# BROWN STICKS TO HIS GUNS

PERTH coach Mal Brown has rejected claims that the Demons have internal troubles and that his players are "unfit and stale".

Brown has refuted many of the rumours given as reasons why the Demons have struggled to win just two of their first seven matches.

"A lot of our senior players have not performed at the expected level," says Brown.

"I've had anonymous letters from someone calling himself 'The Judge' who criticises the younger players, but isn't courageous enough to realise that the older blokes must cop it also."

Brown, WA football's most controversial coach, admits that the senior side has been unbalanced and lacks pace and key position players.

"Our performances to date have been nothing short of disappointing and our effort last week was insipid," Brown said this week.

"Last week's effort against Claremont was the worst game I've seen Perth play since I crossed here as coach," Brown said.

Last week Brown gave five senior players the responsibility of preparing the team, both physically and mentally, for their Saturday night clash with league leaders Claremont.

The WACA Ground scoreboard showed that the gamble to have captain Mick Rea, Mark Watson, John Gavranich, Kim Fancote and Stephen Mount "coach" the club was a disaster.

However, Rea claims that plenty of good has come from the move.

"We were still well in the game at half-time, but then we displayed a lack of discipline and weren't prepared to die for each other," Rea said.

"Having a group of senior players in control at training brought home to all of us that there is much more to coaching than just selecting a team."

# Royals plan their own victory

EAST Perth coach Gerard McNeill put his players through an unusual test before last Saturday's upset win over South Fremantle — he asked each member of the team to nominate what they thought their match statistics would be.

There were some ambitious players in the 20 — such as rookie rover Rod Lewis, who thought he might have 18 kicks, six handballs and kick seven goals — but the fact that he spent most of the game on the interchange bench didn't help his cause.

Co-rookie rover Ray Ewen was equally hopeful — seeking 20 kicks and eight handpasses for an eight-goal haul. But at least he got almost a full game to finish with seven kicks and two goals.

Several players were close to the mark with accurate assessments of their game.

## SPOT ON 'SPANNER'

But the pick of the crop was obviously veteran centreman Peter Spencer, the fairly unanimous choice as best-on-ground.

Spencer felt that a target of 20 kicks and 15 handpasses would be a good day's work — and that is exactly what he had. His estimate of two goals was marred by one poor shot at goal that left his personal scorecard on 1.1.

Others to go close were Mark Blakely, whose 25 kicks and 10 handballs gave him a possession total of 35, equal to his estimate of 22 kicks and 13 handpasses; Glyn Williams, who had 19 and 14 in comparison to his target of 25 and 10; Gary Bock, who had 11 and eight, just one extra kick on his estimate, and Peter Hooper, whose estimate of 10 kicks and five handpasses fell just one possession short after having 11 kicks and three handballs.

Forward Glen Bartlett suggested he would like to kick seven goals and he could well have achieved that target with straighter shooting, finishing with 5.1 and a couple of missed opportunities.

# FOOTY PUNCHLINES

## RADIO COUP

RADIO 6IX certainly pulled off something of an exclusive coup when they had Australia's No. 1 politician and sports supporter, Robert Hawke, as their half-time guest at Perth Oval last week. The Prime Minister is the No. 1 badge-holder for South Fremantle and had accepted an East Perth invitation to see the game at Perth Oval. Radio 6IX's sporting supervisor Harvey Deegan arranged for Mr Hawke to don the headphones and pass some learned comments about the game. Acknowledging that he was initially a Perth supporter when he lived in Perth, Mr Hawke told listeners that South were over-doing the handpassing — something like "expert" commentators agreed with!

## LONG GOAL

## The AUSTRALIAN Game

### GROWING SUPPORT

THE official band of "East" Coast Eagles supporters continues to grow. They met at the Southside Six hotel just a few drop punts from Moorabbin Oval, with Eagles chief executive Graham Moss, director Bill Mitchell, the Eagles Melbourne man John Adams and former East Perth president Mal Atwell among the WA guests. Barrey Williams, from MDA-Mojo, the Perth advertising agency that handles much of the Eagles work, was the speech-maker.

