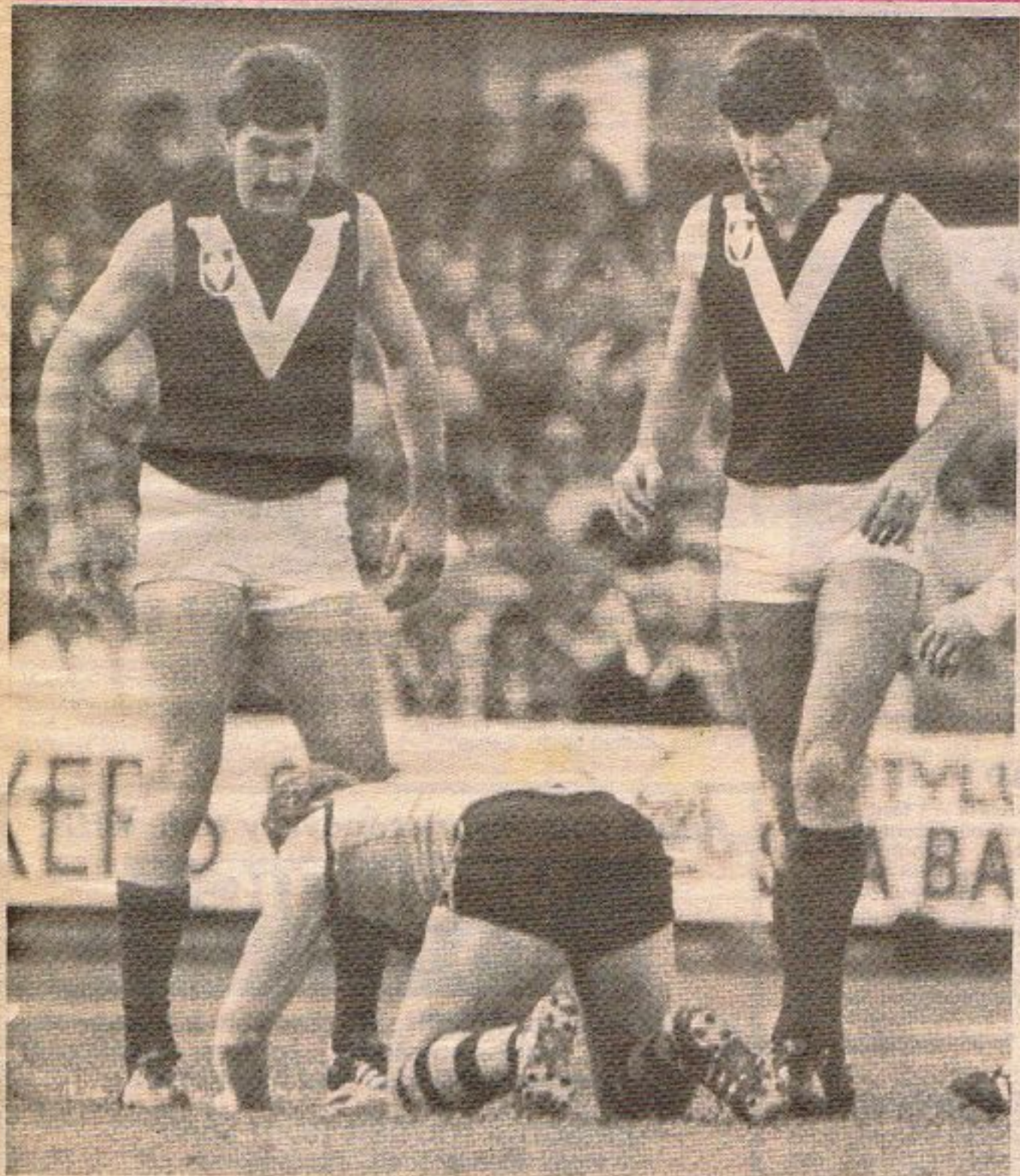

# TOUGH STUFF!

THE Vics are back in the business of playing tough football — and footy fans love it!

A crowded Subiaco Oval on Tuesday saw the Big V survive one of the toughest openings imaginable to a football match — yet they still came out on top.

Victoria are the champions of Australian football for 1985 — even if South Australia did take the NFL Cup home with them this week.

The Kevin Sheedy State machine crushed both South Australia and Western Australia in their most awesome display of precision football for years.

Blood and guts returned to the interstate arena — with the WA players, led by the ferocious Garry Sidebottom, trying to unsettle the Vics from the first bounce. Seldom has any big game started with so many fights.

The Vics were simply too good for WA on Tuesday — but just look at the local casualty line-up:

Maurice Rioli, kick on a knee and influenza; Garry Sidebottom, broken bone in a hand; Brad Hardie, slight concussion; Ross Glendinning, double vision after a cut under an eye; Wayne Blackwell, kicked hand; John Annear, bruised ribs; Alan Sidebottom, bruised shoulder.

Malaxos has played all his league games this season on a half-forward-flank, which has not suited his style of play.

"My favourite position is centre, but I'm resigned to the fact that Terry Wallace has a mortgage on this position at Hawthorn," he said.

"I'm aiming for a ruck-roving berth, but they prefer taller ruck rovers in the VFL."

Malaxos will make a decision on his future after his 1985 commitments with Hawthorn are completed.

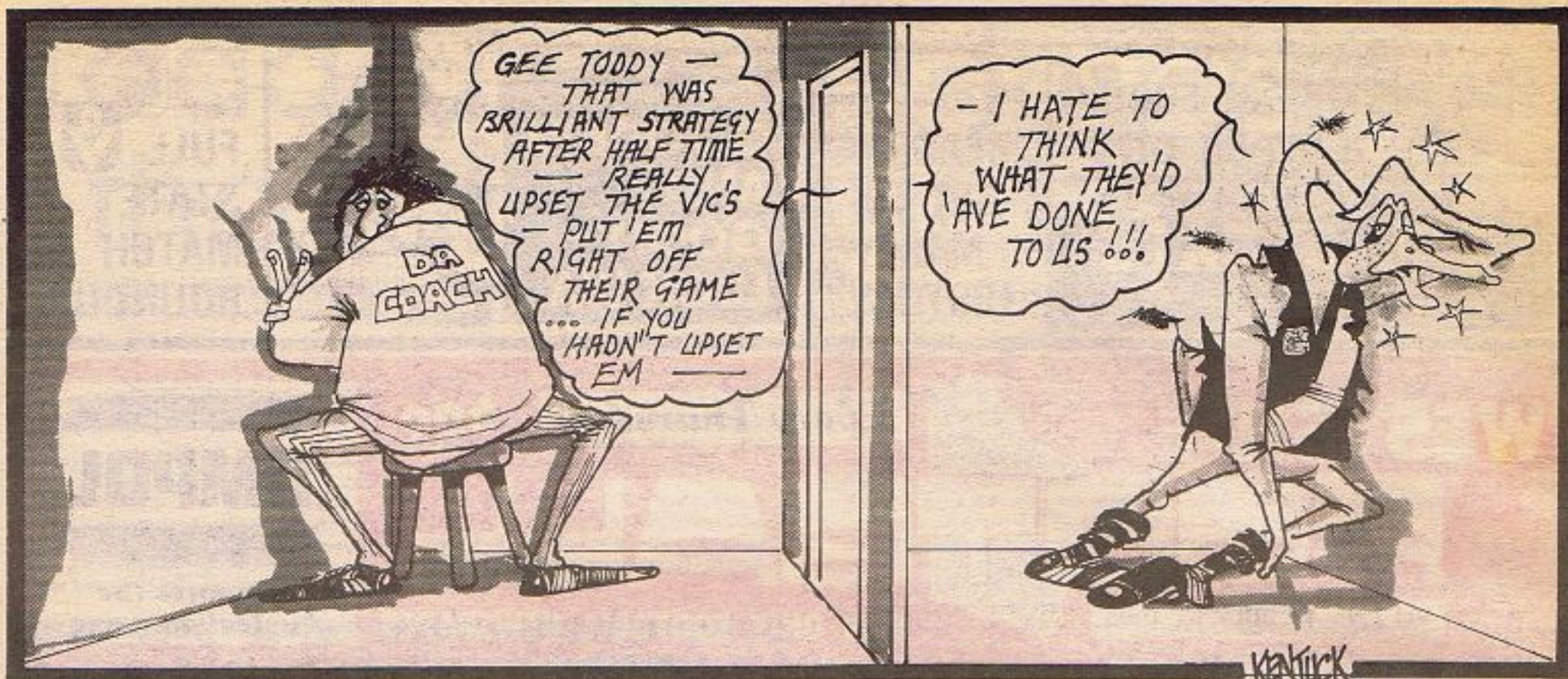
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**BOOTING WITH THE BREEZE**

