# Crows are too good

STATE-of-Origin football and nothing else — that's what the West Australian football public wants.

The dismal crowd of less than 8000 people who saw WA thrashed by South Australia at the WACA Ground on Tuesday night spelt out an emphatic warning to football officialdom.

WA's disappointing showing against a fleet-footed and physically strong SA side under lights further exposed how much WAFL football has been weakened.

But it wasn't the fault of the WA players who struggled to match SA — and lost by 61 points, 18.16 to 9.9.

They were handed a job beyond their capabilities. It was a second-string WA side — and the public knew it.

Sandwiched in between two full sets of WAFL club fixtures, plus a home game for the West Coast Eagles this Friday night, the football fans just had too many other priorities.

But take nothing away from the Croweaters.

They fully deserved their first genuine Australian championship since 1911 and the impressive victory over WA comes in the wake of their thrilling four-point win against Victoria (on a State-of-Origin basis) earlier this season.

"We are now ready to host the Australian championship at the start of next year," said SANFL president Max Basheer.

"And that will be played on a State-of-Origin basis."

Vincent Yovich, WA's president of the National Football League, is also keenly looking forward to that Adelaide State-of-Origin carnival.

"The carnival in Adelaide next March will be a real test of strength and a good yardstick for Australian football."

The Simpson Medal for the best player in the match went to SA's Chris McDermott — giving the visitors two consecutive Medals in games against WA in Perth.

The trophy for WA's best player awarded by the Combined Past Players and Officials Association went to Derek Kickett.

State coach John Todd was surprised at the winning margin — he didn't believe SA were that much better.

"We have no excuses," he said. "There wasn't too much of that WA flair. But as long as we learnt something from the match, it wasn't a waste of time."

Playing off a half-back-flank — or as a loose man in defence, more to the point — he collected an incredible 13 marks, 24 kicks and 10 handpasses. Those 34 possessions would put him in the class of a good rover or ruck-rover, not a defender. It was interesting to see him play the role so well perfected by his namesake — not his brother — Dwayne Lamb, now an Eagle.

### SCARED STIFFI

IF you think that Subiaco's Karl Langdon has used the peroxide treatment on his hair to match zany South Fremantle star Mark Jackson, then you're wrong. The real reason the Lions forward has such white hair is that he's still getting over an unfortunate experience at work recently. The talented Langdon was one of those victims of a bank robbery in Belmont when the thieves dropped from the ceiling, firing a few shots and generally scaring hell out of all the staff!

### OVER-REACTION

THERE weren't too many observers who felt that Subiaco's Todd Breman should have been reported for his minor flirtation with East Perth's David Bain. The feeling in the press box was that umpire Ken O'Driscoll was over-reacting after the Umpires Board had dropped umpires during the week for failing to report South Fremantle's Mark Jackson. As Ian Miller said on radio 6NR: "The umpire should have totally disregarded the incident." The Umpires Board itself put added pressure on the umpires by taking that disciplinary action.

### TIP FOR SHARKS

FLAMBOYANT commentator Percy Johnson handed out a tip to his old side last Saturday — develop some run in the team or you can't win the premiership, East Fremantle. Johnson was critical of the Sharks effort against Swan Districts and said they were playing 1938-style football — with no-one running past to take a handball.

### COACHING COURSE

THE next WAFL Level One coaching accreditation course will be held at Subiaco Oval on July 21-22 and 26. The 13-hour course is the first step in coaching accreditation for juniors — something that will be compulsory by the end of 1988. The course is broken into three segments — 7.30pm to 9.30pm on Tuesday, July 21 (the role of the coach); 7.10pm Wednesday, July 22 (psychology of coaching; injuries) and 8.30-4.30pm Sunday, July 26 when the topics include coaching techniques, fitness, laws and skills teaching. ### COCKER CLOBBERS

THE performance of Subiaco and State ruckman Shane Cocker must have been hard for East Perth officials to swallow. Discarded by East Perth, Cocker produced a best-on-ground performance to blast the Royals from Subiaco Oval. The ruckman won 28 hit outs and had around the ground statistics of 11 kicks, 10 marks and 16 handballs.

### WARY OF WARE

HE might not be a regular goalkicker, but defenders had better be wary of reliable Swan Districts defender Peter Ware if coach John Todd continues to play him on the half-forward line. Todd switched Ware into attack in the second half against East Fremantle last Saturday and the master-stroke was a real bonus. He kicked six goals straight to be an instrumental force in Swans 18.5 second half.

### DANIELS BACK

FORMER State player Allen Daniels has found a new lease of life with his new club. Daniels, who moved from Claremont to Perth last month, was one of the Demons stars against South Fremantle at Fremantle Oval last Saturday. He was a tireless worker in attack and defence, often using his terrific skills which have been in hibernation for much of this season. His 31 possessions and nine marks helped Perth overcome the early stages of the game when the Bulldogs were applying some pressure.

### FEATHERS FLIES

PETER Featherby, a key man in Subiaco's triumphant premiership last season, was quick to establish himself in the Lions win over East Perth last Saturday. Featherby gather 35 possession and though his legs are now 35-years-old, they carried him from one end of the ground to the other as he constructed play for the defending champions. Team-mate Phil Lamb was obviously pleased to have the "old warrior" back, because when Featherby was injured in the last quarter and appeared to be heading towards the interchange bench, he encouraged him to remain.

### DE GRAFF STARS

STILL on the ruckmen, what about the performance of Swan Districts Bob de Graff? He got his first league guernsey for 1987 on Saturday after winning the club's reserves fairest and best last season. He has been in the shadow of Mick Johns, who has been in splendid form this season and would have almost certainly got the No. 1 ruck job against South Australia on Tuesday night. To his credit, the 19-year-old de Graaf grasped his chance with both hands to win 19 hit outs against State squad ruckmen Brad Turnbridge and Steve Matthew, to be among Swans best players.

### BIG PENALTY

THE simmering verbal (and physical) warfare between the Brisbane Bears and the Sydney Morning Herald newspaper has resulted in a hefty \$2000 fine for Bears star Jim Edmond. The former Sydney Swans player was severely reprimanded for an incident where he punched SMH football writer Michael Cockerill to the head in the change-rooms. The Bears administration imposed the fine on Edmond for "conduct unbecoming to the image of the club". Edmond apologised to the club for his "indiscretion" but it's not yet clear whether the SMH will drop their legal action against the player. The VFL has kept a watchful eye on the proceedings — but took no action other to say: "We are satisfied that the issue has been handled in an appropriate manner."

### SIDEY RETIRES

IT IS sad to hear that big-man Garry Sidebottom has decided to hang up his boots (at least for this season). Sidey announced his retirement last week after a constant struggle against injury. He has only three three minutes of football, league or otherwise, this season. Sidebottom, a strong forward and defender, represented Swans on 114 occasions. He also made appearances for WA (5), St Kilda (54), Geelong (7) and Fitzroy (43). During that period he kicked 372 league goals.

### EAGLETS IN DEMAND

THE Burswood Eaglets will be a star attraction at this year's Australian Federation of Travel Agents Convention in Adelaide on July 31. Burswood Resort Casino and the WA Tourism Commission will be presenting the girls as part of the theme encompassing beauty, fun and excitement which WA is renowned for. The Burswood Resort Casino will be the venue for the 1988 conference.