IT was interesting to hear the comments of St Kilda coach Darrell Baldock after their win over the Eagles last week. # THE MONEY FANS

THERE was a time when Collingwood were the most universally disliked team in the VFL competition. But they were also, for reasons which continue to escape me, the most popular.

You can go anywhere in Australia and find a Collingwood fan.

People who have never been within a bull's roar of Victoria Park (not the one across the Causeway) in their lives are fanatically loyal to the black and white.

They live in every corner of the continent — in the cities, in the towns, in the far north, in deepest Tasmania, in the dead centre, in the snow country, under rocks.

Talk football and you'll turn up a Collingwood fan.

## AGGRESSIVE

Collingwood were hated by the other clubs because they were successful, but also because they were often overly and needlessly aggressive and because they attracted those players who seemed to fit too comfortably into that type of game.

Their fans were despised because they lorded their successes over anybody and everybody, because they revelled in their team's bully-boy tactics, because they were totally unbearable.

All of which gave rise to a very popular saying over here: "If Collingwood were playing Japan, I'd barrack for Japan," though to be fair, you didn't hear it much around the RSL clubs.

But that is changing.

The poor old 'Pies haven't won a flag for nearly 30 years, you need a pretty good memory to recall when they last made the five, and about the only bully-boy they have left is David Cloke, who has a fair degree of difficulty with the skin of a rice pudding these days.

Collingwood's place as the competition's arrogant standover merchants has been taken by their arch rivals, Carlton, the team from the wrong side of the tracks, which is, for some inexplicable reason, the darling of the Melbourne establishment.

It is now Carlton whose fans epitomise the ugly Australian football supporter at his worst — contemptuous and patronising in victory, belligerent and spiteful in defeat.

The old dark navy blues pull every trick in the chequebook in their insatiable stampede for success. At Princes Park, money has been no object since they lured a bloke called Ronald Dale Barassi there in 1965 and started the money treadmill rolling.

## CONTROL

As Michael Coward, the respected former Adelaide football and cricket writer said so aptly in the Sydney Morning Herald last Monday: "Carlton, which has had the patronage of the Menzies and Fraser clans and is now under the control of John Elliott, of Elders IXL, is renowned in Melbourne for its power, affluence and intolerable arrogance."

It is the sort of arrogance that makes a group of them called the President's Men charter a plane for a mere \$75,000, fly to Sydney, drop their bags at the Regent and pause only long enough to order the Bollinger for the party that night. Some party.

It is arrogance bred of cheque-book football and a belief that a premiership pennant has its price, but in Carlton's case, that price isn't paid so much in blood, sweat and tears, as it is at most other clubs, but in dollars.

It's the big bucks syndrome.

Need a top centre half-forward? A good young ruckman? A classy centre-man? A left-footed rover? Get one from Perth. Or Adelaide. Or Hobart. Even Brisbane. Just get one. We can afford it.

And don't worry about the VFL sal-

## Dollars replace sweat and tears

any cap. After all, the salary cap was designed to stop the poor clubs from getting themselves into hock simply to remain competitive. If they can't remain competitive without getting into hock, pack them off interstate. Let them eat cake.

No, there are no salary cap worry for the silvertails, which is why the current Carlton team is the biggest bunch of interstate mercenaries ever assembled in Melbourne.

## RECRUITS

Over the past five or six years, Carlton have recruited/bought almost an entire team from the other States, yet they can afford to discard four or five players to a club like St Kilda without doing themselves any harm (or the Saints any great favours, either).

They haven't even had a local boy captain the club since Adam was a boy: Steve Kernahan, the incumbent, comes from Adelaide, Mike Fitzpatrick was from Subiaco; and in between was Mark McLure, who learnt his football at Coogee — not the one south of Fremantle.

Apart from young Silvagni (son of Serge), most of the current Carlton team would have trouble finding the Coburg Town Hall without a road map, but they're the best money can buy.

Michael Cowan again:

"The (Carlton) club and its personnel have the best of everything, and it cares little for the weak, unfashionable and disadvantaged.

