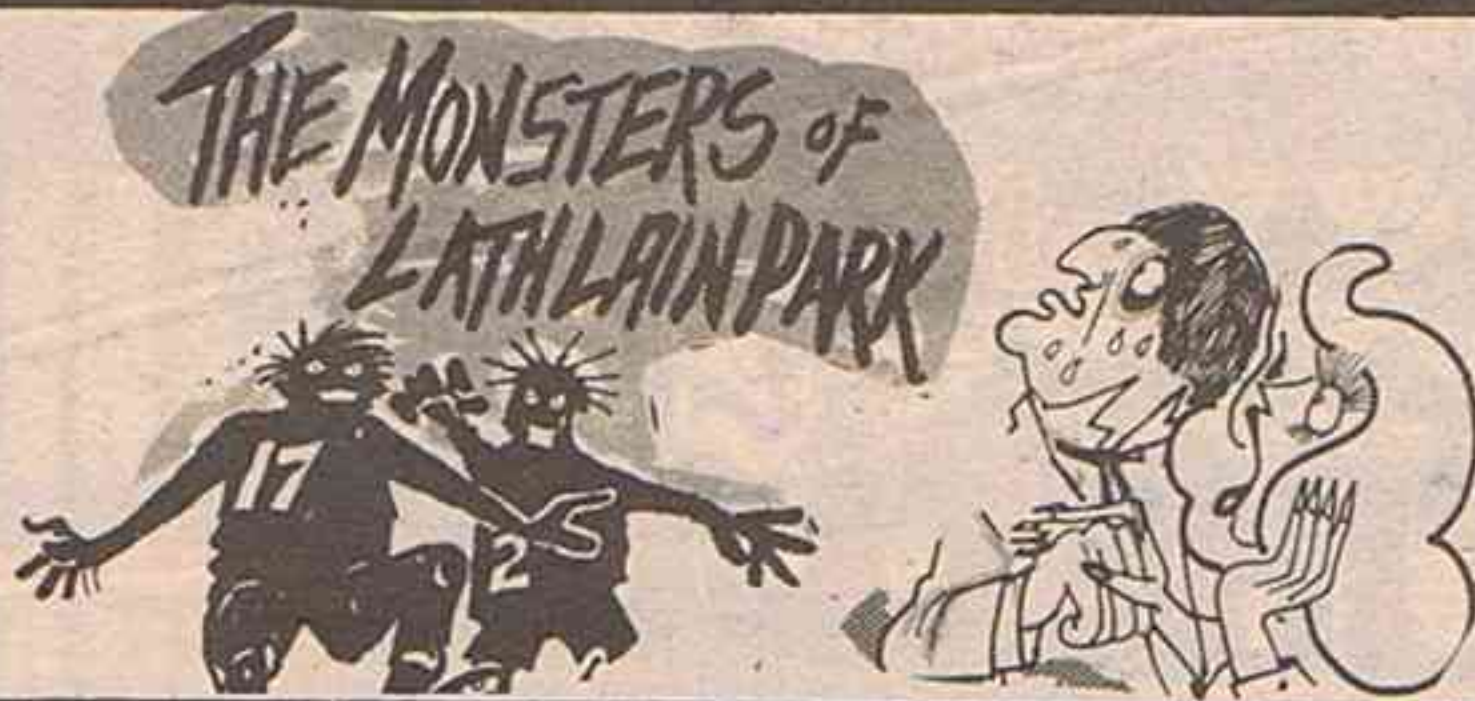

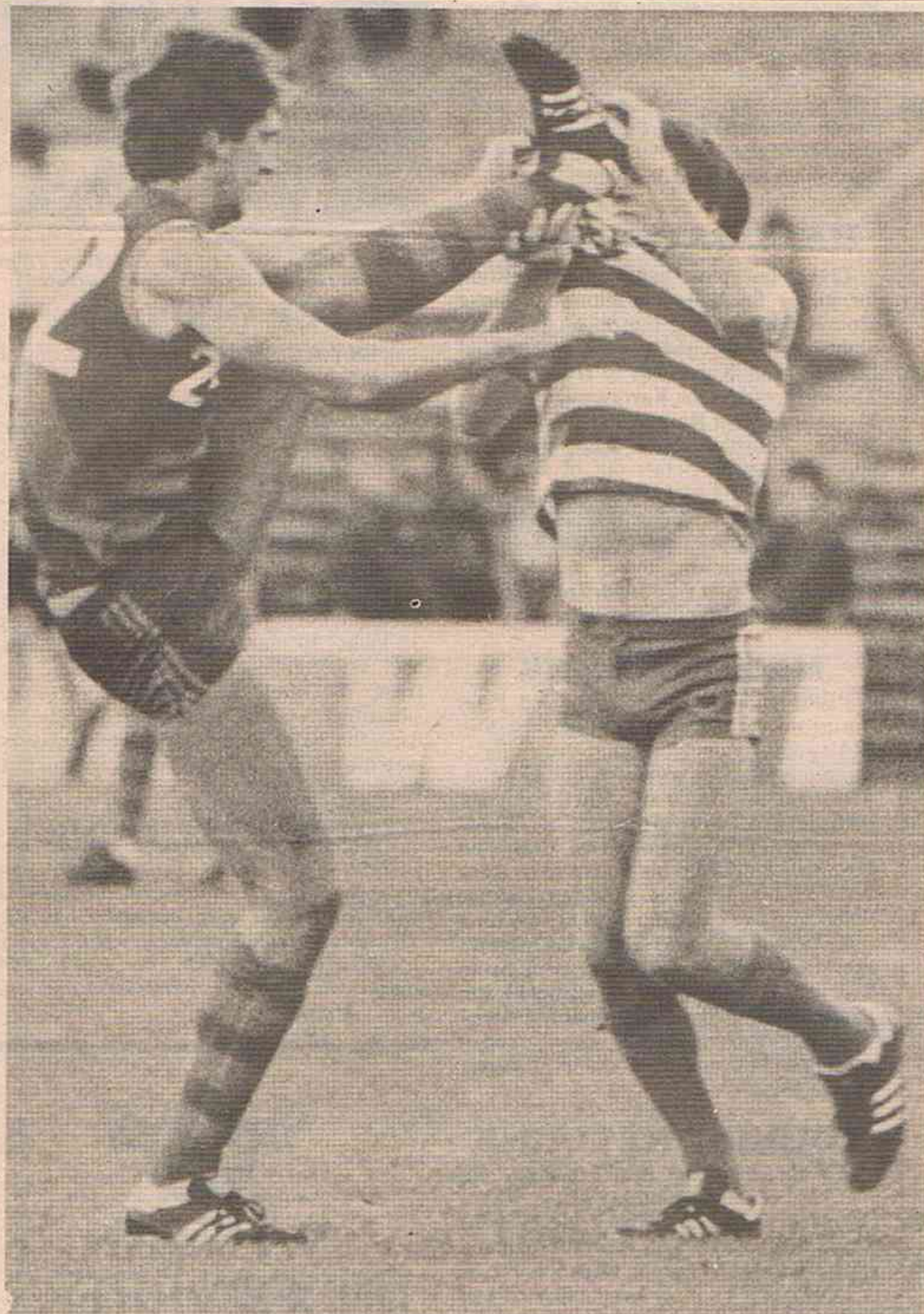

# BROWN WORRY

**SOUTH Fremantle might be sitting on top of the WAFL premiership table — but they are no certainties to play in this year's finals.**

Bulldogs coach Mal Brown is the first to admit that he is concerned. With only two wins in seven weeks and one victory from four games in the second round, Brown has every reason to be worried about his side's chances.

"I was concerned after losing the first game of the second series against Claremont," Brown says. "The problem is that we have incurred so many injuries.

"We recruited Craig Edwards to be our No. 1 ruckman and it will be a while before he is fit again. On top of that Lindsay Borthwick is also out of action and we have been forced to use Paul Arnold, Jon Dorotich and Wayne Henwood in the ruck.

## NOT CERTAIN

"Noel Carter, Nicky Winmar and Brad Hardie are not certain of returning to the league side this week either.

"On top of that Willie Roe has played only one game this year and he is still a month away from being ready.

"I have no doubt that if we have everyone right we will be hard to beat, but we might not be around to play in the finals."

One of the major problems has been the form of champion ruckman Stephen Michael.

The knee injury is worrying him and Brown more than they have let on and Michael has only been able to ruck in patches.

Roe was a sensation in WA football last year when he regularly won goal and mark-of-the-day awards. He has been sadly missed in Souths' forward zone.

## FIRST GAME

He has strained a muscle at the front of his thigh and has been out of action since the first game of the season.

Normally a match against Perth would not present Brown with too many worries. But the Bulldogs do not play well at Lathlain and Perth are cock-a-hoop after beating Swan Districts last week.

Brown and his Bulldogs saw the value of a good big man on Saturday when John Ironmonger set East Perth on the road to victory.

And Perth's star ruckman Rhett Baynes is sure to provide a few headaches for South Fremantle this week.

With the competition so close, South cannot afford to drop a game. Their fate may depend on the fitness of Hardie, Carter and Winmar.

# Taylor reaps his rewards

SUBIACO are back as a force in WA football for the first time in a decade — and with their resurgence come a number of telling factors.

Not the least of which is the huge cash incentive Channel Nine and Western Underwriters are offering the Lions to qualify for this year's finals series.

If the Lions can make the final four for the first time since 1974, they will collect \$100,000.

But the cash, although an added incentive, is only part reason why the Lions are playing their most consistent football since the Ross Smith days of 1973 when Subiaco won their last premiership.

The magical Haydn Bunton grit has spread throughout the young Lions camp to bring the best out of Laurie Keene, Phil Scott, Dwayne and Phil Lamb, Clinton Brown and Michael Crutchfield.

