Cable issues a . . . WARNING

FOOTBALL dynamo Barry Cable has issued a warning to WA fans — don't underestimate the Vics when they come to town next Tuesday.

Cable, who was a key figure in WA's inaugural State-of-Origin win over Victoria in 1977, warns that this will be a very good Victorian side.

"They have picked all in-form players," says the former roving master who has coached and played in both States with distinction.

"For the first time ever, the selectors have been given an open hand at picking the best players in Victoria.

"There might be some new names among the Victorian squad, but there are some great players in the team."

Cable warned that players like Jim Buckley, Terry Daniher, Simon Madden, Des English, Rod Ashman, Gary Pert and Paul van der Haar would be tough opponents for the WA camp to counter.

CHAMPION

"And watch out for Dermott Brereton," said Cable. "He's a champion of the future."

"The WA camp cannot afford to be too confident about their chances; these Victorians will be determined to atone for previous losses in the West under the State-of-Origin concept."

Cable was full of praise for the VFL decision that has allowed open selection for this game.

"I've always believed that the best players should be allowed to earn State selection," he says.

"This year all the VFL coaches agreed to open selection.

"If a player is good enough to wear the big V jumper, then he should not be prevented from doing so because of a selection restriction."

SELECTORS

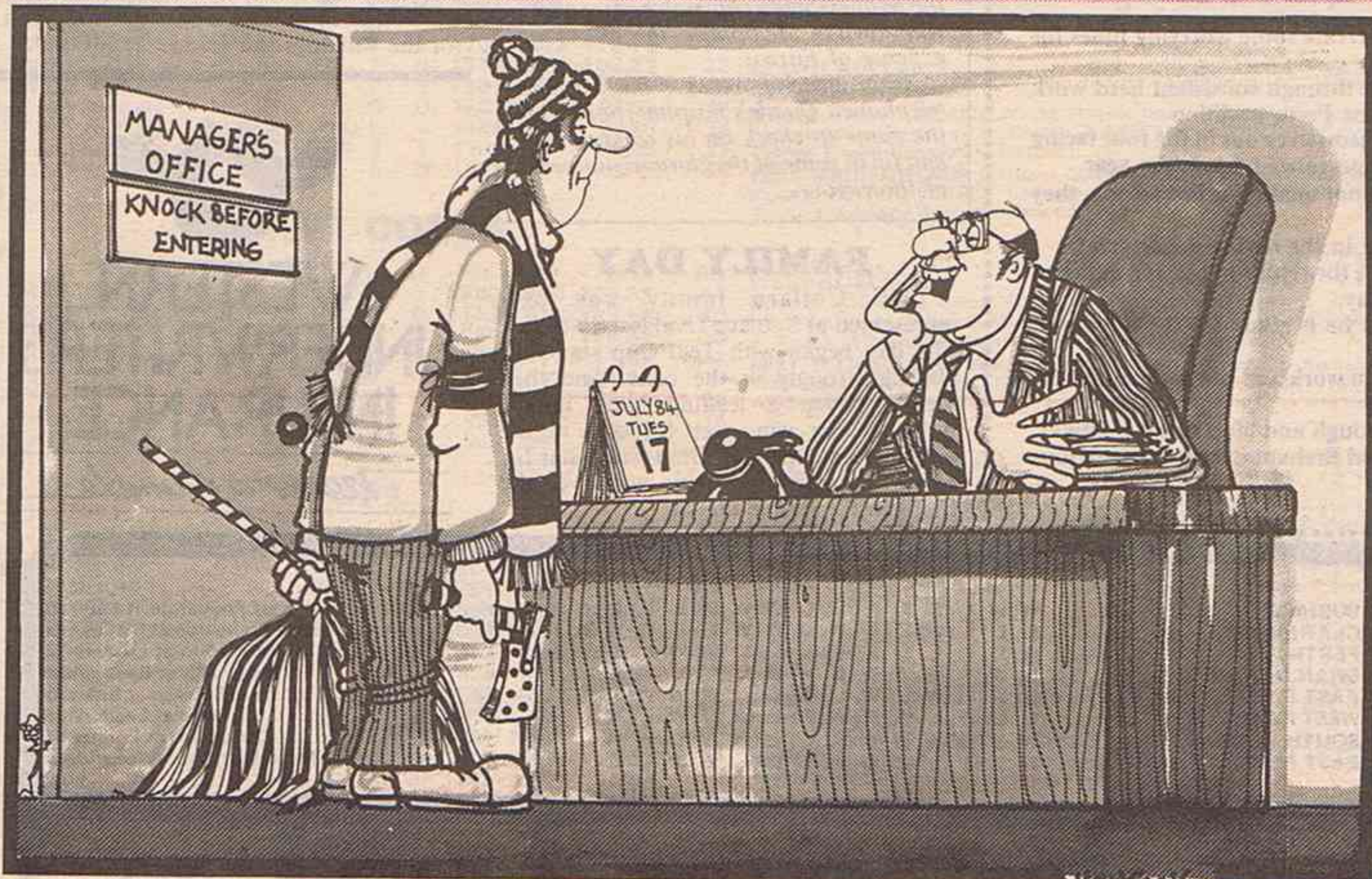
"But I would have liked the VFL to go one step further and allow the WA selectors an open go when it comes to taking former players out of VFL teams. Some VFL clubs have two or three WA players entitled to selection."

"The Vics are really serious about winning this game, so WA had better be on their guard."

Cable, currently battling to keep North Melbourne off the bottom of the VFL table, says he is not disappointed that the Roos did not have a player in the VFL squad.

"We are in a rebuilding process at present and our good players just haven't been fit enough or playing well enough to earn a spot," he said.

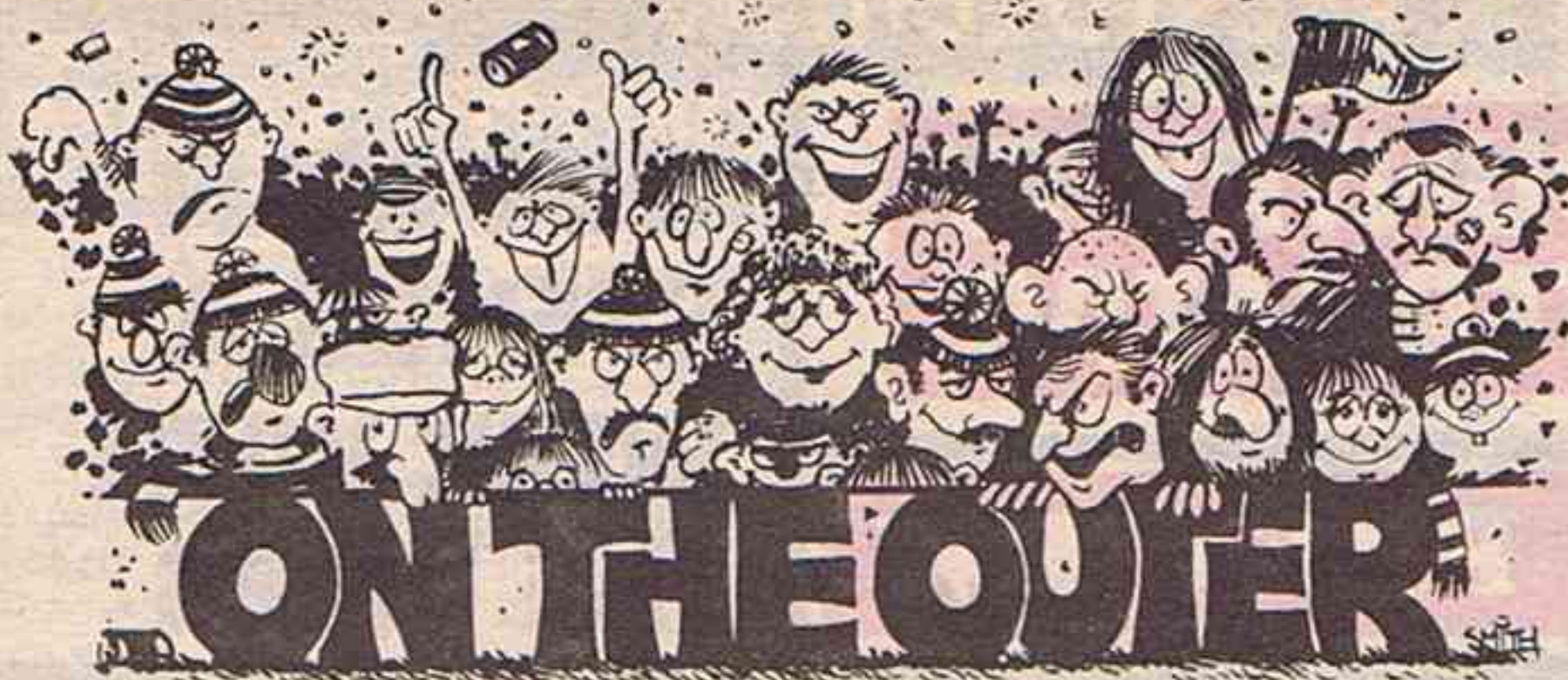

Beware the Vic talent scouts

AS John Todd and his State squad prepare to defend the Australian football crown next Tuesday, it is hoped that there is another team of men also getting ready for the Victorians.

