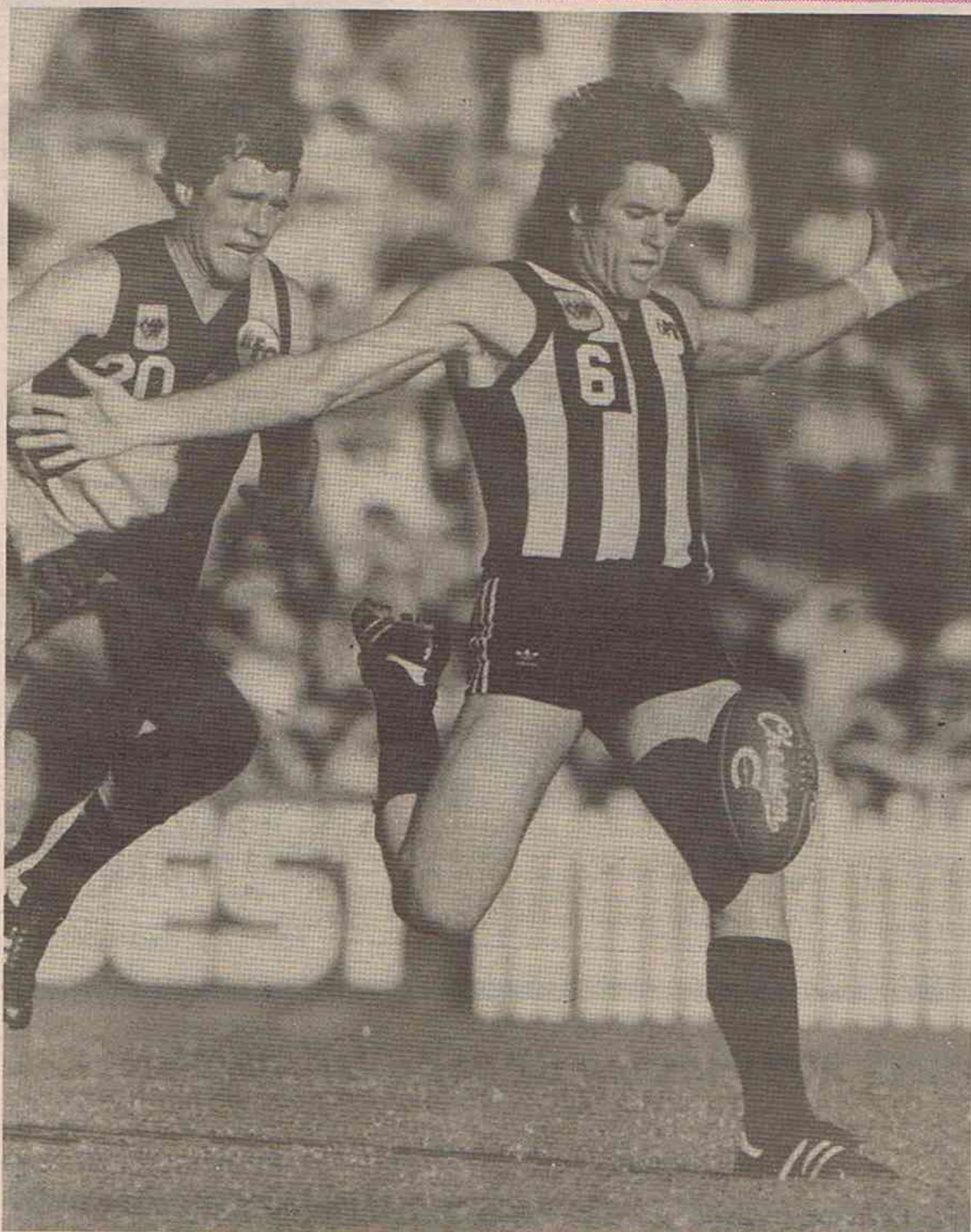

## Brenton gets his State call-up

SWAN Districts wingman Leigh Brenton is the latest "rags to riches" story in WA football.

In just 12 months his career has turned the full circle — from being unwanted by one league club to wearing a State guernsey.

The pendulum's swing will be completed when he makes his interstate debut against South Australia at Football Park, in Adelaide on Saturday.

The pacy winger dreamed of playing State football in his early days with East Fremantle, but admits that those aspirations had almost disappeared.

But his form with Swan Districts this year has been impeccable.

"In my early days State football was an aim," Brenton says. "But I thought I had lost sight of the goal."

"I guess the new environment at Swan Districts has had a lot to do with my new-found form and success."

Brenton was told by the Sharks last season that it would be in his interests to pursue his career at another club and after weighing up the options, he headed to Swan Districts.

And State coach John Todd was the main reason.

Brenton was anxious to play in a successful team under a successful coach and it was a toss-up between South Fremantle's Mal Brown and Todd.

He is extremely pleased he chose the latter.

Since being discarded by the Sharks, Brenton has played in a premiership team, his football appetite has been revived and he is set to play a leading role for WA against the Croweaters.

One of the first men to congratulate Brenton on his State selection was the man who suggested Brenton move on — Sharks coach Ron Alexander.

Brenton has now played over 100 league games at his two WA clubs and apart from being a key man in Saturday's big match, he is also a vital player in Swans' aspirations of a hat trick of premierships.

He is now playing with confidence — something which had been lacking in his game in his latter days at East Fremantle — and he has shown that he thrives on the pressure of finals football.

# YOUNG RUCKMEN START TO EMERGE

IT'S no secret now close this year's football season is.

With the struggle for places in the top four mounting in excitement, a whole band of young, talented players of the future have emerged.

One of the keys to good football teams is a strong and skillful ruck division.

Every club currently has a supply of in-form big men, but it is the younger ruckmen in the competition who are of interest.

East Perth have their 1983 Sandover Medallist John Ironmonger firing again, but it is only a matter of time before he is lost to the VFL.

Swan Districts are starting to gain benefit from 19-year-old Shane Bogunovich, Claremont are getting plenty from David O'Connell and David Court and Craig Nelson is proving to be an asset for the Falcons.

East Fremantle's Paul Harding has stamped himself as probably the most talented knock ruckman in the game, while Perth's Rhett Baynes has finally found the consistent form his potential suggested for so long.

At Subiaco it is obvious that when Laurie Keene and Phil Scott provide their little men with opportunities the Lions are a better side.

There is one thing all these young giants share in common.

Their emergence has come about by accepting the responsibility of the ruck duties for their respective senior sides.

With this in mind, seeing 19-year-old Dean Farmer playing in the reserves at Bassendean last Saturday was a sorry sight.

He is a class player and needs exposure to the 'big time' on a more full-time basis if he is to develop.

In this day and age of the dollar and building for the future of a club and an individual, surely some arrangement can be made.

Leasing a player like Farmer to a lowly club on a short term basis would

allow him the full time commitment to senior football a player of this nature needs.

He could then return to Claremont at a later date.

But allow him the opportunity to progress at the same rate as his fellow big men or he will miss out altogether — and that would be a loss for WA football.

