# BREHAUT HEADS FOR THE CROWN

Gary Stocks looks at the Royal revival

A PREMIERSHIP for East Perth in 1984 would take many people by surprise... even the planners in the Royals camp.

According to coach Greg Brehaut, East Perth did not aim at a premiership when they started planning for this season.

But they are now on course to achieve the ultimate.

"We restricted our recruiting to our country zone this year," says Brehaut.

"But the players were sick of the mud-slinging aimed at them after missing the four last year and they were determined to make it in 1984.

"While we do not have many champions at East Perth, we do have players totally committed to the cause.

"We are in second place at the moment because of a genuine determination from the players to show their critics that they are a worthwhile football side."

Most pre-season predictions had East Perth as one of the also-rans of 1984.

But that only spurred one of the most traditional clubs in WA football on to prove their critics wrong.

And it is not the first time the Royals have caused a few people to eat humble pie.

# You cannot beat the system Dennis!

ONE good thing has emerged from the Dennis Cometti report last weekend — it will prove to many sporting enthusiasts that the media megastar is human after all!

The voice behind so many giant sporting events through the ABC, who has coached West Perth the last three seasons, has finally found himself in circumstances that "Mr Layman" is confronted with daily.

Cometti, the most decorated media personality in WA, has broken a silence on his problems with umpires, causing grave concern for his reputation of composure and conservatism.

But Cometti is in an unenviable position of trying to wear two hats — one as coach of a league club, the other as a most recognisable media identity.

Not an easy task. In modern day league football, the pressures associated with being a league coach are enormous.

It is a fine line between winning and losing and the frustration with facing defeat is doubly enforced with the threat of expulsion or public criticism for coaches when their charges go down.

For Cometti to delve to such depths of unaccustomed behaviour indicates the desperate levels of his plight with the umpiring fraternity.

Many suggest that on accepting the role of coach or administrator automatically an acceptance of responsibility accompanies the appointment.

The thing every coach has uppermost in his mind is the welfare of the people who become the most important part of his life — his players.

If a coach feels for his players he will go to any length to reinforce his admiration and respect and Cometti's demonstration last Saturday will knit the Falcons even closer in the face of the consequences of Cometti's actions.

The Falcons have had more than their share of inconsistent interpretation in a season when umpires have constantly been criticised and it reached a head last Saturday.

The one glaring light in challenging the 'authorities' is that there can only ever be one winner.

But at least Cometti will feel confident within himself that he got his frustrations out in the open.

## Three in a row for Perth?

ALTHOUGH Perth have had two giant results for the club in the last two weeks, they do not seem to be able to gain ground.

In fact, this Saturday sees them in a position that has become an accustomed part of their game.

Over the past two Saturdays, the Demons have started underdogs from the bottom of the table to clash with league leaders.

Even after their efforts of knocking Swans and South Fremantle from top spot, they still find themselves at the bottom of the table.

And this week they face another daunting task of stopping the next top side, East Fremantle — and that's a formula that might well work in the Demons favour.

The recurrence of three important factors could see a repeat performance.

The Demons could have beaten both Swans and South in the first round, but for a final quarter fade out.

East Fremantle are currently on top and the game is at Lathlain Park, the scene of the Demons' two mighty wins in recent weeks.

If superstition counts for much, Ron Alexander and his troops had better be right on their toes when they take the field against the confident Demons on Saturday.

## Call to lift footy's image

THE WAFL's football director, Dr Tom Stannage, has called on the Players' Association to help improve football's image.

Dr Stannage said in a letter to the association that it was his opinion that many supporters see football as a "thugger sport".

The Players' Association, through The Western Player, passes on Dr Stannage's thoughts and impresses upon them their responsibility in this area.

Football should be seen as tough and physical, but an extremely fair ball game, he says.

### NEW LOOK

SWAN Districts defender Tony Solin would have confused a few people at East Fremantle Oval last Saturday had he not been wearing his familiar No. 1 guernsey. Solin took the field for the first time without his moustache and looked a totally different player. The decision to shave off the "mo" would not have come easy for the tough half-back, but there was some compensation in that he played well.

### BUSY DAY

EAST Fremantle reserves coach Peter Gianoli was a busy man last Saturday. He started the day by lining up on the bench for the reserves game for the first time this year and with a couple of injuries was forced to take the ground for the second half. The former Osborne Park star slotted in well and played solidly as a ruck-rover. As soon as the siren sounded to end the reserves game he raced down to the changerooms and changed into his runners' outfit for the league game. And just because he had played one game of football, league coach Ron Alexander was not about to give him any rest and Gianoli was frequently on the ground delivering messages.

### QUICK REVENGE

INJURY-struck Dermott Brereton wasn't really in the mood to be abused as he limped off Princes Park on Saturday with a recurrence of his groin injury.

An abusive spectator leant over the fence to say a few words to the big Hawthorn forward, who stopped and said: "Beg your pardon".

The spectator was a little too close for comfort — and he was left holding a red nose!

### SYDNEY VIEW

IN A special sports editorial published in the Monday edition of the Sydney-based Australian Newspaper, sports editor Kevin Jones criticised the performance of the Sydney Swans in the harbour city.

