

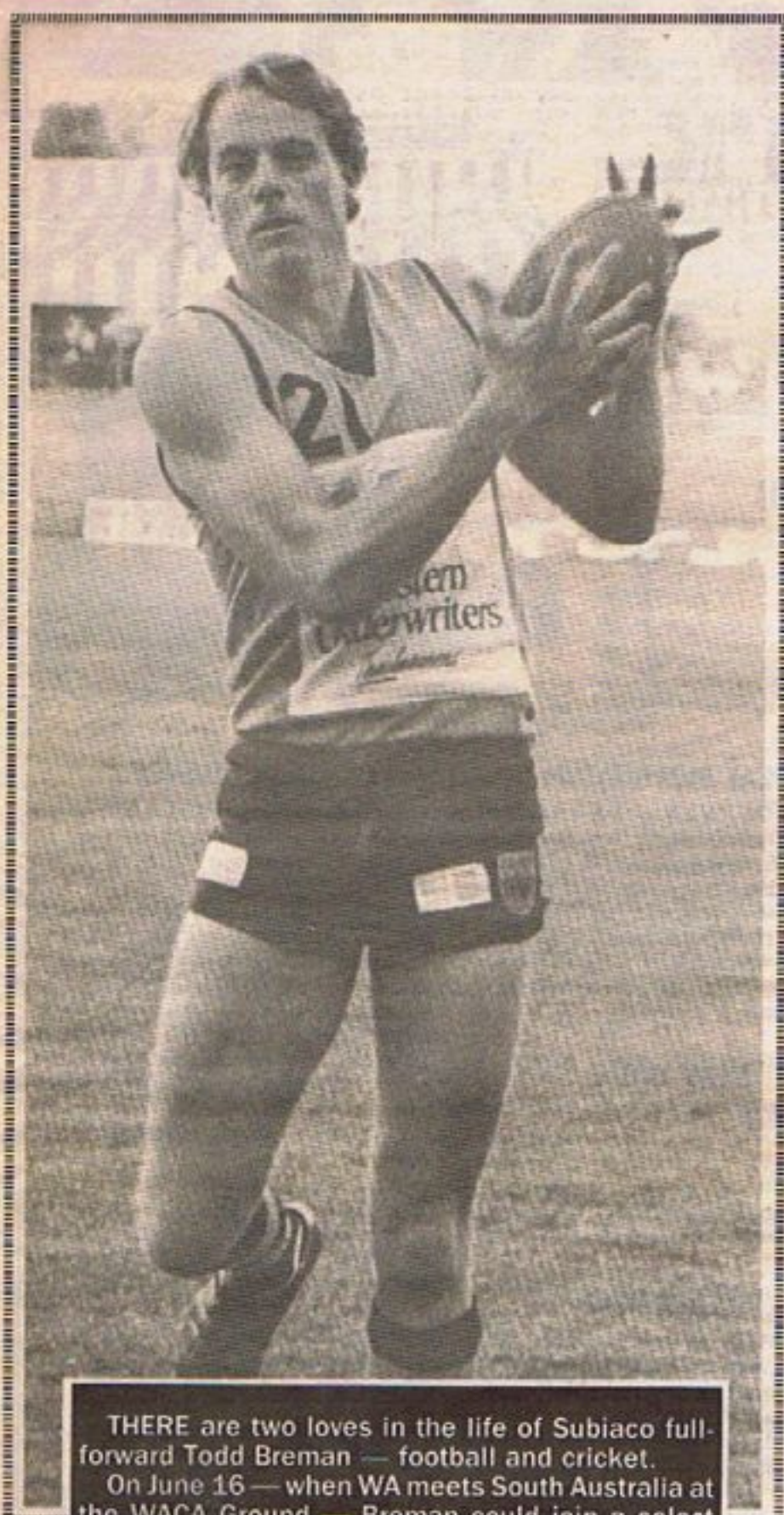

# BIG RON PLAYS IT TIGHT ...

**GRIM** and determined ... that's how West Coast Eagles coach Ron Alexander is approaching the Foundation Day showdown with Australia's most famous football club, Collingwood.

Tight-lipped and obviously concerned at his diminishing player-depth, Alexander is walking a tightrope now that the Eagles have squeezed back into the top five on the VFL table.

The one-game margin traffic jam between the nine teams juggling positions four to 12 doesn't leave room for any complacency after the Eagles dumping of Melbourne last week.

Collingwood, despite being No. 12 in that ranking, are a tough side — and they have a couple of talented West Australians determined to sink their former WA club-mates.

Craig Starcevich (if he's fit) and Michael Christian hold down key goal-to-goal line positions in the Magpies line-up and coach Leigh Matthews is sure to take advantage of their home-town knowledge.

"We know that this will be a tough game; every bit as tough as last Sunday's," says Alexander.

"They're all tough now. But we also realise that a win on Monday would help us cement that top-five place just a little harder."

Collingwood's strength is two-fold — their runners are many and talented and their big-man strength is dangerous and mobile.

Subiaco's Andrew MacNish is likely to return to the side to bolster the Eagles running division, while East Perth's Glenn Bartlett becomes an option when assessing the big-man balance.