No matter how tight the rules and regulations are concerning clearances between the Victorians and WA, the VFL talent scouts will be out to lure as many of our young stars to Melbourne as possible.

The closeness of WA football this year is partly associated with the amazing wealth of talent in the competition.

The scouting motto of "be prepared" will need to be applied in reverse as the hungry Victorian scouts move in to view proceedings at Subiaco Oval next week.

The WA Board of Directors will be the men who must build a defensive barrier to the Vics to slow down their taking of our players to the bright lights of the VFL.

While no-one will go out of their way to prevent any aspiring player transferring to the mecca of Australian football and we can ill-afford a similar exodus of playing talent that has characterised off-season movements in recent years.

Many of the WA players will get close attention from the talent scouts.

Prime targets of attention will be East Fremantle's Paul Harding, Claremont's Steve Malaxos, Souths Brad Hardie and Swans' Murray Rance and Jon Fogarty.

But in view of the way relations were strained at the start of 1984 over

clearances, the Board must take a firm stand in their endeavours to protect the interest of local clubs and WA football.

The coming big event at Subiaco Oval takes on a double importance.

Todd and his boys face the task of proving once and for all that WA is THE force behind Australian football and that we can survive quite adequately here in the West without the worry of losing all our talent to the Victorians.

Sure the talent scouts will be there; they are an accepted part of any interstate clash.

But let's make them work hard for whatever and whoever they think they will take home with them.

OTWAY BACK . . . THE SOONER THE BETTER

EAST Perth's loss to top side East Fremantle will create some worrying times for coach Greg Brehaut.

The Royals had worked their way into the top four through consistent hard work and enthusiasm that is so much a hallmark of the East Perth tradition.

But after their lack-lustre second half, they found themselves out of the four facing an uphill battle to regain a berth enabling a finals appearance later in the year.

The Royals seldom miss out on the finals and after not qualifying last season, they are desperate to make it in 1984.

Brehaut was critical post-game of his lack of talent in the roving department. So it will be a pleasing aspect for the Royals — to see the return to playing duties of one of the hardest workers in the game, Wayne Otway.

Otway played reserves for the Royals and showed he is ready for the rigours of league football.

The Royals formula for success revolves around team work and commitment to the team.

If ever there was a player to carry that tradition through and lift a side it is Otway. His career is typified with grit and determination and Brehaut is sure to be anxious for a quick return of Otway to the senior side.

EAST Fremantle, the most traditional of the eight WAFL clubs, have also won more premierships than any other club in the land and on Saturday night they honoured one of their great teams. The 1965 premiership side will be the guests of the club on Saturday night and among those who will return are former captain-coach Bob Johnson and ace ruckman Tony Casserley. That will be the start of a big week. On Sunday the Sharks host the World of Sport programme and on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday next week they have a big promotion planned for Garden City Shopping Centre. Former stars now playing in the VFL like Brian Peake, Jim Sewell and Ken Judge, along with Hawthorn players who make the Victorian team, and the East Fremantle senior side, will go to the Booragoon centre to hold handball and kicking competitions. The Hawks players in WA will be looked after by the port club during their visit to the West.

MICHAEL RECOVERY

SOUTH Fremantle champion Stephen Michael has not been his usual devastating self this year; but there are signs that he is on the improve. The All-Australian captain has been troubled by a knee injury all year, restricting his effect in league matches. However, last week he worked hard as a loose man in defence and at centre-half-forward and he could be running into some of his old form. That was his second good game in succession and it would be great for WA football for the brilliant Bulldog to shake of the effects of the nagging injury.

QUADE ILL

FORMER Sydney Swans coach Ricky Quade is still ill in hospital and will have specialist tests this week.

Mrs Sonya Quade said that her husband was not responding to treatment for a bleeding stomach ulcer and they were concerned for his health.

The Quades watched the match live on television in their Sydney hospital as the Sydney-based club notched up a rare win down in Melbourne, this one at the expense of Fitzroy.

Swans general manager Barry Lyons telephoned Quade's hospital room after the game to check on his condition — and fill in some of the glorious moments of the victory.

FAMILY DAY

THE Collard family was well represented at Subiaco Oval last Saturday. The day began with Teal Cup star Cliff playing strongly in the colts. And then Derek played a leading hand in the Bulldogs big win over Subiaco in the reserves. To cap it off, Brad was a star for South Fremantle in their win over the Lions in the league match.



WHAT A WINNER!

"IT beats losing," was the comment from newly-appointed Sydney Swans coach Bob Hammond last Saturday.

Hammond, the surprise choice to take over from Ricky Quade, knew most of his players via the television screen as he watched the VFL matches live back in Adelaide.

"I can only thank the guys for being so disciplined and showing such character and spirit," he said after the game.

Hammond said that being an interstate coach was not a disadvantage even if VFL history was filled with failures from across the border.

"What we do is in our own hands," he said.

Hammond preferred not to divulge what he told the players before the game, except to say that he had to win their confidence.

It was a remarkable achievement as he only took over mid-week.

"We will take every game as it comes," said Hammond, who insisted that he was approaching the job in a positive fashion.

FAMILIAR FACES

THE reserves game at Subiaco Oval last Saturday provided a couple of familiar faces and among them were Subiaco's Michael Mort and South Fremantle's Chris Stasinowsky, John Begg and Michael Cockie. Mort made a name for himself when he burst on to the league football scene two years ago as a schoolboy, but injuries had seen him out of action for almost 12 months. Although carrying a little weight he showed he had lost none of his skill and will be a fine player for the Lions later in the year. Stasinowsky has played just one league game this year. That was a few weeks ago when he played poorly and his league career looked in doubt. But he played well in the reserves and proved that he is worth another chance at the top level. Begg's football has always been interrupted because of his work as a geologist and this season had been considered a virtual write-off for him. But he returned from South Australia early and played well in defence. Cockie has spent most of this season on the sidelines, but he showed flashes of the class which made him such a valuable wingman for the Bulldogs last year.

Spotlight will be on best in the land

THE Australian Rules spotlight will focus on Subiaco Oval on Tuesday when WA meets Victoria with the title of Australian Champion at stake.

The stage is set for a titanic battle when WA defend the crown won so magnificently in 1983.

Unprecedented interest has been generated in the game by Victoria and WA narrowly defeating South Australia in Adelaide in two of the best interstate clashes for years.

The Victorians have rightly altered their selection guidelines to ensure that their best footballers will be available to represent their State.

With WA being able to select their Victorian-based players, a magnificent game should be assured.

WA would receive a big boost if Stephen Michael could take his place in the side. The 1983 Tassie Medallist and Australian captain is no doubt one of the great players in Australia.

However, it is to be hoped that the selectors are not tempted to gamble with Michael if he is not 100 percent fit.

Football at this level demands peak fitness and the risk of playing partially-fit players is too great.

Much interest will settle on the selection of the WA side with perhaps the rovers being the most controversial.

Robert Wiley, if used as a rover, would be an automatic selection but John Todd has indicated the other position is wide open by picking Kevin Taylor so soon after returning from Victoria.

David Hart, Michael Mitchell and Bryan Cousins all have strong claims and, of course, Allen Daniels could be used in that position.

It is a pity that Jim Krakouer will not get an opportunity to play as he would have been a big drawcard and a great asset to the side.

Regardless of how the team line-up, the stage is set for a memorable match.

As one of football's most publicised and controversial personalities, his next move will be watched with interest.