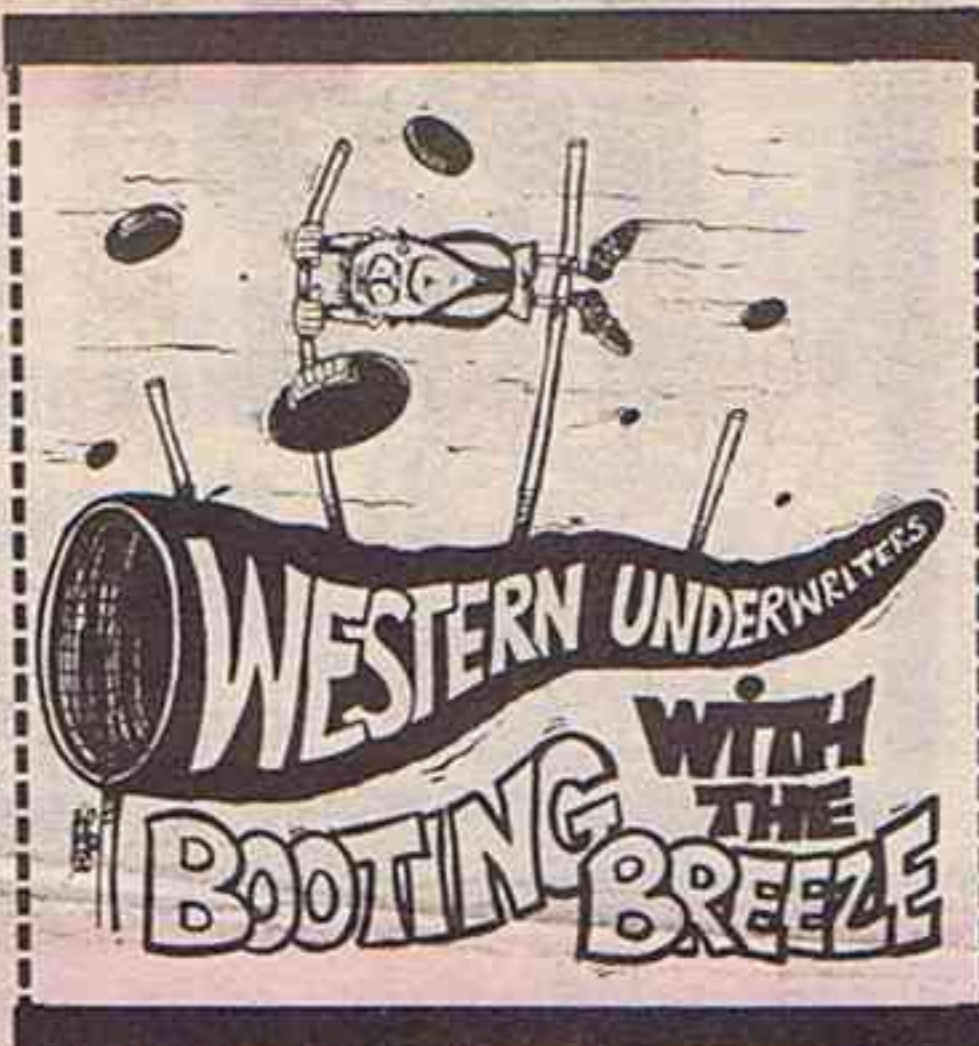
The comments followed the Swans' abysmal performance against St Kilda last Sunday which attracted 10,300 spectators.

He said there was no time for sentiment and it was time that certain big-name players were dropped to the reserves. He singled out captain Barry Round, David Rhys-Jones and expensive 1984 recruit Bill Picken.

He went on to say that the Sydney public has shown that it wants Australian football.

Only three weeks ago the match against Carlton drew 25,000 — the biggest Sydney crowd for a Swans game. The game is thriving at a junior level and general interest is growing.

"Sydney has not let the Swans down — the Swans have let Sydney down," he wrote.

# Little men, big achievers

THESE days a lot of emphasis is placed on a particular side's ruck strengths and rovers tend to be overlooked.

But history has shown that teams who are successful for any length of time — and by that I mean by winning two or three premierships on end — have top class rovers.

Looking back through the history books, that is one of the most distinct characteristics of some of the great sides.

Let's go back to the mid 1940s when East Fremantle enjoyed one of the finest eras in the club's history.

They won premierships in 1945 and 1946 — in fact, in the second of those seasons they went through undefeated — and their class rovers were Vic French, "Runt" McDonald, Jim Conway and Jack Sheedy.

Of course in those days small men played a bigger role than they do today because they could be used elsewhere other than in a roving role.

Perhaps Sheedy, French and Conway were 30 years ahead of their time.

## HANDBALL

They led East Fremantle to flags through their brilliant use of handball, something which has become an important ingredient in today's game.

Sheedy was the master of the handball and he used this weapon to tremendous effect when he took on the coaching role at East Perth.

South Fremantle had a magnificent era from 1947 to 1955 when they were regular participants in the top four and during that time they picked up six premierships.

Rovers like Steve Marsh, Harry Carbon and Barry White played significant parts in those victories.

Of the three, Marsh and Carbon are probably the best known, but White was also a brilliant player who represented the State.

I am convinced that without this trio South would not have enjoyed what history now claims as their Golden Era.

In 1956 Sheedy moved to East Perth and he took with him his most potent weapon — the handball. It was an art he transferred to some of his players.

The most notable of his proteges were Polly Farmer and Ted Kilmurray.

## SIGNIFICANT

While Kilmurray and Farmer played significant roles for the Royals, it was the roving combination of Sheedy, Kevin McGill and Reg Hall which had the most to do with East Perth winning three premierships in four years and being runners-up to East Fremantle on one occasion.

Sheedy taught Farmer the handball so well that he eventually perfected the art and became better at it than his coach.

When football moved into the 1960s it was Swan Districts' turn to dominate the small-man department through Bill Walker and Haydn Bunton — one of the greatest roving combinations of all time.

Bunton, the senior partner and captain-coach, spent most of the time on the ball while Walker kicked goals from a forward pocket — and they showed the importance of the small man.

## DEVELOPED

Walker later developed to become one of WA's football legends.

In 1966 Mal Atwell moved to Perth and while his strength and sheer aggression were necessary ingredients for the Demons to win premierships, he had under his control a couple of great rovers.

Obviously Barry Cable was his trump card, but Graham Jenzen and Greg Bennett combined with Cable to give Perth a three pronged roving division.

Rarely, if ever, has there been a more potent roving combination in WA football.

Then, in 1976 under the Ken Armstrong regime, Perth won two flags in succession and were runners-up to East Perth when they went for their hat-trick.

The rovers who helped them to that success were Robert Wiley and Chris Mitsopoulos.

Basing my judgments for this year's pennant on the small man credentials I would have to tip South Fremantle to win the premiership.

They have the most powerful roving combination in WA football at present

through Wally Matera and David Hart and there is the possibility that Noel Carter could also rove. On top of that there is a chance that Willie Roe will be back in action before the end of the year.

Swan Districts could find themselves in trouble because of the illness and injury problems affecting Ed Blackaby.

Apart from Barry Kimberley, Blackaby is the only true rover at Bassendean.

## STOP-GAP

Claremont also have problems because they have just one rover — Michael Mitchell, although other players like Mark Watson have been used as a stop-gap measure.

East Fremantle, with the return of Kevin Taylor, look to be the side most capable of taking it up to South Fremantle.

Together with Roger, Kerr and Mario Turco, the Sharks now have a strengthened roving attack.