**BASIL CAMPBELL:** For whacking Barry Beecroft and starting the brawl that lived up the 1981 grand final helping to make it the best grand final I saw here.

**THE ABC FOOTBALL TEAM:** Headed by Dennis Cometti. Acceptable English isn't dead.

**HAYDN BUNTON:** For raising Subiaco, my adopted team, above the ranks of hysterically inept.

**COUNTRY GAMES:** Their introduction this season has been a refreshing promotion.

Field umpires Phil O'Reilly and Len Cooper were escorted off the ground by police after an indifferent first-half umpiring performance. Supporters from both sides voiced their disapproval at some bewildering decisions by both umpires.

## TIME TO TAKE A WEEK OFF, RON

EAST Fremantle coach Ron Alexander, with his 300th milestone behind him and a premiership ahead, should give up playing if only for a week.

He may get a better perspective of what his team is all about if he takes the opportunity to view his players from above ground level and away from the emotions of being a participant.

Before last Saturday, the Sharks seemed to be coasting towards this year's premiership. But Swans gave them a sobering jar.

Todd's brigade showed, despite the wet conditions, they could again prove to be the Sharks premiership stumbling block.

Quite a few people, including Alexander, are still smarting from last year's grand final loss to Swans. After having won the second semi-final they looked to have an edge on Swans. History showed that wasn't the case.

As was the case then, Swans showed on Saturday that they know how to win when it really counts.

Their match against East Fremantle could have either left them in the hot-seat for a spot in the top four or put them on course to challenge for a second semi-final berth.

## DETERMINATION

While excuses could be made because of the wet conditions — there's little doubt the Sharks prefer fine weather — Swans displayed the spirit and determination that has enabled them to win the past three premierships.

They are starting to settle a very potent goal-to-goal line.

Gary Sidebottom has become a valuable goalkicker, Murray Rance looks more at home at centre-half-forward, Peter Sartori, if his shoulder stands up, has the height and ability to counter the tall East Fremantle attack and Tom Mullooly is combining experience with the enthusiasm of a first-year player. Peter Ware, after an indifferent season, has again found touch and adds a bit of class to the backline.

The only problem is the centre, but I'm sure Todd will sort that out by the time the finals come around.

Earlier in the season I said in this column that Swans couldn't win the premiership. Now I'm not so sure.

## SHOCKERS

A lot of their players are at their best when it really counts.

But Swans aren't out of the woods yet. They appeared to have turned the corner when they beat West Perth and Subiaco in successive matches only to put in two shockers against Claremont and South Fremantle.

But the signs are there that they are making the same kind of late run that took them to their third successive premiership last season.

It would be foolish to write off East Fremantle on one match.

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# Hardys History

## STATE FOOTBALL

MERV McIntosh, Perth's champion ruckman, capped off his best season in football by winning the first of his three Sandover Medals. He was poised to exert an enormous influence on the football fortunes of Perth and WA.

But for WA football fans in general, 1948 will be remembered most for two magnificent wins over Victoria at Subiaco Oval on Saturday, 31 July (16.16 to 10.14) and Tuesday, 3 August (11.17 to 7.18). That Tuesday victory was the fourth in succession over Victoria. The streak began at Subiaco Oval in 1939 (11.21 to 10.15) and continued at Hobart in 1947 (16.10 to 15.12).

A crowd of 36,000 turned up for the Saturday game. WA triumphed on a day when the Simpson Medal was won by Hawthorn player Kevin Curran.

This match brought to a climax the coaching career of Jerry Dolan, who coached the WA team for four wins in 1947 and 1948. Dolan, a tall ruckman, had one of the greatest careers in WA football. He joined East Fremantle in 1923 from Claremont Teachers' College with great wingman Dick Buchanan.

His career with East Fremantle was split into two sections: 1923-1933 and 1941-1950. In all he coached East Fremantle for twelve seasons for premierships in 1930, 1933, 1943, 1945 and 1946. In 1934 Dolan joined East Perth and under his guidance won the 1936 grand final. He coached East Perth until the end of 1938. In all, Dolan coached for seventeen league seasons; played in twenty-two final-round games and nine grand finals. His official connection with East Fremantle ended in 1955 and after a two-year stint as president. It was fitting that he was WA's first recipient of the ANFC's (Now NFL) merit award certificate.

1948 was a memorable year in many ways for WA football. Team and individual excellence marked the game in Perth. Attendances that had reached 348,972 in 1946 and 399,322 in 1947 now jumped nearly 40,000 in 1948 to 439,200. The momentum created by those immediate post-war games thrust football into a position of prominence.

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## TONY JEWELL RECALLS ...

# The day the Vics were disadvantaged

WITH interstate football still strong in our minds, former Victorian coach Tony Jewell has produced this humorous recollection of a WA-VFL clash just a few years back.

The pride of Victoria's footballers flew into town last Sunday and lived in the lap of luxury at the new Merlin Hotel for three days before the big clash with WA. But it wasn't quite the same back in 1981 when Jewell was in charge of the team ...

### AIR STRIKE

Instead of boarding a jumbo to flick across to the West for the '81 State match, there was an air strike on and the players and I had to fly to Perth in two 14 seater twin-engined planes.

We jammed into these little things, virtually sitting cross-legged, all dressed to the hilt in Victorian blazers and ties, obviously wanting to create the right impression at the other end.

Because of luggage load limits we could only take the bare necessities, the clothes we were dressed in, and the players' footy gear. There were no trainers, no doctors, no runners.

