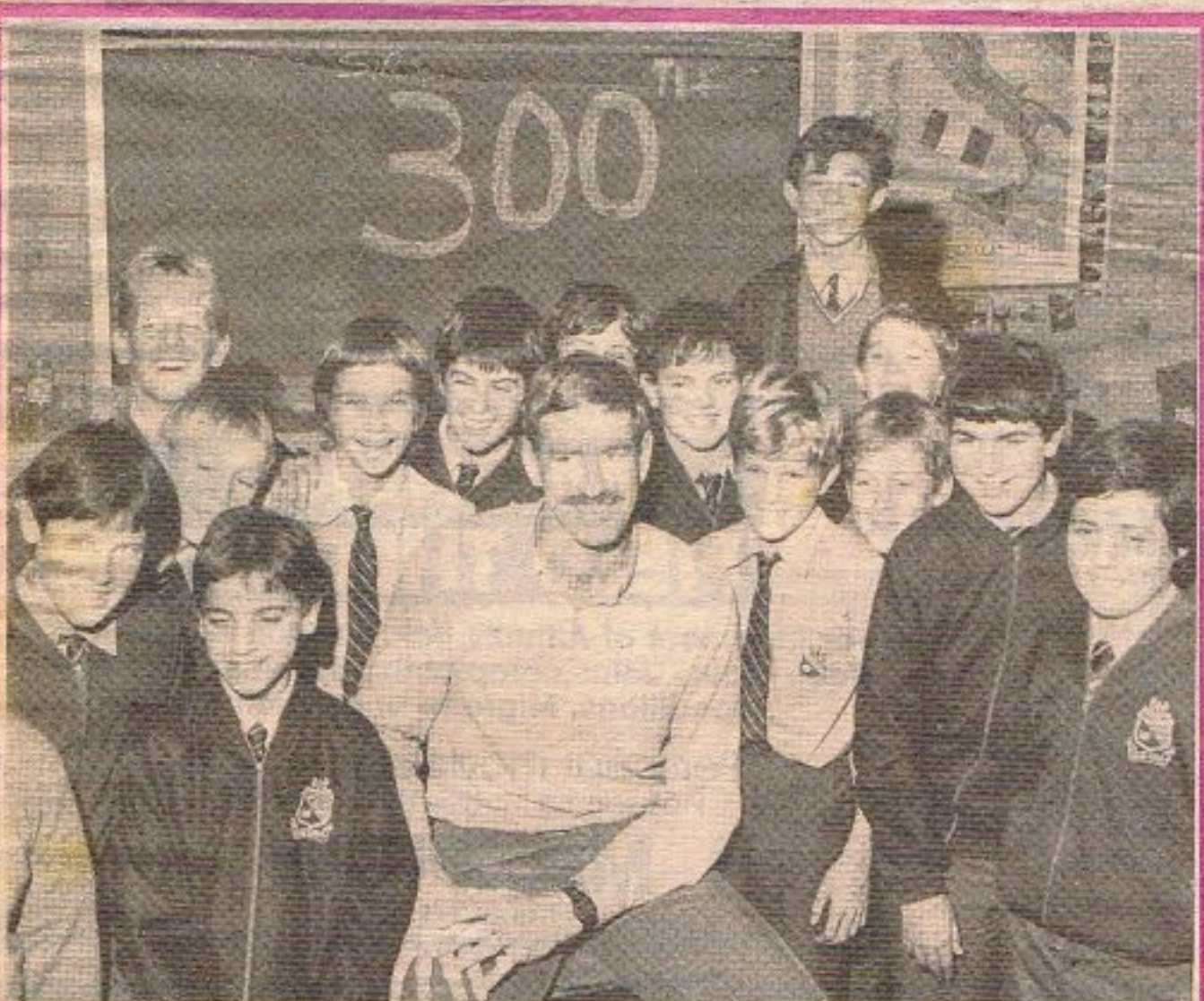

"FORGET the record books, if we beat Victoria we are the unofficial Australian football champions for 1985."

Those were the stirring words from newly-elected WA captain Ross Glendinning, determined to achieve the hat-trick in Tuesday's showdown with Victoria.

The Victorian based WA players have had two training sessions under the supervision of Glendinning and are raring to go.

"The WA players are extremely keen about this game and Perth people would be impressed with their tremendous attitude," a confident Glendinning told Westside Football.

"Even the guys who missed out on the final squad of 26 have stayed involved in the preparation of the team.

The split round in Melbourne this weekend is a blessing for two WA players, Ken Hunter and Phil Krakouer who are battling to overcome injuries.

"Ken will really appreciate this extra week off and he is confident he will be fit to play after the disappointment of having to withdraw last year."

"Phil is making a remarkably quick recovery and if he can run, he will travel to Perth and be given up till the last minute to prove his fitness."

There is a strong camaraderie among the WA players in Melbourne.

"A lot of the WA players here see each other socially and this is where we have a slight advantage over the Vics," Glendinning said.

The Victorians have been very keen about their State football this season and are determined to regain the mantle of Australia's premier football State.

Victorian coach Kevin Sheedy only knows one way to play football — and that is to win.

Strong signs of that typical Victorian arrogance was evident against South Australia last May and that Victorian side had the tough Sheedy style written all over it.

"The Perth crowd is in for another football treat," said Glendinning.

"I'm sure we will prove once again that we are the best producers of football talent in Australia."

