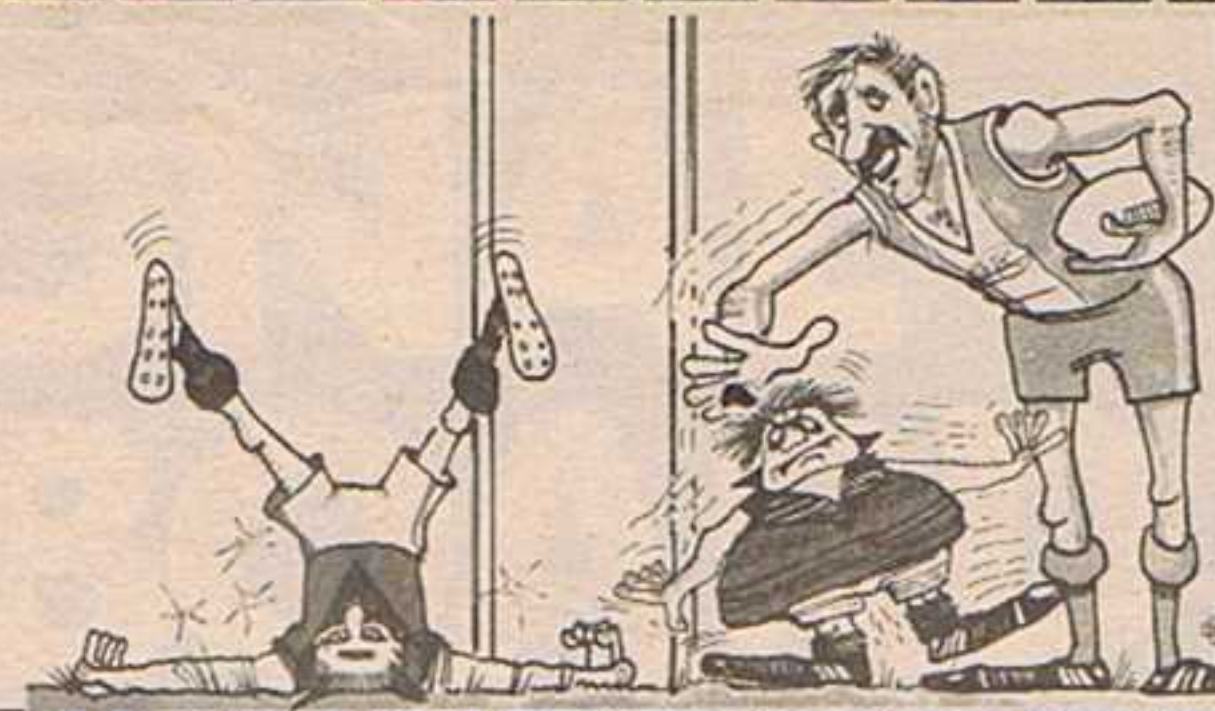

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Time for a change:

ANZAC DAY FOOTBALL

THE West Australian Football League must re-examine the possibility of playing at least one match on Anzac Day in the future.

The league has avoided matches on Anzac Day in recent years — but the time is overdue for a revising of this policy.

Under WA laws, the WAFL has to pay 60 percent of its gate receipts on Anzac Day to the Anzac Day Trust Fund — an Act of Parliament that makes football unviable on one of the few public holidays in the football season.

To have this year's Anzac Day — Thursday, April 25 — without a football match is wasteful at a time when the game needs all the promotion it can get.

New WAFL chief executive John Walker has admitted that he is puzzled about the lack of football on Anzac Day — and promises an investigation.

The league should lobby the WA Government to amend the act requiring such a high fee to go to the Anzac Day Fund — it is completely out of proportion with the gate receipt revenue generated by football.

Mr Keith Habbishow, secretary of the Anzac Day Trust, told Westside Football that an Act of Parliament was introduced in 1969 requiring all sporting bodies who competed on Anzac Day and charged entrance fees to pay 60 percent of their gate receipts to the Anzac Day Trust Fund.

These funds go to the Returned Services League, who use the money to help ex-servicemen.

In Victoria, the Act states that the VFL must give \$12,500 out of their total gate receipts to the Trust Fund from the matches played on Anzac Day.

Greg Durham, company secretary of the VFL, says that it was dependent on what matches were played on Anzac Day for it to be financially viable for the league.

"In the past clubs with strong followings such as Carlton and Collingwood have made this a profitable venture for the VFL," Durham said.

In WA, the issue of playing football on Anzac Day has been put in the too hard basket for several years.

With decreasing attendances, an increasing problem for the WAFL, a positive step for the league would be to ask the State Government to amend this Act.

As usual the football fan is the loser in this issue and the game as a whole is suffering.

The VFL will play two matches tomorrow, while in Adelaide three games will be played, leaving only two for Saturday.



BIG MAN'S BIG DAY

BIG West Perth ruckman Kim Rogers had plenty of incentive to perform well against Perth last Saturday.

The newcomer to league football was discarded by Perth a few seasons ago, who told him he wasn't quite good enough.

Rogers and a young Perth colts player were used in the transfer agreement for Ray Holden.

The Tammin farmer went back home to play football and built a reputation as the best big man in the country.

He was a member of the past two Wesfarmers country All Stars teams and was a prominent player in WA's two impressive victories over South Australia.

Rogers has improved in each match he has played and the Falcons have found badly-needed support for Craig Nelson.

Many Falcons fans are comparing Rogers with former ruckman Ben Jager in the way he uses his body and plays with such great heart.

It was a very keyed up Rogers before the match against the Demons and he must have gained great satisfaction from his top performance.

