VFL RAIDERS AT

WORK

THE player drain to the VFL is set for a major surge as clubs, hungry for success, dangle huge monetary baits in front of the nation's best young players.

Sydney Swans potential owner, Dr Geoff Edelsten — one of the wealthiest men in Australia — and North Melbourne, ready to repeat their enormous spending spree of the 1970s, are in a two-club battle to sign the cream of Australia's future stars.

Former North Melbourne and VFL president Dr Allen Aylett was the pioneer of big sponsorship in football.

The Kangaroos, at the request of coach Ron Barassi and under the rule of Aylett, spent big money to buy premierships and were successful.

Now Edelsten is following a similar path — and has the financial resources to gain similar success.

North Melbourne have made no secret of the fact that East Fremantle trio, Clinton Browning, Murray Wrensted and Michael Brennan, plus Claremont and East Perth stars Peter Davidson and Michael Christian, are high on their list of priorities.

Edelsten has a list of 13 leading SA footballers, including well-known stars to WA fans, Peter Motley, Dwayne Russell, Craig Bradley and Garry McIntosh.

Bradley and Motley will become "free agents" by October, according to VFL administrator Alan Schwab.

HIGHEST BIDDER

Schwab said that "form four" and "draft players" would not be tied to any VFL club after October and would have to be re-signed by their club to prevent them being lost to the highest bidder.

Other players who will become free agents include Michael Aish (signed by Richmond), Stephen Kernahan (Carlton) and John Platten (Hawthorn).

The VFL board has delayed announcing Edelsten as the successful applicant for private ownership of the Swans, fearing he may use his vast wealth to buy a completely new football team.

Edelsten will be stiff competition for the Kangaroos in the attack on WA's young football resources.

Established stars Paul Harding and Murray Rance (Hawthorn) and Jon Dorotich and Peter Sartori (Carlton) have already signed up, which doesn't leave many players ready-made for the VFL.

However, Laurie Keene, David O'Connell, Dwayne Lamb and possibly Shane Bogunovich are prime targets.

Keene must be on top of the recruiting list. There is no doubt he would be a sensation in the VFL, similar to that other goalkicking giant, Essendon's Paul Salmon.

If Edelsten is allowed a free shopping hand, it would be to the detriment of football in both WA and SA as the well dries up.



Murray Wrensted

A REPORT THAT NEVER WAS

THOUSANDS of radio listeners must still be puzzled about the alleged "reporting" of star East Fremantle centreman Murray Wrensted last Saturday.

The hot Sandover Medal fancy had his number taken early in the first quarter by boundary umpire David Ross — but no report eventuated after the game.

Radio commentators on at least two stations made big news of the fact that Wrensted's number was noted in a fiery encounter against Perth.

Several said that the incident obviously affected the star Shark. However, Wrensted went on to be one of East Fremantle's key players in their victory over Perth.

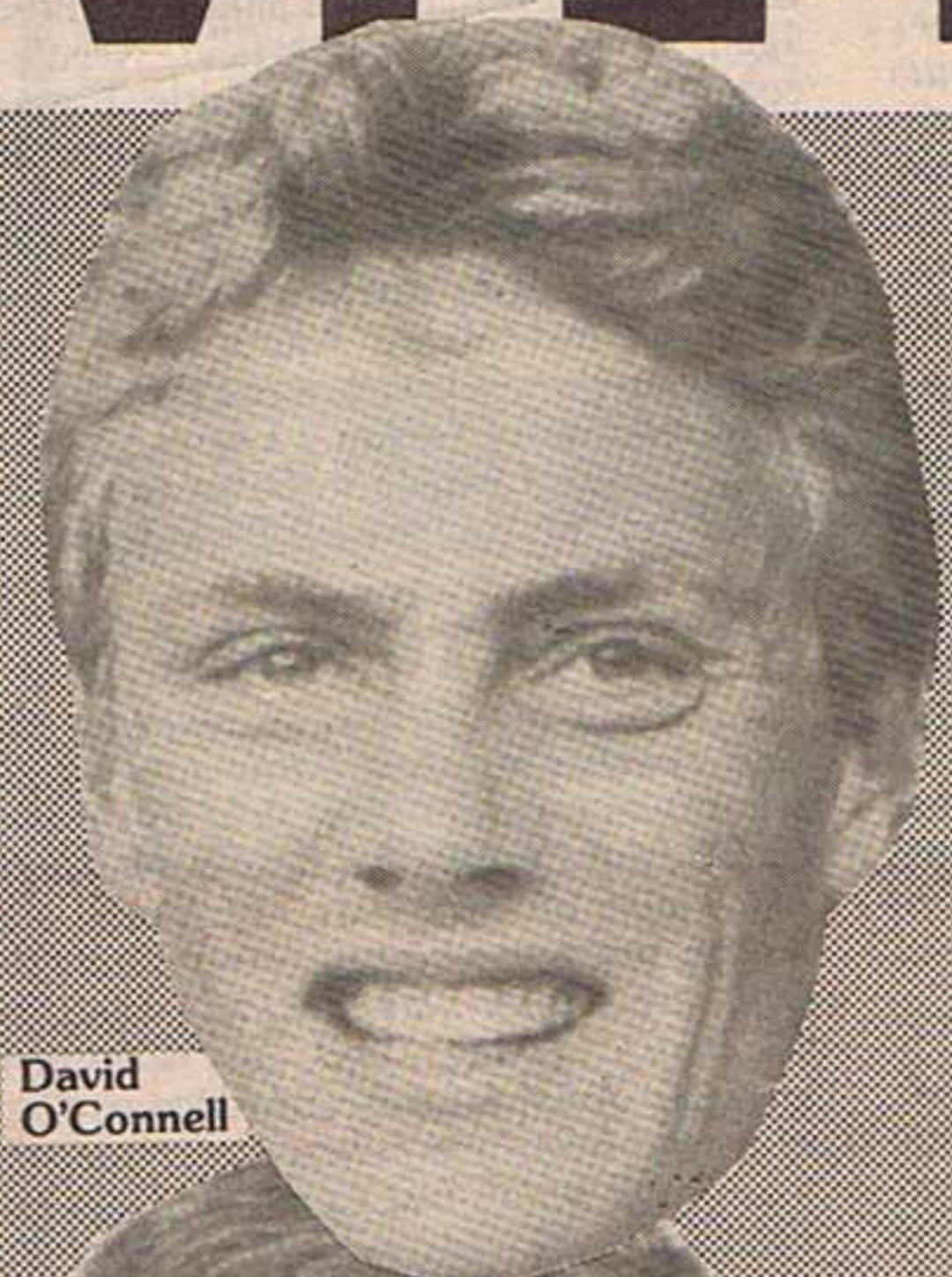
When no report was recorded after the match and nothing surfaced in the Press on Monday, Westside Football delved into what really did happen.

Boundary umpire Ross recalls the event:

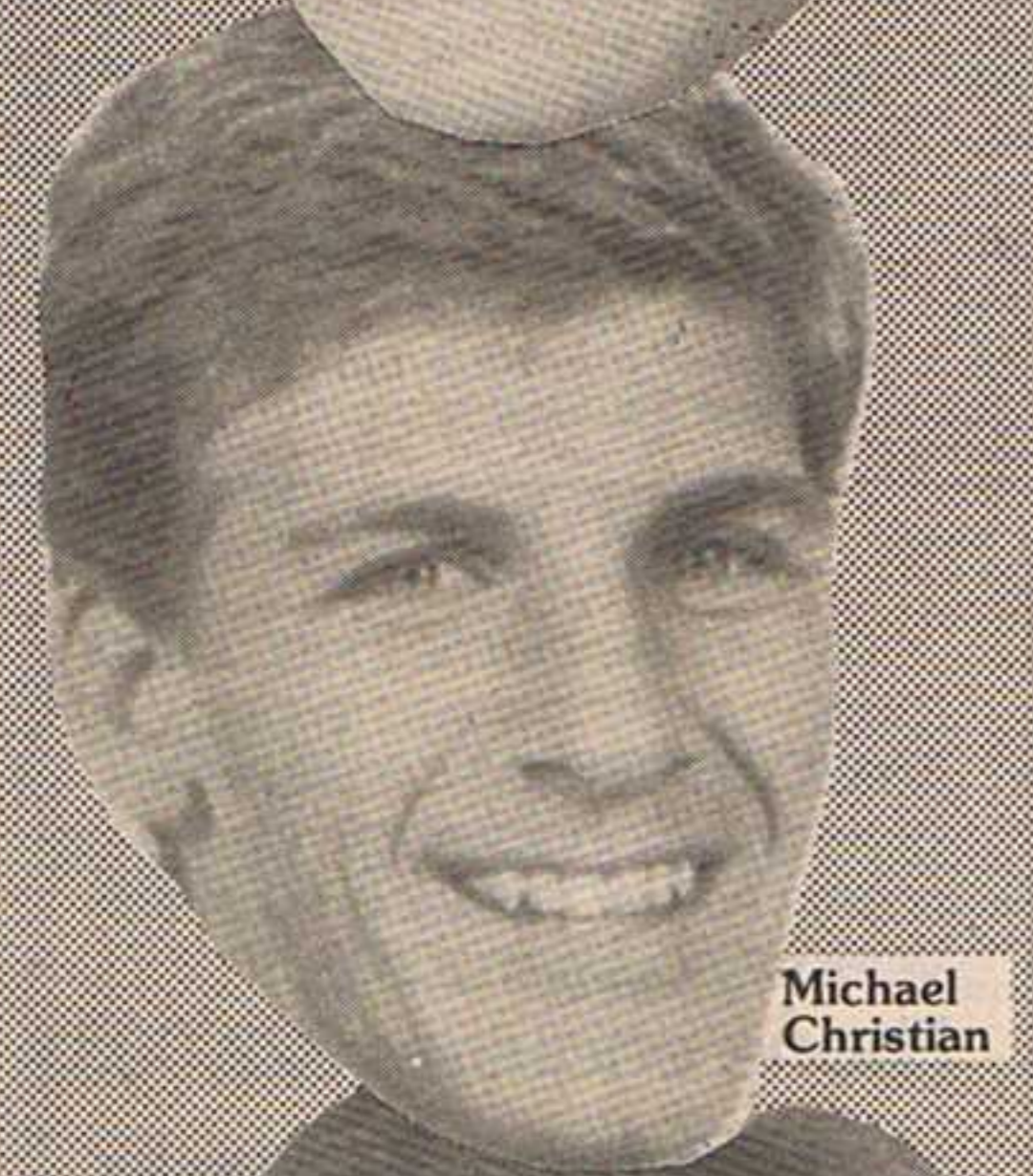
"I was unsuspected during the incident and mentally took the numbers of both players involved by turning them around," Ross said.

