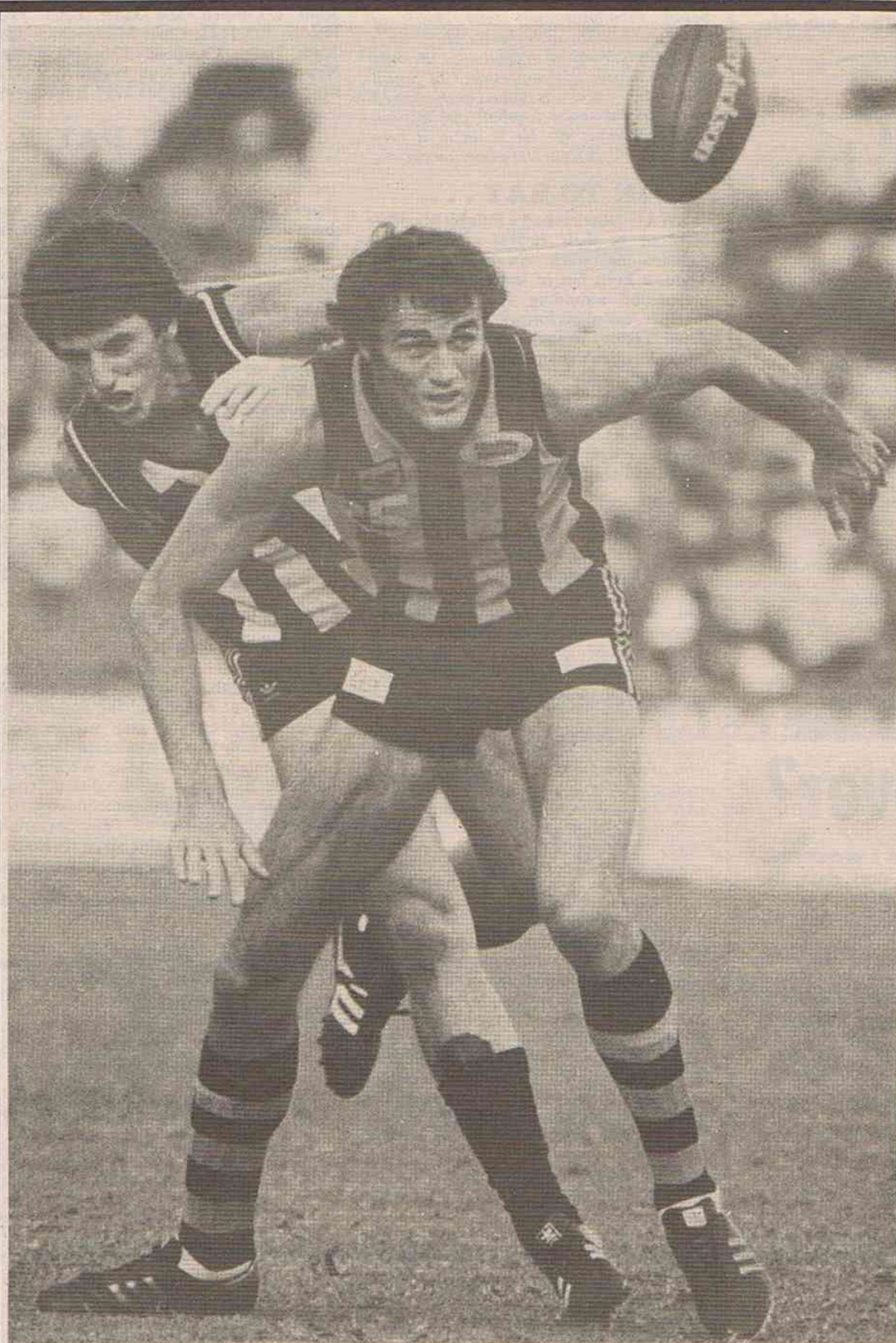

South look for new coach

SOUTH Fremantle have drawn up a short list of possible coaches to take over from Mal Brown next year.

Brown, the game's most controversial and colourful coach, is expected to step down from the Bulldogs coaching role at the end of this season, ending a seven-year reign.

And high on the list of targets for the job next year is one of South Fremantle's all-time great players — current Swan Districts coach John Todd.

Also on the short list of contenders are reserves coach and Brown's under-study, Don Haddow, and former East Perth coach, Grant Dorrington.

South Fremantle currently have an outstanding crop of young footballers; but Brown believes that it is time for a change at the helm. His decision to step down will not come as a surprise; but the choice of a successor is sure to generate intense football speculation.

The man who finally gets the nod should step into a club brimful of talent and ripe and ready to charge ahead in the next few years.

Todd, South Fremantle's 1955 Sandover Medallist and a premature coach of the club in 1959 and later in 1966-67, 68, would obviously like to finish his career back home.

The time is rapidly approaching when he too could be running out of challenges in his current role.

Dorrington would also slot into South Fremantle's coaching ideals.

He has a proven record in the development of young players and he was able to coach East Perth into the finals in his two years at the helm at Perth Oval.

The State under-18 coach has just returned from taking his side to Sydney to contest the Teal Cup and he gave further proof of his ability by taking the WA team to the grand final against Victoria.

He is a strict disciplinarian, just like Todd, and demands total commitment.

Sharks look the goods

DESPITE the unpredictable weekly form of WAFL football, one side has emerged as more consistent than the rest.

It would be a bold pundit to confidently predict the 1984 premiers, but East Fremantle are looming as the most serious contender for the ultimate honours.

Since their humiliating Foundation Day derby loss, the Sharks have stormed to the top of the table with three successive wins. The other seven finals contenders have been up and down on form.

Ron Alexander and his coaching staff have a combination that looks good premiership potential.

In Alexander, Shane Ellis, Mario Turco, Jeff Cassidy, Stephen Green, Colin Waterson and Kevin Taylor they have the experience to guide the enthusiasm of their younger players in the pressure-filled finals series.

That youthfulness is bolstered by some of the State's most exciting players of the future.

Murray Wrensted and Paul Harding are a lethal combination, while Michael Brennan, Peter Wilson and Clinton Browning are three of the most desperate and skillful youngsters around.

The Sharks have one other important ingredient — team unity with a bubbling comradeship which gives every player total confidence in his team-mate.

The unity of the Sharks is akin to



what they had in 1974 when John Todd led them to a premiership.

The formula they adopted then resembles the strategy used this season which revolves around experienced on-ground leadership and off field marshalling.

Whereas Todd had the masterly leadership of Doug Green on the field, Alexander uses the football knowledge of Murray Ward off the field.

For the first time in many seasons, premiership fancies are hard to find, with all clubs but Perth still in the hunt for finals qualification.

But the way East Fremantle have developed in recent weeks, with their tight defensive unit, dynamic centre liners and brilliant forwards in Graham Kicket and Roger Kerr, they look the goods to take away the crown Todd and Swan Districts have worn for two years.

... and the Sandover?

WHILE sticking the neck out at this stage of the season for a premiership winner, it is equally as ludicrous attempting to suggest who may claim the highest individual award, the Sandover Medal.

The Perth Football Club look set to take the wooden spoon, but they have the answer to the question of the Medal — Rob Wiley.

Since his trip to Adelaide — and that now famous last minute kick for victory — Wiley has been in scintillating form.

Before moving to Victoria for five seasons with VFL club Richmond, Wiley had a disappointing run when it came to winning votes in WA's most coveted award.

But this season must see a reversal of that trend and there is no doubt that if the umpires have watched play as closely as they should, the Demon rover will figure prominently on that special night in September.

Although Wiley's possession rate is incredibly high there is one interesting aspect about the way in which he disposes of the ball.

He does use precision, kicking with either foot or even his slick handball, but he might damage his vote catching ability as he disposes of the ball so quickly.

Claremont master Steve Malaxos has the same problem.

Perhaps a penalty for having such brilliant ball handling disposal potential is to be overlooked when votes are being cast.

IN TO BAT . . .

