### ADDO RETIRES

**FORMER** West Perth star centre-half-forward Brian Adamson has finally hung up his boots after several aborted comeback attempts. Falcons supporters will miss his spectacular high marking and his superb skills and agility for a player, so tall. The slightly-built Adamson had several serious injuries during his career and showed enormous courage to return to the football battle field. Adamson has lost his enthusiasm for the game and the physical buffeting he has taken over the years has finally taken its toll.

### BUCKY'S BACK

**HIGH-FLYING** Hawthorn forward Gary Buckenara is starting to feel confident once again about his football. Bucky was out of action for most of 1984 after badly injuring his knee in the opening minutes of the 1983 grand final. It was a long fightback — but in the last two weeks he has flown for some high marks — and come down feeling happy. "Flying for marks was natural before the injury," says Bucky. "When I came back this year, I was in two minds about high-fliers. But the confidence has started to come back in recent weeks."

### TALENTED TRIO

**THREE** brothers with unbelievable skills in football is certainly a rare occasion — but that's the current story with the Danihers in VFL. Now that Neale is back in action after a two-year injury break, joining Terry in the Essendon side, the limelight is right on the family. However, third brother Tony is the least publicised of the trio, but nonetheless is an effective player for the Sydney Swans. He left Essendon a few years back, probably because of constant comparison to his more famous brothers, but his impact with the Swans has been excellent. After playing well on a wing, where his height is a real advantage, he has been switched to centre-half-forward with good effect. Last week the Danihers collectively had 38 kicks, 23 handballs, 15 marks and four goals.

### Polish touch for Swans

JOHN Todd could well change his name to Toddenski to give a Polish ring to it.

Last Saturday's match between Swan Districts and West Perth provides Todd with the perfect rallying point to bring some solidarity to his charges.

Lech Walesa could well take lessons from the WA coach in the way he bonds his players for a common cause — success.

In 1982, the football world shunned Swans after Todd sent his reserves team to contest the Escort Cup in Melbourne.

The boys from Bassendean were banned from the competition for three years and everybody wanted to have a piece of them, including the WAFL and other WA clubs.

It was a classic "them against us battle" which Swan Districts won handsomely. A copy of the trophy still sits in a glass cabinet in the foyer of the club.

Todd often brings about a feeling of isolation at Bassendean by criticising the media for often overlooking his players at voting time.

And last year at finals time he drew his players together by not allowing them to speak to the press.

It was by no means a new ploy, but it was effective.

By generating feelings of mateship and solidarity, Todd has mounted successful campaigns.

Ireland was another example. The Swans tilt for premiership No. 4 and an even bigger slice of history could well stem from the after-match rumpus at Leederville last Saturday.

The controversy surrounding the incidents as the Swans players left the field could give Todd the necessary ammunition to get the momentum off for a push at the premiership.

Last year Swans didn't get going till late in the second series and made the full-blooded charge in the final seven qualifying matches.

This year may see a similar battle-plan from Todd.

It's becoming old hat to suggest that nobody can catch the Sharks this year.

I believe Todd, himself a keen fisherman, now may have the equipment and the bait to hook East Fremantle before the end of the season.

That's not to say that East Fremantle will be beaten by Swans in the grand final.

The Sharks are still raging fancies to win the flag, and deserve to be. Ron Alexander and his lieutenants haven't put a foot wrong all year.

There are storm clouds, however, on the horizon for East Fremantle, and even if the Sharks make it a swim-through to the finals, I'll be having a little wager on Swans to do some damage.

By finals time, Swan Districts may be just hungry enough to digest a Shark.

### Common Touch

I don't want to give this column a totally Eastern Europe flavour, but South Fremantle captain Noel Carter and Czechoslovakian tennis player Milosla Mecir have a touch in common.

During a critical period of Monday's derby, Carter completely went to water as the ball sped in to Souths' forward line.

Three South Fremantle players were running past Carter when he had the chance to gather the ball and handpass it out.

But like a man whose confidence has been shattered, Carter fumbled badly and the chance went begging.

Thirty seconds later Souths coach Don Haddow ripped Carter from the field.

Mecir had more problems than that handling pressure.

During both the World Team Cup against the U.S. and in the current French Open, Mecir resorted to underarm service as his game fell apart.

It must have been a tragic sight to see a world-class tennis player swinging his racket underarm on the hallowed clay at Roland Garros. Feel better, Noel.

DURING my league football days, I had the privilege of playing with — and against — some colourful characters. Some were humorous, many oozed vivacity while others were just plain mean.

Here are but a few.

John Wynne, the current coach of West Perth, was a drawcard for the fans in the late '60s, not only because of his superlative football, but because he had one of the best elbows in the league.

On a rainy day, if you were playing on Wynne, all you had to do to stay dry would be to camp yourself under one of his armpits. Of course, if you forgot to duck, bad luck!

Many critics said that if Wynne had feathers on his arms he would fly, probably soar like the North American bald eagle — or a latter-day Falcon!

He was, however, an integral part of West Perth's annexation of the 1969 flag. He played at centre-half-forward in the grand final and, while not fully fit, turned in a blinder.

While on the subject of the Falcons, or Cardinals as they were known then, we should mention some of the name-calling that went on between West Perth and the Fremantle teams.