Taylor's return could not have been more timely and apart from Wiley at Perth, he is the only true goal kicking rover in WA football.

East Perth re-recruited Wayne Otway to lead their roving division this year, but injuries have prevented him from playing any real part in proceedings.

That has meant that young tyros Angelo Delborrello and Tony Papotto have had to carry the workload and their inexperience will be a disadvantage for the Royals.

West Perth are another club with just one class rover in veteran Les Fong, although he has been well supported by the hard working John Gastev. But the latter also lacks games under his belt and the Falcons have a roving deficiency.

Perth have Robert Wiley and Bryan Cousins and provided they can win enough games to make the finals they could cause a few problems.

They are the most experienced pairing in the competition and they know what finals football is all about.

Bunton realises the importance of top rovers and for that reason he has groomed Neil Taylor for that spot. But the Subiaco captain also lacks support.

I believe it all boils down to a derby grand final because those two sides are best equipped in the small man department.

Time will tell!

## Tribunal is a puzzle

WEST Perth coach Dennis Cometti could feel fully justified in his claims that there seems to be two sets of rules — one for the Falcons and another for everyone else — particularly after Monday night's tribunal hearing. You might remember earlier in the season that Mal Brown abused everyone from the interchange stewards and emergency umpire to the spectators, but his charges were dismissed by the tribunal. On Saturday, Cometti approached the umpires about some pretty ordinary decisions that went against West Perth and he copped a \$500 fine. That was his first appearance before the tribunal. Brown has been a regular visitor to the hearings.

## A VETERAN SHINES

DURING Saturday's game between West Perth and Claremont, I could not help but be impressed by one of the game's veterans, George Michalczyk was given the difficult assignment of tagging Claremont star Steve Malaxos and he did the job to perfection. That followed on from top displays, in similar situations, opposed to two of WA's other outstanding centremen in Peter Spencer and Murray Wrensted. And a young player who impressed was half-forward Paul Mifka who continues to make a big impact in his first season of league football. He is a player of the future. One of the most enthralling duels of the game resulted when tough Claremont half-back Michael Dickfos lined up on sensational West Perth half-forward Derek Kickett. Dickfos worked hard throughout and was one of the few Claremont players who could hold their heads high after the drubbing.

## WATCH OUT IAN

OPPOSITION coaches would not normally take a lot of notice of the form of East Fremantle pair Derek Kickett and Roger Kerr. But in the past few weeks they have made everyone sit up and take notice. On Saturday those two players combined their skills to sink East Fremantle and the week before they helped to beat West Perth. No doubt Perth coach Ian Miller will watch them closely this week.

## ANOTHER SMITH

SWAN Districts fans were thrilled by the exploits of star centreman Mike Smith before he headed to the VFL this season. And now they have another Mike Smith to urge on. The 20-year-old Smith made his debut in WA football on Saturday and from all accounts put in a top performance as ruck-rover. Smith made his debut in that infamous Sterling Cup match when coach John Todd took a reserves team across to Melbourne to play Richmond in protest at the lop-sided rules which favour the VFL. That was in 1982 and it has taken Smith a while to break out of reserves but he looks set for a bright career.

## WHALE OF A DRINK

TWO former players, Ian McCulloch and Jim Haines, have just ventured into the hotel game once more. They have bought the Queen's Tavern in Perth and I wish them every success. # Top pair face crucial matches

TWO of WA football's trend-setters in the last five years — Swan Districts and South Fremantle — face crucial matches this week.

Swans have lost three games in succession while South have won just two of their last seven matches — and both will be desperate to return to the winners' circle.

And neither side has an easy task in breaking their lean run.

Swans come up against Subiaco at Bassendean and the Bulldogs meet West Perth at League headquarters.

Normally Swans could tackle a match against Subiaco with a great deal of confidence — but that is something they have been lacking in recent weeks.

They became undisciplined when the going got tough against East Fremantle and that is uncharacteristic for one of the most professional clubs in WA football.

No doubt coach John Todd will rectify the situation during the week and the return to Bassendean Oval should provide them with the lift they need to get back on course for their fourth successive grand final appearance.

They will need players of the calibre of Jon Fogarty, Don Langsford and Keith Narkle to continue their high rating in the hope that it will rub off on some of their team-mates.

Subiaco, on the other hand, were going along nicely until they were dumped by East Perth last Saturday and they will be keen to rebound from that defeat.

The Lions will need a big effort from lanky ruckman Laurie Keene, half-back Dwayne Lamb and "runners" Phil Lamb and Neil Taylor.

It promises to be a great contest, but

Swans will do everything possible to avoid losing their fourth game in succession and because the game is at Bassendean, they should be able to see it through.

South Fremantle's task is also a daunting one.

They come up against West Perth, who returned to their best form last week.

A leading player for the Falcons in last week's massive win against Claremont was big ruckman Ramsay Bogunovich — and that could cause problems for the Bulldogs, who are undermanned in the big man department.

With Lindsay Borthwick and Craig Edwards out of action through injury, the Bulldogs have had to be content with a make-shift ruck battery — and Bogunovich gives the Falcons a decided advantage.

South will have to cover for this deficiency by having some of their smaller players return to form.

They will look to Noel Carter, Brad Hardie, Nicky Winmar, Brad Collard and David Hart to give them the drive around the ground required to win a game of this nature.

Subiaco Oval is like a second home to the Bulldogs because they have played so many finals there and that should help them in their quest for a return to form.

West Perth have also played their share of games at Leederville Oval this year, but South Fremantle look to have an edge in pace around the ground.

## Tigers to rebound

CLAREMONT were far from impressive last week, but East Perth can be certain that the Tigers will put up a better performance this week.

Graham Moss would have been bitterly disappointed with his side's lack of effort and interest last week, with a few exceptions — and something would have been done during the week to rectify it.

East Perth are a side with a shortage of brilliant players, but they win through sheer hard work and determination — something which has been a short-fall at Tigerland this year.

Claremont worked their way back into finals calculations until going down to Subiaco and West Perth and this match is vital to their cause.

Because they have more at stake than the Royals, they should take the honours.

## Demons' real test

PERTH and East Fremantle have caused several boogymen in the last two weeks and now they clash in one of the most crucial games of the day.

Should East Fremantle win, they will remain at the top of the premiership table — and victory for Perth would put them right back into finals contention.

The Demons have beaten Swan Districts and South Fremantle in the last two weeks and they go into this clash with a great deal of confidence.

