# TAYLOR'S VOW: 'I'm sticking with Swans'

**BRILLIANT** rover Kevin Taylor, one of WA's most unpredictable players, has no thoughts of quitting Swan Districts.

Kevin Taylor — under pressure to succeed and determined to prove his critics wrong.

An emotional pledge of loyalty has come from the goal-kicking star despite being relegated to the reserves — and coming in for some harsh public criticism from coach John Todd.

*"I'm happy at Swans and there is no friction with Toddy," says Taylor.*

This very definite response by one of football's nomads came soon after he had put in just an average performance in the reserves — fuelling speculation that a fifth club could be his destination.

But Taylor, now 27 and with 154 games behind him in WA and Victoria, is adamant that he still has several top years of football ahead of him — and they will be at Swans.

*"Though I've struggled for form in recent weeks, I've enjoyed my football at Swan Districts and I'm determined to finish this season on a high note," Taylor said.*

Taylor's latest setback in a controversial career has seen him dropped from the league side with Todd suggesting on television that he has to have a good look at himself to see where he is going.

"He's now been at four clubs and it seems as though when the going gets tough, he can't handle it too well," said Todd.

Taylor admits that his form hasn't been too good — but he's determined to fight back. Whether he regains his premiership-winning form with East Fremantle in 1979, only time will tell.

The brilliant rover's indifferent football has surprised Swan Districts supporters, but he says he has been carrying an injury which has affected his game.

"I strained a hamstring against Subiaco on May 10, which has restricted me at training and I have lost some of my fitness," he said.

"I thought it was one of those niggling injuries I could carry, but it has restricted my speed which is my biggest attribute in football."

Taylor believes he should have probably rested the leg, but decided to take a chance.

### My decision


"It was my decision to play and unfortunately it was a gamble that didn't pay off," Taylor said.

Taylor said he has been under great pressure from club supporters to perform, with Swans struggling with the introduction of several new players to league football this season.

"As a senior player I've been trying to help the young guys in the team and I'm sure with more experience many of these guys will develop into top league footballers," he said.

"I can assure Swans' supporters that just because we are almost out of the finals race, that doesn't mean we will not be a competitive team for the rest of the season.

*"I'm determined to regain form and fitness and be a part of a Swans side that will finish the season on a positive note and look forward to being a power again next season."*

SUBIACO'S continued drive for expansion in the sponsorship area — where they have become trendsetters in the last two seasons — has seen them sign a new three-year deal with Morley motor firm, McInerney Ford. The association with Subiaco started in 1982 when Graham Farmer, one of the key sales team members at McInerney Ford, became involved with Subiaco's ruck brigade development — an area that has seen two of the best big men in the game emerge in Laurie Keene and Phil Scott. The \$60,000 McInerney Ford deal over the next three years involves the use of vehicles, cash awards and strong support of the Lions dinner auction.

### EARLY START

EAST Perth and East Fremantle were fairly keen to get into action at Perth Oval last week — they were both out on the ground before the umpires. The Sharks had been indulging in a light training session at one end of the ground as the Royals arrived on the field for some warm-up jogging. As the two camps eyed each other off, the umpires finally arrived to get things started.

### FAMILIAR FACE

WEST Australian football fans might have recognised a familiar face among the South Australian camp in the interstate game at Adelaide's Football Park. It was Geoff Blethyn, the former full-forward who played 33 games with Claremont back in the mid-1970s Blethyn, who originally came from Essendon in the VFL, is the assistant coach to Graham Cornes at Glenelg and was used in that support role in the State game.

### WAIT WORTHWHILE

MOST players have fond memories of their league debut, and Nick Greenwood, who achieved that honour with Subiaco last Saturday, certainly will. When Greenwood got the green light to take the field from the interchange bench, he received the ball just 10 metres away and within seconds. As he handballed the final siren blew, giving him his first touch in league football, but the game's last possession.

### TIGHT RACE

TALKING about milestones, Subiaco fans are watching with keen interest the progress of Phil Lamb and Neil Taylor. The two Lions stalwarts are heading towards the 200 Club together, with just seven games to go. Despite starting their careers a year apart (Taylor was first in 1975, followed by Lamb a season later) the two opened up this season on 182 games each. It's a tense situation as they move towards the 200-game mark, with no room for either player to falter, either in form or fitness.



