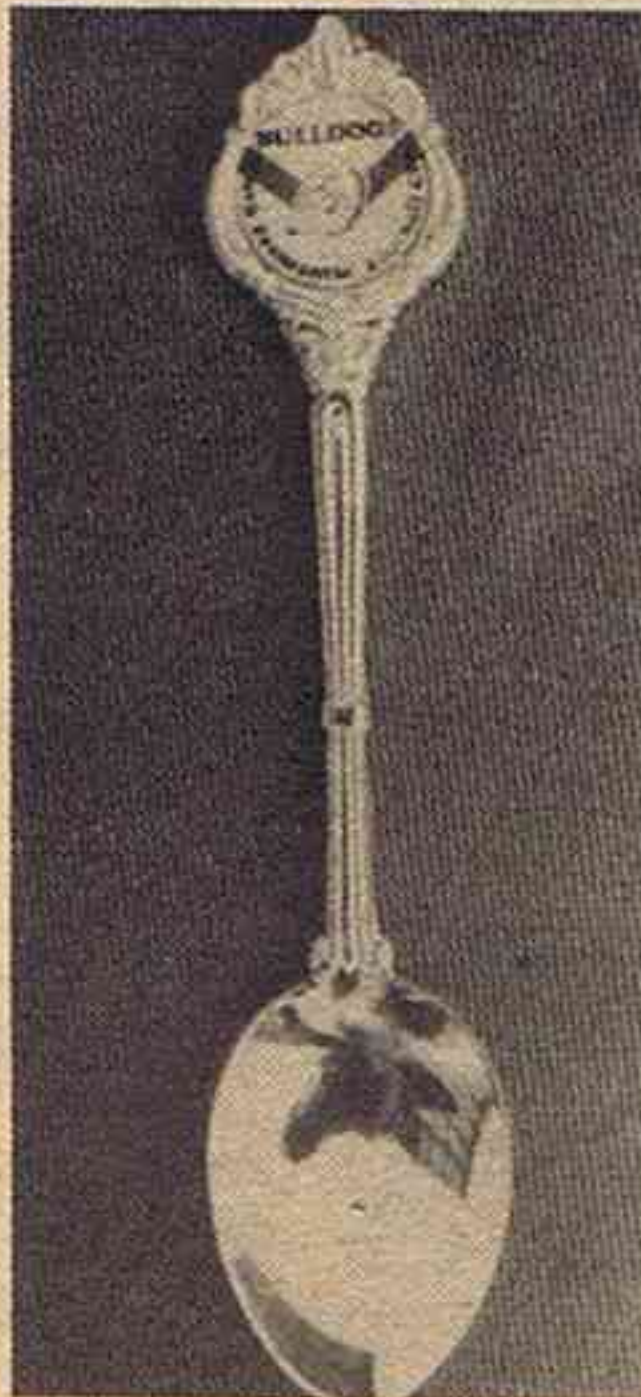
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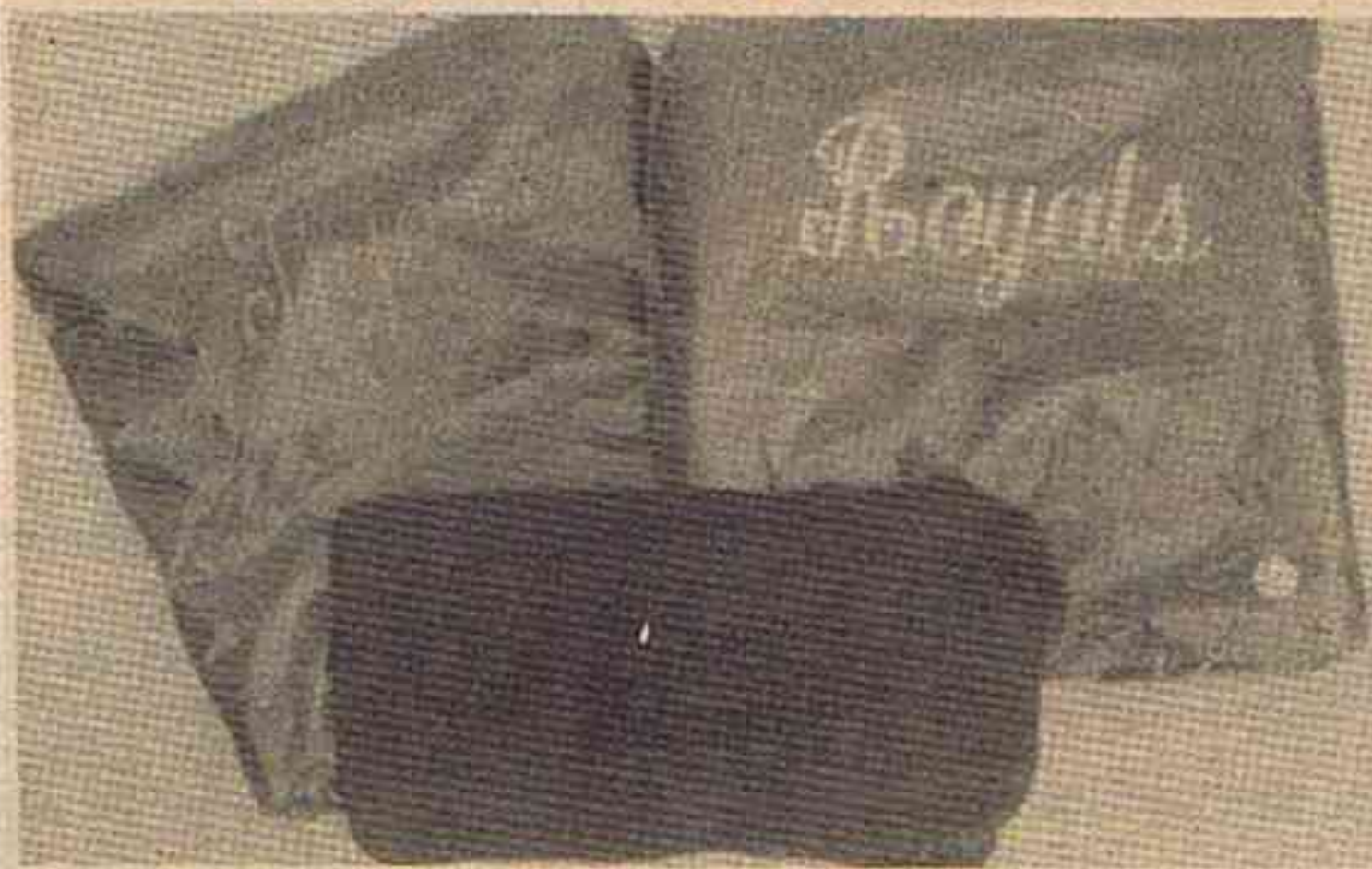
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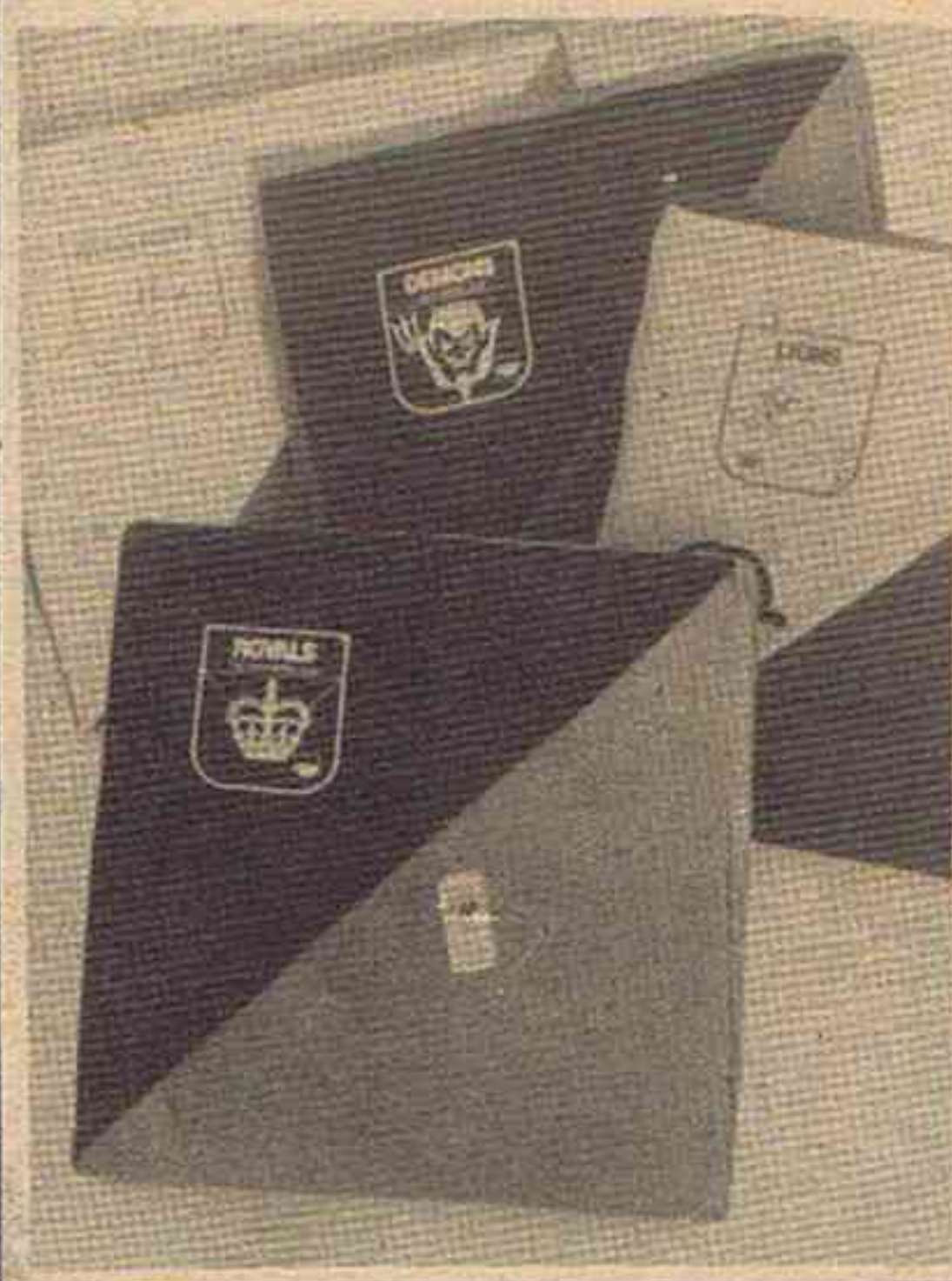