They love playing at Lathlain and they will be extremely hard to beat, particularly if Bryan Cousins, Robert Wiley and Rhett Baynes continue their good form.

East Fremantle will look to Graham Kickett, Paul Harding and Roger Kerr to help offset the Devilish Demons.

The Sharks appear to have an edge around the ground in pace and that should enable them to remain at the top of the WA football tree.

## Time is running out for Swans

ARE Swan Districts on the skids? At the moment, they don't look like final-four contenders, let alone a side shooting for a hat-trick of premierships.

A month ago Swans were on top of the premiership ladder and looking good, particularly after their win against South Fremantle.

Since then they have plunged down the premiership ladder to sixth spot.

And unless they apply the brakes against Subiaco this week they may be on the way to kissing their finals hopes goodbye.

Some may feel that Swans are going through a mid-season slump and can point to the indifferent form of South Fremantle.

But, I believe Swans are showing a lack of appetite for success this season.

Some of their players don't have the

hunger that has enabled them to win the last two premierships.

Players like Brad Shine, Tony Solin and Gerard Neesham, who have built reputations on their desire to get the ball, have hardly been sighted this season.

While it would be foolish to write Swans off — after all they are still only a win away from top spot — John Todd faces a king-sized headache if his team doesn't start to win matches.

It is rare for Swans to end up losers after conceding a substantial lead to a team and then hitting the front. But that happened against Claremont and Perth.

If they can't overcome Subiaco at Bassendean this Saturday then I wouldn't fancy their chances against West Perth at Leederville Oval the following week.

For the first time in a number of seasons, Swan Districts' players have become hung up over the loss of stars.

In the past they have been able to shrug off adversity. In fact it tended to inspire them. But that hasn't been the case this season.

It seems that some players are prepared to look for excuses when the going gets tough instead of putting their heads down and getting on with the job.

### PROBLEMS

Todd has a real problem if some players are indicating they are prepared to throw in the towel.

There's no point lamenting the loss of the likes of Phil Narkle, Leon Baker and Mike Richardson.

Other clubs have had their player losses. And it's useless thinking that because "we have done it before we will do it again."

Though Swans came from the first semi-final last season they didn't have a horror patch like the one they are in now.

It's rare that a team gets the opportunity to win a hat-trick of premierships.

Swans have that chance... but they will need to be a big improvement in the attitude of players if they are to realise that ambition.

### RUNNING INTO TROUBLE

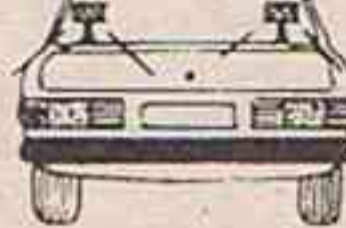

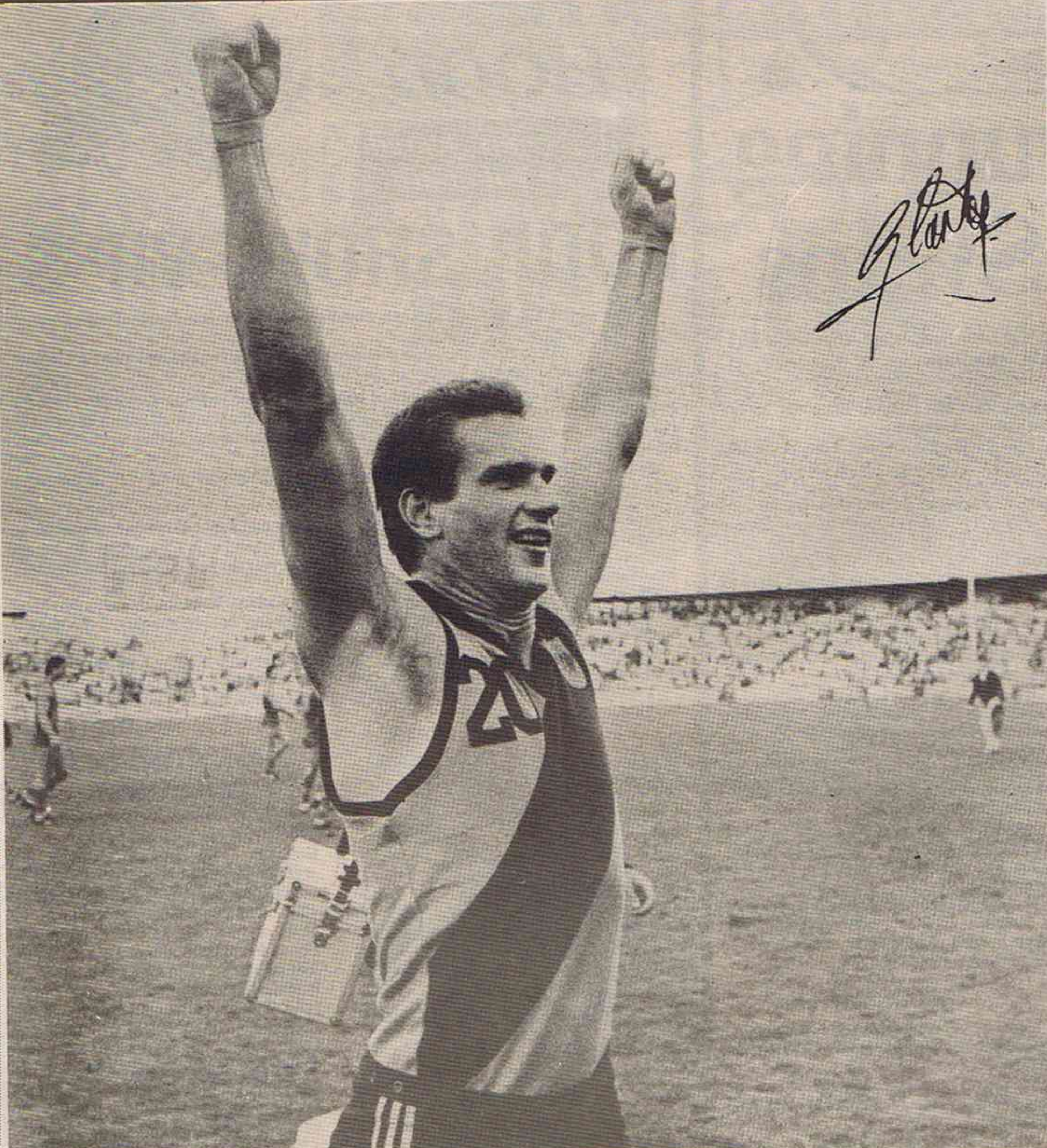

**GAINING** that first opportunity in league football is only the first step towards making the grade . . . just ask South Fremantle and State full-back Gavin Carter.