IT'S not a very pleasant way to leave the field, particularly on a winning day. But that was the sad end to a good game from Claremont's Michael O'Connell after he collided heavily with Perth wingman Gavin Whittington.

### GOULDING DOUBLE

FOOTBALL fans who follow the progress of their club stars in Westside Football's Milestone Men segment on page seven noticed that Claremont's Steve Goulding notched his 100th game last week. But the Tigers ruck-rover is back in the list again heading for another century of games. His milestone last week was his 100th game including the five he played with North Melbourne before heading West. Now he's got just five games to go to earn his century of games with the Tigers.

### O'DEA'S TEAM

FORMER Perth general manager and long-serving official Jack O'Dea still has an important role to play at the club. Later in the season Perth plan a major fund-raising function in the form of "Jack O'Dea's best 20 team" — a night when the best players that O'Dea has seen pass through the club in nearly 40 years will be placed in an all-stars team. When you line-up some of the champion Demons of the past like Merv McIntosh, Barry Cable, Pat Dalton, Pat Astone, the Harpers and Moriartys and so forth, it will be a real champion side.

### SHORT-LIVED

WEST Perth, desperate for ruckmen in their camp, must think they are jinxed when it comes to big men. Last year they lost the services of Ramsay Bogunovich after a protracted clearance battle with Swan Districts and now they have seen their latest acquisition in Brett Buktenica go down injured. The former East Fremantle player was looming as league material, but injured his back in his first reserves outing.

### BIG MILESTONE

DASHING Claremont wingman Darrell Panizza reaches his 150th league game this Saturday — and it's been an amazing march to that milestone by the former Albany player. He made his debut in 1979, to play three senior games. He added 15 to that tally in 1980, but since then has hardly missed a game, his lowest tally for a season being 19 in 1982. Two other players now have 50-game milestones to their credit — West Perth's Paul Milka made it last week and Rod Grljusich gets there this week with his sixth game for Perth after 44 with South Fremantle.

### EXCLUSIVE CLUB

EAST Perth have launched something of an exclusive club — Perth's cheapest Dinner Club. The new-look Royals restaurant, now under the control of former top defender Dobbie Graham, has opened a Thursday Evening Dinner Club with Perth's cheapest meal — \$5, with jugs of beer only \$3.90. Graham, a 211-game veteran with the Royals, must be indulging in flashbacks to his playing days with prices like that!

### HANDY HELPERS

SOUTH Fremantle's playing depth might not be all that can be desired out on the field, but there's no shortage of strength and character off the field. The Bulldogs have agreed to help the club fight its way out of the financial doldrums by pledging to raise at least \$20,000 towards the South Fremantle budget for this year. After home games, the two players nominated as the team's best for the day will take up a bucket collection around the cabaret hall. The first effort raised \$380, so the members aren't letting the side down, either.



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# The half-way mark

AS football passes the half-way mark of qualifying games, the run home is going to tell many stories.

The WAFL has placed great emphasis on crowd attendances this season and while the figures are currently down on last year, there is still rays of hope at League headquarters.

On the playing, things are also a little gloomy. Unless Swan Districts can breathe new hope into the competition this week, it will be only a five-way battle for the finals over the next 10 qualifying games.

It's certainly been a frustrating year for football in general; a year of waiting as talk of the proposed national football league dominates the speculation of scribes across the nation.

Football fans are certainly a fickle lot, with great contrasts in attendances from week to week. But one thing is for certain — the good games will still drag them through the turnstiles, as we found out at Subiaco recently when more than 21,000 fans packed the ground to see Subiaco and Claremont do battle.

Up to Round 11 this year the crowd total is well down on 1985 — 368,000 compared to last year's tally of 390,000. But it must be remembered that last season saw some good early games (combined with similar good weather to this year) and there was only one round where the crowd total dropped below 30,000.

It was in the second half of last season that things fell apart a little with seven wet days in the next 10 weekends and only one Saturday where the four-game crowd topped 30,000.