## ... and Magro fumes

**SOUTH** Fremantle coach Stan Magro is fuming at the run of bad luck that has hit the club on the eve of their derby clash with East Fremantle on Saturday.

Injuries, suspension and bitterness over a behind-the-play incident has threatened to undermine the Bulldogs 1987 campaign.

Friction has grown between South Fremantle and Claremont over the broken jaw suffered by Bulldogs ruckman Dean Irving — and relationships with West Perth aren't all that good either as the Falcons continue to try and entice another big man in Gordon Gatti to switch to Leederville.

The four-week suspension handed out to skipper Brad Collard has angered many staunch South officials who believe that the incident was an accident — and that Collard should not be labelled as a "kicker."

Injuries to ruckmen Peter Dennett (knee) and Craig Edwards (groin) have further decimated the Bulldogs big-man strength.

But Magro's belief in the underdog triumphing is the Bulldogs key weapon as they prepare to topple the Sharks.

"The South players will lift themselves in this critical situation," says Magro.

Kerley is one of the most famous names in Australian football. All Australian player and coaching West Adelaide, Glenelg and South Adelaide to SANFL premierships. NFL President, Vincent Yovich, said that the demands of the position required the coach to be free of club commitments and Kerley, who played in Ireland and New York on one of Harry Beitzel's tours, was an obvious choice. The party, which will include 25 players, an umpire and team officials, leaves Melbourne on October 7 and plays a lead-up game in New York against the New York Gaelic Athletic Association, enroute to Ireland.

## QUICK CHANGE

THE fluctuating fortunes of football was never better illustrated than in Sunday's Eagles clash with Melbourne. Rookie Eagle John Worsfold had started well, but was taken off the ground when there became a need to reshuffle the defence in the first term to curb the high-marking influence of Irishman Sean Wight. Another rookie Paul Peos had started the game with a fit of the fumbles and came off in the second term to allow Worsfold back into the fray. But Worsfold ran straight into trouble — diving headlong for the ball just near the interchange bench and colliding with a Melbourne player. Peos had hardly walked back to the interchange bench when he was recalled to action again. This time he settled down much quicker and became a steady player in attack — while the unlucky Worsfold nursed a badly injured shoulder.



