# Super Shark WYNNE WALKS TALL AFTER FALCONS FIRE

WEST Perth coach John Wynne walked from Leederville Oval by himself some time after Saturday's epic victory — walking tall and well satisfied that he had silenced some critics.

His ferocious Falcons had finally delivered what they had promised all season — exciting football.

Wynne has resisted the criticism about his unorthodox coaching methods and his team's lack of fitness.

He has steadfastly stuck by his philosophies and his team and Saturday's hurricane victory returned some real emotion to the Leederville camp.

Going into the match, West Perth had to win to keep in touch with the final four.

But half-way through the last quarter the players had virtually conceded defeat, both on the scoreboard and in their minds.

But then George Michalczyk, reportedly playing his last game after a lengthy career, plunged headlong into the fray with scant respect for his personal welfare in quest of the ball.

His stretcher departure was the spark that Wynne has been trying to find and the remarkable finish ranks as one of the all-time great comebacks; from seven goals down to three points in front in 15 minutes.

Till the Michalczyk incident the Falcons had been playing lethargic, stop-start football, not only last Saturday, but in previous weeks.

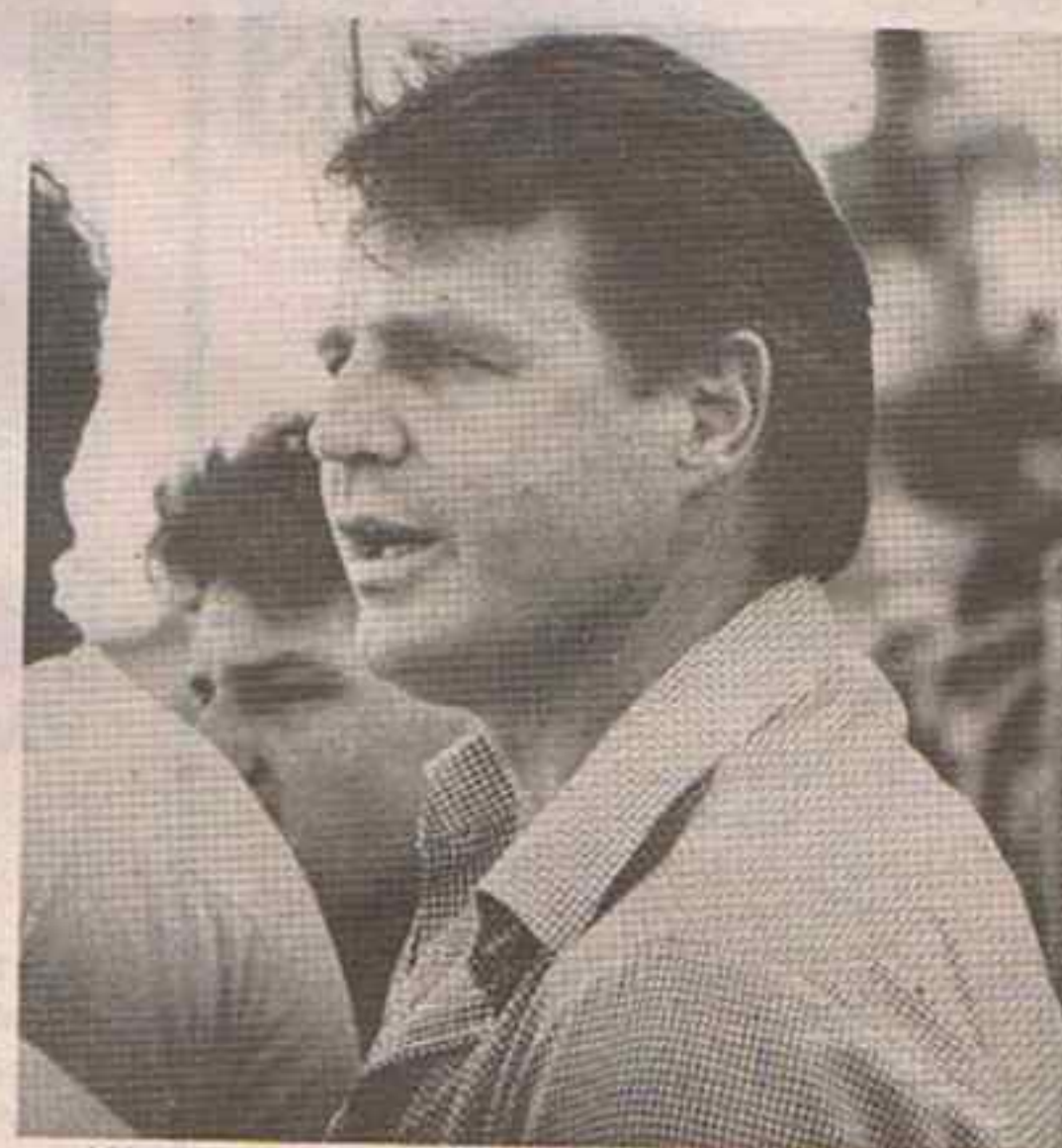
Wynne is a solitude coach, not caring what the critics say or how his public image is portrayed.

But he gained tremendous satisfaction from the victory over Claremont, not only because of the four premiership points, but the way the team had banded together.

At the post-match gathering he had

players from all three grades up on the presentation dias for tribute from the members. And his speech was along the lines of "doing things the Wynne way."

Wynne's football beliefs are refreshing, with a deep inner confidence that what he is doing is the best for all concerned.

He has received solid administration support despite the doubting moments and Saturday's victory will go a long way to boosting the Falcons fortunes for this season.

## A round-up of some of this week's football comments

"I've got plenty to prove. I'd love to play for WA against Victoria this year, but that might have to wait till next season. But I'll play for South for nothing." Football's Mr Individual Mark Jackson.

"To begin with I had no ambition to play league football. But now I'm ecstatic about playing 150 games." East Fremantle's Stephen Green on his big milestone.

"All you young players out there who want to make league ranks and play VFL football, choose your manager carefully or you too could be watching the footy on a TV set in a hotel room." Channel 7 critic Bob Maumill on Maurice Rioli's plight in limbo-land.

"Either I play for the Swans or I give the game away. It's gone on too long and I've had enough of it." Former South Fremantle player Maurice Rioli, cooped up in a Sydney hotel room unable to play football.

"We will be disappointed to see him leave, but we understand his desire to play in Victoria." Claremont president Ian Goldie on Michael Mitchell's decision to sign with Richmond.

## INSPIRATIONAL

THE whirlwind victory snatched by West Perth at the expense of a cruising Claremont last Saturday produced some excitable praise from critics and

commentators. Radio 6NR's John Hayes said that it was one of the most memorable fightbacks he had ever seen, brought about because of George Michalczuk's totally-committed approach to the ball that resulted in him being carried off unconscious — and sparking the revival. In fact, Hayes thought seriously about giving Michalczuk a vote in his best-on-ground because he had provided the spark for victory. Incidentally, the bump from Claremont's Peter Owens was totally fair. In fact, it took great courage from the young Tigers defender to come out and meet Michalczuk as the Falcon raced goalwards for a mark.

## BUNT'S VIEW

SUBIACO coach Haydn Bunton has been quite open and frank in the public debate about the future of Peter Spencer. Bunton says that Spencer was not asked to leave the club, simply that he was told his style of play didn't fit in and he should be prepared to adapt to a new role. Bunton, in fact, invited Spencer along to last Saturday's clash with Swan Districts at Bassendean Oval and told him to put his gear in the boot of his car "just in case".

## SPORTS HELP

FORMER league footballer Alan Griffiths has launched a program aimed at providing trainers for football clubs. Allsports Management is designed to organise training courses through the Sports Medicine Foundation to provide qualified trainers. Lester Morris, a sports therapist who has been involved with the WA rugby league team and Ron Holford, a former head trainer with the Perth Football Club, are organising the scheme. ## GONE NORTH

FORMER East Perth and South Fremantle full-forward Paul Arnold has gone to Northampton to continue his career. Arnold, a nine-goal performer in the finals a few years back for the Royals, has struggled with form and fitness in recent years. He has lined up with Northampton in the Great Northern National Football League — providing a nice avenue to goal for the Rams.

## MASS PRODUCTION

EAST Perth's bid to select the best possible teams for this year's combined inter-districts competitions will see them hold two mass training sessions at Perth Oval next week. On Monday night the eight 13s teams in the club's junior council district will be invited to train at Perth Oval between 4pm and 5pm instead of holding their own training. On Thursday night the eight teams in the 15s competition will also train at Perth Oval. The mass training session, which sees more than 150 juniors on the track with their coaches, will be the first step in enticing more juniors to try out for the combined teams.

## DOBBIE'S BACK

THE push by East Perth to rebuild the club, both on the field with young players and off the field with old Royals, has extended right up to the bar. Former champion back pocket player Bob (Dobbie) Graham has returned to the club as manager of the bar and restaurant facilities. Graham has had long experience in running delicatessens and his move to Perth Oval in a business capacity is part work, part pleasure. He has already introduced a number of innovations, including the Friday lunch-time special of \$5 — almost as cheap as when he played his 211 games with the Royals back in the 1960s.