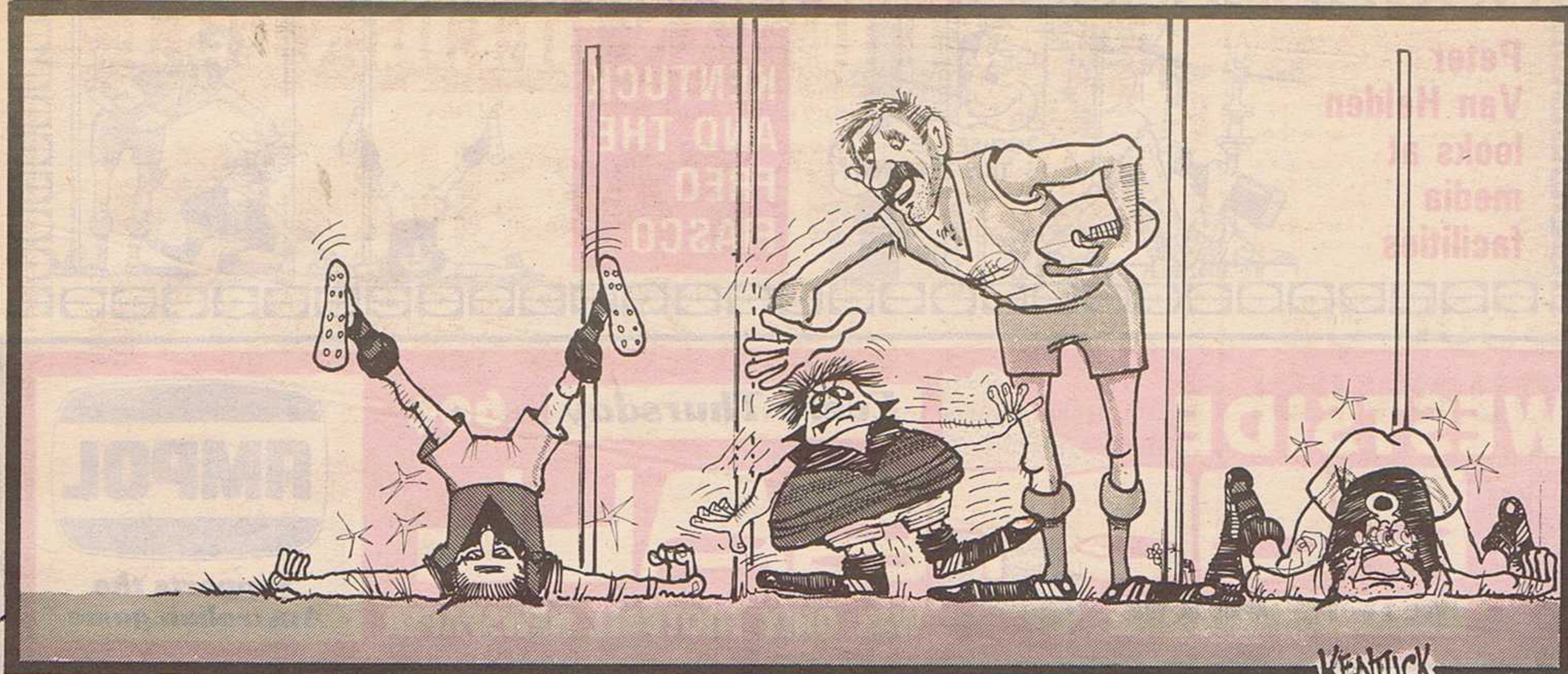

BOOTING WITH THE BREEZE

VASOLI STARS

RECORDS

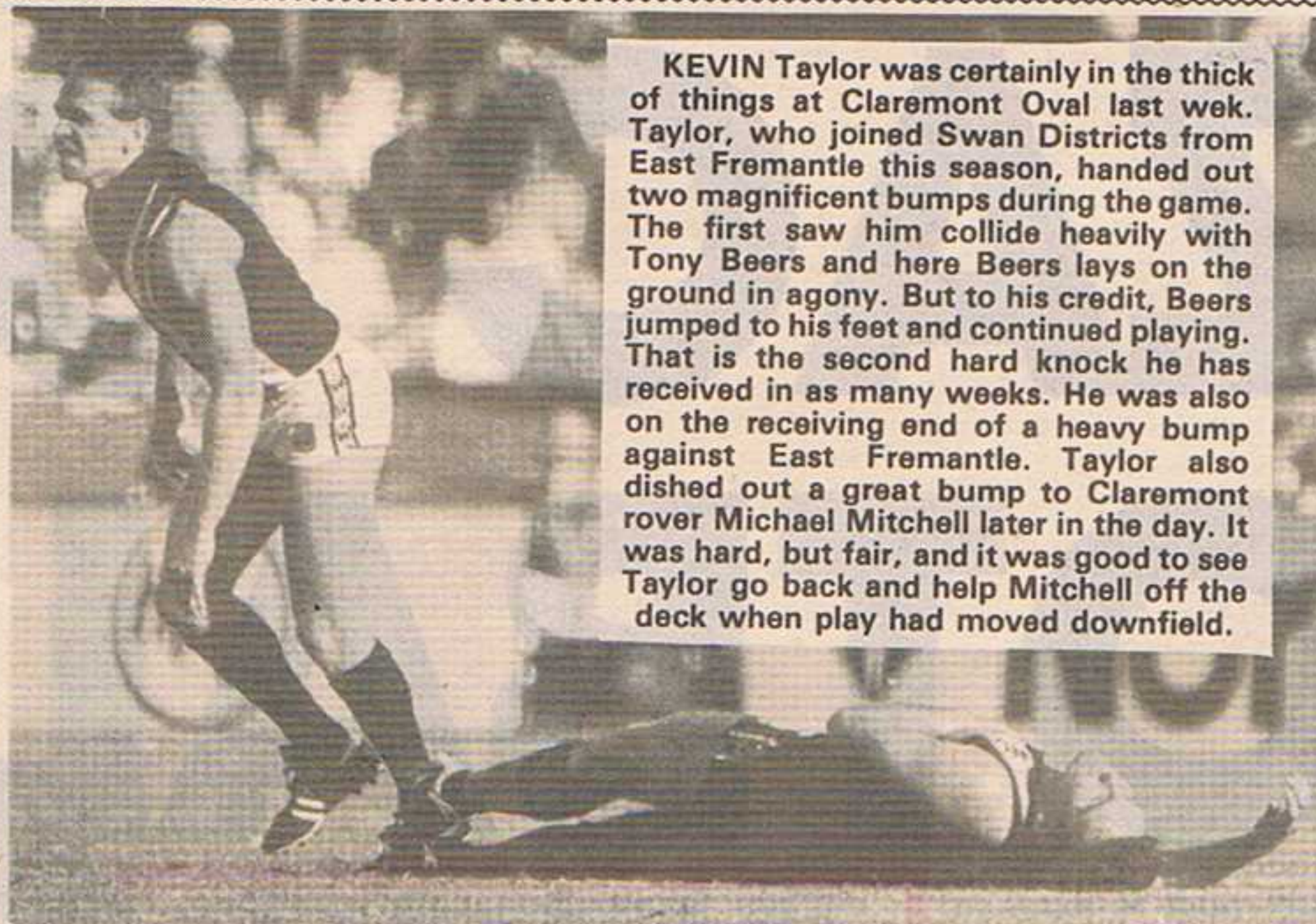
DURING last Saturday's round of high-scoring matches several records tumbled. East Fremantle's score of 31.13 was their highest against East Perth, beating their 1955 tally of 26.16 by 27 points. It was also their biggest winning margin over the Royals. Their previous best was in 1929 when they won by 112 points. West Perth's score of 27.17 equalled their previous best against the Demons. They scored 26.23 at Subiaco Oval in 1981.

CRISIS POINT

THERE were some worried faces in the East Perth changerooms after the game against East Fremantle. There was good reason for concern after a day of incidents where three Royals players were seriously injured and four were reported. The club's depth will be fully tested this week, but the Royals are well-known for their great character in a crisis.

OLD TIME KICK

ST KILDA might be in the doldrums as far as the VFL is concerned, but one of their players has caught the headlines. Former South Australian Bruce Lindner indulged in a burst of drop-kicking at Kardinia Park — and brought some of the old-time critics to their feet. VFL great Ted Whitten thought Lindner was probably the first player to use the drop-kick for several years and his effort brought back memories of some of the game's great exponents of this kick. However, the drop kick is well and truly out of the game because of the danger of mis-kicking and seeing it slide along the ground.



KEVIN Taylor was certainly in the thick of things at Claremont Oval last week. Taylor, who joined Swan Districts from East Fremantle this season, handed out two magnificent bumps during the game. The first saw him collide heavily with Tony Beers and here Beers lays on the ground in agony. But to his credit, Beers jumped to his feet and continued playing. That is the second hard knock he has received in as many weeks. He was also on the receiving end of a heavy bump against East Fremantle. Taylor also dished out a great bump to Claremont rover Michael Mitchell later in the day. It was hard, but fair, and it was good to see Taylor go back and help Mitchell off the deck when play had moved downfield.

HIGH PRAISE

RESPECTED Victorian critic and former coach and player Tony Jewell rates Claremont's Krakouer brothers as among the best exponents of handball in the business. Jewell, writing in the Melbourne's Sunday Observer, says that handball masters like Jim and Phil Krakouer, Maurice Rioli, Robbie Flower and Dale Weightman confirm that the art of using hands in football is far from diminishing. Jewell says that Graham Farmer and Barry Cable were the masters of the art and he says Farmer would be a sensation today. "Some readers may not remember Farmer . . . or have not even heard of him," says Jewell. "Opponents would watch mesmerised as he grabbed the ball and handballed 20-25 metres from an aerial position."

REMINDER TIME

HOPEFUL Footscray players and supporters, who were brought back to earth a little last Saturday, have a constant reminder about their 1985 target.

A huge photograph of the MCG packed to the rafters at finals time is the dominant sight in the Footscray dressing rooms.

Every player, coach and official who walks into the room is overwhelmed by the gigantic photo which reminds them all that September is the time to perform. It's a constant reminder for the players to keep their minds on the job and aim at reaching the finals.

COACH'S DREAM

LONG-haired Carlton star Tom Alvin might not look much like a VFL star — but he is a coach's dream according to Blues mentor David Parkin.

Alvin was given the hottest job in league football last week — watching 1985 superstar Gary Ablet. And he did it in style, cutting the Geelong star right out of the game.

Alvin is one of the hardest-working players in the game and Parkin has praised his devotion to improving the weaker facets of his game.

TOUGH TIME

SUBIACO defender Greg Wilkinson must have found it hard to sleep on Saturday night after bursting a blood vessel in his shoulder in the game against South Fremantle. Wilkinson looked like an American grid iron player with his padded bandaged shoulder, but the Lions are hopeful of having the courageous backman in the side for the important clash with Swan Districts this Saturday.

HELPING OUT

SUBIACO chairman of selectors Neil Randall and runner Dennis Blair, two of the most experienced former players involved with the Lions, played important roles with the team on Saturday. Randall was running around with a water bottle and he and Blair, who played about 400 senior games between them, were on the ground almost full-time during the exciting last quarter. Their experience must be a big help to the young Subiaco side.

GOOD ON YOU UMPES!

MUCH has been said and written in recent weeks about the standard of umpiring.

Despite the "bagging" by club officials the men in white have performed their difficult job satisfactorily in the games I have seen this season.

They have called it how they see it and you cannot ask for any more than that.

As a youngster I was brought up to respect umpires and accept their decision, whether it was right or wrong. Things even out in the long run.

To dispute and become upset by umpiring decisions means that a player's concentration will be broken and this can prove fatal.

My father threatened me at a young age that he would stop following my career if he saw me back chat the umpire — it just wasn't on.

I will never forget the day my eldest brother and I were playing in the East Perth thirds team. I had been filled in by an opposition player and my brother rushed in to provide some protection.

I was proud of him, but dad, was disgusted, he said it was not necessary and a major row developed at home. (I still reckon dad was wrong, but so strong were his principles).

There is no doubt that these recent outbursts at umpires set a bad example to youngsters who play, watch, listen and read about this great game.

My advice to the umpes is be yourself, don't be discouraged, believe in yourself, continue to call it as you see it, use common sense and above all, enjoy yourself out in the middle.

State task

I'M thrilled to be a State selector this season, along with Dr Tom Stannage (Chairman), Bob Manning, Les Mumme and Grant Dorrington. Together with coach John Todd, we have an enormous responsibility to ensure that WA remain as Australian champions in this our Centenary year.

We have been meeting regularly for some months now, assessing the type of player we want. We are really only interested in players who have proved that they can perform at their best under maximum pressure, can play in a variety of positions, always compete no matter what and men who take pride in their performance.

At this stage our thoughts and plans are devoted towards the South Australian game and the league will be sending two selectors to South Australia to watch the game against Victoria to be played under lights.

Todd's hunger for success and dedication to the task is so great that nothing less than 100% will go into preparing and coaching the State team.

Final five

WITH the gap between the top and bottom sides closing all the time. I consider it would now be opportune to have a final five in WA football.

This would mean that all teams would be in with a chance to make the finals well into the last round of fixtures.

The hopes of lower sides of making the five would be kept alive longer and it would make the season more competitive and profitable for the clubs and the league.

You would not need to extend the season, the first two finals could be played on the same day — second and third at Subiaco Oval and fourth and fifth at a neutral ground.



THE VAN HELDEN FILE

MOST FACILITIES ARE RETROGRADE

WHEN it comes to finding out who is responsible for the up-keep and modernisation of media facilities, it's like searching for the "Invisible Man".

