# ROCKY KO'd

## Bradmore's message paid off

**"WE don't want any 'Rockys' at West Perth."**

Those were the stinging words from Falcons coach John Wynne that transformed the inconsistent Phil Bradmore into the most improved player in the WAFL last season.

The remarkable football rags-to-riches story saw the star centre-half-forward gain State selection and win his club's fairest and best award, and he has opened 1986 up in similar style.

"John told me straight out that he wasn't interested in my spaceman-like antics," Bradmore now recalls.

"He told me to cut them out and concentrate on football — or I would have no chance of playing league football at West Perth again."

It is history now that Bradmore did take his coach's advice and with sensational results.

Several other factors also contributed to the quietly spoken postman's dramatic success, not the least his living arrangements.

"Before the 1985 season I was sharing a house with three other guys and life was one big party," he said.

"Just before the season I moved in with my then fiancee Jedda.

"This arrangement settled me down and the late nights out raging were restricted to Saturday's after matches."

Wynne has been an important factor in Bradmore's change of football fortunes.

"John has taught me to believe in myself and he has given me confidence by constantly talking and encouraging me."

"He also told the other players to make me the focal point in the forward line and this system seemed to work."

Bradmore believes this season will be even tougher for him and he is looking forward to the challenge.

"I expect to receive some closer attention from opposition backmen this season, which will make my job harder."

This was certainly the case in the first half last Saturday against Perth, when new Demons centre-half-back Stephen Mount played Bradmore very close.

But as Mount and many other defenders will find this season, it is difficult to keep this forward out of the action for long.

# WHAT THEY SAID

"The Umpires Association rejects the send-off rule and will umpire only in accordance with the laws as set down in the NFL's law book."

## BOOTING WITH THE BREEZE

### MEMORY TIME

THERE were some familiar voices calling the kicks when Channel 7 introduced their flashback segment on last Sunday's World of Football show. The 1964 grand final film clip featuring East Fremantle's Ted Banks had Brian Thirley and Bob Miller calling the action and the 1973 grand final showing Subiaco taking the flag had Neil Garland and Bob Miller. So where are those voices now? Thirley has stepped down from 6PR this year after a long and outstanding service behind the football microphone, as has Miller, whose role at Channel Seven has come to an end after 21 years. Garland is in semi-retirement with the withdrawal from football of radio 6IX.

### SAME AGAIN

AND on the same topic... viewers must be confused at times when they see where certain commentators have switched stations, but then they turn on their television or radio and nothing seems to have changed. The big switch this season was the move of ABC sports-caster Dennis Cometti to Channel 7 to head up their football, taking Eric Sarich and Grant Dorrington along with him as match comments exports. They made their debut on Channel 7's match-of-the-day coverage from the East Fremantle-Subiaco game. But then those loyal ABC viewers who flicked on to Aunty's football on Saturday night suddenly found the familiar voices of Cometti and Sarich together again as Channel 2 used Seven's film of the match.

### MULTI-CULTURAL

FOOTBALL is certainly a multi-cultural sport and there's no bar to any of our foreign migrants taking up the game. It might be Australia's own sport, but it certainly appeals to other nationalities — as a survey of last weekend's opening teams will verify. Pity the poor commentator the day that Perth's Joe Santostefano lines up on Claremont's Renato Dintinosante. Then there are newcomers like Jerry Toutountzis, Steven Sadowski, George Ventouras, Mark and Matt Sambrailo, Franz Allardyce, Rex Carlshausen and Andrew Tigchelaar. We've got used to the old names like Chris Stasinowsky, George Michalczyk, Mark Zanotti, John Zaikos, Steve Malaxos, Warren Mosconi, Alex Ishchenko, Angello Del Borello and Bill Skwirowski. Now it

seems as though we could have a whole new generation of "foreigners" in our ranks.

### LADIES DAY

FOOTBALL opened with a blaze of glory last weekend — and not only on the field, with action aplenty. The crowds really stormed the turnstiles and one of the most pleasing features was the way club fans turned out in a strong sign of loyalty. Many ladies, particularly, adorned their clothing with scarves (despite the heat), ribbons and club-coloured cushions. And it was interesting to notice the obvious signs of loyalty in the colours worn by the VIP ladies, those well-dressed sponsors' wives and so forth who were in the grandstands or the presidents' boxes. It's good to see a touch of fashion at the footy.

### HANDBALL HAPPY

BIG West Perth ruckman Kim Rogers is certainly a man mountain when it comes to breaking open the packs and using his strength. The farmer from Tammin might not feature in the kick-getting statistics at the end of the day, but he certainly gets his hands on the ball plenty of times. Against Perth, Rogers only recorded one kick, but had 21 hit-outs and 10 handpasses. Some of his handpassing from in the middle of a pack, where he literally forced a passage through the opposition to clear the ball out, was brilliant. In fact, the way he took clean possession at the ruck duels and then handballed out into the open was reminiscent of the great Polly Farmer.

### WILY WILEY

THAT magnificent match-saving goal from Perth's Robert Wiley gave the Demons a valuable two premiership points when victory seemed to have eluded them. The right-foot snap back over his shoulder from about 35-metres out was almost identical to the kick Wiley produced at Adelaide's Football Park back in 1984 when Western Australia snatched an exciting one-point win over South Australia. The kick that time only produced a point, but that was all WA needed. Last Saturday, with the Demons trailing by six points, Wiley had to record the maximum — and he did. The goal also earned Wiley \$100 as the Town and Country WA goal-of-the-day on Channel 7's World of Football.