But with the improvement there seems to be one 'unsung' hero who has seen the Lions through the worst times, but is now reaping the rewards of surviving many years as the 'easy beats'.

Neil Taylor has always been a high-possession getter for the Lions no matter what the overall result of the game — and 1984 has seen a new look Taylor which has had enormous bearing on the performance of the entire side.

As team captain, Taylor has the responsibility of setting standards of hard work and determination and for that he deserves the highest accolade.

Taylor has received his share of criticism over his 150 game career, for

being a player who did not use his possessions to the fullest effect.

But his play this year has been as a trend-setter in earning the hard ball.

It is not so much the amount of possession that is characteristic of his game recently, but the things that go unnoticed.

Taylor invariably finds himself at the bottom of packs shovelling the ball to waiting team-mates, shepherding and encouraging the less experienced players in his side.

The courageous little centreline has been a major force in the come-back of the Lions and is an essential part of their aspirations for 1984.

So much so that to take the field against Claremont last week, he dragged himself from the sick bed.

Taylor had been restricted to bed all week leading up to the important clash with the flu. He managed only a light jog Thursday night and struggled through a day at school on Friday so as not to offend his employers when he played football Saturday after a week of sick leave.

The hard working, courageous approach the Subiaco skipper is showing the enthusiastic Lions is something they will look to come finals time if they make it.

It is reminiscent of the character that his new coach used in his playing days to take out the 1962 Sandover Medal.

## WELL DONE DEMONS

STATE coach John Todd has had his share of highs and lows throughout an illustrious football career.

But what a disappointing way for the State's most decorated coach of the 1980's to come back to ground after the euphoria of the Adelaide trip.

For his side to go down to the bottom side the way they did is hardly reward for Todd's efforts in making WA the most powerful football State in Australia.

But nothing can be taken away from the Demons, who threatened so much early season.

Perth are to be congratulated for their effort last week in keeping the

competition the most interesting WA has had for many years.

Plenty of pressure has followed Robert Wiley and Peter Bosustow all year, but they can handle that sort of attention.

Praise must go to the young band of Demons who have suffered nearly as much pressure to stay united in the face of the many problems associated with a bottom club.

Well done Demons and for your own sake put together a few more wins like that one.

## TIGER DEALS

CLAREMONT president Wal Maskell has announced that the Tigers have successfully negotiated with their major sponsors, HFC to continue their agreement with the club through until the end of the 1987 season. The club has also reached agreement with the Esso company to continue their involvement with the Tigers juniors till the end of the 1985 season. In an era when sponsorship money is becoming increasingly hard to come by, it is certainly good news for the Tigers.

## JUNIOR BENEFIT

ON the subject of finance in Tiger territory, the club is well advanced in planning its annual dinner auction and confidently predicts raising more than \$75,000 . . . all of which will be ploughed directly back into the club's juniors.

## PARTINGTON BACK

ANDREW Partington has resumed his football career with Claremont. After a brief comeback early this season following a total lay-off in 1983, he decided to join Sunday League club, Thornlie. Then after three games with the Sunday club he is now back with the Tigers and played a big role in the club's reserves victory over Subiaco last week. Partington was destined for a promising career after winning the 1982 Prendergast Medal, the WAFL reserves fairest and best award. However, he broke his leg in the finals series that year and his future looked gloomy. Football ability runs in the family as his younger brother Shane also shows promise and was a member of the West Australian Teal Cup side which competed in Sydney recently.

## HANDBALL HAPPY

THE Elastoplast handball competition for junior footballers continues to move around the shopping centres on Thursday nights and big entries were received at Phoenix and Karrinyup in recent weeks. The winner from the Karrinyup centre was 11-year-old Kent Rayner, of the Karrinyup Junior Football Club who took the honours with 50 points out of 60 in the final; ahead of Chad East (Noranda) and Mark Dennis (Karrinyup). Down at Phoenix, Cockburn junior John Kelly 11, took the honours ahead of Michael Servillo and Brian Goodreid. The next heat is at Garden City on June 28.

PERTH duo Robert Wiley and Peter Bosustow certainly played their part in WA's great victory over South Australia — combining to produce that winning point. And young ruckman Rhett Baynes, completing the double of State representation at junior (Teal Cup) and senior level, also did his share. So to mark the occasion Demons sponsors Prestige Video last week presented the trio with a video tape of the game. Receiving his tape, after their impressive victory over Swan Districts, Wiley quipped: "Last week's win was great, but this was probably better." Wiley could afford to smile — he turned in one of the best performances of his career against Swans.

## TOURIST RETURNS

AN absentee from East Fremantle this year has been talented utility player Wayne Cormack. The star Shark decided he would take a season off from football and embarked on a trip around Europe. But he has come back sooner than expected and he lined up with the Sharks in Saturday's reserves game against West Perth. He showed he lost none of his pace or skill when he gave a solid contribution. It will not be long before he works his way back into the senior team.

THE one thing that can inject new life into any situation, is a new person. It is great to see this happening now with the injection of much 'new blood' into the football media.

Many media organisations have generally used the same old names to do most jobs in their sports coverage.

Many of the names I have covered, would take to the 'comments man' role very well.

## The 'itchy trigger finger' needs attention

Every week these men have one of the most difficult jobs in football. The men chosen are usually top club stalwarts who want to play a definite role in their team every match day.

Many pressures can emerge during the course of a big game and with increases in incentives, prize money and awards, little consideration has been given to the changing role of the timekeeper.

These timekeepers are members of their own clubs and in these times of increased pressures, you have to ask the question: "Does that parochial club feeling sneak in during tight situations where time is of the utmost importance to the result?"

Should an independent person be in the timekeeper's box as an observer and to help with time checks during the course of the game?

Maybe this independent observer could come from the Umpires Association. In the recent interstate clash in Adelaide between WA-SA, only one timekeeper was on hand to look after that game.

He was a member of the Port Adelaide Football Club. I ask the question: "How did he react in those dying seconds in the last quarter, when Bosustow got the ball, handballed it to Wiley who lined up for that controversial shot at goal?"

Can that 'itchy trigger finger' come into play? I suggest not, but until some action is taken, that doubt will always be there.

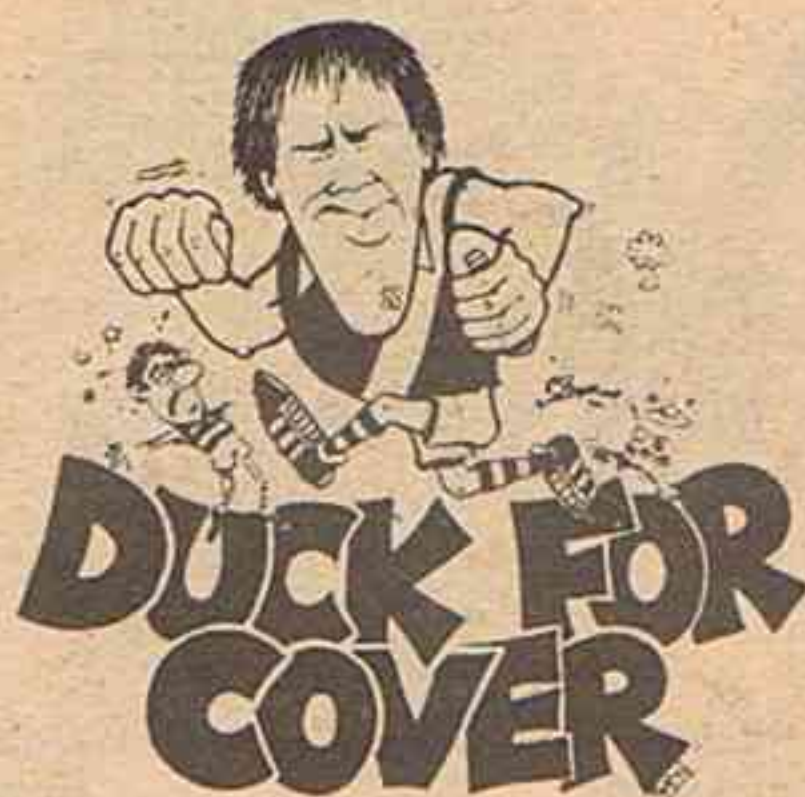

## Well done 'Shorty'

THE best way to answer criticism is with on-field performances and Claremont ruck-rover Allen 'Shorty' Daniels has done that this year. Earlier in the season I gave Daniels a real bagging because I thought he was a player who looked for the easy kick. On Saturday I had another opportunity to see him in action and he continued his recent good form. He is a valuable player for the Tigers simply through the sheer weight of kicks he picks up. I suppose every team has to have receivers and Daniels plays an important role for the Tigers. Even when some of his teammates had stopped running in the last quarter Daniels was still getting the pressure kicks and some of his teammates should have followed his example. Perhaps they might be sitting in the four now if they had.

### KEENE'S ROLE

I spoke to Subiaco coach Haydn Bunton earlier this year and we discussed the problems he was having with lanky ruckman Laurie Keene. "Bunts" told me that he would never use Keene in the ruck because he did not work hard enough. Well, Bunts must have a short memory because in the past month he has used Keene as the team's number one ruckman — and Subiaco have never looked better. Keene has played the leading role in Subiaco's revival. It is their best winning run since 1975 and I suspect Bunts knew that Keene was capable of being his number one weapon. I think that Bunts was using a bit of the old reverse psychology — telling everyone Keene did not work hard enough so that his star ruckman would put his head down and prove him wrong.

### IS IT RIGHT?

I SOMETIMES wonder whether coaches do the right thing when they drag players immediately after having made a bad mistake. From all reports, South Fremantle and State full-back Gavin Carter was playing exceptionally well until he became involved in an incident with East Perth full-forward John Scott. After the tangle Scott was given a free in front of goal and was given a second shot when the two players became entangled only seconds later. He made the most of it by kicking another goal. Coach Mal Brown wasted no time in reprimanding the big full-back by dragging him from the ground. And when he went back on Carter was not the same player.