The clubs, local councils and the WAFL do a "Pontius Pilot" when badgered on the subject.

This is how I assess the current media facilities at the various league grounds:

SUBIACO — Good in all respects.

BASSEDEAN — Satisfactory.

CLAREMONT — Fair: However, when there is an easterly breeze blowing, accompanied by rain, water descends onto the bench in the broadcasting box. Hence, it's not uncommon to find more water in front of you than one would find in the moat surrounding the Sherriff of Nottingham's Castle! If the precipitation cascaded on to your writing material, the the ink would run rampant.

It wouldn't be so bad if one was Van Gogh or Reubens because you could do a match summary in the form of a water painting!

One day last year John O'Connell, fearful that the wires of his radio equipment might get wet, thought he could be electrocuted. You needn't have worried, John; I was there that day and at least you would have got more "kicks" than some of those players out in the arena.

LATHLAIN PARK AND PERTH OVAL — Poor: At Lathlain one needs a miners lamp to read the script — especially at 5.30pm in the middle of June. Not only is the light poor, but critics are also exposed to the elements. At times you would swear that the breeze was coming straight off the Antarctic.

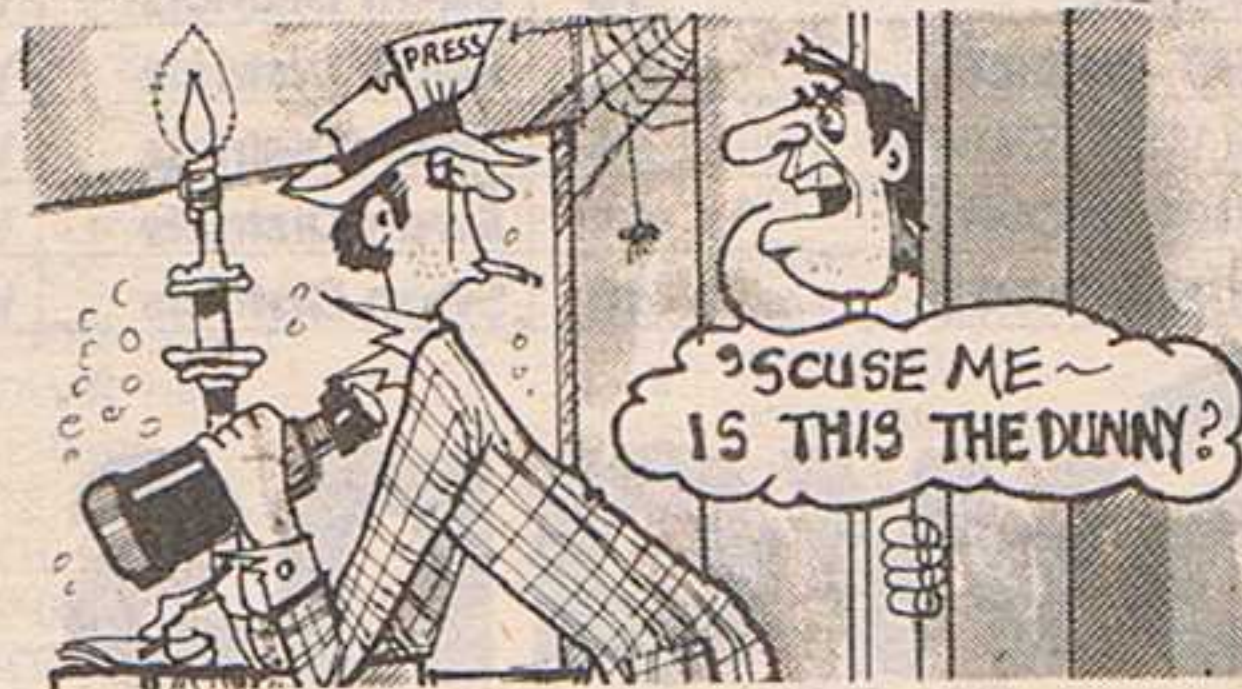
Perth Oval has the same problems as Lathlain, with the lighting even worse. Here a hurricane lamp is required.

LEEDERVILLE OVAL — Horrendous: It's not uncommon to arrive at Leederville Oval and see remains of hot dogs, chips and cold, half-filled cups of coffee decorating the press box. It's bad luck if you have just done your dry-cleaning, because there is more dust that on a Commonwealth Public Servant's desk!

On one occasion I witnessed a member of the press sitting down on what remained of a semi-eaten hamburger. Alas, it did wonders for his Tony Barlows!

EAST FREMANTLE — Ultra-horrendous: The grandstand leaks, one needs a search light to read notes and you are a gargantuan distance away from the left full-forward pocket at the Marmion Street end of the arena. Imagine poor Fred Woods trying to pick up an umpiring decision that far away!

The media personnel are so far away from the action at the southern end of East Fremantle Oval, that if East Perth's Wayne Otway was resting in the forward pocket, they would think it was one of the kids getting ready to play in the R & I Little League game!



FREMANTLE OVAL — Archaic: Also grotesque and neanderthal (pertaining to the stone-age). This is, without doubt, the pick of the "crop".

First of all one enters the press box through a 19th century door. You are then confronted by a ladder that is so steep it's almost perpendicular. It's like negotiating the conning tower of a World War II submarine. In fact the person most qualified to scale the monstrosity is Otto Von Kretschner of the "Golden Horseshoe" (U Boat . . . U99). One day someone will slip and filter into the Nether Regions.

Once that obstacle has been conquered, you then join in the savage jostling for a seat with the other media celebrities. It's easier getting a kick on Bruce Doull! Just imagine, successful at last, and then being wedged in between John Watts and Tim Flynn.

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MORE WIND PLEASE "WINDOWS"

WITH falling attendances and football in general losing popularity, it needs as much media exposure as possible to keep public interest. West Perth coach John Wynne is doing a disservice to the promotion of the game with his refusal to talk to the media. His meaningless and absurd coaches comment after his team's resounding win over Perth was a perfect example of his lack of communication with all spheres of the media. This sort of attitude is unfair to the many dedicated Falcons supporters and the general public.

TOUGH TASK

ONE thing an around-the-grounds commentator always dreads is having to provide a ball-by-ball description of a match. The four radio stations mount big commentary teams for their match-of-the-day, with three men at the other grounds to provide scores. But there are times — such as on radio 6WF last week — when their broadcast game was a walkover (East Fremantle versus East Perth) so they crossed to former South Fremantle great Tony Parentich sitting contentedly at Subiaco Oval. Suddenly Parentich had to provide a commentary of the game — and he obviously lacked a little knowledge of the Subiaco players. In a brief commentary involving about two minutes of football he did not name one Subiaco player.

MATHS PROBLEM

WHILE talking about our old mate Tony Parentich, he is another media man who deserves a barb in my campaign to improve the performance from the men in the press box. Parentich didn't help the promotion of our game when he announced to his listeners on ABC radio just before the Subiaco-South Fremantle clash that there was a crowd of "only 2000" at the ground. He later amended the crowd figure to 4000, when in fact it was closer to 9000.

HARD HITTER

SWANS strongman Garry Sidebottom seems to be preoccupied with the physical stuff and his football form has suffered. The black and whites need the big fellow firing and he might be more effective concentrating on the ball.

DEMON DOUBTS

FORMER Perth champion player and colts coach Ray Lawrence must have summed up the feelings of quite a few loyal Demon supporters when he talked about the "outsiders" in their senior team last week. Lawrence was commenting on the fact that league coach Mal Brown had brought Chris Stasinowsky and Dean Farmer straight into the seniors after being cleared from rival clubs. He pointed out that there were a lot of young Demons who had survived a tough pre-season at Lathlain only to miss out on senior spots.

WHAT A FIZZOGG

TALKING about the so-called game-of-the-day status. Channel 7 took a bold step this season by deciding to show a live telecast of the last quarter of a league match. But with their equipment fairly thinly stretched, they obviously have to nominate the game during the week — though they go to great pains to keep their decision secret. However, they must have regretted going to East Fremantle Oval last week when the Sharks were 15 goals in front when they crossed over live for the last quarter.

MEDIA MUDDLE

STILL on my mates in the media — Joe Fanchi deserved a pat on the back on 6NR last week when he cleverly filled in while the broadcast team "took a powder". Fanchi, covering the game at Claremont Oval, had heard compatriot Bill Valli sum up at East Fremantle Oval and cross back to Tim Flynn and the boys at Subiaco. IS DUCKY TOO OLD?

HAS John Duckworth got rocks in his head? Is he on an ego trip or is he just a football addict?

Those were some of the questions that sprung to mind when the former Magarey medallist decided to try and break back into league football at 36 years of age — more than two years after he hung up his boots with West Perth.

Some may query the advantage it will be to the Falcons in him making a comeback at his age for two-thirds of a season.

It will only be a stop-gap measure. West Perth are a young team and will take time to develop. But if the objective is to make the four this season at any cost, then Duckworth could be a handy man to have around.

I don't see anything wrong in someone playing league football at 36. My main query is him trying again after missing such a long period from league football.

In fact, I think too many league footballers give the game away long before they should.

It seems once they have broken the 30 age barrier it is time to contemplate giving the game away.

Not having had his body tuned to league football for two years and almost another round, Duckworth will probably feel every bump if he does return to the league side.

There is no reason why someone can't play into his mid-thirties and still make a significant contribution as did Jack Sheedy, Graham Farmer, Barry Cable and Mel Whinnen.

The body doesn't suddenly start to pack up just because someone reaches 30, though their appetite for the game may have diminished.

Take world boxing champion Larry Holmes, who is still on top of his sport at an age when those four players gave the game away. And what about American runner Carlos Lopes, who is running better at 37 than any stage of his career.