## HIGH PROFILE

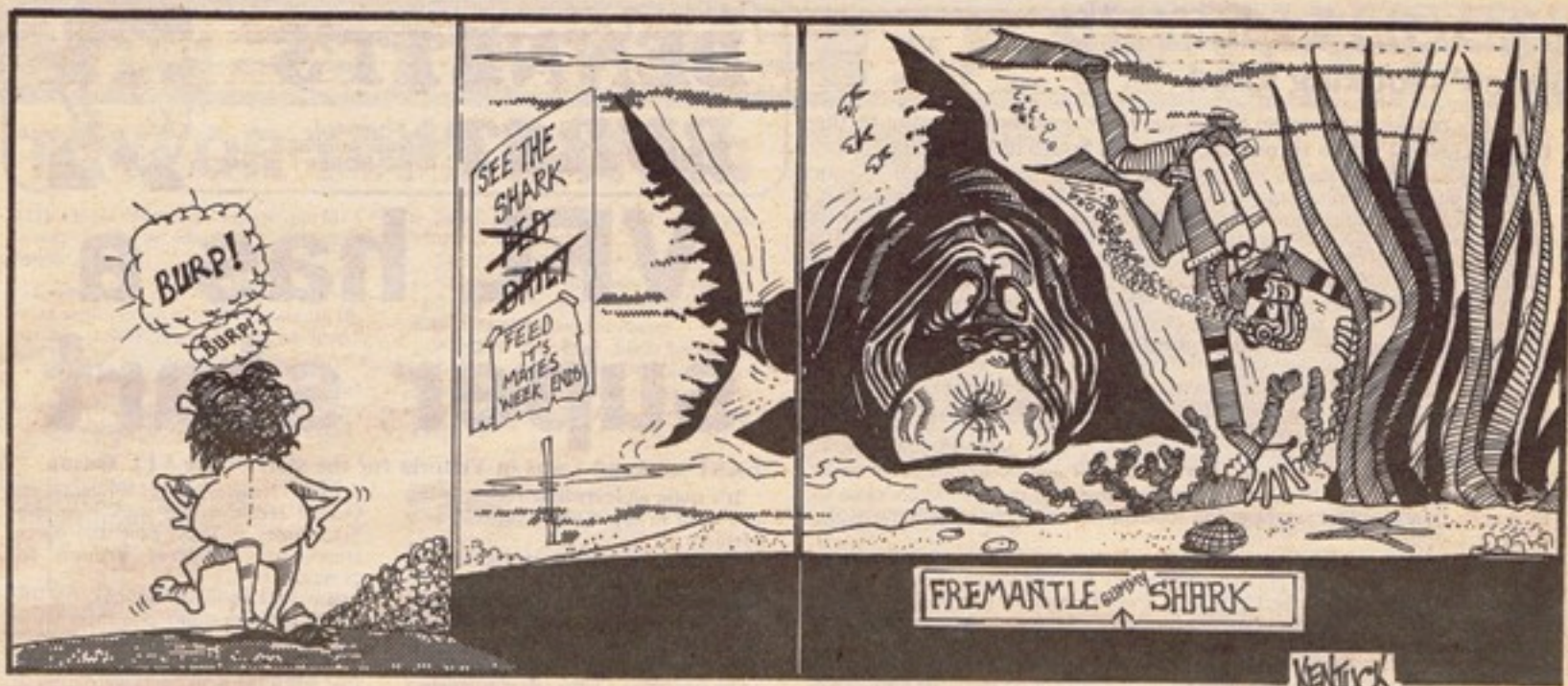
FEW first-game players have received as much after-match exposure as Subiaco's Ian Dargie, a 22-year-old North Beach amateur player who graduated to league ranks against East Fremantle last week. Dargie was in the thick of the heated moments, showing plenty of coolness when he was ruffled up — and plenty of aggression when it came to letting a couple of Sharks rivals know that he was no greenhorn rookie. His father David Dargie just happened to be the boxing instructor at East Fremantle and though he was naturally concerned that his son would do well in his debut, there was no love lost in the camp as the two clubs clashed. Dargie showed that he could handle himself — he was a former boxer who notched plenty of wins in amateur ranks before heading to football. But his great debut had a sour ending — a two-week holiday from the tribunal.

The previous record was Subiaco's, who has 179 kicks against the Bulldogs on June 11, 1983. Swans hold the record for the most kicks in a game. They totalled 278 against East Fremantle — ironically also on June 11, 1983.

## Electronic battle almost as good as the footy

THE on-field battle lines were drawn over Easter — and so too were the off-field duels in the media.

As football clubs were busy recruiting and dispensing, — radio and television stations were equally assiduous preparing for the 1986 season.

Channel Seven made by far the most sweeping changes, channeling much of their effort into Saturday afternoon.

Well they might, as Channel Two is pitting VFL football against 7's local

product for a significant part of the afternoon.

Newcomers to the Seven scene are Dennis Cometti (from the ABC), Wally Foreman (WAIS director), Eric Sarich and Grant Dorrington (both ABC), Bruce Monteath and Tony Buhagiar (just retired after distinguished playing careers), Percy Johnson (back after a year's break) and radio wizard Bob Maumill (6PR).

Those not at Channel Seven for one reason or another include Tim Flynn, Bob Miller, Wayne Harvey, Marty McDonnell, Fred Woods, John Hayes and Trevor Sprigg.

Seven will telecast the last quarter of one match from 4pm each Saturday as well as highlights of another match straight afterwards. The Big League replay is at 5pm and then there's a post-mortem panel show from 5.30.

Up against this line-up, Channel Two presents Tim Lane's VFL replay and panel show between 5.30 and 6.30 ... followed by John Bell hosting a local football replay.

The ABC has decided to stick basically to the names and faces we've been accustomed to over the years with George Grjusich and Ken Casellas heading up the TV team and Ian Brayshaw, John O'Connell (6NR) and Ken Armstrong on the radio call, backed up by around-the-groundsman David Dyson, Ray Lawrence and Tony Parentich.

Sunday on television is again catering for footy fans with Seven screening football replays from 9.30 and live Sydney Swans games whenever they are playing in the Harbour city.

Channel Two has local footy at 8am and the ever popular Winners at 5.55pm.

All this, plus several previews will give football plenty of exposure. Whether that's too much exposure, WAFL turnstiles will reveal.

## Plenty of talent misses out

RADIO has undergone great change over the summer with the most significant difference being the decision by 6IX to do what other music stations, 6PM and 6KY, did a few years ago — discontinue ball-by-ball descriptions of football.

So this leaves 6PR, 6NR and the ABC to describe the footy.

Back on PR again are John K. Watts and Bob Cribb, joined by Trevor Sprigg, while Frank Sparrow has gone to 6NR replacing John O'Connell, recruited by the ABC.

John Hayes, Kim Hagdorn and Chubby Stiles have also gained 6NR guernseys this year.

With all the change, there's still a wealth of talent in front of the camera and behind the microphone.

I might add there's also no shortage of top commentators and analysts who no longer hold positions with the electronic media.

Too often these people are the scapegoats for amateurish production and these days viewers and listeners are no fools.

If the production techniques have been overhauled as diligently as the front men are, then we are in for a very slick year indeed and football will be the winner.

## WESTSIDE COMMENT

### Seven's looking good

FULL marks to Channel Seven for their new-look opening to the football season with a revamped World of Football last Sunday.

The opening of the season had been clouded — almost submerged — with political infighting dominating the build-up to last week's bounce-down. Fortunately, the opening stanza of football was of a sufficiently high quality to make the wait since last year's grand final well worthwhile.

