**SHARK ATTACK!**

**Perth's win saves big pay-out**

PERTH'S surprise defeat of East Perth at Subiaco Oval last week enabled one local bookmaker to breathe a huge sigh of relief... at the expense of another bookie.

The late-season revival of the Royals had opened up the possibility that they might just win enough games on the trot to sneak into the finals — and then anything was possible.

A hopeful Royals fan invested \$200 on East Perth at 250/1 (a \$50,000 result) to win the flag and also had "a saver" with \$1000 at 20/1 (a \$20,000 pay-out) for them to make the four.

Perth's win certainly pricked the Royals balloon and makes their task virtually impossible now, with just five games remaining.

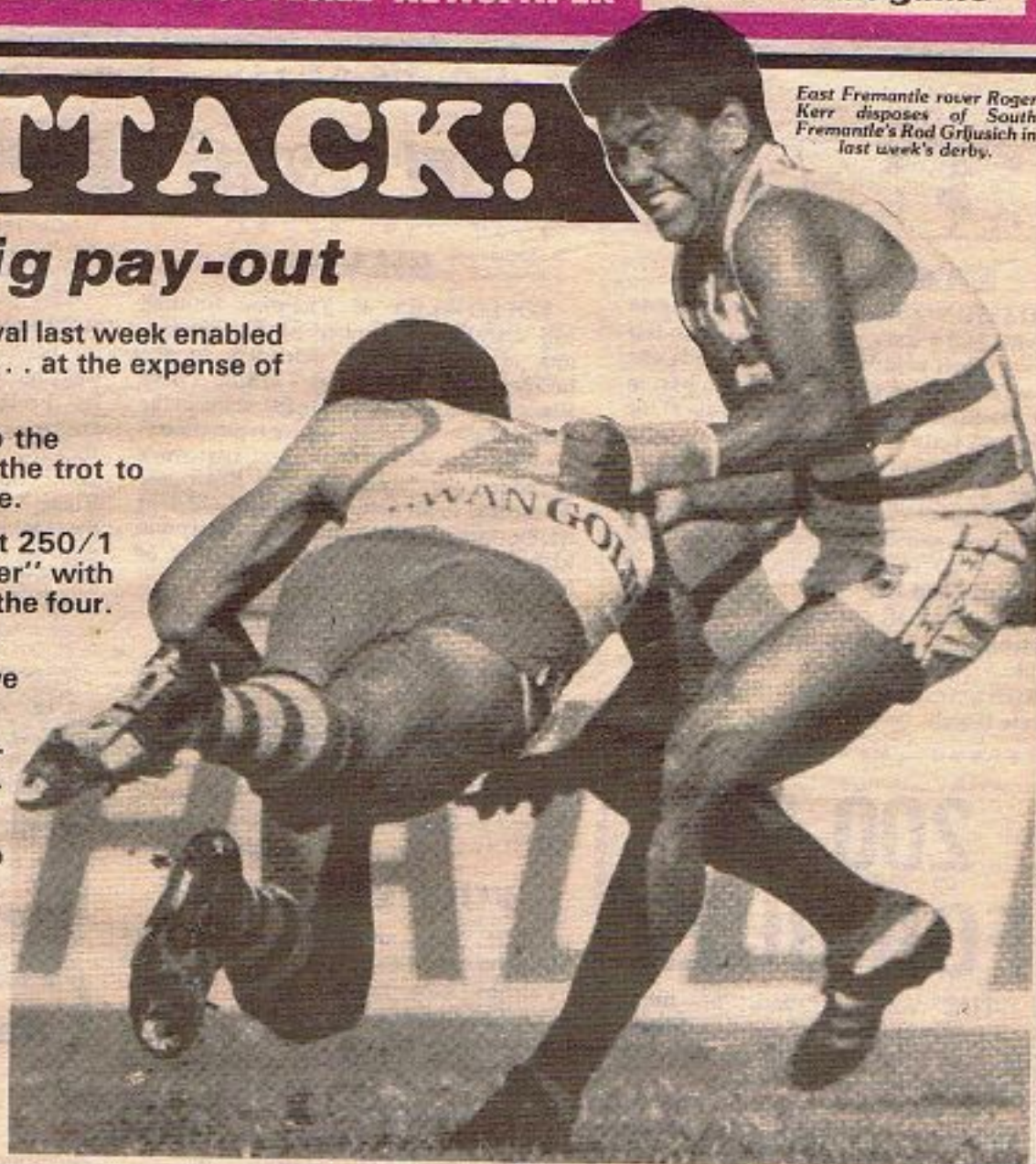
The football market has been quiet recently, with hot-favourites East Fremantle actually easing in the betting.

The Sharks were 5/4 on at one stage when their unbeaten run looked unstoppable. But they have eased to 10/9 at present.

A bookmaker said this week that no-one seemed interested in really backing any team to beat East Fremantle — and the Sharks were too short to back anyway.

The bookmaker's premiership market is:

10/9 East Fremantle; 3/1 Swans Districts; 9/2 Subiaco; 9/1 West Perth; 25/1 South Fremantle, Claremont; 100s East Perth and Perth.

**WAFL ACTS ON RUNNERS**

THE West Australian Football League plans to register all club officials — whether they be runners, trainers or water carriers — before the finals or clubs will face heavy fines.

The League is determined to stamp out irresponsible on-field behaviour which is bringing the game into disrepute.

"There are too many club officials on the field," said a concerned WAFL chief executive John Walker this week.

"This is an area we are determined to control." This hard-line directive issued by the WAFL follows a weekend of controversial incidents concerning runners and trainers.

The major furore erupted at Subiaco Oval, when former Perth and East Perth forward Murray

Couper, who was acting as a trainer for the Demons, physically and verbally attacked East Perth runner Brian Cook and defender Bruce Stewart.

In other recent incidents:

• A Swans trainer interfered with Gerard Neesham at East Fremantle Oval a fortnight ago.

• Last Saturday Swans runner Tony Micale, while leaving the field, attempted to distract West Perth ruckman Craig Nelson as he was about to take a free kick.

"Those types of incidents could incite a crowd riot similar to what happened at a Sydney soccer

match recently," Walker said.

"Murray Couper had no right to interfere with the East Perth player and official and will appear before the tribunal, facing a possible fine of \$5000."

Walker is not in favour of coaches acting as runners and injured players as trainers.

Both Graham Moss and Don Haddow have acted as team runners to get closer to their players during a game.

This season Neil Taylor, Ken Marshall and Rod Alderton have donned the white trainer's uniform while injured.

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### EARLY START

DASHING Swan Districts rover Kevin Taylor had a busy week leading up to last week's clash with West Perth. He was one of several Swans players who took part in the Elastoplast handball competition at the Midland Gate centre last Thursday night — and he was in good form with his hands when it came to a brief demonstration. That form obviously stayed with him in Saturday's game as he went on to be a star in the win over the Falcons, picking up 17 handballs and 13 kicks. Others taking part in that handball competition were Garry Sidebottom, Andy Maher, Shane Renfree and Victorian Richard Osborne, who stayed over for a few days after last week's State match.

### SILVIO

FOLLOWERS of Victorian football will certainly remember Silvio Silvagni, one of the toughest defenders in the business and a legend at Carlton. Those Blues fans are still enjoying the name in the shape of son Stephen, whose reputation is growing as a defender of class. Last week he added the "scalps" of two Brownlow Medallists to his belt. The 18-year-old kept Melbourne's Kelvin Templeton to only one kick and then kept Peter Moore out of business for the rest of the game.

### BIG TARGET

WEST Perth's biggest fund-raising event of the season, their Banquet Auction, will be held at the club on Monday, August 12 at 5.30. The club hopes to raise \$50,000 and are confident that they can achieve this impressive figure. A new Toyota Corolla, valued at \$8000, will be auctioned, plus a \$1000 windsurfer and many other items.