## ON TARGET

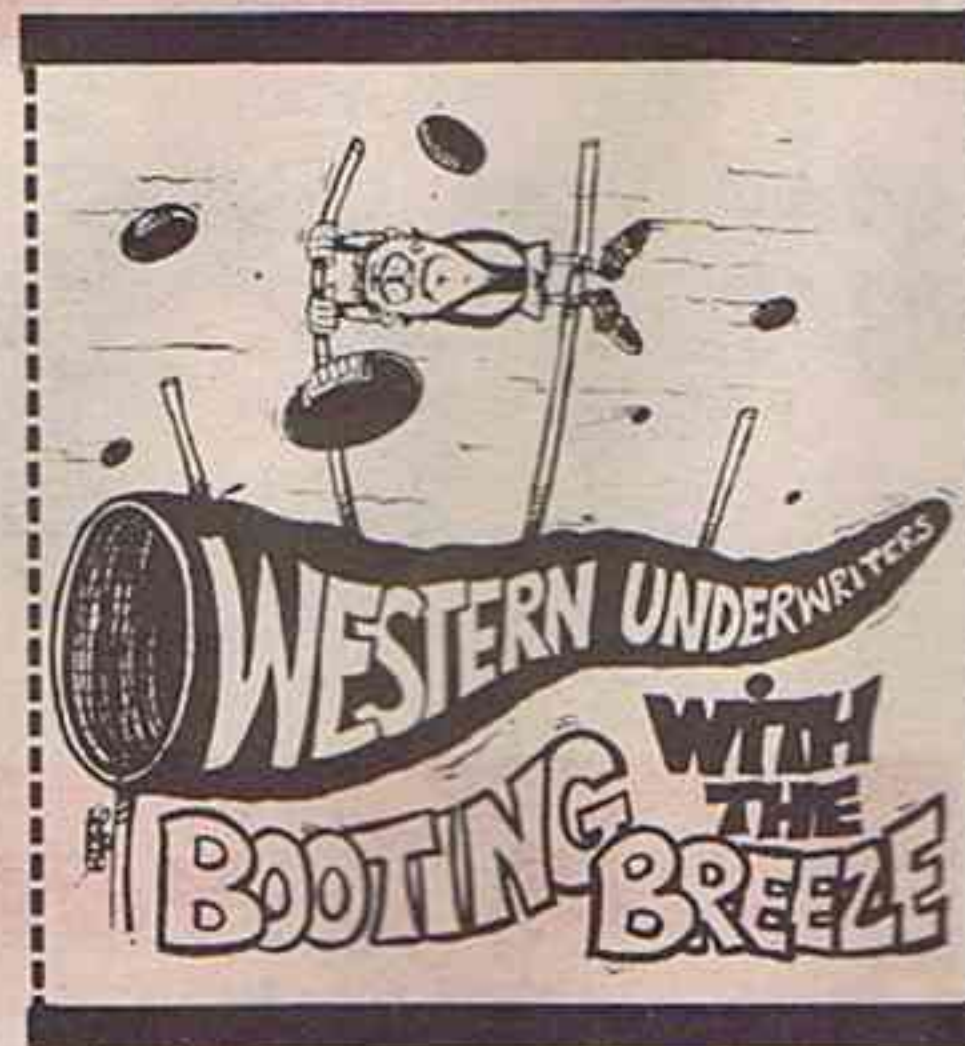

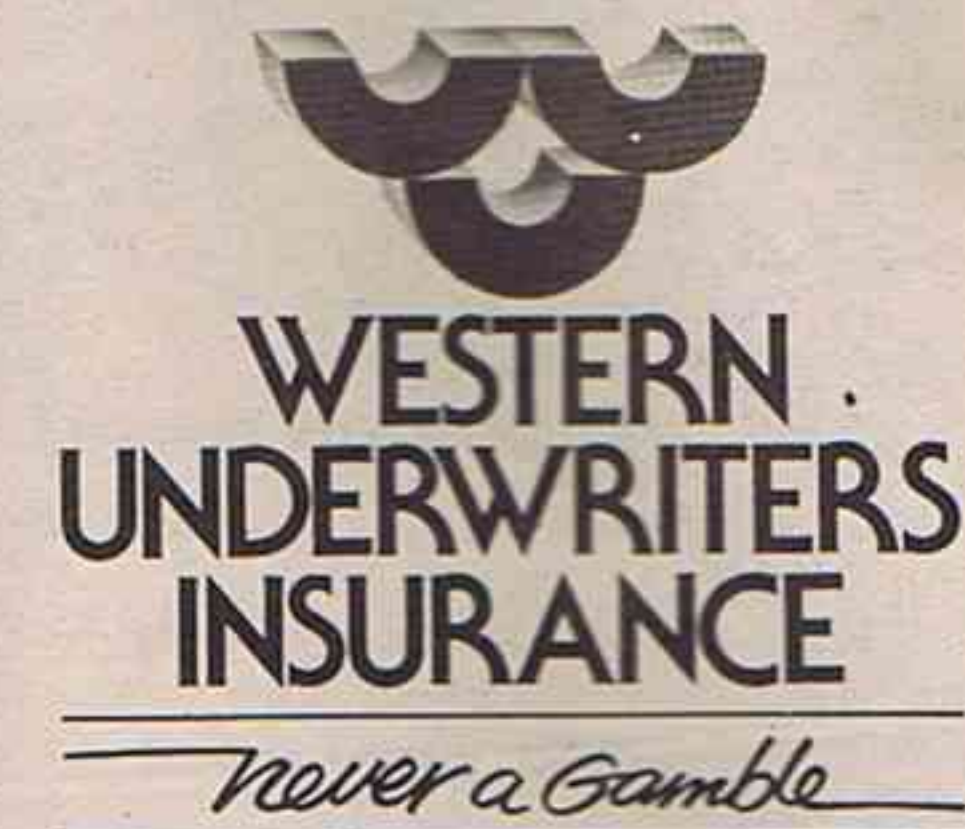
## CROWDS BACK

# We need independent selectors

WHAT is wrong with having a coach and selectors completely independent of the clubs for our future State teams?

For the past week there has been plenty of criticism of the way this year's State selectors were appointed and of the actual composition of the squad originally chosen for Saturday's interstate clash against South Australia in Adelaide.

It seems incredible to me that the selectors — all from the top four clubs of 1983 — could find room for only six players from the other four clubs in their initial squad of 30.

The imbalance was partially corrected later when Laurie Keene (Subiaco) and Dean Warwick (West Perth) were added to the squad.

But other talented players were left out in the cold, especially Subiaco's Dwayne Lamb, who has hardly put a foot wrong in the past five or six weeks.

Now I know that I'll be accused of churlishness for knocking the system after WA's great record in interstate football last season when we became Australian champions for only the fourth time in 79 years.

But we only have to look across the Nullarbor to South Australia to find that the system of having independent men in charge of the State squad really does work.

The Croweaters broke with tradition last year when, for the first time since 1961 when Fos Williams was in charge, they went outside club ranks and appointed Bob Hammond as State coach.

Adelaide fans could hardly believe their eyes as they watched Hammond's team thrash the mighty Victorians by 56 points.

This year SA again have independent State selectors in Barry Robram, a triple Magarey Medallist, and Dave Boyd, who played for Port Adelaide more than 30 years ago, but they have reverted to West Adelaide's Neil Kerley as State coach.

Hammond declined to be reappointed in

"The sooner we get back to it the better", he said.

Here in WA it should not prove difficult to find men divorced from the clubs who would be willing to take charge of State team matters.

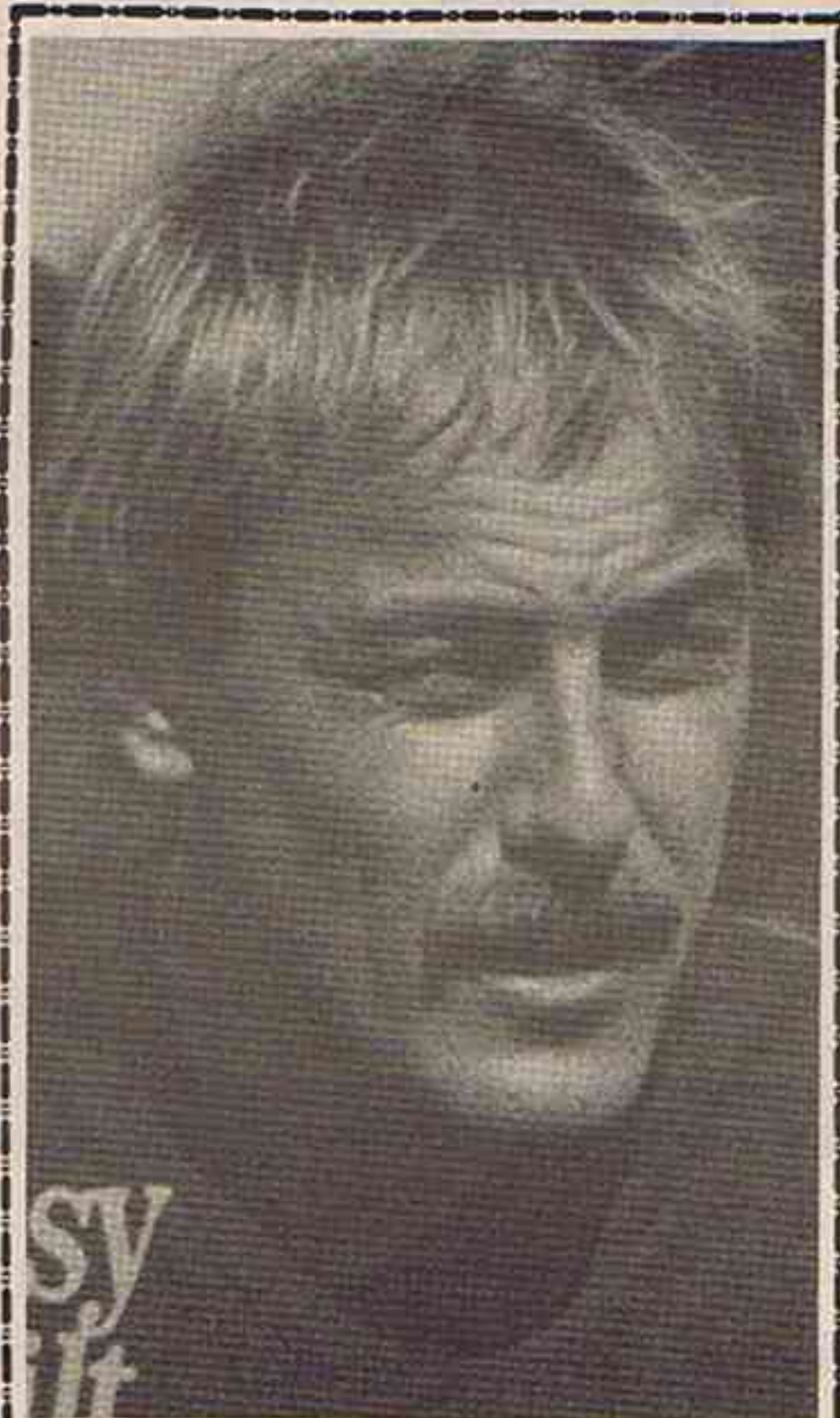
Their services would be required for only three months or so — say from the end of April to mid-July.

And I believe that current State coach John Todd has enough on his plate in looking after his Swan Districts players.

Todd's love of football and dedication to his job are so great that he never puts anything less than 100 per cent into coaching the State team.

But being coach of a club side these days is a seven-days-a-week proposition throughout the winter and the extra State commitments must place him under considerable strain.

There may be problems in having independent men at the helm for our interstate games, but I believe the idea is worthy of a thorough investigation by our new Board of Directors.



## Tackling the U.S. market

MALCOLM Blight, always one of my favourite players, will take a party of South Australian footballers to America in October as part of our export drive.

Blight is now coach of the Woodville Warriors, who will provide two 12-man teams for an exhibition match as the curtain-raiser to the grid-iron clash between the Dallas Cowboys and the New Orleans Saints.

I wonder how Malcolm and his merry men will feel when they run on to the grid-iron field? Cramped for room, I'll bet.

The whole of the playing area is only double the size of the centre square on one of our own ovals.

I don't know how they propose to play this exhibition but I'd say that even the full-backs will be taking a few shots at goal.

With teams of only 12 playing on a ground about 90 metres long, the Woodville party will probably have to dispense with half-back and half-forward lines. Otherwise the players will be treading on each other's toes.

It's a great pity that whenever attempts are made to show overseas countries what Australian football is all about, it can only be a modified version because of the problem with grounds.

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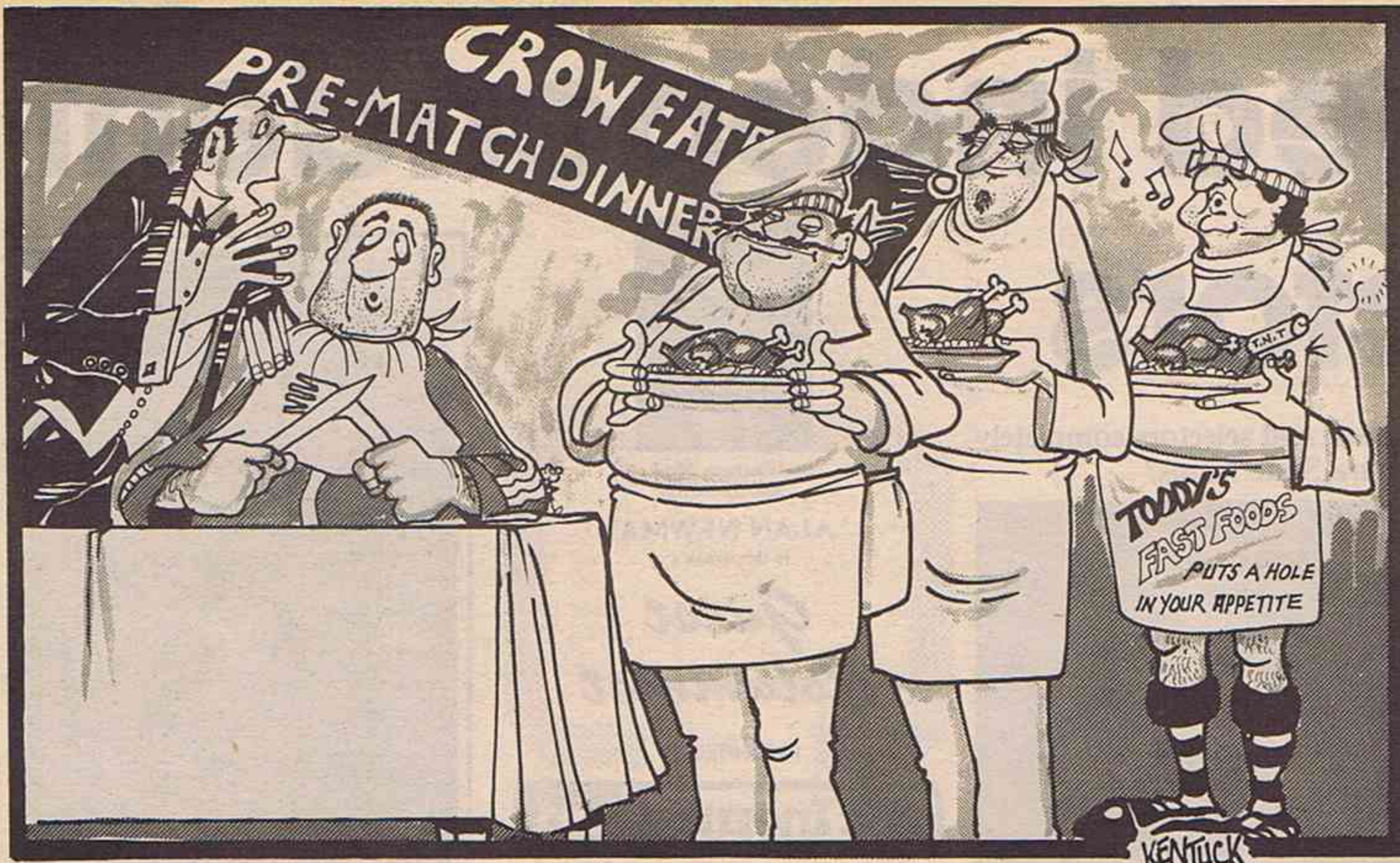

