# THE BUNTON MAGIC

## The little master controls the Lions

IT is no surprise that Subiaco's rise to power has coincided with the return to the club of Haydn Bunton.

It was Bunton who developed a polished combination over a five-year period from 1968 to '72 and then watched his proteges win their fifth premiership in 1973.

Bunton could well have sat back claiming the accolades that were then being bestowed upon his replacement, Ross Smith.

Remembling it was Bunton who introduced such rare football talent like Peter Featherby, Mike Fitzpatrick and Keith Watt to league football.

It was he who watched patiently as these and other youngsters developed into football match-winners and led the Maroons to victory over the Cardinals in the 1973 grand final.

### MODEST

Bunton's great modesty would have made certain he was not outspoken on the subject. But deep down he must have wished it was he who was holding the premiership cup aloft.

Now in 1986 the Bunton magic continues to thrive as he has transformed a bunch of footballers playing below their potential to their current full capacity.

As in his first term at the club, he has uncovered some tremendous young talent on the verge of setting the football world alight.

In true Bunton style, he took a low-

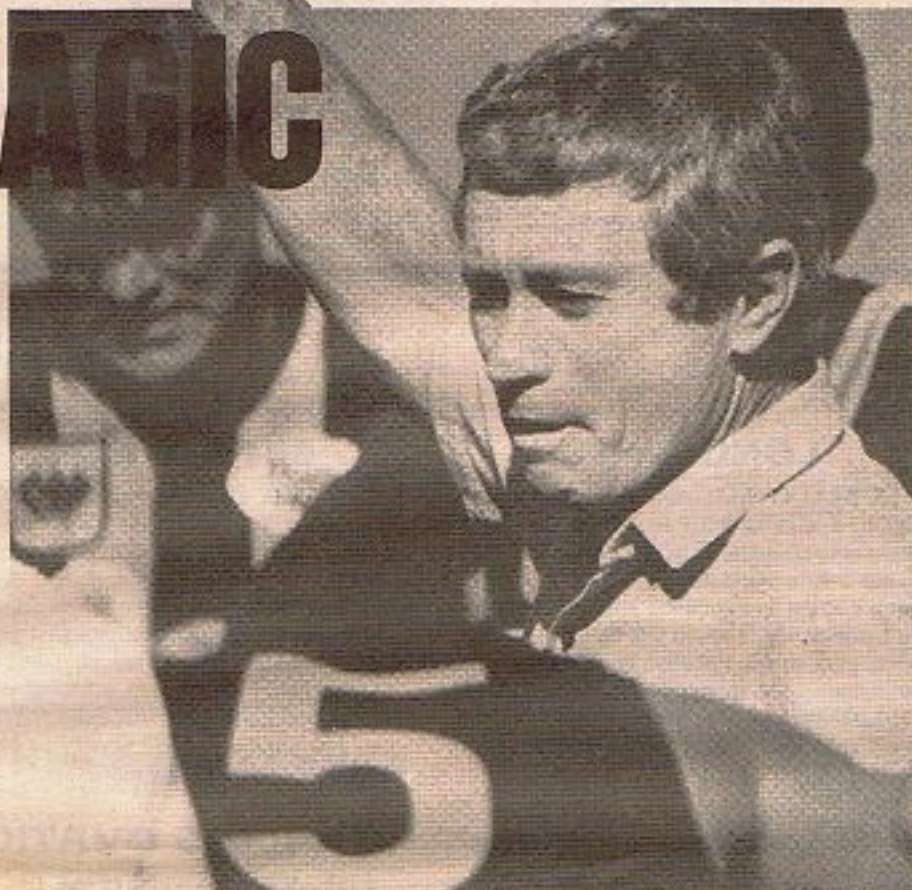
key role on his arrival back at the club in 1984, as he reviewed the Lions playing strength and slowly got to know the players and their football capabilities.

The Lions did not improve greatly on the ladder that season, but there was a renewed confidence coming back into the Lions Den which has been missing since the halycon days of the early 1970's

As a player, Bunton was not blessed with talent in the John Todd, Barry Cable or Graham Farmer mould. But he inspired his Swan Districts players to three successive flags in 1961-62-63 and impressed the umpires with his fearless courage and determination to succeed.

His legendary grit is starting to show out in many of his current players, especially those who are not blessed with brilliant skills.

Bunton has made no secret of his admiration for several of his lesser lights in Glen O'Loughlin, Kevan Sparks and even Brian Taylor, who Bunton has transformed from a player on the verge of quitting league football to one of the most valuable in league ranks.

Bunton has developed the enormous raw talent of Laurie Keene and Warren Dean into two of the most exciting prospects to come out of WA football for several seasons.

Hard, but necessary, discipline last season has seen this pair improve dramatically in a short space of time.

Veterans like Peter Featherby and Neil Taylor are now playing the best football of their careers. And club vice-captain Phil Lamb played inspired football in last season's final round after Bunton had given him the much-needed confidence he had been lacking in the final qualifying rounds.

Giving players confidence is a key attribute in the Bunton coaching philosophy.

His ability to transform reject players from other clubs, like Sparks and Clinton Roberts, into top com-

petitive league footballers is a credit to his uncanny ability in judging football talent.

Greg Carpenter is another player who looked like heading for the football scrapheap. But Bunton has given this skilful player the necessary confidence to repeat his brilliant feats of his outstanding debut season in 1982.

The improvement and consistency in the game of classy half-forward Stephen Sells this season is yet another example of the Bunton coaching magic.

Bunton only asks that his players play to their potential and he is satisfied.

If the Lions don't go one better this season after the disappointment of last year's grand final loss, Subiaco supporters can take some solace from the fact that their popular little coach has given it his best shot.

# WHAT THEY SAID

A round-up of some of this week's football comments

"We have not released a definite figure, but it's fair to say we have access to an almost unlimited amount." Claremont president Ian Goldie on reports that the Tigers have access to \$10 million from Asian sources to back their national competition entry.

"This type of striking is different and it's dangerous." WAFL tribunal chairman Bernie O'Sullivan suspending East Fremantle's Gerard Neesham for three weeks for striking East Perth's Tony Papotto with a raised forearm.

"West Perth and Claremont have come clean about their national football ambitions and we know Subiaco have been in touch with the VFL also. I guarantee that all eight clubs will be in the melting pot when the VFL invitation is issued." West Perth president Rod Brown.

"The WAFL without the eight clubs doesn't have a product to market." West Perth president Rod Brown.

"We probably lost the game against Claremont, rather than them winning. We have to learn how to win." East Perth coach Gerard McNeill.

"Having no previous coaching and competing against people like John Todd and Mal Brown, I couldn't see any point on jumping up on the same stage." West Perth coach John Wynne explaining his low-key media approach last year.

"The umpires are taking the physical contact out of the game." Channel 7 critic Bruce Monteath.

