Todd ready for war

Come on, you Crows!

WESTERN Australia's lack of "big name" footballers will be the State's major asset when we play a cocky South Australia under lights at the WACA Ground next Tuesday.

That's the astute opinion of WA coach John Todd, who is working overtime preparing our State side physically and mentally for the no-holds-barred clash.

"The surprise element could work in our favour," Todd said this week.

"There will be many players in our side who the South Australians will know little about.

"They will need to do plenty of research.

"Sure, we have some really big names in our team who the Croweaters know everything about.

"But a good percentage of our players will be unknowns."

Todd has a good knowledge of many of the South Australians, having coached some of their representatives at All-Australian level, both here and abroad.

"I respect their ability and we will employ special tactics on some of them," the master coach added.

The very confident South Australians are already planning their Australian championship celebrations after beating Victoria by four points in a State-of-Origin clash a few weeks back.

They now want to beat what they think is a weakened WA side — with the advent of the West Coast Eagles — and so claim the Australian championship legitimately for the first time since 1911.

The Croweaters make no claim to the national championship they were awarded in 1985 — they refuse to accept that technical victory over Victoria.

It's an all-or-nothing situation now — and they are coming to Perth with victory celebrations on their mind and plenty of boasting about their champions.

There has been a lot of noise from Adelaide about the ability of SA full-forward Rudi Mandemaker.

The handy goalkicker comes from the tiny Victorian town of Poowong (in the hills of Gippsland) and played with the Hawthorn reserves before moving to Adelaide.

But Todd says that Mandemaker is unproven at State level and "has a long way to go before he can be rated".

Talking of spearheads, Todd hinted that Subiaco's talented Todd Breman could be in front of the big sticks for WA — giving him that rare double of State football and cricket.

"With tall men like Brad Tunbridge, Clinton Browning and Colin Waterson around the forward line, Breman would not be under the same amount of pressure as he is in club games," Todd said.

"Forwards have got to get their share of the ball to do well," Todd said.

"The running players like Mick Lee, Roger Kerr, Darren Bewick and Mark Watson are more than capable of getting the ball into attack."

The WA squad has trained well under the lights at the WACA and also at Parry Field, the home of WA baseball.

But Todd takes little notice of such a good build-up.

"Sure, it's important to train well, but we want them to produce it all on Tuesday night.

"Representing your State is the highest a footballer can go...I'm sure the boys will grab their opportunity."

CARTER'S FUTURE

FORMER South Fremantle and State captain Noel Carter must be looming as a contender to coach Perth's league side next year. Current coach Malcolm Brown has indicated that he will be stepping down and Carter's present role as playing-coach of the Perth reserves side is one that he is really enjoying. "It's a hard habit to toss," said Carter when asked why he had accepted the coaching role after retiring from league ranks two years ago. "I'd like to coach a league side eventually, but I will wait for the right opportunity," he said on radio 6NR.

BAD TIMING

EAST Perth officials have been awaiting the arrival in league ranks of promising youngster Shane Strempel, a Teal Cup product with an exciting future. However, some inconsistent reserves form has prevented an early inclusion in the league side but he was gradually getting closer with some improved form. That came to a temporary stop last week as the tall 18-year-old from Busselton damaged the ligaments in his left knee against Perth and was on crutches after the match.

COMING BACK

PERTH will soon welcome back key-position player Allan Montgomery, who will boost their big-man strength. The talented Montgomery has joined the fire brigade and was forced to give up playing football during the 15 weeks of training. During the same course last year, Montgomery broke his left arm playing football and was unable to finish the course — something he wouldn't risk this year. He has been training four times a week and should be quickly back into league action when the course is over.

HOLMES ON SWANS

WEST Coast Eagles star Don Holmes believes that Swan Districts coach John Todd has got himself another potential premiership team. He says that the hallmarks are all there for a repeat revival of the 1970s. "Whereas clubs like Melbourne and Collingwood try to buy their way out of trouble, today breeds character and team football," Holmes said. "I've seen them four times this season and I've been most impressed."

SPENCER'S TRIBUTE

THERE were many tributes to East Perth's Peter Spencer on his 200th WAFL game last week. Geoff Christian, chief football writer for THE WEST AUSTRALIAN and radio 6NR commentator, summed Spencer up when he said: "He plays the game in the spirit that it should be played in. He is an enormous credit to football." The Royals cheer squad showed their feelings with a Peter Spencer "Our Hero" banner for the battle-scarred rover to run through before his big game at Perth Oval. Ironically, that milestone was against Perth, the club that he was residentially bound to, having played his junior football at Manning, before joining the Royals under the father-son regulation. Father Jim captained East Perth in 1952-55. Spencer's junior club didn't forget him last week, with a huge Mighty Manning banner at Perth Oval.

MIGHTY MENAGLIO

A LOT of people have remarked on the terrific form of West Perth captain Peter Menaglio. Well Menaglio, together with team-mate Wayne Dayman, didn't take the summer off. Instead they went straight into fitness work for 1987. Menaglio says he is feeling the fittest he has ever felt, which has given his confidence a tremendous boost.

CASSIUS WATCHES

ARGUEABLY Australia's greatest footballer, Barry Cable, still finds time to get down to Lathlain Park on a Thursday night, despite his duties with the West Coast Eagles. "Cassius" likes to watch the progress of sons, Shane and Barry junior, who are currently in the Perth reserves team.

