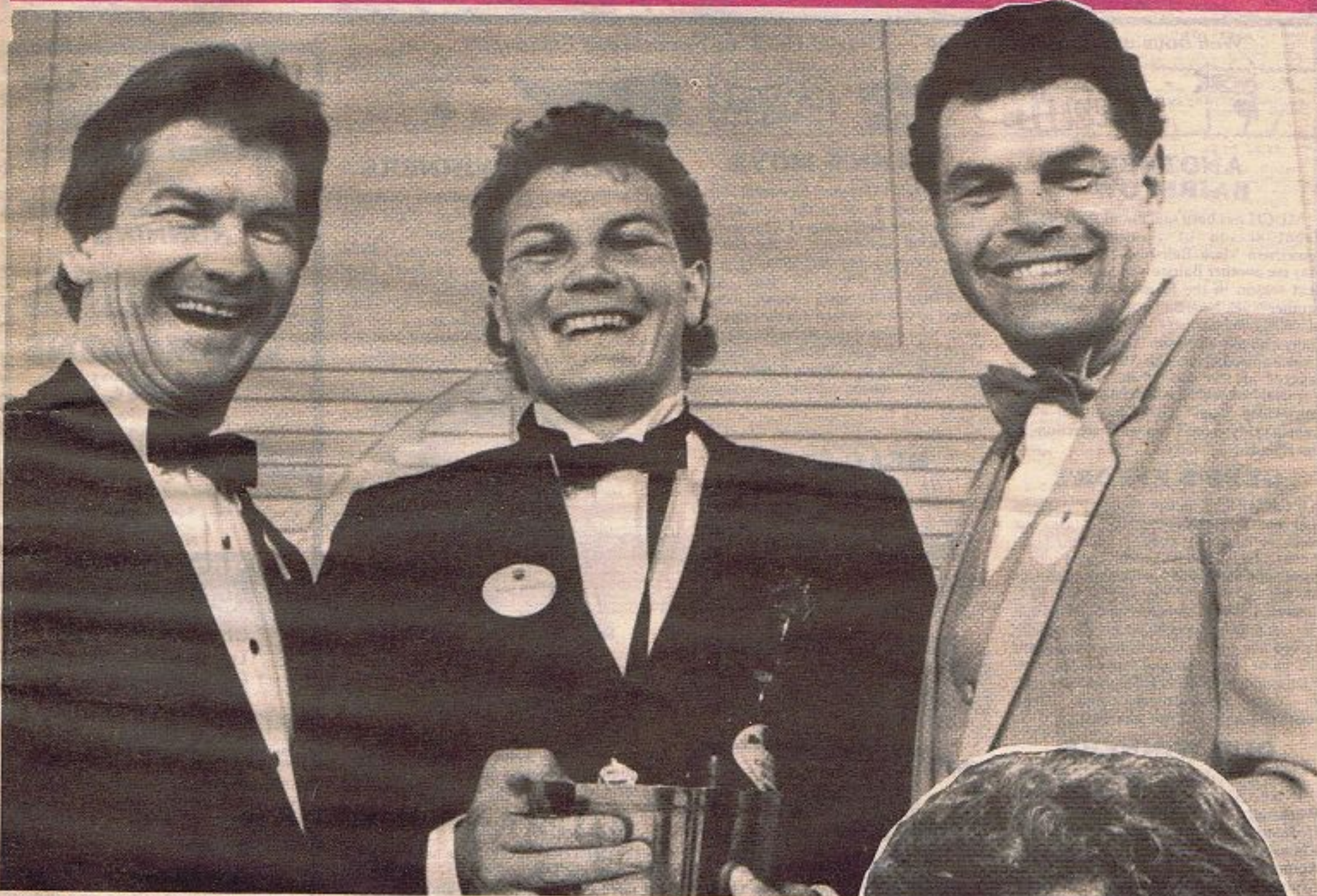

Another country medal winner

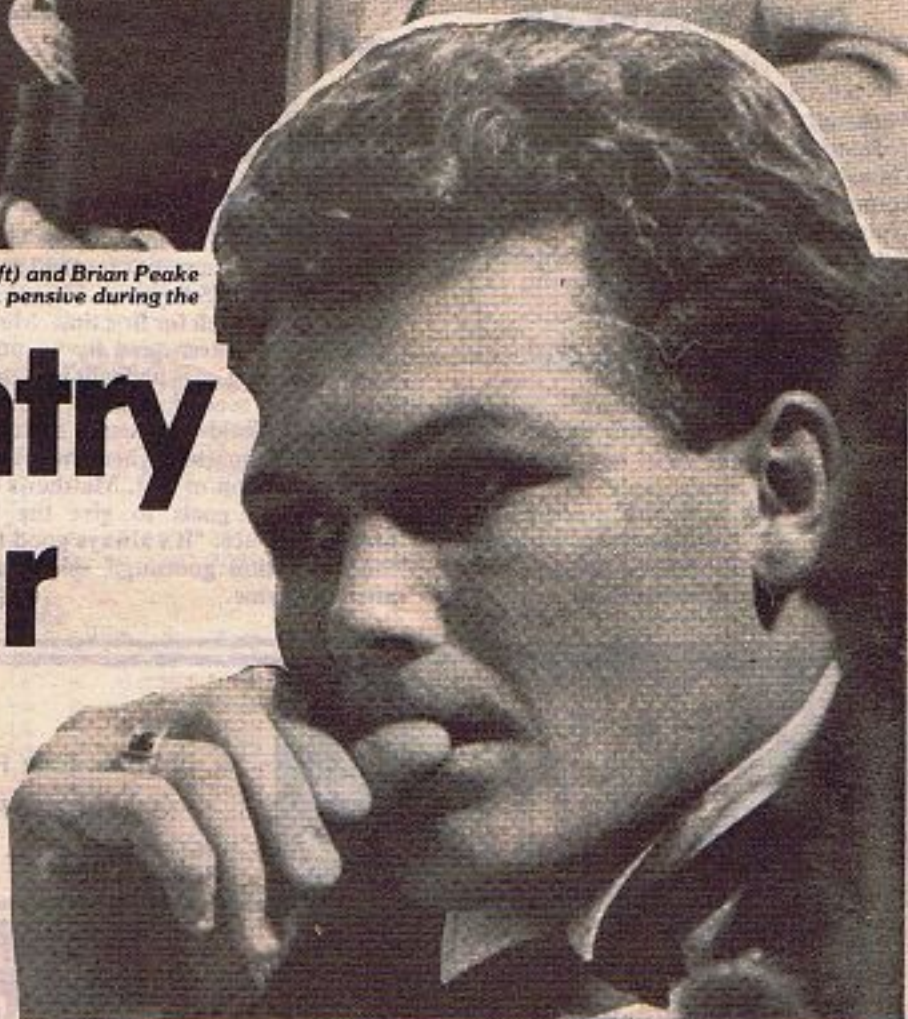
THE country football monopoly on the Sandover Medal continued last Monday night when Murray Wrensted won the 1985 award.