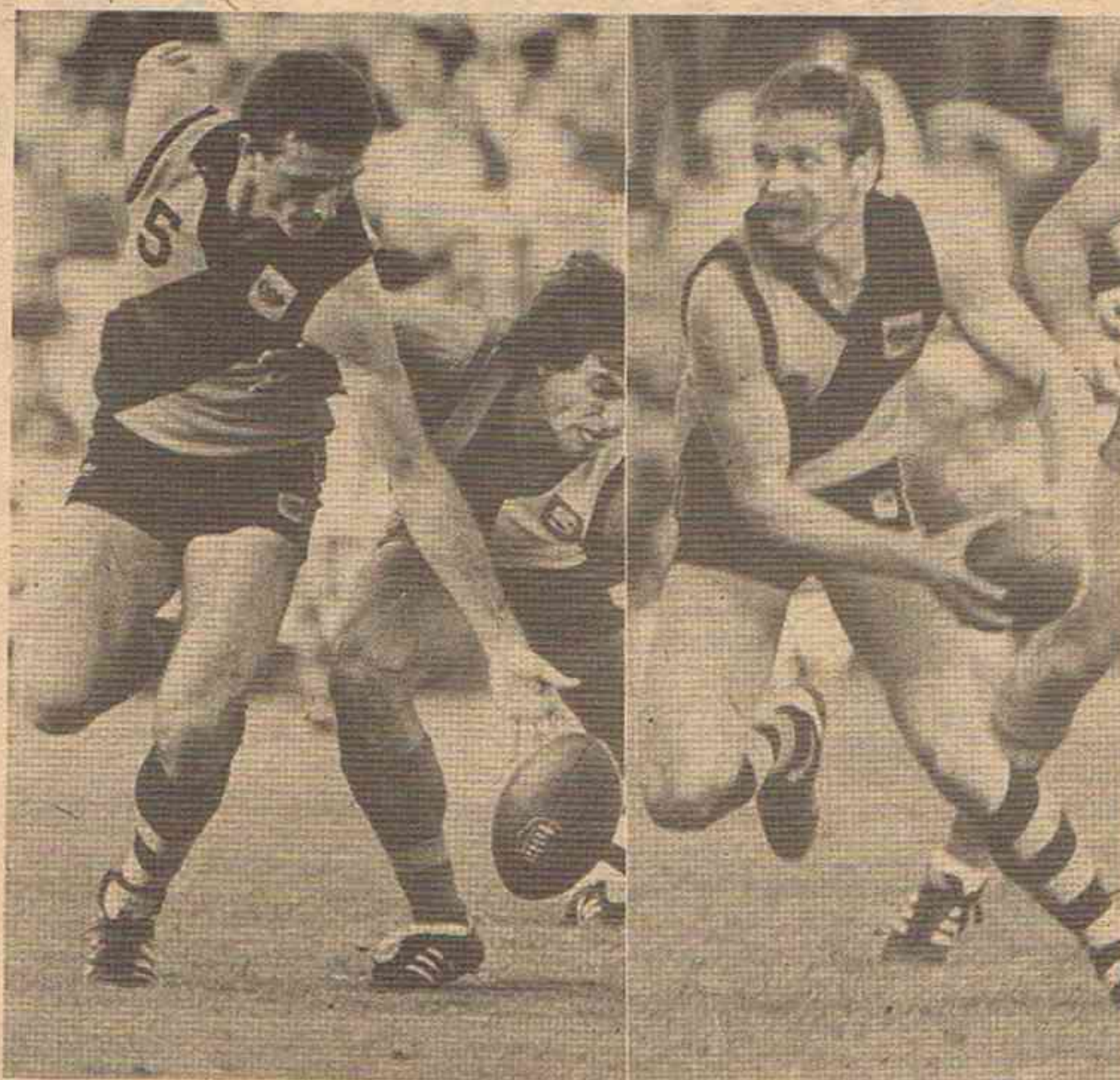
During his colourful career, Mal has attracted much attention from his antics and flamboyant nature.

The South West would be the logical choice.

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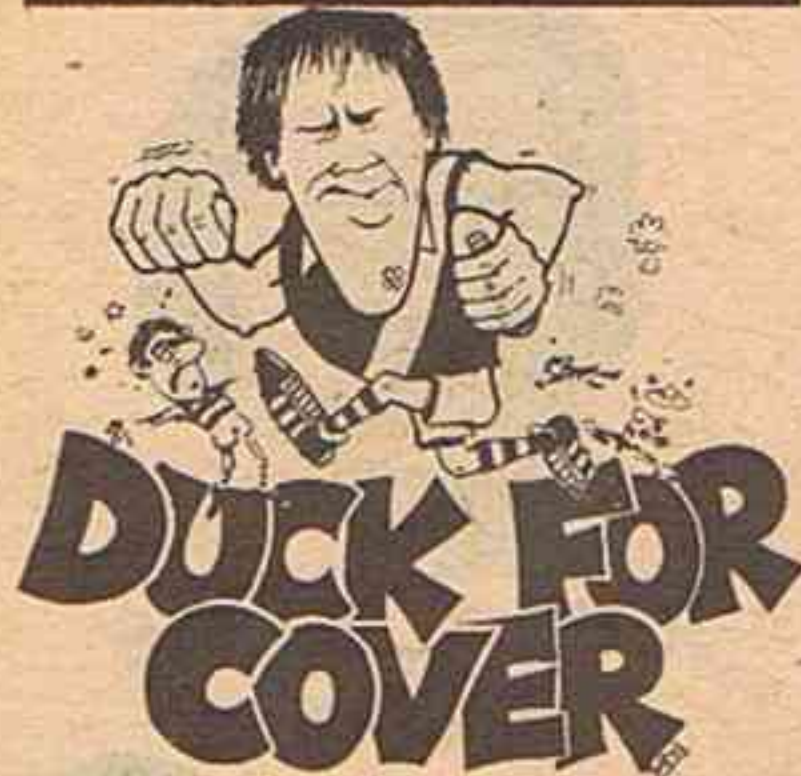

Boucher was a vital player for Swans in the last two premierships and, if he is fit, the Bassendean club could be on the road to a hat trick. He has such incredible strength that even if he plays solely from the forward pocket he can cause a few headaches for the opposition.

APPEAL PUZZLE

WHILE I was delighted to see Ross Glendinning's appeal against a two week suspension upheld by the VFL it now opens the door for other players to appeal against decisions. Glendinning's two-week suspension in his first appearance before the tribunal in 200 league games was harsh, but they should have stuck by their decision. Glendinning is vital to WA's hopes of winning next week's interstate clash and the news was naturally well received here.

TOP MOVES

WEST Perth coach Dennis Cometti pulled off a couple of match-winning moves last week against Swan Districts. Just when Swans looked like they were going to break away with the match, Cometti put Doug Simms to centre-half-back and Phil Bradmore to centre-half-forward. Simms beat three different opponents in his uncustomary role in defence while Bradmore provided the drive up forward which gave the Falcons enough opportunities to kick a winning score.

TOUGH JOB

I READ with interest in the Sunday Times on the weekend that West Perth's Brian Adamson was considering a comeback. Dennis Cometti had called for "Ado" because he considered the talented half-forward vital to the Falcons chances of making the finals and doing well once they got there. That would be a tough assignment for Brian because he has played only one quarter of football for the entire year. It will be interesting to see whether he does pull on the boots again.

THIRD TIME LUCKY

TWO years ago there was a young player at Claremont who looked like making a name for himself. But a lack of opportunities with the Tigers saw Paddy Papalia head to East Perth at the start of this year. Again he failed to get his break, so he headed to West Perth — just beating the June 30 clearance deadline. On Saturday he made his debut in the back pocket for the Falcons and did a good job. Falcons learn the hard way

IT CAN be tough being a league football coach. When you win everyone wants to know you... but when you lose the opposition love to ram it down your throat.

This was never more evident than on Channel 7's footy programme on Sunday when Swan Districts coach John Todd had to face up to jubilant West Perth supporters on their home territory.

Todd took it on the chin — but it must have hurt.

I can't help wondering, as he must, if the cycle has again turned on him.

After taking on a bunch of duffers and moulding them into one of the best football teams in WA in the past decade, Todd may find himself in a situation where he has to take the kind of stick dished out to him on Sunday.

But I'm sure he will be quick to reciprocate should his team stitch up West Perth next time they play.

This season's topsy-turvy competition has not allowed any coach, other than perhaps Ron Alexander, to feel smug about their team.

DOWN TO EARTH

But even he has been brought down to earth with some shattering losses.

It doesn't pay to crow about a big win because the trend of football this year, more often than not, has resulted in a winning team tripping up the following week.

Perhaps that was the reason why, on the same show, Falcons coach Dennis Cometti was a graceful winner.

His rivalry with Todd is such that he must have received immense satisfaction from the win — but Cometti only has to hark back to 1982 to be given a sober reminder of what can happen in football.

There are some at West Perth who believe they were robbed of the premiership that year.

They were itching to get at Swans, because, like this season, they had the wood over them in qualifying games.

But Claremont stopped them from getting a crack at Swans in the finals.

That, and last year's dismal performance, have shown Cometti the road to success in league football is a bumpy one.

HEADY STUFF

It would have been very heady stuff if he had won a premiership in his first season as a league coach. The past two seasons have probably been a good apprenticeship for him.

What he learnt could be the factor that determines whether West Perth are on the verge of a real revival.