A minute after take-off we realised this was going to be an extraordinary trip. The plane had door trouble and appeared as if it would come off. "Biggles" (the pilot) was on the radio immediately and it was decided we would stop off at downtown Whyalla for repairs.

Whyalla! You wouldn't send your mother-in-law there (only joking guys). It was a stinking hot flight. You couldn't stand up in the plane, there were no toilet facilities, let alone anything to eat or drink.

There wasn't even an air hostess to tell tall stories to.

When we landed, many hours later, you can imagine that the old Brut 33 had worn off just a little.

### COMPOSURE

To make matters worse, upon landing we couldn't even get out to stretch our legs or acknowledge nature's call. The door had jammed, and just wouldn't open.

We sat in this little plane for an hour and a half. It seemed like an eternity. Even Mike Fitzpatrick who had his nose buried in the longest novel of all time, seemed to be losing just a little of his composure.

In the end, we squeezed out a little emergency exit. And this was State football!

The locals at the "Y" wondered why the Big V flag and tempers were just a little bedraggled.

Everyone felt they had played two consecutive games of football on Foxy's Moorabbin mudheap.

We staggered into bed at 1am — having been greeted merrily by Dr Allen Aylett and Co., who had hopped on an international flight and consequently got to Perth in a quarter the time it took us.

The players answered an urgent wake-up call at 7.30am for training and a team meeting, before the 2pm match start.

As if we needed anything else to go wrong ... at the team meeting, instead of the players watching a film about their West Australian opponents, a cartoon strip called "Looney Tunes", came on. We can all laugh about it now, but at the time, I just buried my head in my hands in despair.

Winmar has been used in a variety of roles this season, the most notable in recent matches as a rover.

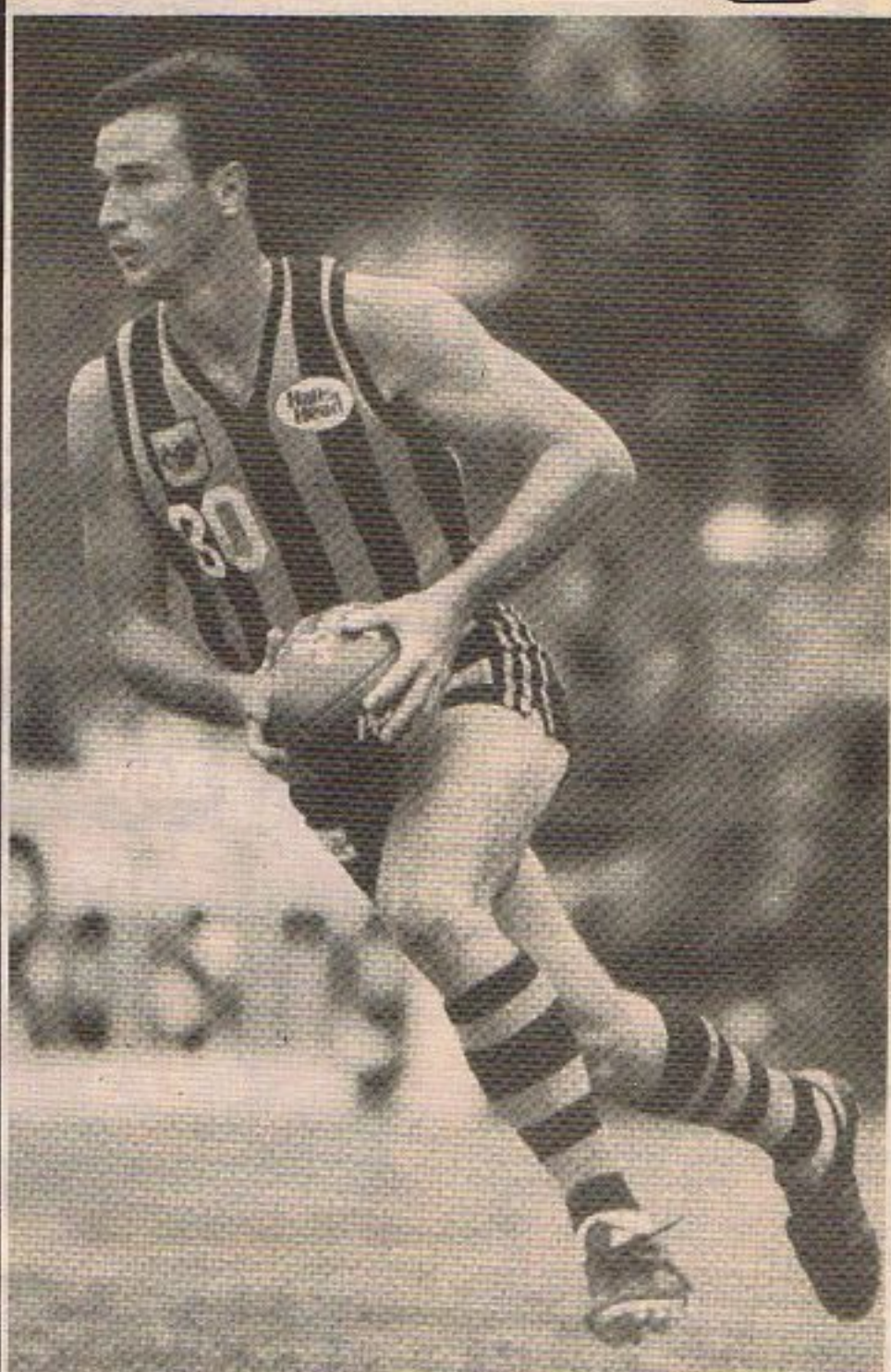
The move to bring this highly skilled youngster into the midfield play has proven a match-winner.

# BIG DROP IN VFL CROWDS

THE split round of football fixtures in the VFL last Saturday might have been good from the point of view of resting some players for Tuesday's State game with WA . . . but it was a disaster from a crowd situation.

Only 32,258 people attended the two matches — Hawthorn against Richmond at the MCG (23,523) and Fitzroy v St Kilda (8735) at Victoria Park.

The experts rated the MCG crowd as the lowest attendance for a match between the two powerful sides for at least 20 years.

The situation at Victoria Park (Collingwood's home ground) is causing the VFL concern. The local council has imposed stringent street parking regulations in the dense area — and the fall-off in attendances at the ground is the result.

Fitzroy president Leon Wiegard has called for an urgent VFL meeting to discuss falling attendances.

VFL observers estimated that the two matches should have drawn 70,000 people with Fitzroy's old ground, the Junction Oval, capable of drawing 15,000 to their match with the Saints under normal circumstances.

VFL Commissioner Jack Hamilton admits that it is a matter of concern.

He said that the VFL had taken steps to have professional research done into why crowds are falling.

It was difficult to understand, however, as just two weeks earlier 150,000 people turned out to see a round of league fixtures, including a Friday night game at the MCG and Saturday games at VFL Park and the MCG.

Both these venues provided ample parking space and fans could get a seat for their \$7 admission without having to pay out any extra.



## Clean sheet

NORTH Melbourne and Carlton are the only VFL clubs who have not had a senior player suspended by the tribunal this year.

Both clubs have had one player appear before the tribunal — Phil Krakouer (North) and David Rhys-Jones (Carlton). But both were cleared.