First-year country players such as Mark Bairstow and Chris Mainwaring are potential Sandover Medallists of the future, as they have displayed rare maturity and talent in their first season.



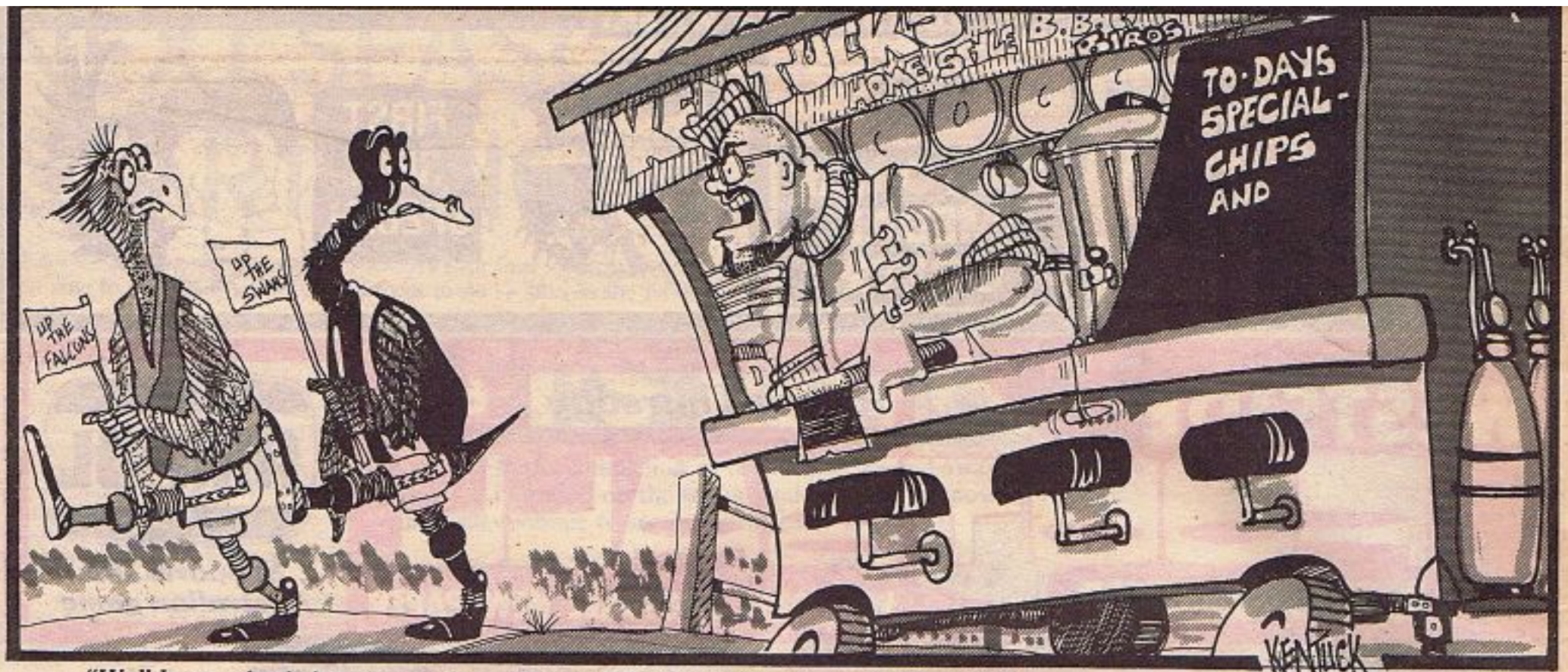

BOOTING WITH THE BREEZE

ANOTHER BAIRSTOW

MUCH has been said about the brilliant debut season of South Fremantle centreman Mark Bairstow. Bulldogs fans may see another Bairstow in South colours next season in the form of Mark's elder brother Noel. Noel Bairstow was a member of WA's Wesfarmers All Stars country team who played South Australia on June 15 at Subiaco Oval. The All Stars side was selected at the end of the Weafarmers Carnival last year in which Mark Bairstow represented Upper Great Southern and, unbelievably, could not gain selection in the squad.

Tough guys have a role

DATELINE: September 17, 1960
TIME: 2.30 p.m. VENUE: Subiaco Oval.
EVENT: The first derby first semi-final since 1949. (Attendance 26,000 approx.).

THE players from both East Fremantle and South Fremantle were standing at attention as the chorus of "God Save the Queen" echoed out over League headquarters. The crowd stood respectfully in identical posture.

The combatants, generally, were standing rigid in their positions. However, as there wasn't a centre square in those days, the circle was surrounded by a sea of blue and white and red and white jumpers.

Then it happened — as the last bars of the royal salute rang out from the P.A. system, Tom Grljusich clashed with East Fremantle's centre-half-forward Ken Holt, sending him crashing to "Terra Subi".

Immediately, the umpire blew the whistle and instead of bouncing the ball, threw it to Holt, awarding him a free kick.

So began the final round of 1960. The crowd was raucous, but bewildered as to why the South Fremantle centre-half-back had fronted his adversary.

YOUR ANTHEM

Years later I was told by someone in "authority" why he had "done the deed". It seems that Holt had turned to Grljusich and said to him — "Why are you standing at attention, it's not your anthem!"

Fair go, Ken! What if one has a name like Cometti, Panizza, Sierakowski, Sarich, Fong, Barassi, Schimmelbusch, Bosustow, or even Van Helden?

Holt succeeded in incurring the wrath of "Turkey" Tom. It has happened that many a player has been goaded in a final round encounter and I'm sure it will happen again.

One of the toughest, if not the toughest, finals on record was the 1969 second semi-final between East Perth and West Perth.

One remembers how Graham "Polly" Farmer (WP) rendered East Perth's Hans Verstegen and Keith Doncon into a state of catatonic despair. Farmer delivered two such enormous shirt-fronts that he made Jack "Captain Blood" Dyer look like the Tooth Fairy!

West Perth played it hard, but fair. It not only won them the semi final, but they won the grand final two weeks later by 73 points.

East Perth weren't always the receivers — they could dish it out, too. They feature prominently in the famous "Knuckle Sandwich Stakes", incidents that have occurred in final rounds since I have followed the game.

SQUASHED TOMATO

1955 GRAND FINAL: Jack Sheedy (EF) turns Terry Moriarty's (P) nose into a squashed tomato.

1957 GRAND FINAL: Jack Sheedy (EP) gives Wilson Onions (EF) a black eye (Wilson, unperturbed, played on).

1958 SECOND SEMI-FINAL: Jack Sheedy (EP) K.O.'s "Trizzie" Lawrence (EF) and also hits spectator.

1960 PRELIMINARY FINAL: Ray Giblett (EP) flattens "Trizzie" (latter revived with smelling salts).

1966 GRAND FINAL: Mal Atwell (P) renders Mark O'Donohue "Hors de Combat" (O'Donohue seen exiting arena in horizontal position).