ONE of the men who lifted the Swan Districts from the basement to three successive premierships is former club present John Cooper. NEVER OFF DUTY

IF you are a West Coast Eagles player, there's never any off duty moments, so it seems. Several injured Eagles team members have filled in as guest commentators in recent weeks when the West Coast boys have headed to the East Coast for tough matches. Appearing in the Channel Seven studio with anchorman John Rogers have been Eagles stars like Robert Wiley and Michale O'Connell — and doing quite well, too. There's certainly life after football, judging on their expert comments.

ROSCO'S MILESTONE

WEST Coast Eagles skipper Ross Glendinning was certainly the centre of attention last week when he notched his 200th VFL game — with North Melbourne and 10 with the Eagles. He is the first WAFL-produced player to reach that milestone (Steve McCann and Ales Epis played 200 games in Victoria but never played in the WAFL). Several other similarities emerged with his milestone, such as the venue, Western Oval, where he made his VFL debut back in 1978 and his current coach, Ron Alexander, was the player who was East Perth's fairest and best player back in 1974 when Glendinning first played senior football.

GOODWILL GESTURE

ONE player the Eagles are certainly missing is dashing wingman Phil Narkle, whose influence over the midfield play in the team's early matches was decisive. Narkle's elbow injury has mystified people treating the former Swans star and his return to competitive football continues to be delayed. Australian Airlines decided that he had been on the side sidelines for long enough and last week they flew him to Melbourne with the team for the Footscray game arousing speculation that he might be a surprise late inclusion. But it was simply a goodwill gesture to keep him involved in team activities.

ISHCHENKO EMERGES

MANY people have marvelled at the performances of West Coast Eagles ruckman Alex Ishchenko this season and he is at last realising his potential. Though he made his WAFL league debut with East Perth in 1982, he has rucked less than 50 games in his professional career. His early days were spent in the shadow of John Ironmonger, now with the Sydney Swans.

BENNETT'S OBJECTIVES

FOOTBALL critics across the country "caned" Eagles fullforward Darren Bennett after several below-standard games early in the VFL season. But Bennett is ready to make amends and quash the misnomer that he is not a good footballer. The sometimes East Fremantle player believes he was too hyped up for games and his eagerness to perform well caused him to drop marks that he would normally take. He has also been told by coach Ron Alexander to make himself available as soon as possible. Bennett says he has no intentions of rushing a comeback after his knee operation, but he thinks he should be fit for this weekend's round of fixtures.

DONOHUE'S STILL SERVING

THE deposed chairman of selectors at Essendon, Brian Donohue, is still working hard for the Bombers. Donohue was on the selectors panel when Essendon were winning all those premierships. Now he helps coach Kevin Sheedy by going to other games and reporting what he sees.

RECORD IN DANGER

LEIGH Matthews record of 340 league games for Hawthorn is in danger from present Hawks skipper Michael Tuck. The 34 year old Tuck is in his 16th season and has made 321 senior appearances for the Hawks. He says that if his form holds, he will carry on playing into 1988. In a recent match the "old man" had 31 possessions, including 10 marks.

SEWELL CLEARED

FORMER East Fremantle star Jim Sewell has been cleared by Victorian club Footscray to play for fast improving QAFL club Wilston-Grange. Sewell, the 31-year-old former East Fremantle player notched 76 VFL games and is now football manager of the Brisbane Bears. But he has no intentions of making a comeback with the Queensland-based VFL team.

VANDER STRUGGLING

THE career of Essendon's Paul van der Haar appears in jeopardy. Bomber coach Kevin Sheedy says his club has been forced to turn to younger players and "Vander" hasn't played too well lately. However nobody likes playing in the seconds, so it could be just the spur he needs.

UNWANTED ERRORS

MOST league football clubs have a team all of their own on the sidelines these days a group of statisticians and bottom side East Perth are no exception. The big stat team record everything that the coach needs, with tackles, run-ons, shepherds and so forth being noted as well as the kicks, marks and handballs. But there's one statistic that they probably don't record — and my spy at Perth Oval paid particular attention to this facet last week. It's the number of times that players make stupid mistakes when they are not under pressure of need to take risks. The Royals had four in the first quarter, six in the second and four in the third before my man gave up in disgust. Four of those 14 simple errors resulted directly in goals to Perth...who won by just a point! Enough said.

MEDIA BATTLE

THE on-going verbal warfare between ABC commentators Trevor Jenkins and Wally Foreman makes good listening on their footy coverage. The continual sniping at each other over their respective height (or lack of it) is a one-upmanship battle and TJ left himself wide open last week. Still smarting over the cushion issue (see last week's column) he suggested after a super-long kick from Claremont's Steve Goulding, that he would step it out after the game to see whether it really was 80-metres, as foreman suggested. WA lead the crows in wins

THERE will be plenty of history and tradition on display when Western Australia play host to South Australia at the WACA Ground on Tuesday night.

Not only will it be Perth's first interstate clash under lights and the first State match at the WACA Ground, but it will be a test of strength for two sides capable of winning the 1987 Australian championships.

The year of 1938 remains the only time that a WA side has beaten SA in Adelaide and Perth in the same year... a record that obviously cannot be matched this year, with only one game to be contested.