Hawthorn have only had one player officially reported — Gary Ayres, who was also cleared. But, of course, they have lost Leigh Matthews for four matches as a result of the Neville Bruns incident.

Geelong, Richmond and the Sydney Swans have had the most players reported — 12, eight and five respectively.

Geelong, helped by Mark Jackson, have the biggest list of suspensions — 16 weeks, with Jacko accounting for half of them.

Other club figures are — Collingwood, Essendon, Fitzroy and Melbourne four each; Footscray three and St Kilda two.

Of the 49 players to face the VFL tribunal so far this year, 27 have been found guilty, 23 suspended and 22 cleared.

## HIGH RATING

FORMER amateur footballer Andrew Witts made his debut for Collingwood last week — and set something of a record. He wore guernsey No. 65, which seems certain to be the highest number used in a VFL game. The Magpies originally had 60 guernseys numbered for their senior squad, but a spate of injuries forced some extra numbers. Witts, recruited from Old Melbournians just a few weeks back, put in a good display and as a reward, he will wear No. 49 next week. PS: WA's Mal Brown wore guernsey No. 100 in one game for Claremont some years back.

## RON'S FUTURE

THERE is considerable speculation about the future of master coach Ron Barassi now that he has publicly declared that this will be his last season at the helm of Melbourne. He has no plans of taking up another football challenge and he is talking of "dropping out" and maybe heading for the Queensland sun. He has ample opportunity to cultivate his sportsman's luncheons, his after-dinner speaking and his motivational speeches. There is already a suggestion that a big WA organisation wants to "recruit" Barassi for motivational purposes. He's got plans to write a book, but with all his media and other business interests, he will hardly have time!

# MATTHEWS' DAY...

"It was Matthews' day and there's more to come." With those words Hawthorn president Ron Cook summed up the club's victory over Richmond (by 67 points) and the feeling about the Leigh Matthews incidents. There was little doubt that the Hawks were fired up by assault charges laid by the police against their skipper over the Geelong behind-the-play incidents three weeks back. Matthews was loudly applauded by the Hawthorn members as he walked around the boundary line to the coaches boxes — on the sidelines for four weeks as the result of the VFL's "de-registration" of him as a player. Matthews himself came out in his Sunday Observer newspaper column with some hard-hitting comments about the de-registration issue. "It's an insult," he said. "For the commissioners to rule I've been outed for conduct unbecoming to a VFL player is to virtually ignore the contribution I've made over 17 years and almost 350 games of league and State football. "Surely the league, if they are serious at laying that kind of charge, should look at an individual's overall contribution to football — and his behaviour in general, rather than one isolated incident."



## BUSH MESSAGE

ESSENDON defender Kevin Walsh heard about his State team call-up on radio — which was just as well because he was out in the country camping. The dashing Bomber, with the knowledge of a welcome weekend off, had gone camping up the Murray River when he heard that he was required back in Melbourne for State training. He had been included in the VFL team for Perth after a spate of injuries, particularly to key players in defence. The same happened to rookie Peter Dean, who heard coach Kevin Sheedy say on television that he wanted the Carlton wingman to join the squad but no-one could contact him. Dean was watching TV up in Bendigo — and quickly rang the station to speak to Sheedy.

# ANOTHER SHOCK WIN FOR DAVIES' SOUTH

SOUTH Adelaide scored a shock victory over Norwood last Saturday and could be a surprise late starters in the race for fifth position.

They won by 41 points. South have been rejuvenated by the appointment of former Sturt star Rick Davies as coach. His appointment followed Don Scott's resignation after six straight defeats.

South, bottom of the ladder three weeks ago, have now won four of their last five games, including victories over West Torrens and Sturt, and are only two games out of the five.



## PLATTEN WAR

STEPHEN KERNAHAN is destined to become entangled in VFL clubs Hawthorn and Carlton's war to secure Central District rover John Platten.

Hawthorn have reiterated their threat to approach any interstate player Carlton have secured by the defunct VFL drafts or on a Form 4 if they persist with their bid to hold Platten to an agreement he signed in November 1983.

State and Glenelg ruckman-cum-forward Kernahan, who before he had played a league game signed a Form 4 agreement with Carlton in 1980, is the key player in Hawthorn's retaliatory moves against Carlton.

Hawthorn were incensed when they learned that Carlton general manager Ian Collins talked to Platten in Adelaide last week.

Hawthorn football manager Tony Farrugia has stated that talking to Kernahan was one option available to the club as they try to oppress Carlton's interest in Platten.

## ANDERSON HAPPY

PORT wingman Greg Anderson indicated he would probably play for the Magpies next season. And he could delay his move to the VFL until 1988 despite having discussions with North Melbourne.

## TITLE CLAIMS

SA would not claim the 1985 national football championship on default despite Victoria's loss of match points for a breach of National Football League rules. The general manager of the SANFL, Leigh Whicker, said SA had no intention of claiming the 1985 title, as many had imagined.

## NEALE ANGRY

CENTRAL District coach Kevin Neale called for the umpires to help stamp out the rough tactics against his star rover John Platten. His plea followed several head-high tackles against Platten during the match against West.

## BIG MATCH SCRAPPED

PLANS to hold a \$100,000 winner-take-all Interstate match between SA and Victoria have been abandoned. The move followed a VFL rejection of a proposal to hold the match in Adelaide during the week before the Australian Grand Prix on November 3.

I'm sure the young Claremont players appreciated Lloyd's role and of course the added bonus for him was the adverse weather conditions. He really enjoyed running the four-quarters in the wet!

WITH Claremont's loss of four premiership points to East Perth last Saturday I'm sure many of the members at the club Saturday night wished that some of the faces in the crowd — Ken Hunter, Mike Aitken, Wayne Blackwell, Allen Daniels and John Annear — could put on the Tiger jumper. Along with Jim Krakouer, who trained with the players, they represent a talented and experienced group. All the players remain in contact with the club and showed their support by attending in strength on Saturday.

## Beasley set for double honour

FORMER Swan Districts and now Footscray full-forward Simon Beasley has an excellent chance of equalling football history this year.

Only one WA player has headed the goalkicking list in both Victoria and WA — the legendary George Moloney.

Playing for Geelong in 1932, Moloney became the first WA footballer to kick over a 100 goals in a season, 109, in fact Moloney returned to Claremont and topped the list with 113 in 1940.

When I say Beasley was the leading goalkicker in WA, the WAFL records actually show that he and Claremont's Warren Ralph finished equal top in 1980 with 82. Ralph kicked five goals one day when Beasley was playing interstate, but this wasn't counted under a WAFL ruling that year.

There are two others to head the list in Perth and Melbourne but they were Victorians. Albert Thurgood was the first, three times the premier goal-kicker here in the 1890's and VFL leader in 1900 and Essendon's Ron Evans, Victoria's best in 1959 and 1960 and WA's top goalkicker in 1963.

East Fremantle's final score last week of 71 points was their lowest since July, 1983 when they recorded 8.8 (56) against Swan Districts — 43 games ago.

#### PRICES

ADMISSION: prices for interstate games are in the news again. Twenty years ago, standing room was 60 cents and reserved seats were \$1.20. Eleven years ago standing room was \$1.50.