A glance back to 1984 indicates that our current figures aren't all that bad — we are 2000 up on the figure as at Round 11.

So it's going to be up to the fans to keep the gates turning over in the next 10 weeks and hopefully the resurgence of the Lions, plus strong following for West Perth in their desperate bid to make the finals, which should see the figure finish up quite encouraging at the end of Round 21.

WITH East Perth and South Fremantle out of the finals race, it's pretty well impossible for them to draw big crowds, though the loyal fans will hang on in there. The same applies to Swans if they fall in their huge hurdle against reigning premiers East Fremantle at East Fremantle Oval this week.

But there is another role that WA's footballers can play in the crowd stakes.

Victory over Victoria in the Tuesday, July 8 interstate clash at Subiaco Oval would be a huge fillip for crowd enthusiasm in the following weeks.

Last week the crowds dropped off after WA had copped hidings from both interstate visitors — firstly South Australia and then the mighty Victorians proved their worth once again, ending two straight wins to the home side at Subiaco in the previous two years.

If WA can take out that Australian championship with a soul-stirring victory over the Vics, then football itself will be the winner for the remainder of the season.

# Tragedy of two clubs

**EAST Perth and South Fremantle have become embarrassments to the competition.**

**When you consider the record and respect these two teams have had in WA football, it's a pity they should become chopping blocks for other teams.**

It has reached the stage where other clubs can virtually rely on premiership points when they play them.

It's interesting to note they are the only two clubs to have had dissension in their ranks in respect to their coach. . . . which I believe has been a major factor in their miserable form.

This week the Royals and Bulldogs meet teams they beat in the first round.

Yet most critics will give them little chance of even making a good game of it, let alone tip them to give a repeat dose.

It amazes me that stop-gap coach Gerard McNeill could say, after the Royals were battered by East Fremantle last week, that the spirit lives on at East Perth.

If getting beaten by 10 goals is spirit, then heaven help the club.

It would seem McNeill was pleased his side was able to make a game of it for three quarters.

Quite frankly, he should have looked at the way the side caved in to allow the Sharks to score nine goals in the last term after having trouble shaking the Royals for three quarters.

It's a sad indictment on the performance of a club when a coach can be satisfied when his side is competitive for only some of the game.

It is that kind of attitude that has a side feeling they have done a good job if they get within a reasonable number of goals of a more highly-rated side.

East Perth deserve what they are get-



Don Haddow . . . intolerable situation. It was a precipitous move getting rid of Greg Brehaut as coach. He could quite easily be sitting back with a smug look on his face. I bet he isn't.

Being coach of a side is like being a parent. No-one likes to see them go off the tracks even if they have deserted the home.

I said in an earlier column that the directors at East Perth had turned this season into an abortive one by sacking Brehaut.

No-one at the club can have the slightest bit of satisfaction with the team's performances since Brehaut was sacked.

Under him the team was ferociously competitive. Since he's gone, they have become an embarrassment.

South Fremantle aren't any better. . . . but for a different reason.

Don Haddow's coaching contract should not have been renewed this year. That is no reflection on him. He simply has not had the support a coach should get.

Last season he had to suffer a situation where not all the players gave him full backing; it caused cracks to develop in the club.

Haddow has worked in an intolerable situation this season. There have been constant rumblings in the club that he should be sacked.

No coach can perform under such conditions, particularly when he doesn't have the players at his disposal.

South Fremantle and East Perth are laced with young talented players. In time they will again emerge as football forces.

All it will take is a little patience.

But for the sake of the competition and the reputation of the two clubs, they have to start becoming competitive for a full four quarters again.

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## Sharks end drought

**EAST Fremantle broke the drought at Perth Oval last week when they won the toss for the first time this year.**

Skipper Brian Peake called correctly for the first time since Ron Alexander picked right in last year's grand final.

I believe the longest run of outs was back in 1964 when South Fremantle's captain Gary Scott lost the toss in 21 consecutive games.

**SUBIACO recorded their highest score at Fremantle Oval against the Bulldogs last week.**

Their 25.14 last week beats the previous best of 23.17 in 1974 when Ross Smith was captain coach.