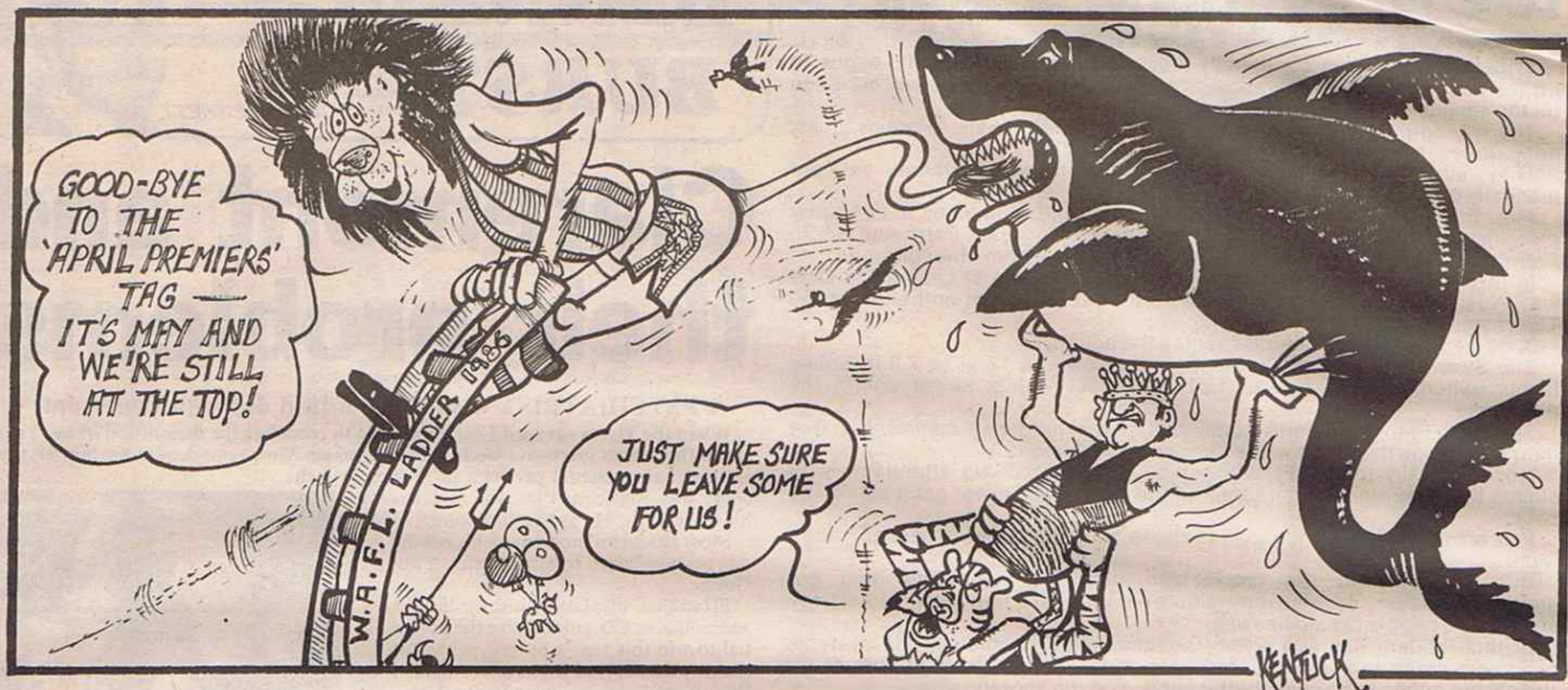


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# KENTUCK — LIFE AT THE TOP



THE current crop of young players in WA is equal in ability at their age to anyone the state has produced in the last 10 years.

But are the league clubs and the football public expecting too much from them?

We have a great wealth of young talent in the local competition, but it concerns me to read in newspapers of how, for example, had Paul Peos or Craig Starcevich not been injured, East Perth might have won a game; or the loss of Darren Bewick or Dean Laidley from West Perth's team could be the difference between winning or losing.

In other words, these players, at an age when they should be in the developing and learning stage of their careers, are expected to carry the load for the team's success or failure.

This is placing too much pressure on these youngsters and doesn't allow them to develop their game naturally.

Take Darren Bewick, for example. After only a handful of league games, he has constantly become the target of a tag by opposition sides. When you consider that established champions like Peter Featherby, Rob Wiley and Steve Malaxos have difficulties in similar circumstances, what effect must it have on a young player?

Unfortunately, when a club is not succeeding, it tends to look to youth as its salvation.

There is nothing wrong with that philosophy. Where it goes wrong is at the same time, the clubs and, more particularly, the supporters, expect immediate results and look to these players with outstanding potential to lift them out of the doldrums.

Because of their potential, these players are being placed on a pedestal by supporters and media alike too early in their careers. Instead of being able to naturally develop, they are expected to perform miracle feats week in and week out.

It just doesn't happen. No matter how skilled they are, young

players need to serve their apprenticeship. Inconsistency is a trademark of youth (there are odd exceptions, of course).

That inconsistency is further highlighted when a group of young players are thrown together in one side.

East Perth and South Fremantle are cases in point. At East Perth, we see Starcevich, Peos, George Giannakis, David Bain and a couple of others carrying the mantle for their side, while South have about eight players who have only just graduated out of junior ranks, expected to play a major role in lifting the club.

Ideally, the position should be as was the case with Rob Wiley and Peter Spencer when they started their careers. Both were in very good sides and were able to develop their outstanding potential without too much pressure on them.

That can be seen now in the top clubs with Andrew MacNish (Subiaco) and Guy McKenna (Claremont). Both have slotted nicely into their respective teams without being placed under enormous pressure to succeed at all costs.

What then can be done to take the pressure off our young players or make them more able to cope with the situations some are faced with?

Perhaps one solution is a greater acceptance of cross transference of more seasoned players between clubs.

The top sides are in a happy position of having a number of players with 30-40 league games under their belt playing reserves football because of their depth.

These players would be happy acquisitions to lesser clubs.

Perth, for example, are now reaping the benefits of obtaining players such as Mark Watson, Chris Stasinowsky, Steven Mount and John Gavranich, who have given the club much-needed depth, allowing them to gradually introduce the up-and-coming player into league ranks.

Another alternative is to give the younger players an opportunity to compete at a national level in an under-21's competition similar to the colts cricket concept.

At the moment, we have State schoolboys for under 16-year-olds and the Teal Cup for 17-year-olds and under. The next step for the outstanding juniors is league football.

The Teal Cup is now established as the premier junior competition and perhaps some thought should be given to scrapping the State schoolboys concept in favour of a national under 21 competition.

This would give our best young league players the opportunity to further develop their game against the best youngsters from other States.

Not only will it help them become better equipped to meet the challenges of league football, but it would also be a stepping stone for State football.

Whatever the case, let's not burn out our youngsters too early by placing unnecessary demands on them.

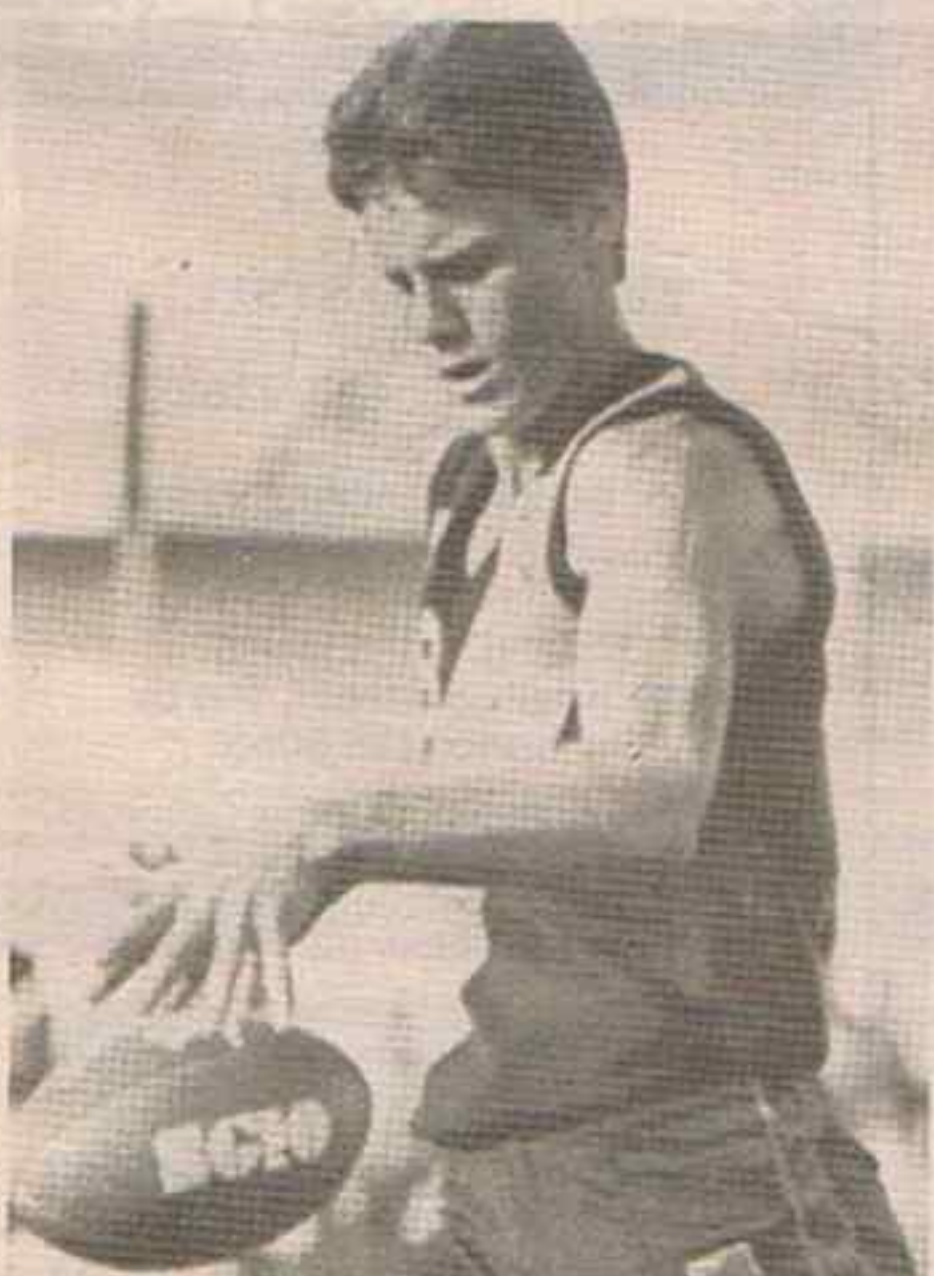

## WESTSIDE COMMENT

### POOR SERVICE . . . STILL

THIS newspaper has continually pleaded to the WA Football League to lift the poor standard of scoreboards at all grounds — and we will continue till the service improves.

The paying public (those people who sit on hard seats or green grass, not lounge chairs) enjoy their football; that's why they go.

They also like to know what is happening elsewhere, yet our manually-operated scoreboards are just not good enough.

Take Perth Oval last week for example, as exciting finishes at two other grounds captured the attention of people watching East Perth and South Fremantle, while listening to trannies giving scores from other grounds.

In the last five minutes of the final term, the score at Leederville Oval was West Perth 20.8 to Claremont's 19.13. Yet the board still showed the Tigers well in front, 19.11 to 13.7.

They were at least 10 minutes behind the action.

The Swan Districts-Subiaco score was shown as 12.11 to 7.8 in Subi's favour, when, in fact, it was 15.11 to 14.10 — just seven points the difference.

The East Fremantle-Perth game was also a long way behind, but that didn't matter as the result was a foregone conclusion.

Now, naturally the WAFL will defend their scoreboard attendants with claims that they work long hours for little reward and never get a pat on the back.

Fair enough and we apologise to those people. It's not necessarily their fault.

But if people in the crowd can tune into a trannie and get around-the-ground scores from radio stations quite frequently, surely the scoreboard people can do likewise.

In this modern day and age of sophisticated communication systems and micro-chips and satellite coverages, surely it's not asking too much for the paying public to be given better service on the scoreboards.

The fact that Swan Districts-Subiaco match was 15 minutes ahead of the other games didn't help matters. But it would only take one more salary for a youngster (\$10 or \$15 a day at each ground at the most) to sit on the scoreboard with a couple of transistor radios going and keep monitoring other matches, leaving the main game to the normal operators.