### FULL STRENGTH

THE injury situation is looking a lot brighter at Leederville Oval with the Falcons now nearly at full strength. Brilliant first-year player Darren Bewick and defenders Noel Mugavin and David Matin are available for selection this Saturday. The only injured players at present are ruckmen Ramsay Bogunovich and Mal Bennett, who the club hope will be ready to resume next season.

### TOUGH STUFF

FORMER Victorian great Neil Roberts was full of praise this week for last Tuesday's interstate game in Perth. The former Brownlow Medallist, writing in the Sunday Press in Melbourne, said that the toughness of the game brought interstate football back to where it belonged — the peak of competition. "Sure, it was tough," he wrote. "But it was fair and that's what football is all about." He said that the State of Origin concept had helped revive football and it was now inspirational to play for Victoria — as it once was. "Football at this level brings out the absolute best in people," he said.

### HOLIDAY TIME

THE recent interstate clash between WA and Victoria provided a good opportunity for players from both States to have a welcome break from football. Perth Oval last Friday was one of their social venue targets as players such as Garry Buckenara, Richard Osborne and Tim Gepp (back home on a visit) attended the Royals Roast, a Friday afternoon function. One of the highlights of the luncheon was the drawing of a car raffle prize — which went to former Premier Ray O'Connor, the newly-elected president of the East Perth Businessmen's Association.

### NEWTOWN BATTLE

SYDNEY football league team, Newtown are struggling to make much of an impact on the competition in the harbour city at the moment. Last Sunday they failed to score a single behind to go down to Campbelltown who managed to put 40.35 on the board. The previous week, Newtown kicked 1.1 opposed to St George who scored 57.29.

### KERNAHAN BID

CARLTON made Glenelg star Stephen Kernahan a big offer as they stepped up their bid to lure him to Melbourne next year. Carlton president John Elliott and the club's executive director Ian Collins flew into Adelaide in Mr Elliott's private jet and met Kernahan and his father at an Adelaide motel.

### SWITCHED ON

TREVOR Switch, who describes himself as a "fanatical Swans supporter" and a great fan of Garry Sidebottom, last Saturday night paid \$250 as the highest bidder when Sidebottom's jumper was auctioned following Swans win over West Perth. The auction was to mark Sidebottom's 200th league game. One of the early bidders was his younger brother Alan, who watched the match.

### BOOTS-N-ALL

BOTH the Claremont league and reserves squads trained in football boots for the first time on a Sunday morning this season. A disappointed Graham Moss worked his players hard after their weak performance against Subiaco the day before. It was ironical that Moss instructed his players to wear boots as he did not know that reserves coach Ian Miller had instructed likewise for his players.

## 200-UP FOR BUZZ

THE colourful and, at times, controversial career of mercurial Perth forward Peter Bosustow reaches a 200-game milestone this Saturday.

His tremendous leap has gone, but the magical skills which have thrilled crowds in WA and Victoria are still there, but not as prevalent.

Bosustow is in his eighth season with the Demons, plus a three-year stint with Carlton.

Bosustow lists his two day and one night premierships with Carlton and two flags with Perth plus playing in three WA Australian championship triumphs, as the highlights of his career.

A bad ankle injury has hampered his football with the Demons this year, but he is determined to end the season on a high note.

"I'm looking forward to the last five games and to 1986 when hopefully, Perth will have more success," Bosustow said.

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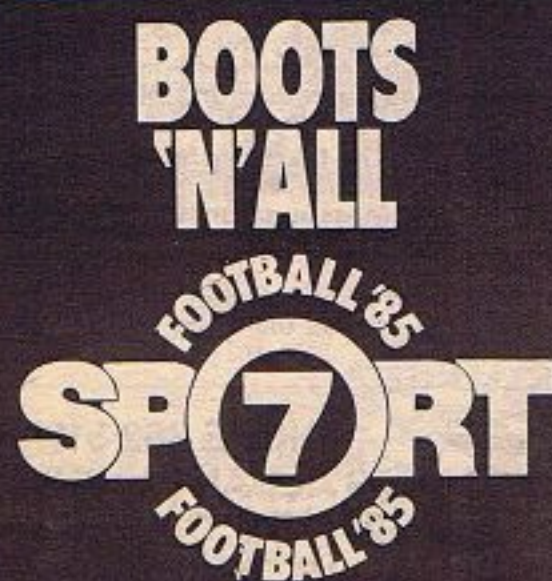

## MY VIEW

### IS IT WORTH IT?

WHAT do footballers actually get out of playing football — Pleasure? Satisfaction? Money?

The last is probably the most publicised.

While money is of prime importance, it's not the only thing a player gets out of the game. There are many other things. Fitness for example.

Most players these days are extremely fit, although some people wouldn't agree with that statement.

A player learns just what sort of punishment the body and mind can take. He begins to understand the effort and hard work required to achieve a certain level of fitness. He also learns how to 'pump iron' and in some instances how to become a pugilist.

He develops understanding of dietary requirements, becomes something of an aerobics expert and he also becomes familiar with every motivational film, tape or book ever written (thank you Vince Lombardi).

They learn how to treat numerous strains, sprains, twists, corks, torn muscles, cuts and bruises and how to play with injury.

Self-discipline is another of the benefits derived from playing football.

It's a most important aspect of a players make-up.

Will I go out on the booze tonight? Will I take my girlfriend to the movies on Friday night? Will I have a pie before the game? Can I cut this corner? Will I run on the inside of the pack when running laps?

Mixed in with self-discipline is honesty. If a player is to succeed, he must be honest with himself, not make himself take the easy way out. Players who aren't honest with themselves cannot be honest with the team, therefore they let the team down and eventually they let themselves down and they miss out, no one else.

### PRIDE

A player must have pride in his performance. He either has it or he doesn't play for very long. It is a hard thing to develop; unfortunately some never do.

Ego is tied in very closely with pride, self motivation and the ability to cope with criticism. Everybody has to have an ego, the difficulty is keeping it under control and not becoming a 'big head' with victories or personal achievements. He must be humble, yet assertive and, above all, be honest with himself.

They are not bad things to get out of football. Friendship is the major thing a player extracts from the game. When your playing days are over, the money you made is spent and people no longer recognise you as you hobble down the street.

There is still a group of individuals you can call friends. In a lot of instances, they are people you played football with and more often than not, guys you played against.

They are people you respect because you know what they have been through, what they have sacrificed and as a rule are level-headed, responsible human beings, although there are exceptions to the rule.

Talking with these friends gives you an opportunity to reminisce, a chance to discuss the way things were and about the fact that you could still get a kick if you were playing today.

Of course, it goes without saying what a great player you were!

It also gives you the opportunity to chat about how arthritis has set into your left knee, how you can't bend down because of a lower back problem and how, at critical times, your hamstrings cramp upon you.

It's always difficult to shake hands because your knuckles are calcified or dislocated and it hurts somewhat when it is grasped by a present day player who doesn't know what he is in for.

So, as you hobble through life, it gives you the chance to reflect on what might have been and ask yourself — was it worth it all?

Without doubt the answer is always YES!

# TOUGH TIMES FOR PERTH TEAMS

THE 1980s have seen the three Perth sides subside to a level of mediocrity — if not to a point of chronic failure.

Perth, East Perth and West Perth won ten out of the 13 premierships from 1966-1978. However, since that period, no Perth side has even played in a grand final let alone win the coveted flag.

One finds it difficult, even perplexing, to comprehend the demise of the aforesaid. Maybe they thought that the days of "wine and roses" would last incessantly.

The hegemony of the Perth sides disintegrated at the end of the last decade when there was a derby grand final. Since that time Swan Districts have won three flags, with Claremont, South Fremantle and East Fremantle being successful on the other three occasions.

It is noteworthy, also, that these four sides have contested all of the grand finals since 1979. The Perth sides, together with Subiaco, have been absentees from "the big one".

Indeed, 1983 saw the finals contested without one of the "city" sides competing — the first time that this had occurred since the first Balkan War (1912)!