Channel 7, who also had spent a summer embroiled in politics with a complete revamp of their football personnel, opened up on Sunday with the polished Dennis Cometti as captain-coach. Newcomers to Seven's team included football veterans Eric Sarich, Grant Dorrington and Percy Johnson, radio "ocker" Bob Maumill and newcomer Bruce Monteath, fresh from the player's ranks.

Cometti, Sarich, Dorrington and Johnson have all had playing and coaching experience; while Monteath joins the media after a long and distinguished career.

Maumill? Well, there's few louder supporters of football and even though he never advanced further than a back pocket for Hamilton Hill (or somewhere close to Fremantle Oval) he does represent the football paying public; Joe Blow of the outer, so to speak.

With due respect to previous panels, Seven's opening burst on Sunday was a smooth-running affair with enough controversy to keep viewers on their toes, plus plenty of replay action; better-quality, it would seem, on past years.

The flashback segment featuring old film clips of memorable moments fitted in magnificently with today's action and the two Tim Wornor specials — an interview with West Perth rookie Sean King and a piece on David Dargie, the boxing coach father of Subiaco's Ian Dargie — both got down to the nitty-gritty of football behind-the-scenes.

But the show wasn't without its stumbling blocks. Several times Cometti was left staring at the camera after introducing a new segment and somehow some Gloucester Park trotting got into the act when it should have been film of King being interviewed.

Button-pressing, it seemed, was not all that smooth. There were flashes of heated moments as Maumill, as only he can do, stirred up people like Ron Alexander and several promising verbal fisticuffs were nipped in the bud, maybe a little prematurely.

What the show needs to help football generate new enthusiasm is plenty of fast-moving action, both in football replays and verbal stouthing on camera.

They should, however, watch a couple of little flaws.

No-one explained, for example, why Seven's panel of experts voted 7-6-5-4-3-2-1 instead of the normal 3-2-1 or even the Saudover Medal system of 5-4-3-2-1.

And hopefully they can get their production people spelling footballer's names right. Surely players like Chris Stasinowsky and John Gavranich have been around long enough to have their names spelt correctly.

# VFL has a super start

LAST weekend I was in Victoria for the start of the VFL season.

It's quite an incredible feeling being in a town so hyped up on football as is Melbourne.

Coaches and players are treated like superstars. The big talking point was whether the Sydney Swans and Carlton could buy success. In the case of the Swans the answer seems to be a resounding yes. Carlton? Well that remains to be seen after a lethargic start against arch rivals Hawthorn.

It's interesting to note that a commentator said after the game that former South Fremantle star Jon Dorotich might "just make it".

IN WA, the Krakouer brothers were nothing short of sensational, but they aren't having it all their own way for North Melbourne in the VFL.

On Monday I went to the MCG to see the VFL's \$6 million team, the Sydney Swans, open their much-publicised season.

If money can buy a premiership then the Swans are halfway there.

They had little trouble disposing of North Melbourne and while they have a long way to go before they can be considered a serious premiership challenger to Essendon, it is obvious they will be a definite finals contender.

But then that's not surprising. They have picked up some of the VFL's top players.

Merv Neagle, Greg Williams and Gerard Healy would walk into most State sides. They gave the Swans tremendous impetus around the ground.

But back to the Krakouers. The umpires don't give them an inch...and neither do their opponents.

It was noticeable against the Swans that when the Krakouers were firing so were North Melbourne.

Early in the game North looked as though they would run right over the top of the Swans. But then the Krakouers just disappeared.

When they came back into the game after half-time North lifted, but by then they had conceded an eight goal lead and the match.

It puts enormous pressure on a club when the skills of a couple of players can make the difference between a good side and an ordinary side.

But then the Krakouers have always been like that.

While Collingwood appeared to toss in the towel after half-time, the simple fact is Essendon were so much more superior.

No amount of trying is going to beat a team that has too much talent.

## FOOTBALL FACTS

With DAVE CLEMENT  
WA's top football historian.

HAS the era of the playing coach finally ended?

This season is the first time in the league's history where we started off with eight non-playing coaches.

It was 1971, 15 years ago, that South Fremantle and West Perth last had a playing coach, Hassa Mann and Graham Farmer.

Perth's last playing coach was Barry Cable in 1973 and Cable was also East Perth's last in 1979.

Swans last captain coach was Stuart McGee 10 years ago and Brian Douge was at Subiaco in 1978.

So last year's playing coaches Graham Moss and Ron Alexander may prove to be the last of the breed.

In the last 30 years the successful coach on 19 occasions has been a playing coach. Victoria phased out the on-field coach years ago.

The last time two playing coaches met in a Victorian grand final was when Richmond (Jack Dyer) and Fitzroy (Fred Hughson) did battle in 1944.

Since then there have been 13 grand finals involving two captain coaches; the last in 1971 when West Perth (Graham Farmer) played East Perth (Mal Brown).

In a football state now known for long coaching contracts, John Todd and Graham Moss established some sort of a record this year. Both are in their 10th successive season with their respective club which betters Jack Sheedy's nine years straight at East Perth 1956-64 and Clive Lewington's run at South Fremantle 1950-58.

The most number of successive years a player has captained a league side is seven. Jack Sheedy, who was East Perth's on-field leader from 1956-1962, shares this feat with Claremont's Graham Moss (1977-83) and Swans Bill Walker (1969-1975) and

now the Falcons skipper Les Fong joins them on seven straight.

When Sharks coach Ron Alexander retired as a player he became the third 300-game plus footballer to finish after playing in a grand final.

Graham Farmer achieved this in 1971. The other player was not as fortunate as Alexander and Farmer, he was the Collingwood legend Gordon Coventry, the first man to play 300 games in Australia. His last game was the grand final in 1937 in which his team went down to Geelong.

IN the post-war era of league football (1945 onwards) a drawn game in the first set of fixtures has occurred only three times.

Ironically West Perth have been involved in all of them — last week's at Lathlain Park; on April 16, 1960 also at Lathlain Perth (Perth 13.6 to West Perth's 11.18 with Ken Armstrong's goal after the siren) and in 1969 when Claremont and the Falcons scored 13.13 each.

TV viewers who watch The Winners on Sunday nights will find a regular missing from the VFL scene.

Aboriginal umpire Glen James has hung up his whistle after reaching the top. Another top umpire in Kevin Smith has also retired, robbing the VFL panel of its two most experienced umpires.

Claremont kicked a record score against South Fremantle and a record winning margin last Monday. East Perth also set some sort of record — their 22.14 is that club's highest losing score.