# History teaches a lesson

THE record books show that WA won its first interstate match exactly 80 years ago — and the team we beat was South Australia.

The games in 1904 involved a match against Victoria in Melbourne in which the Vics won 14.10 to 8.11.

WA then defeated a country team at Bendigo and beat SA in Adelaide 10.7 to 8.10.

Our first-up win in Adelaide gave no indication of how hard it would be for future teams to win there.

WA and SA have met 24 times in Adelaide and the score stands at 20 to 4 in favour of the locals. WA's isolated wins came in 1904, 1935, 1938 and 1978.

And while our 1984 State side reached their destination in three hours such was not the case 80 years ago — they travelled by boat to Melbourne, a journey that took almost a week. The team arrived on the morning of the first match.

Because of the strength of the Goldfields football nine of the 20 taken on tour were selected from the Kalgoorlie teams.

For the record, here is WA's first State side: A. Heinrichs, J. Cooper, Goddard and Franks from North Fremantle. H. Sharpe, H. Kelly, S. Doig and Sweetman from East Fremantle. G. Plunkett (captain), A. McNamara from West Perth. From Goldfields came Ellis, Nelson, Rowell, Tyson, Jarvis, Langsford, Patterson, Hiefner and Bliss. Jefferies from Perth was taken as an extra man!

Only seven of the chosen 20 came from clubs that play in the league today.

Financing the trip had its problems, too. Some clubs were collecting more than others which prompted one delegate to threaten to return all his donations if the others did not start raising more funds.

## Tigers defence is doing the job

Is Claremont's dramatic comeback over the past month attributable to an old fashioned style of play?

The Tigers have really been able to restrict sides to small scores in recent games... and that has been the recipe for their success.

It is interesting to note that a side hasn't kicked more than 12 goals against them in their past five matches.

While two of those games were played in wet conditions the past three weeks have told the story.

It has been a long time since a team has been able to restrict Swan Districts to only five scoring shots on their home ground in perfect conditions, as was the case last Saturday.

Two matches before that Claremont

were able to keep South Fremantle down to five goals in three quarters of play... something few teams have been able to do to the Bulldogs in recent years.

The premiership table really shows the story. Though they are still not in the four Claremont have had considerably less points scored against them this season than any other team.

The next most defensive team are league leaders, South Fremantle, who have had 55 points more scored against them.

Claremont's Achilles heel this season has been their inability to score freely... which has been their biggest asset in recent seasons.

Because they have lacked a key forward the Tigers have had to change their style of play.

They have virtually become a tagging team.

In other words they have adopted a style of play that used to be reminiscent of football before it became a ruing game... playing opponents man to man.

### STARTED

For a half against Swans, three quarters against South Fremantle and in the last 15 minutes of the game against East Fremantle, Claremont virtually starved their opponents of possession of the ball.

It enabled them to set up important wins.

It will be interesting to see if Claremont persist with this style of play when Bruce Monteath again becomes available.

He should provide the club with a spearhead in attack.

Claremont's new formula will be put to the test against Subiaco on Saturday week.

The Lions have developed an appetite for goals in the past two weeks.

The match should be a guide to the respective fortunes of the two clubs this season. Both have struck a purple patch that looks capable of carrying them into this year's finals.

Claremont's big problem in the next few matches will be to retain the endeavour that has enabled them to keep opponents under pressure so far this round.

Having beaten sides that occupied the top three spots at the start of the round there is the danger players may feel they have done all the hard work and that they will have an easy run into the top four.

Coach Graham Moss, who has done a remarkable job of lifting his side back on the rails after a dismal start to the season, seems to think the Tigers have got over the hump.

His comments after the win against Swans on Saturday were those of a confident person: "We will now settle down and look forward to winning the remaining four games of the round."

I would have thought he would have been a little more guarded to stop over-confidence or complacency creeping into the team.

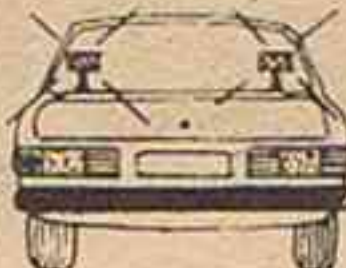
### SECRET SERVICE

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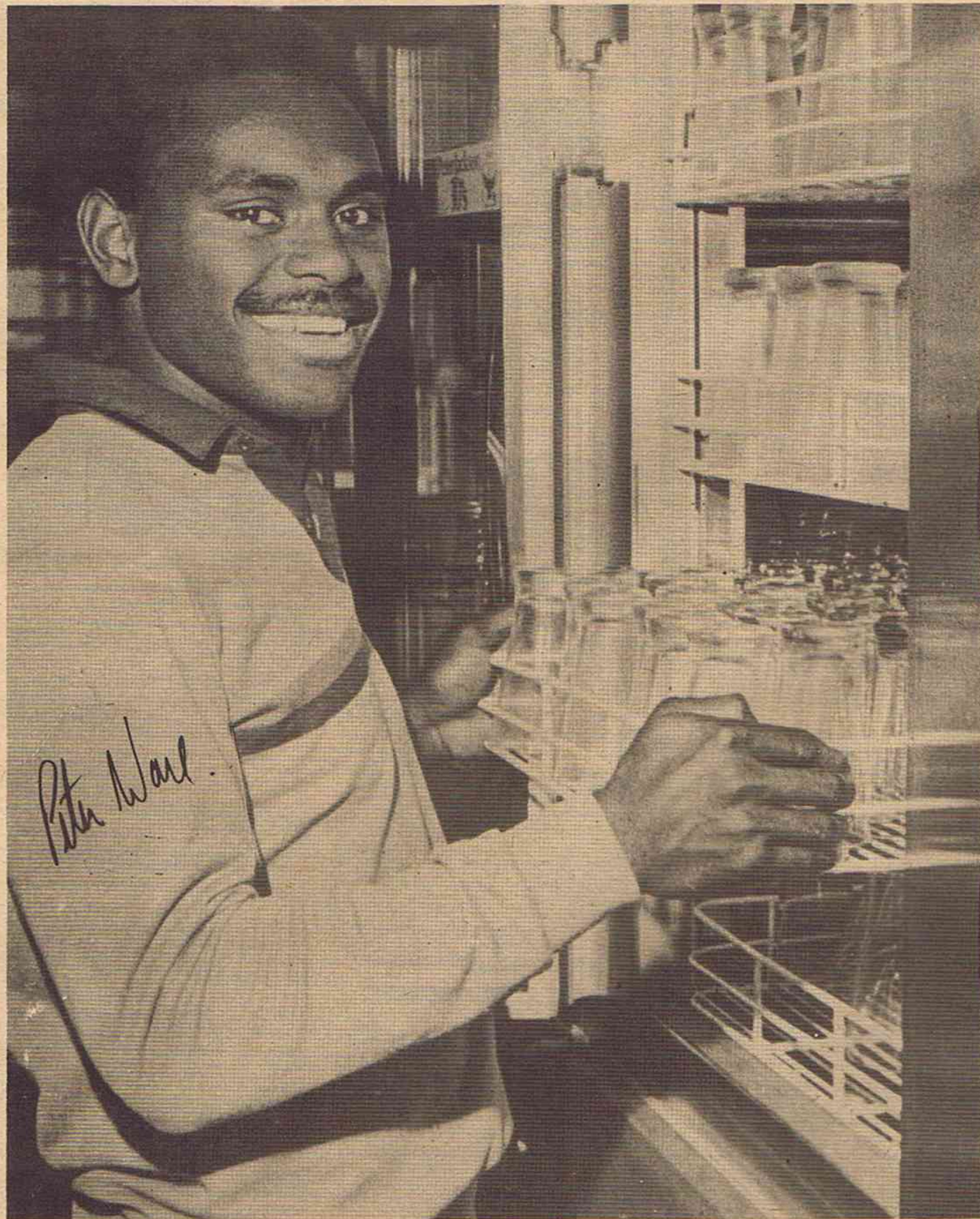
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# adidas PLAYER PROFILE



**THE** flashy skills of Swan Districts back pocket specialist Peter Ware have carried him a long way since his arrival in WA in 1982.

The Thursday Islander has captured the imagination of football fans throughout the State with his amazing reflexes and lightning dashes out of defence.

Ware made his league debut in the infamous Escort Cup match against Richmond at VFL Park in 1982. Coach John Todd, protesting about the lop-sided way the competition favoured Victorian teams, took a group of youngsters across to Melbourne to tackle the VFL giants.

Ware was one of those men and he showed in that match that he was a player of the future.

However, he could not force selection in Swans' senior side throughout that season, but a hard summer's work saw him play his first senior game in the opening round of 1983.

## Peter Ware

Since then he has become one of the most recognisable figures in WA football.

He is a player who believes in "giving it (football) your best shot". He has never been frightened to back his judgement and that has now become one of the most damaging traits in his game.

It is his ability to come charging out of defence and use the ball with precision

passing, by either hand or foot, which has been one of the contributing factors in Swans being able to stay at the top of the football tree.

With key players heading for the bright lights of Melbourne each year, Swans rely on younger players taking on greater responsibility in the side.

Ware has certainly done that.

He leads by example and there is nothing more exhilarating in WA football than seeing Ware bouncing and weaving his way out of the backline and sending Swans forward.

However, it is only a matter of time before the former Queenslander realises a life time goal and takes up a position with a Victorian team.