**EAST Perth have now been beaten by margins of 75 points, 75 points, 53 points and 60 points in their last four games.**

It is the only time that the Royals, now in the 81st year in the league, have been rolled by a margin of over 50 points in four successive games.

**SUBIACO have the chance to equal an achievement of their ancient past this week.**

It's a long time since they won eight

straight against Perth. They completed this feat back in the 1928 season — their best sequence of wins versus the Demons.

## RECORD CROWD

THE record crowd for a qualifying game in WA was established in May, 1969 when East Perth and West Perth met.

The Royals were unbeaten and the Falcons had lost one from the first eight rounds, so a fine day was the recipe for 26,760 people to queue for admission.

West Perth, two points down at the last change, won by 28 points and best-on-ground was current Falcons coach John Wynne, playing at centre-half-forward.

From the East Perth team, four players went on to become league coaches — Mal Brown, Bradley Smith, Grant Dorrington and Derek Chadwick and from the opposition, only Wynne has made the transition.

Four months later the same two sides met in the grand final and they drew another record crowd — the first 50,000 gate in WA football.

The respective coaches that year were Jack Sheedy (East Perth) and a player he developed into a national champion at Perth Oval — Graham Farmer.

The Cardinals, as they were then known, were runaway winners.

That was the year when the triplex grandstand behind the goals was opened.

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



## MOTHER BROWN

#### DIFFERENT CONCEPT



## FROM WHERE I SIT

## DISABILITY IS NO HANDICAP

AT different times I have been approached by people with disabilities and asked how they might become involved with a football team. They obviously had aspirations about becoming a coach or a committeeman with a club, but were not sure how to go about it.

It isn't difficult because most clubs, in particular junior clubs, are always on the lookout for people prepared to put time in for the benefit of players.

There is no point in being reticent about stepping up to a club official and letting him know that you want to have a go at being an official of some kind.

I had a fairly long period of time in the coaching arena, but I'm not the only one who has taken to be part and parcel of the football scene. Three other "wheelchair jockeys" I know have also given considerable time.

RAY DEVINE: Footy clubs always function better if the men running the show know what they are about. One of the less glamorous jobs, but certainly a most responsible one, is that of the club treasurer. Devine was with the Carlisle Amateurs from 1976 to 1978.

"I had mates playing," he said. "And when someone learned that I was an accountant, they asked me if I would pull on the job."

Ray enjoyed being involved, not only doing the books, but he was present at all training sessions and club functions. The job was almost seven days a week and after three years, he took a break.

RAY WILLIAMS: "Bozzo", as they call him in Bruce Rock, played for the town as a wingman-rover before a car smash left him a paraplegic. Like Ray Devine, he continued to take an interest in the game and eventually became a selector for the Eastern Districts Football League, which has 10 sides and covers a wide area, probably the biggest in the State.

He has spent a lot of time as a selector, but also served the district as an association delegate. His only gripe, he says, is when he comes to Perth for Wesfarmer country carnivals, the boys get a bit tired of lifting him in and out of grandstands.

"They need more lifts, I reckon," he said.

RON MARTIN: he played about 50 games with Richmond in Victoria during the 1950's and has always been an avid supporter of Australian Football. Ron came to WA to settle down and took up coaching juniors 12 years ago.

He has coached a number of teams over the years and sides have performed well for him and won premierships. His record is pretty healthy and his success rate is high enough for him to qualify for a more senior team — he would dearly love to have a crack at WAFL colts level.

"Coaching from a chair has never been difficult," says Ron. "The kids respect you if you earn it and they are always keen to do their best for you."

"They seem to think that the chair turns you into some kind of superman, who is having a go. This isn't true. We are no different from anyone else who is taking part for the love of the game."

Anyone who tells a disabled person that he can't coach because he can't give a physical demonstration, doesn't know what he is talking about. All you need to be right in the middle of it all is a command of the English language and the guts to have a go.

I'm sure a number of disabled people will read this story and, if so, I hope we'll hear something of them in theseasons to come.


Jeans and his players are looking forward to the clash with Carlton at the MCG next Sunday.