"My reasons for doing this were to inform the field umpire nearest to the incident of the players who were involved," he said.

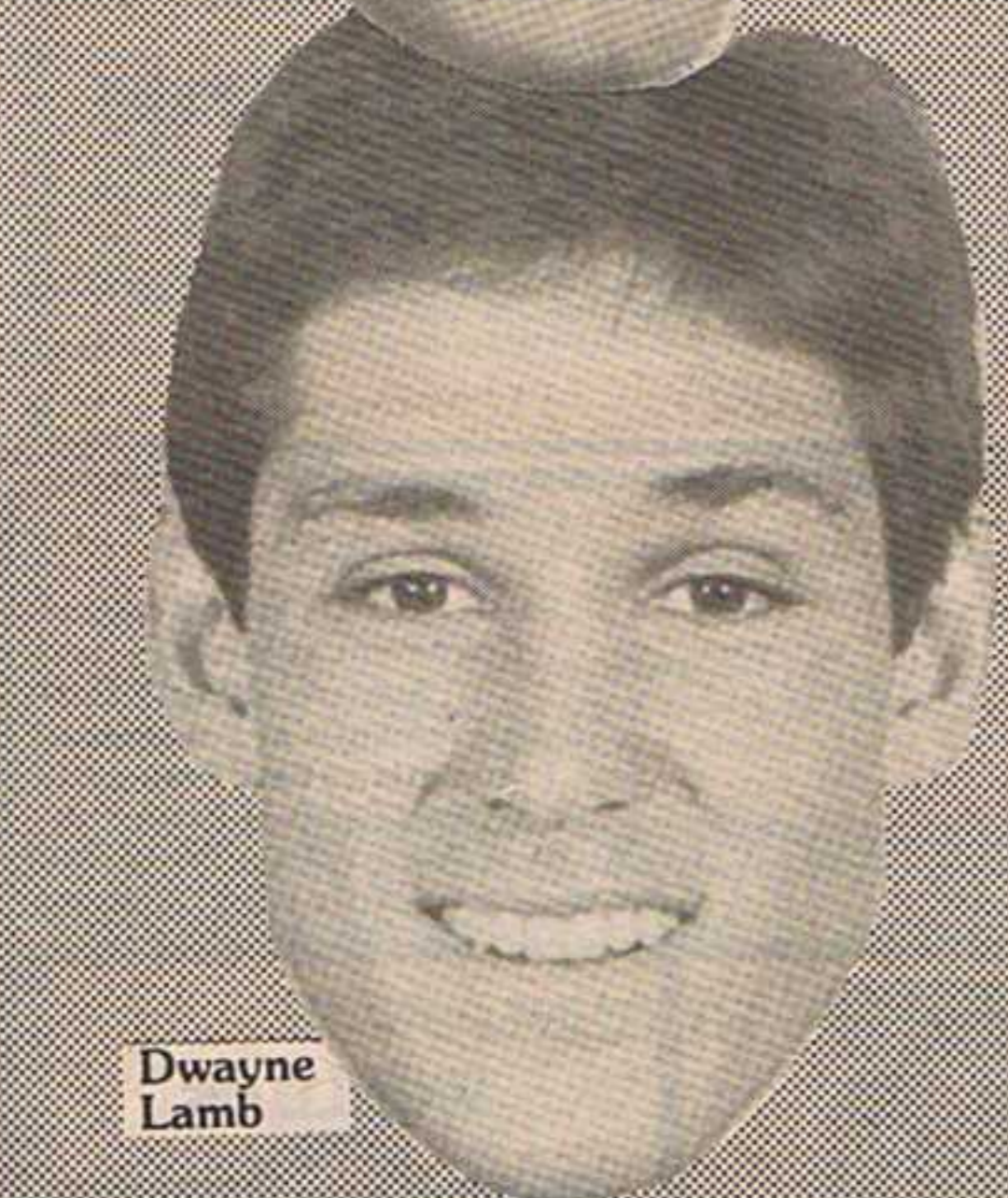
Umpires' Coach Ross Capes said that no disciplinary action would be taken against Ross. The umpires' advisor at the match said that Ross had acted in the correct manner.

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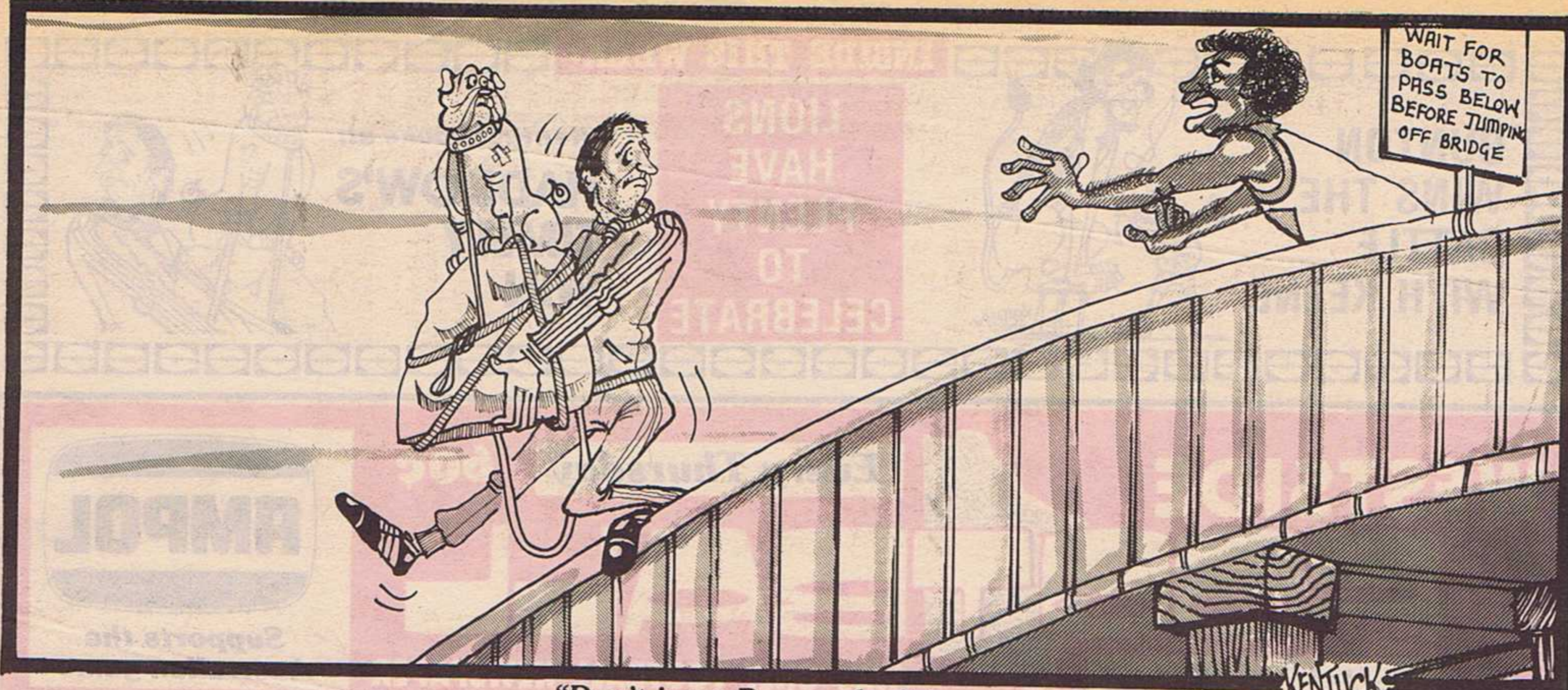

ANZAC FOOTY

OUR front page story last week suggesting the re-introduction of Anzac Day football was quickly followed up by other media and it seems likely now that the WAFL will re-consider its stand.

As we mentioned last week, a Government Act passed several years ago places an unrealistic demand on the WAFL to pay 60 per cent of its gate takings to the Anzac Trust.

However, the current State Government has continually displayed its willingness to assist football and would surely give the request for a review of that arrangement a reasonable hearing.

As the current situation stands, the Trust gets nothing from football, so surely a negotiated fixed sum would be better.

If the WAFL is unsure of the benefits of Anzac Day football then it should look eastward.

In ADELAIDE on Anzac Day, 38,748 people went to two venues and a further 18,516 attended the remaining two matches of the split round last Saturday. That gave the SANFL a total of 57,264 people for one round of football.

On Anzac Day, a double header (two league games) at Football Park drew a crowd of 31,797.

The total attendances of the South Australian split round represented an increase of 23,000 people over the same round last year.