"But ... they have been unable to buy or manufacture the caring, the pride, the single-mindedness and stirring spirit the Sydney Swans players displayed on Friday night."

Those of you in Perth who saw that great game probably thought from the noise that it was a lop-sided home crowd of 33,659.

Not so. Carlton has a huge following here (a lot of them probably disaffected Collingwood fans), and they were there in their arrogant droves — the great unwashed throwing confetti and toilet rolls from the Randwick end goal; the silvertails from the chartered jets in the M.A. Noble Stand; the hoi polloi from the Hume Highway buses behind us members in the Brewongle Stand.

## TERRACES

It might have been the terraces at Anfield, or Stamford Bridge or White Hart Lane.

Their arrogance when Carlton briefly hit the front in those final frenzied minutes was almost unbelievable; their belligerence after Tony Morwood kicked the deciding goal was.

The ringleader of the group closest to us actually thumped a youngish woman (presumably a Swans supporter) in the mouth after the game.

Which is why there's a new saying around town: "If Carlton were playing Japan on Anzac Day, I'd barrack for Japan."

And they're starting to say it in the RSL clubs.

# FOOTBALL FACTS

## Straight shooting Sharks return

THEY tell us that catches win matches in cricket and accurate kicking at goal certainly helps football teams win.

When a side scores 26 goals from 31 scoring shots it makes them extremely hard to beat.

That is what East Fremantle did on Saturday against Subiaco, scoring 26.5 to 14.15.

And there was a touch of coincidence about the result.

The Sharks kicked an identical total 55 years back when they beat East Perth, 26.5 to 13.8.

South Fremantle have tallied some impressive straight shooting.

In 1936, they booted 20.3 (also against the Royals), in 1949 against Subiaco they kicked 22.4 and in 1962 against East Perth they totalled 21.4.

### DOUBLE FIGURE MEN

CLINTON Browning last Saturday became the 13th East Fremantle player to boot 10 goals or more in a match.

The great George Doig (14 times), Bob Johnson (four times), Darren Bennett, Jim Sewell, Rick Vidovich and George Prince (all twice), Paul Nichols, Len Anderson, Roy McGlynn, Jock Laurie, Arthur Rawlinson and Harry Sharpe back in 1905 beat Browning to the feat.

The first double figure tally in WA was kicked by Albert Thurgood way back in 1896, when it was a rarity for a team, let alone an individual, to reach a double figure score.

### COW Paddock GAME

THE first recorded game of Australian Rules Football is said to have taken place in a cow paddock on the outskirts of Melbourne in 1858.

And I think the playing surface used in that historic match 129 years ago would have been no worse than the one at Moorabbin where home club St Kilda and the Eagles met last Saturday.

### ROYALS BITE DOGS

EAST Perth have recorded their worst opening to a season since 1964, when they lost their first 10 games.

Ironically, it was against South Fremantle on Perth Oval when they broke the drought 23 years ago.

And despite the Royals and Bulldogs being the two bottom sides at that time of the 1964 season, they still drew 7998 spectators, about five times more than at Perth Oval last Saturday.

Subiaco own the unwanted distinction of being the club to wait longest to win a game in any particular season.

In 1982, the Lions lost their first 16 matches.

### UNI. EXIT

THERE has been persistent talk around Melbourne that a couple of VFL clubs may be forced to close their doors because of financial embarrassment.

One would have thought that the \$4million entry fee that the West Coast Eagles and Brisbane Bears were forced to pay would have helped get ailing bank accounts in order.

However, it wouldn't be history making if a VFL club was forced to "sell up shop".

University, which joined the VFL in 1908, (the same year as Richmond) disbanded in 1914 and didn't compete again.

However, it wasn't a lack of money which sent University scampering, rather World War 1.

### EASTS CLOSEST

THE two Easts play this week and despite being at opposite ends of the premiership table, East Perth are closer to East Fremantle than any other club — statistically speaking. The Royals have won 114 of their contests while the Sharks have won 138 encounters, a difference of only 24.

South Fremantle have fared next best against their port neighbours, being 38 wins behind the Sharks.

### BOOKED TO TRAVEL

FOR someone trying to keep records of what's going on, season 1987 season has been a nightmare.