They have one of the best crop of junior footballers in the league. In fact, they appear to be in a similar position to that of Claremont and Swan Districts before they started their runs at the top of the premiership table in 1979 and 1980 respectively.

BLUE FIN STARS OF THE DAY

LES FONG (West Perth): Gave another typical hard-working display as a rover when he helped put the Falcons on the road to victory. Gathered 17 kicks, took three marks and made five handpasses.

PAUL HARDING (East Fremantle): Was the outstanding ruckman of the match. Apart from dominating the ruck knocks, where he won 15 clear hit outs, he also picked up 11 kicks, three marks and eight handpasses.

WARREN DEAN (Subiaco): Was given the difficult task of minding Stephen Michael and did an admirable job. Also helped set up attacking moves from defence when he had 11 kicks, two marks and six handpasses.

SIMON LILL (Claremont): Showed why he is held in such high regard at Claremont with a polished display of defensive work. Cut his opponent out of the game and had 14 kicks, seven marks and 11 handpasses.

ANOTHER VIC. CONSPIRACY?

ARE the Victorians ganging up on Western Australia again? They can never be trusted, the Vics, when it comes to interstate football and now, for some strange reason, all our VFL stars have suffered setbacks. The WA selectors, with their eyes on 12 or 13 players over in the VFL, must be a puzzled lot. First there was the suspension for Ross Glendinning, which now won't affect him playing for WA, but he will not have played a game for nearly three weeks. Then most of the real stars have suddenly lost form — or been injured. Leon Baker only had three kicks last week; Ken Judge the same, Jim Sewell only managed two, Garry Sidebottom was down to seven, even Ken Hunter couldn't manage any more than that. Fortunately, Maurice Rioli was in good form for Richmond and Brian Peake played well for Geelong, but there wasn't much to get excited about among the other contenders. WISE WORDS

AFTER-MATCH presentations are generally the time for winning sides to have a little pat-on-the-back for everyone. And West Perth rookie Paul Milka, who is leading most first-year awards in town, wasn't missing out after Saturday's win over Swan Districts. "We can beat any side in the competition when we put it all together," was his acceptance-speech after winning a trophy.

NUMBERS GAME

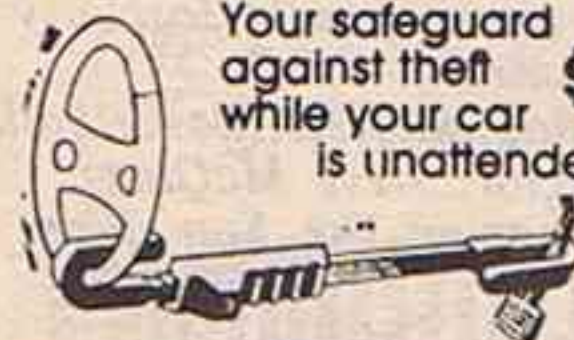

Dennis burst onto the league football scene last season when he was one of the best first year players.

"I was pretty nervous before that game," Dennis says. "It was as bad as the day I made my debut.

"I knew that if I played badly I would be dropped and I didn't want that to happen."

When he was given an opportunity against the Tigers, shortly after quarter time, Dennis slotted into the pace of game quickly and finished up being one of his side's better players in a poor team performance.

The youngster's career has certainly come a long way in the last two seasons and he has progressed through the ranks even quicker than he believed possible.

After winning the club's colts fairest and best award in 1982 he was looking forward to playing reserves and working his way into the league side.

But he gave the reserves a by-pass and graduated to the league team for the opening game of 1983 against West Perth.

And later in 1983 he earned the distinction of being named Teal Cup captain when WA finished second in the under-18 carnival.

Dennis is one of the most exciting young prospects in local football and he will be a valuable player in East Perth's quest to play in this year's finals.

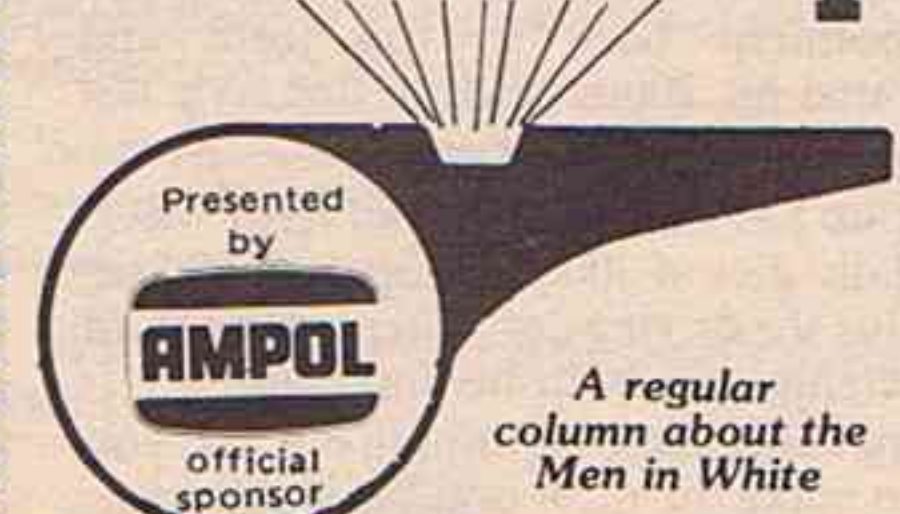
OFF TARGET

Planning for the future

UMPIRES throughout the nation will not be caught napping when the national competition starts. As a part of that planning, South Australia's director of umpiring, Murray Ducker, and chairman of the Umpires Board, Peter Shugg, were in Perth recently to hold talks with local umpires coach, Ross Capes, and Umpires Appointment Board chairman, Slim Somerville. The arrival of the South Australians came after they had held talks with representatives from Victoria and when in WA they discussed uniformity in administration, techniques and interpretations. The idea is to standardise these three areas in readiness for the national competition.

WELL DONE

TWO umpires who have risen up the ranks this year are Colin Shawcross and Len Cooper. Both men had been members of the local umpire's panel for a couple of years before recently being given the opportunity to make their league debuts and they have done the job well.

MORE INJURIES

INJURY problems are always arising in league clubs and the umpiring panel is no exception. League central umpire Paul Mannix has a hamstring injury at present and he could be out of action for a few weeks to come. Boundary umpires Mark Power and Peter Nutchey were both injured during league games, suffering ankle injuries and that earned them enforced lay-offs. On top of that field umpire John Morris has been absent because of business commitments in Sydney for the last three weeks.

SIX PROMOTED

IN an endeavour to broaden the base of umpires on the senior panel, six umpires have recently been promoted to control colts matches. That means that six of the eight colts umpires each week are having the opportunity to umpire at a higher level. None of those six had been members of the city panel in the past two years. Of the six, three joined the senior panel this year, one was on it last year, but has received his first opportunity in 1984, and the other two had controlled games at colts level previously.

FOOTBALL FACTS

Memories of a great footballer

FOOTBALL'S greatest tragedy occurred just over 50 years ago when South Fremantle captain-coach Ron Doig (23) died after being injured in the first semi final.

On September 17, 1932, South Fremantle met East Perth at Leederville Oval in their third, first semi-final clash in three years.

They tied in 1931 and East Perth won the replay by two points. On the fateful day a year later East Perth won by four points — 10.13 to 9.15.

This is how a newspaper report of the day ran the sad story: "During the game against East Perth on Saturday Doig received injuries which necessitated his receiving attention from the club trainers and in the final quarter he appeared to be badly hurt when he fell to the ground."

LIMPING

"He recovered, however, and played at full-forward instead of his usual position of centre-half-forward. He was limping as he left the field at the finish of the game and complained of feeling unwell as he entered the dressing rooms."

"He was ill when he arrived home in Fremantle just after six o'clock and collapsed soon after. A doctor ordered him to a private hospital where he died just after midnight."

Ron Doig was a son of Scotty Doig, one of five famous brothers who played with East Fremantle before World War I.

YOUNGEST COACH

Although only 23, he was in his sixth season of senior competition and the youngest league coach in Australian football.

His record has since been broken by former South Fremantle star John Todd who was 20 when he coached the club in 1959.

Doig, a State footballer had also represented WA at cricket, having played against the touring South Africans the previous summer.

His death cast a gloom over the city of Fremantle and the 2500 mourners in a mile-long procession provided the biggest funeral that city had ever seen.

GREAT RECORD

THE Falcons victory over Swan Districts last week again highlighted an unexplainable situation in that West Perth have a habit of performing well against Swans.

Swans have won the last two WAFL premierships and were pre-season favourites for the 1984 flag, but in the past three years West Perth have been able to win more games than they have lost against the reigning premiers.