In MELBOURNE, 73,547 people went to two games on Anzac Day. At the MCG, 53,067 saw Melbourne beat Carlton and at VFL Park, despite St Kilda's previously all-time low rating, 20,480 people turned out to see them beat Fitzroy.

Carman made a sensational debut in the Bendigo league when he kicked four goals in his opening game — despite playing with the help of pain-killers. Carman injured his leg at work, but that didn't stop him from leading his side against South Bendigo — with one of the league's biggest crowds turning up to see him perform.

ACCLIMATISED

DUAL Sandover Medallist Peter Spencer has been quickly accepted in the Subiaco camp and he was accorded some honours last week when his third game with the Lions brought up his 200th senior game overall. On accepting a trophy, Spencer said that he was really pleased about being part of a fabulous Subiaco team who were on the way back to the top. Lions skipper Neil Taylor, who followed Spencer to the stage to also receive an award, wanted to know why it had taken Spencer 197 games elsewhere before he learnt about Subiaco!

AND talking about Spencer's feat of playing 200 games (169 with East Perth and 28 with North Melbourne) the boys pressing the buttons at Channel Seven last week didn't seem too worried about the minor facts. When Spencer was on camera up came the credit line saying "Peter Spencer, 200 league games for Subiaco."

FIRST CHOICE

UMPIRES' coach Ross Capes had more than umpiring on his mind when he 'organised' the roster for the observers last week. Capes was bound for Bassendean Oval for the game-of-the-day between Swan Districts and Subiaco. But he had a vested interest in the half-time activities when his young son Aaron represented Subiaco in the R & I Bank's Little League competition.

STATE SCHOOLBOYS

FOR the first time in the history of State schoolboys football teams, boys attending non-government schools will be eligible for selection. Boys should be nominated direct to their league club to take part in trial games to be held during the first week of the May school holidays. Further information can be obtained from Ross Davis, the WAFL's co-ordinator of football development on 381 5599.

CASSIDY KING

FORMER East Fremantle player Jeff Cassidy has been an instant success on his return to his home town area of Lavington in the Ovens and Murray League, where he has his team unbeaten. Cassidy, last year's vice-captain of East Fremantle, returned home after playing 75 games with the Sharks. He was a product of the Lavington district, with his father a prominent solicitor — at Cobram, down-river from Lavington.

NEEDLE'S ROLE

FORMER East Fremantle ruckman Brian Needle is making a name for himself again — in the coaching field. Needle is coaching the North Fremantle F-grade amateurs side — and has won his opening two encounters with more than 100 points to spare. North Fremantle is one of the strongest clubs in amateur ranks and they attracted fast-talking Victorian football character Harry Beitzel over to Perth for a pep talk last season. Former South Fremantle big man John Townsend is also at the club, playing in their B-grade team.

STATS HELP

CAREFUL analysis of statistics can help coaches in their battle to beat the opposition on and off the field. Richmond coach Paul Sproule has a valuable ally in the shape of Mr Stats, Victoria's Ray Young, the man who helps co-ordinate the computer information for Westside Football. Young and his statistical recorder John Surridge produce patterns of play for Sproule between each quarter. The graph shows just where the kicks and handballs are taken from and helps pinpoint the areas where teams are dominating — or being eclipsed. Last week's stats, for example, showed that Richmond had an even spread of ball-winning all over the ground — and kicked longer on the day.

"PINT SIZED" PUNCH UP

MY young bloke Ryan, who is trying for a position in the Balga under 9s, told me after training recently that some bruiser had let go a fair dinkum punch and "dropped" one of the other little kids.

The situation obviously had him a bit worried and he wanted some advice on what to do if some microscopic thug took a swing at him.

As he doesn't mind having a go in our lounge room wrestles, the initial reaction was to tell him to walk straight up to the perpetrator and punch him on the nose.

This is the only lingo that the "bully" faction understand.

However, as it is against my principles to give him this moronic reaction, I went for the theory that "he who wins the game wins the fight."

The height and weight discrepancies are often considerable in junior ranks and umpires must pay considerable attention to the control of juniors who have been taught that football is an excuse to whack some other little guy in the solar plexus.

Even in the non-tackling modified rules the game has its fair share of hurly burly and rough and tumble moments. Some little men are going to catch the odd, accidental knock and, tears and all, will have to take it like a man.

The junior councils should give some thought to having a steward at some of these games to keep a watch out for these miniature tanks and the source (usually an ugly parent) who has sadistically sooted them on.

As small as some of these little boys are I think it is in their best interest if the man in white teaches them some respect for the rules of the game and sends them straight to the boundary.

WHAT'S YOUR DECISION?

IT IS infuriating to sit and watch the Channel Seven football programme when the panelists discuss an umpiring decision — without prefacing their comments with something like — "here is an obvious free kick, from where we were watching in the grand stand."

If we line the same incident up from where the umpire was at the time — and remember that his vision could have been momentarily obscured by players — and that he only has a split second to make his decision, then we could all make a fairer assessment of the umpire's performance.

The attitude displayed by the panel only encourages bad sportsmanship. Any junior watching will think he has the right to question decisions, when the only thing he should be worrying about is accepting the call and getting on with the game.

It is easy to ride a race from the grandstand; it is a bit harder when you are on the horse's back.

COME OFF IT!

Listening to an ABC description recently, I couldn't help but wonder about some of the "educated" critics.

George Grjusich, discussing a derby clash with Eric Sarich, implied that East Fremantle had received more free kicks and the imbalance possibly influenced the outcome of the game.

This argument has been kicked around before and is utterly ridiculous.

Umpires are not there to give both sides an equal share of free kicks. Their job is to call the shots as they see them.

If one side or the other is not playing within the rules, then they have to expect to be penalised.

If South Fremantle were on the receiving end of the free kick ratio, then their brains trust must adopt an approach which will not incur the displeasure of the umpires.

Any team that wants to throw itself around unnecessarily should never expect to gain the same breaks as a side of ball players.

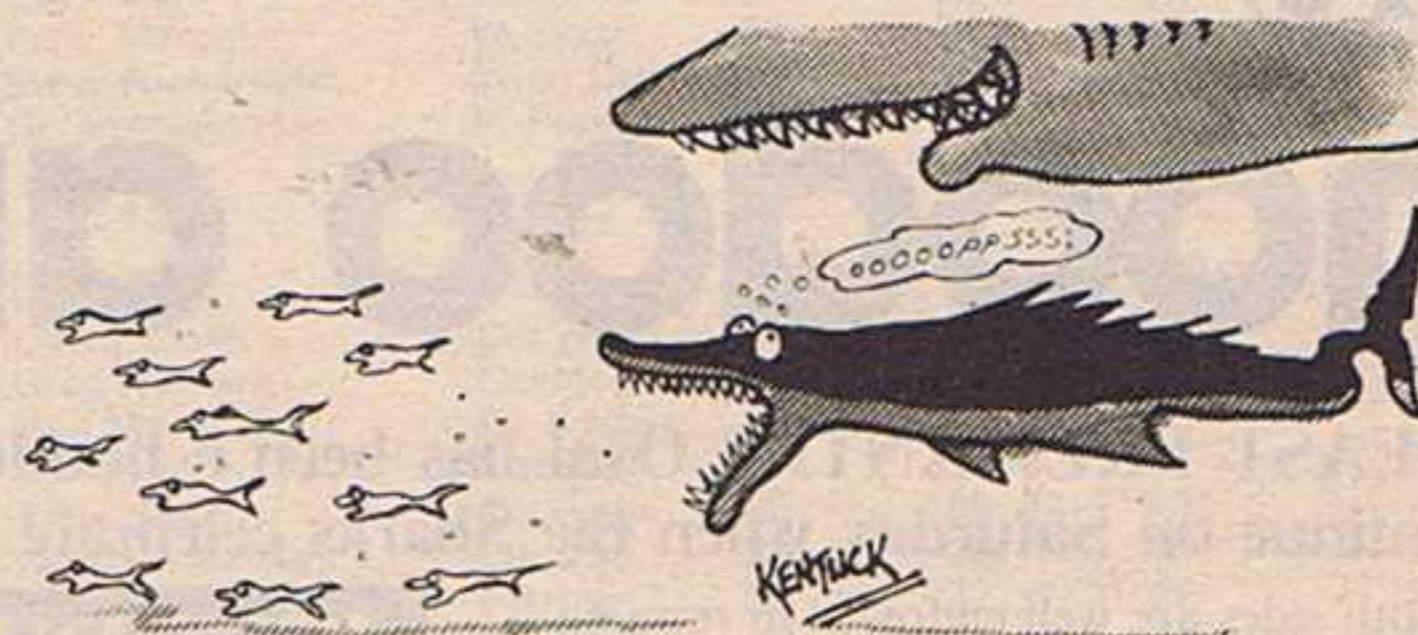
One, of course, worried that, because the Sharks have swallowed the Demons, they may have to hire an Exorcist!

IN my continuing campaign to clean-up our media coverage, I've got a polite memo for the game's doyen, Geoff Christian, of The West Australian. Number 12 for Swans is Gavin Outridge, Geoff. Garry Outridge must have been his brother . . . or some-one!

TACTICAL BLUE

EAST Perth fans could not help wondering at a couple of tactical mysteries as the side struggled against West Perth last week. Back pocket specialist Greg Carpenter was continually used to kick the ball out when West Perth scored a point — and he has never been renowned for his reliable kicking. And skipper Kevin Bryant, the team's most experienced last-line defender, was left out on a half-back flank trying to curb the will-o'-wisp activities of Peter Menaglio. A switch had to be obvious.