Here are some other WA-SA snippets from our history file:

WA and South Australia met for the first time in 1904 in Adelaide and since then there have been 75 games played, in six capital cities in Australia over a period of 83 years.

The table below shows how and where they have performed:

Two games have been decided by one point. South Australia on July 21, 1936 at Subiaco Oval and West Australia in Adelaide on June 9, 1984 at Football Park.

Sixteen games have been decided by a goal or less and WA lead in this aspect, nine games to seven.

WA's highest score of 29.23 (197) was at Subiaco Oval in 1938. Ironically, South Australia, kicked exactly the same score in 1982. However, three years later they bettered this tally by one point to record their highest score against WA, 30.18 (198).

50 COMING UP?

A PERTH win this week will be their 50th at Fremantle Oval against the Bulldogs.

Perth's last win at that ground was in round 8 in 1979 when they won by three goals. Since then the Demons have lost nine consecutive games at the Port... their longest losing sequence at that ground.

This beats the previous record of six straight losses between 1926-1929.

FALCONS FEAST

WEST Perth last week recorded their highest score against South Fremantle and their score of 37.17 (239) equalled their best effort in league football.

It is a remarkable coincidence that the last time they kicked 37.17 was against East Fremantle only seven days before WA met SA at Subiaco Oval in 1981. This time it's 10 days.

The Falcons also set an all-time league record for a winning margin in open football.

Their 210-point win is 18 points greater than the previous record, ironically, held by South Fremantle against Subiaco in 1953.

East Perth did beat South Fremantle by 256 points in the under-age competition in 1944 but this cannot justifiably be claimed as a "league record".

Saturday's score of 37.17 has only been bettered on five other occasions — South Fremantle 40.18 (258) on 5.9.81; Claremont 39.20 (254) on 8.8.81; Swan Districts 40.11 (251) on 11.8.79; Swan Districts 38.21 (249) on 20.4.81; Claremont 37.19 (241) on 30.7.83.

FOR THE RECORD

IN last week's article the drawn game in round 1, 1986 was overlooked. Therefore the draw between Claremont and Subiaco was the 59th drawn game since 1898. Figures should have read: WP (24 draws) and Perth (10 draws).

Take the Pitt Street Mall, for starters.

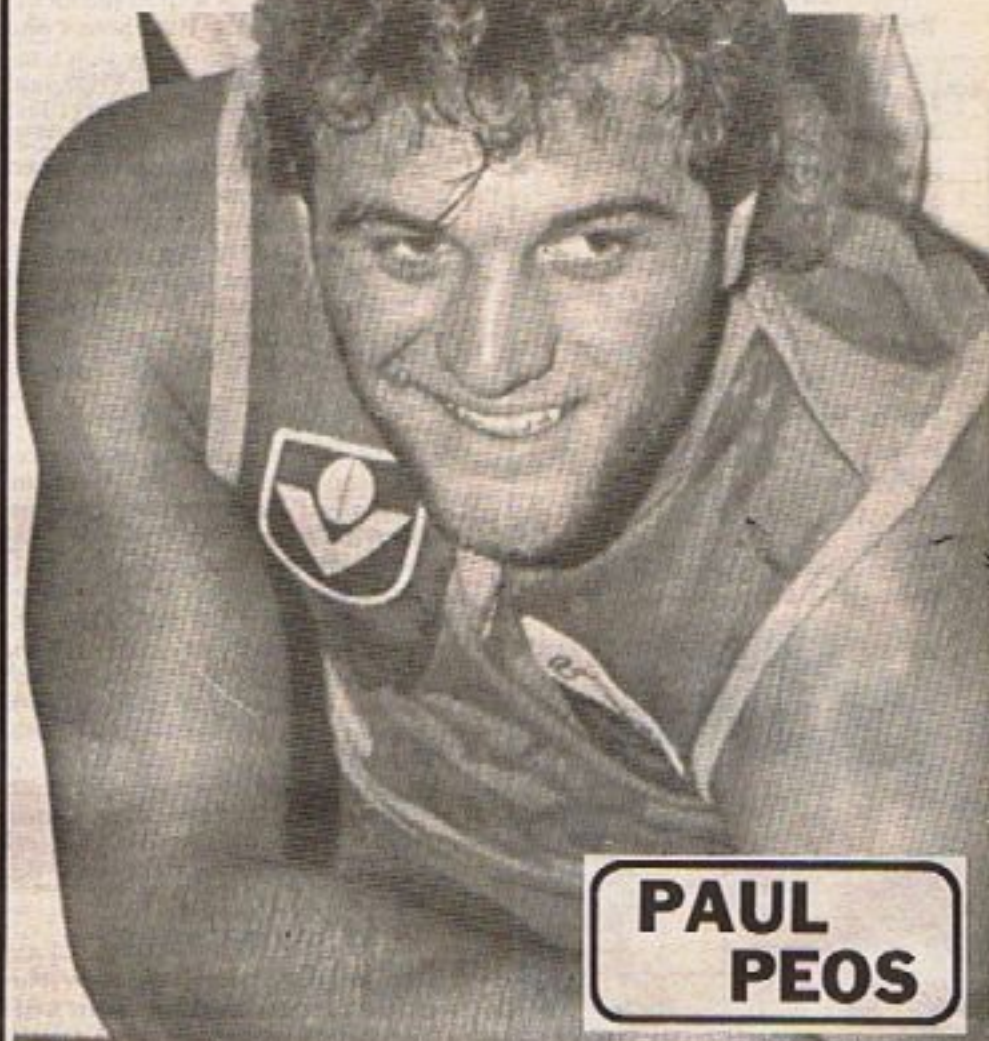
Apart from being about 30 years behind the times, it's been a complete stuff-up since work started on it three or four months ago.