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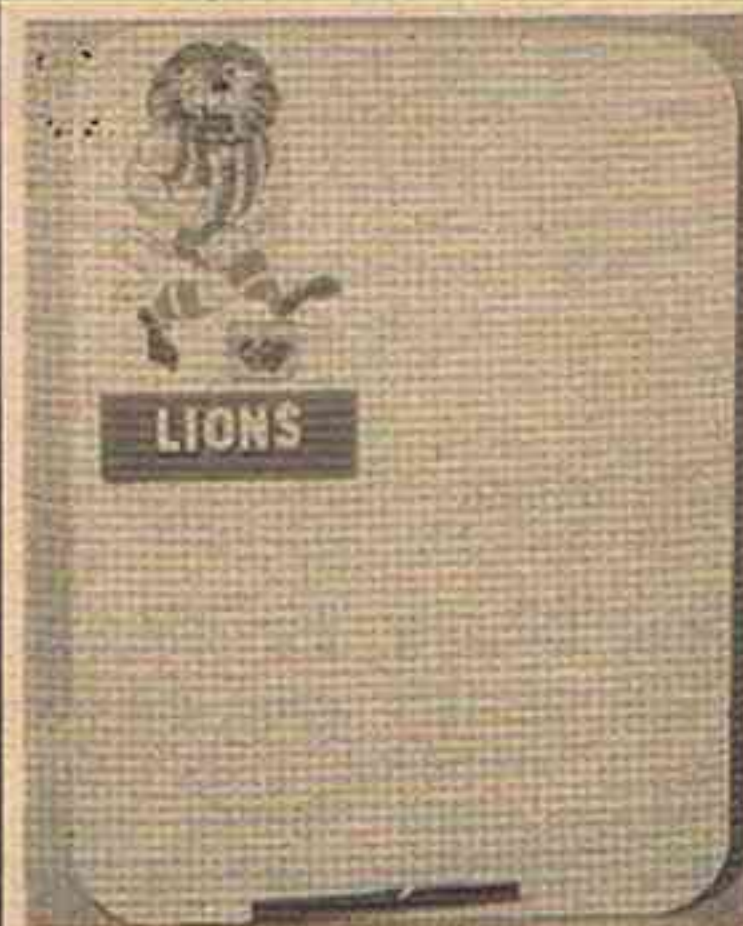
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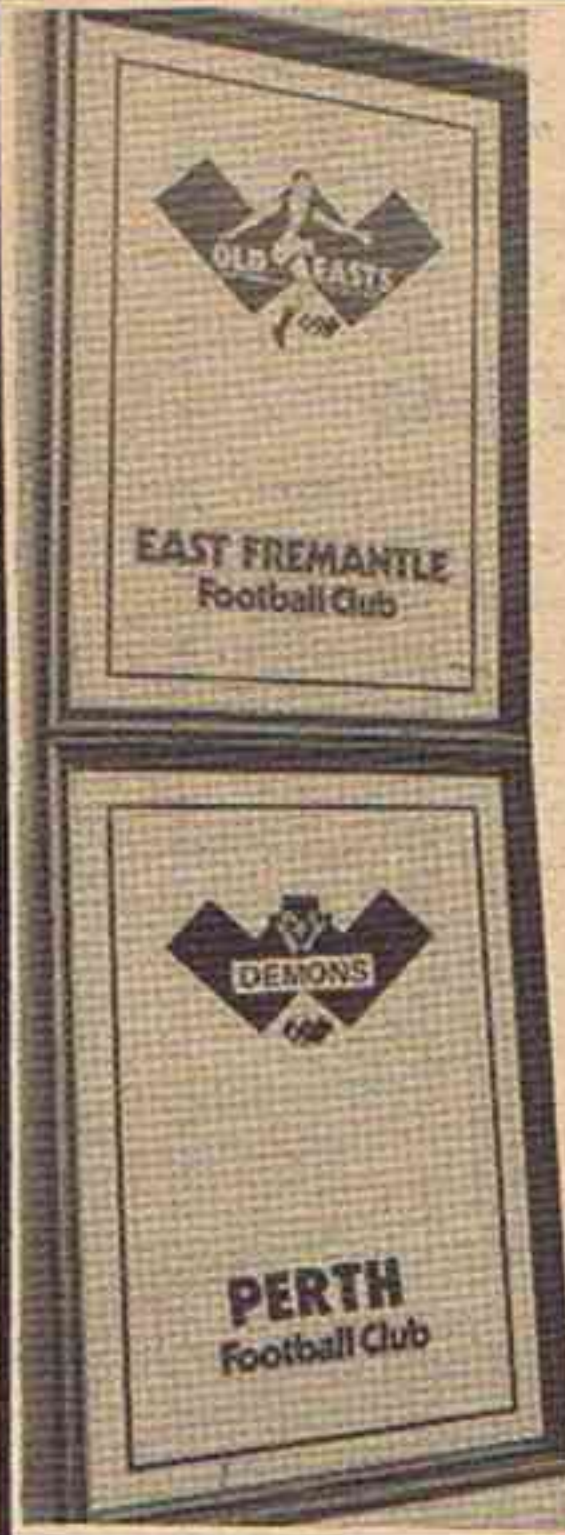
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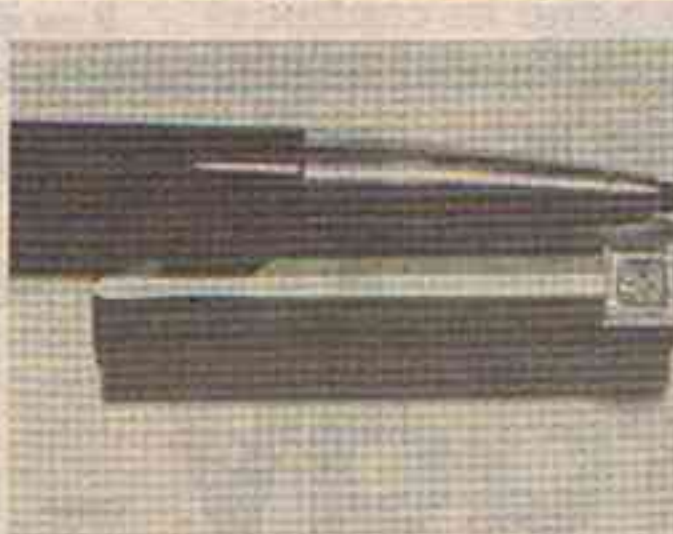