The record in this period shows West Perth with five wins and only three losses. During the same time Claremont have won five and lost five against Swans, South Fremantle have won three and lost six, East Fremantle have won two and lost six, East Perth and Perth have won one and lost seven and Subiaco have lost all eight encounters between the two clubs.

After 50 years of league football, Swans and the Falcons have met 147 times and last Saturday's win provided West Perth with their 99th victory over Swans.

Between 1939 and 1956 Swans did not win a game at Leederville Oval — losing 23 games straight.

HISTORIC CHANT

COME on the Combines!
You may well ask who are the Combines? Well it was a chant used at West Australian football matches about 58 years ago.

When Claremont first joined the competition in 1926 they combined with Cottesloe and supporters and football writers referred to them as the Combines.

MELBOURNE coach Ron Barassi — now confirmed as coach of the club for the next year — has once again unveiled an unorthodox coaching ruse.

The master coach has decided to take a week off in the middle of the season — and take most of his coaching staff with him.

The running of the football side will be left in the hands of former Demons star Greg Wells, who is with the club in a skills-coach capacity.

The move comes as Melbourne, now destined to play in the finals for the first time since 1964, have a break of two weeks before their next clash as the VFL goes into a split round.

Barassi has also put his champion Brownlow Medallist Brian Wilson 'on loan' for just one week.

Wilson, back in the reserves last week after breaking his arm in a pre-season game, badly needs match practice and Barassi is keen for him to play somewhere



next week, "even a social game."

Barassi's move to take a week off is his idea of giving his players a break from him — and vice-versa.

"What they do this week is up to Greg," says Barassi.

TIGER TAMED

RICHMOND star Brian Taylor was dragged from the ground against Essendon on Saturday — a tactical move that put coach Mike Patterson in hot water with some fans.

"Brian had three shots for goal and only three points from his three kicks," said Patterson.

"It was going to be difficult for him to turn the tide. We thought it appropriate to take him off."

Taylor was replaced 12 minutes into the last quarter just as the Tigers were making a move to bridge the gap of less than two goals.

The move didn't work as the Bombers kicked right away.

Patterson praised WA's Bill Duckworth for the way he played on Taylor.

INJURY HELPS

AN injury to Geelong's Peter Johnston probably helped the Cats win a tight game against St Kilda last Saturday. It was 23 minutes into the final term with Geelong only a point in front (and St Kilda kicking with the breeze) when Johnston took a strong mark, but turned his ankle as he hit the ground. Johnston, not a reliable kick for goal at the best of times, said he could not take the kick — and hobbled towards the boundary line as Gary Ablett, a superb kicker of the ball, quickly jumped in to take his place. The heavy ball was booted straight through the middle and Geelong steadied and took out the game.

THAT character of the football circus, Mark Jackson, is in town this weekend — but not to play, just to entertain. Jacko has been brought to Perth by Pier 21, a sponsor of South Fremantle, and he will be a guest of the club on Saturday, appearing on Seven's World of Sport on Sunday and the star billing at a Perth Football Club players panel show on Monday night. A Victorian newspaperman tracked down Jack's mother this week and asked her a few things about her flamboyant son. "Despite all the publicity, he's still just the same boy I've always known and is a very loving son," she said. "I know this will sound funny to a lot of people, but as a child Mark was very normal."

LETHAL'S VIC TEAM

CHAMPION Hawthorn skipper Leigh Matthews has named his team for the game between Victoria and Western Australia at Subiaco Oval next Tuesday.

Lethal Leigh has gone for an experienced combination, with only two 'rookies' getting a berth — Melbourne defender Steven Smith and St Kilda's Tony Lockett.

He says Lockett should get the full-forward role ahead of veteran Fitzroy goalkicker Bernie Quinlan.

"Lockett is a young full-forward who has averaged more than four goals a game in a team which has won only occasionally," he wrote in his weekly Sunday Observer column.

He picked Rod Ashman as the specialist rover — even though he has only played well in the last couple of weeks — and Essendon's Darren Williams, as his partner.

"Williams is one of the few true rovers," says Matthews. "His pace makes him an important part of the forward line and his goal sense is invaluable."

CAN WE BE THE CHAMPS AGAIN?

THE whole concept of interstate football changed dramatically in 1977 — and next Tuesday, July 17, will see chapter 10 of the new story played out at Subiaco Oval.

Interstate clashes based on State-of-Origin selection — with WA players based in Victoria being allowed to return to their original colours — have helped balance up matches between the two States. After all, WA has provided Victoria with the cream of its talent for the last couple of decades.

The original State-of-Origin clash — promoted as an end-of-season experiment by the Subiaco Football Club and later given official WAFL sanction — saw the Sandgroppers, bolstered by some of their great stars back from the VFL, hand out an unexpected and unaccepted thrashing — 94 points, in fact.

Subsequent revenge was extracted by the Victorians in Melbourne a year later when the WA side floundered on the wide, muddy expanses of VFL Park. The margin of 100 points was sufficient for the Vics to resume their crowding.

But since then wholesale thrashings have been scarce; apart from the 35 point win to Victoria in Adelaide in 1980, the clashes between the two States have produced high-class and competitive football.

Victoria have won five clashes; WA four. So this game gives the home side the chance to even the ledger.

The four clashes since 1980 have been won alternatively by Victoria and WA — so the home side needs to break the pattern to achieve victory this time and win back-to-back matches against a hungry Victorian camp.

THE TASSIE MEDAL

IT'S an elite football club... there are just 15 members and a new name will be added to the list next Tuesday.

It's the Tassie Medal club — and nine of the members are West Australians.

The Tassie Medal was introduced in 1937 and was destined to be the prize individual reward at the end of each Australian carnival.

It is awarded to the fairest and best player over all the games in a carnival series and is decided on the votes of umpires and officials from rival camps.

The first Tassie Medal went to West Australian great, the late Mick Cronin — who now has a medal named after him, the Cronin Medal for the footballer-of-the-year judged by Channel 7 each season.

West Australians who have joined Cronin in the Tassie Medal club are Stephen Michael (1983), Brian Peake (1979), Ken McAullay (1972), Peter Eakins (1969), Barry Cable (1966), Graham Farmer (1956), Merv McIntosh (1953) and Les McClements (1947).

There have been two games completed so far in this year's championship series and contenders for the Medal are many. South Australians who have played well in their two games include Peter Motley and Michael Aish. Leading Victorians will be Michael Tuck, Doug Hawkins and David Ackerley.

WA's leading chances should be Murray Rance, Stephen Malaxos and Brad Hardie.

A recent change of mind by the National Football League has seen the reintroduction of All Australian sides being named at the end of the interstate year. The NFL has also adopted a new format for the Australian championship series with the best-of-three matches played between WA, Victoria and South Australia.

Each side plays the other two, with the title of Australian champions going to the top team, either undefeated or on percentage.

WA took out the title in that inaugural series last year, with two exciting victories — a six-goal win over South Australia and then a last-kick three-point win over Victoria.

WA has now completed the first leg of their 1984 double — again with a last-kick victory, this time over SA at Adelaide.

The second leg of the championship race has taken on significant proportions as the Victorians have indicated their determination to atone for last year's loss. It was an all-out effort by the VFL that saw them beat SA in a top-class clash in Adelaide and now the selectors have been given an open-hand in picking the side to come West.

The best football talent in the land will be on display at Subiaco Oval on Tuesday.

The superstars of the VFL are coming in force and eight or 10 of WA's best exports will be back home in the black-and-gold colours, determined to show their Victorian colleagues that they still have some of that West Aussie spirit left.