What with the expanded VFL competition and two new clubs, night football and changes of venues, every week it has been just too much.

So I am packing my bags and heading overseas for three months. While I am away, Steve Davies and Trevor Dawson will supply some most interesting football records.

### GUIDE TO FORM IS A PUZZLE

ALREADY former WA players now playing in Victoria have provided a few problems for the West Coast Eagles.

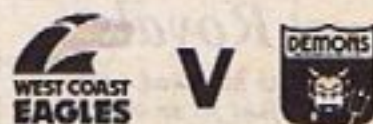
And there will be no exception to that rule when the Eagles tackle Melbourne in an important fixture at Subiaco Oval on Sunday.

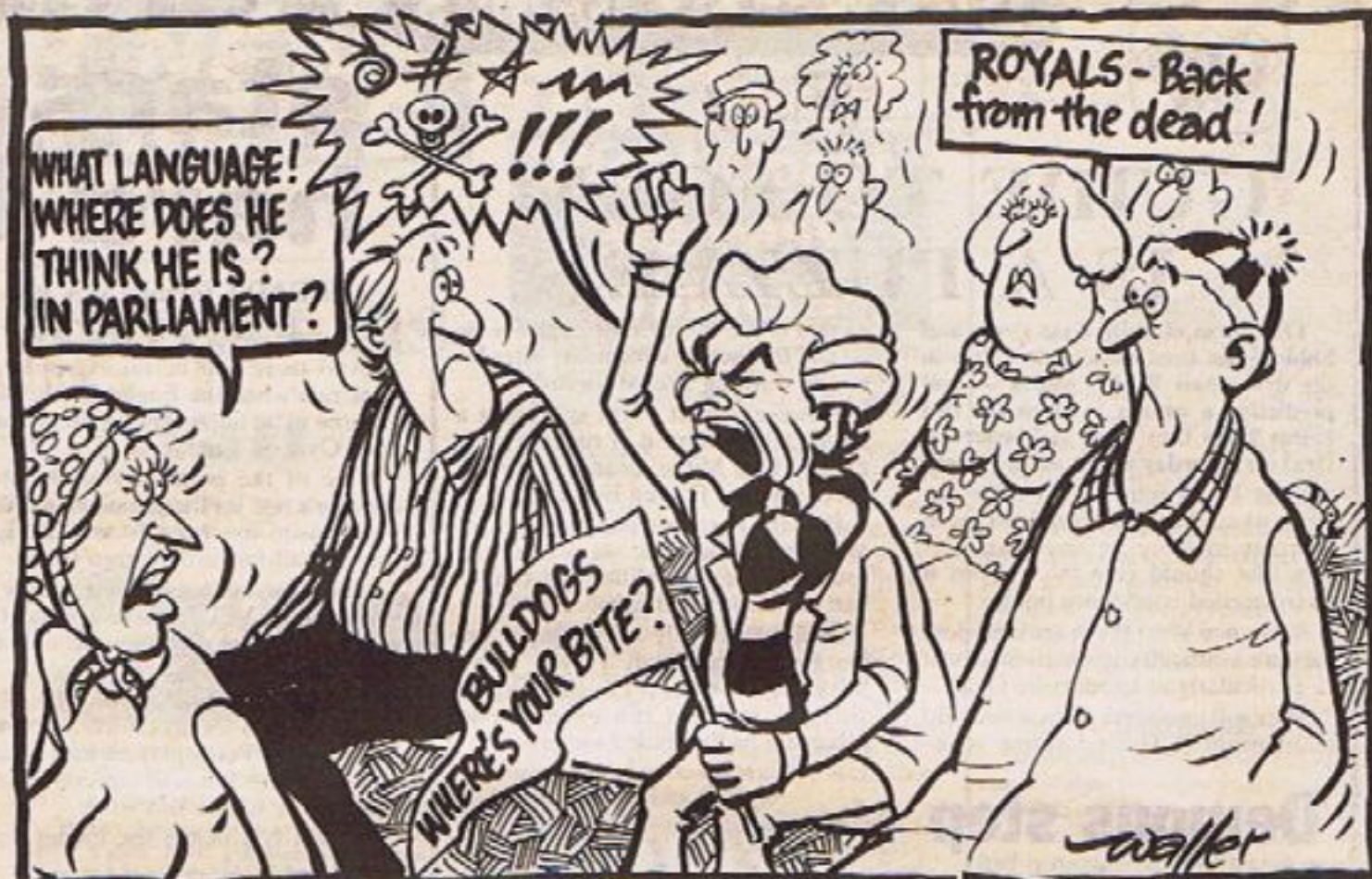

# State clash has lot at stake

JUNE 16 — it may be 10 days late to celebrate D-Day, but for a band of West Australian footballers, it will be a date very important to the State's football calendar.

The advent of the West Coast Eagles has pushed the WAFL into the shadows with the threat of stunting its importance as a football competition.

But on June 16 that band of WA footballers will don the State guernsey in an endeavour to show that WA football is alive and well, despite the expanded VFL competition.

More importantly, it is an opportunity to show that the WAFL is not a second-rate competition as crowd figures would tend to indicate.

In fact, I bet the West Coast Eagles would like to be in a position to select their VFL squad now. I feel certain there would be quite a few players overlooked previously who would come under consideration.

It must be disappointing for WAFL players to front up to picnic crowds because of the attention given to the VFL, through matches being played here and direct telecasts from the East Coast.

It's almost inconceivable to expect matches to draw the 10,000-plus crowd that watched the derby between South and East Fremantle, let alone set attendances that have packed grounds in the match-of-the-day in previous years.

So, as well as putting the WAFL football talents on display, it will provide an opportunity for players to soak up a bit of atmosphere before a big crowd.

It will also be an important match for State coach John Todd.

While he has nothing to prove as a coach, lack of success in recent years has pushed him into the background.

### DIFFICULT

The match against South Australia will be a difficult one.

The Croweaters have not been decimated like the WAFL because of the expanded VFL competition. And they are always a tough proposition.