Taylor a key for Richmond

BRIAN Taylor, the boy from Mandurah who has made the football big-time in Victoria, is shaping up as Richmond's key to premiership success in their centenary year of football.

Taylor, who wanted to leave the Tigers' den last year because of a lack of opportunities — particularly with Michael Roach, a recognised full-forward, in the camp — is now riding high.

He is proving to be the strongest mark in VFL ranks and his seven-goal haul last week against St Kilda took his season tally to 37.

Taylor kicked all his goals from marks, booting 7.2 in stark contrast to his 3.7 a week earlier.

The volatile Taylor is a key man in the premiership plans of coach Mike Patterson — but he has to watch his run-ins with the umpires.

Obviously Taylor is coming under constant pressure from rival defenders and several times last Saturday he



remonstrated angrily with St Kilda players. He also had words with field umpire Peter Howe at the half-time break and had to be cooled down by Richmond runner Peter Grant.

"I don't think he'll get reported," said Patterson. "Our players seem to be on the right side of the reports."

FOLEY'S FUTURE

RICHMOND'S interstate recruit Dan Foley is being chased by at least two other VFL clubs.

The former West Perth forward has had trouble forcing his way into the Tigers senior line-up . . . and injuries have troubled him as well.

Foley, who kicked six goals in Richmond's surprise win over Essendon during last season, has only played one reserves game this year.

But that hasn't stopped North Melbourne and Fitzroy from talking to the WA youngster — something that is now allowed under VFL rules providing the club is notified within 24 hours of the meeting.

"We want to get him fired up and out on the field to show us what he can do," says Richmond administrator Kevin Dixon.

"The ball is in his court. It's up to him."

BIG TEST FOR DEMONS

MELBOURNE'S new-found form will be severely tested against premiership favourites Richmond this week — and the MCG clash promises to be a thriller.

Melbourne have now won three of their last four games and their back-to-back victories broke a long run of outs for the club.

The Demons kicked a record score against Footscray — their 23.21 beating their previous highest in 1947 and their winning margin of 78 points was only two short of their biggest ever winning margin.

The man who has helped bring about the resurgence is former Brownlow Medallist Peter Moore, who has worked hard to make many critics eat their words about his poor form of 1983.

Another boost came in the unexpected form of Peter Thorne, who is back at Melbourne after a successful stint with East Perth and showed great drive as a ruck-rover, booting seven goals.

Palm, the biter, in the news

FORMER West Perth player David Palm hit the Victorian headlines last weekend with his admission that he bit a rival St Kilda player on the arm.

Palm, originally from South Australia and now proving to be a key player with Richmond, was accused by St Kilda and Victorian rover Robert Elphingstone of biting him on the forearm.

Elphingstone said: "He bit me right up here," showing his left forearm, gouged and bruised.

Palm was asked after the match about the allegation.

His reply was: "I was punched and lost my mouthguard, so rather than get reported, that was my plan of attack."

"It was something on the spur of the moment. It's not a regular thing. What was the point of me hitting him and getting reported. There was no sense in me punching him, so that was something I thought of."

The pair had wrestled angrily right on the three-quarter time siren and the infuriated Elphingstone abused Palm as they walked to their respective camps.

Carlton, who capitulated in the second half for the second week in a row, look as though they are on a slide that could tip them into the bottom half of the premiership table.

The first step in a revival plan came with the announcement that Sunday training would start at 8am and not at the normal 9am.

The injuries have compounded the Blues problems.

Ashman has a suspected fractured cheekbone; Glascott has concussion; centreman Jim Buckley has a corked high; forward Alan Montgomery has bruised ribs and the dashing Wayne Harmes has a hamstring injury.

In a classy display he kicked four goals and his performance was rated as better than that of star team mate Stephen Kernahan, who recently kicked 10 goals against the Victorians.

The South Australian star has hit peak form at the right time, following up his top effort against Victoria with a best on ground display against Sturt last week.

SOUTH Australian and Sturt ruckman Rick Davies played his 300th league game last Saturday when his team went down in a tight struggle with boom side Central District.