In becoming the first man to break 2hrs. 8min, he is having probably his best year of running at an age when many sportsmen are starting to live on their memories.

On the football scene here, Ron Alexander and Peter Featherby have a log to offer, though I still believe Alexander will eventually have to decide if he wants to be a player or a coach.

At the moment things are going sweetly for him so he can combine both.

I believe Graham Moss gave the game away too soon, I trace some of Claremont's problems in 1984 and this year to him giving the game away so suddenly.

He should have eased his way out of the side. As it was, he left them in a sink-or-swim situation and for a long time they looked likely to drown.

Claremont's problems in the past two years is in not having had an effective key forward.

With his fight and experience, Moss would have been a handy player to have lurking around the goals.

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The forward line was Claremont's achilles heel last year and it is looming again that way this season.

It is worth noting they have had one of the best defences in the WAFL but have found it difficult to score goals.

This is borne out by the fact only East Fremantle have had less points scored against them than the Tigers while Claremont have only managed to score more points than East Perth.

THE Golden Era for Subiaco Club was in seasons 1912 and 1913. In these seasons the Maroons won the premiership, and were the top dogs of the football, having no less a personage than the State Premier as one of their lusty voiced barrackers.

The football representatives of the model suburb put Subiaco on the map and though after the 1915 season, during the war period and after, there were seasons of depression, it must be granted that the Maroons stand today as good a side as was ever sent out.

Subiaco has now won eight matches in succession — four at the close of last season, and four this season. Each game has shown the Maroons as a brilliant side, and unquestionably meritorious winners.

Their latest victims were East Perth, who went under after a good game.

Subiaco has a perfectly balanced side. It is indeed hard to fault it. Individually and collectively it is good. There are no weak links, and every member of the side plays intelligently, and the side that plays with "head" will always defeat the bullockers. It is a good thing that it is so, for no game is worth a rap that does not offer a reward for the quick, intelligent thinking.

The Maroons are in the happy position, that, except in the cases of sickness or accident, they do not have to be experimenting with new players, and the remarkable thing is that their reserves fill the bill most capably.

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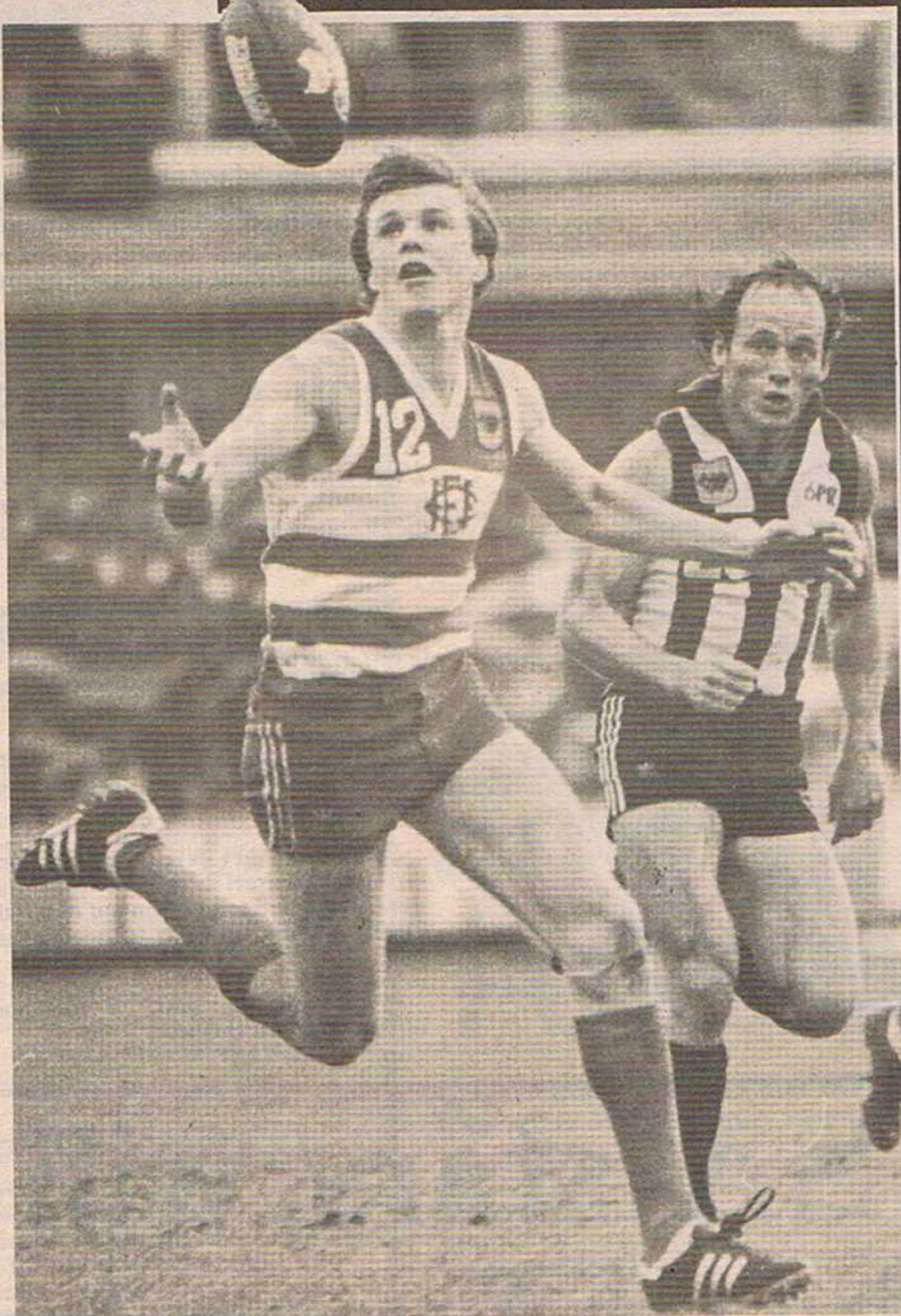
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WHEN young Sharks defender Michael Brennan burst onto the league football scene in 1983, he stamped himself as a player with enormous potential.

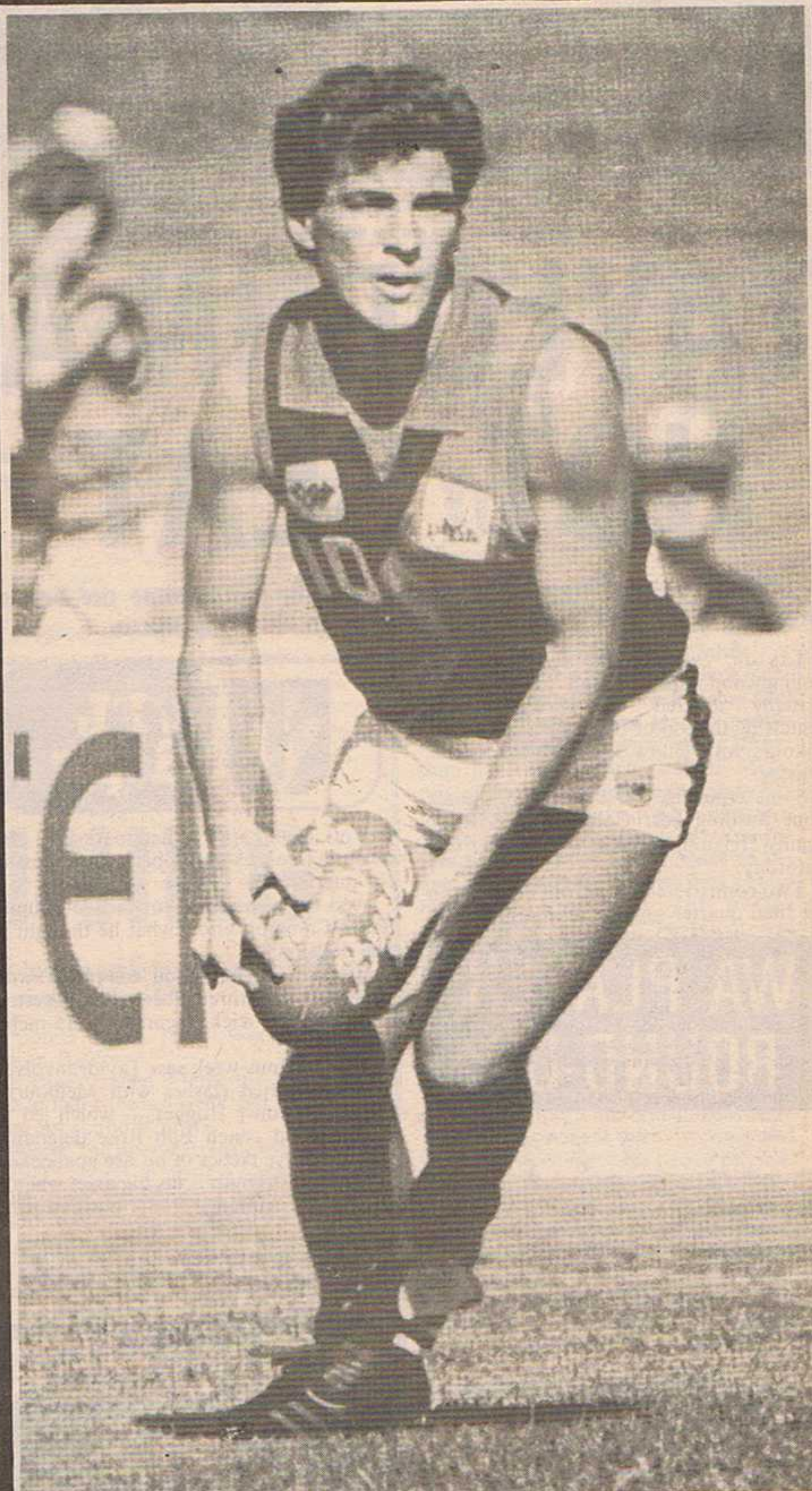

TAYLOR IN A HOT SEAT

BRIAN Taylor, the boy from Mandurah, has become the hottest property in the VFL — and the centre of an umpiring storm.