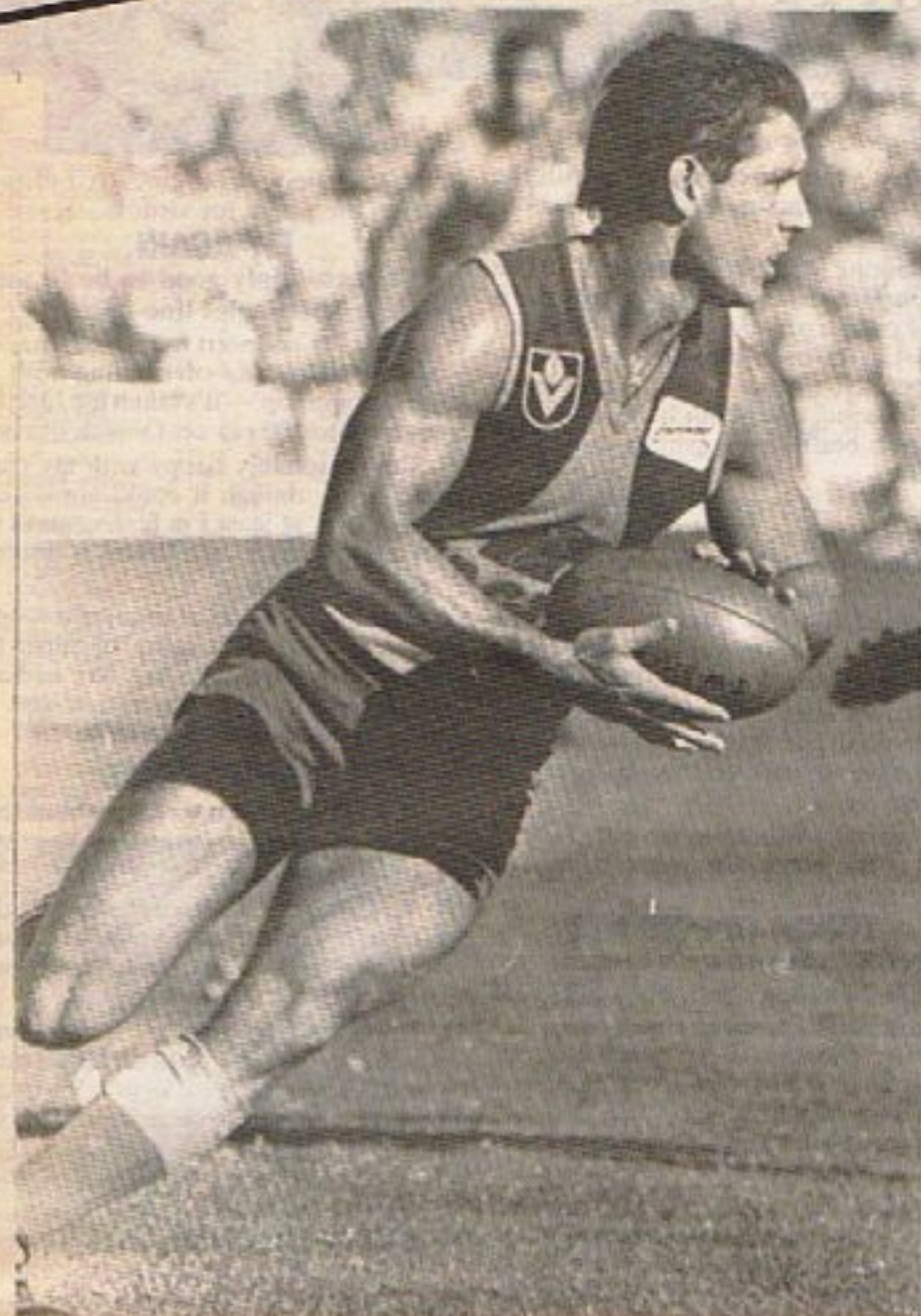

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# The AUSTRALIAN Game

## FOOTY SOUVENIR

THE sportsmen's luncheon held by the West Coast Eagles at the Merlin Hotel last Friday drew one of the biggest crowds seen in Perth for such a function. More than 400 people crowded the room to pay tribute to the horse industry — a regular feature as the Eagles luncheons focus attention on sport in general. Former WA and South Fremantle captain Noel Carter bridged the gap between the sports when he paid \$3750 for the auction item of the day — the whip and jockey silks worn by Peter Cook when the first WA-owned horse, Black Knight, won the Melbourne Cup for Robert Holmes a Court three years ago. Carter's firm, Commercial Bloodstock, are naturally heavily involved in the horse racing industry and he has strong ties in both sports.

## YARDLEY'S VIEW

FORMER international cricketer and part-time comedian Bruce Yardley was the Master of Ceremonies at Friday's Eagles lunch. A strong Bassendean boy, Yardley has always been keen on his footy. He said that while cricket was obviously his first love, he was convinced that there was no greater competitive team sport in the world than Aussie Rules.

## TOP EAGLE

DWAYNE Lamb was the Burswood Resort/Australian Airlines Eagle of the Day in Sunday's clash against Melbourne at Subiaco Oval. The best on-ground Eagle receives a commemorative plaque for his performance, courtesy of the dual sponsors. Lamb's top day — he had 13 kicks and 15 handballs from a back pocket — saw him hit the front in the Eagles player-of-the-year award as published in The West Australian newspaper.

## SPOT THE CROWD

VFL premiers Hawthorn are only a marginally better drawcard than the West Coast Eagles and the Brisbane Bears in Melbourne! In three appearances at Princes Park this year (against Collingwood, the Eagles and Geelong), they have drawn crowds totalling just 34,178 — an average of little more than 11,000 a game. Despite having players of the quality and charisma of Robert Dipierdomenico, Dermott Brereton and John Platten, the Hawks can't get people through the gates.

## GEELONG'S "IF ONLY"

FOOTBALL can be a game of "IFS" and that's certainly the case at Geelong. IF things had worked out differently, they could have fielded a fearsome combination this season capable of winning the flag. IF the Sydney Swans hadn't started up, IF Brad Hardie and Tony McGuinness hadn't been snatched out of the Cats grasp, IF Mark Yeates hadn't suffered such a serious injury and IF Damien Bourke had remained injury-free this season the Cats would have been awesome!

## SOUR COOK

THE temper of Hawthorn president Ron Cook is almost at boiling point. Cook says that communication with the VFL is a constant area of frustration because the clubs are not being told what's going on. "There appears to be little future planning by league chiefs and hardly any of the old interaction between VFL commissioners, club directors and presidents," Cook said. "The last president's meeting was in September last year and as far as I know the directors have met only twice this year."

## LOT OF BULL

FORMER Hawk Glenn Howard got a big shock when he opened his locker at Collingwood training recently. In the locker was the head of a calf, hung up with a shirt done up to its neck and its tongue poking out. The culprits (whose initials are "BT" and "DM") either think he looks like a calf or talks a lot of bull.

## TOUGH TRAINING

IF you ask footballers what they don't like about the game, 99 per cent of the answers are pre-season training. But if you think your training is hard, spare a thought for Port Adelaide players. Their preparation for 1987 began on October 8 and was six days a week. But it wasn't the days that was the killer, it was the triathlons. # Putting the Eagles in perspective

THERE has been a never-ending stream of words about the expanded VFL competition, the Eagles and the WAFL domestic series.

Peter Evans, the WAFL's former football affairs manager, had his say as a guest columnist recently — but this is how I see those affected by the advent of VFL (not national) football into our State.

## BENEFICIARIES:

- (1) The VFL (laughing all the way to the bank).
- (2) The 100 or so people who comprise the Eagles players and officials — where all the money and atmosphere has landed.
- (3) The directors and executives of the Indian Pacific Ltd, with their fees, salaries and share options.
- (4) The media, particularly television with direct telecasts of both VFL (when the Eagles are playing in the East) and WAFL matches every week.
- (5) The thousands who are enjoying VFL in the flesh every fortnight and who are addicted to TV the other week.