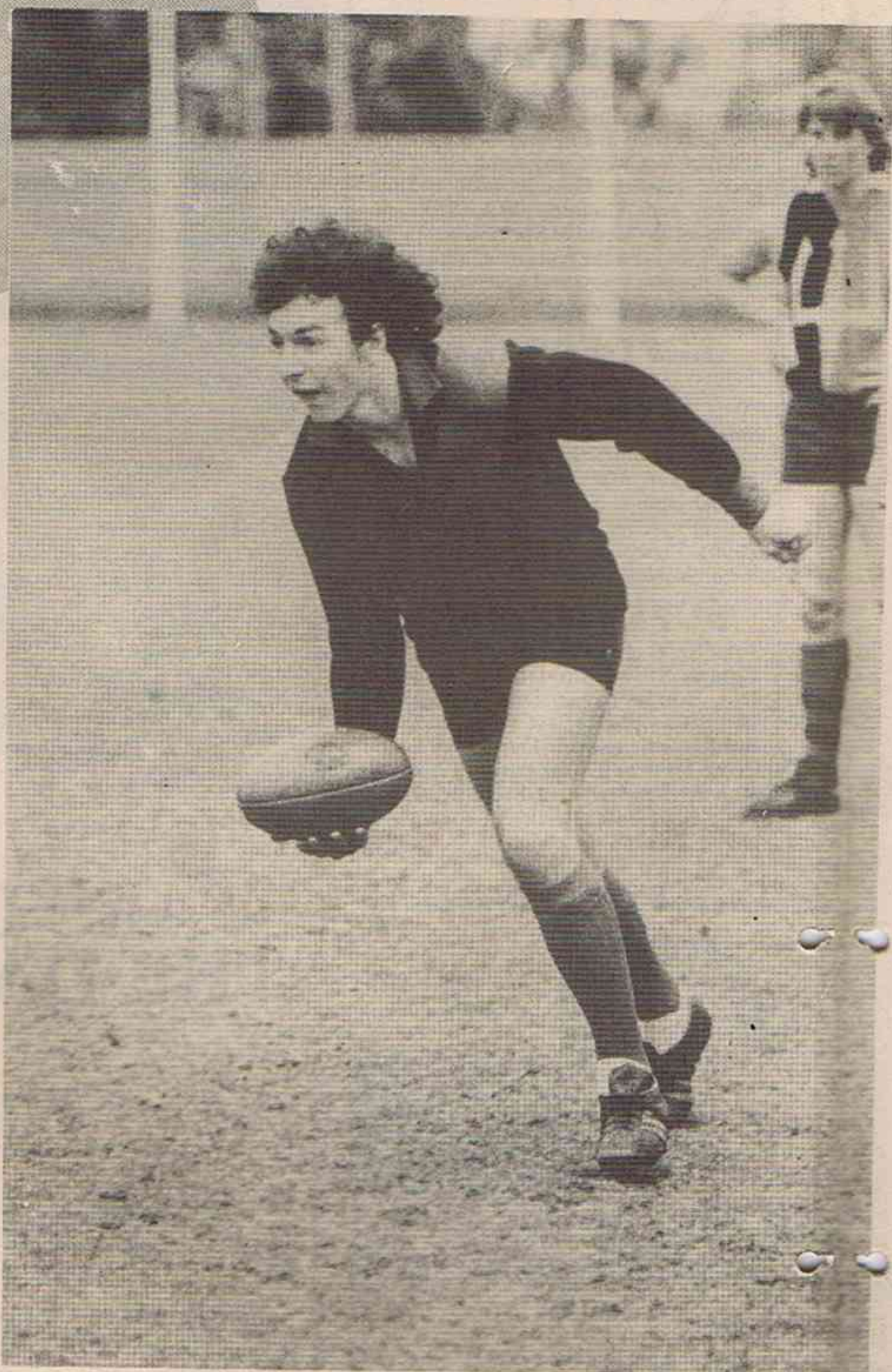

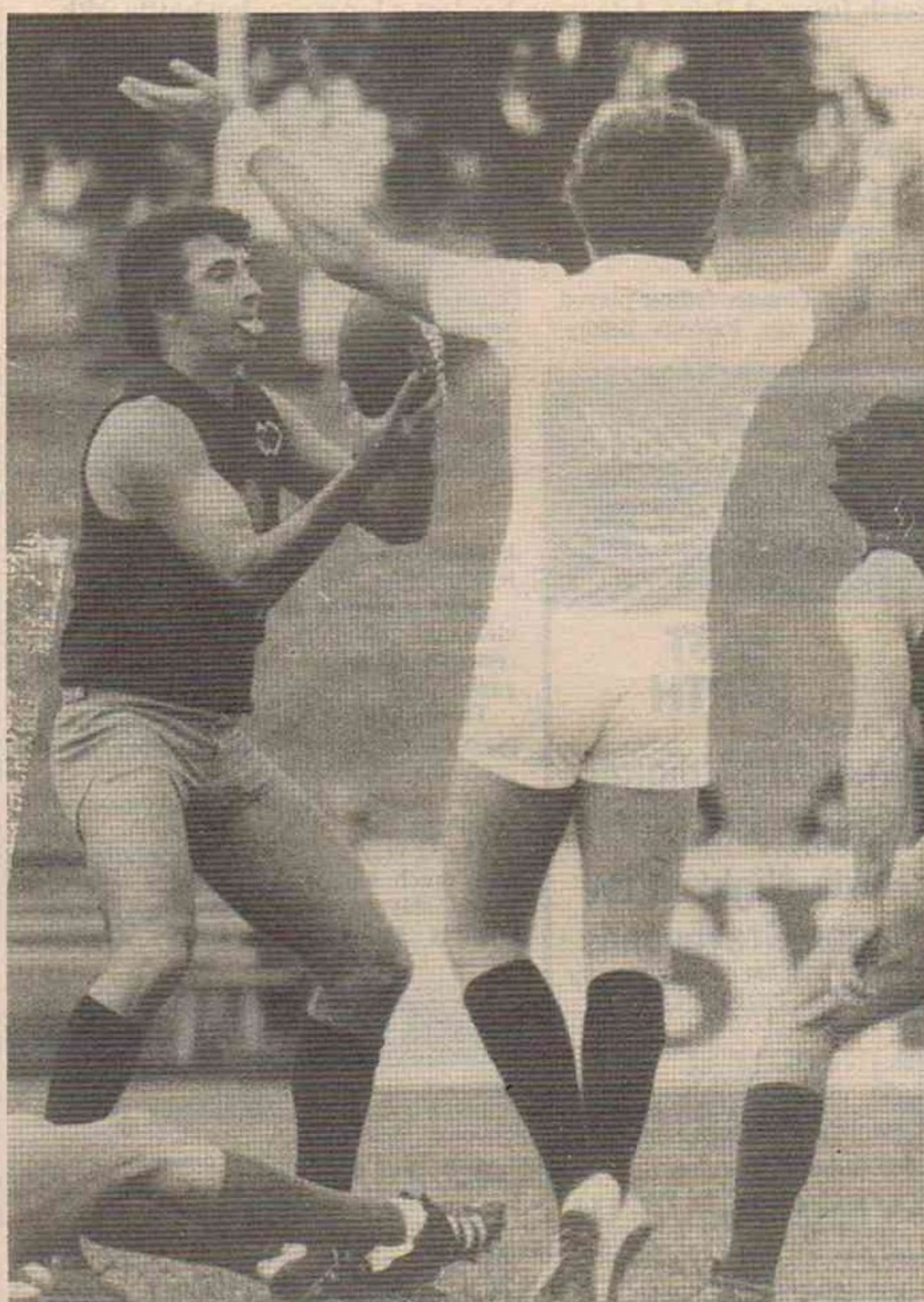

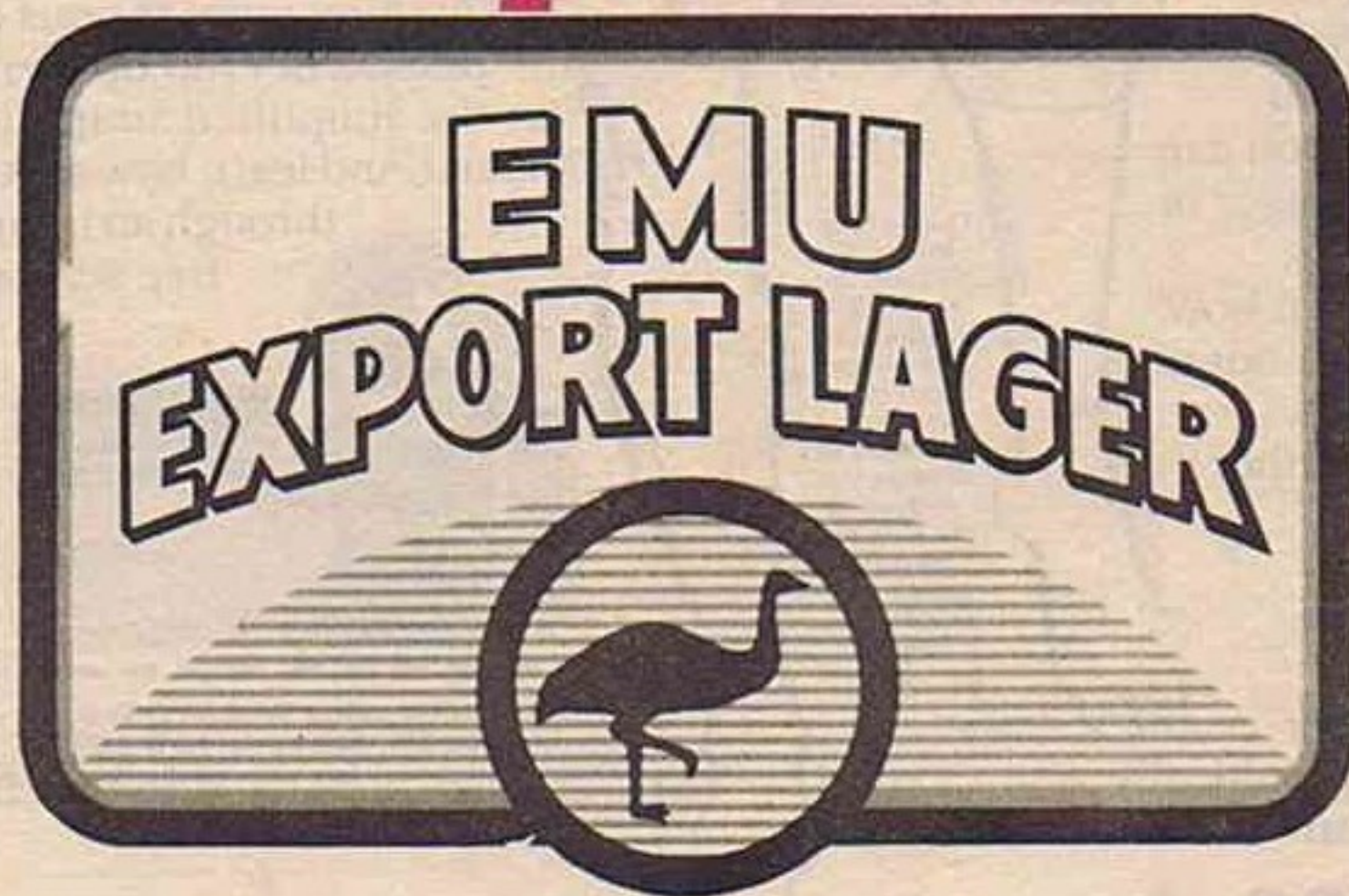

The 32-year-old says that the injuries are now much harder to overcome, but he would stay involved with West Perth, possibly acting as the club's reserves runner.