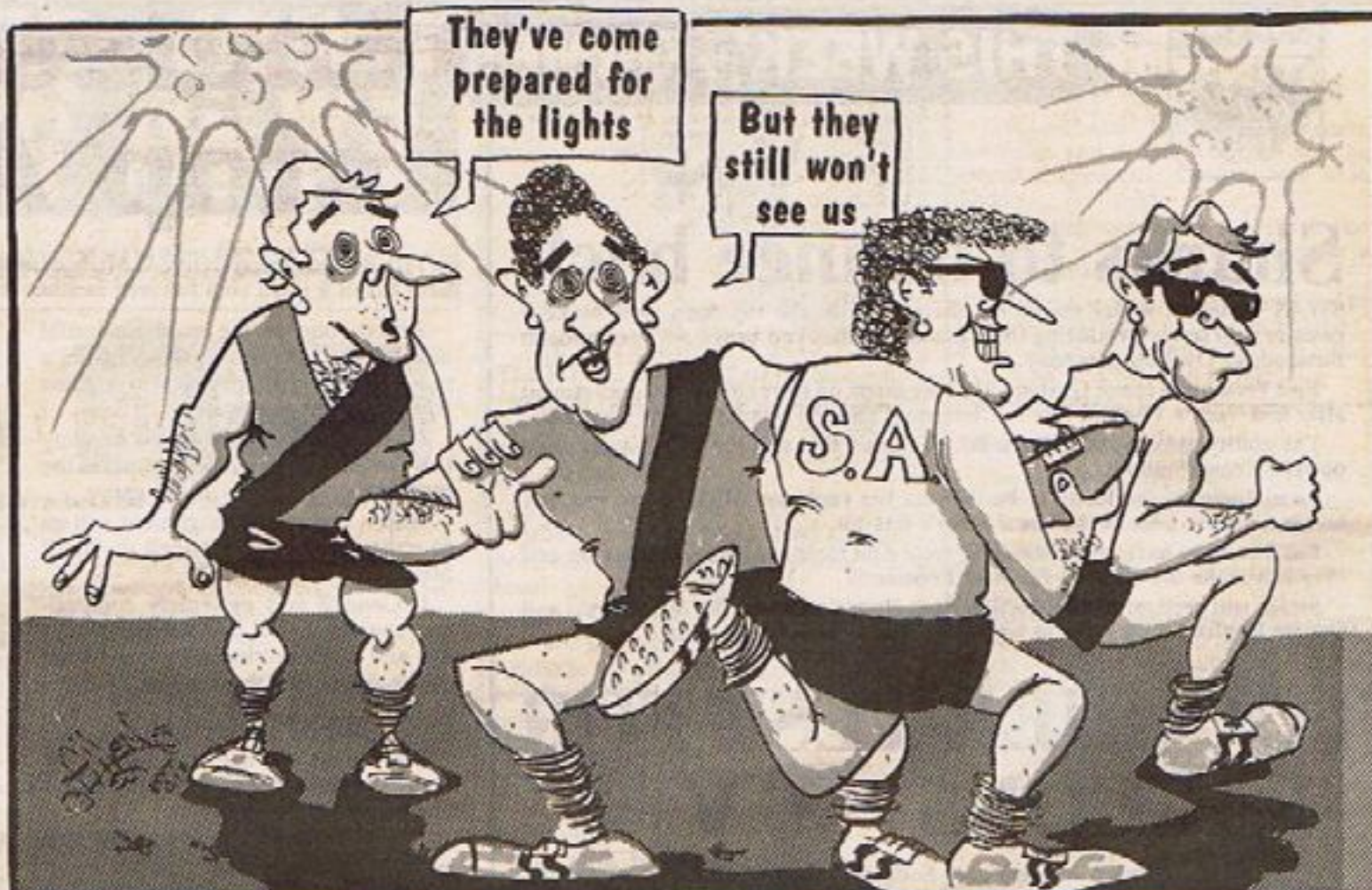

Tiger cubs do it in style

SO Claremont don't deserve to be on top of the WAFL ladder - that's the opinion of East Fremantle coach Graham Melrose.

I don't think Melrose quite meant it to sound the way it did when he told Sharks members that the Tigers were just a bunch of kids and shouldn't be on top of the premiership ladder.

He could be accused of having an inflated opinion of his side. That, of course, is not the case.

On paper, East Fremantle look a million dollars in the depleted WAFL competition.

By comparison, Claremont look like a team of rookies.

But there are two things Melrose overlooked when sinking the boot into the Tiger cubs.

They may be young, but they possess enormous talent. More importantly, they are not intimidated by the big name players.

The Tigers have hardly put a foot wrong this season.

They have hardly stumbled since right from the start of the pre-season competition with their only loss being to West Perth.

The way they came back against the Lions was an indication of their never-say-die spirit.

But it has been their wins over East Fremantle that have highlighted Claremont's performances this season.