## DISADVANTAGED:

- (1) The WAFL, which has already, or soon will, suffer from:
  - Crowd support being drastically and dramatically reduced, therefore revenue slashed.
  - Sponsorship drying up or eventually being decimated because of lack of that same people support.
  - A change in atmosphere, that vital ingredient which has almost vanished from WAFL matches overnight.
  - The standard of competition falling to its lowest level because of the player exodus to 14 VFL clubs and particularly the Eagles.
- (2) Those professional administrators and coaches in the WAFL who soon will be accepting heavy wage cuts or looking for other employment.
- (3) The eight League clubs who are already being hard hit by:
  - Miniscule match day bar turnovers.
  - Dramatic falls in membership numbers.
  - Day-to-day fund-raising being almost decimated.
  - Competition for players from the SANFL clubs and surrounding local and country competitions because of their inability to match player payments.
  - Lack of sponsor and business interest in their competition.

- (4) The 240 players in the WAFL competition:
  - Drastic lowering of their match payments.
  - Lack of crowd atmosphere because of lack of public support at matches.
  - Decline in back-up support for them as regards medical treatment and aids; gym and training equipment; professional staff and entertainment.
- (5) The umpires who will soon have their fees drastically reduced.
- (6) The vast number of proud and loyal officials, workers and supporters who have seen their historic and traditional competition down-graded to second-class status for the benefit of the VFL.
- (7) The juniors who will, over the next few years, come to understand that money will never do for them what spirit and dedication has done over a century.
- (8) The local councils who will soon start to wonder where has all the money gone.

## BENEFITS

Mr Evans has more than flirted with the long-term truth when he states his six main points of benefit to WA football.

- (1) \$1 million a year — to sell your soul to the VFL.
  - (2) \$800,000 to the WAFL clubs — who would have got far more than that from the VFL in transfer fees had they stood out and registered their player contracts with the Arbitration Court.
  - (3) A \$1.6 million payment to the WAFL clubs — a one-off payment which was the main reason the majority of clubs opted for the VFL intrusion. They were nearly as broke as some of their VFL counterparts and voted for the change for the money and not the overall good of WA football.
  - (4) It doesn't do a lot for team spirit when you can select a player who has never trained with your team and is not really a part of the comradeship and esprit de corps that is so vital in a successful club.
  - (5) The 1989 draft — a real joke. Prepare for a year when all of our players (if we have any left by then) can be drafted by any, or all, of the 14 VFL clubs. I thought the idea was to keep our players in this State!
  - (6) A new interest in football — but by whom. If you divide the combined attendances of the Eagles and the WAFL (we do not seem to know what they are any more — some big secret for some reason or another) by five and not four, the average attendance will have shown very little growth.
- As far as the Eagles deserving ALL of our support, I will leave that to the high-flyers and high-rollers.

## In the Eagles nest... WITH DEAN TURNER

That's the current situation with the Eagles and I'm sure we can handle both challenges.

Beating Melbourne last week was an important victory for us. Not only did it give us four premierships points and put the Eagles back into the top five — hopefully, to stay — but it prevented Melbourne, one of our major rivals for a finals berth, from gaining those four points.

I guess it is a sign of a good side when you can play as badly as we did in the last half, but still win. We really slipped into some bad football at stages in the third and fourth quarters. But even though Melbourne kept coming back at us, we managed to hold them out.

We are not playing four full quarters of football and that's not good enough. We have to work on this aspect of our game.

Against Melbourne we got the ball out of the packs, but we lost control of it too easily.

## TOUGH OPPONENTS

**NEXT Monday we come up against Collingwood, one of the real traditional teams in the VFL.**

The Magpies have some talented players in their ranks and I'm not sure whether Brian Taylor, their big full-forward, will be available after suspension or not, but he's a key player.

Other players like Tony Shaw and Dennis Banks are very skilled footballers and the Eagles will have a tough time countering a side that has the capacity to achieve anything on a given day.

After Collingwood, we travel to Melbourne again, this time to Western Oval for a clash with Footscray — and that will be hard too.

Western Oval is a little like Moorabin — a tough ground to win at. It

blows a gale and the one-eyed crowd makes life tough for visitors.

## FIT AGAIN

**IT'S certainly good to be fit and back in the Eagles line-up.**

After my late start to the season — I missed six weeks of training with a groin operation — it's taken me time to get back to 100 per cent match fitness.

I'm reasonably happy with my current form, though it could always be better. But at least I'm feeling good in myself and my match fitness is improving every game.

Missing six weeks of training is tough when you are in a camp of super-fit blokes like the Eagles are. We had an intensive summer preparation and it took some hard work to catch up.

## HANDY HOME

**A LOT has been written about the Eagles training venue at the Mt Lawley campus.**

While it's not the same as having an official home ground to play and train at, there's certainly nothing wrong with the facilities at Mt Lawley.

The ground surface is excellent and we have all the facilities on hand, plus there is everything we want in the way of medical rooms, change rooms and so forth.

As a team, we are gradually getting to know each other a lot better. It's not easy to bring a team together like that — it's rebuilding right from the bottom and I guess it's one reason why we have our patchy moments, such as the last half on Sunday.