Problems for the selectors

SUNDAY Football League coach Stephen Fowles has plenty of problems preparing for the big clash with the Great Northern National Football League this weekend.

Fowles and his selection panel have found it difficult finalising the team of 21 to make the trip to Geraldton for the Foundation Day long weekend clash.

SFL officials have left the announcement of the touring party until after a final training session on Thursday night.

The wealth of talent available throughout the 17-team competition and a succession of poor weather conditions has made selection an arduous task.

SENIOR

After last week's fixtures the selectors named a 28 strong squad from which the senior side will be named.

Competition for places in the line up is fierce with most players capable of holding down more than one position.

The GNFL side appears a more balanced combination than they have in past years.

Fowles has plenty of ruck talent to combat the strength and agility of Wesfarmers State country player Barry Evans.

Geoff Ironmonger and Robert Poejjes have been in tremendous Sunday form and have the potential to stop the dominance of Evans around the ground.

The choice of who to play at centre-half-back is important.

Railways forward Scott Rollands, also in the State country side for Adelaide, poses as a big threat to the SFL's chances.

Former Perth defender Glen O'Rourke has been in superb form for Kalamunda and seems the logical choice for the task of stopping Rollands.

The choice of rovers is another area of concern for Fowles.

Who will be Mick Pember's partner will have a bearing on who dominates proceedings around the packs. Leading contenders are Gosnells' Laurie Ricetti and Kenwick's Mark Triplett.

The GNFL have former East Perth and South Fremantle small man Ross Kerr to lead their mobile brigade. Kerr is an experienced rover/half-forward who has been in tremendous form this season.

The ruck-roving responsibilities for the SFL look likely to be shared by vice captain Brian Cook and Kenwick's Arthur Jago.

Cook has been in superb form for his new club Armadale while Jago's fitness and big game experience puts him ahead of other claimants for the job.

Wayne Delmenico is sure to secure the centre-half-forward spot with the league's leading goal kicker, Ross Leipold starting at full forward.

The 195cm (6ft 5in) ruckman has been in superb form in the early stages of the season and pundits in Geraldton are suggesting a big future for him in the city.

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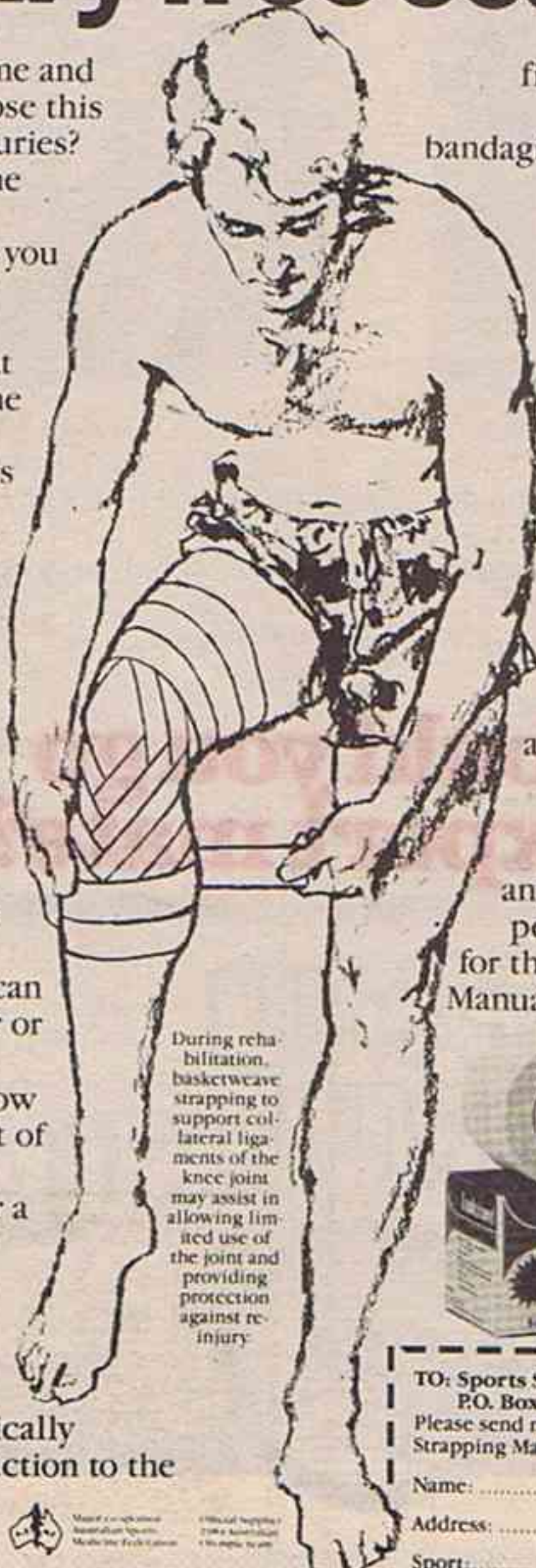
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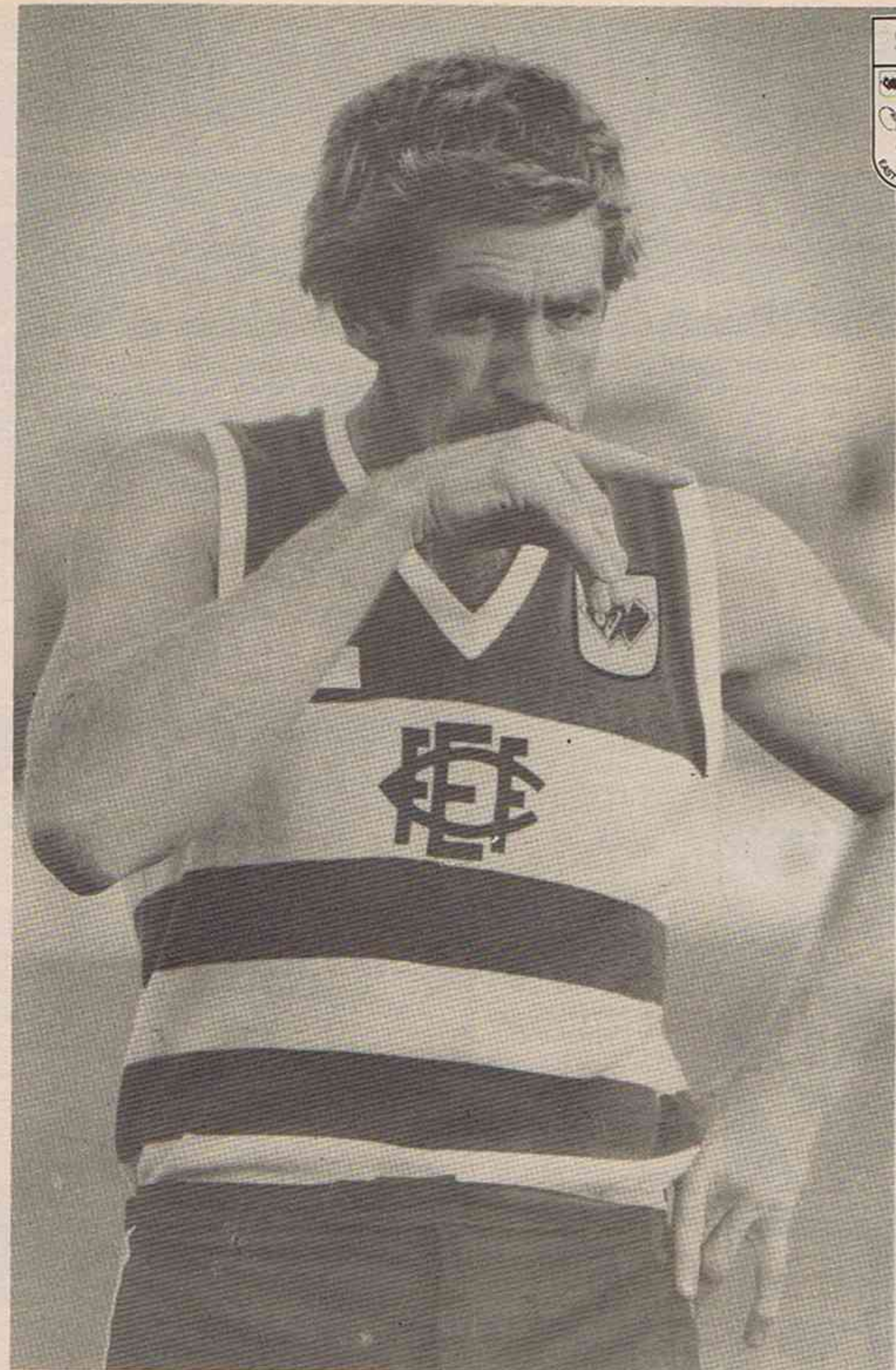