Gerry Neesham must take the credit for the Tigers sparkling form this season.

He has been prepared to sit back and let the players do the job. Not many playing coaches would take a back seat the way he has.

While it may have riled Melrose that his team of big name players should be beaten for the second time this year by a team of players still wet behind the ears, it is great for WA football.

The future of WA football doesn't lie in the hands of the West Coast Eagles, though they have given the sport an enormous lift in interest.

It lies in the hands of the kind of kids who have Claremont sitting on top of the premiership ladder.

Just as they did almost a decade ago, Claremont are reaping the rewards from having top colts sides.

It has taken them from a situation of bumbler to one of the most successful and professional clubs in the league.

Trying to prop up a team with expensive imports may have an immediate return, but it is counter-productive in the long term.

A couple of seasons ago it looked as though Claremont would find themselves in the same situation as Swan Districts...forced to do a stint near the bottom of the premiership ladder while they went through a re-building phase.

Whether through luck — though I suspect it is good management — or not the Tigers are going through a re-building phase, but at the top, rather than the bottom of the premiership ladder.

It is to be hoped, not only for the Tigers' sake but for WA football, that, as so often has been the case here, they don't have the heart ripped out of them in a couple of seasons by the piranhas of the VFL.

"We would have preferred the float to be filled by small investors, but this was not taken up." Indian Pacific Ltd chief executive John Walker on the news that the public float has been taken up by a group of big individual investors.

"I don't have a set pre-match routine. I get motivated as soon as I run out on the ground." Laurie Keene.

"I don't know how to go about getting over a problem of this nature." Eagles rover Robert Wiley on his first groin strain.

"I think it is a step in the right direction to have a woman involved with the development of football, because women have always played a major role in junior football activities." Pam O'Connell on her appointment to the Football Development Trust Board.

"Nobody likes to be at the bottom of the ladder and our loyal supporters deserve another victory." East Perth veteran Peter Spencer on his 200th WAFL game.

"There are more people more qualified than Pam O'Connell to work on football development — she admits that she has fears about football injuries; you can't have that." Percy Johnson on radio 6PR.

"West Perth are on the way back and set to play in the finals." 6PR critic Bob Cribb before Saturday's record-breaking win by the Falcons.

"Maybe East Perth are making too many excuses too often." Ray Lawrence, on 6WF's sports show.

"Never mind what most people think. The birth of the Eagles has injected new life into the WAFL." East Fremantle coach Graham Melrose.

"I felt a very sharp and painful blow to the left side of my jaw. It felt like a clenched fist." South Fremantle's Dean Irving, in a written statement to the WAFL tribunal when Claremont's Peter Higgins was suspended for six weeks for striking.

"I don't believe that East Fremantle should have more than double our number in the State squad." Claremont coach Gerard Neesham.

"One night a video is used as primary evidence and the next night it is ruled as only an aid to the evidence." An upset South Fremantle football manager Brian Ciccosto after the WAFL tribunal chairman Bernie O'Sullivan rejected an appeal on Brad Collard's four-week suspension.

WHAT THEY SAID



"This is not only an auspicious day for WA football, but for the future of the game in Australia as a whole." WAFL chairman, Roy Annear, on the launching of the Football Development Trust.

"I think they were the worst football side I have ever seen play the game. They played ring-a-ring-rosy football." Radio 6PR critic Percy Johnson on East Perth's effort against Swan Districts.

"We will secure the long-term lease subject to making it financially viable as a business by hiring it out." South Fremantle managing-director Harold Harper on the club's move to take over the lease of Fremantle Oval.

"There are a lot of things to take into account and not merely the importance of the game as a whole." Claremont captain-coach Gerard Neesham, hedging questions on whether he will make his playing debut with the Tigers.

"I would very much like to return home to Canberra to coach their team in the VFL." Former VFL legend Alex Jesaulenko on the official launch at Parliament House of a Canberra bid to enter a team in the VFL.

"When the final returns came in and were added up, the total figure was 2830, more than the original figure." WAFL chief executive Peter Cummiskey on the record crowd of 38,274 to see the Eagles play Collingwood.

"Building a good team spirit doesn't come in a few months; it takes years." Eagles rover Don Holmes on the team's development.

"The Winners" has been, and still is, the biggest seller of the VFL. It has convinced those outside Victoria that Melbourne based teams have unlimited talent.

The introduction of the West Coast Eagles into the expanded VFL competition has smashed a few fallacies.

Watching Collingwood several weeks ago, I couldn't believe how ordinary a team they were.

In fact, I am convinced that both Claremont and East Fremantle would have pushed them and may have even

beaten Collingwood, the country's most famous football club.

Some of their players were below standard and most undisciplined.

The critics tell us the Magpies are rebuilding, but that is no excuse for the way they performed.

We all know the Eagles did it easy on Foundation Day, winning by 57 points.

But the locals still weren't convincing. A totally hard and aggressive Eagles would have won by 20 goals.

But back to the VFL and their standards.

I have no doubt that both Western Australia and South Australia, given their population difference, are ahead of Victoria in the producing of talented players.

Paul to wing in to stardom?

WEST Perth utility player Paul Mifka has a lot of natural ability, as was evident to those who watched him against South Fremantle.

Paul possesses natural pace and a most athletic physique.