Lathlain Park and Leederville Oval have continually been a thorn in the side of media men with wrong scores.

Sure, several grounds are good. East Fremantle Oval, for example, have a very speedy service, as does Bassendean Oval.

But overall, the situation is not satisfactory for the paying public and our officialdom should give the matter some thought.

After all, as we've said before, those people who pay the \$5.50 each week are fairly important.

# Claremont and their problems

A PSYCHIATRIST would have a field day with Claremont.

When the Tigers savaged East Fremantle to complete the demolition of last year's grand finalists in successive weeks, coach Graham Moss remarked to me that his players had had a mental problem in their approach.

He was confident that was now behind the club. He spoke too soon.

Moss has a real problem on his hands, one acknowledged by club president Ian Goldie.

From their display against the Sharks and Subiaco, Claremont have the potential to win this year's premiership. But the way they tossed in the towel against West Perth last week indicates the Tigers may not have the mental strength to take out the flag.

Before George Michalczyk was carried off on a stretcher, Claremont were cruising to a big win. They had the Falcons on the ropes. Instead they were humiliated by West Perth in successive clashes.

John Wynne treated them with utter contempt in their final clash last year by finishing the match with only 15 men. So there was a lot of pride at stake last Saturday.

The way Claremont capitulated was probably even more humiliating than the last time these two sides met.

Claremont were absolutely shattered — they had surrendered a match in which

they held a seven goal lead approaching the half way mark of the last quarter. And so they should be.

But was it just a hiccup or is it something endemic in the club?

Claremont lost at least one premiership to Swan Districts because they were found to be mentally wanting in a crisis.

It will be interesting to see whether last week's debacle provides the incentive to sting them back into gear — and Fremantle Oval has not been a happy hunting ground for the Tigers over the years — or whether the Tigers are mentally soft.

And what of West Perth? They needed a rocket put under them and that may very well have happened last Saturday. They are a better side than they have shown so far this season. But there also seems to be an attitude problem there.

They will have their chance to show this week whether last week's win was a fluke and whether or not Perth are finals pretenders.

## SENTIMENT

THERE is no sentiment in football. Just ask Peter Spencer.

He played a very big part in Subiaco's rise to a football power last season, providing the experience the Lions desperately needed.

Now it seems the club can do without him.

But it would be a shame if Spencer is lost to league football. He still has a lot to offer.

There are few players in this State make position as well as him. In fact I believe he could be a big asset to a club in the finals battle.

# Record day out for the Sharks

EAST Fremantle had a day out against Perth last Saturday, recording their highest score against the Demons.

The tally of 26.16 (172) beat their previous best of 25.13 (163) in 1980. The Sharks coach that day was Bradley Smith, with Alan Joyce in charge of Perth.

East Fremantle's winning margin of 91 points was also their biggest against Perth at East Fremantle Oval, just eight points short of their easiest win over Perth five years ago.

The Sharks have now won 14 games straight against the Demons.

### FOOTBALL TRIVIA

HERE is some football trivia that may surprise Bulldogs supporters and perhaps Royals fans too.

Out of their last seven games at Perth Oval, South Fremantle have won five, which takes their total of wins there for the 1980s to six.

During the 1970s South won only twice at Perth Oval; the same as they did during the 1960s and they had only two victories there during the 1920's.

### GREAT FIGHTBACK

I was one of the lucky ones to be at Leederville Oval last week to see a most exciting game when West Perth came back from the 'dead'.

I likened the fight-back to the grand finals of 1955 and 1965 when Perth and East Fremantle both stormed home in the last quarter after appearing well beaten.

Another great Falcon comeback was on August 6, 1966. West Perth, playing South Fremantle at Fremantle, were down 0.4 to 7.1 at half-time, but by the end of the third quarter they were one point in front.

## DISPUTED SCORES

GOAL umpires are the official scorers at football games (not the scoreboard attendant), so when you tally up the number of games where the scores have been disputed, you have a gigantic compliment for the men who wave the flags.

In the last century, protests involving the final score were fairly prevalent. But since 1900 only a handful have been questioned out of over 6000 games.

When the 1905 grand final resulted in a draw, the goal umpires scores were questioned.

In a 1966 Swans-Royals game, the flag wavers were found to have given one more goal to East Perth than what they had scored. In 1978, Subiaco were given a goal extra in a game against West Perth. The two goal umpires were given a week's spell for their error.

## MICHALCZYK INFLUENCE

IN round seven last year Falcons George Michalczyk played his 200th league game and he was responsible for the goal that sealed it for his team's 12-point win against Claremont.

In another way, Michalczyk was responsible for his side's victory over the same club last week when his skipper Les Fong reached his 250th milestone.

### South will be better this time

A MUCH improved South Fremantle side will be more competitive against Claremont than in their first round debacle when these two sides clash at Fremantle Oval this Saturday.

Claremont have found it difficult to motivate themselves against lowly sides and will have to be switched on against the young Bulldogs or may find themselves slipping further down the ladder.

The Tigers seem to struggle against sides who can match their running game and the Bulldogs have the mobile players who could test this Claremont strength.

#### POSSESSIONS

Mark Bairstow, Nicky Winmar and Wally Matera are playing excellent football and will make Tigers stars Steve Malaxos, Michael Mitchell and Steve Goulding work hard for their possessions.

The Claremont half-back-line of Michael O'Connell, Geoff Miles and Noel Morton are making it tough for their opponents this season and the young South half-forward-line will find goals hard to get against this close-checking trio.

South will look to the experience of Benny Vigona and Willie Roe midfield to place enough pressure on the powerful Claremont defence to kick a winning score.

### Falcons snap out of doldrums

WEST Perth are out of the doldrums with renewed confidence and should prove too fast for Perth at Leederville Oval this Saturday.

The Falcons showed in 20 minutes of exhilarating football last Saturday what they are capable of, and that morale-boosting win regained some pride for the inconsistent Falcons side.

When the fleet-footed Falcon mobile players get their running game going, they are almost impossible to stop.

Players like Peter Menaglio, John Gastev, Peter Murnane and the Bewick brothers, Corry and Darren, are damaging players on their day and Perth will have to watch these runners to have any chance.

Big Perth full forward Mick Rea always gives the Falcons defence plenty of headaches and another former West Perth player in Chris Stasinowsky will also be looking for a special effort against his first league club.

The Perth ruck pair of Ian Newman and John Gavanich will pose major problems for West Perth, who are likely to continue to use Dan Foley as Kim Rogers partner after a fine performance on the ball against Claremont.

### Swans too classy

AN improving Swan Districts side will have too much skill and experience when they clash with East Perth at Bassendean Oval on Saturday.

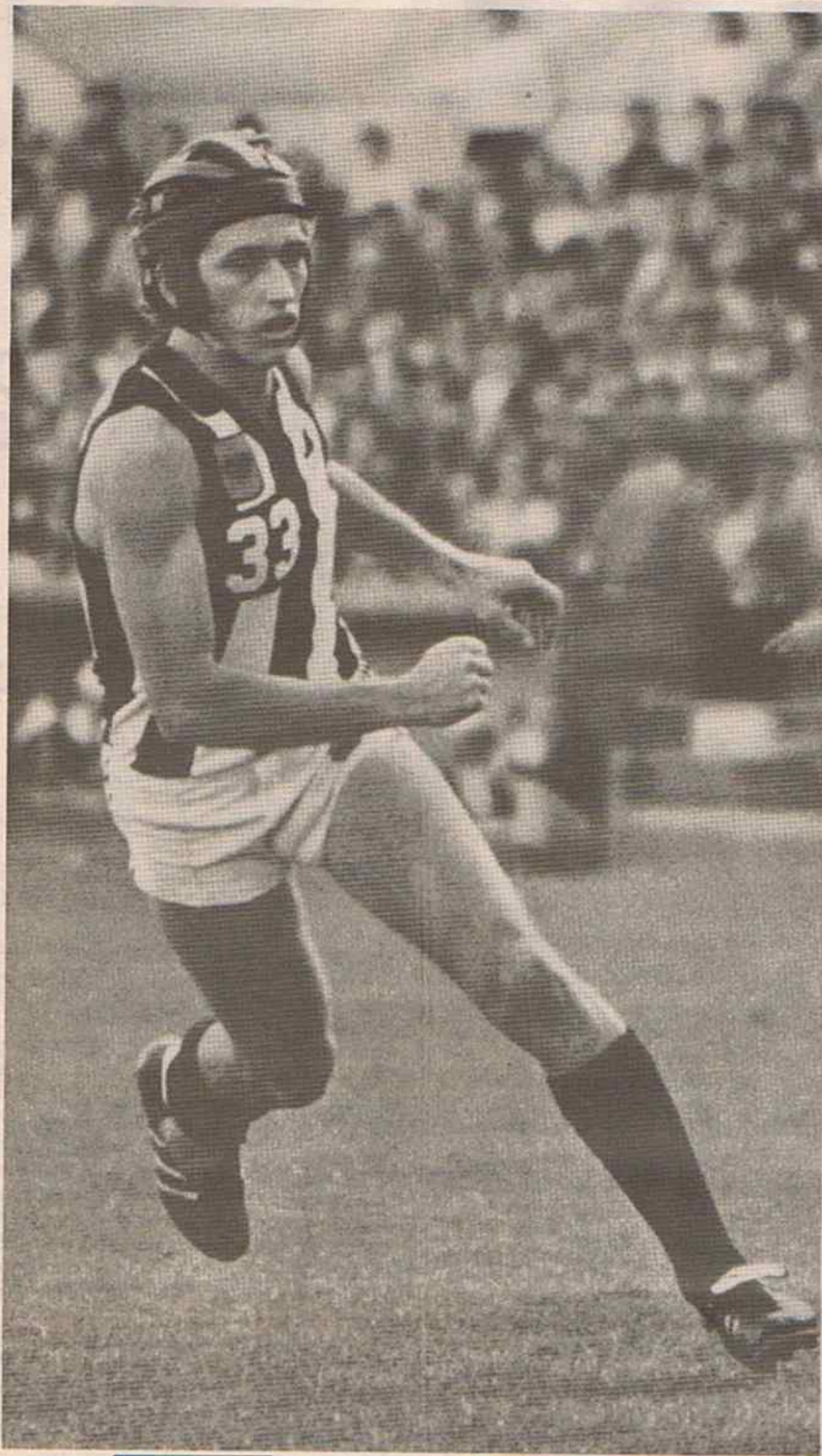
Kevin Taylor put in a rare poor performance last Saturday and this mercurial footballer will be determined to play well to erase the memory of being taken off the ground.