The South Australians won't let Todd forget our audacious one-point win over them in 1984, when he took a rookie team to South Australia. He rubbed the win in and they would dearly like to reciprocate should we lose.

Todd has shown he is at his best when thrust into the role of underdog and WA will be that in the eyes of a lot of people, even though the match is played here.

So there is a lot riding on this clash.

It's a chance for us to show that we still produce the best football talent in the country; a chance for Todd to show he is still one of the best coaches in Australia — and, most importantly, the necessity for us to chalk up a win to put us on course to again claim the Australian championship.

"My coaches are all quite considerate, so I'll just keep on doing both sports for a couple of years before making any decision." Talented South Fremantle player Peter Sumich, who is also a promising cricketer.

"It just shows the serious approach these blokes have to their training and our commitment to the important games ahead." Eagles coach Ron Alexander after a heated clash at training between John Annear and Laurie Keene.

"Our request was defeated and we will not make any more moves in that direction." Eagles chief executive Graham Moss on an unsuccessful bid to convince the VFL general managers to allow the WA side to increase their 35-man squad.

I know it was only the first time I have watched the Sharks this season but one couldn't help but be most impressed with their performance.

The likes of Brian Peake, Colin Waterson, Shane Ellis, Clinton Browning, Stephen Green and Tony Solin are performing as if age is no bar and their commitment to hard work is tremendous.

Having missed selection in the Eagles squad, and with the greatly-reduced emphasis on the local competition, these senior players could be going "through the motions", playing without commitment to themselves or the club.

Their showing against the Lions was superb. No-one wanted to be the star, but rather share the ball so that the team would benefit most.

Captain Peake led the example of

commitment with a superb performance in the middle.

Watching him read the ball from hands in the centre bounce or bringing it out of defence and setting up forward thrusts, one wouldn't believe he is on the other side of 30. Peake's performance was top shelf. He is, without doubt, one of the most complete players this State has produced.

Brian has probably set himself personal goals to reach this season. If he continues to repeat his efforts of last Saturday then he will be a short priced favourite to collect his second Sandover Medal.