There was no affection intended with some of these horrendous nouns. Port players would call their Perth counterparts dings, garlic munchers or market gardeners. West Perth's retaliatory response would be to call the Fremantle boys wharfies, fish-mongers or flat-heads.

Compliments all round!

Fiery Fred Castledine was programmed to strike terrific terror into the hearts of opposition players everywhere. Playing on Fred, was like playing on a howitzer.

Fred Lewis once gave Castledine the run-around at Bombo Valley in 1965 and the black-and-white defender decided to do something about it.

In front of the scoreboard, Lewis gained possession only to have Castledine's elbow come down on the top of his head. Poor Freddy saw all the lights go out in Georgia and, spent the rest of the afternoon in the land of "NOD".

Syd Jackson, of East Perth and Carlton fame, was a superb footballer and a rugged individual. I remember back in 1967, bending over to pick up the ball in a game against East Perth, when I received a knuckle sandwich from the illustrious Syd. One minute there was a football, next moment, following the "bang", I was looking at three Burleys!

Mal Brown has earned a reputation of being anything but staid. He is noted for umpteen dozen incidents, but this one alone will add a little humour to our football.

In a match at Perth Oval, Mal had just received a handball in the square and was all on his own. Instead of a gentle kick for a goal, he unleashed an inter-continental ballistic missile that sailed out of Lotons Park like a Saturn Five rocket!

The leather landed somewhere in Bulwer Street, putting the odd Morris Minor under extreme pressure. Some of the passers-by probably thought they were being subjected to a mortar attack.

The reserve umpire introduced a new football — the WAFL put the old "MX missile" down as sundry expenses.

A former team mate of mine, Trevor Sprigg, was firebrand extraordinaire; many a player was subjected to his "blitzkrieg".

In one particular Derby, he collided with Norm Cox, of South Fremantle and was reported. Norm still had both his eyes open, but was in "limbo". As the saying goes "the lights are on but there's nobody home".

Opposition players and fans used to ask me if East Fremantle put Sprigg in a cage, poked sticks at him and let him out on a Saturday afternoon! Our coach, Eric Sarich, wished that all of his players hated to lose as much as Sprigg did.

Trevor has mellowed, however. Not only does he analyse a game for Channel 7 viewers, but he sits on the WAFL tribunal!

If you think that these stories are hard to believe, then try this one.

Only one player who collided with me in league football has ever said that he was sorry.

The year was 1969, the player was 18 years of age and in only his third game. He played for Claremont. His name — Graham Moss.

## WHAT'S WRONG TODDY?

WHAT'S the matter Toddy — the pressure getting to you, or has menopause set in early?

We, in the media, have become used to your petulant outbursts after a game... particularly in front of a partisan audience in the safe confines of your own clubrooms. I've felt the sting of your ascerbic and sometimes irrational tongue a couple of times.

In fact, some of the younger footy scribes are tentative about going into your clubrooms after a game because of the contemptuous way you treat them.

On Saturday I was warned you were in an "aggro" frame of mind when I went to interview you. I guess I could have baulked at going in. Some of the other media did. But why should I? You get paid to coach a football team. I get paid to write about football.

If you don't want to talk to someone that's your prerogative. But quite frankly Toddy, it's getting a little tiresome you abusing people just because you happen to be in a foul temper.

I didn't even get a chance to complete my question to you before you started your tirade against me.

### ARGUMENT

It wouldn't have mattered what I'd said. You were primed for an argument. I happened to walk into your sights and you gave me both barrels.

I dare say it would have happened to any other newspaper guy who ventured into the rooms at that time.

Toddy you're a great one for dishing it out. And you seem to get some perverse delight in doing it in a way to humiliate people.

But it's a different story when it's handed back. You don't like criticism. You showed that earlier in the year when you got prickly over an article I wrote in Westside Football which stated some people in football circles thought you had become big headed.

Anyone who heard your performance against umpires coach Ross Capes and myself would have trouble believing that's not the case.

### SUCCESSFUL

So you're a successful football coach, but that doesn't give you a monopoly on football nous.

One of the other football writers (who had a run-in with you in similar circumstances) suggested after Saturday's outburst that you're a bully.

It certainly doesn't take any courage to abuse or ridicule someone in front of a roomful of people whom you know would back you to the hilt.

I'd like to see how you'd react if the boot was on the other foot.

One would have had to be a lunatic to argue with you on Saturday. It would only have inflamed the situation. You weren't prepared to entertain another point of view and your players were in a highly emotive state because of the after match incident involving West Perth supporters.

You tend to display the emotions of a one-eyed supporter immediately after a game.

I was only trying to find out what you had said on television. Contrary to what you claim, sure there were some tiggy-tiggy touchwood decisions early, it was one of

the most physical games I've seen this season.

You have an opinion, but so do others. Just as you are entitled to yours so are others entitled to theirs. It's a matter for debate. That's what democracy is all about.

You talk a lot about character, Toddy. It's a pity you don't display something you demand of others.

For the sake of football and Swan Districts Football Club I suggest it's time you start displaying the kind of dignity your position warrants.

Incidentally Toddy I'm not going to be intimidated by you. And to show I've got the courage of my convictions I'll be at your game on Saturday.