"It's easy to coach a side when things are going well." Swan Districts coach John Todd.

"An expanded VFL competition would provide us with so much variety." WAFL chief executive John Walker on plans to use the WACA Ground (and its proposed lights) for both Perth and East Perth and national games.

"It was always understood that expatriate players not required by their home State could play for their new state." WAFL football affairs manager Peter Evans explaining why Geoff Miles and Colin Waterson are eligible to play for WA against Victoria.

"I don't necessarily agree that the local competition will die; in the finish I think you'll see both the national series and the local games thrive." ABC sporting commentator George Grljusich.

"The only way for Perth to beat Subiaco is to tackle them hard and often; put them down and let them know they're playing." 6PR's Bob Cribb previewing last week's big clash.

"Their attitude and injuries will determine whether we finish in the four or not, we've just got to be consistent and put some wins together." West Perth coach John Wynne.

"I felt we were heading for the Guinness Book of Records. I was down near the North Mole and thought I might just keep going that way." Swan Districts coach John Todd on his team's poor two-goal first half against East Fremantle.

"East Perth were far more competitive, but never seriously threatened by a skilful Claremont side." Channel 7's Eric Sarich.

"It was a handy goal — hands in the back." Geoff Christian discussing a controversial goal on radio 6NR.

"Let's see some of the scribes get off the negative aspects of South Fremantle and write something positive; they're a good side." Radio 6NR commentator Tim Flynn.

"If you want to perform, it's purely up to you." West Perth rookie Dean Laidley.

"Don't worry, Toddy. If you get bad enough you'll finish up on this panel with the other sacked coaches." Channel 7's Bob Maumill.

"We were weak in the second quarter and there were a couple of guys who were weak in the first, third and fourth as well." Perth coach Mal Brown after his team's game against Subiaco.



## LONG WAIT

SUBIACO wingman Bevan Warner has had a long wait to notch his 50th game milestone. Warner had to overcome a late start to last season; a setback that was repeated this year when he opened the season on 48 games. He managed one senior appearance in round six, but injury kept his sidelined till last week when he worked his way back into the league side for the clash with Perth.

## BETTER NOW

FORMER East Perth goalsneak John Scott has certainly enjoyed his two clashes against his old side this year. The Claremont full-forward didn't kick a goal against the Royals in his first two games after switching camps last year — and managed just three in their final round clash, which was a losing effort. But in two games against East Perth this year the hard-working Scott has bagged tallies of 5.1 and 7.2.

## STANDING OVATION

THE 50th anniversary of the East Perth 1936 premiership victory over Claremont was marked by a special luncheon at the WAFL with players from both teams present last Saturday. Three of the Royals veterans also made it back to Perth Oval for the after-match trophy presentations and Leo Graham, Artie Hall and Ray Starr were given a standing ovation by the entire East Perth team of '86 when they were introduced to the members. Graham, who earned the tag of WA's first flying footballer when he flew in from Narrogin for a game many years back, made the speeches on behalf of his teammates and quipped: "We were obviously a pretty good side; we beat Claremont, so you guys have got a bit more improving to do."

## LUCKY ROYAL

YOUNG East Perth reserves player Howard Cropley certainly believes in the old adage of grabbing opportunities with both hands. Cropley was one of five Royals left out of the reserves side when the team was picked last Thursday night and when he arrived at Subiaco Oval on Saturday for the clash with Claremont he was resigned to be a supporter. But a late withdrawal meant that he earned a last-minute reprieve and even though he played in borrowed gear (lesson No. 1 — always take your boots to the footy) he still managed to put in a top performance. In fact, he received a trophy from reserves coach Kevin Bryant — almost total assurance that he'll be in the side this week.

## MICHAEL'S BID

THE comeback attempt by Stephen Michael was thwarted by a nagging calf muscle — a legacy of a lack of pre-season training. The dual Sandover Medallist was enticed out of retirement and though he played two reserves games, his bid to resume in senior football was never destined to succeed. Michaels' legs have carried him to many brilliant games, but without his summer preparation, they just didn't stand up to the rigours of football. What a pity.

## CAMPBELL'S ROLE

FORMER West Perth and WA coach Graham Campbell has emerged as a candidate to be an independent coach of South Australia. Campbell, currently living in Adelaide but not coaching a team after losing the Glenelg post, has been suggested as an ideal State coach if the SANFL were to break from tradition of appointing the previous season's premiership coach — as is the case in WA. Current Glenelg coach Graham Cornes, who led SA to victory over the VFL and then defeat at the hands of WA, inherited this year's job by taking his side to last year's flag. But he rejects the suggestion of an independent coach. "For a State coach, you need someone close to the game; those who are currently coaching meet that need the best," he says.

## FAMILY TRIO

FOOTBALL has many sets of brothers in the limelight, but trios are a little rarer even though there are some in Victoria. One family name that has been around for a while is the Rendell brothers, but it's taken time for all three boys to play senior football the same weekend. Big ruckman Matt led Fitzroy on the same weekend that Steve returned to senior football with West Torrens (in SA) after a knee reconstruction. Tim Rendell played with VFA second division club Caulfield the same weekend. The trio had something in common with their widespread games — they all lost.

## ANOTHER CHANGE

VICTORIAN footballer Michael Lockman, who played 15 games with West Perth in 1984, has been involved in some more player-shuffling. The utility player went to South Adelaide last year and was headed back there this season — before Collingwood stepped in. Lockman was on a six-week lease to Richmond, but that was due to expire and he was heading back to Adelaide before Collingwood snapped him up. The 22-year-old had played three senior games with Richmond, but was axed with the return of Maurice Rioli.

## ROYAL FEELING

THE spirit is strong at East Perth, according to coach Gerard McNeill. A speech by Chris Allen at the club's presentation of trophies back at Perth Oval on Saturday night confirms that. Allen, a prodigal son who has returned to the Royals this year, was named best player for the team against Claremont — but he was a bit over-awed about the top trophy. Declaring that the team still needed a win to restore some credibility, he donated his trophy to property man Pat Watson. Allen said that Watson was one of the real workers around the club, showing the genuine Royals spirit and for that reason was deserving of a trophy.



## GOLDEN TARGET

THE big game against Victoria on July 8 has more than the Australian championship at stake — lucky footy fan is going to be \$25,000 richer. Football's most expensive prize is in the shape of a Golden Goal trophy with an 18 carat gold ingot worth \$25,000 going to a lucky name to be drawn out of a barrel. The Emu Export Lager-sponsored competition involves nominating the team to kick the first goal in the State of Origin match and attach a Red Seal of Quality from a carton of Emu Export Lager to the entry. Then it's just a question of whose envelope comes out first.