"I'm not going back. This is where it's at."

Daniels, 27, is in the middle of "second year horrors" — a common complaint in the VFL.

So many young stars fail to be as effective in their second season. Daniels is more experienced than most, having played 100 games with Claremont, and he's well aware that opposition teams have "sorted him out" to some extent.

"I played all but one match last year," he said. "But I've been inconsistent this year. We've been on telly a lot more and sides are taking more careful watch of us."

"Last year I was getting 25 possessions a match. In the end I made a rod for my own back."

After starting in Footscray's league side again in 1986, Daniels has been in the seconds for most of the last month.

He's still playing as ruck-rover, his favourite position, and is hoping his form loss is just temporary.

"We've all been down, but if you put in, you get the rewards back," he said.


Footscray general manager Shane O'Sullivan denied suggestions that Daniels and teammate Neil Cordy had been offered to Collingwood.

## Sports centre caters for football injuries

FOOTBALLERS of all ages and grades can take advantage of a new sports casualty clinic that is now open all weekend.

The Sports Medicine Centre, in Cambridge Street, Wembley, is one of the most fully-equipped and up-to-date casualty stations in Australia.

Highly-trained sports medicine people are on hand at all times to diagnose and treat a wide range of football injuries, such as broken jaws or concussion.

The opening hours are 8am to 7pm, which is a great bonus for weekend footballers particularly.

One of the major problems with any injury is the speed at which the person can receive treatment; the longer a muscle strain, for example, goes without treatment, the longer the recovery time generally is.

Speedy diagnosis of any injury is important and immediate treatment is generally more effective, thus helping get the sports person back into action.

The first six hours after an injury are vital. With the Centre being open till 7pm on Saturdays and Sundays, there is ample time for footballers to have their injury assessed and initial treatment put into operation.

The Centre, which is situated in the grounds of St John of God Hospital, has many pieces of equipment designed to rehabilitate muscle injuries, including the Cybex dynamometer, which is used to test the strength and power endurance of muscles and joints.

Diagnostic x-rays can be done on site, which gives injured footballers an immediate idea of how serious is their problem. There are ample fully-qualified staff on duty to then decide what the next step in rehabilitation is.

Appointments are not necessary, but telephone inquiries to 381 7266 will obviously speed up any treatment.

# KNOW YOUR CLUB



## Swans have success in long bursts

SWAN Districts might have won only six premierships in their 52-year career — but those flags have both come in brilliant hat-trick bursts.

Swans ended their long drought in 1961 when they won their first flag after entering the league in 1934.

They stayed at the top for two more years, but then it was almost 20 years later when the wheel moved again with another hat-trick in 1982-83-84.

Swans are the only WA club to achieve the hat-trick of premierships twice — and, in fact, they are WA's most successful club when it comes to contesting grand finals. They have won 66 percent of the grand finals they have tackled, being runners-up only three times out of their nine grand finals.

The club's modern era under coach John Todd has certainly been an impressive one — but history shows that their first burst of glory in the 1960s was no mean feat either.

Swans had a bevy of talent under the coaching of Haydn Bunton jun, the man who is now spearheading the Subiaco resurgence.

Bunton was a stern taskmaster; a strong disciplinarian and a great leader of men out on the field. As a courageous rover he had no peer and it was always a case of "do as I do and do as I say".

Percy Bright, one of the club's real stalwarts, was president at the time and the strong bond between administration and coach was repeated in the 1980s with both John Cooper and Bill Walker as president, working closely with Todd.

Some of the players in that '60s era have become football legends, probably none more so than Keith Slater,

whose ruck duels with the great Graham Farmer at the time was ranked among football's historic man-to-man duels.

The sheer football skill that was in the Swans side via talented and versatile men like Ken Bagley, John Turnbull, Fred Castledine, Colin Maynard and, of course, a rookie rover named Bill Walker, was the outstanding feature of the side.

Swans drifted out of the finals in the 1970s, but their return to power as that decade ended was a well-planned one.

In fact, it was at the end of 1979 and going in to 1980 that Swans notched their best winning sequence, 18 games in a row even though they missed the finals — but only by a whisker.