The Keith Narkle episode has a parallel case. Remember Alan Prosser? He played with East Fremantle from 1966 to 1973 and then went back to South Bunbury. Because East Fremantle had not dealt with Prosser's clearance within 28 days as the rule prescribed, South Bunbury then played him without a clearance. The WAFL backed East Fremantle and Prosser lost \$1021 in provident fund for his 100-odd league games.

#### 300 CLUB

### Stick with the State of Origin

In the build-up to this week's interstate clash the question was posed as to whether Colin Waterson (East Fremantle) was eligible for a black and gold jumper.

The concept, in its original format, said that a player could only represent the State in which he made his debut. With this in mind, he was eligible even if he is a Victorian. But to my mind he rightly missed out, despite his good form.

State of Origin football has balanced out the inequalities of interstate matches and Victoria can no longer gain an advantage by purchasing everyone else's champions and then using them to belt hell out of the States which they came.

It is important that something is done to govern the rules pertaining to State of Origin games.

If WA and South Australia play, as they did recently, then both sides should be allowed to bring Victorian-based players home for the match.

People who ascribe to the belief that we should only pick a side from our local competition should consult the history books. The best of what is available in WA up against the best of the VFL, would get slaughtered.

The only people who appreciated those games were the Victorians as they rode the dizzy heights on the backs of people like Moss, Farmer, Cable, Baldock, Hudson, Marshall, Hart and a multitude of other instaters.

State of Origin has put interstate football back into perspective and Victoria is now no better, no worse than South Australia or WA.

## No Bleeding

THERE is a general feeling of sympathy for the players who, though they played against South Australia, were over-looked for the battle with Victoria.

In my book, there were only about five, at the most, from that crunch with the Croweaters who would have been up to standard for the Vic game.

We got donkey-licked by a mob that had, in turn, copped the full impact of a Victorian avalanche. We would have been out of our cotton-pickin' minds if we tried to stop a similar onrush with a mob of State seconds players.

There is not one youngster in WA who wouldn't snap up a lucrative Vic contract if it were offered — but the beckoning cheque book wasn't evident after we had played South Aussie. The Vic's obviously believe they have taken the best of what we have got, though I don't doubt that Murray Wrensted and Co will be packing their cases in the not-so-distant future.

If we had to bring the whole team home from Melbourne then I'd say "let's do it".

Professionalism is about winning or losing and selectors don't have the easiest of tasks. Either a player can deliver the goods or he can't.

Only the best boys should get the top jobs because the State comes before a club or an individual.

There's no surprise for second.