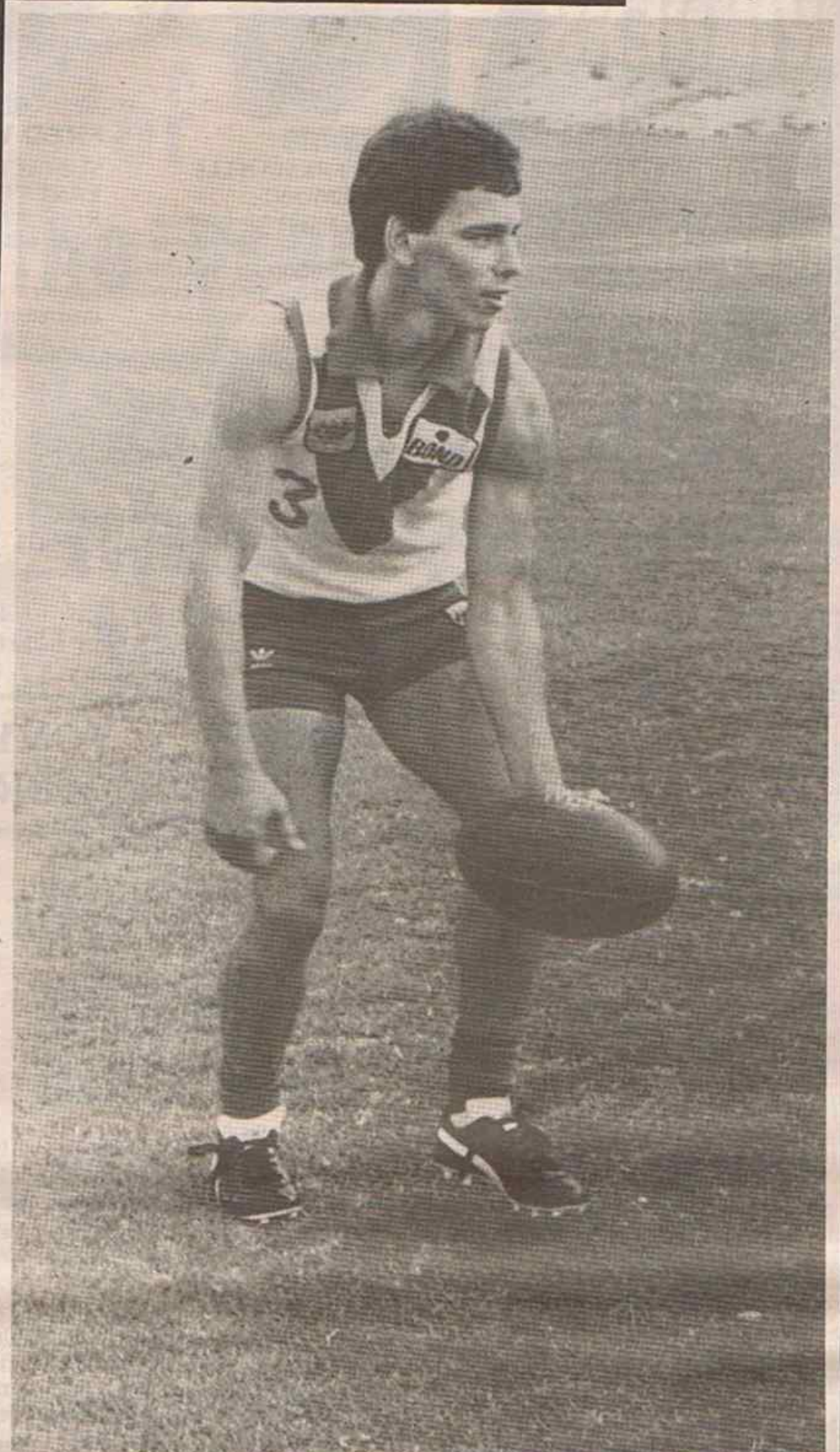

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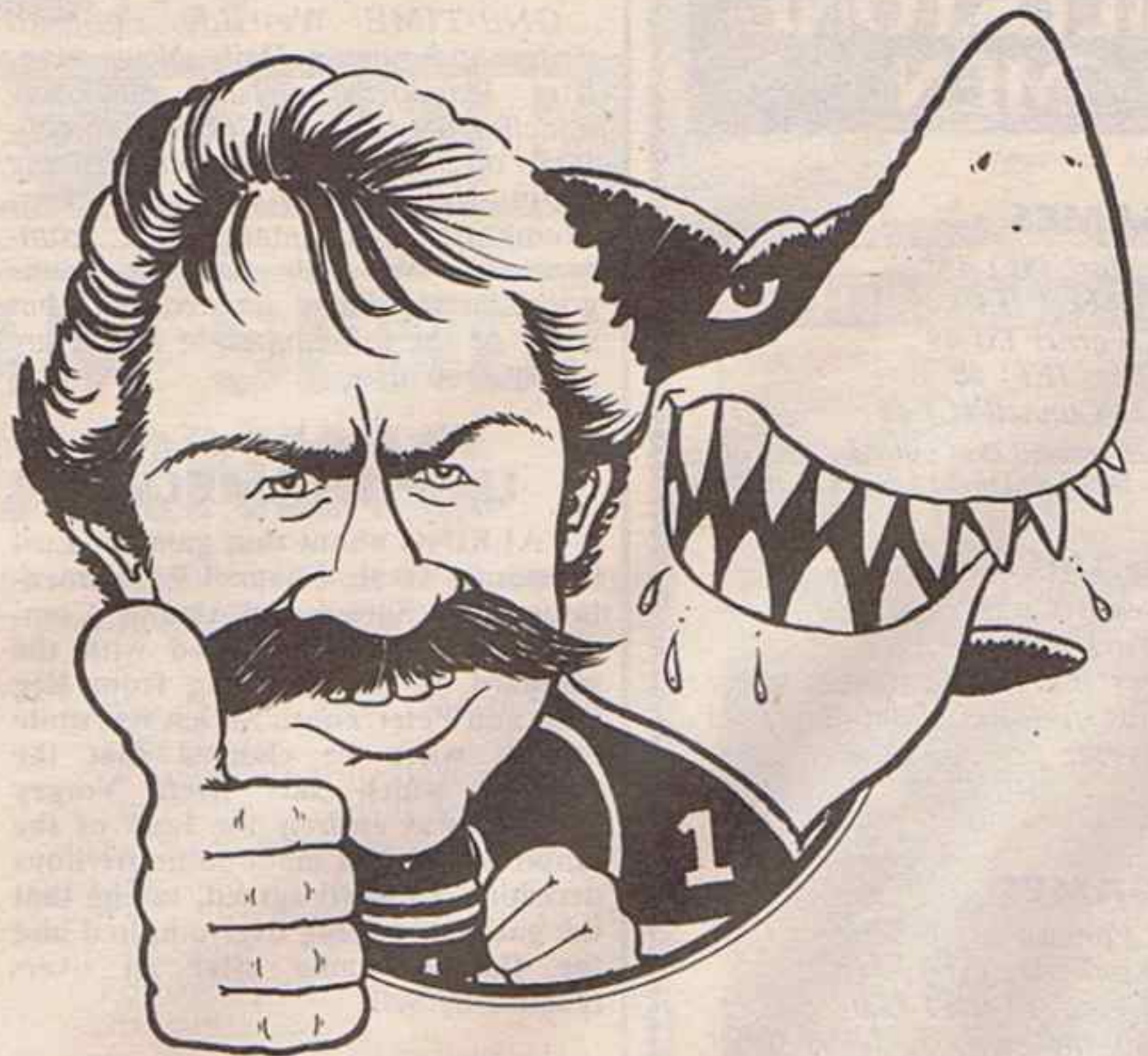
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**GIANT** Glenelg ruckman Wayne Henwood has a burning ambition to represent SA against his home State, Western Australia, at Football Park later this month.

# Henwood hits the big time in Adelaide

He has a great desire to make the State side and his physical strength would be a big asset to SA.

"I went pretty close to making the WA State side three years ago but pulled a hamstring prior to the game, and was selected in the under 23 SA State squad last year but again missed out through injury," he said.

"I have had no luck when it comes to making State sides and I am hoping to be selected this year."

He is not eligible to play against Victoria.

Married to Michelle, the 192cm, 102kg giant joined Glenelg as a centre half-back after 70 games with South Fremantle.

He said he was looking for a change of environment when Glenelg approached him.

"South Fremantle coach Mal Brown left the club and with him went the club's charisma," Henwood said.

"Brad Hardie went to Footscray, several senior players retired, Maurice Rioli was gone, Stephen Michael wasn't really interested in playing and it left a big hole in the club.

"Really, there was nothing left.

"The only player of note still playing was Jon Dorotich and now he's joined Carlton.

"I got out at a good time."

Henwood said when Glenelg approached him he didn't know what the club was all about.

"I didn't know anything about SA football and had never heard of Glenelg," he said.

"I began training with the club and saw how good players like Stephen Ker-

nahan, Chris McDermott, Peter Carey and Tony McGuinness were and I knew Glenelg was an excellent side with premiership prospects."

Henwood took a while to assert his authority on SA football, but was a hero in Glenelg's grand final victory and has since taken all before him.

Moved onto North Adelaide dangerman Michael Parsons midway through the first term in the grand final, Henwood completely shut him out of the game and finished the day with a towering 80-metre goal.

"I was disappointed when Cornes moved me onto Parsons because I felt I was winning the ruck and playing pretty well," he said.

"At full back, my job was to spoil and forget about playing my own game, but I began to get on top and thought I was holding the guy down.

"I was given recognition from Graham Cornes at the breaks and it boosted my ego and I started to enjoy the challenge.

Nicknamed "Moose" because of his enormous build, Henwood jokingly said he didn't do any extra gym work, just ate a lot and didn't run very much.

Henwood's body takes such a battering during a match that he is still recovering on the Friday before the next game.

"It is so hard to get over," he said.

"On Sundays I can hardly move (most players are the same) and at training on Monday nights I look at Cornes and think to myself, 'he's not going to make us train too hard is he?'"

"I used to try and fake my way out of Monday training but now Cornes knows what I'm up to.

"I usually get over the injuries and sore spots by Wednesday or Thursday

after several spas, saunas and a variety of treatment, but I'd hate to think how I am when I'm 28."

Henwood believes the standard of SA and WA football is "very equal".

"The game is faster in WA because of the bigger grounds and drier weather, whereas in SA, there is more pressure and the grounds are smaller," he said.

"The influx of Victorian players to SA also puts more pressure on SA football, as they are used to that style of game, but not too many Victorians go to play in WA."

It was rumoured that Henwood wanted to return to WA this year and said he came "pretty close".

"I feel it doesn't matter where you come from, you always want to go back," he explained.

"A few WA clubs were keen to sign me and I trained over there for a while, but I felt, publicity-wise, football wasn't as exciting in WA as it is in SA.

"The atmosphere is much better in SA and anyway I played in a premiership side last year, so why not come back."

Henwood said his future was still up in the air and he was a year by year proposition.