Whether with hand or foot, his use of the ball is superb and he can pinpoint it so accurately over many metres.

Some of his ball carrying and precision disposal was top class, setting up many goal scoring opportunities for the Falcon forwards.

Paul has been played in many positions but I am convinced he should be left on the wing.

When left on the wing, Paul loves to attack. He also has the height advantage over most other wingmen in the competition, therefore he can create a sure attacking avenue to goals.

To be a great wingman, Paul has to develop the mental attitude to defend as well as attack.

Last Saturday he roamed wherever he wanted and no opponent was willing to play him closely.

To take the next step and play regularly for the Eagles, Paul Mifka must become stronger in his desire to succeed.

Where are the Leederville lovers?

YEARS ago, West Perth and South Fremantle contests attracted thousands.

One would have had to be at Leederville or Fremantle at noon to be guaranteed a "bird's eye" view.

While watching the last half of the West Coast Eagles and Footscray game from the Channel 7 commentary position on Saturday, I looked around Leederville Oval.

Before me was the smallest crowd I have seen at a league football match anywhere.

As a former loyal "Royal" we were advised to have an anti-rabies needle before going to the home of the "garlic munchers".

West Perth supporters are among the strongest and most vocal in the league. The "garlic munchers" love their club and let the visitors know (ask Mal Brown). But where are they now?

Many comments about the crowd size have been made but the facts are simple.

Only a few diehards are leaving the comfort of their lounge room where they can watch the West Coast Eagles live, to go and support their clubs.

Wet and windy afternoons just make it worse.

No one can be blamed. The WAFL have tried everything to keep the local competition alive while the football public have a right to watch live the best football teams in Australia.

There is no straight forward solution.

National football is here to stay and so is live TV coverage of games.

In time, maybe the local competition will begin to attract more people but small attendances will be part and parcel of WA football for some time yet.

The eight league clubs could do worse than to undertake research and establish while people aren't going to the football and more importantly, find out what will make them come back to the game.

Souths false promise

I WAS convinced — especially after watching them in the pre-season Kresta Cup competition — that South Fremantle would be the big improvers of 1987.

I, and I'm sure there were others also, who were convinced it was to be the dawning of a new era for the Bulldogs.

But their exhibition on Saturday was the worst I have seen from a league team.

Earlier in the year, the Bulldogs had skill, pace and a fierce desire to tackle hard.

Their enthusiasm was intense, with every player prepared to assist and praise his team-mates.

I can remember counting the number of shepherds and blocks that occurred and commenting how the "little things" they were doing for each other was a sure sign of better things to come.

I haven't seen South since then and could not believe my eyes last weekend.

They have turned a complete circle within a matter of weeks and were disgraceful against West Perth.

I couldn't help but think of the pain their coach Stan Magro would have been going through sitting on the bench.

Stan was a player who never surrendered. His reputation as a fierce competitor was known Australia-wide.

To have to sit and watch the total lack of commitment from his players would have nearly killed him.

Excuses will be made for inexperience, lack of ability and injuries but the players must forever wear the fact that they kicked just four goals in a game.

Their efforts, or lack of them, on Saturday has placed them in the history books for the worst team performance of all time.

Fitness role is important

ONCE upon a time the coach of any football team was expected to know everything about players, fitness, psychology, skills, tactics and you name it. He was the next best thing to God and if he didn't know something, then it wasn't worth knowing.

The vulnerability of this system was brought home to me when I was coaching junior and was faced with fitness problems.

Whether boys should wear support bandages? Whether they were really fit enough to play? Head injuries?

At Subiaco, doctors Ken Fitch and Tom Dadour made their services available and when I moved to the West Perth area, Dr Ainslie Waddell gave me similar support for the boys at the Westminster-Balga Football Club.

The backing of these men allowed me to coach with the knowledge that if the players committed themselves to going for the ball, then they did so with the knowledge that if they did get hurt, then first-class treatment would be at hand.

The necessity for experts to be on hand came home to me on three occasions that stand out. I asked one of the prominent trainers a league club what

to do if a player went down with a whack to the head: "Sit him up and ask him to read the scoreboard." I was told. "If he can, there won't be a lot wrong with him."

On another occasion I was present when a 14-year-old was in pain through an injury to his arm. He was given a couple of Aspros, had his arm put in a sling and taken home and sat on the doorstep to await the return of his parents, who were out shopping. I learned afterwards that the boy had a broken arm.

A good player at Westminster received a kick to the kidney region and was obviously in a lot of trouble. The consensus around the club was that he should be sent home, as he didn't seem to be all that bad, but I insisted that he be checked out by a doctor. He later went to hospital for about a week.

With this kind of experience behind me, I was keen to talk to Tom Odgers, who plays no small part in the fitness levels of the West Coast Eagles.

Employed by the WA College of Advanced Education at Mt Lawley, his field is sports medicine, with emphasis on exercise physiology.

Looking at the Eagles situation, he

explained that there were four people involved in team fitness — Dr Rod Moore, physiotherapist, Martin Giles, team coach Ron Alexander and himself.

They assess the team and its members from a fitness point of view and training and exercise in relation to performance expectations are made. Moore and Giles are mainly involved with the rehabilitation of injuries, while Odgers then tunes the players for peak performance.

Alexander takes control in much the same way as a jockey takes over from a horse trainer. If he is given a perfectly fit mount, then it is up to him to ride it according to the demands of the race and he employs his tactics accordingly.