#### QUIET WINNERS

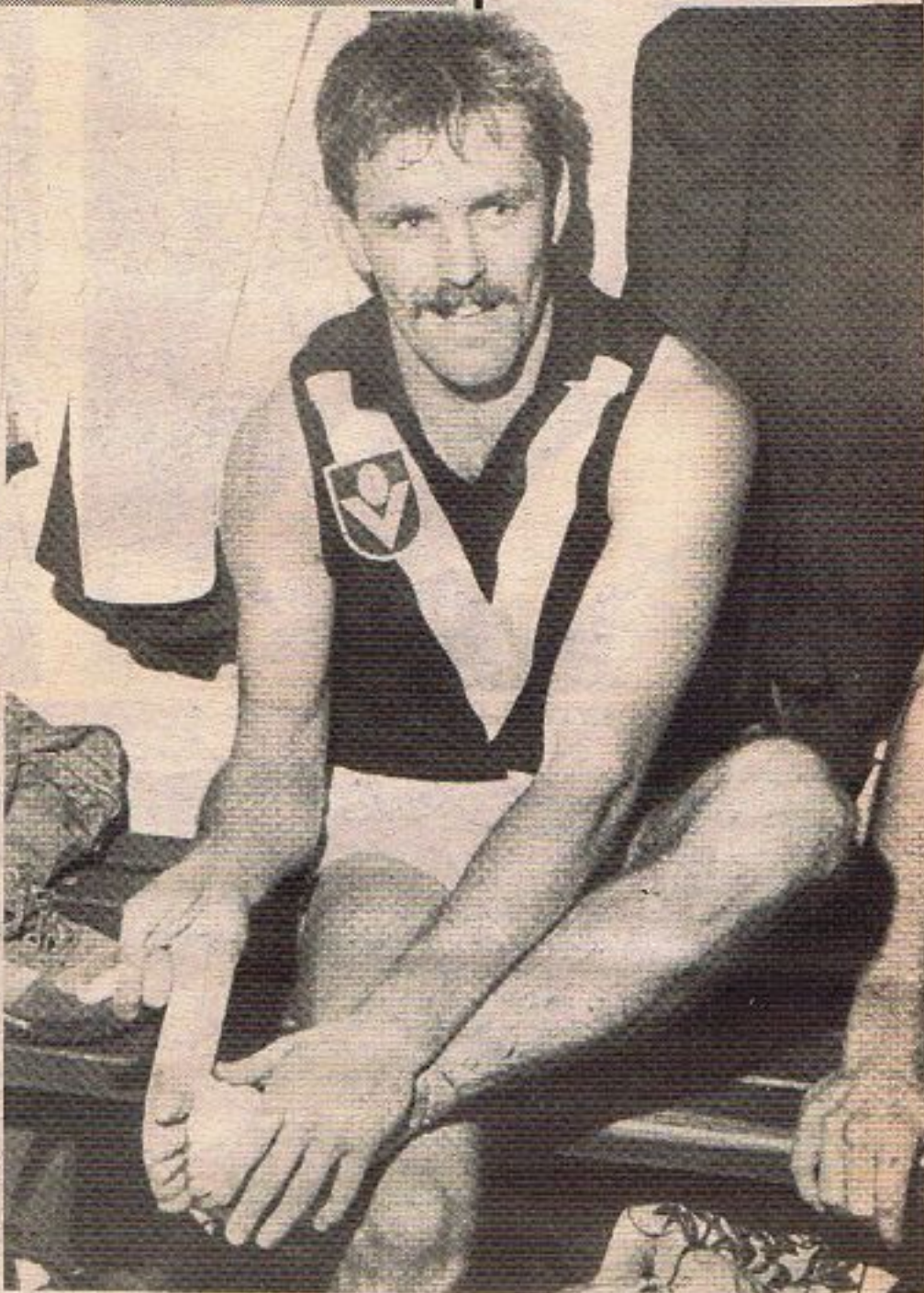

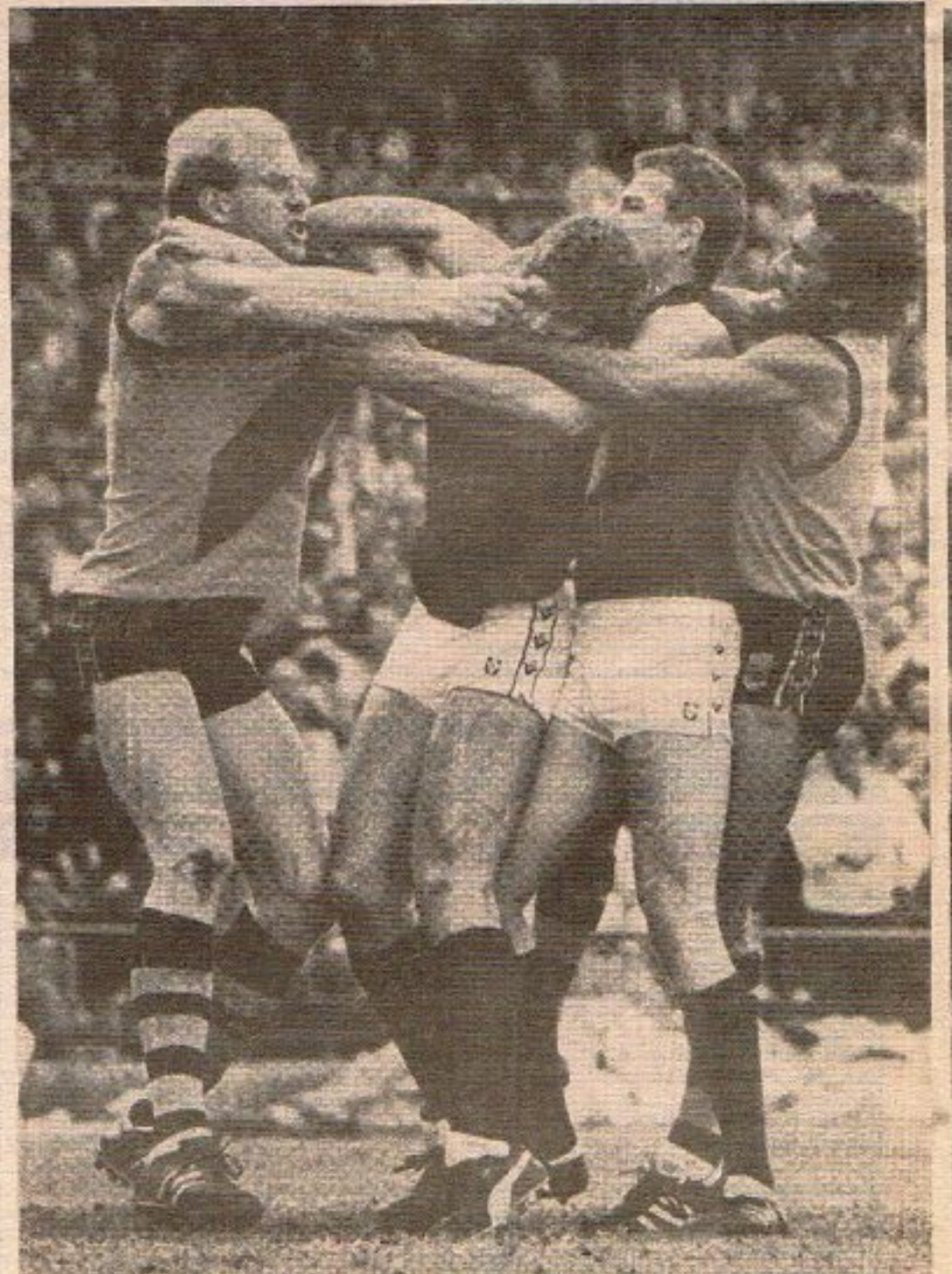

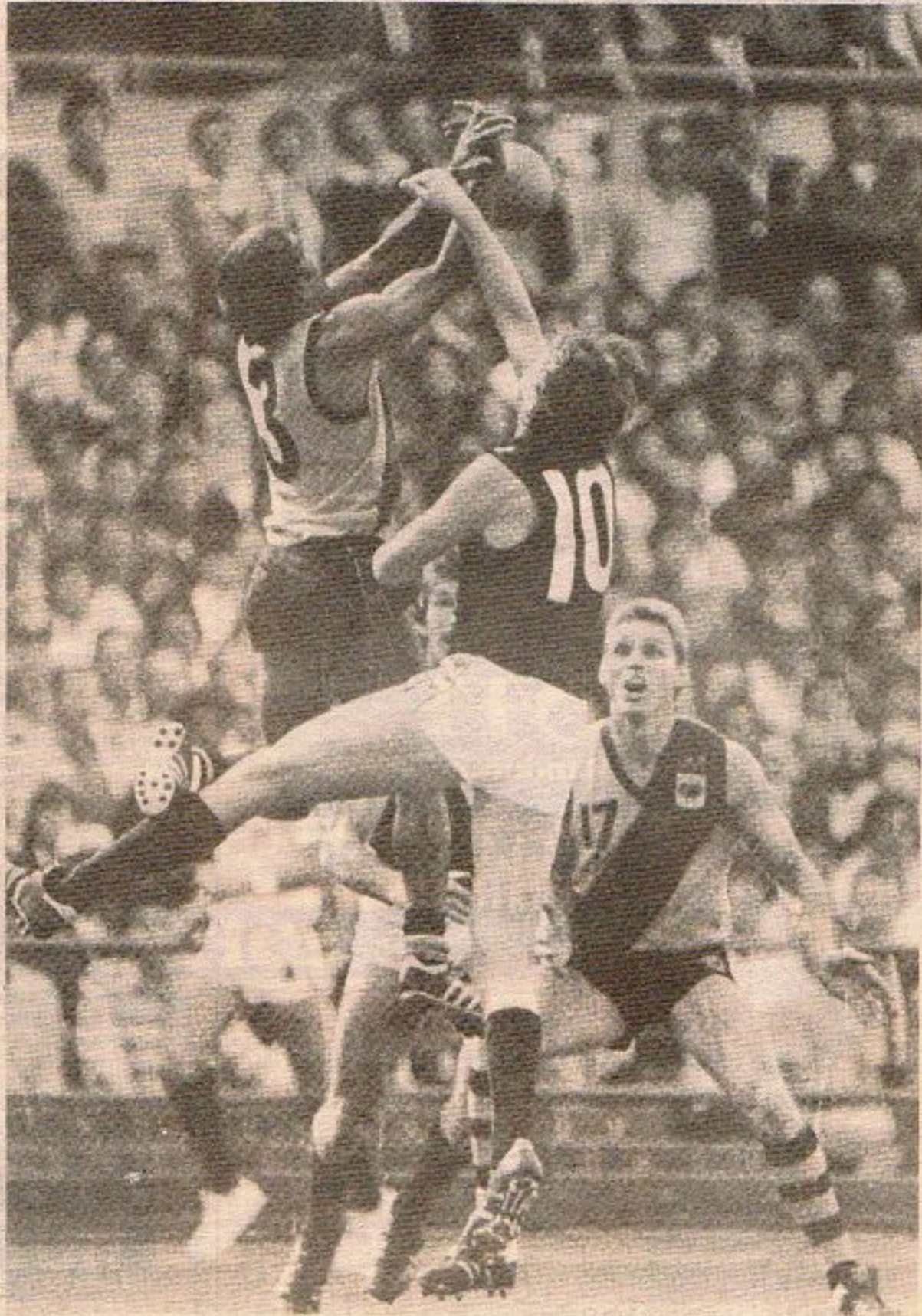

There will be a WAFL photographic exhibition in the FCU office in Fremantle for one month.