## INTER-STATE TEAMS

There is some speculation in Australian Code camps as to how the selection of inter-state teams should be carried out. In Victoria, where there are many strong clubs, the practice is to select a maximum of two men from each of the twelve clubs. In Victoria some of the clubs regard it as a penalty to have too many men selected for representative honours. This strange position has arisen because of the fact that inter-state games have never been taken really seriously, being regarded mainly as exhibition matches. In Victoria, it is the club that counts. There are signs that this attitude is changing, though the attendance figures at inter-state matches in Victoria have always shown that the public is not particularly interested in these "exhibition" games. In any case, it has been obvious all along that the selection of the teams has always been on a wrong basis, and that undoubtedly accounts for the fact that the public has not been really interested. If West Australia was to meet Carlton on the M.C.G., then there would be a packed house. Under the present methods of selection, the team chosen is not really a team, but a conglomeration of stars, used to playing against, and not with, each other. Football is primarily a team game, and by the time that the Carnival is over, a selected team may have worked into some kind of understanding; but before that, the game they play is not even comparable with a club match. Even the club incentive is absent. Club football is very keen in Victoria. The barrackers see to that, and if the club idea was introduced into Carnival teams and inter-state matches, then some real representative football would be seen. The suggestion is made that at the date of selection, the leading team in the competition be picked to represent the State, with power to select, in consultation with the captain of the chosen side, a number of reserves from other teams to make up the 18 to the touring number. These reserves would be available for selection for matches equally with the original eighteen, and should ensure that, say three or four weak spots would be covered effectively — *From the West Australian Football Follower, April 1934.*

# KNIGHTS OF OLD.... a great comeback

TWO great comebacks to football highlighted the Victorian headlines this week as fans paid tribute to some great stars of the past.

A week after the long-awaited comeback to football of Essendon's former captain Neale Daniher — after 2½ years fighting to beat knee injuries — fans saw the high-flying skills of Peter Knights and Kelvin Templeton back to the fore last week.

Knights, the blond-headed bombshell of the last decade, was in a record-breaking mood for Hawthorn as he kicked nine goals — the club's highest tally against Carlton.

The rampaging Knights took 12 marks and kicked 9.2 from his 15 kicks to help the Hawks to a crushing 79 point win over Carlton.

The ultimate tribute came from Carlton's coach, David Parkin, a former



team-mate and coach of Knights: "He was just fantastic. It's a long time since I can remember a full-forward taking so many clear marks."

Knights, now 33, was never really certain about his playing future this season.

He underwent an operation for a chronic groin injury over summer, but then in the first reserves match of the season, he collapsed with a mystery illness, forcing a week's stay in hospital.

"I'm just happy to be back in the team and able to contribute," said Knights, ice-packs strapped to both legs after the triumphant return.

"I always wanted to continue to play, but at times you get terribly frustrated." Hawthorn coach Alan Jeans said that he had never seen a player work so hard to get over injuries.

Knights beat four opponents as he revived some of the memories of his high-flying feats of bygone days.

Former top goalkicker Kelvin Templeton was all smiles after his comeback campaign saw him kick seven goals in the reserves for Melbourne.

It was his first game for the season after a series of operations on an ankle.

"We're absolutely thrilled with his comeback," said Melbourne's assistant coach Ray Jordan.

## SYDNEY SIDER

ROBERTS is a name quite common in Victorian football, with Neil and Neville both being stars of the past.

But if Mark Roberts continues on with his out-standing form of this year a new champion will be acknowledged — and that would be a boost for Sydney people.

Roberts, a 19-year-old bank clerk, was recruited by the Sydney Swans from the St George club and is the first local player to graduate into senior VFL ranks since South Melbourne became the Sydney Swans.

After playing well at full-back in the reserves, Roberts was promoted for his senior debut as a forward — and finished with 3.3 from his nine kicks.

## LIONS AGONY

COURAGEOUS Fitzroy rover Leon Harris has suffered a broken leg and will miss the remainder of the season.

Harris, who has had to work hard to overcome knee problems, was carried off the ground on a stretcher with a suspected broken fibula, in the lower part of his left leg.

The popular rover was taken to hospital — along with teammate, West Australian Dean Turner, who was forced to leave the ground with a leg injury.

# JACKO A LOSER

MARK (Mr Individual) Jackson has broken his pledge of not getting reported this season.

The flamboyant Geelong full-forward was reported by a goal umpire for allegedly striking Richmond full-back Greg Strachan with a right fist.

Regardless of the tribunal outcome, Jacko has lost the bet he made that he wouldn't get reported.

Last year Jackson claimed that his trips to the tribunal were proving too expensive — he had lost about \$45,000 in match payments in his career and it was time he changed.



## KRAKER—JACK

YOU have to take your hat off to the Krakouer brothers, especially Jim. There hasn't been a Victorian footballer under more pressure, both on and off the field, this season than the former North Albany and Claremont star. Apart from his court problems, he continues to be harrassed on the football field — and it's not hard to guess what type of off-putting comments he is subjected to. The Krakouers are always in trouble, with Phil generally running to the aid of Jim who seems to generate most of the action. However, the Aboriginal brothers have certainly matured a lot more this year and they are definitely a major part in North Melbourne's resurgence to power.

Essendon's young blond bombshell Mark Harvey gets another kick for the Bombers. Harvey has developed into a sensation in the VFL and WA football fans would probably remember his outstanding performance in the 1984 VFL grand final.