Both coaching and fitness staff get together frequently and are kept informed as to what might be taking place. This means that all parties, right down to the runner, are aware of the coach's thoughts and able to react on his behalf with a minimum of communication. This allows Alexander to concentrate entirely on what is happening on the field.

Looking at the season as one race, Odgers is happy with the way his

charges are performing. They got away reasonably well, having had a couple of setbacks before moving into the top five. Staying in touch with the leaders to be in a position to storm home at the right time is partly Odgers' responsibility. He must keep his finger on the pulse and know exactly when to advise the coach that the team needs more work or less work.

As the weeks pass he must make sure that the players are up to the mark and keen to face each new challenge. It can be as taxing on Odgers and the rest of the fitness staff to the same degree as the coach. They cannot afford to put a foot wrong; if they do then the entire Eagles camp will suffer.

"The best of the West Coast Eagles is yet to come," says Odgers.

"They have yet to play as well as we believe they can. Hopefully, that form will be seen on the MCG at the end of the season. Preferably grand final day."

Richmond under verbal attack

A STINGING verbal attack — launched on the 43rd anniversary of D-day — against the Richmond Football Club by former president Ian Wilson may have been the tonic the club needed.

Wilson was quoted in a Melbourne Sunday newspaper as saying: "I fear one day I will wake up and find there is no longer a Richmond Football Club".

Twenty four hours later, Richmond made a spirited comeback against Fitzroy to win by 25 points after trailing in the first quarter by nearly five goals.

Wilson said on Sunday that it was completely unfair to blame the failure of the Tigers this season on coach Tony Jewell.

"The board, the administrators, the players and the coach must all share the wrap," Wilson said.

"They all know that they are free-wheeling.

"They should be like the old Arabs and fold up their tents and fade into the night.

A MESS

"These people have had their go and made a mess of it.

"So they should make way for other people with the kind of enthusiasm and dedication essential to keep a football club flying high.

"There is no question that running a club is hard work...and lots of fun if you are winning.

"But it's disappointing when you are losing."

Wilson was Richmond president for 12 years and a committee member for 19 years and during that time they won five premierships - 1967, 1969, 1973, 1974 and 1980.

Wilson has the greatest respect for new Tiger president Neville Crowe, who was captain of the club when he joined the Tiger committee in 1963.

"Neville Crowe has plenty of clues," says Wilson. "But he must have a good look around him and bring together a group of keen, fresh men who get off their backs and work for the club.

"Things won't come right by themselves.

"Neville will need to draw up a plan that will put the club on a better financial footing and enable it to recruit good new players," he said.