Taylor, who has switched to Collingwood this season after being virtually rejected by Richmond, is contesting the top-of-the-table goalkicking honours with fellow West Aussie Simon Beasley.

Some critics believe that Taylor's goal-front bustling cost Collingwood victory against reigning premiers Essendon last Saturday.

Two controversial goalfront decisions in the final quarter saw the umpires take the



ball off Taylor after he had marked — and award a free kick to full-back Paul Weston for interference.

And the volatile full-forward let umpire Peter Cameron know what he thought of the decisions!

In fact, Taylor stood toe-to-toe with Cameron and threw the ball at Weston after one free kick, incurring a 15-metre penalty.

The previous week saw Taylor involved in some heated clashes with Melbourne full-back Danny Hughes — which led to Collingwood coach Bob Rose defending the aggressive tactics of his ace goalkicker.

Taylor's strength is his big asset when it comes to winning front position and marking.

But his tactics are going to come under fire, especially if he concedes free kicks at vital stages of a game.

TOUGHER CATS

GEELONG coach Tom Hafey wants his Cats to get tougher.

After Geelong's 72-point loss to Carlton, Hafey was adamant that the Cats weren't aggressive enough — but he admitted that they lacked the manpower to do much about it.

"We don't hold the ball in our forward line and don't put enough pressure on the opposition," he said.

Carlton continually took the ball out of defence easily and were never under pressure when it came to setting up scoring shots in attack.

The Cats gave Carlton a start in each quarter and then struggled to get back into the game.

COMEBACK DAY

SUPER-giant Paul Salmon is far from being a forgotten man in the Essendon camp.

The big ruckman was sidelined last July when he shattered a knee playing against Collingwood — but he has already set his comeback date.

Salmon wants to be back in action by June 29 and his reconstructed knee is showing no adverse reaction to the higher tempo of training he is now doing.

"I'll be taking it fairly carefully for another four weeks," said Salmon.

"Then I'll do four weeks of tough training and hopefully be ready for my first game by mid-season."

BLUES BLOW

EXPENSIVE Carlton recruit David Rhys-Jones has a recurrence of his old knee injury — and coach David Parkin is worried.

Parkin indicated that the star half-forward was something of 'a crock' before switching from the Sydney Swans, with knee injuries a constant problem.

Rhys-Jones, the most expensive buy of any VFL footballer with a price tag over the \$230,000 mark, left the ground in the second quarter and did not re-appear.

The Blues won handsomely against Geelong, but they didn't come out unscathed. Utility player Wayne Harmes was on the end of a devastating bump that seems likely to put him out of the Anzac Day clash with Melbourne.

Harmes became a stretcher case when he collided with Geelong rover Neville Bruns — who also suffered concussion.

Rioli struggles

RICHMOND champion Maurice Rioli is struggling to overcome poor form — and the clearance battle with South Fremantle is probably the reason.

South have insisted that Richmond negotiate his lease agreement this year. The matter reached a legal head this week — but in the meantime the magical centreman has struggled.

Against Fitzroy last week he managed just 10 kicks and generally he is playing without zest.

South claim they have Rioli bound on a three-year contract as from 1985 and they want Richmond to buy him out of it if the Tigers want the Thursday Islander in their side.

"It is worrying him," a Richmond official admitted this week.

VFL talent scouts are aware that the form four situation and the draft agreement will both expire at the end of this season — leaving the way open for any club to negotiate with some of SA's top talent.

Heading the list of players who should be on the open market is Craig Bradley, the Port Adelaide star who blitzed Hawthorn in a Foster's Cup match in Melbourne last week.

Peter Motley (Sturt), Michael Aish (Norwood), Greg Anderson (Port Adelaide) and Stephen Kernahan (Glenelg) all look certain to be the target of recruiting agents keen to "re-sign" them.

These players have previously been tied to VFL clubs, but that changes with the expiration of the previous agreements — and now they all become free agents.

VETERAN Mal Blight showed that he still knows how to win big matches when he booted 14 goals and steered Woodville to a sensational win over West Adelaide last week.

Blight, a former captain-coach of North Melbourne, led his Woodville Warriors on a second-half burst to take the honours from West Adelaide.

North Adelaide have stayed on top of the SANFL ladder by downing reigning premiers Norwood in a high scoring match.

The clash of win-less sides Sturt (with former Richmond player Merve Keane rushed straight into his new side) beating South Adelaide by three points.

Central District proved too strong for Port Adelaide and Glenelg beat West Torrens.



QUICK WORK

PORT Adelaide full-forward Dwayne Russell has quickly come under the eyes of VFL talent scouts.

The 20-year-old kicked seven goals against Hawthorn in the mid-week Foster's Cup match — and raised a few eyebrows among the Victorian observers.

But those talent scouts who moved into Russell's territory found that they were too late — Collingwood and Carlton had already been in touch with him.

Ten years ago:

BROWN IN THE NEWS

WHETHER by design or accident, Mal Brown has always had great difficulty in keeping out of the headlines and 1975 was no exception.

Brown who returned home after one season with the VFL Tigers, Richmond, was appointed coach at Claremont, and trouble started in his first practice match.

He got tangled up with umpire Lindsay Baguley and copped a 15-week sentence. Fortunately the rest of his club's practice matches counted as playing dates.

Three weeks later, veteran boundary umpire Charlie Pratt had Brown on an abusive language report, but this one didn't stick.

After 11 games, Brown won his clearance from East Perth, but in his sixth league game of his new club there was another report.

This time umpire Ron Powell did not like the way Brown tackled West Perth's Leon O'Dwyer, so he had to sit out the next six games.

Umpires advocate Ray Montgomery put Brown on report after an incident that night, claiming he was pushed down the stairs. However his hearing resulted in a victory for Brown.

SIDEY'S ROLE

A FREQUENT visitor to the league tribunal in 1975 was Garry Sidebottom — but only as the chief witness. In the space of 14 games, three opponents were reported for trying to disfigure big Sidey's head. Stan Magro (SF), Graham Heal (WP) and Ron Bentley (EF) all paid the penalty.

GOOD YEAR

THE year of 1975 was a good one financially for East Perth; their balance sheet showed a loss of only \$440.

IN REVERSE

NEW umpire Darryle Gillies was reprimanded for swearing at players in a game between Swan Districts and East Perth.

BOO-BOO

SUBIACO'S present-day colts coach Eddie Pitter served one week of a three-game suspension when it was realised that the reserve umpire who made the report

didn't have the power to do so. Pitter, a Royals player then, was cleared and the constitution was quickly changed.

Subiaco's Peter Featherby headed for Footscray 10 years ago and his club was reported to be \$20,000 richer for the transfer fee.

Also moving East that year was the nomadic John Hayes, who went as far as West Adelaide.

One of the worst tragedies on the football field occurred in Victoria when Footscray's Neil Sachse collided head-on with an opponent and became a quadriplegic.

Remember the Ron Bayens case? Fitzroy signed him. Subiaco would not release him and everyone finished up in court 10 years ago. No one was the winner as all parties had to share the cost — and Bayens stayed with the Lions.

A player named Stasinowski appeared at Leederville Oval — but his first name was Ian and after three unsuccessful attempts for a clearance, returned to his home club, Norwood in SA.

North Melbourne grabbed 16-year-old colts player Graeme Carter from East Fremantle in a deal reputed to be worth \$27,000 to Carter who didn't quite make it there and later played only 47 games with the Sharks.

BOTTOM TO TOP

THERE was a typographical error in my column last week which drew a couple of telephone calls.

I mentioned that West Perth became the first club to finish on the bottom of the ladder one season and top of the table the next year. Unfortunately, the word "first" appeared as third.

And to further clarify the point, I was referring to West Perth's position on the premiership ladder at the end of the qualifying rounds and not teams who have come from the bottom of the ladder to win a premiership. In fact, that has been achieved on four occasions, by teams who have finished in the four the year after being wooden spooners.

He was an outstanding player in Goomalling and he has gone one step further by coming to Perth.