# KERNAHAN KEENLY SOUGHT BY CARLTON

GLENELG champion Stephen Kernahan will face unprecedented offers to move to Victoria in October.

And Carlton, the club which signed the champion State and Glenelg ruckman/forward in 1980, is not guaranteed of holding him.

In mid-October — October 15 or 21 according to Carlton officials — Kernahan's signature will be sought by most — if not all 12 — VFL clubs.

VFL regulations, which severely penalise clubs which approach players signed by another club, will not apply when the 21-year-old Kernahan becomes a "free-agent" in October.

All interstate players who have signed Form 4s or those chosen in the 1981 and 1982 drafts by Victorian Clubs will be rescinded.

Hawthorn, even if they are not interested in securing Kernahan's signature on a Form 4, indicated last year that they would retaliate against Carlton's poaching of Central District rover John Platten.

Melbourne reports suggest Carlton "have hit the panic button to ensure other VFL clubs do not reap a dividend from the heavy investment they have placed on Kernahan.

Melbourne's Sunday Press sports editor Scot Palmer described Carlton as "the most regular doorknockers at the Kernahan household."

After last week's interstate match against Victoria at Football Park, Carlton officials spoke at length with Kernahan and his father, Glenelg football director, Harry Kernahan.

## RECRUITS FIRE

WEST Adelaide's expensive recruiting campaign finally paid off last week when they notched an upset win over second-placed Norwood.

Derek Shaw, Dale Woodhall and Ronnie Andrews all fired for coach John Cahill and lifted the team to a handy 27 point victory.



Andrews, the once-feared Essendon defender, was in superb rebound form; Woodhall kicked six goals and Shaw's ruck work gave the Bloods much-needed big-man strength.

It was a week of upsets in the SANFL with unbeaten North Adelaide being the only predictable result as they destroyed South Adelaide by 80 points.

Sturt came back into premiership calculations with a four-goal win over West Torrens; Central District — responding to a plea from coach Kevin Neale to play "football" produced an upset nine-point win over Glenelg and Woodville upset highly-fancied Port Adelaide by 19 points.

Malcolm Blight, coaching Woodville from the forward pocket, kicked nine goals.

## CONTROVERSY OVER TIGERS MOVE

THERE has been plenty of controversy over Claremont's decision to ignore WAFL chief executive John Walker's request to rest all Teal Cup players from last Saturday and Monday's games.

The Tigers played three of their Teal Cup representatives — Chris Lewis, Guy McKenna and Brian Sutherland — and rested Brad Mumme, who is carrying a slight injury.

Pitter had similar philosophies with the colts at East Perth and there were many positive results with several of his players graduating to league ranks relatively early.