QUICK REACTION

IT DIDN'T take long for my comments about John Wynne's lack of after-match comments to draw a quick reaction. Wynne was most co-operative at a special press gathering after the game, when he and rival coach Greg Brehaut discussed the game at length. It was also pointed out that John Todd, the master coach from Swans who seems to be a bit dirty on the media at present, has made the same comment after every game this season. It simply says: "Congratulations (and the name of the winning side, whether it be Swans or their opponents.) That's just as bad as saying nothing.

And talking about coaches comments, the one from Perth mentor Mal Brown two weeks ago, when he personally rubbished a rival club president, should certainly come under the WAF's guidelines of fining officials if they make comments that "place the game in disrepute."

HEAD WORRY

HELMETS have become an accepted part of football protection gear, but how far down the line should this measure go? A youngster playing for Swan Districts in the R & I Little League game last week was wearing a helmet, obviously for protection. If a boy that age (12s and under) has to wear a helmet, then maybe football is not for him.

YOUNG HURDLES

THE over-use of young boys as water bottle carriers (so-called trainers, actually) in league games is a worry. In recent weeks a growing number of juniors as young as 14 have surfaced on the league arena — creating a major problem if a fight develops or if they get caught up in the play. There was one narrow escape for a little bloke at Subiaco Oval last week when he was nearly bowled over by a dashing Darren Bewick as the West Perth rover broke out of defence and nearly took the youngster's head off with his kick.

BUNTON WINS THE BATTLE WITH KEENE

HAYDN Bunton has obviously won a clash of personalities with his star big man, Laurie Keene — a clash at one stage that could easily have torpedoed the team's prospects this season.

After a verbal scrap that led to disciplinary action being taken against him, Keene has apparently decided to fall into line with Bunton.

And it looks as though the combination could put Subiaco not only into the final four for the first time since 1974, but make them a premiership chance.

Keene makes no bones about the fact he would prefer playing in the ruck. But Bunton is determined to have him at full-forward.

Now that Keene has accepted that — to the point he has even been practicing his goal kicking — he will be able to get on with the job Bunton wants, that of kicking goals.

Since missing the match against Claremont, Subiaco's only loss this season, Keene has become a very damaging player in front of goals.

He is going to provide a giant headache to opposing clubs this season. Not since Bob Johnson parked himself in the goal square — and used his great height to devastating effect with East Fremantle in the early 1960's — has WA had a player likely to provide the same sort of problems to opposing clubs.

There would be few better full-backs in the competition than Tom Mullooly, yet Keene managed to score nine goals against him. And most of this was because Keene simply had too much height for the Swans defender to counter.

Other full-backs are going to run into the same problem.

Unlike Johnson, Keene is also incredibly agile for his size.

Full-forwards have become something of a rare commodity for most clubs in WA.

For that reason Subiaco, as was the case with Claremont when they had Warren Ralph, will have a big advantage over other sides if Keene continues to score a lot of goals.

While it is a big statement so early in the season, I believe Subiaco will probably play East Fremantle in this year's grand final.

They are an exciting, ebullent side and can only improve.

Bunton has taken a low profile this year, even to the point of suggesting that the media seek the normal after-game coach's comment from the team captain.

Bunton knows he has a very good side that is still maturing under his control.

Over the past two weeks — by coming from behind against South Fremantle and blitzing Swan Districts in the last quarter — Subiaco have shown they not only know how to win, but want to win.

After kicking the pickets for so long, players have obviously acquired a voracious appetite for success.

If there is a lot of improvement still in Subiaco, as Bunton hinted after last Saturday's game, then they may really turn on a show for us this season.

MEMORIES OF HOBART CARNIVAL

WHEN Victoria met Western Australia in the Hobart Carnival in 1924 the Vics outweighed WA by 4 lbs a man, and averaged 2½ inches more in height.

The match, which was to decide the championship, was played before 15,687 people, then a Tasmanian record. At almost the first bounce, Beasy (VFL) took a hard knock and Cazaly came into the first ruck. Collins was a fearless player for the Vics, but "Fats" McDiarmid (WA) was also fearless and his bitter clashes with Cazaly that day are still remembered.

Cazaly, Collins, Beasy and Wigcraft were frequently changed, and there were plenty of incidents. At quarter-time Victoria led by 4.8 to 4.6.

Heavy rain fell in the second quarter, but Victoria still led at half time, 9.8 to 9.6. In the 3rd, Hagger got 2 quick goals but Campbell replied for WA.

Then Hebbard (WA) goaled just before the bell to level the scores, 13.10 all. In the last term, Wilson saved a couple of times for Victoria, and Campbell (WA) narrowly missed, but his point put WA in front for the first time since the opening score.

Then Campbell, from a free, goaled, but Hagger replied quickly. Then came the masterstroke for Victoria, as Fitzmaurice, out of things at centre-half-back, came into the ruck. His play rallied the Vics, and his first knock went to Tandy, who passed to Hagger for a goal.

From there, the Vics hung on to win 15.13 to 14.11 in what is still called by many experts the greatest game ever. Both full-forwards, Campbell and Hagger, got seven goals, the latter early in the game refusing to leave the ground after ambulance men came out to carry him off.

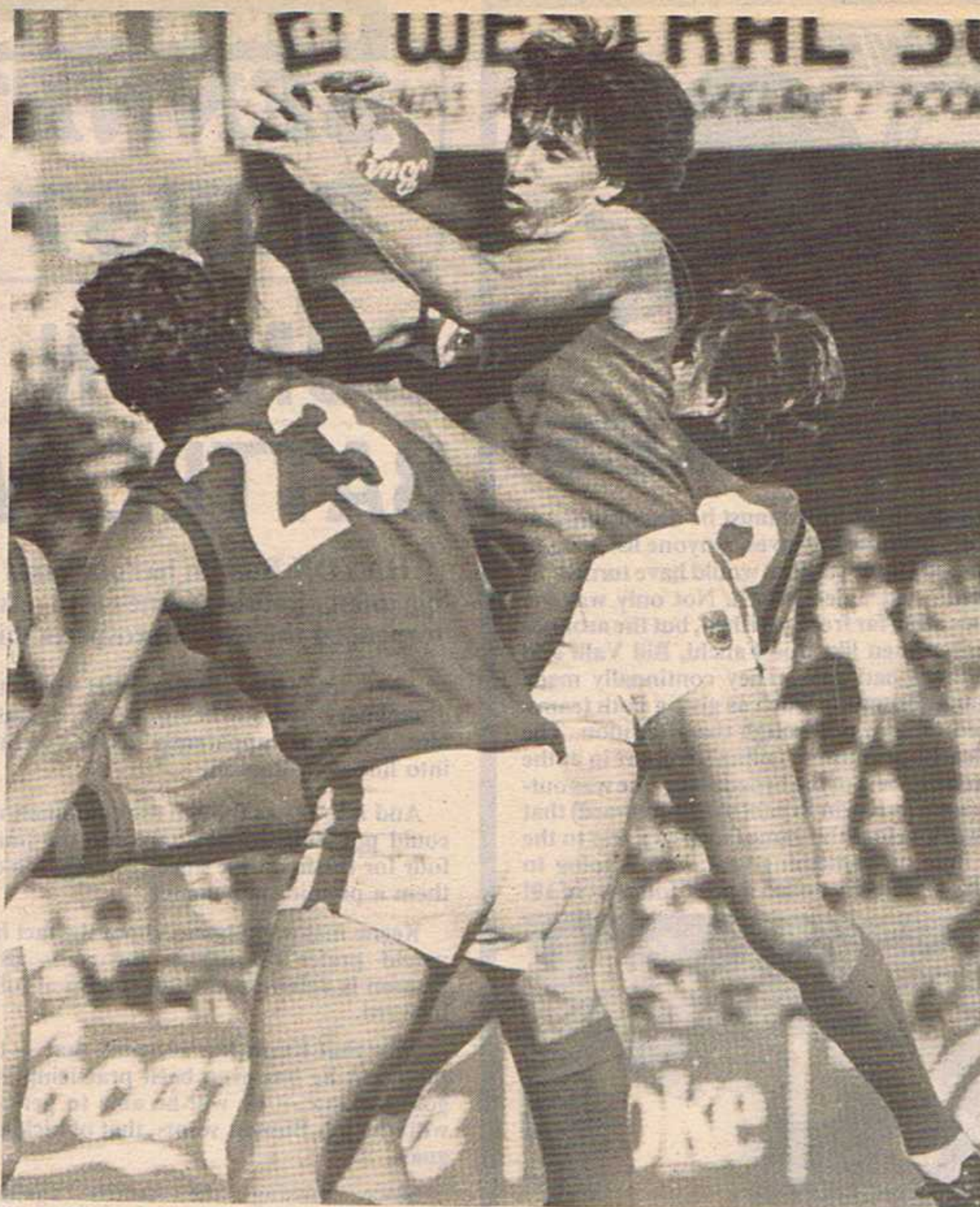

States prepare for Teal Cup

By JOHN WARREN, National Director of Coaching

ALL States are now seriously embarking on their Teal Cup preparations.

In contrast to just a few years ago, these plans involve concerted efforts by a wide range of officials to ensure that each State fields the best possible combination.

While it must be realistically conceded that there are only three States who can hope to win the Cup, there are encouraging signs that all other States are becoming more competitive.

There will continue to be wide margins in final scores between the "big three" and some of the developing States. The difference now, however, is that territorially the less favoured teams figure much more impressively.

Formerly a team which was defeated by, say, a margin of 15 goals, (and this is only a superior scoring average per quarter of less than four goals) were annihilated in virtually every field position.

Now such contests are much more even in terms of general skill with the main difference confined to the ability to finish off scoring moves.