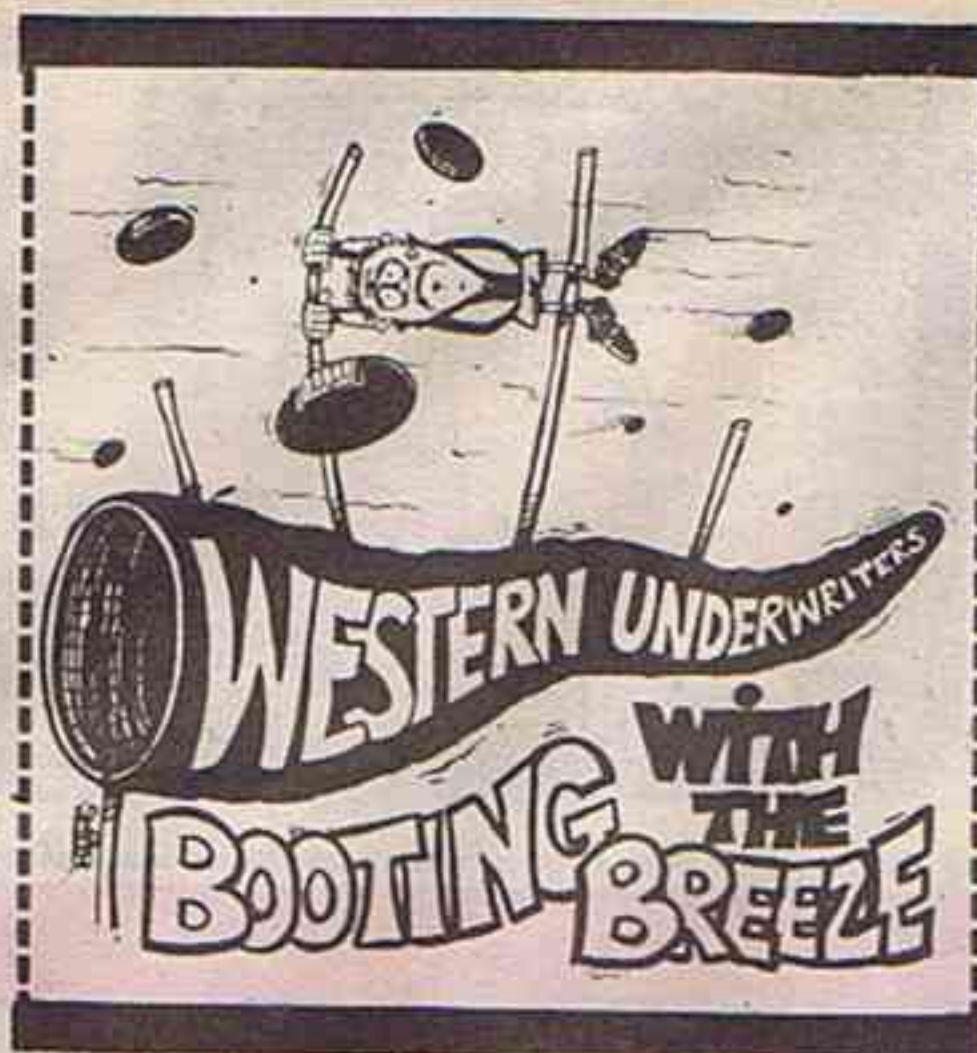

Todd has unbeaten record

WESTERN Australia's chances of defeating Victoria on Tuesday week are pretty slim, but even in defeat (if that happens) John Todd and his co-selectors will have nothing to be ashamed of.

Todd and his helpers have given this State its best-ever record in interstate football.

WA is undefeated under Todd, who has been helped this year by Bill Walker, Graham Moss, Bob Manning, Ron Alexander and Don Haddow.

Last year Mal Brown, Lorne Cook and Ken McAullay were also on the selection panel.

Between them this group has shown tremendous faith in Western Australia's young footballers — and their faith has been rewarded.

BEST—EVER

Now we face up to a Victorian side which is already being nominated as the best side ever to play for the Big V.

And we go into the game without our trump card of most recent interstate matches . . . Stephen Michael.

It was Michael who turned the tide for WA last year in a memorable last half fightback to victory against the Vics at Subiaco.

We have hurt the Vics, demoralised the Croweaters and proven to the Nation that this is the State where the best footballers are raised.

It will be absolutely tremendous if we can celebrate another victory on Tuesday week but if we don't I for one will not be disappointed in the team, the selectors, or the coach.

My team of champions

WHILE thinking about interstate football this week I had a go at selecting a team of WA players that I consider to be the best footballers that I have seen in the last 20 years. I hate to admit it but it was about 20 years ago that I first covered a league football match as a cadet reporter for The West Australian. Here's my team, with apologies to no one!

BACKS: Ken Hunter, Ken McAullay, Mal Atwell.
HALF-BACKS: Denis Marshall, Ross Glendinning, Ken Bagley.
CENTRES: Derek Chadwick, Maurice Rioli, Phil Kelly.
HALF-FORWARDS: John Todd, Mal Brown, Jim Krakouer.
FORWARDS: Bill Walker, Austin Robertson, Graham Moss.
RUCK: Polly Farmer, Stephen Michael, Barry Cable.
RESERVES: Haydn Buntun, Keith Slater.

If that side had ever got together in an interstate match they would have killed the best Victoria or South Australia could field either individually or together.

I have always considered Graham Farmer to be the best ruckman I have ever seen either here or interstate and for that matter Barry Cable the best footballer I have ever seen.

I don't know how good John Todd would have been barring injury and then after him you have absolute champions in Maurice Rioli, Billy Walker, Jimmy Krakouer and Stephen Michael.

I can think of only half a dozen Victorians that would crack that side and they include Darrell Baldock, Peter Hudson, Alex Jesaulenko, Robert Flower and maybe one or two others.

But for my money the talent has always been in WA. We were prevented from proving that until State of Origin football was introduced because in every year half of our best players were playing in Victoria.

NO EXCUSE FOR BRAWLS

I GAVE the Perth team a nice old roast last Saturday for their part in the disgraceful brawls in the third quarter against East Fremantle.

The East Fremantle players were not entirely without blame, but I thought that some of Perth's senior players showed complete contempt for the umpires and the rules of the game.

However in retrospect the biggest blast should have gone not to the players, but to a Perth trainer who shall remain nameless.

I was amazed he was not reported by the umpires because he almost incited an on-field riot by harassing the umpires.

They tell me the chap concerned used to be a trainer at East Fremantle.

If I was Ian Miller I would be sending him back there quick as possible.

Either that or he should be barred from entering the playing arena ever again.

BACK HOME . . .

THERE are many examples of star footballers coming from country areas or outback centres to make it good in the city big-time. And there are always stories about the "other fellow still down on the farm." Well, here's another one. Collie youngster Peter Davidson has proved his worth with Claremont, showing that he is a wingman of real class. But the word from Collie is — watch out for his younger brother Jeff. The youngest son of Collie Football Club stalwart John Davidson is reportedly the most skilful footballer to emerge on the coalfields for decades. He's about 15, so he is a couple of years away.

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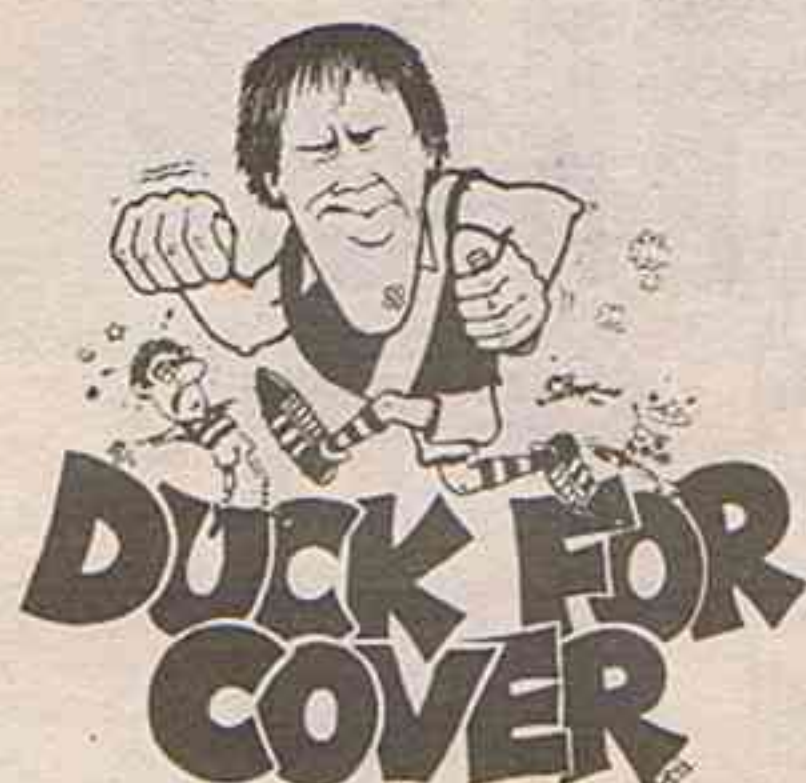

IT WAS inevitable that Perth defender Kevin Worthington would be reported when he charged into a brawl which erupted on the half-back line in the game against East Fremantle on Saturday. But no one could blame 'Wortho' for his actions. I think I would have done the same thing if I was in his boots. What happened when the brawl started was something that should not be a part of the game. Teenage Perth player Ashley McCracken was felled behind the play and Worthington simply came in to offer his support. Any coach would have wanted him to do just that. It is part of his job to protect the younger players.