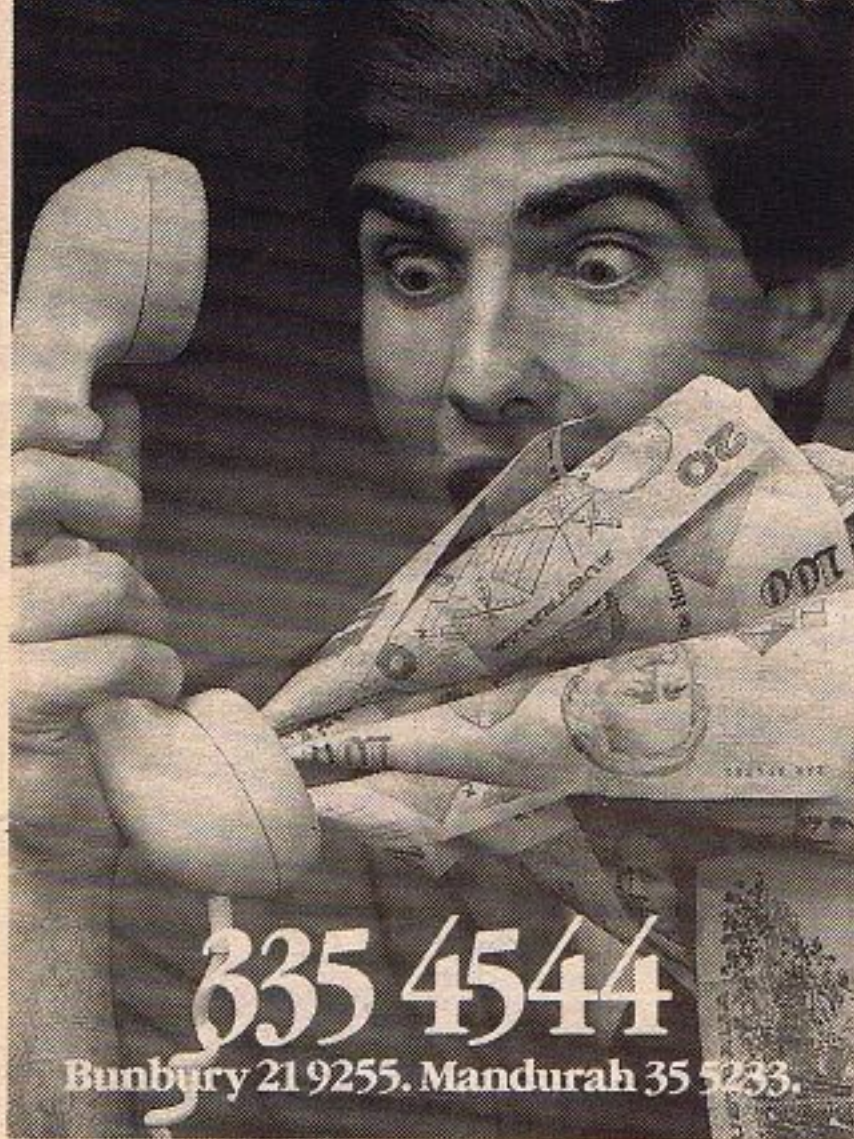

## SAINTS BACK IN CONTENTION

THE Osborne Park Saints are on the march and have sounded a warning that they intend playing in the 1985 finals series.

Inspired by a superb display in the centre from former Swan Districts rover Brian Dawson, the Saints demolished fancied Armadale last Sunday to move back into the top six.

# THE GREATS

An eight part series dealing with the careers of some of the GREAT players in the 100 year history of WA football.

## GOALKICKING WAS THEIR FORTE

WEST Perth have produced two great full forwards in Ted Tyson and Ray Scott.

Only the Second World War separated the careers of these two fine goalsneaks.

Tyson was the complete full-forward, able to snap goals over either shoulder and was a very accurate kick from set shots.

Besides his accuracy, Tyson was a very strong mark for a player of only average height.

He kicked 10 goals or more 16 times in his career and headed the WAFL goalkicking twice — in 1932 and 1938 when he kicked 84 and 126 goals respectively.

Scott did not have the same accuracy as Tyson, but he had an uncanny ability to snap goals from difficult angles.

Like Tyson, Scott headed the WAFL goalkicking ladder twice and kicked over 100 goals in a season four times.

Scott booted 143 goals in 1953, which equalled Tyson's club record set in 1934.

Tyson kicked over 1100 goals during his career, while Scott kicked more than 800 and it was significant that West Perth won a total of six premierships while these two great players were playing.

# FOLEY'S INFLUENCE WAS ENORMOUS

THE last West Perth player to win a Sandover Medal was great ruckman Brian Foley in 1959 — and two of his teammates in the twilight of his career, Mel Whinnen and Bill Dempsey, were unlucky not to achieve this honour also.

Foley had a strong influence on the early careers of both Whinnen and Dempsey.

Whinnen, the centreman, took full advantage of his dominance in the ruck, while Dempsey learnt the finer points of ruck play from Foley, the master.

Apart from his tremendous ability as a ruckman, Foley was a very fair player and had a strong loyalty to his club.

This fairness and loyalty certainly rubbed off on Whinnen and Dempsey, who always played the game in the right spirit.

Their contribution to WA football was immense, with Whinnen gracing the football grounds of Perth for 18 seasons totalling 371 games and Dempsey 17 seasons for 343 games.

Whinnen was a perfectly balanced and elusive footballer in the centre who disposed of the ball superbly.

A record nine fairest and best awards by Whinnen shows what a consistent player he was.

Dempsey was a fine ruckman who used his tremendous leap to outruck opponents several centimetres taller.

He used the art of palming superbly and was a master of playing a kick behind the play.

Both men were ornaments to the game and typified great skill and sportsmanship throughout their distinguished careers.

## A QUARTET WITH A LITTLE EXTRA

THE West Perth Football Club has produced many champions in their 100 year history, but several of these players have taken one step further to be rated as all-time great players.

In the late 1940s and early 1950s, West Perth fielded some powerful sides which were dominated by outstanding players like Stan Heal, John Loughridge, Ray Schofield and Fred Buttsworth.

Heal was the club's greatest ever wingman and combined superbly with centreman Loughridge.

Heal was an excellent reader of the play and made full use of the many possessions he gained.

A Simpson Medal for his fine performance for WA against South Australia in 1949 and runner-up in the 1940 Sandover Medal were the two individual highlights of his career. But playing in two premierships in the same season (for Melbourne and West Perth in 1941) was the biggest thrill for Heal.

Loughridge didn't take long to adjust to league football, finishing runner-up in the Sandover Medal in his first season (1945) and then going one better in 1946.

To conclude a memorable year, Loughridge won the Simpson Medal in the 1946 grand final against East Fremantle.

Both Schofield and Buttsworth were versatile footballers capable of playing equally well in key forward or defensive positions.

Schofield began his career as an outstanding full-forward, but later developed into a great full-back.

Schofield was particularly remembered for the many close tussles he had with legendary South Fremantle full-forward Bernie Naylor.

Despite being only 180cm (5ft 10in), Schofield had an excellent leap and beat many opponents much taller.

His 20 State matches is proof of his consistency over many seasons and his ability to perform at this top level.