## STATS RECORD

SOUTH Fremantle earned a small place in WA football history last week against West Perth. In recent years, with official statistics being recorded in the Sunday Times, records have come quickly and this time the Bulldogs have broken the record for the number of hit-outs in a match. Their experienced No. 1 ruckman Craig Edwards had 38 hit-outs against West Perth and backed-up by rookies Dean Irving and Gordon Gatti, plus some unusual support from Gavin Carter and Stephen Rowe, the team had 61 hit-outs. The previous record of 58 belonged to Subiaco.

# SURVIVING IN SYDNEY

It's not easy following football in Sydney. Real football that is.

Being a fan of the Australian game is not quite as bad as being a pimp or a pom, or even a wog, which is an all-embracing Sydney euphemism for anybody who isn't a pom but who wasn't born here and is probably a pimp anyway.

It's almost as bad as being a cop. And in Sydney, that's bad.

Australian football fans, by and large, are looked on here by the rugby league lowerarchy as more to be pitied than put upon, though there are signs that the Swans' success is starting to get under some thick skins and up some broken noses.

As a former "fringe dweller," I've copped my share in the past six years ("He's from Western Australia, where they're amazed by rain and three-storey buildings" etc).

It wouldn't be quite so bad if only Kimberly William Hughes had stuck his tongue out and told them to rack off and belt their game, instead of turning on the tears. They understand that sort of language over here.

Thank God Dennis Lillee had the good sense to kick that wog Miandad.

But we suffer in comparative silence (and for me that's hard), we dedicated fans of the Australian game, prophets without honour in our own country.

## THE MIRACLE

We roll up every second Sunday or so in winter to watch from the best appointed ground in the country and hope for that miracle every real fan here so desperately wants and every Melbourne club official so desperately fears - a VFL premiership flag being unfurled from the clock tower at Sydney Town Hall.

Four years ago, when Mick Aylett sent the Swans into exile, it was a pipe dream; today, it's a very real dream that could be only a couple of years away.

And that has rugby league worried. Really worried.

For a sport faced with dwindling attendances and a sadly tarnished public image, rugby league has a lot of fence mending to do.

But some of its self-appointed spokesmen still go out of their way to denigrate the Swans in general and Australian football in particular.

One Saturday morning radio talk-back show host, who also writes rugby league for one of the dailies, refused to take calls on Australian football or the Swans. He even refused to take calls on his refusal to take calls.

And despite the fact that the high-flying, high profile Swans this season have outdrawn every rugby league game bar two and have just about trebled attendances at all the soccer games put together, Australian football runs a poor fourth in newspaper coverage behind league, soccer and rugby union.

Only friends and relations go to the rah rahs (or bottom sniffers), and only two men (both wogs) and a dog to the soccer, yet both sports get disproportionately wider coverage in the daily press.

But even that's changing.

Thanks to the good (depending from where you sit) doctor, the Swans are very firmly placed on the Sydney map. And they're even more firmly here to stay, paving the way for an eventual national competition.

So we embattled fans of the national game are hanging in there, cheering for the red and white (that hurts, believe me), sipping our Foster's ("Sissy beer!") or Swan ("I wouldn't give that to a Jap on Anzac Day") shunning the foreign Resch's and Toohey's and praying for that dream to come true.

There may yet be honour in the country.

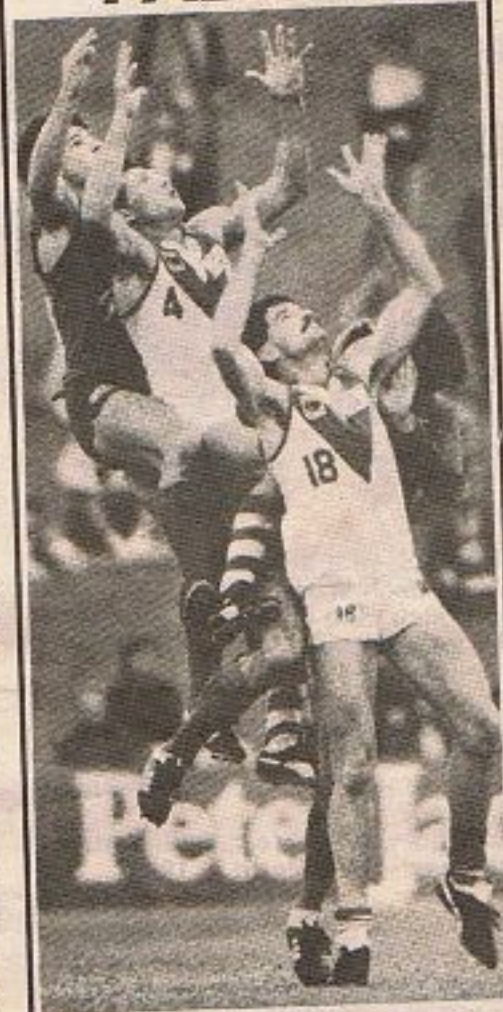

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# Our footy standard

A NUMBER of critics have come out in strong support of the standard of WA football in recent days — but that doesn't seem to be carrying much weight with the football public.

Down-to-earth critics like Channel 7's Fremantle boy, Bob Maumill and the man-of-many-media-roles, Tim Flynn, were both strong in their praise of WA football last week.

They felt that too many critics were continually prepared to "knock" the game and the players; too willing to live in the past and simply talk about the star players who have headed across the border.

"Let's get behind our product a bit more," was Maumill's plea on Seven. "The game's not as bad as some of the so-called experts make out."

Flynn had similar sentiments on radio 6NR, even though he was mainly referring to the much-improved form of South Fremantle.

"They're not a bad side at all," said Flynn as the Bulldogs went down to West Perth by just six points in a high-class game.

Many of our radio critics have experienced some exciting matches this season as the average winning margins drop considerably. The 48 matches this season have resulted in an average winning margin of 40 points — a far cry from the 80-odd points that was the running average at times last year.

With Subiaco, East Fremantle and Claremont dominating things at the top of the table and, unfortunately, East Perth and South Fremantle being chopping blocks, it's only natural that some games will be one-sided.

It is certainly a tragedy that the battle for the final four has developed into a fairly lack-lustre performance, though Perth and West Perth can keep the pot stirred in the next few weeks, providing they maintain their fiercely competitive approach.

What we need is some more positive media comments about the game; let's forget about who has defected to the East; concentrate moreso on the stars over here.

Unfortunately, we lack sparkle among the media personalities — and our promotion is not helped all that much by the coaches.

We need more controversy; more colour; more comments from the coaches. Too many coaches have been reluctant to come out with highly-provocative statements in case the opposition use their words as ammunition back against them at some future date.

Football has gained some added credibility with the much-improved Channel Seven World of Football show (and it's good to see that all eight league coaches have now made their appearance on a Sunday) but we need more impetus and more razzamatuzz.