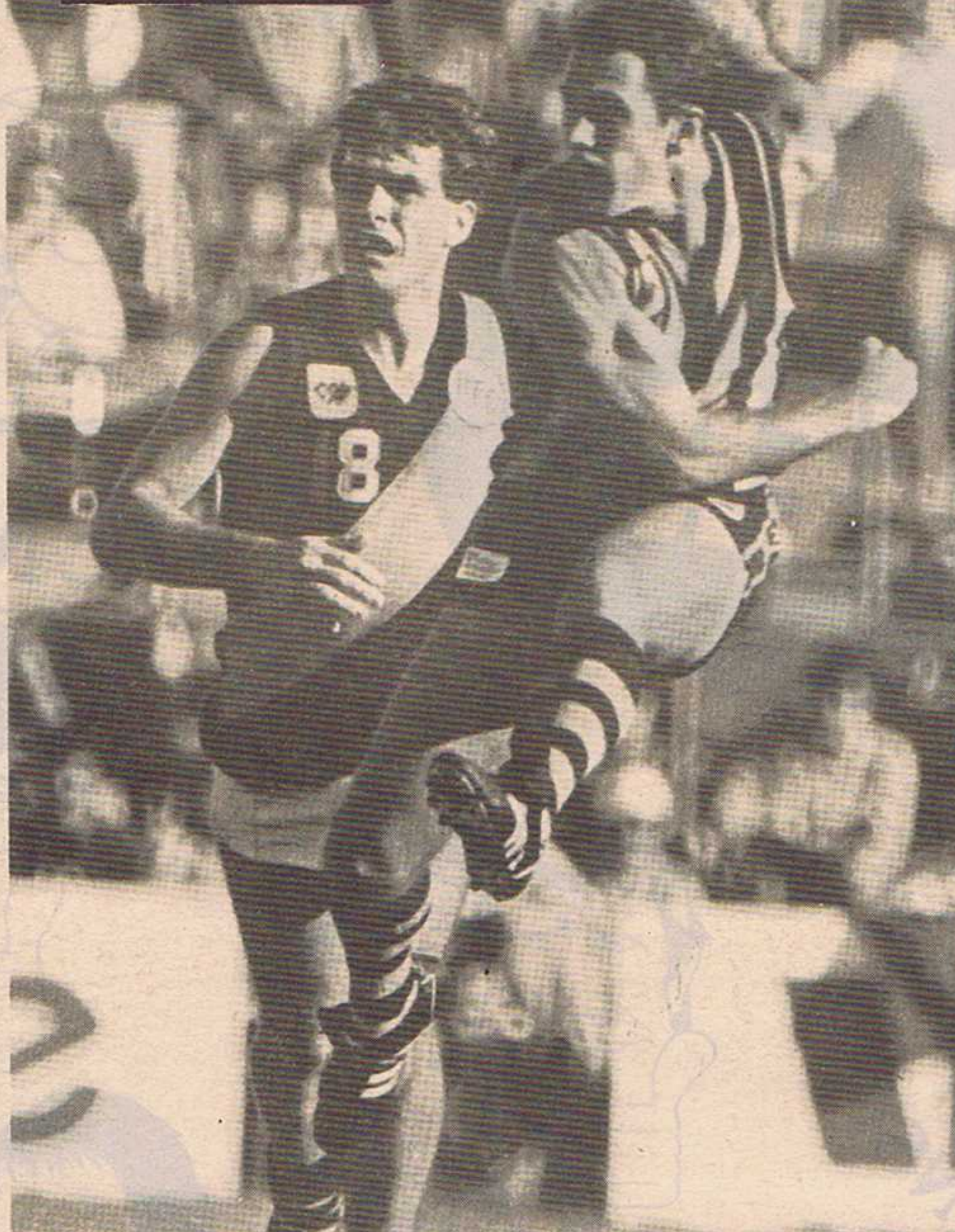

# Nine from WA in 300 club

ONE of our regular readers, Greg Wardell-Johnson, of Marvel Loch, wants to know how many WA footballers have played 300 league games.

I came up with a list of nine — Barry Cable (225 at Perth, 116 at North Melbourne, 41 at East Perth and 21 interstate games) — total 382; Mel Whinnen — 371 games at West Perth; Graham Farmer — (176 at East Perth, 101 at Geelong, 79 at West Perth and 36 interstate games) — total 343; Graham Moss (254 at Claremont and 89 at Essendon) — total 343; Bill Dempsey — 343 at West Perth; Jack Sheedy (210 at East Fremantle, 122 at East Perth, 6 at South Melbourne) — total 338; Graham Melrose (140 at East Fremantle, 111 at North Melbourne, 71 at Swan Districts) — total 322; Tom Grljusich (258 at South Fremantle, 49 at Central Districts) — total 307 and Bill Walker (305 at Swan Districts and 21 State games) — total 326.

All played in at least one premiership side, Farmer and Cable six. In Victoria, there are 20 tripple centurions and seven of them never played in a premiership side.

I remember some old timers down Fremantle way claiming Nipper Truscott passed the 300 mark.

Certainly not at East Fremantle, but where Truscott came from originally, Mines Rovers, the State sides were selected from so I suppose there's justification for claiming these as senior games. His real tally will never be known.

Another WA man with 300 league games up is an umpire, Ray Montgomery with 305 games here and I think one VFL game, too. Montgomery's career started in 1952 at Fremantle Oval and finished there 20 years later.

### NO ADVANTAGE

SUBIACO will be hoping for that home ground advantage to come through this week — they have already lost their last nine games at home to Swan Districts.

That's not their worst losing sequence at league headquarters. Between 1950 and 1963, the Lions dropped 19 consecutive games to East Perth there.

### JUST A HOPE . . .

NEXT week the Falcons launch their book to commemorate their centenary, "The West Perth Football Club 1885-1985". A premiership going to Leederville Oval this year is rather remote but it was interesting to see that they won the flag on their 50th year, 1935. Quite a coincidence that South Fremantle, 1950, East Perth, 1956 and Swan Districts, 1984, were premiers at the half-century mark. Perth made the grand final in their 50th year in league football, 1949 but lost it to West Perth. (1984 was Carlton's 100th year and all they could do was to finish in tenth placing.)

### A CAT'S TALE

EVER wondered how or why Geelong came to be known as the Cats? The story goes that back in 1923 a black cat followed a Geelong team on to the field when they won an important game after a great last quarter. A cartoonist suggested that Geelong would need a black cat to win their next match against Carlton, so their captain arranged for one of their players, noted for his drawing ability to draw a replica of a cat for all the team. They won this game, the cat drawings kept appearing and from then on they were the 'Cats'.