1969 SECOND SEMI-FINAL: Bradley Smith (EP) demolishes Pleitner (WP) with a superb hip and shoulder.

1981 GRAND FINAL: Basil Campbell (SF) says "good night" to Barry Beecroft (C).

1984 SECOND SEMI-FINAL: Peter Wilson (EF) converts Kim Hetherington (SD) into a mobile part of a windmill!

TOSS A COIN TO PICK A WINNER

FORM says West Perth. Experience says Swan Districts. But either way, the WA football public is set to witness one of the most closely-contested first semi-finals for several seasons.

Both sides go into the big game with several players under an injury cloud and neither club can afford to play players who are not 100 per cent fit.

The Falcons were struck an untimely blow last Saturday against Claremont when the side's three leaders Les Fong, Peter Menaglio and George Michalczuk were injured in a tough encounter.

Added to this, experienced full-back Graeme Comerford is in doubt with a shoulder injury.

West Perth can ill-afford to go into this cut-throat final without these senior players who have led the red-and-blues superbly all season.

Two other key Falcons who missed the Claremont match with injury — No. 1 ruckman Kim Rogers and elusive ruck-rover Peter Murnane — are also desperately needed against the black-and-whites.

DOUBTFUL

Swans also have their problems with Tony Solin a very doubtful starter and Jon Fogarty, Peter Sartori Tom Mullooly, Kevin Taylor and Stephen Richardson notable absentees against Perth last Saturday.

The black-and-whites have won all three encounters this season but have had to play well to beat the determined Falcons.

Their clash at Bassendean Oval in the third series saw Swans just win by two points, but the closeness of the two sides was very evident that day.

West Perth have been one side who have consistently troubled Swans during their reign at the top.

THE Falcons pacy mobile brigade has worried Swans and if players like Menaglio, Gavin Chaplin, Corry and Darren Bewick and Murnane are allowed space to move, they could prove very damaging.

Swans will welcome classy midfielder Joe Ahmat back into the side, after a two-week forced break due to suspension.

the packs and with Taylor they form a dangerous goalkicking combination.

West Perth have several options across the centre, with Mikka certain for one wing and if Michalczuk is not fit, Brendon Bell is a ready made replacement for the pivot.

Ross Munns, Dean Laidley or Dean Warwick are the candidates for the other wing, with the versatile Laidley more likely to start on the half-back-flank.

Injuries have prevented Swans from settling on a regular trio across the centre and with the injury to centreman Solin they will go into the match with a makeshift centreline.

West Perth have had problems with their defence all season but came up with their best combination for the season last week against the Tigers and Craig Nelson could be the answer at centre-half-back.

DANGER

GARRY Sidebottom and Brent Hutton are looming as potential dangers up forward for the Falcons defence and both are in peak form.

Sidebottom is a fine big game player whose marking strength and superb use of his body has caused most full-backs plenty of headaches during this season.

Don Holmes made a welcome return to form against Perth but needs to kick more goals.

The Falcons have the consistently-brilliant Phil Bradmore up forward and his mobility will worry whoever Swans opt to oppose him.

The unpredictable Derek Kickett is due to fire and some early goals will make him hard to stop.

The ruck duels between Kim Rogers and Mark Stephens of West Perth and Swans pair Mick Johns and Sartori should prove an even contest with the respective teams smaller brigades relying on reading the knocks.

The evenness of both sides makes picking a victor very difficult — but the enthusiastic Falcons are on a high and should progress into the preliminary final with a narrow win.

One game in particular against East Perth, Bradmore kicked seven goals from centre-half-forward and could only manage two votes. This means in the old system of 3-2-1 voting he wouldn't have received a vote.

Now Todd gets dangerous

WATCH out for John Todd.

That's the message three clubs will need to heed now that we are at the business stage of the season.

Todd has kept a rather low profile since the interstate games.

Indifferent form by Swans and the late surge by West Perth and Subiaco have pushed Todd into the background and has some people writing Swans off for the premiership.

That's the way Todd likes it. And that's when he's at his most dangerous.

Despite having won three premierships in a row, Todd still has the psychological ammunition to fire his team up for the finals.

A win this year will enable Swans to become the first side to win four flags on end since the Page system was introduced in 1931.

Football is Todd's life and you can bet he's been thinking about Swans clash with West Perth since it was confirmed they would meet in the first semi-final.

There are some at West Perth who think they have Swans measure. They felt they were deprived of a premiership in 1982 when Claremont prevented the Falcons from meeting Swans in the grand final.

That's history. It was just another scalp on Todd's belt.

West Perth's major hurdle against Swans will be the intense pressure that will be applied to some of their more "fragile" players.

West Perth's strength has been the way they muster their play midfield.

They tend to hunt in packs. Allowed free rein, their running players can tear an opposition defence apart.

But that's not likely to happen on Saturday.

Todd is sure to use tagging tactics.

Despite Swans indifferent form, it is worth nothing that they have been able to beat each of the other three finalists, on their home ground, in pressure games this season.

In their premiership run Swans have not always fielded the most talented side. But they have fielded the most determined and best disciplined combination.

Those two ingredients stem straight from Todd.

He manages to get certain players to become world-beaters in final rounds. Leon Baker and Brad Shine are the most obvious examples.

Some of his stars of last season, Murray Rance and Brent Hutton, have been only lukewarm this season. So it will be a measure of Todd's ability to get them on the boil in the finals.

Swans have won the premiership the hard way over the last two seasons, having come from the first semi in 1983 and rebounding from a second semi final loss last year.

So Todd's unlikely to be fussed at the prospect of a difficult assignment to come from fourth position to win the flag this season.

In some respects, this year's final round will be Todd's biggest challenge.

The cycle appears to have turned for him following WA's two trouncings in

interstate matches this season. Swans also appear to be on the slide.

Throw in the fact there is no love lost between Swans and West Perth and you have all the reasons why Todd will be at his most dangerous on Saturday.