One factor that is worrying must be the lack of radio coverage for one game a week.

No wonder East Perth fans have stopped going to the footy — even the radio has stopped broadcasting their games with four of their last five games not being put to air.

Maybe the WAFL, in their promotional budget, could have looked at "buying" Saturday afternoon time on either 6IX or 6KY to make sure all four games were covered.

# The wheel of fortune.

HOW quickly the cycle can turn in sport. There's an adage in politics that is equally applicable to football. . . . a rooster one day; a feather duster the next.

Two men who have been catapulted into the super coach category in recent seasons, on opposite sides of the continent, are finding that out.

John Todd has found himself relegated to the scrap bin of WA football while Essendon's Kevin Sheedy is facing a similar situation.

They are finding, like a lot of coaches before them, that good players make good coaches.

It has happened in reverse for Tom Hafey with the Sydney Swans. After establishing a top reputation with Richmond, he found himself on the slippery dip with coaching stints at Collingwood and Geelong.

But the Swans buying spree gave him the players to exploit his coaching talent.

Ron Barassi is another who took a big dive as a coach. The magic wand he waved over Carlton and North Melbourne became a walking stick with Melbourne, which crippled his reputation.

There's no doubting the coaching ability of the above four. But it doesn't matter how good you are, there is no magic formula if you don't have the players.

The trouble with sport is that some people are elevated to almost god-like status.

You have to be a particular type to handle such adulation, otherwise it can lead to you becoming intoxicated with your own importance and when the crash comes, it can be very painful.

## Subiaco add another record

LAST week Subiaco scored 15.8 in the first half to equal their best first-half score; recorded against East Perth earlier this season.

What is the biggest score in the first half of league football?

On September 5, 1981, South Fremantle's half-time score read 21.10 to West Perth's 5.21. The Bulldogs eventually won 40.18 to 12.6.

Swan Districts also recorded a 20-goal first half against Subiaco in 1979, before winning 40.11 to 20.7.

The record for one quarter of football in WA stands to the credit of Subiaco who, in the third quarter of a 1959 semi-final, kicked 16.8 to Perth's 0.1. The Lions finally won 26.23 to 7.8.

COUNTRY cousins the Kicketts have much in common.

As well as an abundance of natural football talent, they are all with their second league club.

Larry went from East Perth to Claremont, Derek from West Perth to Claremont and Graham from East Fremantle to South Fremantle.

LAST week Swan Districts could manage only 2.8 by half-time, which brought the inquiry — how long since Swans scored only two goals in the first half?

Not years, but only-weeks — May 24 against Claremont their score was only 2.5 at half-time.

TAKE a look at the top four teams this week as they may not read the same after Saturday.

I believe it is the first time in league history that these four have comprised the top four at any time in any season. CAN Subiaco beat Swans this week?

It will be a hat-trick for the Lions if they can, as they last won three straight against Swan Districts way back in 1973, the year they won the premiership. Now there's an omen — that was 40 meetings ago.

TALKING of hat-tricks, what about the Falcons.

Can they win their third successive game against Claremont?

It was 1975 when West Perth last won three on end against the Tigers and it was back in 1978 when they last won on Claremont Oval.

CAN the Demons end the drought?

It is now 14 wins straight to the Sharks — Perth last beat East Fremantle on July 4, 1981 at Lathlain Park, 23.24 to 21.9.

The week before Perth were belted to the tune of 125 points.

The only Demons left with those sweet and sour memories are Bryan Cousins, Alan Montgomery and Mick Rea.

## How quick it turns

Todd and Sheedy are heading for the football wilderness for different reasons.

It is obvious the cycle has turned for Swan Districts.

In Sheedy's case a crop of injuries to his top players has relegated the seemingly invincible Essendon to a side battling to just make the finals, let alone a hat-trick of premierships.

If he can get his players back then they are still a premierships chance.

But for Swans, it's a case of back to the drawing board.

After 14 years straight as a league coach, 10 with the same club, Todd may find he needs a change, if not a break, from the rigours of league football.

If he needs a new challenge he doesn't have to look beyond Swans. But having taken them from the bowels of WA football to the top, he really doesn't have a great deal to prove there.

There's no doubting his coaching ability, even though Swans are on a downer.

But it must be hard to swallow having plunged to a candidate for the wooden spoon only two seasons after completing a hat-trick of premierships.

The danger is that supporters, used to success, will start to point the finger at him if the bottom drops out of the team. . . .and there were signs of that happening in the first half against East Fremantle on Saturday.

That's unlikely to worry Todd. He's one person who knows that football miracles don't happen in a season.

## WOODEN SPOONERS

THE meeting of South Fremantle and East Perth could well decide who gets the season's most unwanted title of Wooden Spooners for 1986.

Only once before have these teams been the bottom two and that was in 1964.

The Royals have finished last four times in their 80 years — 1964, 1959, 1913 and 1911 while the Bulldogs have collected the wooden spoon 11 times — the last time being 1972.

## Subiaco set for No. 12

SUBIACO will record win number 12 for the season when they meet Swan Districts at Subiaco Oval this Saturday.