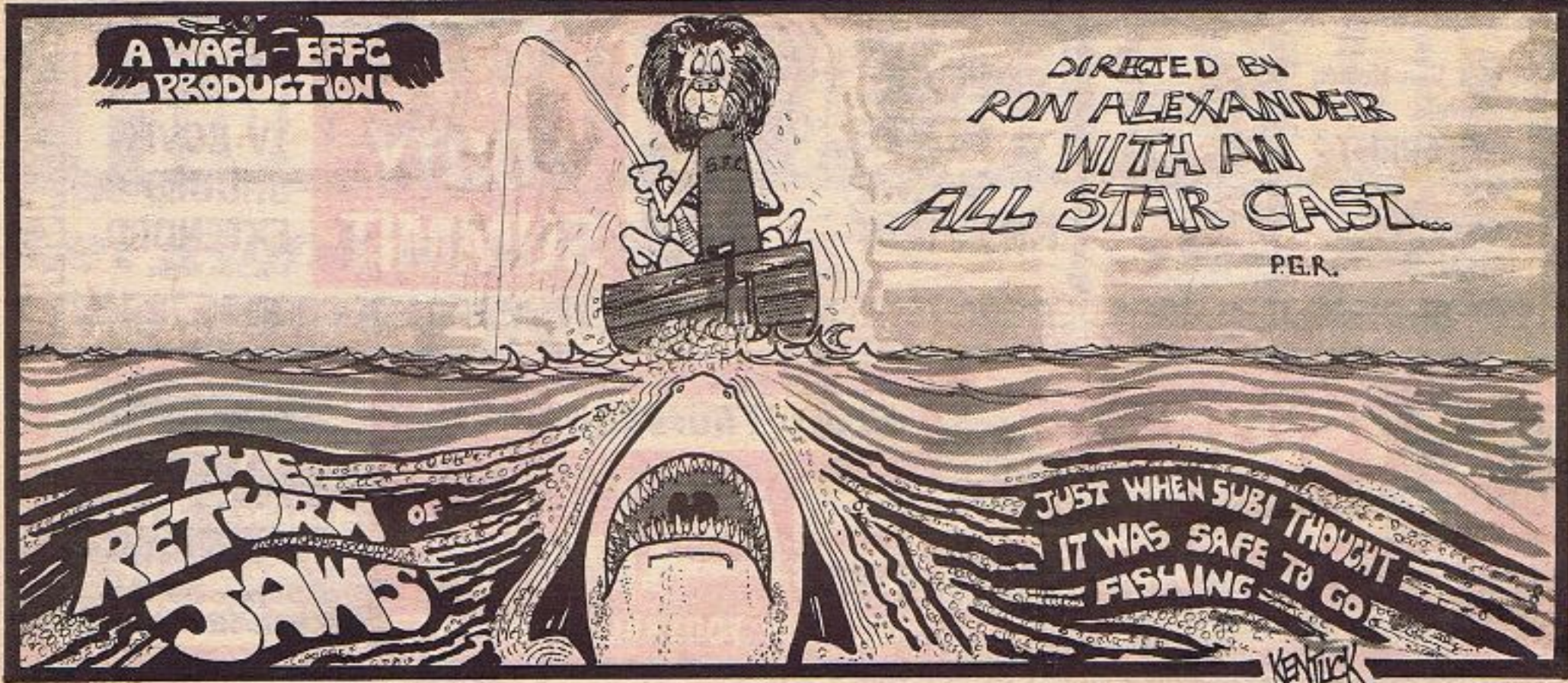

FOOTBALL has provided many rewards for Ron Alexander... and this week will be no exception. The big East Fremantle captain-coach will charge into battle for the 300th time in a league match — and he will show the same youthful aggression that he did back in 1971 when he made his debut. It took Alexander three years of perseverance before he finally achieved his league debut. After missing the first 18 at Mt Lawley High School, Alexander struggled through fourths, thirds and reserves football before a league coach (his current Perth rival Mal Brown) selected him for the seniors. Now 300 games later, Alexander still has the aggressive approach to his football that was so evident when he first ran out against the big men. "After leaving school I knew I was no world beater, but I took things step by step always hoping that I would make the grade," Alexander recalled. "Being a member of the East Perth premiership side in 1972 and my first State game in 1973, when I sat on the bench with Billy Walker, were two of the biggest highlights of my career. "Another memorable year was 1979, being a member of the first Fitzroy team to play in the final round since 1959." The big White Shark, as he is affectionately known at East Fremantle, hasn't many more highlights to look forward to. But a premiership this season wouldn't be a bad way to hang up his boots. — TONY CARR.

**DOUBLE SHOW**

THERE were a few sore heads at East Fremantle Oval on Sunday morning after a night of celebration by the league squad. The powerful win over Subiaco wasn't the only thing the players were celebrating — the other was the 21st birthday of tough half-back-flanker Gavin Wake. Wake's parents were struggling to cater for the many extras who turned up at the party, which was dominated by Sharks players and officials.

**HIGH-FLIER**

THE fast-moving, fast-talking Sydney Swans supporter, Dr Geoffrey Edelsten, is developing into something of a football opportunist. The Doctor wants to buy the ailing Sydney Swans, but while the VFL hierarchy debate his \$6 million proposal, he is picking up some lucrative after-dinner speaking engagements. "I've been doing two or three of these functions a week now," said Edelsten as he flew into Hobart for a speaking engagement with the Sandy Bay Club. "I was a little shy at first, but now that I'm getting the hang of public speaking I'm enjoying it." Edelsten and his stunning wife Leanne didn't let the Sydney airport strike affect their plans of getting down to Hobart for dinner. They used an expensive Lear jet to avoid the strikers.

**CLOSE GO**

COLLINGWOOD coach Bob Rose had mixed feelings after seeing the Magpies go down to top side Essendon by 11 points last week. "I was pleased with our desperation, concentration and courage," he said. "But I was disappointed with our use of the ball. That's what cost us the game." Rose said that Collingwood's effort in coming from 34 points behind in the second quarter to be within a single kick of Essendon for most of the last quarter was a courageous one. "But we just have to learn to win; to run," he said. "If you don't run, you lose."

**CHANGING COURSE**

TWO of the Sharks young stars, Chris Mainwaring and Billy Jones, have changed occupations in recent weeks. Both footballers were bank officers, but Mainwaring has begun a job as a groundsman with the East Fremantle City Council, while Jones is now doing a trainee teachers' course at Churchlands College.

**YOUNG TALENT**

WEST Perth may have missed the four premiership points last Saturday, but they would have been pleased with the continued good form of young first-year player Dean Laidley. He impressed with a strong performance at centre-half-back opposed to an in-form John Scott. Laidley was at his best in the first half when he showed he was prepared to combine attack with defence as he cut Scott out of the game and set up some strong moves forward for his side. He lacks nothing in courage in his approach to the contest and takes a strong mark. It is pleasing to see young talent improving as the season progresses.

**ALVIN'S APTITUDE**

LONG-haired Carlton star Tom Alvin has a particular liking for playing Geelong — he gets to play on super-star Gary Ablett. Twice this year Alvin has been given the job of cutting the dangerous Ablett out of the game — and twice he was succeeded in fine style. Ablett managed only eight kicks against the tough tagging tactics of Alvin last week, with Carlton snaring an important 26-point win. Carlton coach David Parkin was full of praise for Alvin's effort. "He's carrying three injuries," said Parkin. "He is finding it hard to run, hard to kick and hard to mark. But it didn't stop him from curbing Ablett."

HOW long has it been since a score of 1.2 was the highest by a player in a senior team. Last Saturday Subiaco's Warren Dean booted 1.2 which was his team's highest tally.

**ON A DOWNER**

SUBIACO'S Clinton Brown found kicks hard to come by last Saturday against East Fremantle. His first kick came at the 10 minute mark of the third term — via a free kick. He finished the game with seven kicks.

### GETTING KICKS DIFFERENT WAYS

IT IS interesting to observe the various behaviour patterns of matriarchs and patriarchs towards their progeny's football life.

We have a heterogeneous assortment, ranging from the ugly parent to the apathetic variety.

Some are quite strict, being very demanding of their offspring, while others tend to be lenient when it comes to appraising their son's performance.