He made his league debut on April 30, 1977 — but four years later he was playing with Rockingham with only 10 league games to his credit.

After promising so much as a 17-year-old in his first few games in league football, Carter was told in 1981 by coach Mal Brown that his services were no longer required.

He was one of seven players sacked by the league in a major reshuffle.

Unlike the other six players who were given their marching orders from Fremantle Oval, Carter was determined that one day he would be back at a league club. Despite being asked to leave he did not lose faith in his own ability.

The result was that after a season with Augusta-Margaret River and a year at Rockingham, Carter returned to Fremantle Oval to have another crack at league football.



It was something he had dreamed of doing since he was a boy on the family farm at Cuballing.

It is now history that the giant defender has become one of the most consistent players in league football and just a few weeks ago he made his interstate debut in that memorable Adelaide clash which WA won by a point.

Carter played no small part in that victory.

He was given the difficult assignment of watching brilliant SA full-forward Stephen

Kernahan — who had kicked 10 goals against the Victorians earlier in the year — and he did a marvellous job.

He stuck with Kernahan all day, content initially to punch the ball and then when he gained control of the most enthralling individual duel of the day, he began to back his judgement and was the springboard for WA's attacking moves.

South Fremantle could thank one of the club's committeemen of 1983, Dick Woodgate, for Carter's return to the port club.

When told by Brown that his services were not required the burly full-back vowed he would never again play under Brown.

Mr Woodgate came along at a time when Carter was considering an offer from another club and persuaded him to return to Fremantle Oval — otherwise he could now be playing against the Bulldogs.

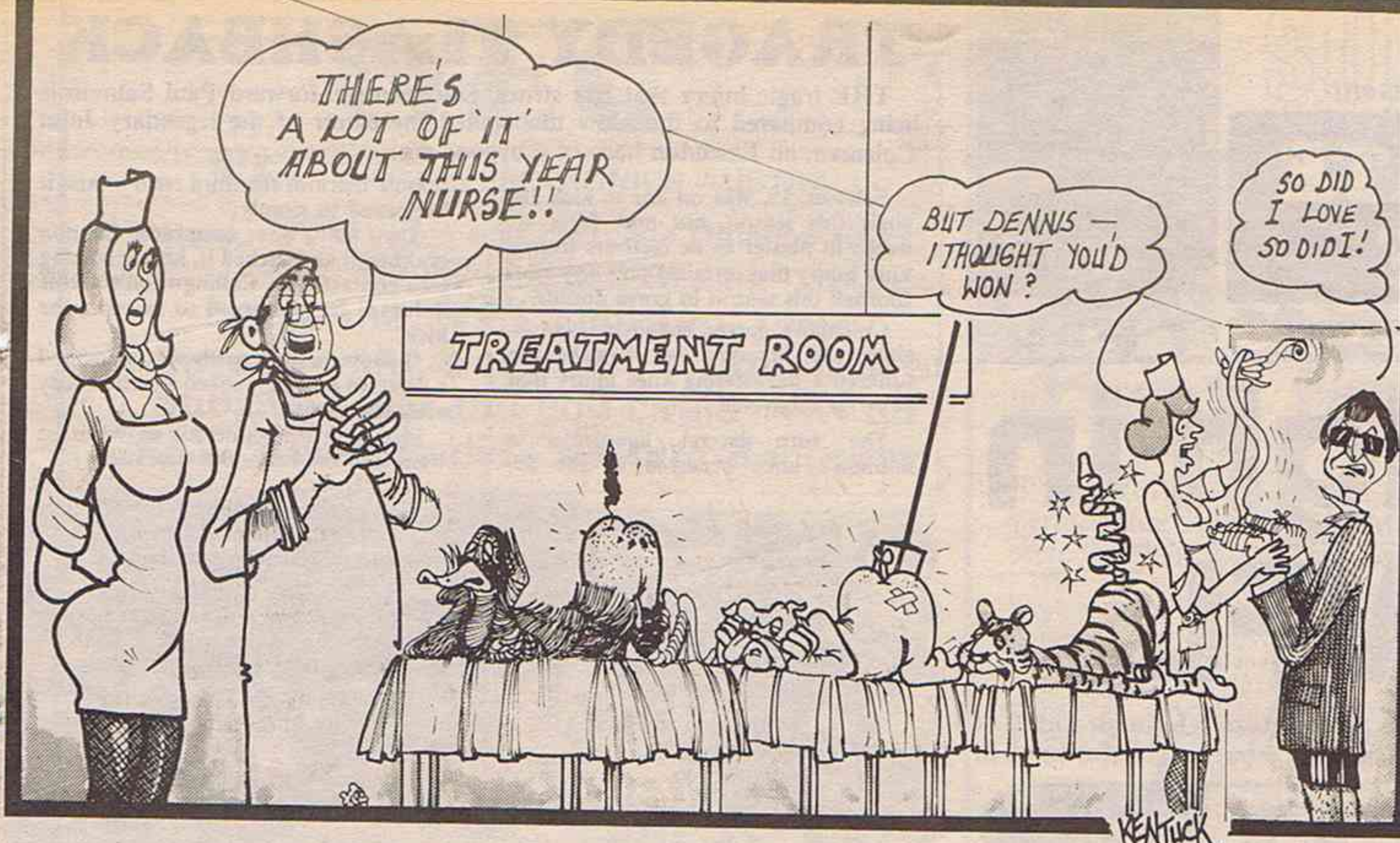

Other long-term injuries have been incurred by Lloyd Richardson, Steve Turner, Cam Shepherd, Greg Campbell and John Zaikos.

### INVOLVED AGAIN

IT IS always good to have former players involved in the game once again and former Perth back-pocket player Bill Leuzzi, who played 161 games from 1956-66, has been actively involved behind the scenes in two areas this year. He spends most Sundays in our country zone representing the club and keeping an eye on prospective recruits. And on Saturdays he brings his son, Trevor to the football to act as one of the league team's statisticians.