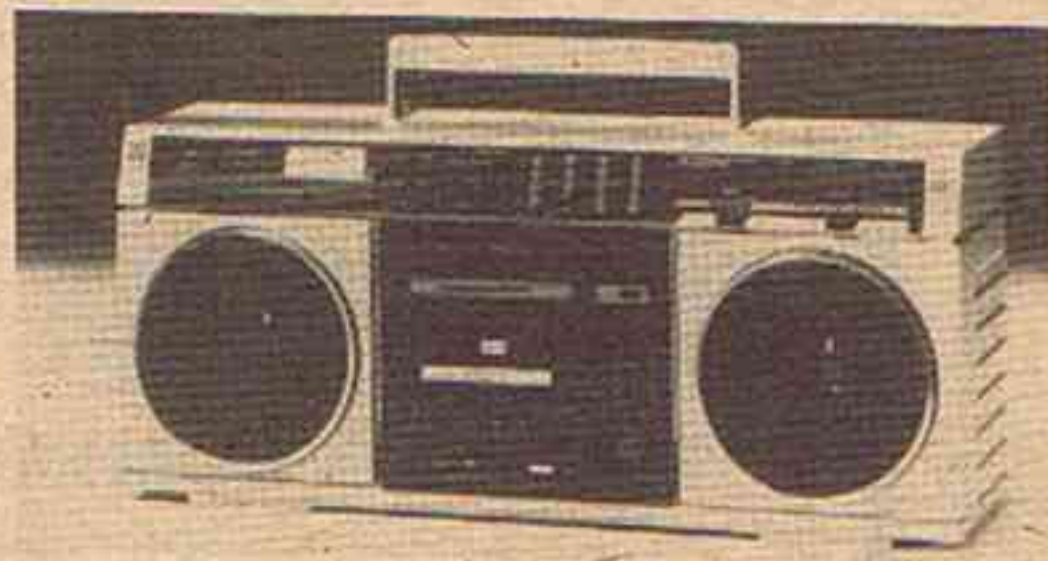

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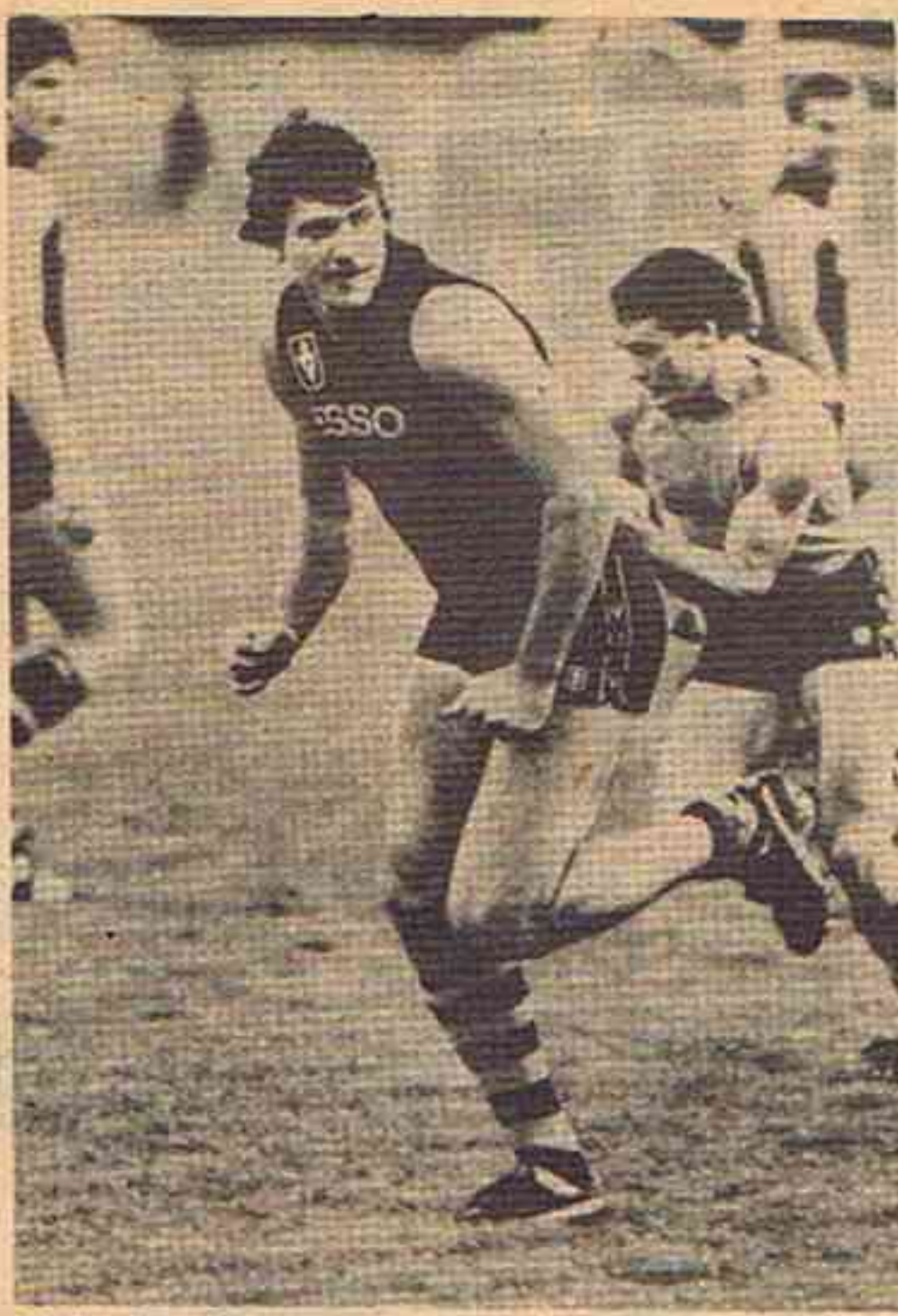

In 1980 he kicked over 100 goals for the Tigers.

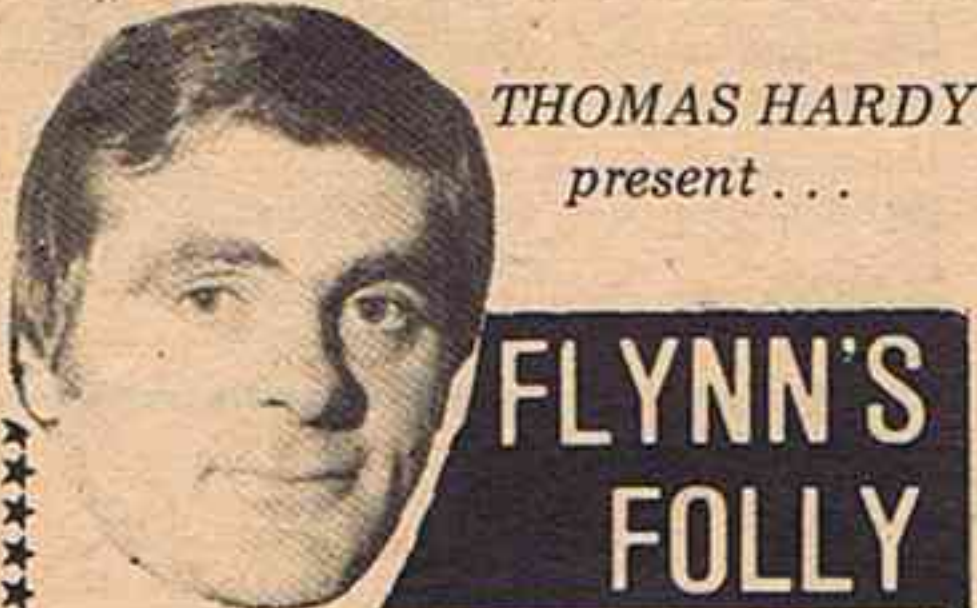
Special features of this year's visit include a super clinic for the local junior teams at Rushton Park, Mandurah next Thursday, starting at 4pm.

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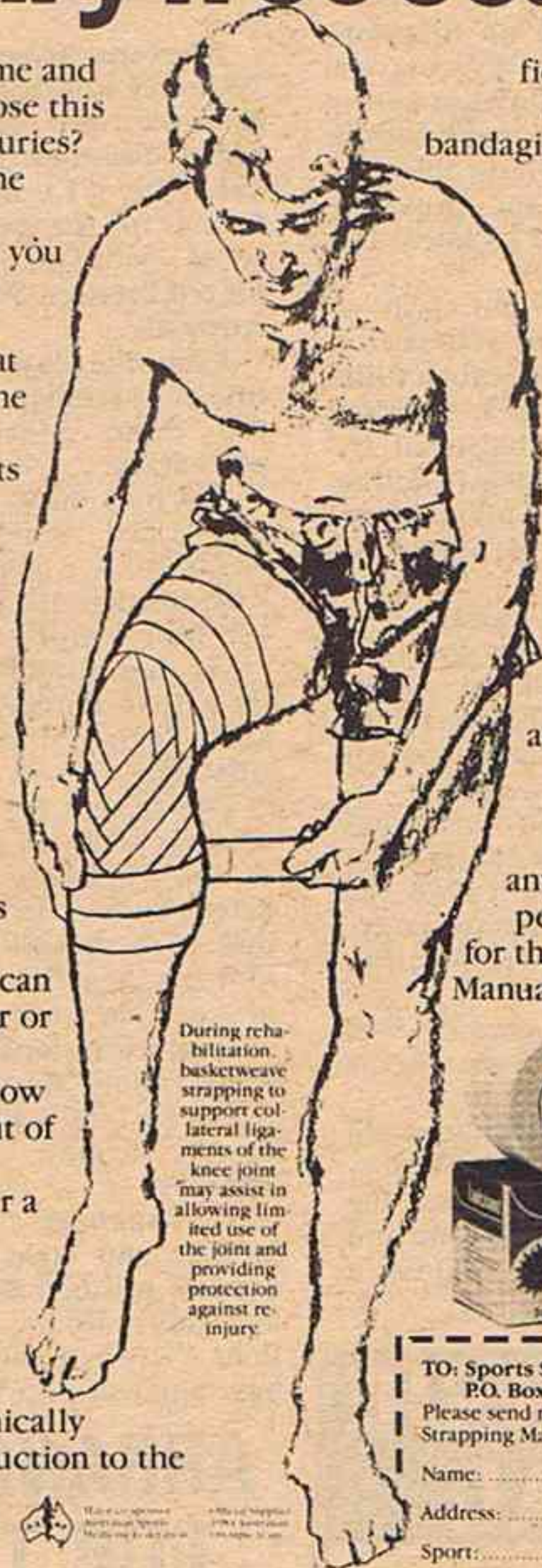

Country TV alternative

THE WAFL's decision to reject a proposal by the Bunbury-based Golden West TV network to televise VFL matches live in country areas is based on sound thinking.