Indeed, I have seen examples where a parent would only shower accolades if his boy had in excess of 30 possessions. Conversely, some parents would pat their son on the back when he hardly sniffed the leather. (e.g. "Well done, Byron")

Byron may have only procured three kicks for the game — two in the head and one in the hindquarters!

The Van Helden household had Dad, the tough taskmaster, and Mum, the boys' advocate.

#### CRIPPLED CRAB

In 1962 I was playing for Mt Pleasant against North Fremantle in the local U/18s competition. My performance was lamentable, as I showed about as much pace as a crippled crab. It was a dastardly day for me and I reckon I couldn't have got a "kick" if I was roaming the East Perth powerhouse.

Dad, appalled at the calibre of my football, elected to drive home and leave me to filter back to my habitat on foot!

Some people think that's not the way to react, but after all, we weren't playing girls' netball. My brothers, Bill and Max, copped it sweet as well, and it didn't do them any harm.

Max won a Lynn Medal (East Fremantle's fairest and best) and Bill won the boxing title for 'C' Company while serving in the army. Actually, Bill was a good footballer for Aquinas and, had it not been for national service, could have played league as easy as he dropped "homo sapiens" on the canvas!

Mum offered the reciprocal response. The coach and the other nineteen members of the side were blamed before us.

In 1970, Max was "dragged" from the ground in a league game. In those days, of course, you couldn't return to the field.

Mum, who was sitting with the players' mothers, wives, girlfriends and the East Fremantle hierarchy, elected to resurrect herself from the seat and storm out of the elite company, and walk briskly down Moss Street in a northerly direction, catch a bus and go home.

When Mum was queried on loyalty, her statement was simply "blood is thicker than water".

#### TRADITION

Incidentally, there's plenty of tradition on Mum's side of the family. My grandfather has been a supporter of East Fremantle since 1904! Imagine that, he has seen 22 of their premierships.

But what of other parents? Let's have a look at the "crawler", the one who endeavours to get his son a game at all costs.

Big Daddy could do a number of things — be the coach; club president; chairman of selectors; buy the club's footies; give the coach a lift in his automobile; stick the "stiletto" into a rival player; buy the trophies; or maybe bring along the "jungle juice" for half and three-quarter time!

I remember a coach who once left a kid out of the side — the same kid owned the football. Mother and "heir" promptly took "their" football, leapt into the car and drove home.

Players teas were something to look forward to when an under-age footballer.

Your son had an exemplary chance of winning a trophy if his parents forwarded party pies, cup cakes, sausage rolls or other such lavish food.

I always told Dad if I was going to be the No. 1 rover, then he'd have to stop sending along Vegemite sandwiches!

## TV coverage would be a cash bonus

TRADITIONALLY, the best way for the WAFL to increase revenue is to spend thousands of dollars trying to entice more people to attend football matches.

Last week, at the East Fremantle v Subiaco game, I couldn't help but reflect on the fact that, broadly speaking, facilities in the outer for the average footy fan (not club member) haven't really improved since probably the first game was played in WA.

Fortunately, I don't have to put up with sitting on a cold wooden plank, getting soaked to the skin all for the privilege of following the fortunes of a particular football team.

There is, of course, another way of attracting revenue without having to rely on heads through the gates and I refer, of course, to the live television coverage of matches.

This year, the WAFL directors decided to test the water by allowing live coverage of the last quarter of one game and, by all accounts, it has been very successful. Crowds are up and revenue has greatly increased because of the associated advertising.

Speaking as a lover of footy and not as a commentator, I would like to see this last quarter concept developed to the point where complete games are telecast.

Rather than trying to fill the huge spectator areas at some of our grounds, seating capacity at all grounds, except Subiaco Oval, should be reduced to, at the most, 10,000 people.

Every one of those 10,000 seats would be comfortable and under cover and close to the playing area, so that players would feel like they were playing in front of a much larger crowd. Rather than have fans queue up on the Saturday, seats would be pre-sold through agencies either on a seasonal or weekly basis.

By reducing the seating capacity, every fan would be assured of a comfortable, dry view of the game of their choice.

Once the majority of seats were sold, then the TV station who had negotiated the telecast rights would cover the whole game.

This same thinking could be extended to Subiaco Oval for interstate games and finals — reduce the seating capacity to, say 35,000, so everyone had a seat; pre-sell these seats and then televise the game live.

There would, of course, be no live coverage unless all, or the vast majority, of seats were sold.

By doing this, crowds would be maintained and revenue to the league and clubs greatly increased. The WAFL and clubs would then have enough resources to prevent some of the talent drain to Victoria.

Their Jekyll-and-Hyde approach to football this season must have you tearing your hair out.

Bulldogs at home, but definitely puppies away. That's been the story this season. And it looks as though it will cost you a place in the finals.

How a side can perform so well at home to the extent that they are virtually the best side in the competition outside of East Fremantle, yet be close to the bottom side when it comes to away fixtures is one of the enigmas of football this season.

No doubt you are aware that of your six wins this season, only one has been away.

Two games ago things looked so bright that you could — and should have budgetted on a place in the finals. But after last week, South will be battling to finish above their current position.

### BACK TO EARTH

Wins against Subiaco and Swan Districts had you riding high, but you were brought back to earth against East Perth.

With only three games at home in the crucial last round — and one of those against East Fremantle — you are really staring down the barrel.

The talent is obviously there — so what's wrong?

Attitude?

Perhaps it's more than that.

The signs have been there for a few seasons that South are only a shadow of themselves when they play away.

It happened in 1981 and last year. After being in a strong position midway through the season, South fell in a hole, mainly through their lack of success away from home.

East Fremantle: Hutchinson, Seubert; Claremont: Reid, Compton; Swans: Zilko; South Fremantle: Chandler, Lewington; Subiaco: Bunton, Shea, Hardiman.

Unfortunately Webster is injured or he must have had almost unchallengeable claims to the goal-keeping position.

Hutchinson is one player who must be brought in and the three former Victorians can hardly be omitted. It might be advisable to place Hardiman in the half-back line where he has distinguished himself no less than at half-forward. — *Daily News, August 11, 1938.*

# Salmon put in "safe-keeping"

ESSENDON put giant goalkicking genius Paul Salmon in cotton wool after his amazing return to league football last week.

Bombers officials kept the media well away from Salmon after he had suffered a minor knee problem in his first match for a year following his knee reconstruction.

He returned to Victoria Park — the scene of his tragic injury a year ago — and left there on Saturday night with his tender right knee heavily strapped.

Salmon limped around the field for most of the match and was taken off twice by anxious Essendon officials as they feared a recurrence of the Neale Daniher episode; where the champion former skipper broke down after making a successful return to football.

"He is pretty certain of playing next



week," said Essendon coach Kevin Sheedy.