Buttsworth was a superb athlete, equally at home at either centre-half-forward or centre-half back.

His best season was 1951 when he won the Sandover Medal and the Simpson Medal against Victoria.

Buttsworth was a brilliant overhead mark and was rarely beaten in the air.

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# MOLONEY — A "DUAL" STAR

CLAREMONT'S greatest player before the Second World War was undoubtedly George Moloney — a star who displayed his greatness in two positions full-forward and centre.

Moloney began his career at full-forward and made an immediate impression. He was selected in his first State team at the age of 19 and repeated that performance the next season by gaining selection for the Australian carnival in Adelaide.

Moloney was lured to Geelong two seasons later and made a brilliant VFL debut, kicking seven and 12 goals respectively in his first two matches.

Moloney's second season in Melbourne was even better, kicking 109 goals, gaining selection for Victoria and finishing runner-up in the Brownlow Medal.

Geelong had poor seasons in 1933 and 1934 and decided to play their champion Moloney in the centre, where he was an instant success.

He returned to Claremont in 1936 and continued to star in the centre, winning the Sandover Medal.

Later in his career, Moloney returned to full-forward and showed his undoubted greatness by kicking 319 goals for the Tigers in his last three seasons.

He still has the record for the most goals in a season by a Claremont player, 129 in 1940.

Moloney goes down in football history as the best Claremont full-forward and centreman ever — and one of the greats in WAFL.

# TWO RUCK STARS IN A ROW

CLAREMONT'S greatest all-time ruckman, Graham Moss, began his career just before another Tiger great, John McIntosh, left to make his mark in the VFL.

Both players had similar careers as they were outstanding in the WAFL and then made a name in Melbourne, with Moss winning a Brownlow Medal with Essendon and McIntosh being runner-up in the 1971 Brownlow, playing for St. Kilda.

From the moment McIntosh made his debut in 1962, Claremont fans knew they had a young player of rare talent.

He made his name as a ruckman, but displayed his tremendous agility many times at centre-half-forward and centre-half-back.

## EXPERT

Although not a tall ruckman (6ft 3in), he made up for this lack of height with his leaping ability and expert use of his body.

His list of achievements in WA football was very impressive — All Australian selection in 1966 and 1969; Simpson Medallist at the Australian Championships in 1966, 18 State matches for WA and one for Victoria. Not a bad record for a man who took up the game at the age of 17.

McIntosh was enticed to St. Kilda in 1970 and literally took the VFL by storm.

After three outstanding seasons in Melbourne, McIntosh was forced to retire due to a serious knee injury.

Many football fans still wonder how much better McIntosh would have been if he had begun playing the game at a younger age.

The arrival of Moss as a champion at Claremont so early in his career was an unexpected bonus for the Tigers so soon after the departure of McIntosh.

Moss reached the top in both WA and Victoria and was every inch a champion with his outstanding football ability and sportsmanship.

He was nicknamed the gentle giant, but was not soft in his efforts to win a tough game of football, but always playing within the rules.

He had many memorable battles with Swan Districts toughman Ron Boucher and never flinched when the going got really tough.

## CONQUERED

After reaching the top in WA football, Moss was enticed to the bright lights of the VFL and quickly conquered that football mountain.

He left an everlasting impression on Bombers supporters and the Victorian football public, winning three consecutive Essendon fairest and best awards in 1974-75-76 and, of course, his Brownlow triumph.

Moss surprised many fans when he turned his back on the VFL after the 1976 season, opting to return to Perth to take up the position of captain-coach of Claremont.

He built a young Claremont side into a premiership combination, winning the flag in 1981.

Of his many list of achievements, only the coveted Sandover Medal evaded him.

Not many footballers compare with the playing record of Moss, who is high in the list of all time greats of WA football.

## DEFENDER STARRED IN TWO STATES

ANOTHER Claremont great to reach the top in WA and Victoria was champion half-back Denis Marshall.

Marshall quickly picked up the pace of league football in his debut season in 1958, showing Claremont supporters that they had a champion of the future.

He reached a high point early in his career when he finished runner-up to Haydn Bunton in the 1962 Sandover Medal.

He was hot football property when he joined Geelong in 1964 and proved in the VFL why he had been rated so highly in Perth.

## DEFENDER

Marshall finished second to the legendary Bob Skilton in the 1968 Brownlow Medal and played for Victoria 10 times during his five seasons in Melbourne.

He represented WA 20 times and was a dashing defender who pinpointed the ball superbly to players further up the field.

Marshall was unlucky not to play in a premiership side, missing the 1964 Claremont premiership triumph and was a member of the Geelong side who lost a memorable grand final to Richmond by nine points in 1967.

He came back to coach Claremont in 1969 and retired as a player in 1972.

His 272 games, played over 15 seasons in Perth and Melbourne, were highlighted by superb skills from this gifted player, who was always fair and sportsman like in his approach to the game.

# WA SQUAD DID STATE PROUD

Impressions of the Australian Amateur Football Carnival, by Brien Thirley, executive director.

IT was impossible to attend the amateur football carnival in Melbourne without being impressed by the quality and depth of amateur football in Australia.

The standard of the football and the spirit in which it was played were excellent and the final match, in which South Australia defeated Victoria, provided a fitting climax to the championship.

I was also surprised to experience that the attitude of the Victorian amateurs is so similar to that of the VFL.

The typically belligerent style off the field and the huge ego that we have come to associate with Victorian football is alive and well in the amateur scene.

Because of this, most devout West Australians seem to develop an inbuilt defence mechanism when it comes to giving accolades to Victoria. But, as the host State and organisers of the Melbourne championship, the VFAA deserve full points for their preparation and presentation of the carnival programme.

The VFAA have their headquarters at Elsternwick Park, a ground equipped with four changerooms and an office and administration area situated above a reception room and kitchen.

Visiting officials were entertained at the ground for a welcome dinner that was equal in quality and presentation to a top restaurant.

The ground itself was colourfully tattooed with the AAFC logo, but unfortunately, the construction of an electronic scoreboard was held up by an industrial dispute and was not completed in time.

Representatives from each of the VFAA clubs paraded at the opening ceremony in their team uniforms and carried the colourful banners of their individual clubs.

The presence of a band and the Victorian mounted police further complemented a spectacular opening ceremony that was performed by the Governor of Victoria.

Even the weather was fine, but a disappointingly small crowd failed to do justice to the obvious work that had gone into the planning of the ceremony.

The highlight of the carnival for visiting interstate players was the dinner at the Southern Cross Hotel with guest speaker Kevin Bartlett.

The VFL veteran drew on numerous humorous incidents from his long and distinguished career in a highly entertaining after-dinner speech.

With the team representatives interspersed at the various tables, this function gave the players the opportunity to establish friendships from all States.

The West Australian players also enjoyed a visit to the MCG, to see Melbourne play Collingwood and returned later in the week for a guided tour of the famous ground.

I have travelled with several State and club sides on tour and the conduct of the West Australian side was excellent.

Their presentation and behaviour, both at Elsternwick Park and as a touring party, made them very worthy ambassadors for Western Australia and the WAAFL.

## RAIN... THE GREAT LEVELLER