Craig Edwards is not the number one knock ruckman at South, but youngster Peter Dennett showed after half-time against Claremont that he is worth persevering with.

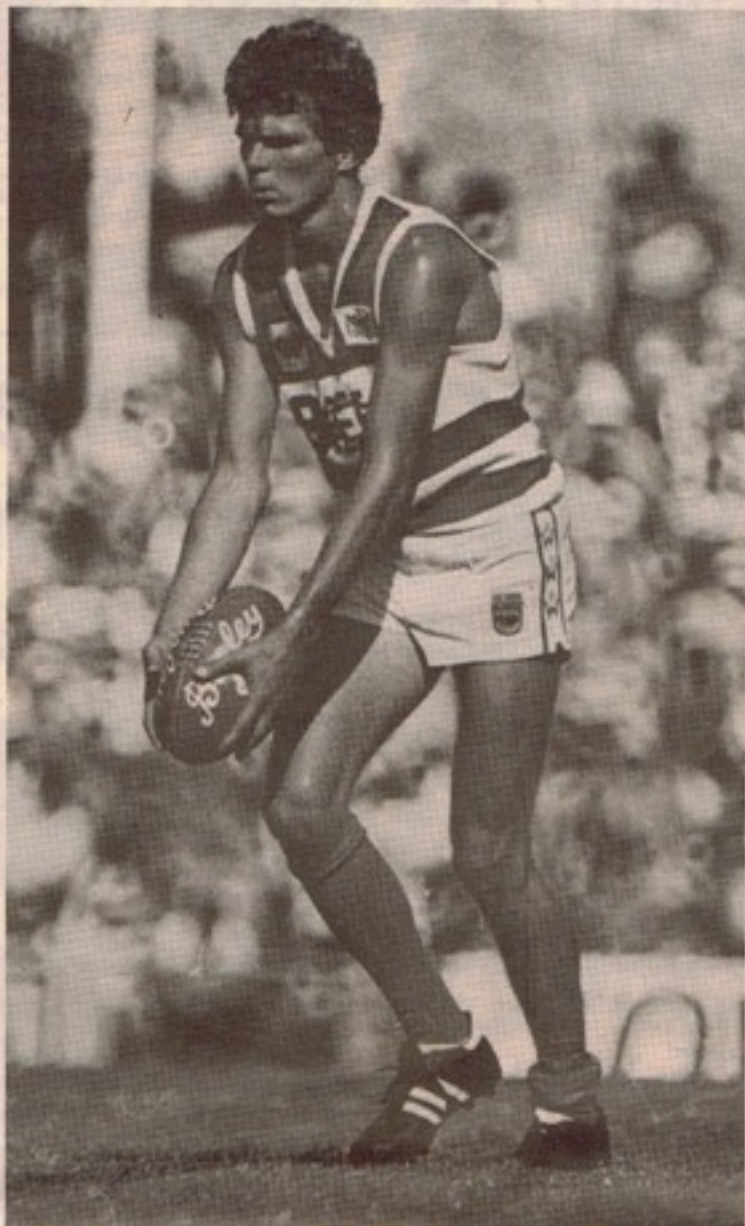

However, neither player could establish themselves permanently at Subiaco, with Dean switching to South Fremantle last year after 24 games with the Lions and Paul following him this year after 14 Subiaco games.

Another set of Mandurah brothers will probably make their name in city WAFL ranks this year — but, ironically again, not with Souths.

Bill and Stephen Monaghan have moved up from Mandurah this year to join Subiaco, having been tied to the Lions under their old country zoning scheme. Bill made an impressive debut for Subiaco last week and Stephen is reportedly not far away.

## FOOTY FANS

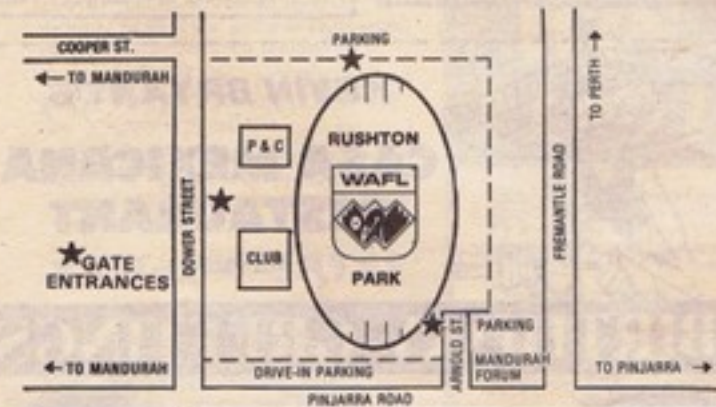

# SOUTH BUNBURY RULE THE ROOST

SOUTH Bunbury have long held the title of the most traditional and successful of all the clubs in the strong, widespread South West National Football League.

Their clash with Sunday Football League premiers Kalamunda at Mandurah this weekend will be yet another test of strength for the side that has reigned supreme in the SW for two years.

Souths won the 1985 grand final, going through the season undefeated to notch back-to-back flags after their premiers triumph in 1984.

They are one of the oldest clubs in the SW — going back to 1897 — and they have won 57 flags in their long and colourful history.

Their home ground at Hands Oval, in Bunbury, has also been recognised as the headquarters of SW football and it is fitting that South Bunbury is the club most qualified for this clash-of-the-premiers, the inaugural game against the champions of the new-look Sunday Football League.

Souths have produced many champion players for the WAFL — East Fremantle's Sandover Medallist David Hollins, former East Perth and Carlton star Syd Jackson, Swan Districts and Essendon premierships player Leon Baker; West Perth's Merv Kennedy and East Fremantle's Allen Prosser, to name some of the more prominent players.

The champion team that has taken Souths to two consecutive flags is sure to produce more stars.

Gerard McNeil, now East Perth's full-time football manager, was captain-coach of those two brilliant sides and he says they were full of talent — both young and old.

"We had a lot of experienced key players in the side," says McNeil.

"Players like ruckman Peter Old (the SW's Hayward Medal winner in 1984), rover Wayne Watterson and full back Peter Upson were real stalwarts.

"Upson was my vice-captain and he's a tower of strength. He's about 27 and could still easily play league football in the city if he wanted to. He went about things in the opposite direction to most players. He came to Perth for his education and then went back to Bunbury and that's where he has stayed."

A number of last year's players are destined for city football this year — with youngsters like Brad McDougall and Tony Wynd going to South Fremantle; Gavin Thornton and Finton Maguire to Swan Districts and Ray Ewen to West Perth.

McNeil, who led South Bunbury from the centre-half-back position, says that the club's tradition in Bunbury and the South West was something to really feel proud about.