### FEMALE TOUCH

IF you thought the South Australians looked fit last Tuesday night, the reason is they were trained by 1984 Olympic heptathlon gold medallist Glynis Nunn. She is the fitness instructor for West Torrens and South Australia. One of the players to benefit most from her efforts was captain Bruce Lindsay.

### FAMILIAR NUMBER

SUBIACO champion Peter Featherby made a welcome return to WAFL football last weekend and at the same time returned to his familiar No. 15 guernsey. Featherby has worn this number for the greater part of his career and it was only in the period between 1984 and 1986 that he used jumper No. 1, now worn by the hard-working Shane Cocker.

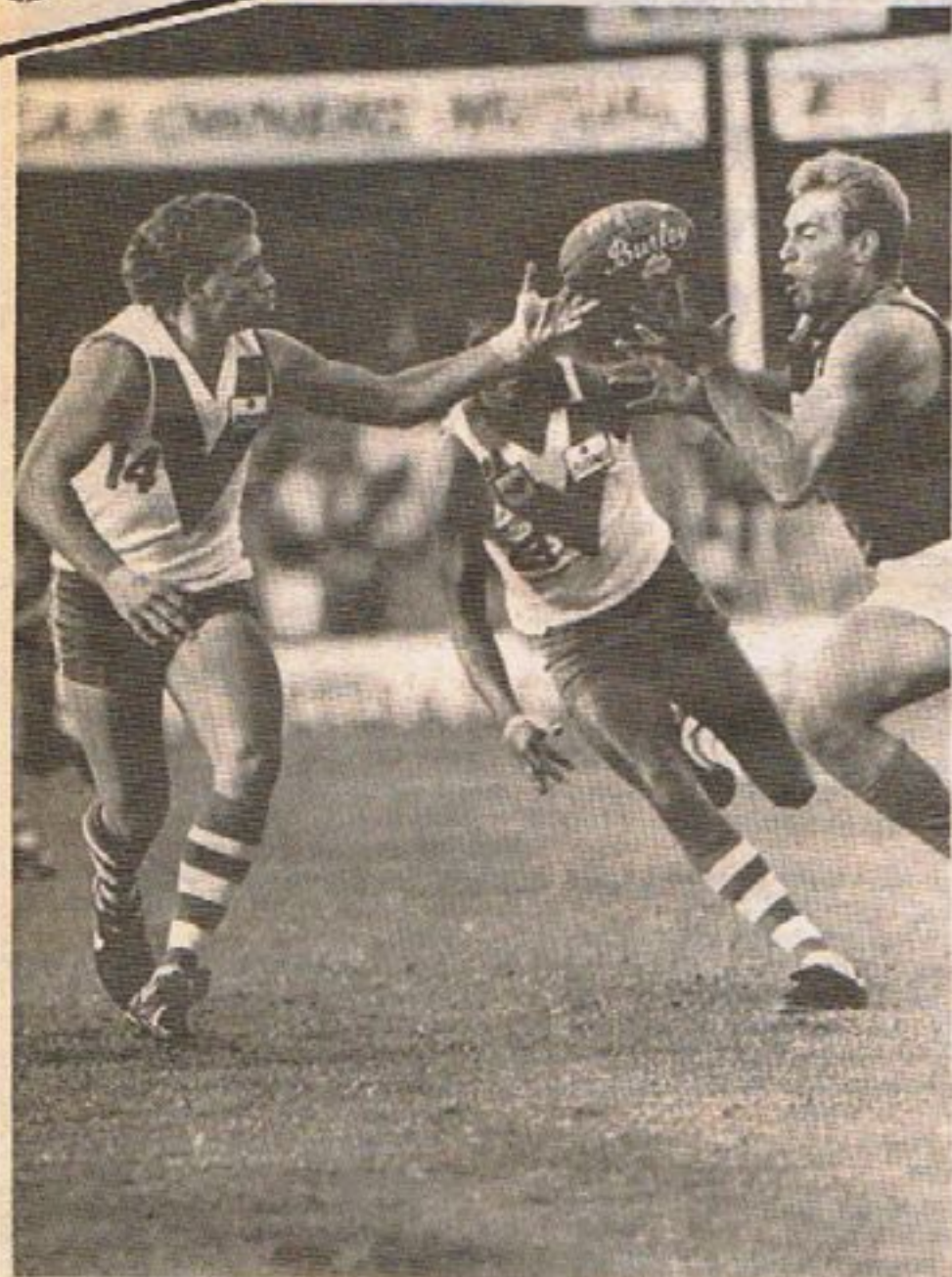

## MIXED MEMORIES

TWO of WA's best football exports to Victoria in bygone days must have had mixed feelings when the West Coast Eagles played Geelong last week. All-time great Graham (Polly Farmer and self-proclaimed super-star John K. Watts were back in their old territory to see the Geelong Cats get home by the bare six points. Both men were in Geelong's 1963 premiership after having played in the successful East Perth sides of that era. They were guests of Geelong and JK called the game for radio 6PR.

## NEW MANAGER

THE bus trip from Melbourne's Tullamarine Airport to Geelong was the meeting ground for the Eagle's new football manager, Russell Cox, to get to know the players. Mr Cox, back in Melbourne packing up before moving to Perth this weekend to start his new job, boarded the bus at the airport and quickly admitted to the players that he was really a Tasmanian even though he had worked as football manager with Richmond.

## CABLE STILL KING

THAT roving maestro Barry Cable, the genius with the handball, showed during last week's Geelong trip that he hasn't lost his skill. ## BAIRSTOW RECOVERING

FORMER South Fremantle star Mark Bairstow was disappointed to be out of the Geelong side for last week's Eagles game. But the good news about his broken jaw is that it's not as bad as first thought and he should only miss another week or two at the most. In fact, the Sandover Medallist made himself available for selection against the Eagles, but was over-ruled by coach John Devine.

## KEENAN ON KICKING

OUTSPOKEN VFL football critic and former star, Peter Keenan says there is a player in the competition today who is sticking his boot in left, right and centre. Keenan said that he had lost the tremendous respect he used to have for this player and wants the umpires to keep an eye on his antics. His name has been passed on.

## FLANIGAN FLOP

THE injury to expatriate South Australian Damien Bourke has dashed the hopes Fitzroy held for securing giant-sized ruckman Darren Flanigan from Geelong. Flanigan has been languishing in the reserves with the Cats, but since his promotion to senior ranks in Bourke's absence he has not looked back. After just a couple of impressive performances the "Katamatite Kid" was selected in the Victorian State squad only to miss the cut for the State-of-Origin clash with South Australia.

## EYES ON EVANS

SEVERAL VFL football clubs are keeping an eye on the performances of Carlton reserves rover Bernie Evans. He has spent a couple of games in the Blues second team and his immediate prospects with the league leaders doesn't look too bright. Evans would be a tremendous boost for any club's small man division.

## CAPPER NO. 2

SYDNEY Swans ruck-rover Gerard Healy says that team-mate Warwick Capper is the second best known sportsman in Australia, behind Greg Norman. He said that the following Capper has in Sydney is unreal and when the Swans were in Darwin earlier in the year to play against a Darwin side, the 20,000 spectators were chanting Capper before the players even went on the ground.

