



IN THE HOT SEAT

UMPIRES were in the hot seat last weekend when West Perth topped East Fremantle in one of the most controversial games for many years.

Two debatable umpiring decisions at the end of the second and last quarters, could have cost the Sharks the game.

Umpires David Johnson and Ken O'Driscoll were both involved in the separate incidents.

The Sharks players were adamant that Johnson had erred with the Colin

Waterson kick right on the half-time siren, resulting in a disallowed goal.

East Fremantle coach Ron Alexander said after the game he was not going to protest because it would probably be taken as sour grapes.

Both umpires could have been helped by looking at a video tape of the separate incidents — as our columnist Grant Dorrington did. He gives his forthright views on this and other football subjects on the back page in Dorro's Diary.

MURNANE READY

"I'M still a week by week proposition."

"I tried everything to get back into football," he says.

"Swimming, cycling, running up and down sand hills and I even had two operations.

"The second operation was pretty successful and I was then advised to rest for several months."

Rest proved to be the best rehabilitation for Murnane and he began to do some running just after Christmas.

"My knee was still very tender and the jogging on hard surfaces was jarring it badly," said Murnane. "I went into the gym and spent several weeks just strengthening my knee."

He began jogging at Leederville Oval eight weeks ago with a distinctive limp, but is now running freely, as was evident with his hard-running performance in the reserves match against East Fremantle last Saturday.

"Family and friends have been very supportive during my comeback bid and West Perth have been very patient," he says.

"The club has believed in me and I was particularly pleased when John Wynne called me several times during the summer to see how I was progressing."



Mr Farris said his club hoped to obtain a freehold title for the crown land. Swans are not expected to pay for the land, but will acquire a crown grant trust giving it possession for football purposes.

PROMOTION OF FOOTBALL

LEEDERVILLE DEVELOPMENT

WEST Perth's centenary celebrations received a setback when East Perth outplayed them at Leederville Oval. But since then, the Falcons have really given their supporters something to celebrate.

West Perth's victory over East Fremantle indicates that a lot of development is taking place at Leederville.

John Wynne and his back-up coaching staff of Bill Dempsey and Tom James are obviously developing the correct attitude and objectives among senior and junior players alike.

Not to mention the behind-the-scenes activity of people like Bob Howat, Colin Hebbard and Rod White and the profound influence Polly Farmer has had on John Wynne.

Considered to be one big man short without Craig Nelson, Wynne has developed Mark Stephens and Kim Rogers admirably as a force to be reckoned with. They have talent galore in the small men department and West Perth are now set to make an all-out assault for the finals.

FROM WHERE I SIT

UMPIRES — and the Mark Jackson fiasco

IT seems obvious that football administrations in the various States across Australia do not have the slightest intention of taking steps to alleviate the thug element from the game.

The only time they utter any indignant sounds about violence is immediately after an incident like the one in Melbourne between Geelong and Hawthorn.

Traditionally, they "tut tut" and make all the appropriate noises.

But in terms of quick, long term, meaningful action, they will do absolutely nothing.

Following the pattern which has been the norm over something like 30 or more years of my time as an avid fan, I have been witness to the "king hitting" of the following players:

Jeff McGann (Perth), Brian (Blue) Foley at Leederville Oval, Trevor Williams (Subiaco) and Wayne Cormack (East Fremantle).

In the middle of these, is a most vivid memory of seeing Subiaco's Terry Pryor knocked unconscious when he was well away from the play. This particular incident was never reported and no questions were asked publicly.

The reason I remember the Pryor occasion so vividly is because I coached him in junior football and had a personal interest in him. Otherwise I would not have seen what happened because the ball was nowhere near the spot at the time.

There was considerable demand for something to be done about the violence after the knock-outs to Williams and Cormack. But because little was said about the others, football administration certainly didn't stir the pot or make any sincere attempts to pinpoint the culprits.