CONSTRUCTIVE

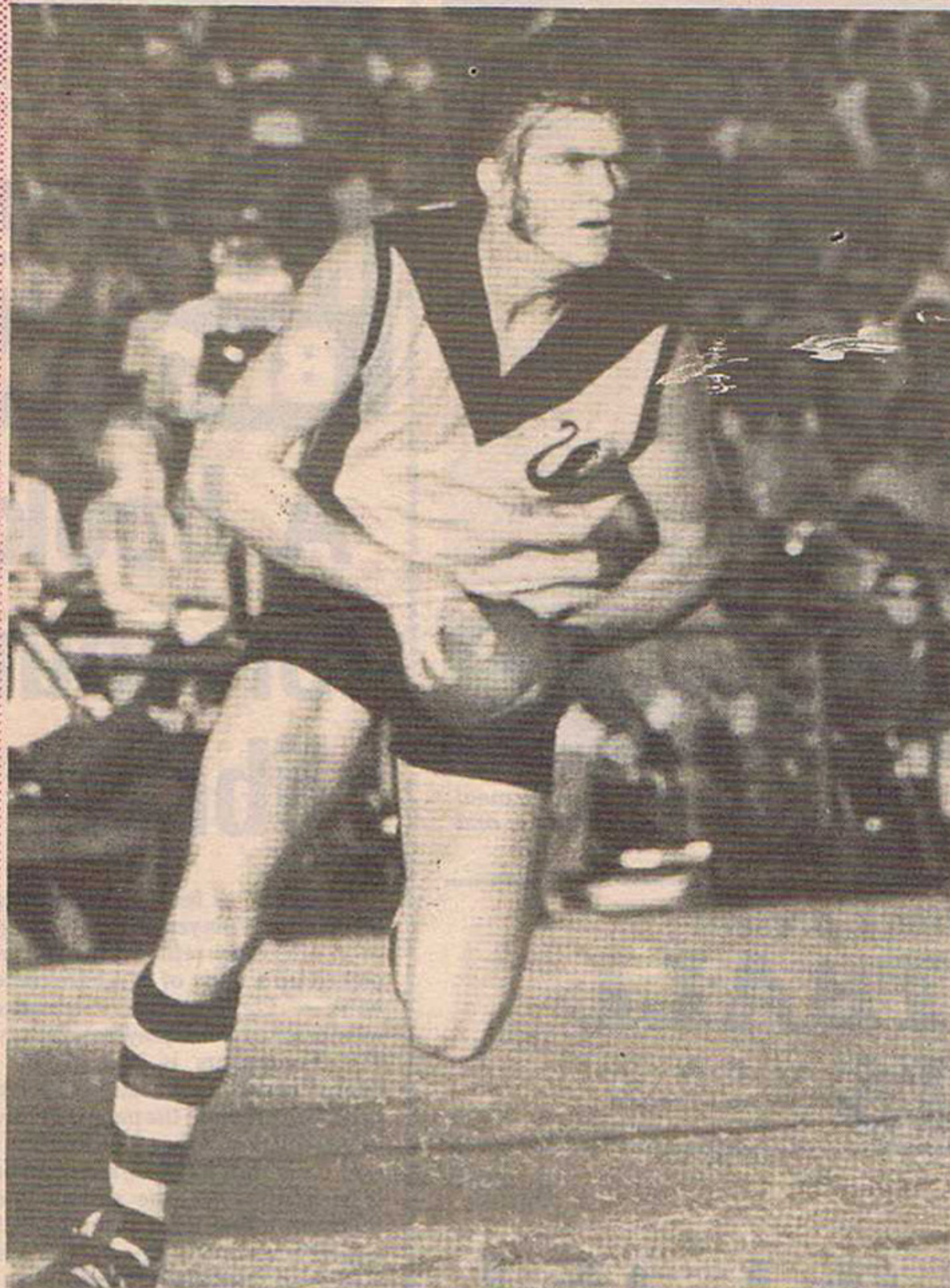

TRIBUTE TO MORE RETIRED STARS

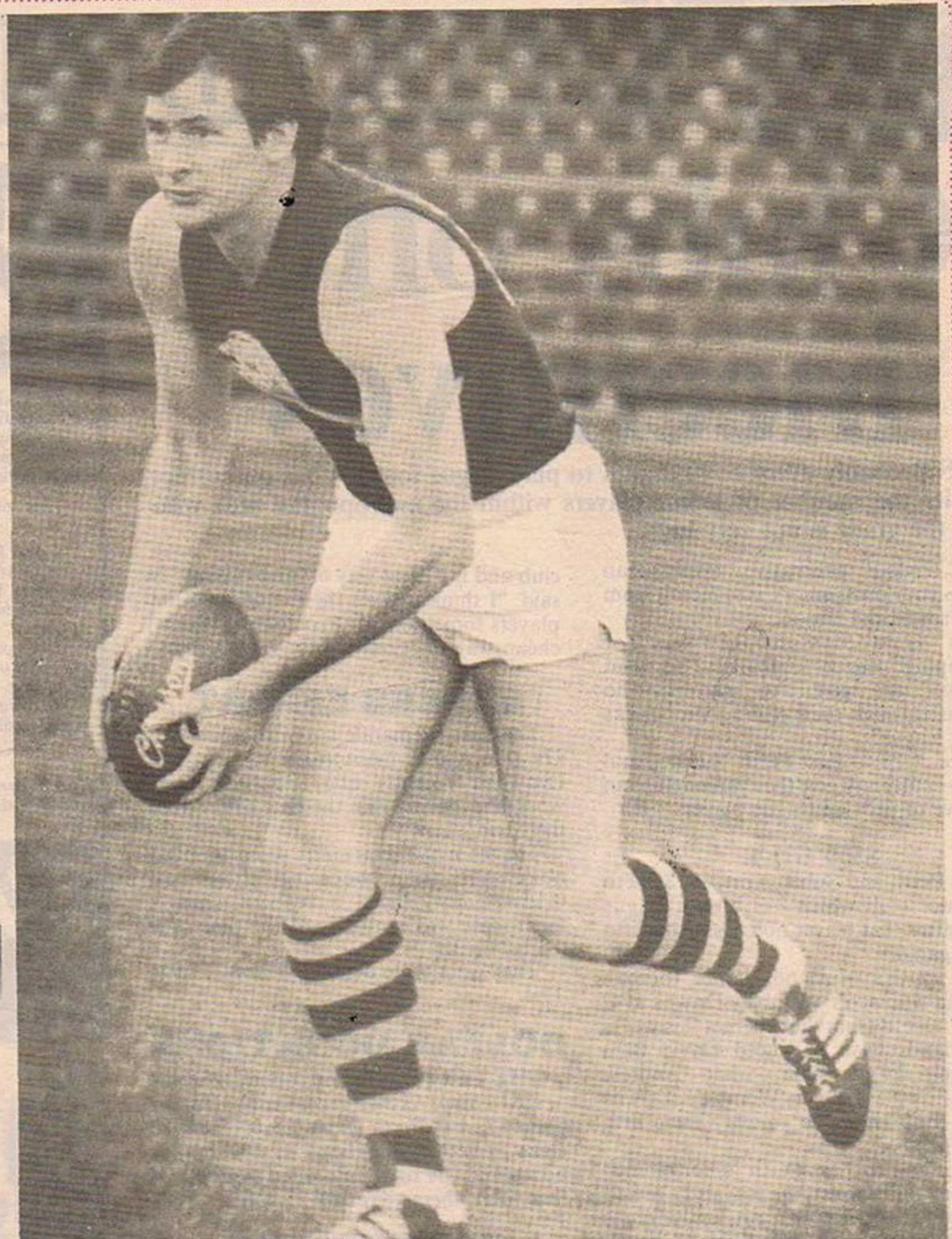
AT the conclusion of each season a short list of players hang up their boots for the last time. The end of the 1984 season was no exception as 14 stalwarts of WA football graced the eight league grounds for the final time. This week we conclude our two-part tribute to these former league stars.



KEVIN WORTHINGTON'S league career began with Claremont back in 1971 and ended one and a half decades later when he retired midway through last season. He was a tough no-holds-barred footballer who decided last season, after receiving a four-week suspension, that the team would be better served by providing opportunities for young players... so he hung up his boots after 226 games with Claremont (105), Collingwood (96) and Perth (27). It was a tough career for Worthington (31) who was troubled by leg injuries continually. His early brilliance shone out at centre-half-forward for Claremont, but when he went to Victoria he developed into a relentless defender. His experience proved invaluable in his final two years at Perth.



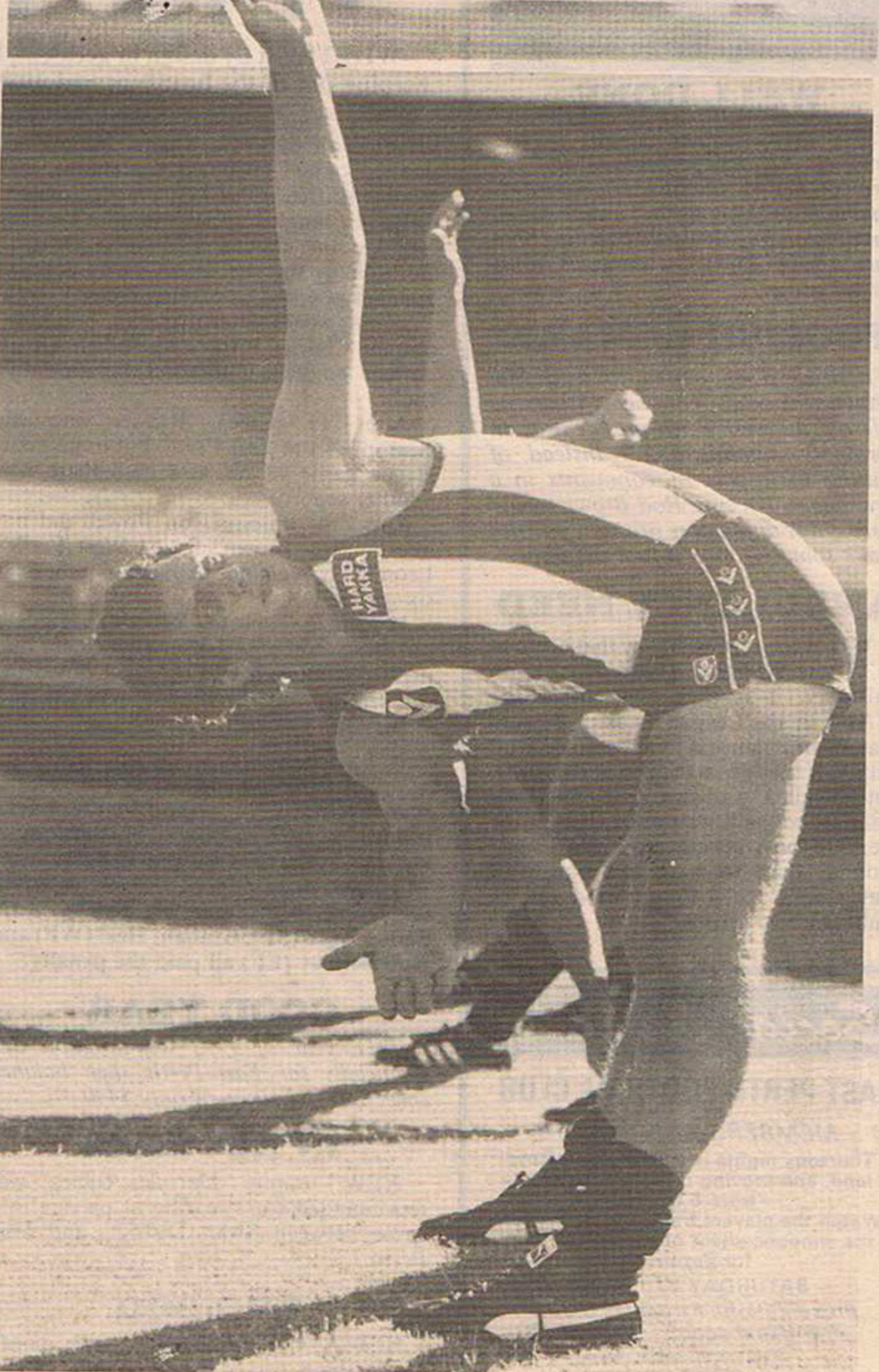
A FOOTBALL battler, but a successful one — that is the way to describe David Rawlinson (32), who entered league football at the late age of 24, preferring to concentrate on University studies. An unobtrusive ruckman, he proved to be a competent back-up to Stephen Michael in his 43 games at South Fremantle, moving there from Claremont, where he played 61 games. Rawlinson was a player who relied on hard work to make up for a lack of natural ability.