"I have just started a new job at CPS Credit Union and therefore I could stay for a few more years," he says.

"Who knows? I could spend my whole career at Glenelg."

"It's great to have a chance of playing with the guys again since our Alcock days at Aquinas," he said.

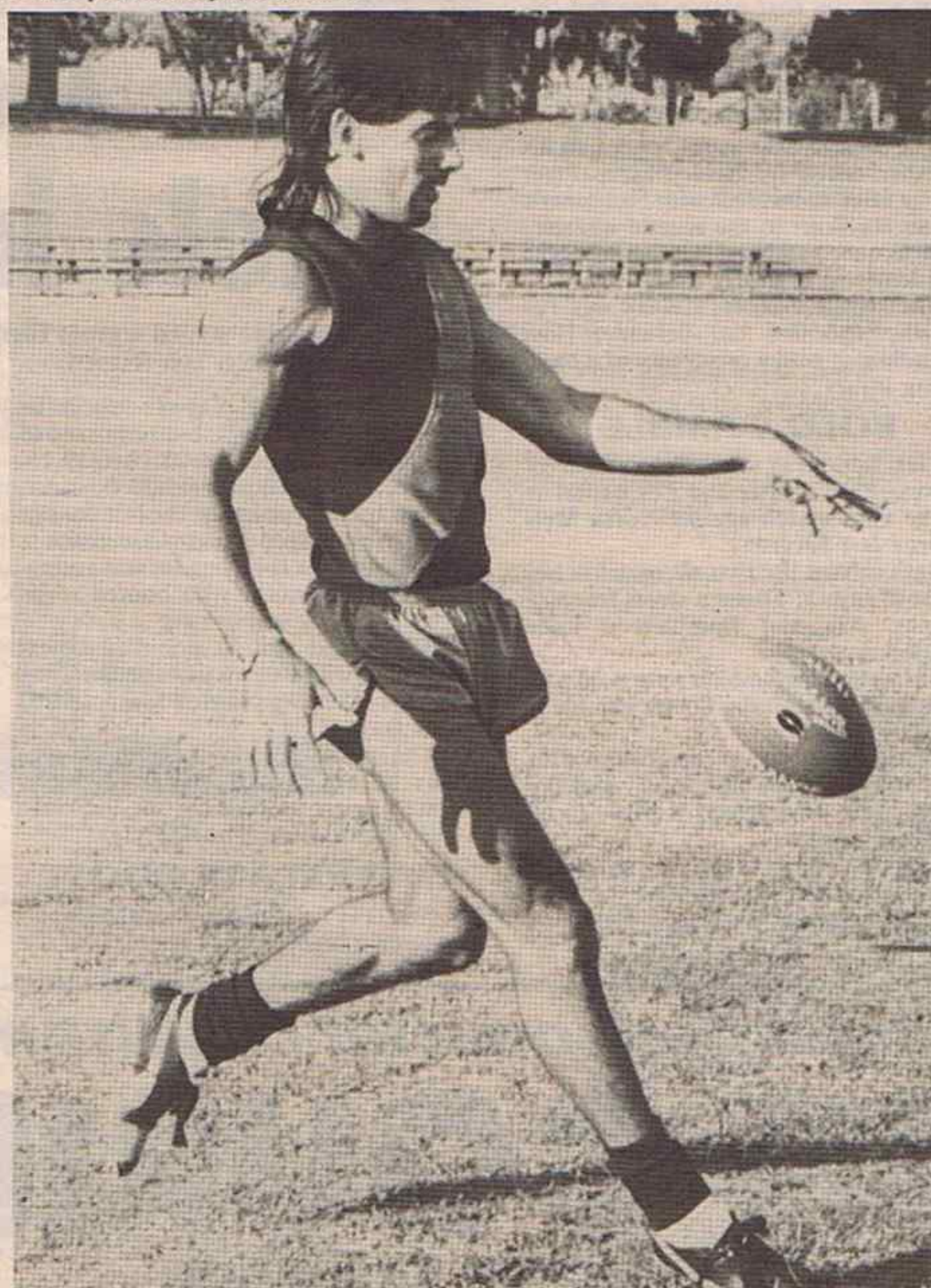
"I played three matches with Clive until injury sidelined him and Rod came into the team last week.

## MOTHER BROWN

### Give South a fair go

IT is time the radio stations forgot about their own selfish needs and gave South Fremantle supporters a broadcast of their game. With only three radio stations covering league football this year, there is always one game that is not broadcast. And unfortunately that always seems to be the South Fremantle game. In the last three weeks the Bulldogs supporters — and there are still some left — have had to rely on crosses from broadcast games to keep in touch with their team's progress. There are people in the country and in hospitals who simply cannot get to league games.

## FROM WHERE I SIT

### Bottom coaches walk a tightrope

THERE is plenty of attention given to coaches of successful teams and people like Haydn Bunton and Ron Alexander share the spotlight because they are making the most of an abundance of talented players.

As trend-setting clubs, the Lions and Old Easts (I can't call my favourite club a pack of Sharks), bask in the glory of success and the players and officials also share in it.

The reverse is the case if you are down the bottom of the ladder, suffering the humiliation of week-by-week defeats.

The coaches have a rickety hold on their appointment and it takes a strong club, with far-sighted ability, to stay with a mentor going through a bad case of the downs.

Unless it is the mug punter, who has just done his last 50c on a sure thing that got nipped on the post, there is nobody as fickle as the average football supporter. A bad year or two, or a row of defeats, and the first head they scream for is that of the coach.

The wolves have been baying for the blood of Don Haddow at South Fremantle and Greg Brehaut has become a victim at East Perth.

### OPTIMISM

Haddow has hitched his fortunes to the abilities of youngsters at South and his optimism will probably pay off.

The Royals made the four the year before last, but got dumped in the first semi against Claremont. They looked as though they were shaping up, but then the same might be said of them from the year before when Grant Dorrington was calling the shots. They were fourth in '83 also.

Last year was a disaster and the side dropped to the bottom of the table. For a club that views itself in much the same light as Old Easts (where winning and tradition are everything), Brehaut was backed into a corner. The flack was flying thick and fast, but he didn't let it throw him, nor did he resort to excuses.

### PLAYER LOSS

At the start of '85, East Perth lost four good players in Greg Walsh (who returned to Busselton), John Ironmonger (cleared to Sydney), Robert Solin (transferred to Old Easts) and Peter Spencer, a prolific goal getter who joined the Lions.

Any of these four could be considered strong link men in any chain of football play. Add the loss of John Scott and Peter Thorne to Claremont, and a team clinging precariously to fourth spot has remote survival chances. It is even more serious if the club does not have a depth of reserves.

With the Royals in financial difficulty to the tune of \$300,000, they obviously cannot buy talent. The Administration were in the humiliating position of asking the players to accept a 10 per cent pay cut.

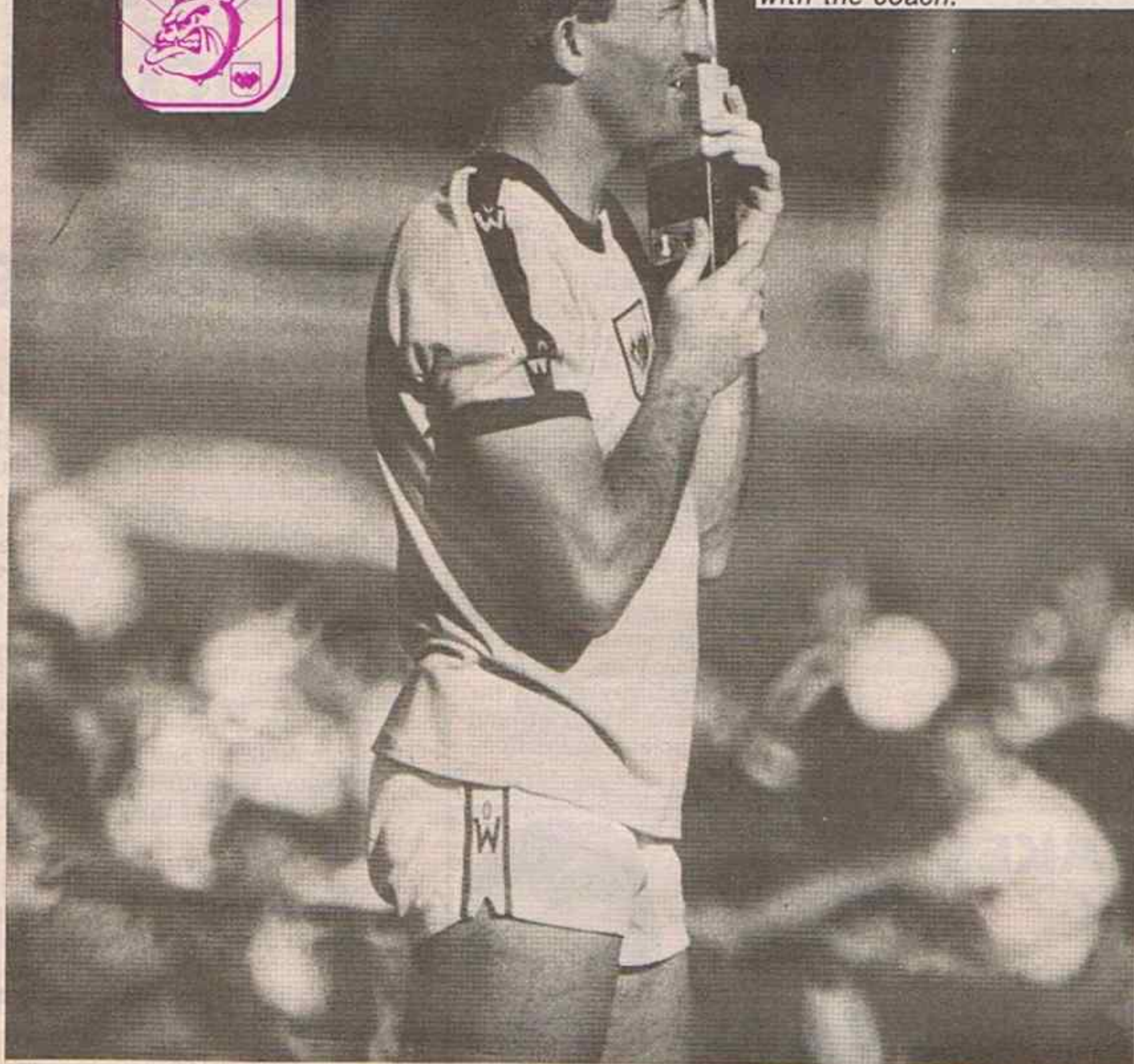
In '85, the Royals didn't sign a single recruit; some kind of record when you consider the players who change clubs each year.

It was once said that when you are really in trouble, the only people you can look to are your own.