### WRONG DECISION

I DISAGREED with John Rogers choice of goal of the day on Channel 7's World of Sport program on Sunday. Devine, a physical fitness expert, umpired more than 200 league games in the WAFL and his experience has been welcomed at the training sessions. Apart from putting the panel through some vigorous routines he has passed on his knowledge to some of the younger boundary umpires involved this year.

# Come back Harold — we need you

LOCAL umpires have come in for a fair amount of criticism in recent weeks... but that is nothing unusual.

There has probably only ever been one umpire who has come close to being perfect and unfortunately for us he lived 65 years ago.

Harold (Zoo) Crapp was seldom criticised. He came to WA with a reputation as being the prince of umpires and fully lived up to that title.

Crapp umpired the first VFL final ever in 1897 and officiated in 17 finals (seven grand finals), before heading West in 1906. He was also in control of the first interstate game between WA and Victoria in Melbourne in 1904. Between 1906 and 1921 he umpired almost 200 WA league games, including every grand final from 1906 to 1914.

Crapp received accolades like: "Crapp was supreme with the whistle; It's easy to see why Crapp is called the prince of umpires; Crapp pleased everyone except the chronic moaners and Crapp umpired with his usual excellence."

The rate of pay in 1912 was, when converted, about \$6.50.

### POLICE PROBLEMS

REMEMBER the fuss South Fremantle's Warren Mosconi had getting leave from the police force to play for WA in Adelaide four weeks ago?

Well, I came across a similar situation this week which happened many years ago. It was in 1928 and Perth's player Shepherd was forced to withdraw from the team when the police would not grant him leave to tour the Eastern States with the State side.

Last-minute negotiations failed and West Perth's famous Ted Fleming was selected to take his place.

### RIGHT RECIPE

THERE will probably never be a competition as even as this year.

Recent developments in the game have seen the tempo lifted and scoring become easier. That was the excuse used in recent times for high scoring, one-sided matches and this year's results tend to disprove that theory.

There have been less goals kicked this year than last year and this has produced the recipe for a tight competition.

Only Subiaco have shown any significant increase in scoring this year compared with their efforts of '1983.

# It's tough in the VFL

THERE were plenty of heated words after Saturday's tough round of VFL fixtures — with the 'king' of the heavies, Lethal Leigh Matthews in the centre of the controversies.

Melbourne coach Ron Barassi — riding the crest of a six-in-a-row-winning-sequence-wave — spoke out harshly against Matthews; but did not name the tough Hawthorn skipper.

The furore erupted when Melbourne's vice-captain Steve Smith was knocked unconscious in the third quarter of the tough and fiery clash at Princes Park.

Matthews himself said that the incident was 'unfortunate' but wouldn't comment any further.

Smith, a solicitor, was taken from the ground suffering from a broken nose and concussion.

But he described the incident as a compliment to the way he was playing.



"I take it as the biggest compliment I've ever been paid in football because I was beating him," said Smith.

"I had a lot of respect for that guy. I wasn't holding him or anything."

Hawks coach Allan Jeans said that Matthews had complained that he was being constantly held and he just threw his arms backwards. "He must have hit him in the wrong spot," he said.

The incident stirred Melbourne into fiery action and as Barassi said: "There was no way we were going to lose after that. Those things seldom work in a side's favour."

## SAINTS SUFFER

ST KILDA'S liquidation troubles are obviously affecting the team's on-field performances as they lament on the bottom of the VFL premiership table.

The Saints have offered to pay their creditors 7.5 cents in the dollar in a bid to survive.

But many past players are among those who don't want to accept the offer — and moves are under way that could force the club into liquidation.

Former players such as Barry Breen — the man now known as the footballer who kicked the winning point in St Kilda's only premiership — Kevin Neale, Jeff Sarau, Bruce Duperouzel and former coaches Alex Jesaulenko and Allan Jeans have the future of the club in their hands.

If they vote against the Saints proposal and alternative proposals to repay the money owed to them are not satisfactory, their voting power could bring the club to the brink of financial defeat.

St Kilda champion Max Crow believes that if the Saints can get through this current difficulty, they will end up with a tough side.

Crow, 28, the club's senior player, says that he doesn't believe the current players are affected by talk of liquidation.

"When you are young, all you want to do is play football," he says.

## CAHILL'S CHOP

JOHN Cahill is ready to wield the axe at Collingwood.

Some harsh words were expected behind-closed-doors at Collingwood on Saturday night after their last-quarter collapse against Essendon.

"I thought we lacked desperation when the crunch was really on," said Cahill. "Some of our experienced players fell right away after half time."

Cahill refused to blame individuals, but one in danger of losing his place is big vice-captain David Cløke, who was replaced 15 minutes into the final quarter.

## TRAGEDY FLASHBACK

THE tragic injury that has struck Essendon full-forward Paul Salmon is being compared to the blow that ended the career of the legendary John Coleman, an Essendon hero of a bygone era.

Salmon, 19, was on line to kick 100 goals this season, but now faces six weeks in plaster as he recovers from a knee injury that certainly puts any more football this season in grave doubt.

Coleman's career ended in 1954 — almost to the day — when he too suffered a devastating knee injury that he never recovered from.

The torn lateral ligaments in Salmon's knee occurred at the 29-

minute mark of the third term — and it happened so simply.

The ball was bounced; Salmon grabbed it and kicked it, his leg coming into contact with Collingwood's Geoff Raines as he attempted to smother the kick.

"I suppose it's a costly win" lamented a dejected Bombers coach Kevin Sheedy after the news.

"He won the game for us when he went into the ruck. But that's footy."