"It's mind over matter. You play. It's a tough game; it's mental toughness.

"We have to wait for the medical report to come out, but he'll be alright."

Sheedy was reluctant to talk too much about Salmon; preferring to focus attention on the whole club.

"He's not the only bloke around the club, you know," said Sheedy.

But, unfortunately for Sheedy's philosophy, Salmon is the only player the fans want to know about at this stage of the season.

## BARASSI'S CHIN

**FLAMBOYANT** Melbourne coach Ron Barassi is copping the ample criticism about his Melbourne team's failure quite squarely on the chin.

Barassi is winding up a five-year coaching stint at his old club, slightly bewildered by the attitude of the football public and certainly disappointed about his failure.

"The players have to accept their share of the criticism and so should the coach if the side is not succeeding," he said.

Barassi's five-year revival plan hasn't really got off the ground at Melbourne, but at the same time he has never had the right commodities to work with.

But he still won't admit to total failure. "If you're looking for a comment, my only comment is no comment," said Barassi when quizzed on his immediate future.

## SMITH'S ROLE

SPECULATION is rife in the St Kilda camp as to the reasons behind a change in the match committee chairmanship.

Former Subiaco coach Ross Smith, a St Kilda favourite-son, has taken over as chairman of the match committee, replacing Travis Payze.

Payze will continue as a director, but says that expanding business interests stop him maintaining his current involvement of 30 to 40 hours a week at the club.

The implementing of tougher discipline standards among the players is one point of contention — with an instruction that all St Kilda seniors are to be fitted out for team blazers, an indication of changes looming.

**LETHAL** Leigh Matthews has taken another step up the ladder of football fame. The Hawthorn skipper was moved into fourth place on the all-time list of great goalkickers in the VFL.

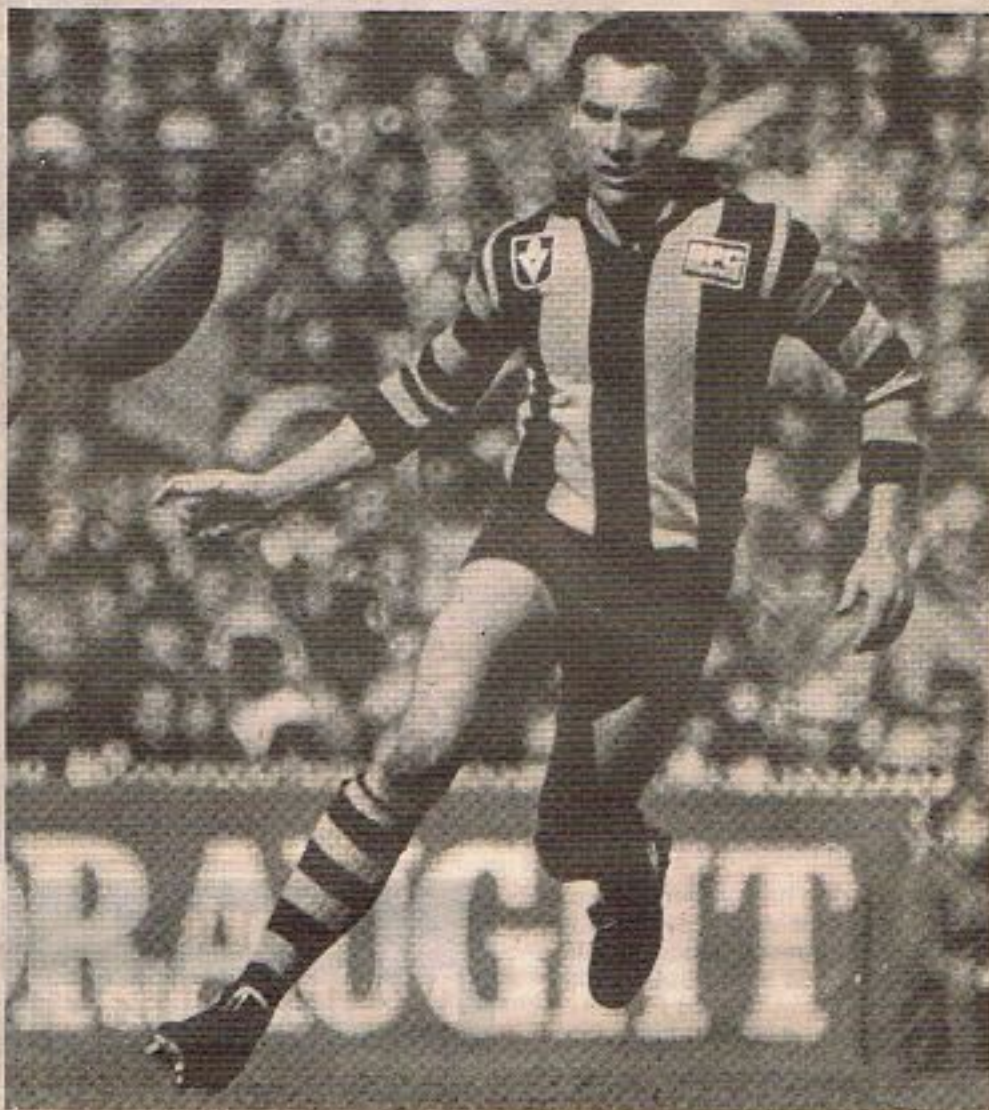
Matthews kicked six goals against the Sydney Swans last week to take his tally to 901 in his 333-game career.

He now nestles behind Gordon Coventry (1299 goals), Doug Wade (1030) and Jack Titus (970) on the goalkicking ladder.

# IT'S FIVE-ALL AGAINST VICS

THE Victorians will be back in town next Tuesday for the second most important game of our 100th year celebration — with the grand final always being the most important.

This will be the 11th game between WA and the Vics under the State-of-Origin concept. The score is equal — five wins each and equality is a dirty word as far as the Vics are concerned with football.

Twenty years ago WA faced two Victorian invasions — the first from the Victorian Football Association and then the VFL.

In June, 1965 the VFA gave the locals a big fright before going down by nine points, 12.17 to 12.8. The WA victory was made possible by two former VFL players Kevin Murray, the Simpson Medallist that day and former Essendon player Ron Evans, who kicked 5.4 This was the last time the VFA have visited Perth — they played in a navy blue and white hooped guernsey very similar to Geelong's.

One month later big brother VFL arrived — and they hadn't been beaten for 17 years in Perth. But that ended when they too were beaten, coincidentally by nine points also, 10.14 to 8.17. Once again the Simpson Medal winner was a former VFL player, this time Bob Spargo, who had played with Footscray and was the West Perth captain-coach.

There were no State-of-Origin rules in those years and the Vics played two former East Perth players, Graham Farmer and Graeme John, while WA played Spargo and Ron Evans.