### PERTH'S GLORY

IT WAS good to see Perth win last week's game against Swan Districts — if for no other reason than for the sake of coach Ian Miller. The former Perth, Fitzroy and East Perth utility player has been in the hot seat this season, but now it is not beyond the realm of possibility that the Demons can make the four. It all makes for a great competition with only 10 rounds remaining.

BEFORE last week's round of fixtures Swan Districts had not lost two games in succession since the 1981 final round.

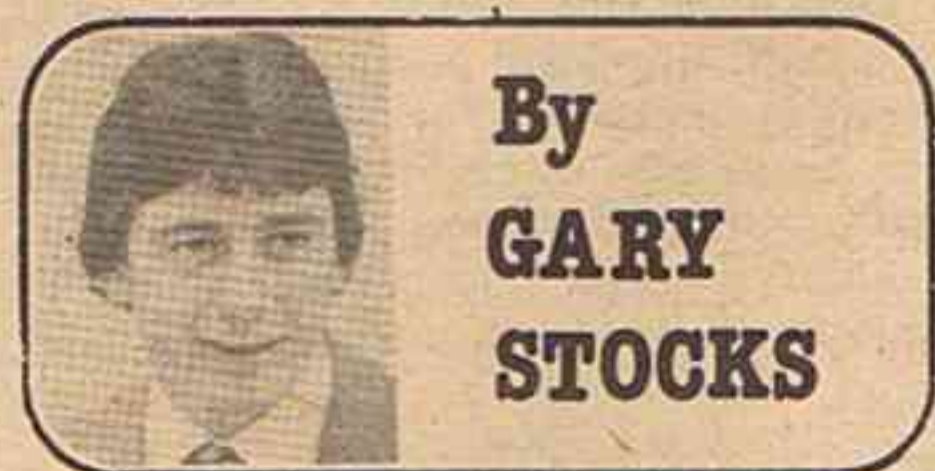
And now they are looking down the barrel at their third consecutive loss.

## It will be tough for Bulldogs

# BENNETT'S BURST

## It's no joke — the Lions are roaring

FOR the past nine years Subiaco have been something of a joke in the WAFL — but you won't find too many people laughing at them at the moment.

There have been a few instances in the past 20 years of a new coach dragging a team of duffers to a premiership in his first season.

Some who come to mind are Graham Campbell (West Perth in 1975), Jim Conway (Claremont 1964) and Haydn Bunton (Swan Districts 1961).

Are we about to see Bunton emulate his performance of 23 years ago?

Because they have finished second last or with the wooden spoon for seven of the past nine seasons, there are some who will be hard to convince that the Lions will be really roaring at the end of the season.

I admit I'm one of them.

But after last week's effort, Subiaco — rank outsiders at the start of the season just for a place in the four — have provided food for thought.

It wasn't so much their win against Claremont, but the way they were able to come back after appearing to be in a hopeless position early in the third term.

The important factor to emerge from the win against Claremont was that Subiaco showed they are not a team of front-runners.

### CAPACITY

They have the capacity to put their heads down and fight their way back into a game.

Haydn Bunton has to take credit for that. Last season it was claimed that Subiaco didn't know how to win matches. They certainly know this year.

How good they are probably won't be really known for another month.

The fact that Claremont were able to race to a seven-goal lead indicates there is still some shortcomings in Subiaco's play.

Their next four games are against the other teams in the four — South Fremantle, Swan Districts, East Fremantle and fifth-placed East Perth.

If Subiaco win two or more of those games then they can look forward with confidence to playing in the finals.

Whatever the outcome, the fact that they are being seriously considered as a finals prospect half-way through the season is an indication of the progress the Lions have made under Bunton.

### UNPREDICTABLE

Following last week's results, where some tipsters (this one included) failed to select a winner, the next few rounds will be vital and possibly unpredictable.

It is difficult to know just who will make the finals, let alone which side will take the flag.

It would be a great boost to WA football if the intense battle, now raging for places in the four, continues well into the last round.

Even Perth, who have little hope of making the finals, could play an important part in shaping the outcome of the four.

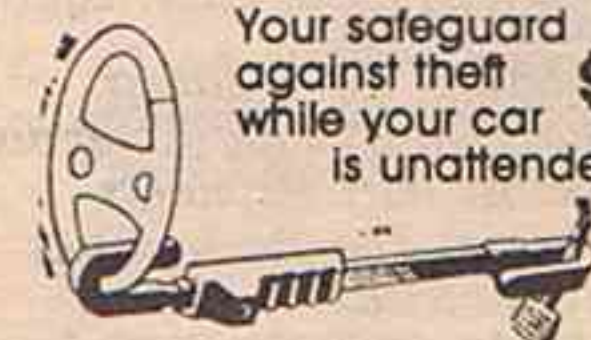

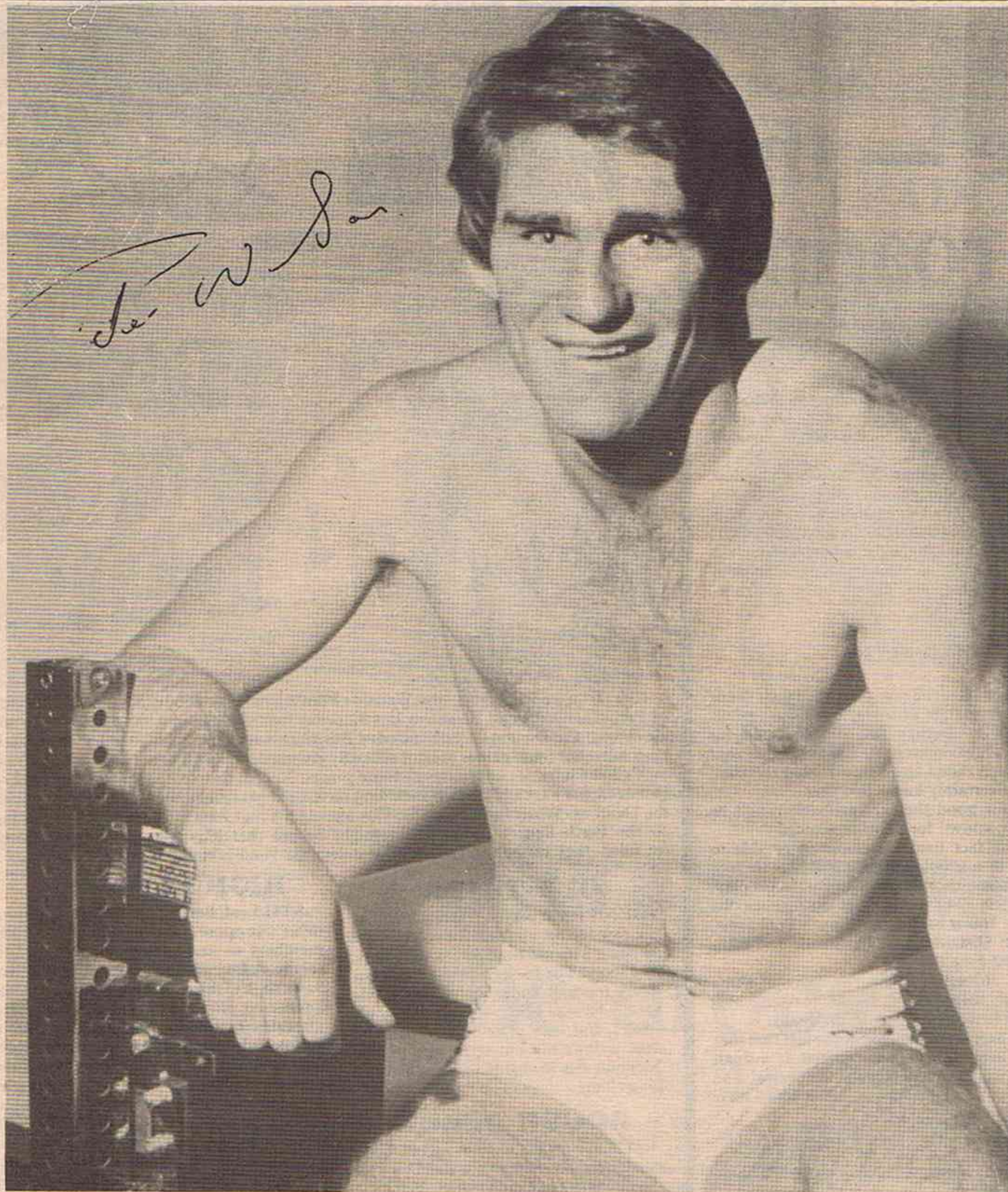

**EAST** Fremantle utility player Peter Wilson was always destined to play league football for the Sharks.

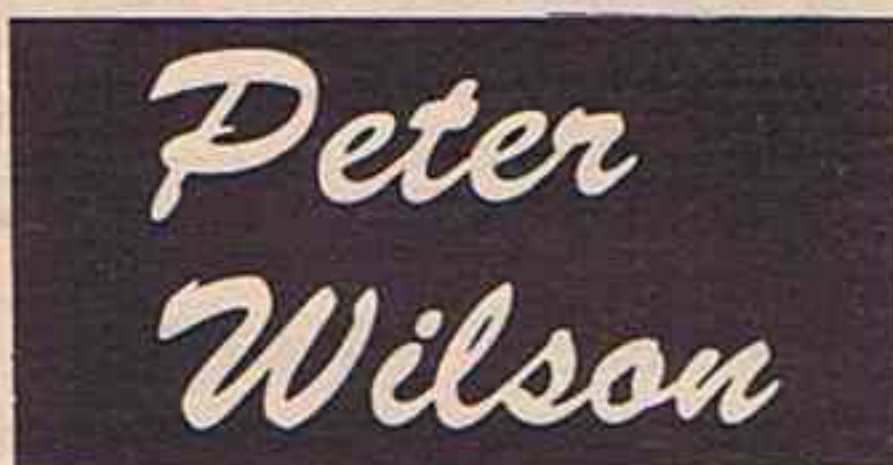
He grew up in Goomalling, only a drop-kick away from one of the club's greatest players — Jack Clarke, who earned four All-Australian blazers.