The Royals have continued to discover young talent and one of the finds has been Craig Starcevic, who has the brightest of futures ahead of him. Other juniors have filled vacancies with good results and the home-grown product is starting to return dividends.

At times, coaches use specialist runners for individual instances, but a League ruling last year has now prevented injured players from acting as runners.

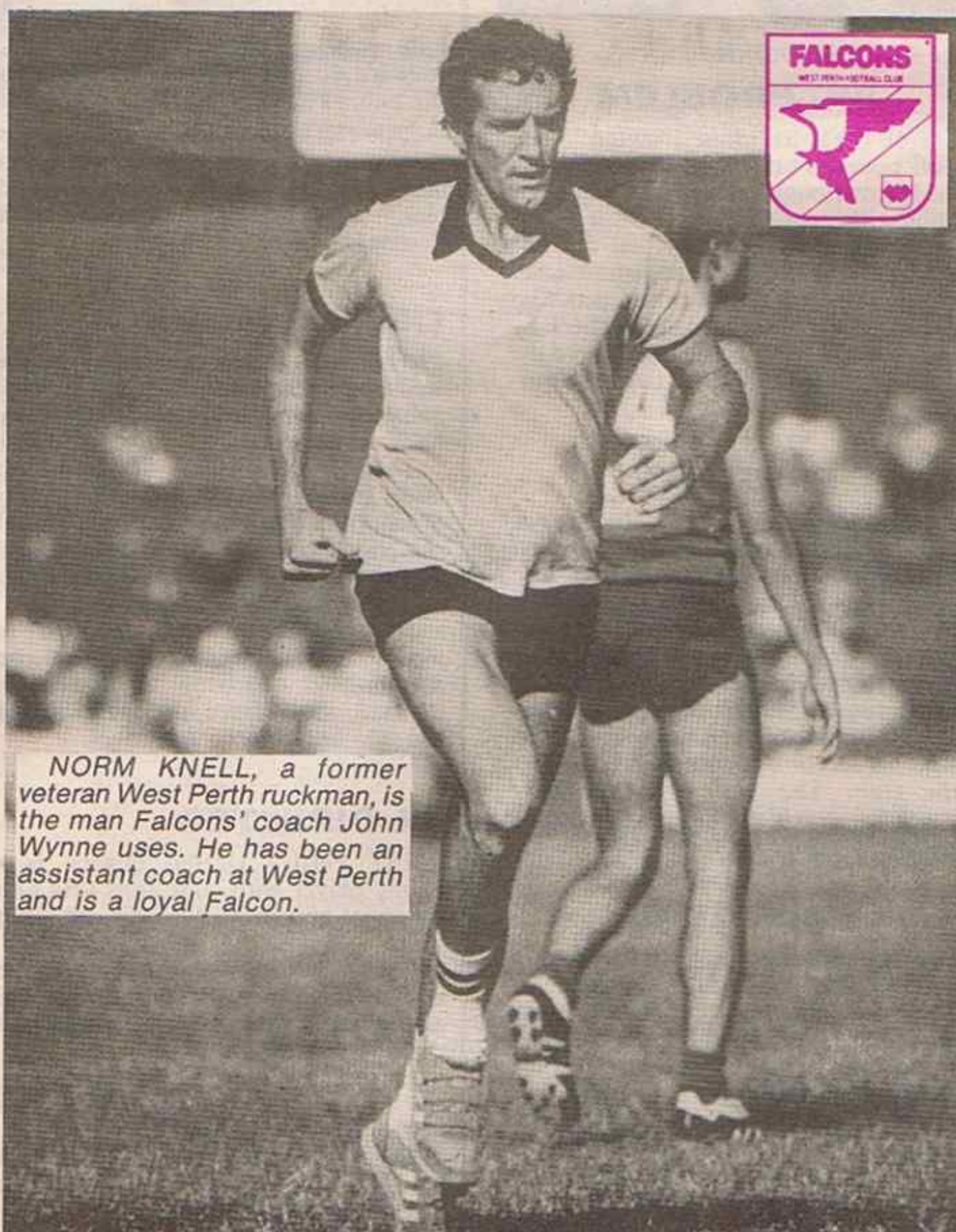

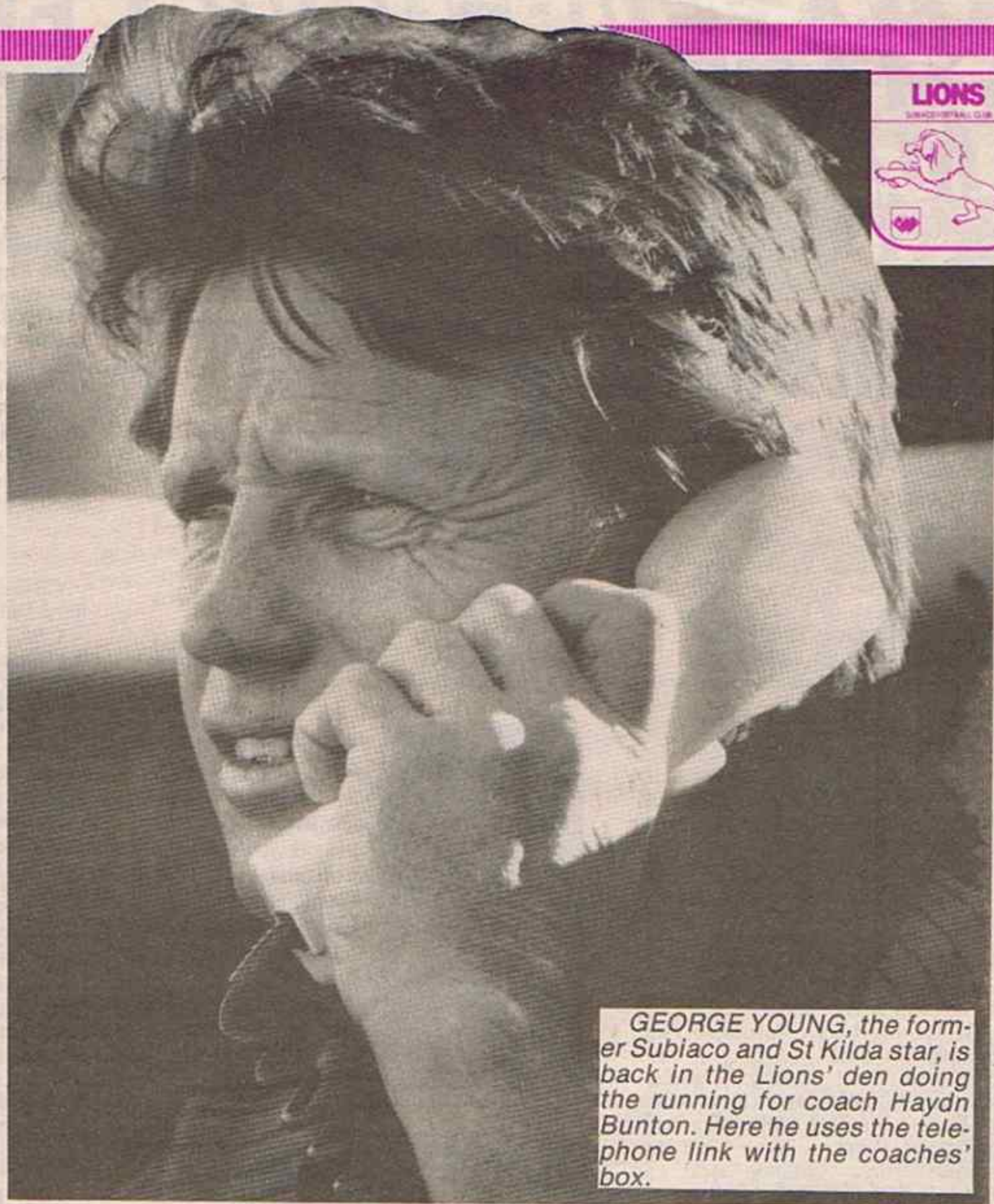

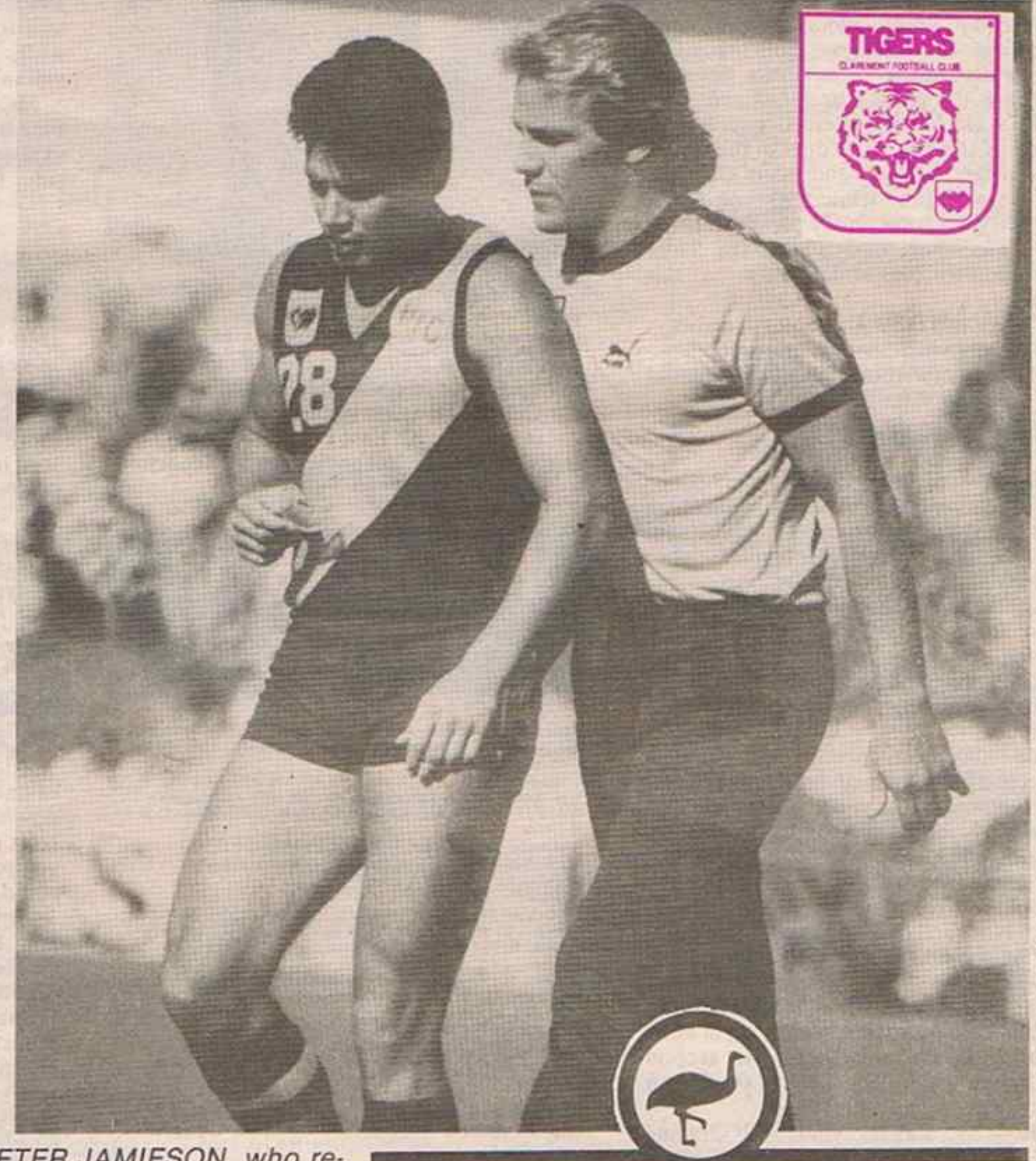

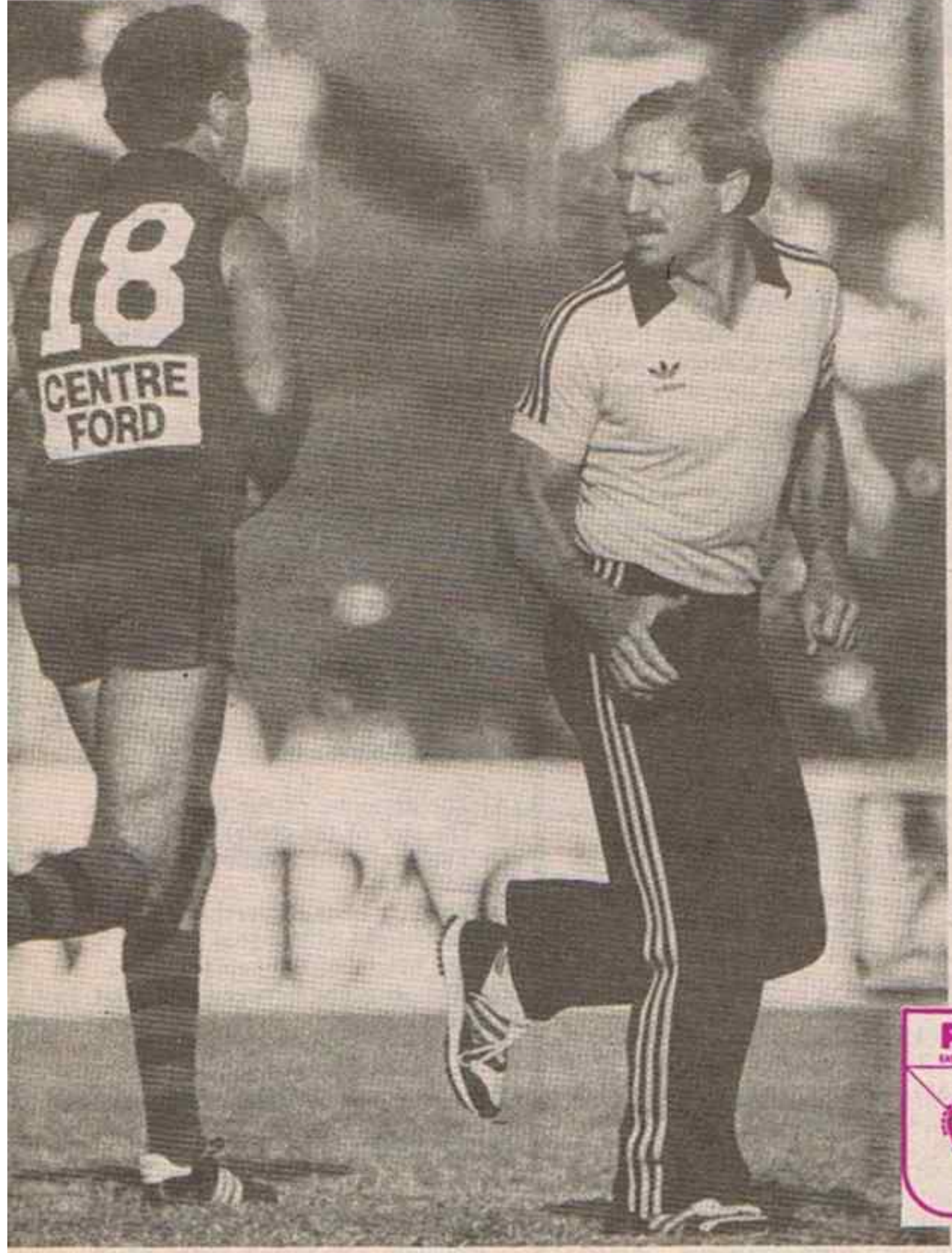

## Royals have had illustrious career

FEW clubs can boast the success — and the controversy — that East Perth have experienced over the years.

The Royals have enjoyed some exhilarating periods as football trendsetters — but they have also been involved in some of the game's most controversial times, mainly through their coaches.

Names like Jack Sheedy and Malcolm Brown add a high degree of controversy to the club's history, though both were successful when it came to premierships. Sheedy, the former East Fremantle rover, was the man who ushered in East Perth's modern era, from 1956 onwards when the club emerged as a real power, contesting 14 grand finals in 30 years.

But success was often denied the Royals as they had to be content with the runners-up role nine times — four in a row in the mid-1960s.

However, East Perth's success has not only been in the modern era; they still hold the record of the most number of consecutive premierships, five between 1919 and 1923. They have been in the final four 49 times in their 80 years giving their supporters tremendous value-for-money.

East Perth's best winning sequence was 21 in the 1944 under-age competition and 19 in the 1958-59 period, when Sheedy developed the powerful team boasting players like Graham Farmer, Ted Kilmurray, Mal Atwell, John Watts and Co.