And together with his selectors he has chosen a side full of players renowned as fighters when the odds are stacked against them.

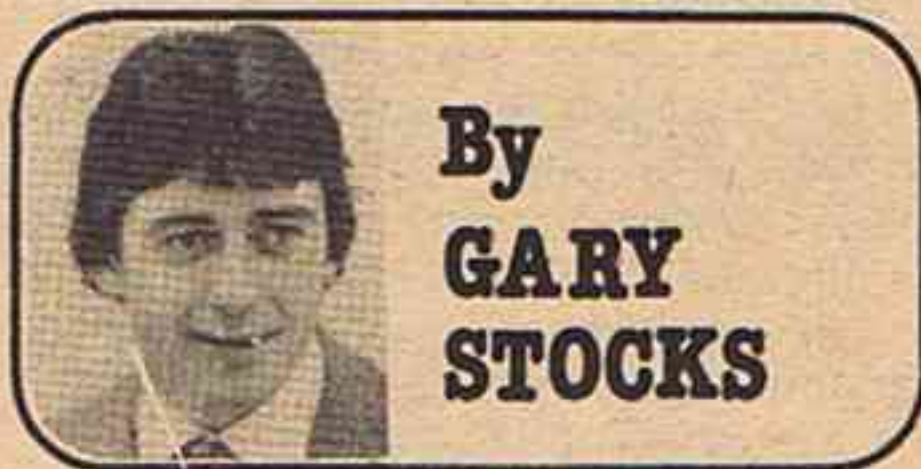
### OBJECTIVE

That is no coincidence. He set out with that objective in mind when he selected his squad and that accounted for a few of the so-called surprises in the list.

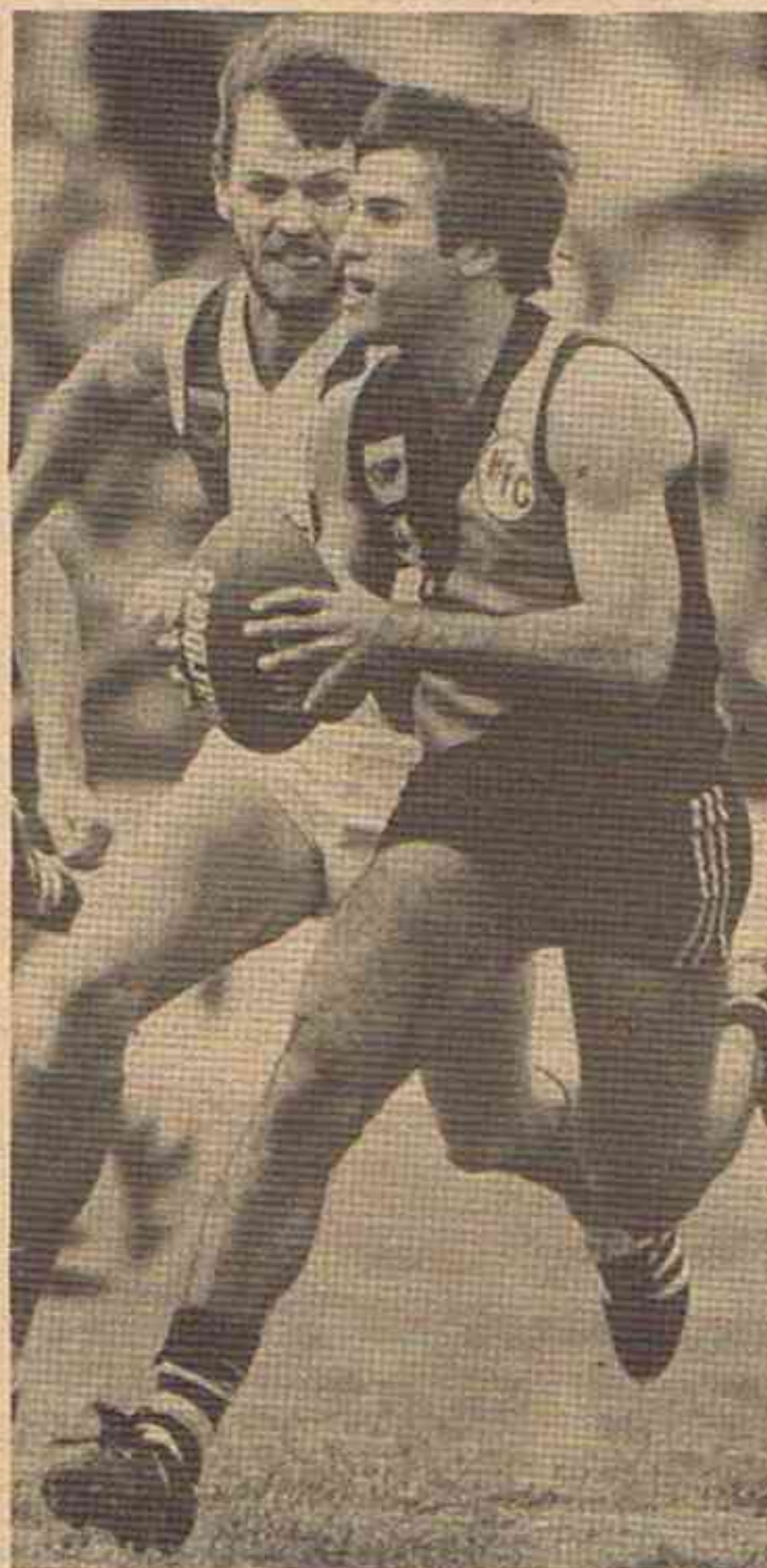

## Comparing footy in two States

**DURING** my stay in Adelaide many people have asked me to compare the football scene with that in Perth.

The league football competitions have obvious similarities and differences and probably the best method of comparison is to look at the various facets of the football scene.

**....WA has greater depth**

### PLAYING STRENGTH

At club level I believe that most Adelaide clubs lack the depth of their Perth counterparts. This stands to reason when Adelaide supports ten clubs on a smaller population than Perth, which supports eight.

### BUSINESS ACUMEN

Adelaide officials would appear to be well in advance of their Perth counterparts.

There are a lot less VFL players playing in the WAFL than there are in the SANFL, and the quality of player that moves to Perth is also inferior.

Conversely, a check of the VFL teams in a recent round of fixtures revealed that 28 West Australians took the field that day as opposed to seven South Australians.

### GROUNDS

Football Park is unquestionably a world class stadium and well beyond anything Perth has to offer.

The club grounds in Adelaide, with their limited spectator areas and terracing, are adequate and promote a mini-VFL atmosphere.

Perth's spacious grounds with their extended grassed banks allow the atmosphere to dissipate quickly from even the best attended games.

### CROWDS

The aggregate attendances per round are similar ranging from 30,000 to 38,000, depending on the draw and the weather.

However, Adelaide crowds do appear more colorful and vociferous (more akin to Melbourne), probably because of the confined spectator areas.

### PLAYER FACILITIES

With the exception of Football Park the "player comfort level" in Adelaide changerooms is appalling in comparison to those in Perth.

While visiting players to grounds such as Alberton run the risk of contracting pneumonia, if not tetanus, all teams in Perth are housed in spacious, modern rooms at all grounds.

### MEDIA FACILITIES

Like the players, the South Australian media seems to be very much a poor relation of the game.

The working conditions at all grounds I've worked at, other than Football Park, should not have to be endured by the game's primary promoters.

### FINAL ANALYSIS

When taken to the bottom line, the final comparison should be the on-field product. A look at the results of the last 14 games between the two States (since 1970) shows WA has won nine and SA five.

That seven of WA's victories were in Perth and four of South Australia's were in Adelaide, indicates there is very little between the two States.

Figures also indicate a distinct home-ground advantage to both States.

In fact, I don't believe there is any difference between the top 40 players in each State. But I do believe the SA competition is shallower in player talent because of the extra teams.

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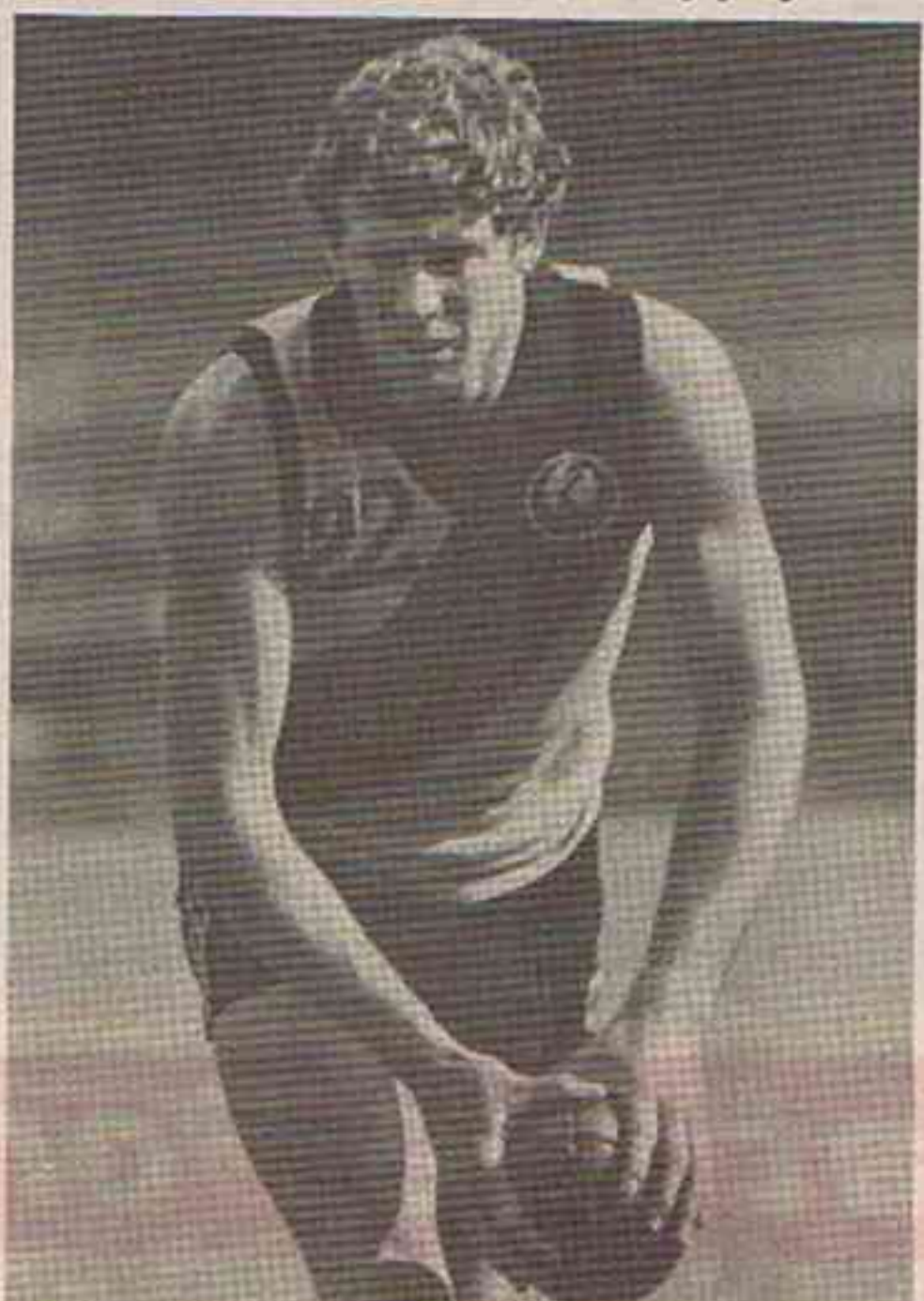