It looked as though 1980 was to be their year, but South Fremantle stepped in and spoil the plans and then the black-and-whites had to sit back for another year to watch Claremont take the flag before they finally got their chance.

The club's best winning sequence against rival sides is the 20 wins in a row at the expense of Subiaco from 1978 to 1984, with 17 straight wins over Perth being recorded in the same period.

One of the fascinating angles of Swans short history is that four full-backs have reached the 200-game-mark — Tim Barker, Joe Lawson, Steve Gillespie and Tom Mullooly. The careers of the first two and the latter two did overlap, but they were basically recognised as specialist custodians.

Swans appear to be short-on for leading goalkickers over the years, but several times they produced big performers only to see a rival club

have an even bigger scorer. Such was the case in 1937 and '38 when Ted Holdsworth posted tallies of 109 and 116, only to finish behind champion goalsneaks George Doig and Ted Tyson.

The same applied to Eric Gorman, the club's leading goalkicker from 1962 to 1968, kicking tallies like 93 and 97 only to be pipped by the champion Subiaco full-forward Austin Robertson.

Swans are a strong club, both financially and in membership, with solid support from their vast local district spreading north of Midland. Sponsorship is led by Swan Lager, with about 30 associate sponsors generating more than \$250,000 a year.

### THE BOARD

Bill Walker ranks among the few people to achieve all three major posts within a football club — champion player, coach and now president.

He joined the club in 1961 for "a one-year try out" and is still there. He has widespread business interests, mainly in hotels.

His vice-chairman is Midland pharmacist David Hewitt and they are joined on the board by advertising director Bob Reynolds, solicitor James Ride, retired electrical retailer Joe Sarich and real estate manager John Farris. Former player and umpire Lindsay Johnston a public servant, has recently resigned from the board.

### THE SELECTORS


Swan Districts probably have one of the biggest selection panels in local football history — eight people, most of whom played with the club.

## THE BREHAUT SACKING

I WOULD like to express my admiration for the administrators at East Perth in making the harsh but obvious move in their dismissal of Greg Brehaut as coach.

Having spent many years involved with football, both as a player and administrator, I know the dilemma East Perth administrators were faced with. The facts should be looked at constructively and unemotionally.

Firstly, Brehaut admitted that his football performances were unacceptable. It is abundantly clear that Brehaut did not have the ability to instill into that side the degree of discipline necessary to win consistently or to hold on to a winning position.

The argument that East Perth just don't have the players does not hold water. Go through their training squad and you see that man for man, East Perth match most other teams. The problem is a lack of consistency and lack of positivity amongst the players. This comes directly from the coach.

Football is a sport where the coach directly and indirectly, through personal example, positive thinking, charisma and applied psychology, affects the physical and mental attitude of the players. If this is not happening, then natural talent will succeed to a degree, but not enough.

Not one person at East Perth would deny that Brehaut's attitude is not one of total dedication, but dedication is not all that's needed.

The scribes constantly write about the tradition at East Perth; well what is tradition? To make it into the four to be eliminated on all but five occasions since 1945? I think not. Tradition demands success.

Administration of football clubs must be strong enough to be totally committed in their beliefs and decisions and be prepared to accept the criticism that the right decision sometimes will evoke from the sentimentalists whose hearts rule their reasoning. They must remember that the club is there for the benefit of all, not the individual.

He was inconsistent, indecisive and, I believe, had more desire to be the centre of attraction than the game. A check of Cooper's career shows that before 1986 he had umpired a total of seven league games since 1980 + No club would retain a player on that type of record; why does the WAFL?

It's time they pursued some of the men who have played the game, have the experience, and can relate to players. Men of the calibre of Stan Nowotny, John Hayes, Stan Magro, Noel Carter, George Michalczek. They wouldn't take any funny business +

Some of our best umpires have been former players, yet that now seems a bygone era. Why aren't there any former footballers on today's umpiring panel?

Only two of our present-day group of umpires have umpired more than 100 games - Ron Buckley and Mike Ball. Three others have reached the 50 mark. One cannot but help wonder what the Umpires Board is up to when one considers that last season our most experienced umpire and only 200 game veteran, Ron Buckley, spent most of the season languishing in reserves. I'm sure Buckley must be aware that this was because he dared speak out early last season against the system.