East Perth's best winning sequence against other clubs is their 18 wins in a row at the expense of Perth between 1957 and 1962 — but the Demons were to extract revenge for that by beating the Royals in three successive grand finals in the 1960s.

Twice East Perth have strung together 16 consecutive wins against Claremont — 1931-36 and again in 1954-59.

East Perth also hold the record for the biggest winning margin in West Australian football — the 256-point victory (30.11 to 1.3) over South Fremantle in the 1944 under-age competition.

The success of Royals' players in the State's most prestigious award, the Sandover Medal, has also been remarkable.

Between 1975 and 1984 — when East Perth managed just two grand final appearances for a win and a loss — they produced a Sandover Medallist six times.

East Perth have an impressive record of producing highly-talented players with local products like Ross Glendinning becoming only the second West Australian to win a Brownlow Medal, Victoria's highest football award.

They also, however, have the capacity to produce players, coaches and administrators for other clubs — as can be

seen at present with Mal Brown coaching at Perth and Ron Alexander at East Fremantle; Trevor Nisbett, the football manager at Subiaco, Ron Webster, the marketing consultant at Claremont and a host of players — 12 at the last count — at other clubs.

The club was one of the first in WA to attract major sponsorship with the Victorian-based firm Hard Yakka putting their name to East Perth's guernseys back in 1978.

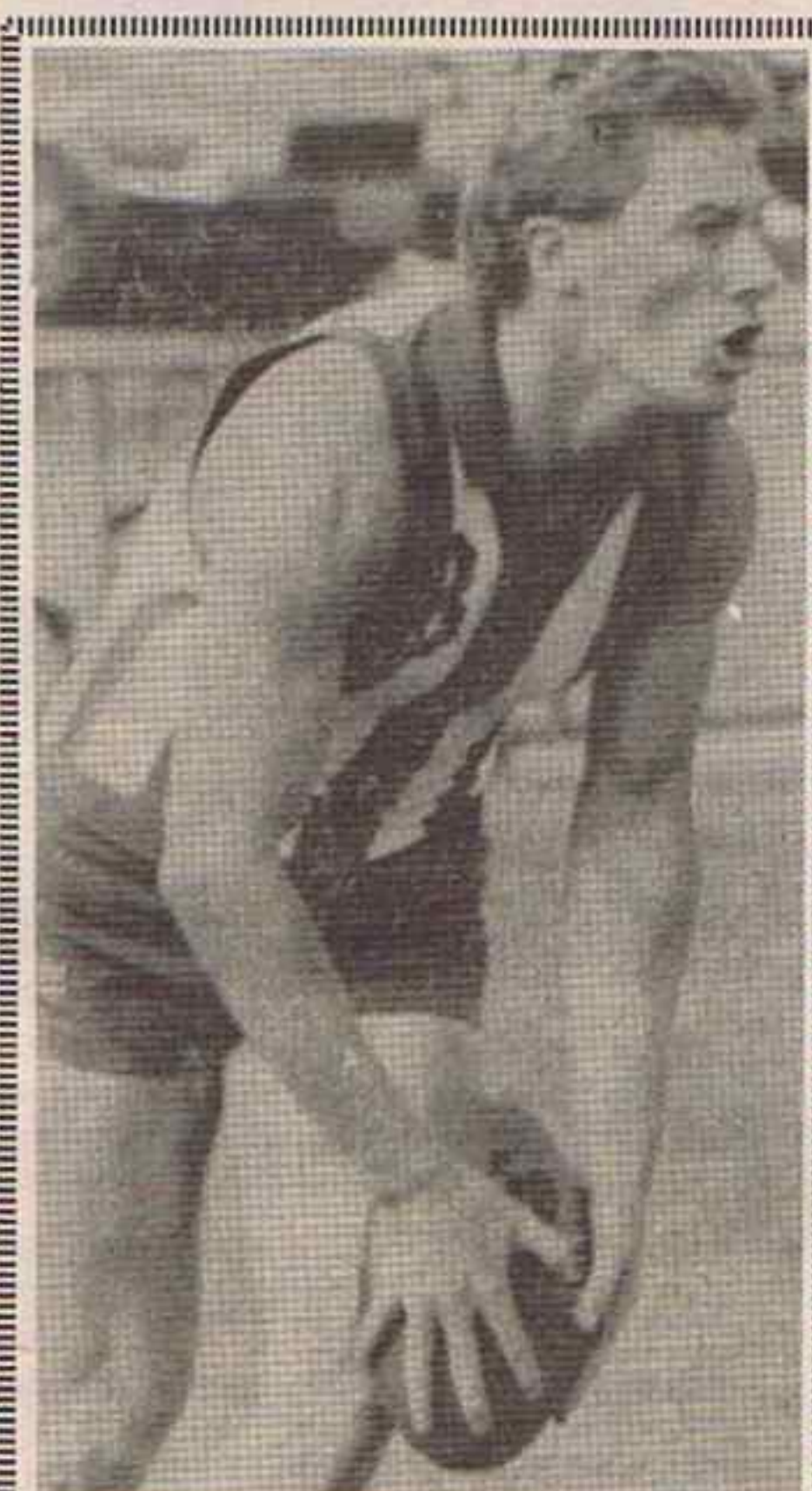

A new battle for \$7500 from the Peter Jackson company will start this week, based on one point for the highest-scoring team in each quarter, plus two points for the winning side.