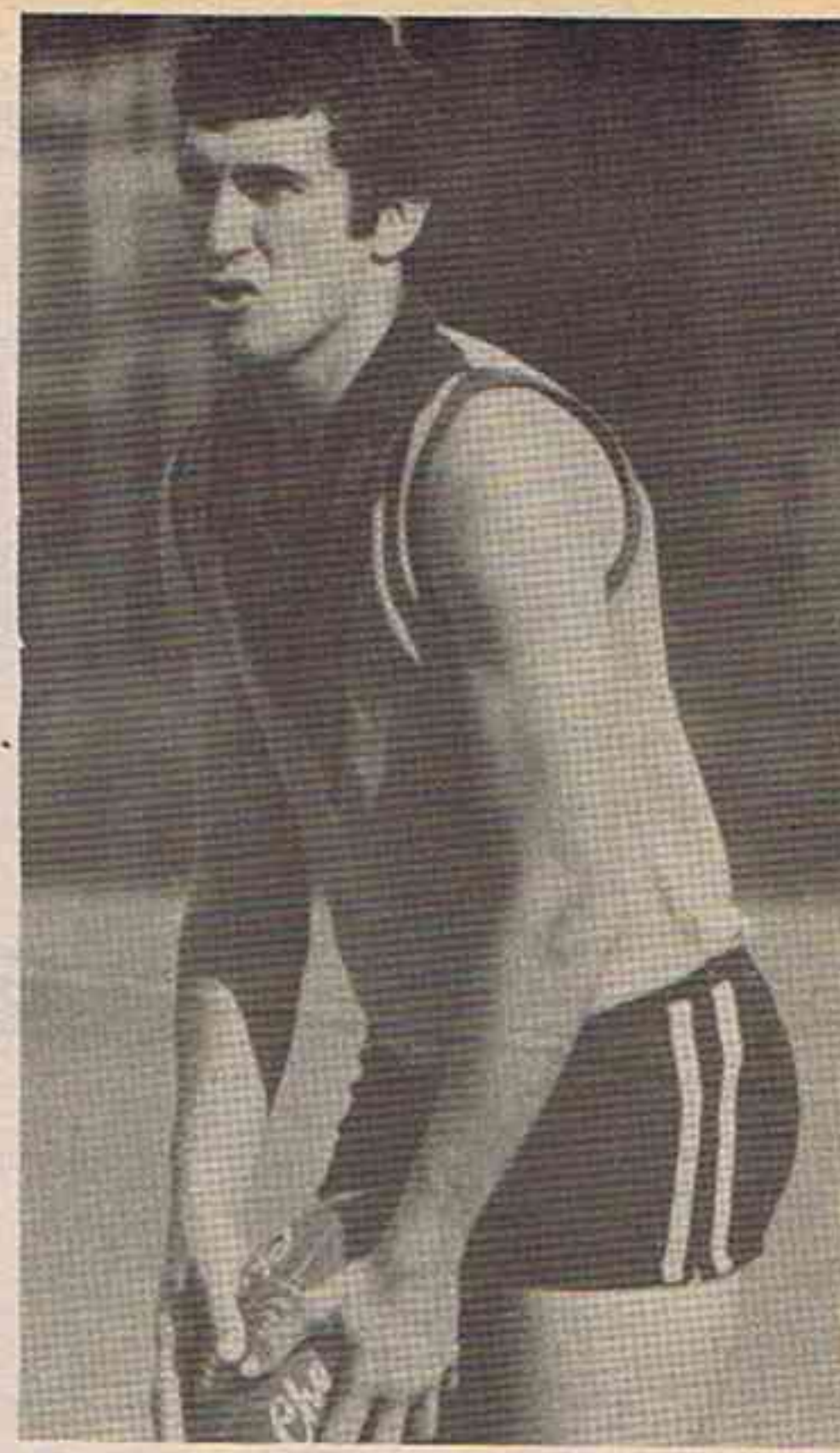
and is still living in Margaret River.

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# Our man gets Sharks pen

IN THE depths of a cold and wet winter most of us spend evenings curled up in front of the heater in the protection of our lounge rooms, watching the popular soopies on TV.

While we are safe from the elements there is a special breed of person slaving in the rain, wind and dark doing his utmost to reach the pinnacle of his chosen sport.

After spending a week in one of these camps, enduring the sacrifice and suffering, I can confirm that it is indeed a very special type of sportsman who reaches the category of League Footballer.

To reach the status of league player demands more than a little determination; a slice of dedication and heaps of ability.

I went into the East Fremantle camp in an effort to gain a first-hand appreciation of just how hard a league footballer trains — knowing that these players had been hard at this routine since November.

Not only is the training more intense than anything I have experienced, but the schedule and adherence to it requires total commitment of time and devotion.

It all began at 8.30am SUNDAY morning. Big Ron Alexander said: "Don't be late or you'll cop the same fine as any player."

On arrival, at East Fremantle Oval I thought I was at the Shenton Park annexe for sports injuries. It was the walking wounded.

Training staff were flat out providing the necessary ice packs and strapping needed to help players prepare to go through it all again next week.

And this was no ordinary week at East Fremantle. The Sharks were getting ready to take on arch rivals South Fremantle in what has become the most important game of the year, the Foundation Day derby.

## DERBY

I have heard down Fremantle way that it doesn't matter where you are on the premierships table as long as you win the derby.

So my week in a league camp had double significance.

- Experience the physical and psychological preparation of a league player.

- To feel the excitement build up as the derby drew closer.

My apprehension of putting my limited football skills against some of the State's best took a turn for the worse when Alexander agreed to the contract saying: "Train with us on one condition — you do ALL training set for the players."

East Fremantle have a set procedure involving a lot of man to man work Monday and Wednesday nights against some of the toughest men in WA football.

Peter Wilson, Clinton Browning, Michael Brennan, Colin Waterson, Russell Jones and big Ron himself have often shown their ability to mix it with the best and most rugged opponents the league can offer.

Sunday morning passed without serious incident. But I can understand why so many players despise it and admit to it being one of the hardest associated with being a league footballer.

Just another sacrifice of being in that elite category of sportsman.

MONDAY night's training wasn't going to be easy. With eight days till the derby Alexander and his coaching staff, assistant coach Murray Ward and physical education instructor Peter Gianoli, had plenty of time to play with.

## In deep water at the Port

After a lengthy warm up period involving stretches and short sprints the balls are introduced in an end-to-end drill with pace the emphasis.

"Modern day football is all about running," Ward said. The pace wasn't good enough so the call to stop and return the centre of the ground is made.

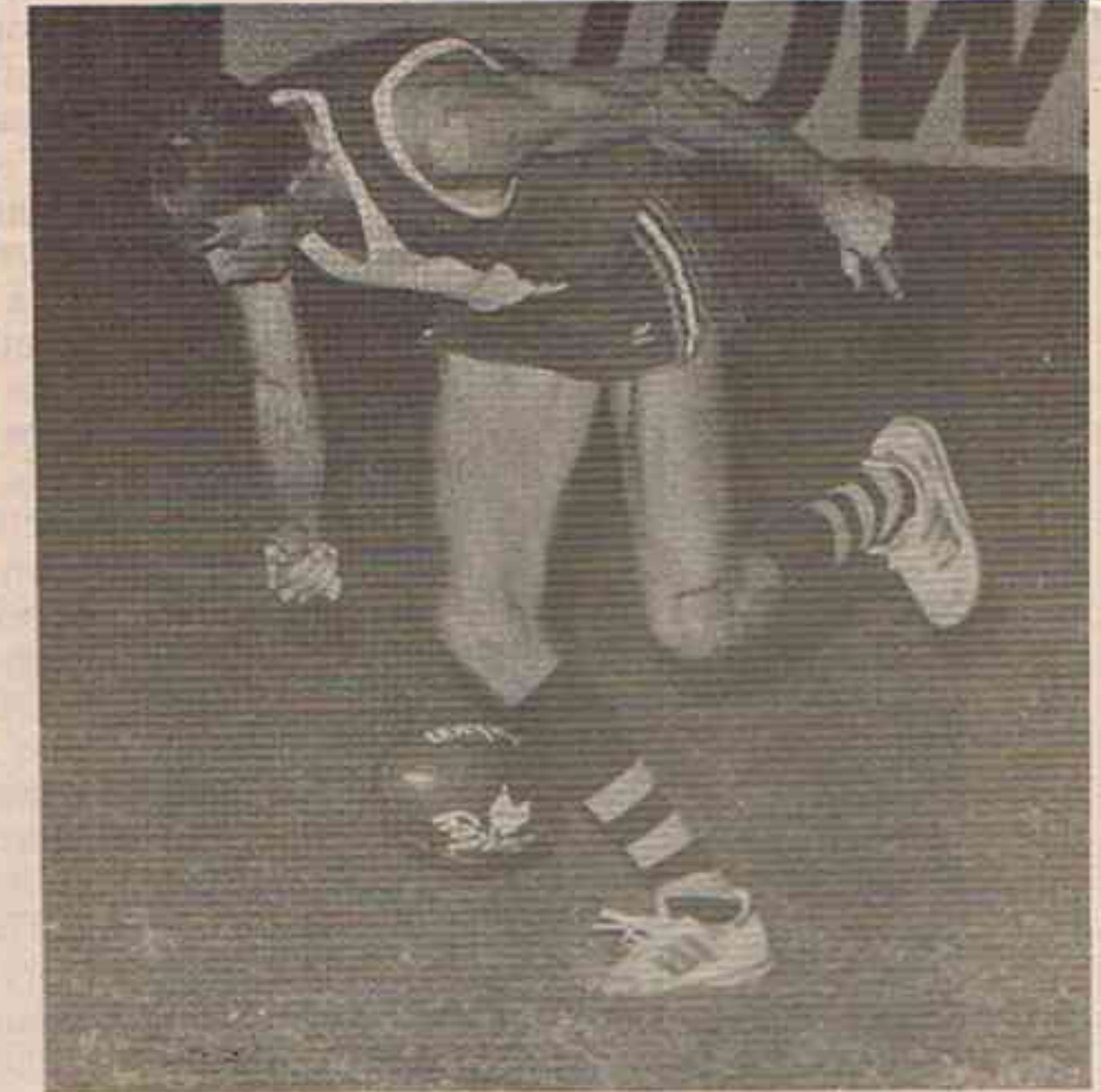
No-one dared be last to the coach. After a tongue-lashing from Ward and a threat to accept the challenge of producing the required standards, things improved dramatically.