THE LEADERS

In this series GARY STOCKS speaks with the on field leaders of the eight league clubs



Ron has plenty of experience

EAST Fremantle captain coach Ron Alexander is no stranger to the duties of a skipper at a league club.

He had his first taste in the most senior on-field position in 1975 at East Perth when Ray Giblett was coach.

He took on that position at Perth Oval after winning the club's fairest and best award the preceding season and was a natural choice to take over from Hans Verstegen.

Alexander had played only about 80 league games when given the responsibility of leading the Royals — one of WA football's great clubs — and it was his job to team with Giblett to lead East Perth back into final round football.

The Royals do not take kindly to missing a finals berth and after finishing in sixth position in 1974 it was up to Alexander and Giblett to form the association required to be premiership contenders.

RELATIONSHIP

The pair struck up a good working relationship and East Perth found themselves playing South Fremantle in the first semi final.

However, the Bulldogs proved too good for East Perth, winning that game by 67 points, before beating Swan Districts in the preliminary final and going down to West Perth heavily in the grand final.

In 1976 Alexander found the attraction of playing VFL football a lure too great to refuse and he began his career with Fitzroy. After three successful seasons with the

VFL Lions his leadership qualities were again recognised and he was made captain in 1979 — a position he held for two years.

He had a poor year in 1980, as did the club, and when Fitzroy elected a new president and appointed a new coach the next logical step was to seek a new skipper and Alexander was deposed.

But the giant ruckman has always bounced back and he aimed to prove that he was far from a spent force in Victorian football.

DECISION

The result was that he won Fitzroy's fairest and best award in 1981.

It was then that he decided the time was ripe to return to the West.

He wanted to coach and when the vacancy came up at East Fremantle he had no hesitation in applying for the position of captain-coach.

In his first season he learnt a lot about the art of coaching and combining his playing duties and that showed last year.

East Fremantle wanted a change of image so they became known as the Sharks — dropping the Old Easts tag which they had carried for so many years — and Alexander brought about a change in their on-field approach.

STRONGLY

After a slow start to the season East Fremantle came home strongly to snatch fourth place from East Perth in the last qualifying game of the season when they beat the Royals in what virtually became the fifth final.

That they were beaten in the first semi final was a let-down, but every team has to serve an apprenticeship.

Alexander's on-field influence has been more noticeable this year as he has effectively combined with former Claremont brains trust Murray Ward.

The big ruckman is leading by example in the forward line and is his side's most consistent goalkicker.

Ron Alexander . . . he's no stranger to the captaincy.

CASSIDY PLAYING A VITAL ROLE

WHEN Jeff Cassidy first joined East Fremantle injuries prevented him from having the influence he had expected.

However, now in his second stint with the Sharks, he has accepted the responsibility of the vice-captaincy and is doing a fine job for the club.

Cassidy made his league debut with Geelong in 1977, but was in Perth to play with East Fremantle the following year.

And in his first season with East Fremantle he played just nine games before heading back to Geelong to continue his VFL career.

By the end of the 1980 season he had tallied 50 games with the VFL Cats, but was ready to return to the West and help the Sharks re-establish themselves as a top side.

At the same time he took on the job of development officer at East Fremantle —

helping to look after the future of the club by passing on his vast knowledge of the game to juniors in the club's district.

He has now played over 50 games with the Sharks and is working hard with captain-coach Ron Alexander to form a side capable of going better than the first semi final in this year's final round.

Cassidy's experience as a development officer should help him in his role this year. He is surrounded by young players who will need his experience if East Fremantle make the finals this year.

With over 100 senior games to his credit he was an ideal choice as Alexander's deputy this season.