## HOODOO RESULTS GET BURIED

HOODOOS were made to be broken and with all but two first-series results being reversed in the second round we have seen a couple of them buried.

THE only results that have not been reversed in the opening four rounds of the second series were last Saturday's game between East Fremantle and West Perth and the June 2 clash which saw Subiaco and Perth in action.

The other 14 have gone the opposite way.

Subiaco, who are playing their best football since winning the 1973 premiership, ended a losing sequence of nine consecutive matches against Claremont. They also lost their previous 10 matches at the Tigers' home ground.

Their last success at Claremont Oval was in 1977.

Perth ended a 17-game nightmare against Swans and they had lost their previous seven encounters with Swan Districts at Lathlain Park, having last won a game between the two teams at Lathlain in 1978.

East Perth ended a run of outs against South Fremantle at Fremantle Oval. The Royals won both games at the Port club in 1977 but they had lost their next seven straight.

### KEEPING CALM

GEELONG'S flamboyant full-forward Mark Jackson has set a record by being reported four times in 12 games.

The former Richmond, South Fremantle, St Kilda and Melbourne player is reported as having taken tranquillisers the day after his game against Footscray. Perhaps he should take one before he makes his way on to the ground.

The only local comparison which can be made to Jackson's appearances before the tribunal was All-Australian player and East Fremantle tough-man Norm Rogers who was reported three times in 14 games in 1968.

### WATCH IT, SWANS

BEWARE Swan Districts — history could repeat itself.

Twenty years ago, in 1964, Swans were heading the premiership list when the interstate tour came along.

They supplied most of the players that year with Haydn Bunton, Fred Castledine, Ken Bagley, Tony Nesbitt, Ken Cooper, Colin Maynard, Bill Walker and John Turnbull representing the State.

They then lost the next four games to slip out of the four and won only two of their last 10 games in that season.

### FOOTBALL DOCTORS

IN 1910, Perth had two doctors playing for them and in one game they scored their team's only two goals.

The reporter of the day named them as Dr Goode and Dr Corder.

Everyone who followed post-war football knows the name Corder. Don Corder won the 1946 Brownlow Medal and his brother Dr Dennis Corder played 160 games with Melbourne and one of the off-spring is a rising star with the club today.

A letter I received this week confirmed that Dr Edward Corder, who played with Perth almost three-quarters of a century ago, was an uncle of Donald and Dennis.

Perth, it seems attracts the medicos. I remember in recent years Dr Rob Peterson pulling on the boots for them. Back about a decade ago there was Dr Merredith and before that was Dr Robinson.

Claremont, too, has had a few doctors, with Peter Tunbridge and Tony Capes in the 1950s and with Mike Aitken today.

He was named among his side's best players in their 16-point win over the Cats.

Duperouzel, who gave St Kilda ten years service before swapping to Footscray last year was asked about his future this week. "I am still enjoying my football.

"I am happy to play out the season in either grade as long as I can assist Footscray's move up the ladder", he said.

## 150 FOR McCANN

NORTH Melbourne's Stephen McCann has played his 150th VFL game.

The boy from Geraldton, who joined the Roos in 1977 without playing a WAFL match, has since represented Victoria in four interstate matches and was last year selected in the All-Australian side.

On the same day as McCann reached his milestone (against Fitzroy), Footscray's Simon Beasley played his 50th game against Carlton.

## PRICE RISE

THE VFL has decided on minimal increase to admission charges for this year's final round. The price of a seat under cover for the grand final at the MCG will rise from \$19 to \$21. A seat in the open increases from \$16 to \$18 and standing room tickets have gone up by \$1 to \$7.

## SHEEDY SMILES

ESSENDON coach Kevin Sheedy could still grin and bear it after grand final rivals Hawthorn trounced his Bombers last week. "We know where our deficiencies are and between now and next time we play Hawthorn we'll rectify them," he said. It was the Bombers' fourth straight loss to the Hawks, but Sheedy was not devastated. He felt that the players had "a red hot" go in the second half and weren't humbled. "We should have performed better," he said. "But we'll be very close together and the morale is good."

## LIT UP!

A RECORD was established at VFL Park last Saturday. The lights were turned on four minutes into the second quarter — the earliest such a move has ever been taken because of the dark winter days. The Fitzroy-Carlton clash was a top one and the lights had to be brought into action to let the money-paying-public see the action. At a cost of \$400 an hour, the VFL must have weighed up the financial implications before throwing the switch down.

## IN HARMES WAY

WHEN a champion player like Wayne Harmes is down in the reserves, his luck must certainly be out. The talented Carlton dynamo lost his senior spot a few weeks ago and was on the sidelines with a hamstring injury. He fought his way back to fitness and form in the reserves and was almost ready for a senior return when disaster struck again. This time he suffered a possible broken hand.

# Big day for Max Parker

STATE and Woodville ruckman turned defender Max Parker played his 200th senior game for the club last weekend.

And the Warriors could not have celebrated the occasion on a higher note.

Although they were sitting in second last position before Saturday's round of fixtures, they tackled equal top team Central District and registered a magnificent win.

It was a tribute to Parker that his teammates rose to the occasion and hung on to win by five points — 19.8 (122) to 17.15 (117).

## BEST PLAYER

Parker also reserved one of his top performances to be the best man afield.

The win could not have come at a better time for the 30-year-old and it capped one of the finest months of his football life.

After making his interstate debut in the game against Victoria three weeks earlier, a win of this magnitude was all he needed to put the icing on the cake.

Parker has been one of football's battlers.

He started his career with Footscray, playing five league games with the Bulldogs

before deciding to retire when just 17. But Footscray swapped him for nomadic Woodville rover Ray Huppatz two years later and the move to Adelaide rekindled his desire for the game.

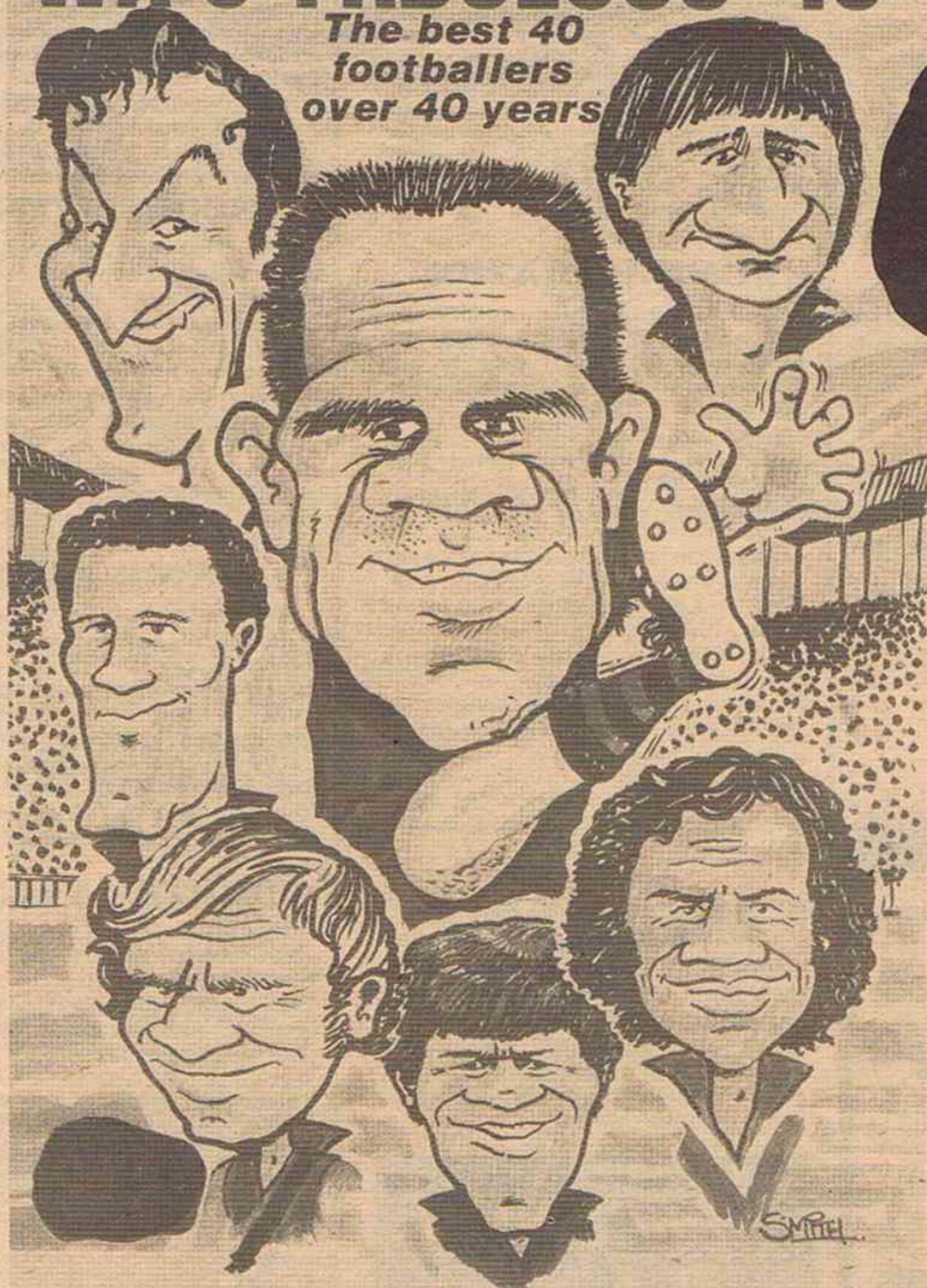

### DISLOCATION:

#### Types of:

#### Definition:

Dislocations result from forces causing the joint to go beyond its normal anatomical range.