YOUNG STARS

IT WAS good to see a couple of players make impressive debuts on the weekend. Young Claremont player Mark Brayshaw, the son of former Sheffield Shield cricketer and Claremont half-back Ian Brayshaw, played extremely well according to all reports. He started the season in the colts and jumped straight into the seniors. Subiaco brought Glenn O'Loughlin down from Kalgoorlie to give league football a second try — and he slotted in nicely.

HIS BIG CHANCE

WHILE on players who have reached league football, it was also pleasing to see young East Perth full-back Gary Kohlman play so well last week. He had to wait a couple of years for his opportunity and he put in a top performance opposed to Claremont's David Martin on Saturday. While Martin kicked five goals, Kohlman spoiled well and cleared with authority. Up until last week he had been a little tentative and looked as though he was scared of making mistakes. He should play with more confidence now.

DEAN'S BACK

IT WAS interesting to see Dean Farmer line up at centre-half-back against East Perth. Farmer, one of the most promising ruckmen in league football, played well against Grant Campbell, but I still believe his rightful position is in the ruck. But at least he is playing league football. He has had problems getting there and hopefully he can now settle down and show his true ability.

And they should be able to achieve that objective.

Graham Kickett represents danger for the Royals.

He has been in damaging form around the goals and as a ruck rover midfield for East Fremantle in recent weeks and he could have a big bearing on the outcome.

In addition, Murray Wrensted returned to his best form last Saturday; Paul Harding has been dominant in the ruck and Colin Waterson has given them a sure avenue to goal at centre-half-forward.

For East Perth to have any chance of beating the Sharks, Peter Spencer must be at his peak, Grant Campbell and John Scott have to return to goalkicking form and they will need a better effort from their wingmen.

Those two players should give East Perth better service across the middle.

However, East Fremantle appear to have too much talent and they should remain at the top of the premiership table.

Last chance for Demons

PERTH are on their last chance to keep their slim final four hopes alive.

The loss to East Fremantle last week after a couple of promising performances means that they are now under pressure to get themselves off the bottom of the table.

They meet second bottom side Claremont on Saturday, but the Tigers are in form and should win.

It is a game of tremendous importance for both sides, the Tigers appear to have an edge in talent around the ground and that should see them through.

With Darrell Panizza, Steve Malaxos and Allen Daniels all returning to form, Claremont suddenly look a formidable combination.

The performances of ruckmen David O'Connell and David Court have also been most impressive and their duel with Rhett Baynes should be a highlight.

Perth will need big efforts from Robert Wiley, Bryan Cousins and Peter Bosustow.

Subiaco's future on line

SUBIACO are at the cross-roads.

The Lions have lifted their rating this year to be a chance to play in the finals; but a lot of their hard work has come undone in the last fortnight.

Two losses in as many matches has seen them slide down the ladder and their game against South Fremantle this week is crucial to their prospects.

Channel 9 and Western Underwriters offered the Lions a \$100,000 incentive to make the four and this match could give them their best guide as to whether they will need to pay out.

Unfortunately Subiaco meet South Fremantle when the Bulldogs are starting to play their best football.

After a mid-season slump they returned to the winners' circle with a strong display against West Perth last Saturday.

Swans back in business

SWAN Districts snapped out of their temporary lull when they were big winners last week and they are ready to prove they are capable of defending their crown as WA premiers.

Swans were impressive in disposing of Subiaco and next on their hit list is West Perth.

The Falcons faltered when they were well beaten by South Fremantle and they will need a big lift if they are to take the points away from Swans.

Murray Rance gave an outstanding performance for Swans at centre-half-back last week and he could have a big bearing on the outcome of this match.

In addition Steve Richardson produced one of his best games of the season as a half-forward and talented young ruckman Peter Sartori — the star of last year's final round — made a fine return to league football.

That trio, together with Jon Fogarty, Don Langsford, Brad Shine and Keith Narkle, should provide the impetus for a Swans victory.

Let's not argue with 'Toddy'

WHY was Kevin Taylor selected in the State squad after only half a league game?

Good question some are saying. They are the ones who feel it is grossly unfair that a player who has returned from the VFL with his tail between his legs should get such privileged treatment without proving he deserves selection.

I'm one who believes he should have had to win his State spurs.

But who can argue with State coach John Todd?

He's on a purple patch in big games. If he wanted to include someone in the team from Port Hedland Rovers there would be those who would stand by him.

Todd appears to have taken out insurance with the selection of Taylor — he

is also banking on his reputation for performing on Subiaco Oval.

Taylor has shown he can't handle the pressure-cooker atmosphere of the VFL. But that is a completely different situation to WA, where players are allowed a free rein.

Taylor plays a loose man game to perfection, and given latitude, which he manages to obtain without much trouble in WA, he can be a very damaging player.

But if he doesn't put in a good performance in the next two weeks he should not be selected in the WA side for the 'grand final' against Victoria.

I don't go along with the theory that there is a dearth of rovers in WA.

Michael Mitchell, Bryan Cousins, Les Fong and Roger Kerr have the credentials to represent WA.

Some of those rovers deserve selection — yet none is in the squad.

But, as I said, I'm not about to argue with Todd. I can't recall a WA coach who has had such a run in big matches.

HAT-TRICK

He's in line for two remarkable achievements. Steering Swan Districts to a hat-trick of premierships and becoming the first WA coach to win successive Australian championships.

It's typical of Todd that he is prepared to stick with players he feels are prepared to put in.

Few would argue that the team of rookies who went to SA met a more polished combination — yet they were able to pinch the game from the Croweaters.

While some of those players will be disappointed at missing out because of the inclusion of expatriates in the VFL, it is good to see Todd has kept most of them in the squad.

With only one set of fixtures before the State game it could be argued that a 36-man squad is unnecessary.

But it is good thinking on the part of Todd to have such a big contingent. For a start it will mean he is working with a substantial squad of Perth-based players.

More importantly, it will help retain the spirit that took WA to victory over SA.

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BLUE FIN STARS OF THE DAY

GRANT CAMPBELL (East Perth): Had an interesting duel with Dean Farmer before breaking away in the last quarter and contributing solidly at centre-half-forward. Had 12 kicks, eight marks and six handballs.

RICHARD LYNCH (South Fremantle): Played a leading role for the Bulldogs on a wing where he continually pumped the ball forward. One of the finds for South this year. Had 13 kicks, took three marks and made 10 handpasses.

BRAD SHINE (Swan Districts): Won his club's award with a brilliant 65 metre goal which bounced over the top of a pack. Showed glimpses of his best form with 10 kicks, three marks and five handpasses.

LEN GANDINI (Perth): He was a top player for the Demons from a half-back flank. Repelled many East Fremantle attacking moves and finished with 15 kicks and four marks.