# Tough numbers game for the Eagles

THE West Coast Eagles are barely half-way into their first season in the expanded VFL competition — but already it is time for them to plan their 1988 assault.

And the place to start is with their player personnel.

It has become glaringly obvious, with the injury to Darren Bennett, that the Eagles lack alternatives in attack.

If Ross Glendinning does not mark — and he is coming under increased pressure as opposition coaches realise the predicament the Eagles struggle for momentum in attack.

The Glendinning situation was highlighted against Footscray and Geelong. When the Eagles needed goals to remain in touch two or three opposition players contested the aerial battles with him.

It was impossible for him to mark — and the small Eagles players were not at the fall of the ball ready to capitalise on the spoiling tactics.

There needs to be alternatives in attack and that is where the Eagles must first look if they hope to improve further in 1988.

Two players stand out as likely prospects.

East Fremantle full-forward Clinton Browning returned to WA this season labelled as a failure after a year with Hawthorn. But that was an unfair tag.

The Eagles would only need to take into account the efforts of Steve Malaxos, another player who could not earn enough opportunities with Hawthorn, when assessing the value of Browning.

Browning can play in any of the key positions; he can take a strong mark, reads the play well and uses the ball to good effect. His versatility should place him at the top of the Eagles shopping list.

Browning's East Fremantle teammate Colin Waterson is another with strong claims because he can fill roles at either end of the ground.

However, the Eagles had the chance to enlist his services in their initial campaign and opted for other Sharks players ahead of him.

Subiaco full-forward Todd Breman should come under strong consideration.

He has been in outstanding form for the Lions this season, takes a strong mark and with seemingly no effort, can kick goals from long distances.

Marking power has been a problem and as far as that is concerned there are no better aerialists in the WAFL than Swan Districts captain Brent Hutton.

He appeals because of the capacity to compete successfully at either end of the ground.

And to bolster the attacking skill on the flanks, the Eagles should call on the magical skills of Claremont's Derek Kickett and maybe East Fremantle's Ken Judge.

Kickett is one of league football's most exciting players and the ability to provide the inspirational spark which can turn defeat into victory making him a high priority player.

Judge arrived back in Perth without too much fanfare from Hawthorn and it is easy to forget his amazing goal sense.

The Eagles centreline has performed well in the opening half of the season and they need only to get players already in their squad near peak fitness to solve any problems in that area.

However, it is necessary to secure young players with talent and East Fremantle wingman Chris Waterman is a player of outstanding potential.

The defence is another story. And

again the question of the key positions comes under scrutiny.

Mark Zanotti has played well at centre-half-back when called upon to fill that role when Glendinning is in attack, but he is a little small for the key defensive role in the VFL and appears better suited to a flank where his hard running and ball skills can create attacking moves for the Eagles.

Therefore, young East Fremantle centre-half-back John O'Sullivan should come into calculations. He was in fine form early in the season and has slipped only marginally in recent weeks.

The need for a specialist full-back has also come to notice.

There are few more consistent defenders than Subiaco's Clinton Brown — and he would be an ideal choice.

Another player who could bolster the defence is young Claremont star Guy McKenna, who can be used in a back-pocket or on a half-back flank.

And if the Eagles decide another rover needs to be added, the man could be South Fremantle captain Brad Colliard, a skilful pacy and intelligent small man.

But the problem confronting the Eagles this season, as it was when they drafted their initial squad, is the numbers game.

They can make a minimum of four changes and that number can only be increased through player retirement. It is unlikely any members of the Eagles squad will give the game away, so it seems only four changes will be made.

And the Eagles are again restricted to a maximum of six players from each WAFL club.

The big problems exist with Claremont and Subiaco who already have the maximum number of six players. East Perth, East Fremantle and West Perth have five players each, Swan Districts and South Fremantle have three and there are two from Perth.

If the Eagles take Breman, the player likely to be dropped is rover Glen O'Loughlin. But at Claremont it is a much tougher choice if they bring Kickett into the squad.

The choice would rest between Geoff Miles, who has played well in defence, or Peter Davison, who has been again hampered by injury and restricted to two games.

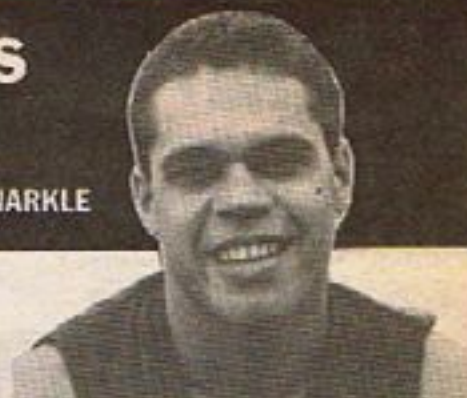
With that in mind, the four players I would choose are Waterman, Browning, Breman and Kickett.

Waterman is just one young player to emerge as a future star and the Eagles will obviously look at other youngsters with the capacity to develop.

They would include: CLAREMONT: Ben Allan, McKenna, Brian Sutherland; EAST FREMANTLE: O'Sullivan, Brad Tunbridge; EAST PERTH: Peter Cransberg; PERTH: John Clarkson, Rod Bogaards; SOUTH FREMANTLE: Peter Sumich, Richard Graham, Scott Watters; SUBIACO: John Georgiades; SWAN DISTRICTS: Andy Holmes; WEST PERTH: Craig Turley.

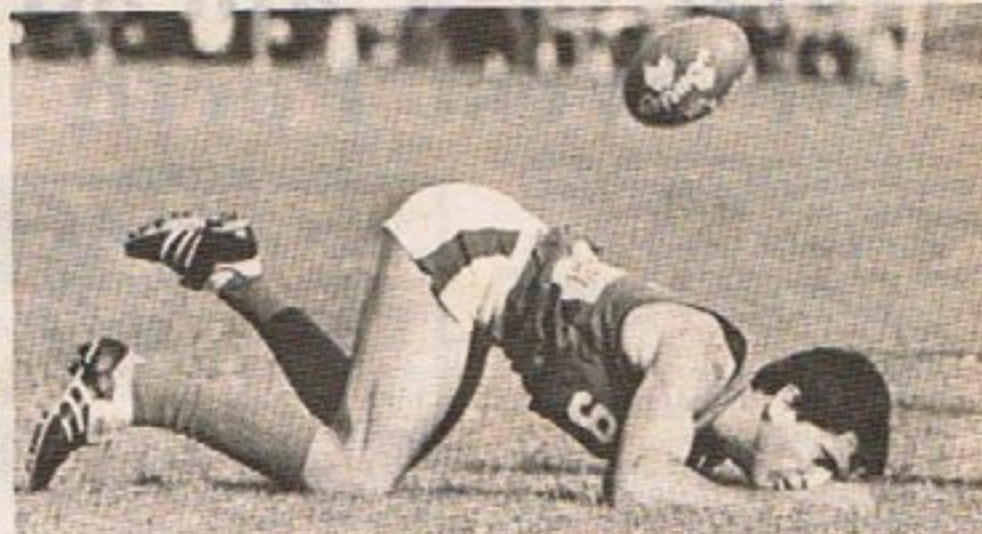
## POOR OLD PUBLIC!

# FOOTBALL FACTS

## Hard task ahead for West Perth

AT the half way mark of the season, West Perth find themselves 1½ games out of the four.