"Some outstanding people have been part of the club over the years," says McNeil.

"Club patron Ernie Manca was a former president and prominent Bunbury identities like Sav Davies and Ross Ranson have long been involved with the club."

South Bunbury's major sponsor, Spencer Motors, led the way with club sponsorship.

The team has been strengthened this year despite the drain of players to the city.

Former Swan Districts player Peter Hodyl replaces McNeil as captain-coach and he will prove to be an outstanding player in SW football.

Danny Platts, a former South Bunbury product, returns to the club after several years with Swan Districts and strong defender Glen Boyd has switched over from Carey Park.

Club president Greg Mason is confident that Souths can reproduce their top-class football this season.

The red-and-whites won back-to-back flags in 1980-81, but then slipped a little before returning to the winners' dais in 1984.

Everyone at the club is working to avoid a repeat of that 1982 lapse, albeit a temporary one.

# FEAST OF SPORT FOR MANDURAH

THERE is a feast of sport lined up for Mandurah with the WAFL match between South Fremantle and Perth just one of the highlights.

An estimated 50,000 people are tipped to visit Mandurah over the week for a sporting program that has a number of major attractions.

The action starts on Sunday, April 6 with the league match and is followed by:

\* **Racing:** The nearby Pinjarra Race Club will host the annual round featuring the Heytesbury Oaks on Tuesday and the Pinjarra Cup on Thursday.

\* **Pacing:** The Pinjarra Trotting Club hosts their annual Pinjarra Cup on Wednesday.

\* **Greyhounds:** The progressive Mandurah greyhound track will host their weekly greyhound racing on Friday night.

\* **Drag racing:** The Ravenswood International Raceway (halfway between Mandurah and Pinjarra) is the nation's best and there will be plenty of hot action there on Saturday night to wind up the week.

In addition, there will be motor cycling around the streets, a pentathlon relay, a golf event, big bowls action at one of the State's top bowling clubs and plenty of social entertainment.

Danny Hillin, the secretary-manager of the Mandurah Football and Sportsmen's Association, says that Rushton Park will cater for a crowd of 10,000 with plenty of room to spare.

"The local council has really come to the party," says Hillin.

"They have spent \$43,000 on providing banking around the ground to cater for spectators to watch the match in comfort and there has been a lot of extra seating installed."

Rushton Park is home for the Mandurah Football Club and is certainly one of the best playing surfaces outside the city WAFL grounds.

In fact, the surface is probably as good as anything the South Fremantle team will play on this season after the poor preparation Fremantle Oval has had.

## REPUTATIONS ON THE LINE

SUNDAY football reputations go on the line on Sunday at Rushton Park in Mandurah.

# Our critics have their say

## MOTHER BROWN

### POOR COVER IN COUNTRY

I SPENT the Easter weekend in Wandering and I was surprised at the total lack of interest in league football up here — and I don't believe the situation was helped on Saturday.

I turned on the television and watched a direct telecast of the West Perth-Perth clash at Lathlain Park and that was tremendous. But I was also interested to hear how things were going in the East Fremantle-Subiaco game.

I turned on the radio and the ABC broadcast game was also Perth-West Perth. The same situation occurred on Monday. Surely the radio and television stations could make an agreement so that country people are not disadvantaged. Perhaps that would resurrect their interest in league football.

#### BAD DECISION

I CAME home from Wandering on Monday and was too late to get to the Claremont-South Fremantle game, but it was refreshing to listen to 6NR and hear the comments of Frank Sparrow and Geoff Christian. They both have a wide knowledge of the game and I enjoyed it. However, I think something needs to be done to get four games broadcast. Football is severely disadvantaged by the 6IX decision not to cover football.

#### COUNCIL BATTLE

ONE of the hottest off-field battles over the summer break evolved around the Claremont City Council and the Claremont Football Club. The council wanted more for allowing football to be played in their district. However, a couple of regular football followers called me during the week and told of how conditions at Claremont are still ordinary. They said it was so dry on the outer that a dropped match would have started a fire and that long grass covered the edge of the fence. If the council wants to take more out of football, perhaps they should put more into it.

#### JACKO'S IMAGE

LET'S hope that the Canadians are not taking any notice of Mark Jackson. The VFL, in its wisdom, decided to send Jacko to Canada on a promotional trip, but I have seen the advertisements and I could not believe them. I am sure the Canadians consider him to be typical of the Australian league footballer and that is a blight on the game. Surely the VFL could have thought of someone more appropriate to send.

## Scoreboard fiasco

AFTER enjoying such an exciting climax to the West Perth-Perth clash at Lathlain Park, I was disappointed with the scoreboard fiasco minutes after the match.

I was one of the many spectators totally confused at the final siren when the scoreboard was changed to show that Perth had won the match by one point.

Demons football manager Jack O'Dea was also confused — I saw him head straight to the umpire's room after the match to check the final scores.

It is not the first time that there has been problems with the Lathlain Park scoreboard and it is time the WAFL acted so we don't have a repeat of that outrageous situation.

#### GOOD DEBUTS

I WAS impressed with two debutants at Lathlain Park last Saturday, Sean King from West Perth and new Demons player Craig Smith.

Both players were not overawed by their first games and were strong contributors during the pressure-packed last quarter.

King was criticised last season in the reserves for always kicking the ball and rarely handballing.

## Subiaco's persistency pays off

I CAN recall last year during the finals making a comment about Subiaco's persistence in their game, a characteristic trait of Haydn Bunton's style as a player and a coach.

Naturally, Subiaco were out to avenge last year's grand final defeat, but the over-riding factor in their win last Saturday was their willingness to work hard and persist at their pattern of play all day.

#### PLAYER SUPPORT

I guess in today's football player managers are part and parcel of our game and that is accepted by club administration. But from a few occurrences over the summer period with local players and managers it is disturbing to me that in some cases, the player does not always win. I'm certainly not against football managers but I'm sure some players don't put enough careful thought into their selection. Especially when it comes to whether he will correctly sum up the player's feeling in regard to offers made and also that he will not be misled by that person, particularly in relation to his ability.

From what I have seen in the past, more often than not the player is not at loggerheads with the club over a contract, but with his manager.

In WA football the role of player's advisor is not as prominent as in Melbourne. But when final decisions are made, they must be made by the players.

#### STEVE'S TURNAROUND

I guess former Perth ruckman Steve Turner's debut for VFL club Melbourne last Saturday shows that football definitely is a game of opportunity. But also once given the opportunity, you have to have the confidence and belief in your own ability to succeed.