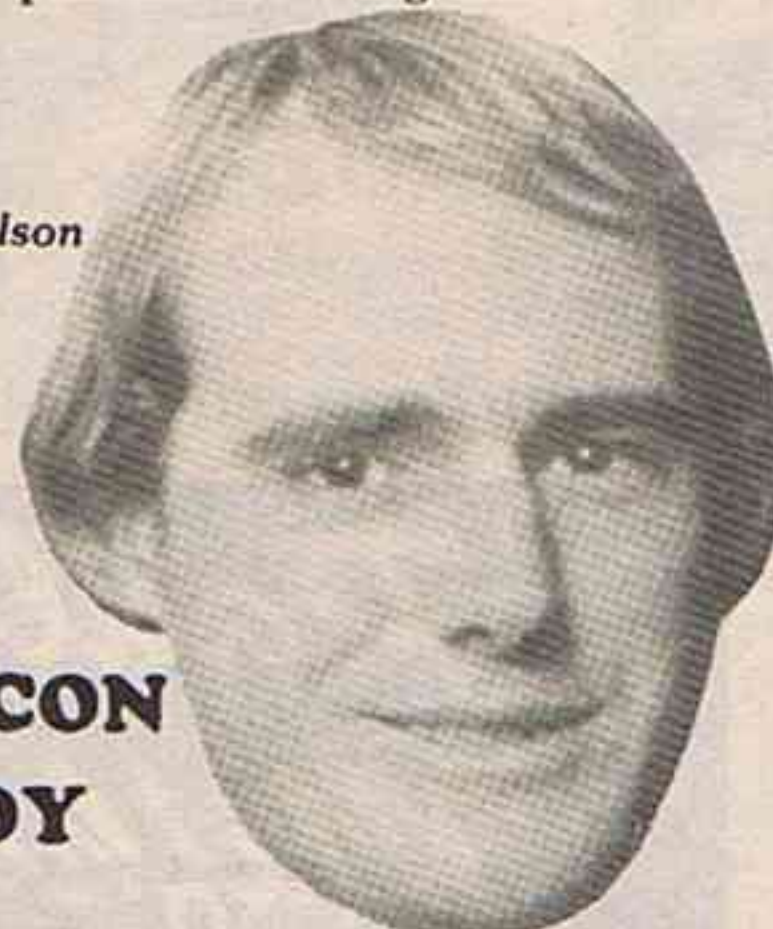
CHEQUEBOOK TOUR

POOR SHOW

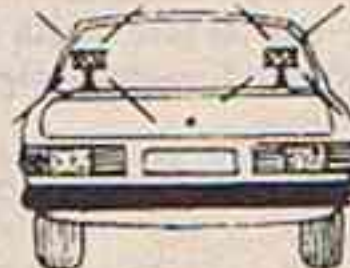

He is a youngster who loves playing the game — something which came to the fore when he offered his advice to juniors with league football aspirations.

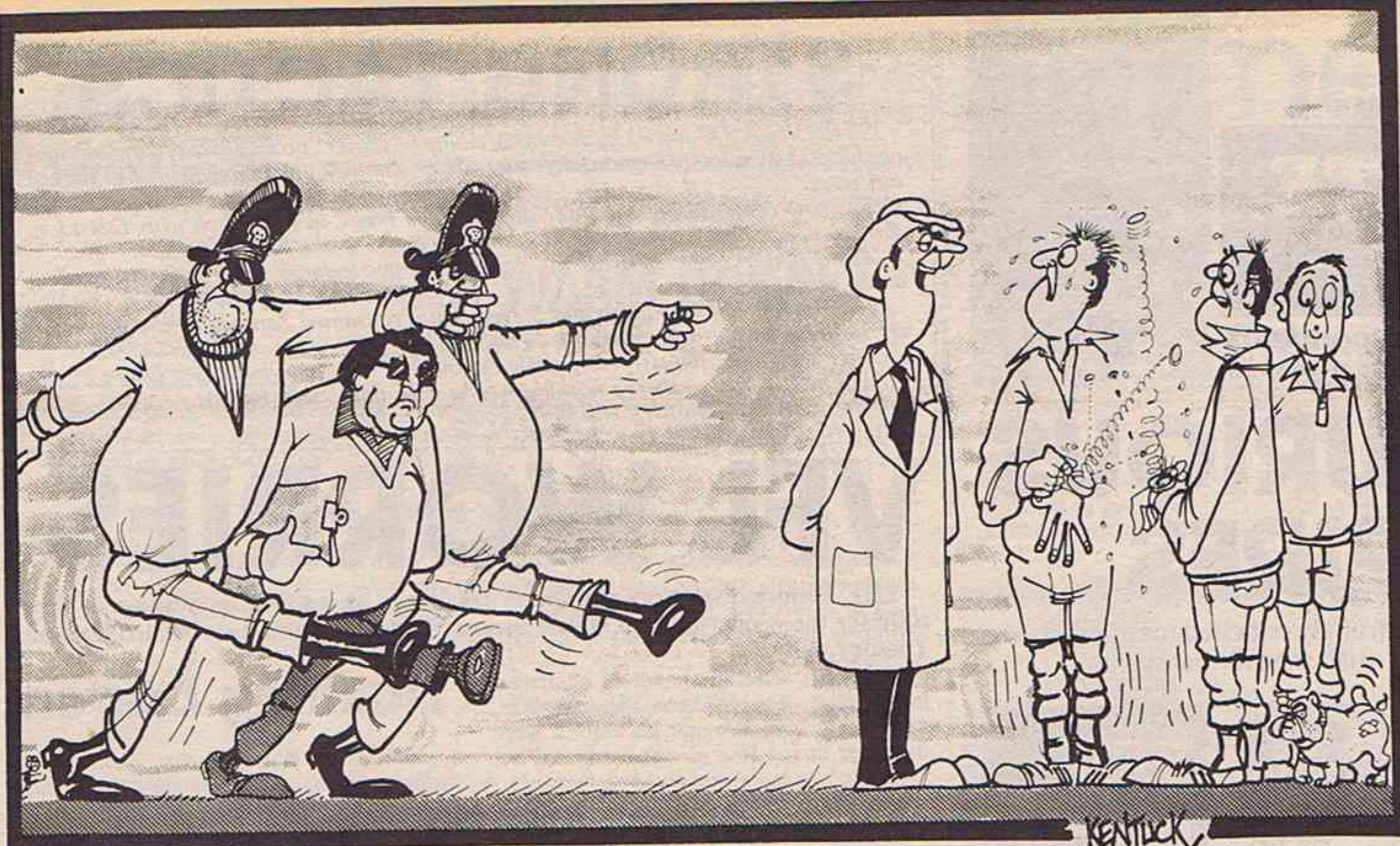
Mifka stressed the importance of not playing for the money he can make, merely for the enjoyment which can be gained.

FOOTBALL FACTS

Leaders in any club colours

TO BE selected as a league club captain is a great honour.

It is something which is bestowed upon a chosen few, but to skipper two senior clubs is extremely rare.

There are plenty of players who became automatic captains on their appointment as a playing coach, but there are only a handful to have achieved the feat without taking up the coaching reins.

Some of the automatic captains of two clubs were Jack Sheedy (East Fremantle and East Perth), Mal Brown (East Perth and Claremont), Barry Cable (East Perth and Perth), Haydn Bunton (Swan Districts and Subiaco), Frank Sparrow (Swans and West Perth as a coach and East Perth as a player), Mal Atwell (East Perth as a player and Perth as a coach), Don Scott (West Perth and Swans), Steve Marsh (South Fremantle as a player and East Fremantle as a coach), Jack Sweet (East Perth and Subiaco) — and probably a few more.

DIFFICULT

Looking for a captain of two different clubs without being the coach was a little more difficult. I could find only two cases.

This unique honour belongs to Graham Melrose, who captained East Fremantle from 1972 to 1974 and Swans in 1982, leading both clubs to premierships at the same time.

The other player to captain two clubs is Don Marinko.

He was coach of West Perth in 1959 and when Arthur Oliver took over in that capacity in 1960 Marinko was elected captain. He was replaced mid-way through that season by Brian Foley.

Two years later he was appointed captain of East Perth during the Sheedy era.

The only player to have captained three league teams in the 100 years of football here is Frank Sparrow, captain of East Perth in 1951, captain-coach of Swans from 1953-55 and captain-coach of West Perth in 1956.