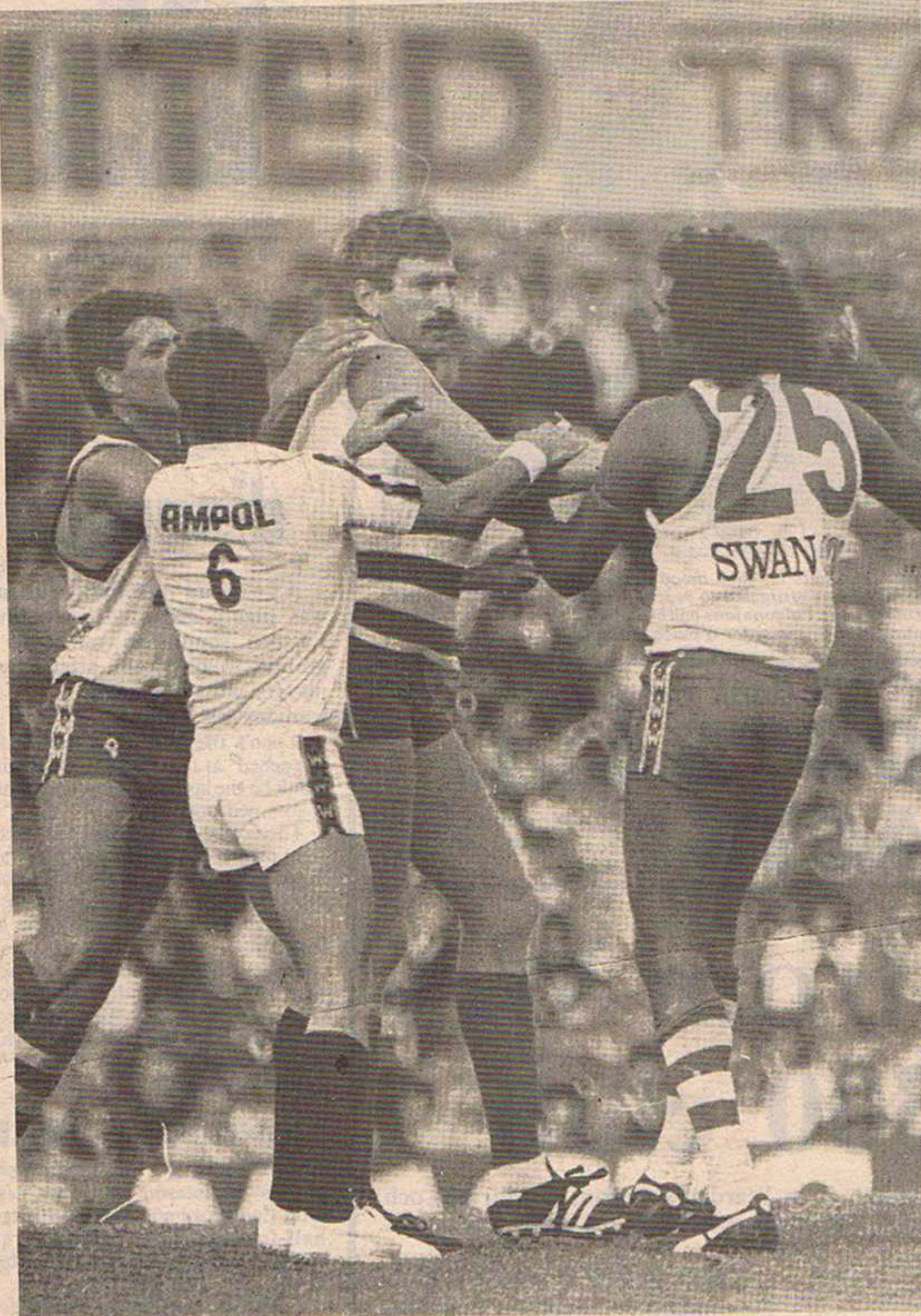

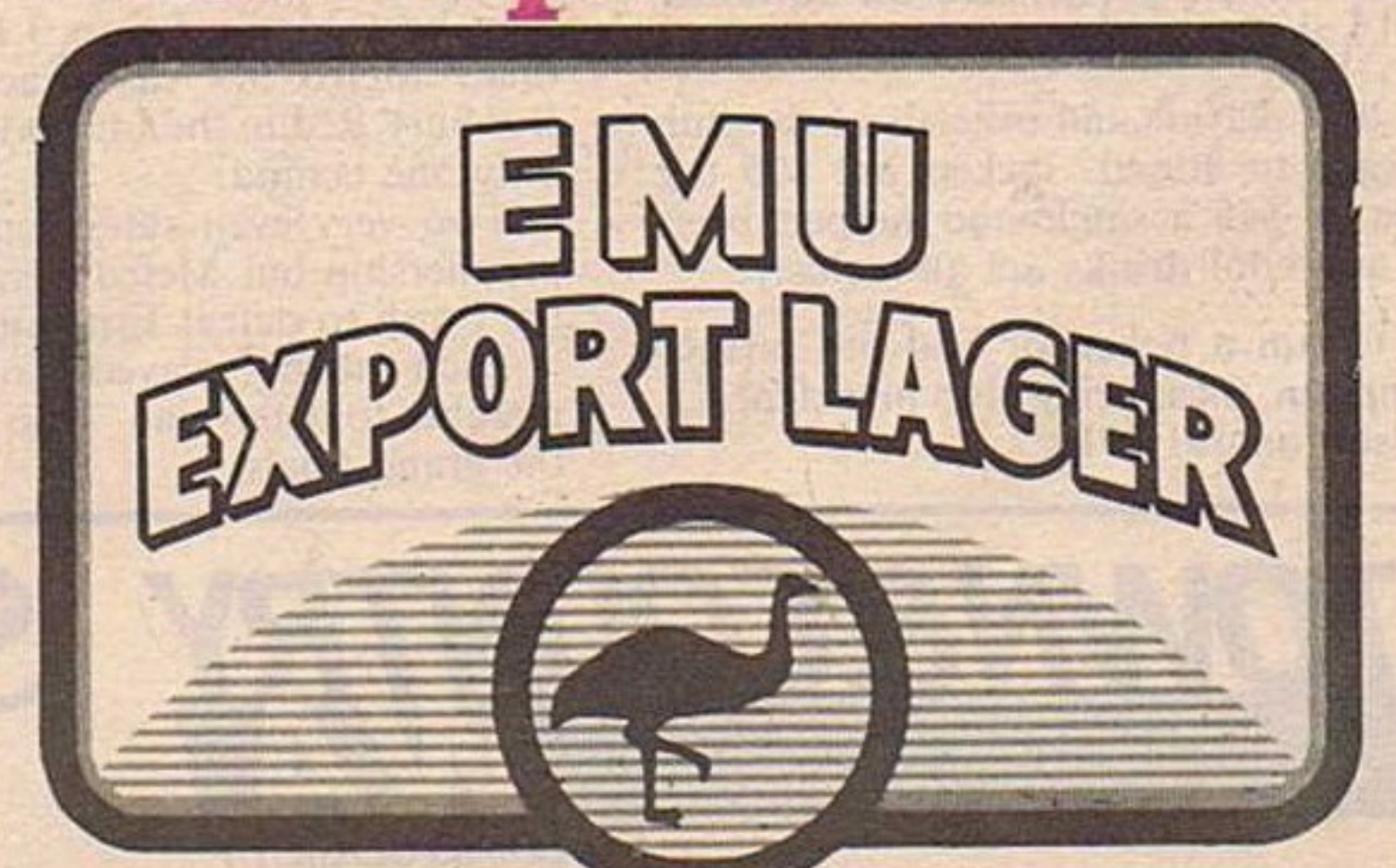

# Doig stands alone as a goalkicker

WHEN talking about great goalkickers at East Fremantle, one man stands alone after dominating the WAFL goalkicking lists in the 1930's — George Doig.

After kicking 144 goals in the 1941 season, World War II ended Doig's great career when he still had several top goalkicking years ahead of him.

Doig first came to prominence during the 1933 season, when he kicked 106 goals to top the WAFL goalkickers list; the first of six occasions he achieved this feat.

Doig had several other top full forwards in the 1930's competing for this honour — West Perth's Ted Tyson, the Tigers George Moloney and Bert Gook, from Perth.

Standing only 5ft 9in (175cm) Doig made up for his lack of height with brilliant leading and his superb recovery on the ground. He was a good mark, preferring to take many on the chest, but he was also strong overhead when it was necessary.

His ability to wrong-foot his opponent and kick proficiently with either foot made him almost unbeatable.

After achieving his first century of goals in 1933, Doig reached triple figures in the next eight seasons, scoring hauls of 152, 144, and 141 goals in 1934, 1937 and 1941.

It was significant that East Fremantle finished in the top four every season during Doig's goalkicking orgy.

Doig scored double figures or better 14 times throughout his 202-game career, with the highlight being his 19-goal haul

against Claremont on September 1, 1934. This great footballer goes down in history as one of WA's all-time champions, whose feats will never be forgotten.

# Dolan was the master coach

EAST Fremantle have had many champion teams and they had one of the greatest coaches in WAFL history in Jerry Dolan.

Dolan was a top ruckman and utility player and was totally dedicated to the game.

This attitude was evident when he began coaching and he expected the same discipline from his players.

He coached East Fremantle to a premiership in 1930, his first year of coaching. He didn't coach in 1931, resuming in 1932 and taking Old Easts to another flag in 1933.