## FROM WHERE I SIT

### FATHER AND SON

THE "father and son" situation which exists in Aussie Rules is something that I would like to see reviewed with two appropriate changes made.

At present, the son of a footballer who has played 50 games, can automatically go to the club that his father played with. This represents about 2% of participation.

Officials like coaches, doormen, doctors, property men, trainers or you name it, who often serve clubs a lot longer and in more dedicated fashion, aren't accorded the same courtesy. It is high time they were.

Here is an example of just one person who has "given his all" to football. Though his services have been recognised by two life membership honours, he is not destined to see his sons play for the club he has worked for because they are ineligible under the present set-up.

Kevin Smyth played junior football with the Wembley under 16's and was more or less "shanghied" into coaching when no one else volunteered. This was back in 1957 and since then he has compiled a pretty impressive record.

With Wembley under 16's he won four premierships in seven seasons. He then coached Subiaco's combined under 16's for three years and won two titles with them. He followed with four years at the league club, coaching thirds and fourths for a runner-up and a third.

As he lives in Balga, part of West Perth's district, he became involved with the Nollamara under 18's and coached them for three years for a premiership and a second place.

His teams took part in the City Motors Cup for two years for a runner-up one season and defeat in the first semi-final in another. He then coached West Perth's combined 17's for two years.

"Percy" was recognised by both Wembley and Nollamara football clubs with a life membership.

I SUPPOSE you've heard of names such as Leigh Matthews, Peter Knights, Ken Judge, Rod Lester-Smith, Dermot Brereton and Rodney Eade?

"Yes", you'll say, "they are players who have represented the Hawthorn Hawks in the VFL. They've won a couple of pennants and been finalists a number of times in recent years."

Have you heard the names Scott Morgan, Norman Hughes, Jason Sandford, Craig Collie, Lincoln Sullivan or Avon Whitted?

You haven't? Well they were members of the Hainsworth Hawks in 1985, and as any kid who attends that primary school will proudly tell you, the Hainsworth Hawks haven't been beaten for the last six years.

If the Hawthorn Hawks wear their colours with a certain amount of pride, then I have been assured that the Hainsworth Hawks have no less feeling for their team. It is considered a pretty big honour to represent the school and be given the opportunity of keeping the record intact.

Ted Sleight, the school's headmaster, says that the students considered it most prestigious to play for the Hawks.

I asked him if he thought it was having any detrimental effect on the players or the school and he replied: "Anything that builds up self esteem is good. The Hainsworth Hawks have given us all a sense of pride in their achievement even though football is only one part of our overall programme."

McAdam first came under the notice of Claremont officials when playing Teal Cup for the Northern Territory two seasons ago.

They were convinced he could be a valuable acquisition when they had further opportunities to examine his skills when he played with Warratah-Palmerston in the Darwin competition this summer.

As soon as McAdam arrived in Perth and trained with the Tigers, he was included in the league squad for the practice match against Subiaco. He came onto the ground after half-time and his impressive performance on a wing was followed up with another good display against VFL glamour team Carlton.

Victorian recruit **ANDREW KINROSS** also appears to have the class to succeed at league level in WA.

The slightly built rover-wingman was also impressive in pre-season matches and that should ensure he is given further opportunities in the qualifying rounds.

The leading recruit at Claremont this

year, however, is former Perth centreliner **CAM SHEPHERD**.

It is ironic that Shepherd should join Claremont this season. He played all of his junior football in the district, but decided to play with Perth under the father-son rule.

The 25-year-old Shepherd, who broke into league football in 1979, will now combine to provide one of league football's most powerful midfield units. Like Peter Thorne, Peter Davidson, Malaxos, Michael Mitchell, Darrell Panizza and Steven Goulding, he is a prolific kick-getter.

That core of six players holds the key to Claremont's prospects of improving on their disappointing fifth place in 1985.

Because they all have the ability to gather a great number of possessions during a game, opposition teams will find it extremely difficult to blanket their performances.

The Tigers simply need to capitalise in attack on opportunities created by this band of talented players.

And one of the players expected to do this is young centre-half-forward **PETER OWENS**.

Owens has played only three matches in two seasons, but he is ready to emerge as a regular in the Claremont team.

He takes a strong mark and needs only to increase accuracy with his disposal to provide a few problems for opposition defenders this year.

At the other end of the ground Claremont will be looking for two more youngsters to make their mark.

**JOHN HUTTON** and **GUY McKENNA**, yet another Teal Cup prospect, should combine in the last line of defence.

Both were given their first taste of senior football last year and should develop into efficient players.

Hutton played two matches on a half-back flank last season and he showed in pre-season games that he has worked hard over the summer.

McKenna broke into league football almost immediately after helping WA to its first ever Teal Cup success and he played eight games, mainly from a back-pocket.

He is surprisingly cool under pressure for a youngster and has the capacity to fill a number of roles for Claremont.

# Royals are breeding a new band of rookie talent



**THERE** is little a coach can do if he does not have the players available to match some of the best sides in the competition.

And unfortunately for East Perth coach Greg Brehaut that has been the case in his first three seasons at the helm of the Royals.

However, that could be about to change this season.

The Royals have recruited extensively from amateur ranks and their country zone and suddenly there is greater depth in the camp.

Last season East Perth had a disastrous run of long-term injuries which saw key players like Kevin Bryant, Wayne Otway, Mark Blakely, Glenn Bartlett and Alex Ishchenko, as well as newcomers Gary Kohlmann and Bruce Stewart, restricted in their league appearances.

Heading the list of 1986 recruits is former North Melbourne utility player KEVIN MCGUIRE - and he should slot immediately into the royals senior side.

McGuire has good skills on both sides of his body and the ability to play in almost any position on the ground make him a valuable acquisition.

He played 18 games for the Kangaroos and is a strong contender for the centre position in the East Perth camp.

Former Claremont and South Adelaide defender PETER IVANOFF also looms as one of the star recruits.

The uncompromising back-pocket player, who played 14 games with Claremont in 1979 and 1980 and later played 52 games with South Adelaide under current Subiaco coach Haydn Bunton, is suited to the East Perth style of play.

He attacks the ball and while he does not have outstanding skills, he is extremely effective.

Gradually players from Teal Cup ranks are working their way into league football and last year's WA captain PAUL PEOS should continue that trend.

Peos was one of the stars of WA's victory over Victoria in the grand final at Leederville Oval last year, but he played strongly throughout the competition and was rewarded with all-Australian selection.

He is a strongly built youngster who has the capacity to fill a variety of roles. In the Teal Cup he was used in the centre and on a half-back flank and was responsible for consistently driving his side into attack.