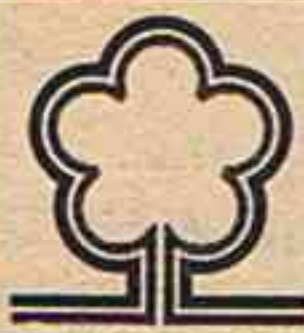

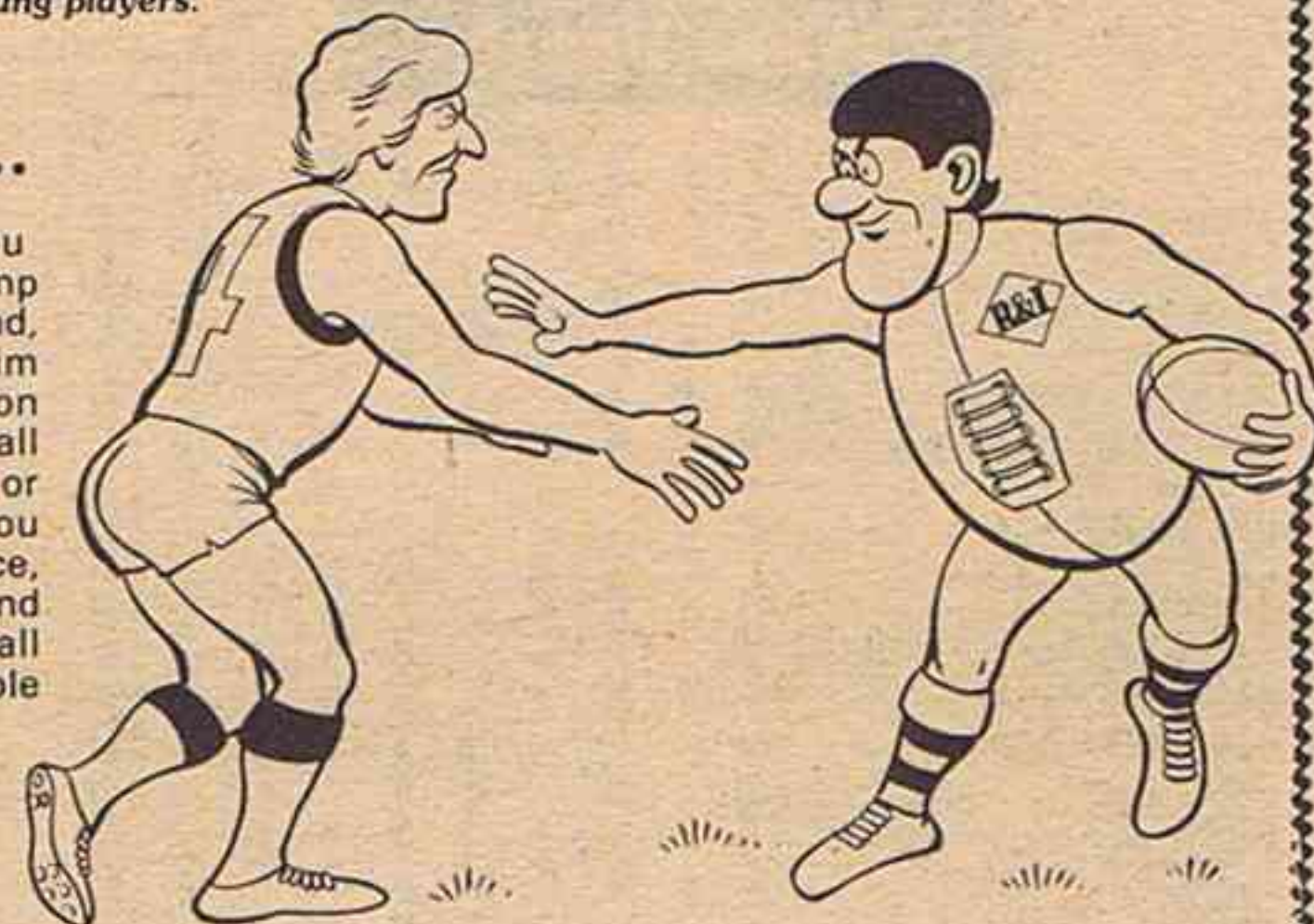

In 1982 he looked like earning berths on a more regular basis, but a broken jaw interrupted his progress and then last year he enjoyed more success.

However, the 24-year-old storeman looks to have at last made the grade and his ratings for this season are an indication of just how well he has been playing.

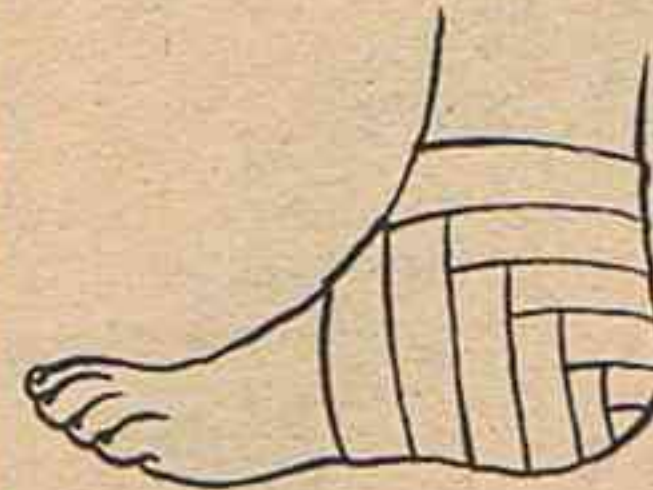
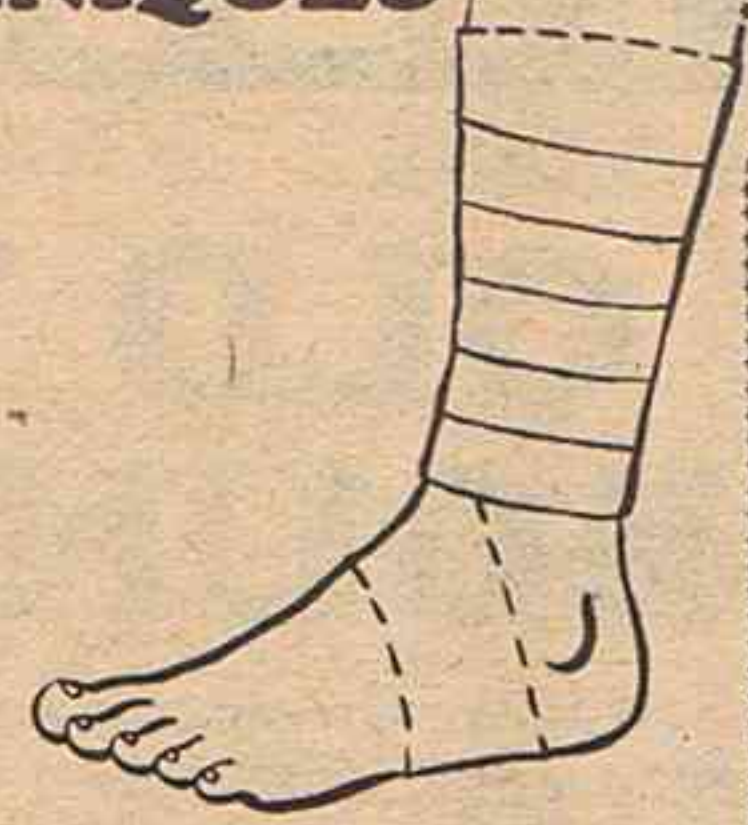

FUNDAMENTAL BANDAGING AND STRAPPING TECHNIQUES

PART 3

THE ASCENDING SPICA: It is similar to the spica but begins over the joint and then fans away from the joint.

SPIRAL BANDAGES: The simple spiral involves continuous bandaging around the limb for the purpose of compression, securing a dressing or pad, or restricting certain movement at a joint. The reverse spiral is used to apply bandages and involves making a half spiral turn folding the bandage over to a right angle and completing the turn. The reason for this is to ensure that the bandage fits the contours of the limb.



RECURRING BANDAGE: Used to bandage extremities. The bandage is passed over the end of the limb, held and folded and then passed back over. The line of the bandage is gradually increased on an angle until the spiral can be completed to anchor the folds of the bandage.

BASKET WEAVE: Strips of tape applied crossing each other at right angles that can be used to support ligaments, especially on the collateral aspect of joints, or to limit the extensibility of large muscle sheets such as the abdomen.

FINISHING TAPES: Used to ensure that the ends of the strips remain in place. This ensures a neat firm job. Elastic adhesive bandage has proven to be popular for this purpose.

ROBERT JONES BANDAGE: Used to pad, support and apply compression to the limb or joint:

- (i) layer of cotton wool
- (ii) ascending spica cotton crepe bandage
- (iii) another layer of cotton wool
- (iv) second ascending spica

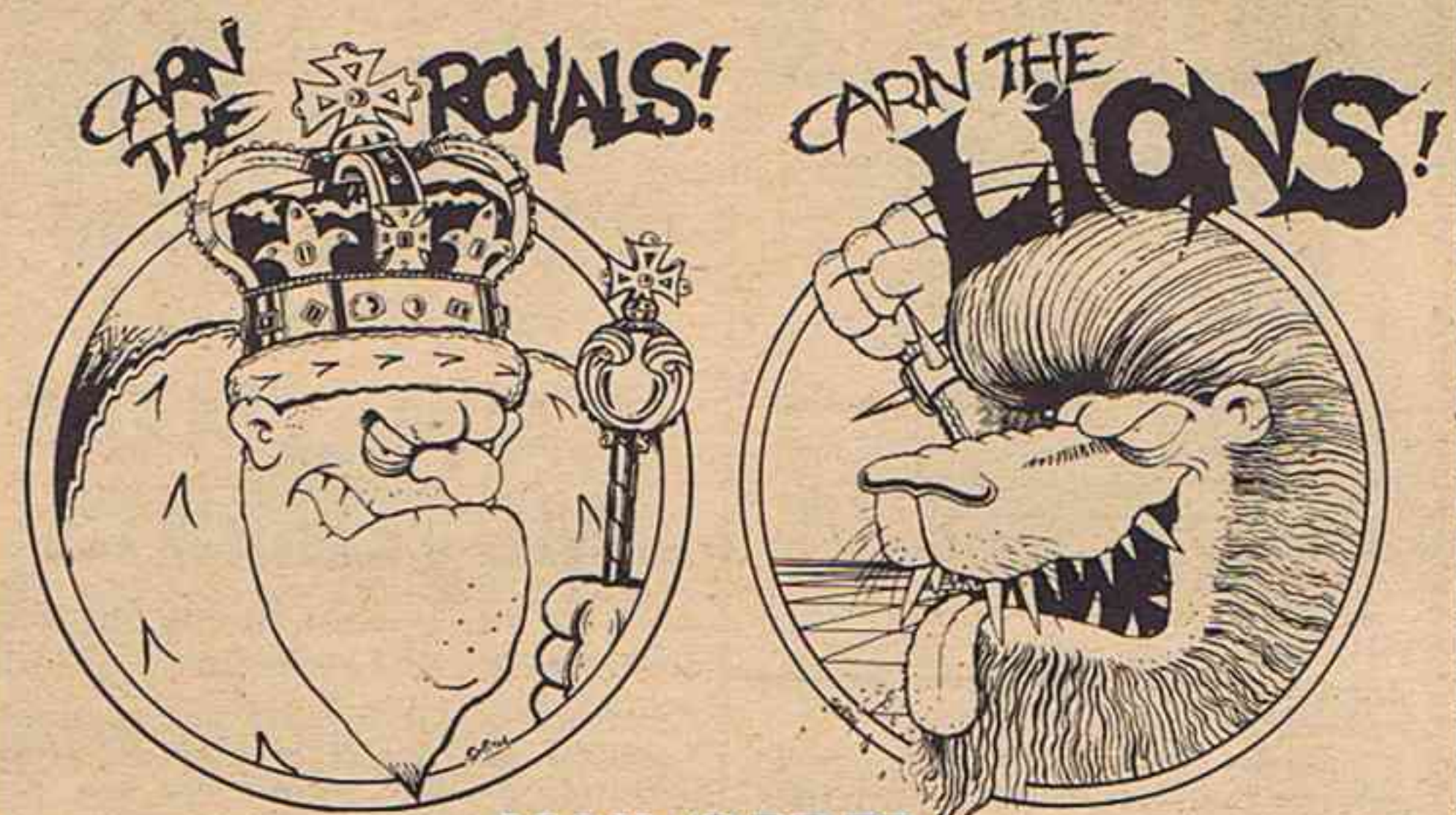
Ice water may be poured onto the application to achieve cold compression.