#### Symptoms & Signs:

1. Constant severe pain.
2. Severe muscle spasm.
3. Loss of function of joint.
4. Deformity may be apparent.
5. Joint swelling.

#### Treatment:

1. Transport athlete as comfortably and practically as possible off sporting arena to a hospital;
2. Support dislocation as well as possible;
3. Refer to a Physician;
4. Physician will manage the injury.

**Subluxation:** A partial dislocation where there is incomplete separation between the two articulating bones

**Dislocation:** A complete dislocation presenting total separation between the two articulating bones

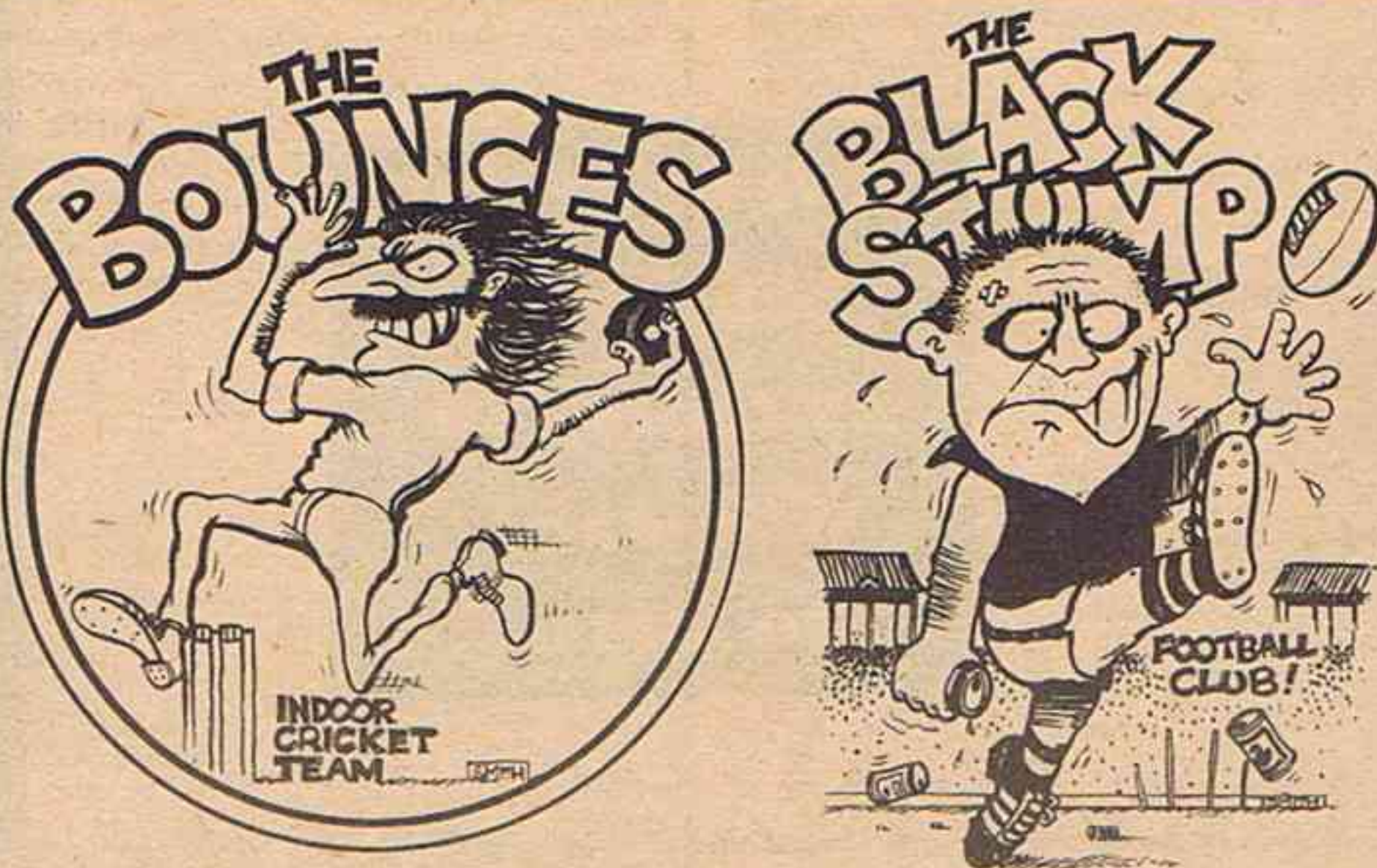

# A great team effort!

THE recent Teal Cup carnival in Sydney saw the West Australian team perform at a very creditable level.

Their performances against Queensland and the Australian Capital Territory in the first two games were magnificent team displays.

It surprised me to see the standard of competition at this carnival with all States sending very strong competitive sides.

The game against Queensland, who were tipped to be the big improvers and had spent thousands of dollars putting a team together, was played on the smallest oval you could imagine.

A goal could be kicked from the centre square.

The small ground gave the physically strong Queenslanders a big chance, but after an opening eight-goal first quarter of great team play, the WA players set up a comfortable win, although they knew they had played a tough game.

Next day we had to front up to ACT who had also endeavoured to pick their best team. At half time the score was WA 16.14 to ACT 1.2 in what all football followers at the game described as perhaps the most disciplined team effort of the carnival.

## RELENTLESS

At half time I changed the side around, replacing first half stars Danny Perry, Brad McDougal (who had kicked six goals) and ruckman Bob DeGraaf, but this didn't stop the relentless exhibition of team play.

Vice-captain Penny addressed the players at three-quarter time and the team kicked 32 goals for the game to finish with a winning margin of 27 goals.

The first two games saw Darren Williams and Tony Walley injure their ankles after playing so well, thus eliminating themselves from the Monday final.

The Victorian game saw a great first quarter into a strong breeze by WA, missing several easy shots for goal and trailing 2.8 to Victoria's 5.2 at half-time.

The third quarter saw the Victorians take complete charge on the ball and kick seven goals in 15 minutes to seal the game, although the WA players never stopped trying.

## DIFFERENCES

Looking at the Victorians they had two major differences that set up their victory.

1. **Physical strength** — they were much bigger in body size and strength due to the enormous emphasis VFL clubs place on weight training for all young players. An example of their size difference was their left footed wingman who was 6ft 4in and ran like the wind.

He plays for the Sydney Swans and is tipped as a future champion.

Not only could he run, but he had an enormous left foot kick.

Young West Australian Chris Lewis, who has just turned 15, did a great job against him, but was overwhelmed in the second half.

2. The Victorians were mentally tougher due to the pressure required to play with a VFL senior club.

Coaches of the VFL clubs are nearly all full-time and expect a far greater standard of performance and training from these young players than the WAFL junior coaches.

They are extremely disciplined in the little things of the game — knocking on, punching from behind, shepherding, blocking and always playing on.

While the WA boys didn't win on the day, I have no doubts that every player has learnt for their football futures.

The experience of competing against Australia's best young players gave each individual player a chance to assess where they are on the football skill ladder and now give them the necessary motivation to improve on their weaknesses to become exciting league players in the WAFL.

The percentage of Teal Cup players to make league football is 60%, and I am sure at least 16 of these young players will become league footballers with up to six of them being extremely gifted stars of the future.

Next year the Teal Cup carnival comes to WA, giving all football followers a chance to witness the most prestigious array of junior footballers in action, an event I am sure the WAFL Board of Directors will want to make the best carnival ever.

As far as I know the idea to give school children free entry is unique to WA and the WAFL should be admired for dreaming up the idea. Apart from promoting the game at the grass-roots level it also adds to the atmosphere at the ground.

### BE EARLY...

WHILE on the State game, anyone is thinking of going should get in early to purchase their tickets. It promises to attract a bumper crowd and no one should rely on getting in on the day of the match. The gates will be closed as soon as the 45,000 tickets are sold.