Another pleasing factor as far as the teams from such States as the Northern Territory, New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory, is that all

such teams have a nucleus of seven or eight or even 10 players who have the ability to "make" the stronger State's teams.

Their present problem is that they, at this stage of their development, "tail off" in the ability of the rest of their team.

It is also an interesting exercise when selection of the All Australian team is undertaken.

We have the brief of being able to select any number of players from a State, however at least one player must be selected from each State. A few years ago when placed under such restrictions, we selected developing States players who really were not up to the standard of players from southern teams who ultimately missed selection.

Not any more.

The Northern Territory team which finished last in 1984 had a worthy selection in David Ross and had we been able to select 21 players, rather than 20, a Territory player would have been the next selection.

Let me also assure readers that the All Australia selectors, realising the opportunities and advantages now available to players selected in the All Australian team, take their responsibilities very serious.

They spend the whole championships conferring together, analysing performances and generally recording individual players' progress.

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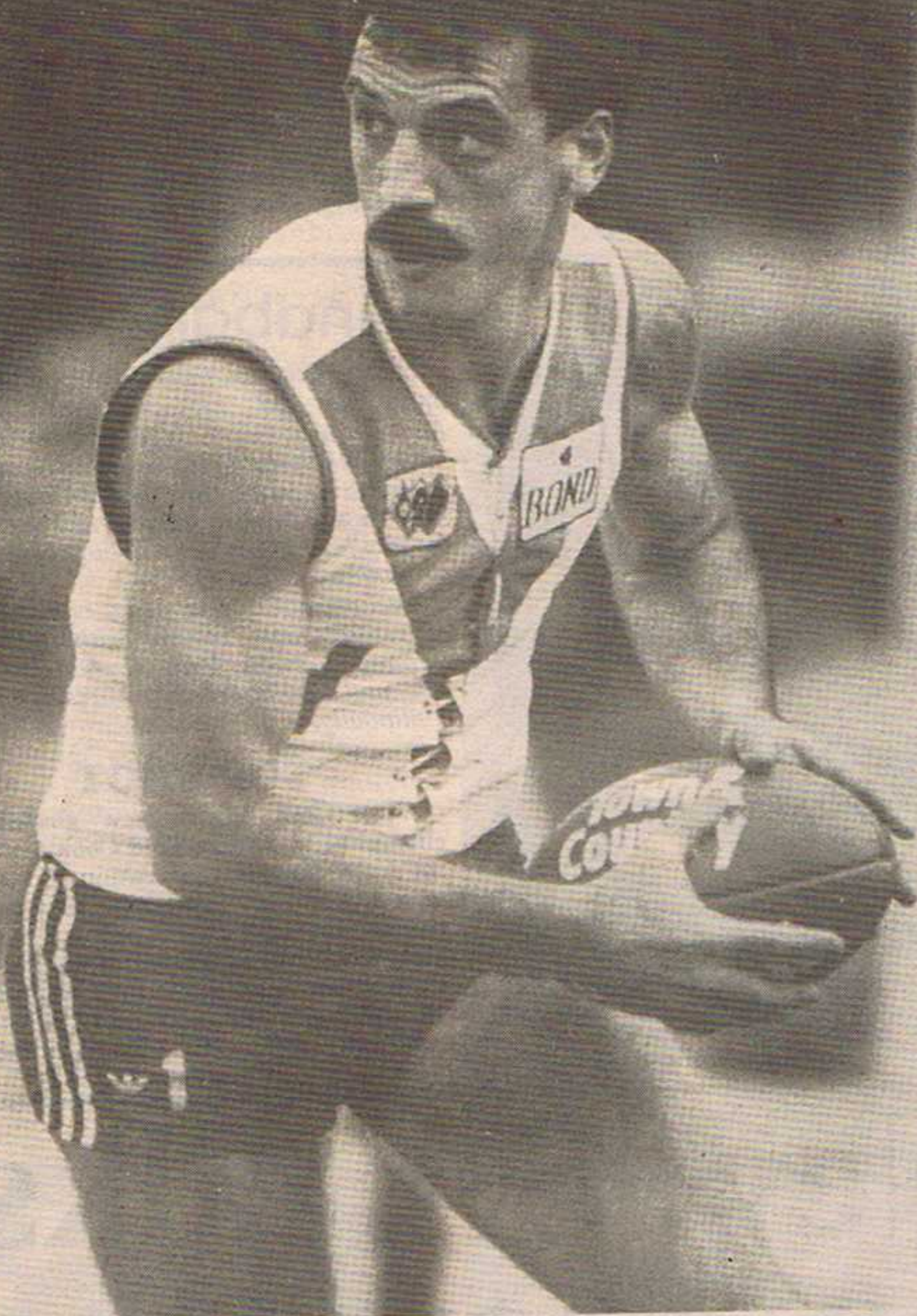
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WHEN Noel Carter arrived at Fremantle Oval in early 1978, many supporters of the club must have wondered whether he would turn out to be another reject from the VFL.

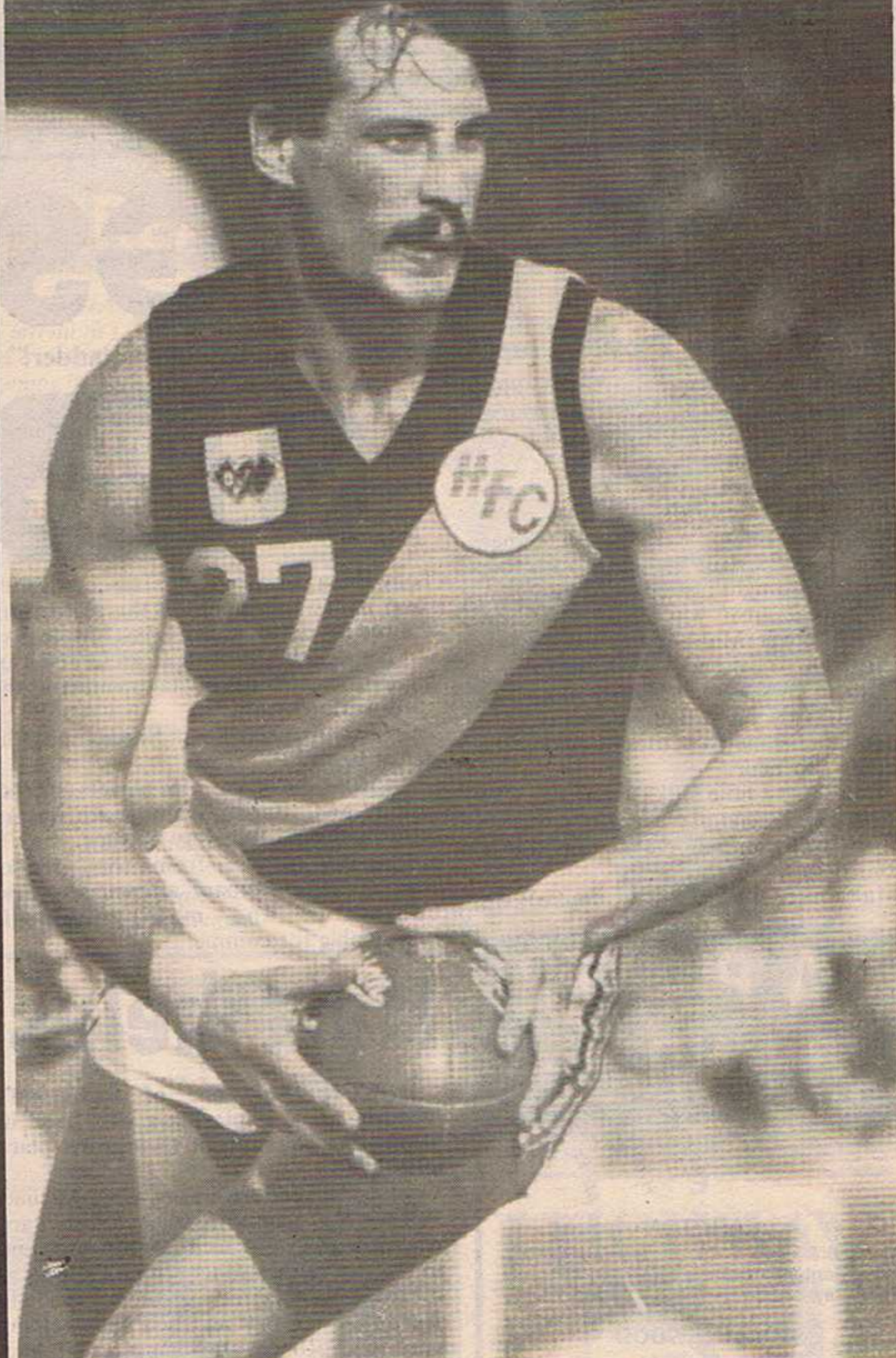

TOP DOGS

"WAIT for this, Footscray supporters. We are on top of the ladder!"

As those words rang out over the public address system at the Western Oval at 4.50pm last Saturday, the Footscray Bulldogs had risen to sit on top of the VFL premiership ladder.

Their morale-boosting win over premiers Essendon was the sign that, maybe, after 31 years without a VFL flag, the Bulldogs might just be top dogs again.

"It was a great win," said Footscray coach Michael Malthouse after the 41-point win over Essendon.

"Our fellows were extremely motivated today. It's not often that Footscray have featured in the match of the day against the reigning superside.

"There was a little bloke in our side who was once an Essendon player and it was his pleasure to hammer home the importance of this occasion."

Malthouse was talking about WA's



Tony Buhagiar, of course. The courageous rover has swapped colours this season and showed his old team-mates just how to take out revenge. Budgie had 11 kicks and four handpasses and was a vital member of the hard-working team.