### ZENITH

The Perth combinations reached their zenith in the late sixties when they occupied the first three places in three out of the four years (1866, 1968-1969). They won the gold, silver and bronze, if you like.

Let's analyse each of these clubs:  
PERTH: In the late sixties, played as if they were adorned with apostolic qualities. The 80s have seen them cascade to the depths of despair.

Since 1978, the highest position they have achieved is sixth (1979-80). It's enough to make you want to throw yourself off the Lathlain Park grandstand (if you're a Perth fanatic).

At the moment, the Demons are playing like a side that has won only seven pennants since the Boxer Uprising of 1900.

They have purloined the porous object (namely, the wooden spoon) on three of the last four occasions, and are headed for another annexation of the same.

Gone are the halcyon days when they were the "Beau Brummels" of the league, winning five flags in 12 years.

Perth have a proud record from 1947-1978, when they missed the four only eight times. However, 1985 will see them eliminated from the "September Ritual" for the seventh consecutive year.

### DARK AGES

Could Perth be drifting back to the Dark Ages, the years 1921-1946? In that period, Perth made the four only three times!

This would be abhorrent to the very nature of loyal Demon supporters. For their sake, let's hope that they never drift back to this dreaded "Twilight Zone".

WEST PERTH: In 1975 the Falcons soared like an exultation of larks. However, since then, they have been more like a flock of quails.

Since 1978, they have made the finals once, being piloted into third position by Dennis Cometti in 1982.

The Falcons, together with the Sharks, have the best final four record since 1945. While they have only missed the finals 12 times in 40 years, five omissions have occurred in the past six years.

As far as the Perth sides are concerned, WA's oldest club has the best chance to "fly the flag" in 1985.

West Perth would not like to filter back to the horrid days from 1906-1931. This era, from the San Francisco earthquake to the Great Depression, saw them go unrewarded.

EAST PERTH: The Royals have a far better record than Perth or West Perth in the current decade. They have, indeed, missed the four only twice in the past 19 years (1974 and 1983).

However, since their illustrious flag of 1978, the Royals have become the "sacrificial beast" in September. They have received the "coup de grace" in four of their last five first semi-final appearances.

East Perth could be forgiven for thinking that Subiaco Oval has been a necropolis in the past quarter of a century. The year 1959 saw East Perth win their 12th flag from 17 grand finals — since then, they have won only two out of ten.

Of course, the other sides won't lament over the misfortunes of these three clubs, save maybe Subiaco.

The Lions have not been in the four since 1974, and have only won one premiership since the first publication of Adolf Hitler's Mein Kampf (Jan. 1, 1925).

At the moment, Subiaco have one of the best "Fuehrers" in the business in Haydn Bunton. He is doing a sterling job of leading the Lions out of bondage — it is surely no tour de force!

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## TODD TALK

WA and Swan Districts coach John Todd has copped plenty of flack in the Melbourne newspapers over his coaching tactics in the interstate arena last week. Melbourne's Sunday Press sports editor, Scot Palmer, reported that the VFL hierarchy, from Commissioner Jack Hamilton down, were incensed with Todd's tactics — particularly having a training run for WA at the same time as the Vics. Palmer said that the half-time walk-off when Victoria were late out, was dubbed as "irresponsible" by most critics. Tony Jewell, writing in the Sunday Observer, suggested that Todd was more interested in promoting himself than winning games for his State. Jewell said his actions were childish and his strategy of running 26 players out on the ground must be embarrassing for the game. "People have lost interest in football partly because of people like Todd, who appear more interested in causing a nuisance, grabbing the spotlight themselves, instead of keeping the game's ideals at heart," wrote Jewell.

But with two field umpires, fans are hopeful that the men-in-white will be right on the spot most of the time and see what happens. So when an umpire misses something that most of the fans see, they naturally express their disapproval. Field umpires Greg Sinclair was the victim of being in the wrong position when East Perth's Brett Stephens marked strongly in front of Perth's Harry Mumford on Saturday. Mumford then hit Stephens in the face, putting the Royals' sneak down almost for the count. But Sinclair was not watching — and a blatant report went unnoticed.

## ARE TIGERS AT END OF ROAD?

IT seems as though the party is over for Graham Moss.

Moss now ranks second behind Johnny Leonard, who took the Tigers to a hat-trick of premierships, as the club's most successful and long-serving coach.

Having made the four for the past six years, finishing third or better on five of those occasions, it must be disappointing for him that Claremont are finishing this season on such a sour note.

He was spot-on with his assessment of his players after the Tigers caved in against Subiaco.

While they have had some high spots this season Claremont, are a very ordinary side, despite the reputed ability of some of their players.

There are simply too many outsiders in the club who give the impression that they don't give a damn.

Against Subiaco, 12 of the 18 were from other clubs.

It's not the first time the Tigers have bolstered their side with imports.

In 1972 they tried to buy a premiership. But they lost to a young, committed East Perth. After winning 18 of 21 games that year, Claremont crashed to finish last the next season.

The same thing is on the cards now for Claremont.

It could be a while before they again surface as a finals side if they slide out of the top four this season. And on Saturday's performance — and the tough matches confronting them over the next three weeks — there seems little hope for them.

### TOUGH SEASON

Claremont were aware that this would be a tough season. In some respects it was to be a holding year while young players were blooded.

But I believe they went about it the wrong way. They cleared out the reserves too early to make way for the talented players from their colts side, which is perched on top of the premiership table.

There simply aren't the experienced players to put pressure on those in the league side, which has hardly been changed all season.

Claremont's policy of shedding so many players to other clubs this season has simply deprived them of any back-up.

Unfortunately for Claremont, they have not received value from some of the players they recruited to plug gaps.

There are too many players in the side who simply don't want to do the hard things in football. They are not prepared to run or chase.

And handball! Claremont looked an old fashioned side against Subiaco. There was a reluctance to handball and their kicking to a man this season has been atrocious.

In other words, there has not only been lack of commitment, but lack of system in the team this season.

In that respect the coach has to carry the can. Perhaps Moss has been too kind to his players. Perhaps an air of complacency crept into the club after having made the finals for six years.

Perhaps everyone at Claremont thought the team would finally click as they did last year.

That appeared to be the case when Claremont thrashed Swan Districts by 95 points at Bassendean.

But instead of going forward, they have steadily gone backwards.

It would seem Claremont will again have to go through a rebuilding program after this season.

They would be better putting their faith in youngsters instead of imports, even if it means wallowing at the bottom of the premiership table.

# Hardys History

A weekly glance at football's past presented by HARDYS WINES

## FORTY-FIVE YEARS LATER

Players were listed for the 1966 Hobart carnival, seventy of them over 6ft tall with sixty-three over thirteen stone. Tallest and heaviest at Hobart was East Fremantle's Brian Roberts, then with South Australia (6' 6 1/2" and 17 stone 1 lb.). Shortest at Hobart was All-Australian Barry Cable (5ft 6ins.) and the lightest Ron Marney, of Tasmania (10 stone 6lb).

Australian carnivals have produced many characters and interesting events. Here are some:

Fred Goldsmith, 1955 Brownlow and 1956 Simpson Medallist, played for the VFL at the thirteenth Carnival in Perth — the first full-back to win both Medals. Fred's exhibition of goal-keeping for Victoria against WA was possibly the best ever seen in the West.

Bert Topping (WA), G. Heinz (Vic), J. Robertson (SA), J. Pennicott (Tas), P. Robertson (NSW) and P.W. Jones (Qld) all won "Referee Medals" as Champion of their States. (Medals presented by now defunct "Referee" Sporting newspaper).

1927 Carnival, Jack "Fat" McDiarmid (West Perth), Dave Woods (East Fremantle), J. "Bum" O'Meara (East Perth), W. Fletcher (East Perth), and J. Craig (West Perth) all won medals for brilliant and unselfish play. A custom which could well be followed today.