Football has some queer ethics internally and the code-of-conduct which exists between players might be considered commendable at first glance.

For example, no-one wants to be a "tattle-tale", "squealer" or the like. We all admire this and accept it as a manly trait and something to encourage in our kids.

The real reason why most players will not tell the truth is that they know they have thrown a few punches themselves at times and it is just their turn to receive instead of give.

They believe the culprit is no better and no worse than the majority of men playing the game.

They also work on the principle that there will be another time and another place and they would be ready to square the ledger.

I was in the East Fremantle club-rooms once, listening to a coach I admired and he let the players know, in no uncertain terms, that if any of the blue-and-whites hit the deck, then one of the opposition had to meet the same fate.

It didn't matter who or when, the deal was simply one for one.

This type of thinking was obviously behind a couple of the knock-outs in the sad Hawthorn-Geelong affair.



THIRD man in . . . should be they charged?

Mark Jackson overstepped the line on this occasion and the people who laughed at his on-field antics and sense of humour, now find it fashionable to label him a bullying thug.

Of course, if he stepped off the plane in Perth today, the media would be there to interview him or have him as a guest speaker.

After all, this is what he is all about.

Go back through the years and you will find that WA has had its share of "bad lads."

Jack Sheedy, Ray Lucev, Mal Atwell, Dennis Barron, Fred Castledine and many others built themselves reputations as tough customers and if the league did "smack their wrists" occasionally, they were, in the main part, encouraged to develop their macho images as the mighty men of mayhem.

To stop 90 percent of Aussie Rules violence, I would prescribe the following actions:

1. Any player reported by an umpire should be automatically suspended for a week. The tribunals should only consider whether the penalty be longer or not. It is childish for a group of people to sit and decide whether the umpire has, in fact, done the right thing by reporting a player.

2. American gridiron has a rule called "the third man in" which is long overdue in Aussie Rules.

When two players get tangled in a fight, any other person who gets involved is fined heavily.

3. The send-off rule should apply, but I wouldn't want it for the entire game. I would prefer to see it used as a "cooling off" period, preferably to the end of the next quarter.

If these rules were implemented, the "man in white" would indeed be proved right and the Mark Jacksons of the football world would have just reason to heed him when he tells them to "break it up."

Both clubs have played their best football of the season in the past few weeks and this is shaping as a very closely fought contest with an even spread of talent in both sides.

The two major recruits for the Tigers this season — Peter Thorne and John Scott — are now playing with more consistency. They have been important contributors in Claremont's improved performances recently.

The performance of Thorne, an important player in midfield for the Tigers and Michael Mitchell, Steve Goulding and Peter Davidson are vital to Claremont's chances.

STRENGTH

They will be opposed to West Perth's strength; a mobile division which has the capacity to destroy opposition sides very swiftly.

Even though the injury was right in front of the interchange bench, no moves were made by the umpires — Phil O'Reilly and Ross Graffin — to halt play while the stretcher was put into use. In fact, the play went close to the injured Sparks as he was being lifted gingerly on to the stretcher but the watching O'Reilly tended to ignore the situation.

TV COVERAGE

WATCHING the game on TV left me a little flat — mainly because the sun was affecting the picture and the players looked like silhouettes at stages. I made a few inquiries this week about why the cameras faced into the sun and I was told that it was because of the "pretty background" — the ocean. The Seven boffins felt they could get over the sun's rays beaming straight into the cameras. Certain people at league headquarters are now asking the question — if Seven felt that the cameras could cope with the Dampier sun, why can't they shoot from the eastern side of Subiaco Oval, into the sun, but at least with the grandstands as a much better backdrop.

POOR SHOW

IT was disappointing to note that the two Sunday papers did not have any results from the East Perth-Subiaco colts and reserves matches. The Weekend News took the trouble to obtain this information and give the public the full run down on all the minor games. The responsibility should also be on the clubs to ring through this information, but instead both parties put it in the too-hard basket and football followers suffered.