Similar telecasts in some regions of South Australia have completely alienated areas of that State from the SANFL.

People in some regions now only think VFL and the SANFL, its players and clubs, have lost their identity.

Despite our greater isolation from Victoria, it would be easy to see the same thing happening here, particularly where youngsters are concerned.

Young footballers all have their football heroes and it wouldn't be long before our WAFL stars would be a forgotten race.

Television is the greatest medium for country fans to keep in touch with league football and with this further exposure of the VFL, country people would soon lose interest in the WAFL competition.

Golden West network manager Des McDonald said this week that his company was keen to play its part in promoting football and offered the WAFL free air time for promotions if it would allow the VFL telecasts.

If the company is so keen to show live football on Saturday afternoon, then why not telecast a WAFL match?

The WAFL would surely permit this as a compromise.

Such a move would be easy to arrange, with the co-operation of TVW 7, who cover an alternative match to the ABC and send it back live to their Tuart Hill studios for replay later that night.

The Golden West Network already take other programmes from Channel 7 so the technicalities of such a move would be minimal — and surely much cheaper than bringing in a programme from the other side of the country.

A large percentage of country people would then have the choice of two matches each Saturday. — Peter Poat.

THE umpires have been in the spotlight recently, what with criticism from coaches and the general mid-season conflict over their performances.

But they are a willing band of football workers who undergo strenuous pre-season training and tolerate months of public abuse all in the cause of their devotion to umpiring.

Westside Football writer KIM HAGDORN joined the umpires for a week of training

THESE UMPERS ARE ALRIGHT!

IT'S not everyone's burning ambition to become a League football umpire.

Most aspiring sportsmen dream of the bright lights associated with superstar status.

This fact of sporting life is a major factor in the current shortage of experienced umpiring staff in WA football.

Our umpires have come in for more than their share of criticism over the years, with this season bringing a lot of ill-feeling between officials, players and umpires to an ugly head.

Seldom has a week passed without special attention being paid to the umpiring fraternity.

So Westside Football poses this question to footy fans — do too many people go to a game each week to watch the umpire and not their team?

From the press box, I have become convinced that too many followers direct their attention at the umpire.

So what better time to go behind the scenes with the men in white to find out their case first-hand.

PERFORMANCES

No matter what we think of their performances, they are an essential part of the game, without whom few players would survive!

Being part of a week of training with some of the most unpopular men in WA football is an experience few fans have known.

The first and most obvious aspect I noticed is the hungry attitude each individual has for success.

During the training sessions, there is a distinct lack of enthusiastic encouragement that you associate with team-orientated training.

Everyone is concerned totally with his own preparation for the coming game.

There is plenty of verbal interaction — incidents from the previous games, tribunal happenings or form in general.

The less experienced umpires rely on the more knowledgeable members of the panel for the guidance they need.

With the recent retirement of so many experienced umpires, the lack of senior umpires is an area of concern for coach Ross Capes and his staff.



RUN-RUN

Capes says: "If an umpire has a particular problem, he can come to me or any of the senior guys like Ron Buckley or Mike Ball. But this season has seen the loss of so many good umpires, that the depth of experience has been drained."

SURVIVAL

Umpiring is a survival of the fittest affair in more ways than one.

Each one of the city panel of 28 field umpires has his own form and fitness as the prime motivator for his involvement in one of the less enviable tasks in WA football.

This is particularly so among boundary umpires where fitness and endurance is the key to getting a senior game.

Running is the most emphasised aspect of an umpire's week.

But Capes has a golden rule for his under-studies: "The secret to being a good umpire is when to run and where."

"Some of the best umpires we have had weren't fitness fanatics. They simply knew how best to position themselves to make their decisions."

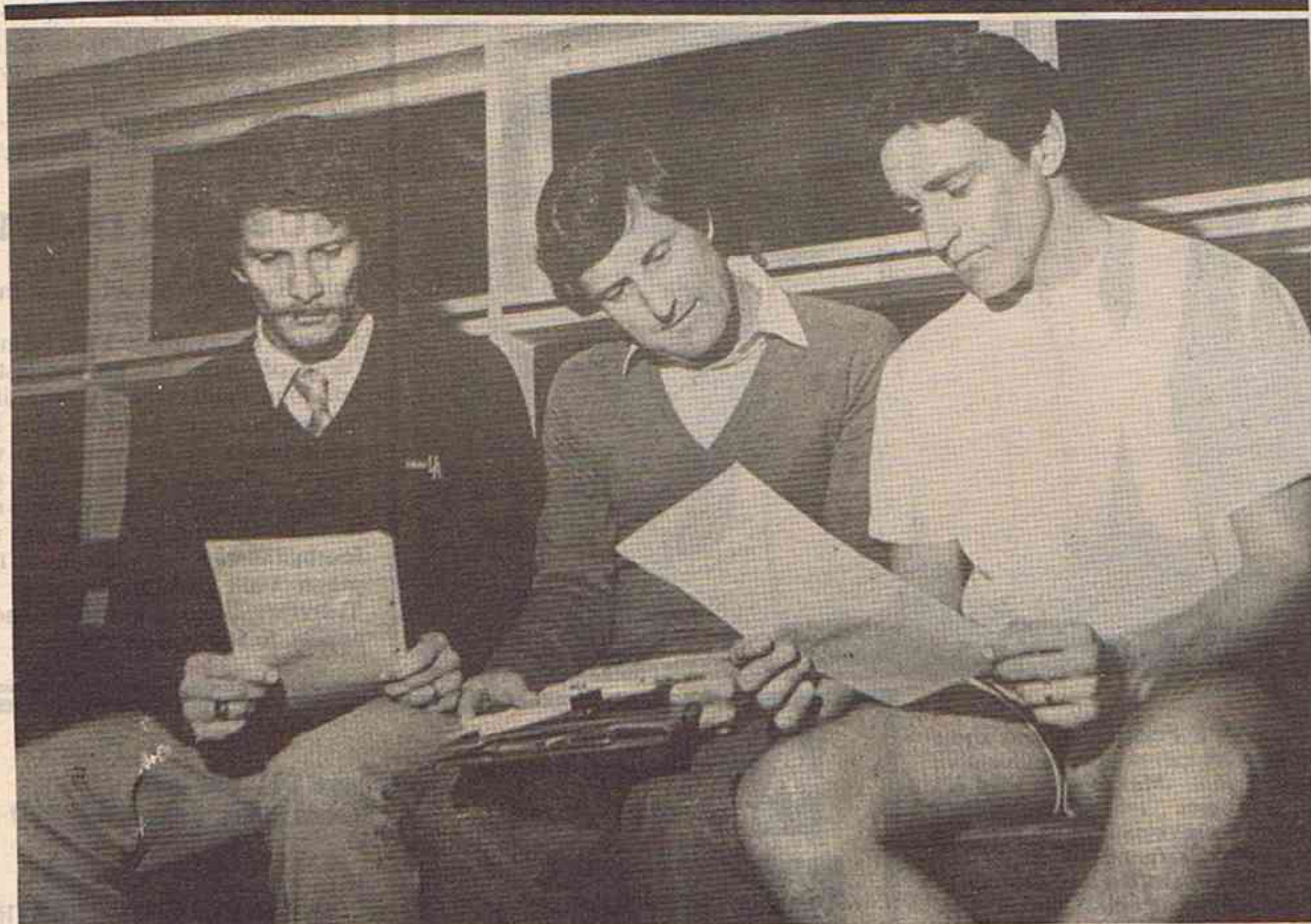
Out on the track among 60 field and boundary umpires the 'kill or be killed' attitude is very apparent.

Each individual follows the set procedure from former boundary umpire and physical education advisor John Devine with relative ignorance of those around him.