HOW'S THIS DENNIS

A COUPLE of weeks ago West Perth coach Dennis Cometti showed his displeasure at the umpires when his side played Claremont.

I wonder what the coaches would have had to say when these two teams met in 1934. Claremont received only seven frees for the entire game, five in the first quarter and two in the third.

On the other hand, West Perth received 21 free kicks.

The coaches in that year were Nugget Gepp at Claremont and Johnny Leonard at West Perth.

In the 16 years I have been researching football this tally of seven is the lowest I have seen.

DON'S GAME

THE selection of East Fremantle rover Kevin Taylor in the State squad after playing only half a game might have been surprising, but it is nothing new.

I recall when the selectors chose the team for the 1961 carnival in Brisbane (which WA won) and they included a player who had played only two quarters on the day the squad was picked.

He was former Melbourne player Don Williams, who played at centre-half-forward in West Perth's 1960 premiership side. That was his last full game before being selected to represent WA.

CROWD PUZZLE

GRAND finals normally attract the biggest crowds, but 1932 provided an exception.

The second semi final between East Fremantle and West Perth attracted 17,800 people, but the title game a fortnight later between West Perth and East Perth drew only 16,755 and the weather was fine on both days.

SORRY 'IVO'

JUST to put the record straight there was a typographical error last week when I was talking about that famous umpire who was almost perfect. His name was Harrold Crapp, better known as Ivo.

PARKIN FURIOUS AT UMPIRES

CARLTON coach David Parkin has strongly criticised umpires who he says are letting "head-hunters" get away with a terror campaign.

He was angry at what he felt was a lack of protection given to his star rover Alex Marcou.

He fired verbal bullets at rival coaches who have complained about the number of frivolous reports.

"Marcou has been obliterated twice in the past two games without a whimper from the umpires," Parkin said.

"At a recent coaches meeting some of the coaches were right into Bill Deller (the umpires adviser) about frivolous reports.

"In the recent Geelong-Carlton game there were nine reportable incidents — our players included — but not one of them was knocked off."

Parkin, who revealed that he had paid a \$2500 fine issued on the club for his recent comments on umpires, said that Marcou had become a marked man by bigger, stronger players who regarded him as an easy target.



Parkin said that the first five Carlton players he saw when he walked out on the ground for his quarter-time address, were all bleeding from the face and head.

"If we don't get the game right at the upper level, we will have nobody playing it," said Parkin.

"We have a lot of skilful players who need protection."

THE GODFATHER

LINDSAY Fox, the president of financially-troubled St Kilda, says that he has spent half a million dollars of his own money to keep the Saints alive.

He said that the decision by the creditors to accept the 22.5 cents and 7.5 cents in the dollar was absolutely necessary even though the club has been trading at a slight profit for the last two years.

"When I took over we had \$900,000 in income and liabilities of \$1.6 million," he said.

"So we lost \$700,000." Mr Fox said that a lot of people had been forced to make sacrifices for the club they loved.

He paid key creditors like Allan Jeans, Alex Jesaulenko, Barry Breen and others a huge compliment. Their acceptance of the offer saved the day, he said.

Defending a decision to press ahead with a scheme of arrangement that forced Jeans to pay the balance of money owing on a block of land that he had been given as part-payment, Mr Fox said that these were the types of sacrifices needed.

He said that he personally had committed more than \$430,000 owed to players and coaches alone.

ALIEN HAWKS

ST KILDA coach Tony Jewell thinks that his players have mental problems accepting the challenge of games against Hawthorn.

"We were overawed by Hawthorn at training on Thursday night," said Jewell.

"And we were overawed by them on Saturday.

"For some reason our boys think that Hawthorn footballers are supernatural beings from outer space. They think they are invincible."

ANGRY TIGER

RICHMOND'S shattered coach Mike Patterson could not conceal his anger after the Tigers were thrashed by Carlton last week.

The often-genial coach screamed at a pressman who approached him after the game to ask where the Tigers were going — and what his future was.

"We've just been thrashed," he said. "I've got more important things to worry about than questions like that."

Melbourne's Peter Moore is likely to play at centre-half-forward with Mark Lee and Simon Madden getting the ruck roles.

DARREN Williams, the Essendon star who played three games with East Fremantle in 1980, has a new nickname — silver.

Bombers coach Kevin Sheedy gave him the nickname when he turned up for training with a dyed silver streak in his hair.

Williams, one of Essendon's real stars this year as a rover, had his hair tinted when he visited his girlfriend's hairdressing salon.

But pop culture fan or not, Williams has shown plenty of courage this year, playing the last three games with a fractured cheekbone.

Nunan keeps his job

NORTH Adelaide have reappointed Mike Nunan as coach for the 1985 season.

North's president Kelly Baker ended recent speculation that Nunan would be sacked.

He said that despite being on the bottom of the SANFL table, Nunan had the complete support of the management and players.

Nunan is in his fourth season as coach of North. Last year they finished fourth; in 1982 they were seventh and in 1981 they finished eighth.

There has been widespread criticism of Nunan for some time and the club's No.1 rover and Magarey Medallist, Tony Antrobus, said on television that Nunan did not mix or communicate with the players.



BOWLED OVER

THE SA National Football League is upset that International cricket will not be played at Football Park next season.

As a teenager he was a member of East Perth's 1978 premiership team.

Skwirowski is one of the closest-checking defenders in the game and would make kicks for the resting rovers hard to come by.

Kelly is currently on the injured list, but he has shown ability in defence and could hold down a half-back flank with any team in the competition. He can also be played forward of the centre.

Christian made his mark in South West football as a forward, but he is one of the outstanding young defenders in the WAFL. He is currently working his way through the reserves because of injury.

Walsh is the current East Perth captain, but is also on the injured list. He has played over 150 games with the Royals and has stamped himself as an efficient half-back.

Pike began his career with Swan Districts and has since moved to East Fremantle, where he has played a couple of solid games on the wing.

Davidson has played mainly on a wing, but has the capacity to play as a rover or ruck rover.

Dawson has the capacity to be a damaging half-forward. Wilson's height would be an advantage at centre-half-forward and Keith Narkle's experience and guile would be handy on the other flank.

Jeffrey could be used as a ruck rover or rover and Cocker and Ironmonger would change at full-forward.

Fogarty has stamped himself as a class half-back. However, he has also enjoyed success as a ruck rover and recently made his interstate debut.

Shine is a suitable rover because he burrows into the packs and feeds the ball out.

State cricketer Darrin Ramshaw has shown outstanding promise in the Perth colts side in recent weeks — complicating his sporting future somewhat.

Ramshaw, the son of former Perth full-back Graham Ramshaw, was 12th man on two occasions for WA in their Shield campaign last season.

If young Ramshaw reaches the top in both sports, he will have to make a decision on which sport, because of the training demands of modern day football.

Another sportsman with this predicament is brilliant Port Adelaide centreman Craig Bradley, who has achieved this unique double.

Bradley has had several overtures from the VFL and is likely to choose the more lucrative VFL instead of the unpredictable life of a State and international cricketer.