Believe it or not, Subiaco were the home side, which the Royals were not aware of. The mistake was fixed during the match and the reserves sides wore their correct attire. There was certainly a communication breakdown between the club and the WAFL which should never have occurred.

Wattsie was commenting on the South Fremantle-Swan Districts match and said during the second quarter: "Swan Districts are kicking to the opposite end of the ground to what they were in the first quarter". Wattsie I know, the press box at Fremantle Oval is sub-standard, but surely you know the difference between north and south.

Well, that hardly applies this season when you consider the WAFL has had only four games on a Saturday twice in the last five weekends. Falcons face testing time

WEST Perth shouldn't get too carried away with their win over East Fremantle last Saturday.

Since 1980, they have shown they are something of front-runners — so will it be the same again this year?

In 1980, they were in the four until the 17th round; in 1981 in the four until the 15th round, and while they got their act together in 1982 to make the preliminary final, they again fell away in 1983 and 1984 after being a finals chance.

In 1983, they were in fifth spot, one game out of the four until round 12 and last year were in the four until the 18th round.

PRESSURE

At virtually the same stage of the year, they are again riding high — but with Claremont and South Fremantle appearing to be getting their act together at the right time, West Perth have the pressure right on them — again.

Whether they buckle again will depend very much on how they perform over the next three fixtures when they play their three opponents for places in the four — Claremont, South Fremantle and Swan Districts.

Two of those games are away so they have a difficult assignment.

I'm not convinced, despite last week's win, that the Falcons will make the finals.

They rely too heavily on one mid-field player for drive — Peter Menaglio.

How far West Perth progresses this season could depend on someone who hasn't played a league game since 1982 — Peter Murnane.

In the reserves on Saturday, he was a prolific ball-getter. More importantly, his disposal was immaculate.

He was always looking for a player. If he can stand up to the vigour of league football after such a long absence through a bad leg injury, then he'll give West Perth that added bite on the ball to make the finals.

DEFENCE

West Perth's Achilles heel is their defence. If they are going to be found wanting then it is in this department. While they have some very hard-working backmen they lack height.

The Falcons were able to get away with it against East Fremantle for two reasons — John Duckworth, who gave them necessary inches when he came on at half time (but will he be able to play out a full game each week?) and because I believe East Fremantle were a little over-confident.

Clinton Browning, the best forward-defender in WA football, should have been thrown into attack when Andrew Lockyer got bogged down against Duckworth. But that's another story.

One thing that impressed me about West Perth on Saturday was their determination. John Wynne has a band of players who are prepared to keep on plugging away. What a contrast on Saturday to the first round when the Falcons caved in against East Fremantle

after half time to lose by more than 21 goals.

While it is early days yet, Saturday's match against Claremont could determine the Falcons future this season. If they win, they will get one of the sides breathing down their neck for a spot in the four off their back and have the confidence to do the same the following week against South Fremantle at Leederville Oval.

It will be interesting to see if West Perth have got rid of the wonky legs that have seen them buckle under in the last round on so many occasions in recent seasons.

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

The Doig family

NO history of WA football would be complete without a tribute to possibly the most famous Australian football family — the Doigs of East Fremantle and South Fremantle.

The first was the redoubtable "Scotty" Doig, who played in Old Easts second match in 1898 and retired at the end of the 1911 season. He was followed by John "Hooky" Doig, from 1900 to 1912, and Charlie Doig, from 1903 onward to 1915. Charlie made a short come-back in 1919.

Cleave and Norman made up the five brothers who have all played in the one WA league team on the same day and in the 1910 grand final, won by "Old Easts", four brothers were in the premiership side.

The second generation appear in 1927 when Jimmy and Ron, sons of "Scotty", player with South Fremantle. In the 1927-29-30 seasons they turned out with South and reached the grand finals. Later, in the 30s Dave Doig won an interstate jersey against the VFL (1939).