Tony Tyson and Charlie Tyson, "Bonner" and Paddy Hebbard, Lou and Stewart Daily, Bonnie and Johnnie Campbell, Jack "Fat" and Norm McDiarmid were all brothers who have played carnival football for Western Australia. Tony and Charlie were the first in the 1908 carnival.

Gil Langley, MLA (South Australia) and Keith Miller (NSW) both top cricketers played at Hobart in the 1947 carnival. Keith also played for Victoria.

Stewart Magee played for South Melbourne and had the unique distinction of representing Victoria at soccer, gaelic football and Australian Rules.

Queensland played the four Trewick brothers at Hobart in 1947 and a fifth played league football, also in Brisbane. Ken Trewick also won the "Stawell Gift".

Syd Coventry and Bill Hutchinson both captained two winning carnival teams, the only ones to do so, and both won the Brownlow Medal.

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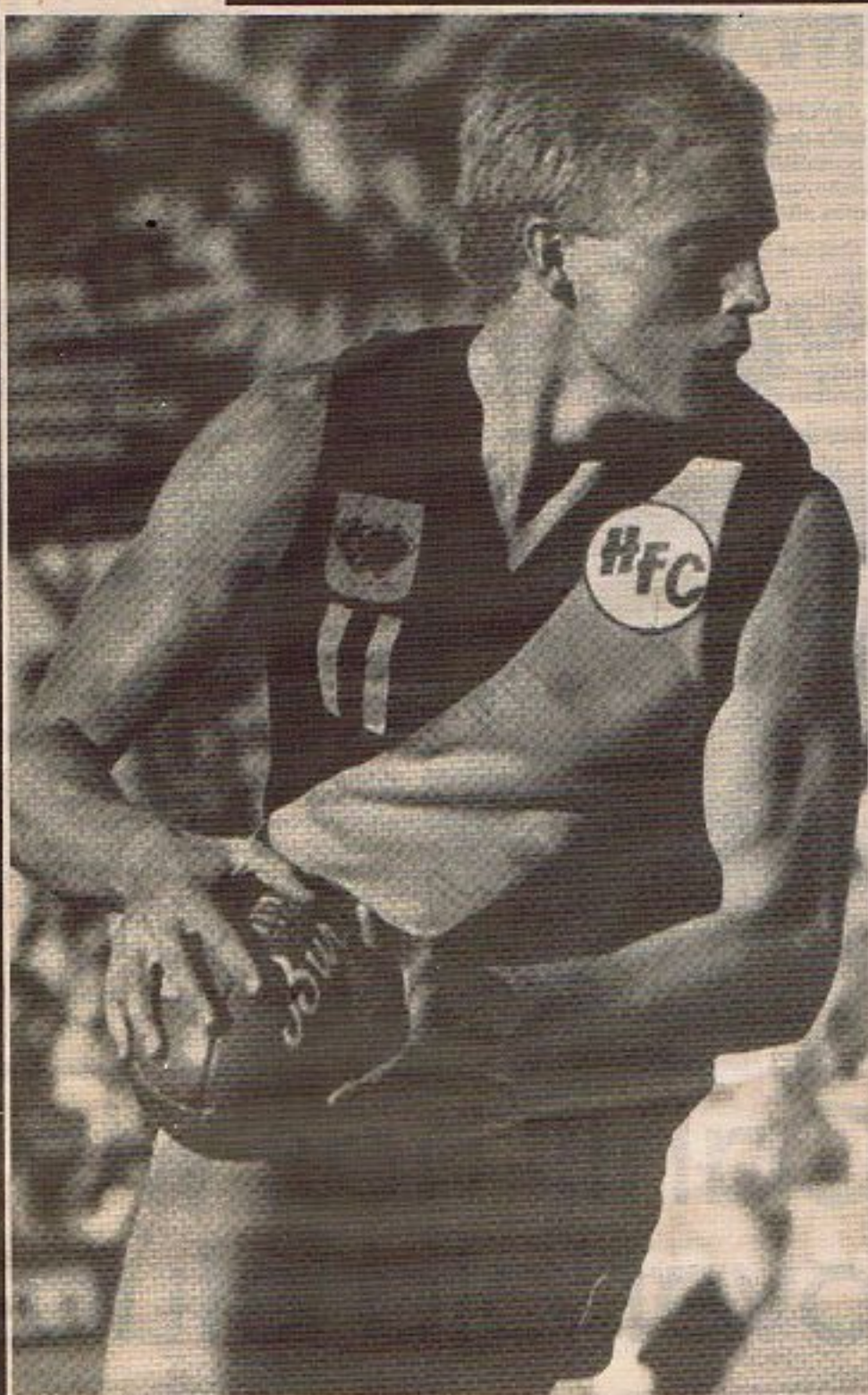
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THERE has been an extra touch of determination in the football of Claremont utility player Peter Davidson in recent matches.

His maturity as a footballer this season has been evidenced by his consistency and ability to concentrate for the full 120-minutes.

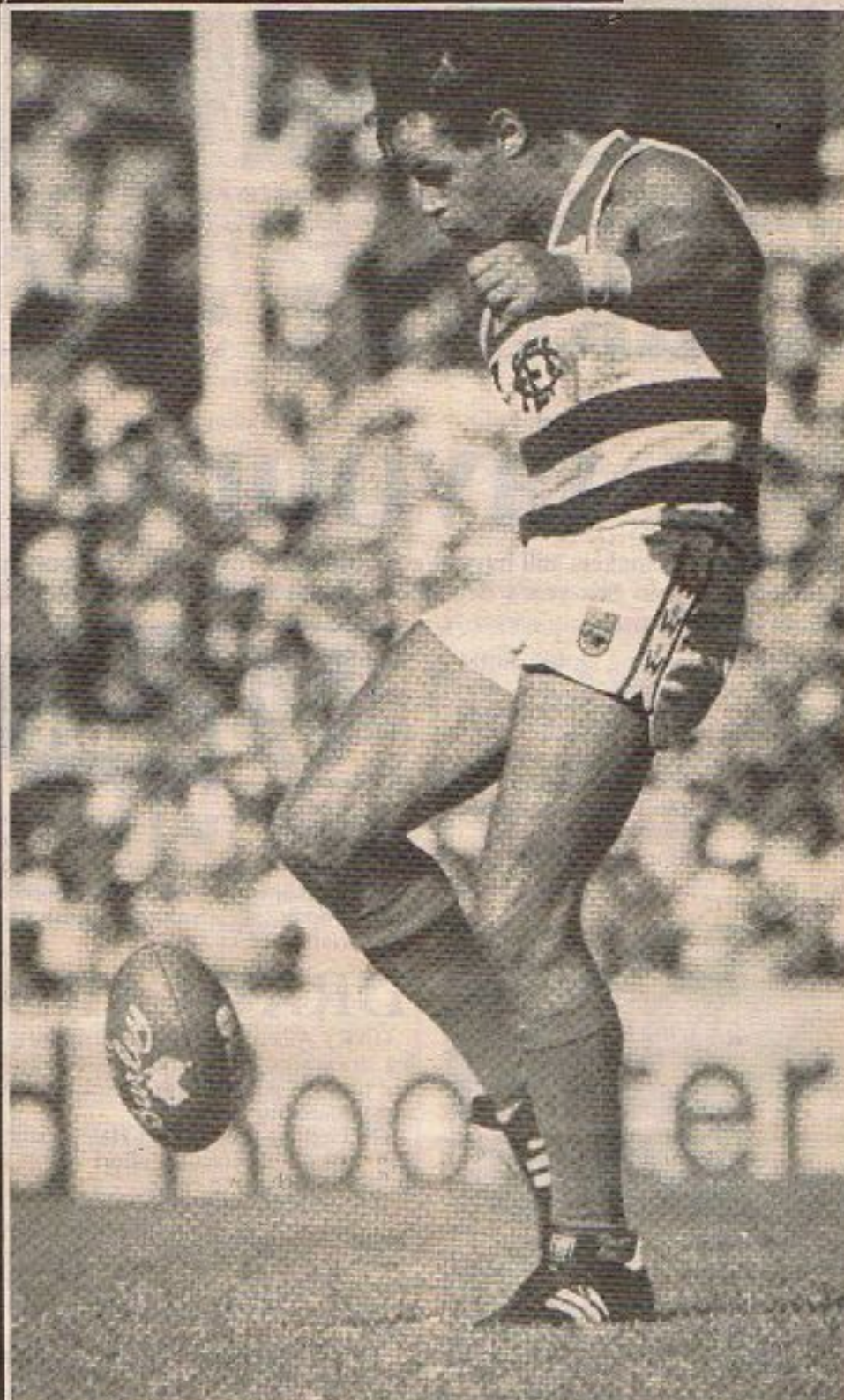
## Peter Davidson

## DRAWCARD

GARY Ablett is proving to be one of the big drawcards of Australian football — and his eight-goal effort last week brought some interesting reactions.