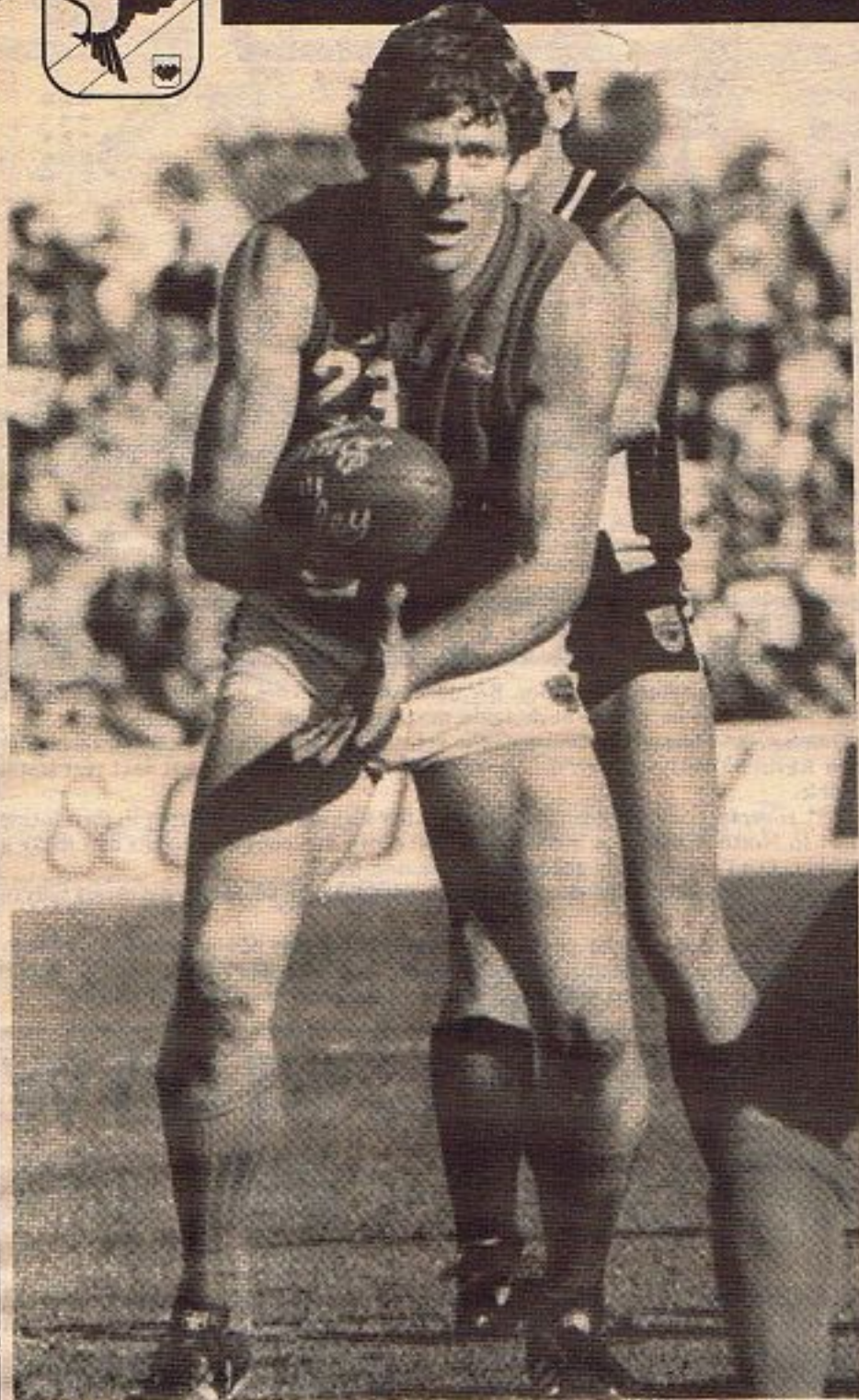

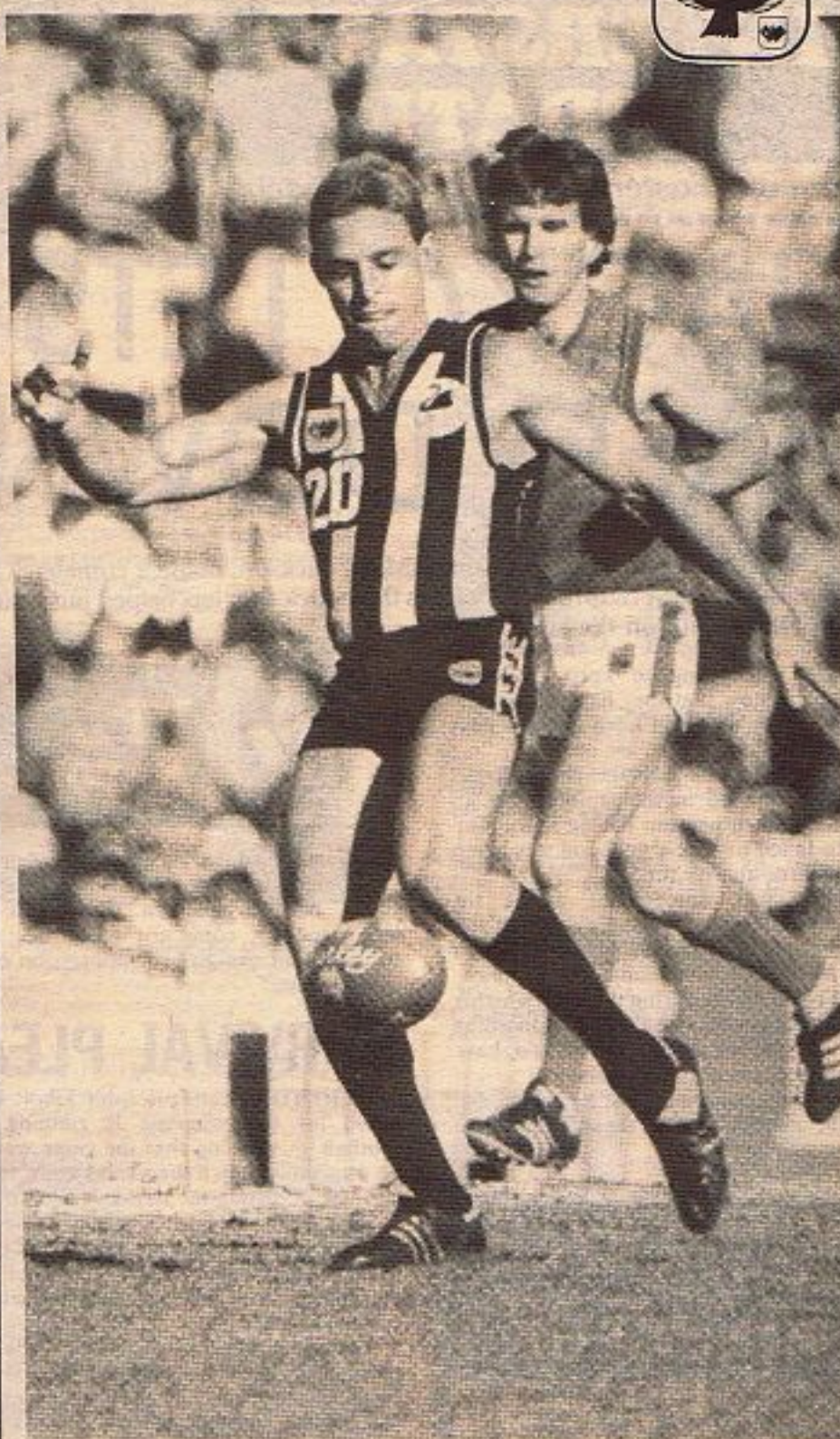

INTERSTATE UPDATE

From our Eastern States correspondents



JACKO LETS HAFEY DOWN

FOOTBALL'S riotous individual, Mark Jackson, made a comeback to league football last Saturday — but his three-kick flop has helped put coach Tom Hafey's job on the line.

Hafey, struggling to keep Geelong's morale up now that they have missed the finals, is keen to stay at Kardinia Park next year — but the snipers are out.

His decision to play the controversial Jackson first up in the seniors after an eight-match suspension backfired on him. Jacko failed to kick a goal and was taken off at three-quarter time.

Hafey was unrepentant about the disastrous Jackson move. Saying that the players upfield kicked the ball badly to him and he did not have many opportunities.