In 1932 "Billy" and Charlie played with East Fremantle and in 1933 Norman and George made the grade with East, and along with Edgar, made five Doigs playing for the blue and whites in the 1934 season.

In the sixties Ron Doig (with South) won interstate honours. Charlie won the Lynn Medal in his second year and captained East Fremantle's unbeaten premiership team of 1946 — a fitting climax to an illustrious career.

George must rank high on Old Easts' honour roll and in the writer's humble opinion, in the first three no player before or since made it possible for his club to win so many games. A century in his first year (this State's first), and with Bob Pratt (of South Melbourne) Australia's fourth. No a big man physically, and opposing bigger men in practically every game, George performed well in carnival and interstate games and, as far as I can rememebr, never failed to score, ever. My main regret is that his full record is not available. Gems like 11.1, 13.4, 8.1 and his 19 and 13 goals are still and likely to remain a successive match record of 32.

"Scotty" Doig played in nine premiership teams (an Australian major State record) 1900-2-3-4-6-8-9 and 1910-11 — a record that stood the test of time. As far as I can ascertain, the Doigs have between them amassed a total of 39 winning grand final appearances and 35 runners-up.

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Kickett notches another target

ACHIEVING football ambitions is something Larry Kickett has aimed at all his life — and this week he reaches yet another of his targets.

Kickett joins football's 200 games played club, becoming the 105th player in WA's history to reach the double century.

Kickett joins 12 other players who have achieved this target by playing with more than one club. His move from East Perth to Claremont at the start of the 1983 season presented him with a fresh challenge, to which he has responded in fine style.

The 31-year-old bank officer notched 158 games at East Perth and this Saturday's clash with Perth will be his 42nd for the Tigers.

A product of Tammin, in the eastern wheatbelt, Kickett set out on the football road with several ambitions — to play league football; to make it to 100 games; to achieve life membership at a club and to then reach the double century.

"I'm pleased to have achieved all those ambitions," says Kickett this week.

"After achieving life membership at East Perth, I really set about to just keep playing as consistently as I could.

"Moving to Claremont was certainly a boost for me; it gave me a new challenge. I believe that many players could benefit by a change of club."

The two teenagers were included in a Royals fourths team while still at school and both later fulfilled Stempel's faith by graduating to league ranks.

And what of the future for the dashing back-pocket specialist? "I'll just take every year as it comes now," he says.




blow and he looked likely to spend many weeks on the sidelines.

Salmon back into action

THE sensational return of goalkicking genius Paul Salmon is set to get the turnstiles clicking in the last half of the VFL season.

The brilliant Essendon forward made a secret return to the competitive arena last week and kicked 10 goals in a smashing display in the reserves.

After a year on the sidelines with a knee injury, Salmon took 14 marks, had 18 kicks and booted 10.2.

And Bombers fans, already confident of a premiership again this year, were quickly calling for Salmon's return to the league side.

A comeback to the seniors by Salmon this week would ensure a sell-out crowd of 35,000 at Victoria Park when Essendon do battle with Collingwood.

"I would love to be in the firsts next week," said Salmon after his miraculous return to football.

"I trained last Thursday and did everything including all the slipping and



sliding and I'm now ready to play anywhere next week.

"I was determined to show everyone that I could play again."

Salmon damaged his right knee at Victoria Park 12 months ago and it would be a dream come true if the big strong-marking sensation made it back this week.

However, coach Kevin Sheedy was non-committal after the game about Salmon's expected return.

He did not see the reserves match because he was preparing the seniors for their clash with Hawthorn — but he quickly made plans to watch a full video tape of the Salmon performance.

The Bombers reserves went down to Hawthorn by 27 points despite Salmon's 10-goal haul — and also the inclusion of other senior players like Bill Duckworth and Cameron Clayton, both on the recovery trail after knee operations.