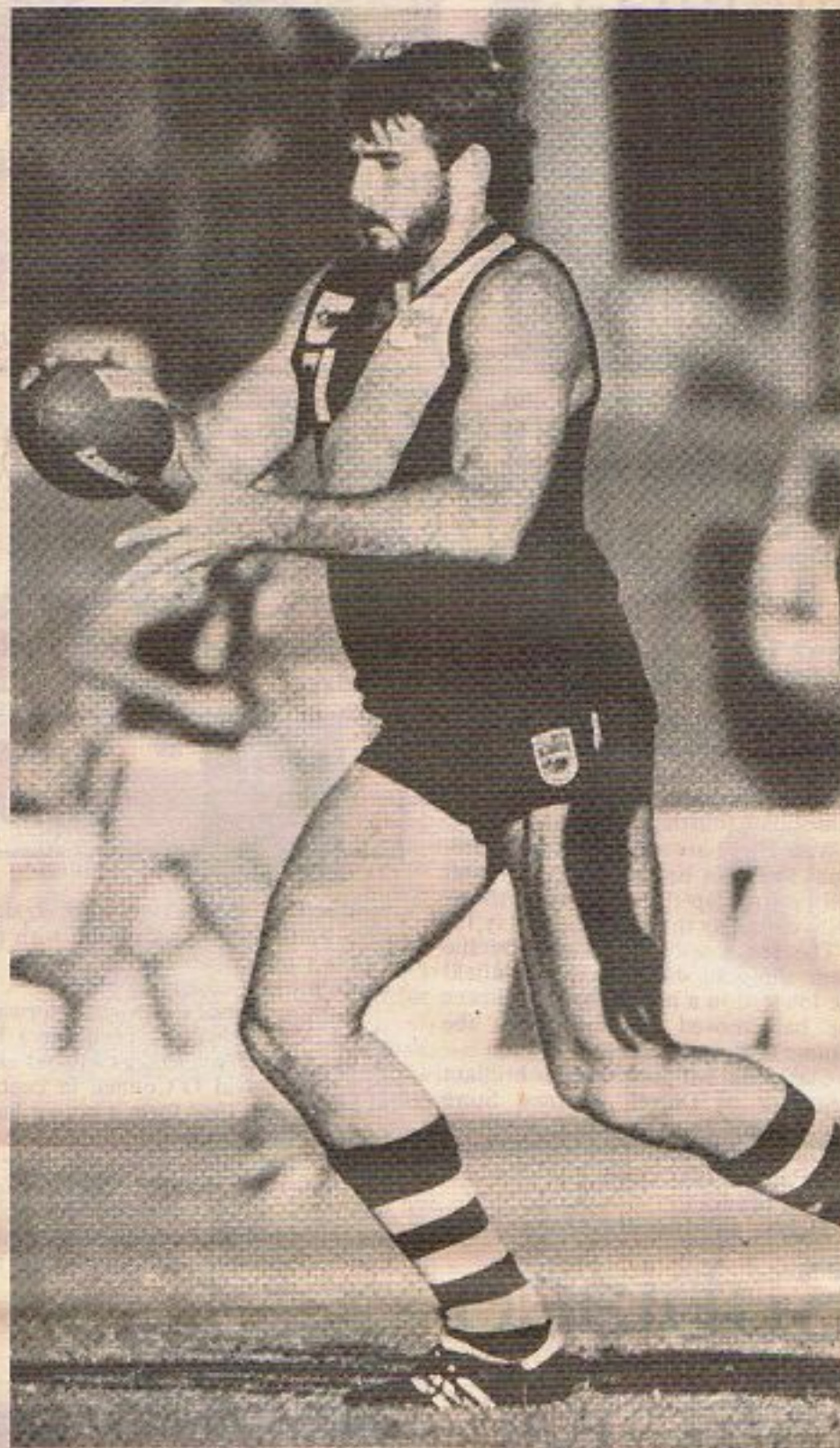

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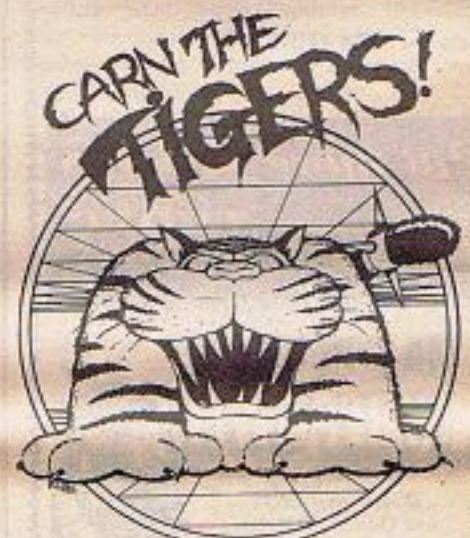

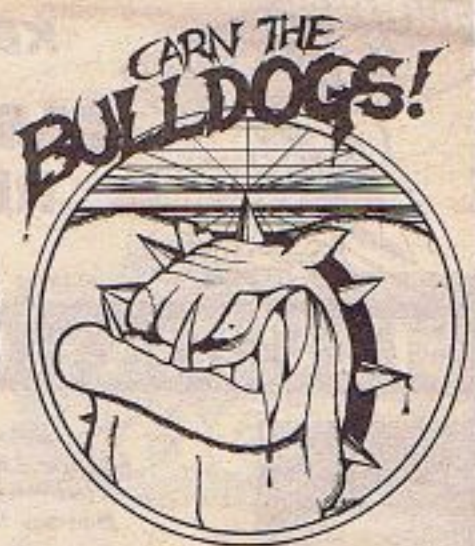

### TEAM LISTS ARE A MUST

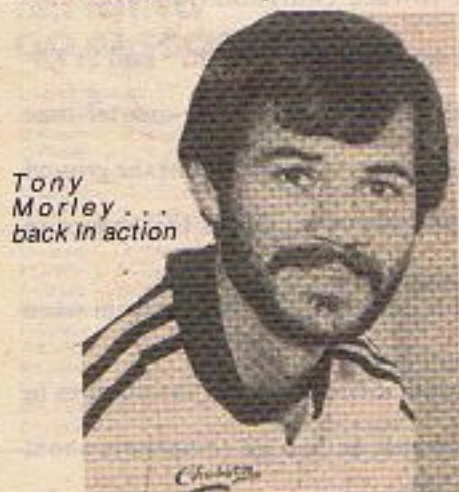
IT IS time the clubs got their act together and made sure that they have accurate team listings in the Football Budget every week. Last Saturday in the reserves game between West Perth and South Fremantle it was hopeless trying to keep track of the new players in each side. It is normal practice for a player not listed in the reserves list, to be placed in the league list. But that was not the case on Saturday. People pay 60 cents for the Budget and the clubs have an obligation to supply up-to-date team lists.

### TV REPLAYS

I CANNOT understand why the situation with TV replays of reportable incidents has changed this season. A policy used to exist where television stations would not show such incidents till after the tribunal hearing. This year that policy has changed with the channels replaying incidents several times. This has certainly condemned several players well before any tribunal hearing.

### UMPS CONDEMNED

THE decision of television stations to show situations which should have been reported has also made the umpires the meat in the sandwich. Presidents, coaches and players are not allowed to make any comments about the umpires, but umpires can be placed in an awkward situation when incidents shown on television are not reported. That was the case for Mike Ball last week when he was dropped — not relegated — after failing to make a report in the game between East Perth and East Fremantle. Where is the sense of fair play? The umpires do not have the chance to announce publicly why they did not make a report and I believe that is wrong in this democratic society.

## Pick our best side

If the WAFL really wanted to make clubs budget to function more efficiently, though maybe not perform as well, simply bring in a rule which makes all clearances cash deals. If they can't put up the money, then they go without.

This would have certainly kept most of those clubs who are in the red out of trouble had it been introduced earlier.

Collingwood, reportedly in for something like \$3 million, would have, in retrospect, appreciated it.

Without Sydney's dramatic marketing drive, the VFL obviously would be facing another big drop in attendances.