"We will decide during the week whether he plays next week," said Hafey, conceding that maybe the spearhead should have been given a run in the reserves.

Jackson, disappointed at his return, felt that he might have upset the stabilisation of the team.



But he denied that he was slow and unfit. "I might look slow to you sitting up there," he told pressmen. "But when the ball does not come to where you are waiting, that can give the impression of a lack of pace."

SURVIVAL PLEA

CARLTON president John Elliott has called for commonsense in running of football — warning that the game would go down the drain if the weaker clubs were allowed to dictate the terms.

Mr Elliott was critical of a decision by the VFL general managers which makes it almost impossible for Carlton to meet the requirements of the controversial salary cap next year.

The recommendation is that the salaries of interstate recruits in their first three years be included in the salary cap — a figure that initially was to be excluded.

"It will be very difficult for Carlton to survive and meet that requirement," said Elliott.

"What we can't afford to do is let the weaker clubs dictate, because they will dictate what happens in the future. If they do, football will go down the tube."

TWO CHOICES

FITZROY coach Robert Walls is undecided about his future — and well he may be. The players have apparently voted to have Walls retained as coach despite them missing the finals this year. However, the club administrators don't seem to share that point of view. Fitzroy are a better side than their ninth position indicates, so it could be an interesting summer . . .

MEDAL MUDDLE

VFL officials will be in a muddle if St Kilda's Paul Morwood wins this year's Brownlow Medal. The Saints centreman is one of the fancies for the Medal — but he will be thousands of miles away, sipping beer at the Munich beer festival in West Germany. Morwood leaves Melbourne straight after the final set of qualifying games for a two-month overseas holiday. Morwood is not worried about missing the Medal count — he believes that Geelong's Gary Ablett and Greg Williams will be the vote-getters.

CARTER'S 200

ONE of Victorian football's lesser-known players, Rod Carter, achieved the 200-game milestone last week. Carter led the Sydney Swans in their crushing win over Melbourne to celebrate

SUPERBOOT'S TARGET

FITZROY'S veteran Superboot, Bernie Quinlan, notches his 350th VFL game this week — and says he will be back again next year for his 18th season.

Quinlan, just turned 34, becomes the second player (behind Richmond's former great Kevin Bartlett) to reach the 350-game mark and he believes that next year is still feasible.

"My contract runs out this year," he said after kicking 5.5 for Fitzroy in their losing effort to North Melbourne last week. "I'll sit down in a couple of weeks and make a decision, but I've probably got one more season left."

Quinlan is second on this year's goalkicking ladder with 80, taking his career tally to 759.

"If someone had told me at the beginning that I'd play 350 games, it would have sounded like I was on another planet," he said. "But as for 400 games, well that would mean playing into a third year and they'd be wheeling me out there by then."

GLENELG SHOW THEIR STYLE

GLENELG served notice that the South Australian premiership race is wide open with a 44-point thrashing of titleholders Norwood last week.

The Tigers stormed into second place on the table, and the double finals chance, when they downed Norwood at Football Park with Stephen Kernahan and Tony McGuinness in outstanding form.

A nine-goal last term by Glenelg turned defeat into victory and they now pose a serious threat to top side, North Adelaide.

Port Adelaide, showing their best form too late in the season, caused the upset of the round again when they toppled top-five side Sturt by 49 points.

Sturt are now under pressure in fifth spot as Central District are just one point away. Centrals kept their hopes alive with a slogging 24 point win over lowly Woodville.

North Adelaide stayed on top with a 19-point win over West Torrens, their first win for six weeks after suffering an end-of-season slump.

West Adelaide beat South Adelaide by 77 points to keep their fourth position secure.

MEDAL ODDS

RECENT history suggest that the 1985 Magarey Medallist will come from one of the top four sides. Since 1966, when Norwood finished seventh and defender Ron Kneebone won the medal, there has been only one medallist from a side out of the top four (at the end of a season). That was Malcolm Blight who won the medal in 1972 when Woodville finished eighth. It shatters the long-held belief that outstanding players from the lower sides have a better chance of taking the award because players from the stronger clubs take votes from one another. Surprisingly though, since 1966 the side which has gone to take the premiership has supplied only one medallist — Russell Ebert (Port) in 1980. Sides finishing the year in second and third positions have each provided six medallists and sides finishing fourth, four medallists.



CAREY'S 350

GLENELG'S Peter Carey has reached his 350th league game. Only five other SA players have played more club games.

DIETRICH BACK

NORTH ADELAIDE forward Grenville Dietrich has continued to train with the club. Dietrich was suspended by North two weeks ago for alleged "personal problems". They were allegedly related to his drinking habits, but North was more concerned with his regular absence from training.

WILLMOTT'S TON

STURT'S Ian Willmott became the second player to kick 100 goals for the season. Woodville captain/coach Malcolm Blight achieved the magical ton recently. But a disappointed Willmott labelled his milestone as "meaningless" following his sides loss.

All advisors have to make difficult decisions at this time of year concerning umpires for final round matches. Some of these decisions are not always popular, but the advisor chooses the best person for the job.

PROMOTION

WHO is the man in white on the cover of the 1986 telephone directory? He is Trevor Rees, who umpired with the WAFL in 1984 and was appointed Umpires Advisor of the Murray Districts League in 1985. When he can, he offers his services to the Subiaco Junior Council to improve the standard of football for juniors.

TOUGH ROLE

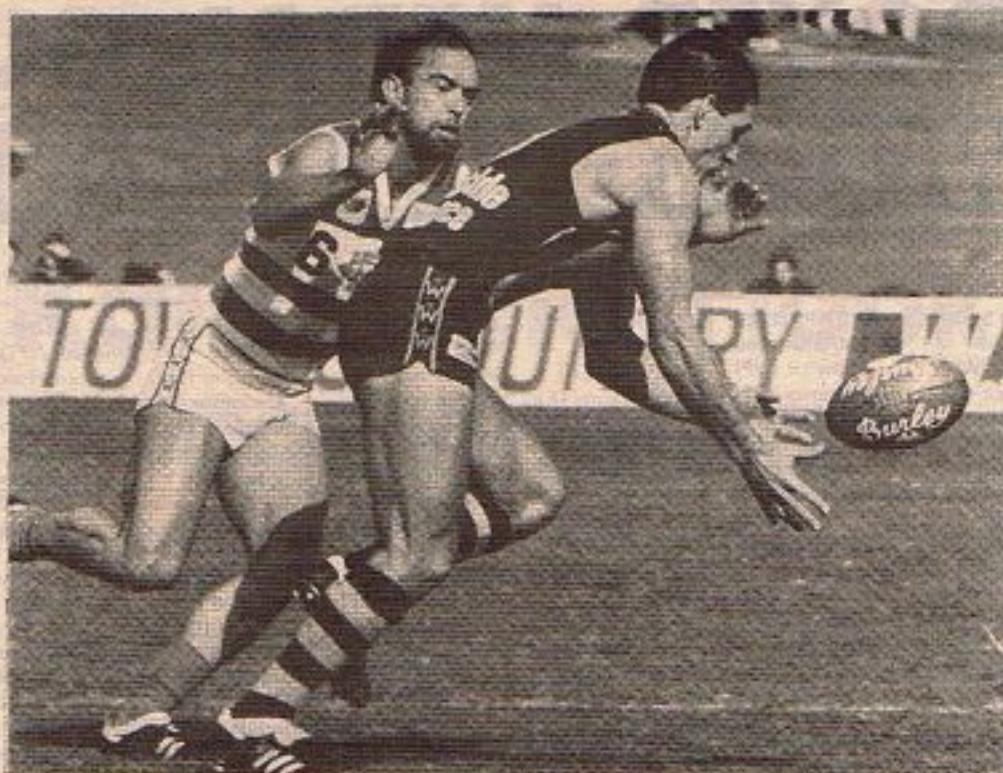

WYNNE STARS AS A "ROOKIE"

JOHN Wynne, the rookie coach with the policy of trying to remain incognito, has certainly upset some of his critics by getting his side into the finals.