But we still need to improve a lot if we are going to stay in the top five. We need to be more direct to goal and the growing understanding between all the players will obviously help us achieve that improvement.

In fact, Johnson and Cribb have become fairly paranoid about their criticism of the Eagles — as has JK about his fervent support. Percy's strong support for the WAFL competition is to be respected — but even he has his momentary lapses. Despite continually boosting up the WAFL, he let one slip during last Saturday's commentary on the West Perth-Subiaco game when he said: "There's some excitement getting into a game that's been a bore all day."

One Eagle unlucky to lose his spot is East Perth's Glen Bartlett, who continues to work hard and be in his team's best every time he's back with the Royals. His club coach Gerard McNeill paid tribute to Bartlett last week when he said: "He's the most professional player I've ever had anything to do with, regardless of whether he's with the Eagles or us."

## CRIBB'S COMMENT

AGAIN I find myself having a crack at my fellow media luminaries. On Saturday's 6PR Footy Forum, Bob Cribb started proceedings by claiming he wasn't going to bag the West Coast Eagles because Barry Cable — one of the all-time great footballers and assistant coach to Ron Alexander — was a guest panellist. However Cribb's willpower couldn't go the distance and before long he had a bet with Swan Districts and State coach John Todd that the Eagles would not win by more than six goals over Melbourne and finished up by claiming there was something seriously wrong in the local team's camp. He said they were a bunch of prima-donnas with swollen heads.

## TOUGH TASK

BEING a West Australian in a Melbourne-based VFL team and coming back home to play against the Eagles must be difficult. The WA quartet of Alan Johnson, Warren Dean, Steve Turner and Earl Spalding were solid, if unspectacular contributors with Melbourne last Sunday. As with the Krakouer brothers with North Melbourne and Brad Hardie and Mike Richardson with the Bears, they seemed reluctant to really let loose with all their skills in front of the parochial West Aussie crowd. Melbourne coach John Northey conceded it must be difficult in such circumstances. "I do believe that they tried as hard as they could, however," he said.

## CHILLY TIMES

IT would have been difficult for umpires Len Cooper and Ron Buckley to take the number of East Perth's Mark Shaw in the first few minutes of last Saturday's game. Though Shaw never gave the umpires any cause to attract their attention, he was jumper-less after it was ripped from his back by an East Fremantle player. 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# FOOTBALL FACTS

## SCORES HAVE DROPPED OFF

WITH the mass exodus of players to the West Coast Eagles and other Eastern States clubs, the question is asked how has this affected scoring in the local competition?

In theory, as the game becomes faster, the scoring should become higher.

This has been the trend before this year.

However, on checking through the scores after round eight in 1987, there has been some interesting comparisons.

This year to date there has been only 1001 goals and 926 behinds kicked, whereas for the same period in 1986 there were 1175 goals and 912 behinds.

You have to go way back to the 1976 season to find a lower start, when the total after round eight was 1009 goals and 865 behinds and that was only 17 points lower.

### MEDAL MEN

IT is interesting to note that 10 of the past 11 Sandover Medallists have joined the VFL competition — with the only exception, of course, being Stephen Michael.

### STRAIGHT SHOT

ON September 1, 1951, East Perth played West Perth at Perth Oval and West Perth kicked 16 goals straight.

Ray Scott kicked 11.2 out of West Perth's score of 20.6.

In 1932 at Perth Oval, East Fremantle kicked 14 straight.

### HIGHEST SCORE

EAST Fremantle recorded their highest score at Perth Oval last week. Their score of 26.18 (74) bettered their 1955 effort of 26.16.

Their winning margin of 104 points is also their biggest win at that ground, and the fifth time East Fremantle have beaten East Perth by 100 points.

Perth Oval has not been a happy hunting ground for the Sharks since 1960. They have won only nine out of their last 40 games at that ground.

### IN BRIEF ...

SUBIACO last week equalled the VFL record of 15 consecutive goals, held by Geelong at Moorabbin Oval in 1979. This, however, falls five goals short of East Fremantle's record effort the previous week.

Claremont and Subiaco have met 88 times at Claremont Oval. Surprisingly each side have 44 wins apiece. Subiaco have an added incentive to win as their next win over Claremont will be their 100th, against that club.

South Fremantle have a chance to level their win/loss record at East Fremantle Oval. East Fremantle lead 27 wins to South's 26.

### 15 YEARS AGO ...

A MOVE to introduce interchange reserves was rejected at an AFC meeting in March 1972. The proposal came from South Australia.

The move was defeated when Victoria, Queensland, NSW and Canberra voted against it. SA, WA, Tasmania and Australian Amateurs voted in favour. A three-quarter majority was required.

Perth coach Barry Cable said: "Tactically, it could help the game, but it could be abused; you would have people coming and going like yo-yos."

West Perth coach Peter Steward thought there would be "no great tactical advantage".

Ironically, the VFL, who opposed the idea in 1972, used it before the WAFL. It was officially used at the start of the 1978 VFL season. The WAFL introduced it on a trial basis from round eight, 1978. After seven games, the league directors were unanimously in favour of continuing the interchange rule for the remainder of 1978.