Then it started — the man to man duels. Alexander's words of provision ran through my mind as the 'big Shark' asked who my partner was.

I sheepishly pointed out I had no partner, so the coach paired me with one of the State's finest defenders in Browning.

The man-to-man drills lasted 1½ hours with little respite but for the occasional pause for comment from Alexander or Ward.

The type of drill varied frequently but the competitive nature from the players showed no variation.



And Clint Browning was matched to the easiest opponent of his league career.

Receiving a hip and shoulder from Alexander has never been high on my list of priorities.

But having sought the experience I suppose I had to expect something.

It came in the form of a shepherd when his team had the run of the ball in a team game drill.

It was a polite reminder that I was in the big league and things were dinkum.

Thankfully Ron is a friend of mine. I'd hate to be an enemy if the ferocity of that bump was an indication of what the number one Shark is capable of.

The desperation was becoming more evident, particularly from the players who hadn't produced their best form the previous weekend.

Alexander challenged one of his most senior players that perhaps he wasn't putting in and perhaps he was injured.

The player in question reacted angrily to the suggestion and within minutes was engaged in the type of grapple with a team-mate on the ground more akin to an opposition number on Saturdays.

Alexander said: "I don't mind if tempers flare at training as long as it doesn't go too far and it is patched up later."

After all the man to man work I thought that would be the end of training.

A gruelling series of sprints and run-throughs were in front of the players (no token effort either.)

## SPRINT TRAINING

Three quarters of an hour later and 5000 metres of sprinting training was called off and the Sharks gingerly waded their way to the safety of the showers.

As someone who prides himself on an acceptable level of fitness I can honestly say the Monday night training was the hardest I have ever been a party to.

It took until WEDNESDAY to even walk without discomfort, let alone contemplate what was in store at training.

It was during Wednesday's training I made a new realization to what I was experiencing.

DISCIPLINE is a word used by many psychologists and coaches in an effort to motivate the required responses.

To go through what these guys do must come from within.

At East Fremantle I witnessed discipline at its best. As the most traditional club in the league, much of the discipline is a matter of pride.

There are 25 premierships and the tag as the oldest club in the league is pride enough.

But that has little to do with the way the current-day players approach, with total sincerity, the set tasks required to achieve a league berth.

At the start of Wednesday's session it was made clear that places in the senior side were under review.

Every-one trained with vigour in an effort to impress. Man to man encounters took on a new importance.

It was the nearest players could get to match conditions and they had to make the most of it if they were to claim the spots 'up for grabs'.

As one player would gain the upper hand over his immediate opponent, the clash became more fierce in end-vour.

Time ticked over and by 7.30 I was again a physical wreck that welcomed the call of halt.

But that wasn't it.

"Into the gym for weights," chirped Gianoli.

I was convinced by this stage that league footballers deserve what ever pennies they get.

Remember they do this three (and sometimes four) nights a week.

FRIDAY night saw a definite change in tempo again on the track.

There was a confident, positive atmosphere in the respective groups scattered around the ground for the various energy sapping drills.

The more positive attitude evident in the players I put down to the fact that they had survived another arduous week of training.

I couldn't define the atmosphere exactly and even some of the most experienced players could only speculate as to why the greater urgency.

Perhaps the derby; perhaps just another game of footy.

No matter how hard the players had performed on the training track, nor how much flack they may have received from the coaching heirarchy, the tight atmosphere of comradeship was always evident.

Schoolboy type pranks, jovial ribbing of poor efforts, staying on the rub down bench too long and even deeds performed long ago add to the strong respect and association these fellows have for each other.

No-one is spared, not even 18-year-old Michael Brennan, who was reminded that it was he who gave Noel Carter the free kick that eventually won the Foundation Day derby for South last year.

In the long term the work, sacrifice and pressure associated with being a league footballer must be worth it.

I am not suggesting East Fremantle is any different to other league clubs.

Every club will have its brand of discipline with their band of finely tuned athletes; all making the enormous sacrifice to reach the pinnacle of recognition — to play in a premiership side.

But to go through this week after week to be in the side every Saturday is a premiership within itself.

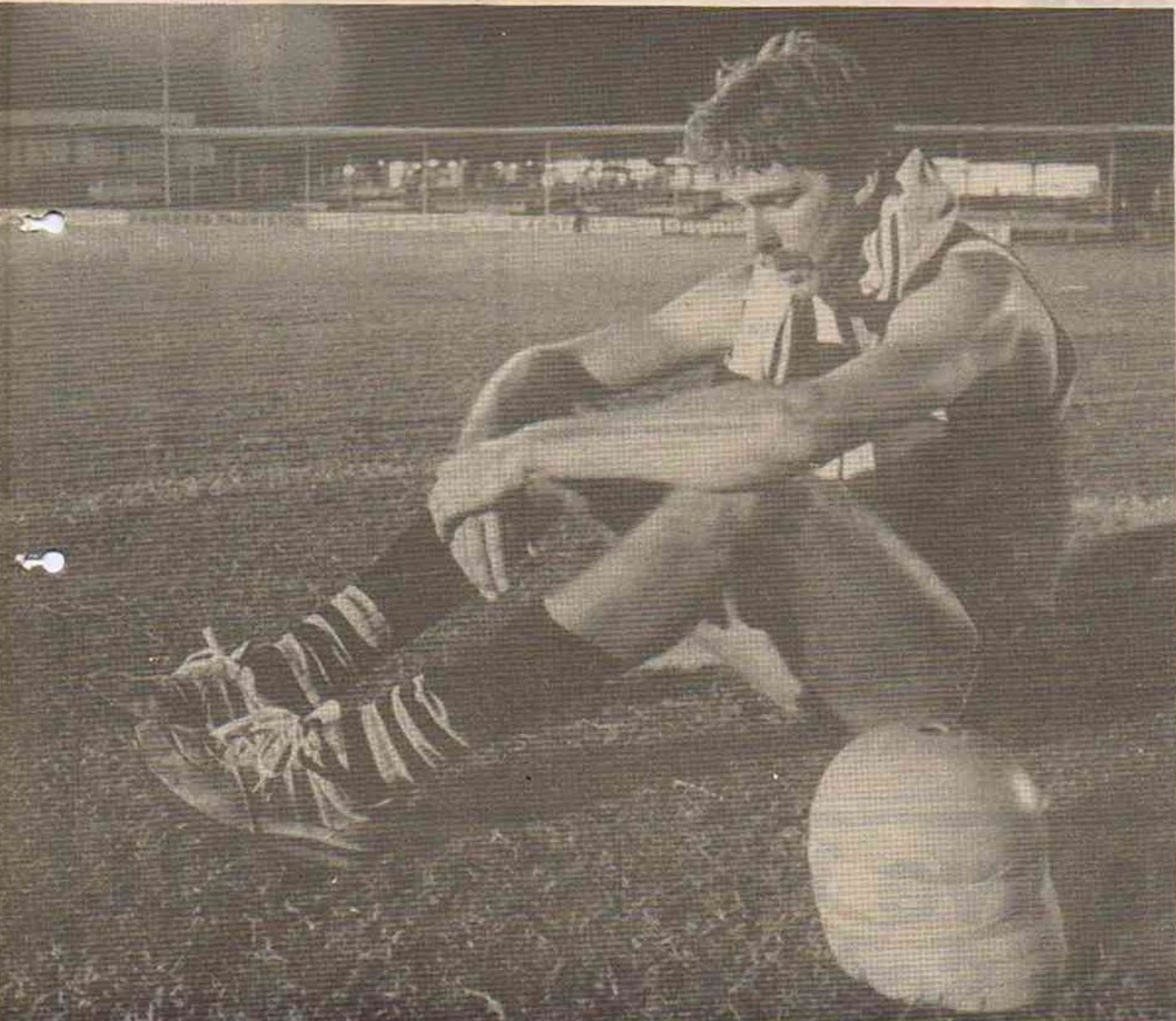
The pressure and disciplined commitment a league player must endure on Saturdays will be greater than anything handed out at training.

# The Melbourne way

## "Do they play Aussie Rules in Perth?"

That somewhat unbelievable query was thrust upon me by a taxi driver shortly after dawn on a miserable Melbourne winter morning last week.

Contemptible as it may seem, the man was deadly serious. We were on route from Tullamarine Airport to a city motel when he started a conversation by asking if I would be going to the footy while in Melbourne.

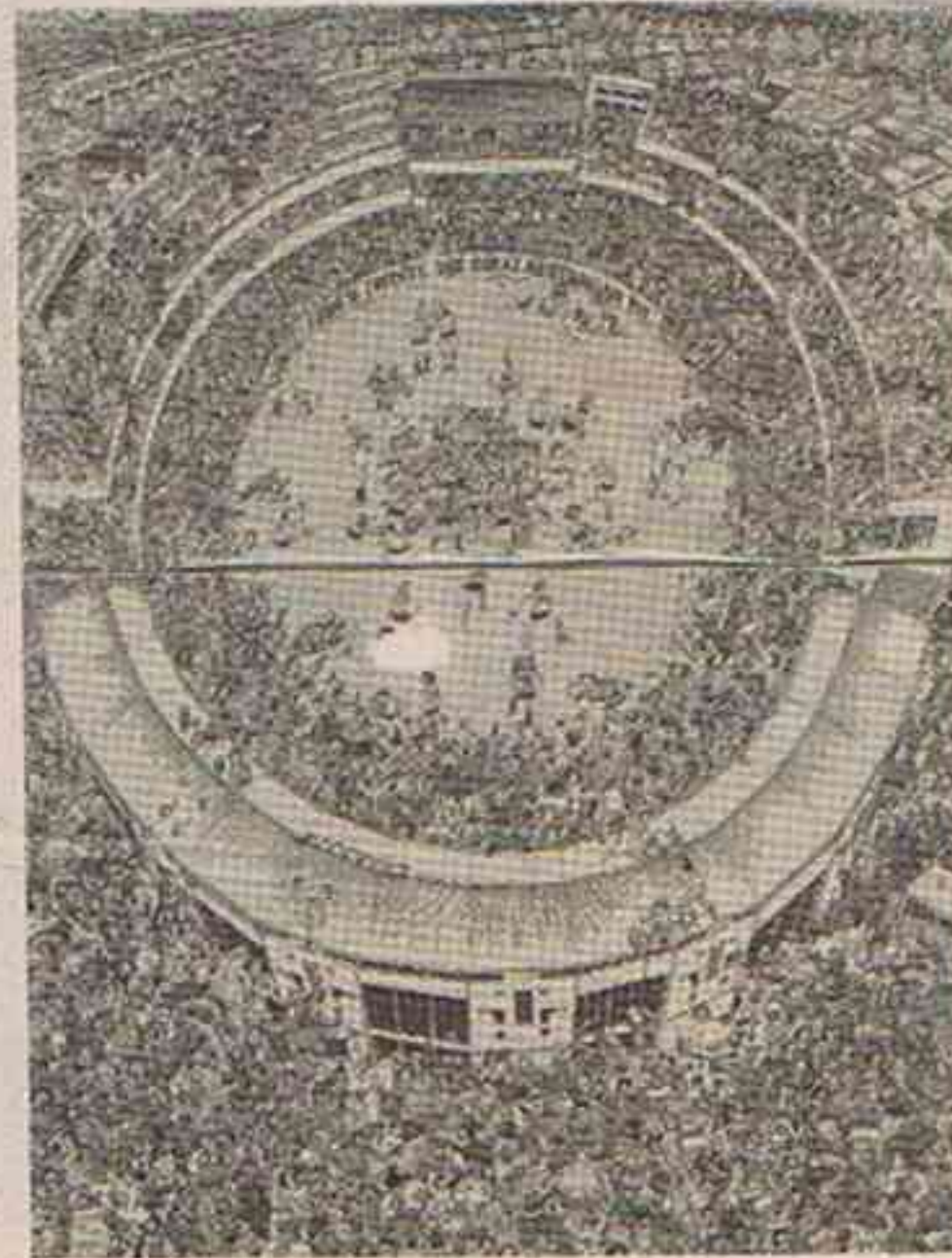
He seemed surprised with my affirmative answer and went on . . . "I thought you blokes played rugby over there like they do in Sydney and everywhere else. I thought Melbourne was the only place that had Aussie Rules".