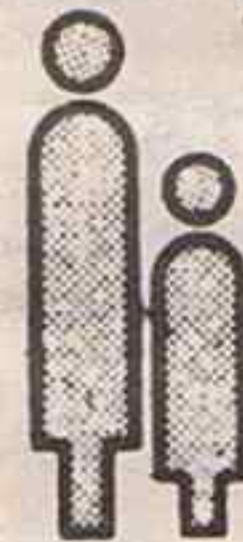

Maddington, fresh from an inspiring and confidence boosting display over South Perth, take on outright premier-ship favourites Osborne Park at Balcatta Reserve.

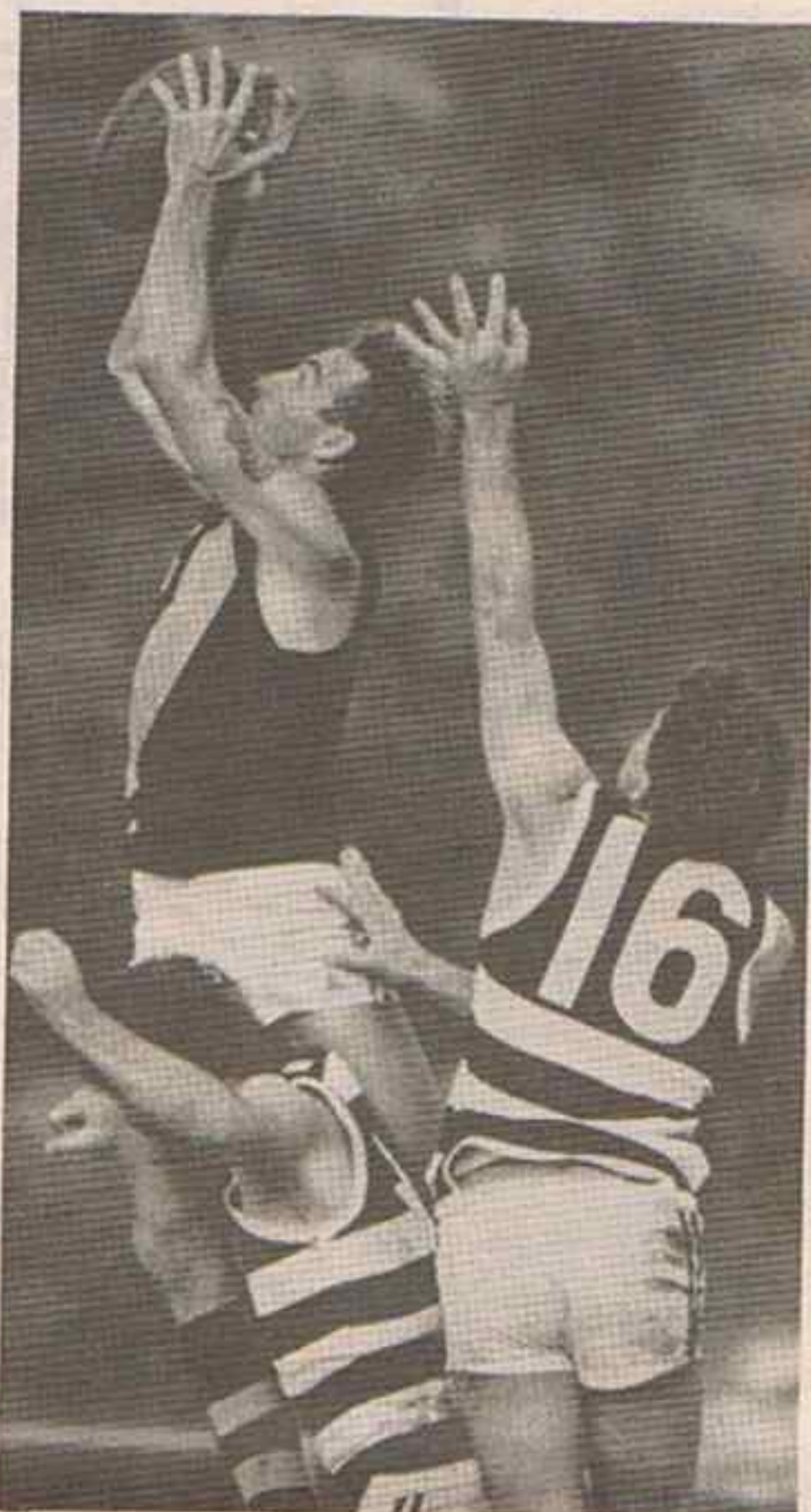
Osborne Park will not have things as simple as they did against bottom side Rockingham last week.

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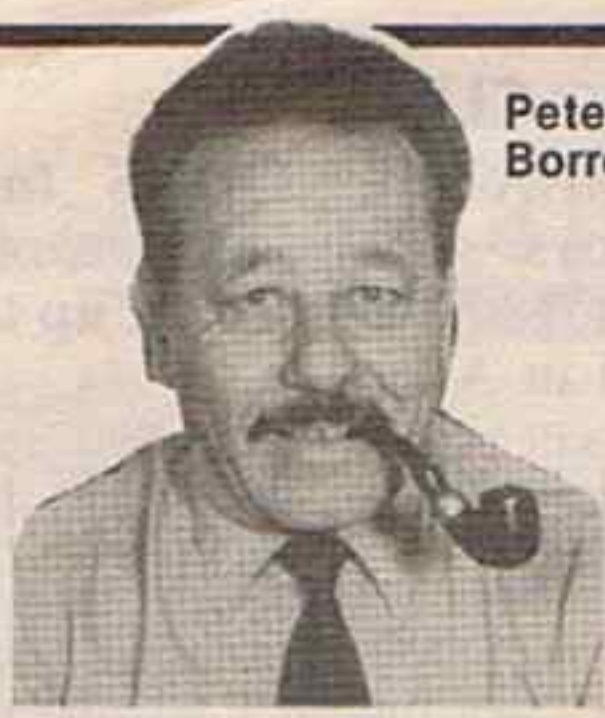
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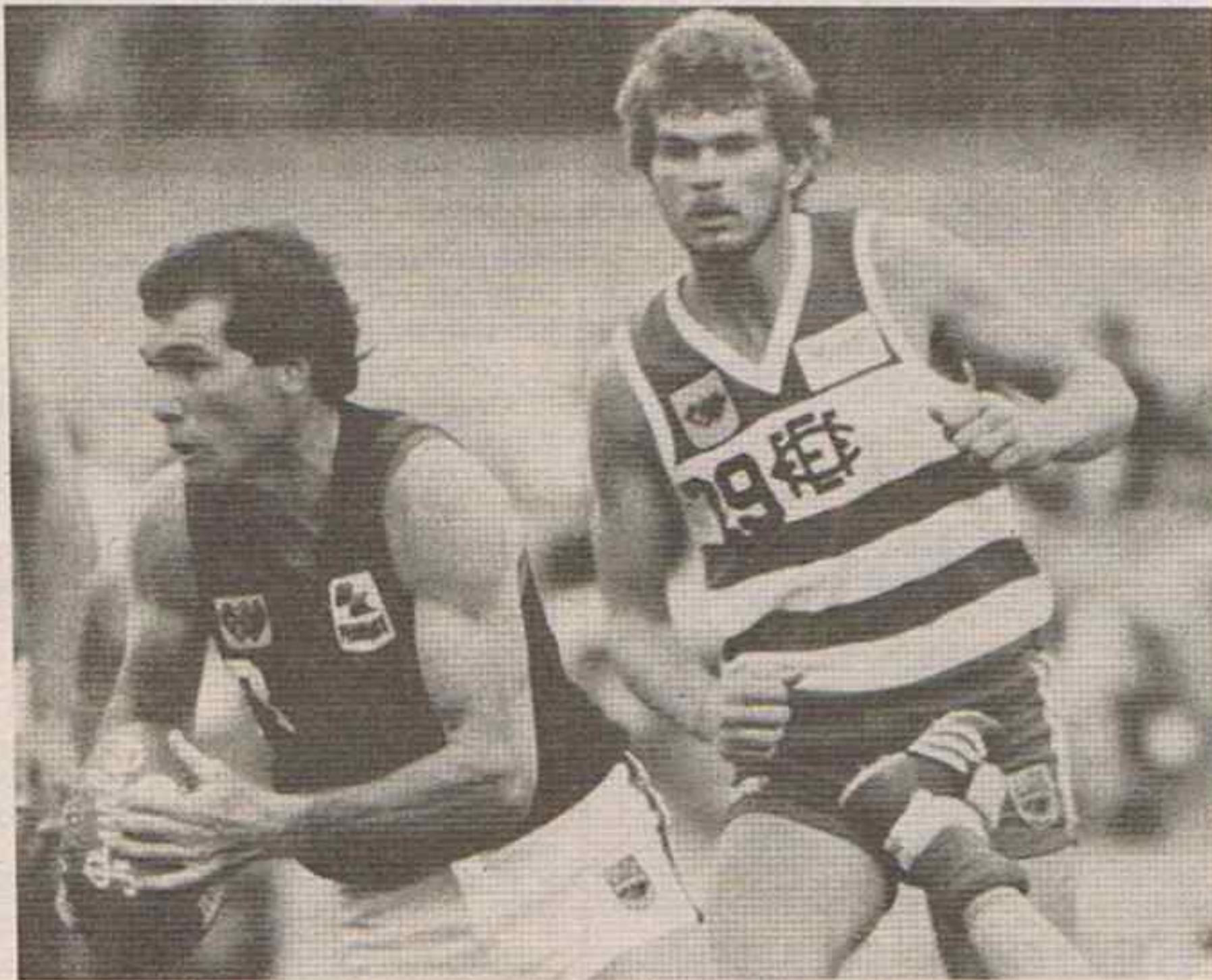

While individual club success is very important, representing your State against the rest of Australia is close to the ultimate.

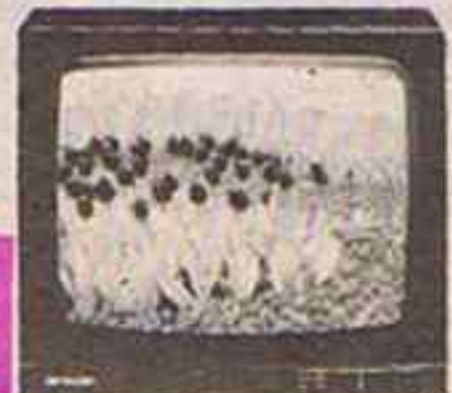