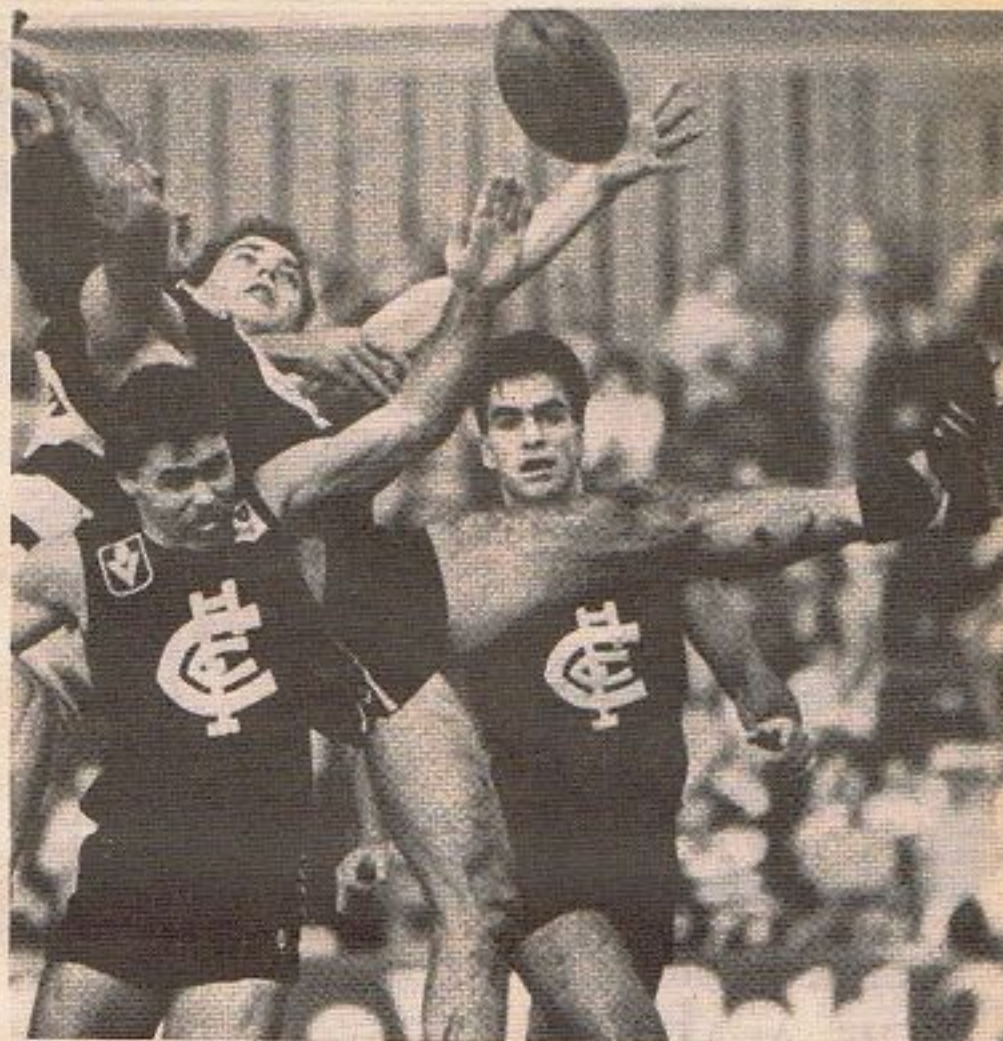
### TASSIE BID

## GELLIE JOINS THE UMPS

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# Gibbs the risk taker...

ROSS Gibbs freely admits he is a risk taker but he makes no excuse for his ways.

"Well, that's what footy's all about," he declared.

"To win, you've got to attack.

"Okay, it's all a risk but the only way you're going to win is by attacking.

"Every now and then I get caught out but the majority of the time it comes off."

Opposition resting rovers can testify to this as, so often, they see the number two guernsey bounding away from them to send enormous screw punts downfield to turn defence into attack.

"If it doesn't come off early, I go back to the basics and just stand by my player for a quarter or whatever until things settle down a bit and away I go."

Gibbs, a spectacular high mark, is not afraid to back his judgement and attempt the odd "screamer" in defence either.

"It depends on the players around you.

"Our back line is pretty good for that. They'll either say 'Stay down' or 'You've got to go' and you've just got to listen out for the players around you.

"If I think I can mark it, I'll go for it and if I don't, I'll spoil.

"It depends on the situation too, of course.

## ... still a high-flier

Adelaide football writer DION HAYMAN files this special story on former West Perth and now Glenelg star Ross Gibbs.

"If it's a ruckman, naturally I don't try and take a mark over him.

"I assess the situation just before I go for it — see who's around, what's around — and if there's not too many big blokes, then I have a crack at it."

If Gibbs has not taken the mark or spoiled, he can usually be seen picking up the crumbs, sometimes tucking the ball under his arms as he runs downfield.

Gibbs said he does this in a bid to break away from his opponents because a recent groin operation has dropped his pace.

"I get about 10 yards start and they still seem to catch me so I try to knuckle down and get away but it doesn't seem to work."

Gibbs 26, played 97 games for West Perth and two for Western Australia before joining Glenelg in 1984.

He said it was in the West where he picked up his habit of kicking mammoth screw punts.

"Yeah, I don't mind the odd torpedo.

### DROPPY TOO!

"I guess all the West Aussies don't. We used to do them all the time when I was in the juniors."

While the screw punt may be dying a long and slow death in Australian Football, it is still much more alive than the old drop-kick.

But Ross Gibbs even revived that in the final minutes of last year's grand final — and it was not his first in a league game.

"I've done a couple over the years, but not in South Australia.

"Actually, it's funny because I was just muckin' around.

"Before the game, just bugging around, I said 'If we're 10 up, I'll do one."

"I forgot all about it and Trevor Jacques, the runner, ran out with about three minutes to go and said, 'Well, we're just about 10 goals up, we want to see your droppy'.

"He reminded me and the ball came down straight after that and I thought, 'Well, here we go', so it worked out well."

And just to rub salt into the Roosters' wounds, the drop-kick was a beautiful pass to Peter Maynard on the half-back line.

Ross Gibbs is a perfect exponent of any kick and although he said he has never really worked on his kicking, it is this attribute which can lift Glenelg sometimes when he is shifted into the forward line.

Blink and you will probably miss the Gibbs' kick at goal. He wastes no time.

"It's good to kick a few goals instead of trying to stop them.

"I only go down there when we're not travelling too well or it's pretty tight and I certainly enjoy kicking goals instead of giving them away."

Gibbs explained why he does not like to waste time after taking a mark in the forward line.

"I just like to get on with the game. You haven't got time to go back and pull your socks up or whatever you do when it's tight.

"I like to get it and get on with it so we can get the ball back to the centre and have another crack at it.

"If I kick one and get it back there as soon as I can, who knows, I might kick another one.

"I guess if we're a couple of points up with a minute to go, naturally I'll go back and take my time but normally when I've done it, we've had to come from behind so I like to get on with the game."

Despite going about the game in an apparently casual manner, Gibbs said his mental approach to the game is quite intense.

"I obviously get keyed up before a game. It doesn't matter what it is or where it is. I try not to get too psyched up.