Sides out of the top four at this stage of the year rarely go on to be premiers — at least according to the record books.

From 1904 when finals were first played I can find only one team to have achieved this feat.

In 1978 East Perth were one game plus percentage out of the four after round 11 and went on to win the grand final by a margin of two points.

### EASY VICTORIES

LAST week's games had a combined tally of 262 points in favour of the winning sides. The week before the four winners had 259 points to spare (boosted by the 210 point thrashing of South).

Both these tallies, however, are way short of the record 358 points separating the winners and losers on August 30, 1952. The second biggest tally is 333 points on May 12, 1979.

In round 12, 58 years ago, an unusual scoring similarity occurred! The goals and behinds tally for each game played that day were:

West Perth 17.13 v Claremont 15.7 = 32.20. East Perth 11.7 v Perth 21.14 = 32.21. Subiaco 19.10 v South Fremantle 13.12 = 32.22. (In 1929, each round consisted of three games with one team having a bye).

### GOAL RECORDS

TWO weeks ago Paddy Madaffari became the 13th West Perth player to kick ten goals or more in a match.

Ted Tyson achieved this on 17 separate occasions. In one game in 1938 he booted 17.5 out of his teams total of 18.7 in a losing side.

Tyson also became the first player to kick 11 goals on the opening day of the season (1937); and the first to kick 1000 goals in WA Football.

The other West Perth players to have kicked double figures are: Ray Scott (eleven times), L. Holland (twice), P. Smith (twice), H. Loel, F. Hopkins, R. Ayre, R. Evans, L. Richards, C. Northcott, R. Alderton and D. Kickett (once each).

### ON THE MAT

WEST Coast Eagles ruckman Laurie Keene is currently having another holiday courtesy of the VFL Tribunal. He has now been reported three times in eleven games.

This outdoes the effort of East Fremantle's Norm Rogers. In 1968, Rogers was reported for the third time in 14 games. He was reported for abusive language by boundary umpire Pratt in the June Derby.

Keene's team-mate and Eagles captain, Ross Glendinning, has become only the second West Australian to play 200 VFL games. The first WA footballer to achieve membership of the "VFL 200 Club" was Max Richardson, (ex South Fremantle), who played 245 games for Collingwood and Fitzroy between 1969 and 1980.

His brother Wayne played 279 games for Collingwood 1966-1977, however, he never played in WA.

### 100TH VICTORY?

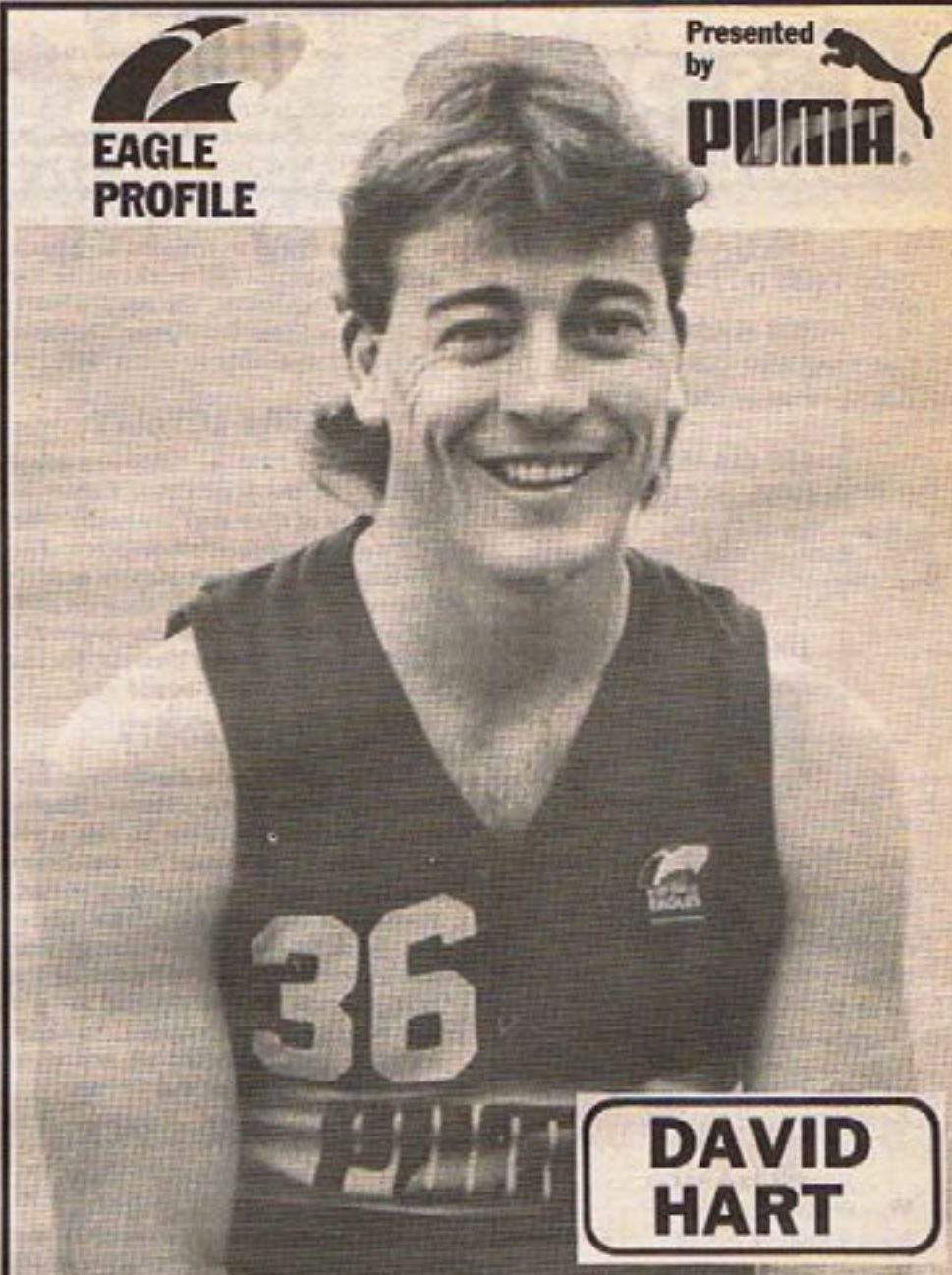
IN round 5 this year, Claremont beat Swan Districts for the 50th time at Claremont Oval. This week they could achieve another milestone. They will start favourites to win their 100th game against the black and whites.

These two clubs have played on five grounds since Swans entered the league in 1934. Here is a table showing how they have fared up to round 12.

## Swans show their style

IN the early 1980's, clashes between Swan Districts and Claremont attracted game of the day status.

That would not have been expected at the start of 1987 but it is the case this Saturday when the two do battle at Bassendean Oval.

Swans have surprised with their performances this season and with seven wins from 11 games are sitting in third position.

Their best win came last Saturday when they beat East Fremantle.

Swans have a healthy blend of youth and experience and have been in outstanding form.

De Graaf played a superb game against the Sharks and his ruck contests with David Court and Mal Thomson could be one of the interesting facets of the game.

Claremont have a young side with a sprinkling of experienced footballers including Noel Morton, Gerard Neesham, Peter Thorne, Stephen Goulding and Derek Kickett.