So how does Wynne's 12 wins (so far) compare with other coaches in their first year as a league coach.

Take the other seven league coaches — Mal Brown won 13 games in 1970, Haydn Bunton 13 at Norwood in 1957, Greg Brehaut 9 in 1983, Ron Alexander 8 in 1982, John Todd 8 in 1959, Don Haddow 8 in 1985 and Graham Moss 6 in 1977.

Who were the most successful 'rookie' coaches?

Ross Hutchinson (EP, 1937) and Graham Campbell (WP) 1975) both won 16 games and a premiership. Bradley Smith (EF) 1979) had 17 wins and the flag. Steve Marsh (EF, 1957), Ross Smith S, 1973) and Mal Atwell (P, 1966) all had 18 wins first up and the title.

But the rookie must be Clive Lewington, the Bulldogs coach in 1950 with 21 wins including the grand final.

In 1968, Graham Farmer, a rookie coach at West Perth saw his charges win 18 games and didn't even play off in the big one.

GOAL FEAT

MICK Rea becomes the third player to head the goal-kicking ladder from a team that finished in seventh place. He joins Austin Robertson (Subiaco) with 89 goals in 1962 and Frank Hopkins (West Perth) with 79 goals in 1930.

GROUNDS

THE grounds disputes with the Perth City Council has at long last come to a head, ironically in the 100th year of football. Disputes relating to ground charges and rentals have been running almost as long as the game itself.

Probably the two years when the ground issue was at its worst was in 1907 when all league football was played at the show grounds, North Fremantle Oval or at Midland Junction.

The other year was 1940, the second year of World War II. Perth Oval and Leederville Oval was closed and a commentator of the day said: "The

grounds war has also been before the public with the league definitely in the box seat.

"Even Hitler is not as greedy as the Perth City Council, which demands that the league should accept conditions that would be regarded as preposterous anywhere else in Australia".

LONG AGO

IT IS 10 years since Swan Districts and West Perth met in their only senior football final, the second semi of 1975 (W.P. 20.22 d S.D. 8.16). They did meet in the first semi final of the restricted age competition in 1943 (S.D. 10.17 d W.P. 9.20).

FINALS RECORD

THE Page McIntyre system of deciding finals was first used in 1931, so how have the winners fared in those 54 first semi-finals??

Well, 20 of the 54 made it through to the grand final and 10 went premiers.

The first team to win three finals was East Perth in 1936, then South Fremantle in 1954, Perth 1955, East Fremantle 1957, Swan Districts 1963, Claremont 1964, East Fremantle 1965, Perth 1976, East Fremantle 1979 and Swan Districts 1983.

But in all sincerity, it was a fine tribute to a man who will retire in 12 months from Perth, the club he has served as a player and administrator for 46 years — and from the game that he has given his working life to at club, League and State level.

I have appreciated and respected his assistance, both when I was a player and a coach and some of his highlights of those 46 years include:

- Playing league football.
- Reaching the 100 game milestone.
- Perth's 1955 premiership, first for 48 years.
- Manager of the winning WA carnival side in Brisbane, 1961.
- Successful administrator with the Mal Atwell era in the 60's, including three premierships and then Ken Armstrong in '76 and '77.

Jack did make one controversial comment. He believes that given the coaching methods and techniques of today, the teams of the 50's and 60's would just tip out the current day players.

BIG 100

CONGRATULATIONS to Mick Rea on kicking 100 goals for the season. It is certainly a great achievement for a player who has battled through league football over the years. It is disappointing that Rea wasn't able to show the consistency, concentration and application to his football in previous years. This year he has used his major assets of marking and body strength in the packs to hold front position to full advantage and has been very much more TEAM orientated. Like many other, he benefited from the change last year and returned to league football knowing this was probably his last opportunity and had corrected his previous mistakes.

YOUNG TIGERS

TWO young Claremont players who have made their league debut in the past two weeks in John Hutton (two games) and Mal Thomson (one game) are to be congratulated after sustaining injuries which kept them out for half the season. Hutton has come through the colts and reserves, but missed 10 weeks with a medial ligament strain of the knee. Thomson is up from reserves, having missed 11 weeks with a broken scaphoid bone in his wrist. Both players acquitted themselves well in their league appearances and will be part of a new-look Claremont next season.

WELL DONE JACK

ONE of the many support personnel who make up a league football club are the property staff. Last Saturday was Claremont's head property man Jack Watkin's last game, after 27 years at Claremont. He has seen the highs and lows at Claremont, including two premierships, many finals and has also been involved with State teams. Like all good property men, he had a great rapport with the players — but the socks and laces were always kept under lock and key!

WORTHY WINNER

EAST Fremantle centreman Murray Wrensted is certainly a very worthy winner of this year's Sandover Medal. He has been a consistent performer for East Fremantle right from the day he joined the club from Geraldton three years ago. He has been rewarded for his skillful, hardworking displays in the centre and joins an elite band of centreman to win the medal.

But on Monday night, WAFL chairman Vincent Yovich put a different slant on the matter when he said that the League had decided to dispense with the money because of the prestigious nature of the award.