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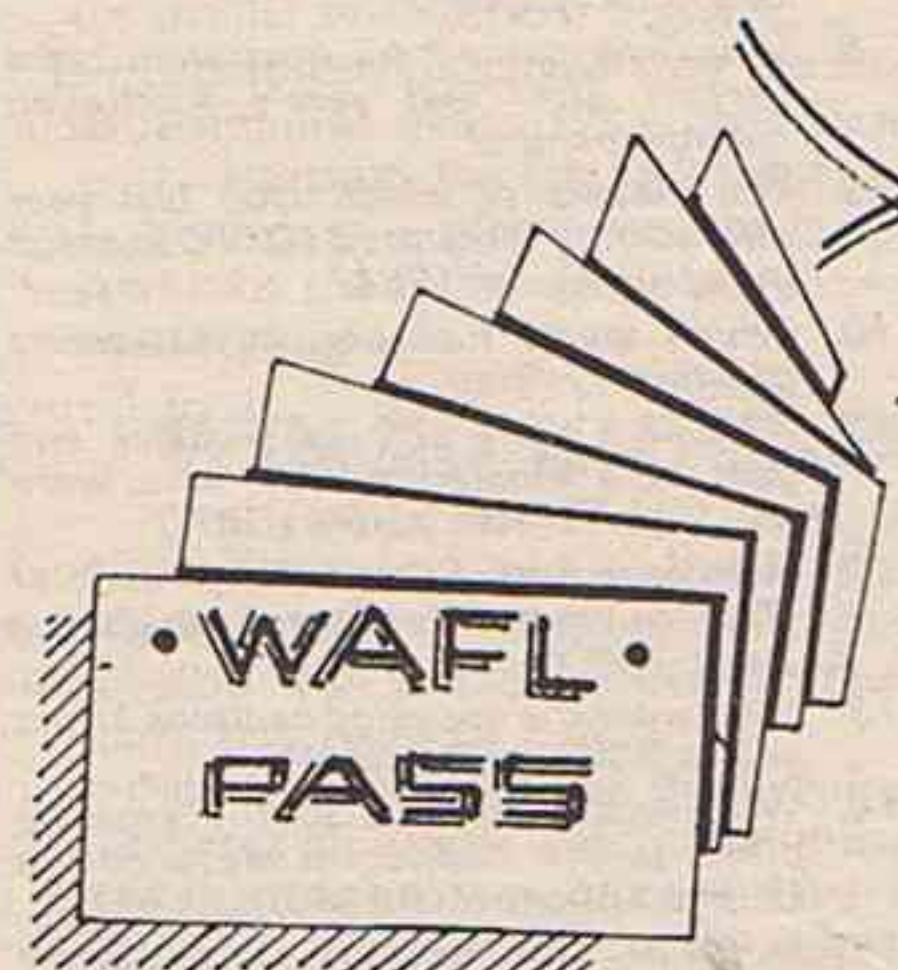
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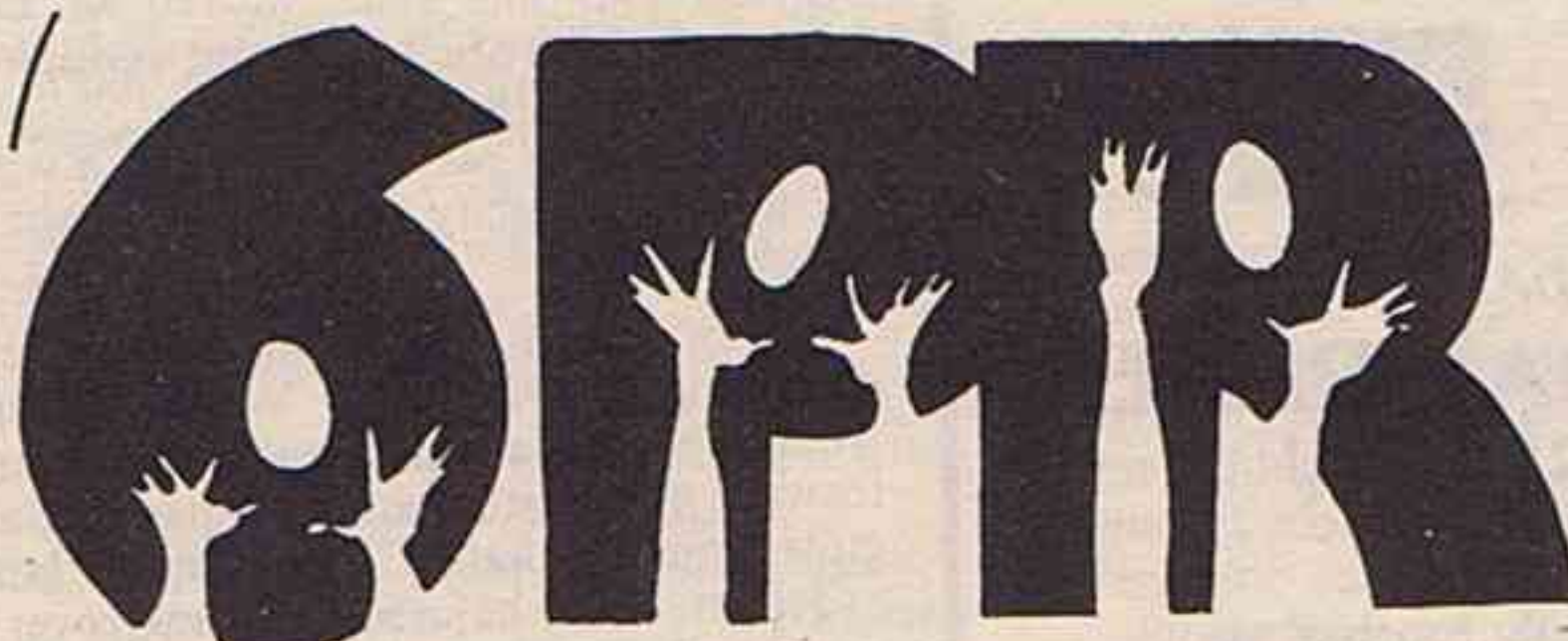

Bradmore saves his own future

ONE of WA's most flamboyant and recognisable football characters seemed destined for obscurity a few weeks back.

West Perth utility player Phil Bradmore was languishing in the reserves and he was not playing well enough to be promoted. "Spok", as he has become known to Falcons fans, played the first four games of the season in the senior side, but could not find any form and was promptly dropped down a grade.

Five weeks later he was given another chance — but failed.

When he was given yet another opportunity a fortnight ago, he was playing for his football future.

This time he responded to the challenge of playing at centre-half-back and was one of his side's best players. And he followed that up with another top performance in a losing side against South Fremantle on Saturday.

Bradmore joined West Perth on the clearance deadline in 1981 and made a sensational debut in WA football when he kicked eight goals against East Fremantle on June 13.

SENSATIONAL

But it was unlikely his career in the west would be as sensational as his first-up appearance.

The Falcons kicked 37.17 that day. The 25-year-old Bradmore enjoyed his best season in WA football in 1982 when he was a prime mover behind West Perth's rise to prominence when they played in the finals.

Since then he has had more than his share of ups and downs, but he looks to have at last found his niche in the key defensive position.

It was a twist of fate which saw him promoted to league level once again.

When Noel Mugavin dislocated a shoulder against East Fremantle, Bradmore was the logical choice to come into the side at centre-half-back.

PS: John Duckworth, your comments about Malcolm being able to get away with abusing umpires is just sour grapes, because you appeared before the tribunal so often.