Their efforts this season have been enhanced by the emergence of talented youngsters Ben Allan, Don Pyke, Brian Sutherland and Guy McKenna.

## South struggle to survive

SUBIACO should continue their climb up football's ladder of success when they play South Fremantle, at Subiaco Oval on Saturday.

After a slow start, the Lions have gradually built up momentum and are ready to demolish a depleted South Fremantle.

South have been hit by a crippling run of injuries and the decision of flamboyant full-forward Mark Jackson to quit will make things even tougher for the inexperienced Bulldogs.



Subiaco have a close-knit defence led by Greg Wilkinson and Phil Lamb, a brilliant midfield unit well served by Mick Lee, Neil Taylor and Greg Carpenter and an attacking division which boasts talents like Todd Brennan and Karl Langdon.

After winning their first three games of the season, South have lost their last eight matches and things do not look bright for them, considering they have more than a full team of senior players on the injured list.

## Perth pose a threat

PERTH, with wins over East Perth and South Fremantle, have stayed within reach of the top four and get a chance to improve their position when they play East Fremantle, at East Fremantle Oval on Saturday.

And the task is not beyond the Demons, who have grown in stature and confidence.

While Perth have won their last two encounters, East Fremantle have been beaten by Claremont and Swan Districts and confidence must be at a low ebb.

As well, East Fremantle had more players involved in Tuesday's interstate clash and they could find it difficult to recover fully for their club match.

Perth were most impressive in disposing of South Fremantle and the return of big defender Allan Montgomery adds stability and versatility.

Montgomery was used in attack last



week and he proved the perfect foil for Mick Rea. They kicked 11 goals between them and could cause a few problems for the East Fremantle defensive unit.

But East Fremantle can ill-afford another loss and with the situation becoming a little desperate they should respond by returning to the winners list.

They are only a game clear of third placed Swan Districts, with another two points back to Subiaco.

## FALCONS NEED THIS ONE

EAST Perth-West Perth games are traditionally torrid affairs and just because the Royals are sitting on the bottom of the premiership ladder and West Perth chasing a top four spot, doesn't mean that Saturday's match will be different.

The Falcons were well beaten by Claremont last Saturday — after a week earlier beating South Fremantle by 210 points — and they had strong representation in the State game on Tuesday night.

East Perth have only won one of their 11 games but are gradually building a team capable of causing a few upsets and they will be anxious to beat West Perth.

East Perth are particularly difficult to beat at Perth Oval and this certainly will be no cake-walk for the Falcons.

However, West Perth realise the seriousness of this situation and should survive the contest. A loss would make it difficult for the Falcons.



# Eagles face a torrid time

THE next two weeks could decide the immediate future of the West Coast Eagles — and they must improve if they are to finish in the top five in their first season in the expanded VFL competition.

Successive losses to Footscray and Geelong — games the Eagles should have and could have won — have put the fledgling WA club in a difficult position.

They now come back to their tough run, playing Fitzroy, Richmond, Essendon, Sydney Swans, Carlton and Hawthorn in their next six matches. They must win a minimum of three of those games to stay in the chase for a finals berth.

That must start on Friday night when they play Fitzroy at the WACA Ground and they will then look to continue with a second win over Richmond. Failure to do that will almost certainly spell the end of their 1987 campaign.

And if they are to achieve that objective, they must make changes to their style of football.

### COMBINATION

Fitzroy boast one of the most talented combinations in the VFL, despite the fact that they are finding wins difficult to come by. And they are coached by David Parkin, one of the game's most astute judges.

They will be anxious to avert their downhill slide by picking up four premiership points against the WA-based team in Perth.

Players of the calibre of Richard Osborne, Doug Barwick, Mick Conlan and Scott McIvor have been slightly down on form. But that gives an indication of the talent and goalkicking power in the Lions ranks.

The Eagles must become more direct and make better use of the ball if they are to win this match.

And there is no better place for them to return to the winners circle than on their home turf at the WACA Ground. They have played only one game on that surface and were successful against the Brisbane Bears.

They will be anxious to retain their unbeaten record at cricket headquarters.

Steve Malaxos, David Hart and Wally Matera have been in good form mid-field, but they require support from ruck-rover John Annear and centreman Murray Wrensted — two players who have been down a little.

And the defensive unit must also



return to the positive brand of football they were playing earlier in the year.

Players like Michael O'Connell and Mark Zanotti, who were outstanding early in the season, are now struggling for touch and this match will be a test of their character.

And Ross Glendinning requires support in attack.

There is no doubt he has the capacity to win a game through his own performance, but some of the younger players will need to feed off the intelligent work of the Eagles centre-half-forward if they are to kick a winning score.

The Eagles are a different proposition in WA and they will make life tough for Fitzroy.

There will be one player — Dean Turner — who will be particularly anxious for a strong showing against his former VFL club. He is another who has been in good form for the Eagles.

One of the highlights of the match should be the clash between big ruckmen Alex Ishchenko and Matt Rendell. Ishchenko has been one of the "finds" for the Eagles this season and was in brilliant touch last Saturday.