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## THIS WEEK'S GAMES



### Fortunes change for Port side

IT is amazing how quickly the position of a football team can change. When South Fremantle and East Fremantle met in the first round, the Bulldogs were undefeated after three games and East Fremantle has won twice. The Sharks won that Derby and have not been beaten since. South Fremantle lost and have not won a game since. The Bulldogs' losing sequence is likely to be extended to six when they play the Sharks at East Fremantle Oval on Saturday. East Fremantle and Claremont have emerged as the early favourites for the premiership and it would be a major upset to see South Fremantle rebound on Saturday. However, the results of derbies is always difficult to predict and the Bulldogs could not pick a better time to return to the form which made them an exciting proposition three games into the season. East Fremantle have an edge in experience with Clinton Browning and Brian Peake in exceptional form and those two players should keep the Sharks impeccable form intact.

### Subiaco are ready for Tigers



CLAREMONT and Subiaco, close neighbours and fierce rivals, meet in an important match at Claremont Oval on Saturday. It is particularly important to Subiaco, who have gathered momentum in their drive towards a place in the final four in the last five weeks. And the Lions showed last Saturday, when they beat West Perth by 50 points, that they are approaching the form which won them the 1986 premiership. Claremont have lost only one of their first eight matches and were able to overcome a slow start against South Fremantle last week to eventually win by 73 points.

This match should provide an interesting clash — particularly midfield, which is the strength of both teams. Claremont rely on a hard core of running players like centreman Ben Allan, rover Brian Sutherland, ruck-rover Peter Thorne and wingmen Tony Begovich and Mark Hann, while Subiaco depend on the creative talents of captain Neil Taylor, wingers Greg Carpenter and Ian Dargie and rovers Glen O'Loughlin and Mick Lee. The winner in that region should emerge with four premiership points. But Claremont have the defensive capacity to place more pressure on the Subiaco players and for that reason should win this contest.

### Last chance for Demons



PERTH and West Perth, two of league football's big disappointments in the opening eight games of the season, clash at the WACA Ground on Saturday in one of their most important matches of the season. The loser could find themselves completely out of touch with the leading teams even at this early stage of the season. Perth have won only two of their first eight matches and would be out of commission if they lost on Saturday, while

West Perth could absorb another defeat and still finish in the four — but it would make their task a difficult one. And the Falcons would certainly need to improve on their losing performance against Subiaco last Saturday. Their 50-point loss on the scoreboard flattered their effort when there were only a handful of players who competed at the required level. Perth needed to beat Swan Districts at Bassendean Oval last Saturday to maintain any hope of playing in the finals and they could be on their last chance this Saturday.

### Big chance for Swans



SWAN Districts, the surprise packet so far this season with five wins from eight games, have the opportunity to firmly entrench themselves in the top four when they play East Perth at Bassendean Oval on Saturday. After last season's disappointing fade-out, when they finished at the bottom of the premiership table, Swans have re-grouped to make a tremendous start to the season. They are basically an inexperienced combination, but they are hungry for success. They should make it six wins from nine games when they meet an East Perth side which has won only one of its first eight matches. However, it will not be a formality. In the first half against East Fremantle last week, East Perth showed they have some talent. But in the end, the sheer weight of experience and skill of the Sharks sunk the Royals.

# Magpies will not be easy

#### INJURED

Former East Perth youngster Craig Starcevic, who has made a brilliant start to his VFL career, was absent through injury last Saturday and without him the Magpies were still able to beat St Kilda by six points.

In the initial stages of the Eagles campaign, their defence was one of the strong points.

But last Sunday they made some terrible mistakes and will need to lift their rating if they are to beat Collingwood.

Michael Brennan and Mark Zanotti were a little out of touch last Sunday, but they have been strong contributors for the Eagles in previous matches.

The Eagles played strongly across the centre last Sunday and they will need to continue that form if they are to give their side a winning edge on Monday.

#### BEARING

Centreman Tony Shaw and former SA star Grant Fielke on a wing have been in good form for the Magpies and their contributions will have a strong bearing on Collingwood's performance.

Former East Perth player Michael Christian is likely to start at centre-half-back and David Cloke — in the likely absence of Starcevic — should play at centre-half-forward, leaving big Wes Fellowes to lead the ruck.

That group of players lacks nothing in talent and should make things interesting for the Eagles.

However, the Eagles have a little more brilliance and are better suited to the vast expanses of Subiaco Oval, where their pace and skills can create serious problems for their opponents.

# Winning can still be lonely

WATCHING Eagles players Murray Wrensted, Michael Brennan and Alex Ishchenko wander away from Subiaco Oval after Sunday's game against Melbourne made me think of the loneliness of the Eagles footballer.

Here is a team that has captured the public's imagination. Yet when the game is won, they don't soak up the atmosphere of victory.

WAFL players can expect to join a packed clubrooms full of supporters after a home match. It can be stirring stuff if they win.

Players usually have a drink together and collectively go into the clubrooms to the applause of supporters for trophy presentations.