SUPER SIMON

FOOTSCRAY full-forward Simon Beasley had his own private message for premiership favourites Essendon last week — "If anyone beats you it will be us."

Beasley was talking after Footscray's 22-point win over Geelong — with the former Swan Districts star booting seven goals straight from his nine marks.

"We've got plenty of momentum up and if we can take each week as it comes, we will be there when it counts," he said.

The Bulldogs forward line has become a potent force with players like Les Bamblett, Tony Buhagiar, Brian Royal and Steve McPherson all capable of kicking goals.

"This has helped take the pressure off me," said Beasley. "We have so many more avenues to go."

VAN DER'S 150TH

ESSENDON forward Paul van der Haar achieved an important milestone last week when he played his 150th game.


The Bombers high-flier has had to overcome plenty of hurdles in his quest for league regularity — and he has had his share of controversy.

After nine seasons with the Bombers, he achieves a milestone that would never have happened if not for the persuasive powers of the Essendon administration.

"I didn't really want to play league footy," he said after Saturday's big win over Hawthorn.

"I kept putting it off, but then I thought I might as well give it a go.

"Once I got the taste for it, I wanted to keep going."

RON 'SORRY'

SHOCKED Melbourne coach Ron Barassi was apologetic to club supporters after the team's 12-goal loss to Collingwood last week.

Barassi said that it was hurtful to see the team perform so badly.

"We apologise to supporters and the football public who have come to expect something from these clashes with Collingwood over the years," said Barassi. "Hardly anything went right. We only had four players who played well."

Barassi was critical of the players for not fighting the game right out.

MALARKEY OUT

THE career of West Australian defender Gary Malarkey is in doubt. The veteran defender now with Geelong has a broken right collarbone — an injury that has troubled him in the past. He fell awkwardly in the clash with Collingwood two weeks ago and he now requires a pin in the shoulder. He will miss the rest of this season as the arm will be in a sling for six weeks after the operation. At the age of 32, and after 163 games with Geelong and 101 games with East Perth, it seems doubtful whether Malarkey can bounce back next year after such a difficult injury.

MAGPIE FIGHT

COLLINGWOOD do not plan to surrender the services of injury-plagued rover Gary Shaw lightly. The nippy little Queenslander has indicated that he wants to rejoin Claremont next season after 2½-seasons of troubled football in the VFL. Shaw cost Collingwood an amazing \$300,000 in the "good old days" of big clearance fees to WA clubs. But injury and poor form has not given the Magpies suitable reward, as he has only played 27 games since 1983 and Collingwood have indicated that they require his services again next year.

COMEBACK BLUES

IT was a mixed day for veteran Richmond defender Jim Jess against St Kilda last week.

He was back in the seniors after having his substantial salary scale debated in the media in relation to his recent performances.

But he finished the game on report — facing a charge of striking.

Jess had six marks, 11 kicks and 10 handpasses for the match to be among the better players in an impressive Richmond win over St Kilda.

SA STARS GO TO CARLTON

TWO South Australian champions — Craig Bradley and Peter Motley — have signed lucrative deals with VFL club Carlton.

The contracts have been negotiated by former SA champion Geof Motley, who made his name with Port Adelaide and is the father of the current State defender, Peter.

The two deals are reportedly worth \$300,000 each for the two youngsters for the next two years.

Motley is due to be cleared free of charge under a special clause in his contract — and the Port Adelaide administration are far from happy with Geof Motley's involvement.

Bradley is expected to be cleared for \$45,000.

RUN OVER

REIGNING premiers Norwood showed that the premiership is far from a foregone conclusion when they stopped North Adelaide's run of 11 straight wins.

Norwood, coached by successful State coach Neil Balme, cemented second place on the ladder with their 36-point win.

North retained top spot despite the loss, but coach Mike Numan was disappointed particularly as Norwood were without key players like Michael Aish, Bruce Winter, Jim Michalanne and Duncan Fosdike.