One major improvement which the WAFL could start with would be to ask the Umpires Board for one word to be spread among their ranks - consistency +

# The Vics get sweet revenge

VICTORIA were bitter about losing the Teal Cup to Western Australia in 1985 and last Monday they had sweet revenge when they thrashed the Sandgroppers 23.15 to 4.4 in this year's final.

WA's loss means that they are the first State not to retain the title after a win.

The awesome Big V had 13 players selected in the All-Australian 17s side after the Adelaide carnival.

The other seven States each provided a sole representative. WA's player is South Fremantle's Richard Graham, of Narrogin.

Victoria swept everything before them during the championship and downed WA's Town and Country WA-sponsored team by 87 points in their qualifying match.

WA, however, won two qualifying games. They beat South Australia by 45 points and Queensland by 91.

The writing may have been on the wall for WA's demise. In their pre-championship trials they lost a game by seven goals to East Fremantle under 19s, who were third on the ladder at the time.

The season before they beat South Fremantle, the top colts side at the time, by 14 goals and subsequently went on to win their first Teal Cup.

Since the championship became an annual contest in 1963, Queensland were title-holders to 1973, New South Wales between 74 and 75, Victoria in 76 and 77, South Australia 78 to 80 and Victoria 81 to 84.



Like so many talented all-rounders, Piromalli will eventually face the crossroads of total commitment.

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

# Concentration it's the key

PERHAPS the greatest difference between the good average league player and the great player is that key human ability — concentration.

How many times do you see a player perform at a top level for a quarter or half a game then completely disappear for the remainder of the game.

Every team has players who frustrate supporters and, in particular, coaches as a result of their continual disappearance during the game.

Why is it that one team can hold another team for periods of the game then allow the opposition to destroy them? It all relates to one team's level of concentration.

Concentration is basic to athletic performance. After the player (athlete) learns control and energy regulation through relaxation, techniques for improving concentration follow.

A player's ability to completely focus all energy and power takes time, effort and practise.

Concentration is the player's ability to tune out all distractions from his single minded involvement in the game.

Once concentration can be controlled, the player and his team will have a marked influence on the outcome of that particular game.

The practice of switching channels each time concentration is lost and then returning to the assigned task given to him by the coach, improves the ability to focus on one thought over a period of time (the quarter or game).

It is essential for the player to learn to dismiss the error and get back to the game.

Unfortunately, most coaches have a habit of reinforcing the error by sending the runner to the player and telling the player again what he did wrong.

It is essential for coaches to endeavour to use the runner as a means of assisting the player's concentration by using positive thoughts in messages given.

As a coach, I have been guilty of reinforcing errors through the runner. But through continual coach education, I am endeavouring to overcome this habit.

It is essential that junior coaches

become aware of the need to teach players how to concentrate. Training drills and personal guidance during a game can have a great effect upon the player learning to concentrate.

Players who can concentrate, projecting performance in mental images, are preparing the nerves, the muscles, the heart and the mind to unify their physical action towards a single minded objective when playing the game.

Australian football coaches in general, don't place enough education into this key element of performance with their players.

## Successful teams are built on this

IT is obvious to anyone who watches Subiaco that team work is their key ingredient to success.

Players in successful teams like the Lions develop enormous respect and understanding for each other.

They seem to have a sixth sense, knowing that a mate will be in position to help without looking for him.

Unsuccessful teams have a hard core of players who don't really care — they are more interested in their own personal performance and getting a game the following week.

To play as a team, each player must make a commitment to all his teammates and his coach.

This commitment need not be ver-

bal; it can be seen by all football followers on the field.

The commitment I am talking about is judged by a player's ability to chase, tackle, harass, shepherd, run when it hurts, run to pick up a man who may not be his immediate opponent.

In general, committed players play for the warm feeling that results when you know you have done something good for a team-mate, even though no one else might have noticed.

Watching the Lions, their commitment is evident to each other. They are the best Subiaco team that I have seen in my football time.