ROD Brown started his career as a 17-year-old in 1972 at Swan Districts, where he made his mark in the backline. After a short stint at Woodville, in SA, he moved to Subiaco where he played some of his best football in attack, mainly at centre-half-forward. Brown (29) proved his versatility by playing in key forward and defensive positions and finished his career on a high note last season by reaching the 100-game milestone with the Lions, after 86 at Swans and eight with Woodville.



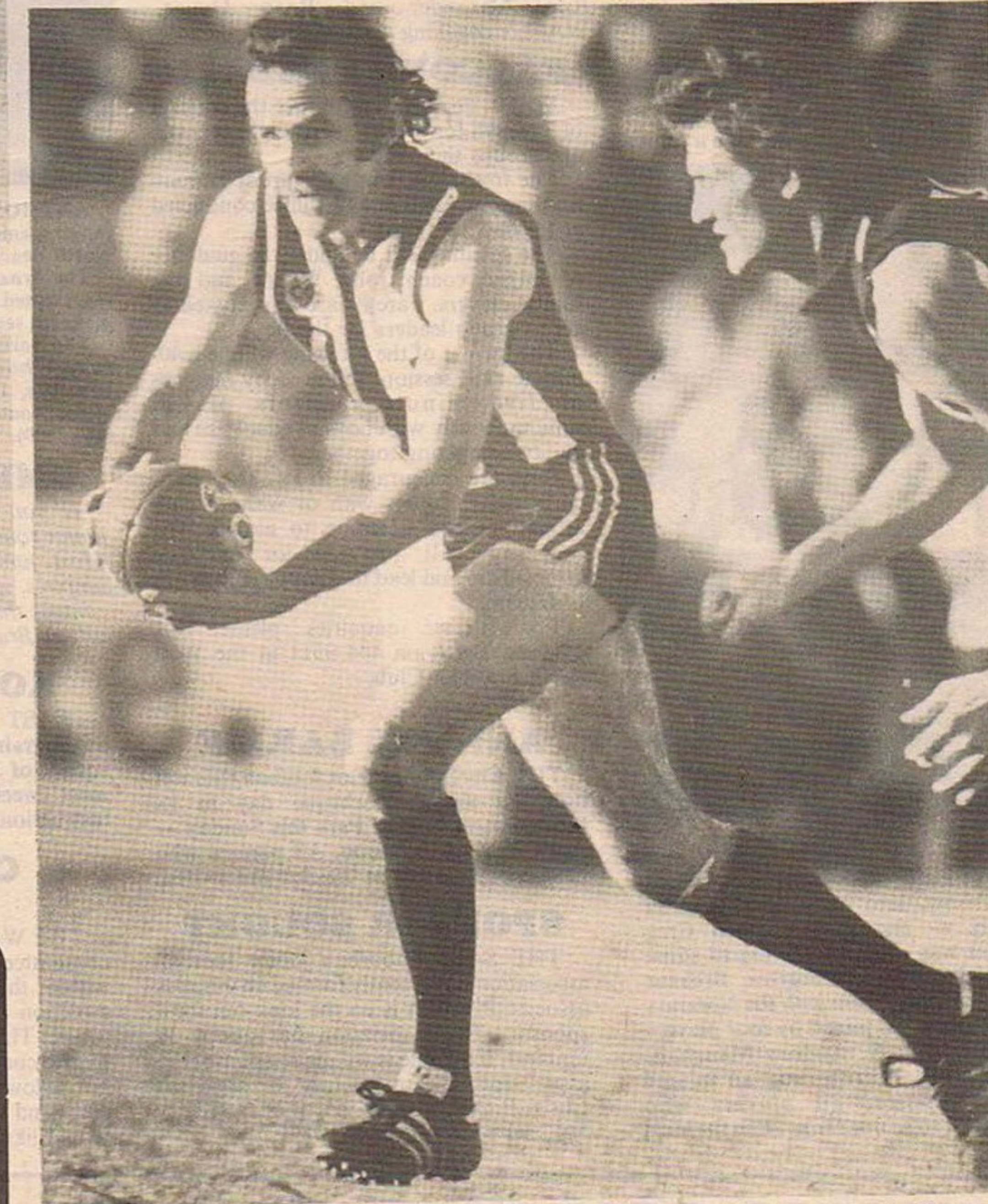
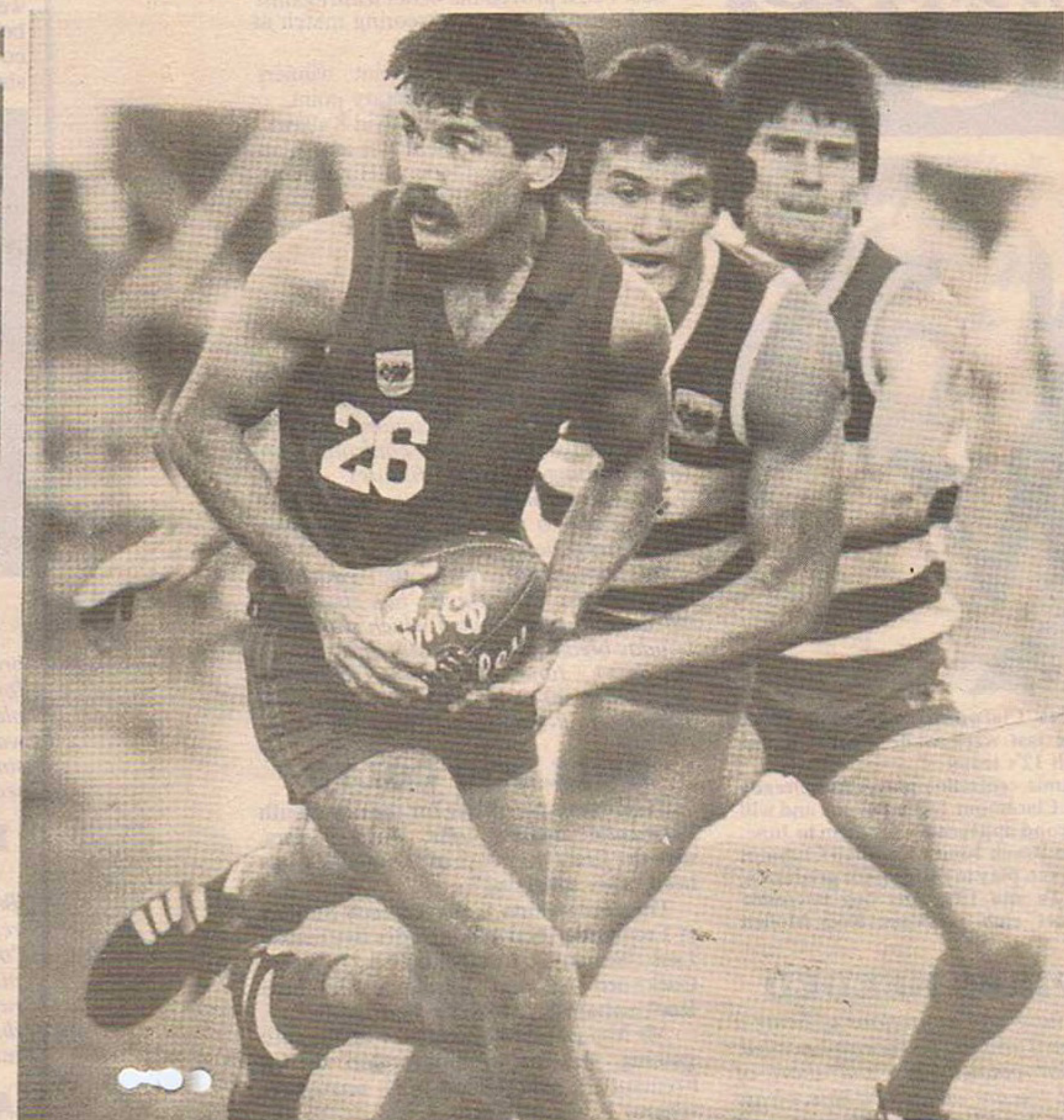
KEVIN Cornell was a solid half-back flanker who was a consistent contributor for the Bulldogs in a career spanning 129 games. He was a skillful attacking defender who was on the half-back-flank in the Bulldogs 1980 premiership side. Cornell (29) was not a headline-grabber, but he certainly did his job with loyalty.