Essendon coach Kevin Sheedy took the defeat badly.

At half-time he gave his players a verbal lashing and after the game there was an individual blast for every player.

Sheedy stormed from the ground, missing the customary after-match press conference and making himself unavailable for comment.

Hart helps

ROYCE Hart, one of Richmond's favourite sons, is playing a vital hand in helping the Tigers regain their power-place in the VFL.

Hart has been working with Michael Roach, the team's red-hot full-forward whose goalkicking accuracy has shot him to the top of the ladder with 32 majors.

"Royce was the greatest kick in Australian football and he's been helping me," said Roach after his 11-goal haul against Hawthorn last week.

"I kicked 6.7 against St Kilda and he has been helping me rectify the problem since then.

"The guys made it easier for me today. Our forward set-up worked well and the way they delivered the ball was beautiful."

FINES FEAR

THE fear of copping a harsh fine for making comments about umpires put a gag on Sydney Swans officials after last week's match.

The Swans were unhappy about a charge of wasting time laid against Warrick Capper — his second such charge this year and the sixth VFL player to be reported on for the new offence.

Swans officials claimed that field umpire John Russo was at the wrong end of the ground to report Capper.

"Mark Russell, the Swans centre-half-forward, was 40 metres closer to the umpire than Warrick and he didn't hear the whistle," one official said.

Capper was reported for allegedly kicking the ball away after play had stopped.

OVER-EXPOSED
HAWTHORN coach Allan Jeans believes that over-exposure is a problem affecting the league's two top teams of 1984.

Hawthorn and Essendon both suffered shattering defeats last week and Jeans believes that the two teams have received too much exposure from the media.

"We have received so much exposure in the last two years that we must expect other clubs to study us closely," he said.

BEASLEY'S BOOTY

ACE goalsneak Simon Beasley was a key man in the sensational victory over Essendon.

He kicked 3.4, but his inspirational play in attack helped produce some match-winning goals.

"We are now a genuine final four prospect for the first time in a decade," said the former Swan districts full-forward.

"We proved that Essendon are not world beaters and I'm confident we can beat them on any given day if we play to our maximum capacity."

Beasley, chasing an average of four goals a match to kick a century in the VFL for the first time since switching from Swans in 1982, said that the team work, particularly in the goalsquare was becoming an important part of Footscray's play.

Tapping the ball out to team-mates and shepherding in the goalsquare were things that he had worked on in his game.

Handball happy

GEELONG midfielder Greg Williams only had 14 kicks against North Melbourne last week — but he was rated as one of the best players on the ground.

Williams collected an amazing 30 handballs — almost a quarter of the total team tally of 134; which is about normal for a winning team.

Geelong have developed a potent band of centre-square players with Williams teaming up with John Mossop, Robert Neal and Neville Bruns to win the ball out continually.

TOP SHOT

VICTORIA has a new goalkicking champion — veteran Fred Cook, a star in the VFA Sunday competition. Cook has now kicked 1309 goals in his long career, passing the 1299 that Gordon Coventry kicked with Collingwood from 1920-37. Cook's tally is 1266 with Port Melbourne, 26 with Yarraville and now 17 in his first two games with this 1985 club, Moorabbin.

New SA talks on clearances

THE South Australian NFL has re-opened talks with the VFL in a bid to introduce a new clearance agreement.

Many SANFL clubs are concerned about the raids of VFL recruiting men, with a host of young Adelaide stars coming on to the open market in the near future.

There are still 25 South Australians tied to Victorian clubs under the old draft scheme and previous form fours, but those agreements between the two leagues, expire on October 19 this year.

Players in line for recruiting across the border next year include young stars like Mark Naley, Greg Anderson, Peter Motley, Keith Thomas and Stephen Kernahan.

But not every high-rated South Aussie wants to swap over to the VFL — obviously aware of the failure of a lot of previous players who have tried out in the VFL.

Norwood's Michael Aish has rejected a \$170,000 three-year package to join Richmond — who have also spent a lot of extra money simply trying to entice the star forward out of Adelaide.

COP THAT!

STEPHEN Copping, the Glenelg star forward who tried out unsuccessfully in the VFL, is proving to be a danger player in South Australia this year.

Copping, who returned to Glenelg midway through last season and proved to be a crucial player as the Tigers rose up the ladder, helped sink Sturt last week.

He kicked five goals roving well across the forward line and helped Glenelg annihilate a demoralised Sturt by 71 points.

West Adelaide started brilliantly against Central District, but in what turned out to be a close game, West won by nine points.



HENWOOD IN STRIFE

FORMER South Fremantle footballer Wayne Henwood has been in trouble again at his new South Australian club Glenelg. After copping a one week suspension when he faced the tribunal after his first game, he was back again last week on a charge of abusive language. He was found guilty and fined \$250.

ATTENDANCES UP

Attendances at first four rounds of SANFL games were up 34,000 on the same period last year. So far 174,699 people have attended matches during the first month of fixtures.

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IAN MILLER

Two show their strength

Lions have plenty to celebrate

SUBIACO had plenty to celebrate last Saturday — their win entrenched them in the four and ended a run of outs (20 of them) against Swans.

As one of the few teams to kick ten goals against Swans in the last quarter on that ground, Subiaco kicked their highest score ever at Bassendean.

Subiaco's previous worst losing run against Swan Districts was nine, in the 1961-64 seasons.

Last Saturday, their 22.14 (146) bettered their previous best on that ground — a 20.20 (140) effort in 1970.

The Lions 10.5 final quarter at Bassendean has been bettered on two occasions, in 1978 Perth kicked 10.6 and in 1976 South Fremantle scored 10.7.

BULLDOG BLUES

A BULLDOG fan asked me before last week if a team had won the premiership after losing their first four games.

Afraid not. The nearest I could find was in 1951 when West Perth lost their first three games and then went on to beat South Fremantle by three points in the grand final.

One word of encouragement is to look at Claremont's position last year. After six games the Tigers had only four points on the board but won their way through to the preliminary final.

BOTTOM TEAM

If medals were given for courage, Spencer would have a box of them. He is a gentleman on and off the field and a great ambassador for the game of football — well done Peter.

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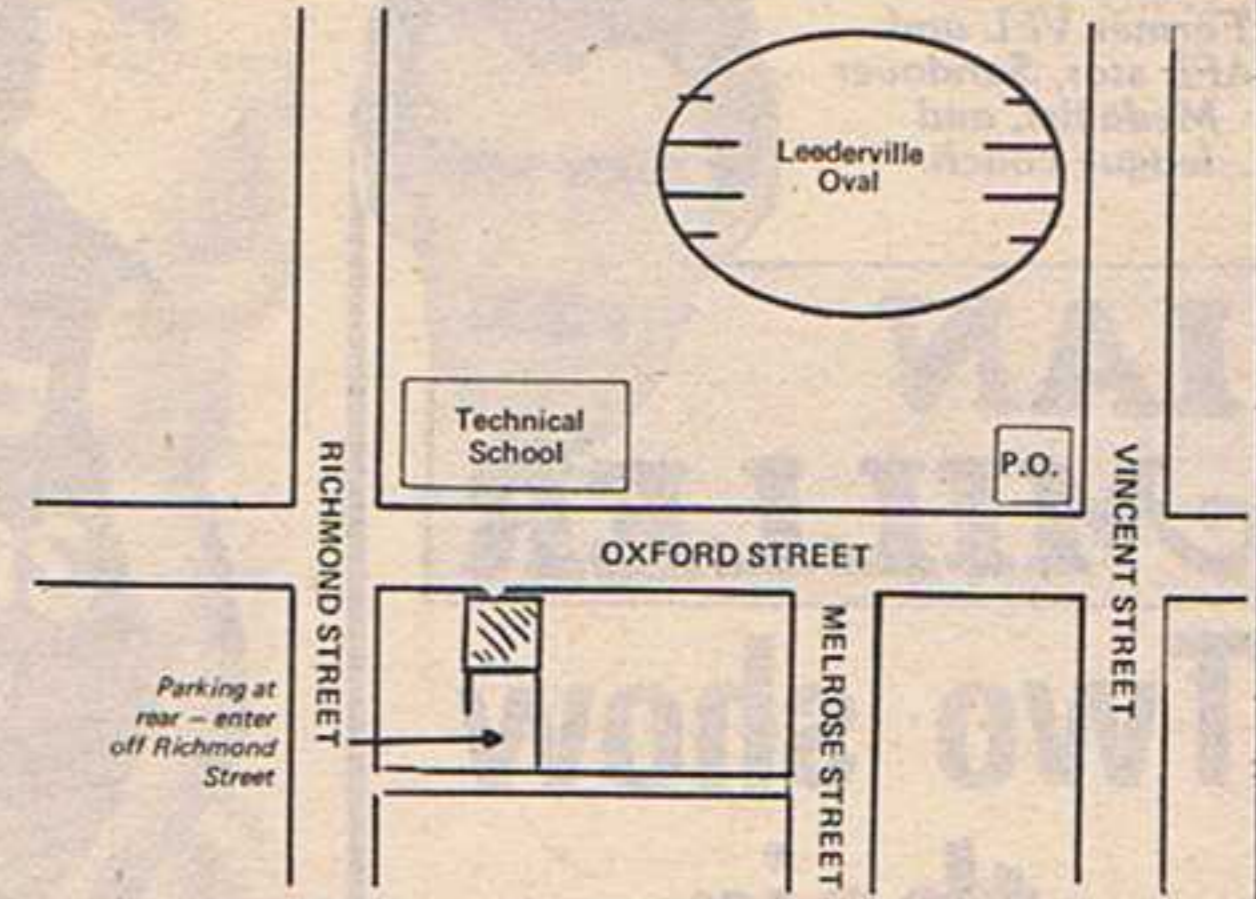