### TIPPING IS HARD

WHAT a great round of football we saw last week — three upset results — is tremendous for the competition and it was interesting to see the four top teams of 1982 all being beaten. It certainly makes it hard for the tipsters. I was one of many of Westside Football's tipsters who failed to get the result of any game right. 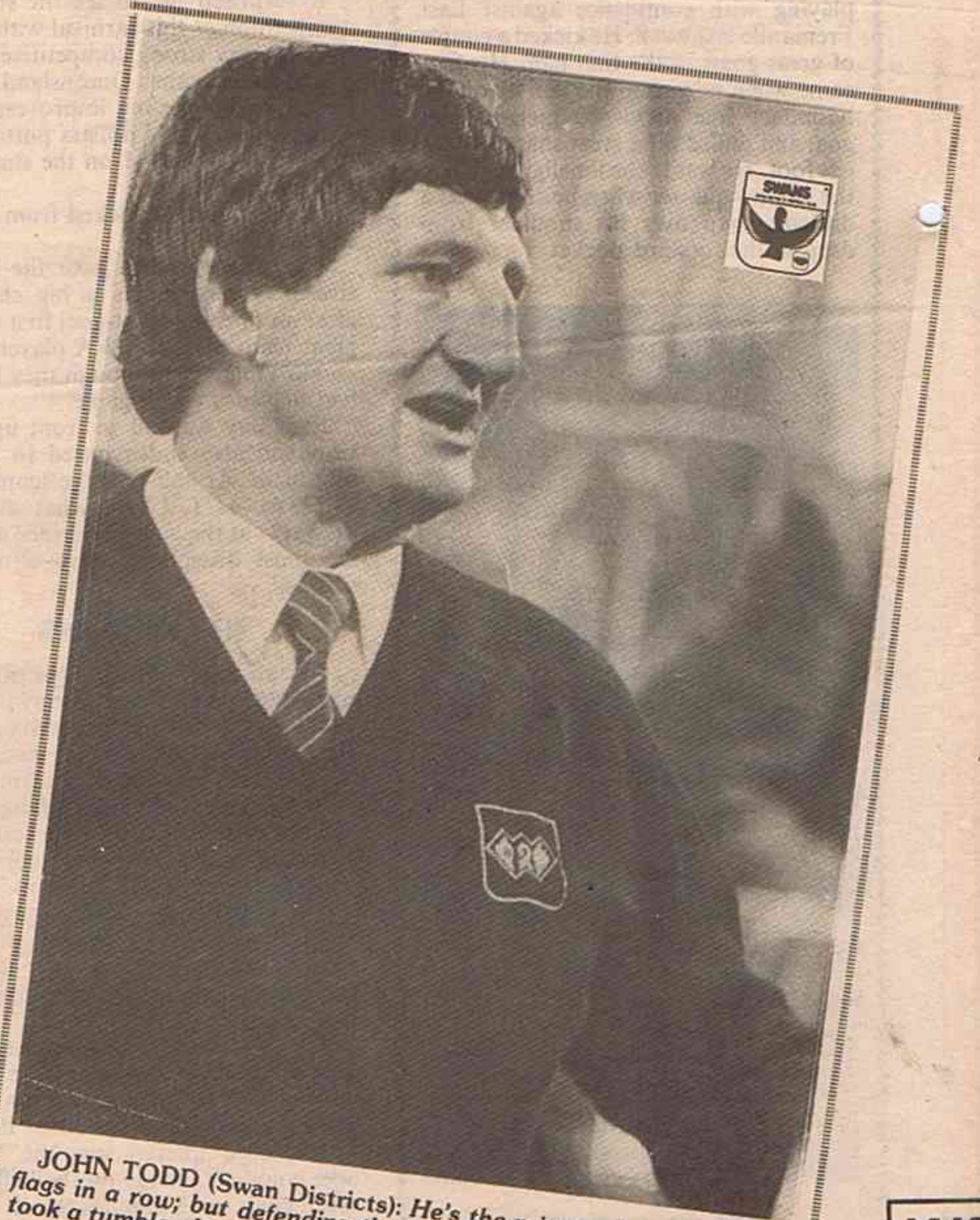


# FOOTBALL'S BALANCE

THE football season has passed the half-way mark — so how are the clubs? With the June 30 end-of-financial-year coming up and with the know-how coaches have been operating their football bank accounts since well before the season, look at their balance sheet.



**GRAHAM MOSS (Claremont):** There's been plenty of pressure on the Tiger coffers as the sponsor's money rolled in, but the dividends weren't being returned by the players. In fact, there were suggestions that a few shareholders were unhappy with the profitability of the Tigers as they struggled in the red department. An encouraging revival helped ease the pressure off Moss as the critics called for his return as a player. The closest he got was as team runner one day and he is now working confidently enough in the off-field seat to keep Claremont in line for a finals challenge.



**JOHN TODD (Swan Districts):** He's the reigning king after two flags in a row; but defending the throne isn't easy. Todd's assets took a tumble after last year's premiership with some heavy losses across the border — and retirements. But his rookies have taken up the challenge and though their form is naturally a little erratic, he has still kept his team in the black. Victory with the State side has kept Todd's own morale high and as the finals start to come around he will certainly build up a solid bank balance for the big pay day.



**RON ALEXANDER (East Fremantle):** There was no shortage of confidence behind the teller's counter at East Fremantle when the pre-season dividends were being declared. However, the quarterly report looked a little thin as the Sharks sailed on icy waters and didn't really justify the shareholders' investments. But the Sharks are an exciting combination and when the Big White himself gets into a snapping mood, they are hard to keep under control. Like the stock market when the bulls are raging, it's difficult to predict just how high they can soar.

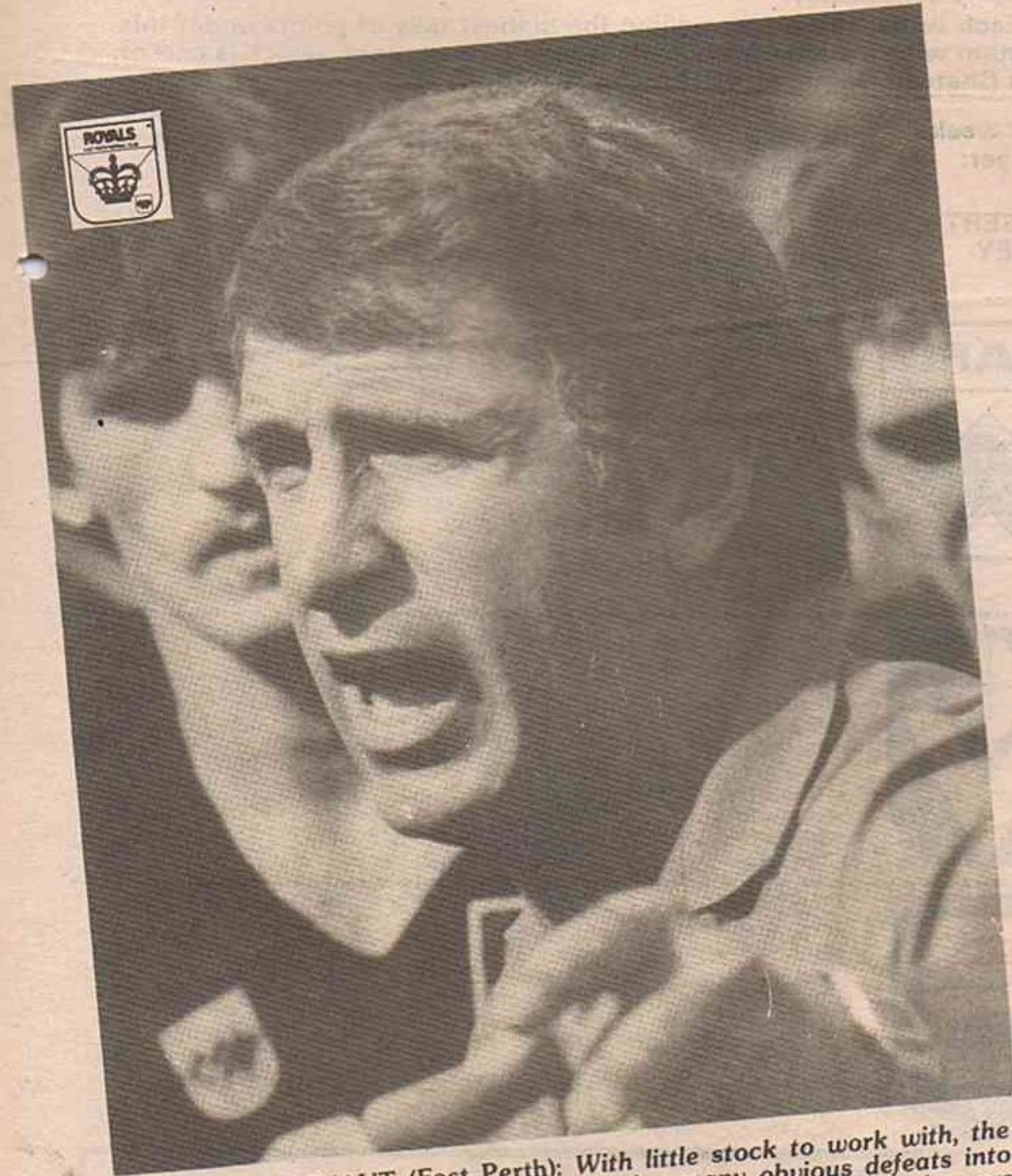


**MALCOLM BROWN (South Fremantle):** There was a lot of pre-season money for the Bulldog after Brown had turned his back on the opportunity to coach in Victoria and stayed at the Port as did champion ruckman Stephen Michael. But the superstar Michael had his future threatened by knee injuries and he hasn't been producing as well as he might — a factor that has affected many other Bulldogs as they struggle to maintain consistency. Some new products on the assembly line have shown promise, but generally Brown is having to work overtime to keep his head above water.

**GREG BREHAUT** (East Perth): With little stock to work with, the Royals coach has done wonders, turning many obvious defeats into profitable victories. Working on the theory that unknown performers with a high degree of desperation will beat proven performers out in the battlefield, he has shocked a few senior clubs. The bank balance has been severely dented at East Perth, but a lack of spending this year will help restore the club's operating costs and a few more hard-earned victories could turn 1984 into a bonus year.



**DENNIS COMETTI** (West Perth): There was little money for the Falcons pre-season and the coffers were running dry. But the rookies came good and started to cost the astute punters heavily with some astounding reversals of form. The talent at Leederville is not in the upper-income bracket; moreso in the working man's class and their performances have had a touch of blue collar desperation about them. There are signs of polish being applied to the line-up and the long-odds being quoted about a premiership are being snapped up by investors with a good eye for the speculative stock.



**IAN MILLER** (Perth): The Demons were the centre of a solid pre-season plunge . . . but that has backfired a little. With a heavy financial outlay to re-recruit some gilt-edge stocks in the shape of Rob Wiley and Peter Bosustow, the shareholders were looking for quick returns. But while the big Two have performed, others haven't and the team work required to turn defeat into victory has been absent. But there can be no excuses now about future productivity after a stirring revival against Swan Districts and the Demons just have to keep performing or else they face the danger of being declared bankrupt.