His Geelong coach, Tom Hafey, claims that Ablett's spectacular effort is just a sample of what is to come.

Hafey forecast that Ablett would kick 15 goals in a VFL game one day — and turn back the clock to the great goalkicking days of John Coleman and Peter Hudson.

"He's one of the great players," said Hafey.

"He has tremendous skills, he can run as fast as anyone, kick both feet and take a high mark."

"He kicked eight goals this week — and did it pretty easy. He could kick three or four goals a quarter one game — some poor side is going to suffer."

Even Ablett's opposing coach last week, the normally taciturn John Kennedy, also conceded that Ablett was "a great player."

## DEMONS MOVE

RON Barassi's beloved Melbourne are about to move away from the MCG — in his last few weeks as coach of the club where he made guernsey No. 31 famous.

Melbourne are set to move to the Junction Oval as their training headquarters — a move which Barassi says is a blow as far as tradition goes; they have been at the MCG for 125 years.

But he admits there are some advantages in the new training headquarters, with the Demons having unlimited use of the oval for training.

"We will be able to hold full-scale practice games," he says. "That's something we couldn't do at the MCG."

## MELBOURNE HOODOO

BEING named captain of Melbourne seems to carry a disastrous fate this year. Former North Melbourne defender, Stephen Icke captained the Demons last week and will miss four weeks after pulling a hamstring muscle. He is the fifth player to skipper the Demons this season and like all his predecessors, he is now on the sidelines. Other captains to be ruled out of action are Robert Flower, Gerard Healy, Peter Giles and Stephen Smith.

## TENSION MOUNTS AS SWANS DECISION NEARS

TENSION is mounting in the Sydney Swans camp about the likely effects of this week's decision on the private ownership of the harbour-city club.

Speculation is riding high that whichever way the VFL decision goes — to flamboyant Dr Geoff Edelsten or businessman Basil Sellers — there will be drastic moves afterwards.

One key Swans official has already indicated that he is prepared to quit his post if Dr Edelsten gets the club.

Betting early in the week indicated that it was still a 50-50 situation as to who would finally get the VFL go-ahead.

There are two theories when it comes to the effect Dr Edelsten would have — his flamboyant style would add a new dimension to football in Sydney, while his renegade approach could cause problems for the VFL administration.

## SURPRISE MOVES

Essendon dropped sensational forward Paul Salmon out of the league side because of the heavy conditions. The historic club have only finished on the bottom of the ladder once, way back in 1900. Their form this year has them heading for that same fate, especially with Woodville's surprise win over West Torrens last week.

Malcolm Blight's Woodville Warriors vacated the wooden-spoon position with a resounding 117-point win over Torrens in the first of a double-header at Football Park.

The main game saw Central District hold fifth spot on the table by beating Norwood by seven points in atrocious conditions.

In other games, Sturt beat top side North Adelaide by 30 points and South Adelaide's resurgence under Rick Davies was temporarily halted when they went down to Glenelg by 35 points.

As has the stretching sessions — being conducted by a leggy good-looking girl now in charge of their aerobics sessions. Wonder what former tough-man Don Scott, who resigned six losses into the season, thinks of that?

## RADICAL SURGERY

TORRENS utility player Kym Dillon said he could undergo a history-making transplant in an effort to continue his league career. Dillon has had seven operations to his left knee but pioneer surgery carried out in West Germany six weeks ago could enable him to continue playing. The radical surgery, a meniscus transplant from a dead donor, would involve replacing his cartilage. Approval has been given by three different medical boards for the operation to be conducted for the first time in Australia.

## DREHER OUT

WEST defender Mark Dreher has been ruled out for the rest of the season. He will undergo a reconstruction on his right ankle next week to try and overcome the problem that has restricted him to just one game this season. Arthroscopic surgery last month failed to identify the problem.

# RARE TREBLE FOR SHARKS

EAST Fremantle's win in the derby last week completed a rare treble for them — it was the first time in 20 years that they have won all qualifying games against South Fremantle.

I use the word rare because this has happened three times in post-war football. Another year, of course, was East Fremantle's unbeaten year — 1946.

Since 1945, South Fremantle have won all three qualifying Derbies eight times, the last in 1983.

Yes, East Fremantle did win three Derbies in 1979 — two qualifying games and the grand final.

## BIG ADVANTAGE

I WONDER if the half-time debacle at the interstate game will force the powers-to-be into taking steps to eliminate a repetition.

I believe there is still a rule in the book that allows the umpire to bounce the ball when it's time to start. It would mean a one-goal penalty to the offenders, but I'm sure it would only happen once.

The last time this actually happened (to my knowledge) was in South Australia in 1933 when South Adelaide took too long to return after half-time against Norwood. The umpire bounced the ball and a Norwood player ran down the field bouncing the ball and casually place-kicked a goal.

See what I mean when I say it would only happen once!

## HADDOW'S NO. 4

BULLDOG coach Don Hadow has become the fourth non-playing coach to 'run' for his side. The list reads Bob Johnson (East Fremantle against Perth in the second semi of 1963 which East Fremantle won), Ian Miller (Perth against South Fremantle 1983, South won) and Graham Moss (Claremont against Perth in 1984 when Claremont won).

## UNIQUE SPOT

IT IS quite a unique situation to see the two top goalkickers, Mick Rea and Brett Stephens, in the bottom two sides on the premiership ladder. Such an occurrence has only happened once before in the 100 years of the game here.

In 1961, the first three places on the goalkicking list were filled by forwards of the bottom three sides. John Gerovich from South Fremantle (last) kicked 74, Bill Byron from Claremont (seventh) 59 and Bob Coleman from Perth (sixth) was third with 54.

Three other forwards, apart from Gerovich, have headed the list while playing in the bottom team. They were Ted Tyson (West Perth 126 goals in 1938), Frank Hopkins (West Perth 79 goals in 1930) and Alan Evans (Perth 64 goals in 1921).

## REMEMBER WHEN . . .

HERE is a quote from a newspaper dated August, 1968: "Ron Barassi said tonight that he was considering becoming a Liberal Member of Parliament when he retired from football. But he would not go ahead with his plans till he finished coaching."

Now, 17 years later, it's the same story! And how's this for famous last words.

In August 1968, John Todd announced his retirement as coach of South Fremantle, saying that he believed a coach should not hold the position for more than three years.

Todd is in his ninth year as coach of Swans!

## WORST RECORD

SOUTH Fremantle go to Lathlain Park this week with the worst record of all. They have won only 13 times from their 38 visits there.

He wasn't suited to a defensive role and was moved to the forward pocket where he has been a damaging player around the goals.