The former president estimated he spent at least 40 hours a week of his own

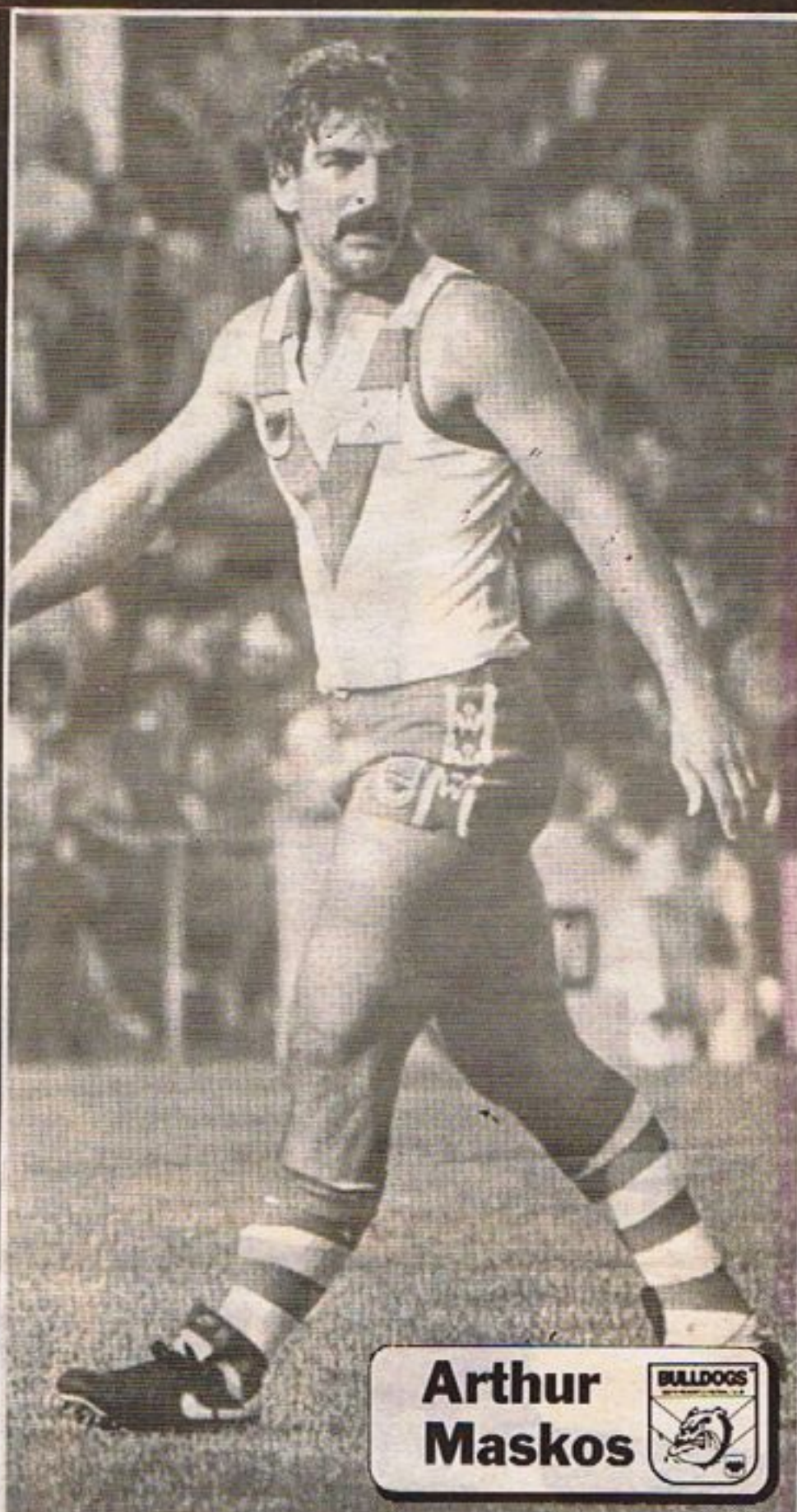

POPULAR

But Todd is about as popular with SA as he is with Mark Jackson and we're still dirty about the one-point loss to WA in Adelaide in 1984.

Not dirty about umpire Mike Ball's amazing holding-the-ball decision against present SA captain Bruce Lindsay that favoured Robert Wiley and resulted in the winning score; just Todd's display of arrogance after the final siren that has made him public enemy No. 1 in SA.

SA have been able to replace the 11 expatriates from the winning side against Victoria with class players.

Andrew Jarman, Peter Bubner, Bruce Lindsay, Garry McIntosh and Magarey Medalists, Michael Aish and Greg Anderson — all members of the side that won in 1985 — will be back again.

All but Aish (injured) played against Victoria.

NEW FACES

New faces to WA will include full-forward, Rudi Mandemaker, a former Hawthorn larrikin who has learnt the finer skills of football while playing under Kevin "Cowboy" Neale at Central District.

Centre-half-forward will be controlled by North Adelaide's Peter Bennett, who is rapidly developing into one of SA's top players.

He will probably be flanked by skilful Darren Jarman, Andrew's younger brother, and Clayton Lamb, a night football genius who also happens to be one of the longest kicks in Australia.

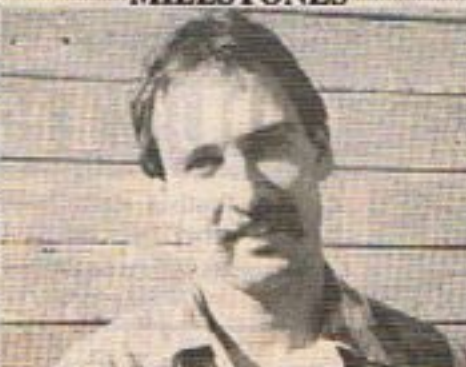

Elders Maintain Carnival

AUSTRALIA'S biggest rural based company Elders Pastoral will again sponsor the Great Southern Football Carnival recognised as Australia's oldest, at Katanning on July 4 and 5.

The return to Katanning this year will be especially looked forward to though a founder member, Katanning has not hosted a carnival since 1971 due to continuing ground problems. But with Kupara Park in good order, it is appropriate that the carnival returns to the ideal venue for a country-based carnival sponsored by a firm such as Elders Pastoral, as Katanning is one of the biggest sheep breeding and selling centres in Western Australia.

Bulldog critics on the attack

FOOTBALL critic and former Bulldog coach Percy Johnson was 'sickened' by South Fremantle's poor showing against West Perth at Leederville Oval last Saturday.

Johnson said yesterday that South Fremantle's 210 point loss was "disgraceful and the worst I've seen".

And South Fremantle football manager Brian Ciccotosto agrees.

Ciccotosto, a member of the South Fremantle side which lost to the Cardinals (as they were known then) in 1972 by 129 points, said there was no excuse for such an uninspiring performance and they owe football and the Bulldogs' supporters a good deal better than that.

Johnson said that South Fremantle were beaten in just about every position.

"It's at a time when we cannot afford that kind of effort", Johnson said.

"The WAFL is struggling to maintain its high profile against the VFL competition and that sort of rubbish just makes it harder.

"Only Merv Dellar, Brad McDougall and possibly Craig Edwards put in passable performances.

"Too many players were not prepared to give a second and third effort in the contest for the ball and as the match progressed they fell further and further away.

NO EXCUSES

Ciccotosto refused to offer excuses for the performance.

"We had nine first year players in the league side and we've tried a total of 37 players in the team this season," Ciccotosto said.

"That certainly isn't a sign of stability but I drew up a team for the Derby made up entirely of injured players.

"And on Saturday we lost John MacDonald with a dislocated shoulder, Troy Wilson with an injured shoulder and Scott Wilcox, who hurt his ankle, had to return to the field.

"This has put a tremendous player strain on the club.

"The colts are really depleted and for the past two weeks, we have been forced to play 15-year-old Brett Genefini in the reserves side," he said.