IT was a long time between Paul Mountain's senior debut and his retirement — 15 years in fact. Mountain (34) was a hard-working ruck-rover who gave solid service to three clubs — Swan Districts (23 games), South Fremantle (116) and West Perth (21). He played his best football at South Fremantle, where he took full advantage of Stephen Michael's ruck dominance. He combined with Paul Vasoli to form one of WA's best ruck-roving combinations in the late 1970's and early 1980's.

STAN Magro (left) one of the youngest players to play senior football, making his league debut for South Fremantle at the age of 15 back in 1970. This tough back-pocket specialist turned centreman played a total of 224 games with three clubs — South Fremantle (105), Collingwood (99) and Ed East Perth (20). He made a name for himself in the highly-competitive VFL/VFL arena, being nicknamed "Stan the Man" — a sign that stamped him as the man to do the tough jobs. This little dynamo will be remembered for the fearless way he attacked his football and his tremendous courage.

"Would you go an Export mate?"



ED BLACKABY proved himself to be more than just another gutsy little rover after joining Swan Districts from the Manuka club in Canberra in 1980. He was plagued by illness during his four seasons in WA, showing great reserves of courage and character to fight back and set a brilliant example of determination and perseverance at Bassendean. Blackaby (33) finished with 54 games at Swans, but his service to the club has not ended there — he continues as coach of the reserves side.

Clubs offer incentives

IT'S probably every boy's dream to play league football but on current statistics the number of junior players within the metropolitan area who make the grade is not very high.

The obvious alternative, rather than develop your own juniors, is to recruit from clubs around the nation.

This is a contentious way of "developing" league footballers. So what incentives are given to players who progress through their club's junior ranks to play league?

Three clubs — East Perth, Subiaco and Perth — currently give their junior clubs an incentive to provide league players.

\$500 GIFT

East Perth and Subiaco present \$500 to the junior club which has bred a league player after that player notches up his fifth league game.

East Perth's Maylands junior football club and Subiaco's Wembley Downs JFC should benefit from the schemes this week.

Maylands have produced David Bain for their league club, while Andrew MacNish is a former Wembley Downs junior. Both are due to play their fifth league game.

According to East Perth junior council president Bill Forrest, the Royals have had this incentive operating for its junior clubs for "about eight years". Subiaco began their scheme last year.

For at least a decade, the Perth Football Club has provided \$500 and a framed photograph of the player to the junior club which bred a league footballer from its junior ranks. The player only needs to make his league debut before the junior club benefits.

South Fremantle junior council president John Ready, believes that such incentives are good for junior clubs.

"The \$500 goes a long way for a junior

club and is a great way of fund-raising," he said. "I think it gives the junior clubs and players something to strive for and is a very cheap way of recruiting for league clubs."

SUPERB EFFORT

The East Fremantle junior football club 17s side had a meritorious victory over Lynwood recently after doubling their work and having half the time to produce their win.

The team had their entire score annulled near half-time because they had inadvertently played a reserve when a team-mate was sent off. At the time they led 8.7 to 3.1.

They went on to defeat Lynwood 17.9 to 11.4.

DOLLAR DONATIONS

THE East Perth junior council likes the new \$1 coins. At their recent annual junior parade day at Perth Oval, players from 10 clubs collected donations in 300 money boxes and the total amounted to \$990. Of that total, there were 209 \$1 coins.

TOP TURNOUT

THE East Fremantle junior council held their annual coaches and managers meeting at the East Fremantle football club recently and a top turnout of 120 officials listened to guest speakers, league coach Ron Alexander and Brian Douge, WAFL's coaching co-ordinator.

FALCON FREEBALL

WEST Perth will introduce the concept of Freeball for the seven and eight year old age groups this year.

The freeball season will start at 9.30 am on Sunday, April 28 and will be conducted at Leederville Oval.

The sessions will be under the guidance of league coach John Wynne and the league players. Parents are also invited to act as group leaders for the boys.

The format of the morning will be a 40-minute skill session, followed by matches of five minute quarters played simultaneously with boys of equal size and ability competing together.

Boys are encouraged to join their local clubs, but all boys with or without club affiliations are welcome to attend. The morning will provide an exciting atmosphere and lead to a happy enjoyment of freeball.

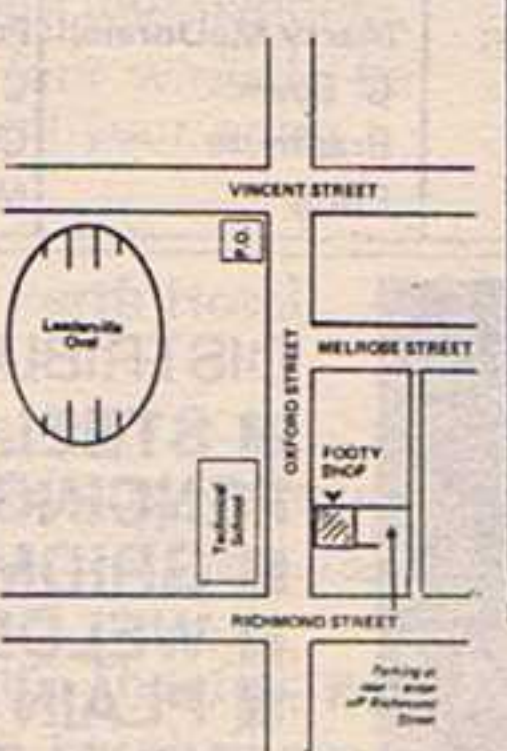

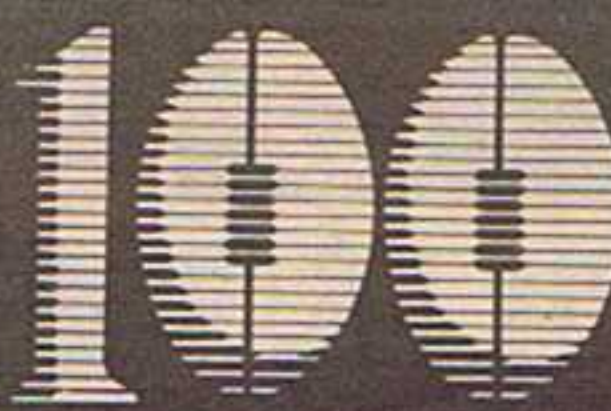

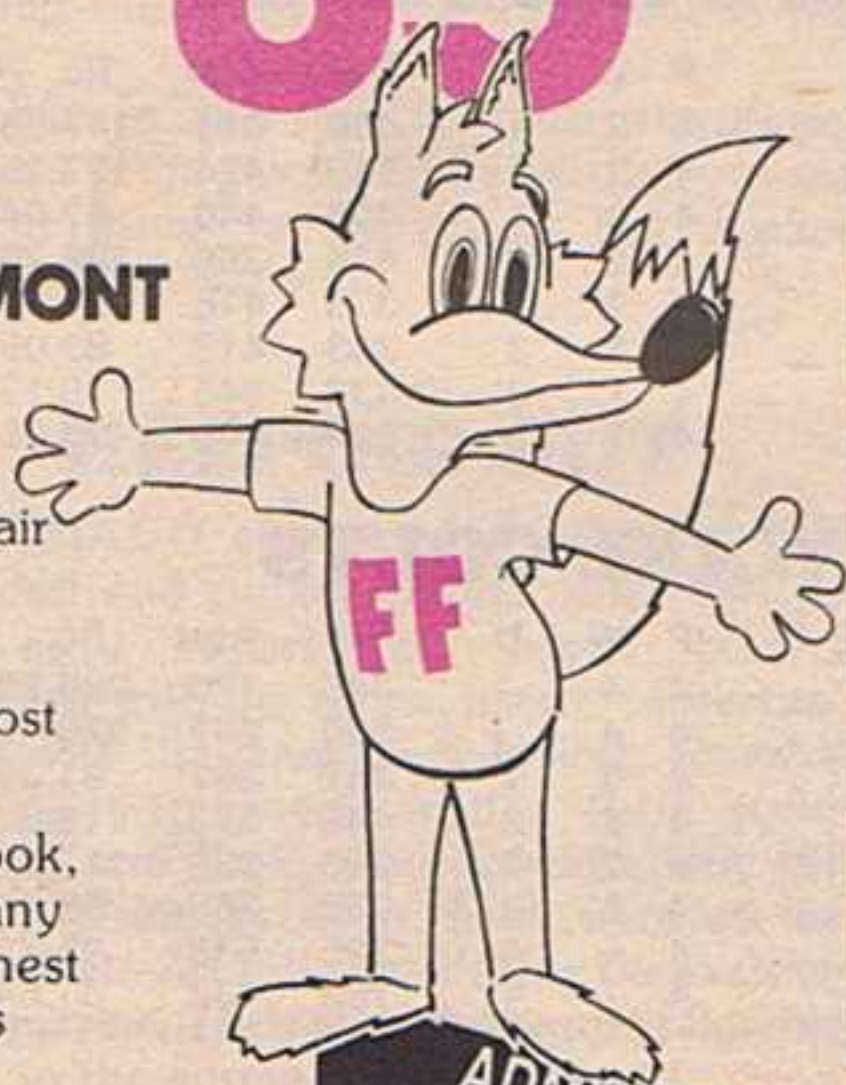