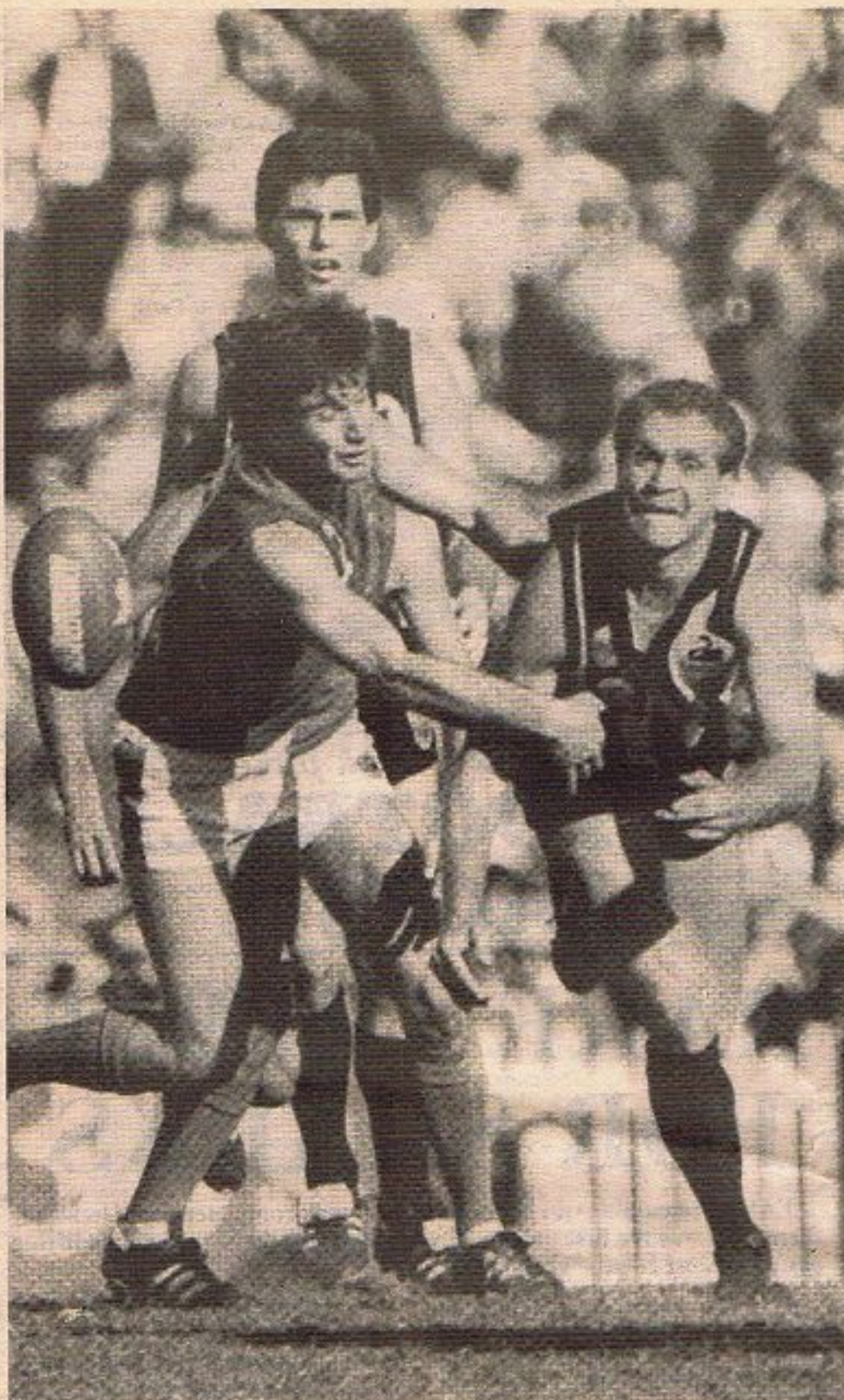
Cernock is now one of the first picked each week and will be a vital player in the Tigers hopes for a colts premiership.

# TODD AND GERO — A TALENTED DUO

TWO youngsters who made their league debuts with South Fremantle in 1955 were to become legends in WA football.

Centreman John Todd and full-forward John Gerovich were both masters of their craft.

Todd was an immediate success, winning the Sandover Medal in his first season of football and becoming the youngest player in WAFL history to win the coveted award.

Gerovich broke into the league side three weeks into the season and showed he had rare football talent.

Todd began his career as a rover and was a flowing left footer who had pace, balance and a brilliant array of skills.

In only his second season of league football, Todd badly injured his left knee. He never fully recovered, but overcame his handicap to still be a great player.

Todd showed leadership qualities at a young age and was captain-coach of the Bulldogs for one season when he was 21.

He coached the red and whites for three more seasons, between 1966-68 and proved himself a great coach, taking East Fremantle to the flag in 1974, Swan Districts to a hat-trick of premierships 1982-83-84 and WA to two Australian championship triumphs, 1983 and 1984.

## GIFTED

Though he only played 132 games, Todd is rated as one of the most gifted footballers ever in the WAFL.

Gerovich was a magnificent spearhead who was arguably the greatest overhead mark seen in WA.

He topped the goalkicking in his second season of league football and repeated this feat in 1960 and 1961.

Gerovich had other fine attributes apart from his spectacular marking. He kicked goals from a long way out with either foot, was a very fast leading goalsneak and had superb balance.

Gerovich was a freakish footballer who caught the imagination of the WA football public with his acrobatic acts which will never be forgotten.

# Michael — the modern day star

SOUTH Fremantle's modern day champion has undoubtedly been Stephen Michael.

Michael is one of the few WA stars who has resisted the big money of the VFL.

There hasn't been much Michael has not achieved in WA football.

Two Sandover Medals, a Tassie medal and the All Australian captaincy in 1983 and a Simpson Medal against South Australia that same season.

An unprecedented 210 consecutive games emphasises the great endurance of Michael.

Michael has proved himself a champion ruckman and has beaten many other talented big men much taller.

Michael has made full use of his tremendous leap and agility and many times has roved to his own ruckwork.

This modest champion has much to be proud of and has been a great ambassador for the Aboriginal people.

# The golden years ... and South's stars

SOUTH Fremantle have produced many great players, with the golden years of the club in the late 1940's and early 1950's the most productive period.

Three all-time greats who were dominant players during this era were centreman Clive Lewington, rover Steve Marsh and full-forward Bernie Naylor.

The Second World War interrupted the career of Lewington, but not his enthusiasm, as he became an even better player after the war.

The 1947 season was a memorable year for Lewington, winning the Sandover Medal and being a prominent player in a South premiership side, breaking a 30-year drought.

Lewington thrived under the pressure of a big game and was at his best in finals and State matches.

In 1950, his first season as captain-coach, Lewington took his side to another premiership and he capped a memorable match by winning the Simpson Medal.

This was the first of four South Fremantle premierships that Lewington coached; the others in 1952-53-54.

Lewington, as a coach, was well respected by his players and never raised his voice to any of his team.

Marsh, a rover of rare quality, was one of WA football's greatest ever.

Marsh began his career with the bulldogs immediately after the war and rapidly developed a reputation as a young player with rare talent.

During his 11 seasons with South, he played in six premierships, won the 1952 Sandover Medal and was awarded the 1953 Simpson Medal for his outstanding performance in the grand final.

Marsh took up the position as captain-coach of East Fremantle in 1957 and had immediate success, taking the blue and whites to their first flag for 11 years.

Marsh was an ornament to football throughout his 265-game career and a rover of the highest calibre.

Naylor was goalkicking genius and his marvellous achievements tell the story — over 1000 goals in nine seasons, more than 100 goals in a season five times and an unbelievable 23 goals in one match.

Naylor perfected the torpedo punt and rarely missed shots for goal.

The 1953 season saw Naylor kick 156 goals, plus another 11 in the finals, to set a record later broken by Subiaco full-forward Austin Robertson in 1968, when he kicked 158 in the qualifying rounds.

Apart from his superb kicking, Naylor was clever with his leading tactics and many a time he would out-think his opponent with a perfectly timed lead.

Naylor was a goalkicking freak and rates with the great full-forwards from any era.