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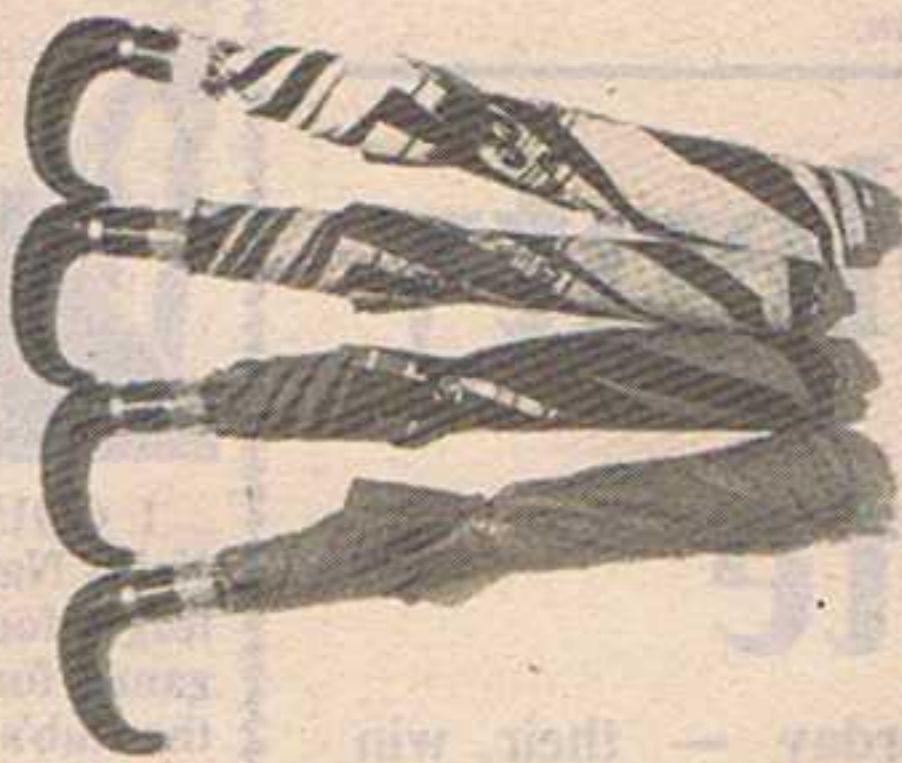

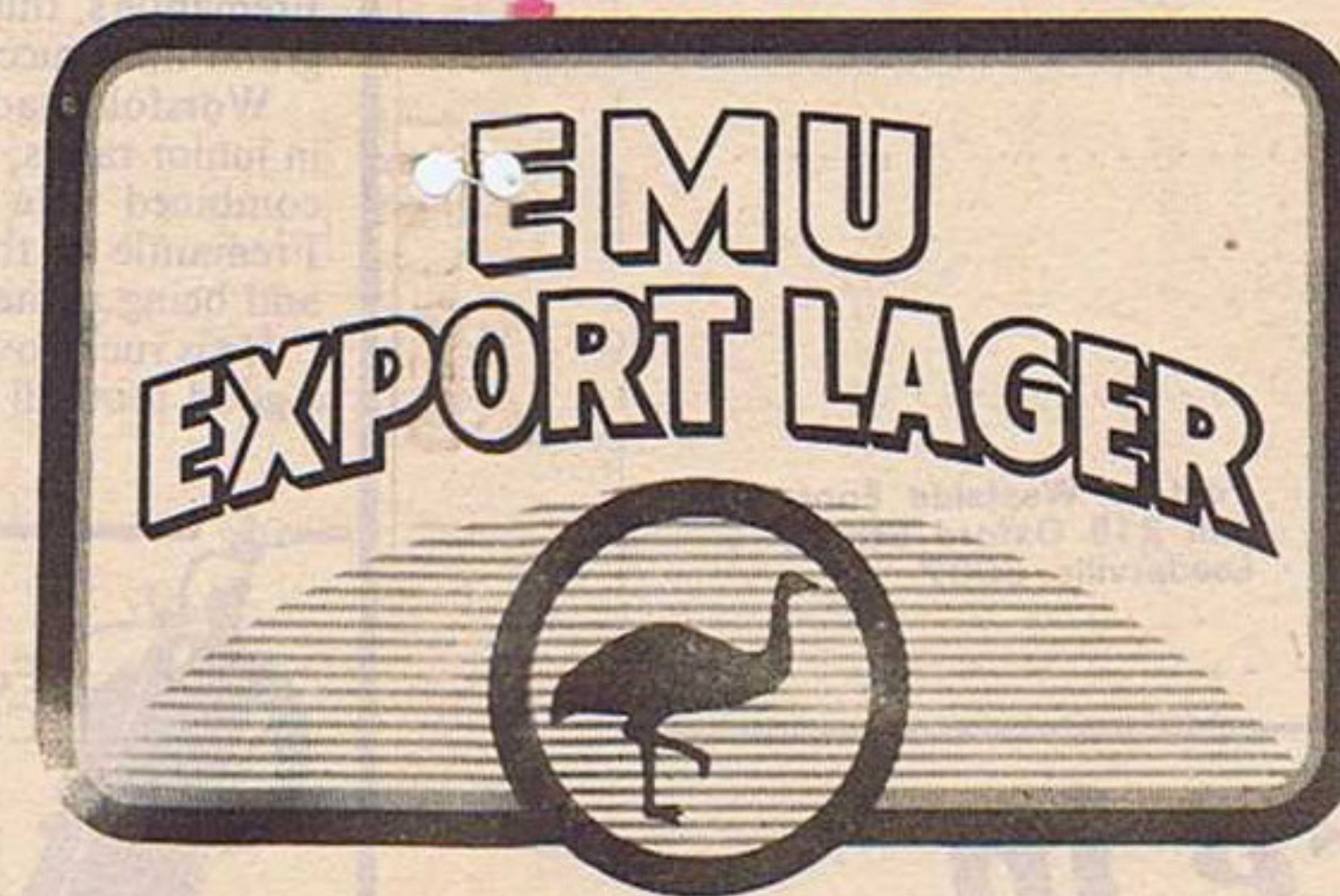

400 games up for veteran

NORTH Mt Barker veteran Fred Mentha reached an outstanding milestone last Sunday when he played his 400th game of football.

The 38-year-old veteran of 23 seasons has recorded 276 league matches and 124 reserves games.

Mentha has played in three reserves premierships sides — 1964, 1965 and 1966 — and helped win four league flags, in 1970, 1971, 1973 and again last year.

Mentha, nicknamed 'fiery' by his teammates, has worn No. 21 in all his 400 matches and is quite an identity in the Southern Districts National Football League.

Mentha has only had one injury of note in his career — when he was forced out for six weeks with a leg injury; an amazing record in the traditionally tough country football arena.



Rex Mitchell — Goldfields legend dies

REX Mitchell, Australia's longest-serving football administrator, died in Kalgoorlie last Friday.

He had held executive positions with the Goldfields National Football League continuously since 1925.

Despite a physical handicap, the legacy of a polio affliction at the age of 3½, he was elected league vice president when aged 23 in 1925.

Then on April 25, 1927 he was appointed secretary-treasurer. He retained that post till 1980 when he shed the secretarial duties. He was still serving as treasurer at the time of his death.

His services to football were recognised by life membership of the GNFL in 1946 and the National Football League in 1958 when he was presented with a Merit Award.

In 1977, the Town of Kalgoorlie (which for many years he served as a councillor) honoured his services to football when it named a new grandstand at the town's main football ground in his honour.

Mr Mitchell's service to football is only surpassed by his dedication to the volunteer fire brigade movement, an organisation he served as an administrator in an unbroken term from 1921.

He also spent long periods as an administrator with several other sporting bodies on the Goldfields including swimming, rifle shooting, racing, bowling and tennis.

In 1979 his services to sport and the community were recognised by the Australian government when he was honoured with the Order of Australia Medal.

ANOTHER 10 GOALS FOR EARL

COLLIE full-forward Brett Earl has begun the 1985 South West National Football League season in fine form by kicking 10 goals in each of his last two matches.

Earl starred in his team's 78-point victory over Boyanup-Capel-Dardanup, but should have kicked 13 or 14 goals after missing easy shots during the match.