It would be wrong to presume that all Victorians had the same scant understanding of the existence of the game outside Melbourne. However, there is plenty of evidence to suggest that a great deal of Victorians know — or wish to know — little more than my taxi driver.

Speaking to many more Victorian football followers in Melbourne last week, including several at last Saturday's MCG match, it became abundantly obvious that the average Melbourne footy fan is concerned only about the 12 team domestic competition.

It didn't take long to discover that it was of little, or no, consequence that:

- Western Australia are current Australian Football Champions.
- That WA defeated both Victoria and South Australia to earn that title last year.
- That the reigning Brownlow Medallist Ross Glendinning, comes from WA and he is one of dozens of West Australians that have propped up VFL clubs over many years.
- That nearly 30 WA born and bred footballers represent VFL clubs each week in the league competition.
- That there has not been an interstate match in Melbourne for three years and that there is little chance of a change to that policy.

## MCG FEVER

THE hallowed surface of the MCG receives some flak from time to time, especially during the cricket season. But to see it after last Saturday's match was a real eye opener.

No sooner had the siren sounded, the ground was besieged by thousands of fans. It looked more like Flinders Street station at peak hour than a football playing surface.

Half an hour after the match I lost count when I reached 200 footballs being kicked around by young (and many not so young) footy fans.

## This McClean did show!

FOOTBALL news in Melbourne last week was dominated by the Glenn McClean clearance wrangle.

McClean is a rookie ruckman who is trying to swap from Melbourne to Collingwood and the transfer has been subject to Court action.

Though the matter had not been resolved by Saturday, Collingwood played McClean in the reserves without a clearance.

Both clubs are claiming that they have him under contract and the VFL is also currently seeking legal opinion about the case.

When media men arrived at a training session at Victoria Park (Collingwood's home ground) last Thursday night to interview the young ruckman they had to ask officials what he looked like.

Despite the attention he had attracted in the media during the week, there were few media men who even knew what he looked like and that seems hard to believe when it is considered he is moving to Collingwood on a \$40,000 contract, which is more than many of the VFL's seasoned State players receive annually.

## Tale of the Whale

THERE are certainly many real football characters in Melbourne and one of the most accessible to the ordinary footy fan is Brian "The Whale" Roberts.

Roberts, who made a name for himself playing interstate football for Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia, runs a cosy little pub in South Melbourne.

He spends almost all day and every day relating football tales to fans who drop in from all over the country.

On Saturdays he is a reluctant radio star (he calls a VFL match on radio with another former Richmond great, Kevin Bartlett) who would sooner be having a beer with one of his regulars than being in the limelight.

### GREATEST

One such "regular" is the famous Laurie Nash, now 74, who lives just down the road. Nash, claimed by many judges to be the greatest footballer ever to play in the VFL, was also an opening bowler for Australia.

The walls of Roberts' quaint little pub are adorned with football photos, cartoons and newspaper clippings from all over Australia.

He still has fond memories of his days in Western Australia and for anyone who is ever in the area, there is an open invitation painted on the front of his pub inviting passers-by to "Drop in and have an ale with the Whale".

## STATS HAVE BIG ROLE

MATCH statistics received a blast from WA coach John Todd recently when he questioned their worth. Last Saturday there were 14 statisticians recording details on the performances of the Melbourne reserves side.

Apparently it's not unusual for VFL clubs to have big teams of statisticians. One experienced statistician told me that a former Geelong coach had a 25-man stats team. There as one stats man to cover each Geelong player and the other five kept tabs on the opposition.

- That WA clubs have been ridden rough-shod in clearance disputes this season.

A Melbourne radio station which regularly conducts phone-in listener polls on a wide range of football questions, recently sought reaction to the concept of a national competition.

The proposal was overwhelmingly rejected and to top it off, the poll attracted far less response from listeners than several seemingly less important questions posed in earlier polls.

The idea of a national competition is not big enough to attract the interest of the average football follower.

Leading administrators throughout the country feel that such a competition will provide the game with its only salvation. So it is of little comfort to know that if it is ever to get off the ground there is little chance it will have the backing of the Victorian football public.

So it seems that it will have to be a proposal pushed through by administrators.

A move similar to the one in which the VFL forced South Melbourne over the border to Sydney against a groundswell of public disapproval is probably the only way a national competition will ever get past the dream stage.

## ITS BIG BUSINESS

LAST weekend VFL football attracted its 1½ millionth customer for the 1984 season. After 10 rounds, more than \$4.25 million has been collected at the gates.

When it is considered that half the qualifying rounds still remain plus the finals series, it seems odds-on that the VFL will take \$10 million this season in admission charges.

### INFORMATION

While on the subject of attendances and their subsequent publication, the WAFL has plenty it could learn from their VFL counterparts. The official crowd of 43,912 at Saturday's MCG match was made available to the media in the Press Box at three-quarter time of the Melbourne v Richmond clash. The official attendance figure was accompanied with the gate receipt figure of \$153,896. I'm told that it makes no difference if there is 10 or 100 thousand people at the match, figures are always available.

In contrast, some recent WAFL match attendances have not been available to the media till late the following Tuesday afternoon . . . and as for gate receipts, they are never released.

# 'Sell the Saints' — Matthews

ST KILDA have been urged to hold a clearance sale of their top players to help raise funds to pay \$1.5 million owed to creditors.

The idea which has attracted plenty of support, particularly from some former St Kilda players, was first canvassed last week by Leigh Matthews in his weekly column in Melbourne's Sunday Observer.

Matthews said St Kilda could easily raise in excess of \$1/2-million in transfer fees for a number of top St Kilda players.

St Kilda has offered 22 cents in the dollar to a number of former players in settlement of playing fees.

They have a choice of either accepting or refusing the offer. If they refuse, there is a likelihood that the St Kilda club would have to be liquidated and consequently cease to exist.

In that case it is thought that the players still owed the money would be lucky to even get the 22 cents in the dollar.

Matthews' plan to conduct a player-sale would wipe out a third of the debts.

He suggested some asking prices — starting with Tony Lockett heading the list at \$100,000, Greg Burns (\$80,000), Rob Elphinstone, Geoff Cunningham (\$75,000), Trevor Barker, Max Crow and Phil Narkle (\$70,000).

Meanwhile, St Kilda is looking for a new chairman — Lindsay Fox has had enough after five years and is opting out of football.

Without doubt, it would be the most unenviable job in Australian football today. It will be a very brave man who steps into a job and immediately accepts that his organisation is \$1 1/2 million in the red.

## FOOTBALL CLINIC

A weekly feature dealing with the treatment of football injuries.

### TREATMENT OF SPECIFIC INJURIES

Many athletic injuries are the result of an external or internal force that stretches or compresses tissues so as to cause damage i.e. local swelling/inflammation, to the surrounding area. The primary goals in the care and management of athletic injuries are:

1. To prevent further aggravation of the injury;
2. Localise the response to the injury as much as possible;
3. Allow the normal healing process to take place.

#### EXPOSED WOUNDS:

Types	Initial Treatment	Care of
<b>Abrasions:</b> Conditions where skin is worn away by a traumatic contact with another surface.	Clean abraded area with soap and water. Use Cotton tips to apply an anti-septic ointment so as to keep moist. Place sterile pad over area.	Keep the wound clean and change dressing as advised by physician.
<b>Laceration:</b> A cut or tear in the skin possibly involving the underlying tissues as well.	Clean around wound avoid wiping foreign matter into area. Apply an antiseptic. Apply appropriate sterile pad. Make sure bleeding is controlled. If severe refer to physician.	Physician completes cleaning, and inserts stitches. Tetanus injection if needed. Change dressing as advised by physician.
<b>External Haemorrhaging:</b> <b>Types:</b> Arterial — Bleeding from the artery: spurts.	Act quickly. Apply direct pressure over the wound or over nearest appropriate pressure point. Elevate the injured region. Treat for shock where necessary.	Refer to Physician and act on instructions
Venous — bleeding from a vein; usually even steady blood flow.	Apply firm pressure over wound.	
Capillary — Bleeding from capillaries is minimal and usually not prolonged.	Will usually cease spontaneously.