Armadale recruit CHRIS SAMPIE could send East Perth fans reminiscing when they watch his exploits this season.

He looks very much like former East Perth champion John McGuire, not just in looks, but also in the way he plays the game.

Sample appears suited to a wing or half-forward flank and like most Aboriginals used the ball with precision and is dangerous around the goals.

Mt Lawley amateurs would be an unlikely breeding ground for league footballers but three new recruits from that club - JUSTIN COOK, BUTCH

BARONI and BRAD DUNN - all appear to have excellent prospects of breaking into senior ranks.

Cook is no stranger to Perth Oval, having played colts and reserves a couple of seasons ago before breaking a collarbone.

That injury saw him sever ties with the Royals, but the State amateur should provide Brehaut with alternatives in attack.

He is tall and mobile and appears suited to centre-half-forward.

Dunn is a utility player in every sense of the word.

He can play anywhere from a back-pocket to a forward pocket and his versatility must increase his prospects of breaking into the East Perth senior line-up.

Baroni is a similar build to Dunn, but he should play most of his football on a wing.

Although not tall, he is strong and aggressive and impressed in pre-season matches.

Former South Bunbury players MURRAY and KEITH WYNNE should add depth to the Royals small brigade.

Originally from Albany, they require clearances from Claremont before they can line-up for the Royals.

Keith won South Bunbury's fairest and best award as a wingman last year,

but he could adjust and play as a rover.

That would place additional pressure on Angelo Del Borrello and Tony Papotto, who are vying for the spot as Wayne Otway's roving partner.

Murray is a half-forward with good skills and he, too, has the potential to develop into a regular league player.

# Kimberley ready to fight back

**THE** low moments in football can be depressingly lonely — so spare a thought for Barry Kimberley.

In Swan Districts' opening match against East Perth on Easter Monday, Kimberley, one of the most honest performers in WA football, put in the worst game of his seven-year career.

The 28-year-old rover had only a meagre four possessions up until the 20-minute mark of the second quarter and, after dropping an easy chest mark when in the clear, coach John Todd dragged Kimberley through the interchange.

I was outside the Swans rooms at half-time and therefore in earshot of the scathing attack the coach launched on his team for their inept performance — and the special burst served on Kimberley.

Now regarded as a senior player at Bassendean, Kimberley was made the scapegoat by Todd. The tactics succeeded because Swans managed an amazing fightback to come from 52 points down at the long break to scramble to a two-point victory.

This stirring win was of little consolation to Kimberley, who was kept away from the action until the final 10 minutes of the game. There was precious little opportunity for Kimberley to redeem himself and despite gaining three kicks and having a steadying influence on Swans play in the crucial dying minutes, he won't rest easy until after this week's match against Claremont.

It will be a long week, however, for Kimberley because come selection time, the hierarchy at Swan Districts will have to find a place in the side for Kevin Caton, who missed the East Perth match for family reasons.

With the apparent injuries and coupled with the debut of No.2 rover Joe Cormack, Kimberley may feel a lit-

tle insecure at the moment. This was unthinkable only two weeks ago given that he was Swans' best player in a practice match against Perth.

Such is the fluctuating fortunes of football.

Kimberley is a fighter and a survivor in league football. He has played 139 games with Perth and Swans since making his debut in 1979.

After four seasons with Perth he transferred to Swan Districts because of contractual problems. It is a move he cannot regret because he has been a member of two premierships sides, winning the Simpson Medal in 1984 for best player afield in the grand final against East Fremantle.

A yardstick for measuring Kimberley's true worth as a league footballer is his consistent high finishes in club fairest and best voting. He has finished in the top five on no less than five occasions in seven years, with his best effort being runner-up to Keith Narkle in Swans 1984 count.

Kimberley can take solace from the fact that he has built a reputation for thriving on hard work and doing the unglamorous things in football like placing his body on the line to win the hard ball.

As is so often the case, one has to experience the hurt to ultimately succeed and although Kimberley has already been through this process, he still has the appetite to stomach another sample.

Whatever the consequences are for his most uncharacteristic performance last weekend, I for one will stand by the man who has had to earn everything he has achieved in football.

**THE** recent controversy over the introduction of the send-off rule in the WAFL colts and reserves has not bothered amateur rankss — it has been used in the Western Australian Amateur Football League since 1947.

In fact, umpires on the WAFL panel have been in control of all WAAFL A-grade matches for the past five seasons.

Many of these umpires have gone on to officiate at all three WAFL levels — league, reserves and colts.

The send-off rule is not new to the majority of colts players, who have played under the rule in junior football in the past few seasons.

The WAAFL has had this rule as part of their laws since 1947, when they became affiliated with the Australian Amateur Football Council.

In the other affiliated amateur com-

petitions in Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania, it has been part of their laws for over 50 years.

The law in the amateur constitution reads thus:

### ORDERING FROM THE FIELD

"In any match, the field umpire shall have the power to order from the field, for such time as he thinks fit, any player for any offence reportable under the laws of the game, and NO such player shall be replaced during the period for which he is ordered from the field. In the event of such player refusing to leave the field, the match shall be awarded to the opposing side."

## WILLETTON LOOM AS FLAG CONTENDERS

SUNDAY Football League premiers Willetton had an early set-back last week when coach Jeff Trott was ruled out of action for six weeks.

The former East Fremantle forward damaged the medial ligaments in his right knee. But at first it looked as though the injury was more serious and might have forced him into retirement.

Trott, who already wears a heavy guard on his left knee as a legacy of repeated problems from his footballing past, was taken from the ground in the opening minutes of a practice match against Armadale.

The Blues have not seen brilliant forward Glen Mitchell at Burrendah Reserve yet. He has just completed a successful interstate and club baseball season where his club Cockburn won the local league championship.

Mitchell will resume training after he gets married this weekend.

Last year's runners-up have lost rugged follower Randall Prowse, who has joined Boyanup-Capel-Dardanup in the South West League, and winger Ray Greenwell and ruckman Peter O'Donnell who have joined Armadale.

The Blues head the unofficial pre-season betting at 5 to 2.



KELMSCOTT should be the big improver in 1986.

The Bulldogs have recruited wisely over the summer and have collected a double bonus in their signing of former West Perth forward Rod Alderton as captain-coach.

Alderton had his league career cut short through a serious knee injury and the Bulldogs are his first coaching assignment.

Since the retirement of champion goal kicker Ray Witt, Kelmscott have not had a forward capable of converting the mid-field efforts of brilliant rover Doug Beattie.

But Alderton adds the potential around the goal mouth that should see Kelmscott improve vastly on their 13th spot on the final 1985 premiership table.