Three days later Victoria avenged their defeat with a 19-point win in a game in which WA's greatest goalkicker, Austin Roberson, made an auspicious interstate debut, kicking seven goals straight.

This was the last time that Victoria played WA twice on the same visit as they had done on nine previous occasions.

I know the best player in next Tuesday's game is going to win the Simpson Medal, but what a pity there is no Larkin Medal for this game — after all, it was Leon Larkin who devised the State-of-Origin concept and brought a new meaning to WA-Victoria encounters.

TWENTY years ago two first-year players were in the news and are still in the spotlight today. Perth's Greg Brehaut won Channel Seven's best first year award and Malcolm Brown showed how volatile he was going to be in his 189-game career. Brown caught the eye of good judges with a 4.3 effort — plus a couple of dust-ups with veteran East Fremantle defender Con Regan in his very first league game.

### YOUNGEST PLAYERS

THE selection of young Guy McKenna to play with Claremont last week raised the old question of the youngest player ever. McKenna, who is 16, ranks with many others of that tender age to play league football. John Todd, Bryan Cousins, Les Fong, Geoff Hendriks and Richard Dennis, to name a few. But in the category of youngest footballers, I can think of three 15-year-olds — Stan Magro and Des Miller, at South Fremantle and Frank Golding, at West Perth. I believe McKenna is probably the youngest player to play league for Claremont.

However, one name that stands out is Henry (Ivo) Crapp who umpired every final from 1906 to 1914 inclusive, a total of 30 consecutive finals. Crapp's last final was in 1919. He umpired one game in 1920 and one in 1921, the WA v Victoria carnival. In all, he umpired 34 finals, plus 16 in the VFL. Henry Crapp passed away in 1924 at the age of 51.

## BEASLEY'S BIG BONUS

SIMON Beasley's football now takes on a different meaning at Footscray — and it spells dollars.

The former WA ace is set to reap a rich harvest in the remaining seven games this year after booting 12 goals in Footscray's giant 120-point win over Melbourne last week.

That haul, a club record for Footscray, beating the 11 goals kicked by Dick Grove in 1946, took his season's tally to 70 — and now the cash till starts to register.

Reports from Footscray indicate that Beasley will receive \$500 a goal for every goal he kicks after reaching 70. And when he passes the 100-goal mark, it jumps up to \$800 a goal.

"He has found the pot of gold at the end of the football rainbow," one Footscray official admitted this week.

But Beasley isn't admitting much about the deal, other than to concede that he is on incentives to reach the 70-goal and 100-goal targets.

He did pay tribute to his team-mates:

"Without them I am nothing. When they deliver the ball like that it makes it easy.

"But I am holding my marks at present; my hands are pretty sticky."

## The send-off rule has merit

PEOPLE closely associated with Australian football are in varying degrees still researching the practicalities of implementing an "order off" rule.

As with most subjects, there are conflicting views — each with merit.

The NFL National Coaching Committee has widely discussed the subject and through David Parkin, has been supplied with a comprehensive study by Victoria College physical education students Chris Glass, Peter Schwab, Peter Owen and Steve Ward over a two-year period.

It is apparent that the role, competency and attitude of umpires is critical. The rule, now widely used in many metropolitan and junior competitions, appears to have become increasingly effective — except against totally recalcitrant players.

Penalising provocative verbal behaviour in its early stages has mostly proved effective in curbing the incidence of general on-field violence.

Both the Eastern Suburban Churches Football Association and the Victorian Amateur Football Association have instigated a "cooling off" system where offending players are banished to a "sin bin" for specified periods.

The question, too, is obviously raised as to whether a dismissed player can be replaced. My view is that it would be regrettable for a team (and its supporters) to be penalised for the stupidity of individual players.

It does seem ironic that most, if not all, of the international body contact sports employ an order-off rule. Our game, traditionally, has resisted — sometimes to the amazement and criticism of supporters of rival sports.

Perhaps Australian football's decision to continue with the reporting of offenders to a tribunal could be more readily justified if the system had not developed into the three-ringed circus status that it now commands.

Unfortunately, in all States and at all levels the impartiality and general competency of tribunals have come under severe criticisms.

Their collective abilities to reach just decisions are, of course, not helped by the farcial players code whereby 90 per cent of them are never transgressed against, leading one to marvel at the number of super fit footballers who are subject to fainting fits and sun stroke!

Banishment from the field for a set period — to be determined by the umpire — or the remainder of the game if the misdemeanour is sufficiently heinous, is a good practical deterrent.

I am not convinced however, that teams should have to play "one or more short".

I am also not convinced that at this stage the very top echelon of professional footballers are "ready" for such a rule. This is certainly not say, however, that in a relatively short term, a send-off rule should not apply to them also.

It is an excellent measure which can be adopted by junior leagues and by senior leagues with a history of problems in the disciplinary area. This certainly includes dismissal for varying periods of verbal abuse of umpires.

Just because foul language can be heard frequently on all forms of the media — and in football circles — doesn't mean our

hard-to-find umpires should be subjected to insult.

Possible adoption of an order-off rule on national basis for juniors will be a subject seriously addressed by junior officials shortly.

If accepted, the applicable rules will then be incorporated into the next edition of the NFL Junior Policy.

## Coaches have no room for failure

**RIVAL** State coaches John Todd and Kevin Sheedy do not have the word "failure" in their vocabulary.

Both men are tough disciplinarians and expect nothing less than 100 percent from their players.

Both earned the champion tag during their playing careers and were fully committed to winning every time they ran onto the football battlefield.

Todd was a superstar at the age of 17, winning the Sandover Medal in his first season of senior football.

A crippling knee injury in his second season hampered Todd for the rest of his 132-game career. But such was his great desire for football that he resisted the pain.

Todd's leadership qualities were noticeable early in his career when he was appointed coach of South Fremantle in 1959 at the age of 21, for a one year term.

He coached the Bulldogs in a three-year stint between 1966-68 and tasted his first premiership success when he took East Fremantle to the flag in 1974.

Todd reached coaching greatness in 1984, taking Swan Districts to their third consecutive flag and WA to another Australian championship victory.

The master coach is now facing his biggest challenge for several seasons at Bassendean Oval — and at State level.

Swans seemed to have lost their great desire and commitment to win the tough games and Todd faces an uphill struggle to get his side firing again to qualify for another finals series.

On Tuesday, Todd faces up to another master tactician in Sheedy, who is building an impressive coaching record.

Sheedy enjoyed plenty of premiership success during his 254-game career with Richmond.

He was a part of the Tigers' powerful teams of the late 1960s and early 1970s.

Sheedy knew the premiership feeling as a player and then as a coach when he took the Bombers to the flag in 1984 in his fourth season as coach.