## FIRST UP

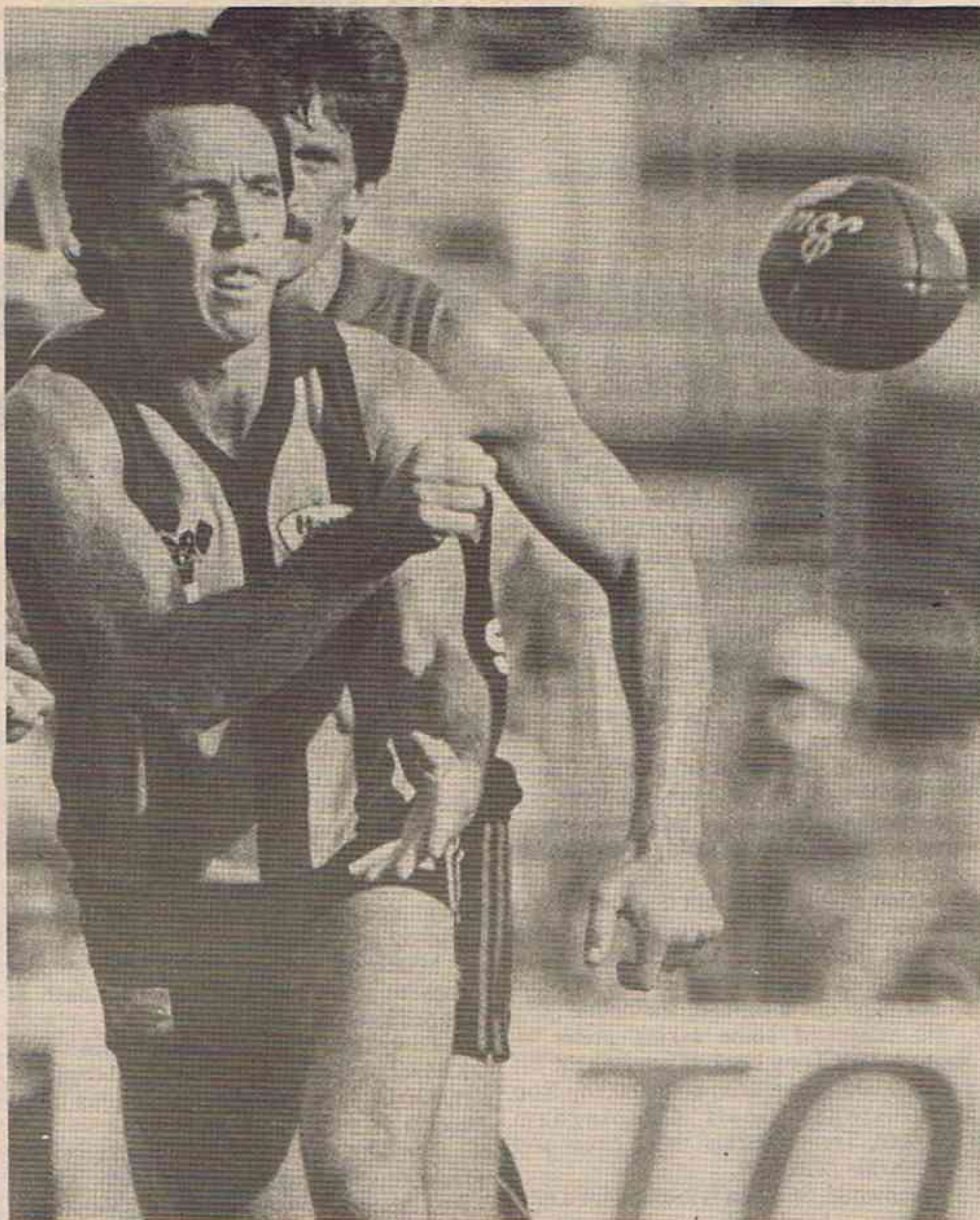

The baulk, or spin out of trouble, is the best way to avoid the clutching hands of an opponent eager to apply a vigorous tackle.

But you have to practice it a bit. A good exercise at training is to have some team-mates stand in a line about five metres apart and for you to duck and weave your way past them all.

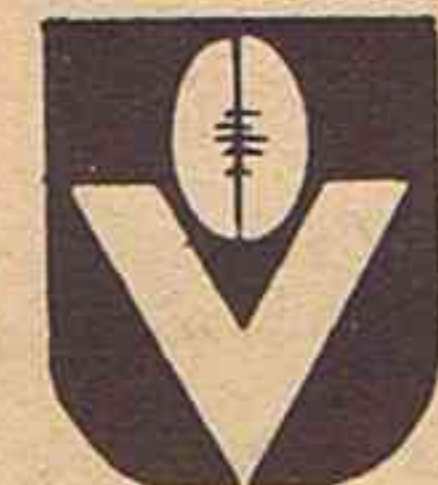

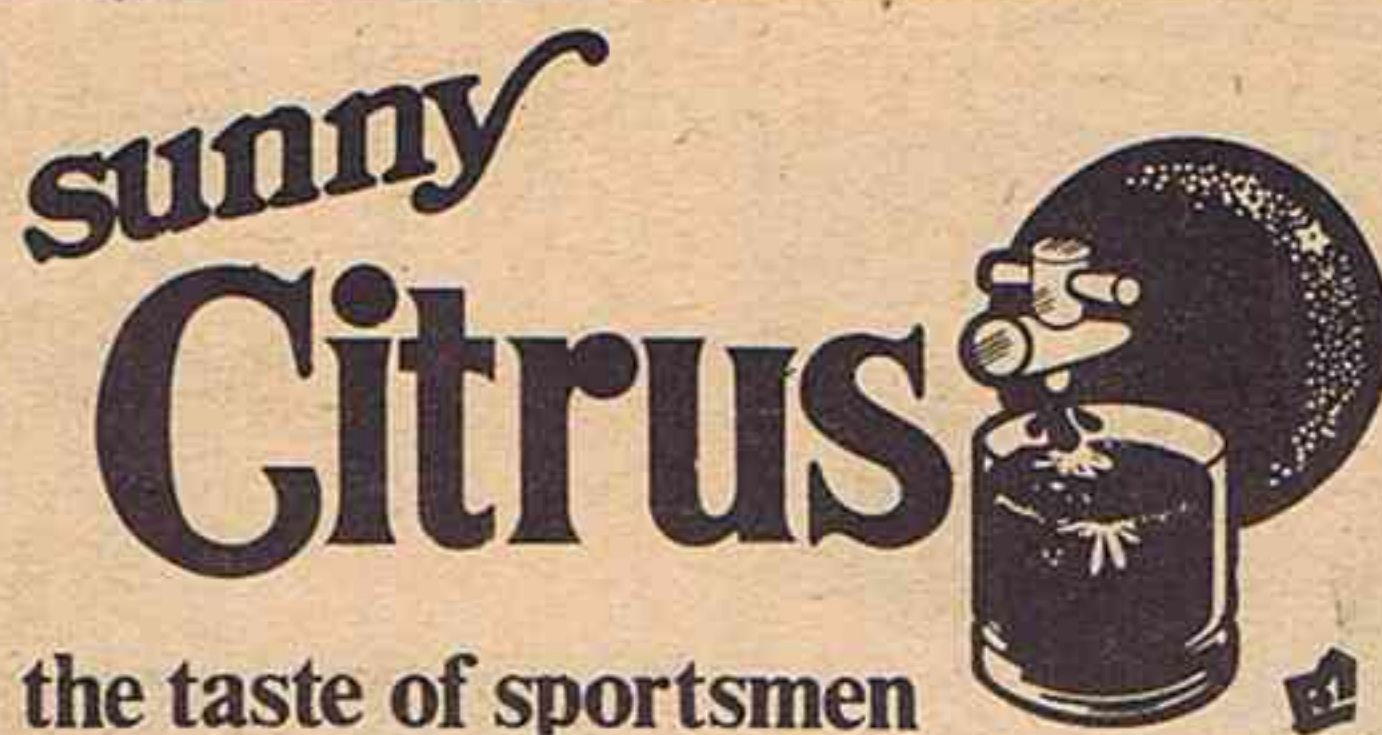

In the case of Swan Districts, the players have shown they can perform at their best under maximum pressure in grand finals.

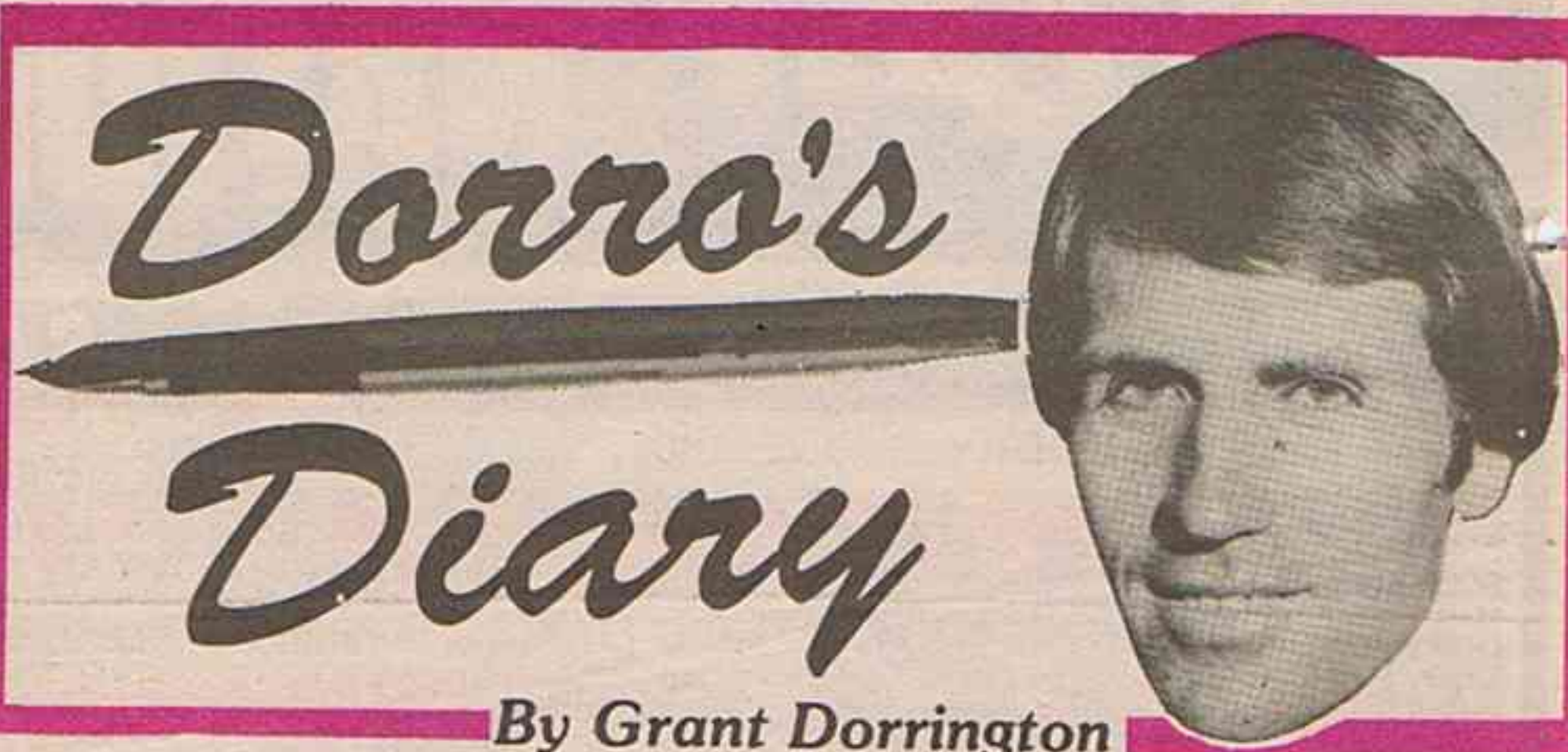
Many of the players mentioned as being unlucky not to be selected have yet to prove that they can perform or have the football character to succeed at the very top of playing in finals or State football.