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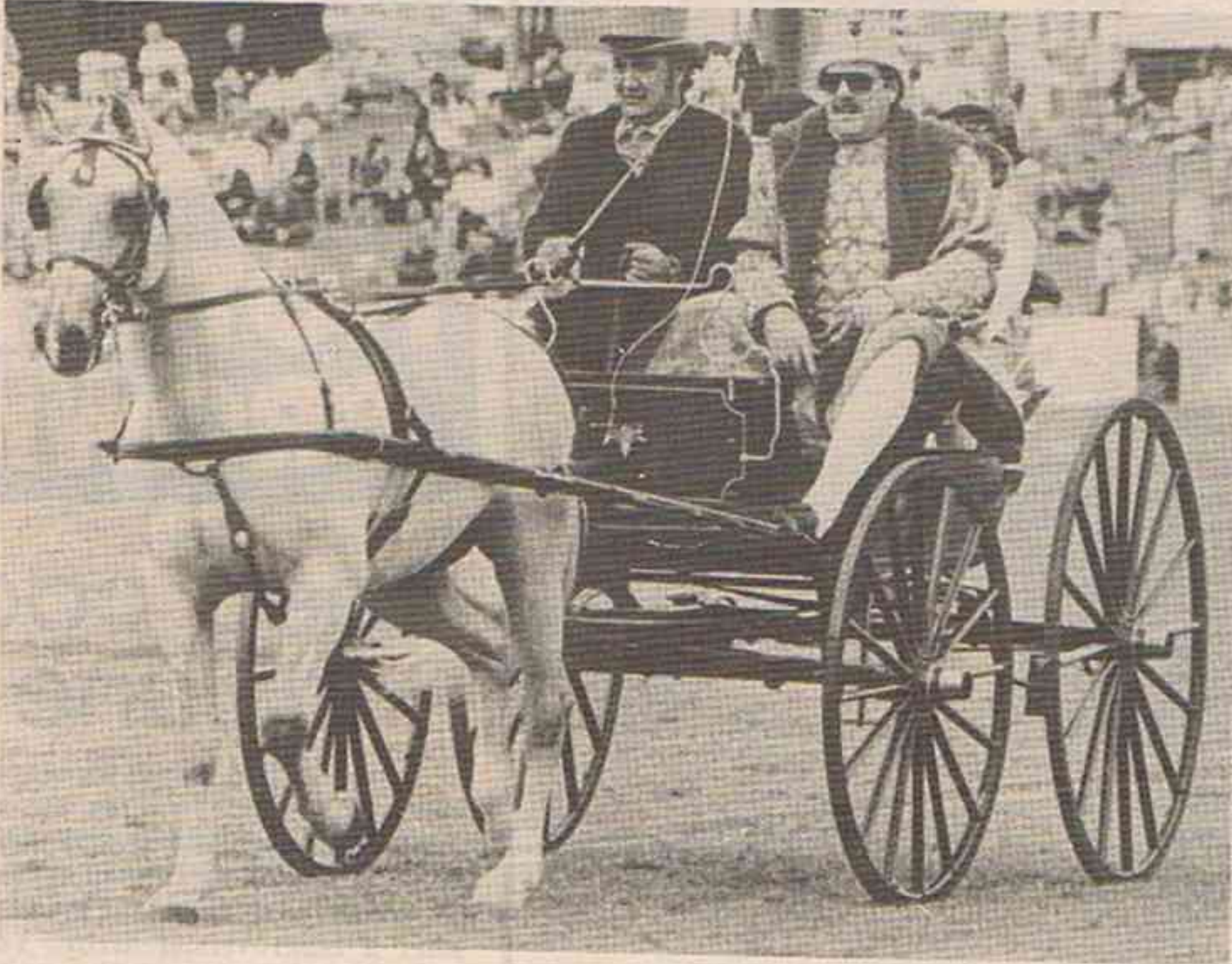

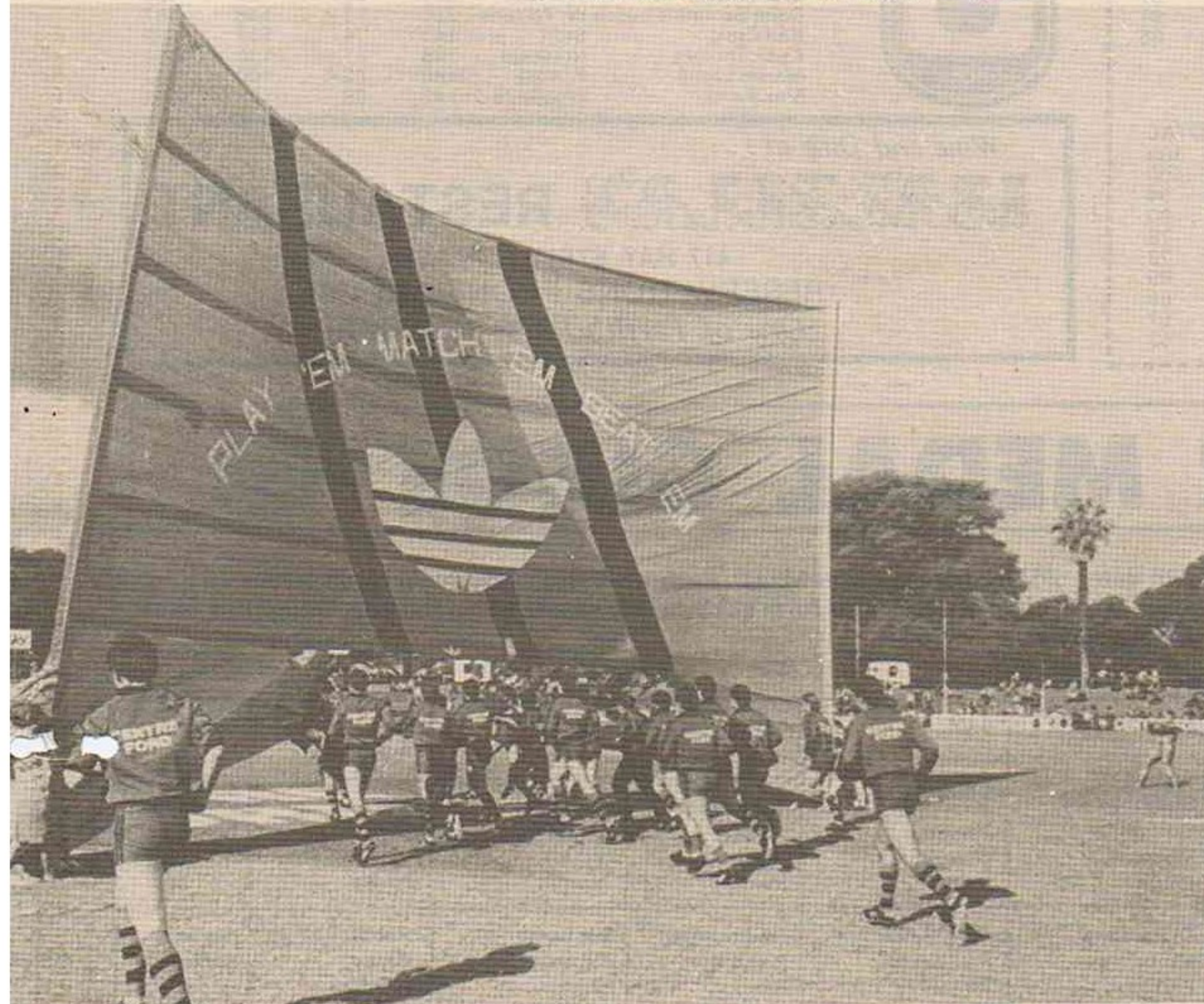

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WARM-UP AND WARM-DOWN

Introduction

Before competition or training it is important to prepare muscles for the work to come. Just as importantly, the muscle at the end of the work period must be assisted in its recovery.

WARM-UP

The reasons for warm-up are the effect it has on improved performance and its function in preventing injury. Warming up involves the increasing of circulation to a particular area and activating the muscle's energy systems. Warm-up is also related to stimulation of hormonal resources and the alerting of the nervous system.

1. Passive methods of warming up such as hot showers and massage have proven adequate.
2. Warm-up must be specific to the task at hand, e.g. warm-up for endurance activity should be designed to take the working muscles through the anaerobic stage in order to reach the point where heart rate, ventilation rate and oxygen transport to working muscles are all at an adequate level, allowing the athlete to reach "second wind" prior to the start of competition.
3. It has been indicated that in strength and high power events, the muscles should be overloaded before performance. In such events the tasks should be performed at a level below the maximum to conclude the warm-up. This acts as a warning system to the muscles. This rehearsal may excite nerve fibres to a point where a greater number of muscle fibres may be stimulated on the next performance.
4. Speed and power events also need to be simulated before competition. It is in these events that muscle tearing is a commonplace mishap due to the force and speed of the contraction. A build-up to maximum effort is very important for prevention of injury and for optimal performance.

And out on the field, the runner is the crucial communications link between the coach and the active participants — the players.

Todd has used a variety of players in that capacity over the years, including former veteran Steve Gillespie, who served faithfully after his retirement before opting for a coaching commitment in the Sunday Football League.

Now the job has gone to former Subiaco player and runner Gary Tester, who teaches at the nearby Guildford Primary School and is a physical education expert with a great love of running.