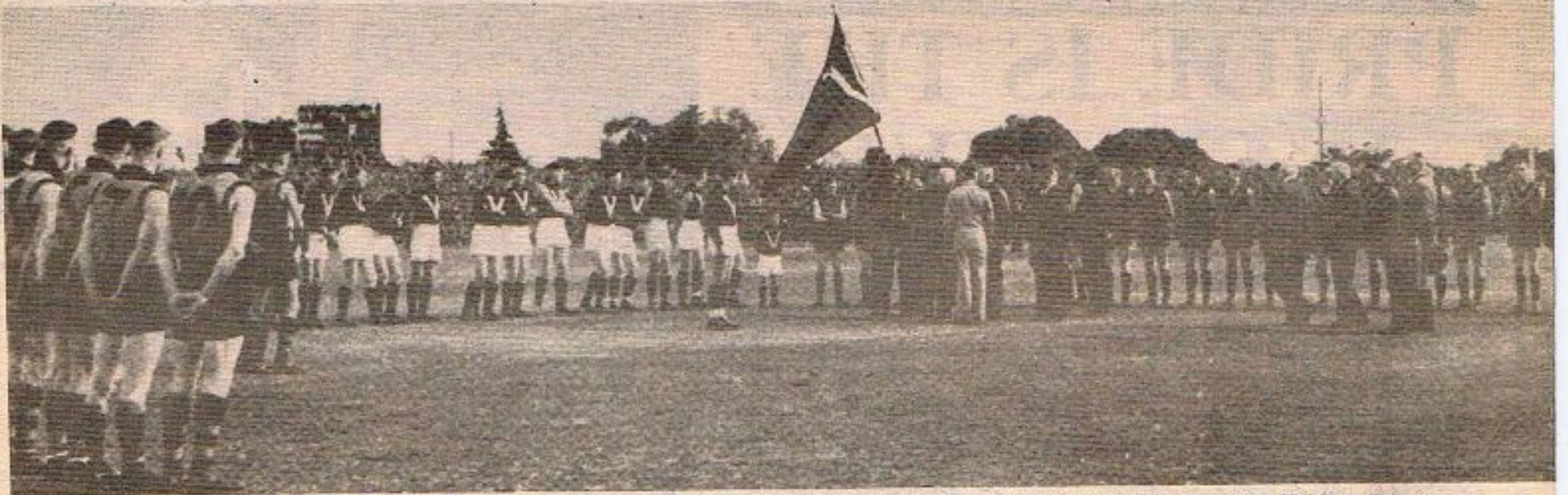

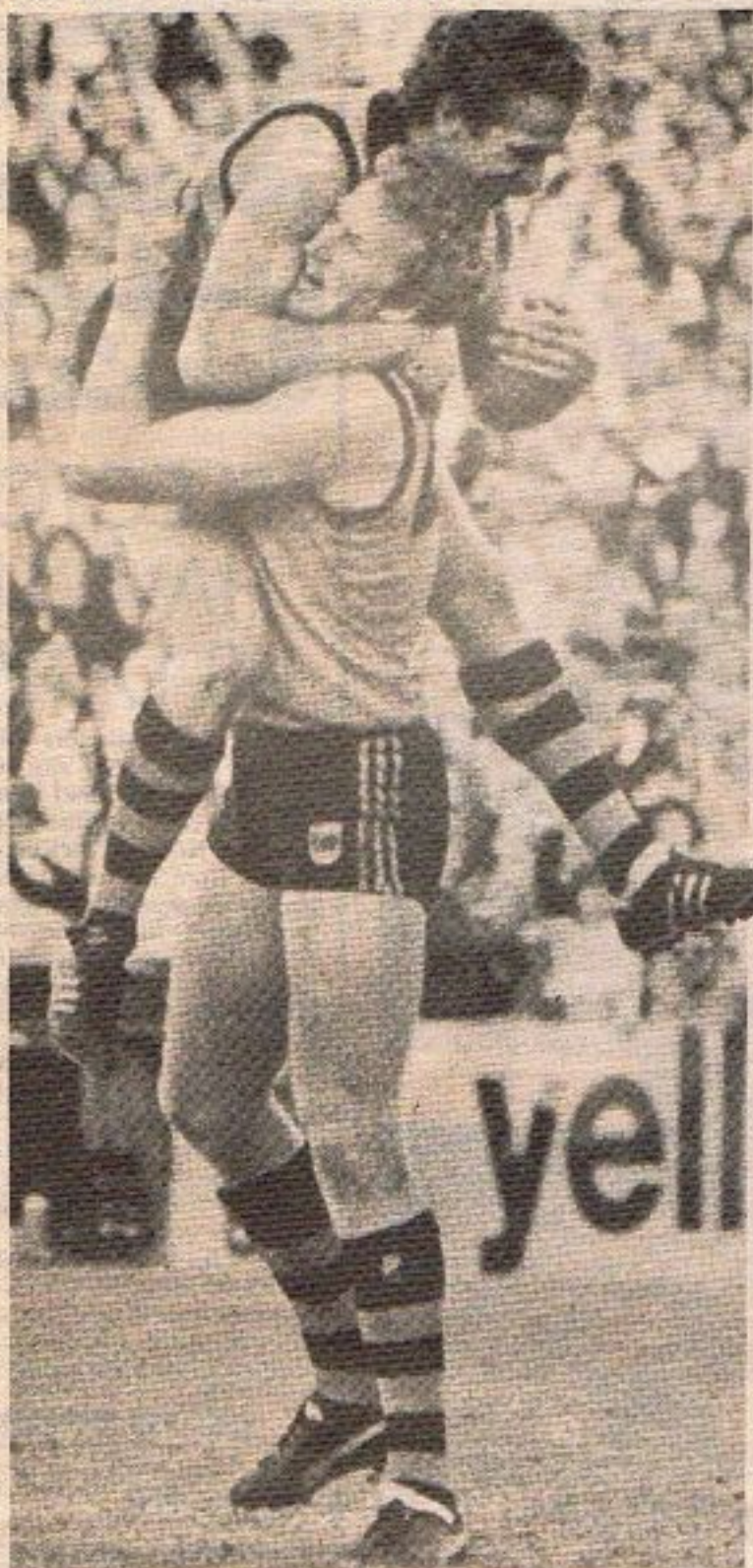
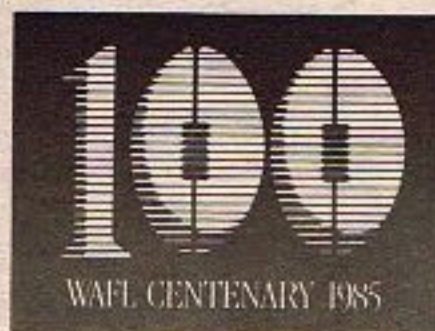