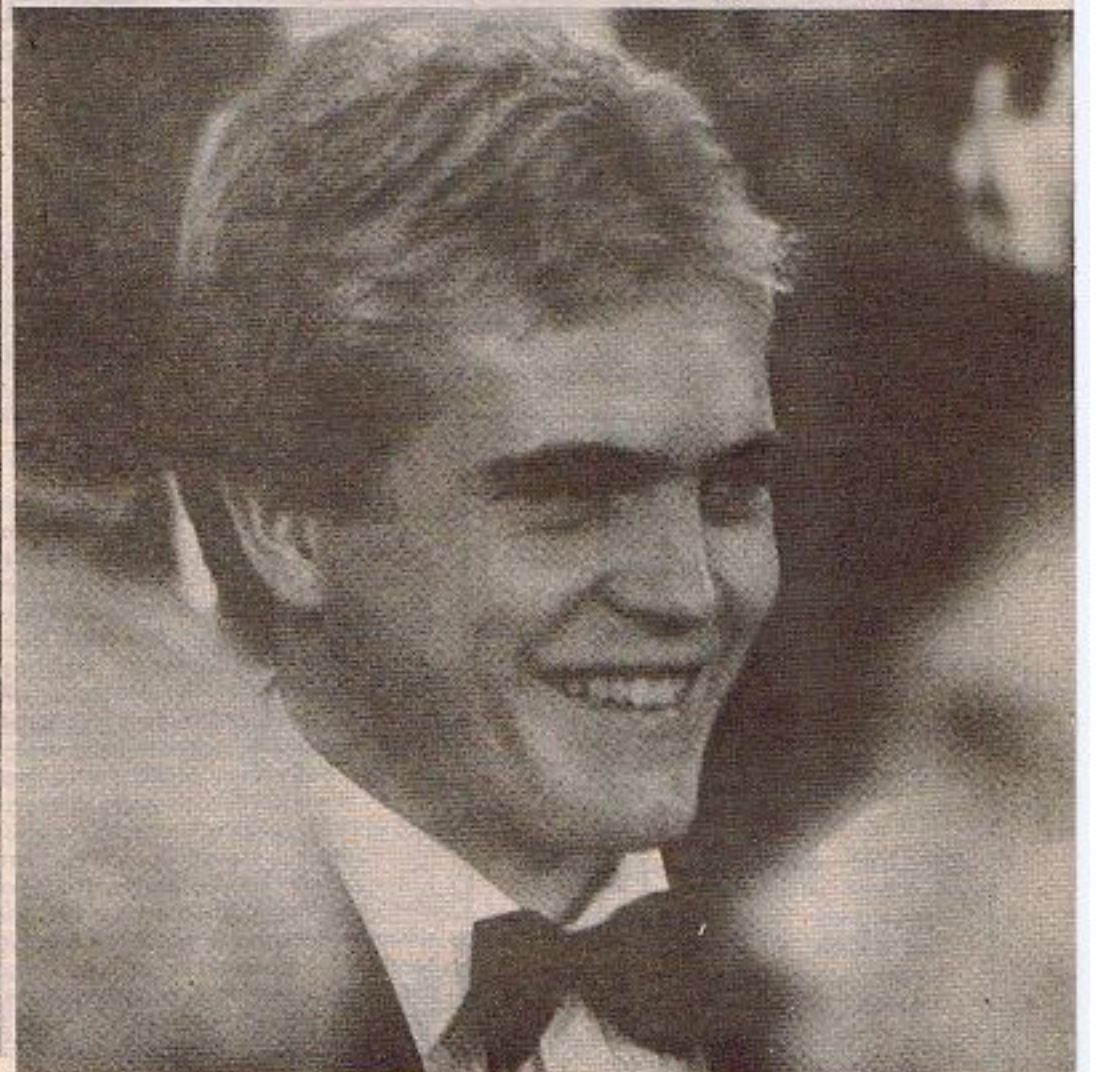

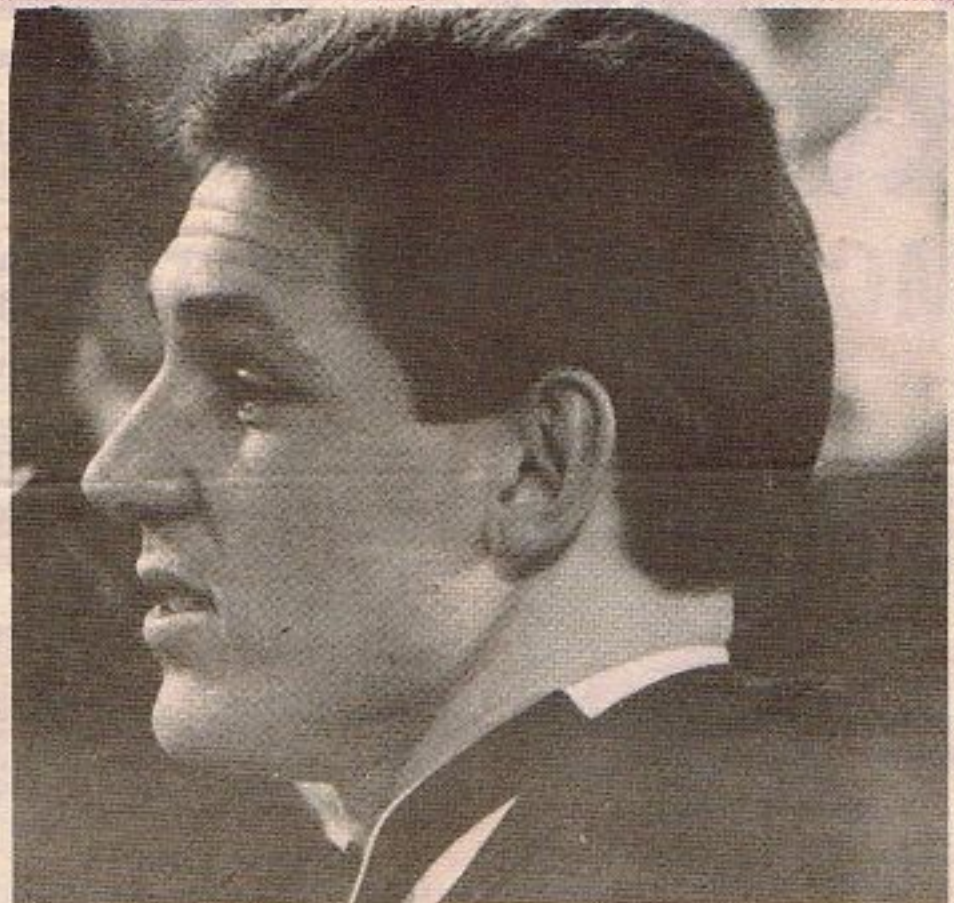

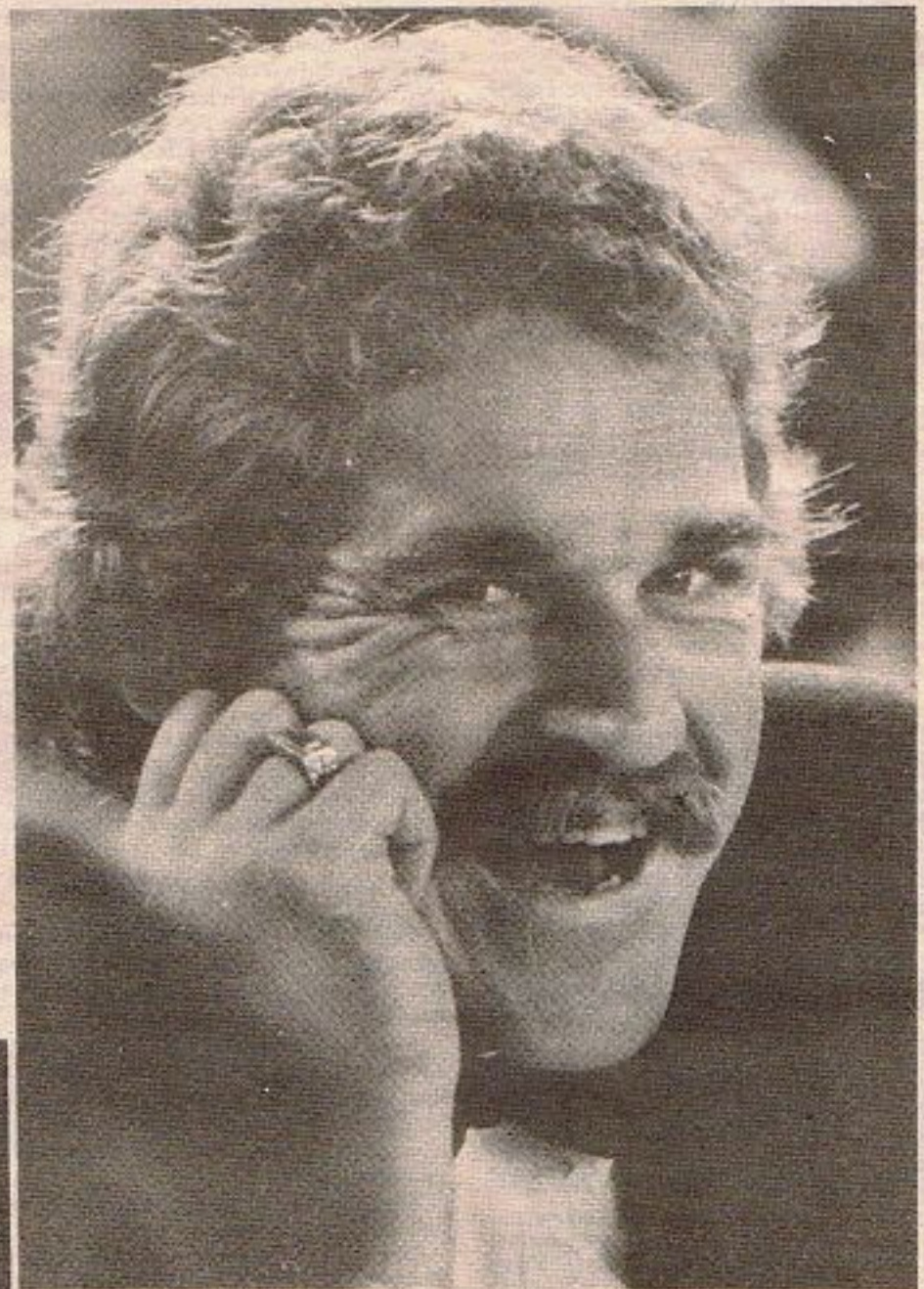