TRIANGULAR COTTON BANDAGE: Triangular or square folded into a triangle. They can be used in the following ways:

- (i) Folded into strips to hold splints or dressings
- (ii) Folded they can be used as slings
- (iii) Open they can be used as slings

West Australia blitz Croweaters

THE West Australian State side recorded one of the biggest wins in amateur football when they beat South Australia on Sunday.

After an even first half, the WA side ran the visitors into the ground at Leederville Oval to notch a 53-point win, 13.14 to 5.9.

It was WA's third win over South Australia (1959, 1979 and 1984) and the second on home soil.

The last-half capitulation of the visitors was due to the efforts of one of the most desperate teams seen in interstate clashes.

Russell Ellen was a tower of strength for WA. Second-quarter efforts of hard-running and tackling saw the home team open up a match-winning margin. The strength of Ken Duffy at centre and the marking potential of Justin Cook at centre-half-forward were telling factors.

With the heavy rain in the third quarter, WA were expected to cave in. The exact opposite happened with the locals revelling in the slogging conditions, holding SA scoreless while adding further to their score.

The last quarter saw WA grind the opposition into a no contest situation, piling in goal after goal in the heavy conditions to take the South-west Cup.

Coach Steve Arnott, in his first interstate clash, was elated and it will be a valuable guide to the type of player to lead WA to a carnival win in 1985.

SA coach David Marsh offered no excuses and was satisfied that it was the best side the South Aussies could produce.

A video was taken of the whole game, arranged by Kevin O'Keefe, through Channel 7, with support of broadcasters Ian Brunton and A-grade amateur critic Trevor Schorer.

The tape will be available for clubs to view. Full details soon.

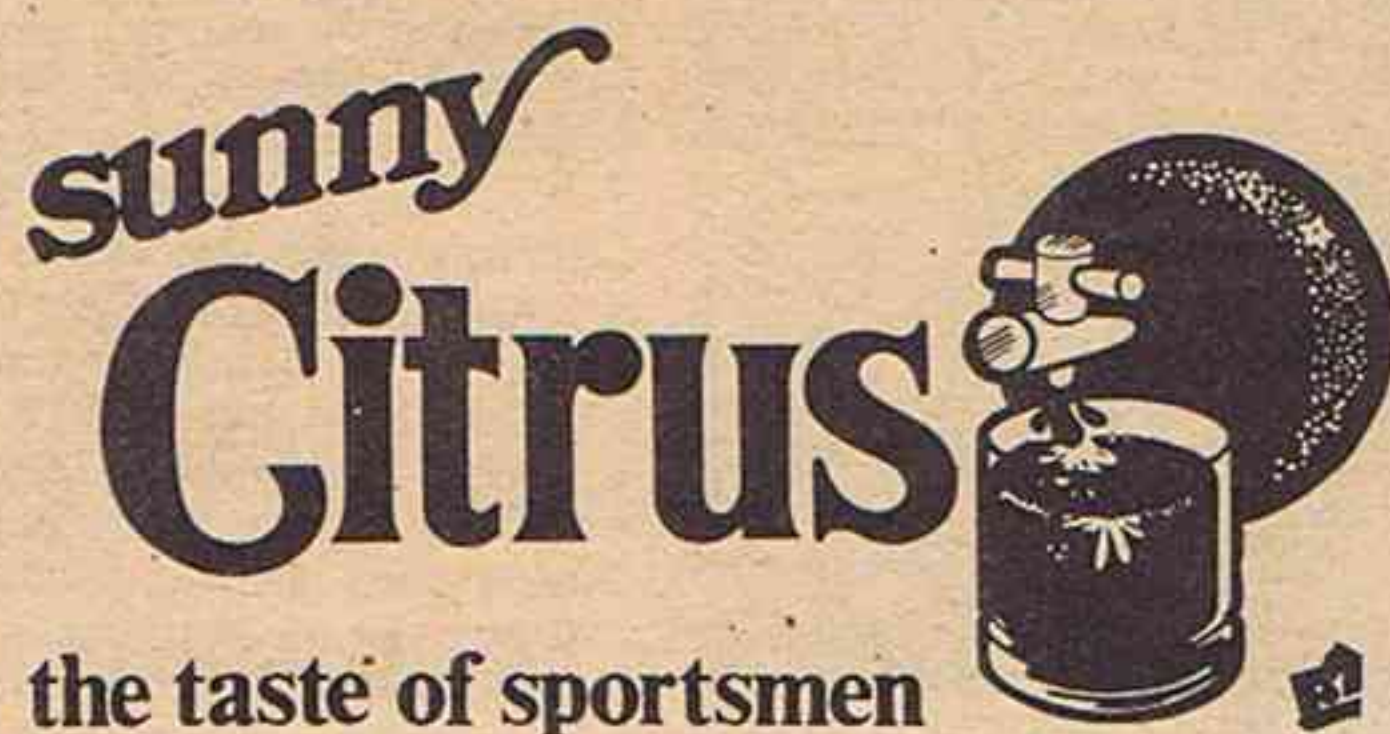

Football's Yearling Sale

THE 1984 Teal Cup carnival will start in Sydney this weekend and while many football followers have heard of the Teal Cup, few know what it is all about.

In 1953 Mr and Mrs Teal, from Sydney, provided a trophy for a game of Australian Football between New South Wales and Queensland — and, as you can imagine, football was of no significance at this time in these rugby dominated States.

In 1974 all the other States of Australia were invited to join, although Western Australia were the last State to enter in 1978.

South Australia won the Teal Cup in 1978-79-80 before the Victorians decided

to pick their best players and they have won the trophy in 1981-82-83.

This carnival is the only true carnival with every State in Australia being represented, including the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory. There it is a collection of the best 17-years and under boys Australian football can muster.

Year by year it grows in prestige, with it now being something like a yearling horse sale, giving the VFL talent scouts a first-

hand look at what the football market has to offer in the future.

Young players can virtually go away unknown and come back the "hottest property in Australia".

This carnival has seen WA approach the task in the most professional manner, due to the support given to recommendations by the new Board of Directors.

A doctor will be travelling with the team as will the selectors, a team manager and a head trainer, with most of the league clubs sending a representative to observe what is happening at the most important gathering