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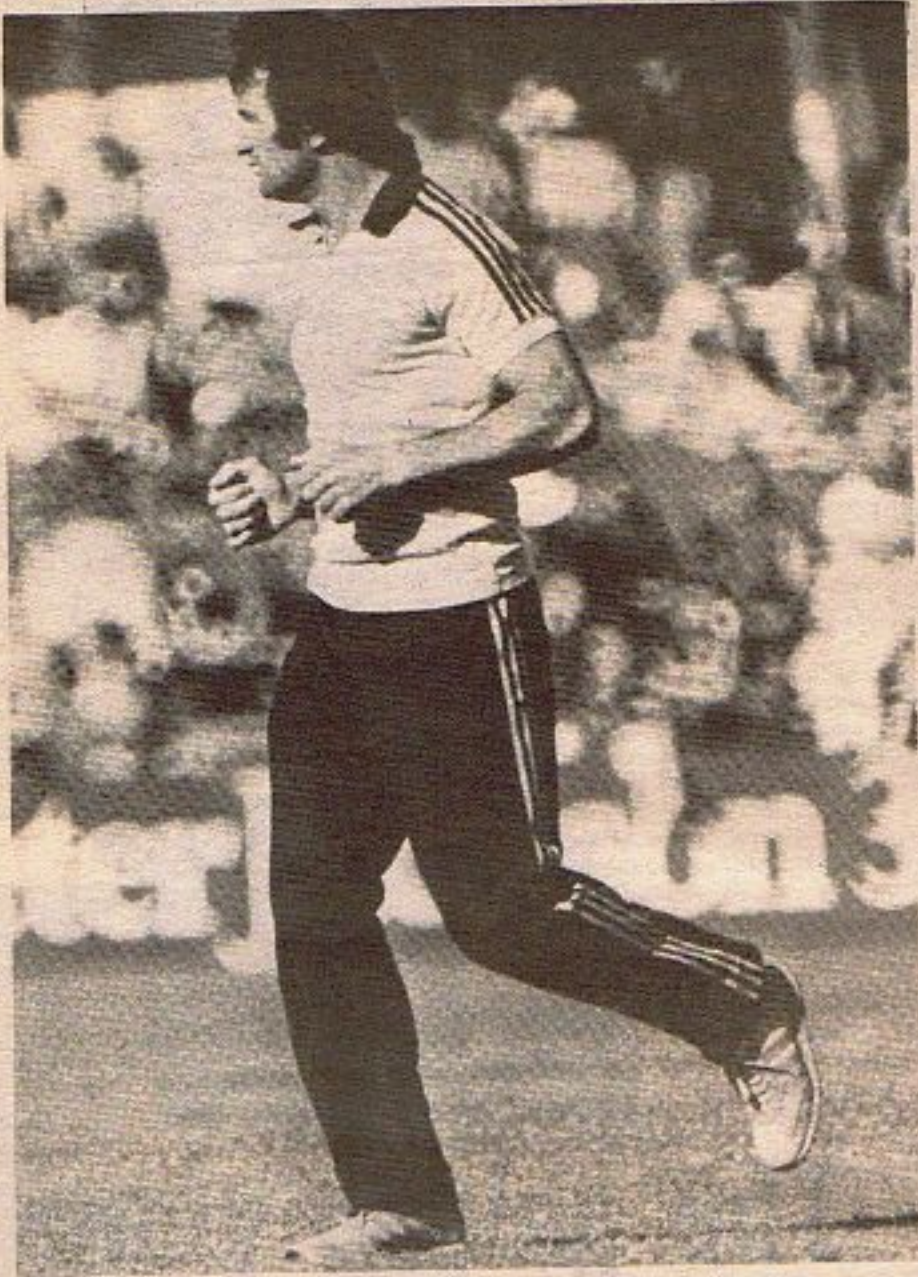
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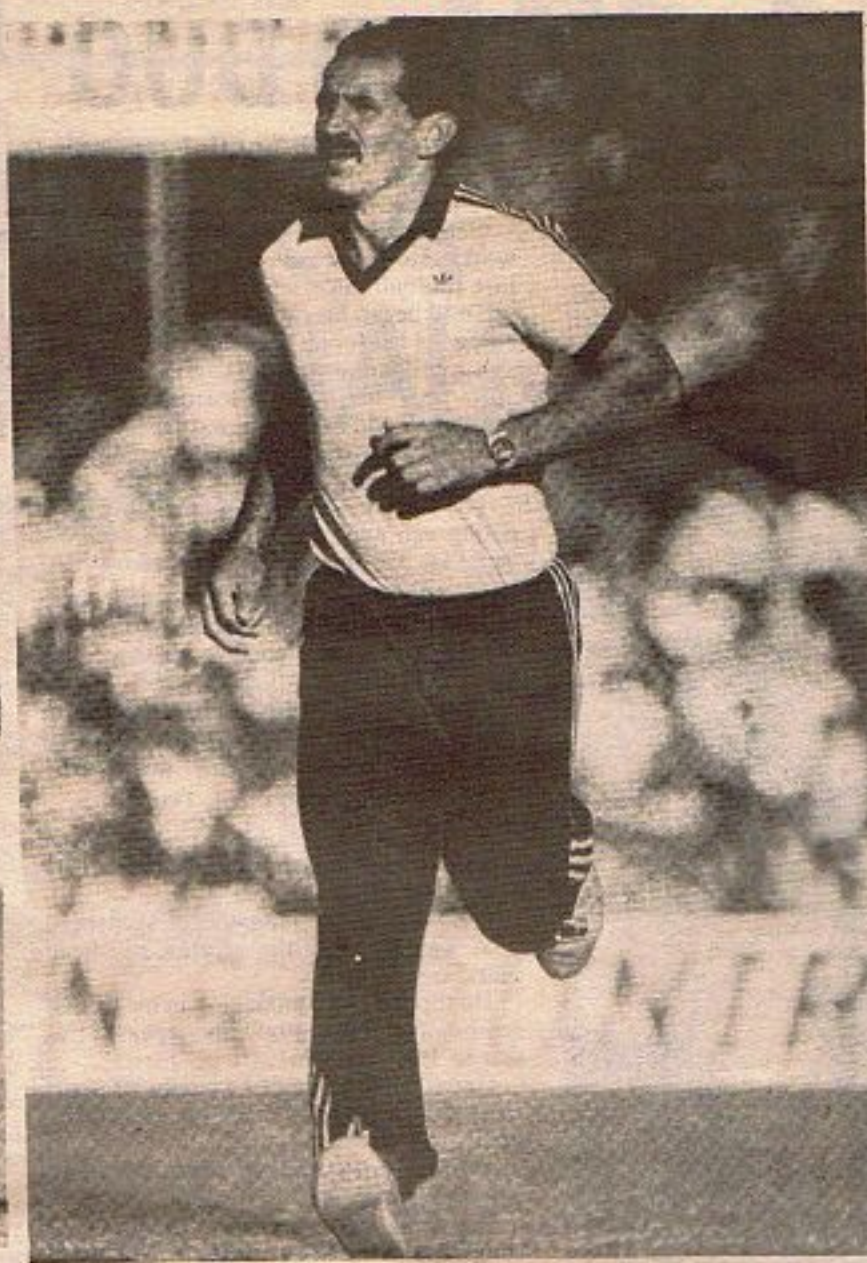