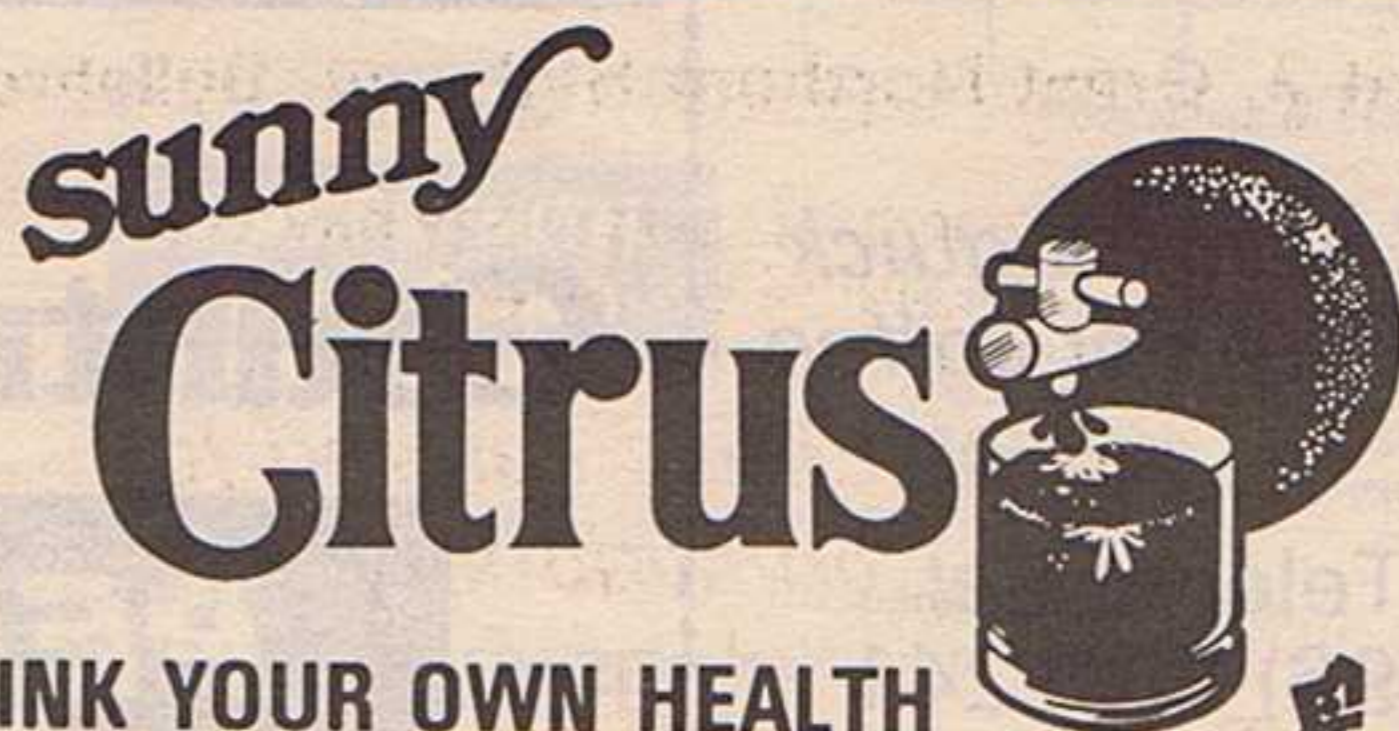

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TWO AMAZING GOALKICKERS

CLAREMONT have produced two prominent goalkickers since the club was formed in 1926 — and both have outstanding champions.

One is George Moloney, an all-time great who dominated for the Tigers over three decades in the 1920's, 1930's and 1940's. The other is Warren Ralph, who topped the WAFL goalkicking four years in a row between 1980 and 1983, kicking three successive 100-plus tallies.

Moloney's outstanding career began in 1927 and he quickly displayed his tremendous ability.

He made his State debut in 1929 at the age of 19 and was a regular member of the State team until he was lured to Victoria in 1932.

He began his VFL career in a blaze of glory, kicking seven and 12 goals for Geelong in his first two VFL matches.

Moloney kicked 109 goals for the season and had the distinction of finishing runner-up in the Brownlow Medal.

Geelong had poor seasons in 1933 and 1934 and Moloney had limited opportunities at full-forward.

In an effort to bring their star into the

game, the Cats played Moloney in the centre and he was an instant success.

Moloney returned to Claremont in 1935 and proved a dominant player in the centre. He had an outstanding 1936 season, winning the Sandover Medal and polling 30 votes, the fifth highest ever.

He starred in the Tigers' two grand final losses in 1936 and 1937 and led his team brilliantly in 1938 to win that elusive premiership.

Moloney returned to full-forward in 1939 and played there until he retired at the end of the 1941 season, kicking a total of 319 goals in his last three seasons.

A highlight of Moloney's great career was topping the WAFL goalkicking in 1940 with 113 goals.

Ralph was one of the major reasons for Claremont's revival in the early 1980s, kicking over 100 goals in 1981, 1982 and 1983.

The high-flying full-forward had a magnetic understanding with the Krakouer brothers, Jim and Phil, as he used his fast leading ability to telling effect.

Ralph proved he could kick goals without the Krakouers when they were enticed to Melbourne in 1982.

He struggled in his first season for Carlton in 1984 and is currently on the sidelines with a serious injury, but proved in patches last season that he will be successful in the VFL.



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ONE OF THE GREATEST

GRAHAM Moss ranks as one of Claremont's and WA's greatest players in a career spanning 15 seasons and 342 games in WA and Victoria.

The ruck genius was the first WA player to win a Brownlow Medal and also finished second and third in this prestigious football award.

He surprised football pundits with his decision to leave the glamour of Victorian football after winning the 1976 Brownlow Medal.

Moss opted for the Claremont captain/coach position in 1977 and it is history that he led the Tigers out of the football wilderness and to a premiership in 1981.

Moss achieved almost every football honour except the coveted Sandover Medal and he is one of the greatest players never to win the award.

Only Ken Caporn has played more games for the Tigers than Moss who also played 25 State games and gained All-Australian selection.



KEN Caporn holds the record for most games played for Claremont in a career spanning 17 seasons and 273 games.

Caporn played mainly at full-back and did his best work against great full-forwards such as Bernie Naylor, Ray Scott and Ron Tucker.

He played several State games in a back-pocket, looking after the resting ruckmen. Caporn used his physical strength superbly to take many strong marks.

His long kicking was another strong feature of his game and his many fine performances at full-back earned him the Tigers 1951 and 1954 fairest and best awards.

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WORLD OF SPORT

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CHADWICK WAS A DEDICATED STAR

ONE of the greatest wingmen produced in WA, Derek Chadwick, holds the record for most games played at East Perth, with a total of 269.

The little wingman achieved many awards during his 14 seasons of league football, but playing in a winning premiership side was the biggest prize to elude him.

Chadwick must go down as one of the most unluckiest footballers ever to play in WA. He played in seven grand finals, but never a premiership side.

The 1964 season saw Chadwick at his best, winning a Simpson Medal, finishing third in the Sandover Medal and winning his club's fairest and best award.

Though he did not experience the joy of being part of a premiership victory, his career highlight was that fantastic 1961 Brisbane carnival win, where he was a strong contributor on a wing.

Chadwick was a dedicated sportsman, being able to combine his State cricket commitments with his football and achieved a high level of perfection in both his chosen sports.

Another champion Royal who figures high on the games played honour board at Perth Oval is Ted Kilmurray, who recorded 257 games for his club.

Unlike Chadwick, Kilmurray did taste the joys of premiership success, playing in six successive grand finals and was a member of three winning teams.

He made his debut in 1953, playing in a forward pocket and later graduated to the full-forward position.

Kilmurray played his best football as a ruck-rover changing on the half-forward-flank, and it was in this role that he enjoyed his best season in 1958, when he won the Sandover Medal, was his club's fairest and best and, of course, was a member of the Royals premiership side.

Kilmurray was famous for his snap shots with his left foot over his right shoulder and he perfected the art of marking the ball in front of his body which made spoiling very difficult for his opponents.

His attacking attitude to his football proved a major headache to opposition defenders, who had their work cut out to stop this elusive footballer.

Spearheads from different eras

EAST Perth are not noted for producing many superstar goalkickers, but several players have been fine spearheads for the club.

Hugh 'Bonny' Campbell and Phil Tierney earn the title as the Royals' greatest full forwards.

Campbell topped the East Perth goalkicking in the years 1924 and 1928.

Though he never kicked a century of goals in a season, Campbell was something of a freak in an era when goals were hard to score.

Campbell headed the WAFL goalkicking four times, the first in 1922 at South Fremantle and then in 1924, 1926 and 1927 at East Perth.

He was famous for his superb judgement in the timing of his lead, or the way he stayed within kicking distance of goals.

Campbell had unerring accuracy when kicking for goals and bagged 10 or more goals on three occasions during his career.

Tierney was the last Royals player to head the WAFL's goalkicking, a feat he achieved in 1967 when he kicked 119 goals.

The high-flying full-forward kicked over 100 goals three times during his career and was the Royals leading goalkicker on five occasions.

Tierney relied on his brilliant marking to make life difficult for opposition defenders, who had no answer to his superb leap.

He was unlucky to be playing at the same time as the great Austin Robertson, who outscored Tierney in 1968 and 1971 when both champions kicked 100 goals.



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Graham Farmer

Farmer . . . he was the greatest



EAST PERTH'S greatest player — and arguably the best produced in WA — was the legendary Graham Farmer.

Farmer had no peer as a ruckman in a 356-game career spanning 18 seasons, highlighted by many magnificent achievements.

He began his career in 1953, and by 1956 when he won the Tassie Medal at the Australian championships in Perth, he was already in the champion status.

The year 1956 was a memorable season for Farmer; apart from winning the Tassie Medal he won his first Sandover Medal and was big contributor in the Royals premiership win.

Farmer continued to enhance his growing reputation in the next five years, winning his second Sandover Medal and being a prominent member of East Perth's 1958 and 1959 premiership triumphs.

After 176 games with the Royals, Farmer set his sights on the bright lights of the VFL.

Geelong were the lucky club to gain his services and the great man didn't let his new club down.

Farmer revolutionised football during his six years in the VFL, introducing a new style of football with his expert use of handball.

Farmer proved his greatness by beating all comers in the VFL and decided to return home to WA in 1968 to take up the position of West Perth captain/coach.

He ended his magnificent career on a high note when he led the Cardinals to premierships in 1969 and 1971, ironically on both occasions against his former club East Perth.

Standing 6ft 3in, Farmer was short compared to today's giant beanstalk ruckmen, but his superb leap was his weapon against taller opponents.

His uncanny ability to take strong marks in packs and the pinpoint accuracy of his handball is still spoken about in awe today by those lucky enough to witness this great champion.

Tassie trio