Balme's brother Craig did the damage for Norwood by holding top goalkicker Grenville Dietrich scoreless at full-forward.

In another upset, bottom side South Adelaide rolled third placed Sturt by 32 points.

It was sweet revenge for Rick Davies, who took up the coaching role at Souths after being sacked as a player by Sturt.



ROUND EYES SA JOB

FORMER Sydney Swans captain Barry Round wants to coach in Adelaide next season, according to a Melbourne report.

Round, who has only played a couple of league games this season has been associated with South Adelaide in a Melbourne newspaper.

South refutes any interest, discussions or knowledge of Round's interest in South.

Round 35, has stated that he will retire from VFL football at the end of the year.

Inside Football reported last week that "SA club South Adelaide was interested in securing Round as playing coach when Don Scott resigned the post last month.

"Round, however, wanted to continue with his beloved Sydney Swans and has since forced his way back into the senior line-up.

"South Adelaide has appointed former Sturt goalkicking great Rick Davies as caretaker coach for the rest of the season, but it's not clear if he'll continue in the role next year.

Close memories for East Fremantle

A two-point defeat last week shattered East Fremantle's hopes of another unbeaten year.

By coincidence, it was a four-point loss that ended their record run of 35 straight wins back in 1947 when South Fremantle won the first derby of the season, 13.16 to 13.12.

The Sharks effort in winning the first 12 straight has only been bettered twice since their own unbeaten year of 1946. In 1980, Swan Districts won 13 on and before losing to South Fremantle and in 1959 East Perth were unbeaten till round 18 before going down to West Perth by 12 points at Leederville.

SAME FATE

LAST week's thriller at League headquarters, when East Fremantle's Chris Mainwaring had the last kick to decide the game, was reminiscent of another game between the same two sides 14 seasons back.

In the 1971 preliminary final, West Perth beat East Fremantle by three points after a shot for goal by Garry Fenner missed in the dying seconds of the game.

DORO'S FEAT

BIG Bulldog Jon Dorotich has become the 11th South Fremantle player to kick a double-figure goal tally in league football.

His 10 goals last week puts him on the same record page as Chris Stasinowsky (11 against Subiaco in 1983), Noel Carter (11 versus West Perth in 1981), Ray Bauskis, Peter Troode, Graeme Scott, John Gerovich, Bernie Naylor, Bill Truscott, Bert Changler and Sol Lawn.

The only other club with 11 individual double figure goal kickers is West Perth.

HARSH RULE

RICHMOND footballer Jim Jess was reported recently as receiving \$425 every time he kicked the ball, based on his match payment of \$2590 or an annual payment of \$57,000.

Before the VFL was formed in 1897, the VFL was then the parent body of Australian Football and they made every effort to keep professionalism out of the game. Stringent laws were made and enforced. One read — "Any player found receiving payment directly or indirectly for his services as a footballer shall be disqualified for a period the VFL may think fit".

The following year an Essendon player named Webb was disqualified for LIFE for accepting a payment to play.

FIGHTING FIT

YES, it's been going on since they started playing football, so we can't blame Bernie O'Sullivan for not eliminating it. Fighting, that is. Here's a report from a 1908 paper.

"In the last quarter, during an exciting bit of wing play, two men assumed a pugilistic attitude. Umpire Crapp spoke to them but they again got into a fighting position and time off had to be declared while the public witnessed the ludicrous spectacle of Crapp getting the two players in front of him and giving them another talking to".

And after watching "The Winners" on TV last week where a uniformed policeman stood by (holding the football actually) while the players had a set-to, I guess no one will ever stamp it out.

Chubby's Chatter SOUTH PAIR SHOW STYLE

TWO of South Fremantle's young, unobtrusive players in Arthur Maskos and Michael Athanasiou caught my eye at Fremantle Oval on Saturday.

Both players miss out on the accolades of their more credentialled team-mates, but they went about their jobs quietly and efficiently last Saturday.