COMPETITION

Comradeship is evident, but there is very much an air of competition among aspiring league umpires.

Mental preparation is a big part of an umpire's build-up, but his prime objective is to get the big-game

RUN-RUN

appointment on the coming Saturday. After all there are 160 league footballers every week, but only eight central umpires who get the honour of controlling the four big clashes. Capes agrees that there is a sense of rivalry among his 'team' of umpires. "Much of their training revolves around going over their strengths and weaknesses of recent weeks," the veteran of more than 200 League games said. "Of course there is competition among them for a game each week. But once they are paired up and get out in the middle, they work as a team. "As long as we co-operate and co-ordinate, any pair of umpires will work well."

PHYSICAL FITNESS

Devine sets a fine standard in physical fitness for all umpires to follow. His peak condition and variety of training methods is an important part of the preparation of the panel. "Keeping enthusiasm up is important so I look for variety as much as possible," Devine says. "But when running is such an important part, there isn't much else we can do." After the weekly routine of running, going over the good and bad points of last week's display and hoping for another opportunity, the time arrives to settle into the task at hand for the coming games. Mass meetings on Thursday night, after another gruelling running and sprint session, is a common occurrence. The meetings are aimed at consistency among the panel

and further opportunity to discuss problems and strengths. They are headed by Capes and his panel of advisors and are an essential part in developing unity among the team.

FORM REPORTS

A highlight of the training week is Tuesday night when every umpire receives a hand written report from the 14-man panel who scrutinise their performances.

The comments, which take many hours to compile, have a bearing on appointments for the coming week.

Naturally, there is a variety of comment in each report and the recipient studies the opinion with intense interest.

A prime objective is to avoid the wrath of the Appointment Board.

Like any league player, umpires are subject to promotion and demotion.

The week that I was in the camp there were mixed fortunes for two umpires.

Len Cooper received the congratulations from his colleagues on his league debut appointment, but Ross

Graffin received a one-game suspension for failing to report an incident that the advisor felt was reportable.

Players face fines and suspension for misdemeanours and make headlines. But seldom is much said of an umpire's suspension.

Devine has his troops in peak fitness in preparation for the tasks at the weekend.

In fact I'm sure some of the umpiring staff could lay good claim to being some of the fittest men in the game.

Peter Wilson, Allen Daniels, Robert Wiley, Peter Spencer and Brad Hardie are fit men, but I have been privileged to see another fit and strong athlete in action.

IMPRESSION

The completion of the week behind the doors with the umpires, left one outstanding impression on someone who has noticed the difficulty the umpires have had this season — these guys are human after all.

Through all that stern exterior, ignoring the abuse and ridicule hurled their way every Saturday we find characters and personalities truly concerned for the welfare of the game.

It is indeed a lonely life, that of a league umpire.

They choose to be part of the most unpopular side of our national game.

So for my part over coming weeks I will go to the football and attempt to watch the game to the fullest and see if I can ignore the presence of the man in white.

After all, if you don't realise that there is an umpire out there, he must be doing a good job. So football fan, try it too.

Go to the football to watch the two teams in combat and not worry about the two guys in control.

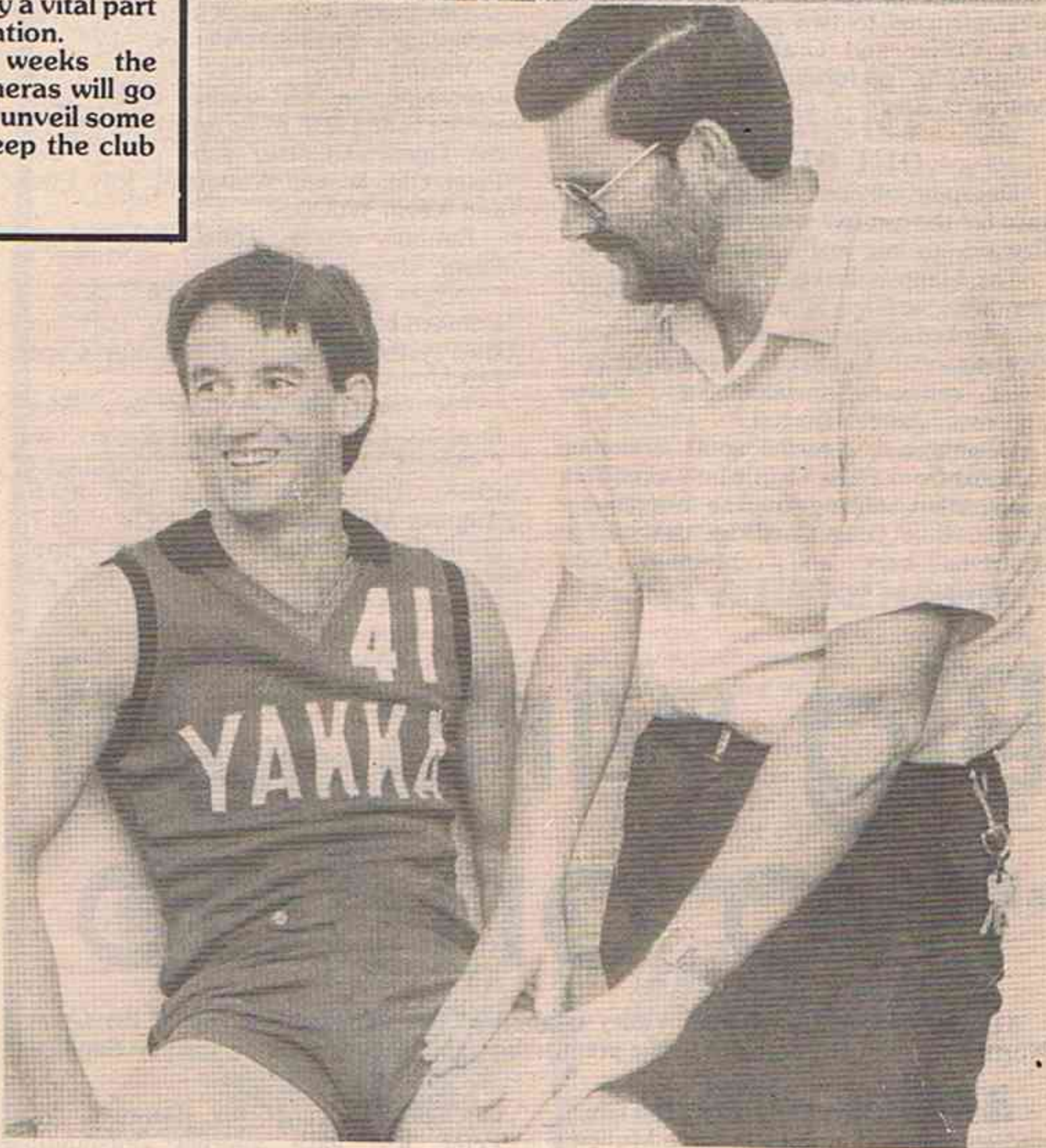

While there is a need for everyone to do their time as an apprentice, more allowance must be made by the Umpires Appointment Board for former players to umpire in the colts competition where the future champion players are nurtured.

Surely after being involved for 10 to 15 years as a player/coach, the old rule of going to the country can be easily amended.

With this simple amendment, I am positive former players like Alex Hamilton, John Dimmer and Stan Nowotny, to mention a few, would be more than interested to continue their involvement as an umpire, thereby adding greater character to the game. Something that has died out over recent years.

The coaches were on the field while the game was in motion, positively encouraging and showing their players what to do.

RELAXED

The number of parents and friends who watched was astonishing — and even more encouraging was the relaxed atmosphere they showed.

Gone was the hysterical parent telling their son how to play. Gone was the constant abuse towards the umpire, gone was the pressure from coaches to play like a league team.

The parent/friends were involved in the game but only positive encouragement was tolerated.

Club President Barry Dedman indicated that the guidelines for 'free ball' eliminate the ugly parent.

Laughter occurred from parents as they saw the 'little players' attempting to give their best and making genuine mistakes.

CRITIC

I have been an outspoken critic of the 'ugly parent' and 'ugly coach' indicating they need to be removed from junior sport permanently.

To witness young boys, their coaches and parents all enjoying themselves and playing sport the way it was designed, was indeed a big boost for our game.

From what I am told the battle against the 'ugly parent — ugly coach' is being won. More and more junior clubs are terminating any coach who wants to break the guidelines for the boys playing football.

'Ugly parents' are being encouraged to not yell out, if they do, they are asked to leave or get out of that particular club.

The exciting part of this battle for the sporting lives of our young footballers will not be seen for years, until this new skill-orientated, enjoyment-seeking young player gets to senior ranks — not only will the individual be better but, more importantly, the game of Australian football we all love will really boom.

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