"I just go my own sort of way and take it pretty casually but deep down I get myself pretty worked up.

"On a Friday night I'll work out who I'm standing and who the rovers are and work out their weaknesses and their strengths and just go through it by myself.

"I see how I can nullify them — what I've got to do and how and where and when."

Ross Gibbs has now played 66 games for the Tigers but there was doubt about him continuing with Glenelg this year — he almost returned to Perth with his family.

"I've got a house over there and my wife's pretty keen to go back. Her father's pretty crook.

"But the club's been great and we won the premiership and everybody's been really fantastic and made us really welcome so we decided to stay another year or so.

"At this stage, we'll see what happens at the end of the year."

Gibbs still follows the fortunes of his former team in W.A.

"Every Saturday night and in the Sunday papers I'm always looking for best players and I still speak to a few of the blokes on the 'phone every second Sunday.

"We still keep in contact to see how they're going and they do the same."

It is this 'home-sickness' which may eventually drive the Gibbs family back to Perth.

"It depends on how my wife's father is getting along.

"She flies back there every now and again.

"She's pretty family orientated — we both are I guess."

But in the meantime, Ross Gibbs is going to leave a few more goal-hungry rovers starving on a Saturday afternoon.

FEW footballers have been able to compete on a man-to-man basis with Stephen Michael, a tough and versatile player who has left an indelible stamp on the game in Western Australia.

Michael, now 30, has announced his retirement, a move many people suspect is not completely irrevocable. But a comeback attempt this year failed because of a leg injury, so he now returns to the sidelines.

Over the 11 years of Michael's career he was never far from the limelight, winning successive Sandover Medals in 1980 and 1981, the last with a record tally of thirty seven votes under the 3-2-1 system. He was

always a great competitor in the big games; a fierce player for WA in the interstate arena, winning a Simpson Medal for the best player in the 1983 clash with South Australia.

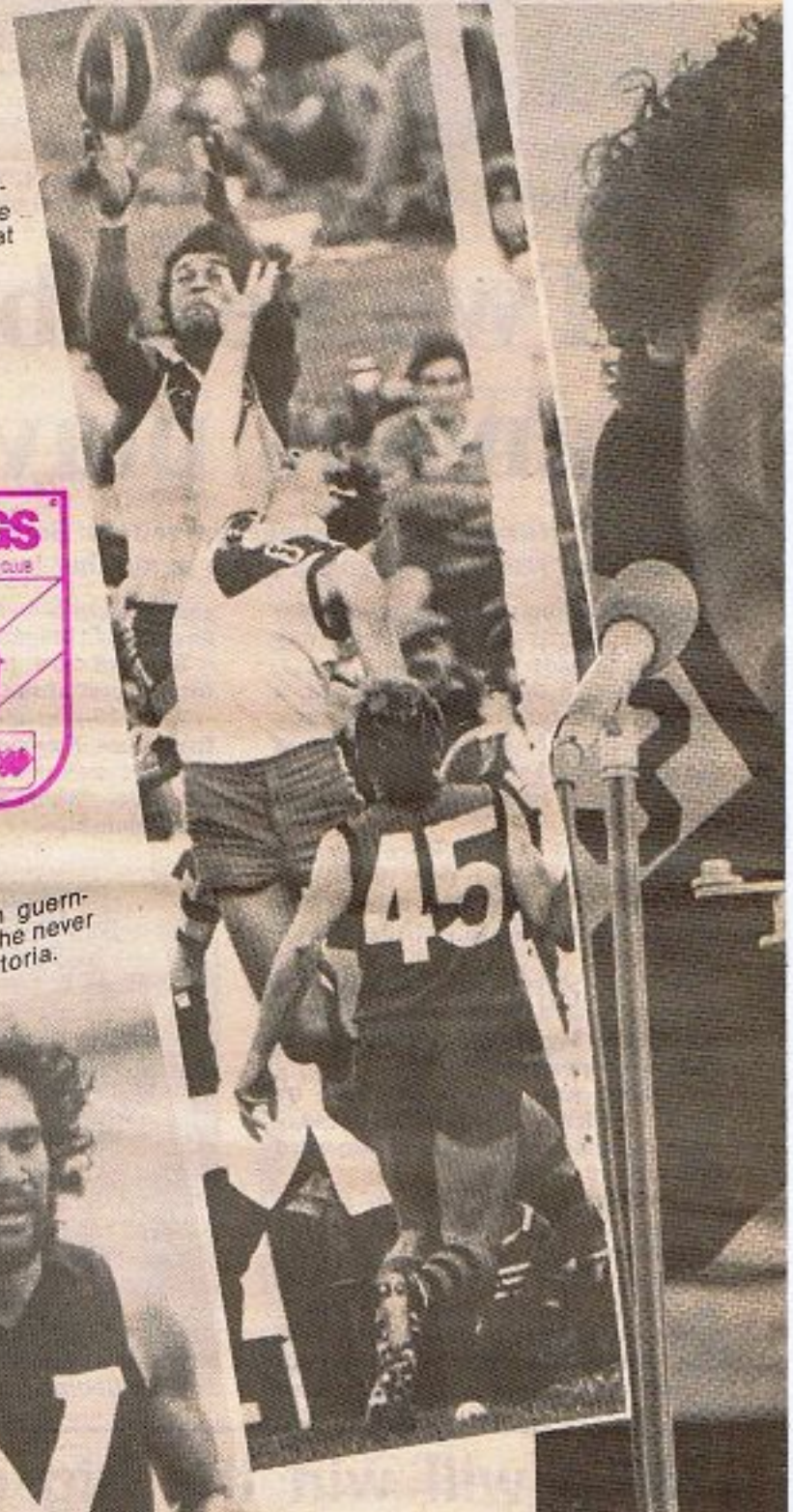
Michael was a raw, young ruckman when first spotted by South Fremantle talent scouts, playing for Kojonup. A lithe Aboriginal with a big crop of hair, an amazing spring and no sense of fear, he immediately caught the eye of the Bulldogs, who were searching for a new ruck star.

The next week, Saturday, April 12, he was swung into the league-side — where he remained for the next 210 senior games, an Australian record for consecutive league appearances.

At the end of the 1984 season, when he had also represented the State 17 times, his career started to taper off with troublesome leg injuries — and a shooting accident that left him in hospital with shotgun pellets in a knee.