Maskos was unfortunate to incur an injury and looks likely to be sidelined for several weeks, which will unsettle the Bulldogs backline.

OFF BEAM



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DAMPIER REPORT

A round-up of last Sunday's match at Dampier.

MIXED BAG FOR SEVEN

THE picturesque Dampier Oval was a much talked-about topic in last weekend's football experiment in the Pilbara.

But it did pose major problems for the Channel 7 team who travelled north to provide a live coverage of the Subiaco-East Perth clash.

The decision to locate the cameras on the eastern side of the oval and shoot the football action with the delightful bay in the background proved to be a disaster.

Despite attempts to mount filters on their four cameras, the strong mid-afternoon sun — and particularly its reflection off the water — detracted from the coverage.

Not only did the film lose its image back in Perth, but the commentators, John Rogers and Bob Miller continually had trouble identifying the players on the opposite side of the ground.

It was a disappointing end for Channel 7, who had tackled an enormous challenge to telecast the game back to Perth. A team of 18 people went to Dampier for the coverage, including those who left five days in advance to drive the outside broadcast van 1550kms up the coast.

It was an expensive operation for Seven Sport, as part of their promotion of football and they deserve a big pat on the back for the commitment.

BRICKBATS . . .

WHILE the television media gets a bouquet for the Dampier event, the radio media certainly deserves a brickbat.

The ABC, via radio 6WF, did not endear themselves to residents in Dampier, Karratha, Paraburdoo and Tom Price by refusing to allow local station 6KA to broadcast the Subiaco-East Perth game.

The Karratha station flew in two former local radio announcers in Pat Love and Peter McEachen to call the curtain-raiser, a match between the North Pilbara combined side and the BP All-Stars, drawn from surrounding leagues.

In view of the tremendous local interest in the WAFL match, and 6KA's intense promotion of the big day, it was decided that they should also call the main game for local listeners who generally have trouble picking up a clear signal from the ABC.

Despite a few days of hectic lobbying, including intervention by the WAFL, the ABC stuck to its rights as the exclusive broadcaster of the game and declined 6KA's requests.

HI'S TOP SHOW

MINING giant Hamersley Iron certainly know how to turn on the public relations charm when it comes to displaying its community involvement.

It was HI's initiative that led to this WAFL fixture being staged in the country — and they tied it in expertly with the delivery of their 500 millionth tonne of iron ore to a waiting ship in the Dampier Harbour.

A dinner on the eve of the match saw football officials mixing with politicians, unionists, HI executives from all over the country and, most importantly, the general workers.

HI had the Premier, Brian Burke, and a former Premier in Sir Charles Court among their impressive guest list for the big weekend — and there was plenty of pomp and ceremony on the Saturday morning when that special tonne of iron ore rolled down from Paraburdoo.

FOOT POWER

THE massive organisation of taking 42 footballers, 30 support staff and some 200 supporters and VIPs to Dampier was a difficult operation . . . and naturally something had to go wrong.

One of the main bug-bears in the weekend was the crossed-wires with bus arrangements.

The most embarrassing — and, eventually, most comical — came after the game when the bus to take the victorious

Subiaco players back to the hotel was nowhere to be seen.

The Lions had come to the ground at the last moment, all geared up and dressed ready for action — a ploy by Bunton to avoid having his players caught up in the carnival atmosphere.

So, in view of this, the players decided not to shower at the ground, but to head back to their nearby hotel — a 400-metre walk with the absence of the bus.

It was rather strange seeing league footballers — in varying stage of dress, including Greg Wilkinson with a towel around his midriff and just his ankle strappings — trudging back up the hill to their hotel.

But, as victors, they smiled all the way!

FINALS FEVER

THERE was a distinct grand final fever at Dampier Oval on the Sunday.

Some 2000 balloons were filled with CIG gas and let loose as Subiaco and East Perth ran on to the ground — with the howling gale blowing down the ground soon carrying them out to the ocean.