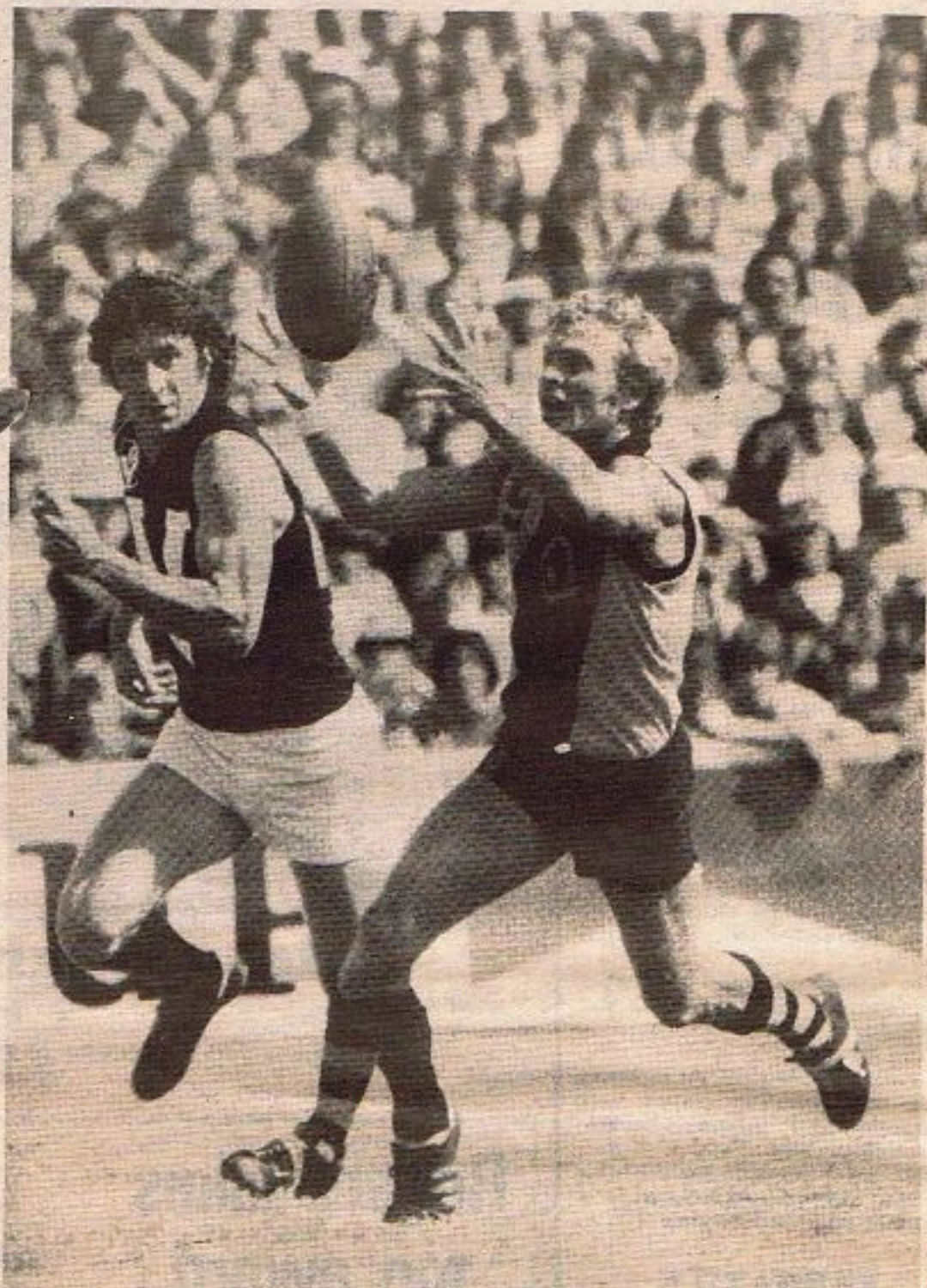

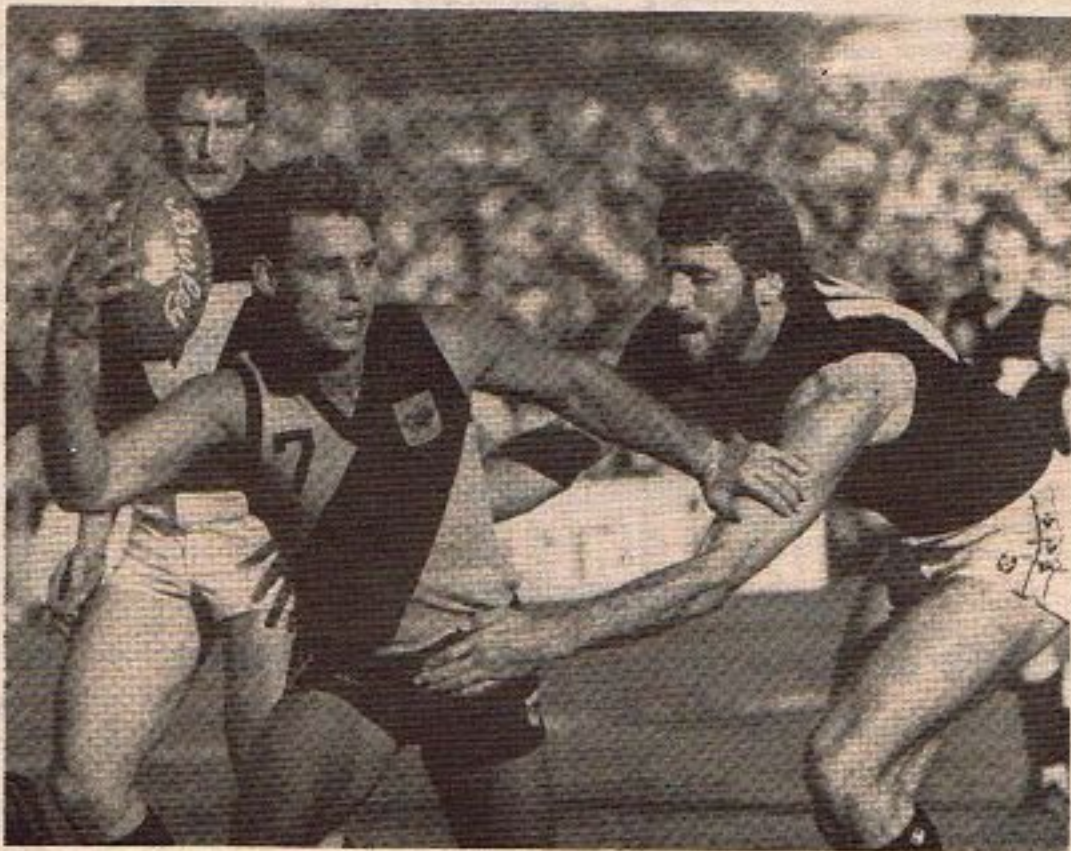

Guv played his first league game after a meteoric rise after only two reserves games.