East Perth recruited Dolan in 1934, hoping he could repeat some of the success their former master coach of the 1920's, Phil Matson had achieved.

After a five-year stint with the Royals (including a premiership in 1936) and a two year break from coaching, Dolan took over at East Fremantle for the next eight years, winning three premierships, highlighted by the 1946 team's undefeated season.

Dolan was the first WA recipient of the Australian National Football Council's merit award for outstanding service to Australian Football.

When he finished his coaching and teaching occupations, Dolan turned to politics and was elected as a Labor Party member, serving as Minister for Police, Transport and Railways in the cabinet of then Premier John Tonkin, who was a former president of East Fremantle.

## Three great champs

EAST Fremantle are well known for producing champion teams over the years, rather than champion individuals.

Brian Peake, Ray Sorrell and Jack Clarke have proven outstanding East Fremantle players over the past 30 years.

Peake is still thrilling WA crowds with his superb skills, after returning to the West this season after a stint in Victoria.

His record in WA reads like a who's who — 1977 Sandover Medallist, Tassie Medallist, All Australian captain and five consecutive Lynn Medals as East Fremantle's fairest and best.

Now in the twilight of his career, this great champion has much to offer the Sharks and should eventually prove a successful coach.

The magnificent skills of centreman Sorrell will live long in the memories of East Fremantle supporters who were lucky enough to watch him play.

His perfect balance and ball-getting ability also impressed the umpires, who voted him as the 1963 Sandover Medallist.

A teammate of Sorrell's was WA's most famous farmer, Jack Clarke.

The country boy from Jennacubbine, played an outstanding debut season in 1952, beginning an impressive career as a ruckman, which was highlighted by winning the 1957 Sandover Medal.

The great ruckman from the bush earned All-Australian selection an unprecedented four times in a 206 game career.

Clarke had many memorable duels with two other great ruckman, Merv McIntosh and Graham Farmer.