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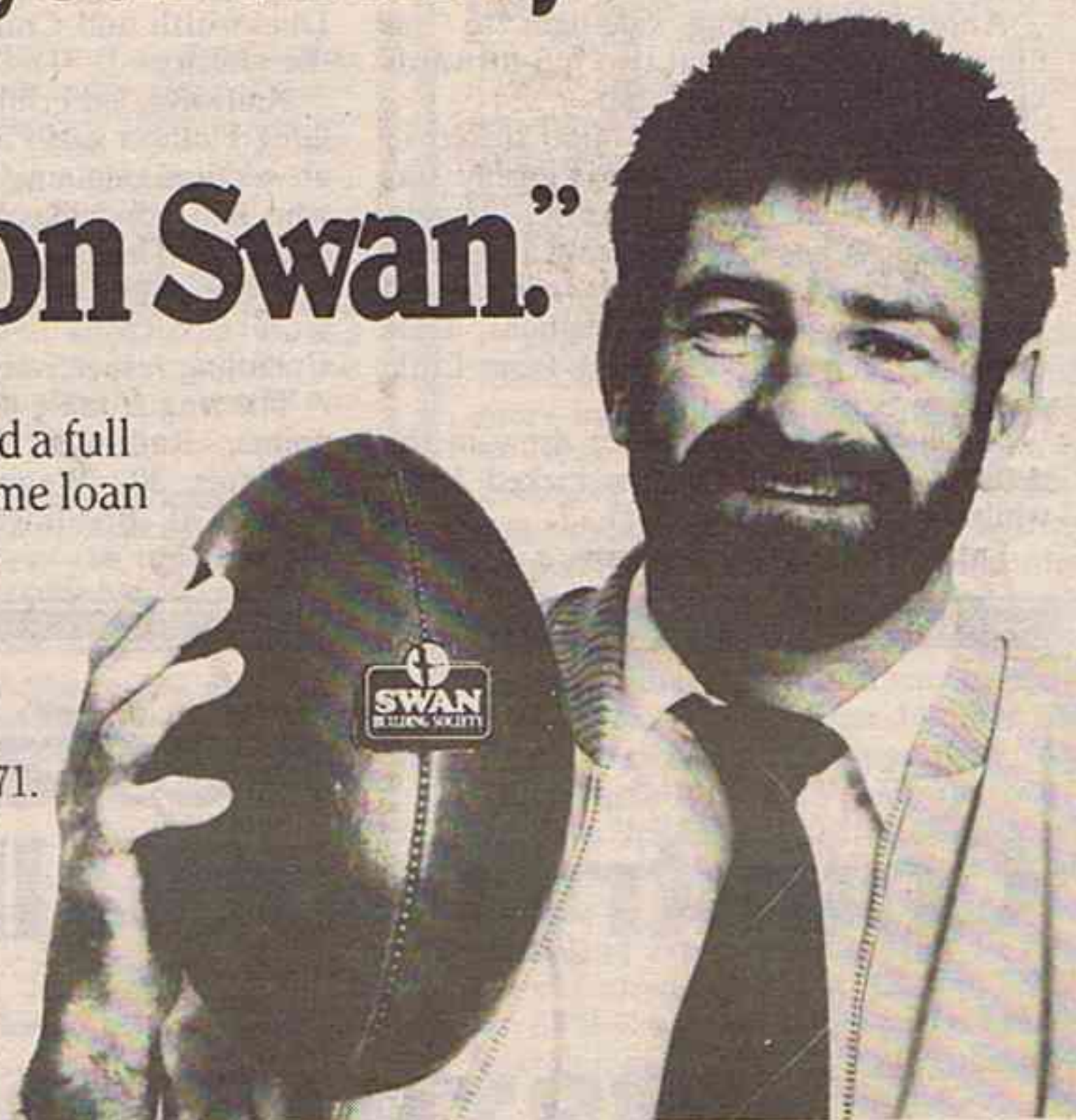

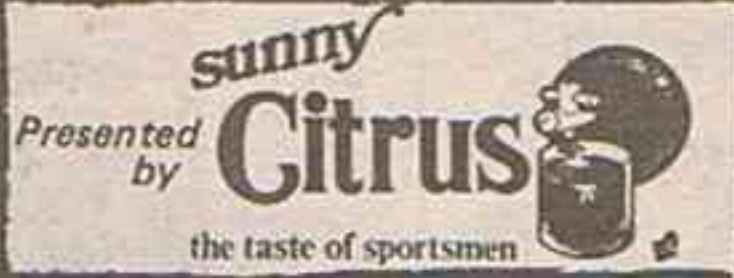

Final round eligibility

CLUB officials are reminded of the qualifications to participate in final rounds.

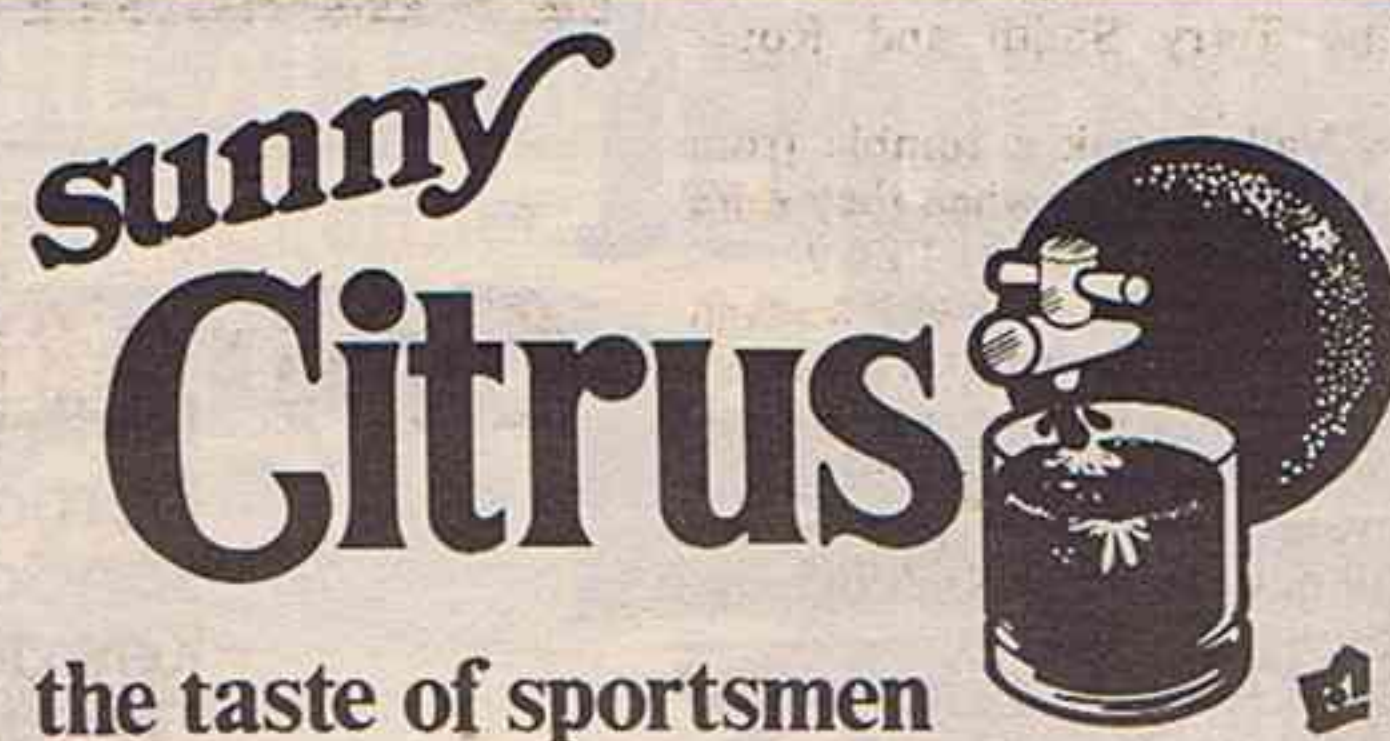

His greatest presence at the Bulldogs must be the example of commitment to the club through success and failure, something I'm sure many of the younger Bulldogs could take a leaf out of his book.



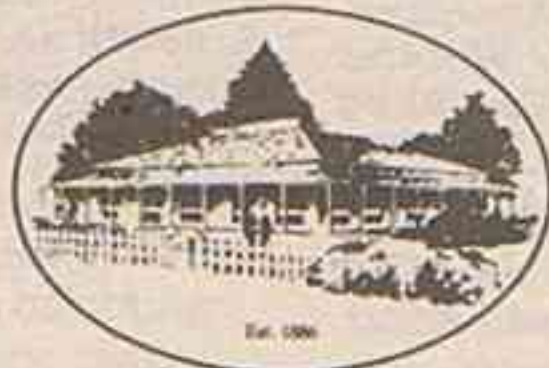