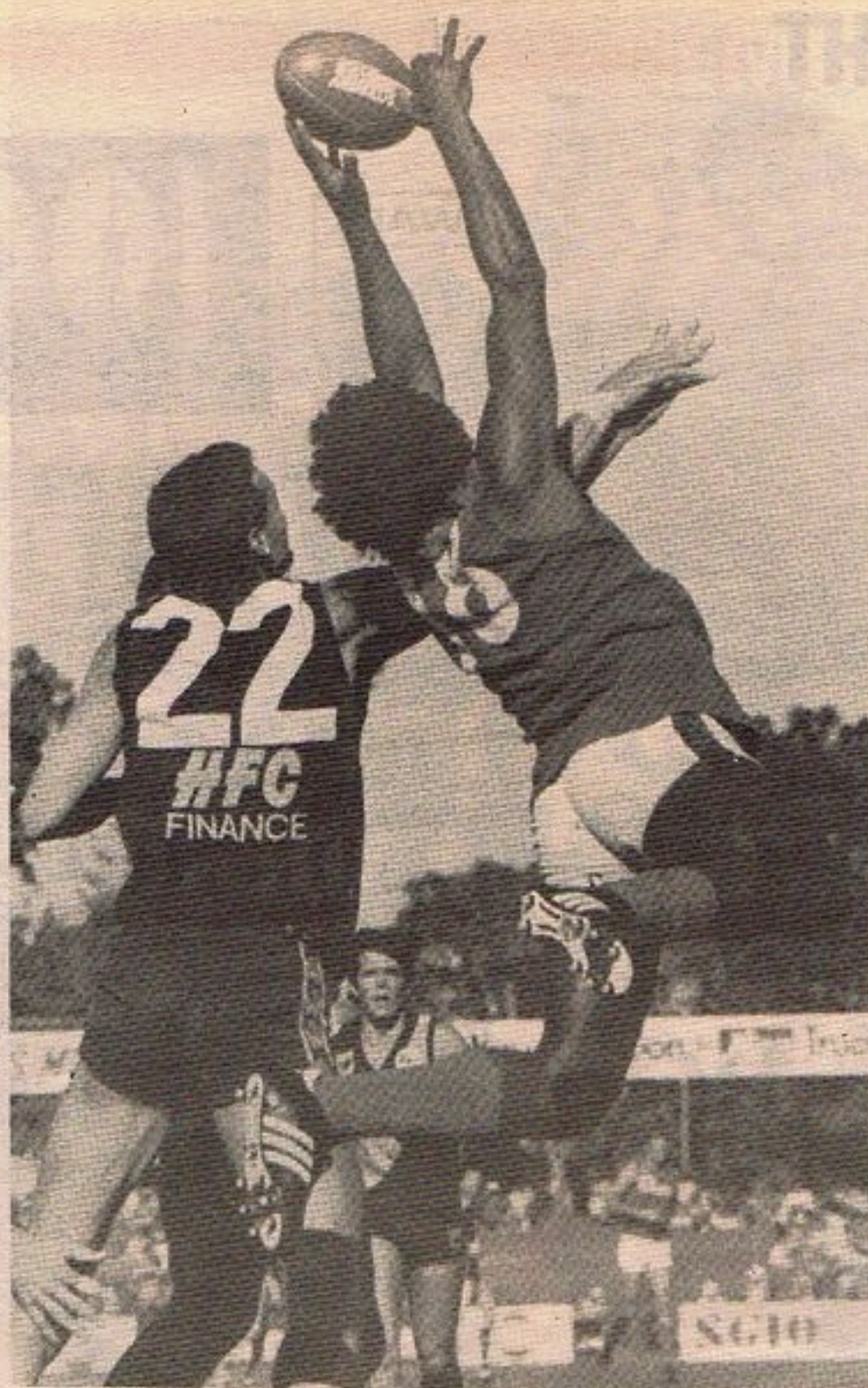

But the desperate attitude among the Hawks' camp that has seen them crash their way back into finals contention, should see Applecross collect the four points.

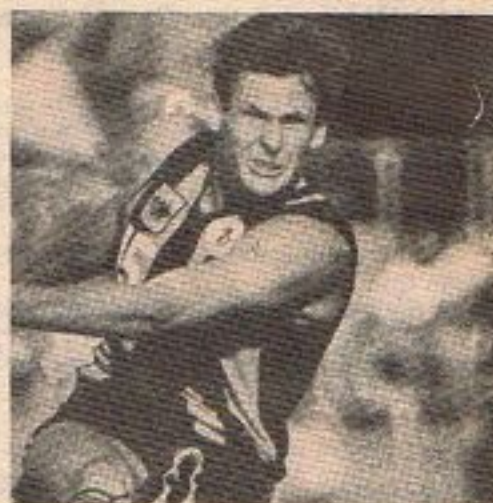

# TIME FOR A SUMMIT

## Let's look at where the game's going

HAVING watched two rounds of the 1985 season, I am convinced there is an urgent need for the WAFL to follow Prime Minister Hawke's example and call a "summit meeting" relating to our game.

### WELL DONE TIGERS

BEFORE Saturday's league game, the Tigers Esso squad (the best juniors in their city zone) were introduced to the Claremont members.

Each player, dressed in his Tiger gear, had the honour of parading in front of his club, something the player will never forget.

The Tigers Esso squad has had a remarkable influence on the production of outstanding juniors.

The Tigers colts team, loaded with talented players, is an example of what can be achieved if you are prepared to organise and work to a plan.

Claremont has some of the most talented youngsters in the league; developed through their outstanding junior programmes over the previous years.

I am sure colts coach John Hayes appreciates having young players with outstanding ability to coach; it makes coaching that much easier.

The Tigers and Bulldogs colts teams are by far the strongest in the competition and look sure to play off for the 1985 premiership — which I believe the Tigers can win.

Football needs a complete analysis of the rules and regulations, before too much damage is done.

Changes such as the two-umpire system, the centre square, kicking out on the full and so on, were all made several years ago when the game needed to be reviewed.

I am convinced that the high scoring needs to be curtailed — it has destroyed the competitive nature of the game. Teams can now kick 14 goals in a quarter with ease.

#### ADVANTAGE

Competition requires both teams to be given an equal chance. The centre square has given the side with the ball too much advantage, allowing a team to score either a point or a goal every time the ball is brought out of the middle.

The square needs to be reduced in size, allowing more players a chance to get at the ball; bringing more body contact into the game and forcing the teams to work harder physically to score.

Recent games have been boring watching one side kick 28 goals and the other 20.

A "football conference" is essential with representatives from all clubs, the media, the public, coaches etc. The "conference" must be professionally organised and chaired so that the game can be the only winner.