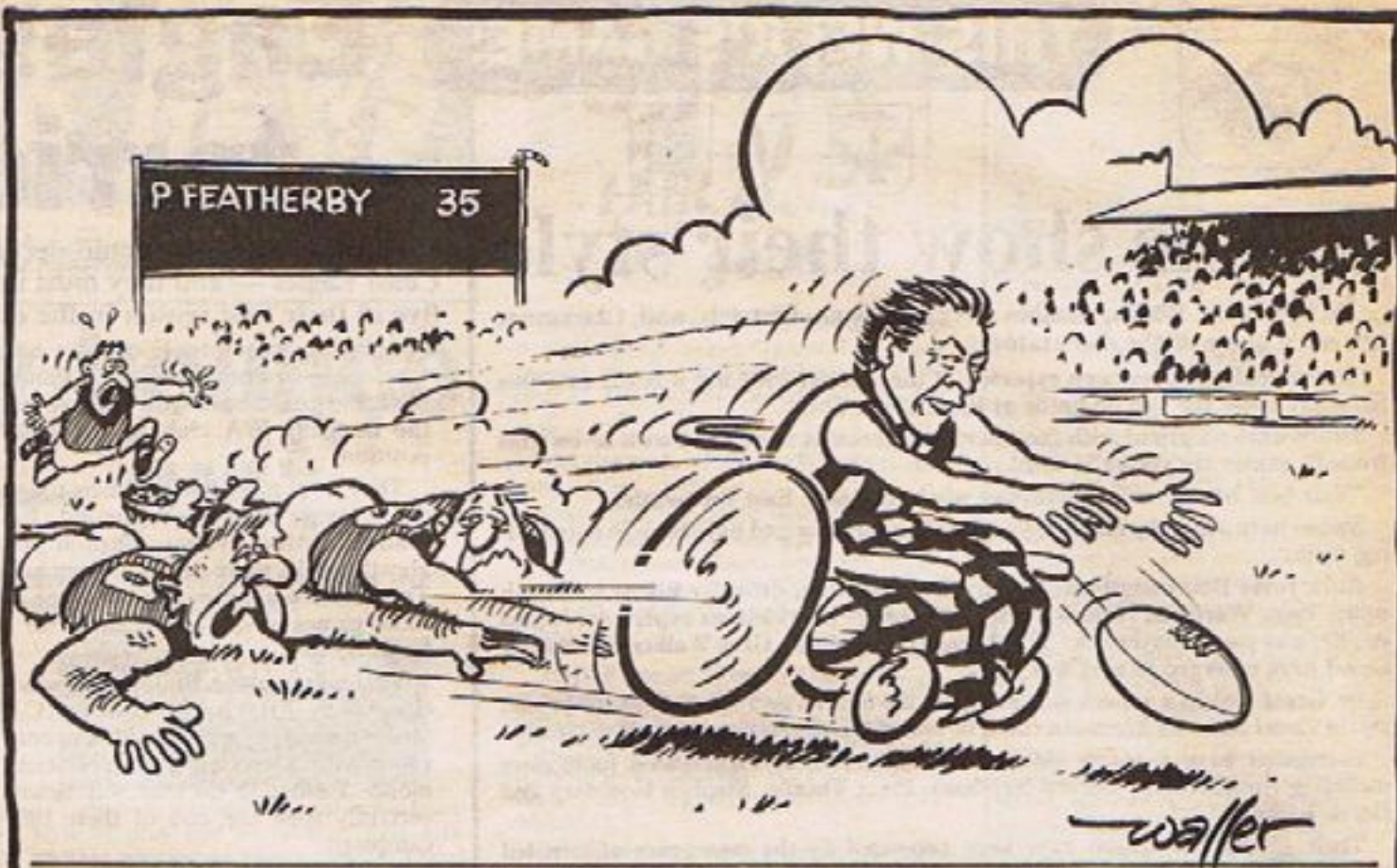

# Coaching duo prove a point

THERE are coaches and there ARE coaches.

Haydn Bunton and John Todd are showing that they are made of stuff that separates the men from the boys.

Subiaco were discarded by most critics in pre-season premiership selections because they were decimated by VFL clubs after last year's premiership win.

And it looked as though their predictions were right when the Lions got off to a hesitant start.

But how that has changed.

Bunton has moulded his left-over brigade into a team that not only looks certain to make the finals, but is again a premiership prospect.

Bunton's astuteness has been emphasised with the recruiting from East Perth of Shane Cocker.

The loss of Laurie Keene and Phil Scott left the Subiaco big-man cupboard bare. Cocker has shown potential at East Perth over a number of years, but that was all.

Under Bunton he has become a State ruckman.

Bunton has collected a good team around him. Among them is Neil Randall, chairman of selectors. It's a brains

trust that has enabled Subiaco to keep on their feet when other clubs, through the loss of so many players, would have fallen on their face.

As was the case with Subiaco, many believed that Swan Districts would be in the basement of the premiership ladder again this year.

There's no doubt that Swans are a vastly tougher side at home. But it was the way they reversed the trend of play to turn what appeared imminent defeat into a stirring win that indicates they could now hold their place in the four.

Swans aren't yet out of the woods. They still face a tough time making the finals.

But a whiff of success could not be a better tonic for a young side and they won't be in any hurry to surrender their position in the four.

That Todd has been able to blend a young side into a finals prospect is indicative of his ability as a coach.

### CHALLENGE

I thought Todd was washed up at Swans. Like many, I was of the impression that he had stayed on too long at Swans and should look for a new club and a new challenge.

It would have been easy to have left a sinking ship. Todd has not only kept the ship afloat with his football acumen, but has it on a steady course up the premiership ladder.

In contrast, Stan Magro has run into tempestuous seas at South Fremantle.

For a team that promised so much at the start of the season, the Bulldogs have become an embarrassment to the competition.

Magro has the job just to make Souths competitive again. It will be a test of his coaching ability to stop their dive to the bottom of the premiership ladder.

"They've got it in for me." Eagles ruckman Laurie Keene on his third report by VFL umpires.

"It's nice to know that the coach has confidence in me." Subiaco ruckman Shane Cocker on his big improvement under coach Haydn Bunton.

"West Perth played like a bunch of lard-heads. They would have been better off at the Saturday session." Peter van Helden on 6PR.

"If you play well in grand finals or interstate games, then people will always be chasing you." State coach John Todd on the challenge facing the WA players this week.

"We are concerned that the WAFL, under its laws, is powerless to act in these types of situations." Umpires Board chairman Slim Somerville on actions by Mark Jackson that went unreported.

"It's a real blow because the game against the Eagles was the one I was looking forward to." Sandover Medalist Mark Bairstow, who broke a jaw playing with Geelong.

"You can't give too much away. You need to keep the other side guessing." Claremont coach Gerard Neesham on team selection.

"I have been trying to get them to develop the killer instinct so we can play four good quarters of football." West Perth coach Bruce Monteath after their big win over Souths — and before last week's loss.

"It is incredible the difference between the two leagues." WAFL umpire Grant Vernon on his VFL debut.

"I just couldn't get on with the bloke; he was different." Claremont star Derek Kickett explaining why he left West Perth after differences with coach John Wynne.

"I think I'm just plain unlucky." Injured Eagles star Peter Davidon.

"I need the work now if I'm going to be of any value to the Eagles in the finals." Phil Narkle, on his bid to return to competitive football.

"At Subiaco we were very close as a bunch, but that's not so with the Eagles yet. It takes time, but we'll get there." Laurie Keene on the Eagles team spirit.

"We are gradually overcoming the setback at the start of the season when we lost so many of the last year's players." Perth coach Mal Brown after their win over South Fremantle.

Watching him in action against West Perth last week only confirmed my thoughts. With match statistics of 13 kicks, 15 marks and 15 handballs out of defence, he was a good choice as best on ground.

Every time West Perth launched an attack, McKenna either worked the ball or assisted with his good body use to help a teammate run out of defence and set up a counter attack.

At the young age of 18, McKenna has become a focal player in that mechanism and his reliability and stability are qualities that help win premierships.

When the Eagles selectors look at



who will come into their squad next year, McKenna's name must be a high priority.

Four of McKenna's teammates from that 1985 Teal Cup team are already on the Eagles list and another 14 are playing or have played league football.

But McKenna still ranks as the best total player I have coached. And that's saying something as that 1985 team possessed many outstanding young men who will continue to be top footballers.

Only time will tell, but players like McKenna who have clear goals and a total commitment to work can never fail in their objectives.

# Roberts...a footballer of character

**THE** retirement of former Perth and Subiaco defender Clinton Roberts highlights a much unheralded aspect of our game — the "honest" footballer.

Roberts epitomises what our game is all about — he was the perfect team man.

Not blessed with pace or an overabundance of natural skill, he developed great upper body strength to compensate. He never had the subtle body manoeuvrability needed to make him into a great player, but his dedication and total commitment to his team and club was of the highest order.

Rarely do you come across men with such a strong character. He would never slate his team-mates or the club, no matter how poor his form was or how harshly he might have been treated.

Having been involved in football for many years, I've found few men who you admire greatly for the effort they put in, even though the history books will not heap accolades on them.

Roberts is one and he retires from our game as a man of great character; he is an example to all current and future players.

# Plenty of stars coming up

**WESTERN** Australia has ample talent in its Teal Cup team for this year — but plenty of problems as well when it comes to chasing the prestigious title.

The WA team has been training and playing practice matches for more than a month and now they have just three weeks before they depart for Hobart.