**HAYDN BUNTON** (Subiaco): Investors who have followed the stocks and share of Bunton Incorporated over the years have generally finished up with good dividends, or at least their money back. Few fingers are burnt when Bunts is at the helm and the resurgence he has generated in the Lions camp has been incredible. Subiaco are now achieving results considered impossible in previous years and their capacity for hard work and disciplined production are paying off handsomely. It is a joint operational effort in the Lions den and it could be the year of the \$100,000 reward.

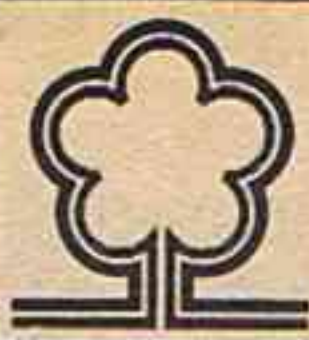

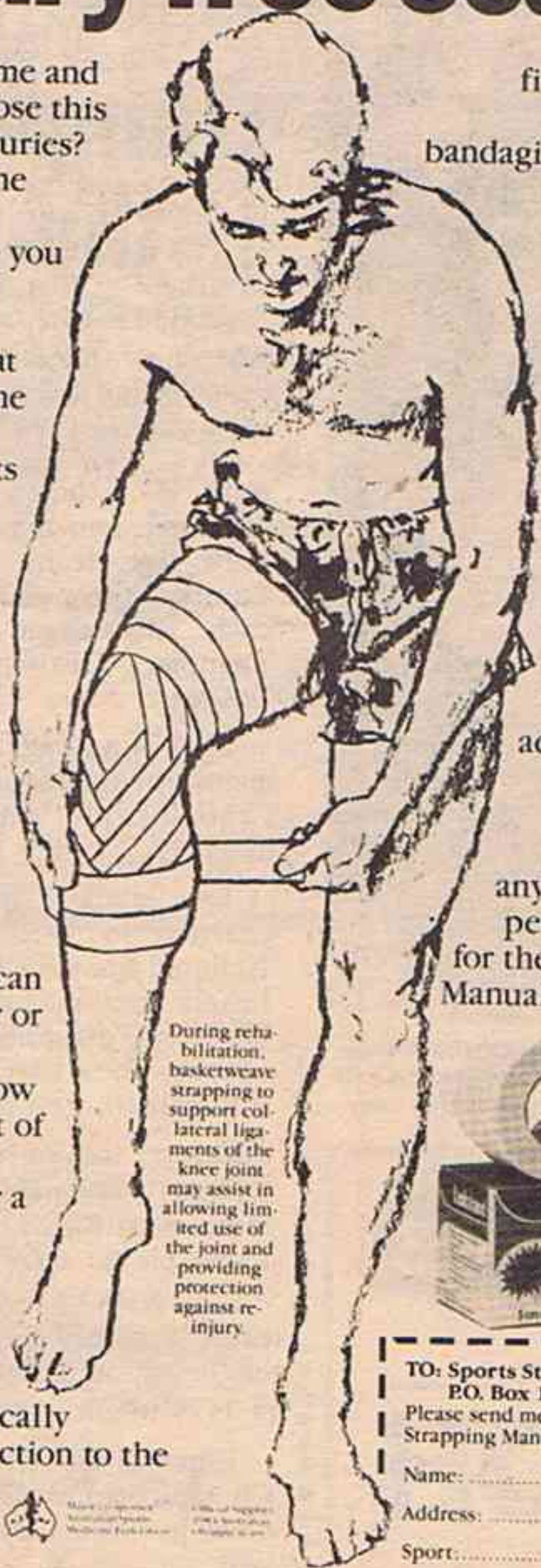

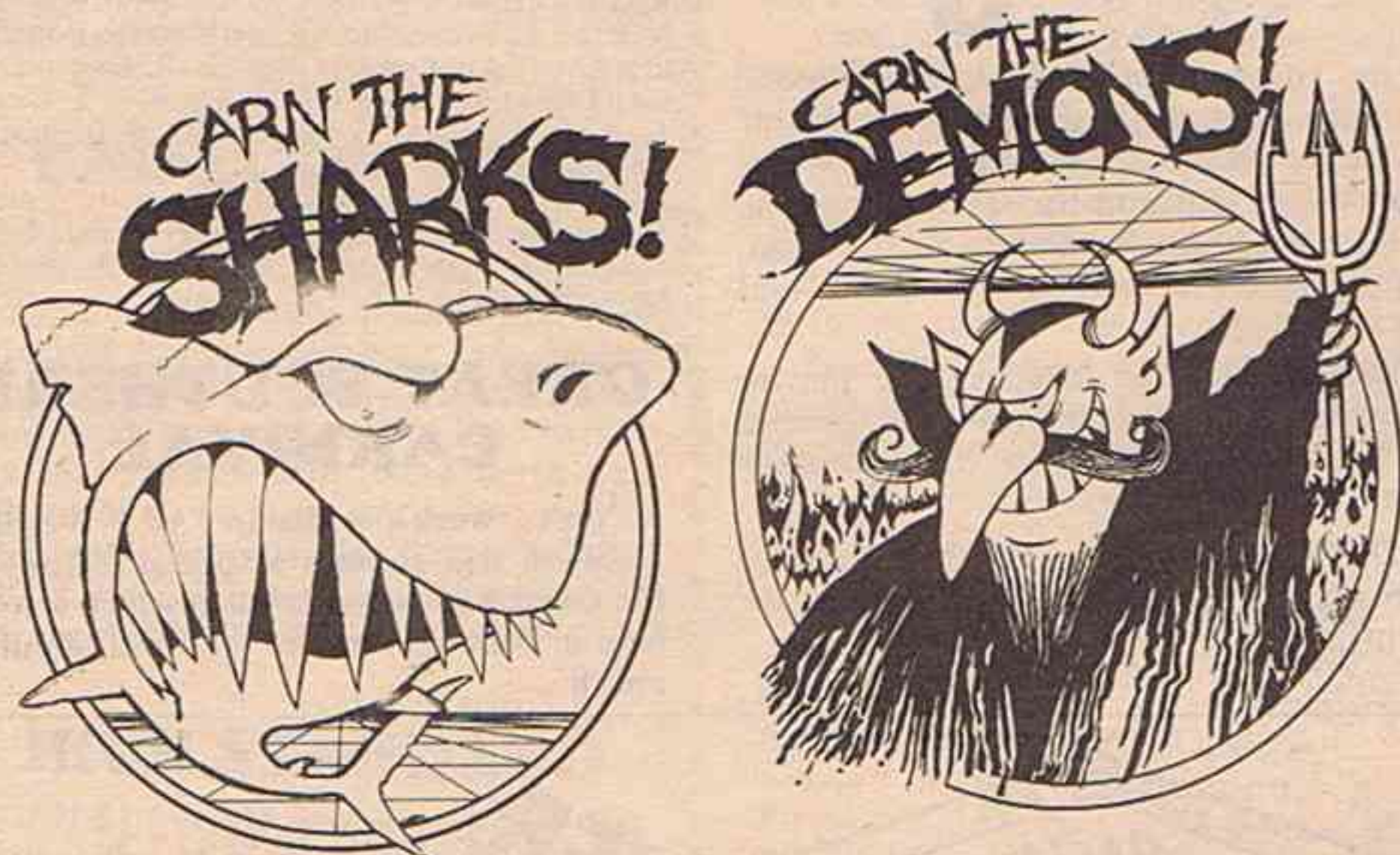

## West Pilbara on line for hat-trick

WEST Pilbara have the chance to create football history when the annual BP Pilbara National Championships are held in Newman next weekend.

They are on line for their third consecutive victory in the championships and, if successful, it will be only their third win in the carnival's history.

The first championship was held in 1976 and since then Fortescue have won the event three times (1976, 1978 and 1979), Newman twice (1977 and 1980), West Pilbara twice (1982 and 1983) and DeGrey once (1981).

Newman and Fortescue, after dominating the competition in the first five years, have slipped dramatically, but the indications are that these two leagues will put up better performances this year.

In fact, they can be expected to throw out the most serious challenge to West Pilbara.

West Pilbara have chosen a well balanced squad and they will be looking to players of the calibre of Peter Lauritsen, Dave Sheahan and Lyndsay McGuinness to steer them to victory.

This year's carnival promises to produce the best football seen in the area and it could also mark the end of the competition as it is now known.

The newly formed North West Football Council, chaired by North Pilbara president Royce Rogers, will hold talks with BP in an effort to include leagues above the 26th parallel through to Kununurra.

This will mean leagues from Carnarvon, Exmouth, East and West Kimberleys would be eligible.

Carnarvon and the Kimberleys have been invited to join in all meetings of the North West Football Council and they are almost certain to play in next year's carnival.

Carnarvon were invited to play in an

exhibition match this year, but they could not raise enough funds to make the trip.

The championships are cut throat and West Pilbara will begin their hat-trick quest when they play Fortescue in the first game on the Saturday at noon.

The second game, between Newman and De Grey, will be played at 2.15pm.

The losers of those two matches will meet to decide third and fourth at 11.45am on Sunday with the grand final being staged at 2.15pm.

Sunday's football will kick off with an exhibition match between West Kimberley, who will be represented by Broome, and a combined Pilbara team.

## Dampier was the start

FOOTBALL started in Dampier with a practise match between combined Dampier and Port Hedland teams in July 1970.

In 1971 three teams were formed in Dampier, and then in 1972 Dampier had only one team, Karratha and Cape Lambert (now Wickham) put in a team each. This League was then known as the Dampier Districts National Football League.

In 1974 and 1975 Dampier formed two teams, the original Tigers and a new team, Centrals, with Centrals taking out the flag in 1974.

The name Dampier Districts was changed in 1976 to the West Pilbara National Football League and in 1977 this League combined with DeGrey to form the DeGrey/West Pilbara National Football League. These two leagues separate for the B.P. Pilbara Football Championships.

Before the introduction of the B.P. Pilbara National Football Championships, West Pilbara's combined team once a year played a DeGrey combined team.