But for the Eagles, still without a home, it must be a big let-down to straggle off individually to a local drinking establishment after a game.

I'm not knocking the place where they go — O'Connors. In fact, it's good they have somewhere to celebrate. But it's just not the same as your own clubrooms.

It's a point I've touched on before in this column, but one that cannot be understated.

Ironically, for team spirit, the away games are probably the best thing.

It means the players are together in the lead-up to a game and feel the highs and lows of performances on the plane trip back to Perth.

The fact they don't have a home and are thrown together for such long periods before and after games has forged a bond that probably no other club in the VFL can claim.

The Eagles are always going to be difficult to beat in Perth. For exactly the same reason they will struggle in Melbourne ... the playing surface.

Have you noticed how the Vic teams that come here start quickly, but tend to lose their pace as the game progresses.

The Melbourne-based players find that the hard Subiaco surface taxes their legs, just as the spongy and muddy surfaces in Victoria make our players' legs feel leaden.

It's a problem that could be with the Vics for quite a while, given the fact their teams play only once a season over here.

The Eagles, on the other hand, should become used to Victorian conditions in time, but perhaps not in time to make an impact on the VFL this season.

Ron Barassi raised an interesting point in a weekly football column he writes in Melbourne. He said the Eagles should have at least one training session a week on a muddy surface.

He is one of a growing number of Melbourne football critics who recognise that the Eagles in Perth are an entirely different proposition to the team that plays in Victoria.

Barassi believes Melbourne's mud will anchor the Eagles out of the finals this season.

He based that assessment on the way they were sunk by St Kilda at Moorabbin. Eagles coach Ron Alexander believes that performance was an aberration. It will be interesting to see who is right.

"Earl and I have been used up this week as the blokes have picked our brains asking about the Eagles players." Former Subiaco star Warren Dean talking about the role that he and fellow WA player Earl Spalding played in Melbourne's build-up to Sunday's game.

"The Eagles seemed to be on a seven-second delay system." ABC commentator Trevor Jenkins after Melbourne had kicked their fifth goal within seven seconds of a centre bounce-down.

"They are changing too many rules and not interpreting them too well." Graham Farmer on radio 6IX on the controversial play-on decision that is confusing players this season.

"East Fremantle are highly professional and apply themselves in that way — that's why they're on top." East Perth coach Gerard McNeill — before Saturday's thrashing.

"I figured it was a chance to get a free trip to Australia." Melbourne's Irish recruit Sean Wight explaining how he first tried out at a recruiting clinic held in Dublin by former Melbourne coach Ron Barassi.

"There's a move on at the moment to admit Canberra to the VFL. If it's sustained, it'll be worth seeing." Prime Minister Bob Hawke.

After a fairly mediocre career with a very ordinary Subiaco team, Johns has been a valuable player with Swan Districts.

He has beaten the best ruckmen in this State and his capacity to ruck all day is impressive. He seems to have unlimited stamina, an attribute many big men in today's game don't have.

His development should be an example to his opponent last Saturday, Shane Bogunovich.

Bogunovich doesn't think about his game enough and plays in spurts. He has the size and skills to be a dominant ruckman, but may never reach his true potential.

The Demons need a dominant big man on the ball to give the mobile division more opportunities mid-field.

Perth coach Mal Brown has obviously done everything possible to make Bogunovich into a regular player, but ultimately it is in the player's own hands.

Johns has earned football respect through sheer hard work and Bogunovich should follow that example.

## The best news for years

THE announcement by the Minister for Sport, Graham Edwards, that accreditation for all junior sporting coaches will become compulsory is the biggest boost for junior sport for years.

Accreditation will help eliminate the ugly side of junior sport — the side that is doing enormous damage to young people and contributing to the reduction in numbers participating over the past decade.

Junior sport is for children. The games are played by children and therefore children must have the right to determine what they want.

Over-keen adults had decided that children's sport had to be highly organised and therefore they set the rules —

rules based on adult ideals of winning at all costs.

Australian football has been fighting the negative side of sport for the past decade with great success. Modified rules have been accepted after doubts by many of the "old football brigade" that these changes were ruining our game. The banning of tackling caused enormous controversy throughout the football world.

His appetite for work and his ability to organise and promote his knowledge makes him the leading junior sport expert in Australian football.

Dr Douge has travelled the length and breadth of WA "selling" coach accreditation. Anyone who has been involved in his coach accreditation courses will sing his praises. They are a great learning experience.

He has a great personality and a very genuine approach — attributes that have made him the "saviour" of our modern day game.

He doesn't have the high profile of many other football administrators, nor does he want it. But the job he has done so far will not be fully understood for years.

Coach accreditation and its impact on junior sport will be the salvation of sport. The Minister's announcement last week is the best news in sport for years.