The casual seating arrangements around the boundary line saw many spectators arrive early with their deck chairs to get a prime spot.

In fact, there was a 200-metre long queue at the gate at 7am . . . just as some of the visitors from the city were getting home!

A radio panel show on the Saturday attracted a big crowd to the Karratha International Hotel, where the East Perth players — and some 160 members — were staying.

6KA's general manager Phill Burnie compered the show, which featured guests from both clubs.

FRIENDLY FOES

THE two WAFL clubs showed considerable friendliness in this NW experiment — to the extent that the players mingled freely on the same Ansett flight north.

However, they were located in different hotels — and some astute judges think that Subiaco took the tactical points in that issue.

Lions coach Haydn Bunton opted for the Mermaid Hotel in Dampier, close to the ground, but away from the more sophisticated Karratha township.

It was a fairly 'ordinary' motel; certainly not a patch on the Karratha International, a flash hotel with real luxury tones.

Maybe the Royals players treated the whole exercise just a little too much like a weekend holiday!

MADDINGTON IN TOP SIX

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



SUPPORTING THE JUNIORS

By John Warren, National Director of Coaching.

WHEN Australian football championships are mentioned thoughts mainly relate to those conducted at senior level which have been the subject of a spectacular rise in interest since the adoption of the State-of-Origin concept involving the major States.

There are now also interesting and closely contested interstate matches between New South Wales, Queensland, the Australian Capital Territory and Tasmania.

However, junior championships in terms of organisation, sponsorship and general funding, are also of considerable magnitude.

Readers may be interested in the National Football League's role in the presentation of the 15, 16 and 17 championships.

The under 17 championships have been extended to an all-States series from an original annual match between N.S.W. and Queensland and sponsored privately by the Teal family.

This year Caltex injected \$35,000 in sponsorship to ensure prestigious presentation and, additionally, helped participating States with preparation and attendance costs.

Additional to host State responsibilities in such matters as billeting, ground allocation and organisation of functions, the NFL produces the official programme and obtains such essential items as

footballs, trophies, All-Australian outfits and participation letters and certificates.

The under-16 Australian schoolboys championships are run by the Australian Secondary Schools Football Council. This series has a graduated age system in which the major football States concede an age advantage to the less developed — in terms of Australian Football — States.

Sponsorship emanates from the Commonwealth Banking Corporation as a result of submissions made by the NFL.

Under 15 championships are contested between NSW, Queensland, ACT and Tasmania. The Northern Territory will be admitted in 1986.

It was originally our object for this series to also become fully national in character.

There is now growing support, however, for the championship to remain one which is contested only by the so-called "developing States".

The NFL, through its Junior Council, completely co-ordinates the series which this year will be held in Hobart.

The NFL is extremely proud of the manner in which all national junior championships have developed.

EF CONFIRM COMMITMENT

EAST Fremantle have confirmed their desire to join the South Fremantle district colts competition next season and have tentatively pledged four teams.

This announcement follows a recent meeting between the two Fremantle clubs.

SFDC administrator Boyd Meiers said South Fremantle officials are delighted by the acceptance of East Fremantle.

The 18s and under competition is in its first season with five clubs. The current ladder reads Kardinya 36, Coolbellup 36, Melville 12, Cockburn 8, and Rockingham 4.

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



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
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AMATEUR NEWS

Waterson, himself, stated no such call was given. The mistake by the umpire obviously occurred with him not realising left footers always move slightly off line when kicking.

The Mainwaring incident was a classic example of having two umpires who didn't take control. Falcons ruckman Kim Rogers gaining on the mark, then the umpire's decision to ask another Falcon to move away instead of giving 15 metres were unbelievable mistakes.

Last week I congratulated both umpires on their efforts. This week they definitely deserve to be criticised for a lack of control that, as it turned out, cost the Sharks the game.