The WPNFL played with only three teams in 1976, 1977 and 1978, but assisted the formation of a second side at Karratha in 1979 which was named the Cardinals.

West Pilbara hosted the B.P. Championships in 1979. West Pilbara went down to Fortescue in the grand final of that year.

The football in the West Pilbara area has greatly improved over the years mainly due to the Woodside Natural Gas Project (this has injected numerous young men into the area).

The West Pilbara area and DeGrey have now combined to form the North Pilbara Football League.

## De Grey area is stronger

THE De Grey Football League was founded in 1969 with five clubs — Port Hedland's Rovers and Panthers, Finucane Island, Goldsworthy and Mable Bar — taking part.

After just two seasons Marble Bar collapsed and dropped out of the competition. But in 1975, South Hedland and Shay Gap joined the league making a six team competition.

The sealing of the North West Coastal Highway was the big contributing factor in the De Grey and West Pilbara Leagues (Karratha, Dampier and Wickham) combining their fixtures.

However, they remained as two separate leagues and retained their own identities. Finucane Island temporarily pulled out

of the competition in 1977, leaving eight teams to do battle in the inaugural season.

The North Pilbara Football League was formed last year and the seven competing clubs are Cardinals, Dampier, Karratha, Panthers, Rovers, South Hedland and Wickham.

Because the two leagues were playing individually in championships it became extremely confusing and amalgamation appeared the only way out.

The league is now going strongly and is hopeful of taking out this year's BP carnival.

## Many incentives in Newman

THE Newman Football League was developed in 1972 with a three-team competition.

Centrals, Saints and Tigers competed each week, but for the first two seasons the football was more of a social event.

As the town expanded the competition improved and it took on a more competitive air.

In 1974 Newman competed in the annual country football championships and went down narrowly to Esperance in the grand final of their division.

In 1975 Newman again made the trip to Perth for the country carnival. In this same year a fourth team — Pioneers — entered the league.

After struggling at the bottom of the table for several seasons, they finally broke through and won their first premiership in 1982.

The 1979 season will probably be remembered as the most progressive in the Newman Football League's history.

It saw new incentives for players and clubs with the introduction of the \$1,000 T & G Insurance Cup, run along similar lines as the Peter Jackson Superscore in Perth, media awards for fairest and best winners and numerous other small incentives designed to reward players and clubs for outstanding efforts.

## Men honoured by medals

The medals presented to players at the end of the Pilbara Championships were struck in honour of two of the best supporters of football in the area.

Adrian Marshall (donor of the Marshall Medal for the fairest and best player throughout the carnival) is one of the men who did most to establish the carnival as a regular event.

Together with a hard working band of helpers he set up the first carnival in 1976. And when the carnival was first mooted, Brian Sodeman was the Pilbara MLA and he pledged his total support to the cause.

Sodeman now presents the medal for the fairest and best player in the grand final.

## Fortescue expands

THE Fortescue National Football League was formed in 1970 and consisted of four teams from Tom Price.

Before that social matches between the pit and plant areas of the minesite were played regularly.

The four teams involved in the inaugural season were made up of players from specific areas of the minesite and the township.

The Hill club came from the pit area, Crushers (now Tigers) from the crusher area, Centrals from the workshop and administration and Towns from the township.

Initially games were played fortnightly because of the unavailability of the oval and Towns went through the first season undefeated, but were beaten by Hill in the grand final.

In 1973 Saints, a team from Paraburdoo, entered the competition and won the pennant in their first year.

The following season Demons, a second team from Paraburdoo joined the Fortescue league.

Of the original sides Tigers are the only team not to have won a premiership and Demons are also flag-less at this stage.

Centrals have won five premierships and Towns four.

### OFFICIAL VISITOR

The WAFL will be represented at the carnival through Football Administrator Neil Judge, who will also be acting in his capacity as secretary of the Country Football League. The president of the country organisation, Bug Byfield, will also make the trip.

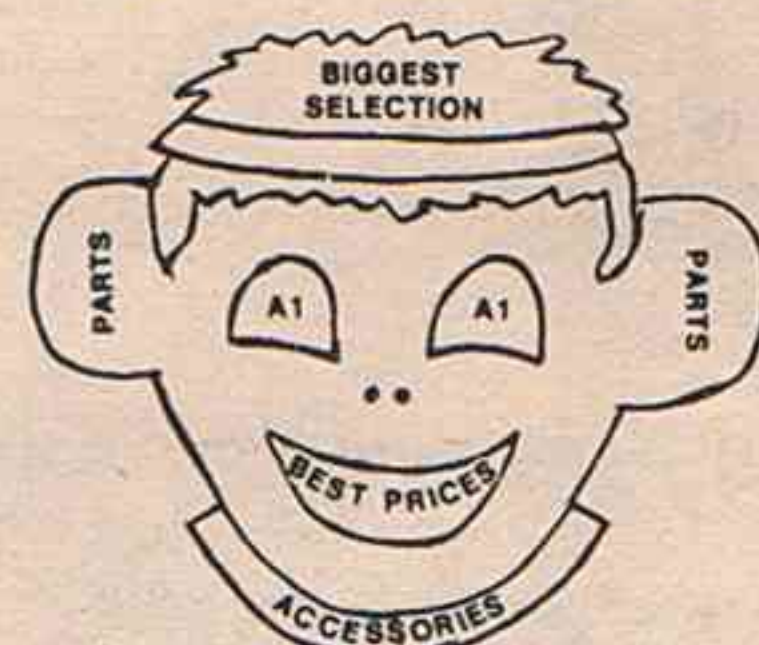

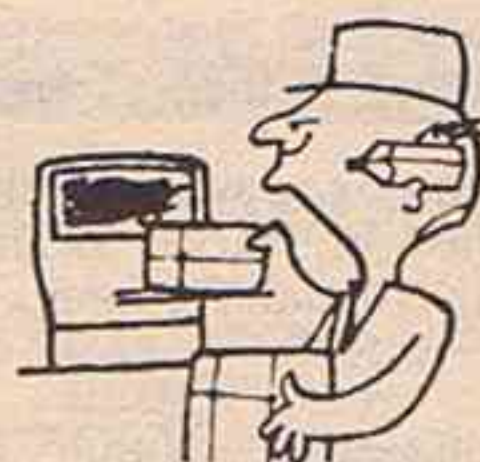

#### 'C' COLTS

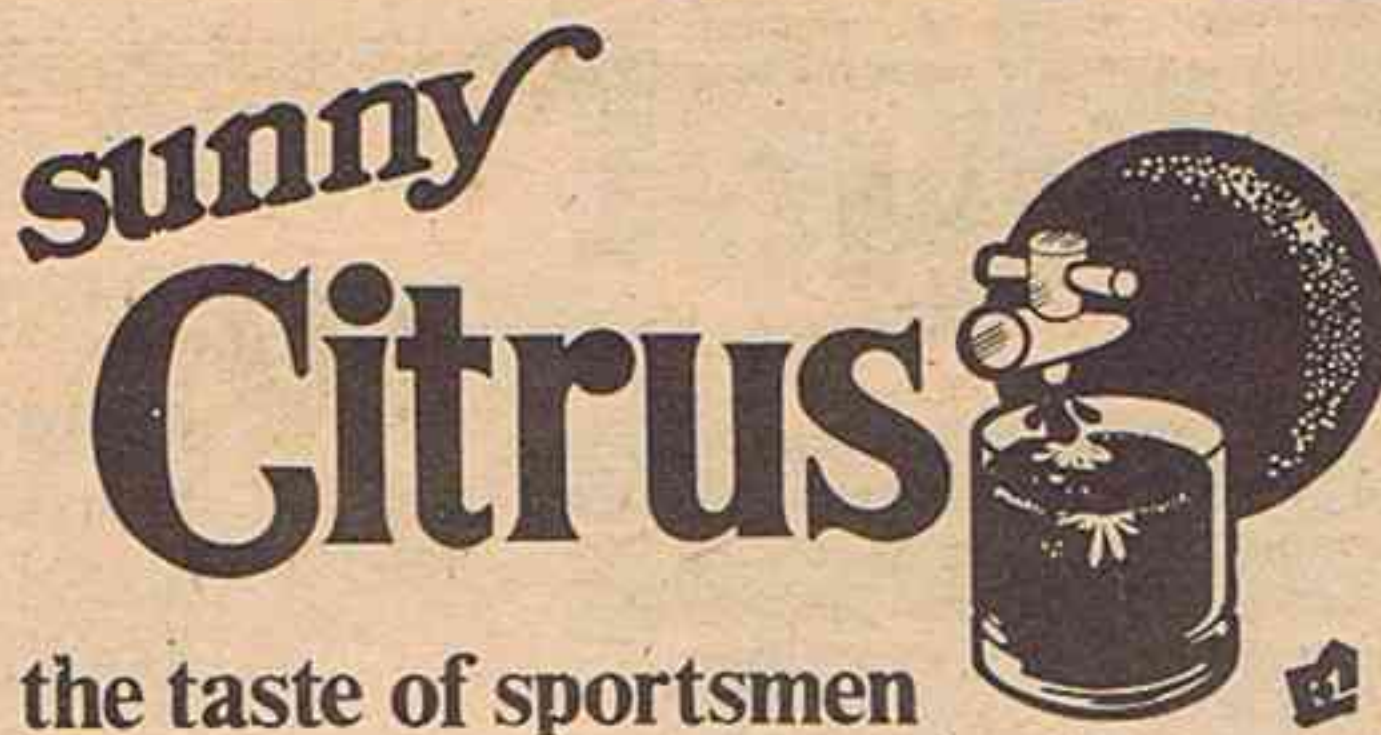
North Bridge A.I.C.A.'s First-year colts team have advanced to second spot and must be odds on to play in the finals.