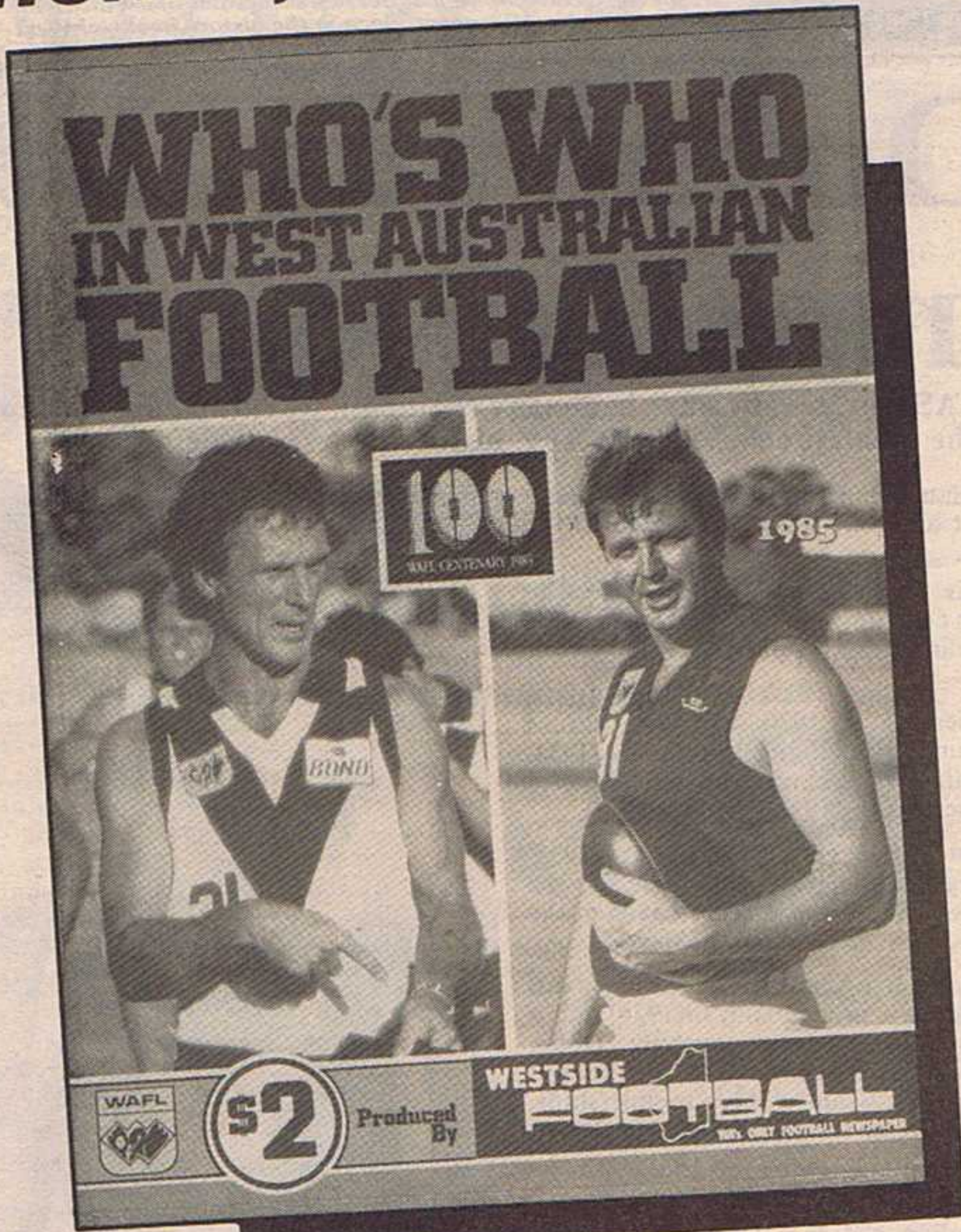

# SFL just fail in Geraldton

**A SEVEN goal roving performance by Kym Zubranich was not enough to prevent the SFL suffering an eight-point loss to the Great Northern NFL at Geraldton last Sunday.**

The SFL lost the match 17.22 (122) to 17.14 (114).

Zubranich was a live-wire follower all day in a match highlighted by pace and dominant running players from both sides.

**PERMANENT**

Match-of-the-day billing belongs with the Canning-Willetton match at Wyong Reserve.

Canning must win to keep their hopes alive of a finals berth and the talented Willetton combination are sure to find the home side in a ferocious mood.

At different times of the year, football administrators call for alcohol to be sold around the ground. This 'cry' to assist club funds should never be listened to.

There is nothing wrong with supporters having a drink but it is a fact that too much alcohol makes the weak strong, the cowards brave and causes emotions to be exaggerated.

It will not be long before someone is seriously hurt, unless the authorities that control our great game, make the obtaining of alcohol harder to get and stop the growth of bar areas at all grounds.

With an excellent overhead mark and perhaps the best left and right handed handballer in the league, Bradmore never takes his eyes off the ball.

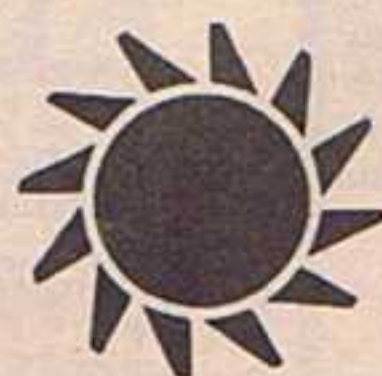