And that's where the first problem lies.

Hobart's ground conditions will be totally foreign to our young players. They have small ovals with heavy, muddy surfaces which will restrict WA's running style.

The Vics generally come from a more 'pressure-type' competition and therefore know how to apply fierce pressure at a very early age in their football apprenticeships.

WA coach Greg Brehaut and selectors Stan Nowotny, Chris Mitsopoulos and John Duckworth are pleased with the enthusiasm and endeavour displayed by the youngsters. The experience of playing against the best young men from all over Australia will be great for their football future.

**CLAREMONT'S** performance against West Perth last Saturday was tremendous to watch.

Rarely have I seen such a dedicated and relentless Claremont side so methodically destroy their opposition.

Their tackling and use of the body to shepherd and block was outstanding.

"Richmond gave me a call in '84, but it never came to anything," he said.

However, his commitment to the club left much to be desired.

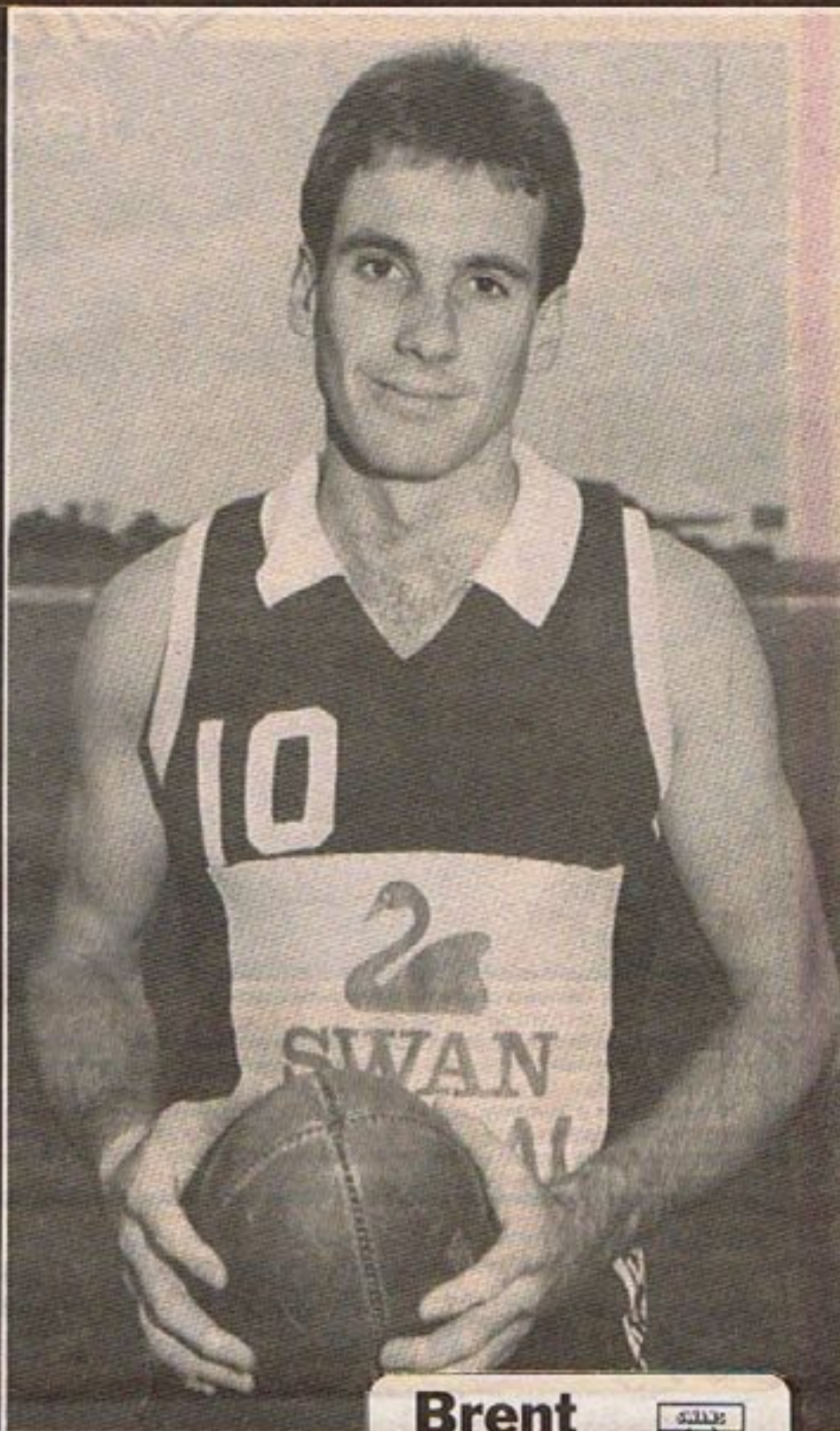
Because of growing outside interests, South Fremantle became of secondary importance to Jacko and he was a poor example to a young team.

 Been in charge for a full season now, but lacks depth in the stable and has tasted only limited success.