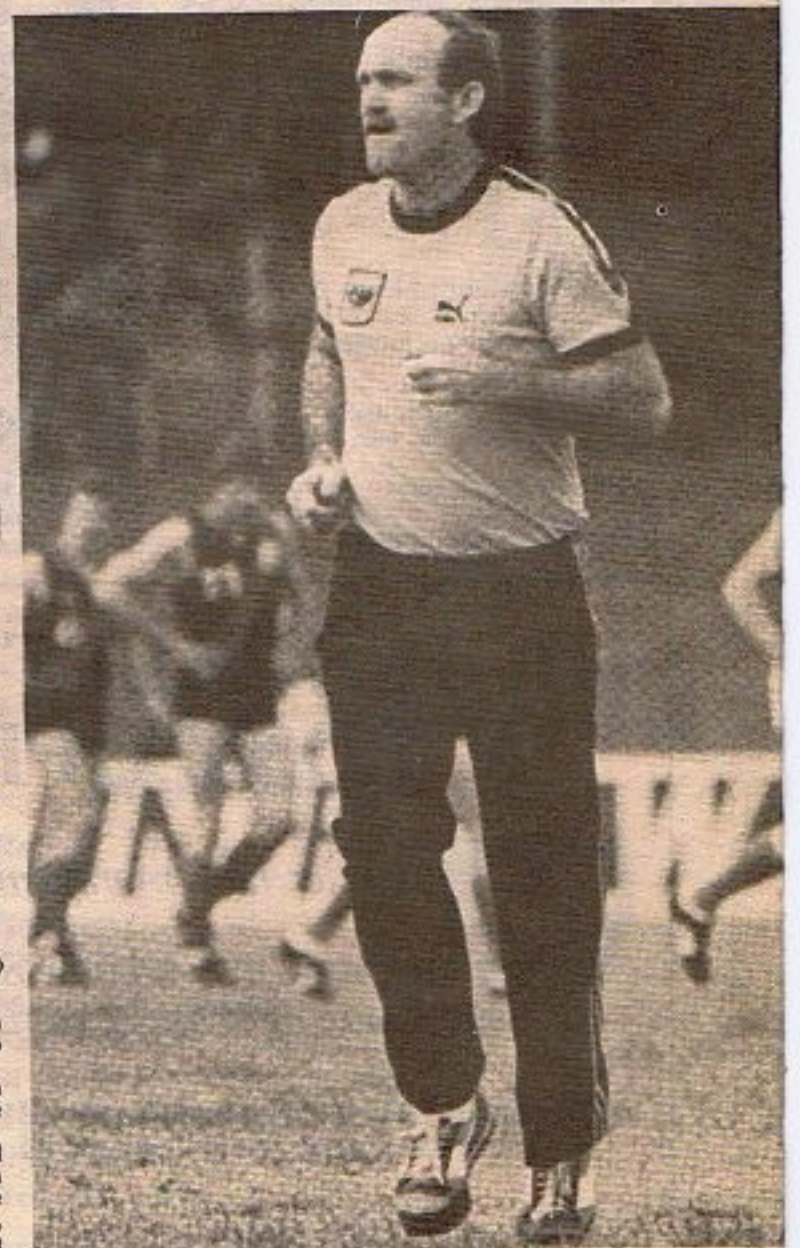

CLAREMONT league team runner George Young could be almost referred to as an expert when it comes to the position.

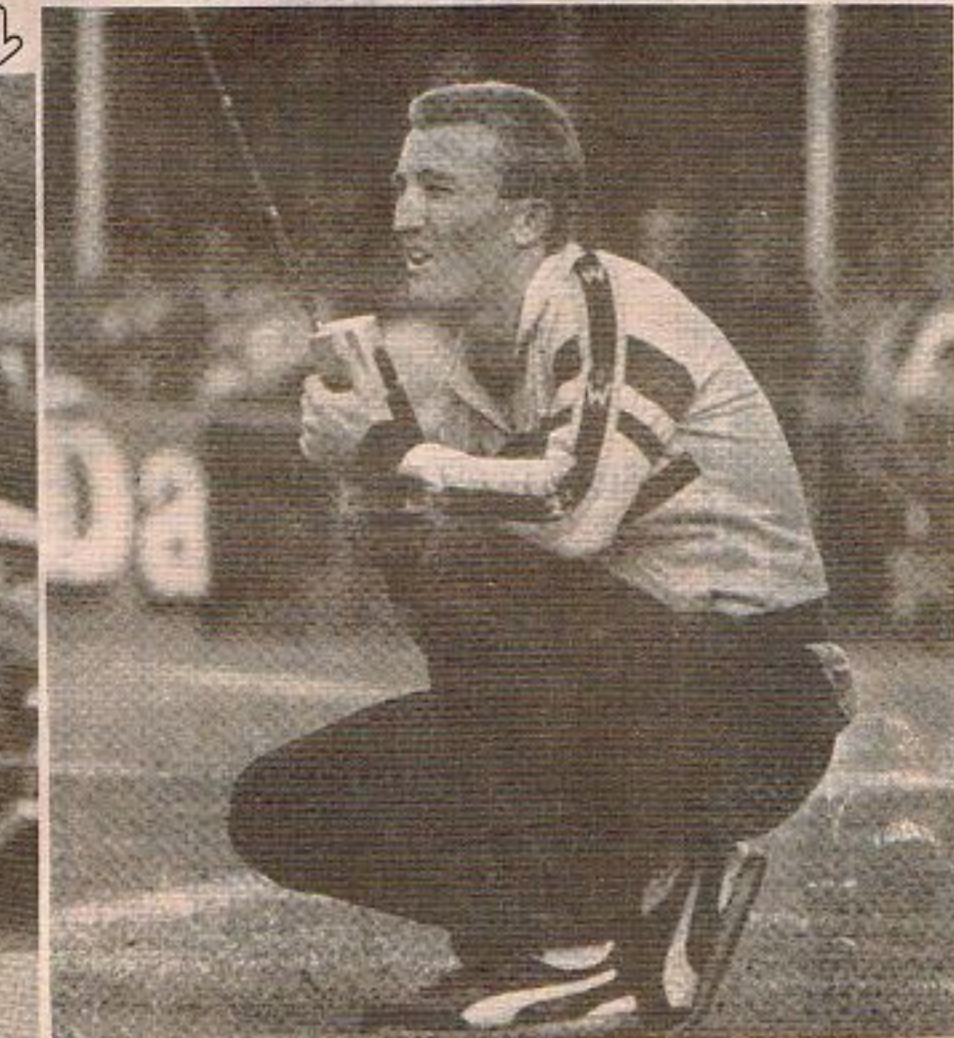

Unfortunately, history will record that 1985 saw WA beaten convincingly by both South Australia and Victoria.

West Australians, like all sporting fans, want to know why their State failed. We have developed a fierce pride in losing the title of Australian champions, pride that has come from the previous two years when the State team performed magnificently.

Unfortunately, the wheel turns and this year the Victorians have started to take State football seriously again. They have a crop of excellent young players who were great to watch in their totally committed pursuit of regaining their State's dented prestige.

The losses this year will have done little damage to our State if we can learn from them.

We have some outstanding young players who need time and experience before they are ready to retrieve the title we in the West love — Australian champions.

## ROYALS DUO

ONE of the key reasons behind the Royals recent run of victories has been the great form of ruck-rovers Glyn Williams and Steve Da Rui.

Their ability to control the mobile play gave the Royals a new lease of life.

Both young players began their football during my term as coach of East Perth. They had great skill and, above all, an ability to read the play which compensated for a lack of pace.

The two have had an unbelievable run of injuries over the past two seasons, restricting them from developing into top players.

Strength of character makes great teams and both Steve and Glyn, born and bred in East Perth territory, have that commitment that has kept the Royals a football power for many years.

Injury free, both young players continue to be a headache for opposing teams.

## EXCITING DUEL

WATCHING last Saturday's derby, I concentrated on the duel in the middle of the ground between two youngsters, Mark Bairstow and Murray Wrensted.

These two young players have the potential to be champions. They both have great skills and have that ability to take control of a game through their own brilliance.

One of their strengths is their personalities. They never get 'ruffled' and play the game hard, but fair.

Both young men played wide of each other, with Bairstow playing the "Old type" centreman role, staying at home in the centre and attacking directly to goals.

Wrensted plays like a rover from the centre, following the play. But he has great support from the veteran Gerard Neesham, who covers the centre for him. Beautifully balanced, Wrensted always seems to have plenty of time to get rid of the ball.

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