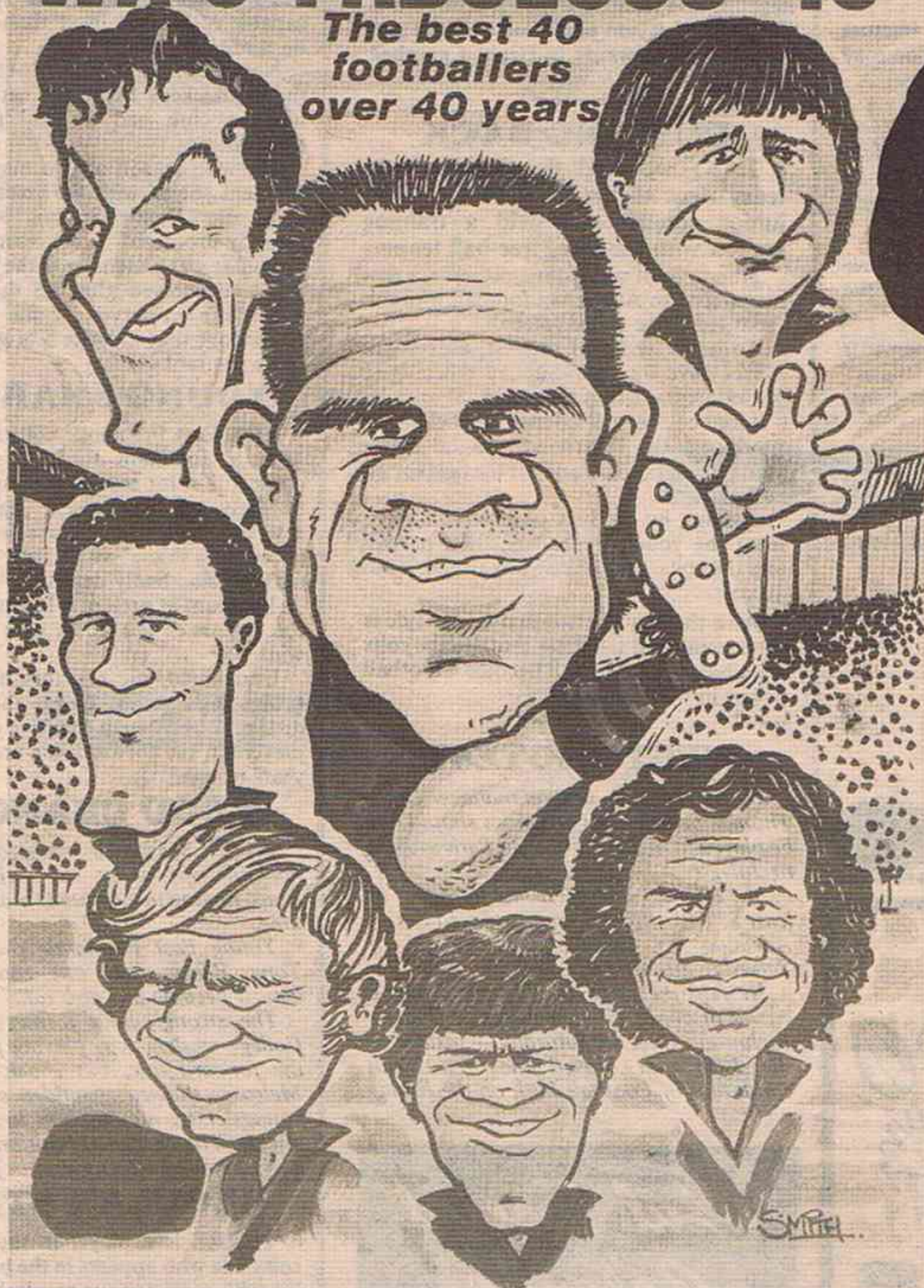

## TREATMENT OF SPECIFIC INJURIES

### FRACTURES

Depressed Fracture.

**Definitions & Causes:**

May occur when hard external forces strike the head areas such as the cheek bone. Associated conditions such as unconsciousness, concussion, and haemorrhage need to be considered.

Greenstick Fracture.

Are incomplete breaks in the bone. The name is derived from the similarity of the fracture to a break in a green twig which has been snapped.

Compression Fracture.

When the force of the injury along the bone shaft compresses one part of the bone into another.

Comminuted Fractures.

A number of bone fragments are separated at the fracture site. A hard blow or fall into an awkward position may cause such an injury.

Transverse Fracture.

Break is in a straight line across the bone shaft.

Spiral Fracture.

It has the appearance of a spiral S-shaped separation. Common in football or skiing where the boot is firmly planted and body is suddenly rotated in a different direction.

Oblique Fracture.

Similar to, however worse than, spiral fractures and have same causes. They result in a diagonal separation of the bone.

Stress Fracture.

These may result from repetitive exercise movements which cause abnormal stresses on the bone causing "flaws" or weak points in the actual structure of the bone. Commonly seen in the small bones of the foot.

Open Compound Fractures.

Consist of any one of the aforementioned fractures where there is a wound connecting the bone to the external environment.

Closed Fractures.

Consists of any one of the aforementioned fractures where the skin is not broken.

Their plight this year could easily be compared to 1981.

At the end of the 1980 season the Royals announced a severe financial loss and the players' payments were delayed; pre-season predictions had East Perth firmly entrenched in the bottom half of the table and they had done little or no recruiting.

Being told they would not make the finals was enough to lift them into the four.

Brehaut is the first to admit that there is a lot of football left to be played this season and says the Royals still have a way to go.

Mr Thomas said West had forfeited "at least \$7000" through having played South Adelaide on Friday night instead of Saturday afternoon.

He said the clubs would have drawn a crowd of about 7000 to Adelaide Oval or Richmond Oval on Saturday — instead of the 3630 that braved the wet, bleak conditions of Football Park on the Friday night.

## MOTHER BROWN

### When time stood still

AN unbelievable situation developed at Lathlain Park on Saturday and it proved most annoying to players and supporters alike. The clock stopped at the 10-minute mark of the last quarter and everyone at the ground was guessing as to how much time was left during the cliff-hanging finish. I don't know whether it is the responsibility of the WAFL or the Perth Football Club, but something should have been done about the situation. Surely there was some way it could have been rectified. It could have been operated manually for that matter. Paying spectators are entitled to that service, particularly when the game is as tight as it was on Saturday.

### MISSING FANS

THE attendances at league football games this year have been most disappointing. Even if the figures are up on the same time last season it is still not good enough. We have the best competition ever seen in local football, yet we still struggle to get fans through the gates. Last Saturday was a perfect example. There were four good games scheduled and it was a fine day, yet the attendances were disappointing. What has to be done to attract people to the football?

### IT'S LUDICROUS

I DON'T want to buy into the argument surrounding umpires, but it does seem a little unfair that coaches, players and administrators can all be criticised, yet the umpires do not have to put up with it. The umpires are paid just the same as players and coaches and it seems lop-sided to me. Last year the grey ghosts ruined an afternoon's football for many fans by slapping parking fines on their windscreens. I hope they are not out in force this year and only book the serious offenders, who obstruct laneways and other cars.