To add to the Sharks' highly-committed, experienced group is a group of extremely talented youngsters.

### NATURAL SKILLS

It was great to watch former Teal Cup players Chris Waterman and John Derecourt display their undoubted natural skills. Both possess enormous ability and must be relishing the opportunity to undertake their apprenticeship under such experienced league footballers.

Apart from Peake's super effort and Browning's 10 goals, the most eye-catching players were new ruckmen Steve Mathews and Brad Tunbridge.

Mathews and Tunbridge have all the attributes and skill to develop into top players.

It was refreshing to watch the enthusiasm they showed on the ball and when resting in attack, creating many opportunities for the running players.

While Lions ruckman Shane Cocker worked hard, Mathews and Tunbridge use their physical strength to burst packs open, allowing the ball to spill free. These two young ruckmen, with continued work and effort, will develop into the best ruck combination in the WAFL.

## RULES ARE A TALKING POINT, BUT ...

ONE feature of Aussie Rules that annoys me is that there is too much hit-and-miss about it.

For example, how often does a player have to bounce the ball when running with it?

The answer is set at 15 metres, but every football follower knows that the distance can vary considerably.

The 15-metre margin also applies for infringements of the rules, but once again it gets back to the judgement of the umpires and the distance can also vary considerably.

Aussie Rules would be one of the least controlled major sports in the world and it is time that officialdom came to terms with that fact. Unless they can control the game more, a player is going to be badly hurt, or even fatally injured. If this ever happens, the blame will be squarely with the administration and they should be held as culpable.

Instead of interfering with umpires, the administration should get behind them and let them run the show right

down the line. When they report players, they need support, not condemnation. Their word should be law to any player under their control.

My suggestions to bring the game into better repute and provide more credibility where control and rules are concerned are as follows:—

There are five major lines of players in the game and they should play a more vital role in relation to distances or penalties.

These lines — full-back, half-back, centre, half-forward and forward line — should be marked on the oval and used as measuring guides to assess the 15 metres distance.

If a kick is awarded behind one line, then the mark is taken on the next line up the ground.

These distances would still vary, but you would know exactly where a kick is to be taken from.

The ball should have to be bounced once every time a line is crossed. Sideways across the ground would not be penalised, but forward possession

could only be made with the bounce of the ball.

The distance may be a bit long and I would prefer to make a player move the ball more, instead of less. This would ensure that a gifted player with the superior ball skills would be seen to best advantage.

I would like to see the apex of the 50-metre line marked and a kick given to the centre-half-forward at that point in the event of the following:

- (1) Two 15-metre penalties incurred
- (2) Time wasting
- (3) Striking or a similar offence.

These rules would clean the game up a lot and stop much of the tactics which are employed at present.

A player who is awarded a kick must pull directly back from the man on the mark. Once he moves sideways or takes more than one step forward it should be play on.

I would still like to see umpires have the power to order a player from the oval, but, as I have said previously, only for a full quarter of play.

## FROM WHERE I SIT

I don't believe that umpires should have to face the tribunals.

Given that they are put in charge of a game to run it fairly and as unbiased as possible, we should concede that they will only report players who have stepped way out of line.

In fact, I think they would only take the action of reporting in circumstances that require drastic action. The tribunals should appreciate that and deal with the offenders accordingly.

The third-man-in rule should apply.

If a third party becomes involved in any pushing and shoving or worse, that man is automatically suspended. This would stop the ugly episodes where players run from all over the ground to take part in two-man melees.

## Cronin defends Bears, sees VFL changes

"It's a shame these critics couldn't have helped us from the start instead of spreading a message of gloom, doom and disaster, saying that the Bears would not be competitive in the VFL."

"Their message got through to many players we had in our sights and they decided to give us a miss."

"This made it a much more difficult task in forming our squad and had we gained some of those we wanted we would be in an even better position."

"We expect to reach our target of finishing in the top seven this year with the object of making the finals next season," he said.

Cronin claimed the formation of the Brisbane Bears was a much more difficult task than that confronted by either the Swans, who were re-located to Sydney, and the Eagles.

"The Eagles are a combination of the best players from the talented Western Australian League."