Watching him struggle up slippery stairs and then listening to his com-

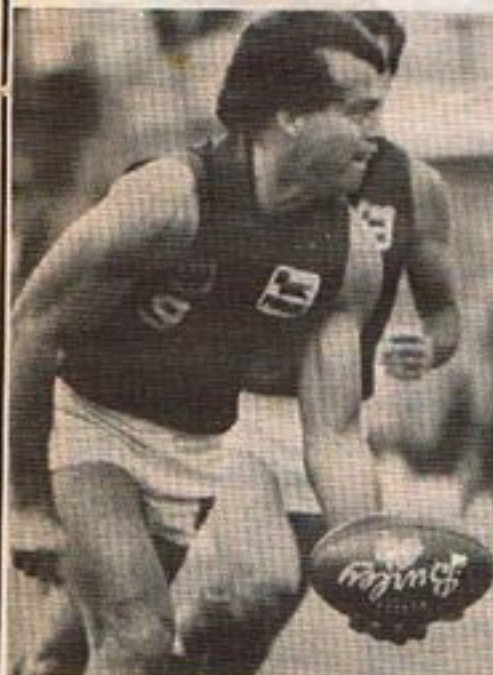
ments once he gets to the media box, it is obvious to all that he doesn't enjoy the experience.

## Caution urged on WACA

WHILE the Eagles are still in limbo so far as a home ground is concerned, they should be keeping a watchful eye on what might be happening at Lathlain Park.

If the Perth Football Club make the move to the WACA, then the Eagles would be unwise not to snap up one of the best football venues in the State.

This though has added strength when you take into consideration that the Burswood Resort and Casino people are major sponsors of the Eagles and may therefore like them to be positioned handy to the Resort complex.

Given that the Eagles continue to be big drawcards, then Burswood might also like to take an interest in a venue that could be developed into a major stadium, and if this becomes the case, then Lathlain looks the goods.

Having made these comments, I should go further and say that Perth might take a second look before they jump into some unholy alliance with the cricket mob at the WACA.

I have never believed that the mar-

riage would work at any time because, if history repeats, and I reckon it will, the annals of the two sports on one venue has been chaotic.

It was, and has proved to be in my view, a great success when football became more independent and each club moved into its own home ground.

I agree that the costs may be prohibitive in a lot of ways, but when you consider that each club can train, play games and use their venues any way they see fit, then the costs may be justified.

Perth, should they make the move, could have difficulty in training on the WACA and this in itself makes the proposition less than appealing.

East Perth could also be interested in joining Perth at the WACA. If they do, then I advise both clubs not to let go of their present home grounds because I reckon cricket will tighten a noose of restrictions about their necks until they find their tenure unbearable and they have to retreat.

In the meantime, the Eagles are

watching; Perth, East Perth and the cricket mob are watching, and I guess we'll all watching to see what is going to happen.

The end result will create some talking points I can tell you.

GRAHAM Melrose, the man who coaches Old Easts, made himself unpopular with Eagles coach Ron Alexander when he insisted that Darren Bennett should drop back to the blue and whites reserves before he would be considered for their league team.

Alexander seemed put out that one of the Eagles would not be accorded preferential treatment.

He obviously didn't go along with the rule that Melrose has applied at East Fremantle this year — that all players, coming back from injury or otherwise, have to perform in the reserves before being considered for the top side.

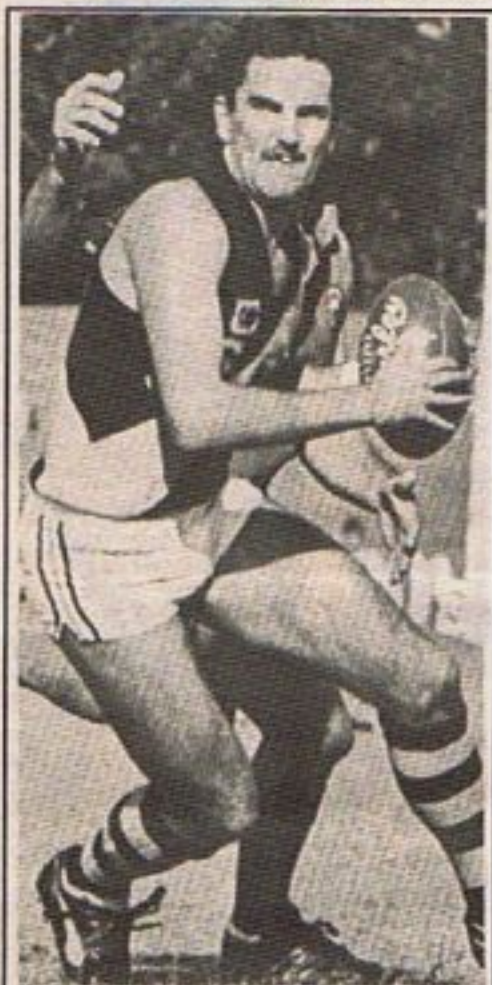

## FALSE DECLARATIONS

THE WAAFL management committee is taking a strong stand on the ineligibility of players.

Under notice are several clubs who continue to play players who: (1) have been suspended by the tribunal and play under a false name; (2) play while awaiting for their reinstatement to be confirmed; (3) continue to use players who have had their reinstatement denied for various reasons as per reinstatement guidelines; (4) play in dual competitions, i.e. amateurs on Saturdays and another competition (other than social) on Sundays.

The WAAFL is quite willing to exercise the maximum penalty of \$500 for any club caught, plus loss of premiership points, suspension of the player and guilty officials.