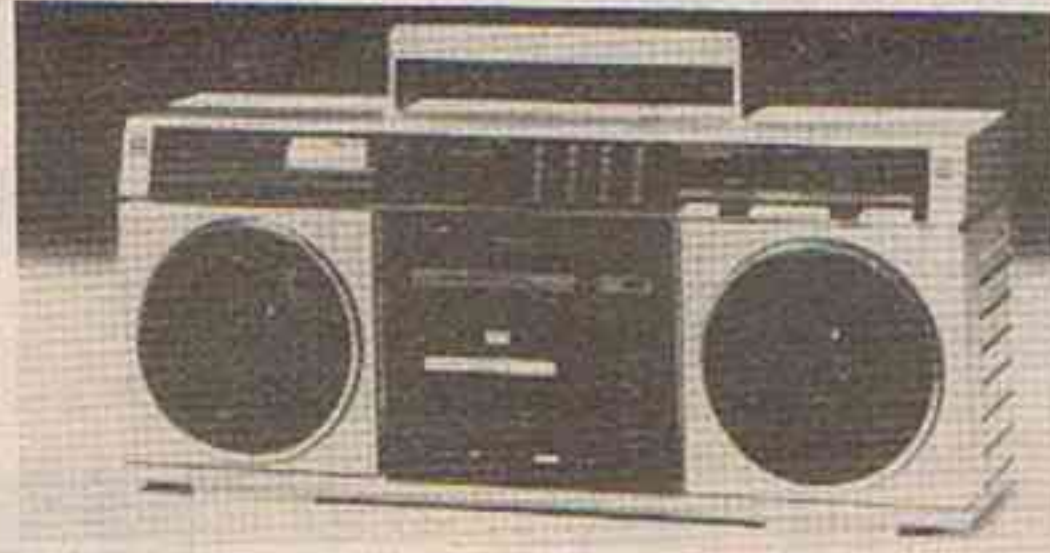

## UGS look set to retain title

UPPER Great Southern will start favourites to win this year's Elders Great Southern carnival at Narrogin on July 7 and 8.

The defending champions have again chosen a strong squad and the key to their prospects will be the performances of Wesfarmers State country team players Greg Cavanagh and Ross Tyson.

Tyson, a regular member of South West teams in recent years, is now playing with Pingelly and he is an extremely damaging and creative midfield player.

Cavanagh, a former South Fremantle player, is the captain-coach of reigning premiers Williams and he has been in fine form in recent weeks.

His strong marking and long kicking will present problems for opposition teams throughout the carnival.

New team South East Football League have been drawn to meet Upper Great Southern and that will provide them with a tough initiation in this carnival.

Undoubtedly the Esperance-based league will have plenty to aim at in their initial carnival. But they could struggle against some of the top sides.

Unfortunately for them they meet two leagues who should come under strong consideration for the carnival honours.

Their second match is against the star-studded Central Great Southern side, who will be coached by former Carlton and Claremont star Ross Ditchburn.

Also in the Central Great Southern team is former Claremont back-pocket specialist Tom Pearce and Rodney Zilm, a player who narrowly missed selection in the Wesfarmers All Stars team which played in Adelaide earlier this month.

Ditchburn's marking power at centre-half-forward will give Central Great Southern a focal point in attack and young full-forward Keith Punch will also create a few headaches for opposition defenders.

He recently followed up a 13-goal haul in a club game by kicking 18 the next week — a performance that gave him the record for the most goals by an individual in one match.

Southern Districts won their last carnival in 1982 and look to have their work cut out this year.

They will rely on the efforts of big ruckmen Charlie Staite and Gerard Cameron and fast-moving players like Murray Wynne, Neil Williams and Craig Bevan.

Their biggest test will come in the opening game on Saturday when they come up against Central Great Southern.

Lower South West have found carnivals difficult to win in the past and this year should be no exception.

They simply do not have the players required to take it up to teams like Upper Great Southern and Central Great Southern.

However, they have an easy draw this year as they meet Ongerup and Ravensthorpe in their preliminary matches and that could see them earn their way to a showdown against the bottom team in the Southern Districts, Central Great Southern and Upper Great Southern division.

It will be interesting to see how Ravensthorpe shape up.

They are an unknown quantity at this stage and because of that they will have the surprise element working to their advantage.

Ongerup is another side which has found victories in this carnival difficult in past seasons. But they are in the weaker section of the draw and that could spur them onto bigger things.

## Plenty of tradition in this carnival

THE Great Southern Carnival has become a traditional part of football in the deep south over the years.

Initially Albany, Mt Barker, Katanning and Narrogin eagerly awaited their turn to host the event which gave players from each of those towns the chance to trade stories once a year.

And it did not take long for other leagues in the area to realise the significance and importance of the carnival.

By 1926 it had grown to the stage where Wagin and Tambellup were also a part of the carnival.

With the admission of those two teams, another change was forced upon the organising committee. It had to be lengthened from a two day affair to three days.

And in 1928 the carnival was extended by a further day.

The first serious problems came to fore in 1937 when the Katanning Association withdrew from the competition.

Because the carnival organisers wanted to keep an even number of teams, a new association was formed from the eastern end of the powerful Wagin Association and the Dumbleyung-Lake Grace side was formed.

The following year the most memorable grand final in the carnival's history took place.

Wagin won their third pennant in as many years when they kicked a goal after the siren to beat Mt Barker, robbing the home team of what looked like certain victory.

Katanning were re-admitted to the competition in 1939 and because of the odd number of teams, an elimination match was required. In that game Katanning beat Albany — the first and only time Albany had failed to take part in the carnival.

In 1949 a colts competition was also introduced and that is now unique to football in the southern region of WA.

The participating leagues are split into two divisions and they play qualifying matches before the carnival is held.

At the end of those preliminary matches two teams earn the right to play a grand final in the curtain raiser to the Great Southern Carnival final.

Ironically, it was the colts competition

## CARNIVAL HAS A LONG HISTORY

THE Great Southern Carnival is thought to be one of the longest surviving of its type in Australia.

It certainly has no rival in Western Australia as its origin dates back to 1922.

When the concept of the carnival changed from club to league participation in the early 60s it was dominated for many years by the Upper Great Southern National Football League. However, since the mid-seventies, the title has been shared around a little more.

which saved the carnival when it looked to be in great danger. A lack of interest saw it abandoned in 1974.

But because of the colts competition, interest was restored in one of WA football's most historic and prestigious country events.