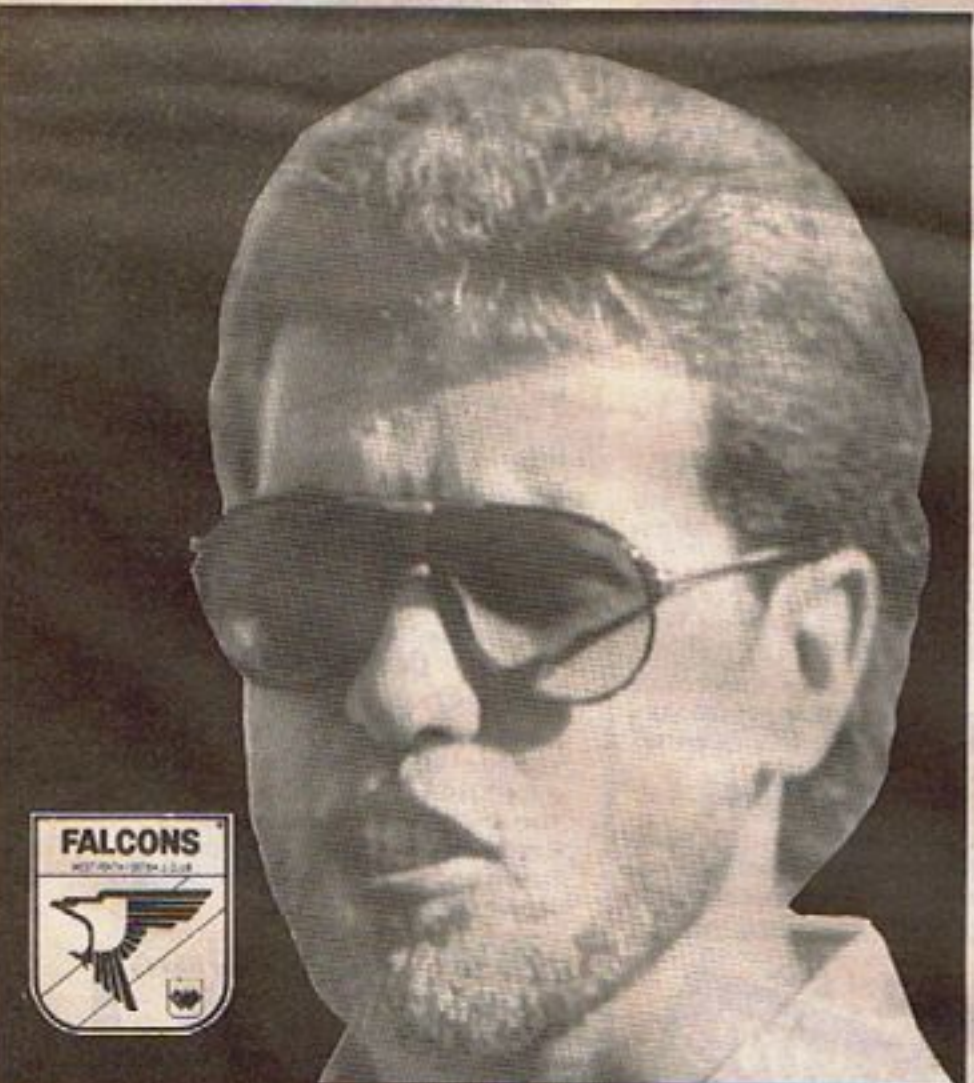

## Demons on the verge of a new era

**THE** move back to the WACA Ground has heralded a new era in football for the Perth Football Club.

General Manger Mick Moylan believes that the move will lift the club from its present lowly position on the league ladder.

The benefits include the obvious advantage of using the WACA playing surface as a home ground and the excellent facilities at WA's cricket headquarters.

"West Coast Eagles home games at the WACA ground are another attraction for people to become members of the Perth Football Club," Moylan said.

But despite all the advantages in the move from Lathlain Park (where the club still trains and maintains its administration), membership in the Demon camp is down by 50 per cent this year.

Moylan said that there are several reasons for this.

"A lot of people interested in becoming a Perth member were in limbo a bit with the late "okay" on our use of the WACA and together with the interest shown in the Eagles and the variable WAFL fixtures, everything snowballed against us.

"Now that the balance in the fixtures has returned, the crowds have started coming back as well.

"It is also noticeable that our membership has increased a little in the past month, the general manger and former South Fremantle and Claremont league footballer said.

Moylan became general manager of Perth in March, 1985 after joining the Demons in November 1984 as the football administrator.

He has had a close affiliation with Perth league coach Mal Brown for a number of years starting back at Claremont and then at South Fremantle. Moylan also coaches the colts side, which is in a rebuilding situation and currently in the bottom half of the premiership table.

Moylan isn't the only member of the Perth staff who has more than one role to play.

Reg Watson — brother of league vice captain Mark Watson — is the assistant administration manager and the league team runner.

Watson is a new appointment, as is development officer Steve Woodhouse.

Other permanent staff members are personal secretary Sue Andrews and receptionist Maria Princiotta.

Moylan says that Perth are financially well placed in 1987.

The Demons have attracted \$180,000 in sponsorship from Rothwells Ltd, Pennant Holdings, the Swan Brewery and Tricontinental Corporation.

"After being \$350,000 in the red in 1985, we are now in principle, debt free," says Moylan.

"We turned in a profit of \$150,000 in 1986 and we're looking for a similar effort this year," he said.

With functions like a Masquerade Ball, the Premier's Dinner hosted by the Premier Brian Burke, Perth's No.1 ticket holder and the annual auction in August, they have high hopes of achieving this aim.

Perth are also gearing up for a major assault on junior development — another reason why Moylan believes that the Demons will return to stay in the top half of the premiership table in the years to come.

## Why I decided to quit WA

BECAUSE of my decision to retire from league football, this could be my last column for WESTSIDE FOOTBALL.

### FOOTBALL LESSON

WEST Perth went from 35-goal winners to 16-goal losers in just seven days. That's a difference of 51 goals or 306 points in only a week.

Football works that way. I said last week that if a side gets a couple of early goals, then it lifts the whole team and hits the other side.

### EAGLES NOT GOOD ENOUGH

ABOUT the only way the West Coast Eagles will make the VFL finals is if they make it the final nine.

That's how well they are going and is about the position they will finish on the VFL ladder.

I was right again. It was too difficult for them to win at Kardinya Park and they will be lucky if they win a few in Melbourne even though they are hard to beat here because of good local support.

Everyone has heard the official reasons for me deciding to finish and probably have a few ideas of their own.

My business commitments have escalated to such an extent that I have found it impossible to devote much time to football.

I met with South Fremantle coach Stan Magro and Bulldog officials on Monday afternoon and we reached a mutual agreement releasing me from my contract.

I leave the club with no hard feelings and wish them all the best.

Since I cannot guarantee the club that I can train every week, it's only fair I stand aside and give a younger player the chance to fill my boots.

Sure, I'll be a hard act to follow but there is plenty of talent at South Fremantle and I'm sure they will find a suitable replacement.

Although the main reason for me finishing was the growing number of commitments, there were a few other reasons why the decision to stop playing football was easier to make.

Firstly, there was the trial by the media last week.

I was tried, convicted and hanged for certain incidents in the match against West Perth without me having the right of reply.

Carefully edited highlights on television of the match were things that happen in the normal course of a game. I could have gone through the videotape of the same game and picked out just as many incidents of violence against me.

I cannot afford the bad publicity which results from this unfair scrutiny.

Bad publicity against me is also bad publicity for Eveready, the company I represent throughout Australasia.

Secondly, as a direct result of this gutless act by the media, the umpires have mounted a "get Jacko" campaign and I doubt if I could even sneeze on the field without being reported.

While on the subject of umpires, those dropped after the West Perth game should count themselves lucky.

I believe they should have been dropped much earlier in the year — preferably before the first game.

And what about an umpires adviser who dubs his mates in?

At least players "shut up" and "stick up" for their fellow footballers at the tribunal hearings.

Fair dinkum, I would have hated to have been in the trenches and relied on umpires to back me up.

### RULES

WAFL umpires seen reluctant to enforce the rules.

They won't give a free kick in front of the big sticks, even blatant ones.

Another shameful happening is the "evening-up" of free kicks during the last quarter.

The umpires adviser at each game gives the field umpires a list of the free kicks and any imbalance is reduced during the fourth quarter.

Of course, the umpires deny that such a practice occurs but I assure you that this is not just a figment of my imagination.

## WAFL IS THE BIG LOSER

THE WAFL is going to be the big loser out of my retirement.

As if the loss of many of the best players and the formation of the West Coast Eagles wasn't enough.

That may have been pre-season stuff but this mid-season crisis will hit the league coffers.

League chief executive Peter Cumiskey was recently telling me that Jacko was the greatest thing for the competition.

Peter admitted I was the biggest crowd puller the WAFL had and I suppose he's right when one considers the 15,000 that watched the Derby earlier this year.

Now I'm afraid the WAFL will crash again. It appears to have second rate everything and is quickly sinking.

Things could have been so different if, like I deserved to be, I was selected in the State side this year.

I was the leading goalkicker, had the experience and would have been a lot fitter. I believe the side was picked on personalities, rather than ability and track record.

My big aim was to play State footy this year. I realise that my critics will now be saying I failed to kick 100 goals in the season.

But I was on target for such and was the leading goalkicker. Business commitments got so big and the umpires were making it so hard, that I had to get out.

And what of the future? I think I'll head to Bali and sort it all out.