All three proved huge kick getters in SFL ranks last year and with added big man power around the ground they can be expected to again receive a lot of possession.

The Bulldogs are the ones to watch and with new president Barry Chester, there is sure to be an air of professionalism around the club this winter.



ARMADALE are looking to go three steps further up the ladder, but despite constant rumour have ruled out the possibility of former All-

Australian, State and South Fremantle champion Stephen Michael playing with them this year.

Michael was said to be considering playing with the Demons this season, but was in fact training with Munding, further south at Armadale.

The Demons lost the first semi-final last year after coach Rod Barrett had shown true leadership qualities, mixing battles of tactics with the best Sunday football can offer.

However, 1986 sees Barrett without two of his most experienced on-field leaders in Brian Cook and Charlie Tenardi.

Cook has been transferred to Canberra through his job with the Department of Youth Sport and Recreation and Tenardi has retired.

Cook's amazing fitness qualities on the ball and Tenardi's spectacular aerial abilities up forward will be sadly missed by the Demons.

Armadale have not sat still over the off-season where they have enticed East Fremantle physical fitness advisor Peter Gianoli to the club.

Gianoli's stamina and ball gathering potential will greatly offset the loss of Cook.

Armadale have also added former State amateur John Townsend and Greenwell and O'Donnell to the league side for 1986.



KALAMUNDA, premiers for the past two seasons, are sure to produce a solid case as contenders for a third flag.

But the black and whites, under new coach Rod Brown, will find it hard remaining at the top.

The Cougars have lost popular coach Steve Gillespie, who apart from hanging his boots deep in his wardrobe, has taken a selectors role alongside John Todd at Bassendean.

Gillespie will be missed both as an on-field motivator to the Cougars and as a shrewd and deep thinker of football.

And Kalamunda will find the pace of John McGuire, Jeff Davidson and Ric Ellard across the centre hard to replace.

McGuire takes his first coaching appointment with Towns in Narrogin, Davidson has joined Gillespie in retirement and Ellard has settled in at Perth.

But the Cougars remain confident they can make it a third premiership in as many years and have suggested SFL fans keep an eye on Mike Douglas, Peter and Graeme Webb, Matthew Mumme, David Netherway and Joe Pesca as players who will play a big part in the '86 efforts.

"In Victoria games are very congested because of weather/ground conditions. In WA the game is more open because of better such conditions."

Quigley said the MPJFL played grades from 9s to 15s and players wore the "cycling-type helmet."

"Although most players wore helmets it wasn't mandatory, but I have no doubt it gave players much more confidence."

# FOOTBALL CLINIC

A regular feature on football, injuries prepared by the WAFL Trainers' and Propertymen's Association with information taken from the NFL's Trainer's Manual.

## BLISTERS

These are usually acquired at the start of training or after wearing new boots. Prevention—toughening of the skin is affected by applying methylated spirits daily for some weeks. A thin layer of Vaseline to the foot before training or playing is also useful.

Treatment—Cleanse the surface of the blister with methylated spirits or a suitable antiseptic and prick with a sterile needle or one which has been sterilised by being held in an open flame. Allow the blister to drain and treat with an antiseptic such as mercurochrome to prevent infection. Cover with a sterile protective dressing—gauze sponge around the area, for instance—to keep pressure off it. Don't cut away the skin forming the roof of a blister.

Complications—infection. This may be local infection or an ascending lymphangitis in the form of a red streak in the skin radiating from the blister towards an often tender gland in the groin. Once infection has occurred, a medical officer will have to prescribe treatment.

## TOE NAILS

The two main problems associated with toe nails are: (i) Ingrowing; (ii) Haematoma.

Ingrowing toe nails are not effectively treated by trying to cut the corner of the nail off and back into the side border of the nail. A spicule of the nail is left to penetrate the flesh and produce pain and infection.

The application of a thin wisp of cotton wool, placed under the corner of the nail, which can be rolled into a larger piece as improvement occurs, is the simplest form of treatment. Antiseptics are applied to minimise infection. Very severe cases may need surgical treatment—nail removal or excision of part of the nail.

Haematoma beneath the nail is sustained when trauma to the surface occurs e.g. when trodden on, from kicking or when the nail is injured through contact with the inner side of the boot.

Ill-fitting boots can cause this condition. It is treated by the release of the entrapped blood. Heat a paper clip to red hot and gently press on the nail until it burns through, creating a hole to allow blood release and pain relief.

Reheating and re-application may be necessary to achieve full nail penetration. The same can be effected using a sterile needle and slowly easing a hole in the nail.

## PLANTER WARTS

These can sometimes be confused with callouses but are smaller, may not be on an area of pressure and are extremely tender. Treatment by a doctor of chiropodist is usually necessary.

The wart is caused by a virus which can be spread in changerooms with contamination of the floor from an infected foot. Wear thongs when using communal showers.

## PLANTER FASCIITIS

This is pain on the sole near the front part of the heel; usually worse on weight bearing after a period of activity such as first putting the foot to the ground after lying in bed all night.

It is produced by strain of the plantar fascia where it arises from the heel and a tender point is usually able to be found. Treatment is by using a sponge surround to take pressure off this area or in more severe cases refer for medical advice.

## CALLOUSES

These occur on the soles of the feet and toes and are thickened areas of skin on points experiencing frequent pressure and friction. Usually little treatment is necessary but paring or wearing away of the callous by use of an abrasive may be required.

## BRUISED HEEL PAD

A jarring injury causing tenderness of the posterior aspect of the heel. Use a doughnut shaped sponge where the hole is placed beneath the tender area.

Inaccurate kicking marred Souths fightback and the Tigers hung on to win by eight points.

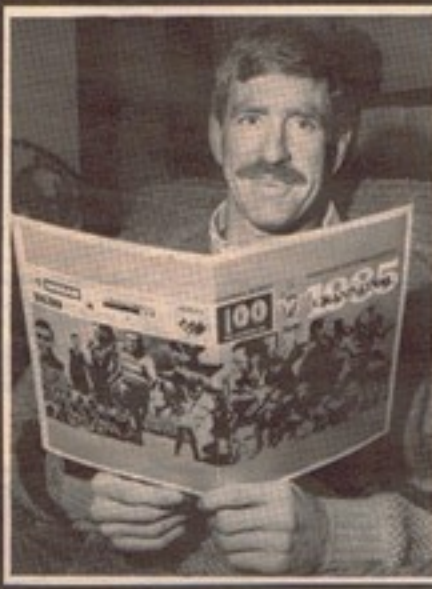