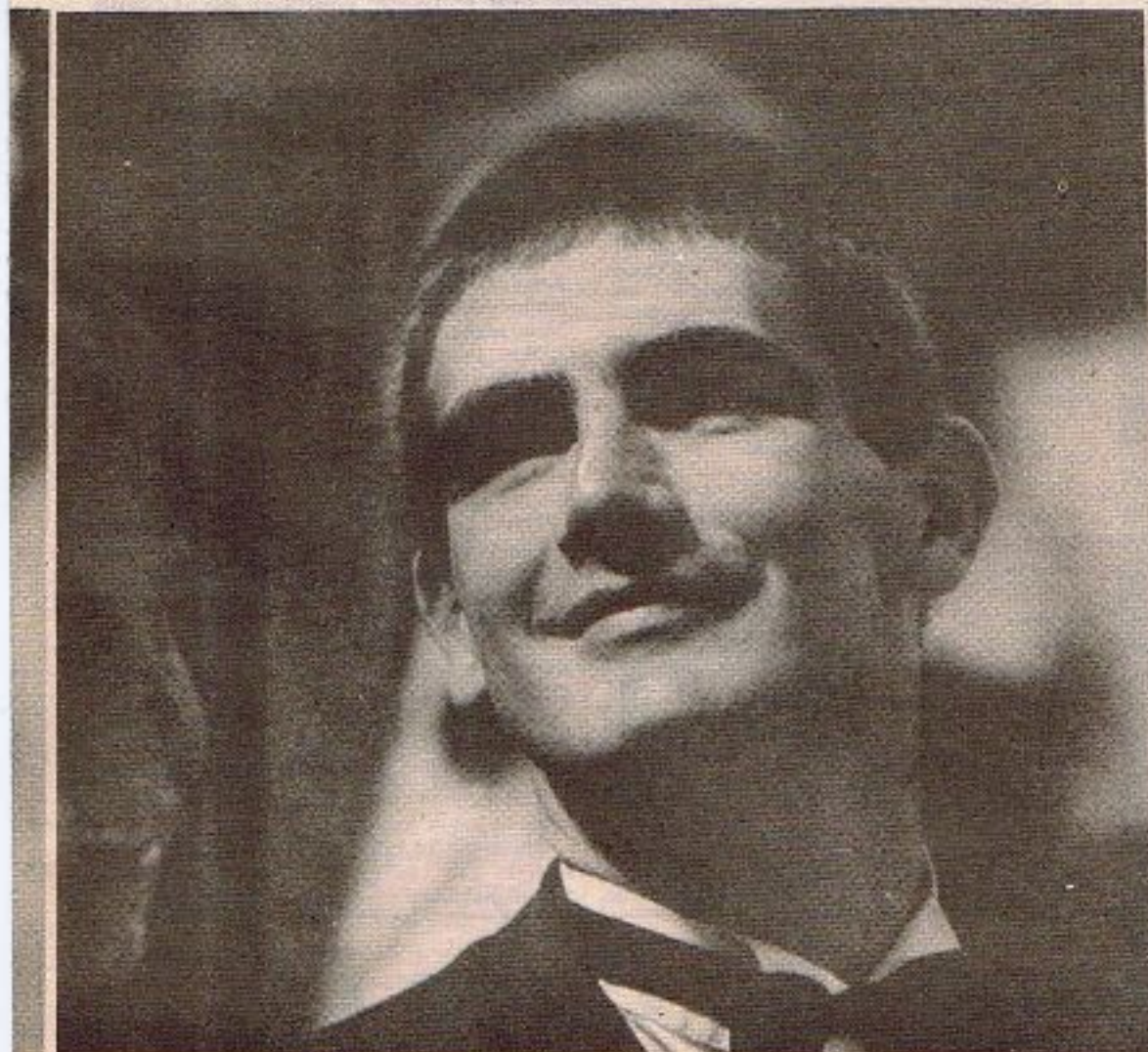

BALL WAS OUT ON THE FULL

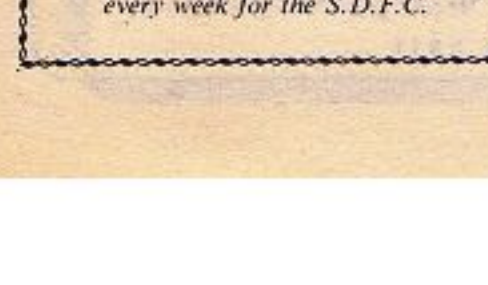