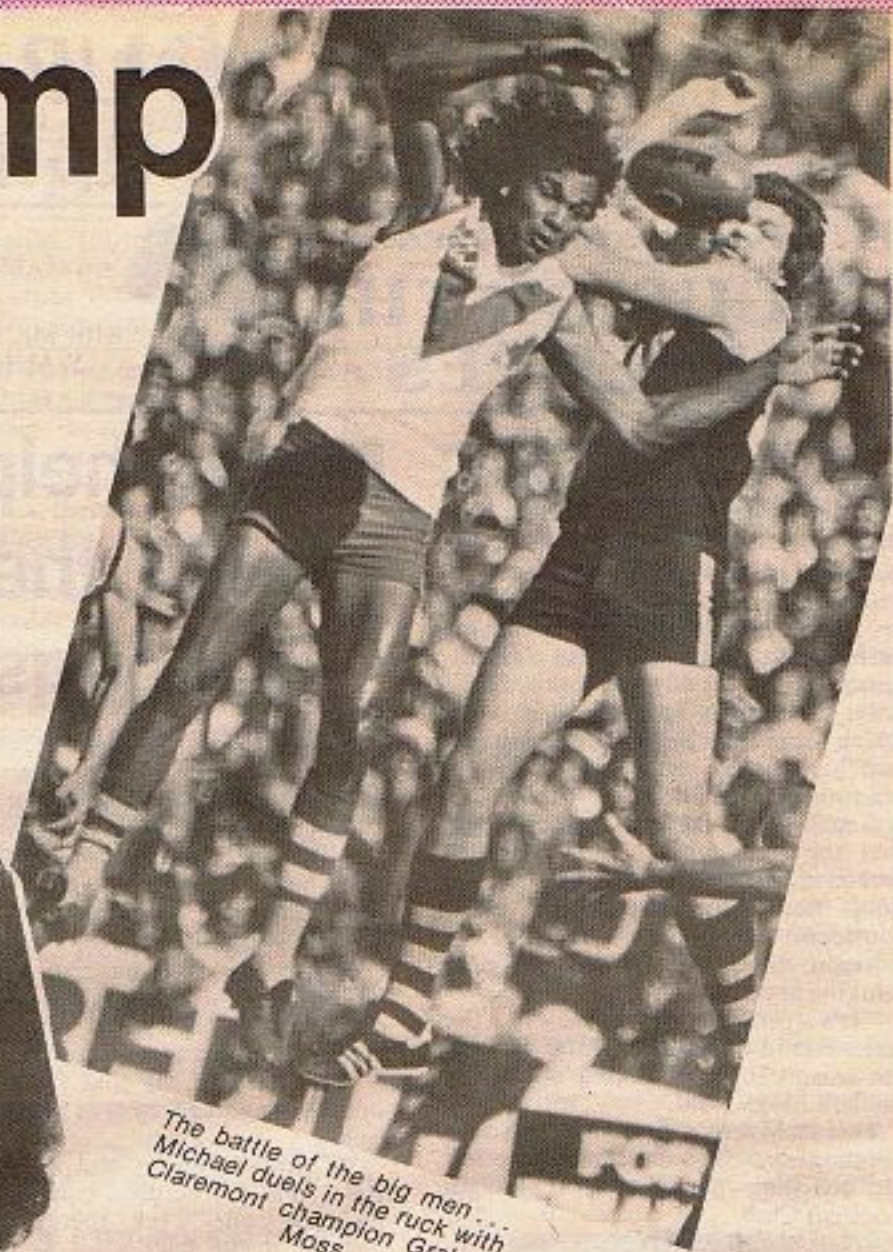
A lack of pre-season training handicapped him in 1984 when he played only 18 games and leg ailments in 1985 saw that tally drop to 15 — and

the writing was on the wall. After 243 games he was about to hang up his boots.

It was certainly a sad day to see Michael finally lose his spring, his great athleticism, his ferocious approach to winning the ball, his high marking or low-to-the-ground work and his sheer inspirational football.

Always a gentleman, always conscious of football's role in his life and always urging fellow-Aboriginals to make a go of whatever they tackle, Michael stands tall on football's pedestal.

A former sales manager at Joyce Bros, where he worked for 26 years, he accepted the full-time post after serving on the club's board of directors for three years. He has now served under three presidents and his role entails complete operation of the non-playing side of the club, ranging from sponsorship to bar management.

The club's full-time football manager is former player BRIAN CICCOTOSTO, who is responsible for the implementing of all football policies from league down to juniors. 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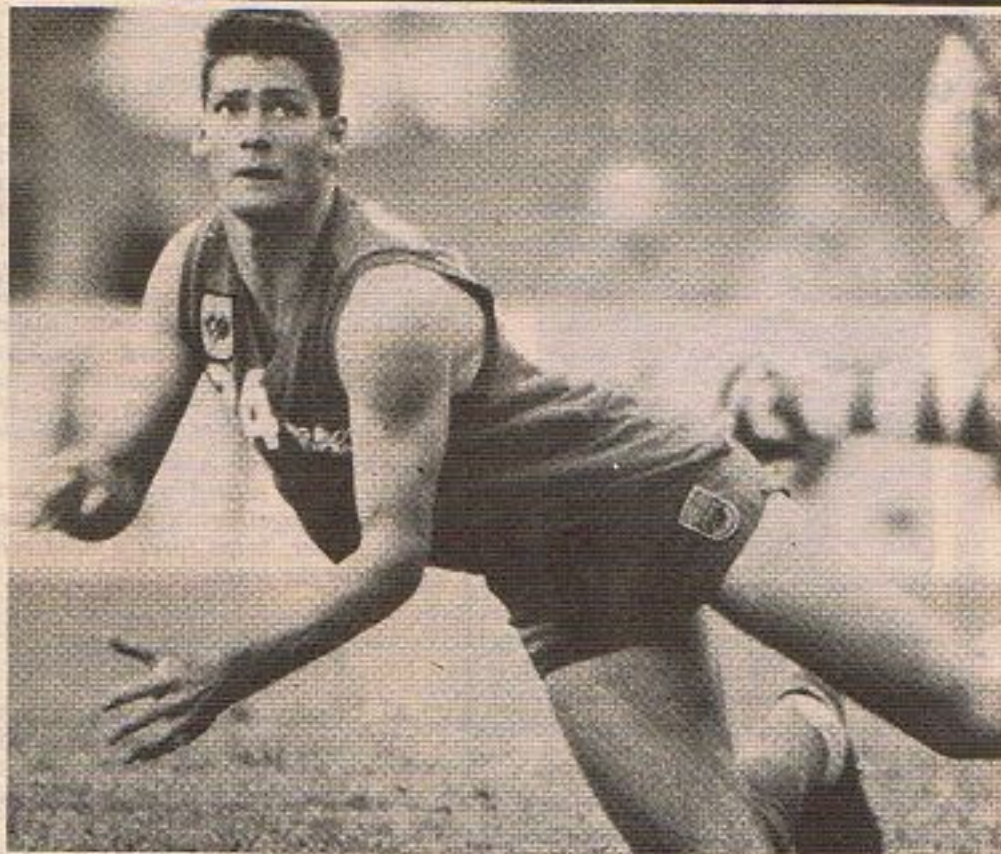
